TV System **Owner Wins Bids Right**

Most of Resolution **On TV Franchise Approved by Court**

Everett Akers, Martin television system owner, won a partial victory last week when the state Supreme Court held unconstitutional one section of the resolution adopted by the Floyd fiscal court governing cable television systems in the county

The fiscal court's resolution was the basis of a suit filed by Akers in circuit court, and the appeal to the higher court was filed after he had lost the circuit court decision

J. K. Wells, Paintsville, attorney for Akers, said the Supreme Court opinion, in effect, gives the Martin man "the right to bid on as many television cable franchises as he wants to.'

The section in the fiscal court ordinance which was voided by the ruling reads

"No owner or operator of a community television system will be allowed to bid on an area in which a system is operating, other than the one in which he is presently operating, nor shall any person bid for same on his behalf or with the intent of permitting him to operate same. 2 Officials Say **Revision Should Aid Annexation**

The Municipal Statute Revision Commission held its second Eastern Kentucky hearing last Tuesday night at May Lodge on the proposed revamping of state law governing cities, and Prestonsburg officials emphasized that the greatest need is a change in the annexation law.

Mayor Harold Cooley and City Manager Curtis Clark joined in pointing out that the law should provide cities the means of annexing areas to which cities are already providing services.

The problem Prestonsburg has with pollution of the Big Sandy River by persons living outside the city limits was cited, the city being powerless in such cases to control a situation which affects its residents.

The proposed revision would make the methods of annexation uniform for all classes of cities.

The mayor and city manager also said they were disappointed with the draft of the statute revision, as it now stands, because it does not provide for solving what they described as a serious problem here. This problem, they said, is the city's inability to effect badly needed zoning measure because it is tied to a joint city-county zoning commission which is inactive. As a consequence, they pointed out, development here is not planned, nor is there any planning for nearby areas that affect Prestonsburg and which could at some future date become a part of the city through annexation. George Rabe, legal counsel for the Statute Revision Commission, suggested that the city use its influence to get citycounty zoning action, and, failing that, to seek relief from the courts. The statute revision proposes mandatory use by cities of county assessments of property for tax purposes, and Councilman Ronald Hager, of Prestonsburg, and Ed Burtner, of Big Sandy ADD, urged the commission to give cities the option of using either assessment, their own or the county's. November Poll To Decide Fate Of Utility There

The Prestonsburg City Council and Utilities Commission and the board of trustees of the City of Allen last week took the preliminary action which will later depend for implementation upon a decision to be made by the voters of Allen at the November election

The action taken here last Thursday was to accept the proposed contract with the City of Allen which had been prepared by Grafton & Fleischer, attorneys. The tentative agreement was approved the following day by the board of trustees of Allen, clearing the way for final adoption or rejection by the voters. The question to appear on the ballot will read:

"Shall the City of Allen, Ky. sell and convey to the City of Prestonsburg, Ky. all of Allen's right, title and interest in and to properties and facilities providing water service in and to the City of Allen and to the adjacent unincorporated areas known as New Allen and Dwale, upon assumption by Prestonsburg of the City of Allen's overdue and unpaid obligations with regard to such water system properties?

The incorporated portion of Allen, which is known as Old Allen, acquired its water system in 1966, issuing \$280,000 in revenue bonds to pay for it. The obligations of the incorporated town are listed at more than \$35,000, and it has defaulted on the principal and interest of the bond issue.

A majority vote will decide the future of the water system.

In the tentative agreement made between Prestonsburg and Allen it was specified that the existing minimum charge of \$6.80 for the first 2,000 gallons of water used per month will remain in effect if Prestonsburg should acquire the system. These other rates are also in the agreement:

\$1.80 per 1,000 gallons for water used above the minimum and up to 100,000 gallons; over 100,000 gallons, \$1.05.

Home Rule Loss To Cost County; **May Void Order**

Although the Floyd fiscal court hasn't used much of the power granted it under the so-called Home Rule law, the authority taken from local government when the state Supreme Court last week ruled the legislation unconstitutional is considerable, County Judge Henry Stumbo said Monday.

The court has, from time to time, discussed actions possible for it under Home Rule, but has not entered many orders under that authority

One order in effect under Home Rule is the recent fiscal court mandate directing that all loaded coal trucks have a tarpaulin cover while travelling any highway in the county.

The Supreme Court opinion voids that, unless the court later reverses itself on appeal from its decision.

And, even without the high court action, it is highly doubtful that the fiscal court's order is legal, County Attorney Harold J. Stumbo told the magistrates when they met here Monday.

Stumbo questioned the validity of an order directed at only one industry and expressed the opinion that the order, to be legal, would have to provide a penalty for other trucks-gravel, for instance-if they transported spillable contents and did not use a cover to prevent spillage. He added that one attorney for a coal carrier had threatened to take the court order to circuit court for a declaratory judgment.

The county attorney said he thought the fiscal court order was "a good thing but that it should be written so as to be legal.

County Judge Stumbo said he understood one or more of the four magistrates have levied fines from truckers hauling coal in uncovered trucks.

It is estimated that only half of the truckers were in compliance with the order

\$1 Million Seen **For ARH Relief**

The Appalachian Regional Hospital system, still in critical financial condition, is expected to receive a transfusion of \$1 million later than week from the U.S. Department of Commerce.

The Department of Commerce staff has recommended approval to Robert T. Hall, assistant secretary. In addition, the grant has received the endorsement of a study team from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) which visited many of the firm's 10 hospitals in Kentucky, West Virginia and Virginia in August.

A letter from HEW to the Department of Commerce said the \$1 million grant would be a good short-term solution until HEW can devise a way to remedy 14 years of financial problems.

Rex Bailey, spokesman for AHR, said the hospital chain has finished in the red every year except one during the 14 years it has been in existence.

While he termed the \$1 million grant a 'tremendous boost," he cautioned that, "We're not sure we can set a date as to how long \$1 million will last us." He noted the chain has a \$68 million yearly budget.

Details concerning the annual observance will be published in next week's Times.

Congressman Hails Passage Of Black Lung Legislation

Congressman Carl D. Perkins jubilantly discussed via telephone Tuesday morning the victory won Monday afternoon when the House approved by a 283 to 100 vote his bill, the Black Lung Benefits Reform Act.

The bill now goes to the Senate, which is expected to act this week.

Perkins said:

"The major thrust of the House bill is to bring about changes in the program so as to obtain the approval of thousands of claims of miners suffering from pneumoconiosis who have previously been denied benefits.

He added that his great concern for the older miners who filed under Part D of the Act prompted the legislation. Perkins pointed out that in most cases such a miner spent 30 or more years in the mines, and there is no way that state workman's compensation or any other program can reach his needs.

'He cannot find any responsible operator and he is barred by the statutes of limitation. Now, the reforms made by the House passage of this bill brings him new life," the Congressman said.

The legislation, according to one congressman who voted for it, "stacks the deck in favor of the coal miner."

One of the most controversial features calls for establishment of a trust fund,

financed from production royalties paid by coal operators, to cover the costs of black lung benefits.

This, supporters of the measure said, would shift the burden of financial responsibility away from the federal government to the operators.

The legislation was not quite as sweeping as a version which the House approved last year and House Education and Labor committee chairman Carl Perkins, D-Ky. pushed through his panel again this year.


The Senate, earlier this year, approved similar legislation including provisions for the trust fund. But, the Senate stopped short of voting final approval because the trust fund was viewed as a revenue measure and the Constitution requires the House to act first on revenue measures.

Under the legislation, coal operators would still be required to pay the full cost of benefits in cases where responsibility can be determined. The fund would finance other claims.

The fund would be administered by a board of seven trustees elected by coal operators.

Claimants would be given three years to file, and rejected claims could be appealed to federal court under the new legislation.

Big Sandy ADD District To Share Funds

Gov. Julian Carroll today announced federal funding approval of Kentucky's Joint Funding Administration Program, which will provide more than \$6 million to the state's 15 Area Development Districts.

Grant awards were received last Thursday from the Economic Development Administration, Housing and Urban Development and Appalachian Regional Commission totaling \$2,475,438.

Other funds will be included from Urban Mass Transit Authority as well as from six state agencies-Justice, Transportation, Human Resources, Natural

Resources and Environmental receives the funds from participating Protection, Development and Department for Local Government (DLG).

unified grant application, the Commonwealth led the way in bringing more services to local governments with less agencies and ADDs to help improve red tape," Gov. Carroll said. "With this year's level of funding, Kentucky will continue to be a leader in this innovative federal, state and local government effort.'

Under joint funding, DLG files a single application for the 15 ADDs incorporating all major sources of funding into one single program plan. DLG then

agencies and disburses them quarterly to each ADD, with each funding agency "As pilot state for the first statewide maintaining control over its program. Throughout the funding period, DLG serves as liaison between funding overall funding systems, identify problems and help resolve problems.

Parent Says 'Smoke Breaks' At School Invite 'Pot' Use

I can't sleep tonight because of a conversation I had a few days ago with my child, who is a high school student. She said, "Mom, the schools are making it easy for kids to smoke marijuana." Astonished, I asked why she thought so. She went on to explain that students are permitted a smoke break if they have written permission from their parents. There are no school personnel supervising these breaks and "pot" is openly passed from one youngster to another who is willing to "take a drag." I can remember a time, not so many years ago when, even though the child's parents permitted those things harmful and not in the best interest of the pupil, the schools did not.

If a parent wants to permit his or her child to smoke, let him smoke at homenot at school. Not where other students can be influenced to take up their bad habits.

Drug users in Floyd county junior high and senior high grades are rapidly multiplying. Our law-enforcement officials verify that. Is it any wonder drug users are on the increase? How many regular users of marijuana inhale their 'joint'' at school-permitted smoke breaks? How many kids are introduced to "grass" at school who might not otherwise be, were it not for the smoke breaks? How many principals and teachers know marijuana is used during these permitted smoke breaks? How

Why are our schools allowing these smoke breaks? Just because a few have written permission from their parents does not justify this.

Our school system needs to take a firm stand against habits which medical science has proven to be harmful.

I would like to challenge our superintendent of the Floyd county schools, assistant superintendent, principals, and teachers to take a firm stand against these smoke breaks, thereby fighting the use of drugs also. Our administrative officials have allotted money or means to fight narcotics in the schools. One of the best things that can be done to prevent further drug use is eliminate the smoke breaks. Those of us who do not allow our children to smoke at home do not want

ADD Board Proposes Floyd Project Funds

The proposed use of nearly three and a McCauley said, "The funds are available half million dollars currently available in the form of state and federal funds was outlined Monday night at the meeting of the Big Sandy Area Development District at May Lodge.

A list of projects throughout the fivecounty Big Sandy ADD was reviewed and approved by the board of directors for proposed allocation, including \$1,860,000 for projects in this county alone.

Of \$1,027,200 available in state Area Development Funds (ADF), \$250,000 of that total was approved for proposed allocation for the following Floyd county projects:

Highlands Regional Medical Center sewer line, \$100,000; Sandy Valley water plant, \$100,000; Wheelwright recreation and community improvement, \$50,000.

The Sandy Valley water plant was one of five water projects approved for possible allocation in the district and, if funded, would go toward alleviating the severe water problems which have plagued the Mud Creek section of this county in recent years. Joe McCauley, executive director of Big Sandy ADD, said he was particularly pleased with the inclusion of Wheelwright for ADF help in community improvement. Three hundred thousand dollars of the available ADF funds were allocated for the ADD district's enterprise development program which is aimed at rekindling and we known we have topnotch chances of getting them funded.

Featured speaker at Monday night's meet was Ralph Ed Graves, director of the state Department for Local Government (DLG). Graves announced that \$4,000,000 in federal Housing and Urban Development (HUD) funds will be made available for the state with \$2.5 million of that total being allotted for the Big Sandy area for flood rehabilitation. Graves said his office also got \$100,000 in HUD 701 funds for technical assistance and an additional \$50,000 from Gov. Carroll for flood-related work.

Much of Graves' talk concerned the widespread problems faced by the area's water districts. He pointed out that the dilemma is not restricted to the counties included in Big Sandy ADD. "Water districts are actually failing all over the state," he said. He admitted, however, that problems faced by water districts in the Big Sandy area are particularly severe.

Graves said his office plans a 90-day water resource survey in the district. 'We want to see exactly what you've got, what you need, and what you have to have to secure adequate water service." Usable land was pointed to by Graves as "the greatest need there is in the Big Sandy." He cited a project which has been initiated by Big Sandy ADD for securing detailed LANDSAT satellite photographic maps of the area as of considerable significance. "The LAND-SAT mapping program will help make better use of the land . . . and when flat land is not available, somebody better be looking at how best to use what you've got," Graves commented. Earl Campbell, director of the Department for Local Government's Division of Local Affairs, presented a slide show outlining the services which the office offers ADD districts and communities all over the state. "Our purpose is to help communities in handling development and problems in the most efficient manner," Campbell told the group. Big Sandy ADD staff member Roger Recktenwald reported on the ADD's involvement with the City of Allen in securing water service for the community. The extension of water service from the Prestonsburg system has occupied much of the effort, Recktenwald pointed out, and an ordinance will be drawn up which will allow citizens of "old" Allen to vote on the question of transferring the water system there with its assets and liabilities to Prestonsburg. Board member Alan Perry, of Paintsville, introduced Big Sandy ADD's newly acquired enterprise development specialist, Charles Nicklas. Nicklas, 44, an Ohio native, will head the district's efforts at attracting diversified industry to the area. Also present at the meeting was ARC representative Mike Potter. Potter spoke briefly of the agency's involvement in Eastern Kentucky as well as throughout the Appalachian region and concluded his talk by quoting long-time ARC official John Whisman who said, according to Potter, "If you can get it done on the Big Sandy, you can get it done anywhere.

the same area, then the first operator who has given continual service shall be preferred in awarding franchise if he meets other qualifications."

All other sections of the resolution dividing the county into areas for the stated purpose of "preventing a monopoly" and ordering that these areas be advertised for bids and that exclusive franchises be awarded for a period of 15 years to the highest and best bidder were upheld by the high court. The section calling for bids specified that "such best bidder (shall) be selected by the court, taking into consideration the ability financially and educationally to operate such a system and the moral character and fitness of such bidder.

The Supreme Court opinion, written by Justice Sternberg, was rendered last Friday

The high court recently reversed the Floyd circuit court judgment holding that Frank DeRossett, Jr. had filed too late his \$57,000 suit against Herbert Wayne Burgher and Capitol Truck Rentals for injuries allegedly sustained when his auto was hit by the company's truck.



Our Fragile Earth

By DR. JERRY HOWELL **Director of Environmental Studies** Morehead State University

There has been an upsurge in oceanic oil spills at sea during the past two years. 1976 is on record as the worst year in high seas oil transportation history. There were 13 oil tankers completely lost at sea. but it was the Argo Merchant that captured the nation's attention.

The Argo Merchant was really one of the smaller tanker casualties, but its beached location and its loss of nearly eight million gallons of oil catapulted it to tainted fame. It ran aground on December 15, 1976 and broke apart six days later. The dilapidated ship was grounded on Georges Bank, an excellent fishing ground for U.S. vessels, off Nantucket Island.

Although the initial fear of broadscale fish, mammal and shellfish degredation was never realized, some damage to the area's resources did occur. The difficulty lies in assessing the damage. The spill occurred during or just before the prime breeding season for several species of northern Atlantic fish, including cod, haddock, flounder and sea herring, which utilize Georges Bank as a primary breeding ground. The effect on breeding will not be known for another year or two, but it is known that some scallops were contaminated.

The area is also on the migratory route for humpback whales, but it is thought that these whales had already passed through the area at the time of the spill. Bird losses were not as heavy as predicted, although it is certain that more than 1,000 died when the oil removed the mucus lining of their feathers, rendering them incapable of flying and exposing them to the bitter cold.

The Argo Merchant disaster was only the first in a series of six tanker accidents during the last two weeks of 1976. Two of the other tankers spilt a total of 135,000 gallons of oil near Connecticut and Pennsylvania, while one, the Grand Zenith, carrying 8.2 million gallons of oil, completely disappeared 300 miles southeast of Cape Cod. Five of the six tankers involved in the late year accidents were registered in Liberia, a nation known to issue registrations for ships and captains with little investigation of credentials. The Argo Merchant, for example, had long outlived her usefulness (the tanker was built for a maximum life of 20 years; it was 24 when it grounded for the final time; and had a long history of accidents, ownership changes and neglect.

Liberia does not have the most lax standards for ship and crew registrations; that title probably belongs to Cyprus or Panama (the Grand Zenith and its crew of 38 was Panamanian registered). There are a number of other countries considered to have standards more lax than those of Liberia.



There are towns, some big and some big in heart. Owensboro, Hopkinsville, Paducah, Madisonville, Fulton, Hickman, Mayfield and Wickliffe, each with a story to tell, beauty to see and heart enough to say to all comers: "Glad to see you. Stay on. Get to know us better. You might not want to leave."

But out here in big country are small discoveries that tell everyone the season of summer is rusting around the edges and the brightness of fall is here. It's a feeling in the air, rather than a change in

It can be a hazy, shimmering sunbeam hovering over a field of calico asters. Such a sight makes everyone think of country days, a country stove in a country kitchen redolent with aromas of fried potatoes, country ham and mellow coffee, all served by a country mother in a calico dress covered with a clean calico apron.

On a sun-gilded day in late September, Short's asters will trim western fields with a ruffle of blue-violet. This wildflower was discovered by Dr. Charles W. Short of Transylvania University and named for him in 1834.

There are spreading asters, New England asters, various violet and white asters, all about to star the Big Country with bloom


These flowers are not in a class to themselves so far as western wildflowers are concerned, for there are the sunflowers, ironweed, sneezeweed,

goldenrod and others. But for those who watch the seasons, they look for the return of the asters.

If you're traveling westward, look for the asters and other wildflowers. Search for them. Buy a book, so you will be more able to identify these small beauties that make big fields, big woods, big roadsides as pretty as an oriental carpet.

Learn from the asters. If you note an area turned from green to white, it might be a blanket of frost-weed aster. This flower is part of one of nature's patterns. Afer frost-weed asters live their era out, they are followed by shrubs and berry vines which in turn are followed by trees. In the weeks ahead be aware of the

wildflowers dotting the Big Country like different colored patches ina big country quilt.





HERE FROM PIKEVILLE

By A. K. WEBB A place of hope for alcoholics in Floyd county is the Layne House.

Is it an undercover bootlegging place, you ask? Not even close.

Located behind the Mountain Comprehensive Care Center, on Front Avenue here, Layne House is always open. Some five dedicated workers go around the clock in providing a comfortable homey atmosphere for the visiting problem drinker.

And for the drunk in this communitythe hospital and jail are his only other alternatives, both of which are threatening surroundings.

The two-story white frame, warm looking building supporting the sign, 'Layne House," is a non-medical detoxification center. In essence it's where the alcoholic can come to sober up after a drinking binge.

The Layne House also welcomes other drug-addicted patients, who, like the alcoholic, can stay at the house up to five days to dry out. The facility is used as an evaluation and referral unit for the substance abuser.

The Layne House way of thinking is to treat the chemically dependent person with concern and empathy for his illness. An alcoholic is a diseased person, not a criminal.

After a five-day visit at Layne House, the counselors can refer the patient, if he wishes additional guidance, to a longterm treatment facility. One such place is ARC (Alcoholism Recovery Community) in Lexington which is a 30-day residential program to assist the alcoholic to living without drinking.

The counselors suggest attendance of Alcoholics Anonymous (A.A.) meetings, held weekly on Saturday night at the Floyd Regional Library in Prestonsburg. Steve Knowles, alcohol and drug team director at Mountain Comprehensive Care and the first Layne House manager



KPA Opposes Proposed Legislation

The Kentucky Press Association, in open opposition to legislation headed toward the Kentucky General Assembly for adoption under sponsorship of the Kentucky Municipal League, gives this explanation of the proposed statute:

City officials in Kentucky would be given broad, sweeping powers of taxation and for use of tax monies.

That same statute, however, would make it more difficult for the taxpayer to find out what the city officials are doing with his money

The proposal has been drafted by the Municipal Statutes Revision Commission, made up largely of city officials from across the state, established by a bill approved by the General Assembly in 1976

Legislation called for the group to review statutes pertaining to city government and, hopefully, come up with a uniform code of statutes that would apply to all cities.

Although the proposal drafted by the commission recently doesn't meet the goal of providing completely uniform statutes for all classes of cities, it does go a long way toward eliminating the hodgepodge of laws which have been written and added to the law books in a piecemeal fashion over the years.

While giving some uniformity to laws that apply to the six classes of cities, the commission has gone much farther-too far, some say-in giving local officials control over city government than does any current statutes.

One Frankfort attorney who has been close to the commission's study since it was formed back in August, 1976, says he believes the commission's attempt to give local authorities such broad powers could create problems in trying to sell the proposal to the General Assembly and, ultimately, to the public.

"Coming on the heels of the Judicial Article, which brought about changes in our court system that the public neither understands nor wanted. I think the commission is going to have a difficult time selling the public on a proposal giving city officials authority to do many things that they can't do now without approval of the legislature," the attorney said.

"As a matter of fact," he continued, 'I'm not sure that even the legislators are ready to give up their say about what the cities can do in some of these areas." He cites as an example one section of the commission's draft which would permit city officials to exercise the same powers beyond city boundaries that they exercise in the city, except for taxation and penal regulation.

This section specifically gives cities the right of eminent domain outside, as well as inside, the city limits.

Another section would give cities the same immunity as the state against suits for injury or damages, including suits for such actions as excessive force by police officers. All claims against cities would be vested in the state board of claims, as are claims against the state.

Cities could "maximize" tax revenues. according to the commission, by taking advantage of a section of the proposed legislation that permits municipalities to impose and administer any tax authorized by the Kentucky constitution unless such tax is prohibited by statute.

And, while cities would be required to have public funds audited each year, the commission would no longer have these audit reports sent to the state Auditor of Public Accounts for review. Instead, copies of the audit reports would go to the Department of Local Government, which has no mechanism for doing anything with the reports other than filing them away.

If city taxpayers wanted to take a close look at the city's finances to see just how their money was being spent, the new proposed legislation would require them to visit city hall.

The commission recommends that cities no longer be required to publish financial statements showing who gets their money and how much. Neither would they publish more than a summary of new ordinances adopted by city legislative bodies, and then only after the ordinance had been adopted.

And city officials could spend up to \$5,000 without having to advertise for bids. That's double the amount the legislature decided last year was a reasonable limit on non-advertised contracts.

In the area of conflict of interest, the commission says it sees nothing wrong with conflicts so long as other city officials know about them.

"This section does not prohibit conflicts. It merely requires that conflicts be disclosed," says the commentary of the commission following one section of the drafted legislation.

are the subject of public hearings to be held throughout Kentucky during the remainder of September. Persons who wish to comment on the proposals but do not attend the hearings, may comment in writing to the commission prior to September 21.

The commission is expected to meet late this month or early next month to put the finishing touches on their proposal, then send the recommendations to the General Assembly for consideration when that body meets in January.

\$1.3 Billion Savings Seen If Roads Resurfaced Soon

billion by resurfacing 11,000 miles of roads before they become too badly worn to restore, says a study released last Thursday.

With increasing traffic, these deteriorating roads are expected to wear out by 1985 and then will have to be rebuilt at more than four times the cost of resurfacing, according to The Road Information Program (TRIP), Washington, D. C.

The research and information agency found that

-Twenty-six per cent of Kentucky's paved road system needs resurfacing now to prevent further expensive damage

-Nearly forty per cent of these aging roads are in the state's coal haul regions where trucks carry some 83 million tons



-It would cost \$1.69 billion to rebuild 10,733 miles of deteriorating roads after they wear out, but only \$357 million to resurface them instead-a \$1.3 billion savings

-Timetly resurfacing would save the equivalent of \$670 for each of the state's 1,957,000 drivers.

Traffic in Kentucky is expected to increase 17 per cent by 1985, from 24.7 to 29 billion vehicle miles per year, according to state traffic predictions. At the same time, coal mining will increase to help meet the nation's energy needs, resulting in increased truck tonnage oer the deteriorating coal roads.

Kentucky already has 1,065 miles of roads that are too badly worn to be resurfaced and must be rebuilt at a cost of \$167.7 million. Four years ago, it would have cost \$24.1 million to resurface them, the study estimated.

"It's a waste of tax money not to resurface roads and streets in time to avoid the need for more costly reconstruction," said TRIP state chairman Buckner Hinkle, who released the report. Hinkle is president of Hinkle Contracting Corporation in Paris, Ky.

Hinkle said the state, counties and cities are postponing urgently-needed road resurfacing to stay within inflationpinched budgets, but that "the day of reckoning from stretching out road renewal cycles is only a few years away.

TRIP estimated it would cost \$543.4 million, or \$67.9 million a year to catch up on road resurfacing and reconstruction needs by 1985. By comparison, the state has budgeted \$36.1 million for road improvements in fiscal 1978.

In addition, only part of the \$33 million the counties and municipalities have budgeted for all road work, including new construction and bridge replacement, will be used to upgrade existing roads.

The pavement condition in Kentucky would be even worse were it not for the continuing efforts of the state Department of Transportation and the county and local road agencies to achieve maximum possible improvement under these extremely limited budgets.

In June 1975, TRIP issued a study showing that Kentucky would have great difficulty doubling its coal production to meet national energy needs unless an estimated 4,228 miles of coal-haul roads were upgraded.

Since then, a \$25 million, two-year "Energy Roads Program" was authorized by the state for the renovation of coal roads in fiscal 1977 and 1978. Also, a \$93 million project to rebuild one major coal road, called "Kentucky 80," was approved by the state legislature and work is scheduled to begin this summer.

These two programs represent, however, only 10.4 per cent of TRIP's total estimated cost of improving these essential roads.

TRIP's study is based on date from the U.S. Department of Commerce, Labor and Transportation, and the Kentucky

Department of Transportation.





'77 Crop Report

Corn production is forecast at a record 6,229 million bushels based on conditions as of September 1, up 2 percent (137 million bushels) from the August 1 forecast and fractionally above 1976.

Grain sorghum production is forecast at 786 million bushels, up 8 percent (62 million bushels) from August 1 and 9 per cent above last year.

Feed grain production (corn, sorghum, oats and barley combined) is forecast at 198 million metric tons, 3 percent more than a year ago.

Soybeans production, forecast at 1,644 million bushels is up 3 percent (42 million bushels) from a month earlier and 30 percent above last year.

Oilseed production (soybean, cottonseed, peanuts and flaxseed combined) is forecast at 51 million metric tons, 28 percent more than last year

All wheat production is indicated at 2,030 million bushels, 5 percent less than last year's crop.

Food grain output (wheat, rye and rice combined) is expected to total 60 million metric tons, 6 percent less than last year. All cotton production is forecast at 13.2

million bales, 25 percent (2.6 million bales) above last year but 2 percent below the August 1 forecast. All tobacco production forecast at 1,839

million pounds is 14 percent below 1976 but 2 percent above last month. Fluecured types are down 21 percent from last year and barley down 6 percent. Sugar crops: sugarbeet prospects at

24.4 million tons are 17 percent below last year. Sugarcane is forecast at 27.6 million tons, down 4 percent from 1976.



Gasification Plant Groundbreaking Set Today In Pike Co.

(From the Pike County News)

Groundbreaking for Pike County's new coal gasification plant will be held today (Wednesday) at 3:30 p.m., according to County Judge Wayne T. Rutherford.

Gov. Julian Carroll will be on hand for the start of the \$142 million project. Sens. Walter (Dee) Huddleston and Wendell H. Ford, as well as U.S. Rep. Carl D. Perkins, are attempting to arrange their schedules so they may attend.

Judge Rutherford hailed the new project Monday as "the most important event to be held in Pike county.

He said the people "just don't realize the importance of this project."

The gasification plant, which should be in operation in about 18 months, will open Pike county to a vast amount of industrial and commercial development. The site of the plant, in the Douglas Industrial Park on Robinson Creek, will open 72 acres of level ground for development.

Actually, construction has already begun on the gasification plant. The 30foot excavation needed for the plant, which will change coal into low BTU gas,

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

ACCORDING TO KRS 96.450.

Section 1. The City Council hereby acknowledges its receipt and consideration of a certain instrument which is designated "Proposed Contract of Sale and Purchase Between the City of Allen. Kentucky (the Seller) and the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky (the Purchaser)," relating to the water service problems of the nearby City of Allen, Floyd County, Kentucky; shown to have been considered and approved by the Utilities Commission of the City of Prestonsburg; and contemplated to be submitted to the Board of Trustees of the City of Allen, Kentucky; all subject to the outcome of a special election, contemplated to be held within the corporate limits of the City of Allen on November 8, 1977, in accordance with the requirements of Section 96.540 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes; and shown by the terms thereof to be intended to be ineffective for any purpose unless (a) such "Proposed Contract" is approved by the Board of Trustees of the City of Allen, and (b) the same shall be approved and authorized upon the occasion of such special election in the City of Allen, by a majority of the voters who may choose to vote thereon.

Section 2. A copy of the text of the aforesaid "Proposed Contract of Sale and Purchase" shall be preserved in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, where the same shall be subject to examination by any qualified voter of the City of Allen, Kentucky, or by any other party having a legitimate interest therein, during the normal working hours of the City Clerk, at any time prior to the occasion of the proposed election which is above referred to.

Section 3. The City Clerk is hereby authorized to tender a copy of this Ordinance, and of the pertinent portions of the minutes of this meeting of the City Council, to the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the City of Allen, Kentucky, in order that it may be understood that if such instrument is approved by the Board of Trustees of the City of Allen, then the same may be the subject of a special election to be held in said City on Section Two, Page Eight

Electrocuted while working last Wednesday with a power crew near Sitka, Earl Clay Branham, 30, of Weeksbury, was killed instantly.



Space for New District Courts Is Problem in Some Counties

While the new district courts are with the problem of finding space in which to house the district courts.

problem with space," Bill Davis, director of the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC), told members of the interim joint committee on judiciary-courts. In the remaining 20 counties, however, he said there is a "serious problem." And, he said, financial arrangements in a "good many facilities" won't be settled until January.

Under existing law, counties must provide "reasonably available" space in which to house district courts. If such space is not available, the courts can be housed in city facilities. If space can't be found in either city or state facilities, the state may lease space at the fair market value from the private sector.

Davis said it would be "impossible" to have enough money to lease all the needed space at fair market value. In addition Leland King, of the AOC said, while counties are by law to receive the net revenues they received from their courts prior to implementation of the judicial article, current audits of county court revenues show that many counties have not been making revenue from their court systems, but losing money.

The courts committee passed a resolution which asked the AOC to prepare legislation aimed at remedying the situation.

Workshop Plans Told by College

An evening class in Ceramics beginning Tuesday, September 27, and one-day workshops in Social Security and Quilting on Thursday and Friday, respectively, are scheduled at Prestonsburg Community College during the week preceding the Apple Day festivities.

The beginning ceramics class, taught by Lynn Rogers, will meet for six consecutive Tuesdays from 6:30 to 9 p.m. in Building A. This course will introduce handbuilt construction and wheel techniques, but will not include pre-made mold forms. Mrs. Rogers holds the master of art teaching degree from the University of North Carolina and has taught ceramics classes at the college here for two years for the Community Service Program.

At 1 p.m. September 29, in the auditorium of the Technology Building, Jim Kelly, assistant district manager for Social Security, will present another in a series of workshops, "Your Social Security," which began several years ago. This one, entitled "Social Security Disability Payments," will cover the disability eligibility requirements for disability as well as case documentation. The instruction will also include: medical reports, attorney representation, how payments are computed, appeals, and several other related aspects of the Disability program. There will be a question-and-answer period for each topic. Three-tenths c.e.u.'s will be awarded those in attendance. A quilting workshop will meet Friday, September 30, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in room 216 of the Technology Building. Those who plan participating in this workshop should pre-register by contacting the Office of Community Services. Participants will need to bring with them a pair of scissors and quilting scraps, needles and thread. The workshop will be taught by two experienced quilters, Charity Arter and Patricia Cory, of Lansing, Michigan.

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

If what purports to be a \$20 gold ingot found last Friday by a bulldozer operator at or inside an old house in this county is truly gold, its value is "fabulous," a former dealer in old coins here said Monday

The ingot, purchased by Donald D. "Dootney" Horn, of Prestonsburg, from the finder, is a perfect replica of the ingot listed and pictured (see photo) in the Guide Book of United States Coins published in 1965. In later editions the publication does not list the ingotpossibly, it is believed, because it is so rare that none have over the years turned up and further listing was held unnecessary.

The obverse side of the ingot bears the inscription:

> Parsons & C. Assayers Col 1860 **Twenty Dols**

Mrs. Abigail Allen Grant, who has handled old coins in recent years, commented on the ingot submitted to her by Horn for inspection and a "qualified guess" as to its worth. She said she is certain there was no intention on the part of Mr. Horn or the original finder to perpetrate a hoax but that it will be necessary to determine if the ingot is, indeed, pure gold before anybody can place a value on it. She added, however, that if the ingot is gold, its worth "is a fabulous figure.'

Horn said the ingot was cleaned with gold cleaner and that the result convinces him that it is genuine and pure gold.

Mrs. Grant suggested that the Numismatics Society in Louisville would be able to authenticate the find and give an accurate estimate of its worth. The owner said, however, it is in a bank safety deposit box and will remain there. With its listing of the ingot in its 1965 edition the Guide Book of U.S. Coins wrote:

"Very little is known regarding the mint of John Parsons and Co., although it is reasonably certain that it operated in

How did the ingot reach then-isolated Eastern Kentucky from Colorado and under what circumstances was it acquired by an early settler of this section of the state? Nobody knows, although it is surmised that a Civil War soldier, returning home from service, could have brought it with him.

Horn bought the ingot for \$125-"just on a gamble.

"I bought it to have it made into jewelry for my wife," he said.

His plan for that apparently has changed, however, since it appears he got more than he bargained for.

Gravestone Study, Part **Of Appalachian Study**

More than a year ago, Marguerite Estep Carson, of London, in Laurel county, began a study of ancient gravestones in Appalachia. Using rice paper, masking tape and graphite, she developed her own technique of taking "rubbings" from the handmade sandstone markers, an art long practiced in Europe. Her study led to many new and exciting discoveries about her own "mountain" people and evolved into a new approach to learning what life was really like for the early settlers of Appalachia

Before Marguerite started this project, she had studied the Appalachian people, their furniture, architecture, artifacts and log buildings for more than 20 years. To her disappointment, there has been little written about the Appalachian people, and few scholars have delved into the study of their cultural development. With a good working knowledge of the people, their customs and artifacts, she was able to interpret the gravestone rubbings and trace the patterns of migration across the mountains. The information found on the gravestones also helped her outline the various stages of cultural development in Appalachia. Mrs. Carson, who had always loved and read Appalachian poetry, realized that poetry was still another link. She began rereading the poetry, especially those poems which dealt with death. "Death, in our culture, is actually one of the most important parts of life," she explains. "The artistry in the rubbings seemed to complement the symbolism in the poetry. It also speaks more clearly than our history books of a creative and sensitive people. Another area of her research includes working with the Kentucky Oral History Commission. She has spent many hours talking with the older Appalachians, listening to their mountain music and hymns and making oral history recordings. Marguerite has also spent many hours researching family histories in the genealogical library of the Kentucky Historical Society in Frankfort.

"The tombs of Jericho, which were built around 3,500 years ago, contained artifacts exactly like those of the early Appalachian settlers, such as rope beds, baskets and other woven materials," she says. "The two words, 'plime blank,' are used by Appalachians to mean 'exactly' and 'Plime Blank Like Jericho,' which is almost ready for publication, seemed a perfect title.'

Mrs. Carson has formed a corporation, Mountain Heritage, Inc., which includes herself, her husband, Bill, her daughter, Pam, and scholars from West Virginia, Kentucky and North Carolina. With the help of the corporation, she plans to establish an Appalachian Folk School.

"Our goal is to preserve our culture by exposing the people to their own heritage through the school, publications and research," she explained. "Scholars from within the culture will teach, write and prepare the programs for the students.

With an intense desire to preserve and protect her rediscovered culture. Marguerite has compiled her research and written a book, titled "What Say'd These Stones?

That title also identifies a unique program which Marguerite developed to share her culture with others. After purchasing her own computer, she was able to put together a presentation of old tintypes of the people with recordings of their voices, music and poetry.

Marguerite's interest in the gravestones has now expanded into another area of research, the genealogy and the art of the people. Her native dialect and a knowledge of archaeology provided her with the title of the book she is writing about the early material culture

She is now buying log buildings to use in constructing the school. Marguerite, who was born in a log cabin in Laurel county, now lives in a house in London which is constructed of five log cabins. She helped with the carpentry work and laid some of the bricks. Marguerite also grows and cans her own vegetables, dries beans and apples, designs and makes rugs, and bottoms chairs with hickory splits. Some of her other talents include playing the piano, organ, dulcimer and guitar



Unemployment Rate Up .4% in August

Kentucky's unemployment rate edged upward 4 per cent in August, to 4.6 per cent of the labor force compared to July's rate of 4.2 per cent, according to statistics released Friday by the Department for Human Resources.

Robert MacDonald, chief labor market analyst for the department, says that there were an estimated 68,500 persons out of work in August. This was 5,800 more than in July, but 8,300 fewer than were unemployed in August of 1976.

MacDonald says that most of the August increase was due to layoffs within Kentucky's manufacturing industries. However, three areas of the economy registered gains in employment: Agriculture, up 3,000 over July; trade, up 2,400 and construction, up 1,600.

The national unadjusted rate of unemployment was 6.8 per cent in August.







Secondary Education last week took action which would broaden representation on the Kentucky High School Athletic Association (KHSAA).


The board's action would permit each local board of education or governing body of private or parochial schools to appoint one representative for each member school within the district to represent the school in the association. Only certified personnel employed by the district would be eligible for appointment.

Previously, secondary school principals automatically served as member schools' representatives.

The board's consideration of the issue began in March when representatives of the 400-member Kentucky Girls Sports Association (KGSA) asked the State Board of Education to broaden eligibility requirements for the association so that women would be represented on KHSAA's governing Board of Control. Norris Wake, attorney for the KGSA,

has contended that membership regulations precluded women serving on the board due to the limited number of women secondary principals. Board members are elected by member school representatives.

KHSAA is the state's administrative agency for high school sports, and as such has the responsibility for enforcing rules of high school sports throughout Kentucky.

Work of Billboard Clearing **Faced by Strong Criticism**

Kentucky has begun enforcing the been near it two commercial signs which 'Lady Bird'' law to clear billboards from the proximity of federal or federal-aid highways, and the going is rough.

State compliance with the federal law which was sponsored by onetime First Lady, Lady Bird Johnson, is being initiated in order to avoid the loss to the state of \$10 million or more in U.S. funds.

"We've run into opposition in spots," C. K. Dingus, of Martin, who has been assigned to supervise the work in Floyd and other counties of the area, said this week. "It's an unpleasant job, one I didn't want, but it was given me," he added

One complaint heard was from the Hueysville community where the Church of Christ sign was removed last week without notice and was reported damaged when state workers took it to the site of the church, downhill from where the sign was located.

Mr. Dingus said he would have permitted the sign to stand, had there not were patently in violation of the law. He said that if he had permitted the church sign to stand after removing the others he would have been open to discrimination action. He denied that the sign was broken.

"I told the lady (a member of the church) I was sorry and would myself help erect a legal sign," he added. The sign, he said, measured 4 by 8 feet,

while the federal law forbids signs of more than 8 square feet. He admitted that no notice was given

before the church sign and the two erected by business firms were removed. The sign in question was on private land and 50 feet or more from the rightof-way of KY 80.

The Bosco signs are the only ones taken down without prior notice, it was said. The regulations given him, Dingus said, are lengthy and difficult to comprehend. "And I don't agree with all of them, but I didn't write the law," he added.

Those affected by enforcement of the law call it 'highhanded and inconsiderate of the people's rights."

Simultaneously with the sign removal undertaking, the Department of Highways began enforcing the junkyard law which forbids five or more junk cars to be visible in one location from the highway.

One-Room School

By MRS, HERSCHEL COMBS The beginning of this year's school has brought back memories of my childhood school days.

My thoughts go back to a one-room school I attended at Jacks Creek in Floyd county. The description of my school fits most of the others, I suppose. It was a frame building, painted white; one door in front, with windows on each side. A long blackboard was across one end with the teacher's desk nearby. A cast-iron stove sitting in the center of the building supplied the heat. A boy, hired by the teacher for ten cents a morning, usually came early and built the fire.

The long benches up front were used by the students for reciting their lessons. Each class was called up separately. The students in lower grades had an opportunity to advance their learning by listening to the discussions of the upper grades.

The school building was used by the people for church gatherings, box suppers, a voting place and many other community activities.

There was cooperation between parents and teachers. They usually worked together in disciplining the children. The students respected the teacher and each other. They regarded good manners and morals as an accepted 'must''. These values meant a lot to people in those days. Children were not so quick to challenge authority or to question long-established social customs. Not everyone finds the scene as they left it; time has a way of changing things. The school building I attended many years ago is gone. Sad memories reactivate the sense of loss each time I pass the place where it once stood. Most of the one-room schools have disappeared and large Consolidated schools have taken their place in the name of progress.

W'wright Studies **Possible Purchase Of Utilities System**

The board of trustees of the City of Wheelwright has for some time considered the acquisition of the water, sewer and gas system presently owned by Mountain Investment, Inc. This possibility moved one step nearer reality September 9 when Delbert Davis, chairman of the board, met with Earnest Murphy and Scott Smith, of the Public Service Commission in Frankfort.

The purpose of the meeting, requested by Mr. Davis, was to become fully acquainted with the actions of the PSC in regard to both the water and sewer system and the gas system. The city received a systems evaluation report in January of this year, commissioned by the Big Sandy ADD, and executed by Schimpeler-Corradino & Associates, an accounting firm with branch offices in Louisville. This report, together with the district water-sewer plan, makes specific recommendations regarding the renovation of both systems.

Initial contacts with Frank Arnell, president of Mountain Investment, and Walt Williams, the local manager of the corporation, have proved very encouraging, Mr. David said. In regard to future rate structures, Davis was informed that if the systems now serving his town were to be purchased and managed by the city as public utilities, individual customers would realize nearpresent rates. The prospect of expanding the existing service area to include areas not presently served was strongly encouraged by the PSC.

Fishtrap Reservoir

Drawdown Started

The annual fall drawdown of Fishtrap Lake began September 12 in preparation for the flood season.

A U. S. Army Corps of Engineers representative in the Huntington district office said Fishtrap will be lowered five feet at a rate of about .25 foot per day until October 3, after which it will be lowered 27 additional feet at a rate of about .45 foot per day. Water will be discharged at approximately 190 and 280 cubic feet per second, respectively, for these two drawdowns.

It is expected that the drawdown will be completed by December 1.

A retired office workers writes:

"Years ago there was much agitation about Krebiozen, a so-called cancer cure, and then the topic died out. Why hasn't the same thing happened with Laetrile, another phony cure?"

ANSWER line: Early in the 1950's Krebiozen, a substance made from the blood of horses, caused much publicity and controversy. The issue began to die away as evidence mounted that its proponents were profiteering at the expense of patients. Laetrile, an extract of apricot pits, has been proven time and time again to be of no value in treating or preventing cancer and it was therefore banned by the Food and Drug Administration. Why, then, unlike Krebiozen, is it being legalized in several states, and promoted as well? The answer is a social and political one: Laetrile backers are well organized, publish literature for the public, make films, speak on radio and TV. Most crucial, they have linked Laetrile in a misleading way with the political issue of "freedom of choice." Despite the misinformation the truth is this: if a cancer patient relies on Laetrile rather than scientifically proven methods of treatment, he or she may lose the time and means to save his or her life.

A mailman asks: "Many years ago I lost a young cousin to Wilm's tumor. Have things improved at all?"

ANSWER line: Definitely, yes. Wilms' tumor is a form of cancer of the kidney that can afflict young children. It is first noticeable as a swelling or lump in the abdomen. Today, using a combination of treatments—surgery, radiation, drugs some 80 per cent of patients are being cured. This is a true sign that the investment in medical research pays off. An English teacher asks: "What are some of the most common misconceptions about cancer?"

ANSWER line: There are many myths about cancer which are simply untrue. For example, despite what some people may believe, the following do NOT cause cancer: Cooking in aluminum pots, vaccinations for smallpox, fluoridation of water. Contrary to what some women may think, a blow or injury to the breast does not cause breast cancer. Also, there are still some people who worry needlessly about contracting cancer from a patient. Cancer is not the kind of disease that one "catches." Nearness to a cancer patient is not harmful to health.

Consumer Comments

Recently a consumer received a telephone call from a salesperson who wanted to sell magazines. Since she was in a hurry to get off the phone, the woman hastily agreed to purchase a magazine so that the salesperson would hang up. Much to her surprise, a few days later a bill arrived from a company saying that she had purchased over the phone a fiveyear subscription to not one, but several magazines!

Each week the Attorney General's Office, Consumer Protection Division receives complaints about annoying salespersons trying to sell products over the telephone. If you receive a call of this nature and are not interested in purchasing the product, the easiest solution is to simply hang up the phone. However, if you are bullied into agreeing to purchase something that you later discover you did not need or want, then Kentucky law can help you.

Dialing a telephone rather than ringing a doorbell does not change the responsibility that a salesperson owes a consumer. The Kentucky law requiring a three day "cooling off" period for doorto-door sales also applies to telephone solicitations.

Under the law, a telephone solicitor is required to send the consumer a written statement of the sale and advise him of his right to cancel the telephone sale within hree days. Therefore, if, after the salesperson has talked with you over the telephone, you do not receive this written notice to sign, the seller has not complied with the law. You then have the right to cancel the contract. On the other hand, if you do receive written notice of the telephone sale but no longer want to purchase the product, you still have three days to cancel the contract.

To properly cancel a contract for a sale made in your home or over the telephone, you must notify the seller in writing. A simple letter to the company listing your name, address, and the name of the product you no longer want to purchase is usually the best means of cancellation. Keep a coyp of this letter for your records. It is essential, however, that you cancel the contract within three days after receiving the telephone solicitor's written statement.

Kentucky law also requires magazine solicitors to register with the county clerk in each county in which the salesperson intends to sell subscriptions. If the solicitor fails to register, then the consumer again has the right to cancel the contract of sale.

These home solicitation laws were enacted in an attempt to remedy abuses that have occurred in the past. Although fraudulent telephone practices have not been stopped completely, consumers are given more rights under the law to confront such practices.

To protect yourself from improper sales, always insist on receiving a written contract when ordering magazines or any other product from a telephone solicitor. If a dispute later arises regarding the terms of the sale,



contract as your proof of the agreement.



Lending considerable interest to the already fascinating lore of the woodlands are the many unnatural growths to be found on roots, stems, buds, leaves and flowers of vegetation. These growths are called "galls" and in most cases are caused by the irritating presence of larvae of insects.

BANANAS

These galls may vary in size from the merest swelling of a twig to fruitlike growths several inches in diameter and weird sprangles of twigs known as "witches' broom." In all cases there is great variety in appearance. Some are ball-shaped; some are shaped like stars, trumpets, rosettes and beef kidneys. Some are smooth and shining; some are rough and hairy; some are green, brown, and red and blue speckled. But one thing all galls have in common—each contains one or more young insects.

Birds and squirrels often tear open these strange little castles to feed upon the larvae within, but natural protection from such ruthless enemies is generally afforded by curious devices by the galls themselves. For instance some galls secrete caustive juices that burn the tongues of predators; others are so inconspicuous as to escape notice; and still others are bitter with tannin.

Many gall-producing insects like the Hessian fly, clover-seed midge, or grapevine phylloxera are extremely destructive to some forms of crops and fruit. The small, dark, four-winged gallfy, however, is of some value, especially when it deposits its eggs in the leaves and twigs of oaks to produce the familiar spongy white, green, and blue "oak apples."

From these growths are obtained

tannin for tanning leather. They are also used in making ink and in pioneer days were frequently utilized in the compounding of medicine. The gallic acid from these oak galls was considered a specific in cases of chronic diarrhea or whenever an internal astringent was required. It has also been said that pioneers used oak galls for making dye and that some of the oldest American documents show the bright, permanent ink of oak galls.

Although oak galls are abundant throughout the woodlands of America, gathering them for commercial use is considered too tedious and expensive. As a consequence the galls used in commerce are gathered chiefly by country folk in parts of Italy, Iran and Syria.

As a hint to fishermen, galls found on goldenrod stems have another valuable use. The little worms found inside these galls make the finest bream and bluegill bait in the world, or so it is said. These little larvae reach fishbait size just in time for late autumn fishing.





ORDINANCE 1-77

An Ordinance of the City of Wayland, Kentucky Regulating Mobile Homes within the Corporate City Limits.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the City of Wayland, Kentucky has the power to pass ordinances that are necessary and proper to provide for the safety of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, the City of Wayland, Kentucky has a responsibility to provide for the safety and well being of its citizens;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the City of Wayland, Kentucky, per meeting of September 12, 1977

Section 1: Mobile homes are not permitted on lots outside of an approved mobile home park unless granted a conditional use permit by the Board of Trustees of Wayland, Kentucky.

Section 2: All mobile homes located outside of an approved mobile home park shall be subject to the following regulations:

(A) The lot must be suitable for a mobile home permitted as a conditional use and located outside of an approvad mobile home park by virtue of its location, shape, topography and the nature of surrounding development.

(B) No mobile home shall be placed on any lot on which a structure used for dwelling purposes already exists.

(C) A mobile hoome must be located on a lot which abuts on at least one public street for a distance of not less than twenty (20) feet.

(D) A mobile home shall not be connected to electric, gas, telephone, water, sewer, or any other utility or service in, through or at another structure; all such utility and service connections must be made directly to the mobile home from regular utility service lines in the same manner that connections are provided to other dwellings within the corporate city limits.

(E) It shall be unlawful to occupy any mobile home permitted as a conditional use until the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the City of Wayland, Kentucky has issued a certificate of occupancy as required in this ordinance authorizing such use. All applicants for a certificate of occupancy shall submit, along with their application, the county health officer's certificate approving the water supply and sewage disposal as required in this ordinance.

Section 3: All mobile homes in existence within the city limits at the time of adoption of this ordinance, and which comply with all existing regulations, shall be allowed to remain in their present location as long as there is no change in ownership of the existing mobile home, or the lot on which the existing mobile home is harbored.

Section 4: The provisions of this ordinance are separable and if any of the provisions provided herein shall be held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision of the court will not affect or impair any other section, clause, provision or portion of the ordinance which is not in itself invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 5: This ordinance shall take effect as of the date of adoption and

publication as required by law.

the award of a \$40,755 Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) grant for initial funding of a three-state consortium that will coordinate Emergency Medical Services (EMS) and train emergency medical personnel in Floyd and other counties. Local sources will provide \$15,885, bringing the total for the project to \$56,640. The FIVCO-Big Sandy EMS Region IX Board is the official grant recipient.

According to Development Secretary William L. Short, Carroll's alternate on the ARC, the grant is for the planning phase of the project and will support a planner-developer in Ashland who will work with Boyd, Carter, Elliott, Floyd, Greenup, Johnson, Lawrence, Magoffin, Martin, and Wayne counties in Ken-

Gov. Julian M. Carroll has announced tucky; Cabell, Lincoln, Logan, Mason, Mingo and Wayne counties in West Virginia, and Athens, Gallia, Hocking, Jackson, Lawrence, Meigs and Vinton counties in Ohio.

Approximately 738,000 people stand to benefit from the program, Short said. "A serious problem exists in this Tri-State area in the coordination of policies to guarantee that patients will be transported across state lines when it is necessary," he said.

Short indicated that other problems related to emergency medical services in the area include weakness of cooperation between EMS providers and health facilities; inadequate reimbursement of EMS services; lack of job stability and career ladders for EMS personnel and lack of first aid and emergency medical service training for public safety personnel.

According to Short, the project has three major goals:

-Development of an organized interchange of information about EMS among the three regions to eliminate duplication and improve services.

-Development of an organized tristate continuing education campaign for EMS and their business and public safety personnel.

-Development of a mechanism for financial solvency in the tri-state EMS system.






