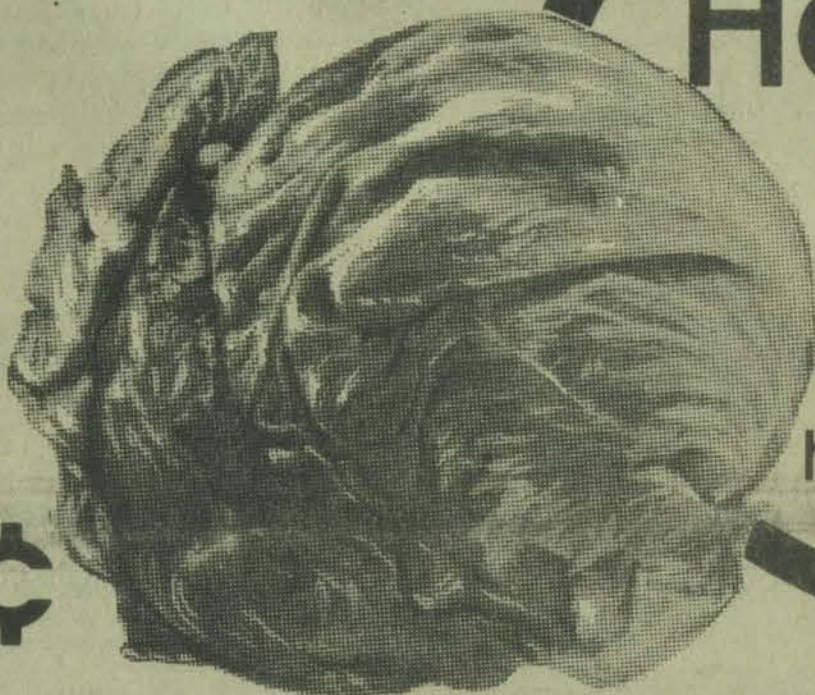

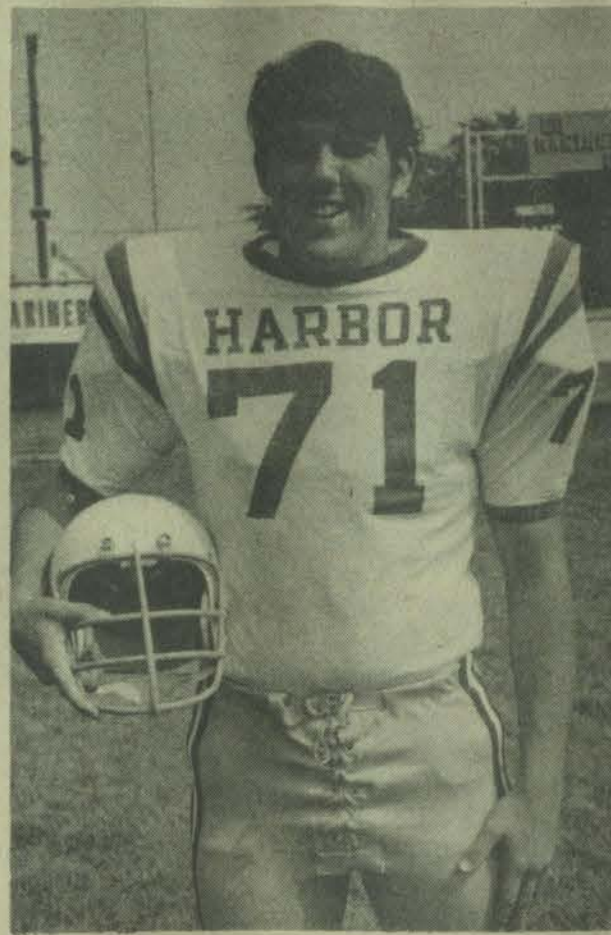

State To Begin Work in August Registering Welfare Recipients

Next month Kentucky will begin registering able-bodied welfare recipients for jobs, according to state Economic Security Commissioner Gail S. Huecker.

About 25 per cent of those on the rolls of Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) will be required to register under a new federal law which became effective July 1.

The new law requires able-bodied welfare recipients to sign up for work or job training and offers tax incentives to business firms to induce them to hire such persons.

Under the law, lists of those who register will be turned over to local employment offices, which will be responsible for interviewing the recipients, finding them jobs or assigning them to training.

Once the plan is under way, either the local employment offices or social workers will check on whether the recipients have jobs and how the jobs affect their welfare status, and will help them with any problems such as child-care needs.

As of April 30, Kentucky had an AFDC caseload of 40,476 families, representing 144,344 individuals, Mrs. Huecker said. She said about 75 per cent of them will be

exempt from registering for jobs for various reasons such as having children under six years old, being incapacitated or lacking available day-care services.

CREATE (Community Resources for Employment and Training Effort), a similar job-finding program, has been in operation in Kentucky for two years. That program, launched by the 1970 legislature, requires some welfare mothers to accept jobs or job training or have their welfare checks cut.

### Senior Citizens Protest Telephone Rate Increase

Frankfort, Ky.—The Kentucky Public Service Commission (PSC) heard opposition last Thursday to a \$25.6 million rate increase requested by the South Central Bell Telephone Co.

Early testimony by witnesses representing senior citizens and others living on fixed incomes said the rate hike, which would increase residential costs from 63 cents to \$2.25 per month, would work a particular hardship on them.

Several cited instances of persons having to sacrifice their telephone service because they were unable to afford the higher rates.

The increase took effect on an emergency basis in March subject to refund later if the PSC fails to give it final approval.

Later, more than 100 persons, led by John Reeves, chairman of the Kentucky Association of Older Persons, carried their protest to the steps of the state Capitol, where they displayed signs and listened to denunciations of the rate increase.

Later testimony by economic specialists generally concluded that the company, a subsidiary of the giant American Telephone and Telegraph complex, didn't warrant such a large increase because of its favored financial position as a monopoly utility.

Several of the latter witnesses were presented by the attorney general's office, which has been the chief opponent of the rate increase.

Support for the increase came in testimony at an earlier hearing.

Cary Davenport, one of those who said she might have to give up her phone, told the commission, "I'm here to plead for mercy." She said for the last three months she had to borrow money to pay her bills since "everything," not just the telephone bill, "had gone up."

"Some of us just get one monthly check," said Mary Etta Downing. "We can't go to the man and say, 'Give us another dollar to pay our telephone bill.'"

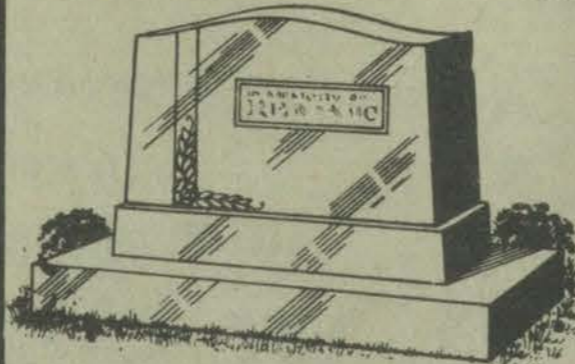

### For Whom Shall the Bell Toll?

For whom shall the bell toll?—that is the question which has resulted in legal skirmishing at Paintsville for some time now.

In 1927, when he was a youngster of 35, Fred Preston was considered by some as "the finest engineer on the Chesapeake & Ohio's Big Sandy Division." But he got into a fight with a fellow-worker, a brakeman, and was fired.

Almost 20 years later, Preston saw his old engine being stripped down. That was just after diesel engines had replaced the coal-burning locomotive. When he saw the old engine being dismantled, Preston wrote Walter J. Tuohy, C. & O. president, whom he has met a few years earlier, and asked for the old bell that had clanged through Big Sandy towns and crossroads the more than 20 years Preston had been at the throttle. It is claimed Preston told Tuohy he wanted the bell to put it in his church.

Anyway, Preston cleaned and polished the bell, and, he says, he really was planning to give it to a church. But came the report that the church was to be converted into an apartment building. So he stuck the cherished relic into an orange crate and left it in his yard.

That did it. A member of the church went before the grand jury and indicted Preston. The case later was dismissed and the bell was turned over to members of the church.

The next episode unfolded when the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) last year announced plans to tear down the church as a part of urban renewal action. Preston reclaimed the bell.

But at least one member of the church put the ex-railroader's action in stronger

terms. One, Cecil Tackett, said Preston swiped the bell. He claims the railroad company says it belongs to the church. A writ of delivery has been procured, and another court trial looms.

The whereabouts of the "bone of contention"? It's buried deep in effects at the new church. And this church already has a bell.

**FORMER FLOYD WOMAN PUBLISHING  
EARLY CENSUS OF THIS COUNTY**

Mrs. Verle Hamilton Parrish, of Stamping Ground, Ky., is publishing the 1850 Census of Floyd County, which was the fifth taken after the county was formed in 1799 from the counties of Fleming, Mason and Montgomery.

Mrs. Parrish, wife of H. T. Parrish and a former resident of this county, notes in her introduction to the work now being published that Edward Dobyns' list of taxable property for District 1 in Mason county is labelled "Floyd County, 1793" on the outside cover, thus indicating that several years passed during which the area was so designated before the General Assembly in 1799 legally made this district the county of Floyd.

That taxable property designation by Dobyns, the writer points out, was made only one year after Kentucky became a state (1792). "Its territory," she writes in her introduction, "was so extensive that from it have since been formed the whole of Pike county in 1821, parts of Clay in 1806, Harlan in 1819, Perry in 1820, Lawrence in 1821, Morgan in 1822, Breathitt in 1839, Letcher in 1842, Johnson in 1843, Rowan in 1856, Boyd, Magoffin and Wolfe in 1860, Elliott in 1869 and Lee in 1870..."

Mrs. Parrish adds in her introduction: "This Census Record was copied from microfilm records of the original population schedules on file at the National Archives, Washington, D. C. The Census was taken as of the 25th of July, 1850, by David Cooley, assistant Marshal. The 1850 Census was the first to record full names of all members of each family, their age, sex, occupation, if over 15 years of age, the value of real estate owned and the state or county of birth.

"These records were probably handled many times before being microfilmed, and many errors were made (often deliberately) by the person giving the in-

formation, by the person taking the Census (the difference in spelling family names) by my transcription (by sight, or typing), and many of the names were very hard to read. I have copied them in their original spelling as nearly as possible..."

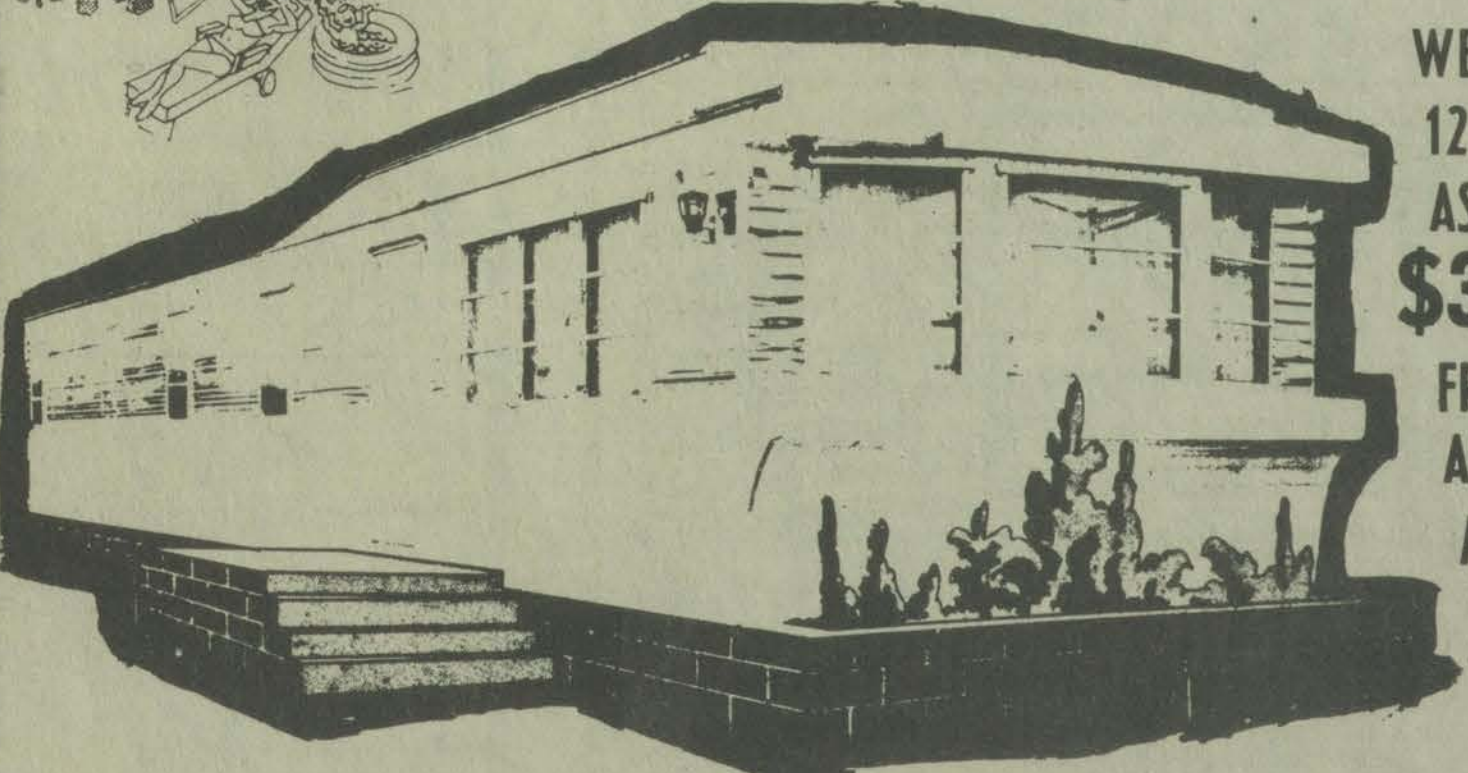

Trio of 150-Year-Olds Whooping It Up This Year!

West Liberty, Ky.—Triplets were born in Kentucky in 1822, and this year they are celebrating their 150th birthday. If the years have brought some wrinkles to the two Eastern Kentucky counties of Pike and Lawrence, and Hickman county in the far western end, face lifts have smoothed them into great beauties!

In the mid-1750's, William Robert Leslie and a brother John left their native Scotland and sailed with other immigrants to New York. Immediately after landing, William Robert's Scotch dander got riled and he came out victorious in a street fight with a stranger. He then decided he needed a shave to cool off, went into a barber shop and almost had his throat cut by the barber, who was a friend of the defeated fighter.

The throat injury plagued Leslie the rest of his life and might have contributed to his death years later, but not until he and his sons made a settlement at the mouth of Pond Creek in what would become Pike county.

The history of the area that eventually became Pike is an indication of the lusty strength of the pioneer who pitted himself against the Indian and the wilderness.

That early settlers put natural resources to good use in their battles to win the wilderness is evident in another experience of the Leslies.

William Robert, son Robert and nephew William McQuire were traveling along Rockcastle Creek in the Burning Springs area. One evening McQuire shot an elk near the mouth of the creek, and either long hunters in a nearby forest or a band of Indians became frightened and set fire to escaping gas at the springs, the fire lighting the countryside for many miles.

William Robert Leslie later fought the red man and again had his throat slashed, making it impossible for him ever afterward to eat solid food. A man with a lusty appetite, he tried to eat meat one evening while his wife was away from the house and choked to death.

While the Leslies were expanding their settlement, Harman's Station was being established in what would later become Johnson County and

Vancouver's Fort was being built in what one day would become Lawrence County.

Lawrence county's early history begins for the most part with Dr. Thomas Walker's explorations in the mid-1700's, but must include the presence of the first white man to see the Tug and Levisa Forks of the Big Sandy River.

Gabriel Arthur, captured by Indians, traveled the great warrior trail while in captivity in 1674, through deep forests to the present site of Louisa. Eighty years later, Mrs. Mary Ingles and her Dutch woman companion, both fleeing Indian captivity, escaped by way of the forks of the river.

Many historians believe that George Washington explored the area while surveying land grants. A marker in Louisa, founded as the county seat of Lawrence in 1822, states that Charles Vancouver established Vancouver's Fort in 1789. He had been granted 15,000 acres of land by Virginia Governor Beverly Randolph.

The fort later was abandoned to the Indians, but a new route from Virginia had been found, one that would start at Staunton and end in the Bluegrass of Kentucky.

While new settlements and travel routes were being established in the east, brave men were also opening new areas in the west and clearing the way for travel on the great Mississippi and Ohio rivers.

Hickman county was named for Capt. Paschal Hickman, who came to Kentucky from Virginia in 1785. He is known for his efforts to settle the region in the face of Indian opposition. He later was killed in the Battle of the River Raisin.

Hickman's first county court was held in an old blockhouse built by early settlers in 1804.

The blockhouse was in Columbus, which was the Hickman county seat until 1829 when the seat of justice was moved to Clinton. Near here is Columbus-Belmont Battlefield State Park.

Spencer Adkins is called the father of Pike county, which was named for Gen. Zebulon M. Pike. Lawrence county was named for Capt. James Lawrence.

A birthday cake would have to be of giant size to allow one slice for every visitor to these counties as they celebrate.

Major observances are scheduled during the week of July 4; but these counties had an exciting time winning the wilderness and they are not about to end their 150th birthday with just one party.

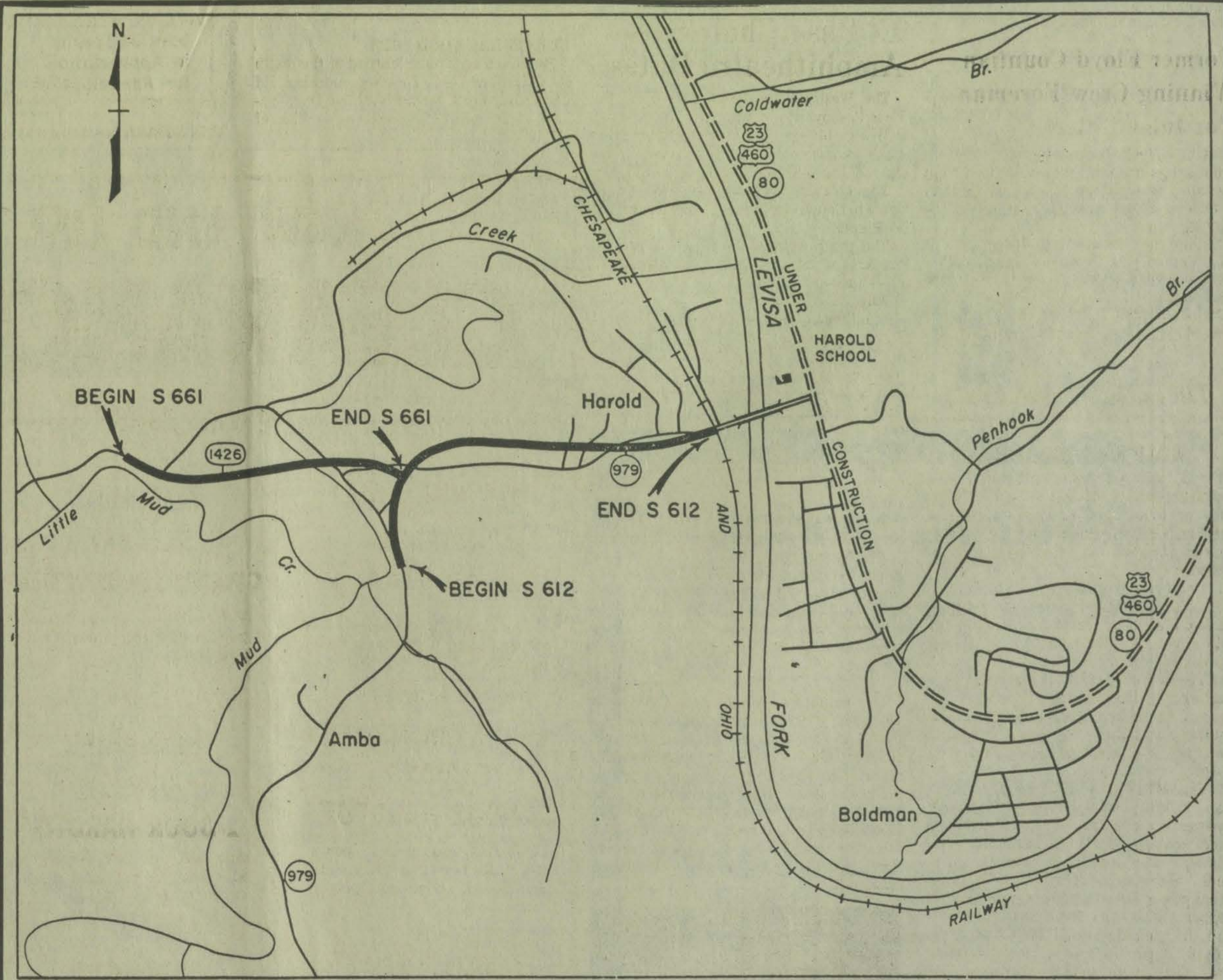

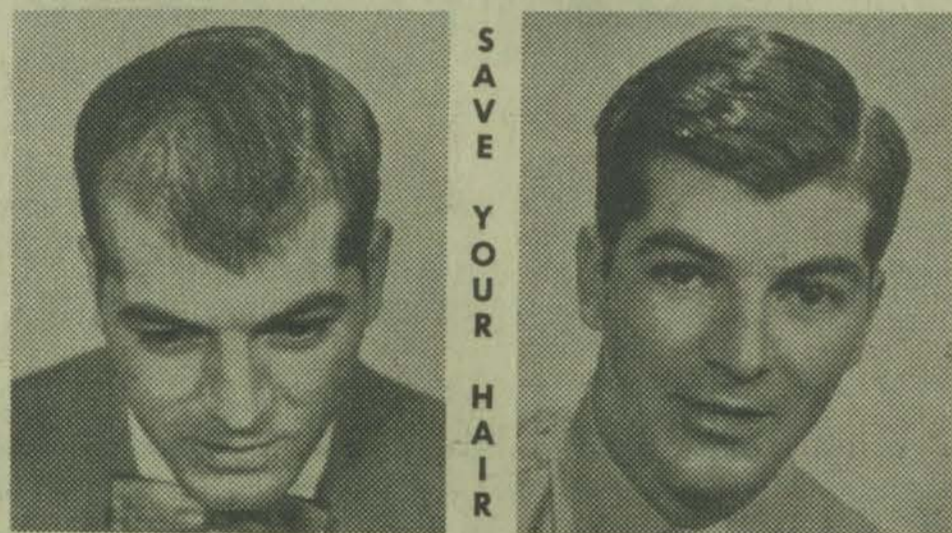

**Attorney General Hancock Favors Audit of Kentucky Racing Boards**

Reversing an opinion by his predecessor, attorney general Ed Hancock said State Auditor Mary Louise Foust has the authority to audit the Kentucky State Racing Commission and the State Trotting Commission.  
 Miss Foust began an audit of the commissions in 1970, but then Atty. Gen. John B. Breckinridge ruled "expenditure of state funds for that purpose would be illegal."  
 Mainly for this reason, Miss Foust said, she dropped the matter for the time being.

But now she plans to return to the audit as soon as members of her staff are available to complete the work.

Bolstered by Hancock's new opinion, Miss Foust said she hopes to complete audits of the commissions for the calendar years 1970 and 1971 this summer. The audits would be the first in the history of the two agencies by a state auditor.

The two commissions normally are audited annually by private firms, hired by the commissions themselves.

Hancock said in his opinion that state law not only permits but "requires the auditor of public accounts to annually audit the accounts of all state agencies...and budget units."

He added that the definition of a state agency is "broad...(including) any state officer, department, board, commission, institution, division or other person or functional group that is authorized to exercise any executive or administrative jurisdiction."

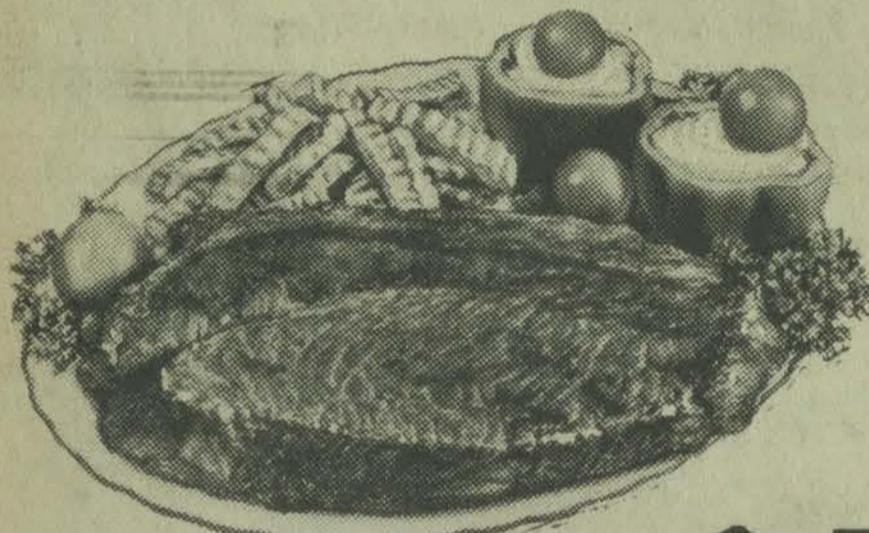

## Federal Court Decision Ties Up U.S. Water Pollution Program

Washington, D. C.—The Justice Department has asked a federal appeals court to reconsider a decision that has the nation's main program against water pollution tied up in knots.

A spokesman here said department agents petitioned the 3rd Circuit Court of Appeals in Philadelphia for a rehearing on its decision of last May 30.

A federal court in Pittsburgh had convicted the Pennsylvania Industrial Chemical Corp. (PICC) of violating an 1899 law, revived last year as a major weapon against pollution, which prohibits any waste discharge into a navigable waterway without a permit from the Army Corps of Engineers.

The company admittedly had no such permit, but then neither has virtually every industry in the nation, for the Corps has issued only half a dozen permits and prosecuted only a similar number of companies for failure to have one in the 73-year life of that law.

In December 1970, President Nixon ordered the Corps to establish a formal permit program.

On June 29, 1971, only two days before the Corps' first deadline for receipt of preliminary applications, the Pittsburgh federal court convicted Pennsylvania Industrial (PICC) of pollution violations allegedly committed in August 1970.

Last May 30, the appeals court ruled that PICC could not be convicted of lacking a permit when the Corps did not yet have a permit program in existence.

"We do not believe," the court said, "that the axe can stay or fall depending upon whether the defendant did or did not go through the charade of making an application for something which did not exist."

In seeding a rehearing, federal attorneys said Thursday that the appeals court was interpreting the law incorrectly.

"This court's construction... (makes) even the most harmful discharges lawful in the absence of a permit program, thus elevating the execution of a formal permit program above the essential purpose of the statute," they wrote.

The government's petition argued that the 1899 law "states that one wishing to discharge refuse must first seek a permit; nowhere does it suggest that the government must solicit permit applications or establish a formal permit program."
