## Burned Body Found, Murder, Arson Seen

### Stumbo Parole In Plea-Bargain Ending of Case

As part of a plea bargain struck in circuit court here Tuesday, Steven Isaac Stumbo, 26, of West Prestonsburg, pleaded guilty to second-degree manslaughter in the 1979 shooting of his brother-in-law, Larry Johnson.

Circuit Judge Hollie Conley, following the recommendation of Commonwealth's Attorney James R. Allen, sentenced Stumbo to 10 years in prison—the maximum for second-degree manslaughter—and acknowledged a prosecution request that he be paroled immediately.

In order to give the state parole board time to consider the parole request, Judge Conley stayed the new sentence for 90 days.

This week's plea arrangement follows the reversal in April this year of Stumbo's 1979 murder conviction. In overturning that conviction, the Sixth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals cited

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### Teacher-Victim Thought Killed Prior to Blaze

The discovery of a charred body inside an automobile that had been reduced to twisted metal by fire and a drop of a few hundred feet over Sizemore Mountain Monday afternoon poses the possibility of murder and arson, authorities said Tuesday.

Found inside the vehicle were the remains of Glenda Sharon Marshall, 35, of Minnie, a teacher in the county school system and wife of Doug Marshall.

Although official findings of Coroner Roger Nelson and Dr. David Wolfe, state pathologist, had not been reported, the Pikeville post, Kentucky State Police, said Tuesday morning that the woman had apparently been killed by a blow to the head before the vehicle burned.

Deputy Sheriff Harold Johnson, a county officer at the scene high on the mountain separating Right and Left Beaver Creek soon after the bizarre tragedy was reported, said one witness, a woman who lives nearby, told of seeing a man leave the car which burned and depart the scene in another vehicle which she described as yellow.

The auto plunged down the hillside several hundred feet and came to rest at the roadway where it wound up the mountain, it was said. "You couldn't tell the make or model of the car, it was burned so bad," Johnson said.

If it was murder, no motive has been established Tuesday afternoon, and no arrest had been made. State Detective Danny Stumbo and Coroner Nelson were back at the scene Tuesday.

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### Grants To Help Park Work Here

Two state grants have been awarded for improvements at Archer Park, members of Prestonsburg city council were told at a special meeting last Wednesday.

A \$15,000 grant will go toward construction of a new playground and a \$10,000 grant will enable replacement of lights on the men's and women's softball fields and the Little League field, it was said.

Both grants, which were awarded by the Heritage Conservation and Recreation Commission of the state Department for Local Government, require that 50 percent of the funds be contributed locally. The Archer Park board will put up half the playground money and the city council agreed Wednesday to provide \$5000 toward the lights project.

A third grant application, for \$15,000 to build a miniature golf course at the park, was turned down.

Money for the successful projects will be released in August and work on them is expected to begin soon thereafter, said David Evans, city administrator.

In other business, the council voted to accept the resignation of police officer Randy Ferrell who is said to have accepted a position with the Pikeville police department.

A hearing on the use of municipal road aid money was set for 6:30 p.m., June 27.

### Campbell Dies, Newsome Held Without Bond

Ellis Joe "Bo" Campbell, 27-year-old Water Gap man, was found fatally wounded last Wednesday afternoon on the Spurlock fork of Middle Creek, and Frankie Newsome, 22, of this area, is being held in jail here without bond on a murder charge.

Apparently, there were no witnesses to the shooting of Campbell. Residents of the Conley fork of Spurlock told authorities they had seen Campbell and Newsome driving in the vicinity and that a short time later they heard one or more shots. Campbell was found in the roadway with a bullet from a small-caliber weapon in his head and three others in his chest and abdomen.

The murder weapon has not been recovered. It was indicated that Campbell was unarmed.

No motive for the shooting has been established, but officers said the two men had been drinking. Newsome

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## Sheriff Critical As Budget Voted

A final vote on adoption of the 1983-'84 county budget drew sharp criticism from Sheriff Henry Hale at a meeting of the fiscal court last Friday, the sheriff warning that he would be unable to continue night patrols as a result of the fiscal court's failure to provide for his deputies' gasoline expenses.

Hale had asked the county to budget \$200 a month in expenses for each of two deputies. The expense money, which was included in this year's budget, was lost in cuts that trimmed by a third county support for the sheriff's office in the 1983-'84 fiscal year.

A suggestion by Magistrates Gerald DeRossett and Lowell Samons that the proposed 6 percent tax on alcoholic beverage sales could pay the deputies' expenses drew a protest from Huey Darby, who said that such a tax had been declared illegal.

Assistant County Attorney Eric Hall said the legality of the tax—a vote on which is expected at the fiscal court's July 15 meeting—has never been adjudicated by the courts.

Yet another idea for funding the sheriff's deputies came from Magistrate

Kenneth Roberts, who recommended cutting the needed \$4800 from the salary of the deputy judge-executive.

Morris Isaac was named to that post last Thursday and his salary was fixed Friday at \$18,000. While the figure is \$5220 higher than the deputy judge earned in the last administration, the increase is justified, said Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo, in view of the fact that the deputy judge will now serve also as county planner and flood plain administrator.

Both the budget and the deputy judge's salary were adopted over Roberts' objection.

Sixty-five employees were hired for the new fiscal year, on a motion of Magistrate Roberts, whose daughter, Vickie Martin, was among those hired. Mrs. Martin, who lost her \$16,000-a-year job as flood plain administrator in a recent reorganization of county offices, was hired as a heavy equipment operator at an hourly wage of \$6.50.

Although the project was apparently not advertised as required by law, the court awarded a \$36,100 bid for

## Water System Bids at Martin Expected Soon

Architects' plans for a 60-unit housing complex are in the final stages, bids should be let this summer for rebuilding the town's water system, the mayor and council appear to have patched up their long-standing differences, and future plans include a new municipal building, a swimming pool and a lighted athletic field.

At long last, said City Councilman Denzil Halbert this week, the news from Martin is good.

After waging a long, and finally losing, battle to see his own plans realized, Mayor Larry Hall is now proving "very cooperative" in implementing plans favored by a majority on the city council for refurbishing the city's leaky water system, Halbert said.

While the mayor argued for expanding the Beaver-Elkhorn system to enable it to supply Martin, the council's plan calls for reconstruction of the city's own

## Bar Association Oks Master Commissioner For Divorce Cases

A proposal by Circuit Judge Hollie Conley to share the burden of divorce cases with Master Commissioner Marshal Davidson won the support of the Floyd County Bar Association by only a slim margin last Friday and, even then, only after a controversial provision was dropped from the proposal.

Under the plan, contested cases will be handled initially by the master commissioner. To pay for his services, a special \$20 filing fee will be added to the usual \$75 fee and an additional \$10 will be charged for filing a child support, custody, or other motion.

Dropped was a provision that would have required litigants to pay at a rate of \$40 per hour for hearings lasting longer than 30 minutes.

Some attorneys had objected that that fee might have prevented poorer clients from exercising their legal rights. Even without the provision, the proposal was approved by the attorneys' group by only 11 votes to 10.

## Two Die in Friday Wrecks

Two men are dead and an elderly woman seriously injured as the result of separate traffic accidents last Friday.

Rocky Meade, 22, of Harold, died at 1:55 p.m. Friday at Our Lady of the Way Hospital, Martin, about four hours after his auto was struck by a truck loaded with asphalt at the Allen intersection of US 23 and KY 1428.

Ballard Ousley, 75, of Risner, retired miner and merchant, succumbed at 9 p.m. Monday at the UK Medical Center, Lexington after having been injured in the collision of his car and an unloaded coal truck on new KY 80 at the Stephens Branch intersection, near Martin, Friday afternoon. His wife, Bessie Allen Ousley, was seriously injured and is a patient in the Lexington hospital.

State police said the Allen collision resulted when the asphalt truck could not stop as the traffic light changed at the intersection. The truck, traveling north on US 23, struck the Meade car on the driver's side as it was crossing the main highway from KY 1428. The driver of the truck was not held.

No official report of the Stephens Branch wreck was available from State Police. It was reported that the Ousley car pulled onto KY 80, into the path of the truck.

Meade was a loader operator for Big D Excavating Co., Stanville. He was a son of Cloyde and Gertrude Ruth Meade, of Harold. Besides his parents, he is survived by three sisters, Sandra, Cindy

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## 20 Plead Innocent To Federal Counts

Twenty men charged in connection with an alleged plot to put a Floyd coal mine out of business pleaded not guilty to the charges in U.S. District Court in Pikeville, last Wednesday.

Nineteen were charged under the Hobbs Act, a federal anti-racketeering statute dealing with interference of commerce by threat or violence. The twentieth defendant was accused of violating federal firearms and explosives laws.

According to the June 6 indictment, the defendants planned or took part in violence aimed at shutting down the Ray-Mac mine near McDowell in February last year.

Edgar Jones, of Prestonsburg, president of JRM Coal Co., was freed on \$50,000 oral recognizance bond. The rest were freed on similar bonds of \$25,000.

U.S. District Judge G. Wix Unthank warned the men not to communicate with potential witnesses in the case "in any way that could be perceived as a threat." He scheduled a pre-trial hearing for Sept. 12 and trial for Oct. 11.

One of the defendants asked Unthank to let him take a lie-detector test. "I am a minister of God and a dedicated Christian and never in my life conspired with Edgar Jones or any of these people to bring harm to Ray-Mac," said Morris Ray Mac, 47, of Hi Hat, who is accused of buying guns and ammunition that were used against Ray-Mac. Unthank advised him to consult his lawyer about requesting a lie-detector test. "We're treating you the same as the other people," he said.

The federal grand jury indictment said Jones was underbid by Ray-Mac on a coal-sale contract; that he tried to persuade the UMWA to direct an organizing effort at Ray-Mac, a non-union operation; that he told miners working for his subcontractors to picket Ray-Mac; and that he offered to get them guns and ammunition to shut Ray-Mac down.

The Ray-Mac operation was fired on, an auger at the mine was blown up, and a coal tippie leased by the company was burned down, the indictment said.

# Unemployment Insurance Rules Change, July 1

Beginning July 1, all unemployment insurance claimants will have to report in person to their local unemployment insurance office every two weeks to continue their benefits. Cabinet for Human Resources officials announced recently. Since 1976, Kentuckians receiving regular unemployment insurance benefits have been allowed to file their initial claims at the local office and then continue their claim by mailing a pay-order card in every two weeks. Those claimants receiving extended benefits and federal supplemental compensation benefits are already required to report in person to local unemployment insurance offices every two weeks.

Department for Social Insurance Commissioner John Cubine says returning to the in-person reporting system for everyone is necessary because of the dramatic increase in overpayments.

"Overpayments in regular unemployment insurance benefits rose sharply in 1976, the year we instituted the mail-in system," Cubine said. "In 1975 we had about \$800,000 in overpayments and by 1982 that figure had risen to \$4.6 million. In 1974 overpayments were only 0.42 percent of total payments, but by 1982 overpayments increased to 1.33 percent of the total," he reported.

The Kentucky Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund has been in serious financial trouble since 1980, and 1981 Kentucky began borrowing money from the Federal Unemployment Insurance Trust fund. Action by the 1982 legislature to increase the taxable wage base and make other changes in the program proved inadequate to

keep the trust fund solvent in the face of continued high unemployment. Since 1980, over one million Kentuckians have filed initial claims for unemployment insurance and received \$626.8 million in benefits. Kentucky's Unemployment Insurance Fund now owes the federal trust fund over \$207.1 million with an added \$7.4 million in interest payments due Oct. 1.

"With our debt so large, we must put the highest possible priority on eliminating error and fraud in benefit payments," Commissioner Cubine said.

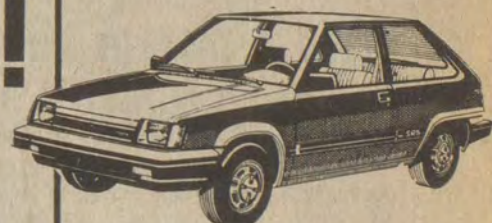

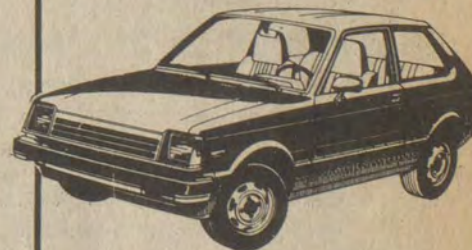

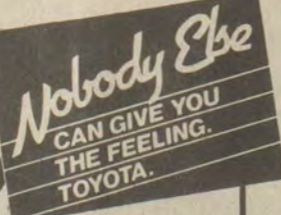

**Ambulance Services Sues Court To Void Franchise Issuance**

The right of a Watergap firm to operate a second commercial ambulance service in this county has been challenged by an operator who claims an exclusive franchise here.

In a suit filed in circuit court Monday, Harold Joseph, Jr., manager of P. and B. Ambulance Service, seeks a court order that would prevent Ezra Branham and William Adams from operating their newly-formed Respond Ambulance Service.

Joseph claims he was given an exclusive franchise by a July 16, 1982 resolution of the Floyd fiscal court. Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo and members of the fiscal court are also named as defendants in the suit because, Joseph alleges, their allowing a second ambulance service to operate here violates the court's earlier agreement with him.

Plaintiff also claims \$20,000 in damages.

County Attorney Arnold Turner, Jr. advised the court in March that the franchise granted P. and B. was not exclusive. The July 16 resolution, a copy of which has been filed with Joseph's suit, does not say the franchise is exclusive.

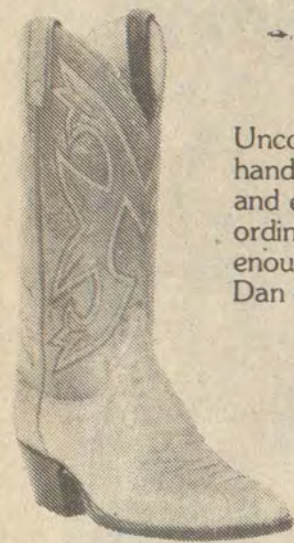

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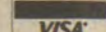

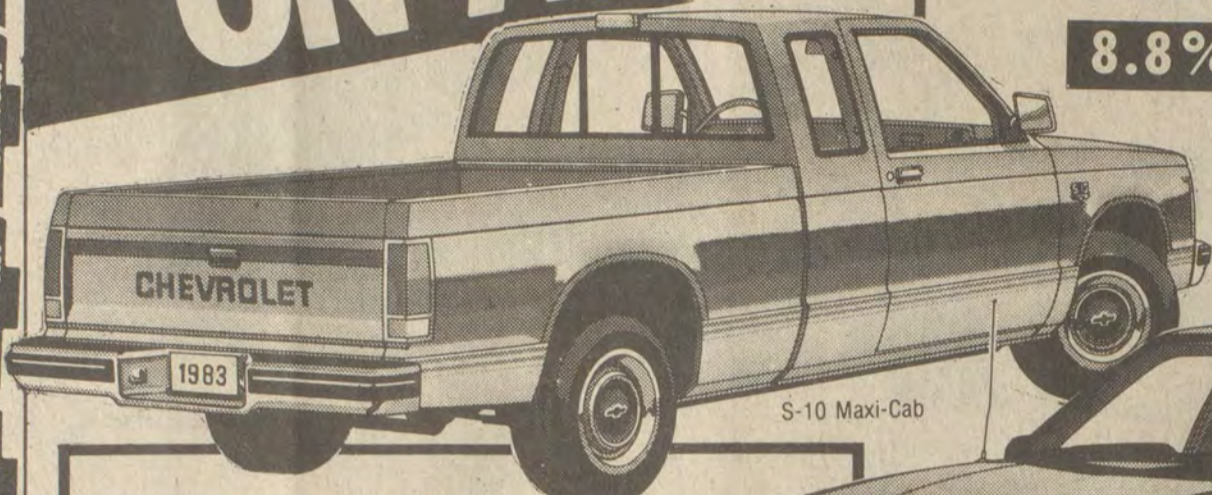

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# Bell Explains Why Telephone Rates Are Going Up

Later this month South Central Bell is expected to file for an increase in local phone rates—the biggest the company has ever requested.

According to Art Willett, local manager for Bell, the need for local rate increases has been building up for a long time, and not just here in Kentucky. Among the factors the company claims are pushing rates up.

—Competition. America's entire telephone industry—including South Central Bell—was once a legal monopoly, Willett explained. But in the past two decades, the business has become highly competitive.

“As a monopoly, regulators allowed us to use profits from long distance service and telephone rental to offset—subsidize—the cost of home phone service,” he said. “Today, about 40 cents of every dollar of long distance revenue goes to subsidize local service. The total subsidy from long distance and equipment is well over \$100 million a year, or about \$14 per month for every local line.

“There's already a lot of evidence that competition in the long distance and equipment businesses will mean lower prices. That's good for long-distance users and people buying telephones. But it means less subsidy to help pay the way for local phone lines. Before long, the subsidies will be almost totally gone. That leaves one unavoidable result: local rates must go up, and pay much more of their own way.”

—Maintaining good service. By any measure, service in Kentucky is as good as it is anywhere, Willett said. He added, however, that the demand for service is constantly increasing.

“Kentuckians make more than 9 million calls a day, and that number is growing; more of you have phone service than ever, and that number is growing too. It costs a lot to make sure the network can keep up with these demands.”

Beyond that, Willett said, some of the toughest competition of all is between states and cities vying for the jobs provided by high-tech, “information age” businesses. “The local telecommunications network—in any size town—is often a key to attracting such companies, which can boost the whole economy,” he said. “A healthy network is also important in preparing Kentuckians young and old for Information Age jobs.

“We need to keep upgrading and improving our entire communications network, to make sure that Kentuckians—at home and on the job—share in the benefits of the Information Age with the rest of our nation.”

—New Technology. “It's no secret that all areas of industry use new technology to save money,” Willett said. “The telephone business does too. Rapid advances in technology, along with changing customer needs, mean equipment doesn't last as long as it once did, and that complicates the job of keeping up with what customers want done.”

Willett said Bell needs faster depreciation rates, so the company can get out-dated equipment off its books, and more quickly recover the dollars invested in it. He said these dollars can then be put into newer, more efficient equipment that will help cut costs, and save Kentuckians in the long run.

“Whether we do this or not, other states and cities will, and they'll get a head start on the Information Age,” Willett said.

—Why doesn't someone stop competition? “It's impossible to turn back the clock,” Willett said. “Competition is here to stay. Besides, a telecommunications monopoly probably wouldn't have gotten the country ready for the Information Age as quickly as a competitive industry has. Local rate increases are the price tag for that progress, but in the long run, everyone will benefit.”

—Why doesn't Bell cut back and be more efficient? “We'll match our efficiency with anybody,” Willett said. “We've cut our work force by 25 percent since 1980, we're handling more calls than ever, and service has never been better. We continue to surpass the service standards set by regulators, as well as our own tough internal standards.”

This rate request isn't some quick fix to solve a service or efficiency problem.

“There's an awful lot of work to do in Kentucky, and we must be financially healthy to do it. That's what this rate case is all about.”

No price increase is popular, Willett admitted, but he said that once Bell gets local service prices in line with costs, and the imbalances caused by 50 years of subsidy straightened out, the future promises great things for all Kentuckians:

Full competition for many products and services, which means lower prices for many services, like long distance and equipment.

Better local service options like Measured Service (a discounted local phone service), with bigger discounts to help you cut your phone bill.

A healthy telecommunications network that's ready to put Kentucky at the front of this country's Information Age explosion.

“The Information Age is here,” Willett said, “and the places with strong telecommunications networks have a head start on it. We think Kentucky can be one of these places.”

“When all's said and done,” he added, “the most important issue is this: every state in the U.S., and every local telephone company, is facing the music—home phone rates must go up. Kentuckians must decide how important it is to stay in tune.”

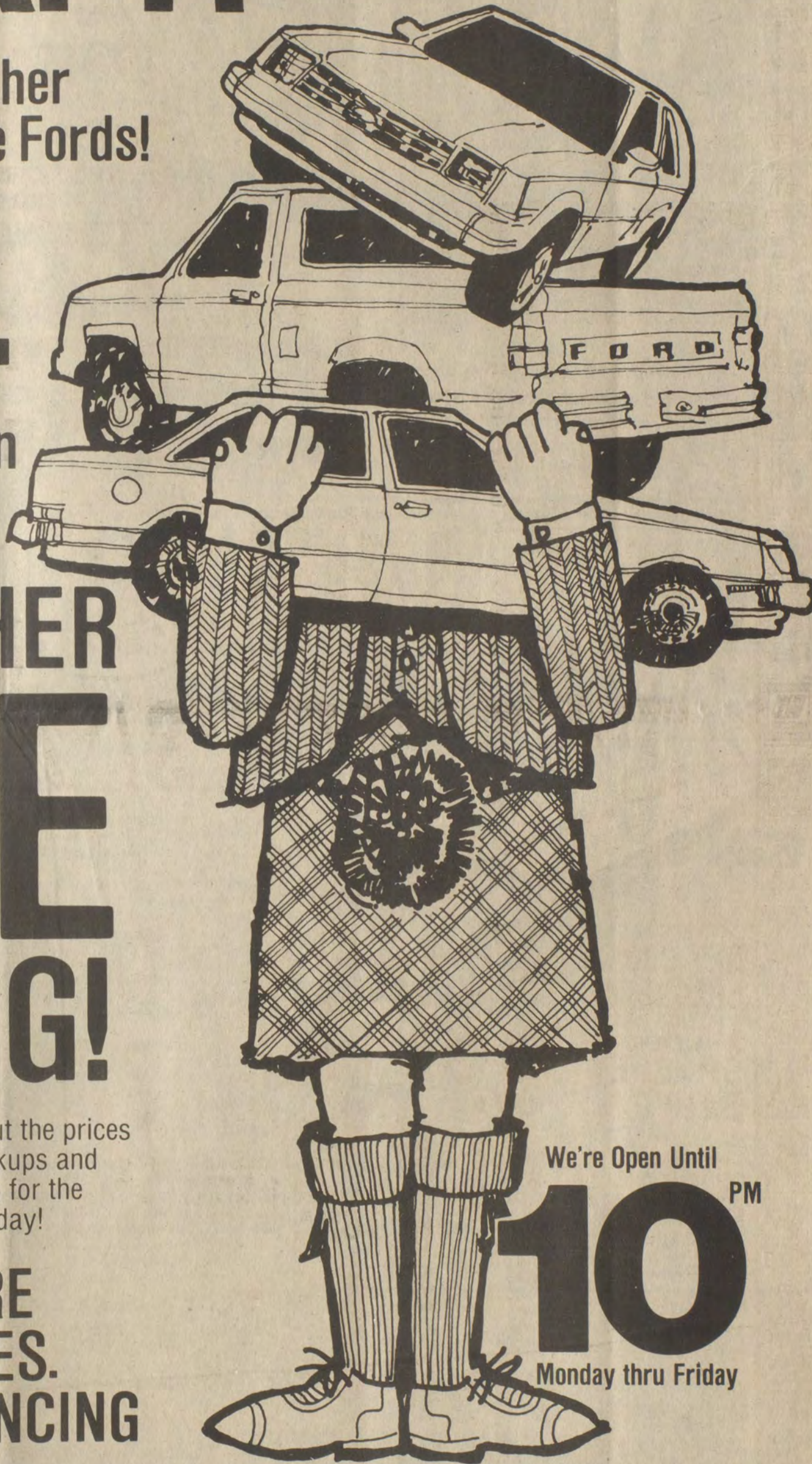

"Have you been to Martin county lately?" a smiling man asked me. I somehow knew he was a retired miner. "Yes and no," I answered, meaning yes I'd been there and no I didn't know much about coal mining there. I listened intently as he told of at age 16 starting back into the mountains with ponies in what the Kentuckians called "Pony Mines". I listened as it was not only his story but the story of thousands just like him who began as a miner at a young age before the laws and regulations of mine safety and child labor were enforced. Men began work at 13, and men they were because by going into the mines to work they lost all thoughts of childhood as children live it today. Some of those ponies lived for 35 years, I'm told.

"Wild as bucks, they were; meanest things you ever saw," he said of the ponies, but the miners were known, too, for drinking, fighting and living—it-up." Lots of people got killed, one way or another, and some, merely children, were so badly mashed up in mines so that they were marked for life.

Ponies and mules were used to tram the loads of coal out of the mines. He explained to me, "These would be a lead pony and sometimes others would be tied to the tail of another, and another and another." I noticed he frequently used terms like deep mining and names such as Consol, Princess-Elkhorn, Colonial Coal and Coke. This certainly sounded different from life as the other half of Appalachia knew it.

My recollections of coal mining at age 13 only brought back memories of two young uncles hitching Old Ribbon, a high-stepping riding horse, to a sled and going to the coal bank at the head of Wallow Hole. This was on their property and they went to and fro as they pleased. (Years later, this was to produce a fabulous quantity of high grade coal). With pick and shovel they did just that—they picked out the blocks and shoveled it in the sled to be dumped in an old coal shed to supplement the firewood to heat the big log homeplace. Two big back logs were set diagonally in the fireplace. These were cut from hardwood and lasted a long time, to hold the fire in between to prevent its rolling out on the hearth or bare floor. This was before grates were used. With a poker or small shovel, one could top the back-log and a brilliant array of sparks would ascend the chimney, then the fire would brighten up to light the whole room so grandma could see to read the Bible or sew. While shadows danced between rafters on the ceiling, children sat staring, day-dreaming into the flickering firelight as the night-birds sang their own special tunes in our hills.

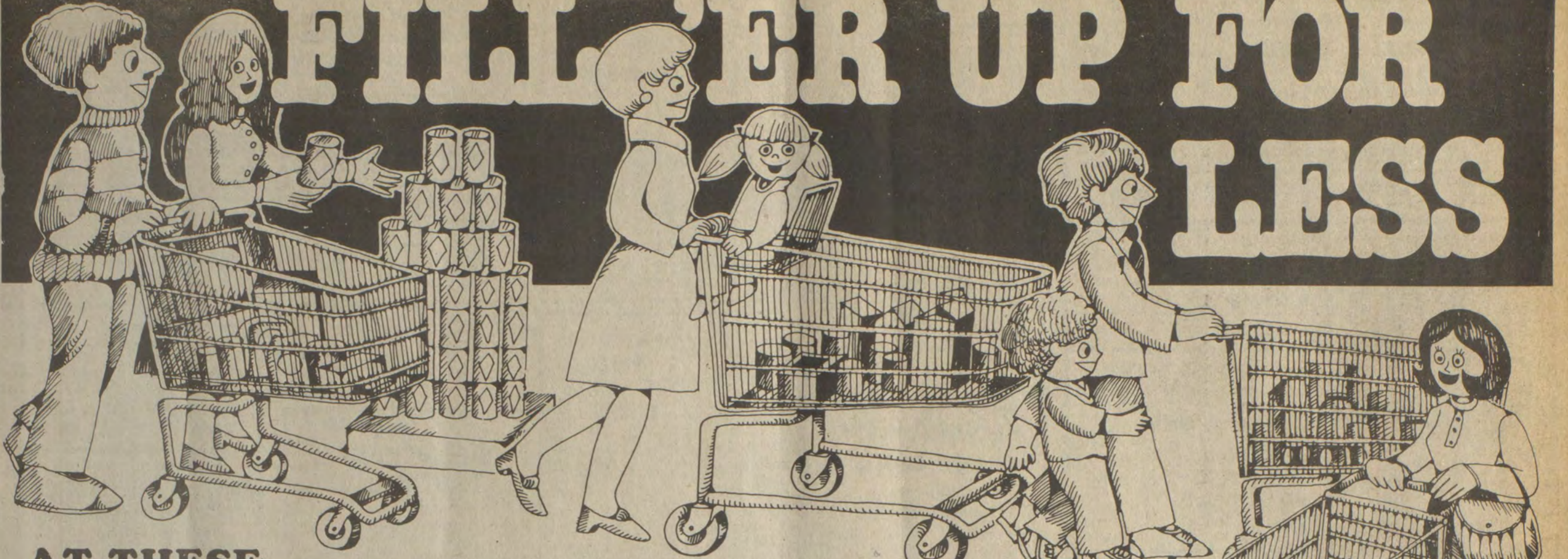



## Good News Report

You've heard the old saying, "two's company, three's a crowd." But in ACTION's Senior Companion Program (SCP), three is the number that keeps the company together and is often a lifesaver.

All too frequently an elderly married couple will be hit by debilitating illness. And when they've recovered enough to no longer be hospitalized, they are still not well enough to manage the details of their lives. If they lack the active support of family members, they may be referred to a nursing home or remain in the hospital. What this can mean, aside from the added burden of cost to the community, is the break-up of a home and the agonizing loss of an independent relationship.

This is where the third person comes in—the Senior Companion. Paul Cobb of Carbondale, Pa., is such a companion. A farmer before retirement, Paul decided several years ago to join SCP and enlisted in its training course.

SCP volunteers are usually assigned to five clients whom they assist in whatever way the situation demands. In the case of Harold and May Dougher it necessitated a special kind of attention, for without it the couple would have been forced to give up their life together.

Harold had been in a very serious automobile accident which had left him crippled and prone to strokes. His wife, a diabetic, was confined to a wheelchair. They needed someone who could do the things for them they could not do themselves—needs the healthy person takes for granted—shopping, cleaning, laundry, the glue that holds the routine of life together.

Twice a week, no matter what the weather, Paul would drive 25 miles to the Dougher's trailer home and see to the couple's wants. More than that, he became their close friend and they eagerly looked forward to his visits. At 6 o'clock one morning Paul received a desperate telephone call from Harold, "Please help me!" was his cry.

Paul left on the run, still wearing bedroom slippers. He broke speed records reaching the Dougher's home. There he found Harold on the floor, suffering a hemorrhage. Paul summoned the ambulance, calmed May and accompanied Harold to the hospital emergency room. Later the doctor saw Paul and told him, "You saved this man's life."

As a Senior Companion not all Paul Cobb's volunteer efforts are quite so dramatic, but whatever client he serves, he's ready with a helping hand and a comforting manner.

What Paul does as a Senior Companion, his wife Margaret does also. The fact is that they first met at a Senior Companion meeting. A former school teacher, Margaret specializes in speech therapy, and, like her husband, she believes that the impossible, while difficult, can be accomplished. Two years ago a doctor used the word "impossible" when he referred to Margaret's new client. It was impossible, he said, that the woman would ever walk or talk again. Today she does both, thanks to Margaret's talent and patience. Like Paul, Margaret's warmth is the added dimension that Senior Companions bring to their caring, and with it three is never a crowd but always a great comfort.

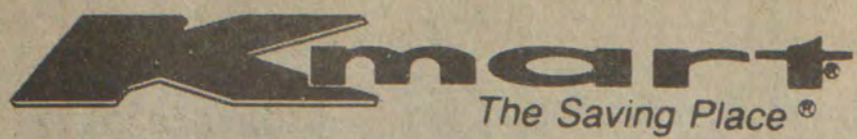

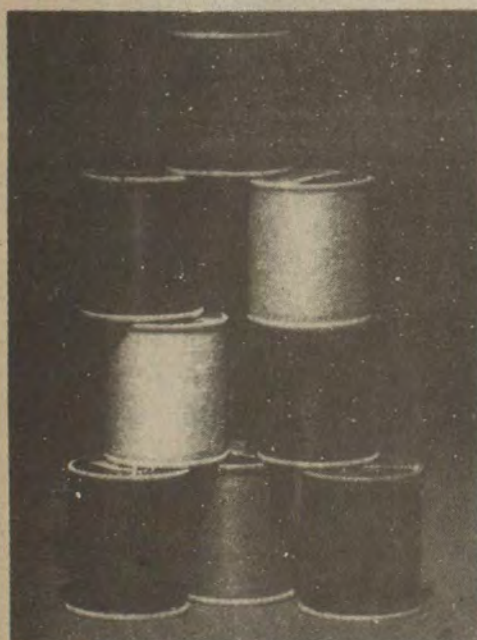

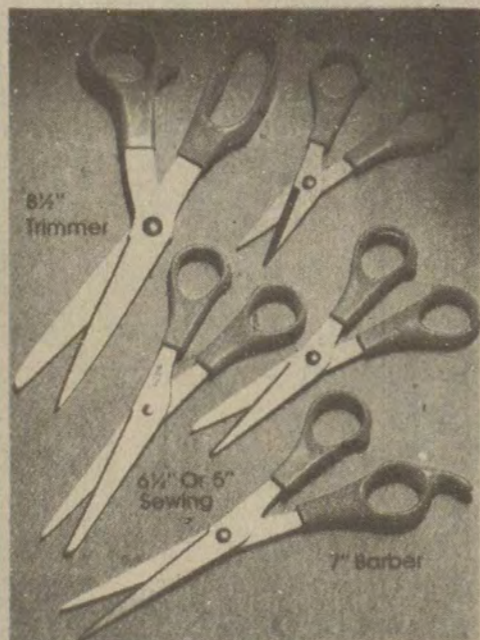

**ROCK ON**

**Eddy Grant** — "Killer on the Rampage" (Portrait/Epic) — Hate doesn't usually make a basis for good music. Early punk showed that: great emotion, lousy songs. But Eddy Grant, a reggae artist of startling intensity, can sing "Deep in my heart I abhor you" to the white overclass, and we fat-cat listeners say "Yeah, right on, let's dance." Because Grant's music is so hypnotic, so melodic, so enjoyable that "Electric Avenue" leaves people snapping their fingers rather than cowering in fear.

This is a remarkable record, more deserving of attention than anything on vinyl in a long time. It is unsettling, important, easy to listen to and great to dance to. It will probably be one of the first major commercial successes for reggae.

**The B-52's** — "Whammy" (Warner Brothers) — Calling the B-52's silly is like calling water wet; it doesn't tell you anything you didn't know already. But the Athens, Ga. quintet is getting sillier as time

goes on, to the point where the band has become nothing more than a parody of itself.

**Sparks** — "Sparks in Outer Space" (Atlantic) — Brothers Ron and Russell Mael have been a popular act in Europe for years, but it's only since the acceptance of new wave sounds on radio that they have become recognized at home in America.

The latest LP is typical Sparks: clever, catchy, fun, insubstantial. A duet between Russell and Jane Wiedlin of the Go-Gos has sparked (excuse pun) interest in "Cool Places," one of those songs you get tired of after you've heard it the inevitable 50 times.

**Lou Reed** — "Legendary Hearts" (RCA) — Lou Reed doesn't make easy music. His voice isn't any prettier than his lyrics. But his songs, in the past, have had the capacity of jumping off the turntable and kicking you in the stomach, leaving you reeling with their power and agony.

His latest offering is softer than that, gentler and somehow resigned. It's not satisfying as a record, but it may hold out the hope that Reed is finding a measure of contentment in his own life.

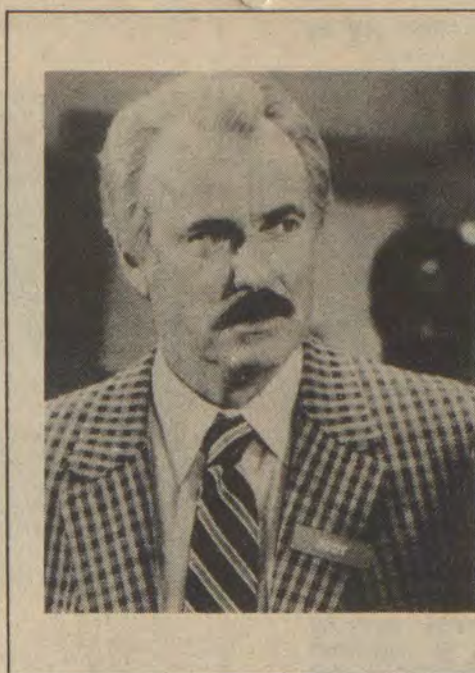

## Consumer Alert

### "THE RIGHT OF RESCISSION"

According to Attorney General Steven L. Beshear, summer is the primary season for home improvements and repairs. If you are planning to borrow money and use your home as collateral, be aware of the "right of rescission" provision of the Truth in Lending Act.

"The right of rescission allows three business days to consider whether you really want to use your home as a guarantee of repayment of a loan," said Beshear. "The loan can be canceled for any reason during this period of time."

—A credit contract has been signed.  
—Two copies of a notice explaining your right to rescind have been received.

—Material disclosures have been received which include annual percentage rate, finance charge, amount financed, total number of payments and the payment schedule.

After these events have taken place, if you want to cancel, you have until midnight of the third business day following the described occurrences to notify the creditor in writing that you are canceling the contract. You may notify the creditor by mail, telegram or other written communication. Saturday is considered a business day for purposes of counting your three days.

Once the creditor has received your notice of rescission, they must within 30 days return all money or property given to them and they must take steps to release your home as collateral.

Any money or property received from the creditor should be kept until you are notified that your home is no longer being held as collateral and any money you paid is returned.

Transactions for which the right of rescission does not apply are:

—When applying for a mortgage to purchase a home.

—When refinancing or consolidating a loan already secured by your home.

—Applying for a loan where a state agency is the creditor.

"If you do not want to slow the process for three business days, you can waive the right to rescind," said Beshear. Unless the right is waived, no money shall be disbursed, no services performed and no materials delivered until after the three days have expired. To waive the rescission right, you must:

—Tell the creditor you have a "bona fide personal financial emergency."

—Give the creditor your own written statement describing the emergency and state you are waiving your right to rescind.

—Sign and date the statement.

## Replace Nitrogen Lost During Spring Rain

The heavy rains that fell this spring may prove costly for some corn and tobacco farmers who applied nitrogen before planting.

"Heavy rains in the spring are normal, but we got much more rain this spring than usual," said Dr. Ken Wells, Extension soils specialist in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Wells said the extra heavy rain leached a lot of nitrogen into the ground water, including some that was put down this spring and some carry-over nitrogen in the organic matter.

All of the nitrogen is not gone—just that in the form of nitrate, which is subject to leaching. Nitrogen in the ammonium form will withstand leaching and much of the anhydrous ammonia injected in the root zone is still there. But the nitrate in the top 4 or 5 inches of the soil is gone, said Wells.

The same rain that leached the nitrogen has delayed corn planting. On the fields not yet planted, farmers should reapply nitrogen fertilizer, although it is not an inexpensive input at 20 to 25¢ per pound of nitrogen. Tobacco farmers should do the same before transplanting.

"Watch the fields already planted," said Wells. "If the plants start looking pale in mid-to late June, apply a top or side dressing of nitrogen."

"This won't be anything new since it's a standard practice in Kentucky, but this year it's more important," Wells added.

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# Kentucky Afield

**NIGHT FISHING**  
As the sun starts going down and pleasure boaters, water skiers and daytime fishermen head for home, another group of anglers, the night fishermen, are just starting their "day."

Some anchor in a favorite spot, usually off a deep point or a steep, almost vertical bank, light lanterns and fish for white bass and crappie. Others glide quietly, with no lights showing, along the shoreline, casting surface lures into the darkness for largemouth bass.

At dawn, as the rest of the world begins to wake up, these nocturnal anglers are back at the dock, busy with their filleting knives. Chances are they've been more successful than their daytime counterparts and know that fishing at night is worth losing sleep over.

White bass and crappie anglers who use lanterns are, in effect, attracting an entire food chain around their anchored boat. The light from the lanterns attracts plankton (in the water, these small plants and animals look something like swirling cornmeal). The plankton attracts shad and other bait fish, which in turn lures hungry sport fish to the scene.

The fisherman, with several baited lines over the side, waits for this natural process to work itself out. Sometimes almost the entire night will pass with little activity, then the white bass will suddenly move in like a pack of hungry aquatic wolves and the fishing will suddenly get fast and furious.

Minnows are the favorite bait for this type of fishing and the anglers experiment with different depths to find out how deep the fish are running. In addition to rods, reels, hooks and bait, about the only other equipment required is extra lantern fuel, warm jackets (it gets chilly on the lake, even in the summer) and plenty of coffee.

Fishermen at Laurel Lake, near Corbin, use similar techniques but fish with "organic" bait—worms, cheese or corn—for rainbow trout. During the summer months, night fishing is the most productive way to take trout at Laurel.

On lakes with clear water and a lot of daytime activity, largemouth bass usually "hole up" during the day. But they become active after dark, move in to shallow water and do most of their feeding then. They will strike readily on just about anything from top-water lures to plastic worms, although most night bass fishermen like a loud surface lure, one that makes enough noise to allow the bass to home in on it by sound alone. Black is by far the most popular lure color for night fishing.

Experienced night fishermen usually like dark nights—the darker the better. Heavy tackle is required, because it's often necessary to cast toward a shoreline that's barely visible, so jerking lures out of trees or bushes is a regular part of night casting.

It's important to move quietly and show as little light as possible, since the fish in shallow water will be spooky. And remember that bass won't be active all night long—activity, like it does during the day, will come in spurts. But feeding periods are usually longer and more intense at night.

White bass have finished spawning now, and several lakes are reporting good mixed catches of white bass and crappie. Night largemouth fishing should be getting good around now and will get better as the summer progresses.

So if your daytime trips aren't as productive as you'd like, try sleeping during the day and fishing all night.

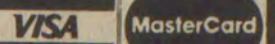

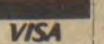

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## Muckraking Not Always a Service

The recent attack on Henry Kissinger by Seymour Hersh, though doubtless not altogether untrue, is, as tea to the British palate, typical. That Henry Kissinger had his public and his private flaws we would all agree. I suspect, in fact, it is good to know that; for we too often elevate such leaders as Kissinger to unreasonable and dizzying heights, making their lives quite difficult for even them. We run the risk of deifying our great leaders when they are, after all, just men.

But that is not the real problem. The real problem is that someone is always out there waiting to attack and to assassinate the reputations of such men as Eisenhower, Kennedy and Kissinger. They seem to feel that their God-given role is to debunk heroes, to deface the reputations that great public men have carved into the granite of history.

Much of what these critics say, though it is from the garbage pile, contains truth. However, what gives these men the right to rake through the garbage of public figures? Moreover, what right do they have to muckrake through the

private lives of public men? Or, what right does the public have to know the private flaws of its heroes? On Nightline a few nights ago, Kissinger called Hersh's comments about him "filthy lies", and most of them probably were.

The tragedy of such muckraking books as Hersh's is that they are little better than some of the so-called expose magazines like the National Enquirer, which makes millions each month at the expense of the famous and the ignorant. Those who revel in such stories by the Enquirer and those who buy such books as Hersh's fall into the latter category.

Hersh will not indeed bring down Kissinger any more than a fly will bring down an elephant. For although Kissinger was controversial, although the Harvard professor had his own views about foreign policy, although the German-born immigrant greatly loved power, although the Ivy-League intellectual was also something of a playboy, still Henry Kissinger was a great foreign policy advisor and a great secretary of state.

Aside from Kissinger, however, Hersh bothers me precisely because there are so many Hershes around. Muckrakers abound. From local politicians to national officials, every day leaders are mercilessly assailed. Perhaps the character assassins feel more powerful by pulling down others. Perhaps they do it for the money they get from a blood hungry public, pandering to their baser aspects.

There is a time, I suppose, when dirty laundry is news. Most of the time it is just dirty laundry.

## Martin County Group Seeks Rule Reversal

The Concerned Citizens of Martin County (CCMC) filed a motion recently with the State Board of Tax Appeals asking them to reverse a ruling that the group says has effectively cut off a citizen's right to assure fair property taxation.

"This is a ruling against citizens being able to monitor and challenge tax assessments they feel are unfair or too low," stated Joey Childers, attorney for CCMC and for Gladys Maynard, of Lovely, who is individually a party in the case.

Childers' reference is to the June 3 ruling by the tax board which dismissed a case challenging the low property assessments of two major corporations in Martin county—the Kentucky-Pocahontas Corporation and Martiki Coal Company. The group had asked that the assessments be raised to reflect fair market value of the property, as required by law, and had appealed the case to the State Tax Board after a local hearing resulted in a ruling in favor of the companies.

The tax board based its June 3 ruling on a 1966 case in which the Court of Appeals determined that only "parties" involved in tax appeals processes on the local level can make appeals to the State Board.

"We are a party," said Childers. "We are formally recognized participant. I think they are wrong."

Childers cited a section of Kentucky law specifically giving individual property owners the right to challenge the assessment of any other property owner in their county or, in other words, to become a party in such a case on the local level.

"We believe this also allows the right to appeal those local decisions to the State Board of Tax Appeals," he said, adding that he thought the board simply overlooked these statutes in making their ruling.

**Grant Furthers 'Family-Centered' Birth**

**High Student Default Rate May Cut Loans at Four Banks**

High default rates on student loans have resulted in a state agency's taking action which could lead to suspension of purchase of loans from four banks. Students at four schools are affected.

The actions which will be effective July 1, if not successfully appealed, are based on a regulation that took effect March 1, said Paul P. Borden, executive director of the Kentucky Higher Education Student Loan Corporation.

Conditions will be placed on the corporation's purchase of loans to students at Kentucky State University, Frankfort; Lincoln Memorial University, Harrogate, Tenn.; Bowling Green Business College, and Kentucky Junior College of Business, Lexington.

Borden added that the corporation intends to suspend purchase of all student loans from the Southern Deposit Bank of Russellville. He said that purchase of loans made to Lincoln Memorial students by two Middlesboro banks—Commercial Bank and City and County Bank—also will be suspended. Loans the two Middlesboro banks make to students at other schools will not be affected.

The corporation also will suspend purchase of loans that Pikeville National Bank and Trust Co. makes only to Kentucky Junior College of Business students.

Under the new state regulation, the corporation suspends purchase of loans banks make to students at a school when the default rate is 11 percent to 15 percent unless two conditions are met: a qualified, financially-sound person must co-sign for the loan and the lender must disburse the amount of the sum in multiple payments rather than a lump sum.

Under the regulation, those conditions will apply to all loans made by all lenders to students from Kentucky State, Lincoln Memorial, and Bowling Green Business College. For Kentucky Junior College of Business students, the conditions apply only to loans made by Pikeville National.

Another part of the regulation that goes into effect September 1, would require the Corporation to suspend purchase—under any condition—of loans to students at a school where the default rate on all loans made to students exceeds 15 percent.

The regulation in force also sets a 10 percent default rate limit on individual banks. Purchase of loans from a bank that exceeds the limit are suspended. This applies either to the bank's total portfolio of student loans or to the bank's loans to students at a particular school.

Eleven percent of the loans made by Pikeville National Bank & Trust Company to Kentucky Junior College of Business students were in default for a total of \$40,693.

Individual community colleges are not affected by KHEAA regulations unless the combined default rate for all community colleges exceeds the limit.

Default rates at most of the community colleges are well below the limit; however, the default rate is 11 percent at both Somerset and Jefferson Community colleges. "If the rates get too far out of line at any single community college, we may have to treat these schools as single institutions, rather than a group," Borden said.

No schools or lenders are affected by the regulations until the amount of matured loans to students at that school or made by a particular lender totals \$100,000.

All of the loans involved are made under the Guaranteed Student Loan Program. In that program, the corporation uses bond-issue funds to purchase the loans—usually after banks have held the loans for only a short time. Then the corporation must service and collect the loans.

"Buying up these loans frees the banks' funds for making more student loans," Borden noted.

The Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority insures the loans that are reinsured by the federal government. However, the amount of the federal reinsurance is based on a state's default rate—100 percent reinsurance if

the default rate is less than 5 percent; 90 percent if the rate is from 5 percent to 9 percent and 80 percent if the rate is greater than 9 percent.

Thus, high default rates could cost the state thousands of dollars in insurance payments to lenders on defaulted loans.

"This financing system is somewhat fragile and dependent on the good-will of the Legislature, which sets the bonding level of the Corporation, the bond market and purchasers of the bonds, and the public, whose support we must have for such programs.

"If these constituencies become antagonized by high default rates, the entire student aid program would be undermined," Borden said.

Borden also made these points:

—Students at the affected schools are not cut off from loans. Banks may still make the loans, but will have to service and collect them since the corporation will not purchase them if conditions are not met. Because of certain agreements with the U.S. Secretary of Education, the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority, a companion organization to the corporation, will continue to guarantee such loans.

Also, students may apply directly to the corporation for a loan if a bank won't make the loan.

Households with small children should have the telephone number of the local poison control center readily available for emergencies. An estimated five million poisonings occur in the U.S. each year with children under the age of five being the most frequent victims. Also, as a precaution, each household should have on hand a bottle of syrup of ipecac, which is an emetic. It will induce vomiting within 20 minutes of its use. Do not confuse syrup of ipecac with fluid extract of ipecac which is 14 times more powerful and dangerous. There are situations when induced vomiting will do more harm than good in an accidental poisoning situation. For example, the case when a corrosive acid or alkali is swallowed. Always consult a physician or poison control center first!

Anyone with small children at home knows how easily they can sometimes get into things that are dangerous to them. It only makes sense to keep the phone number of the nearest poison control center close by. 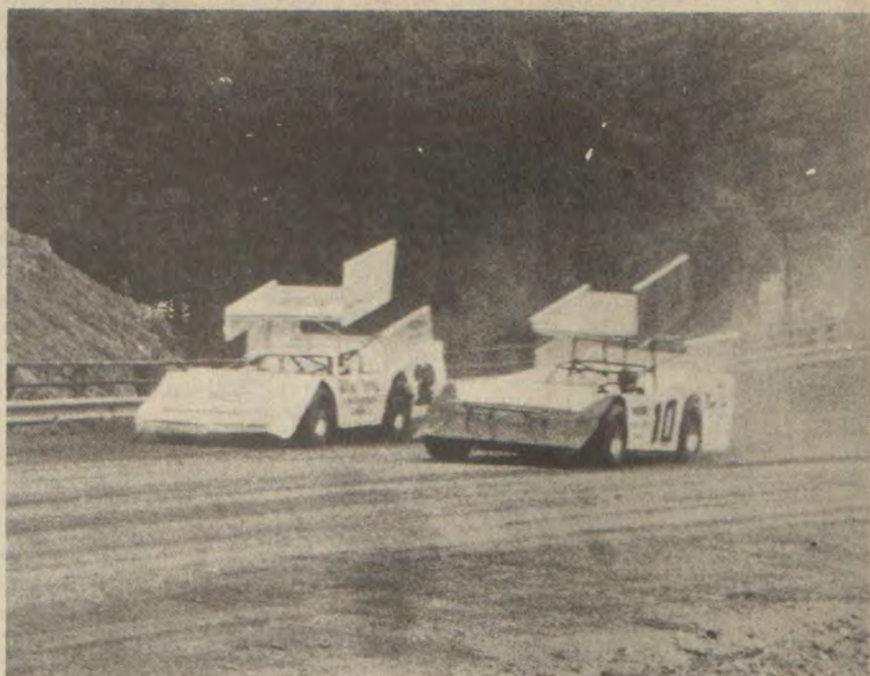

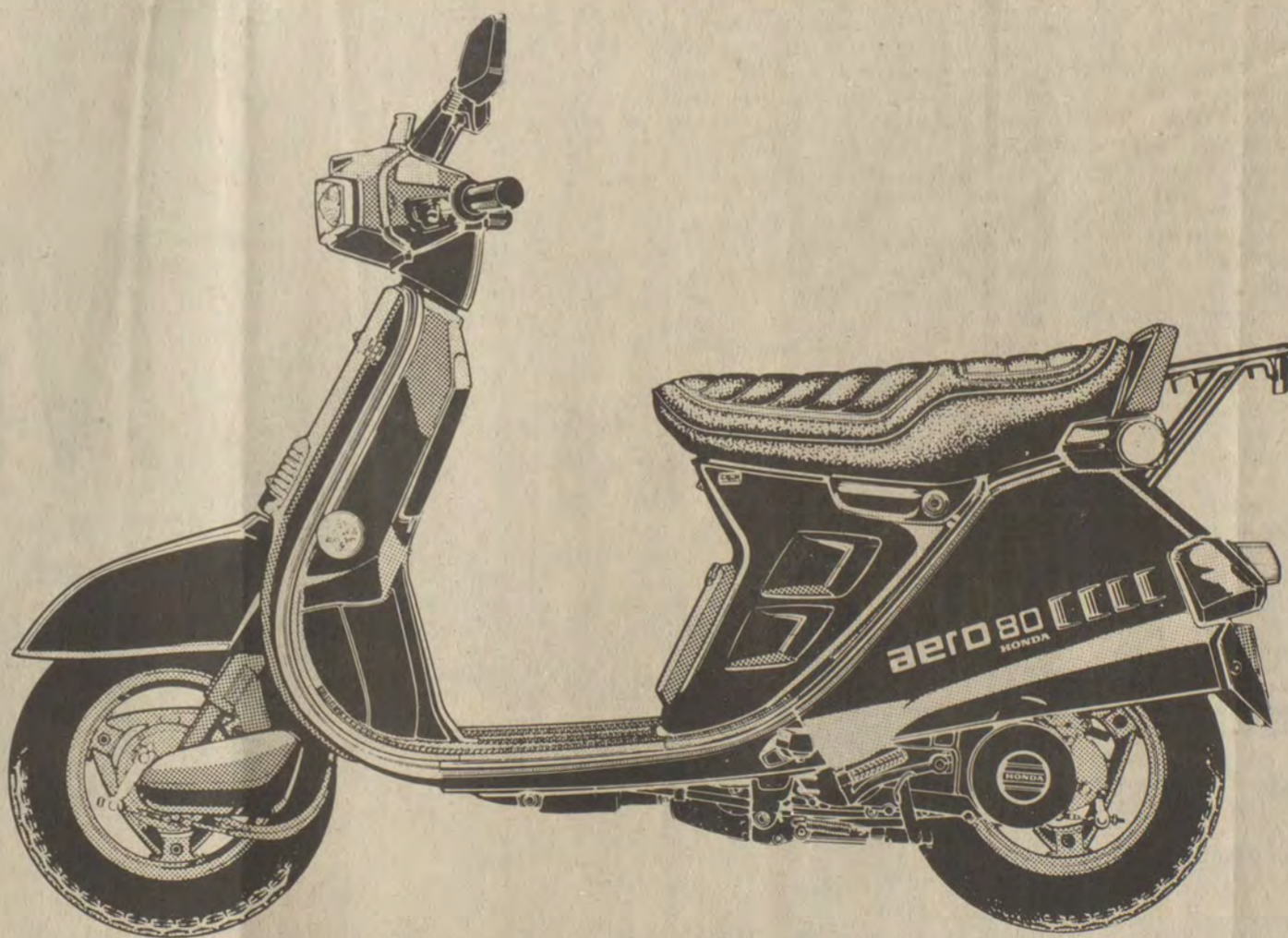

## Kentucky Fishing Report

Frankfort, Ky., June 20—There is a lot of good fishing across Kentucky as water temperatures move up around 80° and the fish move into their late spring habitats. The lake-by-lake rundown, as compiled by fish and wildlife conservation officers:

**KENTUCKY:** Sauger good trolling deep runners over ridges; black bass fair along shoreline; crappie fair fishing deep; catfish fair along rocky areas using trotlines; below dam white bass and sauger fair casting jigs from banks; catfish good using larger minnows out in holes; clear, stable at summer pool, 76°.

**BARKLEY:** Bluegill good fishing worms or crickets along shoreline; black bass fair casting plastic worms along shoreline or crankbaits off points; catfish fair fishing nightcrawlers along rocky areas; below dam white bass slow casting jigs and catfish fair on cutbaits; clear, stable at 1/2 foot above summer pool, 76°.

**ROUGH RIVER:** Crappie fair and small in size; bluegill fair and of good size two to five feet deep; clear, falling at 12 feet above summer pool, 80°.

**NOLIN:** Bluegill good on worms and crickets; crappie fair and scattered three to six feet deep; black bass fair casting worms or crankbaits along shoreline or rocky points of main lake; clear, stable at summer pool, 80°.

**BARREN RIVER:** Bluegill good fishing worms and crickets around shoreline cover; black bass fair casting worms or topwater lures early and late in day around flooded brush; catfish fair; clear, falling slowly at 22 feet above summer pool, 79°.

**GREEN RIVER:** Black bass good casting surface lures, spinner baits, or plastic worms; crappie good fishing minnows eight feet deep around submerged cover; bluegill good with worms around stickups; clear to murky, falling at 10 feet above summer pool, 79°.

**HERRINGTON:** Black bass good casting crankbaits and nightcrawlers along rocky banks; bluegill good with crickets drifting or sculling along deep banks; hybrid strippers fair trolling medium-deep runners or white grub jigs near mouths of lower lake coves; crappie slow driftfishing minnows around stickups; clear to murky, falling at three feet above summer pool, 77°.

**LAUREL:** Bluegill fair to good with worms or crickets around submerged cover; trout slow at night fishing worms; black bass slow on plastic worms off points; clear, stable two feet below power pool, 76°.

**CUMBERLAND:** Walleye good in lower lake early in day casting night-crawlers off points of main lake or by trolling deep runners across points and along steep banks; walleye fair in upper lake trolling deep runners or casting nightcrawlers; white bass good at night under lights off rocky points and rock walls of main lake with a few jumps being spotted in upper lake but none being fished yet; bluegill fair fishing worms off shallow banks; black bass fair on surface lures or plastic worms in cover off shallow banks; trout fair below dam but should improve with this week's stocking; clear, falling at timberline, 78°.

**DALE HOLLOW:** Bluegill good fishing worms or crickets in cover along shore; white bass fair at night under lights over river channel; clear to murky, stable at three feet above normal pool, 80°.

**CAVE RUN:** Musky fair casting medium-deep runners along banks and in sloughs; black bass slow casting spinner baits and plastic worms off banks; crappie fair with minnows around cover, 18-20 feet deep; clear to murky, falling at two feet above summer pool, 78°.

**BUCKHORN:** Bluegill fair with worms or crickets; white bass and crappie fair at night under lights; murky to muddy, stable at summer pool, 78°.

**DEWEY:** Black bass spotty casting artificial baits off points; crappie slow fishing minnows six feet deep in stickups; clear to murky, stable at summer pool, 78°.

**FISHTRAP:** Catfish slow using trotlines; crappie slow at night; trout should improve with this week's stocking; clear, stable at summer pool, 78°.

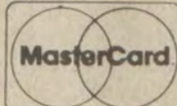

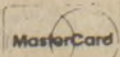

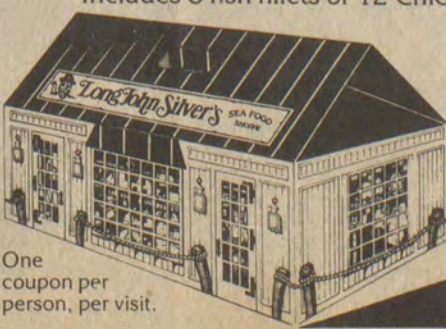

### SKYCARE on Floyd Mission

SKYCARE, the helicopter ambulance service operated by Jewish Hospital, Louisville, flew another mission into Floyd county last Wednesday afternoon when mortally wounded Ellis "Bo" Campbell, of the Prestonsburg area, was transferred from Our Lady of the Way Hospital at Martin to the Louisville hospital.

Campbell succumbed to gunshot wounds five days later, despite the dramatic effort to save his life.

SKYCARE, which began operation on July 1, 1982, is Kentuckiana's first helicopter emergency service. Since the 466-bed acute-care Jewish Hospital attracts 35 percent of its patients from outside the Louisville area, it was a natural extension of the hospital's programs and services.

Dr. David Holland, medical director of the program has announced that the helicopter ambulance service was recently modified to accommodate two patients simultaneously.

"This significant modification to the helicopter has been introduced so that we may more effectively address the medical emergency needs of the region," said Henry Wagner, president of the hospital.

By expanding SKYCARE's capabilities, the hospital can now respond to scene runs and medical requests involving more than one patient. To date, SKYCARE has received 528 requests for service and completed 399 patient transports.

"The importance of SKYCARE has been clearly demonstrated," commented Dr. Holland. "In the results involving our patients, our medical committee evaluated the first four months of the helicopter's operation. Several significant conclusions were rendered. The use of SKYCARE had a positive impact on the patient's condition in 43 percent of the cases. More significantly, a

patient's condition actually improved during transport in 14 percent of the cases as a result of the medical care they received in-flight, by the paramedic and nurse on board."

Soon after making the adaptation to accommodate multiple patients, SKYCARE had two opportunities for a double-patient transport. On May 10, two males were transferred from Knox County General Hospital suffering from poke root poisoning. A few days later, a 56-year-old woman and a nine year-old boy were transported because of burns received in a house explosion and fire.
