## No Dangerous Dams At Floyd Mines, Said

## **Burgess Doubts** Possible Danger Cited by Bureau

FLOYD

The U.S. Bureau of Mines in Washington last week said three of Kentucky's 23 potentially hazardous coal-waste dams are in Floyd county, but the Bureau's office chief here said he knows of no such dam.

Asked the location of "possibly hazardous" coal-waste impoundments in the county, W. R. Burgess, head of the Prestonsburg office, U. S. Bureau of Mines, said Monday the only waste impoundments he had knowledge of are the two on Spurlock Fork of Left Beaver and one on the mountain, near the Price tipple.

Only one of the impoundments on Spurlock is being used, and Mr. Burgess said he considers none of them dangerous. Bureau of Mines personnel visited every such dam in the area, soon after the Buffalo Creek disaster, and further inspection will probably be made within the next few days. The list of dams remaining under scrutiny gives sparse information about the

amount of water held by them. One dam, in Perry county, near Scuddy, was reported to have 15 million gallons of water backed up behind it. The dam was identified as belonging to the heirs of M. K. has been given the Kentucky Bar

According to the bureau, Beth-Elkhorn Corp., a subsidiary of Bethlehem Steel, owns the dams creating the three largest

In Pike county, on the Left Fork of Elkhorn Creek, a lake 2,000 feet long, 800 feet wide and seven feet deep.

In Letcher county, on Elkhorn Creek at Dunham, a lake 1,500 feet long, 300 feet wide and 100 feet deep.

In Letcher county, on the Razorblade Branch of Rockhouse Creek, a lake 1,400 feet long, 220 feet wide and 50 feet deep. Seven of the dams are in Pike; five each

in Breathitt and Letcher, two in Perry and one in Harlan. All five of the spoil banks are in Pike county.



### Accused Robber Of Pike Co. Bank Is Jailed Here

Burl Wells Spurlock, president of the bank here, said Monday he has had no word of any FBI success toward a solution of the crime.

Belcher, a resident of Draffin, Pike county, is accused of chasing bank employees with a machete and of scooping up \$10,825 before departing. As he left, he dropped one bundle of bills. He was arrested when State Trooper Kenneth Frost and Pike county Deputy Sheriff Hobe Robinson found him in his car which was parked while he was talking with another man. The second man was not accused of having a part in the robbery. State officers said the money taken from the bank was

strewn over the floor of his car. At his arraignment last Wednesday Belcher said his family had employed legal counsel and that the attorney had advised him to waive examining trial. He declined Mrs. Layne told officers she was not to answer questions. Belcher is scheduled to appear in U.S. district court at Pikeville,



## McGovern Gets No Support From Floyd and Seventh District

Supporters of front-running Senator McGovern won 10 of Kentucky's 47 delegates to the Democratic national convention last week-end at the state Democratic convention held at Frankfort, but they received no help from Floyd and other counties of the Seventh Congressional

The remaining 37 delegates go to Miami, uninstructed, as Governor Wendell H. Ford had urged.

State Representative W. J. Reynolds, Jr., of Allen, presided at the Seventh district convention, and all six of the district delegates got to the national convention, uninstructed. The district convention was described as "well-handled and orderly." Other district conventions had their flareups, however.

Representative Reynolds was one of the six national convention delegates named from the district. W. W. Burchett, Floyd county Democratic chairman, was chosen as a Presidential elector, and Edward Worland, Jr., of Prestonsburg, was elected as an under-30 member of the powerful State Central Exectuve Committee for a four-year term.

In addition to Reynolds, Seventh district delegates named to the national convention are Everett Reeves, Boyd county; Paul Patoon, Pike; Mrs. Norma Hogge, Rowan;

The Seventh did not share in the selection of state-at-large delegates unless Floyd county can still claim Ex-Governor Bert

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Combs, one of those chosen.

The former governor's daughter, Mrs. Lois Weinberg, of Pippa Passes, was nominated from the floor as an uncommitted delegate and received 16 votes.

Mr. Goble is at the UK Medical Center and is expected to be able to be brought home this week. He will be in a cast, however, and will not be able to return to work for two to three months.

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
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


reviewed under new Federal Legislation signed into law by President Nixon. Some coal miners and their families who didn't qualify before may now be eligible for monthly payments, according to Daryl E. Ratliff, manager of the Pikeville Social Security office. Coal miners and their dependents who

have previously filed claims do not have to file new applications to qualify for benefits. "These people do not have to do anything at this time," Ratliff said. "Claims denied in the past will be reviewed, and we'll let the applicants know as soon as we can as to how the new law affects them. The new law also will apply to claims that haven't been decided yet.'

Miners totally disabled by Black Lung from work in surface coal mines-as well as coal miners' widows, and orphans or other dependents may be newly eligible for Black Lung payments under the new law, Mr. Ratliff advised.

WHITESBURG, Ky.-This little coalmining town in the Eastern Kentucky mountains has a life-style, atmosphere and pace like most small communities, but with a heritage and spirit all its own. Now it's going to dramatize its heritage for all the world to see.

It's a heritage of former importance as a railroad town, of Civil War skirmishes fought along the nearby mountain ridges and of pride and love among the people for the rugged natural beauty in which they

For the past 19 months, the people of Whitesburg and Letcher County have been acquiring land and money, donated by local citizens, to build a 500-seat amphitheater and produce a drama, "The Little Shepherd of Kingdom Come," to tell thier tale.

The drama, which opens this month, carries a special meaning for the community, its citizens tell you, for it is a story written specifically about their valley.

Based on John Fox, Jr.'s novel of the same name, the drama tells of a mountain waif named Chad, raised in Kingdom Come, and his experiences in the Civil War when brother fought brother and friend fought friend.

In fact, it was in Whitesburg, about five miles from the site of the new amphitheater, that Fox wrote his novel—the first in this country to sell over one million copies. His cabin stands there today.

According to local citizens, Fox came to the valley from Paris, Ky., as a young man, with his father and brother to work in the mines.

It was here, they say, that the well-known author first developed his friendship and love for the mountain people. Here also he experienced many of the scenes about which he would later write, such as mountain men and their sons floating logs down the Kentucky River to the Bluegrass.







OLIVE HILL, Ky .- A blast from an old, old foxhorn will echo through these Kentucky hills on June 10 to start the singing at the 42nd annual American Folk Song Festival.

Thousands are expected to attend the two-day event in the rustic amphitheater of Carter Caves State Resort Park, a vacation retreat in Kentucky's rugged eastern

Staged in these highlands that may be the last bastion or pure fold music, the American Folk Song Festival has for four decades been the project of Jean Thomas.

All the native ingredients are always there-mountain folk dressed in homespun, linsey-woolsey and calico, musical instruments which were old when the first pioneers breached Cumberland Gap, and authentic folksongs and Elizabethan ballads that came to America in Colonial

A time machine that takes visitors back three centuries, this mountain musical event is a a unique experience, as the high hills echo song, frolic and lonesome tunes to the muted strain of fiddle and dulcimer, harp and flute.

The simple and haunting melodies preserve a centuries-old folklore and the rich Elizabethan heritage from which it grew. The songs tell of the solitary mountain life, the sorrows of poverty, the love and basic spirituality of the people.

Their instruments are as native and authentic as the songs-zithers, dulcimers, gourd banjos, banjos, banjos whittled from white oak, and cornstalk fiddles.

Since 1930, when she first gathered the balladeers and their quaint instruments from the hills and hollows of isolated Appalachia, Jean Thomas has been the guiding light of this annual conclave of musicians and enthusiasts determined to preserve folksinging as an authentic American art form.


The Traipsin' Woman herself is as legendary and colorful as any folksinging hero. Born in Ashland in 1881, she studied business and stenography and at 17 was hired as a stenographer by a circuit-riding judge. She began her travels to the farflung mountain county seats, and the people soon dubbed her the "Traipsin' Woman."

She left the mountains for New York and Greenwich Village, where she worked for 13 years. Later she put in a stint as a script girl for silent movies in Hollywood.

Her beloved mountains and their music were always a powerful magnet, however, and she returned in 1930 for a lifetime campaign which has included an appearance at the Royal Albert Hall in London, a network TV special with folksinger Burl Ives, a "Today Show" feature and nationwide coverage on NBC-

## Commerce Chief Has Mixed Emotions on Legislation

FRANKFORT, Ky. -State Commerce Commissioner Damon Harrison told a recent Industrial Development Institute conference at the University of Kentucky that, although no legislation was introduced that directly affected his department, industry was affected by the actions of the 1972 General Assembly.

"During the legislature," he said, "our department was very involved in evaluating legislation in terms of its effect on business. We submitted written comments to Gov. Wendell Ford on 44 bills and actually looked over every bill that was introduced.

"We won some points and, of course, we lost some."

Harrison told the industrialists, some measures "did not entirely suit me. And some of the actions did increase the cost of

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doing business in Kenutcky.

"However, in my judgment, Kentucky's million," Harrison said. competitive position is still sound."

several issues including the Kentucky tax system, wage base for unemployment insurance and helpful legislation for industrial development.

"Several serious students of taxes have shown factually within the past two or three years that the Kentucky tax system weighs relatively very heavily on individuals," he said. "Taxes on business and industry, on the other hand, are relatively light."

food was exempted from the state's fivecent sales tax and the corporate income tax was changed by removing the deductibility of the federal corporate income tax and reducing the tax rate to 4 percent of the first \$25,000 taxable income and to 5.8 per cent on income in excess of \$25,000. The new rates take effect July 1, 1972.

The current rates are 5 and 7 per cent respectively.

"The Kentucky General Fund will receive \$16 million more in corporate income taxes in 1973," Harrison said. "But the net increase to corporations will be only about \$8.3 million because of the deductibility under the federal tax."

He noted that, although \$8.3 million seems a large figure, it equals less than 1/2 percent of the wages paid by Kentucky manufacturing firms alone.

Corporate income taxes in Ohio, South and North Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, Tennessee, Michigan and New York exceed Kentucky's new rate.

The General Assembly also increased Kentucky's wage base for unemployment insurance from \$3000 to \$4200 per covered employee to meet new federal legislation.

"This federally required change would have added \$12 million annually to employers' contributions. But rate schedules

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

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

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Special Services at Alice Lloyd means special people. Bob Hall, director, Gale Walker, counselor, and three faculty tutors. According to one student "Special Services won't do things for you, but it will give you help in doing them yourself."

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The program began in 1970 when the U.S. Office of Education provided funds. As originally conceived, Special Services was supposed to help students with low financial resources and below average academic performance (below a 2.5 high school grade point average). But the assistance these students received, especially the counseling, has proved to be attractive and beneficial to better students and their parents need to have realistic expectations about college experience.

"Very often parents view college as an escape from a life of hard work," Bob says. "They don't want their sons and daughters to have to work as hard as they have. Students pick up this attitude, and if they avoid feeling guilty, then they think that only a small effort will get them through school and through life. It probably won't, and even if it does, the student will have lost the satisfaction of learning well, of having given himself so that the efforts and rewards can be truly enjoyed."

Bob believes that this kind of attitude considers hard work as "something to be avoided instead of something that can benefit people." But both Bob and Gale think that students often have difficulty learning because they don't think highly enough of themselves.

"Everyone is entitled to some selfesteem," says Gale, "and we want students to discover that there are good things about themselves. As they find their strengths and utilize them, they also can begin to overcome their deficiences."

Because all Alice Lloyd students work while attending school, it's important that their work hours become a "growth situation." Bob tries to arrange such situations to give students a challenge involving something that really interests them. "If students find it personally rewarding," he says, "they acquire extra motivation for their other learning ex-

The tutors find that many students are not academically able to compete in a classroom situation because of a poor background for a particular course. For such students, and often for the A and B students, tutoring enables them to do better work and feel more confident about their

Special Services personnel see increased desire among students and faculty for the that eventually the program will be extended officially to all students. In the meantime they have begun to help propriate senior colleges for continuing their education.

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
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

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#### More Holiday Traffic On Kentucky Toll Roads

FRANKFORT, Ky.—It may not be until the next three-day holiday that Kentucky's toll roads will register the amount of traffic realized during the recent Memorial Day

For the period 3 p.m. Friday, May 26, to midnight, May 29, the state's eight toll roads carried 634,385 vehicles.

Although this figure (an average of 181,240 vehicles daily) may not be impressive, it becomes somewhat more so when you consider that three of the toll roads together accounted for a mere 28,359 vehicles.

The Daniel Boone Parkway, between Manchester and London, had only 6626 vehicles in the 3½-day span, the Audubon Parkway registered 10,734 and Purchase Parkway traffice totaled 10,999.

Heading the list of the heavily-traveled toll roads was the Kentucky Turnpike, which carried 330,742 vehicles. the traffic count then falls off considerably, to the 86,492 vehicles counted on the Western Kentucky Parkway and the 84,041 on the Mountain Parkway.

There were 62,066 vehicles using the Blue Grass Parkway, which, like the Western Kentucky, deposits one of its lines of traffic onto the Kentucky Turnpike. The Pennyrile Parkway showed 42,685 vehicles for the same period.

Add to the 634,385 vehicles the estimated total of 9,922,260 miles traveled on the system during the weekend with no fatalities and only a handful of minor accidents and injuries, and you'd repeat the words of highway officials... "an outstanding weekend."

## Whatsoever Things

Did you ever notice the wonder of words? They have the power to heal or to hurt, to stab or to soothe, to lift or to level. And in that respect, each of us were created equal. That is, we can use or abuse this wonderful power of the spoken word.

It is easy to be cutting in one's remarks. And certainly this is the tempting route sometimes. All of us have, at some time in our life, experienced the very deep hurt that comes from the cutting remarks. And, beyond a doubt, each of us has been guilty of expressing cutting remarks ourself.

For words to cut deeply into one's heart doesn't mean they have to be spoken with malice or prejudice. Indeed, the deepest hurt comes from words spoken apart from malice or prejudice. For those who speak with malice or prejudice ususally have very little, if any, concern for those they speak against. But let one who is supposed to love us speak a selfish word to us and the cut goes into the quick.

Two young men were called upon one day to give a dramatic reading before a very select audience. One of the young men was very intelligent, very seasoned performer. He had the ability to hold the audience in his grip. The other young man was not so seasoned, had not the opportunity for experience. But he had one quality which was a part of him more than anything else—he wanted to become an actor. More than anything in all the world, he wished to become an actor.

The first young man went before the crowd polished and perfect—except for one slight flaw in pronouncing a word. When he walked off the stage his mother was waiting for him. She immediately began condemning the young man because he made the single mistake. She said nothing about the rest of the speech which was absolutely perfect. The only thing the young man could hear from the lips of his mother was condemnation for only a slight error—a slip of the tongue. The mother acted as if she was embarrassed by the son's mistake.

The second young man went on the stage. He mispronounced several words, forgot his script in three places, and in general gave a very poor amateur performance. But the audience could tell that the young man was trying, trying as hard as he could. When he walked from the stage he was utterly disgusted with his performance and vowed to do better next time. But his mother, waiting for him as he stepped from the stage, put her arms around him and



**Green Berets Slated** To Spelunk in Ky.

FRANKFORT, Ky.-Kentucky parks officials recently announced that Green Berets from the Army Special Forces Warfare Headquarters at Fort Bragg, have scheduled a spelunking exercise at Carter Caves State Resort Park near Olive Hill. June 13-26.

In what is believed to be a first in Special Forces history, some 30 veteran Green Berets-two A-teams plus support unitswill study the cave environment, surveying and mapping the cavern corridors.

Charles Rippy, state naturalist and parks coordinator for the exercise, explained that the Special Forces project was prompted by experiences in tunnel complexes in South Vietnam.

"This unusual training exercise will be mutually beneficial to the Special Forces and to the Parks Department," Rippy said.

"They will map our caves, and the use of our facilities will offer valuable subterranean insights for combat training." The exercise, labeled the FTS Cabecca

Fling IV, will begin the afternoon of June

13, when the 7th Special Forces troops drop by parachute in a zone near Carter Caves. The troops will billet at the park's group camp facility where food and supplies will be trucked for a field mess operation.

In addition to cave surveying and mapping, the combat unit's training schedule includes studies in cave rescue, rappelling (rope descent) and tension climbing, underground environmental effects and leadership problems.

A Special Forces Field Day will be held at Carter Caves on Sunday, June 25. The Green Berets will demonstrate phases of their operations such as helicopter rappelling, parachute jumps into Smoky Valley Lake and unarmed combat reper-

### Tax Relief Available To Storm, Flood Victims

Louisville, Ky.—The President's declaration that parts of Kentucky are a disaster area as a result of the storms and floods which occurred on or about April 12, 1972, makes special tax benefits available to disaster victims.

Robert J. Dath, District Director of Internal Revenue for Kentucky, said that victims may deduct their casualty losses on ATTEND ASBURY COMMENCEMENT their 1971 Federal income tax retruns instead of waiting until next year. Since 1971 returns have already been filed, taxpayers may deduct their losses by filing an amended return or a Claim Form 843. The deadline for doing this for calendar year returns is July 17, 1972.

Amended returns should be filed on Form 1040-X. Copies of the form and instructions

for its use are avialable at local IRS offices. Mr. Dath advised taxpayers suffering losses in storms and floods to prepare and retain records and information establishing the amount of their losses.

Nonbusiness casualty loss deductions are limited to the amount over \$100 for each

IRS Publication 547, "Tax Information on Disasters, Casualty Burnis Newsome, Curt Newsome and Losses and Thefts," describes procedures for claiming casualty losses. For a free copy send a post card to the District Director, Internal Revenue Service, P. O. Box 60, Louisville, Kentucky 40201.


