



## Almost 800 Could Lose By Cutback

### "Wolf's at Door," Dr. Stumbo Warns On Welfare Status

Some 782 of the 9983 Floyd countians on various welfare programs will be taken off the rolls because of federal budget cuts due to take effect next month, according to figures released last week by Human Resources Secretary Dr. Grady Stumbo.

In all, nearly 75,000 Kentuckians will be removed from the programs—including about 28,000 people in the Aid to Families with Dependent Children program, 27,000 on the food-stamp program, nearly 12,000 of those drawing Social Security disability payments, and about 6000 of those receiving Medicaid payments.

More than \$107 million will be cut from these programs in Kentucky as part of federal reductions in social programs sought by President Reagan. The cost reduction in Floyd county has been put at \$925,357.

Among those expected to be hardest hit by the reductions are the 36 percent of those drawing Social Security disability benefits who are deemed to be technically improved enough to work again. Many of these people have not worked for years, state officials contend, and will be hard put to find a job despite a medical determination that they are employable.

Under the new guidelines, a woman with two children who earns \$282 or more a month—and who is eligible for \$160 a month in benefits under the existing program—will no longer be eligible for AFDC benefits. She will be required in effect to raise her children on little more than \$3300 a year.

A family of three can now get about \$59 a month in food stamps if it has a monthly income of about \$766. Under the new policy, if the family makes \$766 or more, it will get no food stamps. Strikers will also be ineligible for the program.

Speaking at a news conference last week, Stumbo—whose department is responsible for the welfare programs in Kentucky—criticized the cuts as "unjustifiable."

"The wolf's at the door," he warned. "There's going to be suffering."

## Girl Files Suit For Appointment As Cheerleader

A place on the varsity cheerleading squad at Allen Central High School is the point of contention in a circuit court suit filed here last Friday.

The suit, filed by Hubert Halbert, as next friend of his daughter, Elizabeth Anne, claims she ranked 11th in the number of votes cast by the student body when a 10-member squad for the current school year was chosen and that she was by virtue of that vote an alternate and eligible to appointment if a vacancy occurred.

Two of the regular cheerleaders have resigned, leaving vacancies, but, the plaintiff points out, another election is proposed to select girls to fill the vacancies. Plaintiff claims it is "the express and implied policy" of the high school to fill such vacancies with those elected as alternates and that Miss Halbert should have been named without another vote.

The action, which names the school, its principal, J. O. Dingus, and the Floyd County Board of Education as defendants, contends that the calling of another election is "a gross departure" from the policy of the school and is in violation of plaintiff's right to due process under both federal and state constitutions. The court is asked to enjoin the defendants from holding the election to select replacements and that they be directed, instead, to install Miss Halbert.

## Branham Named For Kidnapping Of Emma Youth

Although the Floyd circuit court's grand jury did not, before its adjournment last Wednesday, name Elisha Branham, Jr., 23-year-old Prater Creek man, in a murder indictment for the slaying of Michael Dwayne Cline, Emma youth, such a charge may be voted this week during a special one-day session of the jury.

Commonwealth's Attorney James R. Allen explained that this county's jurisdiction on a murder count had not been established at the time the jury completed its work last week and that, as a consequence, no murder indictment was voted. Since that time, however, it has been found that, although the Cline boy was killed in Perry county and his body was found there, the slaying was in sequence with the robbery of the Allen service station where young Cline was employed and to the kidnapping of the youth, and that there are legal grounds for making the indictment and holding the trial here.

The prosecutor said Monday he will attempt to have the grand jury back tomorrow (Thursday) to consider the murder indictment.

The grand jury last week voted two other indictments against Branham.

## Red, White and Blue To Shift to Martin

In an unanticipated switch that has left some Prestonsburg officials angry, it was announced this week that Red, White and Blue Day—the patriotic county celebration founded 12 years ago by Marcella Bailey, of Langley, and hosted by Prestonsburg ever since—is to be held this year at Martin.

Mrs. Bailey, who approached the Martin city council earlier this month with a request to hold the event in that town, told the council that lack of support in Prestonsburg was the reason for the change of venue. The council unanimously endorsed the proposal.

Prestonsburg City Manager David Evans characterized the switch this week as "a slap in the face" for Prestonsburg and complained that the city has even now not been officially notified of the change.

Charges that Prestonsburg has not been supportive of the annual celebration are without foundation, he said. City officials here have invariably done much of the organizing for the event, city police and fire departments have been fully deployed and, in preparation for this year's event, he has already contacted Air Force, Navy and National Guard units to solicit their participation, Evans said.

## Court Studies Health Merger Plans for Area

While other Kentucky counties are reportedly giving in to state pressure to join district health departments, Floyd will apparently remain intransigent.

County Planner Dick Leslie told a meeting of the fiscal court here last Wednesday that, in pressing their plan to consolidate local health departments, state health officials are asking the county to "sign a blank check." Requests for details of the state proposal—which would amalgamate the health departments in Floyd, Magoffin, Martin and Johnson counties—have been ignored by state officials, he said.

One of the details of interest to Floyd officials, Judge-Executive Bill Wells indicated is where the main office of a consolidated health district would be located. "We don't want to lose our health department," Wells said. "But if they put the district office here we could be for (the districting plan)," he added.

So far, only Johnson and Magoffin fiscal courts have voted to join the proposed Big Sandy health district. Across the state, fiscal courts in 42 of the 83 counties that were not already in health districts have voted to join districts.

After a shaky start, the operation of the county garbage collection system is "looking much better," Magistrate

## Feds Press Martin On Sewer Problems

Repairs on Martin's sewer lines and lift stations are complete and, to hear the chairman of the city's water and sewer commission tell it, the flick of a switch might soon have the sewage treatment plant there operating again.

Other sources indicate, however, that the plant is still far from functional and that federal environmental authorities are pressing for a resolution of the problem that prompted them to bring suit against the city in U.S. district court last November.

"We are ready to start operation," Raymond Griffith, water and sewer commission chairman, said last Thursday, conceding only that "a few minor

things' remained to be done at the plant.

According to an official of the Environmental Protection Agency who inspected the plant July 28, however, it is not likely that—even with the repair of the lift stations and sewer lines—the plant will be able to be operated in the near future in accordance with federal anti-pollution laws.

The inspector said he was told the plant had not been operated since 1977 and that no maintenance had been done on it since 1978. Electrical switches and chlorination equipment had been removed and the plant's sludge removal system was frozen with rust and was inoperable, the inspector reported.

At a pretrial conference between EPA and state attorneys and William G. Francis, Prestonsburg attorney representing the city of Martin, last Friday, the federal officials pressed for "a workable agreement and arrangement" to be worked out before December 15, when a further conference has been scheduled.

In its original complaint, filed last November, the EPA charged the city of Martin and its water and sewer commission with discharging raw sewage into Beaver Creek, failing to perform necessary operation and maintenance of the city's sewage treatment plant, and failing to perform water quality

## State, Fed Officers Investigate Blast Damaging Auto Here

State and federal investigators began Sunday the task of attempting to identify the person or persons who on the preceding night had caused heavy blast damage here to an automobile and lesser damage to the home occupied by the owner of the vehicle.

The explosion, apparently placed on the hood of the auto of Ron G. Nance, manager of field operations for Hiller Fuels, Inc., blew out windows of the auto, wrecked the dashboard and smashed a window of the nearby residence tenanted by Nance at 38 North Arnold Avenue.

Barry McKenzie, state arson investigator, and federal officers had not determined Monday afternoon the nature of the explosive device employed.

Nance, who was in Greensboro, N.C., visiting relatives at the time of the explosion, said he knew of no enmity he had incurred to motivate the act. His company was involved, some weeks ago, in a controversy with Dinwood residents over the operation of overweight coal trucks. Company operations there have since been halted.

The residence occupied by Nance is owned by Infred Meece.

## First Auxier Parade Ever Precedes Groundbreaking for Community Park

The town of Auxier had Sept. 5 what is said to have been its first parade in its long history.

The parade of officials, citizens, veterans' groups, children and the Prestonsburg High School band preceded, and ended at, what has been termed "a dream coming true"—a community recreational park.

The official groundbreaking for the \$100,000 park followed the parade. Dr. John C. Wells, a native son who is commissioner of state Manpower Services and who joined the Auxier Development Club in promoting approval and financing of the facility, was one of those who spoke. The other was James Kennedy, of the state Department for Regional Development, who represented Governor John Y. Brown, Jr. at the groundbreaking. Magistrate Hershel Ray Wilcox presided as master of ceremonies.

The day's activities ended with homecoming at which more than 450 meals were served at the Auxier Elementary School gymnasium.

Funding for the project is being provided by \$50,000 from the state Department for Regional Development, which is being matched by \$15,000 from the Big Sandy ADD board and \$35,000 from Floyd county coal severance tax funds.

Auxier's Community Recreational Park will include a Little League baseball field, tennis and basketball courts, two areas for horseshoes, a picnic shelter with concession stand and grill, a jogging track around the perimeter of the park with obstacle course, plus swings, slides and other playground equipment for children. The park will be enclosed by a chain-link fence.

The project is expected to be advertised soon for contractors' bids.

Presbytery of Transylvania To Meet at P'burg Church

A church body whose roots antedate the founding of Kentucky will meet in Prestonsburg tomorrow (Thursday). The Presbytery of Transylvania, which originated almost two hundred years ago, now covers 55 counties in the eastern part of the state. Though Presbyterians split during the Civil War along with other major denominations, in Kentucky a reunion has taken place between the "Northern" and "Southern" branches, even though nationally the two are still separate. This is the first time the reunited Presbytery of Transylvania (Union) has met in Floyd county in plenary session, though its predecessor bodies have met here in the past. The meeting will convene at the First Presbyterian Church here at 10 a.m.

A presbytery consists of all the ministers in the region as well as a ruling elder delegate from each of the churches. The Rev. Timothy Jessen will serve as host pastor for the event. Delegates from local churches include Gladys Allen and Wesley Howard, Prestonsburg, First, and J. Phillip Fairchild and John Reed, Drift Presbyterian.

Other members, officers, and groups will join in welcoming the visitors. Drift's Presbyterian women will host the morning coffee hour; women of the Prestonsburg Church will serve the luncheon, which will be largely prepared by Community Meals on Wheels. (Meals on Wheels is housed in the Presbyterian manse and received initial support from the Presbytery.)

Both county Presbyterian churches are celebrating anniversaries this year: Drift Presbyterian is 25 years old, and the Prestonsburg Church recently celebrated 15 years in its present sanctuary, though the congrega-

tion dates back to 1899. In the Presbyterian system, it is the Presbytery that establishes churches, provides for their support, and acts as a representative body to act on matters concerning a larger constituency than one local church. Thursday they will install an associate Presbytery executive, as well as examine and receive new ministers.

Mrs. Richard Coe, of Cynthia, is moderator of the Presbytery and will preside over the sessions. The Rev. William McAtee, of Lexington, is the Presbytery executive, and the Rev. George Aichel, of Hazard, the associate. Delegates are expected from approximately 100 churches to participate in the representative form of government that characterizes Presbyterianism and from which the nation's government was patterned.

**One Magoffin District, Wet**

One Magoffin county magisterial district (District 3) with a population of only 2400 may have as many as five legal liquor stores soon as a result of the wet vote cast at the local option election there last Saturday. The retail outlet apportionment is based on the population of the county as a whole.

The wet vote was a surprising 935 to 298 dry.

The town of Royalton is in the district, and one boundary edges near the Mountain Parkway. One of the liquor stores is expected to be located as near that highway as possible.

Meanwhile, downtown Ashland precincts for the second time voted wet. That election may involve further court battling before the issue is settled, however.

The state Alcoholic Beverage Control Department was studying the Magoffin election.

Edward Farris, distilled spirits administrator, said that while the department does not rule on the wet-dry status of a community, the department will review the election results since only one magisterial district—not the entire county—voted in the local-option election.

"A wet-dry election held in a dry county in a territory or district (that is) less than a countywide vote represents an exception to the usual citywide or countywide local-option elections held in Kentucky," Farris said.

"The statutes relating to local-option election are unclear on the question of a district in a dry county voting itself wet in an election involving less than the entire county," said.

Farris confirmed, however, that the issuing of licenses in District 3 will be based on the population of the entire county and not just that district.

## Feet Held to the Fire

Frankly, we were a lot more interested in the Auxier-to-Inez road that has been placed in limbo than the Inez-to-Ulysses highway, but we are none the less pleased with the legal victory won by Martin and Lawrence counties in getting their road restored to its original four-lane design.

Former Representative Leo Marcum, of Inez, is due thanks not only from his own county but from all Eastern Kentucky. He almost literally held the state's feet to the fire by asking and getting an injunction which required that the original construction plans be honored as a prerequisite to the sale of the state's \$583 million bond issue. When an Appellate Court panel affirmed the injunction order, and the state Supreme Court later followed suit, the Department of Transportation was forced to "plea bargain."

It is possible that the state was being extravagant when the road was designed for four lanes and contracts were awarded on the basis of those specifications. The four lanes will cost more, true, and perhaps the state in these days of financial stress may be excused for trying to save on construction costs. But Martin county coal through the severance tax will afford enough revenues to pay for the job and it is justified in refusing to go second-class when it has an opportunity to get its first first-class road.

Mountain roads are costlier than those built over more favorable terrain, but these coal-haul routes are justified in view of the tax monies they engender. Mr. Marcum has set the example for other counties if and when the state decides to shift road-building gears and cut down on expenses at their expense.

Hershel Hamilton, a member of the solid waste agency board, told the court. Initial opposition to the mandatory pickup made collection of the \$6 monthly fee difficult, but collections are said to be improving as opposition diminishes.

Magistrate Ray Wilcox, of Auxier, and John Ed Shepherd, of the Middle Creek road, were named to the solid waste agency board.

The court adopted a county tax rate of 15.2 cents per \$100 assessed valuation. At that rate, down from last year's 15.4 cents rate, \$566,281 in tax revenue is anticipated. The rate rollback was required to keep revenue within the four percent annual growth permitted by state law and not subject to voter recall.

In other business, the court voted \$6000 for the county Civil Defense agency; awarded a contract to Hall's Septic Tank Service, of East McDowell, to replace a septic tank at the animal shelter property on the old Middle Creek road; heard a request from Ethel Hamilton, of Tinker Fork of Mud Creek, for the extension of a water line to that section; considered a dispute between Daniel Newsome, a property owner on Pinhook Branch at Harold, and Dale Meade, mobile home dealer, over access to a new housing development in that section; and heard requests for road maintenance from Richard Ousley, of Blue River, and Samuel Bentley, of Hoods Fork of Frasure Creek.

One of the true bills accuses Branham of kidnapping Cline "to accomplish or advance the commission of a felony and failing to release the victim alive." The other alleges that he committed first degree robbery "by threatening to use physical force while armed with a pistol and in the course of committing a theft..."

Of the 42 indictments reported, five named two defendants on the charge of "obtaining or attempting to obtain a controlled substance by the forgery or alteration of a prescription..."

One defendant was named in five theft by deception charges in which it was alleged he fraudulently obtained food stamps while employed.

Theft by deception offenses were of such number that the jury in its final report to Circuit Judge Hollie Conley said, "...law enforcement officers and officials are encouraged to strictly enforce the law as it applies to such offenders..."

The jury in its report made only two other brief recommendations — that the leaky water line which is causing damage to the front entrance to the courthouse and the sheriff's office be repaired and that the courthouse be cleaned more thoroughly.

Johnny Howard, third degree assault by striking Freddy E. Lyons with a stick; Kenis Hall, third degree assault by striking Jimmy Dale Hall on his head with a pipe; Benkia Howell and Loretta Little, separate indictments, each charged with taking clothing valued at \$31.74 from Maloney's; David Hoover, second degree assault upon John M. Turner, II, by striking him on his head with a metal object; Roger D. Kimbler, making a false statement of a material fact or knowingly failing to disclose a material fact to the Department for Human Resources to obtain or increase unemployment compensation and so receiving \$1536 compensation while employed by Scorpie Coal; Danny McCoy, first degree assault, accused of shooting Jerald Harvey; Cecil Moore, first degree wanton endangerment by shooting into the house of Collie Tackett; Cecil Moore, first degree wanton endangerment by shooting at Rita Little; Jack Mitchell, first degree wanton endangerment by shooting at an automobile occupied by Ronald Slone and Debbie Slone; Gregory Pennington, theft by unlawfully taking a 1977 Dodge pickup owned by Huey Gray; James Roe, making a false statement or failing to disclose a material fact to the Department for Human Resources and receiving \$768 compensation while employed by the Brown Produce Co.; Virgil Shelton, theft by deception by obtaining a loan of \$2500, giving as collateral a 1978 Oldsmobile Cutlass which had no value.

Knott Man Shot, 2 Found Stabbed In Johnson Co.

The stabbing deaths of two Johnson county men featured the crime news during a weekend in which a Knott county man was shot and seriously wounded by a Bypro woman and a Craynor youth was severely slashed about the face and neck.

Larry Slone, 31, of Topmost, was shot in the stomach by a bullet from a .30-.30 rifle around 8 p.m. Monday. Anna Slone, 23, of Bypro, who is unrelated to the victim, was arrested by Deputy Sheriffs Harold Johnson and Denver Hunt and charged with first degree assault in connection with the incident.

The wounded man was taken to the McDowell Appalachian Regional Hospital, where he was reported Tuesday morning to be in guarded condition. His alleged assailant was lodged in the Floyd county jail and bond was set at \$10,000.

The shooting, which occurred at the Wheelwright home of the accused woman's father, Ronnie Hitchcock, is said to have resulted from long-standing trouble between the victim and his alleged assailant.

In 1979, Larry Slone was convicted of shooting into the home of Anna and Marvin Slone, who then lived at Minnie, serving seven months in jail for the offense. He was indicted on a similar offense in May last year and spent nearly 10 months in jail here awaiting trial on the charge which was subsequently dismissed as part of an arrangement by which Slone was committed to a state hospital for psychiatric care.

In seeking psychiatric evaluation for his client, Public Defender Lowell Spencer argued that there was reason to believe Slone was mentally incompetent to stand trial. Slone appeared to believe, his attorney said, that Anna Slone "controlled his mind and body."

Monday's shooting is being investigated by the Floyd county sheriff's office and by State Detective Don Weedman.

Palmer Hall, 42, of Grethel, was jailed here on a first degree assault charge Monday after he had allegedly cut 16-year-old James Edward Hall so extensively about the face and neck that 180 stitches were required to close the wounds. The youth was treated at Pikeville Methodist Hospital and released.

The incident is said to have resulted from an argument Sunday at the residence of Homer Hall, at Galveston. The alleged assailant was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Gillis Conn. A \$5000 bond was set in the case, which is under investigation by State Detective Weedman.

Glen J. Hicks, 20, of Thelma, was lodged in Johnson county jail Monday after being charged with two counts of murder in the fatal stabbing of Steven M. Sharkey, 20, and Raymond Holbrook, 46, at Thelma, late Saturday night.

Sharkey's body was reportedly found at the home of his parents, Stephen and Georgia Sharkey, about 10:45 Saturday night. He had been stabbed four times.

While State Detective Kenneth DeBoard was seeking out possible witnesses to the Sharkey slaying, he entered the mobile home belonging to Holbrook—about 200 yards from the Sharkey residence—and there discovered Holbrook's body. The man had been stabbed 14 times.

Both men are said by state police to have died within minutes of each other of puncture wounds to the heart inflicted by a sharp instrument, apparently a knife. Police said no motive for the killings had been established.





**Empty Shoes at River's Edge Create Stir in Martin County**

Three pairs of shoes left along the edge of the Tug Fork by three youngsters, one of whom is from Floyd county, who were unconcerned about footwear during the warm weather, touched off one of Martin county's biggest rescue efforts recently.

The story is excerpted from Joe Szakos' account of the fiasco in The Martin Countian, Inez newspaper:

If Tom Sawyer and Huck Finn were walking through Martin county now, they could rightfully be jealous of the attention that a lad named James Diamond got last week.

James, a rather lanky youth at age 15, goes down to the Tug River not too far from his residence in Hode, with his sister, Addie, and their friend from Floyd county, Mae Mullins.

The sense of adventure that Sawyer and Finn knew so well gets into the trio and they decide to shed their shoes and socks and take a swim. Enjoying the day, the teenagers continue to swim toward the Diamond trailer in Hode.

After a lengthy swim, they reach the bank of the river behind the place they call "home." Not paying much attention to the footwear that they left back at their entry point, they go to their abode and seek warm and dry clothes.

Two fishermen are near the riverbank and they see three sets of foot apparel, without any occupants. Looking around, Johnny Pack and his father, John Pack, see that nobody is to be found. As a thoughtful measure, the two notify the Martin county sheriff's department.

The sheriff's office sends Chief Deputy Sheriff, Jim Meeks, to investigate the matter the next morning. Meeks comes upon the shoes and begins the normal process of sending for more help.

Kentucky State Police Trooper Dave Wallen is summoned from Johnson county, only being told that the sheriff's office "needed some assistance." He is told to meet Meeks and associates "down the Riverfront."

After looking around, the law enforcement officials begin to walk along both sides of the river, looking for footprints of anyone entering or exiting the water. Shortly thereafter, other deputies make their way to the scene and the Martin County REACT is asked to bring equipment and personnel.

Sensing the seriousness of the possibility of three persons being taken by the Tug, the assistance of the Johnson County REACT is solicited and they come, armed with skin divers and other sophisticated equipment used in "dragging" for bodies.

But the cast of characters at the scene would not be complete without the coroner, Jay Hinkle, eventually making his way there, and an appearance by Harrison Jude's helicopter.

While the festivities began at about 10:30 a.m., they would still be moving along at a rapid pace when another trooper, Scott Woodard, comes on duty at 4:00 p.m. Woodard would have the first helicopter ride of his life before the evening was over and would find himself along with the others, very muddy and wet when the sun left the skies for the day.

Well, amid all the searching, James Diamond, son of Bert and Bertha Diamond, made his way toward the rescuers, hoping to get his tennis shoes and the footwear of his sister and their friend. It was a day after his entry into the water, but today he was going fishing and remembered that he had to pick up some forgotten items.

When he approached one of the officials, they told him that they were having a training session, hoping not cause any alarm. (Rumors even spread that it was the Navy practicing some maneuvers.)

James, who is obviously a shy and quiet fellow, decided not to interrupt, but to go about his other business, hoping to catch a few fish.

James is fishing while two troopers, at least six deputies, the county coroner, about ten REACT squad members, a helicopter pilot and who knows how many nearby residents are looking for the occupant of his tennis shoes—shoes that he is afraid to get for fear of getting in their way.

Nevertheless, James finally has to go home because night has arrived. Most of those in the search party have taken their boats and gear out of the water and some have left the site.

James peacefully goes to a deputy sheriff near the scene, Bobby Endicott, and asks if he could get his shoes. Endicott, a bit stunned, makes sure that the boy is talking about the right pair of shoes and directs him to trooper Woodard. After Woodard realizes what had happened, he has a good laugh and is able to breathe a sigh of relief, knowing that everything is safe.

**New Phone System**

T-Day for Our Lady of the Way Hospital in Martin came quickly but quietly one day last month. T-Day was the day that the new telephone system was installed.

South Central Bell had determined that the phone needs of the Martin Hospital had outgrown the old telephone system. The hospital had decided that there should be telephones in each patient room. **Quilt-Makers To Vie In Statewide Quest**

**Estimated Tax Due For Corporations**

Corporations operating on a calendar year basis and having an expected federal tax liability of at least \$40 for 1981 are required to make a payment of 1981 estimated tax by September 15, 1981, the Internal Revenue Service says.

The amount due can be computed on Form 1120-W, a worksheet for computing corporation estimated tax. The form should not be filed with the IRS, but should be kept in the corporation's records.

When the payments are deposited in authorized commercial banks or Federal Reserve Banks, they must be accompanied by the Federal Tax Deposit Form 503, the IRS adds.

Supplies of Form 1120-W and IRS Publication 542, "Tax Information on Corporations," are available free by calling IRS at 584-1361 in Louisville, 628-0055 in Covington, 255-2333 in Lexington, or toll-free 1-800-428-9100 elsewhere in Kentucky.

**FLOYD COUNTY HEALTH NEWS**

September 14 through 18 has been declared National Glaucoma Week. Glaucoma is a leading cause of blindness in the United States; one out of seven blind persons is a victim of it. Chronic glaucoma is the more common type and it strikes slowly and painlessly. The symptoms may come and go, thus causing a person to put off seeing a doctor, but most of the time no symptoms are noticed at all. It is for this reason that persons over 35 (the age glaucoma usually strikes) are urged to have glaucoma screenings to determine if the disease is present.

When treatment of glaucoma is started early, the progress of the disease can be checked. So the needless blindness from glaucoma can be prevented if the disease is discovered in time.

The Floyd County Health Department is having a glaucoma screening clinic Friday, Sept. 18, from 8 until 4. This clinic is open to persons of all ages, but those persons age 35 and over are especially urged to take advantage of this free service.

A nurse from the health department will be in Wheelwright at the branch office of the health department, Monday Sept. 21. She will be offering free immunizations, blood pressures, T.B. skin tests, and urinalyses.

The only sure way for a woman to protect herself from cervical cancer is to have regular Pap smears. This is a simple test which takes only a few minutes of her time, and can save many lives if cancer is detected early enough.

The Floyd County Health Department is having a Pap clinic Monday, Sept. 21 from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. This clinic is a free service of the health department and any woman who has not had a Pap smear in the past year is urged to take advantage of this clinic.

Family Planning will be in Wheelwright Friday, Sept. 18 for supply counseling and pregnancy tests. Call 886-2788 for an appointment.

**Fire Dept. To Offer Sessions In Home Fire Prevention**

In recognition of Fire Prevention Week, which begins October 5, the Prestonsburg Fire Department will present a series of programs for the public called "Fire Prevention in the Home," it was announced this week by Larry Adams, fire inspector for the City of Prestonsburg.

The sessions will be presented on the evenings of October 7, 8 and 9 at 7 o'clock and will examine such topics as exit drills in the home, pre-fire planning, fire prevention (concerning fire hazards most often found in the home), mobile home fires, smoke detectors and fire extinguishers. Question and answer sessions will be a part of each program.

"Fire strikes someone's home every 57 seconds," reminded Adams, "and last year alone 6,300 people lost their lives due to home fires." In Prestonsburg, he pointed out, four people have died in such fires within the last two years and during 1981, 20 structural fires have occurred in the Prestonsburg area alone.

"The best method to stop a fire is to prevent it," Adams said, "and we hope Prestonsburg residents will take advantage of these special programs to learn more of fire prevention."

Pre-registration is requested for the programs and to do so residents may call the fire department at 886-1010.

**Opposes Toll Increase**

The Blue Grass Automobile Club—AAA strongly opposes the state Department of Transportation's recent proposal to increase highway tolls by one cent or more per mile.

Kentucky's toll roads were designed strictly for economic development, and their deficits should be paid out of the general funds, rather than user taxes. AAA recognizes that highway funding is a grave issue. But the state cannot afford to jump into the fire with just any alternative. Certainly, raising tolls should not be considered, since it could have a devastating effect on Kentucky's economy through decreased usage of the roads.

Currently, many trucks are not using these highways because they do not want to pay the tolls. Therefore, they are traveling on roads which were not built to withstand the weight of 80,000 pound vehicles. This results in unnecessary road maintenance costs.

AAA is concerned that an increase in tolls would continue to decrease travel on these roads. Motorists are already extremely conscious of how much they pay for gasoline and how much it costs to operate their cars. They are looking for ways to cut costs.

The debt service in Kentucky on toll roads is \$54 million each year, and this doesn't include maintenance costs. The revenue for the current year is only about \$19 million; and, from this comes \$6 million to collect tolls. Even if toll revenue was doubled, it would not retire the bond debt.

Financing highways through tolls is the most expensive method, because frequently the interest and toll collection costs greatly exceed construction costs. Also, toll roads are self-perpetuating and seldom become toll-free. Reconstruction often is necessary long before the bonded debt is retired, forcing new bond issues and the extension of tolls.

The Blue Grass Automobile Club encourages motorists to urge the Department of Transportation and state legislators to study methods of raising highway funds other than through tolls.

**\$650,000 Loan For Clinic OK'd**

The way has been cleared for construction of a new medical clinic on Mud Creek, with the approval of a \$650,000 Farmers' Home Administration loan announced Tuesday by Congressman Carl D. Perkins.

The clinic, operated by Big Sandy Health Care, Inc. since 1974 in a rented frame cottage on Mink Branch, is to be replaced by a 5991-square-foot building on property to be purchased from Cline Mitchell, about a mile above the John M. Stumbo school at Grethel.

Patricia Little, management assistant at Big Sandy Health Care, said this week the agency was grateful for Mitchell's extending its option on the property during the protracted negotiations for the federal loan.

The new clinic will provide space for two doctors and a dentist. Bids for its construction are expected to be advertised soon.

Big Sandy Health Care, which is partially funded by a grant from the federal Department for Health and Human Services, also operates clinics at Wheelwright and Salyersville.

### School Leaders, Legislators Meet

Legislative awareness — making legislators aware of educational needs for the next biennium — was the result of a legislative conference sponsored by the Eastern Kentucky Educational Development Corporation (EKEDC) of Ashland.

The second annual event, which was held at the Continental Inn, Lexington, saw approximately 125 superintendents, board members, administrators, state legislators and state department personnel come together to share ideas on how to plan better for Kentucky's future educational needs.

Highlighting the meeting was a presentation by State Superintendent of Public Instruction Raymond Barber, who praised EKEDC for its continued cooperative spirit, and

discussed recent cuts in Kentucky education.

"The cuts have been difficult, but we knew they had to come," Barber said, "and I felt we have kept in mind the education of our youngsters in doing so."

Barber also said that while he was not overly optimistic about future funding levels in education, he did feel that educators should look and talk about the good things that are happening in education, such as high test scores and a kindergarten program, instead of always emphasizing the negative.

Barber also said that his office was concerned about such areas as textbooks, student fees and extended employment, while special interest groups continue to be a concern too.

The legislative panel was highlighted by a presentation from Speaker of the House Representative Bill Kenton, assisted by Senator Nelson Allen, chairman of the Senate Education Committee; Representative Jody Richards, chairman of the House Education Committee; and Senator Michael Maloney, chairman of the Appropriations and Revenue Committee.

Allen said that all educators present shared a common commitment and dedication to education, and he called upon the legislators to put funding behind programs that they mandate.

Allen said he intends to pre-file a bill that would put back the two inservice days this year.

The superintendent's panel was comprised of Herald Whitaker, Magoffin county; James T. Dotson, Pike county; Eugene Binion, Elliott county; John Brock, Rowan county, and Dr. Stephen Towler, Ashland Independent.

Overall, the superintendents praised power equalization, and also told legislators that they need to know in advance what monies they are getting in each area so that they can adequately plan.




# Planning for Retirement

As the end of 1981 draws near, many older people think about retirement. They may wonder: Should I stop work now or wait awhile? How much will Social Security pay, and can I work part-time and still draw some benefit checks? When will Medicare start and what will it cover?

Answers to these and other questions depend on all the facts in each case. If you're considering retiring soon—say, at the end of the year—you should "inquire before you retire." Call any Social Security office now and discuss your situation. This will help you make plans and to be prepared, should you decide to apply for retirement checks.

Following is some general information that may help you in your retirement planning:  
Work credits are needed. If you are a worker 62 in 1981, you need at least 30 "quarters of coverage" credit (or credit for 7½ years of covered work) to be insured for benefits. The required amount is less if you reached 62 before 1981 and will be more if you reach 62 after 1981.

Evidence required. You should bring at least the following evidence when you apply for checks: Your Social Security card; your birth certificate or other proof of age; and your W-2 forms (Wage and Tax Statement) or self-

employment tax returns for the past 2 years.

You can learn what additional proofs may be needed by calling the Social Security office. Don't delay filing for your claim just because you don't have all your proofs yet.

How much you will receive. The amount of your retirement check will largely depend on your average reported earnings over the years. The higher the average, the higher the check. Payments to workers retiring at 65 in late 1981 can be as high as \$752.90 a month.

Your checks can start as early as 62 but the amount will be permanently reduced to take account of the longer period you will be getting them. The reduction is 20 percent at 62, 13 ½ percent at 63, and 6 ⅔ percent at 64.

Back benefits. If you apply for benefits after 65, back benefit checks are limited to 6 months. However, generally no back payments can be made for any month before 65.

Checks for your family. When you retire, checks can also be paid to: your unmarried children under 18, or at any age if severely disabled before 22; and your wife or husband 62 or over or at any age if caring for your child (under 16 or disabled) who is getting checks on your record.

Inflation protection. Once benefits start, the amount increases automatically each year to help keep up with the rising cost of living. Also payments are not subject to Federal or State tax.

If you work. If you are 65 through 69 in 1982, you can earn up to \$6,000 and receive all your retirement checks. If you earn more than this, the basic rule is that \$1 in benefits will be withheld for each \$2 earned over \$6,000. Only earnings from working count.

If you are under 65, you can earn up to \$4,080 and receive all benefits before the \$1 for \$2 rule applies. And if you are 72 or older, your earnings won't affect your checks.

Delayed retirement. Many older people prefer to continue working full time as long as they can. If you reach 65 before 1982 and work past that age, your retirement check will later be increased by 1 percent for each year (or 1/12 percent for each month) that you don't get a benefit because of your work. If you reach 65 in 1982 or later, that credit will be 3 percent for each year (¼ percent for each month).

Medicare protection. You can apply for Medicare at 65 even if you don't wish to receive retirement checks yet. Medicare helps pay costly hospital, doctor, and other medical bills.

You can get free leaflets explaining retirement benefits and Medicare from any Social Security office. To find the phone number and address, look under "Social Security Administration" in your phone directory.

Q. I can't decide whether to retire at 63 in December or wait until 65. Can I find out what my benefit would be at each age?

A. You can get a free estimate by contacting any Social Security office. The people there will be glad to discuss your situation so you can decide what to do.

Q. I'll be 65 next March and have a chance to work a few years longer if I want. Would there be any advantage in my doing so?

A. If some of your highest earnings years are ahead, they could help increase the amount of your retirement check later on (since the amount is based on your average reported earnings). In addition, your benefit will be increased ¼ percent for each month (or 3 percent for each year) that you don't receive a benefit now because of your work. (NOTE: If you decide to keep working, you should still apply for Medicare 2 or 3 months before you are 65.)

Q. I retired a year ago at 62 and would like to take a part-time job. How will this affect my Social Security checks?

A. You can earn up to \$4,080 in 1981 and receive all your checks. Then \$1 in benefits will be withheld for each \$2 you earn above that amount. Should you not receive checks for some months before 65 because of your work, and adjustment will be made later to lessen the reduction on the amount you receive.

More information about planning for retirement can be obtained at the Big Sandy Area Social Security office, located on U.S. 23 between Prestonsburg and Paintsville.







Allen Fire Loss Above \$100,000

The Big Y Food Saver, Allen supermarket, was hit by fire of undetermined origin early Wednesday morning at an estimated loss of more than \$100,000.

James Fulks, who had operated the business for 27 years, said Monday that the blaze could have been the result of arson or of electrical origin. Barry McKenzie, state arson investigator, was called for a probe of the fire.

Mr. Fulks estimated his loss at \$100,000. The 50x60-foot brick structure which housed the store was owned by Mrs. Rebecca Martin, of Allen, whose early estimate of damage to the building was around \$20,000.

The Allen Fire departments was joined by volunteer departments of Allen and Betsy Layne and individual firemen from Prestonsburg in preventing total loss of the building. The walls were left intact, but other damage will make necessary replacement of the roof, trusswork, wiring, plumbing and some flooring.

The fire apparently began behind a cooler, in the rear of the building. Insurance covered the damage to the building and part of the inventory loss, it was said.

Mr. Fulks said he expects to reopen the business when repairs to the building are completed.

The state convention will feature Gov. John Y. Brown, Lt. Gov. Martha Layne Collins, U.S. Senators Walter "Dee" Huddleston and Wendell Ford, and other state and national Democratic officials.

Mrs. Latta urged all members to attend this meeting which will also view plans for a booth on Red-White-Blue Day. No reservations are required at the luncheon meeting, and anyone interested in joining the club is welcome to attend, she added.

**State Closes Road Bond Deal**

After losing a court battle, the state negotiated a settlement of a suit which last week threatened its \$583 million bond sale.

The controversial sale of state "refunding" bonds took place as scheduled Thursday in New York City.

The sale had been threatened by an injunction obtained in connection with a lawsuit filed in Martin circuit court, but an agreement reached Tuesday led to dismissal of the suit and cleared the way for the bond-sale closing.

Attorney Thomas Currier said the closing was completed at about 11:45 a.m. Thursday — about an hour later than expected because of Wednesday's power blackout in parts of Manhattan.

The transaction involved the transfer of funds by wire, and transmissions were backed up because of the blackout, Currier said.

Proceeds from the bond issue were used to buy U.S. Treasury obligations, which in turn were put in escrow to guarantee repayment of two older road-bond issues.

A major purpose of the refinancing was to "defease" the old bonds, and thus to void a restriction that would have barred the state from issuing \$150 million of the \$300 million in road bonds authorized by the 1980 legislature.

The Martin circuit court suit was filed by former state Rep. Leo Marcum, of Inez, who sought to prevent the state Transportation Department from changing the Inez-Ulysses road project from four to two lanes.

The project is one of those financed by the old bonds being "defeased."

The settlement calls for making about 12 miles of the Inez-Ulysses road four lanes and deleting about 1.5 miles of the project south of KY 40 near Inez.

Making the road four lanes will cost about \$8.5 million more, but the deletion of the 1.5-mile segment will cut about \$9 million from the project's overall cost, according to Transportation Secretary Frank Metts.

**KENTUCKY:** Crappie fair in inlets and bays; white bass fair near turbine intakes above the dam; in tailwaters, catfish good; clear, falling slowly, three feet below summer pool and 78°.

**BARKLEY:** Crappie slow with minnows over deep drop-offs and submerged cover; in tailwaters, catfish fair; clear, falling slowly, three feet below summer pool, 78°.

**HERRINGTON:** Bluegill good with worms and crickets along deep banks; black bass fair at night on plastic worms around steep banks; clear, stable at summer pool, 81°.

**DALE HOLLOW:** Black bass fair at night on plastic worms along deep drop-offs and weed beds; walleye fair trolling deep runners along mud flats and shallow banks; bluegill fair on worms and crickets along deep banks; clear, falling, two and one-half feet below normal pool, 79°.

**CUMBERLAND:** Crappie good drifting minnows through old creek channels and still fishing minnows around stick-ups in upper tributaries (8-12 ft.); black bass fair with live crayfish along rocky points; in tailwaters, trout excellent; clear to murky, falling, 25 feet below the timberline, 78°.

**LAUREL:** Trout good on worms, cheese and corn; bluegill good on worms and crickets around shallow banks; clear, stable, eight feet below power pool, 80°.

**CAVE RUN:** Musky fair trolling medium to deep runners in upper lake; crappie fair with minnows over submerged cover; clear, stable at summer pool, 80°.

**GRAYSON:** Crappie and bluegill fair; black bass slow trolling deep runners; clear, stable, three feet below summer pool, 79°.

**DEWEY:** Crappie and bluegill slow; clear to murky, stable, one-half foot below summer pool, 79°.

**BUCKHORN:** Crappie good on minnows over submerged cover (8-20 ft.); black bass fair on plastic worms around drop-offs and stump beds; clear, stable, two feet below summer pool, 80°.

**FISHTRAP:** Bluegill slow; clear to murky, stable, one-half foot below summer pool, 79°.






## New KET Season Premieres With 'Great Performances'

From "Great Performances" to Kentucky public affairs to insightful documentaries on American business and Black American history, KET presents a diverse, new season of public television programming beginning Monday, September 28.

Leading off the 1981-82 line-up is "Willie Stark," a "Great Performances" musical drama based on Kentuckian Robert Penn Warren's "All The King's Men" (8 p.m. September 28).

Also opening the fall season are several KET public affairs productions, including new programs of "Kentucky Journal" (Monday through Thursday at 7:30), "The People's Business" (Wednesdays at 8), and "Comment On Kentucky" (Fridays at 7:30).

In October, KET viewers can broaden their awareness through two new series—"Another Page," an adult reading skills series (premiering October 14 at 6:30), and "The Universe And I," an earth/space science series which explores some of the underlying principles of scientific method and the properties of the universe (beginning October 6 at 8). Originally designed for secondary classroom viewers, these award-winning programs have been recently revised for viewing by the entire family.

For track fans, there's "The 1981 Kentucky Futurity" (October 10 at 8), the 89th edition of the final jewel in harness racing's triple crown held at Lexington's Red Mile.

Premiering in late fall is "Upon This Rock," a 90-minute KET documentary special which traces the history of the Black Church in Kentucky and the Southeast (TBA).

Then, in early January, KET resumes its coverage of the Kentucky General Assembly in Frankfort. Each weeknight program will capture the day's highlights as Kentucky's law is shaped.

In addition to these KET productions, the network presents an array of new and returning series and specials from around the nation and the world.

In the area of public affairs, there's "Enterprise" (premiering October 8 at 8), an examination of the workings of American business and how the free enterprise system functions. Among other topics, "Enterprise" focuses on the overseas marketing strategy of Kentucky Fried Chicken (October 15) and, in a program co-produced by KET, the successful Bluegrass horse farm operation of Tom Gentry (October 29).

"Ben Wattenberg At Large" (beginning October 8 at 8:30) provides 13 shows which view big business, big government and the U.S. economic future; while "John Callaway Interviews" (starting October 3 at 8) features seven weekly conversations with personalities such as newsman Mike Wallace and opera star Leontyne Price.

For the hobbyist, there are three new "how-to" shows on KET this fall. "The Photo Show" (beginning October 15 at 10:30) provides tips on photography technique and "The Woodwright's Shop" (TBA) offers entertaining demonstrations of 19th century woodcrafting by host Roy Underhill. In December, "The World of Cooking" (TBA) leads viewers on a tastetempting circuit of the world's great kitchens, chefs and recipes.

Among the season's specials are "Stepping Out" (October 7 at 9), the story of a group of handicapped students who surmount their disabilities to perform at the Sydney Opera House in their native Australia, and "A House Divided: Denmark Vesey's Rebellion" (January 27), a dramatization of one man's ill-fated but noble attempt to free his enslaved brothers.

In January, KET will be on stage with the new "Playhouse" series (TBA), featuring dramas and adaptations of outstanding works by American playwrights and authors—from Mark Twain to Tennessee Williams. The "Playhouse" season also features the Broadway hit, "For Colored Girls Who Have Considered Suicide When The Rainbow Is Enuf."

Another new series in the 1981-82 offerings is "Media Probes" (also, TBA), which looks at the impact and workings of the mass media in America.

Anthropology, science, drama and music are just some of the subjects in new editions of several returning series. Carl Sagan's personal tour of the universe, "Cosmos," encores (September 29 at 9); the anthropology series, "Odyssey," begins its new programs with a study of the lives of ancient seafarers (September 29 at 10); "Live From The Met" opens with "La Traviata" (September 30 at 9); the two-part program, "The Bluegrass Music Festival Of The United States,"

# On Eve of Revolution, Conservationists Smuggled Zoological Cargo Out of Iran

Iran was a riot-torn, fearful country on the verge of revolution on December 8, 1978, when in the late afternoon an El Al jetliner took off from Tehran for Israel, loaded with precious cargo.

It wasn't gold or jewels aboard what was probably the last plane to leave Iran for Israel, but four female Persian fallow deer.

The intriguing story of how these deer were rescued from Iran by some gutsy environmentalists is revealed in the current issue of International Wildlife magazine. The cloak-and-dagger tale involved Avraham Yoffe, Israel's premier conservationist, who planned the rescue, Michael van Grevenbroek, a Dutchman who carried it out, Prince Abdor Riza, brother of the Shah of Iran, and several others who must be nameless for fear of reprisals by Iranian authorities.

Why were the fallow deer worth such a dangerous effort? These tiny deer, which are only three feet high at the shoulder, once ranged across most of the Middle East and North Africa.

Now, the graceful animals whose flat antlers resemble those of a miniature moose, are endangered. "In 1978, the last-known population consisted of fewer than 150 animals that roamed reserves in Iran," according to the National Wildlife Federation's bimonthly publication. "In all likelihood, these have since been finished off by the war with Iraq, which swept across the reserves."

As early as 1970, conservationist Avraham Yoffe was interested in bringing some of these deer to Israel to live on a "Hai Bar," or wildlife reserve. Israel's Hai Bar Preserve system was born in the 1960's when the country, having lost virtually all of its native wildlife, started a movement to restore as many species as possible back to its biblical range. As Persian fallow deer are mentioned in the Bible, Yoffe was eager to get a healthy herd started.

Yoffe managed to establish a relationship with Prince Abdor Riza, a brother of the Shah of Iran who had traveled to Israel incognito in 1977. Arrangements were made then to remove some fallow deer from Iran. Then in 1978 the Prince warned Yoffe that there was going to be an "earthquake" and urged him to remove the deer as quickly as possible.

"Not surprisingly," explains the International Wildlife account, "Yoffe is deliberately vague about some of the details of the plan, but one thing is clear: Once he had the word from the Prince, Yoffe set things in motion for a transfer of some deer from Riza's estate, located near the flat shores of the Caspian Sea."

Yoffe's emissary was Michael van Grevenbroek, a Dutch agronomist who was manager of the Hai Bar South Preserve. Arriving in Tehran on

November 28, 1978, van Grevenbroek managed to gather all the needed transportation and equipment and traveled to the Prince's estate. There he received some devastating news: The Prince had fled the country and no deer could be removed without his permission.

Plan B was put into motion. Van Grevenbroek and some companions went quickly to a nearby reserve, the Semeskandeh Wildlife Refuge, where he knew fallow deer were kept. He arrived on November 30 and enlisted the aid of some local woodcutters. Unfortunately, the villagers, although helpful at first, discovered that the deer were bound for Israel and they killed the first creature captured.

Van Grevenbroek solved the problem by convincing the locals that he was taking the deer to Holland. By December 4 he had selected four females from ten captured deer, and headed straight back to the Israeli compound in Tehran.

International Wildlife reports that by cajoling, arguing, and bribing, van Grevenbroek and a sympathetic Iranian colleague managed to obtain the necessary documents from Iranian officials, who were reluctant to allow the deer to leave the country. They were finally convinced that the deer were headed for Holland by way of Israel—a ploy that had worked earlier with the woodcutters.

Early in the morning of December 8 the deer were crated and loaded aboard an El Al jet. Mobs of would-be passengers jammed the airport, but van Grevenbroek finally managed to pass through immigration and join his precious cargo.

On arrival in Israel, the female fallow deer were added to a small, already-established Israeli herd. They have since produced several young.

## FLOYD COUNTY HEALTH NEWS

The special supplemental food program for women, infants and children (WIC) funded by the United States Dept. of Agriculture provides specified nutritious food supplements to pregnant, breastfeeding, and postpartum women, and to infants and children up to 5 years of age who are determined by health professionals to be at "nutritional risk" because of inadequate nutrition.

Earl Compton, administrator, Floyd County Health Department, said that under the WIC Program, infants receive iron-fortified infant formula, cereal which is high in iron, and fruit juices which are high in Vitamin C. Participating women and children receive fortified milk and/or cheese; eggs, hot or cold cereal which is high in iron; fruit or vegetable juice which is high in Vitamin C.

Mr. Compton also said that infants, children and pregnant breastfeeding and postpartum women are eligible for the WIC Program if they reside in an approved project area and meet the income standard for the WIC Program. Each person is individually determined by a competent professional on the staff of the Floyd County Health Department to be at nutritional risk and to need the supplemental foods provided by the WIC Program.

At present, Compton said, the health department has, because of limited funds, a waiting list for persons applying to the program. The waiting list is established on a priority basis. When openings occur persons with the greatest nutritional need will be admitted first. In most instances pregnant women and breastfeeding women, and infants will be of higher priority than postpartum women and children.

If you believe that you or a member of your family may meet the eligibility requirements for the WIC Program you may obtain more information by contacting the Floyd County Health Department at 886-2788.





Arts Council Views

'82 Grant Requests

The Kentucky Arts Council is accepting grant applications for arts projects occurring between Jan. 1, 1982, and June 30, 1982. Non-profit arts organizations or community groups committed to providing arts services or programs to Kentuckians are eligible to apply. The deadline is Nov. 1.

Funds are intended primarily for smaller projects not foreseen in time for the council's spring grants review. Since limited funds are available for this grant cycle, council grants can pay for no more than half the cost of the project.

Nov. 1 is also the deadline for applications for the Teacher-Initiated Residency Program. The residency program is available to teachers for projects which use residencies of professional artists to integrate the arts into the regular classroom or to strengthen and enrich school arts programs.

Any teacher, or group of teachers, presently teaching in a Kentucky elementary or secondary school, public or non-public, may apply. These residency program grants range from \$100 to \$1,000 and may be used only to pay the artist's fees and expenses. The teacher or school must match the grant, at least in part, with either in-kind services or cash.

Support for a limited number of short-term artists' residencies in performing arts, visual arts and poetry is also available.

## Moves to Curb Auto Thefts

Incredible as it sounds, auto theft is a \$4 billion business these days. No car is immune; car thieves prey on new and old models alike, since any car can be "chopped" and sold for parts. Insurance companies, law enforcement agencies and the government have been organizing strategies to reduce these statistics.

A new group, the Coalition to Halt Auto Theft, is pressing Congress to enact anti-car theft legislation. The group seeks Congressional approval of the Motor Vehicle Theft Prevention Act of 1979. This legislation includes provisions to require auto makers to mark major automobile parts and imposes stiff penalties for anyone caught removing these numbers. The Coalition bases its recommendations on recent Congressional hearings on auto theft operations and organized

crime. Auto makers themselves have begun experimenting with marking major auto parts. The labels are made so that they cannot be altered or reused. Another anti-theft feature on some 1980 cars is a recessed door lock cylinder which is very difficult to pick. General Motors issues certificates of origin with its 1980 cars. The documents, printed on bank note paper, should deter fraud.

Of course, if thieves really want a car, they will always find a way to steal it. These measures, however, are designed to take the profitability out of auto theft, thereby discouraging organized crime's interest to begin with.

## Car Financing Goes Up

High interest rates affect every aspect of consumerism today, but the automobile industry and automobile consumer have been especially hard hit. Here's why.

High interest rates affect the retail price of automobiles in two ways. First of all, car dealers are affected by rapidly rising floor-planning costs. There are the charges that dealers must pay the manufacturer for the cars kept in inventory. These costs, in turn, affect the prices the dealers must charge the consumer.

The second factor in price escalation is the high consumer interest rate for individuals wanting to finance their car purchase. Because of inflated car prices, more people

want to finance cars, but the rates have become so high that many consumers cannot afford the level of monthly payments. Worse yet, because of the high cost of money, some lenders have stopped making auto loans altogether. Others insist on large down payments.

Although some financing subsidiaries of the automobile companies have tried to aid consumers with loans in hopes of boosting sales, they, too, are facing ever higher interest rates which, in the end, must be passed along to the buyer.

Perhaps the best thing to do these days is to hang on to your present car as long as possible in hopes that the situation will stabilize in the near future.

## Should You Buy Extended

Service Contracts? Last year, all U.S. automakers offered extended service contracts at a cost ranging from \$75 to \$150 depending on a variety of factors. There is some debate, however, about whether the contracts are worth the cost.

An important factor to consider in evaluating a service contract is whether you will be paying for coverage you might already have through your regular 12,000 mile warranty. In many cases, the only advantages are car rental and towing provisions. Therefore, in essence, a three year plan is only protecting you for two years.

Also find out exactly what components are covered in your

contract. Many contracts only cover major parts that are unlikely to break during the early life of your car. If major parts do break, you have legal rights for reimbursement of repair costs even if your first year warranty has expired.

If you do decide to buy an extended service contract, you should shop around for the best price; you do not have to buy the plan from the dealer that sells you the car, and prices for the same coverage vary significantly. You should also know that except for AMC and Ford, cancellation of the contract with full refund is available within the first 30-60 days. After that time, refund policies differ.

The Encyclopedia includes chapters on the history of automobiles, auto manufacturing, designing new cars and the car of the future, just to name a few. ## Crop Report as of September 1

August was a month of generally favorable growing conditions, according to the Kentucky Crop Reporting Service. Crop conditions vary from county to county and even from neighbor to neighbor. Crops are generally much better than last year, but prices are depressed. Rains received in late August and early September should be of benefit to late developing corn, tobacco and soybeans, but another month of frost-free weather is needed.

Corn prospects in Kentucky are much improved over last year, as production of corn is forecast at a record 148.4 million bushels. The 1981 production is up 43 percent from last year's drought shorted crop and 12 percent above the previous record crop of 1979. Expected yield, at 97 bushels per acre, is up 5 bushels from August 1 and is the third highest on record. Growing conditions were favorable during August. Acreage intended for harvest as grain

at 1.53 million acres is 3 percent above last year. Harvest of early planted corn is under way with good yields reported in most areas of Kentucky. Approximately 27 percent of the corn was mature on September 6, compared to 40 percent last year.

U.S. corn production is expected to total 7.94 billion bushels, up 19 percent from last year and up 3 percent from the August 1 forecast. Estimated yield at 107.1 bushels per acre is up 16.1 bushels from 1980.

The burley crop in Kentucky is estimated at 484.0 million pounds, an increase of 24 percent from last year and the largest crop since the 520.8 million pounds produced in 1963. The September forecast is unchanged from August. Yield per acre and harvested acreage are both up from a year ago. Production in the Burley Belt is expected to total 710 million pounds. This is up 27 percent from last year.

Kentucky production of soybeans is forecast at 51.0 million bushels, the second largest crop on record. This is an increase of 39 percent from last year. Yield is estimated at 30.0 bushels per acre, up 7 bushels from last year and 2 bushels above last month's forecast. Acreage intended for harvest is estimated at 1.7 million acres, up 6 percent from last year. Soybean development is good, but generally behind that of last year. A delayed frost will be needed for the crop to develop fully.

Combs, coordinator of the associate degree nursing program, and Dr. Henry A. Campbell, Jr., director of Prestonsburg Community College, will represent Prestonsburg.



We have examined the Statement of Assets, Liabilities and Fund Balances Arising From Cash Transactions of Floyd County as of June 30, 1980, and the related Statement of Cash Receipts, Cash Disbursements and Changes in Fund Balances for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. We also conducted tests of compliance with state and federal laws and regulations including federal revenue sharing requirements enumerated in the Audit Guide and Standards for Revenue Sharing issued by the Office of Revenue Sharing.

As recommended by the State Local Finance Officer, pursuant to KRS 68.210, the accompanying financial statements are prepared on a cash basis. Consequently, certain revenues and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when a liability is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly the assets, liabilities and fund balances arising from the cash transactions of Floyd County at June 30, 1980, and its cash receipts and cash disbursements during the year then ended, in conformity with the accounting system described above, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

The supplemental information presented in this report is not necessary for a fair presentation of the financial statements, but is presented as additional supplementary data. This information has been subjected to the tests and other auditing procedures applied in the examination of the financial statements mentioned above, and in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Recommendations and areas of noncompliance are as follows:

The County Clerk failed to make timely reports for deed transfer tax, delinquent tax and occupational licenses as required. We recommend that the fiscal court require the County Clerk to begin immediately to make these reports and payments when they become due.

The county was in violation of KRS 64.710, which states that no public officer or employee shall receive or be allowed or paid any lump sum expense allowance except where such allowance is expressly provided for by statute. This county paid the Coroner, Constables and Sheriff's deputies a total of \$12,000 in lump sum payments. Also, the county paid the Magistrates a lump sum expense allowance of \$200 per month. KRS 64.258 limits lump sum expense payments to \$100 per month for the Magistrates. The total overpayment to the Magistrates was \$4,800.

We remind the fiscal court that KRS 424.260 states that bids for materials, supplies, equipment or services are needed if the expenditure is more than \$5,000 (\$2,500 as of January 1, 1980). There were expenditures of \$43,050 during the year for which bids were not obtained.

We recommend the fiscal court review the bond of the County Judge/Executive who is now bonded for \$5,000. We advise the court to require bonding of this official in an amount commensurate with his financial responsibilities.



# New Flood Warning System May Operate by Year's End

A new system to improve flash flood warnings is being installed in parts of Kentucky and three other central Appalachian states, covering areas containing some of the most flood-prone valleys in the nation.

Floyd is one of five eastern Kentucky counties participating in the program's initial phase.

The system is being developed as part of a National Prototype Flash Flood Program by the Commerce Department's National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and the Appalachian Regional Commission. State and county governments in Kentucky, West Virginia, Virginia and Pennsylvania, and the Tennessee Valley Authority are cooperating in the development of the system. In Kentucky, the division of disaster and emergency services and the Kentucky Emergency Warning System are combining to implement the system.

The first components of the new, automated system have been tested in Pike County in Kentucky and additional components will be added in the next few months.

"The goal of the Flash Flood Program is to provide reliable warnings of local flooding from 30 minutes to three hours or more in advance of high water in the country's high-risk areas," according to Wilbur R. Buntin, executive director of the Kentucky DES.

"This level of warning, combined with effective local action plans, is expected to reduce substantially the loss of life and property from floods," added Buntin.

Flash floods rank as major killers among weather-related disaster in the United States. Each year, they kill about 200 Americans, double the rate for the 1960s. Annual property damage from flash floods amounts to about \$2 billion, Buntin said.

According to Mark Spellman, project coordinator for Kentucky DES, the new system starts with a network of cooperative observers like those existing in most flash flood warning systems. It adds a significant number of radio-reporting rain gages, a variety of other automated sensors and minicomputers at the county level to provide quick assimilation and analysis of local data.

An area-wide radio communications network is used to pull together the vital rain and river information at the state level. A small computer in each state's emergency operations center provides further analysis and controls the flow of information to and from the National Weather Service and other concerned emergency services organizations. The computer in Kentucky is located at Boone National Guard Center in Frankfort.

New radar units have been installed

by the National Weather Service to maintain close surveillance of weather of the Appalachian areas. They are located at Jackson in Breathitt County and Beckley, W. Va.

The Appalachians were selected for the site of the new system because of the seriousness of the flash flood problem there and the willingness of the state and local governments to share responsibility for maintenance and operations.

Present plans call for expansion of the prototype system in the Appalachians to about 80 counties during the next two years and an extensive evaluation program to assess the potential for further expansion to other areas of the nation.

Counties participating in the first phase of the program in Kentucky are Floyd, Magoffin, Johnson, Martin and Pike, Spellman said the five Kentucky counties are scheduled to be operational by the end of this year.

Spellman went on to explain the expansion counties will include 15 counties in Kentucky: Rowan, Menifee, Morgan, Powell, Wolfe, Lee, Breathitt, Perry, Knott, Leslie, Letcher, Harlan, Bell, Knox and Whitley. Work has just begun in this area for future operations.

### Rufus M. Reed Honored

Rufus M. Reed, the most prolific writer and story-teller of Martin county's past, was honored last Friday by the faculty and students at Sheldon Clark High School with his very own day of recognition — Rufus M. Reed Day.

It was a day of smiles and pats on the back for a job well done for the man who has been writing of his love for Martin county since his birth on Wolf Creek, at Caney Creek, on May 5, 1895.

At 86, Rufus Reed is getting frail. A retired civil engineer, he surveyed his last mountain two years ago "because I couldn't get around the hills anymore," he explained last week.

He still drives, however. His gait is rather wobbly and uncertain, a sure sign that the years are beginning to catch up with him.

A student, Dewey Hensley, opened the formal ceremony in the Home Economics Department by presenting Reed with a key to the high school. Another student, John David Robinson, had sketched a very good likeness of Reed and passed around copies to everyone who wanted one.

While Reed smiled in accepting the honors, leaders of the Martin county community looked on in approval.

They, too, thought it was high time that Martin county's most famous writer and naturalist and civil engineer and poet and former teacher and former scout master was recognized for all the good things he had done.

Next up was County Planner Larry Smith, once a Boy Scout in Reed's troop at Lovely, who announced that the Martin County Library Board had just the night before voted to name the new county library the "Rufus M. Reed Public Library," in his honor.

Reed, as always, bragged about his county when it came time to say thanks for the honors just bestowed upon him.

"It pleases my heart to have a public library," he noted, never once making reference to the news that it would be named after him.

Reed graduated from Martin County High School in 1916 at Inez and from there enrolled in the Sandy Valley Seminary at Paintsville where he graduated in 1917, having studied civil engineering.

For the rest of his life, he surveyed the hills of Martin county both with a transit and with his keen mind. He loved the beauties of nature and often wrote about it.

Education, Reed says, has undergone the biggest change in his lifetime here.

Reed has written several books of poetry and two novels. Another book, this one written for children, is scheduled to be released in a few days.

"There was no money for schools back then. Now look. We can afford anything we want for our schools," he

told the 75-or-so who came to watch and to listen.

He gave the thanks for Martin county's progress to the coal companies.

"President LBJ (Lyndon Baines Johnson) came here to tell the world how poor we were. But it was the coal companies that turned Martin county around, not the government," he remarked.

Earlier in the day, Reed spoke to the English classes at the school.





GOOD DOVE NUMBERS REPORTED

Although rain dampened the spirits of opening day dove hunters over much of Kentucky, there seem to be more birds available than last year, according to a check of fish and wildlife district supervisors across the commonwealth.

After the first two days of hunting, conservation officers in 78 counties had checked 3,088 dove hunters who had accounted for 12,110 doves. When checked, 250 hunters had taken their limit of 12 doves each. The COs made 102 arrests during the opening two days.

Dove populations look good across Kentucky, the supervisors say. In the Bluegrass and in north-central Kentucky, populations are definitely up, while all other sections of the state report either some increase in dove numbers or populations very similar to last year.

Agricultural operations are behind schedule over much of the state, so finding good concentrations of doves over cut silage fields or fields sown to cover crops is difficult in some regions of Kentucky. Some of the best shoots seem to be over fields where crops such as millet or sunflowers have been grown specifically for doves.

Dove season will continue through Oct. 31, then resume for a nine-day period Nov. 26 through Dec. 4. The shooting hours this year are from noon until sunset, local prevailing time.

After the dove opening and the early duck season (Sept. 9-13) it won't be long before the opening of the archery deer season rolls around on Oct. 1, so sportsmen have a lot to keep them busy. But in the excitement of new hunting seasons many people overlook one of the best times of the year for fishing.

After the Labor Day weekend, the number of pleasure boaters on our lakes drops noticeably. The weather

starts getting cool and crisp, causing water temperatures to drop. As the seasonal signs begin to point toward winter, fish start feeding more heavily and moving into shallow water more frequently.

If your summertime fishing trips left something to be desired, give fall fishing a try. Summer is actually one of the toughest times of the year to catch fish, and you might be surprised at how much your local lake or stream has come to life since August.

Be particularly alert for autumn water temperatures which correspond to spring spawning temperatures for your favorite fish. A few angling experts believe that a so-called "false spawn" occurs in the fall, when some species will be in the same areas and will exhibit much the same behavior as they do during the spring spawning time. This is still a rather tenuous theory, but one that certainly deserves some more looking into.

So don't put your boat in winter storage yet. We still have at least between two and three months of good fishing ahead of us, if we can find time between the various hunting season openers that keep popping up this time of the year.

Two State Roads To Be Resurfaced Here

The state Department of Transportation will accept bids on Sept. 18 on two projects to resurface 18.8 miles of roads in Floyd county.

KY 114, Prestonsburg-Salyersville road, will be resurfaced from the Magoffin county line to U.S. 23, a distance of 11.3 miles.


KY 850, Midas-Goodloe road, will be resurfaced from KY 80 to KY 404, 7.5 miles.

The projects are a part of the state's record resurfacing program which covers more than 1,000 miles of road at a cost of \$40 million.

Transportation Secretary Frank Metts said the program, which nearly doubles the 584 miles of roads resurfaced in 1980, was made possible by economy measures within the department.

Abolishing non-essential positions, merging maintenance and equipment garages and reducing planning activities are just a few of the measures which made the record resurfacing program possible, Metts said.


