Eviction Looms For Two After **Court Decision**

A Harold firm and a Teaberry resi dent face eviction for failure to comply with the county solid waste ordinance, following a default judgment granted by Circuit Judge Hollie Conley to Floyd County Solid Waste, Inc. last Friday.

Harold Hydraulics and Bob Hall were the only names remaining this week on a list of 33 who were identified in May as either not using the mandatory garbage collection service or else not paying for the service.

The 33 represented only the first batch of many who would be prosecuted in an effort to enforce the county's solid waste ordinance, County Attorney Arnold Turner, Jr. warned at the time. And Bob McAninch, chairman of the garbage agency board, said this week that more prosecutions could be expected soon.

"If we're not willing to enforce the law, we should resign as commissioners," he said. "We were appointed to do a job and we're going to do it."

Most of those taken to court in May have subsequently joined the system, although a few could not be served with legal papers and one man is fighting the court action, it was said.

Session Called To Eye Charge Of Conspiracy

A special grand jury session will be held today (Wednesday) to consider the indictment of three men accused of complicity to murder Glenda Sharon Marshall, 30, McDowell teacher, whose body was found June 20 in a wrecked, firegutted car on Sizemore mountain, near

If the jury votes indictments against Clyde Douglas Marshall, husband of the victim, his brother, Bobby McGuffey, 30, of Lafayette, Tenn., and Carl Harold McFarland, 52, of Glasgow, the examing trial scheduled for Marshall in district court Thursday morning will not be held.

Extradition of McGuffey from Lafavette. Tenn., where he is being held without bond, has been asked but he had not been returned here as of Tuesday morning.

Marshall and McFarland are being held in separate cells of the county jail here. Although they are within yelling distance, they have not been permitted

to converse privately Jailer Lawrence Hale said he had not been asked by State Police to deny the two men communication but that he had ruled out private conversations between the two because he "felt it was the right

thing to do.' At his arraignment last week Marshall's bond was set by District Judge Harold Stumbo at \$1 million on the single charge of complicity to murder. McFarland's bonds total \$1 million-\$500,000 on complicity to murder and \$500,000 as a persistent

Ned Pillersdorf, public defender, has been named to represent Marshall.

State Police have alleged that Mrs. Marshall, McDowell math teacher and mother of two-one, a month-old baby at the time of her death-was killed by a blow to the head and that the auto in which she was a passenger was set afire and turned off the highway into a long

plunge over Sizemore mountain. Case Wins Right Of Jury Hearing

A Garrett man who sued C. & O. four years ago over the loss of his leg in a railroad accident has finally won the right to have his case heard by a jury.

In Damage Suit

James Martin Case, 34 at the time of the accident, had his right leg severed below the knee when he was run down by a train around 3 o'clock one morning in 1979. U.S. District Judge G. Wix Unthank, persuaded by C & O's argument that Case contributed to the accident by his own negligence, granted the railroad summary judgment in the case.

But a federal appeals court ruled last week that Case is entitled to a jury trial and remanded the matter to U.S. District Court in Pikeville for trial.

Case was walking along the railroad track which cuts through Garrett when he was struck from behind by a train that was backing up in the same direction he was walking. Described as a "mine shifter," the train was pushing 19

Schools Face Test, Though Now in Black

The Floyd school district ended the fiscal year in the black, but barely, and a deficit is likely next year unless spending is controlled tightly, Treasurer Ray Brackett told members of the Board of Education last Wednesday.

"I felt like a Houdini this year. I'll need to be even more of one next year," Brackett said.

Even after beginning the 1982-'83 year with a healthy \$465,760 surplus, the school district ended with a balance of only \$31,810.76-not enough to run the school system for a single day.

A shortfall in state revenues, which cost the county \$77,050 in anticipated funds, was partly to blame for the narrow margin, but overspending in some departments was also a problem, the treasurer implied.

Despite some pointed questioning by Board Member James A. Duff about low tax support for the schools-only 5.4 percent of the schools' \$16 million budget is raised by local property taxes-the board voted to seek only the four percent tax increase permitted by law without

a referendum. Prestonsburg High School will have a new basketball coach and assistant principal, the board naming Jack Stanford to those posts. A Wayland native, Stanford was most recently director of pupil personnel in the Paris Independent School System. Prior to that, he coached basketball at Breathitt County High

Stanford replaces Ralph Roberts, who is returning to Cumberland (Harlan County) High School after two years

A contract for draining and paving for the McDowell school playground is expected soon. The job is expected to cost about \$22,000, of which the school has committed \$5000 and the PTO \$4000.

State approval will be sought for the purchase from Jim Mayo of a 7.2 acre tract, on which the board intends to

erect a middle school. Waiver of a state regulation requiring a certain per-pupil area will be needed for the property, which lies behind the old WPRT studio on South Lake Drive.

A new vocational program is being added this year to the course offerings at Prestonsburg High School. Retailing I and II will teach marketing, inventory control, use of cash registers and other skills needed for persons entering retail sales jobs, it was explained.

After spirited promotion by representatives of the two firms, the board awarded the contract for school annuals to Josten's over kreative grafiks, inc. While Josten's bid price of \$31,640 compared favorably with kreative grafiks' \$33,545 bid, kreative grafiks representative Fred Tuttle said his competitor's product did not meet bid specifications.

Competition was also keen for the school photos contract, with Taylor Studios, John Wilson Studios and Paula Ann Goble submitting bids. The contract was tentatively awarded to Taylor Studios, pending confirmation of that firm's bid price, which was much lower than the others

Contracts were awarded also for contract drivers and custodial supplies. The choice of vendors for food products was delegated as usual to the schools' food service manager, Blanche Dingus. Resignations were accepted from

Dennis King, recently appointed teacher at Prater grade school; Alixe Roberts and Robert Harmon, teachers at Prestonsburg High School; and Mary Beth Johnson, teacher at Maytown, A year's leave of absence was granted to Marilyn Barnes, Betsy Layne grade school

planning and zoning, the city council decided Monday in re-establishing a city planning commission.

The decision follows a recent circuit court ruling that the Floyd County Joint Planning Commission-which has included since 1975 the county and its incorporated towns-was never properly established and a fiscal court resolution last week that, even if the joint commission were legal, the county no longer wants to be part of it.

That sat just fine with city council members, who have long felt chagrined that Prestonsburg's zoning plans have had to be submitted to a countywide panel, most of whose members are unfamiliar with the city

The council adopted an iterim zoning ordinance, zoning map and comprehensive plan-a public hearing must be scheduled before they are finally adopted-and named a temporary planning commission to oversee the final adoption process.

Appointed to the panel were William Gordon Francis, attorney, who was named for a two-year term and will serve as commission chairman; Byron Dixon Nunnery, realtor, four years; David Bruce Spradlin, developer, four years; Randall Burchett, architect, three years, and Evelyn "Suzy" Hager, bank officer, one year

In a redoubled effort to collect delinquent city taxes, the council hired a Paintsville debt-collecting firm, Eastern Kentucky Credit Exchange, Inc. The firm came highly recommended by Highlands Regional Medical Center, which also uses its services. It will keep one third of whatever it collects.


Marshall Davidson, Prestonsburg's present delinquent tax collector, will continue to have first option on the city's bad debts. Of the 25 cents-on-the dollar levied as a penalty on overdue taxes, the city takes six cents and Davidson 19.

The council bristled at a rate hike announced by Floyd County Solid Waste Inc., which would increase from \$1600 to \$2200 the monthly fee charged the city

Prestonsburg will take care of its own for use of the county landfill. Council members said they would approach the solid waste agency board at its next meeting to seek an explanation of the rate increase, which is the second in nine

Tougher Management Seen for Textbooks The report on Floyd schools by a state

accrediting team is acceptable, the Board of Education decided last weekexcept for an addendum to the report which was sharply critical of textbook management here

Some claims in the addendum-an April 7 report by John B. Shoemaker, of the State Education Department's textbook utilization division-were false and he has already sent a rebuttal of the claims to State Superintendent of Public Instruction Raymond Barber, explained Assistant Supt. Ron Hager.

Nevertheless, the board adopted a tough textbook management policy which appears to acknowledge at least implicitly the validity of Shoemaker's claim that textbook distribution has been in "disarray" here. And the measures adopted by the board parallel recommendations made by the state Shoemaker's report, which followed

an investigation of textbook shortages at McDowell last spring, figured prominently among charges of mismanagement levelled at school officials by the Floyd County Citizens Education Council in June.

Under the policy adopted by the board at its monthly meeting last Wednesday, all textbooks will be numbered, school principals will have to sign for all the books they receive from the school district's central office, and parents will have to sign for the books their children

When a student returns his or her books at the end of the year, a receipt will be given for them. Without it, the student will not be eligible for free textbooks the following year.

If books are lost, damaged or destroyed, the students or their parents will have to pay for them, according to the new policy

Addressing a criticism heard here last year, the new rules provides that principals report any surplus of books, so that the extra books can be transferred to schools that have shortages

And yet another question raised by the critics appears to have been settled. The intent of the textbook program, the new policy spells out, "is for each individual pupil to have a full set of appropriate textbooks of current adoption and in good physical condition.







No Utilities Tax, Please

Kentucky has fallen on hard times, and its financial prospects for the next year or so are, to put it mildly, bleak. Meanwhile, the needs that require money will not go away.

Former Governor Julian Carroll and the scholarly Edward F. Prichard have made a study of the situation, with an eye to solving the knotty problem of state finances, and have recommended that the 5 per cent utility tax be restored.

And we, who admittedly are more expert in the field of criticism than in the matter of state revenues and budgets, veto the suggestion. We see in a restoration of the utility tax the "last straw" situation as thousands of citizens would be bearing an added financial burden each month at a time when the burden is already back-breaking. Most Kentuckians could abide the extra load, but there are those who cannot, and they must be considered.

An increase in the state sales tax, which exempts foodstuffs, might be more acceptable than the utilities tax. And then there is the untapped resource of taxes that could be collected on unmined coal. The farmer pays taxes on his fields that lie fallow, unproductive and unprofitable. Those coal beds that lie fallow, many owned by corporations based outside Kentucky, might ease the load if anybody would dare "bell the

Greeley's Advice, Revised

If Horace Greeley were alive and dishing out advice today, his "Go west, young man" would likely be dropped and supplanted by "Stay home, young man, and get into the utilities

And that might be the soundest advice he ever gave. What other business can expand its services—lay new lines to new, paying customers—and collect in increased rates the cost of such a sound investment? Or can collect from its customers the cost of a plant that does not yet exist? Or de-

mand, and get, as much as \$5 for a product that costs 35 cents? The advantages, young man, are even more. There's exemption from competition through franchises and the prohibitive cost of laying of new lines for competitors, and in some cases there's a nice depletion tax deduction, to boot.

Stay home, young man—unless the cost of utilities drives all your customers elsewhere.

SHUMLA, ET AL

A few weeks ago this column listed the postoffices in Floyd county in 1894, including five which had me stumped: Shumla, Setser, Cutch, Alliance and Defiance. Had an idea some oldtimer would enlighten us, but no such help came. This week, Robert M. Rennick, of Prestonsburg, coordinator for the Kentucky Place Name Survey, came to the rescue.

Wrote Mr. Rennick:

"Shumla was on Johns Creek, below Thomas, probably at the mouth of Collins Branch 'Setser was probably at the mouth of

Copperas Creek (on Johns Creek). Alliance was on Mud Creek. Defiance was in the Wheelwright area.

"And Cutch may have been in the vicinity of Clark Elementary School at the forks of Middle Creek.

When we noted that Allen was not in the list of 1894 postoffices, Mr. Rennick delved into his records and came up with the answer. The postoffice was Mouth of Beaver, established in 1854 and discontinued in 1856. But there's an unexplained time gap in the history of postoffices there. None is listed from 1856 till Allen was established May 16, 1905 with Shadrach Combs as postmaster.

We are too young to take advantage of any Senior Citizen privileges; yet it seems if we try to get a job, the employers are looking for someone younger. Most of us do not have young children at home any more, so we are not eligible for any government benefits except, maybe, Black Lung survivor checks, which is \$304.90 a month-who can live on that amount now-a-days?

We might be able to qualify for State Aid if we can prove we are poor enough; which means we cannot own our home or in some cases, a car! If we are not physically or financially able to establish our own businesses, we are just left to sit, worry and pray that we will live to be sixty. By that time we hope that we'll still be able to take early Social Security benefits at a 20% deduction.

Some of us have to buy our own insurance and hospitalization which is so expensive we can't afford it. We are not eligible for any medical card until we get to be 68 years old. This seems so unfair to me!

How many employers out there are willing to hire a lady to work after she becomes fifty or past? How many of you have applied for jobs and never heard from the employers? When you check on the job again, you find it has been filled by someone younger. Are we in our fifties just misfits?

I would like to know if there are any solutions to these problems that maybe, I'm not aware of. I would like to hear from some of you out there in the same or similar situations



In Two New Books From UK Press...

Control Is Central Issue for Appalachians

APPALACHIA AND AMERICA: Autonomy and Regional Dependence Edited by Allen Batteau 286pp. University Press of Kentucky, \$26 WHO OWNS APPALACHIA? Landownership and Its Impact By the Appalachian Land Ownership Task Force 235pp. University Press of Kentucky, \$25

It is probably no different living in the south Bronx or on a Navajo reservation, but to be native to eastern Kentucky is to be object of apparently endless fascination on the part of folks elsewhere.

Last year, movie-makers were here for the filming of "Kentucky Woman." In the spring, National Geographic did a spread on the coalfields. There was last week's piece on Mud Creek by NBC's Good Morning America. And now two more books on Appalachia have rolled off the presses at the University of Kentucky

Do people in southern Florida, upstate New York, or the Rockies get this kind of popular and scholarly attention?

Natives might be simply bemused by all this attention or indifferent to it except that it gives wide currency to images of this region and its people that are frequently wrongheaded. Moreover, since they shape the perceptions of policy-makers, "helpers," the American public, and even Appalachians themselves, distorted images can do a lot of damage.

Appalachia and America both exemplifies the continuing outside interest in this area and takes a critical look at it. It is a collection of 15 essays, most of them originally written for a symposium on Appalachian studies conducted by the Southern Anthropological Association in Memphis in 1979.

There are chapters covering such anthropological staples as regional identity, family group organization, religious belief systems, rituals of dependence, and forms of health care.

Charles E. Martin, a history professor at Alice Lloyd College, explains the old custom of papering interior walls with pages from the Sears catalog, the Saturday Evening Post, or the local newspaper. UK sociology professors Dwight B. Billings and Robert Goldman discuss the celebrated 1974 school textbook controversy in Kanawha county, West Virginia. Michigan state social sciences professor Allen Batteau and Phillip Obermiller contribute an introduction to

The political and economic domination of Appalachia by metropolitan elites and outside control of the region's resources have been well-documented. But, Batteau and Obermiller argue, the coal barons of a previous generation have now been replaced as oppressors by a cadre of professionals-lawyers, bureaucrats in the health, education and welfare agencies, and smooth-talking public relations people working for the big energy corporations.

The professionals are by definition the competent, so this argument runs. So the eople they deal with are systematically divested of competence and ability. "The ambivalence that many Appalachians feel toward the values and expectations of well-educated professionals...the antagonism and potential conflicts it implies...will become increasingly important with the continuing development of professional services in this region," the authors predict.

Batteau and Obermiller find grounds for hope in the "reemergence, in varyingly conservative and progressive colorings, of ethnicity and cultural regionalism"-movements like the Moral Majority, La Raza, Black Power, and the American Indian Movementas tools for resisting the newer forms of domination.

That hope may seem a bit farfetched in an area where "ethnicity and cultural regionalism" take the form of Pike county's Hillbilly Days or Perry county's Black Gold celebrationconsciously aping Beverly Hillbillies and Dukes of Hazzard caricatures-and where Floyd's annual folk festival lingers mostly as a last gesture to a bygone era. Nostalgia has its place and self-parody may even be healthy but they are hardly the stuff of resistance movements

What does make a resistance movement depends, of course, on what one takes as needing to be resisted. It does not appear from these pages that change is itself the enemy.

Traditional modes of rural life will inevitably change under the influence of the complex, specialized and hierarchical forms of social organization found in modern, urban, industrial areas, argues Thomas Plaut, associate professor of sociology at Mars Hill (N.C.) College, in one of the essays included here. Nor, after a generation of highway building and the advent of television, is there any way of insulating the one world from the other.

There comes a point in this process of change," Plaut explains, "where individuals realize that their interests and opportunities in life are no longer determined by community and kin but by their position in the transcommunity agency that employs them. The truly radical nature of this switch in allegiance from community to organization is most visible in rural areas such as parts of Appalachia, where people with traditional and modern loyalties and self-definitions live, work, and struggle with each other.'

Rather, the argument that surfaces in this volume is that Appalachians ought to participate in shaping the changes that affect them.

That will mean, as several authors here note or imply, that natives will need to break out of the definitions laid on them over the years by the mass media and by academics-not least by the kind of theory that attributes to Appalachians a kind of fatalism or some other enervating habit of mind or character.

Anyone who saw Good Morning America's portrait of Mud Creek's Eula Hall last Wednesday will know that the old stereotypes die hard. The grinding poverty and weepy heroics of that piece reflect the New York editors' preconception of what life in eastern Kentucky is like-or what they imagine is best calculated to bring a lump to the throats of their viewers—but any resemblance to the complex reality of the place is coincidental.

The anthropologists represented in this book know better. In his essay on rituals of dependence, Batteau takes behaviours that used to be seen as signs of a "culture of poverty" and redefines them as the first signs of ethnic solidarity. Other authors look more to economic and political structures than to the minds of Appalachians both for the causes of the region's ills and for possible solutions.

Among the more ideological of these analysts, Richard A. Couto takes the health care industry in Appalachia as an example of the exploitation of the area's resources "for the benefit of others and by institutions whose control is far removed from the region." And he looks ahead to a struggle for "greater social control over the means of the production and distribution of health care.'

Couto, who as director of the Center for Health Services at Vanderbilt University has been responsible for a number of health care initiatives in Floyd and surrounding counties, may be right. But his remedy will sound to many as, at best, socialized medicine and, at worst, a socialist state.

"It will be enough," he writes, "when the health of Appalachians and all Americans is declared a public responsibility to be met with public means. This will require that the inequities between sectors of American society and regions be redressed by a redistribution of the wealth and resources accumulated in such great disproportions."

A less radical, and so more feasible, strategy is suggested by Patricia D. Beaver's report on the land ownership study recently concluded by the Appalachian Land Ownership Task Force of the Appalachian Alliance. It is this study that is now published as Who Owns Appalachia?

Beaver's praise for the study—she is director for the Center for Appalachian Studies at Appalachian State University in Boone, N.C.—may strike some as overly fulsome or at least premature. If the task force findings are half the threat to established interests as has been suggested, then presumably other scholars are already being funded to poke holes in them. Indeed, in his introduction to Who Owns Appalachia?, Charles C. Geisler summarizes various shortcomings already noted by critics of the

But the land ownership research yielded impressive documentation of the thesis that control of much of the land and resources in southern Appalachia is in the hands of distant owners and that this is directly related to losses in tax revenue, destruction of farmland and the stifling of economic development and diversification.

If this turns out to articulate a conviction widely felt by Appalachians, it may yet generate some important legislative changes. In this state, the Kentucky Fair Tax Coalition has already used the study findings to campaign for a new state tax on unmined minerals and to bring local challenges to corporate assessments in several counties, including Floyd.

It is too early to feel sanguine about such strategies-after gaining considerable momentum, the unmined minerals tax proposal was easily derailed by the house leadership in the last Kentucky legislature—but reform of this order is at least possible.

It wouldn't restore to Appalachians control of their own destiny or anything like that. But it might be a step in that -Ron Marstin

MEDICARE

"Medicare is a Federal health insurance program administered by the Health Care Financing Administration. It is for those 65 or older, those with permanent kidney failure, and those with certain other disabilities," says Attorney General Steve Beshear.

Medicare is divided into two parts—hospital insurance and medical insurance. Hospital insurance is paid for through part of the Social Security tax. It helps pay for in-patient hospital care and certain followup care after leaving the hospital. Medical insurance is financed through monthly premimums paid by those who have enrolled for it and from Federal revenues. Medical insurance helps pay for doctor's services and other medical services and items.

In some cases, it is necessary to apply for hospital insurance protection. It is not necessary to retire to be protected at age 65 by hospital insurance. If you plan to continue working, file an application at the Social Security office at least three months before your 65th birthday. If you receive Social Security or railroad retirement, your hospital insurance protection is automatic at age 65.

If you are not eligible for hospital insurance at 65, you can buy it. As of July 1, 1983, the basic premium will be \$132 per month for a 12-month period. In order to buy hospital insurance, it is necessary to enroll and pay the monthly premium for medical insurance.

Almost everyone 65 or older and eligible for hospital insurance can enroll for medical insurance. Social Security or Federal work credits are not necessarily. As of July 1, 1983, the basic premium cost is \$13.50 per month for a 12-month period.

If you receive Social Security benefits or retirement benefits from railroad retirement, you will be automatically enrolled for medical insurance. In some cases, it is necessary to apply for medical insurance. Additional information can be obtained from the local Social Security office or railroad retirement office.

There is an initial enrollment period of seven months for medical insurance. This period begins three months before the month you first become eligible and ends three months after that month. If you choose not to take medical insurance during the initial enrollment period and later change your mind, a general enrollment period is held January 1 through March 31 of each year. If you enroll during this period, protection will become available the following July and monthly premiums will be 10 percent higher than the basic premium for each 12-month period you could have had medical insurance but chose not to

Each year, after meeting the annual medical insurance deductible (this figure is \$75), medical insurance will pay 80 percent of the approved charges for other services covered. Payments are not based on doctors' or suppliers' current charges. They are based on what is a "reasonable charge" as defined by law. Due to high inflation, the approved charges are often less than the actual charges.

"For your own protection, do not cancel present health insurance until the month actual Medicare coverage begins. And before buying private insurance to supplement Medicare, examine the policy carefully," advises Attorney General Beshear.

Local Social Security Administration offices take Medicare applications, assist in filing claims and provide information. Health insurance related complaints may be filed with the Office of the Attorney General, Consumer Protection Division, 209 St. Clair Street, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601 or by calling the toll-free hotline: 1-800-432-9257.

New VA Debt Collection Effort

Some 850,000 veterans who have been overpaid for G.I. Bill education benefits will receive letters from the Veterans Administration advising them of new statutes affecting money owed the government.

The mailing to start July 19 is the second in a series of steps taken by VA in response to a Congressional mandate to intensify collection of \$954 million owed in some 1.3 million accounts. Amounts owed range from several thousand dollars to as little as five dollars, the lowest amount to be targeted for collection. Some of the accounts are more than 10 years old.

Letters regarding education accounts will be mailed at the rate of 42,000 per day from the Centralized Accounts Receivable Section of VA's St. Paul, Regional Office. Similar letters are scheduled for veterans who owe for overpayments in compensation, pension and loan guaranty defaults.

In the first three months following the first mass collection effort in January, VA received \$24 million in payments, almost double the normal amount for that period.

This month's mailing to veterans who have ignored their overdue obligations will advise that interest on their balance will be charged at the annual rate of 15.05 percent.

Legislation enacted in 1980 (P.L. 96-466) authorized interest charges in such cases at the rate used by the Treasury during fiscal year 1982. While the rate is reviewed each year, the initial rate assigned to an account remains unchanged while the debt is outstanding.

Veterans are advised that the interest cost can be avoided by remitting the full amount due within 30 days of the date of the letter. Those unable to repay the full amount are advised to submit a partial payment together with a proposed

repayment plan. If no repayment plan is submitted within 30 days of the notice, an administrative fee of 61 cents is added each month in addition to the interest. Those who have established repayment plans will not be charged interest and administrative costs unless the account becomes delinquent.

All repayments are to be made to the Centralized Accounts Receivable Section in St. Paul. A remittance form is provided with each letter. Local VA regional offices can assist in explaining remittance procedures, but all of the delinquent accounts are maintained in St. Paul.







There is a simple test to determine Cervical Cancer; this is the Pap test. This test is a simple painless test which requires only a few moments of a woman's time.

The Floyd County Health Department is having a Pap clinic on Friday August 19 from 8:30 until 11:30 and from 1:00 until 2:00. This clinic is a free service of the Health Department and is open to women of all ages, but those women age 45 and over are especially urged to take advantage of this service since this is the high risk age for the disease.

A nurse from the Health Department will be in Harold at Ward's Health Food Store on Monday August 15, from 10:00 until 2:00. She will offer T.B. skin test, urinalyses, anemia screening, blood pressures, and immunizations. This clinic is a service of the Health Department and the public is welcome.

Phone Rate Hikes 'Unwarranted'

Within the past several weeks, several Tof the largest telephone companies in the state have filed for rate increases which are unprecedented in both their magnitude and complexity. The dollar figures in these requests are quite substantial, with General Telephone requesting an increase of \$31.3 million, Continental Telephone requesting \$6.6 million and South Central Bell requesting \$163.2 million in rate increases. These rate requests are in part a reflec-

ion of the tremendous changes that have taken place and are continuing to occur in the telecommunications industry. Perhaps the most visible of these changes involves the impending breakup of the Bell Telephone System and a series of wide-ranging decisions by the Federal Communications Commission.

Kentuckians already reeling from some of the highest telephone costs in the country are understandably concerned about the implications of these ecord rate increase requests. Since August of 1971, residential one-party monthly phone bills have increased approximately 151% in Bardstown, 135% in Bowling Green, 140% in Cynthiana. 160% in Hopkinsville, 132% in Lexington, 99% in Frankfort, 96% in Hazard and 164% in Pikeville. Now, again, Kentuckians are faced with the possibility of substantially increased telephone costs—with the new proposals possibly tripling rates for some consumers.

Unquestionably, recent events in the telecommunications industry will exert upward pressure on the rates charged for local service. Divestiture and recent decisions by the Federal Communications Commission will result in a number of changes in the industry, generating certain extra costs by the ratepayer. However, these events should not be used to blindly justify enormous and perhaps unnecessary increases in the cost of basic telephone

ratepayers' spokesman before the Public Service Commission, intends to see that this does not occur.

There appears to be a tendency on the part of some to view the magnitude of the rate increases as beyond the control of the local telephone companies because of the factors which I have previously mentioned. While we recognize that a portion of the rate increases sought may indeed be a product of external events, we feel very strongly that rate awards in the full amount sought by the companies are unwarranted.

For decades, national communications policy has been directed at the goal of achieving universal, affordable telephone service. These filings, currently under review by the Public Service Commission, threaten to deny affordable phone service to many Kentuckians. Because of this threat, I feel that any increase in the cost of basic service over and above that absolutely necessary to comply with federal regulatory and court decisions and to provide a fair return to utilities' investors must be denied by the State Commission.

This is not the time for telephone companies to request higher profits for stockholders, faster recovery of capital or more liberal operating expenses. Yet, according to our initial review, it appears that these elements make up a significant part of the rate increases being requested. It disappoints me that the industry has not exercised greater restraint in this situation in order to ease their customers' transition to the new era of telecommunications. On the contrary, they seem to be using divestiture, deregulation and competition as excuses to seek rates far above those that are fair, just and reasonable to the consumer.

There are those who say that flat rate, unlimited local calling is a premium or luxury service and that local measured service is the answer for those who cannot afford the proposed new rates. However, local measured service as it currently exists in Kentucky is no panacea. While a switch to measured service may save many Kentuckians money in the short-run, it also creates revenue shortfalls to the utility and ultimately higher rates. It appears that the companies' ultimate goal is mandatory measured service for all customers, and we think that this will result in even higher telephone rates for Kentuckians. This could be devastating to the elderly, who often rely on the telephone as their primary link to the outside world but who simply may not be able to afford higher telephone rates.

My office has already begun to review the documents related to these rate increase requests and to research the many complicated issues involved. In addition, we have retained the Washington, D.C., consulting firm of J.W. Wilson and Associates to assist us in analyzing the major filings and in preparing testimony on behalf of the rate-payer. Mr. Wilson is a nationally known expert in telecommunications and has testified in many states in opposition to rate increases. We believe that his firm's assistance in providing ratepayer input into the pending cases will be invaluable.

My staff will devote the major portion of its time and resources in the upcoming months to the scrutiny of, and where necessary, opposition to, the filings of South Central Bell, General Telephone

BARREN: Bluegill fair to good off steep banks; black bass slow early and late casting plastic worms off points; clear to murky, falling, 21/2 feet above pool and 90°.

NOLIN: Bluegill fair on worms or crickets off steep banks; black bass slow at night on plastic worms off points; clear, stable at pool and 90°

ROUGH RIVER: Bluegill slow off steep banks; black bass slow casting plastic worms off points; clear, stable at pool and 90°

HERRINGTON: Black bass fair at night on spinner baits and plastic worms off points; bluegill slow drift fishing off steep banks; clear, stable at two feet below pool and 90°

GREEN: Bluegill fair to good off gravel points and over drop offs; crappie fair over submerged cover; black bass fair early and late and at night off points on spinner baits and plastic worms; clear, stable at pool and 90°.

CUMBERLAND: Catfish good on trotlines in lower lake; bluegill fair to good off steep banks; white bass fair in the jumps early and late; black bass fair at night casting plastic worms off points; in tailwaters, trout good; clear, falling, 17 feet below timberline and 89°

DALE HOLLOW: Bluegill fair still fishing worms or crickets along steep banks; black bass fair at night casting plastic worms and spinner baits off points; clear, falling, two feet below normal pool and 90°

LAUREL: Bluegill fair along shoreline cover; trout slow night fishing off steep banks; clear, stable at six feet below power pool and 85°.







Dog Licenses Due July 1 But Sales Slow, as Usual

to renew their driver's license or to buy the license for the family car.

"But one licensing date that can pass unnoticed is July 1, when dogs in the state should have new licenses," says state Agriculture Commissioner Alben W. Barkley II. The Agriculture Department's Division of Livestock Sanitation administers the dog licensing program for the state.

In 1954, the General Assembly passed the Kentucky Dog Law. It provides for each county fiscal court to employ a dog warden, for each county to create a dog pound and for each county to sell dog

According to the law, July 1 is the date to license all dogs six months and older. The license fee is \$1.50, and the tag must be worn by the dog at all times.

Any dog without a license can be picked up and impounded by the local dog warden. Any person who does not license his or her dog is subject to a fine of between \$5 and \$100 or imprisonment for five to 60 days or both a fine and imprisonment.

'Each year it seems fewer and fewer dogs are being licensed," Barkley said. "While we're not sure why this is happening, we are sure the dog population is not declining. There are more and


During the year ending June 31, 1982, the department licensed 79,676 dogs. According to early calculations from livestock sanitation, that figure is expected to drop by more than 12,000 for the year just ended, Barkley said.

"This is a good self-supporting program, but only as good as the counties' enforcement of the law," Barkley explained. "Half of the \$1.50 stays in the county where the license is sold. The other 75 cents goes into a fund for Kentuckians who have livestock and poultry damaged by stray dogs.

"The program could be helped greatly by each county strengthening its license sales," he added.

Dog licenses must be purchased in the owner's county of residence.

Food Stamps Delay **Result of Tardiness** On Part of Congress

Some 30,000 Kentuckians eligible for food stamps received their August allotments one to two days late as the Department for Social Insurance did not receive authorization for the release of the benefits until late Sunday afternoon,

Social Insurance Commissioner John Cubine says his office finally got the "go" from the U.S. Department of Agriculture around 4:30 p.m. Sunday to distribute food stamps to recipients in the state. "Even though President Reagan signed the enabling legislation Saturday, we were told not to release any stamps until Agriculture officials put their 'OK' on the proper papers. When we got the word we put the stamps on the first mail trucks about 7 this (Monday) morning," Cubine said.

The delay in receipt of food stamps affected only recipients whose social security numbers end in the numbers "O" and "1". Cubine explained. Only the first mailing cycle was affected, and it was expected that most of those clients, would get their stamps by last Wednesday at the latest. "Everyone else who gets their stamps through the mails should receive them on time, and everyone will be receiving 100 percent of their regular allotment," Cubine said.

The last minute authorization for release of the August food stamps occurred because of late Congressional approval of additional appropriations to fund the program through the end of the current federal fiscal year. In Kentucky some 185,000 households are eligible for food stamps at this time.



Home Care for the Elderly

Home care for older persons is one of the best-kept secrets in the state—this was the conclusion of 400 Kentuckians attending a Long-Term Care Conference at Kentucky State University last week.

'We have services out there to provide care in the home, but people don't know they exist, much less how to obtain them," said Cabinet for Human Resources Deputy Secretary Joe Smith.

At the two-day Frankfort meeting, health and social services workers and consumers discussed the growing need for long-term care for people who can no longer manage the activities of daily liv-

ing without assistance.
"Up until four or five years ago, this care was provided only in nursing

homes," Smith said. Relying on nursing homes as the only providers of long-term care was shortsighted, according to State Representative Gerta Bendl, a conference panel-

ist. "It was a quick fix," said Bendl. According to a needs assessment, most older people did not like this "quick fix". Going to a nursing home for care was the last choice of 94% of older Kentuckians surveyed by the University of Louisville's Urban Studies Center.

National studies support the views of older people that they function better in their own homes. "A two-year study of people who received nursing care at home showed that those who were not severely ill experienced less deterioration than those treated in a nursing home, especially in mental function,' said Dr. Sidney Katz, director of the New England Long-Term Care Center at Brown University and conference keynote speaker.

Dr. Katz believes where and how much care a person needs should be decided by how well they can continue to function, not by the names of their illnesses. "Doctors and other caregivers should ask their patients how well they are performing activities of daily living," said Katz. "For instance, if asked about my ability to move around, my answer could range all the way from being able to get out of a burning house by sliding on my rear end, to the ability to use public transportation without assistance. My answers to that and other questions about functioning should dictate my care needs.

The desire of older persons to remain at home and the escalating costs of nursing home care has led Kentucky and other states to establish home care programs. However, according to the long term care conference participants home care services are not yet coordinated, and there is no "road map" for people seeking services.

"The challenge now is to coordinate and manage the services so they are delivered in the proper mix to meet the needs of specific clients," said Peggy Mooney, director of the cabinet's Division of Aging Services. "If I need a bath, a meal, transportation to the doctor, and someone to give me a daily insulin injection, I'm not going to make it at home unless all those services are there when

Some consumers at the conference also think home care services are not sufficiently funded. In Kentucky nursing home care costs from \$12,000 to \$19,000 a year," said Barbara Sandford, Institute for Aging chairperson. "We need state and federal action to develop alternatives that will supplement but not supplant the care of family and friends.

Federal action to significantly increase home care funding is not likely, says Jeffery Lewis, a national specialist in health policy and reimbursement who spoke at the conference. "Congress is paralyzed by two conflicting emotions," he said. "Members of Congress want to respond to their constituents' strong wish to live at home, but at the same time they are scared of the cost of home care. Only documentation that home care is cost effective and a groundswell of demand will break this paralysis.'

Hensley To Represent 7th Wildlife District

Gov. John Y. Brown Jr. has named Doug Hensley, of Hazard, and Pershing Hayes, Tyner, to serve four-year terms on the state Fish and Wildlife Commission.

Hensley will represent the seventh wildlife district and Hayes, the ninth. Both districts are in Eastern Kentucky.

Hayes, an oil company executive, will be serving his first term. Hayes replaces Danny Coffey, Jamestown, and Hensley replaces Tim Dash, of Jenkins, on the commission.

Commission members are selected by the governor from a list of five names from each district submitted by sportsmen after a special election. The ninemember commission, which meets quarterly in Frankfort, serves as an advisory body to the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. Among its duties are setting season dates and other game and fish regulations and approving the department's budget.

Triple-Amputee Vietnam Vet Elected To Lead Disabled American Veterans



"Just let me die!" whispered the young solider to his platoon sergeant seconds after a Viet Cong "booby trap" land mine mangled his body

Unwilling to listen to such talk, the sergeant ordered Dennis A. Joyner to stop wishing for death, telling him he had much to live for. "Right then," the Vietnam combat vet says today, "my whole attitude turned around. I wanted to be a winner—to overcome any obstacle life put in my way."

After losing both legs and an arm, the Apollo, Pa., man found life's obstacles steep, but he came out a winner. Last week, his fellow-members of the threequarter-million-member Disabled American Veterans (DAV) chose him to lead their organization through the coming year. The election took place at the DAV's national convention in Los Angeles

Joyner fears his year at the DAV's helm will be one of the most difficult years in the history of veterans' affairs. "A full decade has passed since the signing of the Paris Peace Accords ended the Vietnam War," he commented. "And so many have forgotten that veterans' benefits are part of the cost of war, that our country has a moral obligation to those who spilled their blood or lost their health while defending us.

'Combine that forgetfulness with the demand for reduced government spending," he continued, "and you've got a real problem for veterans, particularly

Joyner has served the DAV well at the national, state, and local levels. He was elected to several DAV national vice command offices prior to attaining the office of national commander. At the state level, he served as the DAV Department of Pennsylvania second and third junior vice commanders, and he was commander and chapter service officer of DAV Chapter 36 in his hometown of Vandergrift, Pa. In 1977, the triple amputee was selected as the DAV's national Outstanding Disabled Veteran of the Year.

In addition to serving the DAV, the combat veteran is active in civic and church activities. He is a member of the VFW, AMVETS, and American Legion and was appointed to serve on the Pennsylvania Vietnam Herbicide Commission by Pennsylvania Governor Richard L. Thornburgh

Joyner served four years as the Westmoreland County Juvenile Service Center accountant and was fiscal manager for the Westmoreland County Courts in Greensburg, Pa. In 1979 he was appointed Westmoreland County court administrator, responsible for administration of the eight-judge court system and all court-related offices.

Joyner lives in Apollo, Pa., with his wife, Donna. He is the father of two young sons, Dennis, Jr., and Paul.





Turner Enterprises and the selfmotivational program, Dare-To-Be-Great. A lengthy trial was held in Fayette Circuit Court, Lexington, resulting in Turner being enjoined from operating the Dare-To-Be-Great program within the Commonwealth. The Court also ordered that monies be paid to the Division of Consumer Protection for distribution to consumers who had invested in the program and for whom a refund had been approved by the

Due to the outdated addresses and telephone numbers, the Division of Consumer Protection has been trying for several months to locate consumers eligible for the Court approved funds. The Division is asking those individuals who invested in the Dare-To-Be-Great program prior to December 20, 1972, and who believe their names may be on the Court approved list, to contact the Division of Consumer Protection at (502) 564-2200 by August 23, 1983. 

Presence of Arsenic Detected in Stream

Martin county residents have been warned to avoid Big Elk Creek because tests show the presence of arsenic. The poison situation came to light after dead opossums and raccoons were found during a routine inspection of a nearby legal

Samples in and around the dump showed the presence of chromium and arsenic, according to John L. Bailey, of Prestonsburg, environmentalist with the Martin County Health Department. Creek water also contained the chemicals

The samples were taken June 17, but not until last week did the state notify Bailey, who then visited 20 households to warn residents to keep their children and animals out of the creek

Bailey said he couldn't assess the seriousness of the situation, but "saw minnows and other aquatic life in the stream...Drinking the water one time wouldn't be fatal, but continued usage could be harmful.

Alex Barber, director of the Division of Waste Management in the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet, said the dump has been receiving liquids in violation of solidwaste regulations. He said the amount of arsenic in the stream is "enough that we are concerned.'

Bailey said the source of the chemicals has not been determined, although officials suspect a septic tank cleaner may have put the waste there. Martin County Judge/Executive John Callaham said he plans to close the dump, and has posted a night watchman there. Bailey said Callaham has talked to a local mining company about taking garbage to a nearby strip mine and

Bailey said costs of cleaning up the site are likely more than the county can

LEARNING TO CLASSIFY "What's this?

"What's that?"

When children ask these questions, they are in the process of learning how to classify things-to distinguish how objects are alike and how they are different.

We are always classifying things, grouping things. We classify things all day, ever day, automatically. Children start learning this skill early in life, according to Growing Child, the monthly child development newsletter.

Who cares? We all do. Because we have to. Because we can't live without being able to tell the difference between aspirin and arsenic

It's classification that tells a child how to think about the world, where to look for a crayon, what part of a catalog will have a picture of a doll. It tells a child she can expect to find bears in the animal crackers and jelly next to the peanut butter on the shelf.

Most important, classification skill will show a child how to create order out of chaos, how to cope confidently with unknowns in the future when parents will not be around to give answers.

It looks simple, but classification isn't as easy as apple pie. For example, in the supermarket, soft drinks are arranged on shelves by brand, flavor (lime, orange, cherry), by size (quarts, pints), by number (six-packs, eight-packs), and by type of container (can, bottle).

How does a child learn to classify things? You help her. Almost every minute of the day, she hears and sees you using the idea of same and different that underlies all classifications.





American settlers plodded their way westward in covered wagons, as did the Grants while traveling to Thika in a battered old wagon drawn by oxen and led by an African guide.



Cancer Hopeline

Q. I think I have cancer because I have had some unusual bleeding. Could it be something else? I'm terrified. What should I do?

A. You are right; that unusual bleeding is one of the seven warning signs of cancer. (The others are a nagging cough or hoarseness, change in a wart or mole, persistent indigestion or difficulty swallowing, a lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere, change in bowel or bladder habits, or a sore that does not heal in two weeks.) These signs may indicate cancer, or they may mean something else. The only way to find out is to see a physician. Don't put it off.

Learn the facts and start dealing with them. Knowing instead of wondering takes away much of the fear. If it's nothing serious, you will be relieved; if it is cancer, you can do several positive

-Once you have seen a physician, get as much information as possible so you can make the best decisions.

-Make sure you have the right physician for your kind of cancer. Ask questions and do not hesitate to seek a second opinion if you feel you should do so. It is often advantageous to have your condition evaluated by more than one

-Insist on hearing all the alternatives before beginning treatment. Insufficient information may limit your options at

-Take an active role with the physician in planning your fight against cancer so you can live your life the way

-Make notes and have a family member with you when discussing your case with the physician. Later you can talk it over. -Don't deny cancer or leave

everything to the doctors. Learn as much as you can about what is happening to you. Denial closes out the facts. Knowing the facts facilitates hope. Remember that the doctor will work

with you to control the cancer. If one treatment fails, there are others available.

-Without doubt, the most difficult times are diagnosis and early treatment. It takes a lot of adjusting before you are ready to mobilize all your resources to face and plan the future. Expect some depression and anxiety, and do things you enjoy to overcome these feelings. Share your thoughts and allow others to help you cope. The support of family and friends is a powerful aid in the fight against cancer.

COOL CAR CARE COSTS

For hot weather, don't change your radiator thermostat. In today's cars, it's calibrated to keep things running at most efficient temperatures year-

Check your oil every third gas fill-up, and change as recommended, to help keep dirt from building up. Also contributing to peak performance and less maintenance, a modern detergent gasoline works to keep your carburetor

You don't "save" by using plain water in your radiator; keep it full of water mixed 50 percent with a good "anti-freeze" year round; it fights rust, and you need it for your airconditioner, too. Change your coolant every two years.

Vacuum or brush accumulated insects off your radiator to let cooling air

For safety and best gas mileage. keep tires at recommended pressures, and check them when your car's been standing in the shade a couple of hours.

And park in the shade whenever you can. Your car's exterior, like yours, stays healthier out of the hot sun.



August—"Child Find" Month

August has been designated as "Child Find" month in Kentucky by Raymond Barber, superintendent of public instruction.

The purpose of Child Find, according to Barber, is to identify and locate any handicapped child who is not attending school, or a child who is attending school but not receiving the proper education. Barber stated that many special services may be available to such children, once found, through the Department of Education's Bureau of Education for Exceptional Children and the local school districts.

Child Find is a cooperative effort conducted by the State Department of Education, local school districts, other agencies serving handicapped children, and various parent groups.

Barber encouraged public support for Child Find. "Every child deserves an opportunity to learn—to be independent of others; Child Find can give them that chance," he said.

Besides identifying handicapped children in need of special services, the Child Find project is designed to make citizens more aware of services available to handicapped children in the public schools. He emphasized that an estimated one out of every ten students has some type of handicapping condition requiring special educational services.

Parents, relatives and concerned citizens who know of unserved handicapped youngsters are urged by Barber to refer them to local school districts. Information being sought includes the child's name, age, suspected handicap, and parents' address and phone number.

Handicaps to be identified include retardation, hearing and speech impairments, visual problems, emotional problems, orthopedic and health impairments, multi-handicaps and learning





They Also Suffer . . .

Trees, Plants Hit by Drouth

More than gardens and farm crops are suffering from lack of rain and an over-supply of heat.

Drought conditions persisting for the last couple of months have taken a toll on trees and other plants as well as

The injury being inflicted now can continue to cause problems for trees and shrubs in years to come, according to Dr. Robert E. McNiel, Extension specialist in nursery crops, University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

McNiel says the problems may show up as slow plant decline or as infestations of insects or diseases.

'New plantings are suffering more than normal, mostly because of lack of expanded root systems," McNiel said. He explained that because of spring rains, many plants were not planted until late, and these plants were not able to establish themselves well enough before the dry weather arrived this

"This condition will establish 1983 as a year of more plant loss with newly planted items than occurs in most years," the specialist said.

He added that loss is also occurring with 1981 and 1982 planted stock which still tends not to be large enough to have root systems to support them during severe droughts in upper soil levels. Large trees may not be suffering as much if their root systems are into soils of lower depths where water is available, according to McNiel.

The specialist reported that trees and shrubs native to moist areas, but which are now located in drier commercial and residential landscape sites, are showing the most injury.

The shallow-rooted Burning Bush has either died or is showing full foliage color. Maples, such as Sugar and Red, also are browning out in foliage as they are drying. Leaves turning black are due to rapid water loss on days with high evaporation rates, according to McNiel.

Other plants, such as Willows, Birch, Tulip Tree and Sycamore are defoliating yellow leaves, notes the specialist.

McNiel says that damage of trees such as Canadian Hemlock is not easily noticed because they will die from lack of water without the leaves changing color. "Once this stage is reached, touching the plant will cause all the needles to fall off. When this happens, the tree is dead with little warning," he said.

Certain sites are showing more plant losses than normal, according to McNiel. During 1983, north side landscapes, which tend to need less attention than those on the south or west side, are suffering from lack of water as much as other segments of the landscape, he

In commercial or industrial areas where trees are planted in small islands surrounded by larger areas of asphalt or concrete, tree losses are higher than normal. Trees in open space of at least the minimum recommended size of 14 feet by 14 feet may be in much better condition, reports McNiel.

While plants which are defoliated or have brown leaves may be beyond saving, trees and shrubs just beginning to show symptoms need water to remain healthy, advises the specialist.
