## Bell To Combat Phone Fraud

The first phase of a program aimed at curbing long-distance telephone fraud began in Kentucky Feb. 1, with calls charged to false phone numbers the main target.

According to Art Willett, local manager for South Central Bell, the plan starts up, full-scale, April 1, when long-distance calls charged to a third number will be completed only if someone at the third number verifies the call.

During February and March Bell will explain the new plan to callers making third number billed calls, Willett said.

"Operators will try to verify every call billed to a third number, and will still complete the call even if they can't reach the number," Willett said. "However, operators will also tell callers who don't get approval that, beginning April 1, third number calls will have to be OK'd by someone at the number being charged to be completed."

The new procedure is expected to make a big difference in the growing problem of telephone fraud, which cost Bell's customers tens of thousands of dollars in Kentucky last year.

"Long distance fraud is a big problem, and the worst part is, when dollars are lost to fraud it means higher prices for everyone," Willett said.

As for those callers who frequently make third number calls, Willett said there are a number of alternatives.

"The first choice should be to dial direct—it's the cheapest way to call long-distance. People can also consider calling collect," Willett said. "But those options aren't always available. The best answer may be a Bell System Calling Card."

"With a Bell System Calling Card, you have your own individual account number. You charge your local distance calls to your account, easily and with no hassle. Best of all, you save money over the rates for operator-handled calls. It just takes a local phone call to get a Calling Card, and there's no fee or extra charge for having one."

## Ford Pushes OSM On Reclamation

Senator Wendell Ford (D-Ky.) recently made a strong pitch for a faster release of revenues from the Abandoned Mine Reclamation fund, criticizing the Office of Surface Mining for giving land reclamation a low priority. His remarks came in a hearing of the Energy and Natural Resources Committee.

Ford criticized the OSM for not distributing funds in an equitable and timely fashion. In giving consideration to only two spending priorities, Ford said the OSM was creating an "East-West problem". The first two priorities deal with health and public safety, but the next four are land reclamation purposes. Ford said this put the East at a strong disadvantage, since this is the region of heavy strip-mining since the 1930's.

"I do not mind funds going for health and public safety. This is only right," Ford said. "But I contend that funds should also go to restoring the land in the East that has been decimated by strip-mining. That is the reason we created this fund in the first place."

Ford also pointed out the cumbersome state procedures, where bureaucracy delays countless funds reaching the mine sites. "In Kentucky, there are three levels of clearance," said Ford. "Why does the process have to be so complicated and time-consuming?"

Ford wants to see all the unused funds spent. "The money isn't doing anyone any good just sitting idle gathering dust."

### Deer, Small Game Seasons Fixed

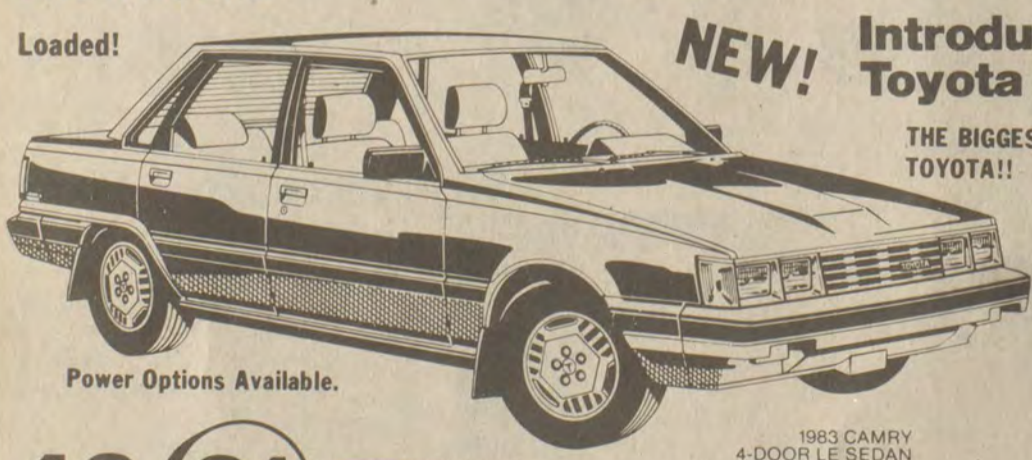
An earlier closing date for quail and rabbit seasons is the only major change in 1983 hunting regulations approved by the Fish and Wildlife Commission at its regular quarterly meeting in Frankfort Feb. 27-28. The commission voted to close rabbit and quail seasons after Feb. 12. These seasons, which were open through Feb. 28 last year, will begin on the traditional third Thursday in November (Nov. 17). Grouse season will run from Nov. 17 through Feb. 28, 1984.

The 1983 gun deer season will open Nov. 5 in 117 of Kentucky's 120 counties (Lincoln, Knott and Knox are closed to all deer hunting) and will run for three, five or 10 consecutive days. The state will again be divided into six different harvest zones with differing deer hunting regulations in each. Gun hunters in zone one may take any deer during all ten days of the gun season. Zone two gun hunters will have one day (Nov. 14) of either sex hunting, but will be limited to antlered deer on the first nine days of the season. In zone three, only antlered deer may be taken during the 10-day hunt. In zone four, antlered deer may be taken during a five-day season, while a three-day antlered deer only season is the rule for zone five. Zone six is closed to all deer hunting, whether by gun or bow.

The deer bow hunting season is set for Oct. 1 through Nov. 3 and Nov. 16 through Dec. 31. Crossbows may be used only during the Nov. 19-28 portion of the archery season. Archers in zones four and five may take only antlered deer, while bow hunters in zones one, two and three may take either antlered or antlerless deer. Squirrel season will open Aug. 20, and run through Oct. 31, with the second phase of the season set for Nov. 17 through Dec. 31. Hunting and trapping seasons for furbearers will run from Nov. 17 through Jan. 31. Bag limits and other regulations remain basically unchanged.

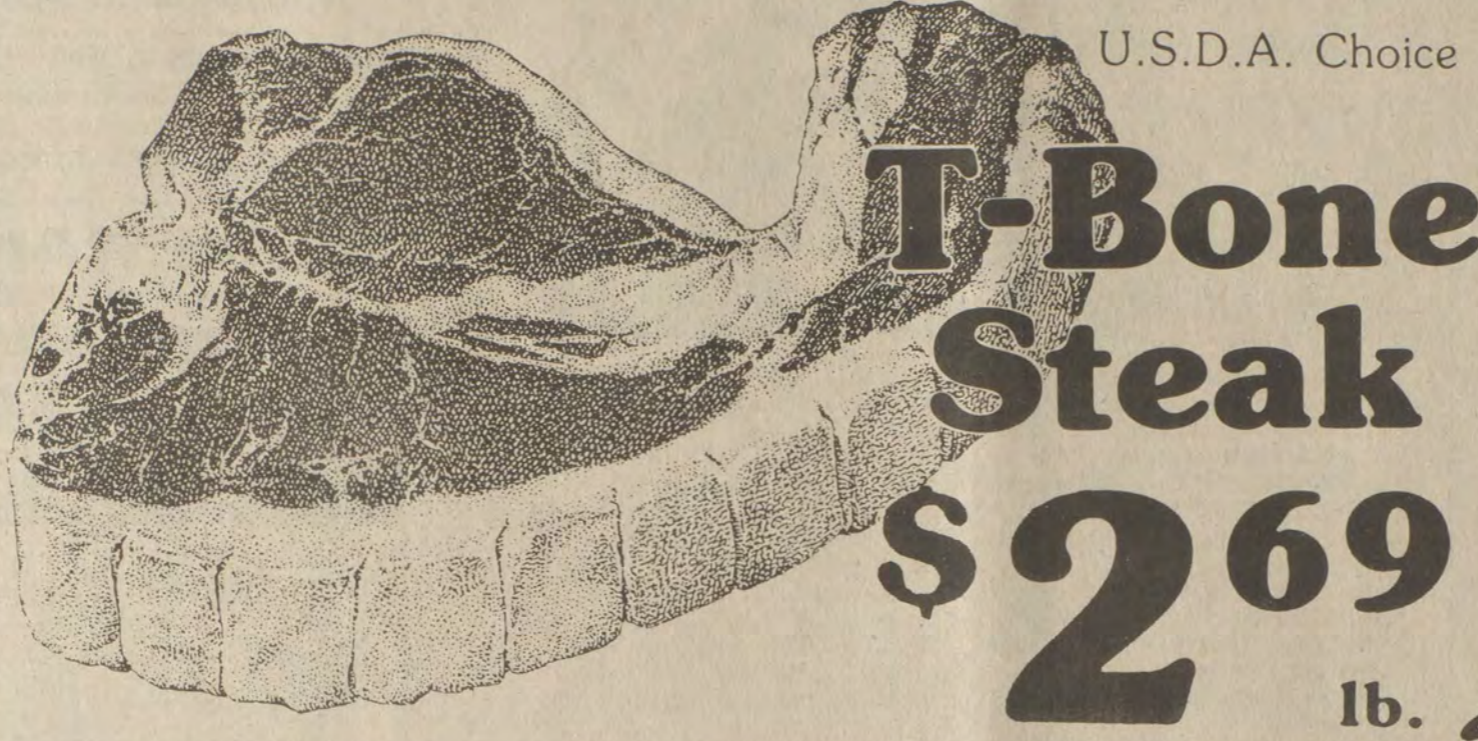

**Here's How To Seal  
 Leaking Windshield**

Water leaking into a car's passenger compartment from around the windshield is a fairly common problem. This condition could cause interior corrosion and even electrical problems. But it can be fixed.

Writing in Mechanix Illustrated, automotive editor Don Chaikin notes that the tricky part of this project is to first find the source of the leak, because the way water flows can be deceiving. Here's how to proceed.

With a helper inside the car to spot the incoming water, take a garden hose without a nozzle and squirt water under moderate pressure at the windshield, starting at the bottom horizontal surface and working up one side at a time. Go slowly; it may take the water time to work its way through. Starting at the bottom is important to eliminate the chance of error from water flowing downward into the car.

If you find a problem with the windshield seal, it's usually at a butt joint. Just pry away the rubber and squirt thin bead of a suitable flexible sealer. Your auto supply store will have a silicone paste that is ideal for this job.

If the problem is not the windshield itself, check around it for a badly sealed body seam. An occasional entry point is at the front corner of the drip moldings where there may be pinholes visible. To fix a drip molding leak, fill any gap in a joint or the pinholes with the flexible sealer.

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### Bond Program Under Way In Floyd

The world of medicine is reverting to the Stone Age for a surgical instrument. An anthropologist and an eye surgeon are experimenting with blades that the ancient Mayans crafted from volcanic glass as far back as 2000 B.C., hoping to craft a greatly improved scalpel for eye surgery. The March Reader's Digest notes that the experimental blade is vastly sharper than any edge commercially available and it should cost about \$15—as opposed to a diamond edge scalpel which costs about \$800 and up.

### March 31 Is Deadline For Scholars Program

Teachers and school administrators have between now and March 31 to nominate Kentucky's top high school juniors for the 1983 Governor's Scholars Program, Gov. John Y. Brown, Jr. has announced. Floyd county school district may submit two primary and two alternate nominations.

Selection standards and forms for nomination of students have been mailed to all school superintendents, principals and heads of private and special schools, Brown said. Nomination forms for distribution to teachers and counselors were included in each packet.

Two hundred and fifty outstanding students will be chosen for the new academic program to be held July 3 through August 5 at Centre College. Brown said there will be no charge to students for tuition, room or board. Funds for the program are being provided by government, business and foundations.

Students will have a choice of concentration in the study of mathematics, science, humanities or the social sciences, during the intensive five-week session. They will also take part in a core seminar on the program theme "Science, Technology and Kentucky's Future" and in regularly scheduled discussions on personal development, emphasizing the individual's relationship to society.

Every school district will be given the opportunity to submit names and applications of at least one primary nominee and one alternate to participate in the program, providing they meet the minimum standards, Brown said. All primary nominees who meet the basic standards will be invited to attend the program.

Alternates will be placed in a pool with nominees from private and special schools to compete for places in the program. Each private school may submit one nomination for the pool.

Each school superintendent has been notified of the number of nominations for that particular school district. Most Kentucky public school districts have less than 600 students in their 11th grades. Each of these districts may submit one primary and one alternate nomination. Twelve school districts have 600 or more juniors; they will be allowed more nominations in accordance with their numbers.

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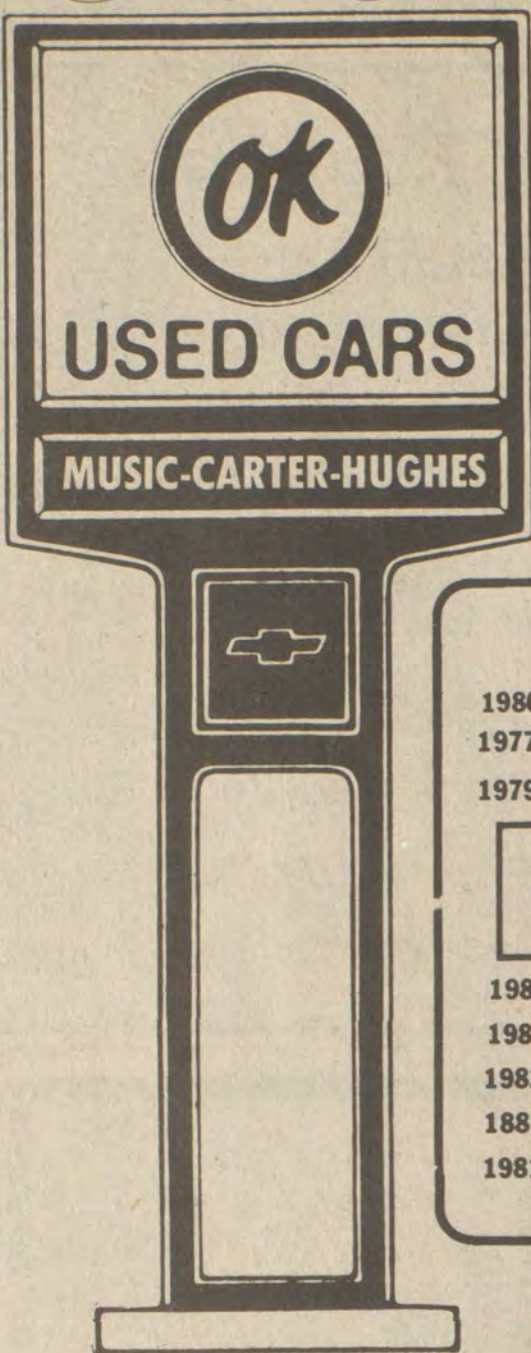

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# State Idle Total in January Reached Record-Setting High

For the second consecutive month, the number of jobless Kentuckians reached a record-setting high during January. An estimated 207,700 persons were unemployed in Kentucky during the month. This caused the state's January jobless rate to rise to 12.4 percent, according to figures compiled by the Cabinet for Human Resources.

The 12.4 percent preliminary January unemployment rate marks a 0.7 percentage point increase from Kentucky's revised 11.7 percent December jobless rate. The comparable national unemployment rate for January was a nonseasonally adjusted 11.4 percent.

According to the state's chief labor market analyst Ed Blackwell, Kentucky Labor force estimates for January have been revised to a 1982 benchmark instead of the 1981 benchmark used for the December figures. "This is a major contributing factor to the large unemployment rate increase from December to January," he said.

Blackwell noted that the number of jobless Kentuckians increased by 10,700 from December to January. The January estimate of the state's jobless indicates an increase of 26,500 from January 1982.

The January unemployment rate for the state's bituminous coal mining industries was 24.7 percent, down from the 30.2 percent December rate. The January jobless rate for Kentucky's con-

struction industries remained unchanged from December's rate, 27.5 percent. The state's manufacturing industries' rate climbed from 16.7 percent in December to 21.5 percent in January.

Kentucky's civilian labor force fell from 1,682,100 in December to 1,672,700 in January. The civilian labor force only includes persons currently employed and unemployed persons actively seeking jobs.

The number of Kentuckians employed during January was estimated to be 1,465,000, down 20,100 from December but up 7,600 from January 1982. "The usual decline in trade employment following the Christmas season, plus declines in agricultural and construction employment, were major contributing factors in the state's employment drop," Blackwell said.

The state's manufacturing industries' employment was estimated to be 239,000 during January. This figure is comparable to Kentucky's 1968 manufacturing employment level.

## March Designated Organ Donor Month

Kentucky Gov. John Y. Brown, Jr., and Lexington Mayor Scotty Baesler, have joined in declaring March as "Organ Donor Month." The goal of this action is to increase public knowledge regarding the important need to pledge the gifts of life and sight by signing an organ donor card.

"The area of medicinal dealing with organ transplants has made significant advances in the last decade. Hardly a day passes that a story regarding transplantation and lives saved cannot be found in the newspaper, on radio or television," notes Tom Threlkeld, manager, Renal Transplant Program, University of Kentucky. "In spite of growing public awareness, there are over 100 Kentuckians awaiting a donor kidney."

Jim Martin, Director of the Lions Eye Bank—University of Kentucky, seconds that statement. "A shortage of corneal eye tissue also exists," he states. "We currently have seven patients in Lexington alone on our waiting list."

These shortages are due primarily to an inadequate pool of potential donors.

"The donor section of the Kentucky driver's license has been terribly underutilized since its inception," says Threlkeld.

Persons wishing more information on organ donation, or to sign an organ donor card, may visit the information displays hosted by the following Lexington shopping malls on these specified dates: Lexington Mall, March 5; Fayette Mall, March 19, and Turfland Mall, March 26.

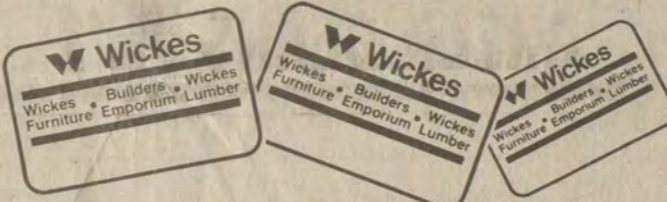

### ★ Cancer Hopeline

Q. Is there any relationship between drinking alcohol and cancer?

A. Drinking alcoholic beverages (including beer, wine, and hard liquor) has been linked to a number of cancers. Studies indicate that heavy drinkers have an increased risk of cancers of the mouth, throat, larynx, esophagus, and liver.

The relationship between drinking and cancer is strongest for those parts of the body that come in direct contact with the alcohol, such as the mouth, larynx, and esophagus. Liver cancer is also related to heavy drinking. Some studies have shown 60-90 percent of liver cancers are associated with cirrhosis of the liver, a disease usually attributed to alcohol abuse in this county.

Recent research has shown that heavy drinkers are ten times more likely to develop mouth cancer than the average person.

The use of tobacco in combination with alcohol is even more dangerous. The risk of cancer of the mouth for a heavy drinker who also smokes may be as much as 15 times greater than that of nondrinkers and nonsmokers. The combined use of tobacco and heavy alcohol consumption is strongly implicated in cancer of the throat, larynx, and esophagus.

Scientists at the National Cancer Institute have found a connection between alcohol consumption and esophageal cancer among black men in Washington, D.C., where the rate of this disease in black males is higher than in any other city in the country. Researchers found that 96 percent of the men who died of esophageal cancer drank, and usually did so heavily, as compared with 78 percent of those who died of other causes. The risk of developing this cancer seems to be greatest with hard liquor. Nearly half of esophageal cancer patients drank the equivalent of 15 ounces or more of hard liquor per day. These patients also usually had poor diets, which suggests that poor nutrition also may contribute to esophageal cancer.

Scientists are studying alcohol to identify possible carcinogens. Ethanol, a component of alcohol, may promote the cancer-causing activity of carcinogens. Several known carcinogens may be present in alcohol, including nitrosamines and asbestos fibers.

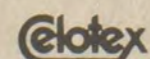

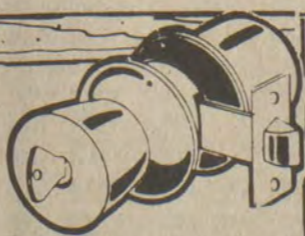

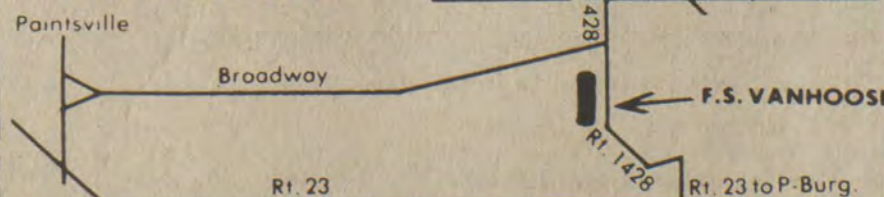

Warns Consumers Against Possible Lottery Scheme

Attorney General Steven L. Beshear has announced that many Kentuckians have recently received notice in the mail from the American Testing Institute, Miami, Fla., that they have been "computer selected" to participate in a Television Testing Procedure whereby the consumer is requested to complete a TV test response form and return it with a check or money order in the amount of \$14.80. Every participant who completes the test response form is guaranteed receipt of a free gift. The company asserts that the gifts include a lifetime membership in a film club, microwave ovens, TV sets, stereo systems, watches, cash prizes ranging from \$500 to \$2000, a trip to Mexico, among other prizes.

"Consumers should know that the U.S. Postal Service has filed suit against the American Testing Institute charging them with conducting a lottery," said Beshear. "A judge's decision is pending as to whether or not all incoming mail to the company can be stopped for possible violation of federal mail statutes."

Beshear cautions consumers to give careful consideration before participating in this alleged lottery. Citizens are encouraged to contact the Office of the Attorney General, Consumer Protection Division, 209 St. Clair Street, Frankfort, Ky., 40601-1875, if they have complaints or inquiries regarding this matter.

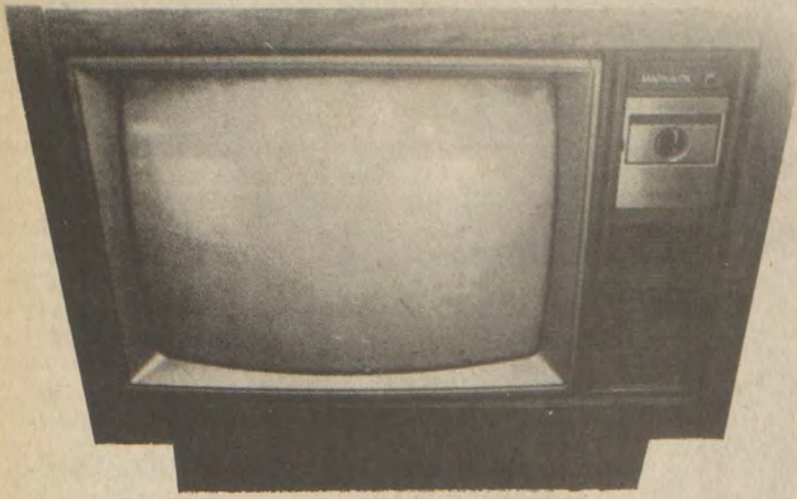

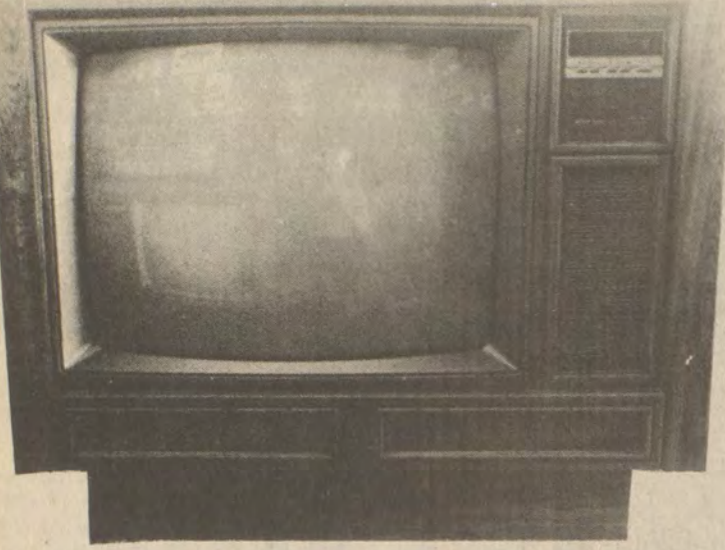

## Lt.-Gov. Candidate



Steven L. Beshear, state attorney-general and one of five Democratic candidates for lieutenant-governor, campaigned in this county last week.

The 38-year-old Hopkins county native claimed that, as attorney-general, he "has turned an otherwise routine office into an active force for the benefit of taxpayers."

## Dramatic Drop Recorded in Childhood Diseases

In a world obsessed with statistics, life and death can be reduced to numbers on charts. Even so, on a chart full of zeros a single "1" stands out.

A Cabinet for Human Resources chart labeled "Deaths Attributed to Vaccine-Preventable Diseases, 1981" lists zeros for polio, measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria and tetanus. In the pertussis column there is a "1." It represents a Bullitt county baby, dead at two months of age because someone around him had not been immunized against the disease most people call whooping cough.

The infant, not yet old enough to be immunized himself, became a tragic statistic: the last reported Kentucky death caused by vaccine-preventable

disease. Public health officials are striving to make his death the last "1" on the chart forever.

Because of intensive efforts by the cabinet's Department for Health Services, more and more Kentucky children are being immunized against the seven preventable diseases once common to childhood. As a result, the incidence of illness and death from those diseases has dropped dramatically since 1971.

In 1971 there was one death from polio, a late result of the disease, but no new cases. That year, there were 3994 cases of measles, 2532 of mumps and 1756 of rubella, and five deaths from measles diseases. There were 81 cases of per-

tussia (whooping cough) with four deaths and five cases of tetanus from which three died.

The figures for 1982 reflect the marked gains effected in the fight against the diseases. There were no polio cases, only one of measles, 22 of mumps, 31 of rubella, none of diphtheria, seven of whooping cough and one of tetanus—and no reported deaths.

Statistics provided by the Communicable Diseases Office relate the continuing decrease in disease to the increase in immunization levels. Almost 95 percent of all children entering Kentucky schools for the current school year had been protected against diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, polio, measles and

rubella (mumps immunization is not required by law in Kentucky). For the 1974-75 school year, when the first immunization surveys were conducted, only 73 percent of all new pupils had received the six mandatory vaccines.

Robert Young, M.D., the Human Resources Cabinet's deputy commissioner for community health services, attributes the improvement to a federal/state "push" called Immunization Initiative and stricter enforcement of the state's immunization laws. Immunization Initiative began in 1978 with a focus on school children.

"The department's Immunization program went into the schools, checked the records and had notes sent to parents whose children needed to update their immunizations," Young said. "The school boards required those children to get the protection they needed. The program had the support of the schools and the local health officials, plus the help of community volunteers."

Young said the Department of Education and local school boards have been instrumental in stepped-up enforcement of immunization laws. In fact, many parents are seeing that children receive the required immunizations long before school age. Last year 94.1 percent of the children enrolled in licensed day care centers in Kentucky were already protected against six vaccine-preventable childhood diseases.

Another factor in the increased immunization of very young children, explained Young, is the Immunization Program's distribution of disease prevention information to mothers of Kentucky newborns. "The success of that public education effort," he said, "is reflected in the percentage of 2-year-olds protected against the so-called childhood diseases."

While Kentucky public health officials are pleased with the results of Immunization Initiative, they say they cannot ease up. "At the beginning of the initiative, we set an immunization goal of 90 percent," stated Young. "Now that we are about to reach that goal, we are pushing the objective to 95 percent."

# State Divided into 9 Areas For New Job Training Effort

Governor John Y. Brown Jr. has approved a proposal to divide Kentucky into nine areas for funding and administration of the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA). JTPA is the new federal program which will be administered by the Cabinet for Human Resources and will replace Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) programs in October this year.

The nine new regions, called Service Delivery Areas (SDA), were contained in a proposal from the Interim State Job Training Coordinating Council to Gov. Brown. The governor signed the document Mar. 4.

According to Human Resources Secretary Buddy Adams, the coordinating council was given the difficult responsibility of restructuring the entire state for the new JTPA program. "Because of their hard, thorough work, I am not surprised that the proposal was unchanged by the governor's review," Adams said. "The recommendations were the result of the input received during a series of conferences held throughout the state in January and February," he added.

Department for Manpower Services Commissioner Robert Spillman noted that the only major changes in the proposal are expected to deal with the Louisville and Jefferson County area and the area composed of the six surrounding counties. "Because the six-county area surrounding Jefferson County does not have the population and industry to stand alone, the council recommended that the governor's approval be contingent on a future arrangement between the two SDAs," Spillman explained.

Also contained in the coordinating council's proposal is a breakdown of the JTPA funds which the Human Resources Cabinet anticipates Kentucky will receive. The cabinet's estimate of \$52-million in JTPA funds for federal fiscal year 1984 is about equal to the amount of CETA funds Kentucky received for fiscal year 1983.

"Dollar-for-dollar, we expect JTPA funds to go a lot farther than CETA funds in terms of actual job training for Kentuckians," stated Spillman. It is estimated that only 18 percent of CETA funds were used for job training, he said. "Federal law mandates that at least 70 percent of JTPA funds be spent on actual job training."

"The purpose of JTPA is not unlike the purpose of CETA to train economically disadvantaged and unemployed people for jobs with a future," Spillman said. "The main differences between the two programs are that JTPA specifically focuses on partnerships between the public and private sectors, and that emphasis is placed on local control. In other words, for the first time, government agencies and private enterprises will have equal authority in putting federal job training funds to work," he stated.

Another major difference between the two programs is that JTPA will not create public service jobs as the Public Service Employment Act as CETA did, noted Spillman. "JTPA is geared only toward training people for existing and new job openings that have been identified by local businesses."

The coordinating council's approved proposal to achieve equitable funding and authority throughout the Commonwealth presently is being published for public scrutiny, according to Spillman.

## Are We All Equal?

The first strike ever staged against a bank in Minnesota became a national story and changed the lives of eight women who didn't set out to be heroes. The story of their three-year struggle is told in "The Willmar 8" airing Friday, March 25, at 10 p.m. on KET.

The women had been receiving low pay as tellers and bookkeepers and two of them with 10 and 11 years' experience were passed over repeatedly for promotions. The final straw came when these women were asked to train newly hired men for jobs that the women were never considered for.

"We're not all equal, you know" were the words that opened the battle. The program focuses on the women who picketed daily, through two winters, protesting their low wages and dead-end jobs.

The citizens of Willmar chose to ignore the strike, hoping it would go away. The eight women, isolated by a wall of silence, grew personally as they supported each other against tremendous odds. In their protest they learned to believe in themselves and compelled the town to confront issues it wanted to bury.

"The Willmar 8" is produced by independent filmmakers Mary Beth Yarow and Julie Thompson.

## How To Cope Without Panicking

With the price of gasoline falling, more people are returning to the roadways for daily and extended trips. While there is pleasure in being able to drive less expensively, a greater number of cars on the road also increases the potential for accidents and vehicle breakdowns.  
 The Blue Grass Automobile Club-AAA offers these tips on how to cope with highway mishaps without panicking.  
 If a problem occurs while you are driving, try to locate a service facility and have your car checked. If you must stop immediately do it safely. Stay out of the main flow of traffic and remember, quick panic stops can result

in tragedy! Once you are completely off the road, determine your exact location in case you need to summon help.  
 On busy highways, take care when getting out of the car. Exit on the side away from oncoming traffic. Raise your hood and tie a white cloth to the side mirror or antenna, also turn on your emergency flashers. This will identify your car as a disabled vehicle.  
 Before any on-the-spot repairs, extinguish all cigarettes, cigars, and pipes. Make sure you know what you are doing. Motorists and passengers have been injured or killed because they failed to take the necessary emergency measures before working on a car. At

the very least costly repairs could result from attempting to fix something and causing further damage.  
 When you first open the hood, be aware that the engine may be hot; let it cool down some before touching it. Also, sometimes parts in your engine will continue to move after the car has been shut off. Long hair, loose clothing, and jewelry can get caught in fans and other objects under the hood.  
 When requesting help, be sure that the individual you talk to knows the make, year, color, and license plate numbers of your car. Also, be certain that they have a clear understanding of where you are and whom you want them to call. There is no point in having someone call the police when you really want a towing service.

Giving calm, clear instructions to those who offer to help will save time. If you call for help on your own and are parked in a crowded area (stadium, shopping center, university, or hospital) arrange to meet service personnel at a specific location and then show them to your car.  
 If you are involved in an accident and are not seriously injured, attend to those around you. If anyone is in a position of immediate danger, remove them as quickly as possible and then get assistance. When property damage in excess of \$200 occurs, or if anyone is injured or killed, you are required by law to contact the police and remain at the scene to speak with them.  
 The saying that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure is old but true, so be prepared! Be aware of the weather and road conditions, if at all possible, and drive accordingly. A spare tire should always be properly inflated and easy to reach. A good working jack of the correct size and type for your car is a must, and never get under the car when it is jacked up. Jumper cables, a white cloth, flashlight, and an extra can of motor oil are all items which can help bail you out in a pinch.

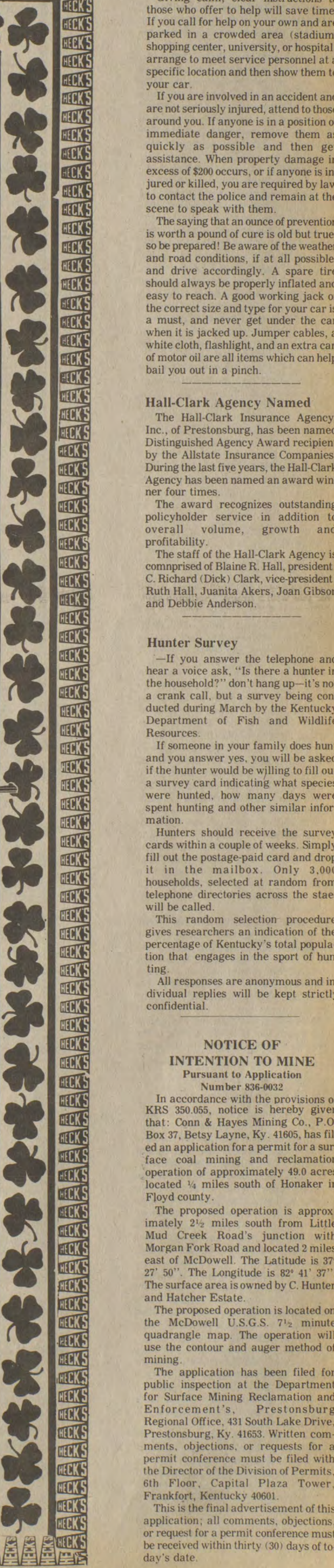

# Top Ten Harness Racers Include Three Ky. Horses

Harness racing's 10 outstanding performers of 1982—including three Kentucky-originated horses—have been honored by Harness Tracks of America, according to the Kentucky Harness Racing Commission.

The horses, each a champion at its age, sex and gait, have been selected by the racing secretaries of the 50-member association of the HTA. Owners of the 1982 champions will be honored at the HTA's annual awards banquet when they are presented the NOVA Awards in Palm Springs, Calif. on Feb. 9. (The NOVA Awards are comparable to the Thoroughbred Eclipse Awards.)

Over one-third, nearly \$2.4 million, of the total \$5.6 million earned, was won by the three Kentucky-based harness horses.

World champion Three Diamonds, produced by Kentuckian Farms and winner of the Three-Year-Old Filly Pacers, was the only unanimous choice of the 26 voters who cast their ballots. In 1982, she set six world-records, won 16 out of 21 races, and earned \$502,225. She set one of those records at Lexington's Red Mile last October during an elimination heat of the Tennessee race. Sold at the 1980 Fasig-Tipton Standardbred Sales for \$100,000, she has earned \$719,733 for owner George Segal of Illinois.

Another Kentucky-based horse, the Free-For-All Genghis Khan, was the second highest vote-getter, receiving the HTA Aged Pacer of the Year award. The six-year-old son of Meadow Skipper also won the 1982 U.S. Trotters Association-U.S. Harness Writers Association Aged Horse of the Year. Genghis Khan has won a total of \$551,050 and set a world-record time at The Meadowlands last August.

Winner of both the 1982 HTA and USTA polls for champion Two-Year-Old Pacing Colts, Fortune Teller is the third Kentucky offspring to be honored by the harness association. The colt is the greatest money-winning two-year-old of all time, having earned more than \$1.3 million.

"We are thrilled to see three harness horses with direct ties to Kentucky win national recognition," said Carl Larsen, state supervisor of racing at the Kentucky Harness Racing Commission. "Originally sold for relatively inexpensive prices; these sturdy horses have won hundreds of thousands of dollars for their owners. These winners are just another example of the harness industry's strength in the Commonwealth."

The remaining nine divisional champions selected by the racing secretaries are as follows:

\* Three-Year-Old Pacing Colt Cam Fella was voted the 1982 Horse of the Year by the HTA and the United States Trotters Association and U.S. Harness Writers Association. Bred at Blue Chips Farms in Walkill, New York, Cam Fella won his first 1982 victory on Jan. 15 at the Meadowlands and 32 starts later, in November, won his 28th race. The pacing colt earned \$879,725.

\* Three-Year-Old Trotting Colt Jazz Cosmos is a world champion and set a world record when he won the Kentucky Futurity at Lexington's Red Mile last October. He equaled time records at Philadelphia's Liberty Bell last year, as well. The colt has earned a total of \$608,248 and will stand stud at Armstrong Brothers stables in Inglewood, Ontario.

\* Aged Trotter Mare of the Year Delmegan, a world champion, set a world record at Louisville Downs last September and has career earnings of \$469,573. She has retired to Armstrong Brothers stables in Ontario and, say Armstrong officials, will most likely be bred to Jazz Cosmos.

\* Two-Year-Old Trotting Filly Arm-bro Blush won 16 of her 20 trips to the post and finished third in two other

starts. Another Armstrong Brothers' horse, she has earned \$331,968.

\* Two-Year-Old Trotting Colt Dancer's Crown won all nine of his 1982 starts. He won four stakes and set national season's marks in four different races. Dancer's Crown is yet another Armstrong Brothers-bred horse. Bought during the Fasig-Tipton Standardbred Sales in Lexington for \$25,000, the colt has won more than \$406,000.

\* Two-Year-Old Pacing Filly Bardot

Lobell is the fastest two-year-old ever and is a world champion. She has earned more than \$259,000 for her Florida and New York owners.

\* Three-Year-Old Filly Trotter Dance Spell was the dominant sophomore filly on the race tracks during 1982. With owners from Chicago and New York, the trotter won \$340,281 in 18 starts during the season. She set national season's marks on five occasions and missed the world record by a fifth of a second.

The project will include mowing the right-of-way along the following roads:

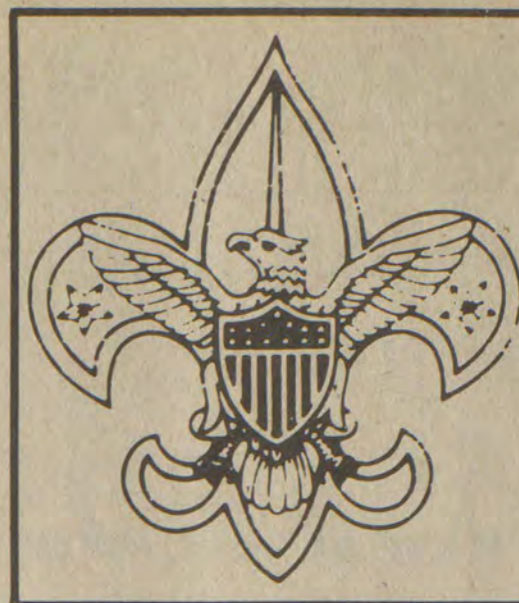
—KY 80, Hazard-Watergap road, from KY 15 in Perry county to U.S. 23 in Floyd county.

**Want To Be Included**

This is in reply to the "Prettiest Spring" for Daniels Creek residents. All of the undersigned agree that spring is always beautiful. That means the snow is leaving, the mud is drying, and we can all wash our cars.

As most county residents are aware of the garbage problem, so are the "upper hollow people" of Daniels Creek. Unlike Cow Creek and Prater Creek Development Clubs, where most of the residents are involved, no one has ever heard of the Daniels Creek Development Club, let alone be a member. True, some residents do litter the creek, as they do in all other communities; however, that does not necessarily mean that everyone is a litterbug. If some people did not litter, then there wouldn't be a trash problem, would there?

Everyone is not financially able to hire trash picked up from their private property and publicly shared water and road ways; therefore, we must perform the tedious task of removing other people's garbage ourselves. Residents should not be expected to clean up neighbors' yards and surrounding property, unless they are homebound due to health reasons. Personal and civic pride should result in the act of keeping a clean environment.

The main reason that area residents did not help county employees with the cleanup was, we weren't aware of it as being an area cleanup exclusively on Daniels Creek. When the county performs other tasks such as grading roads, cutting bushes, etc., we don't aid in this, mainly because we are not asked.

We would like to thank our magistrate, Lowell Samons, for the equipment that he provided, and for his time and effort. He remembers that Daniels Creek is a part of District 4.

As for the major dump on the main road, it was mainly contributed to by non-residents of Daniels Creek. Why should we haul our garbage a mile and dump it when we can throw it out of our front doors; that is, if we wish to litter. Remembering back a few years ago when the Ivel post-office's safe was removed from its premises, where was it found? It was found on Daniels Creek at a garbage dump that was cleaned up almost two years ago and is yet to be refilled.

As for the Dempster Dumpster-type garbage bins being placed in the upper reaches of the hollow, are these for car litterbugs or for the homes to take their garbage there? If the latter is the reason, why should we be separated from the rest of the county and be denied home pick-up of garbage.

The main reason that the upper hollow people may feel that the trash will return is that maybe they weren't involved or even asked to be involved in the cleanup. We had to find out about it in the local newspaper. Some of the residents were made aware that a meeting was to be held in the local church's annex building prior to 1983 concerning garbage. We were told we'll get back to you as to the exact time and day; we're still waiting. Perhaps this is the Daniels Creek Development Club.

According to an article on the Floyd County Solid Waste, Inc.'s situation, we thought it was illegal to dump or bury garbage anywhere other than at an authorized landfill. One thing that does need clarifying is that the actual work did not consist of seven days, but of four days.

We wish to inform our neighbors that just because your name is not on this letter doesn't mean we think of you as a litterbug; it only means you didn't call us and complain of being characterized as a litterbug, a slum resident, or a segregated upper hollow person. We have already been segregated—we are serviced by different electric companies, different cable television, and different garbage pick-up days. However, we were unaware that we felt separate from the lower hollow residents. We have the same pride and dignity as they do, and we try just as hard to have a clean community.

What we are trying to say is that we would like to be considered a part of the whole community and that means being involved in everything, including the cleanup. We're not degrading the cleanup or the ones responsible in any way. We are glad that the area is clean; nevertheless, we would like to have helped beautify our community. This benefits all residents, not just a certain few.

**Kentucky's Top Ten Deer Counties**

By JOHN WILSON

Although the complete tally from last year's deer season isn't in final form yet, enough figures are in to show that the 1982 deer harvest set another record for the state.

A total of 17,966 deer were brought through check stations in Kentucky's 118 open counties last year. This figure does not include the harvest from military reservations, wildlife management areas, or the estimated 15 to 20 percent of hunters who don't bother to have their deer checked.

The total statewide harvest is expected to reach 25,200 according to John Phillips, the biologist in charge of Kentucky's deer management program. This represents a 10.7 percent increase over last year's total harvest figure of 22,500.

Owen county led the list of deer taken with 1,013. This was the only county to break the 1,000 mark and the first time since records have been kept that over 1,000 deer have been taken from a single county in Kentucky.

Christian county, with 833 deer, is in second place, followed by Ohio (696), Hopkins (656) and Butler (626). Franklin county earned sixth place honors with a harvest of 566 deer and Logan is number seven with 531.

Muhlenberg and Henry counties, each with 505 deer, tied for eighth place. Breckinridge hunters tallied 491 deer, and rounding out our top ten is Crittenden county at 464.

All of these "top ten" counties were in harvest zone two, where hunters could take antlerless deer on the last day of the 10-day gun hunt. Under 1983 regulations recently approved by the Fish and Wildlife Commission, Breckinridge, Franklin, Henry and

Owen counties will be moved to the bucks only zone three. Biologists feel that a "doe day" on alternate years will be sufficient to stabilize deer populations in these counties.

An indication of how Kentucky's deer herd has grown in the last several years is that the total harvest from our top ten counties (actually 11 counties because of the tie) of 6,886 deer is more than the statewide harvest from open counties in 1978, which came to 5,925.

Another indicator is the success rate, which in the past few years has climbed from around 10 percent to 18.3 percent. That means for every 100 hunters around 18 come home with venison for the freezer.

Cancer Hopeline

Q. My 15-year-old daughter may be smoking secretly, for it is not permitted in our home. She has heard all the warnings, but I'm not sure they will help. What can you recommend?

A. In the January-February, 1981 issue of CA, a cancer journal for physicians published by the American Cancer Society, there was an article called "Smoking: The Ticking Time Bomb for Teenage Girls." The physicians who read it were so impressed that they wanted to get the message to their young women patients. In response, an open letter was prepared; it is being used by many physicians and is printed here in an edited version:

"Dear Patient:  
"For teenagers, smoking is like a time-bomb set to explode and do damage at some unknown time in the future... There has been a dramatic rise in lung cancer deaths among women. By 1989, lung cancer is expected to be the number one cancer killer among women.

"Perhaps you know these and other (smoking and health) facts. It may be more important to you just now to consider the way smoking affects you personally.

"How you think about yourself—Girls who smoke are not somehow better people, nor are they more popular. In fact, not smoking can add to your self-esteem.

"How you look—There is nothing attractive about yellow stains on teeth and fingers, nothing appealing about smelling cigarette smoke in your hair—or on your breath.

"How you appear to others—No one is admired because of smoking. High school boys in a Texas study said they would rather date girls who didn't smoke. More than half said they wouldn't let girls smoke in their cars!

"How smoking is rated today—In society as a whole, smoking is definitely becoming less the thing to do and is now restricted or banned in many public places.

"Worse, smoking affects your health right now. Smoking makes your heart beat faster, interferes with your nose and lungs filtering dirt from the air, and damages your breathing capacity. If you are an athlete, you will have far less endurance than your nonsmoking competitors.

"So I prescribe for you a life without cigarettes. If you don't smoke, don't start. If you do smoke, you can stop; there are many programs to help you.

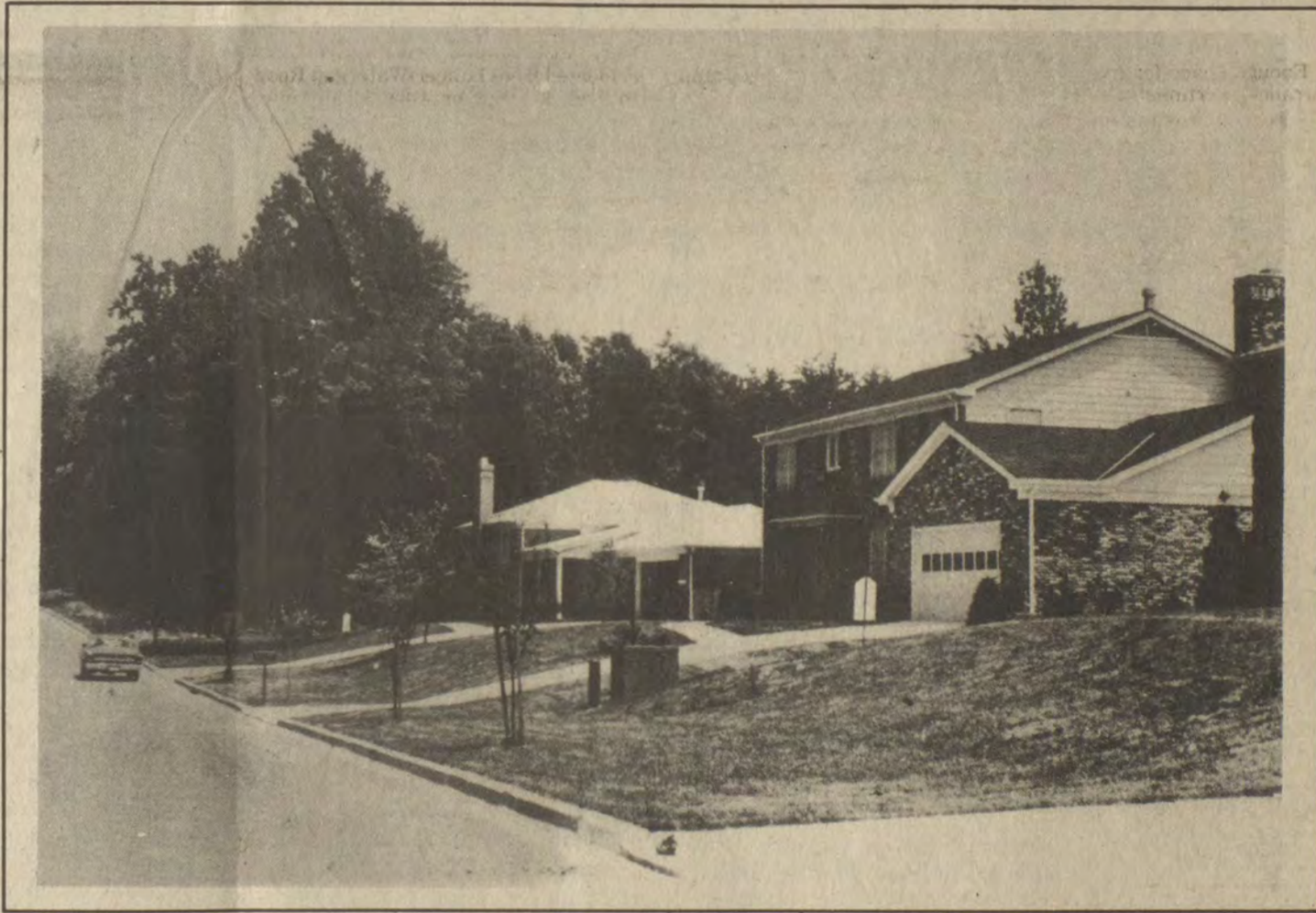

It was necessary to consider all funds as a whole in order to determine your cash position because your records indicated payments were made from incorrect funds and credited improperly to accounts within that fund. Because of this, your county has numerous violations in your road fund, revenue sharing fund, and local government economic assistance fund this fiscal year.

In order for your county government to stay within your total available budgeted funds you must strictly adhere to the above listed estimated expenditures. Please note that you only have \$49,842.44 available for road materials and supplies and \$40,000 for gas and oil for the balance of the 82-83 fiscal year unless you reduce expenditures in other categories.

At this time I would like to recommend the following:

- That you immediately cease using credit cards for county business. There are currently three charge cards being used: American Express, personal card, Jerry Lafferty and Stella Lafferty; Visa; and Master Charge. (See Exhibit III.)
- That your court read the minutes of each previous meeting in court instead of approving them without reading them. Your written minutes did not agree with the typed minutes in several instances.
- That a copy of your approved claims be entered in each months' minutes. A good way to handle claims would be as follows: (a) fix a cutoff date for receiving claims - Wednesday, noon, before the Friday fiscal court meeting; (b) prepare a claim list and mail or give a copy to all magistrates, county treasurer and county attorney to study; (c) if there are any questions about any claims check on them before the fiscal court meeting; (d) present claims at meeting; (e) approve; (f) pay.
- That you do not give anyone a lump sum expense allowance as this is illegal. For example, on 4-21-82 motion by Gerald DeRossett, 2nd by Eddie Caudill, it is hereby moved by the court to return the \$6,507 in excess fees from the sheriff, back to the sheriff, to keep his office in operation.
- That you request a personnel study from the Department of Local Government for better utilization of your present employees. This would eliminate over-staffing and give you information on salaries and structures of other county governments.

- That you eliminate emergency transfers and amendments on a daily basis. If you properly follow your budget, these will be necessary only on a limited scale. Your fiscal court may make transfers from one account to another within the same fund when necessary. Your court may also transfer from one fund to another, but in most cases the funds must be returned to the original fund before the fiscal year ends.
- That your fiscal court collect excess fees of \$20,843 due from your former sheriff, ~~Doug Lewis~~, and also \$51,047.12 in excess fees owed by your present clerk, Ollie Robinson, as per audit dated October 6, 1981. The statute of limitations must be considered here.
- That you and your fiscal court take a close look at the county audit report issued by Burchett and Bottoms for the fiscal year ending 6-30-82. This report makes no mention of numerous road fund, revenue sharing fund or local government economic assistance fund violations previously mentioned in this letter which could result in a loss of funds for Floyd County.
- That you correct your court order showing from what accounts county salaries are to be paid. Your 6-28-82 order reveals (Exhibit IV) all summer employees were paid from Road Account #100-A-5. Your court coordinator was paid from Road Account #100-A-5. This was improper, as they did not perform any road work.
- That you and your court prepare and adopt a proper road program each month based on funds available.
- That you, as county judge/executive, vote on each motion in court. If you do not vote, you are still counted as voting with the majority.
- That you require a monthly financial report from the Floyd County Solid Waste District because your fiscal court guaranteed their \$51,000 bank loan.
- That your office physically prepare your county payroll and save \$750 per month you are currently paying Computer Utilities (John Allen) for preparing the county payroll; 146 checks, an average of \$5.20 per check.
- That your county treasurer physically prepare the county jailer payroll. Computer Utilities (John Allen) charges you \$400 per month to prepare fourteen salary checks (7 twice a month). The preparation cost is over \$28.57 per check.
- That your sheriff and county clerk remit their payroll withholdings the first day of each month so the county treasurer can file his reports on time. There are automatic penalties for late filings on Social Security reports. If any fee official is late remitting to your county treasurer, the treasurer should file the report and let that fee official pay any penalty that results from his inaction.
- That you and your fiscal court consider all alternatives before acting on requests. If you agree to do something, where will the funding come from, etc?
- That you carefully check your payroll report which reveals several state offices your county is partially funding. Your fiscal court may continue this practice if they so wish and funds are available. Those employees are as follows: (a) Commonwealth Attorney, J. Allen - \$583.32 monthly (b) Court Coordinator, M. McCormick - \$1,000.00 monthly (c) Ass't. Commonwealth Attorney, A. Burchett - \$500.00 monthly (d) District Court Judge's Office, Pluma Stumbo - \$400.00 monthly
- That you and your court check with your county attorney and his assistant about all county legal problems and save \$500 per month in other legal fees currently being paid to Damon and Caudill, Attorneys.
- That you and your court check into your park and recreation personnel still on your payroll as to their present duties and if they are working each day.
- That you and your fiscal court members check your expenditures list before turning them in for payment. The only checks that should be issued to you, your deputy judge/executive, magistrates and other county employees should be a salary or expense check from a properly budgeted account and also documented. Magistrates do not have to document if they are only receiving their \$300 expense allowance. However, if they receive any additional expense monies they must then document everything for that month.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

- Kentucky Constitution, Section 157:  
  
"No county, city, town, taxing district, or other municipality, shall be authorized or permitted to become indebted, in any manner or for any purpose, to an amount exceeding, in any year, the income and revenue provided for such year, without the assent of two-thirds of the voters thereof, voting at an election to be held for that purpose; and any indebtedness contracted in violation of this section shall be void. Nor shall such contract be enforceable by the person with whom made; nor shall such municipality ever be authorized to assume the same."
- Officials who contract beyond the county's debt limit must be regarded as under penalty of malfeasance in office. (Fulton County v. Bell Telephone, 146 SW 2d 15).
- Any obligation incurred in violation of the debt limit is void; and any obligation which exceeds the revenue that was reasonable anticipated from taxes is void. (Payne v. City of Covington, 95 SW 2d 278).
- A city (county) is definitely forbidden to become indebted in any matter or for any purpose in an amount exceeding in any year the income and revenue provided for such year. (Meyers v. City of Louisville, 220 SW 2d 852).
- The County Budget Act, KRS 68.210, provides that the State Local Finance Officer may "investigate, examine and supervise the accounts and operations of all local governments and local government officers."
- Since adoption of the County Budget Act and the decision in the Payne case, the public is on notice that credit extended in disregard of the Constitution is at the creditor's risk. (Griffin v. Clay County, 201 SW 2d 733).
- The County Budget Act is designed to require safe and sane methods of handling county finances (Cawood v. Stivers, 430 SW 2d 327)
- The acts and omissions of Floyd County as set forth in the Statement of Facts warrant the State Local Finance Officer taking the action set forth in the following order.

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# State Cabinet Helps In Disaster Areas

When disaster strikes Kentucky, such as the tornados of 1974 and floods of 1977, one of the first state agencies to come to the aid of the citizens of the Commonwealth is the Cabinet for Human Resources.

The Cabinet for Human Resources has much of the responsibility of caring for people during and after disasters in Kentucky. They are among the first called by the state Disaster and Emergency Services division during floods and other natural disasters.

"From the moment Human Resources staff is notified by Disaster and Emergency Services, things start happening," says Human Resources chief disaster coordinator Dick Greenwell. "During disasters, our first and paramount concern is that affected people are kept healthy."

Greenwell is the Human Resources staff person who directs needed Human Resources services to disaster sites. In times of disaster, he answers only to the state Disaster and Emergency Services division.

"Keeping people healthy" is the reason that the cabinet's Department for Health Services' coordinator Joe Miller usually accompanies Greenwell to the state's disaster control center in Frankfort. The Health Services Department can, almost instantly, coordinate and arrange for doctors, nurses and other medical personnel to be sent to a disaster area, if local media resources are overwhelmed, according to Miller.

Medical personnel and equipment are usually sent to disaster sites to care for persons with acute medical emergencies, said Miller. "After the acute emergencies are cared for, medical personnel turn their efforts to preventing outbreaks of diseases by inoculating the affected population," he continued. "Local health agencies can usually handle this without much help. But in large disasters, such as the Eastern Kentucky floods of 1977, greater numbers of medical personnel need to be called in from other areas," Miller explained.

The Health Services Department also is responsible for testing food for purity and certain water supplies for contamination. "Our laboratories in Frankfort can work around the clock, if necessary, to insure contaminated food or water is identified," added Miller.

If there is no ready supply of food in a disaster area, Human Resources officials can arrange for U.S. Department of Agriculture surplus food commodities to be shipped into the area. This food is distributed to organizations like the Salvation Army and the Red Cross to prepare hot, balanced meals for people forced out of their homes, and for cleanup volunteers as well, Greenwell said.

"After we are certain that there are no lives threatened by food shortages or medical problems, our efforts turn to keeping existing Human Resources offices in the area open," noted Greenwell. Sometimes this involves moving offices out of a flooded area to a place nearby on high ground, he added.

Most of the Human Resources local offices' day-to-day operations serve the least fortunate people in normal times, Greenwell said. "In times of disaster, it is imperative that people continue to be served by programs such as food stamps, Aid to Families

with Dependent Children and Unemployment Insurance. Unless a national disaster area is declared by the federal government, the amount of aid the Cabinet for Human Resources can render is strictly limited to providing medical services, food and the operation of existing programs," concluded Greenwell. "If and when a federal disaster area is declared, our job changes dramatically."

## Star In Romantic Comedy

"American Playhouse" presents "Who Am I This Time?," a romantic, light comedy based on a short story by Kurt Vonnegut, Jr. The production, which encores Wednesday, March 16 at 10 p.m., stars Christopher Walken and Susan Sarandon. Jonathan Demme, who directed the much-acclaimed motion picture, "Melvin and Howard," is the director.

In "Who Am I This Time?," Walken portrays Harry Nash, a shy, young amateur actor who has won acclaim for roles such as Abraham Lincoln and Cyrano de Bergerac. His latest production is "A Streetcar Named Desire," in which he plays the lead, Stanley Kowalski. Once on stage, all of Harry's inhibitions disappear.

## NATIONAL MATH PROGRAM SET FOR JUNIOR HIGH STUDENTS

A new program called Mathcounts is the first nationwide effort of education, industry and the engineering profession to combat the growing problem of math illiteracy. The program was announced recently by its sponsors, the National Society of Professional Engineers, the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics, the CNA Insurance Companies and the National Science Foundation.

In the next few months junior high teachers throughout the country and U.S. territories will receive Mathcounts kits from local chapters of the engineering society and CNA which explain the combination coaching program and contests.

**Census Bureau  
To Survey Here**

Local representatives of the Bureau of the Census will conduct a survey of employment in this area during the work week of March 14-19, 1983. Joseph S. Harris, Director of the Bureau's Regional Office in Charlotte, announced today.

In addition to the usual questions on current employment, the March survey will include others concerning the work experience and income of household members last year, and whether they have moved since March 1982.

The survey is conducted for the U.S. Department of Labor in a scientifically designed sample of approximately 71,000 households throughout the United States. Employment and unemployment statistics based on results of this survey are used to provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the nation.

For example, in January 1983 the survey indicated that of the 110.5 million men and women in the civilian labor force, 100.8 million were employed. The nation's unemployment rate was 10.4 percent, 0.3 percent lower than reported in December.

Information supplied by individuals participating in the survey is kept strictly confidential by law and the results are used only to compile statistical totals.

**Twin Brothers  
Blaze Victims**

(In The Troublesome Creek Times, March 2)

A house fire on Beaver Creek claimed the lives of twin brothers early Friday morning.

Thirty-eight-year-old Clarence and Lawrence Slone died in the blaze which started around 2:30 a.m. in the wooden frame house approximately three-fourths of mile up Ferd Slone Branch (also called Dick Hall Hollow).

The men's mother, Monti Cains, her 15-year-old son Fred and her three-year-old grandchild escaped from the house while it was engulfed in flames.

The two brothers, who were mentally retarded, resisted the rescue attempt made by their younger brother. One body was found in his bed and the other less than three feet from the door.

Deputy State Fire Marshal Doris Shepherd said that Fred reported that the blaze apparently started when a pair of pants hanging near an open space heater caught fire and then caught the back bedroom wall on fire.

The youth reported that he was awakened by the fire and the house was already filled with smoke. He awakened his mother and yelled to the others in the house. He and his mother tried to put out the blaze.

The youth was forced to use an axe to knock the door down so the family could escape. The door was padlocked at night to prevent the twins from leaving the house at night to roam outside.

Mrs. Shepherd praised the efforts of the 15-year-old. "He's a bright kid—he was able to get the others to safety and he did everything possible to try to save the two men."

She added that the victims were probably so frightened by the fire that they fought off attempts to be rescued.

The house was burning out of control when the Beaver Creek Rescue Squad and Fire Department arrived at about 3 a.m. The Hindman Fire Department, which first received the call and called the Beaver squad, also responded.

However, many found that suitable housing was not available for them and their families. High interest rates, lack of adequate water and sewage facilities, lack of suitable building sites and runaway inflation have caused many of our people to have doubts about home ownership.

There have been some bright spots however. The housing projects in Prestonsburg and Martin, the building of homes in David and the renovation of Wheelwright have helped many of our people obtain adequate housing. There is much left to be done. We need a comprehensive government policy to bring together private developers, lending institutions and public policy to make it possible for our people to build and own their own homes.

Senator Benny Ray Bailey has fought for more housing for East Kentucky. The Kentucky Housing Corporation, while not perfect, has provided more and more funds for construction of new homes. We need to have a new development policy that encourages, not hinders, land development associated with road construction and surface mining so that suitable housing sites can be constructed. Our water and sewage services need a major governmental commitment for construction, repair and maintenance and, state government needs to assist lending institutions in providing finances for housing construction.

The job of providing home ownership for our people is a complex one and does not lend itself to easy answers. Benny Ray Bailey understands the complexities of the problem and works in the legislature to assist us. That's why we need to keep him on the job.

The outlook for adult leukemia patients is quite hopeful today. The major reason for this is the development of chemotherapy treatments. Since you have just been diagnosed, possibly by your family physician, it is important for you to know that treatment should be prescribed by an oncologist (cancer specialist). A hematopathologist should be consulted if there is any difficulty in determining the exact classification of your leukemia. A patient's survival depends on the initial treatment, so it is wise to have the most up-to-date treatment from a specialist.

As a cancer patient, you will be exposed to a whole new vocabulary, one that is highly technical and that may be confusing to the layperson. By all means, insist that anything to do with your disease and its treatment be explained fully to you in language you understand. When you know you will be getting test results, decisions about what treatment course to follow, etc., it is also wise to take a trusted friend or relative with you who will write down what is said so you can refer back to it later. You may also want to form the habit of writing down questions between visits to your physician. Remember that it is your body that is being treated and that you have a right to ask and be informed.

The most common forms of adult leukemia are chronic lymphoid leukemia (CLL) and acute myelogenous leukemia (AML). Our brochure, "What You Need to Know About Adult Leukemia," explains these and other forms of leukemia.

Since leukemia is a cancer of the blood, understanding the function of the blood helps in understanding the disease. Blood is composed of cells and fluid. There are red cells which carry oxygen and food to the body, white cells which fight infection, and platelets

which aid in the clotting of blood. All these cells are produced in the bone marrow, where they stay until mature. When immature white cells get into the bloodstream, leukemia is present.

Blood tests are a part of the life of a leukemia patient, for they tell the physician the state of your disease and how you are progressing.

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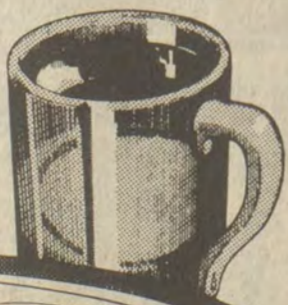

PIKEVILLE

STATE AID SECURED

County Attorney Zach Justice appeared before the Highway Commission of Kentucky at their meeting of last week, and prevailed upon the commission to take over for maintenance the central bridge and the stretch of road between it and Dow Chaney's home. The county recently spent approximately \$13,000 improving this bridge and annually spends \$2,500 on its upkeep. With its maintenance in the hands of the state, Pike county will be saved at least \$10,000 within a four or five year period. Another great advantage of state ownership is that the commission proposes to increase the tonnage capacity from the present capacity of four to six tons to 12 tons.

Mr. Justice asked for the letting of the remainder of the Mayo Trail but was informed that the letting could not be done this year because of lack of funds. The statement was made that it would be arranged that the remainder of the Trail should be let at the January, 1928, letting, but since that action of the commission next year is outside the jurisdiction of the present commission, this statement carries little weight.

In a conversation with Chief Engineer of Maintenance Partee, Mr. Justice was assured that the work of graveling the Pikeville end of the Williamson road would be started by the 25th of this month, and that all the bad places in the road would be improved so as to make the road passable during all the coming winter.

INSANE, MAN KILLS SELF

In a fit of insanity, Mose Justice, 41, killed himself by blowing the top of his head off with a shotgun Tuesday evening of last week at his home near Vi, Ky. Justice was subject to occasional attacks of insanity and in his final one had run all his family away from home except his wife. She had hidden his gun and ammunition, but unknown to her, he had himself concealed one load of shot. He demanded his gun from her and she reluctantly gave it to him, handing it over only because she thought that it was unloaded and he had no loads for it.

Justice instantly loaded the gun, and unable to stop him, his wife fled. A moment later the fatal shot was fired which entered the head near the left ear and tore away the entire top of the skull.

Squire George Justice, who was here on business at the time of the suicide, returned home Wednesday and was advised of the occurrence. He held an inquest Thursday and the evidence brought forward, he said, unquestionably pointed to suicide in insanity, as stated.

Justice was a farmer and the head of a large family. He leaves his wife and six children.

INJURED BY SLATE FALL

Tom Maynard was caught under a slate fall Monday at Big Shoal and his back was broken. He is in the Methodist hospital here. Maynard is about 27 years old and is a resident of Coal Run.

He held them to eight well-scattered hits and struck out seven. The features of the game was the hitting of Roberts, who made three hits out of three trips to the plate, and Cyrus, of Pikeville; and the fielding of Edwards was good.

The guests included Walter Hatcher,illard Leslie, Oscar Jackson and Archie Jackson.

WILDCAT'S PLAYMATE

An authentic wildcat's playmate and his wildcat were in Pikeville last week. This person was, and still is, for that matter, Virgil Johnson, of Grays, Mo. Tennessee, who supplies and acts as keeper of the wildcats used as mascots for the football team of the University of Kentucky.

Mr. Johnson has been located at Hellier this summer but returned to Lexington last week, taking the current wildcat with him. This one, he said, is the first that has ever survived one season and started a second as mascot. Evidently Kentucky State's "squirrels" are rough on wildcats. Mr. Johnson formerly lived in Pikeville and graduated from Pikeville College Academy in 1921.

**Deadly Cobra Helps Indian Villagers**

Is the deadly cobra blessed with special powers? The people of India think so. Since ancient times, in fact, the Hindus have worshipped the poisonous cobra as a symbol of one of their gods. A tribe in southern India calls the cobra "null pambu," or "good snake," according to Ranger Rick's Nature Magazine, the monthly publication of the National Wildlife Federation.

Because there are so many people and so many snakes in India, people occasionally are bitten by the deadly cobra. But many more are helped by the snake. Cobras prey on the millions of rats and mice which transmit disease and eat grain that is desperately needed to feed the millions of people in India.

Cobra venom is also made into a painkilling medicine that is better and safer than many other medicines. Scientists continue to search for other promising uses of the venom.

The cobra's main use for its venom, however, is self-protection, according to Ranger Rick.

During its vulnerable youth, the cobra is the prey of other predators such as the catlike "civet" or the badgerlike "ratel." Even peacocks will eat young cobras like spaghetti, but all these dangers subside as the young cobra matures and becomes more deadly. Even the famous cobra-killer, the mongoose, is wary of adult cobras.

To the people of the village Shirala, in west-central India, the adult cobra is cause for celebration, as villagers have "Naga Panchami," or "cobra day," with the snake as the main attraction.

On a day of their monsoon season, when frequent rains soften the earth, the villagers go into their fields and gently dig cobras from their nests and bring them back to the village in large clay pots to await the festival.

On the morning of the festival, the villagers gather with happy shouts, carrying their pots of cobras to a small shrine where the cobras are let out to be worshipped and given offerings of fruit, rice and flowers. By noon, the celebration will have moved back to the village to continue until nightfall.

When nightfall comes, the worship is over, and the cobras are placed carefully back into their pots. They are released the next day to slither off and protect the villagers' crops by feeding on rats and mice for another year—a cobra's natural duty.

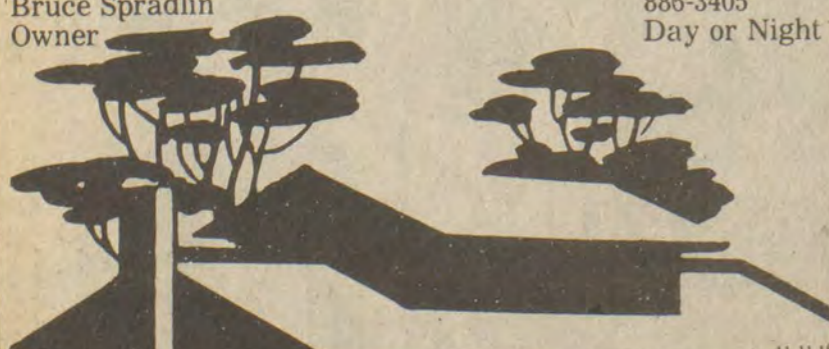

 One of the finest films was made in 1957 by MGM. In it Presley starred as a hotheaded Southerner who was serving time for manslaughter. While in jail he was taught by cellmates to play guitar and sing the blues. When he was released, he attained fame and fortune and a classic swelled head.  
 The film itself is famous for featuring the definitive Presley production number, the dance version of the title song. To this day it remains one of the top rock 'n' roll classics of all time.

**The deadly Triangle**

Since 1945, hundreds of ships and planes, and thousands of people have vanished without a trace in an area of the Atlantic Ocean off Florida known as the Bermuda Triangle. On Tuesday, March 15, Nova investigates the mystery surrounding these strange disappearances in "The Case of the Bermuda Triangle."

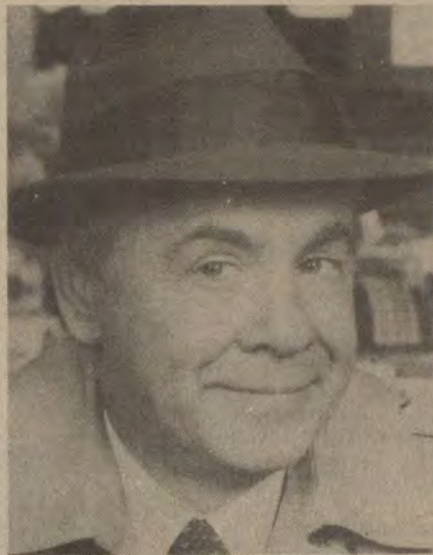
It's reported that an average of four boats and two airplanes set off into the Triangle every month — and never return. Some pilots are said to avoid the area because their instruments unaccountably stop functioning there.

These events have led some people to think something powerful, sinister, or perhaps supernatural is lying in — or perhaps under — that part of the Atlantic.

Is there a reasonable explanation for these strange reports and events? Nova traces some of the most famous reports, searching for clues, testing theories and finally penetrating the mystery of the Triangle.

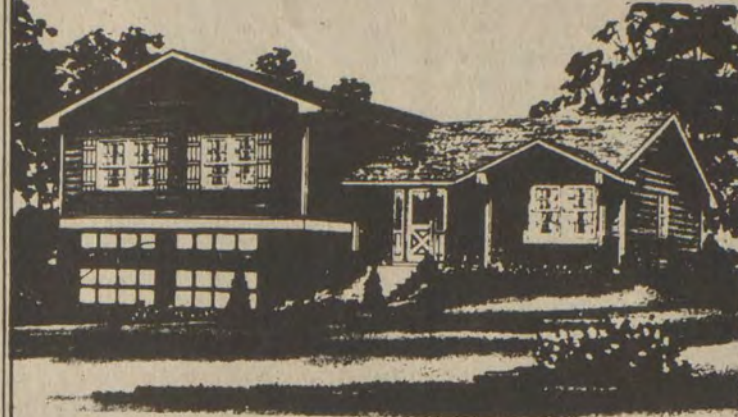
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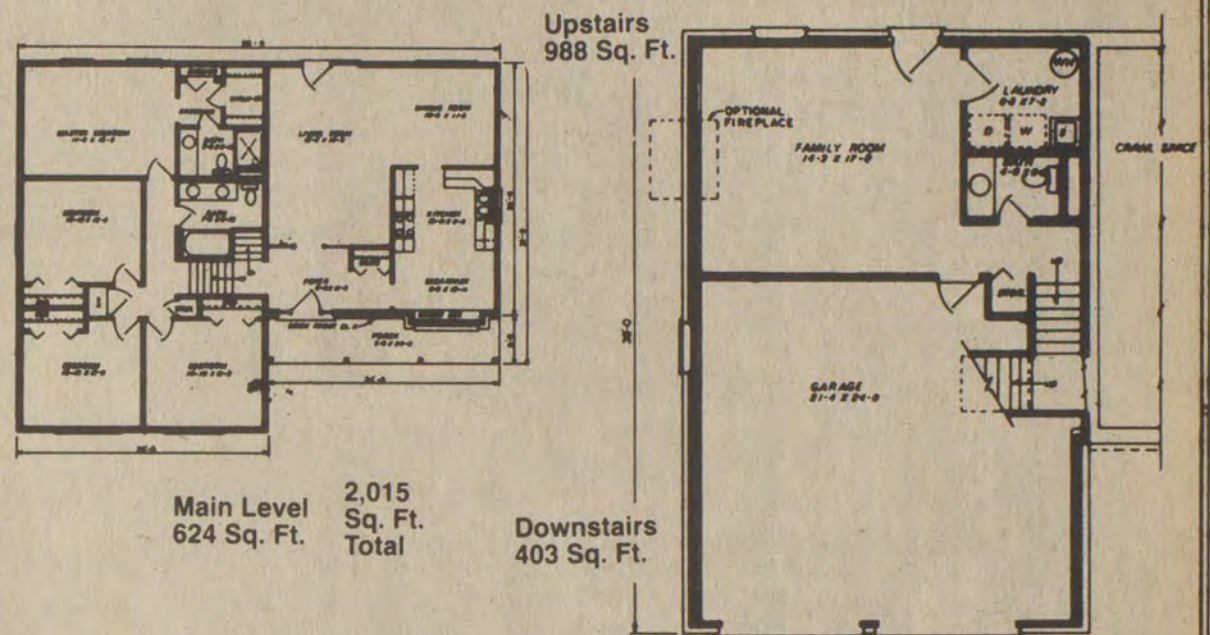

**Grant made U of L For Research Project**

The University of Louisville School of Dentistry has received a grant of \$40,402 from the American Fund for Dental Health (AFDH) for a research project concerned with the effects of hydrogen peroxide on bone tissue. Robert J. Desmond, a Louisville native and executive director of AFDH, announced the award.

The study, "Inhibition of Bone by Hydrogen Peroxide: Role in Periodontal Disease and Therapy," is being undertaken by Dr. Warren K. Ramp in the dental school's Department of Oral Biology. The project begins in July 1983 and will be conducted for two years, concentrating on the general effects of hydrogen peroxide on various types of bone. The study has practical significance because hydrogen peroxide is sometimes used in the treatment of gum disease.

The American Fund for Dental Health, headquartered in Chicago, is the nation's only voluntary, non-profit agency raising funds and making grants for the support of research and education in dentistry. This is its first grant to the University of Louisville and one of 13 given to schools and organizations across the country.

The Kentucky Easter Seal Society owns and operates rehabilitation centers to help people with physical handicapping conditions. Two of the centers are resident camps—Camp Kysoc at Carrollton and Camp Green Shores at McDaniels.

**Special Pays Tribute To Arthur Rubenstein**

Monday night, March 21, KET will present "Great Performances: Rubenstein at 90," at 9 p.m.

Arthur Rubenstein, acknowledged as one of the world's greatest piano virtuosos, died in December, 1982. In this encore presentation of a 1977 special honoring Mr. Rubenstein on the occasion of his 90th birthday, he is featured in concert with the London Symphony Orchestra conducted by Andre Previn, and in an exclusive interview at his home in Paris with Robert MacNeil.

Mr. Rubenstein performs two compositions which he describes as "close and dear friends"—Camille Saint Saen's "Piano Concerto in G Minor," which he played at his New York debut at Carnegie Hall on January 8, 1906, and Edward Greig's "Piano Concerto in A Minor." Both performances were taped at Fairfield Hall, Croydon, England.

"Great Performances: Rubenstein at 90," is a production of WNET, New York public television.

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
