Soon Another Bridge To Cross



This four-lane bridge spanning the Big Sandy at Allen is approximately 85 percent complete and, barring bad weather or other delaying circumstances, is expected to be completed in the next six to eight weeks. Construction work is being done by the Dixie Bridge Company.

Completion of the new sector of US 23 from the Mountain Parkway here to Allen is expected this summer. Kentucky Road Oiling, East Kentucky Paving and Central Kentucky Landscaping, which are doing the work from the Parkway to Water Gap, predict completion of that sector by June 30. The Winston Ford Company has the contract on the new highway from Water Gap to Allen, and his schedule is expected to be near that of Kentucky Road Oiling. All contractors have been hampered by frequent and heavy rains this spring.

39 Candidates Are Delinquent On First Report

Thirty-nine candidates for the Kentucky General Assembly, including House Majority Caucus Chairman W. J. Reynolds, of this county, have been reported to the attorney general's office as delinquent in filing the first of two preelection reports of their campaign expenditures.

Three candidates for state senator were among those listed. Five are from Louisville districts, and two are from Frankfort. Other Eastern Kentucky candidates, in addition to Reynolds, who failed to meet the filing deadline are Darvin Allen (D), Royalton; Mrs. Treva T. Howell (D), Jackson; Maude R. Miles (D), Salyersville; Taylor Bradley (D), Fredville, and Fon Deskins (D), Elkhorn City The reports were due April 30 but the state Registry of Election Finance did not file the list with Attorney General Ed Hancock till a week later. A second preelection statement by candidates is due 10 days before the primary, and a postelection statement is to follow. Representative Reynolds said his expense account has been filed. State law, Atty. Gen. Hancock said, permits the nullifying of the nomination election of candidates who are delinquent in filing expense accounts. But it was said four suits against delinquent candidates have failed to disqualify them.

Liquor Raids Net Large Haul

The largest haul of illegal intoxicants in recent months was recovered last Monday evening on Hunter's Branch at Hunter by State Troopers Danny Stumbo and Phillip Tucker and two men were arrested in connection with the raid.

Festa Salisbury, of Hunter and W. A. (James) Jacobs, of Wayland, were charged in quarterly court last Tuesday with possession of alcoholic beverages for purposes of sale after 183 cases of beer, 300 half-pints whiskey, 27 half-pints vodka, 18 half-pints gin, 18 pints wine and six bottles of beer were found in a building on Hunter Branch belonging to Salisbury. The two were released on \$500 appearance bond.

Huff was charged wth illegal transportation of alcoholic beverages and taken before Martin Police Judge D. M. Hutchinson.

Saturday, a raid on the residence of Freddie Collins on the Corn Fork of Brandy Keg by State Troopers Cantrell and Williamson, netted a total of 552 cans of beer. Collins was charged in quarterly court with possession of alcoholic beverages for purposes of resale and released from the county jail Saturday on \$500 appearance bond.

11th Annual Refund By Floyd Co. Clerk **Of Extra Fees Made**

The recent refund to the county of excess fees by County Clerk C. "Ollie" Robinson is said to have been the 11th time in the history of the county for such payment to be made. Robinson, who is completing his 12th year as County Clerk, is unopposed in the May primary and the November elections.

Excess fees returned to County Treasurer W. J. May this week by Mr. Robinson amounted to \$3,099.97. The fiscal court also allowed the Clerk to pay \$1900 this year to bind old books in the Clerk's office, which brings the total to \$4,899.97

Mr. Robinson said he has returned more than \$100,000 since he has been Clerk. In addition, \$2,676 was returned to the County Treasurer for taxes collected on recording deeds; \$1,201.26 for delinquent taxes collected for the year 1972; \$5,129 for occupatioal licenses, and

Board Split Emphasized This Week

Making the transition from the old election law to the new has Floyd county's election board split squarely down the middle, with two precinct officer lists possible and the acceptablity of both hanging in doubt.

Two members of the board-Sheriff Frank Leslie, ex-officio member, and Gormon Collins, appointed as the Republican member-met last Tuesday and named officers for all 44 precincts. Sheriff Leslie, acting as chairman. notified Yvonne S. Jones, appointed Democratic member, of the 10 a.m. meeting but she did not appear.

Leslie said Jim Hammond, who was appointed to the board to take the place of County Clerk C. "Ollie" Robinson, who could not serve because he is a candidate, was not legally appointed, is not considered by him and Collins as a member, and so was not notified to attend the meeting. They contend that they constituted a quorum

Meanwhile, Mr. Hammond, acting on the advice of the attorney general's office as chairman of the board, was notifying all four members of the board of a meeting to be held at the courthouse at 2 p.m. Monday. Only he and Mrs. Jones appeared and in the absence of a quorum could take no official action.

Water Association **Sets Deadline For Consumers To Sign**

The Parkway Water Association, which will provide water service to homes and businesses in a three-milelong area up Middle Creek from the present terminus of the Prestonsburg water system at the Clark elementary school, is ready for final plans, and a June 1 deadline has been set for consumers to sign up for the service at the reduced cost of \$100. After June 1 the tap-on fee will be \$300, or the actual cost of making the connection-whichever is greater. D. H. Holbrook, a member of the Association, explained that Richard E. Martin, engineer, has been instructed to proceed with final plans and that, once these are completed, no changes or additions can be made till the water main is actually laid.

This is what the applicable state law says:

"The nomination for, or election to, an office of any candidate who violates any provision (of the state campaingspending laws), or whose campaign treasurer violates a provison (of the laws) shall be void, and the office or candidacy shall be filled as provided by law for the filling of a vacancy.

'An action to declare a vacancy under this subsection may be brought by the registry or any candidate for the office sought to be declared vacant.

Perkins Urges Ky. Communities To File for Clean Water Funds

Rep. Carl C. Perkins this week urged Kentucky communities to move ahead with applications for federal funds to clean up water resources, after a judge had ruled that the government should not withhold the appropriated money.

"I welcome the ruling, because unless we get some help in Kentucky-and all over the country, for that matterthere's not going to be enough water for us to drink safely, let along out children and grandchilddren," Perkins said.

The Congressman worked for and voted for the funds to help communities build and improve sewerage treatment plants.

President Nixon had vetoed the bill, but the House and Senate passed it again, over his veto.

"I think that when you can get enough members of the House and Senate to pass a bill over the President's veto, you know you are dealing with something the people want, and ought to have," Perkins said. "I don't see how anyone can deny people the right to have pure water.'

Perkins noted that the Administration may appeal the decision, but he urged communities to go ahead with applications anyway, saying, "We can't sit around and wait, year after year, waiting for clean water until it's too late. That's what happened with fuel oil and gasoline. and I don't want to see the day come in this country when we have to ration water.

The project, estimated to cost \$75,000, is being financed by a Farm Home Administration loan. No federal grant funds have been made available. The water system will extend from the Clark school to Mill Branch, near the mouth of Rough and Tough fork of Middle Creek.

Fifty-one have signed tap-on contracts. About 10 more consumers are needed, Holbrook said.

Dear voter,

Some time ago I made the decision to become a candidate for your State Representative in the 95th District of Floyd County. I did so on my own. I felt-and still believe—that the most important issue in any campaign is not how many powerful friends you have in Frankfort, Louisville or Owensboro, but what kind of program and representation you can offer to the people of Floyd County.

My opponent has received the blessings of the present and former governors-not to mention the party chieftan from Western Kentucky. None of them works here, or earns a living here, or drives over our roads, or sends children to our schools, or shops in our local businesses, or owns property here, or votes here.

The people who have endorsed me are just that—people. The ones who care about Floyd County. Public endorsements have been given to me by the members of my union—the men and women I work with every day—and by the working coal miners who apparently believe I can offer a better program for them and the county they live and work in. Privately, I've received the backing of many good people in Floyd Countyteachers, professional people, business men and women-a wide cross-section of people who really care about this county.

To me, the point is obvious. I owe no favors to anyone outside of Floyd County and no one owes me any. I am my own man and will be my own man as your Representative. I will vote for the best deal for Floyd County and that is the only "deal" I am interested in. I will not OWE my election to powerful outsiders . . . I will not OWE them my vote in the House of Representatives on important issues. The only people I will owe my vote to are the voters of Floyd County.

Likewise, I do not owe anything to my employers. I am extremely grateful to the C & O Railroad for their policy of encouraging their employees to run for public office, and if I am elected, that policy is to allow me all the time needed to be your Representative in Frankfort. In the meantime, I am on leave of absence-without pay-to run for this office. I am not using a company car to drive around in or a company credit card, and I get no special favors from my company. They do not ask me for favors and I do not owe them any.

Since this campaign began, I have challenged my opponent on several issues which I

believe are important to Floyd County:

1. Severance tax on coal-A crippling 30 cents per ton tax on our most important mineral and source of many jobs in Floyd County, but none on oil or gas-he voted for it.

2. Redistricting—Took eight precincts—and 2,900 voters—out of this county and added them to the Senate District in Johnson, Lawrence and Boyd and the House District in Pike-he voted for it.

3. Workman's Compensation—The bill he voted for does more to help lawyers get rich on black lung cases and hurt the coal industry with impossibly high compensation rates than it does to help the working man in the mines.

So far, my opponent has not said a single word about the questions I have raised. Instead, he has run to Frankfort or Louisville to get anoher endorsement from a powerful friend. I do not believe that Floyd County needs another two years of being represented in Frankfort by and for Mr. Reynolds' "friends."

I was told by some of these outsider friends that I should not enter this race. Apparently no one is supposed to run against Mr. Reynolds. However, I meet the gualifications of age (1 am 30), of living in the District (at Martin) of being a citizen (born here to Mr. and Mrs. William "Bill" Allen) and I have filed all the necessary papers and campaign reports required of me. In addition, I have three years of college (at Morehead and Pikeville), am a working man in Floyd County (for the C & O Railroad), am a family man (wife, Emily Allen, a school teacher, and son, Greg, age 7) and-most importantly-I am interested in and concerned for the needs of Floyd County.

I ask you-the voters of Floyd County-do you want another two years of boss rule, guided by my opponent's powerful friends in Frankfort, Louisville, Owensboro, and Charleston, W. Va., or do you want—for a change—a representative in Frankfort who owes only the people of Floyd County who sent him there? The choice is yours on election day.

The Morgan county smithy not only made guns but also shod horses for his neighbors, mended and made their farm tools and even served as community dentist when necessary

"I've seen the set of forceps he made for pulling his neighbors' teeth," the late J. M. Gevedon, of Grassy Creek, wrote in

When he had a few extra hours, he devoted them to making slat-back chairs and other furniture.

It was in 1874 that Chaney, his parents, a number of brothers and a sister moved from Pike to Morgan county. The family acquired land that extended two miles from the present Salem Church to Halsey Branch of Grassy Creek.

Though a man of many talents, Chaney was more popularly known as a gunsmith. People came from far and near to buy his guns, paying the specific price of ten dollars.

Josh Perkins, of Morgan, and Henry Perry, of Wolfe county, were also gunsmiths, noted for their artistry and skill, as was Chaney. Perkins made many fine "squirrel guns"-from .22 flobert rifle barrels

According to Gevedon, many of the old time smiths took guns made for large game and reduced the caliber for smaller game. "This was done by inserting a cold steel rod into a heated barrel and beating it down to the desired caliber. Then they redressed and rerifled the gun.

Nothing came easy to the workman of 100 years ago. Timber for gun stocks was soaked in water sometimes for a year,

curly part of the maple was long enough they made the whole length stock called whole stock," wrote Gevedon, "but sometimes the curl didn't reach far enough, then they made the half stock with a rib to reach from there to the muzzle."

Most merchants of that era maintained a stock of hardware for guns, with J. Taylor Day of Hazel Green supplying area smiths with butt plates, locks, triggers, guards, cylinders, thimbles for the ramrod, ferules for the stock end and barrels.

The last gun made by Chaney was for Dr. Guerrant, of Central Kentucky, who wanted a special gift for his son.

Guerrant had organized the Presbyterian Church at Salem, and because of Chaney's respect for him and his part in the community's religious life, he used special care in making the rifle. This gun was the last and perhaps the finest of all the Chaney guns.

It is not known if Chaney, Perry or Perkins used special marks on their creations, but all three men were known for accuracy. It might be their guns are still blazing away, winning trophies for today's Kentucky marksmen.



If Strip-Mining Were Banned ...

The Times has argued, without any great success, that in its opposition to most, if not all, stripmining it is not an enemy but a friend of the coal mining industry.

Our contention has been that, aside from all the destructive aspects of surface mining, it offers a deadly competition to deepmined coal, that it employs relatively few workers, produces low-cost coal and reduces the number of drift-mouth operations which do employ many.

We have argued that coal, plentiful and vital as it is to the nation, is not all that is needed. We insist that its production should provide work for men, payrolls for communities, taxpayers who join the rest of us in paying the never-paid bill.

Many have refused to "buy" that argument.

But now comes a report prepared for the Appalachian Regional Commission which suggests that even the abolition of contour stripmining would result in a major increase in employment rather than in the adverse economic effects surfacemining adherents predict.

The report, prepared for ARC by Charles River Associated, Inc., indicates that as many as 9,000 jobs would be added to the work-force in Eastern Kentucky and West Virginia if stripmining were banned. And, it adds, even the resultant increase in the price of coal produced from deep mines is taken into consideration in that prediction of more men working.

The coal of Eastern Kentucky is of such quality, the report says, that addition of 50 cents a ton to the price will not affect its sale. The two problem points for the industry are listed as (1) further restriction on the sulphur content of coal burned by power generating plants, and (2) the further lifting or entirely removing of oil import quotas.

Each year, the balances are tilted farther toward surface mining. The volume of coal produced may even increase, but the number of men making a living and working at home will become less. And Eastern Kentucky will have lived in an economic fool's paradise, following the lure of the quick dollar while its basic coal industry was dying.

WOMAN'S CLUB FEATURES MT. MENTAL HEALTH EMPLOYEE

Sister Noreen Bentfield and Mrs. Brenda Kinder, of the Mountain Mental Health Services, Prestonsburg, were guest speakers recently at the March meeting of the Lackey-Garrett-Wayland Woman's Club, which was held at the home of Mrs. J. T. Spillman, Lackey.

Naming the many services of the Mental Health out-patient clinic, Sister Noreen listed a child psychologist to assist in solving children's problems, facilities for counseling, testing, and an alcoholic and drug abuse program. She explained that patients are picked up in the morning three days a week by bus and are involved at the clinic in various group projects in order that they may have the benefit of a variety of learning experiences, while at the same time learning to cooperate and get along with other people. Often they cook and then clean up after the meal; they go to town; they bowl; and occasionally, when weather permits, they have a picnic. On Tuesdays and Thursdays the nurses go to the Golden Years Rest Home, Lackey, to lead in group social activities there. They pointed out that volunteers are always welcome to assist the nurses.

The Community Placement Program was also explained by the speakers. Many patients ready to leave the Eastern Kentucky State Hospital have no place to go. So, many persons out in the community have volunteered their homes for these patients. The nurses call at the homes at regular intervals and keep a report on the patients' progress. This program is a first in the State and one of







Kentucky Afield By Hope Carleton Dept. of Fish and Wildlife

Fishermen are a strange lot. For example, there are those who will attest that trout is the only fish to battle. Others feel that black bass is tops while some choose crappie, White bass, catfish, Rock bass or others. There is a large segment of Kentucky's ardent anglers who swear there's no finer fish than the bluegill.

In fact every fisherman has a certain fish that is tops on his list.

Bluegill fishing is especially good during the spawning season, particularly in the shallows of some 60,000 farm ponds that have been stocked by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

It is not uncommon to witness the saucer-like depressions in the shallows and see handsize bluegill by the hundreds.

Angling methods are wide and varied. Possibly the most used outfit is the closefaced spinning rig, equipped with a casting bubble, small hook and a lively worm.

The fisherman casts over the nesting area, allows the worm to sink slowly and then carefully retrieves the bait over the nesting site. At times this method brings a fish with every cast.

Other methods that are quite effective include the open-face variety of spinning tackle and fly rods with small poppers or wet or dry flies. Of course, the cane pole is still good and will account for endless numbers of these fine pan fish.

Kentucky has some 40 state-owned or state-managed lakes that teem with bluegill and offer sportsmen excellent fishing opportunities. The 13 major lakes also offer fine bluegill fishing.


The Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources has an extensive farm pond stocking program throughout the Commonwealth. Black bass and bluegill are furnished to the landowner free of charge for new ponds.

In some areas of the state, nesting bluegill already have been reported. During the next few weeks bluegill fishermen should be having a "heyday" harvesting their top fish.




Jenny Wiley Hosts Educational Groups



He announced that he is notifying all candidates of a meeting to be held next Wednesday in the county courtroom to acquaint them of the situation and to give them an opportunity to institute legal proceedings requiring participation of the full board in naming precinct officers and getting the election machinery in motion in time to hold a legal primary. He said he did this after conferring with Secretary of State Thelma Stovall, who is chairman of the state election commission.

Mrs. Stovall, he said, expressed the fear that failure of the Floyd election board to follow proper procedures in naming precinct officers, instructing them in the use of voting machines and in carrying out other details might invalidate the entire election.

The legal action contemplated is the filing of a suit by a candidate or by a citizen to require the election board to meet and transact the business necessary for the holding of a legal election. Action by the state election board under its emergency powers was considered, but the state board does not meet until next week.

Told that the legality of his appointment is challenged, Mr. Hammond said KRS 127.030 was followed in detail in his appointment. This part of the new election law provides:

"Where from any cause the county clerk or sheriff cannot act, the two appointed members shall appoint a commissioner to serve during the period the county clerk of sheriff is ineligible..."

Hammond says Mrs. Jones, the appointed Democratic member, notified the Republican member, Mr. Collins, of the county clerk's disqualification because of his candidacy and asked that they meet to appoint a successor. The meeting was not held, and five names were submitted by the Democratic executive committee and five by the Republican to the state election board. He said the state board named him and that certification of his appointment was signed by Secretary of State Stovall as chairman.

All concerned avow their desire to see that a fair list of officers is named according to law, but they differ on details.

Sheriff Leslie pointed out that four of those who served in last year's general election as precinct officers are now candidates themselves and that officers for a newly created precinct-No. 44, Dwale-New Allen-are not on that list. It is admitted that some of the November, 1972 officers have died or have moved elsewhere. Leslie and Collins said they omitted from their list two officers because the son of one and the brother of the other are candidates this year. All these facts were recited in opposition to the assistant attorney general's opinion that the list of election officers named for the November, 1972 general election are eligible to serve under the new law this year's primary.

Such vacancies, Hammond and Mrs. Jones point out, are matters of business the election board is expected to handle in orderly and legal fashion.

in orderly and legal fashion. The big hassle stems from the change from the old to the new. Mr. Collins pointed out:

"The new laws that went into effect December 1, 1972 state that the election officers will hold office for one year and in all elections in that year and must be selected by September each year. Since the law went into effect on Dec. 1, 1972, there was not time to select officers after the law went into effect... The new law required the Election Commission (county) to meet once every month. This commission has never met until a meeting was called by Sheriff Frank Leslie, one of the election commissioners under the new law." Maytown-T. 





Two Centuries of Hospitality

When Kentucky was a couple of hundred years younger, the natives were not nearly so hospitable as they are now. Plenty of times, stockaded Fort Harrod proved to be a welcome refuge for the pioneers from howling Indians who, more than once, chased James Harrod, Daniel Boone and their companions into the safety of the fort.

Fort Harrod, built in 1774 on a site surveyed by Harrod and Boone, proved a haven for settlers pouring into the western country through Cumberland Gap and over the Wilderness Road. In 1974, the fort's gates will swing open in a wide welcome to visitors as Kentucky celebrates the 200th anniversary of the founding of Fort Harrod.

Fort Harrod has been built again at Harrodsburg. Authentic as to details, the wooden enclosure contains blockhouses, cabins, even a log schoolhouse. Rude buildings are stocked with handmade utensils and farm implements, and the hastily-put-together furnishings of the pioneer era. The fort makes up a portion of Old Fort Harrod State Park, on US-68 and US-127 in the center of Harrodsburg.

Much of Kentucky's romantic past is recalled here. The Lincoln Marriage Temple, just inside the entrance to the park, which was designed to represent an early-19th-century Kentucky church, contains a large and highly valued relic. The mellow brick building shelters the log cabin in which Abraham Lincoln's parents, Thomas Lincoln and Nancy Hanks, were married on June 12, 1806. The one-room cabin was removed from its original location in Washington County to the present site in 1911 by the Harrodsburg Historical Society.

The Mansion Museum, in a house built in 1830 by Major James Taylor, stands across from the Lincoln Marriage Temple. It houses mementoes associated with the great periods of Kentucky history, with Lincoln, with the Confederate cause, and with George Rogers Clark. Appropriate other exhibits are in the Gun and Music rooms.

Fort Harrod's Pioneer Cemetery, older than any other burial ground in Kentucky, contains the graves of more than 500 early settlers. George Rogers Clark isn't among them, but his contribution to Kentucky's beginnings is honored by a monument at the entrance to Old Fort Harrod State Park.

Each summer the park amphitheater comes alive with an exciting outdoor drama, "The Legend of Daniel Boone." Audiences nightly witness the excitement, sorrows, struggles and joys that greeted Americans making the westward trek in the 1700's.

Students of period houses find a treasure trove in the town of Harrodsburg. Examples of Georgian and Greek Revival architectural styles are numerous, and experts consider the details of many houses, such as Diamond Point, among examples of the state's finest craftsmanship. Another of Harrodsburg's old houses, once a girls' academy, is now Beaumont Inn, renowned for its good Kentucky food and for its hospitality. The Morgan Row





houses, said to be the oldest standing row houses used for commercial purposes, are five distinct buildings that were once connected by first-floor passageways. They were built between 1807 and 1830 by Joesph Morgan in downtown Harrodsburg, and a portion of them has been restored.

Seven miles northeast of Harrodsburg is the restored Shaker colony of Pleasant Hill. Though it's been many years since the founding of the Believers' Colony there, the Shakers' gentle influence is still being felt in the 19th century village.

The United Society of Believers in Christ's Second Appearing founded their communal religious colony at Pleasant Hill in 1805, on the 140-acre Shawnee Run Farm. By 1820 the Shakers had erected some 25 buildings, counted over 500 members in their settlement, increased their plantation to 4,300 acres, and constructed warehouse and wharf facilities on the Kentucky River.

One of the more lasting legacies bequeathed by the Shakers is the simplicity and honesty of design in their furniture and architecture. Micajah Burnett, an expert builder, with skilled stonecutters, brickmasons and woodcarvers, produced a "Georgian-Shaker" architectural style that presents some of the finest examples of 19th-century construction found in America.

In the mid-1850's the society began to decline. It is natural to suppose that the Shakers' strict practice of celibacy was largely to blame, though the Civil War and its ravages contributed to their demise. The last Shaker, Sister Mary Settles, died in 1923, marking the end of over 100 years of the colony at Pleasant Hill.

A hub of history, Harrodsburg has witnessed the beginning of the movement west, the Civil War, a communal social experiment and, now, is combining them all in a gala celebration of Kentucky's Bicentennial.

Wanderings of an Amateur Journalist

By STEPHANIE MIDKIFF (NOTE: This article is the result of a trip taken to Red River Gorge, April 11 and was written as an assignment made in a journalism class at the University of Kentucky. Miss Midkiff is a junior at UK and is a resident of Prestonsburg.)

On a recent trip into Red River Gorge I saw what looked like a mud slide and two places where the roadway had cracked away on Highways 77 and 715. I thought visitors needed to know about this.

So I set out to find how travel along Red River would be. I am an amateur journalist, so I borrowed a tape recorder, camera, and had interview questions prepared.

It was a beautiful day and when I arrived at the Slade exit from the Mountain Parkway, I took out my trusty map to save time. I almost never fail to get turned around and lost in the Gorge. My first stop was at the Koomer Ridge

and perhaps a maintanance crew to tell me about the road conditions. No office. I discovered a map posted on a bulletin board at the campsites which showed a District Ranger Headquarters at

Stanton, 15 miles away. Driving toward Stanton, I stopped at Natural Bridge State Park to see if I could get any information there on road conditions

I explained to the young man at the main desk at Hemlock Lodge what I was trying to find out and why. Having left the tape recorder in the car until I was sure I had someone worth interviewing, I can't remember exactly what the man said, but he finally looked at me and asked, "Where are you from?" I told him Prestonsburg. He replied, "Well, don't you know?

Kind of bewildered, I asked, "Know what?

"The roads around here are just like the roads in Eastern Kentucky," he stated. He went on to say that the roads in the Gorge area are repaired when the state gets around to it, since it is not a very high-priority or well-travelled area. I left with the impression that he didn't consider the topic worthwhile at all.

Deciding not to trust his judgment, I drove the old road (Highway 15) on to Stanton, After driving through Stanton without spotting the Ranger Headquarters, I finally asked directions at the post office. After procuring these, I drove on, getting so tired that I almost wished I wouldn't find a ranger to interview


A very nice secretary let me in. She said that the ranger was out, but should be in soon and I could wait if I liked. She also explained that the district office at Stanton maintained the gravel roads through that section of Daniel Boone National Forest, while either a district office at Jackson or the Forest Supervisor's office at Winchester maintained the state highways.

We talked till about 4:30 p.m. when the ranger radioed in from Koomer Ridge, about half an hour away. Having a camera with me, I was really anxious to take some shots of Grey's Arch, a particular favorite of mine, before the sun went down. So I got the ranger's phone number and left, intending to call and ask about the road conditions.

I drove back to Slade and headed for Tunnel Ridge Road and Grey's Arch. I set out at a fast pace for a hike of 1.4 miles to the Arch. Somehow, when you're alone and you know it won't be long before dark, the trail doesn't look quite the same as it did in bright sunlight three days before. I made it to the Arch in about 15 minutes and started taking a few photographs. But it was really disappointing to see that the beauty and massiveness of the Arch and rock shelters could not possibly be captured and conveyed by such a small camera. But no snapshot could do the place justice. It is almost a surprise each time I see it, because I have forgotten that it is so scenic and awesome.

Finally, heading back to the car, I heard four distinct scrunches on leaves. So I stopped, and whatever it was stopped, too. I figured it was probably some small animal cowering in fright till I left. I waited about five minutes before moving on, but heard nothing more; it vere waiting each othe out. My imagination was starting to work because the "step-sounds" were measured and deliberate, not like an animal scurrying away. I got back to the car and headed back toward Slade and Nada Tunnel, since I wanted to take a couple of pictures of the road and possible slides. I found a few likely spots for the pictures, got these, and in the growing dimness indulged myself by driving farther into the Gorge, looking for a spot where some friends and I went jumping off a rope into the river last summer. Finally, on my way back to the University of Kentucky campus at about 7 p.m., already having missed the prescribed time for supper in the campus cafeterias. I decided to be frugal and adventurous and take Highway 15 and U. S. 60 into Lexington. Passing through Stanton, I decided to pick up some crackers and cookies at a local grocery store for supper and call the ranger, who lived in Stanton. There were three phone booths in a line and only the third worked, but I got no answer. I was ready to climb into the car, get gas and really head back, when I discovered I didn't have my car keys. After a frantic search of pockets and purse, I recalled laying them down in the first phone booth, which had been occupied in the meantime. But, whew! they were still there and I took off. The drive back was pleasant and scenic, even though it was fairly dark and I was in strange territory with a car that runs when it feels like it. It just happened to feel like it that night and I made it back, very tired, about 9 p.m. Not having interviewed anyone, I felt as though I had spent a fruitless day except for some of the pictures I took and the scenery involved. Even that has me worried though, because I don't recall seeing any flashes when I used the electronic flash.





Kentucky's anglers should have some who fish farm ponds, the state-owned very fine fishing as the early season fishing reaches its peak.

Both white bass and crappie runs are approaching their crests, while black bass are following a close second. Bluegill fishing is close at hand. As time goes by, anglers will have a much wider choice of fish as well as more ways in which to harvest their favorite.

There won't be any shortage of places to fish-anglers of the Commonwealth have 13 major lakes, more than 40 stateowned or state-managed small impoundments, farm ponds by the tens of thousands and some 13,000 miles of running water.

As soon as the White bass and crappie runs are over, then it is time for night fishing under lights for these two fine species.

Fishing by artificial light at night is a family sport. In late evenings at the major lakes, dock areas look like the shrimp boat fleet is taking off. Small and large boats, pontoon crafts and house boats all head out to the open waters and the deep banks to anchor for a night's activity. Minnows are the prime bait for both white bass and crappie. At peak times, limits and near limits are common.

Black bass are also active during the next few weeks as nesting time approaches. At this time, these fine fish move into the shallows to feed and select a nesting site.

Surface fishing for these gallant fighters provides exciting sport for many, popping bugs and spinning and casting top-water lures account for endless limits of Black bass in early Spring. Trout fishermen are not to be denied during this time, especially in the area above the dam at Lake Cumberland. Many fine rainbows are harvested by night fishermen drifting live nightcrawlers or minnows in the main pool above the dam.

lakes and some of the major lakes, will catch baskets full of these fine pan fishespecially when the bluegill are "on the nest.'

Stream fishermen are enjoying good catches as they wade or float the smaller waterways. Both live and artificial baits account for many fine strings of black bass, goggle-eye and even channel catfish.

So if you are looking for a lot of fast action, now is the prime time to harvest many of Kentucky's bountiful fish.

Be sure to check special limits imposed on some of the state's small impoundments; keep in mind that a trout stamp and a valid fishing license are required for those engaged in trout fishing.

Hunting and fishing are privileges, so be sure to ask a farmer for permission before entering his land.

HEPATITIS

By JOE B. VANCE (Floyd County Health Dept.) Do you really know what infectious hepatitis is about? Infectious hepatitis means inflammationoftheliver. Jaundice means yellow skin or yellow color to the whites of the eyes. Since there are other diseases, both communicable and non-communicable, which may cause jaundice, jaundice alone does no necessarily mean that a person has in-fectious hepatitis is thought to be caused by a virus. The virus is hardy. It will withstand heat at 133 farenheit for an bour, and freezing for years. The mode of trasmission is person-to-person contact, presumably by the fecal-oral route. The infectious agent may be found in feces and urine. Common vehicle outbreaks have been related to contaminated water and food, including milk, slices meats, salads and bakery products. The infectious agent is present in circulating blood prior to onset of jaundice and for a few days later. Therefore, spread by parenteral noculation of infected blood or blood products, or by contaminated needles and syringes, may occur, particularly esemble those of flu. Tiredness, loss of appetite and discoloration of the urine are almost universal. Jaundice may or may not be present. It is wise to remember that anyone can get the disease, but the severity of symptoms is frequently dependent upon age. The best preventive measure of in-fectious hepatitis is health education directed toward good sanitation and

Both sides were well armed, and the situation was very dangerous. Henry C. Hale, then sheriff of Floyd County, and in conjunction with the Kentucky State Police, came to the picketing to do their lawful duty to insure that the union had the right to picket without interference from any person or group and without fear of their life and to insure that there was free access and flow of traffic to the mining site and the neighboring communities, so that local residents could get to and from their homes without being harmed or put in fear of being harmed. At no time did Henry C. Hale order us to stop picketing or to break-up our picket line.

In doing his lawful duty, Henry C. Hale prevented someone from losing their life or from being seriously injured.

An alerted public and responsive government have effectively worked together to combat the con-men, shysters, and disreputable businessmen

One such deceptive sales strategy is referral sales. This scheme is mainly used by door-to-door salesmen in the home improvement or appliance line. Here's how it works.

A salesman knocks on your door and asks if he may demonstrate the latest product in vacuum cleaners, for instance. Then, after what is usually a convincing demonstration, he trys to sell you his product.

You are promised a credit on your purchase price for each prospective customer that you refer to the salesman. Often you are told that the value of the "referrals" will more than cover your purchase and that you will end up paying nothing.

However, consumers are almost never able to pay for their product by referrals. They usually end up owing the full price for the same product or service they thought they were receiving free.


Now, however, there is a new law on referral selling. The new Referral Selling and Sales Law prohibits referral sales techniques by salesmen.

Our new consumer protection laws can protect you to a certain point, but to make our laws work to the fullest extent. ier, must participate How? By notifying the attorney general's Division of Consumer Protection when you observe any violation of the consumer protection laws.








U. S. Census Bureau To Ask Information On Dual Jobholding

How many American workers are holding more than one job? How many are working overtime and what is their overtime pay? What are workers' usual hours on their jobs?

Joseph R. Norwood, director of the Bureau of the Census Data Collection Center in Charlotte, announced this week that information on these subjects will be collected during the week of May 14-18 from a sample of households in this area. The questions are in addition to the usual ones asked in the monthly survey on employment and unemployment conducted nationwide by the Bureau for the U.S. Department of Labor.

Results of this monthly survey provide a continuing measure of economic conditions in the country. The March survey showed that employment rose sharply to 83.9 million, 700,000 more than in February. The overall jobless rate was 5.0 percent, not materially different from 5.1 percent in February, but substantially below the 5.9 percent rate of March a year ago.

Facts supplied by individuals participating in the survey are kept strictly confidential by law, and results are used only to compile statistical totals.





Sycamores Suffer

Disease Damage

If a sycamore tree provides shade for your front lawn or otherwise graces your property, you should be on the lookout for signs of disease damage, according to Mark Matuszewski, insect and disease specialist.

Matuszewski, who is on the staff of the forestry division of the Department for Natural Resources and Environmental Protection, says this year's exceptionally cool, wet spring is encouraging the growth of a fungus, Gnomohia platani. This fungus thrives in wet weather and affects sycamore, black walnut, white oak and maple trees.

"Sycamore trees are more vulnerable to anthracnose damage than the others,' says Matuszewski. "This disease does more damage to sycamores than any other disease that occurs in the eastern United States."

Signs of anthracnose may appear on the twigs, buds, shoots or leaves of a sycamore tree. Shott blight, the sudden dying of expanding shoots and young leaves, is the most noticeable symptom of the disease. Leaf blight is also apparent, appearing as irregular brown areas adjacent to the midrib and veins of sycamore leaves. Partial or even complete defoliation of the infected tree may occur, but a new crop of leaves is usually put out by late spring or early summer.

Although anthracnose does not usually cause the death of a sycamore, Matuszewski says, it can reduce the tree's resistance to attacks by other insects and diseases. Control of sycamore anthracnose is not attempted in forests because it is not economically feasible.

Anthracnose can be controlled however, on shade and ornamental trees. The impact of the disease can be greatly reduced by pruning of infected twigs, destruction of all fallen twigs and leaves, and fertilization.



Each is governed by a locally elected board of supervisors which develops and carries out conservation programs. All of Kentucky's land is in one or another conservation district.






Classroom Training **Approved for 198**

Six Manpower Development and Training Act (MDTA) projects have been jointly approved by the Department of Labor and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to provide classroom-type training for 198 persons in Kentucky.

Twenty participants from the Big Sandy-Pikeville labor area still receive clerk-stenographer instruction. Federal funds in the amount of \$38,896 have been allocated for periods up to November 9, 1973.

Elsewhere in Eastern Kentucky, 18 in the Big Sandy-Ashland labor area will receive machine operator instruction for periods up to December 21, 1973, with \$41,840 have been allocated for the project.

The Kentucky Department of Economic Security, Capitol Annex Building, Frankfort, is the grantee. The State Employment Service determines the need for workers in the occupation in which the training is to be provided; refers, tests and counsels applicants for training; administers the payment of training allowance, and provides job placement and assistance to trainees upon completion of the course. The State Department of Education's Vocational Division will provide academic services during the period of vocational training.

Niles Thrills ALC Students



John Jacob Niles, 81, stirred Alice Lloyd College students three generations his junior. The famous "Dean of American Balladeers" sang recently and visited classrooms as part of the college's cultural program.

Pippa Passes, Ky.-John Jacob Niles, 81 years young and full of folklore culture, thrilled Alice Lloyd College students recently with a "super" musical performance and two days of visits to classrooms.

Of the many singers of folk songs in America today, none more richly deserves the title, "Dean of American Balladeers." For more than 60 years Mr. Niles has distinguished himself as collector, folklorist, author, teacher, arranger, composer, craftsman and singer.

His major collection has been done in the Southern Appalachians, mostly in these southeastern counties of Kentucky, with a spillover into almost every mountain county in North Carolina, Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama, West Virginia and Virginia.

In his performance, Mr. Niles used only materials he has collected and arranged, accompanying himself on one of his homemade dulcimers. These dulcimers, like his voice, are unusual instruments. Larger than the usual three or four stringed Appalachian instrument, they are classic dulcimers he has refashioned to suit his purposes.

Mr. Niles, born in Louisville and raised on a Jefferson county farm, had the usual grade and high school training with emphasis on music, classic and folk. His later studies took him to the Cincinnati Conservatory, the University and Conservatory at Lyons, France and the Schola Cantorum in Paris.

Western Kentucky **Study ROPES Work At Region II Office**
