Offenses Many But None Slain,

No murders are among the 56 true bills handed down by the Floyd Circuit Court grand jury on adjournment Monday. Nine persons are charged with assault, however; one is accused of raping a 12-year-old; four face drug charges and most of the remaining indictments allege forms of robbery and theft.

Four Pikeville men-Clancy Adkins, 22, Kenneth Damron, 24, Sammy Fronto, 21, and David Damron-are accused of first degree assault in the stabbing and beating of Ronald "Whitey" Wills in a fight outside The Warehouse at Auxier on August 11. Adkins, Fronto and Kenneth Damron were also indicted in the beating of Gary Hopson the same

Also charged with assault is William 'Doc" Scalf, of Stanville, in the lugwrench beating of Paul Vernon Lewis on July 7. Lewis was left blinded in one eye.

Kenny Johnson, Vernon Johnson and Dave Slone were indicted in the beating of Rodney Thornsbury, the grand jury alleging that Slone held Thornsbury at gunpoint while the other two "beat and stomped him about the face and body.'

Brackett Is New Report by Jury Supt. of Schools

Board To Ask Public To Join Hunt for Supt.

Ray Brackett, an employee of the Floyd schools system for 28 years and its chief financial officer for the past 13, was sworn in last Wednesday as acting superintendent. He replaces E.P. Grigsby, Jr., who quit the top post last month with three years remaining on his contract and who has been named as Brackett's administrative assistant.

The public will be invited to share in choosing a permanent superintendent, said Chairman Dr. J.D. Adams near the end of Wednesday's meeting of the school board. The Floyd County Education Forum, a citizens' group, had earlier requested public participation in the search and screening process.

Brackett's inauguration—the oath was administered by his son, District Forester Stephen Ray Brackett—came just five days before Floyd school officials were scheduled to learn whether the state Board of Education would permit them to continue to run the schools here. The new appointee said he felt confident of state officials' support and, in a brief statement of his goals as superintendent, listed improved relations with state education and fire officials as top priorities.



(Brackett's confidence was not misplaced. The state Board of Education voted Monday to give Floyd another chance to put its house in order. The school district must have a state approved consultant to aid in the search for a new superintendent, however, and the state will continue to monitor the Floyd school district at least until a new

One knowledgeable source, who asked not to be identified because of courthouse ties, predicted that changing to a commission form of government could profoundly alter the relationship between the judge-executive and other members of the fiscal court.

"Under the present system, the county judge has a stronger hand. No one magistrate can threaten him directly," the source said. With the proposed change, "the commissioners would take on new stature. It would be more difficult for the judge to isolate them.'

Insurance, TV Tops Agenda

Discussions of what to do about Prestonsburg's city insurance and possible upgading of TV cable service topped the agenda of the City Council Monday

At the Council's Aug. 26 meeting it had been decided to go with coverage provided by the Hatton-Allen Insurance Agency for a period of 60 days, while accepting bids from other insurance agencies. Hatton-Allen stepped in with coverage for the city after the former underwriter, Kentucky Insurance, withdrew its policy as of midnight, August 25.

Denzil Allen reportedly talked with City Manager David Evans sometime after the meeting and said he felt it was unfair to allow 60 days for bids, as that would give other insurance companies the advantage of knowing the price of their premiums. Allen asked for a cap of 45 days, said Evans.

However, a representative from Nationwide Insurance, Roy Ramey, said 45 days would not give his company enough time to prepare a bid. Council decided to keep the 60-day deadline but keep secret the cost of the Hatton-Allen

New Building Needs Stressed at Meeting

schools at last Wednesday's meeting of the Floyd Board of Education made it clear that nothing short of new buildings will resolve some of the school district's most pressing problems. And there were signs that the availability of additional state money next summer may set off a spirited scramble here for the coveted

An estimated \$9.3 million is expected to be available for school construction in this county in 1986 and 1987 as the result of recent action by the special session of the General Assembly. The Floyd board is also expected to seek an increase in local property taxes this year to help raise building funds

A delegation from Garrett, where one building has been condemned as unsafe and students are attending classes in an auditorium, put in a strong bid for a share of the money. Rodney Moore asked that a new school there be moved up on the district's list of building priorities.

Parents from Prater Creek, incensed at an overcrowding problem that left seventh graders without a regular teacher and eighth graders sharing space with a remedial reading class, also feel they have a strong claim on a new building

In fact, the school district's current building plans call next for construction of a middle school at Lancer-a project that would also alleviate conditions in the long-overcrowded Clark schoolfollowed by a new elementary school at Allen and high schools at McDowell and Wheelwright.

Construction of a new grade school at Garrett is currently fifth on the official list of priorities; renovation and expansion at Prater is sixth. But acting Supt. Ray Brackett indicated in an interview last week that the troublesome issue of consolidation—urged by state officials but unpopular in some local communities-will again have to be con-

Delegations from several grade sidered in the school district's longrange building plans.

The board voted to apply for \$250,000 in emergency loan money from the state Department of Education to furnish portable classrooms at Garrett. The 10-year loan would be interest-free. The state Board of Education was expected to vote this week on the loan application

Rosalie Shepherd, president of the Clark PTA, told the board that a onelane bridge over Middle Creek is causing a dangerous bottleneck there. She also asked why Clark was given only a part-time physical education teacher while smaller schools had a fulltime

Supt. E.P. Grigsby, Jr., in his last meeting as head of Floyd schools, said reconstruction of the narrow bridge is the responsibility of the Floyd fiscal court. The appointment of physical education teachers is dictated by tradition as much as by school size, he

Everett Akers vehemently argued for the removal of vehicles from the grounds of Martin grade school and for the establishment of a parent-teacher organization there. Jean Rosenberg, representing the Floyd County Education Forum, asked the board to lend its support to parent-teacher organizations

throughout the district. Board Chairman Dr. J.D. Adams suggested that a well-publicized day be set aside in all schools for parents and teachers to organize any groups they desire. He said he was trying to contact the Martin mayor and city council in the hope of providing alternate parking space for teachers there.

Over Adams' objection, the school district's bus drivers, cooks and custodians will receive a four percent pay raise beginning Sept. 1; other noncertified staff will receive raises on an individual basis depending on length of

Performance Report Shows Floyd Sends More Grads To College Than Average

The good news is that a higher than average percentage of high school students from this county go on to college. The bad news is that Floyd high schools have a higher-than-average number of students dropping out along

Both figures were contained in the schools' annual performance report which was summarized for the Board of Education last Wednesday by schools psychologist Larry Jervis and which will be published in its entirety by the Floyd County Times.

Forty-four percent of Floyd high school graduates enrolled in college last year, compared to a state average of

However, of students in grades seven

through 12, an average of 4.4 percent (9.3 percent of the senior year) dropped out during the school year-an improvement over the previous year but still an area that needs close attention, according to the report.

No state dropout average is given for the 1984-'85 school year but, the year before, Floyd ranked only 2 on a scale of 1 to 10 in the percentage of students staying in school.

Two figures with a significant bearing on Floyd students' test results, board members were told, were the percentage of school revenues raised from local sources (taxes and investments) and the percentage of students enrolled in special education classes. While, on

At Age 84, Allen Bookseller In Business Almost 40 Years

old house at Allen a pleasure place, a store of more than 10,000 volumes, some first editions, all hardback, all for sale.

Presiding over these tomes is Wyatt Martin, who has been in the book-selling business since 1947. Martin, who will turn 84 soon, said his life's work arose from a love of books and the expansion of one's horizons books provided.

Coming from rural Knott county, Martin said he "didn't have much chance to expand" intellectually as a child, but spent many hours wandering around the then almost untouched countryside of what he described as "really the prettiest section of eastern Kentucky.

A rift in their clan and some reportedly shady land deals took the Martins' home-place in Knott, forcing a move to Garrett, which Martin described as "a delightful place." It was there he began his schooling at the Stone Coal school.

For lovers of books, there exists in an Martin said he loved to roam the area with his dog when he wasn't going to what he described as "a good school with good teachers," or working around

'Life was pleasant, but it wasn't easy," he said. "There was always lots of work to be done. You didn't have all the (different) things you wanted to eat, but it was substantial food-corn, beans, potatoes and berries, things like that.

Martin pursued his education at Stone Coal for a time before a Prof. W.R. Thomas organized a subscription school in which students paid a monthly fee to attend classes. Martin said the subscription school was unlike anything available at the regular county schools and it was there he got his first taste of drama. Thomas introduced him to historical plays on American heroes such as Washington and Lincoln.

growth in Full Time Equivalent (FTE) students during this semester. While the headcount rose from 1,267 to 1,340, the FTE rose from 797 to 858.6. Two hundred ten classes were on the class roster for the fall semester. Only 10 of those classes had to be dropped for insufficient enrollment.

The increase in the number of students carrying fulltime loads is seen as the reason for the growth in FTE. It is also the reason for the large classes and the necessity to split a sizeable number of classes. Once again, students from Floyd county contributed the largest percentage of the total student population; Pike county has the second

Prestonsburg Community College set largest enrollment, with Johnson county very close behind.

> "The future of this institution looks very good," continued Campbell. "With the tremendous growth that we have had, we can anticipate that the Legislature is going to look favorably on the addition of two new buildings to our campus. By 1990, this campus could have from 1,800 to 2,000 students. Part of this growth has come from the influx of new people to the area; however, growth is also evidenced through the increased numbers of high school students pursuing a college career.

> Dr. Campbell pointed out that in the past three years, many distinguished faculty members have been added to the PCC roster and that each of these has contributed to the educational growth of the college. "We now have eight faculty members with earned doctorates and three more who will attain their doctorates within the next academic year," Campbell said. "New faculty members that we have brought into the community college have credentials that are far beyond what one normally finds in the community college setting. In addition, a larger number of faculty members at Prestonsburg Community College have been taking sabbaticals and leaves of absence to go back to college for graduate work in their subject matter fields. All of these factors have contributed to a better-trained and superior

MAO INHIBITORS AND FOOD

Individuals taking monoamine oxidase (MAO) inhibitors, which are occasionally prescribed for depression or high blood pressure, need to exercise great care in food and beverage selections. Food and drugs that contain high levels of tyramine, a natural component, can interact with MAO inhibitors. It can force blood pressure to dangerous levels and cause severe headaches, brain hemorrhages and even death. Tyramine-rich foods and beverages include aged and fermented items such as snarp cheeses, yogurt and sour cream. It also includes pickled herring, salami, pepperoni, soy souce, active yeast preparations, beer, Chianti wine and sherry. In addition, livers from beef and chicken, broad beans, canned figs, bananas and avocados are on the list as well.

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State Extends Pay On Long-Term Care

The Cabinet for Human Resources has announced a major revision in its plans on providing Medical payments for skilled nursing long-term care patients who no longer need that level of care.

Effective immediately, the Kentucky Medical Assistance Program will pay intermediate care reimbursements for skilled nursing patients who, after Sept. 1, no longer meet the medical criteria for the skilled nursing level of care and are awaiting placement in an intermediate care bed.

The state will continue to pay, through Jan. 31, 1986, skilled nursing rates for approximately 1,200 Medicaid recipients who were listed as skilled nursingawaiting-intermediate care placement prior to Sept. 1.

Effective Feb. 1, 1986 only intermediate care rates will be used in making reimbursements for any Medicaid recipients classified as skilled nursingawaiting-intermediate care placement.

On July 30 the cabinet announced plans to end the higher payments effective Feb. 1, 1986 as part of action to balance the state Medicaid budget. The change was designed to save \$4.2 million this fiscal year.

Human Resources Secretary Al Austin called the announcement good news for numerous concerned Kentuckians who had questioned what would happen to those nursing home residents affected.

Mine Rescue, First Aid Contests Scheduled

Safety Days will be held September 12-13 at Allen Park, the Department of Mines and Minerals has announced.

A mine rescue and recovery contest will test the skills of the people trained in this field. The five person team will be judged on performance under pressure of a practical mine rescue and recovery problem, representing to the fullest extent possible, the condition a team would encounter during an actual

mine fire or other mine emergency. First aid contestants must display the proper skills to aid an injured miner while implementing cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR), artificial respiration and the best care possible until actual medical help arrives.

"This is definitely a positive turn of events, both for the program as well as for the nursing home residents affected," Austin said. "This should surely reduce the concerns of many residents and of their families. We now have the ability to make appropriate reimbursements for the level of care

Austin said the state plans were altered because of a change in position by the federal government.


'In the past, this agency had been informed that we could not make intermediate care payments for patients in the higher level of care," he said. "When we recently learned of a possible modification in the federal position, I immediately inquired to the federal Health Care Financing Administration regarding the issue. Today I received a letter from the HCFA regional administrator to the effect that there is no federal statutory or regulatory prohibition to such payments. Therefore, we have immediately exercised this new option."

Austin said he considered an immediate implementation of intermediate care rates for the 1,200 Medicaid recipients currently in the skilled nursing-awaiting-intermediate care placement classification. "At this time, however, I see no need to alter our previously announced schedule of reductions and reimbursements," he said.

The Cabinet for Human Resources will also continue its schedule of incentive payments to intermediate care facilities which receive skilled nursingawaiting-intermediate care patients. Through Jan. 31, 1986 the cabinet will pay a \$7.50 per day incentive in patient reimbursement for any transfer of a skilled nursing patient awaiting placement in an intermediate care bed. The \$7.50 incentive is one-half the difference between the daily reimbursements for skilled nursing and intermediate care. The incentive is to continue for a minimum of 90 days.

Austin said the cabinet would continue to explore any avenue available which would help balance the Medicaid budget while reducing any impact of those actions on recipient services.

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

Sheriff's Office Makes Two Marijuana Raids

According to Deputy Paul Auxier, 135 plants were confiscated last Wednesday on the Left Fork of Abbott. Arrested and charged with cultivation of marijuana were Brenda Collins and Gary Bayes, both of Abbott. Also on Wednesday, 132 plants were confiscated on a hillside along the Mountain Parkway. That case is still under investigation by Kentucky State Police Trooper Lee Weddington, Auxier said.

The raids, a team effort of the Sheriff's office and state police, were based on information supplied by a reliable source, said Auxier.

What he interpreted as a school board ploy to dump Grigsby in order to placate state critics drew an angry response from Burl Scott, coal company executive from Hite, who accused the

board of caving in to pressure from state education officials and the media. 'Someone comes in here from Frankfort to stomp their foot at us and we ran away and hid from them," he said. To a smattering of applause, Scott

said board members would answer to the electorate if they continued to be cowed by "gin hands sent up here from Frankfort." In the audience were at least three state Department of Educa-

Brackett said he had "no hard feelings" for the man he replaced and that he and Grigsby would "work together." But he also stressed that he intended to assume full control of the county schools system. "The board elected me as its chief executive officer and that's the role I will play," he said.

On Thursday, Brackett was moving his effects into Grigsby's former office. Grigsby was given an office in the school bus garage at Garth. Although he will lose the \$2400-a-year stipend he was paid as board secretary, there will be no change in the former superintendent's \$44,817 salary. Brackett will get an \$8900 raise to bring his salary up to the same level. He is also serving as board secretary

Among other objectives listed by the acting superintendent were improved relations between the board and the community, raising more money for the schools, building new schools, and-a crowd-pleaser among the 80-or-more visitors jammed into the sweltering boardroom—finding a cooler and more spacious meeting room

He will try to hold at least one board meeting every year in each of the five educational districts, will seek to improve dropout and attendance rates, and will work at improving student test scores and relations between administrators and staff, Brackett said.

Thomas, said Martin, was unconcerned about money, and would teach the children even if they could not pay. Around 1912 or 1913, said Martin, he

enrolled in the Hindman Settlement School, where he spent two or three

"I seemed to gain the confidence of the teachers," he said, "and did a reasonably good job for my age.'

Success at his studies going to his head a little, Martin said he eventually got to thinking he was grown up. "I thought I knew more than I knew," he said, "I knew better what to do than what others could tell me. I left with two school companions to see the outside world. With lots of walking and skimping, we made it to Ohio. The war was raging and labor was short; employers didn't care much about size or age, and we were able to get jobs. We made a little money and bought new clothes. After about a year we returned to our old stomping grounds, decked out like financiers, telling tales of thing across the border."

Martin said he derived enormous benefit from his years at the Hindman Settlement School, and in a way regretted leaving. His education didn't come to an end then, however. While living in Ohio, he had received letters from Alice Lloyd offering a scholarship to the Raymond Rirdon School in the Catskills of New York. He accepted the offer and as soon as he was able, left for the school from which he would eventually

At the Raymond Rirdon School, Martin was thrust into an environment different from anything in his experience. The boys there came from all over the world-Cuba, South America, Mediterranean islands and other farflung

But Martin said he didn't experience much culture shock. "I hadn't reached the stage where I thought much of culture," he said. "I was still caught up in the joy of living." He concentrated on literature and the Spanish language while at the school, where the philosophy he said was to merge arts and sciences, trades and culture into the interests of

After graduation, Martin said he moved back to Ohio, where he found a job with the Crystal Paper Co., but wasn't satisfied there. He wanted to see the world. In the early 1920's, he joined the Army Medical Corps.

He completed a three-year tour of duty in Hawaii, returning eventually to the mainland and once again resuming his studies, first at the Columbus Academy of Fine Arts, and later at the University of Louisville. It was at U of L he met the man who introduced him to the passion he carries to this day, the study of medieval history and literature.

"Professor Beard got me started in medieval history. I enrolled in whatever courses I could find on the life and times of the medieval ages. I held together and reached its downfall, and that's a heap of study for a little mountain boy.'

Martin said he also had admiration for the great Russian authors, such as Dostoevski, Tolstoy and Turgenev, but had no use for more modern American writers such as William Faulkner or Ernest Hemingway.

But for those interested in any of those writers, and a host of others, there is a very good chance of finding their works among the many lining the walls of Martin's combination residence and place of business, where he has been since 1947.

He said around that time he read an advertisement from a fellow from back East who wanted a book on European superstitions. Martin had one and sent it to the man in exchange for \$5. From these humble beginnings began a mailorder business that prospered for more than 30 years. That business has tapered off a bit in recent years, he said, as he doesn't send out as many book lists to his clients. And, he said, he has never had a large number of walk-in customers.

The bookstore remains open. Martin cautioned, however, that one should call before dropping by.

He summed up his great love of literature and music with a grin and a twinkle in his eye. "It runs like a golden thread through the years of my life, discovering the beauty and magnificence of literature and music," And for those who share such love, particularly that of literature, a visit to the old house in Allen could be quite rewarding.

average, school districts across Kentucky raise 23 percent of their income locally, Floyd derives only six percent of its budget from local sources.

"That's the difference between bologna and a steak," remarked Board Chairman Dr. J.D. Adams.

Floyd had 6.4 percent of its students enrolled in special education classes next year, compared to 11.7 percent statewide. The relatively low number here means not only that some handicapped children are not getting the special support they need but also that their inclusion in the general school population distorts achievement test scores, Jervis said.

On another measure thought to affect test scores, 57.8 percent of Floyd students are listed as "economically deprived" or eligible for free lunch. No state average is available for 1984-'85 but it usually runs around 36 percent.

In two high schools and nine elementary schools some classes were larger than the maximum permitted under state regulations. The county's most crowded conditions were at Harold Elementary, where seven classes containing 57 percent of the students enrolled there were over the limit, and Martin Elementary, where eight classes containing 47 percent of the students exceeded the maximum size. Countywide, 32 classes, representing 10.8 percent of the county's students, were listed as overcrowded.

Although the figures were said to have improved this year, 25 teachers last year taught 41 classes out of their field of training. Eight were teaching a total of 13 classes out of field at Allen Central High school; six were teaching out of field at Betsy Layne high school.

Across Kentucky, \$537 in local money is spent on each child in school; in this county, the figure is \$127. Statewide, each child is backed by \$106,018 in assessed property value; in Floyd county, \$62,346.

With 91.47 percent attendance, Floyd lags several percentage points behind the state average. While tiny Home Branch school boosted the county average, with 96.4 percent, Allen Central High School had only 86.4 percent in average daily attendance, while Wheelwright High School had 87.2

The report also lists grade-by-grade results of the new Kentucky Essential Skills Test (KEST) given to all students in April and results of the Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills (CTBS) given to grades three, five, seven and 10.

The KEST resulted from a bill passed by the 1984 General Assembly that required the state to establish certain basic skills as the foundation of classroom teaching, to test whether students had mastered those skills, and to tutor those who had not.

were required to take the test last spring in math and reading; kindergartners took it in reading only. Next spring, all Kentucky students are expected to take the test in writing arts, spelling and reference skills as well.

Whereas the KEST is tied specifically to what is taught in Kentucky schools, the CTBS is a national, standardized achievement test which is not specifically linked to the Kentucky curriculum. Under a 1979 state law, students in grades three, five, seven and 10 take the test in five areas: reading, math, language arts, spelling and library use.

Some of the new channels Prestonsburg might be in line for include MTV, Nickelodeon, the Disney Channel and Showtime, while most of the currently available channels would remain.

The upgrading, however, is not targeted for completion until September

Crawford, aware of the numerous subscriber complaints, ended his letter, saying, "I am hoping that this letter will help to keep your council and city cool for a couple of months. I promise you, you won't be sorry.

Councilman Bill Ray Collins, however, was not impressed. He made a motion, seconded by Councilman Bobby Ranier, to allow "any and all other cable companies to contract in Prestonsburg." Mayor Harold Cooley refused, however, to entertain the motion until City Attorney Larry Brown checked into its legality.

In other action, Council set the city property tax rate for fiscal 1985 at 25¢ per \$100 property evaluation, the same as for last year.

The question of the propriety of paid firefighters doubling as auxiliary police officers was brought up by Collins.

Saying he felt "it's a conflict with the best interests of this city," Collins said he would like to see the practice stopped. He said he was afraid a problem might arise if two separate emergencies necessitated the men abandoning one job to do another, thus leaving the city with diminished services. Police Chief Stan Fletcher said there are now four men pulling such double-duty. Council did not vote on the proposal.

Another matter, ongoing for some time, came again before the Council in the form of a letter sent by attorney Woodrow Burchett to Cooley and each of the council members, concerning a family cemetery the city moved when building the new access road at Cliff. The cemetery is on land owned by the

Burchett wrote that Lillie Parker, a relative of those buried there, had commonument to the new location and had meeting on the first floor.

In an ongoing saga of dissatisfaction failed to erect a chain-link fence around the cemetery. But the mayor and members of council said the city had done much to improve the site.

Following a dispute between 4th St. neighbors, Council voted to have yellow lines painted along both sides of that street across from driveways to better accommodate traffic flow and parking for residents. Fifteen-minute parking will be permitted for loading and unloading, it was decided.

The painting of the yellow lines will fulfill a motion passed by the City Council 18 years ago, said Evans, who added that he didn't know why the painting had not been carried out at that time.

Council also voted to honor E.L. Beirman's request that the city donate \$500 to the Jenny Wiley Festival, to be held here Oct. 6-12.

Floyd County Public Schools UNIFORM CODE OF STUDENT CONDUCT

(Fifth in a Series)

VI. APPEAL AND DUE PROCESS

A pupil shall not be suspended or expelled from school or school related activities, until after at least the following due process procedures have been provided:

a. The pupil has been given oral or written notice of the charge or charges against him/her which constitute cause for suspension; b. The pupil has been given an explanation of the evidence of the charge or charges if the pupil denies them; and

c. The pupil has been given an opportunity to present his/her own evidence and explanation of the facts relating to the charge or

The specifics of suspension and/or expulsion are explained later. These due process procedures shall precede any suspension unless immediate suspension is essential to protect persons or property or to avoid disruption of the ongoing academic process. In such cases, the due process procedures outlined above shall follow the suspension as soon as practicable but no later than three (3) school days after the

Appeal may be made, in writing, through administrative channels to the Board of Education. Written appeals will receive a written response. The channel of appeal is as follows:

Principal, Supervisor of School, Assistant Superintendent, Superintendent. The final level of appeal shall be to the Board of Education through the Superintendent's office.
VII. THE DISCIPLINE PROCESS

A. TEACHERS' DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS The teacher has the following responsibilities:

To stop behavior that interferes with the educational

To preserve the rights of others.

To help students improve their self-discipline. A teacher is responsible for utilizing, as appropriate, the following

measures to maintain discipline: Give a verbal reprimand.

Notify parent/guardian-confer with if necessary. Assign constructive assignments/tasks.

Require a student-teacher conference.

Develop a behavior contract with the student. Refer the student for peer counseling.

Refer the student to the counselor.

Administer corporal punishment (used according to approved guidelines set forth in this Code) when other in-class measures have proven ineffective.

If the misbehavior continues, the student will be referred to the principal/designee for further action. Serious offenses may require direct referral to the principal/designee.

CORPORAL PUNISHMENT Corporal punishment, defined by this code, means swatting a student on the buttocks with a wooden paddle. Corporal punishment should be used as a last resort and only after other acceptable methods of control have been tried and determined ineffective. The purpose of discipline is to alter, modify, or change an unacceptable behavioral pattern. Corporal punishment shall not be excessive or unreasonable and is not in-

tended to injure the student. Striking a child on the head, pinching or slapping his/her face, striking his/her hands with rulers, boxing his/her ears, and similar means of inflicting pain are forbidden on the part of all principals, teachers, or other members of the staff.

Corporal punishment must be administered either by the principal, in the presence of another certified staff member, or by a teacher in the presence of the principal or another teacher, and the second school official must be informed beforehand and in the pupil's presence of the reason for the punishment. Corporal punishment shall not be administered in the presence of other pupils.

The parent, on request, shall be informed in writing of the reasons for the child having received corporal punishment and the name of the second official who was present.

Pupils must have prior warning of offenses for which they may be corporally punished. The following are examples of, but not limited to, offenses for which a pupil may be corporally punished:

Willful violation of any written school policy. Indecent language, either written or spoken. Willful disobedience or defiance of authority. Persistent disobedience or disorder

Habitual tardiness. Unauthorized absence.

Forgery of signature.

Leaving school premises without proper authority.

Willful misrepresentation of the truth.

Use of alcoholic beverages, tobacco, dangerous drugs, or narcotics on or about the school premises or on school buses, or causing to be brought to school, including all schoolsponsored activities, alcoholic beverages, dangerous drugs,

Willful destruction or defacing of school property.

Having in possession, while under the authority of the school, or causing to be brought to school, firearms, knives, or any object that may be considered as a dangerous or deadly weapon(s).

Possession of or shooting firecrackers on school premises. Any acts of misconduct which are so anti-social or disruptive in nature as to shock the conscience. Disruption of class which interferes with the learning by

fellow classmates. Physical or verbal assault of a teacher.

Assault of another student. USE OF REASONABLE PHYSICAL FORCE BY STAFF

School personnel may, under the authorization of the Board of Education (see KRS.180), use reasonable physical force to restrain a student whenever immediate action is essential for self-defense, preservation of order, or protection of other persons or property.

WIC Program Said **Economically Worthy**

A recent congressional study shows that a federal food program for children, pregnant women, and new mothers saves \$3 in short-term hospital costs nationwide for every \$1 spent.

But more importantly, these groups of people in Kentucky are healthier because of the Special Supplemental Feeding Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC), says Peggy Kidd, director of WIC in Kentucky's Department for Health Services.

The WIC program, funded entirely with federal dollars, provides nutrition education and specific foods high in protein, iron and vitamin C to low-income pregnant women, new mothers, infants, and children through age four. With vouchers from local health departments, women can buy iron-fortified cereal, juice, milk, cheese, eggs, beans and peas. For infants, they can buy ironfortified formula, juice and cereal.

"The program's goal is to improve the health of children in their formative years through proper nutrition," said Kidd. "To qualify, participants must be income-eligible and determined by a physician, nutritionist or nurse to be at nutritional risk, meaning they have health problems that can be improved through better nutrition.

"Our studies show that participants in the program—even after as short a time as six months-become healthier," said Kidd. "I believe that these facts, coupled with the federal study showing cost-effectiveness, prove that WIC is a worthwhile expenditure of tax dollars.'

For example, a marked drop in the rate of anemic children occurs after a few months in the program, she said. "This is significant since physicians have observed that anemic children tend to be more susceptible to infections, appear lethargic and are often poor learners in school," said Kidd.

Good nutrition during pregnancy can help prevent low birth-weight babies and can improve the survival chances of those who are born too small, said Kidd.

Families in WIC tend to stay in the health-care system because of realizing that preventive measures can improve health, Kidd said. Because of involvement in WIC, "women are coming in earlier and more frequently for prenatal care and nutritional counseling," she

"However, the success of the program should not be construed to mean that we are doing all that we can do," Kidd pointed out. "In Kentucky, we serve 62,000 women, infants and children every month. There are 161,000 people eligible for the program. We cannot serve these people because of limited

'So we end up serving only those in the high-priority categories, such as women with high-risk pregnancies, teenage mothers, low birth-weight babies, and breastfeeding mothers with nutritionally-related problems.

'We just now have started serving high-risk post-partum women. These are women who definitely need to be served, but if we continue serving them, we may have to cut some children off the

The congressional study by the House Select Committee on Children, Youth and Families supports these conclusions. Only a third of the nine million eligible women in the nation participated in WIC last spring, the report

"The Silent Scream," an edited version of the highly controversial film showing an abortion through ultrasound visualization, followed by a response by Planned Parenthood;

"Speak Out," which shows segments from the National Abortion Rights Action League (NARAL) campaign about women defending their decisions to have abortions; and,

"Abortion Clinic," a documentary, originally aired as part of the "Frontline" series, portraying the agonizing decisions of four pregnant women, two of whom choose abortion and two of whom bring their babies to term.

"The Abortion Battle" is produced by KQED/San Francisco.

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


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
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
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

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Unemployment Rises in State

tucky counties between June and July, reflecting the rise in the statewide rate, according to figures released last Friday by the Cabinet for Human Resources. Rates were lower in 19 counties and remained the same in five.

Sixty-six counties reported rates above 10.0 percent, compared to 51 in June and 59 in July 1984.

Compared to July 1984, rates were higher in 66 counties, lower in 51 and the

In the Big Sandy district Floyd county's 14.2 per cent jobless rate was highest and Martin county's 6.4 percent was lowest. Over the five-county district unemployment for the period rose to 12.2

percent from 11.5 in June. The preliminary statewide rate for July was 9.1 percent, up from a revised 8.3 percent for June. Nationally the comparable rates were 7.4 percent in July, down from 7.5 percent in June. The rates are not seasonally adjusted.

The increase in Kentucky's jobless rate between June and July was caused by a drop in agricultural jobs and a decrease in the number of hourly employees who work for schools and colleges during the summer, according to state labor market analyst Ed Blackwell.

Trimble County reported the state's lowest rate, 3.2 percent, followed by Bourbon with 3.5 percent, Woodford with 3.9 percent, Fayette with 4.5 percent and Scott with 4.7 percent.

Five counties reported rates above 20.0 percent. Wolfe County's 30.7 percent rate was the highest and was a drastic jump from that county's June report of 13.0 percent. Blackwell cited layoffs at the Campton Electronics plant as a contributor to the rate jump. "This is a temporary layoff, with most of the work force expected to be called back in September," he said. "Also, more people entered the labor force. Many of these were applying for jobs at a new shopping center in Jackson and a fastfood restaurant in Campton.'

Carter county's 21.6 percent rate was the second-highest in the state, followed by Letcher's 21.5 percent, Menifee's

Unemployment rates rose in 96 Ken- 21.3 percent and Robertson's 20.5 percent.

Blackwell predicted the August report would show an increase in agricultural employment because of the tobacco harvest season. "Education jobs should increase in September," he said.

Employment also was down in manufacturing and bituminous coal mining, he said. "But more people were working in construction, finance, insurance and real estate, transportation, communications and utilities, and trade."

An estimated 1,558,400 Kentuckians were working in July, down from 1,572,900 in June and just barely above the 1,558,300 employed in July 1984. The state's jobless numbered 156,100 up from 142,000 in June and slightly below the July 1984 report of 156,300.

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

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

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Crop Development Rate Remains Good

Harvest time is keeping Kentucky farmers busy despite scattered rainfall, according to Agriculture Commissioner David E. Boswell.

Current farm activities are centered around cutting and housing tobacco, harvesting hay, chopping corn silage, spraying weeds and preparing field machinery for the up-coming corn and soybean harvest.

Moisture levels are quite good, with only 4 percent short, 85 percent adequate and 11 percent surplus.

Burley tobacco cutting has advanced to 48 percent complete, continuing to be well ahead of last year's 28 percent and the average of 33 percent. The tobacco still in the fields is rated 13 percent fair, 69 percent good and 18 percent excellent.

"But there has only been a limited amount of houseburn and rotting, so we're really in pretty good shape," the Commissioner said.

The dark tobacco harvest is also well ahead of normal, with 52 percent cut.
"The corn crop is also progressing

rapidly," Boswell said.

The crop is now entirely in the dough stage and beyond. Over four-fifths of the crop, 86 percent, has reached dent stage or beyond, compared with 72 percent last year and for the average.

Thirty percent of the crop has been rated as mature, as compared to 13 percent last year and 20 percent average.

"We're happy to see that yields for early harvested corn have been good, and that farmers are busy harvesting silage corn as time permits," Boswell said.

Some farmers are expressing concern over potential damage from corn borers as the season progresses, but as of Aug. 30, the corn crop was rated 6 percent fair, 63 percent good and 31 percent excellent.

The rains have been a great help to late-planted, full-season beans and especially to double-crop beans. The beans are showing good growth and 72 percent of the soybeans are podded or podding

This compares to 70 percent last year and 76 percent on average.

The soybean crop is listed as 10 percent fair, 68 percent good and 22 percent excellent.

Grain sorghum is being rated as mostly good. The hay harvest is continuing, although recent rains have delayed some cuttings.

Select Group Visits Auxier, Other Points

Points of interest in Floyd, Johnson and Martin counties were inspected last week by a group of "emerging leaders," from across the state.

A state police investigation is being conducted into allegations of election irregularities in the May primary and a report is expected to be made to the Floyd Circuit Court grand jury at its November session, Commonwealth's Attorney James R. Allen said this week.

Allen said the report, which is being prepared by the state police special investigations branch, was originally anticipated at the grand jury session just completed. However, several new charges necessitated that the probe be extended, he said.

Among the alleged irregularities are "abnormally high" numbers of absentee voters and voters requiring assistance at the polls and alleged infractions by the board of election commissioners.

East Kentucky Grouse Trapped for Stocking

A program to capture 150 ruffed grouse from six eastern Kentucky counties was begun recently by the Department of Fish and Wildlife in an effort to restore the bird to its historic range across the state.

Grouse from Rowan, Clay, Knott, Jackson, Bath, and Breathitt counties will be released in the Land Between the Lakes National Recreation Area located in Trigg and Lyon counties, and at the Higginson-Henry Wildlife Management Area (WMA) in Union county.

Extirpated from the central and western portions of the state in the early part of the century, the grouse has thrived in the eastern mountains and has been naturally extending its range into the central counties again. The Department believes that stocking the birds will hasten the process, and that protection will soon increase the population to harvestable levels.

East Kentucky sportsmen should not be concerned that their birds will be trapped out. According to Lauren Schaaf, Assistant Director of Wildlife, the grouse are being trapped from a very large area, and many of the birds taken would succumb to natural mortality before the hunting season. "There will still be plenty of birds to hunt" he says.

Stocking wildlife into areas with suitable habitat is a normal management practice and a successful one. The Knott county deer stocking program, where 500 whitetails were relocated to the east from the Ballard WMA is an example of that success.

Big Sandy Family Planning Program

In accordance with the Title X legislation, federally subsidized Family Planning services are available to all clients requesting them, but, special priority will be given persons who are high risk and to those of low income. The regulations also state that charges will be made for services to persons other than those from low income families in accordance with an income and family size

The regional program consultant for Family Planning points out that services to high risk women are a priority. High risk is defined as women under age 20 and over age 35 of childbearing capability, women 20 to 34 with four or more pregnancies, women giving birth two times within a 17-month period, women with a history of premature birth weight or fetal death, women having had an abortion and women with low educational attainment. The following is a listing of priorities in accordance with federal policy and regulations: 1. High risk women and their partners with incomes below poverty; 2. All teenagers;

3. All low income persons. The mission of the Statewide Family Planning Program is to provide individuals the information and means to exercise personal choice in determining the number and spacing of their children. Family Planning clinics must provide services without regard to religion, race, color, national origin, creed, handicap, sex, number of pregnancies, martial status, age and contraceptive preferance.

Every Family Planning clinic must assure client confidentiality and provide safeguards for individuals against the invasion of personal privacy.

Some of the services offered by the Family Planning clinic is provision of a method of birth control including sterilization, counseling and referral; to other services offered in the health department or county offices. Annual pap smear, pelvic and breast examinations are offered as well as pregnancy testing, which takes only approximately five minutes to perform. Abnormal pap smears, high blood pressures and diabetes are monitored and/or referred as indicated. Genetic counseling and referrals are also done.

A debate has recently been raging regarding parental notification of adolescent family planning patients. Regardless of the outcome, family planning clinics are concerned with involving patient's families whenever it can be a supportive influence for the decisions patients are making. Adolescent patients are encouraged to discuss their actions with parents if they feel it is feasible.

Watts said 15 persons were working in the mine at the time of the accident. None of the other miners was injured. The BJ & L operation was "an excellent







Paintsville, Hazard Seminars On Kindergarten Program Set

The Kentucky Department of Education will hold training sessions on effective kindergarten programs at locations throughout the state during the 1985-86 school year, the first year of mandatory kindergarten attendance in Kentucky.

The first of 11 two-day sessions are scheduled in Perry and Johnson counties this month. Training will be offered on Sept. 16 at Hazard Community College and on Sept. 24 at the Carriage House in Paintsville. A second day of training is planned Oct. 18 in Hazard and Oct. 24 in

"Through these workshops we hope to bring about a better understanding of what constitutes an effective kindergarten and to involve teachers, administrators and the community in working together toward that goal,' Superintendent of Public Instruction Alice McDonald said.

The training sessions are designed for instructional leaders, kindergarten teachers, university personnel and the directors of private preschools. The training team at each site will consist of four early-childhood specialists from the Kentucky Department of Education and a kindergarten teacher from that region.

The 1984 General Assembly approved a law that made successful completion of kindergarten a prerequisite for entry into the first grade, beginning in 1986. The session will include the rationale for mandatory kindergarten attendance and the benefits anticipated from the program.

Participants will also be instructed in methods for determining successful completion of kindergarten and the ac-

creditation requirements for kindergarten. Other topics include the kindergarten environment, curriculum, financing, and the involvement of parents and the community.

In conjunction with the training sessions, a local resource fair at each site will provide information about community resources that can contribute to the kindergarten program.

The training sessions have been approved by the State Board of Education for 12 hours of training credit for instructional leaders. Under legislation approved by the 1984 General Assembly, instructional leaders are required to complete 42 hours of training every two





Report Says Headstart Aids Kids, Saves Money

Head Start, child nutrition and early intervention programs top a list of eight federal programs that have improved the lives of children and saved the public money, says a new congressional report.

The report, prepared for the House Select Committee on Children, Youth and Families, gave high marks to all eight programs elected for study, which included childhood immunization, Medicaid, the special supplemental food program for women, infants and children (WIC), prenatal care and youth employment and training.

Programs such as Head Start, the report says, have resulted in better grades, fewer absences, less need for special education services, greater likelihood of high school graduation and continuation of schooling beyond high school.

"The findings are clear. Head Start produces substantial gains in children's cognitive and language development, school readiness and achievement. Children in Head Start obtain markedly higher levels of health care than children not in the program, have fewer absences from school and perform better on physical tests," the report notes.

In general, the report says that \$1 invested in preschool education returns \$4.75 in savings because of lower special education and welfare costs, and higher worker productivity.

1985 Dove Season Opens With Increase Of Birds

The dove season in Kentucky opened with an increase in the number of birds harvested as compared to 1984, according to information received from Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources regional law enforcement supervisors in an informal telephone

Over Labor Day weekend, September 1-2, conservation officers checked 5,248 hunters in 79 of Kentucky's 120 counties, who had bagged a total of 21,963 doves. Four hundred fifty seven hunters checked by conservation officers had bagged their daily limit of 12 doves. The informal telephone survey is conducted annually as a means of subjectively comparing hunter success on opening weekend and estimating the availabili-

ty of birds. The number of doves harvested per hunter during the opening weekend of the 1985 season (4.18) was higher than the three year average of 3.61 doves per hunter, and considerably more than the 1984 success ratio of 2.90 doves per hunter. During three days of hunting on the opening weekend of the 1984 season, the 4,764 hunters checked had harvested 14,146 doves. In 1983, 5,587 opening weekend hunters bagged 21,079 doves (667 limits checked) for a hunters success ratio of 3.77.

An increase in the number of birds available in 1985 was noted in the first, third, fourth, and sixth law enforcement districts. A slight decrease was noted in the second district, with the fifth, eighth, and ninth districts reporting population levels that were unchanged from last

In the first district of far western Kentucky, an above average harvest was reported on opening day at the Ballard County Wildlife Management Area where 527 hunters took 4,165 doves. A total of 78 limits were checked and the hunter success ratio was 7.90 birds per hunter. Public hunting at Ballard continues through October 14.

Statewide, dove season continues through October 31; the second half of the split season opens November 30, and runs through December 8. Shooting hours are from 11:00 a.m. until sunset during the September 1-October 31 season. During the later time frame, November 30-December 8, hunting is allowed from sunrise to sunset, since the

hours of daylight are extremely short.

The bag limit is 12 doves per day. After two or more days of shooting, a possession limit of 24 doves applies to the transportation of game. A possession limit does not allow a double bag limit in the field.

Prestonsburg's Greg Shepherd kicked off, but the Tigers fumbled the ball, Prestonsburg recovering on the Tiger 28. In three plays the 'Cats marched the

On the forth play of the drive, John Goble ran into the end zone for the 'Cats' second TD. Hackworth again displayed deadly accuracy for the extra point, and with 6:49 left in the first quarter Prestonsburg led, 14-0.

Possession of the ball changed hands five more times in the quarter, and it was not until 10:36 remained in the half that Prestonsburg again stung the visitors, this time on a 23-yard carry by Nunnery. Again Hackworth made the extra point.

After five more changes of possession, the 'Cats once more struck gold when Pete Green received a Goble pass, scrambling past several defenders for the score. Again, Hackworth's aim was true for the extra point.

With the score now 28-0, things were beginning to look grim for Paintsville, but most of their gutsy fans stuck it out till the third quarter, when Prestonsburg scored as Goble flashed nine yards for the six points. 

WILD ANIMALS

Kentucky Veterinary Medical Association Pity the poor little rabbits, orphaned in their nest by the mowing machine. And the baby squirrel dropped from its nest. As well as the young raccoon obviously disoriented and lost.

To pity them is fine. To take them home with you, even if the pity is sincere, may be opening to you a Pandora's box of trouble and disappointment.

To begin with, wild animals have personalities and natural instincts that equip them to survive in a wild environment. They may not survive in captivity, and certainly will not thrive. Most have an instinctive fear of man as well, which further complicates things. And then, you simply may not have time to care for the very young according to

Wild rabbits are a good example. If their eyes are not open, they require almost constant attention. If they can see, their fear of man becomes a domipant factor and they may refuse to eat

No matter how good the intention, attempting to raise extremely young wild animals may innocently result in their

Beyond that, consider the danger to humans. Skunks, for example, are the primary reservoior of rabies in Kentucky. Baby skunks have been known to be carriers and even a playful nip from an infected young skunk can result in human infection.

Tularemia is another danger. In humans it causes headache, nausea, high fever and severe prostration, followed by extreme weakness, recurring chills and profuse sweating. Even slight contact with an infected animal is sufficient to transmit the disease, which is caused by Francisella tularensis, which can penetrate unbroken skin. It is so highly infectious that special precautions must be taken in laboratories when attempts are made to isolate it.

All wild animals in Kentucky are protected to one degree or another by government regulations. To keep one in captivity requires a holding permit, available from the Department of Wildlife for \$6 per year. The holder is subject to inspection by the department at any time to assure the animal receives proper care. Penalty for violation is a fine ranging from \$15 to \$100, plus court costs.

animals for exhibition or sale require a commercial license, available from the same department at a cost of \$30.

Federal regulations protect most birds such as hawks, eagles and owls. Permits for keeping them in captivity are difficult to obtain and penalities are

Beyond that, there are strict regulations prohibiting the importing of certain wild animals into the state for any purpose. These include wild hogs, jackrabbits, the monk parakeet, the javelina and nutris, wild turkey, the San Juan rabbit, bears, bobcats, cougars and

The only exceptions to this regulation are zoos with animals for exhibit.

Department of Wildlife personnel recommed that if you discover orphaned wild animals, report it to their office or to local officials who will contact them. They are equipped to care for young animals and then release them in their natural habitat. They will pick up such wild animals with no questions asked.

Those who wish to keep wild animals in captivity should also be aware that not all veterinarians are willing to treat them, and that treatment of wild animals is not always as successful as treatment of domestic animals.

If you're thinking of catching a wild animal for a pet, best advice is-don't! If you're thinking of buying one at a pet store, thus covering the legal aspects, look around in advance for a veterinarian who both has the expertise and is willing to treat it.





Gasoline Up 4.4 Cents from Year Ago

The estimated 28 million motorists on creases of 2.3 and 2.9 cents respectivethe road over the Labor Day weekend found that the average price of gasoline, \$1.269 a gallon, is 4.4 cents higher than it was last Labor Day, the Blue Grass Auto Club (AAA) reports.

AAA's latest fuel gauge survey shows that, nationally, gas prices have increased by .3 cent a gallon since July 4.

Nationally, full service prices average \$1.312 for regular and \$1.377 for unleaded gasoline, increases of .4 and .3 cents, respectively, since July 4th, date of AAA's last survey.

Self service prices were \$1.157 for regular, an increase of .4 cent, and unleaded remained \$1,229 a gallon.

Premium unleaded rose .3 cent, to \$1.47, for full service stations, and .4 cent to \$1.338 at self service stations. The price of this grade of fuel is not included in the national average because of its relatively small share of the market. Diesel fuel, at \$1.25 a gallon, dropped

1.2 cents since July. In its survey of service stations throughout Central and Eastern Kentucky, the Blue Grass Auto Club found that gasoline prices have increased here

also since July 4. Although full service regular dropped 3.2 cents to \$1.271, unleaded increased 2 cents to an average of \$1.346 and premium unleaded increased 1.4 cents

Mine Permits Issued

The Division of Permits of the State Department for Surface Mining Reclamation and Enforcement issued 201 permits in July.

The permits included 54 original permits, one transition permit, 72 revision permits, 12 amendment permits, 43 twoacre permits, and 19 transfer permits. Of the 201 permits, 10 were for preparation plants and refuse areas, three for haul roads, 90 for surface mining and 51 for underground mining.

Permitting activities for July authorized the disturbance of 23,575.03 new acres and resulted in the collection of \$344,050 in fees.

In this county, stripmine permits were issued to Cager Branch Coal Co. and Homer Short Co. (revision); deep mine permits were issued to Allen and Newsome Coal Co. (revision); Amber Coal Co. (Ligon Prep Plant); Wellmore Coal Co.
