RESOLUTION

Passed by the
Kentucky Better Roads Council, Inc.
In Meeting On
May 15, 1972, Frankfort, Kentucky

WHEREAS, anti-highway forces are attempting to divert highway user taxes to other forms of transportation, failing to recognize the need for continued highway construction, and

WHEREAS, Kentucky has been forced to increase its state taxes and to resort to revenue bonds for road purposes while being assessed federal taxes which Congress has held as a highway trust fund, and

WHEREAS, bills pending in the Congress would divert trust fund money to other forms of transportation to supply the needs of more populous states for rapid rail and bus transportation, and

WHEREAS, increasing registration and use of motor vehicles is causing great concern in regard to traffic accidents and is resulting in major congestion problems,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the KENTUCKY BETTER ROADS COUNCIL go on record against any and all diversion of Highway Trust Fund money, and that members of Kentucky's Congressional Delegation be urged to support the will of Kentuckians in the matter of continued highway improvement and to resist any attempt to divert this money to other forms of transportation.

Done in Frankfort, Kentucky, on this, the 15th day of May, 1972.

All Black Lung Claims Reviewed Under New Law

All Black Lung claims that have not been approved are being automatically reviewed under new Federal Legislation signed into law by President Nixon. Some coal miners and their families who didn't qualify before may now be eligible for monthly payments, according to Daryl E. Ratliff, manager of the Pikeville Social Security office.

Coal miners and their dependents who have previously filed claims do not have to file new applications to qualify for benefits. "These people do not have to do anything at this time," Ratliff said. "Claims denied in the past will be reviewed, and we'll let the applicants know as soon as we can as to how the new law affects them. The new law also will apply to claims that haven't been decided yet."

Miners totally disabled by Black Lung from work in surface coal mines as well as coal miners' widows, and orphans or other dependents may be newly eligible for Black Lung payments under the new law, Mr. Ratliff advised.

Stuart, Arnow To Conduct Murray Writing Workshop

MURRAY, Ky.—Jesse Stuart, Kentucky author known the world over for his novels, short stories, poems and other writings, will direct a Creative Writing Workshop at Murray State University, June 26-July 14.

The workshop, now in its fourth season, is in reality a study in creative publishing, according to MSU journalism director Dr. L. J. Hortin.

Dr. Hortin, who is also coordinator of the workshop, explained that at the conclusion of each of the past three sessions a copyrighted book has been published containing creative writings in poetry, novels, short stories and articles by students attending the workshop.

The books have been titled "First Summer," "Second Summer," and "Third Summer," respectively.

Another is planned for publication this year. A limited number of the workshop collections are available at the Murray campus bookstore.

In addition to Dr. Stuart, scheduled lecturers for the workshop include Harriette Simpson Arnow, novelist and magazine writer; Lee Pennington, poet and short story writer, and Dr. Hortin.

Mrs. Arnow, born in Wayne County, and author of "Seedtime on the Cumberland" and "Hunter's Horn," will teach novel section.

Lee Pennington, president of the Kentucky Poetry Society and a Greenup County native, is a teacher at Jefferson Community College in Louisville. His published books of poetry include "April Poems" and "Spring of Violets."

Dr. Hortin, for many years director of the School of Journalism at Ohio University, has been a writer for the St. Louis Post Dispatch, the Associated Press and various professional magazines.

Workshoppers at the 1972 session will be permitted to enroll for three hours' credit in any one of the four sections and will also be permitted to audit one other session. They may enroll for graduate or undergraduate credit.

Preliminary registration will take place Monday, June 26, at 8 a.m. in the University School Auditorium.
