Fire Dept., A Total Community Effort

Back in February of this year the folks on Cow Creek decided to form a community development club. Their two major goals were the establishment of a volunteer fire department and the acquisition of "city" water from Prestonsburg. In May, construction on a modern fire house was begun and the structure was dedicated this past Saturday. And, it looks like the water may come through as well.

The Cow Creek Community Development Club works fast—that's for sure. But maybe even more impressive than the speed with which the club's goals have been accomplished is the fact that not one cent of federal, state or county money has been used.

"We've got a bunch of people who just really got on the ball and did some things," commented Jim Caldwell, community club member and fire chief. Caldwell said funds for the new club's goals came from things like dinners, house-to-house solicitation and one road block. The success of these fund-raising activities exceeded club members' expectations. "We never expected to do what we've done this quickly," said Caldwell.

In Cow Creek's new 64 X 36-ft., block firehouse which, with complete kitchen facilities, also serves as a community meeting place, is housed fire fighting equipment including a fire truck purchased from the Prestonsburg Fire Department and a 1,000-gal. tank truck donated by the Allen Department. In addition, the local state division of forestry office donated a pickup truck for use by the fire department. The department boasts 25 trained members.

Community members also are hopeful that a "deal" with the Prestonsburg Water System can be worked out in coming weeks whereby water can be extended through enlarged pipe up Cow Creek in exchange for the actual work which will be done by Cow Creek residents. Extension of city water would allow locating of fire hydrants as well as residential service.

President of the Cow Creek Community Development Club is Phillip Goble, while David Shepherd serves as assistant fire chief.

Plea of Guilty As Drunk Driver Draws Jail Term

Another Floyd motorist was sent to jail for drunk driving last week and, if County Attorney Arnold Turner, Jr. has his way, there will be more penitents to follow.

"We are trying to give attention to repeat offenders," he said. "It is most important that we maintain the momentum that has been established."

After Hayes Howell, Jr., 29, of Betsy Layne, pleaded guilty to charges of driving under the influence, failing to stop after an accident, and having neither license nor insurance, he was given a one-year jail sentence and ordered by District Judge Harold Stumbo to pay \$1047.50 in fine and costs.

An employee of the Zapata Coal Co., his blood alcohol registered .22 shortly after his arrest at Harold on August 21, according to court records.

Five Applicants Denied Permits Lodge Appeals

Prestonsburg's alcoholic beverage control administrator and a member of the city council clashed Monday on the question of whether the administrator exceeded his authority in appearing recently before a state panel.

Councilman Bill Ray Collins charged in this week's council meeting that Paul Preston Burchett, the city's attorney and alcohol administrator, disregarded the wishes of the council earlier this month. Despite a council directive, Burchett appeared before the state Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission Nov. 3 to argue against awarding liquor licenses to some who had filed applications here, Collins said.

Burchett contended he was "only doing (his) job." While a city ordinance passed this summer limited to three the number of liquor licenses to be issued in Prestonsburg, nine applications were received. He chose three for approval, forwarding their applications to the state licensing panel, the administrator explained.

Differences surfaced when five of those whom Burchett had passed over appealed to Frankfort. On a 4-3 vote taken in closed session late last month, according to one source, the council instructed its attorney not to oppose the five appellants. Some council members felt they should not have imposed a limit on liquor licenses here and that the state panel should award all Floyd

National Group Dubs Eula Hall 'Wonder Woman'

"I've been called a wild woman...but never a wonder woman," Eula Hall reflected Monday in New York, where she was one of 18 women presented with a \$7,500 award from the Wonder Woman Foundation, an organization created to honor women over 40 reckoned to have the traits of the comic book heroine.

A longtime social activist and founder of the Mud Creek Clinic, Mrs. Hall said she was "shocked and surprised" at her selection from among 1,300 women nominated for the award. "The best part of it was knowing that women had been recognized for their efforts and that many of them had the same or similar struggles I have," she said.

Murder of Handshoe Poses Second Puzzle

A second murder mystery within the last eight weeks entered the county's criminal records Tuesday, last week, with the discovery at Hueysville of the body of 51-year-old Charles Handshoe, of the Knott county section of Salt Lick Creek.

The first was recorded Sept. 18 when the body of David Allen Whitten, 17, of Endicott, was found in a deserted fishing cabin in the headwaters section of Dewey Lake.

Both cases have state detectives perplexed as they seek the identity of the slayers.

The body of Handshoe was sighted by school bus driver Curt Moore in a field across old KY 80 from Duff's Service Station, shortly after 4 p.m. He had been shot in the chest, and had a fractured skull.

Coroner Roger Nelson said his death had taken place, probably within five days. Although there was no marked decomposition, features of the victim had been torn away, possibly by

animals, and positive identification was announced only after an autopsy had been performed by the state examiner's office in Louisville.

Neither State Detective Roger Castle nor State Trooper Danny Stumbo, who have been assigned to the case, could be reached Monday, but Commonwealth's Attorney James R. Allen said other State Police personnel had informed him there had been no new developments in the case.

Since Handshoe was known to carry on occasion sizeable sums of money, it is believed that robbery may have been the motive for his murder. Officers had not determined Monday morning where the slaying took place.

Coroner Nelson said \$5 was found beside the body and a \$1 bill and some coins were found in a shirt pocket. Another pocket had been turned inside out, and his pocketbook was missing.

The cabin in which young Whitten was found burned a few days later after investigators had placed it under seal. The youth had been shot in the head and back by shotgun charges. Information of another crime possessed by Whitten may have supplied a motive for his slaying, it has been suggested.

County's Idle Rate Said Area's Highest

While the state's jobless rate stood at 10.6 percent in September, the average for the five-county Big Sandy Area Development District was 13.3 percent, and Floyd county had the district's highest rate, 17.2 percent.

Some 2972 of Floyd's 17,297-member work force were unemployed in September, according to preliminary figures released last week by the Cabinet for Human Resources. Numbered among the work force are only those who are currently employed and those who are actively seeking jobs. Those who have dropped out of the job search are not reflected in the unemployment count.

A survey of 20 percent of those receiving unemployment benefits in the Big Sandy district indicates that 70.4 percent of the jobless were employed in mining, 7.5 percent in trade, and 7.3 percent in services, it was reported.

The September jobless rate was 13.5 in Magoffin county, 13.4 in Pike and 12.1 in Johnson. As usual, Martin county reported the district's lowest rate, 6.6 percent.

State Officials and KEA At Odds on Pupil Testing

Should the state's public schools be made to shape up to standards set by outside testmakers or should the testmakers design tests that better reflect what is actually taught here?

If Kentucky 10th-graders did poorly on the statewide test of basic skills administered last spring, does this mean their teachers are not teaching the right things—or that the test is not measuring the right things?

State school officials appear to be working on the assumption that the test is the norm and the schools should get the help they need to measure up to it.

The Kentucky Education Association (KEA) disagrees, arguing that the test has too narrow a focus and that teachers should have a say in determining what they should teach in their classrooms.

It is still too early to decide the issue,

says Floyd Superintendent E. P. Grigsby, Jr., who favors a "long range" view and says he is keeping an open mind in the meantime.

A Floyd contingent joined teachers from 60 local school districts who met last week with officials of the state Department of Education to identify deficiencies in the educational system that are contributing to low scores by the state's sophomores on the Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills, an achievement test administered each year in the third, fifth, seventh and 10th grades.

While students in the lower grades generally do as well as or better than the national average, the state's 10th graders have usually scored below the national norm on the test, which was mandated by the 1978 General Assembly.

A new feature of this year's achievement test measures a student's potential, and Dr. Donald Hunter, head of the Department's Bureau of Instruction, says that children statewide are consistently scoring above their potential.

"This says to me that we have a good cadre of teachers manning our classrooms, but either we're not measuring the right things with our test or we're not teaching the right things," Dr. Hunter said.

Suggested causes of the lag in 10th grade scores, however, generally fault the schools or parents rather than the tests. Among possible causes cited by Dr. Jack Sanders, of the Appalachian Laboratory, a Charleston-based research facility, are a softening of the secondary curriculum, with less emphasis on basic skills at the high school level; less parent interest in basic skills at that level; declining attendance among secondary students, and test items going beyond what is taught in Kentucky schools.

But the fault might lie more with the test than with the schools, insists the KEA. In a position paper recently adopted by the KEA board, the CTBS is criticized as having "too narrow a focus."

For one thing, the test is preoccupied with cognitive skills to the exclusion of equally important affective qualities, values, creativity, and reflective or analytical thinking, according to the KEA. Reliance on the CTBS could narrow the school curriculum and usher in a statewide curriculum, the KEA directors warn.

Elderly Woman Draws 18-Year Prison Term

Ironically, a jury's intelligence and concern for his client did her a disservice, a bitter public defender argued in Circuit Court here Friday.

"I don't like to lose one but this one hurts most of all," the attorney said, shortly after Circuit Judge Hollie Conley imposed on Connie Thacker Bush the 18-year prison term recommended by the jury which found her guilty last month of first degree manslaughter in the slaying of her husband, 71-year-old John Bush, on Meade Branch of Tolers Creek last summer.

A shudder momentarily shook the 70-year-old defendant's thin frame as Conley announced the sentence, which is close to the maximum for the crime of which she was convicted. Mrs. Bush could have received from 10 to 20 years. She has passed some six months in the county jail and will need to spend three years in the state penitentiary before she is eligible for parole.

Noting that the jury had questioned the court on how much time Mrs. Bush would actually have to serve and whether mental therapy was available at the jail, Public Defender Ned Pillersdorf said it was clear the jury was trying to help his client. In effect, "they sentenced her to three years' treatment at La Grange," he said.

But this line of reasoning was inappropriate, Pillersdorf said, arguing that "this is not what the criminal justice system is about." "We have been getting fairly sophisticated, intelligent juries," the public advocate said and, while he generally welcomed this development, it worked against his client on this occasion, he said.

A new trial, voluntary or involuntary commitment to Eastern State Hospital, or commitment to the care of her son, Woodrow Parsons, were alternatives urged by the defense attorney.

The word, wake, literally means to "watch a corpse," according to Elaine Landau in her book, "Death: Everyone's Heritage."

Funds "Well Spent" On Buyer Protection

"Tax dollars which went to support my Consumer Protection Division in 1981 was money well spent," said Attorney General Steven L. Beshear, in releasing the 1981 Report on the State of Consumer Affairs in Kentucky.

"For the second straight year, more than a million dollars went back into the pockets of consumers in the Commonwealth in the form of restitution, civil penalties, goods and services," said Beshear. This was the result of action taken by the division on several thousand complaints and court cases in 1981.

In addition, the Consumer Intervention Section continued its policy of intervening in utility rate cases before the Public Service Commission on behalf of the public. "During 1981, my staff intervened in 19 major utility rate cases involving requests for additional revenue totaling over \$291 million," said Beshear.

According to Beshear, consumer legislation prepared by his Consumer Protection Division enjoyed its greatest success since 1976 in the Kentucky General Assembly. The 1982 General Assembly passed a buying-club bill to protect consumers who became members of a buying club, a health-spa bill to protect consumers who join spas, a charitable-solicitation bill, requiring all professional fundraisers to file certain information with the attorney general, and small-claims "clean-up" bill to clarify certain procedures in small-claims courts.

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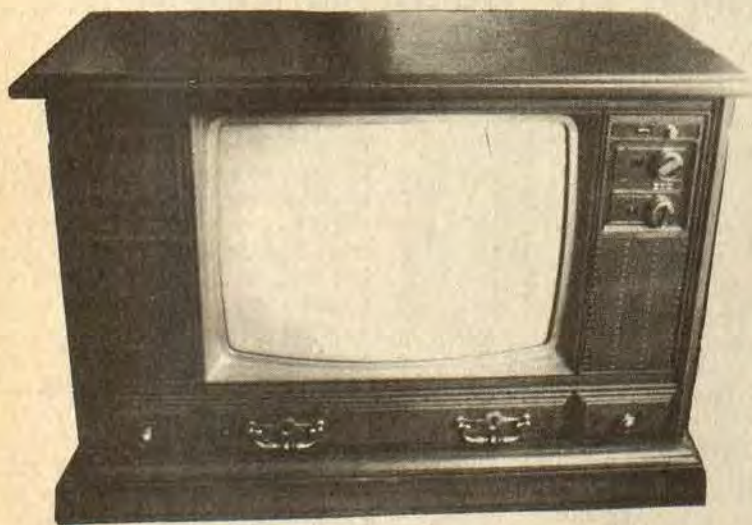

Same Topic—Teaching

Last week this column listed widespread complaints against public schools. The problem, its causes, effects, and remedies are complex. U.S. security depends on its solution to the extent that the government now seeks to induce more top-level students to major in math and science, citing the inefficiency of many teachers in those curricula. As stated last time, we can't teach what we don't know. That calls to mind the year I, an elementary major, was drafted to teach high school English in Wayland for someone on leave. Had it not been for the expertise of co-worker Thelma Daniels—who has no rival in her field—encouragement of principal L.B. Price and fellow teacher Lassa Hatcher, who excelled wherever she was needed, plus my willingness to study, one dislikes to think how badly my classes would have been shortchanged!

As the educational decline grows worse some systems, schools do an about-face, and many teachers do a good job; moreover, efforts to regain lost ground pay off. Fortunately, the absurd practice of passing Suzie along with her peers regardless of her standing, is at last passe. That theory contributed heavily to present failures, which are typified by a star athlete recently shown on TV trying to learn to read, despite his holding a degree from Rutgers University! A friend's description of him prompted these columns. Persons denying that standards have fallen deceive no one.

The fact that more teachers realize their job is a calling, not just a profession, is bearing fruit. Teachers who go on strike have this to learn. Our children come first. Though anything except an authority in any department, having taught 14 years and been a parent longer I see both sides, and write from a reservoir of fairly extensive research done for my little book, A TEACHER VIEWS THE SCHOOL CRISIS, which if possible is less ordinary than its author. Errors in it were not in the galley sheets, further proof of lower standards. Incidentally the book, which came off press in 1957, said much being found in magazines and heard on TV today, about schools.

Causes of the crisis are multiple: politics, poor discipline at home and in school, an affluent society, too much leisure, the dying work ethic, the dole that often promotes shiftlessness in some families for 2-3 generations, low socio-economic parents, working mothers, poorly qualified or indolent teachers or parents, addiction to the T.V. emphasis on athletics, Frills, integration in some places, though long past due, teachers or parents who hold

grudges, penalizing a child; poor health of some involved; lack of respect for authority which begins in the home. All these and more play vital roles in determining the finished product. Every pupil, teacher, parent, home, school and system is individual. Circumstances vary, but some common denominators exist to form a basis for study and action. Requiring regular tests for teachers is one step in the right direction. Some other professions have them. Re-evaluating tenure is another, higher teacher salaries a third.

We are all more or less responsible for the emergency. If the shoe fits us we should wear it! There is no such thing as one side being totally right and the other entirely wrong. Some criticism of teachers, schools, and parents is justifiable but blaming each other produces no improvement. Progress being made in some places is proof that conditions can be corrected. Sometimes less bitterness and condemnation with more understanding and cooperation by all involved helps. Certainly it is worth trying. The least we can do is look at both sides, remember that habits are formed before a child starts school, where good ones should be strengthened. Chances are there is as high a percentage of good parents as of good teachers. The more we pull in the same direction the more we will accomplish.

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Helpers Needed For Tax Returns

Volunteers are needed to help others with their tax returns as part of VITA, the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program sponsored by the Internal Revenue Service.

In the VITA program, volunteers are recruited to provide free assistance to taxpayers unable to pay to have their tax returns prepared, particularly those who file short forms and qualify for the Earned Income Credit. VITA volunteers receive a three to five day training course in basic income tax return preparation. VITA instructors and training materials are provided free by the IRS. Training is conducted at a location convenient to volunteers and instructors, generally starting in late December and continuing through January of each year.

VITA volunteers also assist low income elderly, handicapped or non-English speaking taxpayers. They give explanations of the special credits and deductions for which certain taxpayers may qualify.

For the convenience of taxpayers who cannot travel to an IRS office, most VITA volunteers provide assistance in local neighborhoods at schools, churches, and libraries. Over 6,000 taxpayers were helped last year at 28 sites throughout Kentucky.

Feed Seedlings Available From Forestry Division

Thirteen varieties of tree seedlings can be purchased from the Kentucky Division of Forestry for delivery in mid-February, forestry officials have announced.

The seedlings, grown at the Division of Forestry's nurseries in Dawson Springs, Gilbertsville and West Liberty, include both hardwoods and pines. Offered for sale are black locust, white ash, cottonwood, sycamore, yellow poplar, black walnut, white oak and Chinese chestnut trees.

Three types of shrubs—black alder, autumn olive and lespedeza—are also being sold by the division. Special wildlife packets which contain a mixture of seedlings suitable for wildlife planting is also available. Containing 100 seedlings, the packet costs \$17. Seedlings are available in bundles of 100, 500 and 1,000. Prices range from \$12 for 100 pines to \$135 for 1,000 Chinese chestnuts or black walnut seedlings.

WEKU-FM To Build Station At Hazard

Eastern Kentucky University has been awarded \$85,800 from the National Telecommunications and Information Administration for a Public Telecommunications Facilities Program Grant to construct an educational, non-commercial radio station near Hazard. The grant calls for a 50,000 watt FM station which will broadcast the signal of WEKU-FM to the area. There are currently no plans for local origination from the Perry county location. The transmitter and antenna would be located at the Kentucky Educational Television tower site on Highway 1096.

The proposal was a cooperative effort by WEKU-FM and Western Kentucky University's WKYU-FM, which also was granted PTFP funds to build a station in Casey County. The proposals are the result of a study completed by KET to identify areas of the state still unserved by public radio. KET received a grant from NTIA last year to study new instructional uses of audio for educational use and engineering surveys showed the southeastern counties of Kentucky could not receive an adequate public radio signal.

The proposal to construct a station at Hazard asked for \$85,800 from NTIA to match \$28,600 in local funds. WEKU-FM currently airs 19½ hours of programming daily, with emphasis on information and cultural programs. It is operated by the University's Division of Television and Radio.

WEKU-FM Manager Madison Hodges said that operating the proposed station as a satellite of established services would be the most cost efficient method of providing the services to southeastern Kentucky. WEKU-FM plans to include news, public affairs, and public service announcements from the area as part of its regular programming. Nearly 300,000 persons living in the area should be able to receive the station's signal, which would be located at 90.9 MHz. The antenna will be 1,005 feet above average terrain.

Former Pike Judge Rutherford Heads New Coal Truck Group

A statewide coal truck association has been established, using the motto, "United we haul—divided we stall."

Former Pike County Judge Wayne T. Rutherford has established the Mountain Truckers Association, Inc., with a mountain office in Pikeville and an office in Frankfort. He has recruited former state official and Morehead State University staffer, Robert M. Cornett, to manage the Frankfort office and to act as research director.

Rutherford was outspokenly for coal throughout his 12 years as judge. "I will provide full-time, strong leadership for the truckers. No longer will the coal trucker be the forgotten spoke in the total wheel of the coal industry," he said. It will be the association's goal to educate Kentucky General Assembly members outside the coal regions concerning the coal trucking industry and what it means to their counties and Kentucky. Rutherford says, "It is a shame that honorable Kentuckians who haul coal for a living are now forced to haul outside the law. We will work to change this situation in the future."

Rutherford emphasizes that the Association will not act as a bargaining agent on haul rates. Rutherford says haul rates are best established at the local level. He expects to work closely with local associations to develop policy positions on legislation, and otherwise to be supportive of local associations. However, he emphasizes, "We are not in the bargaining business."

The voice of the Mountain Truckers Association members will be "The Coal Truck Journal," which will be published monthly. Ken Hart will be the editor.

LANCER HOMEMAKERS MEET

The Lancer Homemakers' recent meeting was presided over by Jenny Wallace, president, and the devotions were given by Frances Pitts, who read a poem, "I'm a Little Mixed Up." Mrs. Pitts also gave the lesson, entitled "Let's Talk Turkey." Linda Burchett extended an invitation to everyone to attend the revival at the Lancer Church, and roll call was made by Gloria Sizemore. Those attending were Jenny Wallace, Nancy Roberts, Gloria Sizemore, Linda Burchett, and Frances Pitts.

The December meeting will be held at the Steak House, and at that time members will exchange Christmas ornaments.

Not only will this new association lobby in Frankfort, but will also keep up with what's going on in Washington, D.C.

Rutherford said that even though the association is in the early stages of soliciting memberships, there is already extensive research being done on House Bill 810. Strong consideration is being given to a lawsuit challenging this bill. "The administration's position on this legislation is not in the best interest of the truckers or the citizens of Kentucky. The administration is not carrying out the intent of the Kentucky General Assembly," Rutherford said.

The Truckers Association will use the joint purchasing power of its members to obtain savings on such services and goods as truck insurance and tires.

'Nutcracker' Cancelled

Because of the deterioration and impending renovations of Faith Chapel stage at Pikeville College the 1982 production of the Nutcracker has been postponed. Renovations will begin soon and the Center for Continuing Education plans to meet in January to begin work on the Nutcracker for Christmas, 1983.

Pharmacy Footnotes

Most children do not have a great deal of trouble chewing and swallowing aspirin and other flavored medications. However, administering some other medications can sometimes pose problems. If taste is the problem, do not pretend to the child that a medicine tastes good. That strategy of deceit will not work after the first swallow. Instead, acknowledge that the medicine's taste leaves a lot to be desired. Do your best to disguise the taste by mixing it in a drink or putting it on toast and jam. Check with your physician to insure that the food used to disguise the taste is chemically compatible with the medicine. If tablet swallowing is a problem, simply crush it into palatable pieces.

If your child has difficulty swallowing pills or balks at the taste of certain medications, try mixing it with jam or applesauce. It can sometimes make medicine go down much easier. Dentist Indicted On Fraud Charge

Attorney General Steven L. Beshear has announced that the Medicaid fraud-control unit of his office has obtained an indictment from the Jefferson County grand jury charging Dr. P. R. Williams, D.M.D., of Louisville, with the filing of fraudulent medical claims.

The indictment of Williams contains two-felony counts and charges Williams with devising a scheme to defraud the Medicaid program in the filing of some 1,062 fraudulent claims for dental services which were never rendered to the patients. These false claims resulted in the state Medicaid program paying Dr. Williams approximately \$77,357.

The grand jury returned the indictments after the case was presented by the staff of the Medicaid fraud-control unit of the attorney general's office with the assistance of the economic-crime unit of the attorney general's office with the assistance of the economic-crime unit of the Jefferson County commonwealth attorney's office.

"This is the 15th indictment obtained by the Medicaid fraud control unit since it began grand jury proceedings in Medicaid fraud cases in September, 1980," said Beshear.

The indictment alleges a scheme to fraudulently obtain benefits from the Medicaid program. This is a Class C felony and carries a potential penalty of five to 10 years of imprisonment. Also the indictment alleges the filing of some 1,062 fraudulent claims. This is a Class D felony and carries a potential penalty of one to five years' imprisonment.

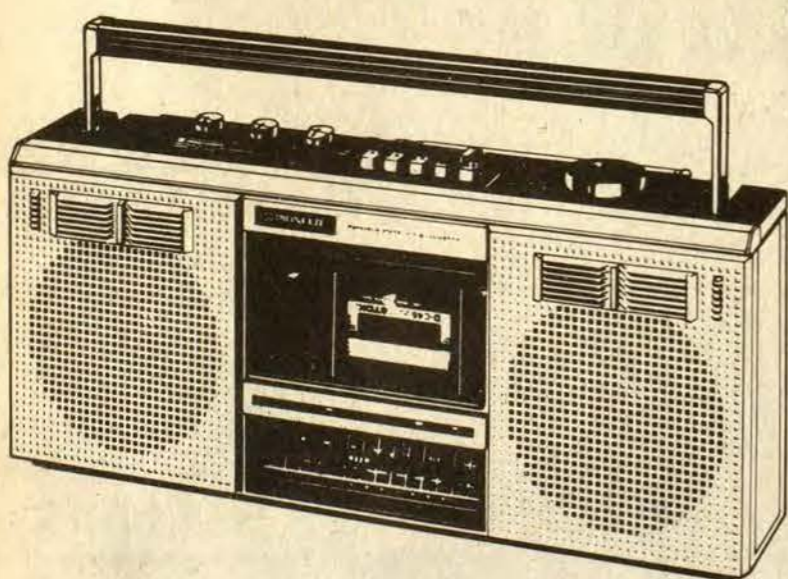

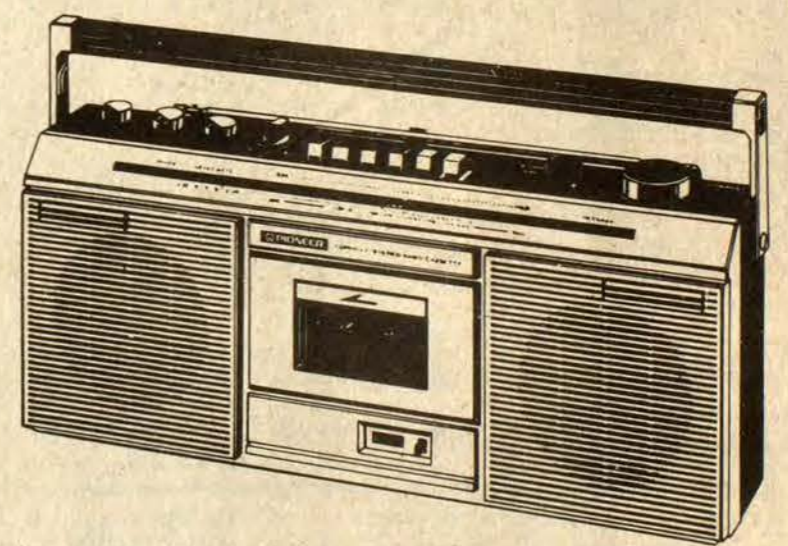

Remarkable Floyd County Family

This is the family of James Whitaker and Rebecca Puckett. Rebecca Puckett was the daughter of Caleb Puckett and Mary Craft who were married in Floyd county June 29, 1843. I am not certain of the parents of James Whitaker. James Whitaker and Rebecca Puckett were married in Magoffin county February 4, 1872 by B. M. Holbrooks, minister of the M. E. Church.

This family moved to Jennies Creek in Floyd county prior to 1880. The aspect of this family which makes it remarkable to me is the fact that there were 19 children born to this family and all except one grew to maturity.

The 1900 census lists this family as follows: James Whitaker, head of household, born in Jan. 1851; Rebecca, wife, born in August 1854; Caleb, son, born in Jan. 1873; Reubin, son, born in March 1874; Mary, daughter, born in April 1875; Mitchel, son, born in October 1876; Thomas, son, born in October 1877; Cora, daughter, born in April 1880, in the 1880 census she was called Clarinda; John, son born in May 1882; George, son, born in July 1883; Clerindy, daughter, born in October 1884; Franklin, son, born in February 1885; Jefferson, son, born in October 1887; Laura A., daughter, born in April 1888; Tandy, son, born in December 1889; Myrtle, daughter, born in March 1891; Cleveland, son born in November 1892; Lula, daughter, born May 1894; Dora, daughter, born in June 1897; and Marie, daughter born in February 1900.

Of this family, only Marie lives today. I do not know her married name or where she lives.

I would guess that this picture was made about 1904 or 1905, judging from the size of Marie.

The semi-annual regional heart clinic will be held at the Floyd County Health Department in Prestonsburg on November 30 and December 1. This clinic is co-sponsored by the health department and the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

Health And Safety Issues Explored In PTA Today

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) estimates that more than 8,600 public schools may have friable (flaking) asbestos materials, which may expose the 2,990,000 students and 269,000 teachers and staff... Asbestos causes cancer and there is no safe level of exposure.

A 1981 nationwide government survey indicated that more than 600,000 children aged 6 months to 5 years have enough lead in their bodies to put them in danger of developing serious learning and behavioral problems.

Playground equipment may be harmful to children's health... On the Consumer Product Hazard Index, playground equipment consistently ranks in the top 10 percent.

These disturbing statements appear in a series of articles devoted to making the world safer for today's children in the November issue of PTA Today, National PTA's magazine.

Only recently has the public become aware of the potential health hazard of asbestos, although this toxic substance has been used in insulation and acoustical systems in schools as far back as 1946. According to an article coauthored by Lois Gibbs, president of the Citizen's Clearinghouse for Hazardous Wastes, on June 23, 1982, the EPA established a ruling requiring all schools—public and private, elementary and secondary—to conduct an asbestos check. The rule, however, does not require schools to remove the asbestos if it is found. Consequently, the article provides the concerned public with information which might aid asbestos removal—how to identify it, clean up loosely attached filaments, and recover inspection and clean up costs.

While the public has learned of the asbestos danger only recently, lead has long been recognized as a toxic metal. Young children, in particular, are vulnerable to its effects. Kirk A. Johnson of the Center for Science in the Public Interest, writing in PTA Today, reports on a 1979 Harvard Medical seat belt safety, school bus safety, and home fire prevention.

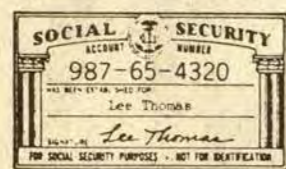

Apply Promptly, Says Social Security Head

People in the Floyd County area who plan to retire before they reach age 65 should apply for monthly benefits no later than the last day of the month they want the benefits to begin, Jim Kelly, Social Security District Director for the Big Sandy Area, said recently.

"In general," Kelly said, "benefits that are payable before a person reaches age 65 can begin no earlier than the month the person applies. This provision also holds true for widows and widowers who will begin receiving benefits before they turn 65."

"If a person applies for benefits after reaching age 65, retroactive payments can usually be made for up to 6 months prior to the month the application for retirement or survivors benefits was filed. To make certain of receiving all benefits due, an individual should apply as early as 3 months before he or she wants benefits to start. This would help assure that the first payment is received on time."

In addition to the information all applicants for Social Security benefits

are required to submit, those applying for disability insurance benefits should have the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of doctors, hospitals, and clinics where they were treated. However, it is not necessary to wait until all the information is available before applying. The people at the Big Sandy Area Social Security office will advise about other proofs that can be used to support an application.

Additional information about Social Security benefits and how to apply for them can be obtained from the Big Sandy Area Social Security office, located on U.S. 23 between Prestonsburg and Paintsville. The telephone number is 886-8525.

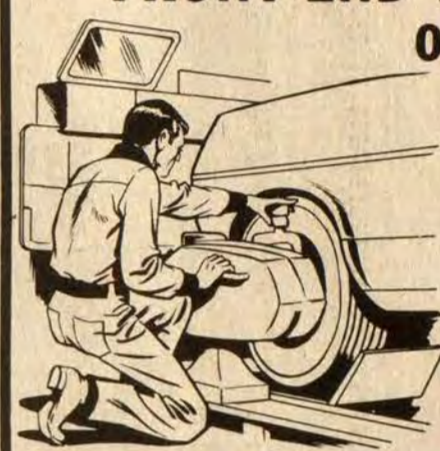

Extension News

Fruit Tree Protection

One of the primary factors which limits home fruit production in Kentucky is low temperature. Low temperature affects fruit production in many ways. There can be death to terminal shoots due to fall forest, soil-heaving damage, crown kill, sunscald and frost splitting of tree trunks, and kill of dormant flower buds, just to mention a few. There are several ways in which we can protect home fruit plantings.

Never fertilize trees, bushes and vines with nitrogen fertilizer in the fall. Fertilize only in the spring. By doing this vigorous fall growth is discouraged and normal tissue hardening is allowed.

Fill any depressions at the base of trees which might hold water. This increases oxygen availability to the roots and reduces the chance of frost heaving, root injury and disease problems.

To reduce sunscald, spray peach tree trunks between ground level and the first few scaffold branches with an inexpensive latex paint. This type of injury to the trunk occurs on cold winter days when the trunk is warmed by the sun and suddenly frozen when the sun passes behind a cloud.

Mulch strawberry plants in late November and early December by placing a half inch of straw on top of the plants. The mulch protects the plants from frost heaving and at the same time, it reduces weed growth, conserves moisture and keeps the fruit off the ground.

These are just a few ways in which you can provide winter protection for your home fruit plantings. For further information contact the Floyd County Extension Office at 886-2668.

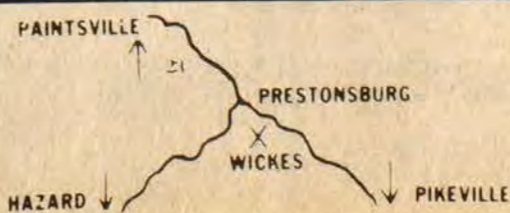

Wear Seat Belts Is Message To Children

"Get home safely! Please wear your seat belt!" E.T. sends this important safety message to children in the November issue of PTA Today, the National PTA's magazine. The issue features a picture of the famous extra-terrestrial buckling his seat belt and encouraging kids to do the same.

Though research has shown that use of seat belts cuts car-related injuries by 50 percent and reduces fatalities by 60 to 70 percent, 90 percent of the population chooses not to wear safety belts, basing the decision on a number of myths. The article "The Number One Killer of Children: A Tragedy Seat Belts Can Prevent," explores several of those myths. For example, many people think they need seat belts only on long trips when traveling at high speeds, when in fact, 80 percent of deaths and injuries occur in cars traveling under 40 miles per hour and 75 percent occur fewer than 25 miles from home.

The issue also reports on the National PTA's Safety Belt-Child Restraint Project, recently launched with a grant from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). Responding to the alarming fact that 110,000 children were injured last year while traveling as passengers in motor vehicles, the National PTA/NHTSA project has awarded grants to 15 PTA Councils throughout the United States to conduct seat belt-child restraint safety awareness campaigns in their communities during the 1982-83 school year. The scope of project activities is broad, ranging from incentive programs for schools that have the greatest number of students "buckling up," to training speakers to visit local schools, to developing local cable TV programs related to car safety devices.

"Automobile accidents are the leading cause of death among children," states Mary Ann Leveridge, National PTA president. "Yet so many young lives could be saved each year if parents knew the facts about car safety. By addressing this problem through our Safety Belt-Child Restraint Project, we hope to make parents aware of a primary responsibility—keeping their children properly restrained at all times while riding in a car."

Though school buses are one of the safest forms of ground transportation, school bus safety is also a continuing problem, according to an article by Vincent L. Tofany, president, National Safety Council. About two-thirds of the fatalities related to school bus transportation occur outside the bus, and many involve children under 10 years of age, he says.

Tofany urges parents to work with school administrators to make sure bus tops are not located near conditions that might pose safety problems, such as factory parking lots or construction sites. If pupils have to cross busy roadways to get to their stops, it might be wise to change bus routes, he advises. In addition, parents should encourage their schools to hire professional, properly trained bus drivers who are concerned about the wellbeing of every pupil.

Are seat belts necessary on school buses? An article by David Soule, Pupil Transportation Specialist, NHTSA, examines reasons given by those for and those against. Proponents of the idea believe children are better off restrained by a safety belt if the bus rolls over, stops suddenly, or crashes. Opponents point to the enormously high cost of installing seat belts on school buses and claim that high-backed, well-padded seats achieve much the same degree of protection. Soule lists points parents should consider if their school district is contemplating installing seat belts on school buses, such as policy concerning mandatory use of seat belts, cost of insuring a school bus equipped with seat belts, and the type of seat belt that would be safest for children.

The November PTA Today also features an article on choosing a safety seat for your child, including descriptions of the various types of infant carriers, convertible models, toddler seats, booster seats, and adult safety belts; and information on how PTAs can develop their own seat belt-child restraint safety campaigns, including a list of resources.

Don't Panic, They Say... If The Police Pull You Over

The Kentucky State Police has some advice for Kentucky drivers who are trying to get where they're going faster than the law allows.

If you have ignored the speed limit and subsequently see the flashing blue lights of a KSP cruiser in your rearview mirror, don't panic and turn a traffic stop into a traffic accident.

Don't stop suddenly. Signal your intention to pull off the road and gradually slow down. At the first safe opportunity, pull completely off the road onto a wide space which leaves room for the trooper to stand beside your car. Never stop on a bridge or alongside a guard rail.

Remain calm and stay in your car or truck with both hands on the steering wheel. Passengers should also remain in the vehicle. Getting out of the vehicle places you in danger of being struck by passing vehicles. Suddenly reaching for something on the floor or seat might make the trooper think you are reaching for a weapon.

Wait for directions from the trooper. He or she will ask for your driver's license. If the trooper determines a violation has occurred, a citation will be issued. The trooper will then explain the procedure for paying or contesting the ticket.

At this point, the average driver is ready to heed the best and simplest advice concerning speeding.

Welfare Fraud Unit Got Floyd True Bill

Attorney General Steven L. Beshear said last week that the Welfare Fraud Unit of his office was responsible for the indictment voted by the Floyd county grand jury, Nov. 4, charging Jerry and Sherry Hurt, of Weeksbury, with welfare fraud.

The indictment contains two felony counts and alleges that the Hurts failed to report income from employment and illegally received \$1,914 in food stamp benefits. Both counts are violations of KRS 194.505, alleging a failure to report a change in factors affecting eligibility for benefits. This is a Class D felony and carries a potential penalty of one to five years imprisonment.

"Since the responsibility for investigating welfare fraud in Kentucky came under the jurisdiction of my office in July, 1980, more than 1,000 cases have been referred for prosecution with a dollar figure in excess of \$1,000,000," said Beshear.

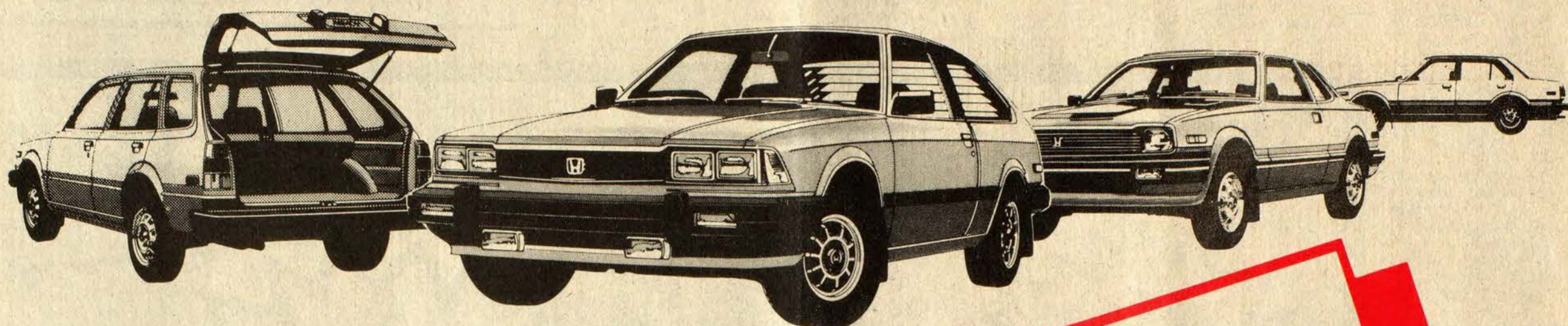

TV Series Explains How Laws Are Made

If you have ever tried to follow a piece of legislation moving through the Kentucky General Assembly, you know that the bill can take more twists and turns than a Kentucky creek bed. The process is not as complex as it might first appear, if you know a few basic rules. KET's updated series "Lawmaking In Kentucky" provides just that kind of information in terms simple enough for high school students (for whom it was originally designed) to understand. The series premieres Monday, December 13, at 3 p.m.

The six half-hour programs examine the lawmaking process beginning in Program One with the history of the Kentucky Constitution and an overview of the major steps in making a law in the state. The format includes interviews and footage from the 1982 General Assembly.

Remaining programs deal with such topics as the differences between the House and Senate chambers; the numerous sources of legislation, including citizens, lobbyists, special interest groups and the executive branch, and the role of political parties and party leadership in considering legislation.

WAVE newsman Ferrell Wellman hosts the KET production which also features discussion by legislators and experts who deal with the many aspects of lawmaking.

January 10 at 3 p.m.—"How Bills Originate" with Sen. Henry Lackey, Henderson; Lobbyist Mack Morgan, Georgetown, and Secretary of Human Resources Buddy Adams, Bowling Green.

January 17 at 2:30 p.m.—"How Bills Are Considered" with Rep. Aubrey Williams and Rep. Gerta Bend of Louisville and Legislative Research Commission Administrative Assistant

Science Group Honors Barber

Superintendent of Public Instruction Raymond Barber was honored in Ashland recently for his efforts to end the shortage of science and math teachers in Kentucky's schools.

At its annual meeting at Ashland Oil, the Kentucky Academy of Science presented Barber with a plaque for his contributions to science education in Kentucky.

The state superintendent was instrumental in getting funding from the Kentucky General Assembly for a unique loan program to lure more teachers into the math and science field. A year of the loan is forgiven for each year of science or math taught in a Kentucky school.

"Raymond Barber has been unusually receptive to the concerns of classroom teachers and the needs of the science community," said Dr. Ted Goerge, outgoing academy president. "This is the only such program in the U.S. at this time."

Most recently, Barber instituted a science advisory council composed of school teachers, school administrators, college and university professors, and representatives from industry. This group will examine science education in Kentucky and make recommendations concerning its improvement.

The Kentucky Academy of Science membership consists of teachers, professors and scientists representing all phases of the sciences including physics, chemistry, biology and geology.

★ Cancer Hopeline

Q. Do you have literature on mouth care during cancer treatment?
 A. Radiation to the head and neck and certain chemotherapy drugs reduce the amount of saliva. The result can be severe tooth decay as well as difficulty eating and swallowing and a temporary loss of the sense of taste. Sores also may develop, and the gums may become sensitive and bleed.
 "Radiation, Chemotherapy, and Dental Health" and "Mouth Care for the Chemotherapy Patient" are available free from the Cancer Hopeline and are the basis for this column.

It is wise to consult a dentist prior to cancer treatment. Much can be done to prevent or reduce mouth problems. A clean, healthy mouth helps. Brushing the teeth three times a day with a soft toothbrush and no toothpaste and flossing once a day are recommended by most physicians and dentists if the bloodcount permits.

Patients with mouth problems, especially those who have low bloodcounts, are urged to rinse their mouths thoroughly after eating instead of brushing. This can be done with plain water or a variety of homemade solutions. Commercial mouthwashes are not recommended because they may irritate the mouth or cause nausea and/or vomiting.

Diet is important to good oral health anytime, and especially during cancer treatment. Drinking more fluids, eating soft, bland foods, taking smaller bites to assist swallowing, and avoiding sweets except at mealtimes help.
 The physician or dentist may advise exactly when or if dentures can be worn. As objects in the mouth, dentures may increase the possibility of vomiting or could be lost or broken if in place during vomiting. Many physicians and dentists recommend that poorly fitting or old dentures not be worn at all during treatment since they may irritate the mouth and cause infection. A physician or nurse can advise further about this.

Roberts wrote about the struggles and conquests of Kentucky settlers, and her work reflects the people who shaped Kentucky history, especially the Kentucky woman.

Gasoline Available During Thanksgiving
Motorists traveling Kentucky's major highways and interstates during the Thanksgiving Holiday should have no major problems finding gasoline, AAA says.

According to the Blue Grass Automobile Club's November Fuel Gauge Report, 63% of the stations surveyed will be open Thanksgiving Day. In addition, 68% will be open on Sunday; 82% will be open past 6 p.m. Saturday; and 58% will be open past 8 p.m. on weekdays.

AAA also reports that the average price per gallon for gasoline in Kentucky has increased one cent at full-service stations in the last month and has dropped one cent at self-service pumps.
The average cost per gallon at full-service stations is \$1.33 for regular, \$1.38 for no-lead, and \$1.45 for premium no-lead. The average price for diesel fuel is \$1.24.
Self-service averages range from seven to 12 cents lower and are \$1.21 for regular, \$1.29 for no-lead and \$1.38 for premium no-lead.

Task Force on Wildcat Mines Wins First Jury Conviction

The Department of Mines and Minerals Task Force on Illegal Mining recently won its first jury trial conviction in Harlan District Court, according to state Mines and Minerals Commissioner Willard Stanley.

This marked the first such ruling since tighter controls on illegal mining became effective last summer. Three men, arrested and charged for mining without a license to sell coal in late October, were convicted after a seven hour and 30-minute jury trial. The three were fined \$337.50 each for the Class A misdemeanor, Stanley said.

Created by the 1982 General Assembly to investigate and close wildcat mines, the Mines and Minerals task force began official operation July 15. (The Legislature established a similar unit within the Natural Resources and Environmental Cabinet to close strip mines operating without proper permits.) Over the last four months, the task force has closed six illegal operations and has arrested more than 20 violators in Knox, Whitley, Floyd, Bell, Pike, Harlan and Knott counties, according to Kentucky State Police Lt. David Whitehouse. Whitehouse and two other KSP officers have been working with the seven-member Mines and Minerals unit since its formation.

The Harlan county conviction marked the second court victory for the department. In late October, a Floyd county man was convicted and fined \$300 with a 30-day suspended jail sentence for operating without a license.

The other five cases are pending trial in the local district courts.

Stanley said he is encouraged by the department's success and by the overall impact of the task force.

"Closing wildcat mines and prosecuting the violators are our immediate responsibilities, but we have longer range goals," the commissioner said. "Ultimately we hope our people will work themselves right out of a job by giving unlicensed operators the incentive to get legal."

An increase in mine licenses during recent months indicates that the task force is having just that effect. Many wildcaters—an estimated 400 in the London area alone—have opted to become legal rather than risk being arrested and prosecuted.

In addition the illegal operator risks losing any equipment found at the mine site during a task force closure. Nearly \$2 million worth of equipment has been seized by the state during the six closures since July. Some of the equipment has been released to owners who had liens or who were leasing it to the wildcaters. Before the equipment was released, however, the owners or lessors had to prove in court that they had no knowledge that their machinery was being used for illegal operations.

"We have to follow the law, whether closing a mine without a license or releasing an outside owner's equipment," added the commissioner. "But, be assured that our department counsel is working with local county attorneys to vigorously prosecute the offenders and to retain and sell any machinery confiscated at an illegal mine site after a conviction."

Public Protection and Regulation Cabinet Secretary Neil Welch added that he is optimistic about the impact of the new program. The secretary oversees the Department of Mines and

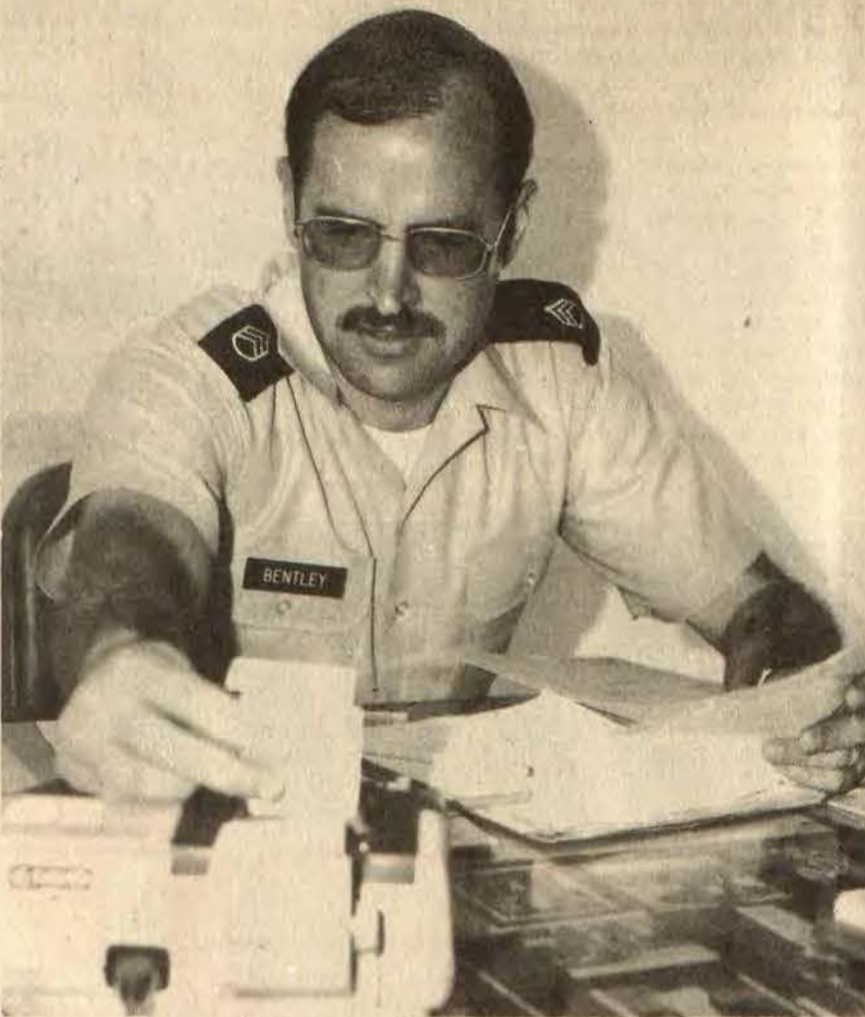

'Wrong-Side' Driving a Problem

CAMP ZAMA, Japan—Two once implacable enemies—Japan and the United States—have become, over the years since the end of World War II, strong friends and allies. The names of Japanese firms and products are household words in America, and American soldiers serve their country on the Japanese home islands. Army Staff Sgt. David C. Bentley, of Wayland, Ky., is one of them.

Bentley, 35, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert H. Bentley, Wayland, is a finance specialist with the U.S. Army Finance and Accounting Office at Camp Zama.

"It's my job to compute and audit travel vouchers for the military and civilian personnel working at Camp Zama," Bentley said. "I also provide travel information for personnel who are making travel plans and trying to budget travel money for their employees."

Camp Zama, 35 miles southwest of Tokyo, was established in 1935 when the Japanese Diet (governing body) approved plans for construction of a military academy near the town of

Zama. In 1936 the completed academy was dedicated and became the Japanese counterpart of the U.S. Army Military Academy at West Point, N.Y.

"I enjoy all aspects of Japan," Bentley said, "except for driving in this densely populated country. The people are friendly and it's very interesting working with the Japanese because we're always comparing one another's customs. It's been fun teaching English and giving the Japanese my impression of American life. I've also come to find how delicious raw fish is."

Bentley, who enlisted in August, 1970, arrived in the "Land of the Rising Sun" in March, 1980. The Wayland High School graduate said there were a couple of adjustments he's had to make since coming to Japan. "Without question the biggest adjustment was driving," he said. "Not only driving with millions of others, but driving on the opposite side of the road. Also, in the beginning, there were some problems in trying to be understood by the Japanese."

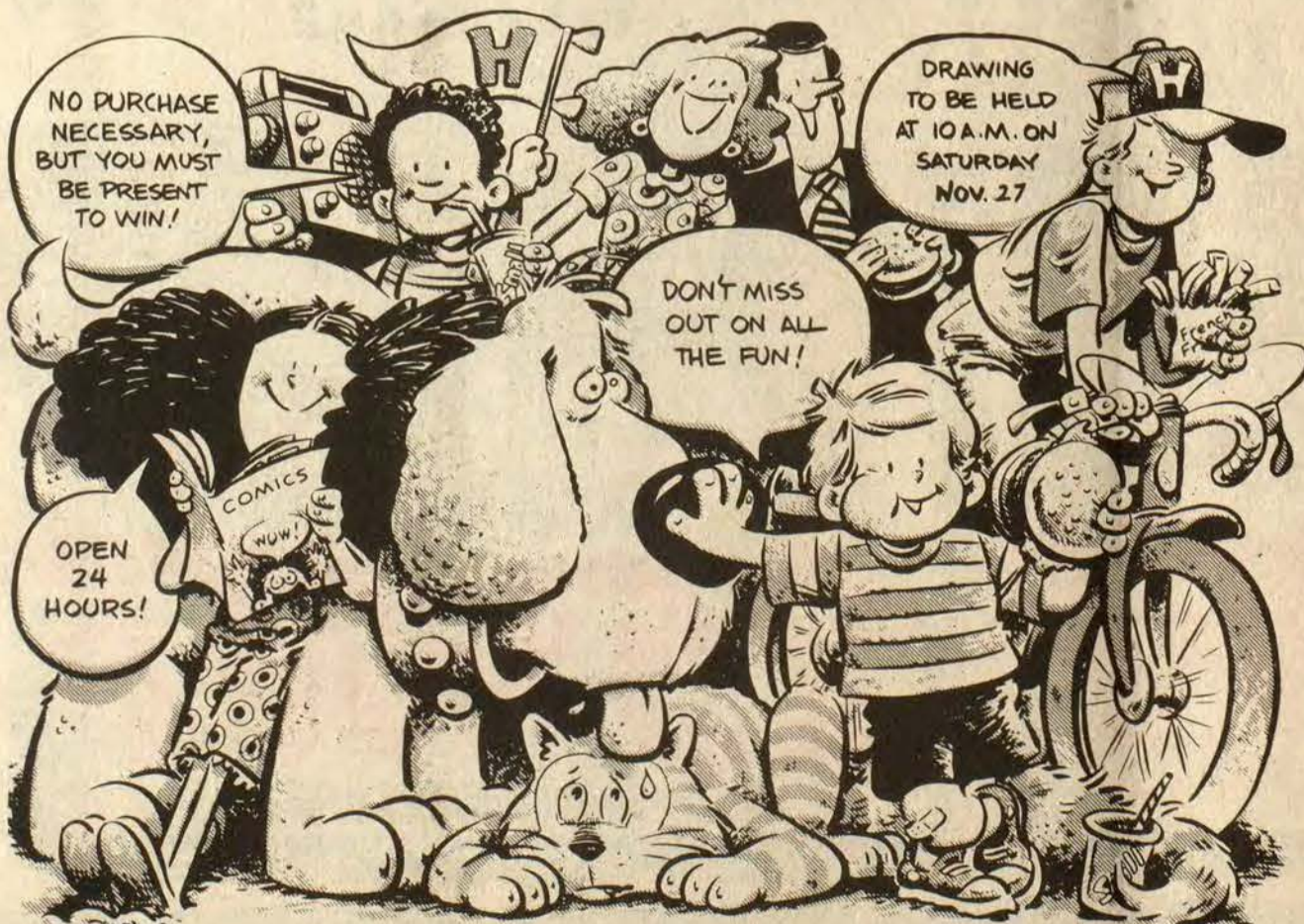

A model probation and parole project, funded by a \$30,000 grant from the National Institute of Corrections, is expected to greatly improve efficiency in Kentucky's probation and parole system, according to James L. Hurd, executive director of the office of community services in the state Corrections Cabinet.

"In the past, we have had a loose system that has been subject to too much individual interpretation. When evaluating performance in all our probation and parole districts, it's difficult to compare 11 different systems," said Hurd.

Under the new system, clients will be classified based on risk of future criminal activity and need for services. The system is designed to help probation and parole staff deal with offenders individually and develop more appropriate case plans. In addition, it will standardize the supervision requirements to enhance accountability and performance. Wisconsin is the only other state to implement the model project.

"This system is similar to the federal program but superior," said Hurd. "In implementing this program, we can be more sure of what we're trying to accomplish, we can move people through the system more quickly, and we need not maintain clients' rolls who do not require assistance," he added.

Hurd said that the Parole Board has agreed to cooperate and that the board has shown confidence in community services by allowing the office to determine the type of supervision suitable for paroles whether it be minimum, medium or maximum.

The project will also involve a client-based management information system that will provide data necessary for routine monitoring, evaluation, as well as planning and preparation of necessary management reports. "I believe that in the long run the job of the probation and parole officer will be made easier," said Hurd. "In addition, we will be able to rate staff fairly and have more accountability."

A core team was selected to attend a training session at the National Academy of Corrections in Boulder, Colorado. Participants included Jerry Nichter, branch manager, Louisville probation and parole; Joan Wagner, district supervisor; Wayne Alexander, district supervisor; Dan Yeary, assistant district supervisor; Mike Price, training instructor, corrections training; Terrell Davis, Covington probation and parole officer; Delores Catchings, Bowling Green probation and parole officer, and Spencer Underwood, Paducah probation and parole officer.

"The core team did a splendid job during the session. Their presentations were superior and it is obvious that they are very conscientious individuals. I believe that their enthusiasm will be contagious," said Hurd. On Sept. 9-10, the core group discusses the new system with the probation and parole supervisors.

The core team will train all proba-

tion and parole personnel in using the new system. A statewide orientation will also be held on Nov. 15.

Hurd said that Kentucky is the second state in the nation to receive grants from NIC for both institutions and field services. NIC will provide technical assistance in implementing the program. He estimated that the entire program will be implemented in a year or less.

Flood Information Available

Flooding is a recurring problem along many rivers and streams in Kentucky, which has had five Presidential-declared flood disasters since 1975. Annual damages caused by flooding in Kentucky exceed \$40 million.

There are several methods available to communities to reduce their flood damages. The traditional response to reducing flood damages was to attempt to keep the flood water away from the people by building dams, floodwalls and levees, and other structural type activities. Experience through the years has shown that these solutions have failed in many communities.

The major approach to reducing

flood damages today is through a comprehensive floodplain management program. This floodplain management program incorporates the structural techniques with other measures that reduce the susceptibility to flood damages by keeping people and developments out of the flood hazard areas by making such developments more resistant to flood damage (warning and preparedness planning, flood-proofing, and floodplain regulations).

AUDITORS' STATEMENT

To the People of Kentucky,
Honorable John Y. Brown, Jr., Governor,
Honorable Jerry A. Lafferty, Jr., County Judge/Executive, and
Members of the Floyd County Fiscal Court

We have examined the Statement of Assets, Liabilities and Fund Balances arising from cash transactions of Floyd County as of June 30, 1982, and the related Statement of Cash Receipts, Cash Disbursements and Changes in Fund Balances for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with the "Standards for Audit of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions," issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As recommended by State Local Finance Officer, pursuant to KRS 68.210, the accompanying financial statements are prepared on a cash basis. Consequently, certain revenues and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when a liability is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly the assets, liabilities and fund balances arising from the cash transactions of Floyd County at June 30, 1982, and its cash receipts and disbursements during the year then ended, in conformity with the accounting system described above, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

We also conducted tests of compliance with state and federal laws and regulations and unless otherwise noted below, the tested items were in compliance with applicable state and federal laws and regulations. During our examination nothing came to our attention to cause us to believe that the untested items were not in compliance.

We conducted a study and evaluation of internal accounting controls, some of which are incorporated in the statutes, regulations, and Uniform System of Accounts. The significant internal accounting controls are as follows: 1) Receipts are to be deposited intact, 2) Segregation of duties, 3) Proper authorization of disbursements, 4) Disbursements by warrant or check, countersigned by the County Judge/Executive and the County Treasurer, 5) Bonding requirements, and 6) Fixed asset control. Our study and evaluation of internal accounting control included tests and review of each of these items. A material weakness identified as a result of the evaluation is as follows:

We recommend the fiscal court review the bonds of the County Judge/Executive who is now bonded for \$5,000. We advise the court to require bonding of this official in an amount commensurate with his financial responsibilities. This action has now been taken by the county.

Areas of noncompliance are as follows:
The county was in violation of KRS 64.710, which states that no public officer or employee shall receive or be allowed or paid any lump sum expense allowance except where such allowance is expressly provided for by statutes. The county paid various employees a lump sum expense allowance from General and Revenue Sharing Funds. This practice has since been discontinued.

The county paid dual salaries to several employees from general county revenues as well as from grant funds from the Kentucky Department of Justice. This is in violation of the grant guidelines and an audit of the grant funds by the Kentucky Department of Justice recommended that the county repay funds totaling \$14,892.39. The practice of dual salaries has since been discontinued.

The county entered into a contract for computer services to prepare payroll checks for the county for a fee of \$9,000. There was no evidence that this contract was put out for competitive bidding. This is in violation of state statute.

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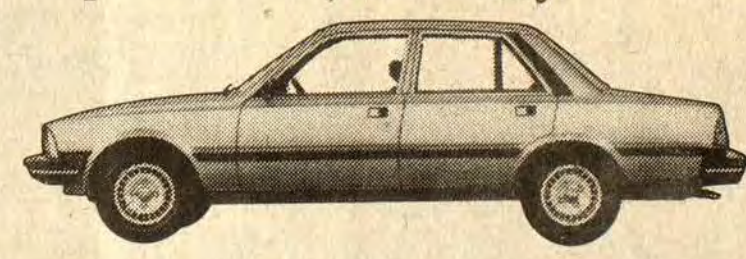

Fire Season Here Mild thus Far

Floyd county is having one of its least destructive fire seasons ever, District Forester Stephen R. Brackett said Monday, exactly a month before the fall fire season officially ends.

Since October 1, only 16 woodland blazes have been reported, and these burned over only 334 acres.

Brackett ascribed the lower-than-usual damage "partly to the weather and partly to our continuing enforcement activities." This fall's fires, to date, are only about 25 percent of last year's, and they're only one-tenth of one per cent of the damage suffered in 1980 when 127,000 acres of Woodland burned in this county alone, Brackett added.

The largest fire reported this fall was in the Wayland area, where about 45 acres burned.

To date, 12 citations have been issued to persons held accountable for fires in the county. Only one of these cases has yet been brought to trial. The defendant was fined \$100, plus court costs.

Bunnell, who has served as controller for 2½ years will now devote his time to external financial operations and long-term financial planning. He will also remain responsible for the overall budget process. Bunnell's appointment comes at a time when the hospital is facing major changes in reimbursement policies for third party payers such as Blue Cross, Medicare and Medicaid.

"This opportunity will allow me planning time so we can be in a better position to act rather than react to the changes," Bunnell said.

Morgan, previously assistant controller, will oversee day-to-day internal financial operations. He will manage admitting, data processing, billing, credit and collections, general stores and accounts payable.

"This move reflects the sophistication of Highlands in the complex world of hospital finance," Mr. Traum explained.

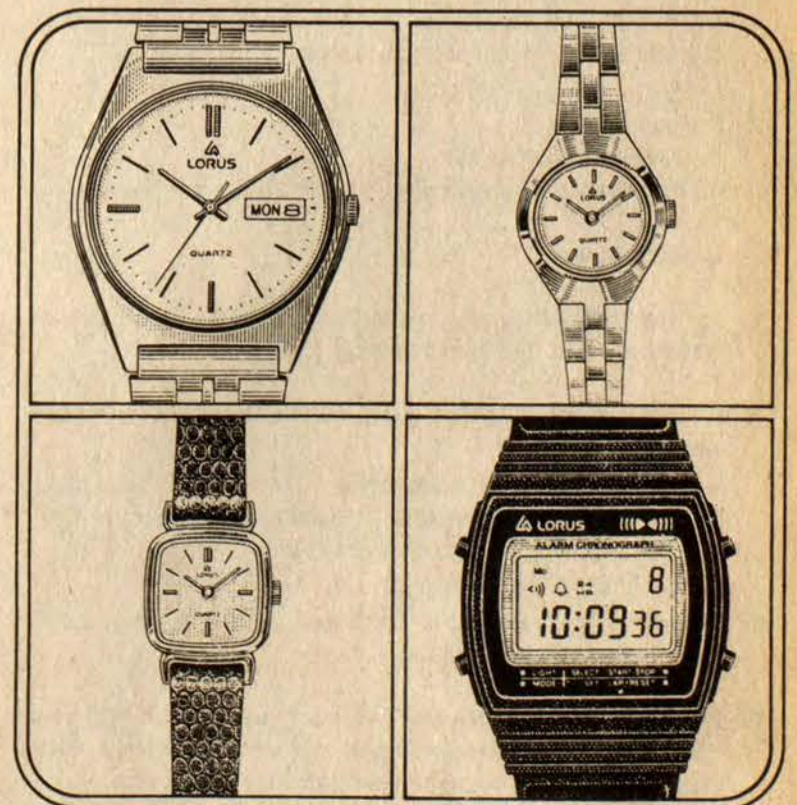

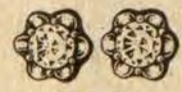

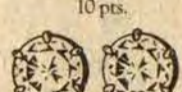
