Board Adopts Maximum Fees Pupils To Pay

A grade school student may be levied as much as \$12.65 for classroom supplies this year. A high school freshman may be be required to pay \$40 or \$50 or more, depending on the subjects taken. Following a decision by the state legislature no longer to provide student 'fees"-money used for workbooks, typing paper, and other consumable materials-local school districts must themselves raise the money

In Floyd county, that will mean that individual school principals will decide how much they need to levy to pay for classroom materials, up to a maximum set for each grade or subject by the Board of Education.

Assistant Superintendent Ron Hager this week lamented the lawmakers' decision not to furnish fee money from state funds, saying it would impose an additional burden on parents in difficult economic times.

Who's To Blame **For Incomplete Lines Is Argued**

With about a quarter of the work completed, and the materials on hand to finish the job, a project designed to extend water lines on Spurlock, Bucks Branch and the left fork of Middle Creek (KY 404) has become bogged down in a dispute over who should pay for it

Bill Harvey Howard, superintendent of the Prestonsburg Utilities Commission, complained to board members of the Big Sandy Area Development District at a meeting of the board Monday that the ADD had backed down on its commitment of \$200,000 in Area Development funds for the water line.

Howard explained he was speaking for Judge-Executive Jerry Lafferty, Jr., who was unable to be present at the meeting.

But ADD Executive-Director Joe McCauley said yesterday it was the county that had reneged on its commitment to the project.

In fact, McCauley said, this represents the third obligation-he named the Cliff road and a park at Auxier as the other instances-from which the present county administration has "backed out."

As Howard explained the situation, an initial plan which would have cost \$600,000 was pared down to \$300,000 last year, with \$200,000 to come from the ADD for materials and \$100,000 to be contributed by the county in labor and equipment. In fact, only \$100,000 in ADD funds was approved for the project

McCauley acknowledged that the ADD component had been halved, but said this was a result of state funding cuts that came after initial ADD approval of the project.

In any event, this should have been enough for the job, in view of the fact that the fiscal court also committed to the project \$100,000-in cash, not in kind-of which former Judge-Executive Bill Wells paid \$64,000 for pipe and fittings shortly before he left office last year.

Dr. Stumbo Cites Leadership Need

Human Resources Secretary Dr. Grady Stumbo was in this area Monday, calling for "creative, innovative" leadership in Kentucky-and making it clear he was the one who could provide

Stumbo addressed a meeting of the Big Sandy Area Development District board at a Pikeville motel and-except for a spirited exchange over the future of a water line intended for the Middle Creek area-his was the only business on the agenda.

Considered a likely candidate for governor next May, the Secretary listed his achievements as head of the state's huge human services agency, drawing applause from the audience of about 70 with reports of his success in putting welfare recipients to work and forcing absent fathers to support their children He portrayed himself as an efficient manager of a bureaucracy which has traditionally defied attempts to organize it and as tough enough to make the hard decisions, like laying off 2100 employees, that efficiency demands

As to the site of the clinic, which has been proposed as part of a reorganization of the federally-funded program for compensating black lung victims, Stumbo said only that it would be "somewhere between Paintsville, Hazard and Pikeville," the area from which most black lung claims in this state originate.

At a hearing in Covington last Thursday, U.S. Judge G. Wix Unthank acceded to Hamilton's request for bond on the stolen property charge, a request that a magistrate had denied earlier.

At the same time, however, U.S. Attorney Thomas Self moved for revocation of bonds on two counts of which Hamilton was convicted last fall and which are still being appealed.

Judge Unthank denied the government motion in the case of a conviction of dealing in stolen explosives, on which the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals has yet to rule, but granted it in the case of a conviction of obstructing justice, which has twice been upheld by the appeals court but which Hamilton's attorney said he will ask the U.S. Supreme Court to review.

After Thursday's hearing, Hamilton was held in the Fayette County Detention Center. He is scheduled for trial on the stolen property charge in U.S. District Court in Pikeville. He also faces trial on a charge of theft by deception, passing a bad check, in Floyd district court on October 20.

Slone Sentenced To Three Terms, **Two Concurrent**

Following an agreement between prosecutor and defense counsel in the case, Eddie Slone, Jr., recently found guilty of slaying Paul Douglas Stanley and Terry D. Johnson at Wheelwright in January, was sentenced Friday to two 20-year pen terms, to be served concurrently.

At the same time, as a result of negotiations conducted in chambers, he pleaded guilty before Circuit Judge Hollie Conley to a charge of wanton endangerment, for which he was sentenced to an additional five years.

Slone will be eligible for parole after serving five years of the 25-year total sentence.

Ordinance Outlines Changing 'Dry' to 'Wet'

The pervasive question, in many Prestonsburg residents' minds, of "What's it going to be like when it goes wet," was answered to some extent when the city council met in special session Thursday for the first reading of an ordinance regulating the sale of alcoholic beverages within the city limits.

The nine-page ordinance outlined the strategy which the city hopes will make the transition from "dry" to "wet" less traumatic than some have feared.

According to the ordinance, one retail package liquor license would be allowed for each 1,200 population within Prestonsburg. This ruling would restrict carry-out liquor stores to three within the city, although no limit was set on malt liquor (beer) licenses which may be issued to grocery stores, arkets and like establishments as ell as to carry-out stores which sell stilled liquor (whiskey, for mple)

ty Attorney Paul P. Burchett, who o alcoholic beverage control adrator for Prestonsburg, stressed it is conceivable that there may liquor stores in Prestonsburg. plained that while the city may

approve three retail liquor applications, the state, which has the final word in the granting of licenses, may refuse those same three.

As to the question of taverns within the city, the ordinance restricts such establishments to two, since no more than one license may be granted per each 2,000 population. In addition to taverns, which may serve only beer, restaurants may obtain beer and/or wine licenses if 50 percent of the business' gross revenues are derived from the sale of food and if the seating capacity of the establishment is 50 or more people. There are no restrictions on the number of licenses which may be granted to restaurants which meet these criteria.

Burchett said that the state Alcoholic Beverage Control board (ABC) "takes the position that there is only one category of beer license," leaving the distinction of whether drinking will be allowed on the premises up to the proprietor. "However, there are some case laws which support our decision to render drinking on premises unlawful in the city except for those establishments clearly specified in the ordinance," Burchett stressed.

Moreover, for reasons that a school official here is at a loss to explain, the figures show a dramatic drop in the performance of Floyd pupils tested this year.

However, comparisons are in this instance not only odious but also beside the point, school administrators say. The point of the annual test is not to rank schools or school systems, they explain, but to identify areas where individual students are weak and to design remedies tailored to the student's needs.

The test, known as the Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills, has been taken by Kentucky students in grades 3, 5, 7, and 10 since 1979, the year after the state legislature required a statewide testing program.

Some 190,380 youngsters took an updated version of the test in the spring. They were tested in reading, language and math.

Students taking the test this year were compared with a national group that took it in 1981. Those taking the test from 1979 to 1981 had been compared with a national group that took it in 1973.

Kentucky third-graders were the highest achievers on the test this year, exceeding the national benchmark in all the subjects tested. Compared to 77 percent of the national group, 82.6 percent of the state's third-graders are ranked on the test as average or above. In the fifth grade, Kentucky students exceeded the national norm in all categories but spelling. Seventhgraders passed the national benchmark in all areas.

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

Rural Women Seeking Jobs Is KET-Produced Special

"Rural Women: In Search of a Paycheck" is a one-hour special focusing on the problems of rural women who are looking for jobs. Whether as the sole support of a family or as a supplement to farm income, today the phrase "rural woman," rarely means a woman who works primarily at home. Dr. Allie Hixson, a resident of Green County, Ky., and herself a rural woman, hosts this one-hour special which airs Wednesday, August 18 at 9 p.m. on KET.

In two segments, rural women tell of both their problems in finding jobs and some possible solutions in combating the often-stagnant rural job market. Joining Hixson in the first segment and talking about situations which are prevalent today are: Ruby Buchannan, a Greensburg resident and an inspector at a sewing factory for the past 18 years, as well as a mother of eight who lives and also works on a farm; Ruby Ingram, a resident of Bowling Green who is currently enrolled in a vocational program studying secretarial skills; and, Barbara Greene, a staff member of the Mountain Women's Exchange in Jellico, Tenn., where she monitors housing and school issues of interest to rural women.

In the program's second segment, Hixson and her guests address the problems expressed by guests in the first half-hour and give both analysis and possible solutions to rural women's employment issues. Guests in the second segment include: Marian Collette, a Williamsburg, Ky., native who has worked with developing leadership skills among low-income women with the Mountain Women's Exchange; Alice Mark, a Morehead resident and coordinator of the Displaced Homemakers Program at the Appalachian Development Center at Morehead State University; and, Lela Williams, a Fort Knox resident who works for an advocacy group for federally employed women.



The Pike county grand jury last week had things to say about the drug traffic and the impunity with which drug peddlers operate that apply to the situation existing not only in Pike but in many, if not most, other counties of Kentucky.

The grand jury did not criticise peace officers themselves for the breakdown in enforcement of the law against the sale of narcotics, but it did have something to say about the failure of county and state to provide enough officers to meet the situation, and about a parole system that turns the criminal free, and about a judicial system that, by and large, is a failure in the business of serving as a crime deterrent.

This grand jury suggested that Pike county could well reassess the situation and get its priorities straight by diverting money that is being spent on what it termed "routine matters" to the more important business of getting a sufficient number of police officers and plainclothes personnel in action.

Ask any official in this county about the drug situation, and he will readily admit his concern about the growing use of drugs, the greater prevalence of narcotics in varied forms and the imminent threat to young people, including many who are in school.

Something needs to be done, they agree, and drug awareness education is not enough. The seller and the more formidable wholesale supplier, or the "ring" that represents one of the most loathesome aspects of crime, need arresting and being brought to trial and sent to prison, and not for only a few months.


Floyd county has convicted one, perhaps two, persons of marketing, as the law politely puts it, "controlled substances." That's not enough. It's not fair to the one or two who got caught for a dozen or so others who are equally guilty to run, scot-free, and it amounts to criminal neglect of those who become their victims.

In the name of economy, Kentucky state police troopers, detectives and investigators are fewer, sheriffs' and city police departments are often reduced to the point of ineffectiveness. By the same token, the state legislature enacts laws and state parole and probation boards adopt regulations which make a conviction a mere slap on the wrist, because jails and penitentiaries are overcrowded and it costs money to build new ones.

Individual or collective dismay at the situation will avail little. The law needs strong arms—and teeth.

The use of drugs must not grow undeterred till they become as popular and accepted as alcohol. If this ever happens, they may be legalized.

average or above on the standardized test."

Last year, 66.5 percent of Floyd third-graders were average or above, compared to 84.9 across the state and 77 for the nation.

The story—of a substantial drop, even from last year's low scores—is the same for the other grades tested here. For Floyd fifth-graders, the figure this year is 59.7 (compared to 65.9 last year); in the seventh grade, 64.9 (70.6 last year); in the tenth grade, 64.3 (69.8 last year).

One reason given for Floyd students' poor performance is that relatively more pupils here are from lower socioeconomic groups.

While it is not clear, by that reasoning, why Pike students, for example, should perform considerably better than Floyd students, it is true that scores for all school districts in this part of the state generally fall behind the state and national norms.

Might it be that the student scores correlate with quality of teaching? School officials say they don't think so—"We would assume that teacher competency is fairly consistent," a Fayette school official is quoted as saying—and, since it is the pupils who are tested and not the teachers, the figures give no indication.

One reason the figures might suggest, though officials are reluctant to acknowledge it publicly, is that students here have less-than-average native ability.

This appears to be implied by the fact that, while Floyd students did poorly on the basic skills test, they nevertheless did about as well as could be expected—as measured by a new aptitude test which the students also took this year.

The aptitude test—known as the Test of Cognitive Skills—measures how students are expected to score based on their individual potential.

Floyd third-graders' scores on the basic skills test translate into a grade equivalency of 3.1. That is, while the test was taken in the seventh month of the third grade, the students were some six months behind—equal to the first month of the third grade—in terms of the skills they had actually mastered.

According to their aptitude test,

McGraw Hill—is supposed to be free of such bias, said Assistant Superintendent Ron Hager.

Perhaps the reason for this year's drop in scores is students' unfamiliarity with the new-type test, Hager speculated. Alternatively, "perhaps it is a morale problem. Perhaps adverse publicity has affected the system," he suggested, adding, "I don't know."

At any rate, the purpose of the tests is less to rank schools or districts than to pinpoint weaknesses in individual students, school administrators argue. While the state education office has available scores for each school district, a worker there insisted this week that there exists no listing of the state's school districts in rank order.

And while school-by-school scores are already circulating here—Hager said they will be released when they are presented to the school board next month—school officials are clearly not encouraging comparisons.

In fact, parents of children in a particular school or grade may find it harder even to compare notes with one another this year, since public hearings on the test results, traditionally offered in each school in April, will no longer be held here.

The hearings are no longer mandatory, since very few parents attended them when they were, Hager explained. Interested parents should see the school principal to get their own children's results, he said.

Since the test results indicate the precise skills which an individual has or has not mastered, they provide teachers and parents with a valuable guide as to what remedial measures need to be taken, Hager explained.

Floyd students have generally done better when tested a second time—ordinarily, each child is tested every two years—and parents should not be alarmed by a one-time test score, he said.

Kentucky is one of 19 states that have statewide testing programs. It is the first state to have included the Test of Cognitive Skills in its testing program, said a consultant for the test manufacturer.

Among the guidelines spelled out by the school board in adopting the fee schedule:

---no pupil will be required to pay the fees as a condition of being admitted to, or allowed to complete, any course;

-no earned grades, credits, privileges, awards or diplomas will be withheld ''if pupils do not or cannot pay'' the fees;

-pupils will not be charged fees for materials provided by state or local boards of education;

-money collected for course materials will be used for that purpose only;

-supplies paid for by pupils will become their property.

Hager explained that students will be charged only for materials they use. The fees adopted by the board represent a maximum, he emphasized.

According to the board policy, kindergarten students may be liable for as much as \$6 a year; grades 1-4, \$12.65; 5th and 6th grades, \$11.85; 7th and 8th grades, \$9.75.

In high school, the maximum fee for science will be \$10 a year; for health and phys. ed. I, \$10; phys. ed. II, \$12; typing I, \$30; clerical office practice, \$10; accounting, \$12; general business, \$10; shorthand, \$10; art I or II, \$20; music, \$10; band, \$20; home economics, \$20; agriculture, \$20; journalism, \$10; mathematics, language arts and social studies, each \$5.



nowever, the third-graders here were expected to have reached a grade equivalency of only 2.6 at the time they were tested.

In the fifth grade (technically, 5.7 at the time the test was given), the basic skills scores translate into a grade equivalency of 4.6, just a month short of the 4.7 projected by their aptitude test.

Seventh-graders scored a grade equivalent of only 5.7—a full two years behind their nominal grade, but exactly what was predicted by their aptitude test score. And tenth-graders here scored at 8.9 grade level, just three months ahead of what was expected of them.

Intelligence tests have come under fire in recent years for allegedly being biased against some cultural or economic groups. The test used in Kentucky—one of two published by CTB-

The fiscal court never authorized a cash contribution and the county should be reimbursed for the \$64,000 paid by Wells, Howard said.

Only about three miles of the projected 12-mile line have been laid and, although the pipe is on hand, the project is stalled for lack of funds to lay it, he said.

Part of the deal was that the county would do the labor itself, under supervision of the city utilities commission, McCauley said. The real obstacle to the project, he suggested, was a reluctance on the part of Judge Lafferty to honor commitments made by his predecessor.

Apart from the Middle Creek water line project, the present county administration "has not spent a red cent" on the Cliff road, despite an earlier commitment, McCauley said. That project is going ahead only because of the cooperative efforts of the ADD and the city of Prestonsburg, he said.

Moreover, a \$50,000 federal grant toward a \$100,000 park projected for Auxier is going unused because of the present county administration's refusal to contribute \$35,000 in local money, McCauley said.

Under an agreement with former Judge Wells, the county consented to contribute \$35,000 and the ADD \$15,000 to make up the local match necessary to obtain the government funds. The ADD paid its share—which went toward architects' fees—and the project "could go to bid any time the county honored its commitment," Mc-Cauley said. According to the ordinance, beer may not be sold for consumption on the premises of any tavern or restaurant prior to 10 a.m. or after 12 midnight. Likewise, such establishments may not sell beer on Christmas Day "nor on any election day during the time when the polls are open."

Fees for those holding liquor, wine or beer licenses in the city are double that required by the state. For example, while the state ABC board charges \$300 for licenses to sell distilled spirits and wine at retail, and a like amount for a restaurant wine license, the city will charge \$600. For beer licenses, the fee in Prestonsburg will be \$400. Burchett explained that the state would reduce its amount somewhat to accomodate those required to pay both city and state license fees.

The "regulatory license fee" or tax on the gross receipts of the sale of alcoholic beverages of each license in the city will be five percent, according to the ordinance. The fee will be reviewed annually to determine if an adjustment is warranted as a result of possible need created by "additional policing, regulatory or administrative expenses, related to the sale of alcoholic beverages."

As far as time is concerned, October will probably be the earliest that beer will be sold in the city, according to Burchett. "Although the county is officially 'wet' on August 29, the review process will likely delay the granting of beer licenses until October, and liquor sales will not come before November," he commented.

Burchett emphasized that the city's attitude toward regulating alcoholic beverages is one of minimizing change after legal sales begin. "We're going to try to see that the businesses are operated in such a way that residents of the city don't really see much change," he said.

Much of the city's concern, he said, is with the overall appearance of such businesses. "We have an ordinance on signs, for example, and buildings will be subject to inspection by the building inspector and fire marshal.".

Possible need for added law enforcement will be determined as the transition to "wet" status is made, Burchett commented.

The presence of legal alcoholic beverages need not degrade the quality of living in Prestonsburg, city officials believe. "We're going to enforce the conditions of the city ordinance to the letter." Burchett stressed.

Jobs, Not Welfare, Is Aim of Programs Human Resources Grady Stumbo has announced three new programs designed to get some low-income Ken-

tuckians off welfare and into jobs. In a press conference yesterday, Stumbo said the programs and other changes related to Aid to Families with Dependent Children are "major objectives" for the final months of his administration.

"I've said from the beginning that able-bodied welfare recipients ought to work," Stumbo said. "But they must have the opportunity to do so."

He said the new programs will help AFDC adults, most of them mothers, to get the job skills they need and become self-sufficient.

One new program provides additional financial support to AFDC adults who enroll in college, vocational school, high school or GED courses to learn job skills. The education and training allowance is available to those who must pay someone outside the household for child care in order to attend classes.

Stumbo said an earlier attempt to provide such aid was unsuccessful. The program placed few restrictions on clients and was open to abuse. The new program limits the number of payments that can be received and the amount of those payments. It also requires monthly verification of child care expenses and school enrollment.

The program, which began Aug. 1, is funded by a 1982 General Assembly appropriation of \$1 million for each year of the biennium.

A second program opens 90 one-year, federally funded positions to AFDC adults and other unemployed people in Louisville, Lexington and Prestonsburg. Those hired will staff three new branch offices of the Human Resources Cabinet's Division for Disability Determinations, which manages 70,000 annual claims for Social Security and Supplemental Security Income disability benefits.

Participants will be offered training in typing, office procedures, filing, medical terminology and other skills that transfer to jobs in the private sector.

The third new program, Kentucky Unique Employment Experience, will train 300 AFDC recipients to work as teacher's aides, clerical staff, food service aides, child care providers and cashiers. Training will take place in public schools in Boone, Hardin and Pulaski counties and in Human Resources residential facilities in Daviess and Jefferson counties.

According to Stumbo, this program will demonstrate a new approach to providing the child care and transportation services many welfare parents need in order to work. Trainees who work in schools will be able to ride with students on school buses. Child care expenses will be eliminated by selecting recipients whose children are in school.


Recipients placed in positions at the residential facilities will have subsidized public transportation. Children of these trainees will be cared for by other AFDC recipients, who will be given child care training. As the threemonth work experience positions are vacated, the child care providers will move into them, leaving their children in the care of other AFDC adults. He said the cabinet also has received federal funds for Preventacare, a project to help AFDC recipients become salaried homemaker/home health

aides. In the project's first year, 100 people will be trained to provide inhome services to elderly or disabled persons who might need to move to a nursing home if such services were not available.

Stumbo cited results of another work experience program that has placed 132 former welfare recipients into fulltime, unsubsidized jobs in health facilities. He said the savings in welfare payments plus the tax money generated by the jobs totalled \$547,363. The total does not include savings realized by removing those workers from food stamp and Medicaid rolls, he said.

Stumbo said the Cabinet for Human Resources also is cutting AFDC expenditures by taking more aggressive action to see that parents accept the obligation to support their own children. A cabinet report states the agency has made "substantial gains" in locating absent parents, establishing paternity, obtaining court orders for child support payments and enforcing those orders.

Jenny Wiley Park Report Draws Ire of Officials

Creed Black, publisher of The Lexington Herald-Leader, spent a recent week-end at Jenny Wiley State Resort Park, and in last Sunday's Herald-Leader he reported on what he found. It was a report which probably in-

spired the headline, "Is America's Finest State Park System Going to Seed?'

Obviously disturbed by Mr. Black's report, Division of Parks officials in Frankfort were quick to respond. They spoke of the "negative" quality of the article, of the newspaper publisher's dedication to fault-finding and his failure to note the attractive features of the park.

"I think the guy is taking a cheap shot," concluded Rick Norton, deputy commissioner of planning, construction and maintenance.

Black's article follows:

In a glass case attached to the administration building at Jenny Wiley State Resort Park, there's a reprint of an advertisement-complete with a photo of John Young Brown Jr. and Phyllis-which boasts that Kentucky has the "finest state park system in the nation."

That may be a legitimate claim. But it won't be for long if conditions in Jenny Wiley are any indication of what's happening elsewhere in that system.

A week spent there recently was my first visit to Jenny Wiley, so I don't know how it stacks up these days against its past. I do know, however, that the impressions I brought away were much less favorable than those gained on earlier visits over the years to Kentucky Dam, Kenlake, Lake Barkley and Pine Mountain.

Like these other parks, Jenny Wiley has a lot going for it. A state brochure on the system describes it this way.

'Jenny Wiley State Resort Park is embraced by spectacular mountains, it covers 1,700 acres, and it is edged by Dewey Lake. It offers exciting hiking trails and fishing opportunities; and visitors can catch the beauty of the Appalachians from a skylift...

'A summer music theatre presents Broadway musicals in a 900-capacity amphitheater. Guests can stay at the 48-room lodge, in any of 16 cottages, or at one of 128 campsites where electrical hookups and city water are available.

"Dances and other social affairs are planned year around by a recreational director. There's a 9-hole golf course and a miniature golf course, and visitors can enjoy boating, fishing, hiking, horseback riding, swimming, shuffleboard and picnicking."

All true. But this visitor's enjoyment was diluted by a growing feeling that the whole place was slowly going to seed.

Our cottage, for example, was com-

lodge than the guests' lot. My car was the only one in the employees' lot, which led me, Dr. Watson, to the elementary conclusion that the employees were gobbling up the guests' spaces-a conclusion I later confirmed by observation during my morning walks to the lodge to buy the Herald.

That, of course, is a reflection on Jenny Wiley's management. Whether its other problems can be attributed to that or a shortage of money and manpower-or both-is something I don't know and haven't tried to find out. I'm simply saying that as one visitor I was disappointed-and I wouldn't go back.

My disappointment is all the keener, I think, because of the respect and affection I have for Henry Ward, who was my first boss in the newspaper business in Paducah and who later, as commissioner of conservation, became the father of Kentucky's park system.

I know how much pride Henry took in the parks, and I also know him well enough to say that he wouldn't put up with a park as tawdry as Jenny Wiley is today.

Kentucky may be a state that's run like a business, but Jenny Wiley State Resort Park assuredly is not. If the neglect and shabbiness I found there are spreading throughout the system, the Brown administration is tarnishing a Kentucky treasure with one hand even while promoting it with the other.

When Jenny Wiley Park Manager Danny Brown was asked to comment on the Black indictment of conditions at the park he said, "I would rather let Frankfort make a statement." And "Frankfort," (the Division of Parks) was preparing such a statement Monday.

That statement would list, among other things, Norton said, major improvements that have been made at Jenny Wiley. "When we took over (when Governor Brown took office), the park was in terrible mechanical shape," he added. Since that time, he said, major work has included:

 Lodge completely renovated. -Vacation cottages renovated only last year.

A Martin county citizens' group may appeal a decision by local officials not to raise the property taxes for two large coal companies in Martin county, its attorneys said.

The group was scheduled to meet Tuesday to discuss whether to take the matter before the state Board of Assessment Appeals, said attorney Joe Childers of the Appalachian Research and Defense Fund of Kentucky.

Members of Concerned Citizens of Martin County had tried to persuade county officials that property owned by the Pocahontas Kentucky Corp. and the Martiki Coal Corp. is grossly undervalued.

Current assessment rates placed on the surface value holdings of both firms is \$200 an acre. Attorneys for the coal companies have maintained that the rate is fair.

On July 20, the county Board of Assessment Appeals heard arguments from attorneys for both sides and decided to leave the 1982 assessment rates unchanged.

"The board felt that considering the terrain of the land owned by Pocahontas, \$200 an acre was a fair assessment," said Roger Moore, Martin County deputy clerk. "Most of the land is rural and you can't get to some of it except by horseback.

However, the board did order Betty Mundy, county property-tax administrator, to review the holdings of each firm on a parcel-by-parcel basis and to further check the companies' declaration of equipment.

"The order was pretty positive in that sense," said Childers, "but we had hoped they would keep the books open on this year's (assessment) rate."

Deadline for filing an appeal of the decision with the state is Thursday, he said.

Three Charged In Magoffin Co. **Slaying of Two**

Two men and a woman were charged in Mount Sterling last Wednesday with the July 12 slaying of an elderly Salyersville man and his son, according to Montgomery county Sheriff Bobby Joe Stamper.

Stamper and Montgomery county jail officials said James Powell, 34, and Paul Anderson, 24, both of Mount Sterling, were charged in a warrant with two counts of murder and one count of criminal attempt. He said Powell's sister, Leona Powell, 27, was also arrested in the case, but he did not know on what charge.

Their bodies were found July 10 in a side yard of the rural home of the elder Patrick's aunt, Maggie Issac.

fortable and clean, at least inside. Outside it was a different story. Half a banister railing had rotted away. The paint was peeling. The porch was unswept, the windows dirty. An ancient and encrusted charcoal grill defied one to even get close to it with anything destined for his stomach.

Our small porch had only one chair, a decidedly unsatisfactory arrangement for two people who planned to spend a lot of time catching up on their reading. A park attendant explained there was a shortage and said more chairs were "on order." (To her everlasting credit, however, she did not tell us to await their arrival but commandeered a second chair from an unoccupied cottage. I didn't ask what the next occupants of that cottage would do if they wanted to sit outside.)

Unhappily, the shabby maintenance and housekeeping around our cottage turned out to be the rule rather than the exception at Jenny Wiley. Weeds abounded, even in some of the parking lots, and grass went uncut. Trash littered the park grounds, the parking lots, the marina, the shores of Dewey Lake and even the lake itself.

Speaking of grass, there was little of it on the tees of the golf course and not much more on some of the greens. It left me wondering if the person who wrote the brochure describing the course as "meticulously maintained" had ever seen it.

That same brochure speaks of "wellequipped marinas" in the state parks. Jenny Wiley has seven fishing boats to rent, but on the day we asked for one only two were running, and both were already out. "I guess we'll have to get a mechanic to fix the motors" a young man working at the marina told us. A good idea!

Even as we spoke, one of the four rental pontoon boats was being towed back in after a motor failure, and a park guest who wanted to rent one the following day was told only two of the four were in service.

The food in the lodge's dining room was acceptable down-home cooking, filling and a real bargain on buffet evenings. But on one evening when there was no buffet, the dining room was thrown into chaos when just one waitress walked out in a huff for some reason we never determined.

I can't remember if that was the same evening I arrived in the dining room a bit irritated because I hadn't been able to find a parking place in the rain and had wound up in the employees' parking lot, which was somewhat farther removed from the

They always add so much to my life and of course, I couldn't close without praising them for all they have done to help my little one, who dearly loves being on the stage with them. They are family to her and there will be tears and a feeling of emptiness when they leave next week. We wish them all the best-they deserve it!

Magoffin-Johnson 'Gusher' Reported

Ashland Oil confirmed Tuesday that a new well ner the Johnson-Maggoffin line, drilled to 5200 feet, was currently flowing some 225 barrels of oil per day under choke, and producing about 400,000 cubic feet of gas.

Spokesman Jim Butler said the well was a joint venture involving Ashland, Columbia Gas and Spartan Oil and Gas, with Ashland as the operator.

Production is from two formations, oil coming from the Black River and gas from the Upper Beekman Town.

Butler said the well is considered a new discovery, in a block of about 5000

Although oil production is not new to the area, dating back to the early part of the century, the new well's production has stirred considerable interest in the possibility of a major development. Most oil in the past has come from relatively shallow wells, and "stripper" production, as well as from water-flooding older fields.


Medicare-Covered Services

Medicare medical insurance can help pay for a variety of services and supplies, Jim Kelly, Social Security district director for the Big Sandy area, said recently.

"For example," Kelly said, "medical insurance can pay for diagnostic tests performed by independent laboratories if the laboratory is certified by Medicare for the particular service. Medical insurance can also help pay for transportation by ambulance if the ambulance, equipment and personnel meet Medicare standards and if transportation by ambulance is necessary for the patient's health. Medical insurance cannot pay for transportation by ambulance between the patient's home and a doctor's office."

Prosthetic devices and medical equipment may also be covered under Medicare. "Medical insurance will help pay for such devices as cardiac pacemakers and the corrective lenses

Wool Producers To Vote On Marketing Program

Lamb and wool producers will have an opportunity during an August 16-27 referendum to vote on whether they want the American Sheep Producers Council, Inc., to continue its market promotion and improvement program on their behalf by entering an new agreement with the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

By approving it, producers would authorize deductions of up to 4 cents per pound on shorn wool and 20 cents per hundredweight on unshorn lambs marketed in 1982. These deductions would be used to finance the council's promotion activities and would be withheld from any wool incentive payments made by USDA.

County offices of the Agricultural Stablization and Conservation Service will distribute copies of the agreement and ballots to sheep producers in early August. Producers may cast their ballots by mailing or delivering them in person to the county ASCS office by the close of the referendum. Anyone may vote who has owned

sheep six months old or older for at least 30 consecutive days during 1981. Votes may be cast by individuals or by cooperatives. The agreement requires approval by two-thirds of the total volume of producers, or two-thirds of the total volume of production represented in the referendum.



Perhaps no animal inspires more terror than the shark. Sensa-tional movies such as "Jaws," "The Deep" and "Jaws II," did ittle to enhance the reputation of a creature that has long been shrouded in myth and and misinformation. Actually, the shark is a great of great beauty and efficiency, as well as

economically useful to man. "The Sharks," a National Geographic special, will air in an encore performance, Tuesday, Aug. 24. (Air dates may vary; please check local listings.)

Older than dinosaurs, sharks began evolving more than 300 million years ago. Sharks come in a wide variety of sizes, from the largest fish in the sea — the 40-foot-long whale shark — to an adult tiny shark which is less than 6 inches long. Dr. Eugenie Clark, professor of zoology and one of the

world's foremost shark experts, is featured in underwater scenes where she points out the phenomenon of "sleeping" sharks in undersea caves. She also explains that relatively few sharks attack humans, but when they do, the shark usually loses

A visit to the Tokyo tish market shows how tons of car-casses are dumped each day for auction. Dr. Clark is also responsible for discovering a natural shark repellent — a

modest fish called the "Moses sole," native to the Red Sea. "The Sharks," which was underwritten by a grant from Gult Oil Corp., ranks as the most-watched program on PBS. It is certainly worthy of a second showing.







★ A Woman's Place ★

By VICKI DENNIS THE WOMEN'S MOVEMENT: SAME SPIRIT, NEW TACTICS

There is an old proverb that people embroider on linen and hang on their living room wall: "The more things change, the more they stay the same.' Trite, perhaps, but, like most timehonored sayings, there is much truth to be found there. Take, for example, the long history of the women's movement in America.

On Aug. 21, women and men across the country will gather to celebrate one of the memorable dates in women's history, the 62nd anniversary of the passage of the 19th amendment to the Constitution. It was on August 26, 1920 that women won perhaps their first victory when we were granted the right to vote-finally-by a group of male legislators who had resisted the general notion of equality for women for 134 years and the specific notion of voting rights for 72 years.

The passage of the amendment marked a big change for the women of this country, but much has stayed the same too. For it was on June 30 of this year that another group of male legislators (distant relatives of that first batch, I'm sure) once again resisted the notion of equality for women when they rejected the Equal **Rights Amendment.**

Admittedly, advances for women have not stalled in the 62 years since the 19th amendment was signed. Women can now be found at almost every level of business, industry, politics and other fields. Women have moved into managerial positions, into non-traditional fields like coal mining and construction, into their own businesses. And despite the attitudinal sameness of our legislators, there just might be a movement afoot which will knock the stitches out of that old embroidered adage-and the socks off those legislators-once and for all. For this is the year of the Political Action Committee, and women, like other organized groups, have gotten into the PAC act.

According to Patricia Todd, state coordinator for the National Organization for Women (NOW), the political action committee approach is not a new one. "Corporations have for years put people, energy and money behind certain political figures who supported their positions," she said. "That's what the women movement is doing. We've learned a lot in the last ten years and one of the chief things we've learned is that politicians listen to PACs because PACs mean money. The difference is that from now on we intend to be the ones with the money and therefore the power."

Apparently much of America agrees with Todd on this new tactic for women's movement since NOW has raised more money this year than the Democratic Committee and "our PAC has raised almost as much money as many of the major corporations' PACs," she said. In Louisville on August 21, Kentucky women's PAC approach will get off the ground with the "PAC-Woman Walkathon," a five-mile walk designed to raise money for PACs within organizations like NOW, the Business and Professional Women's Clubs and the Kentucky Nurses Association.

Maybe this is the year that the women's movement finally retires that old embroidered adage about change but no change. With the introduction of new political savvy in the form of PACs and a few new adages like "We've been nice too long" and "We will remember in November," perhaps some politicians will finally get the hint that their notions about equality for women are

State Black Lung Program **Simplified To Serve Miners**

State Labor Commissioner John Calhoun Wells recently announced changes in Kentucky's Black Lung Program that will streamline the program, make it accountable, and responsive to the needs of the coal miners.

In news conferences scheduled for Frankfort, Middlesboro, Pikeville and Madisonville, Wells, Public Protection and Regulation Cabinet Secretary Tracy Farmer and Human Resources Cabinet Secretary Grady Stumbo outlined the proposed revisions.

Farmer explained that the changes are the result of an exhaustive ninemonth study conducted by the Labor Department in cooperation with the Human Resources Cabinet.

"A thorough evaluation and analysis of the program covered a wide scope of concerns," said Farmer. "These areas ranged from the location of medical clinics to medical fees, from the number of physicians examining a coal miner to speeding up the process for deciding the disability of a miner."

Wells said the revisions grew out of not only research, but numerous discussions with individuals affected by the program. He said that he and other department staff have held lengthy review sessions with miners, legislators, doctors and attorneys who have all worked personally with claimant procedures.

Last May the department sponsored a public hearing in Lexington to give "all individuals and organizations an opportunity to have their say and to make recommendations for improvement," Wells said.

At issue is a program which last year paid out nearly \$26 million in occupational disease awards, almost all of them for Black Lung claims. The total outlay included benefits to an average of 3,000 new and existing claimants, as well as medical and legal fees associated with claims processed during the year.

The state's Department of Labor is responsible for administering the Occupational Injury and Disease Special Fund from which payments are awarded to Black Lung claimants.

The Workers' Compensation Board, a five-member appointed panel operating within the Labor Department, directs the amount to be awarded and to whom.

During fiscal year 1980-81, the Workers' Compensation Board approved 90 percent of all the claims for occupational disease, which primarily were for Black Lung.

Wells said that, of the \$25.9 million awarded last year, \$4.6 million went to miners' attorneys and more than \$500,000 was paid to doctors for examining and testifying about miners seeking Black Lung compensation.

Secretary Stumbo added that recommendations in the medical procedures should allow for less time-consuming and more accurate diagnosis of pneumoconiosis (black lung)

Wells said that he started looki

*All Black Lung claims filed in the Special Fund will be thoroughly analyzed within the 90-day statutory peried.

*The policy of the Workers' Compensation Board will be that no more than four physicians are necessary in the majority of Black Lung claims.

*An ad-hoc Medical-Technical Advisory Board, designed to work with the Labor Commissioner on medical issues for pneumoconiosis, should be appointed by the Governor.

*Administrative controls will be tightened through the use of audits of Special Fund payments and quarterly reviews of case status.

Drug Arrests Up, KSP Reports

It's been a good year for the Kentucky State Police narcotics section and a bad year for illegal drug operations.

The number of drug cases and arrests by the narcotics section during the first six months of 1982 has already exceeded the cases opened and arrests made in all 12 months of 1981.

There were 857 cases opened in January to June 1982 compared to 866 cases in all of 1981; 774 drug arrests in January to June by the section compared to 478 in 1981. (These totals don't include drug arrests made by other state police sections).

Part of the reason for this increase is State Police Commissioner Marion D. Campbell's efforts to centralize narcotics investigation functions within his agency. Prior to July 15, 1981, narcotics agents in the field served under the commanders at the 16 state police posts and arrests by the agents were included under post totals.

Under the Campbell reorganization, Lt. Louis Stiles was placed in charge of the section and, as section commander, coordinates the statewide investigative effort. Resident agents now serve under the narcotics section even though they are still stationed at state police posts.

The upsurge of activity in 1982 is still impressive if a comparison is made just between the first six months of 1982 and the last months of 1981 when the section was unified. The narcotics section is 121 cases ahead of 1981 figures and 351 arrests ahead of 1981 figures

Concerning the increased section activity, Lt. Stiles said he doesn't feel the number of drug operations has increased, rather he attributes the section's activity increase to "good officers who are working hard and producing. This will no doubt be the best year for the narcotics section since its creation in 1970."

By Aug. 5, the number of cases initiated was up to 974 and steadily approaching the best year-round total for the section: 1,114 cases opened by narcotics in 1979.

Stiles said the tougher drug laws effective July 15 may have encouraged the state police officers but he doesn't feel this has been a major factor in the increased activity

What has helped a great deal is the resident agents' newly acquired ability to perform chemical analysis of marijuana at the posts rather than shipping it to state police laboratories. Since June 15, the agents have done 71 tests for the narcotics section and 48 for other state police sections, he said.

So far this season, the section has destroyed 82,000 marijuana plants. The number should double in August and September since these are the two main cultivation months.

Marijuana growing is a big problem in Kentucky as it is in other states since import of the illegal substance has become more difficult due to creation of a federal task force. Lt. Stiles recently appeared on a CBS News segment which focused on cultivation in the U.S.

Marijuana is the most prevalent drug in Kentucky, followed by cocaine which has edged out methaqualone (commonly known by the brand name Quaalude). The third most common type is pharmaceutical drugs.

Marijuana sold in Kentucky is mostly grown within the state or brought in from Colombia. The flow of grass from Mexico has been stemmed by spraying of the fields by Mexican authorities. Cocaine comes from coca plants cultivated in South America.

Pharmaceutical drugs come from several sources: drug store thefts, forged prescriptions, illegal laboratories and from the few physicians who freely prescribe commonly-abused drugs.

Regarding drug trends in Kentucky, Stiles said heroin use is down, often replaced with a drug combination called Ts and Bs, two Talwins and a pyrobenzamine taken for a heroin-like high. The use of phencyclidine, also called PCP or angel dust, is down.

The drug of the 1960s, LSD, lysergic acid diethylamide, appears to be making a comeback, said Lt. Stiles.

When asked why drug laws are vigorously enforced by the Kentucky State Police, Stiles said, "The Kentucky State Police is a police agency, sworn to uphold the law. And public interest has shown most people do want tough drug law enforcement.'

Furthermore, there is an intrinsic value in enforcement of drug laws, he added. Some people call drug abuse a 'victimless crime," but it's just not true, he said. Society, and that means all of us, is a victim of unlawful drug operations, Stiles said.

Drugs are the "stalk" which supports and feeds other crimes, said the section commander. Dealers commit crimes to obtain drugs for sale and users commit crimes to get money to buy drugs, said Stiles.

Stiles said there is illegal drug activity in all 120 Kentucky counties even though larger operations are usually based in metropolitan areas. This year the section has, so far, opened cases in 78 counties and plans to open cases in every county by year's end.

Extensive investigations by the narcotics section, sometimes lasting months, are begun when the resident agent at the post has information indicating a need for a concentrated effort or when the local police agencies request sate police help.

After two or three rungs up the ladder, the probe usually extends outside Kentucky but that doesn't necessarily end the involvement of the Kentucky State Police. The state police don't have jurisdiction over drug cases oute commonwealth but they can





The Financial Ladder


You read of starting salaries of college graduates with MBAs, what law firms are offering beginning lawyers, what ball players have negotiated for their latest contracts. Then you read about salary cuts, "give backs" in union contracts, the effects of inflation and recession on the average person's paycheck. This month, in the July Reader's Digest, Thomas Brooks answers some of the questions you might want to ask about where you stand on the financial ladder.

Q. Which career has the best salary curve—lawyers, engineers, chemists, or accountants?

A. Top lawyers are making about eight times as much as they did 15 years ago, leading the list in the professions. Chemists and engineers are also doing well, but accountants are below average in salary growth.

Q. How do starting salaries for today's college graduates compare with the average salary of established workers of all age groups?

A. College graduates tend to start at roughly the same average pay that all workers average. Highly sought-after degrees command an even higher salary.



Q. Among upper-income families (\$25,000 and up), what percentage enjoy that status because of two incomes in the household?

A. Of the 20 million families who have incomes over \$25,000 a year, 8 million—or 40 percent were carried there by wives' earnings.

Q. During a working lifetime, by how much can the average person expect to increase his salary?

A. Salaries generally increase 2- to 4-fold in many occupations, but this rate can go much higher, allowing for cost-of-living increases and the individual's motivation and talent.

Q. Who are the highest paid Americans?

A. If you guessed doctors, you're right. Sports and entertainment stars are paid in six figures, but their careers are relatively short. In 1980 the median income for physicians was \$83,700, and one out of every four people earning over \$100,000 is a doctor.

Definition of Handicap Points to Kind of Education To Be Provided

What is a handicapping condition? According to Harry P. Brown, Director of the 35 member educational consortium known as Eastern Kentucky Educational Development Corporation, many people have different ideas about what actually constitutes a handicapping condition for a child. The law then describes the conditions for which education must be provided.

According to Brown, many children have mental, physical, emotional or learning problems that make it difficult for them to be part of a school program without special help.

Often professionals use words such as, "handicapped," "emotionally disturbed," or "mentally retarded" to describe the children.

In the public school system in the state of Kentucky, words used to describe these children who require special education are defined by law, and these definitions are used to report to state and federal government and to obtain the extra state and federal funds that are available for special education services

"No definition, however," Brown said, "is an absolute judgment of a child's strengths and weaknesses. Most classifications are based on the results of tests and examinations and the judgments of a variety of professionals.'

(a) Emotionally Disturbed. In this area, tests and examinations have revealed that the child has serious problems relating to other children and adults such as parents and teachers. The child may often be unhappy and have a hard time accomplishing things that he/she has the ability to do at home or school.

There is no easy way to know whether or not a child is emotionally disturbed, but if the child's behavior is extremely different from the behavior of other children of the same age and is extremely disturbing to other adults and children, he/she may need special help.

(b) Mentally Retarded. The child has shown through tests and examinations, an inability to learn and adapt at the same rate as other children.

Additionally, his language and motor development is considerably slower than that of children of the same age, and he or she is unable to learn new skills as rapidly as others his/her age.

Mental retardation can be mild, moderate, or severe. School districts use three general categories to describe mentally retarded children:

1. "Educable mentally retarded" means that individual intelligence and other test results have shown that the child may learn somewhat more slowly than other children of the same age. On intelligence tests, the child has scored between 50-75.

2. "Trainable mentally retarded" means that individual intelligence and other test results have shown that the child may learn and develop at a slower rate than other children of the same age. On intelligence tests, the

purposes. Because of the severe hearing loss, the child will need specialized training to learn to talk-either with speech sounds or with sign language or both.

(g) Hard of hearing means that the child has a serious hearing loss but can use the sense of hearing either with or without a hearing aid for ordinary purposes

(h) Physically Handicapped. Here, the child has a physical problem such as cerebral palsy, epilepsy, heart disorders, disorders of the nervous system or another health or medical condition.

(i) Multiple Handicapped. The child has two or more primary handicaps such as deafness and blindness or severe emotional disturbance and mental retardation.

(j) Children who have been identified as learning disabled have a disorder in one or more of the mental processes needed to receive, organize, or express information. As a result, the child may have difficulty in listening, thinking, speaking, writing, spelling, or doing arithmetic.

3. "Severely or profoundly retarded" means that individual intelligence and other test results have indicated that he/she may learn and develop at a substantially slower rate than other children of the same age. The child may also be identified as multiple handicapped.

(c) Speech/Language Impairment. In this area, the child may have dif-ficulty talking. Additionally, according to Brown, the child may substitute one sound for another, be unable to make certain sounds, leave sounds out, make some speech sounds that cannot be understood, stutter, or have difficulty understanding or using words or sentences.

(d) Legally blind means that the child has a severe vision loss, but may be able to use his/her vision in some situations.

(e) Partially sighted means that the child can, with glasses, use his/her vision. The child may be able to learn to read regular print with glasses or to read special books that are printed with large type.

(f) Deaf means that the child cannot use the sense of hearing for ordinary

BUYING A BURIAL PLOT

Almost everyone must someday face the inevitable task of purchasing a burial plot, either for a relative or on a pre-need basis for yourself. "Choosing a plot is not an enjoyable chore and some people hastily select a gravesite without considering several important factors, such as cost, location, proximity to other family members, reputation of the cemetery, and maintenance of the cemetery grounds," says Attorney General Steven L. Beshear.

Cost, of course, is an important factor. A burial plot can cost as little as a few hundred dollars or as much as two thousand dollars or more. Therefore, the consumer should shop and compare prices at local cemeteries before making his buying decision. Along with cost, consumers should consider not only the location of the cemetery itself, but where the plot is located within the cemetery. Many consumers want to select a cemetery which is easily accessible for family members. Along these lines, consumers often con-

All individuals wanting to locate a liquor store or obtain a beer or wine license inside the city limits of cerned with the closeness with which they are buried to their relatives. These factors are important considerations once the consumer has decided he or she wishes to purchase a plot.

Two other important factors concern the selection of the cemetery. According to Beshear, consumers should consider the reputation of the cemetery, as well as the cemetery's record of proper maintenance of the cemetery grounds. Consumers should inquire into the cemetery's reputation by asking friends or relatives who have puchased plots at the cemetery under consideration, contacting the local Better Business Bureau or Chamber of Commerce to check on complaints or other information, and visiting the cemetery itself to observe the grounds. This last point is important in determining the cemetery's maintenance record. The consumer would want to observe the grounds to make sure the grass is cut, dead flowers are removed from the graves, and trash and debris on the grounds is collected regularly. Even though a portion of the money you pay for the plot is to be deposited in a perpetual care and maintenance trust account, this fact alone does not assure proper cemetery maintenance. An insufficient amount in this account may indicate problems for the cemetery in maintaining cemetery grounds. Therefore, before buying a plot, the consumer may want to ask the cemetery representative for the location of the trust account and its balance.

Dig, Sell or Buy . . . **Ginseng License Required**

Ginseng is now considered an endangered species, and to protect it the Kentucky Department of Agriculture has established a digging season not unlike fishing and hunting seasons.

Both diggers and dealers must now procure license from the Department of Agriculture, Frankfort, at a cost of \$10, to be legal, and no ginseng may legally be dug until next Sunday, Aug. 15. To help enforce the regulation imposed, each dealer must keep a record of the license number of the person from whom ginseng is purchased.

When does the season end? The first frost will mark that, says George D. Brown, Prestonsburg dealer, since the frost will kill the tops of the plant and it cannot be seen by those who would dig it through fall and winter.

Ginseng-digging is a means many employ to supplement their income in "spare" time, and at peak prices several months ago the dried roots brought around \$100 a pound.

Is ginseng an endangered species? Mr. Brown contends that it isn't, pointing out that only half the ginseng grows above-ground in a given year

Q. I'm president of a men's civic organization, and one of the things I would like to do is have a discussion of cancer during one of our meetings. Can you suggest any particular areas of interest?

A. You may wish to center your cancer deaths among men in this country. The American Cancer Society estimates that nearly 75,000 men will die of lung cancer in 1982. Smoking is the major cause of 83 percent of lung cancer among men.


The second leading cause of cancer deaths among men is cancer of the colon and rectum. It is estimated that 55,000 new cases of colorectal cancer will be diagnosed this year. Men over the age of 50 should have regular cancer examinations. Early diagnosis and treatment make the chance of cure very good.

Prostatic cancer, the third leading cause of cancer deaths among men, will affect 66,000 men for the first time this year. Regular physical checkups which include a digital rectal examination can detect most prostatic cancer early.

Testicular cancer is the most common form among young men between the ages of 15 and 35. Testicular selfexamination is a simple procedure which, if performed regularly each month, is a man's best insurance that he will find any tumor early. The prospects for curing early testicular cancer are excellent.





Summer Survival For Parents and Kids

By Dr. Teresa Bolick So you've been to Camden Park and King's Island; the 4th of July picnics and fireworks are over; day camp and vacation Bible school have come and gone. But it's another month before school starts. How will the parents and kids in your family survive the "dog days of August" without trying each others' patience?

By the end of July, a lot of school children have explored the woods and ridden their bikes to their hearts' content. The swimming pool is losing some of its excitement. Parents begin to hear, "I'm bored" and "There's nothing to do," every time they turn around. August is the time for families to use their creativity to overcome boredom and have fun without spending too much money. The suggestions below are designed to bring good, clean (and, hopefully, cheap) fun.

1. Write a family history. This can be a joint task or an individual project for an older child. Talk to grandparents, aunts, uncles, etc., to learn about ancestors. Find out how Mom and Dad got together, how each child was as a baby, where the family has lived. Include old photographs if you have them. 3. Now that we've mentioned libraries... the public library is a great source of all kinds of information. The library has books on travel, crafts, cooking; and almost anything else you can imagine. The librarian will help you find books that will be interesting to any child or adult. In addition, the Floyd County Library lends record albums and 8-track tapes. They have a summer reading program for children and will begin a Story Hour soon. For details, call the Floyd County Library at 886-2981.

4. Make up a new game. You may want to make a new board game or a new sport. Collect all the equipment you need and keep it in a specially decorated box. Don't forget to write down the rules.

5. Recycling is a great project for kids. They can pick up aluminum cans, scrap iron, copper, etc. When they have enought to fill several bags or boxes, take them to a dealer to sell what they've collected.

TV-two hours per day is plenty unless something special is on; (2) limit the kinds of programs they watch and don't hesitate to turn off a program that offends you; (3) select programs to watch together and talk about the program afterwards, thus helping everyone understand how TV programs are like or different from real life and how values on TV agree with or oppose those held by your family; (4) use a TV program as a stepping stone to learn more about the world-for example, if Walter Cronkite talks about blimps or about a new type of airplane, ask a family member to read up on the topic and give a report to the rest of you; and (5) turn the TV off during

mealtimes. Finally, parenting is a rough job, and summertime taxes even the best parent. Be sure to reserve some private time for yourself and your spouse. Even if you just sit and drink a cup of coffee or take a long, relaxing bath all alone, time away from the children can work wonders. Trade off babysitting with a neighbor or relative to give both of you a few "child-free" hours each week. Remember, parents are people, too!

These ideas are just a few of the many strategies you and your family can use to beat summer boredom. Use them to spark your own creativity and have a great August!

Tips For Handling Blac

Obscene Phone Calls South Central Bell customers who are repeatedly bothered by obscene or threatening phone calls may be able to determine where the calls are being made from, thanks to advanced tracing techniques used by the phone company.

Local Bell manager Art Willett said the methods developed for tracing calls are used mainly when obscene or threatening calls are frequently repeated. "There is no listening in on conversations," he said, "but the number the call was made from can be determined."

He added that, in many cases, the company can find the number even if the caller hangs up, through devices that hold the connection.

Willett said that anytime a harassing call is made; some basic tips should be followed:

If the caller does not identify himself, hang up.

If the caller makes obscene, suggestive or threatening remarks, hang up.

If there is no voice on the line, hang up.

up. "The kind of person who makes these calls wants a reaction. When you hang up, you take away the main thing he wants—an audience—and in most cases, the calls will stop coming," Willett said.

If the calls continue, he recommended that a log or record of the calls be kept. "Write down when the calls are made, what the voice sounds like and the nature of the calls. All these things may come in handy in pinpointing who is doing the calling," he said.

"If the calls persist, however, let the police department or telephone business office know about it.

How many of you have seen advertisements similar to the one above and wondered if this might not be your chance of a lifetime? For some investors, it may be the right opportunity. "But while some advertisements are offering legitimate business opportunities, others are not," says Attorney General Steven L. Beshear. "Before investing your money on promises of getting-rich-quick with little or no effort on your part, take time to educate yourself on the company and the rules and regulations with which such companies must comply."

Know the Offeror. It is important to find out everything you can about the offeror of an opportunity. Determine the number of years the company/opportunity has existed, whether the offeror actually has the successful franchisees, distributors, etc. that they claim to have, and whether the offeror has a reputation for honesty and fair dealing with the franchises, distributors and others. Do not hesitate to consult with the Better Business Bureau, Dun and Bradstreet, or other reporting agencies to find out the financial standing and business reputation of an offeror. Request names and addresses of individuals, such as yourself, who have already invested in the opportunity. Do not be rushed into committing yourself before you obtain this information.

Know the Opportunity. Be sure you understand your duties and obligations under any agreement, as well as the duties and obligations of the offeror. Get all promises and representations in writing. Determine exactly what the product or service is; whether the marketing has been successful; and whether you are interested in selling this particular product or service. Determine the total cost of the opportunity and how this is to be financed. Advertising and promotional materials may refer only to the monies that are paid to the offeror to purchase the opportunity and may not include other charges that may be necessary to operate your new business. Be sure you verify any statements as to the profit you can expect. While many opportunities are excellent income producers, beware of promises of fantastic profits within a short time.

Know Applicable Federal and State Law. On December 21, 1978, the Federal Trade Commission issued a final trade regulation rule entitled "Disclosure Requirements and Prohibitions Concerning Franchising and **Business Opportunities Ventures''. The** rule, effective July 21, 1979, requires franchise and business opportunity sellers to provide a disclosure document at least 10 days before a contract is signed or any money is paid. The document must contain: (1) the history, background, and financial status of the seller; (2) the cost to start and maintain the business; (3) the responsibilities you will have to the seller once you buy; (4) the names of the supplier and other services you will have to use when you own the business; (5) the names of other people who bought the business; and (6) the conditions under which the agreement can be canceled. Certain types of companies are exempt from this law and are not required to give you a disclosure statement. If you are told a company is exempt from the law, check with the Federal Trade Commission, an attorney, or other business advisor to validate the claim. Even if business is not required to give you the document, many reputable businesses do so. In addition, ask for the data from an exempt business Kentucky law also requires certain disclosures to be made by those businesses not exempt from the provisions. Offerors covered by the Kentucky business opportunity provisions must furnish and display to the potential investor information on: (1) trade names, assumed names and all trademarks by which the offeror or investor will be doing business; (2) names, home addresses, and home telephone numbers of persons/company offering the opportunity; (3) company's directors and chief executive officers; (4) names, home addresses and home telephone numbers of all representatives selling the business opportunity in Kentucky; (5) length of time the person or company offering the opportunity has conducted business both within and outside of Kentucky; (6) litigation history; (7)

names, addresses and telephone numbers of all persons sold a business opportunity within the last two-year period; and (8) names and addresses of any investor who has requested a return of his money within the preceding three years. If you are told a company is exempt from these provisions, check with the Division of Consumer Protection in order to validate the claim.

If you have a question concerning the Kentucky business opportunity laws, or if you have a complaint regarding an opportunity you have purchased, write to the Attorney General, Division of Consumer Protection, 209 St. Clair Street, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601. 

Teams Represent Floyd in State Tourney





Resurfacing Contracts Awarded on Two Roads The state Transportation Cabinet

has awarded a contract for resurfacing 6.6 miles of road in this county. Medusa Aggregates Co. of Lexington

received a \$302,205 contract to resurface 4.1 miles of KY 466, Weeksbury Road, from Abe Fork Road to KY 122 and 2.5 miles of KY 1929, Frasure's Creek Road, from Ned Fork Road to KY 680.

The project is part of the state's 1982 resurfacing program. Transportation Secretary Frank Metts has recently increased funding for the program to \$90 million.

"We're going to blacktop one mile in ten of the 25,000 miles of state maintained roads," he said. "We're protecting the investment Kentucky has made in its roads.

Accidents Dip, Police Report

State Police Commissioner Marion D. Campbell has announced the publication of "Traffic Accident Facts 1981," his agency's annual analysis of vehicle accidents in Kentucky.

"This yearly analysis of accident information assists the Kentucky State Police, other law enforcement agencies and the public in the common goal of reducing traffic accidents," said Commissioner Campbell.

The information is assembled by the state police planning section from accident reports submitted by law enforcement agencies throughout Kentucky.

There is good news in Traffic Accident Facts. It shows a decrease in the number of motor vehicle accidents and a decrease in the economic loss in 1981 compared to 1980.

The number of accidents dropped from 128,130 in 1980 to 125,116 in 1981 and the economic loss dropped from \$483,510,000 to \$472,313,000. There was also a reduction in the number of people injured from 40,812 in 1980 to 40,688 in 1981.

Unfortunately, five more people died in traffic accidents during 1981 than died in 1980. The fatality figure increased from 825 to 830. However, aside from 1980, the 1981 death toll was the lowest since 1974 when 795 people died. There were 882 killed in 1975, 874 in 1976, 958 in 1977, 893 in 1978 and 905 in 1979.

There were more licensed drivers in 1981. Kentucky had 2,114,521 drivers in 1980 and 2,327,264 in 1981, an increase of 212,743. But the number of miles traveled decreased from 26.6 billion in 1980 to 25.1 billion in 1981.

Among other facts in the state police publication are those which reveal the "who, what, when, where, why and how" of fatality accidents, those resulting in a death or deaths.

WHO: Most fatality accidents involve drivers who are male (82.2 percent) and ages 16 to 24 years (50 percent).

WHAT: Passenger cars are involved in 79.8 percent of fatality accidents.

WHEN: Most fatality accidents occur on weekends, Friday to Sunday, (52 percent). The most dangerous time on Kentucky highways for all ages is 6 p.m. to 12:59 p.m. when 40 percent of fatality accidents happen. For teenagers, there is an additional "danger zone," 3 p.m. to 4:59 p.m. when 17 percent of fatalities involving teenage drivers occur.

WHERE: The majority of fatalities occur on a dry (82.5 percent), straight and level (37 percent) road. Accidents on state numbered roads account for 45.2 percent of fatality accidents.

WHY: Of all Kentucky drivers involved in fatality accidents in 1981, 38

percent were speeding and 28 percent had been drinking. Traffic Accident Facts also contains a chart weighting the various contributing factors. The chart shows human error accounts for more than 70 percent of these factors; the environment, 20 percent and the vehicle, 10 percent.

HOW: Most people killed in traffic accidents last year were riding in vehicles which had head-on collisions (57.4 percent).

In addition to identifying the young man as the typical driver in a fatality accident, the report also reveals the typical accident victim is also a young man. The percentages are: 15 to 24 (35 percent), male (73 percent).



Fleas May Be Hungry After Pet Is Away

If you take your dog or cat with you or board them when you go on vacation, don't be surprised if you come home to an unpleasant welcome—a houseful of hungry fleas.

"When you go on vacation and take your pet with you, no one is happier to see you return home than any fleas in your house," said Dr. Rudy Scheibner, Extension entomologist in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

"They welcome you back by hopping on everything that moves, and biting people as well as pets."

Fleas don't invade homes while owners and pets are away, Scheibner said. But you may not notice a flea problem until your dog or cat is away—taken on vacation, housed in a kennel, or even given away.

What happens then is that flea eggs continue to hatch and a large population of adult fleas may develop. "Without any warm-blooded creature around to feed on for a couple of weeks, the blood-sucking pests are starved and attack both animals and people as soon as they get into the house," Scheibner said.

People who don't have pets but who move into a horre previously occupied by pet owners may find a similar problem with fleas.

Although fleas can transmit several diseases, most are not common in this country, Scheibner said, and the only usual problem fleas cause is irritation from bites. Reactions to flea bites range from small red welts to a severe rash and itching.

What can you do to get rid of the fleas? Scheibner recommends a threestep procedure.

First, eliminate as many flea larvae as possible with a thorough house cleaning. Sanitize by vacuuming the carpets and furniture, and along wall edges throughout the house. Be sure to vacuum places where your pet likes to sleep and out-of-way spots, such as under furniture.

Throw away the vacuum-cleaner bag in an air-tight plastic bag. And be sure to wash the pet's bedding in warm, soapy water.

Next, treat your dog or cat with an insecticide for fleas. You can do this yourself, or have your pet dusted or dipped by a veterinarian.After fleas are under control, keep a flea collar on your pet at all times.

You also should have the house sprayed with an approved pesticide. The most effective insecticides for flea control are labeled for use by professional pest control operators only, Scheibner said, so it is usually wise to contract with a professional to apply an insecticide in your home. But, he added, there also are products homeowners can use which will do an acceptable job.

Pet owners also should consider spraying the areas outside the house where the dog or cat likes to stay, such as under trees along the house. Such areas are breeding grounds for large numbers of fleas in the summer.

Cost of Cover Crops



May Be Shared By ACP

Landowners who may be planning to seed permanent vegetative cover through the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) should file their applications as soon as possible with the ASCS office.

ACP offers a 75% cost-share rate on seedbed preparation, seeds, necessary fertilizer and lime (as determined by a soil test). Practices must not be started before approval of the application for cost-sharing to be eligible.

ACP also offers practices such as livestock wells, ponds, tree planting, timberstand improvement, sod waterways, deversions, witner cover crops, etc. Cost-share rates and eligibility requirements may be obtained by calling the local ASCS Office.

The ACP is administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service located at 105 Court Street, Prestonsburg, Phone 886-2802.

If you owe a debt, you have the right to be treated fairly when a debt collector is trying to convince you to pay. The Fair Debt Collection Practices Act is a federal law that prohibits abusive and misleading debt collection practices. The federal law specifically prohibits third-party debt collectors from engaging in such practices and gives certain requirements that the collector must follow. A third-party collector is someone other than the person who sold you the goods or services. Any unfair or misleading debt collecting practice may also be a violation of the Con-

According to Attorney General Steven L. Beshear, "It is illegal for creditors to send consumers deceptive forms when attempting to collect their debts. For example, the use of any form that resembles a Small Claims Court Complaint form to collect a debt is a deceptive debt-collection practice. My Consumer Protection Division has taken action against companies that have illegally used such forms."

A debt collector may not harass or abuse any person. Debt collectors cannot use threats or violence; they cannot use obscene profane language, and they are not allowed to use the telephone to repeatedly annoy you.

A debt collector may not use any false statements when collecting a debt. For example, they cannot imply that they represent the United States or Kentucky government. They cannot say that you have committed a crime or that you will be arrested if you do not pay the bill immediately. They cannot say that they will garnishee your wages or seize your property unless

If a debt collector contacts any other person to locate you, he or she cannot tell them that you owe money; they cannot use a postcard; they cannot put anything in an envelope that identifies the writer as a debt collector; and they cannot contact you at work if the debt collector knows your employer disapproves, nor at home at any time that he

If you do not want the collector to contact you, you must say so in writing. Once you have told the collector not to contact you, he or she can no longer do so, except to tell you there will be no further efforts to collect. Also, he or she can inform you of specific remedies that will be pursued if the collector or creditor usually

If you feel you do not owe the debt, you should inform the collector in writing within thirty days after you are first contacted. Although the debt collector may not contact you, collection activities can begin again if you are

You have the right to sue a debt collector in a state or federal court within one year from the date the debt collector broke the law and recover money for the damages you suffered. If you feel a debt collector has broken the

Tax Decisions Ahead that May Affect Many State Cities

The Court of Appeals is considering testimony about tax-collection practices that could affect most Kentucky cities.

An attorney for a Campbell county clerk told the court last week that the Northern Kentucky Area Planning Commission should not be allowed to levy two taxes covering an 18-month period.

The county has appealed a decision by Campbell Circuit Judge Thomas Schnorr in favor of the planning commission.

William W. Bowdy, executive director of the planning commission, and Elmer Schaefer, deputy director of the agency, said a victory for either side probably would result in an appeal to the Kentucky Supreme Court.

"The statute change will affect quite a number of cities around the state," Bowdy and Schaefer said. "The Kentucky Municipal League attempted to join us in this case as a friend of the court.They were concerned, because cities have the same problem. They want to use the same ruling."

In June 1981, the planning commission levied a tax of 10 cents per \$1,000 assessed property valuation. This covered the first six months of the year. The planning body later that year added a levy of 20 cents per \$100 for the period from July 1, 1981, to June 30, 1982. "They had no authority to do this,"

argued Paul Twehues, Campbell county attorney.

Twehues said the levy of two taxes during a single year provided a windfall for the planners of six months' taxes.

Twehues said the only legal way to collect taxes is on a single-year basis. Garry Edmondson, the planning commission's attorney, said every city in the state must go to fiscal-year financing during 1982, as required by the state legislature.

The planning commission said the tax levies overlapped because the commission adopted fiscal-year financing in 1981.

Kentucky statutes do not say whether the planning commission's levying of 18 months' of taxes in one year can or can't be done, Edmondson said.

"The commission was on its toes and anticipated the General Assembly's mandate" Edmondson said. "The commission can't provide services without financing."

"The issue is this: How to collect taxes if you go to a fiscal year? The planning commission put two tax levies on one bill. One covers the first six months of 1981 and the other the next 12 months. Clearly, they can do this," the attorney said.

SECTION 5:-Penalties: The penalty for selling to anyone under the age of twenty-one (21) shall for the first offense be fined Five-hundred dollars (\$500.00) and shall have his license suspended for a period of seven (7) days, for the second offense his license shall be suspended for a period of fourteen (14) days and for the third offense shall be subject to a fine of Twothousand dollars (\$2,000.00) and revocation of his license.

Any person who violates any provision of this ordinance for which a penalty is not otherwise provided shall be fined the sum of One-hundred dollars (\$100.00) for each offense.

Upon notice of a suspension of a license by the local administrator, in lieu of the suspension pay to the City of Prestonsburg the sum of One-hundred dollars (\$100.00) per day for each day of suspension.

SECTION 6:-Severability: Action by a court of competent jurisdiction declaring any section, subsection, phrase or word of this ordinance to be invalid, unconstitutional, and/or void shall not affect the remainder of this ordinance which shall remain in full force and effect.


