Court Approves Larger FD Limit

The Floyd County Fiscal Court met in regular session on Friday, Dec. 16.

The Court approved the minutes of the last meeting, the treasurer's report and the electrical inspector's monthly report.

The petition, presented by Paul Howard in the November meeting to close Red Dog Hollow in Stone Coal, was denied by the court. Several people protested the road closing.

A petition requesting that the Allen Fire Department extend its protection area from Simpson Branch south to the mouth of Justice Branch, was presented and accepted by the court.

Property owners of the private road of the Shaun Howell Subdivision in Abbott Creek presented a petition to have the county take the road into the county road system, provided that the county maintain the road. The petition was accepted.

A petition was presented by landowners to condemn the Katy Friend Hollow Road and accept it into the county road system. Landowners stated that the road has been used as a public passway for 60 plus years, although it is privately owned.

They also said they couldn't maintain the road because the owner would not let any heavy equipment pass over the road. The court directed the petitioners to return to the January meeting to allow time for study of the road.

Arnold Collins, a resident of Mare Creek, requested that someone

assume responsibility for the Mare Creek road and surface it. Collins said that neither Pike nor Floyd County would take responsibility for the road, although residents pay taxes in both counties.

Judge John M. Stumbo said he would contact Pike County and possibly render a solution to Collins at the next meeting.

The court passed a resolution at the August meeting to be added to the Official Personnel Code for Floyd County employees stating if a county employee runs for an elected



Floyd Board Meets, OKs Bond Issuance

In a special meeting Thursday, the Floyd County Board of Education approved the sale of \$3.5 million in construction bonds for the new Right Beaver (Garrett-Wayland) Elementary School.

The board also employed bond counsel, but declined to comply with an architect Paul Hoffman's request that his firm be given a letter relieving them of any liability for site preparation on the site.

Discussion by board members revealed that a road currently exists that allows access to a two-acre site near a highwall above the school, but that the architect's design calls for the road to be eliminated.

Board members questioned why the architect asked to be relieved of all liability at the site rather than at the area mentioned if the road is left in place.

"This is very minute; it doesn't affect the school site," said Superintendent Ron Hager.

"It just makes me think that there is something wrong somewhere along the way," noted member Ray "Shag" Campbell.

Board member James Arville Duff noted that it was "doubtful" that the district would use the two-acre tract, and that if it is needed, the district could re-construct the road.

After the board meeting adjourned, members re-convened as the Floyd County School District Finance Corporation; the board comprises membership of the corporation. Elected as officers of the company were Dr. James D. Adams, president; Campbell, as vice president; Hager, as secretary;

Blue Ribbon Panel Hears From Auditor

Home Burns

A house belonging to Elkhorn Coal Corp., occupied by the Lewis Smith family, was totally destroyed by fire Friday night in Eastern.

According to Darrell Bradley, chief of the Maytown Fire Department, personnel received the call about 9:20 p.m., and had 13 firefighters and four trucks responding. Upon arrival, they found the entire second story of the home engulfed in fire.

Bradley said the fire apparently began upstairs. Officials believe coal in a fireplace may have exploded, throwing embers into the room.

Firefighters were on the scene about two and a half hours Friday night; the home was still smoldering Saturday. Bradley said renovations resulting in double walls and double ceilings contributed to the rapid spread of the fire and difficulty in controlling it. No dollar estimate of the loss was available as of press time.



Body Found At Local Lounge

The body of Sharon Kay Robinson Spradlin was found lodged in a window opening in the front of the Wildcat Lounge in Prestonsburg early Thursday morning.

Preliminary reports indicate the 33-year-old Prestonsburg woman died of suffocation while attempting to climb out of the window.

According to officials with the Kentucky State Police, no foul play is suspected.

Deputy County Coroner Glenn Frazier, who pronounced Spradlin

dead at the scene, said the woman was reportedly locked in the building when the lounge closed.

Evidence indicated she broke out the window, stood on a metal folding chair and tried to climb out, said Frazier, but the chair collapsed. She was apparently unable to climb back in, he said. Frazier estimated the time of death was 2 or 3 a.m. Thursday. Her body was discovered about 8:30 a.m.

Spradlin, daughter of long-time Floyd County Clerk C. Ollie Robinson, is survived by her mother,

Margie Neeley Osborne of Prestonsburg; her husband, John Thomas Spradlin of Prestonsburg; two daughters, Angela Kay Spradlin and Amber Nicole Spradlin, both living at home; a sister, Melissa R. Tussey of Dayton, Ohio; and her maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Elza Neeley of Prestonsburg.

Funeral services were held Sunday, Dec. 18, at 1 p.m. at Carter Funeral Home with the Rev. Lowell Robinson and the Rev. L.P. Tussey officiating. Burial followed in Davidson Memorial Gardens at Ivel.

Train Strikes, Kills Area Man

A 21-year-old Hager Hill man died Thursday afternoon after being struck by a train at a crossing in Dwale.

Aster L. Hill Jr. was pronounced dead at the scene by Floyd County Coroner Roger Nelson.

According to Det. Joel Newsome with the Pikeville Post, Kentucky

State Police, Hill was walking on one of two adjacent train tracks and, as the locomotive approached, stepped off of the unoccupied track into the train's path.

Hill, an employee of Asplundh, a tree trimming service, was working in the area. Newsome said the engineer of the CSX Railway train blew the train's whistle more than once; state Department of Transportation employees in the area also heard the whistle.

The CSX Railway engineer told officials the train was traveling about

35 miles per hour when the accident occurred. A speed report on the train may be received by the Floyd County Coroner's office this week.

Newsome said transportation department employees spoke with Hill just before the accident, and said Hill's hearing did not appear to be impaired. Newsome said he had no reason to believe alcohol was involved in the accident.

The state police trooper said it appeared Newsome thought the train was approaching on the other set of tracks.

Wheelwright Council Addresses City's Water Issues

Wheelwright City Council members heard a report on the water supply and passed two resolutions dealing with the city's park system at Saturday's monthly meeting.

Randall Johnson, chairman of the Utilities Commission, reported that residents should be using water from the new source on Jack's Creek by mid-week. However, he cautioned that the new supply represents only a "short term solution" and that the commission must look for a more permanent source of water.

Council passed a resolution to apply for funds, through a 50 percent matching grant, from Big Sandy Area Development District to build a ball park on the site of the town's old slate dump.

In an effort to improve and upgrade the city's current park system, council appointed six members to a newly created Parks Commission. Appointed were Andy Akers, Clark Thornsberry, Harlis Stone, Debbie Hall, Robert Hood and Myra Thornsberry.

Accident Claims Second Victim

Louverla Adams, the 38-year-old mother of five boys injured in an automobile accident at Boldman almost two weeks ago, has died of injuries sustained in the same accident.

Her husband, Roy Adams, 43, was killed instantly when the accident took place.

The Grethel couple was traveling home with their five sons when a truck driven by John J. Jarrell, 21, of Banner, struck their vehicle.

All five boys were injured in the Dec. 10 accident. Those released have been Roy Dewayne, 2; Ronald Eugene, 17; and Jason Milford, 5.

Still receiving care at Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington are Joseph Lee, 13, and Daniel Louis, 15. Jarrell is hospitalized at the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

Charges against Jarrell, who was absent without leave from National Guard duty, may be pending.

Caudill Receives 20-Year Term

On Wednesday, Dec. 14, Kenneth Caudill of Prestonsburg was convicted of first degree sodomy by a Floyd County Circuit Court jury. The conviction stemmed from a case opened up by Cpt. G. Hall and Officer C. Akers, according to Hall. The victim was a 12-year-old juvenile. Caudill was sentenced to 20 years in a state prison; he will be transferred from the Floyd County jail at a later date.

In a separate incident, a city employee was not seriously injured Tuesday when he was shocked while working to repair lights on the city's Christmas tree.

An accident involving two cars and a coal truck occurred on Monday, Dec. 12 at Branham Street and US 23, resulting in no injuries or citations, according to Cpt. G. Hall of the Prestonsburg Police Department.

The persons involved in the accident were Anthony Bova of Grove City, Ohio, Betty G. Summers of Prestonsburg and Russell E. Conley of Wheelersburg, Ohio.

In a separate accident on Saturday, Dec. 17, a vehicle driven by Kenneth Music slid into a vehicle driven by Russell Music, due to slick road conditions, according to Cpt. G. Hall.

On Friday, Dec. 9, a car belonging to David Fletcher of Flatrock was stolen from the Prestonsburg Village Shopping Center while Fletcher was shopping, according to Sgt. Sue Blackburn. The car has not yet been recovered, officials reported.






Program Offers Clients Help, Understanding

Mountain Comprehensive Care offers Floyd Countians a variety of services, but one very special — and little-known — program at the Martin Clinic fills a unique niche.

Tony Bentley, as part of his role as site supervisor at the Martin clinic, oversees the partial hospitalization program, which serves more than 50 clients each week.

"Our primary emphasis is to work with individuals who need development in social and personal skills,"

Bentley explains. "We try to help build people's self-esteem, and help them find ways to work out their daily routines. Ultimately, our goal is to try to avoid hospitalization, or prevent re-hospitalization."

The program's clients are local residents who have a need for treatment of mental illness — either long-term or severe — those who need more intensive treatment than is available on an out-patient basis.

"This is a purely voluntary program," Bentley emphasizes. Clients may suffer from emotional illnesses that cause severe adjustment dif-

iculties to life situations that many people take for granted.

Clients attend the program five days a week, and participate in a variety of activities designed to help them become better oriented to reality. Individual and group therapy is also available, says Bentley.

"We are trying to get people to improve or increase their awareness and orientation to reality," he explains. "People tend to withdraw into themselves when they have severe mental illness, and we try to draw them out of themselves, out of their regression or withdrawal."

Using a somewhat structured program, Bentley and the staff utilize activities that revolve around occupational awareness and readiness, including woodworking, ceramics, maintenance, basic cooking, money management and other simple, structured activities.

"These activities tend to allow a person to experience similar situations to what they have in everyday life," Bentley observes. "They interact with other people, doing something they can be proud of, which builds their self-esteem. It also improves their orientation to focusing on the here and now, and on real issues of life."

By providing activities in a therapeutic environment, Bentley and his staff can help clients deal with problems they encounter in various areas.

"Hopefully, we help people improve in family and other social functions, so that they understand how to work at a job with their disability," says Bentley.

"A lot of this is an educational process, too, for them to understand

their illness," he adds. "We look at it like a chronic physical illness. If they understand it more, they don't have this devaluing stigma attached — that they just aren't capable of handling their life."

Bentley notes that many of the illnesses suffered by the clients can be controlled through medication and

therapy.

The Martin partial hospitalization staff includes Bentley, as site supervisor; Estill Newsome, supervisor of the partial program; Karen Gibson, a professional clinician who assists in the program; and additional staff members Andrea Conley, Jack Spears, Dena Buckley and Herbert

Spears, who help administer the program.

In addition to the partial hospitalization program, outpatient services are available at the clinic.

Fifty Years Ago

(December 15, 1938)

With an "almost undreamed-of goal" in sight—the convening of a Floyd grand jury without a slaying to investigate—three murder warrants were issued last week, marring the county's longest "peacetime record" in approximately 15 years. The fight for two positions on the Floyd County Board of Education was resumed last week as both John Coburn and Wesley Campbell, defeated candidates, filed suits. Unreasonably slow driving speeds on the highway are more and more being recognized as a traffic menace by legislators and already 22 states have adopted minimum speed laws. For the benefit of drug store coaches and "cracker barrel second guessers," Walter Price, local athletic official, gave out his selections for an all-time, all-Prestonsburg high gridiron team. Russell Rice, current All-Big Sandy conference tackle, is the only member of this year's squad to be placed on Price's all-time team, which includes: Backs—Harkie Mayo, now playing for Navy, whose booming punts will long be remembered here; Frank "Red" Branham, bone-crushing full-back who could toss a football like a baseball. Price's linemen, each a tower of strength, are Tom Marshall, center; Harold Williamson and Jim Dotson, guards; Victor Hale and Russell Rice, tackles. For ends he chooses Wendell Spurlock and John Hunley, who perhaps is best remembered for his backfield work. There died: Mrs. Drendy Slone, 69, mother of Dr. C. R. Slone, of Prestonsburg; Mrs. Nancy Nelson Campbell, 95, who died at her home at Water Gap, was probably Floyd County's oldest woman; James Hackworth, 51, Bonanza, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hackworth.

Legislative Perspective

This week, members of the special session of the Kentucky General Assembly completed their work to establish a lottery. A reliable and effective lottery commission has been established through the legislation fashioned in the three weeks of concentrated effort by lawmakers. I am proud to have played a role in creating what I believe will be a model lottery program in the United States.

My Legislative colleagues are to be commended for their efforts in completing this streamlined measure in such a short time. Cooperation between members of the House of Representatives and the Senate has been outstanding, as well as the Governor's willingness to discuss all aspects of the issue.

I believe that the mechanism

designed to operate a Kentucky lottery is the best of its kind anywhere. We have investigated other states' programs and lottery and vendor experts have testified before the State Government Committee. As I discussed last week, major details of the lottery legislation include the creation of an independent corporation to manage the lottery. The corporation will be headed by a board of directors and a president of the corporation. The legislation provides for legislative oversight and subjects employees of the lottery and those retailers participating in the lottery to security checks.

The General Assembly also set in motion a plan to initiate a Vietnam Veterans bonus that will be funded by revenue realized from the lottery.

In anticipation of a special session in 1989 to address major weaknesses in the state's education program, a

12-point plan to improve all aspects of education by the year 2000 was unveiled by members of the Joint Committee on Education.

Those critical points include additional funding for the power equalization program that helps poor districts make up for their low tax base. Legislators also recognize the high dropout rate of high school students in Kentucky. The plan recommends that rate be cut in half and attempts to be made to raise the percentage of adults with high school education to 90 percent by the year 2000.

Education programs favored by the Governor such as classroom restructuring and early childhood education and medical screening were included in the goals established.

The interim committee also announced plans for an "education summit" during the last week of January. Legislators are hopeful education supporters from across the state, professional educators, legislators and the Governor can at that time lay specific plans for legislation that will set Kentucky on the right track for our children and our future economic endeavors.

Persons unable to pick up commodities may authorize another person to be their representative; the applicant can pick up for themselves and one other person. The representative must show a signed, dated statement that includes October's total income, address, and number in family.

Religious Viewpoints

"I know the Bible says Jesus was tempted like me in every way, but I find it hard to believe he was tempted and tried with pressure like I have right now." Even the strongest, in the midst of a traumatic experience, wonders if God really understands. Many hurting church members have shared such agony of doubt with their preacher.

We can confidently say, "The Bible says it, I believe it, and that settles it."

The Bible clearly teaches that Jesus does understand: "Because he himself suffered when he was tempted, he is able to help those who are being tempted." -Hebrews 2:18

"For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weakness, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are, yet was without sin." -Hebrews 4:15

But how can we make these passages our own? The following thoughts entitled "God's Sheltered Life" by an unknown author will help us to understand.

At the end of time billions of people were scattered on a great plain before God's throne.

Some were near the front talking heatedly and belligerently. "How can God judge us and know about suffering?" snapped a taunting brunette. She jerked back her sleeve to reveal a tattooed number from a prison, a Nazi concentration camp. "We endured terror, beatings, torture, death!"

In another group a black man lowered his collar and snarled, "What about this?" He revealed an ugly rope burn while shouting, "Lynched for no crime but being black! We have suffocated in slave ships, been wrenched from our loved ones, toiled until only death gave release!"

There were hundreds of such complaints against God for the evil and suffering He permitted and for His calloused indifference to the human plight. How lucky God is to live in heaven where all is sweetness and light, where there is no weeping, no fear, no hunger, no hatred. They all agreed "God lives a pretty sheltered life."

Each group sent a leader as a representative before God. There was a Jew, a black, an untouchable from India, an illegitimate, a person from Hiroshima and one from a Siberian slave labor camp. After consulting in the middle of the plain they presented their case.

It was simple. Before God would be qualified to judge, He must endure what they had endured. Their decision was that "God should be sentenced to live on earth—as a man!"

To keep Him from using His powers for protection, the delegates gave the following safeguards: Let Him be born a Jew. Let the legitimacy of His birth be doubted. Let Him champion a radical cause that would incur wrath. Let Him try to describe what no man has ever experienced through the five senses. Let Him be betrayed by His dearest friends. Let Him be indicted on false charges. Let Him experience utter loneliness. Let Him be tortured and let Him die in humiliation!

As each leader announced his portion of the sentence, loud murmurs of approval rippled across the great throng. But when the last had finished there was a long silence. No one uttered another word. No one moved. For suddenly all knew....God had already served His sentence!

God understands because He was incarnate in Jesus Christ! "The Word became flesh and dwelt among men and we beheld His glory as the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth" -John 1:14.

The one trait of Jesus which stands above all others is His understanding compassion. "When

Jesus...saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd" -Mark 6:34.

It is a misconception of Jesus which depicts Him as the aloof king and the insensitive judge.

In the upper room, in the presence of one having all authority, the apostles would have expected to look up, but instead they looked down where He knelt washing their feet!

The angel seeking someone worthy to open the scrolls was told by an elder, "See the Lion of the tribe of Judah...has triumphed. He is able to open the scroll...." He looked for a lion but "saw a Lamb, looking as if it had been slain...." -Revelations 5.







with the school system, according to panel chairwoman Dolores Smith.

The panel agreed to sponsor two open forums in January to hear concerns and to involve local citizens in the panel's review process. One forum will be for teachers and the other for the general public. Dates will be announced later.

In sub-committee reports, Jean Rosenberg, chairperson of the curriculum committee, said the group considers the curriculum audit to be "factual and valid."

Gary Frazier, assistant superintendent, highlighted the school administration's plans to implement the audit recommendations.

The management and personnel sub-committee, headed by Anne Chaney, reported it is looking at dif-

ferent management structures to determine the most effective structure for the local system.

Russell Frazier, assistant superintendent for finance, explained the system's current budget to the finance committee. The committee also plans to use information, expected in January, from the state Department of Education on the financial status of the school system.

The sub-committees are proceeding with the tasks of coming up with long range goals and a sense of mission for the school system, said Smith. One of the panel's specific tasks, she said, is to find ways to index teacher salaries.

The panel's next meeting is Jan. 12 at 6:30 p.m. at the school board office.





Three of Clay's starters had fouled out as the fourth period waned, hurting the PHS squad's ability to be aggressive on defense.


Despite the attempted comeback, the Lady Rebs finally out-hustled Prestonsburg, earning a 64-59 win.

In a separate contest, the Lady Trojans fell to M.C. Napier last week, 57-38, despite 15-point efforts from both Hood and Hutton.


Saturday's win takes the WHS women to 1-5 on the season.


4:39 mark, when McDowell took the lead for good at 42-40 and extended to eight, 48-40, with 2:49 remaining.



"We're good enough to win the 58th District," Coach Compton said. The Lady Rebs demonstrated that by coming out in the second half and


shooting 66 percent from the field.







Gun Deer Season Dates Becoming Traditional

Next year's deer gun season will again open on the second Saturday of November, a date that is rapidly becoming "traditional" with Kentucky hunters.

The Fish and Wildlife Resources commission approved the dates for next fall's hunt at its Dec. 5 meeting in Frankfort, according to John Wilson, F&WR spokesman.

The gun season will run for 10 consecutive days over much of the state, but hunters in some deer zones will be limited to either five or three days of hunting.

Hunting in the five-day zones will begin Nov. 16, and in three-day zones, on Nov. 18. Gun season will close in all zones on Nov. 20.

The commission approves gun season dates at its December meeting so that deer hunters who have to plan their vacations early in the year will know when to ask for time off.



Students Help Provide Holiday Cheer

In the dark, snowy hours of early Saturday, a group of students from the Delbarton School in Morristown, N.J. swiftly unloaded two 40-ton trucks, filled with clothes, toys and other gifts to make Christmas a little merrier for some of the area's neediest families.

After more than 12 hours on the road, the young men arrived with the donated goods to help staff of the Christian Appalachian Project prepare food and gift baskets for 715 families in Floyd, Knott and Magoffin counties.

They were joined later Saturday by a team of students from Creighton University in Omaha, Neb. Along with CAP staff and local volunteers, the visitors packed boxes, in assembly line fashion, for distribution Monday and Tuesday.

The recipients had been identified throughout the year through CAP's various service programs, said Joe Foley, who helps coordinate the Christmas basket program. "We compiled lists of families with first names, ages, gender and interests so that each family gift box could be personalized," Foley said.

Family sponsors from across the country sent individualized boxes to about 220 of the needy families on the CAP list. The other family boxes were assembled locally.

CAP purchased more than \$8,000 worth of food, including canned hams, fruit, rice, potatoes and other items, depending on the family's likes and needs, from local stores and agencies.

Saturday, Mike Sanders, director of CAP's eastern district headquartered in Martin, apologized for the appearance of the organization's warehouse in West Prestonsburg. "It's been coming in so fast we can't keep up with it," said Sanders, referring to the stacks of donations that have come from across the country and on the trucks from New Jersey.

Sanders said some of the clothing and toys are used, but much of it is

new.

Floyd County families received their gift boxes at the warehouse on Monday, following services at St.

Martha's Catholic Church. Families in Knott and Magoffin received boxes in their respective counties on Tuesday.

Ceramic Birds Out, Flannel Sheets In

Mammaw smiles and says thank you, but she's really afraid she'll scream if she gets one more ceramic bird.

Uncle Bert sighs and puts the new tie in the drawer alongside the 43 other ties he seldom wears.

But what can you do? What can you get as a holiday gift for a relative or friend who doesn't seem to need or want anything you can afford to give them?

Everyone at the *Floyd County Times* pitched in with a few suggestions for helping you with your holiday shopping.

Parents, grandparents and elderly relatives and friends can present a problem when they seem to be fairly content with what they have. On the no-no list, for sure, are what-nots, house slippers, and dull brown car-

digan sweaters—unless that's what is requested.

Instead, look around for things they might need, or consider luxuries. Try a food basket filled with grocery items normally passed up because of cost, such as smoked oysters, or canned salmon or Canadian bacon. Listen to them talk about foods they once ate but can no longer afford.

Everyday items that they need to stock up on through the cold winter might also make appreciated gifts. Light bulbs, vacuum cleaner bags, paper products, aluminum foil, a book of stamps or a box of assorted greeting cards all might fit the bill.

If they complain of cold nights, how about a set of flannel sheets? If they have a hobby, buy a gift that relates to it. For the knitter, some

rolls of yarn; for the carpenter, a lumber store gift certificate.

For a personal touch, there are any number of ideas to please an elderly relative or friend. Take them on an afternoon visit to the town or area where they grew up, if it's nearby. Often, they can't get there themselves, and the rush of early memories will be a present to the giver as well.

Offer to sort and label old photos. Write letters to family and old friends for them as they dictate to you. Set a regular date each month for a year when you'll take them out to dinner or cook for them. Hire someone to clean up their yard (or do it yourself), clear out the basement or clean and put new paper on kitchen shelves.

Pick out a bill and pay it for them. Have a cherished photo framed. Give them a phone company gift certificate so they can call a distant loved one. AT&T offers the service.

For great-grandma or 26-year-old Uncle Terry, consider a subscription to a publication. Consider, too, season tickets for next summer's Jenny Wiley Summer Music Theatre productions (only \$25 through Dec. 31) or an eye exam (\$35) or dental exam (\$20).

Other ideas for just about any adult: sweater shaver, window sun catcher, blank VCR or cassette tapes, camera film, computer discs, miniature sewing kits, auto first aid kit, auto booster cables, antifreeze, big bottles of aspirin or antacid tablets.

Parents of young children can always use diapers. They can also use the gift of your babysitting services occasionally while they have a night on the town.

College students or young people who've just left the nest can use just about anything to ease life in their new surroundings. A care package of instant food mixes, canned puddings, snacks, fruit, soap, towels, and twin bed sheets can be put together with a couple of stops.

Most all teens love records and cassettes. Ask the record store clerk for ideas on current hits—or try to introduce the young person to something new. Fast food gift certificates are also popular.

For young children, keep three rules of thumb in mind: Don't get them presents that will cause their

parents more work and irritation (such as drums); think about what you liked to get when you were a kid (chances are kids today will enjoy much the same thing); most younger kids don't appreciate gifts of clothes, so if you must get Billie a pair of gloves, stick a little metal car or crayons in with them.

And whatever the age, batteries are an always needed gift.

The greatest shopping aid, however, is to listen to the people on your list and observe how they live and what they're interested in. Everyone gives out gift hints all the time, not just around holidays. Listen and watch, and you'll pick up on their wants and needs.

Dionia Conn Reyna, a resident of Dana on Prater's Creek, graduated from nursing school in Pikeville three years ago, among the top scholars in her class.

Today, the Floyd County resident is

at home, awaiting a telephone call from Pittsburgh, Penn.

Reyna found out recently that she will definitely require an organ transplant, although she has received medical treatment for her illness since 1972.

She and her family have been told that while Medicare will pay a percentage of the medical costs, the transplant fees will total between \$150,000 and \$175,000—much of which will have to be paid for by the family.

"We don't know how much, yet," explains her sister, Thelma Thacker, who also lives on Prater Creek.

"She will have to go to Pittsburgh in January for pre-surgical tests," says Thacker, "including tissue and blood type."

If an organ is not available, Reyna and her family will have to stay by the phone and, when one is found, travel to Pittsburgh in a matter of hours.

The family is asking area residents to donate money for the transplant; an account has been set up at the Bank Josephine. Checks can be sent to the Dionia Reyna Donation Account.

Reyna is the daughter of Dixie Conn of Prater and the late Allen Conn.

Tips For A Healthful Holiday



Holidays can be brightened by festive desserts and drinks.

In this week's County Kettle, there are decorative desserts and easy drinks for the holiday season. Readers can also find some hints to keep the holidays healthy and happy.

EGGNOG

6 eggs, separated
1/2 cup sugar
2 cups heavy cream
1 to 2 cups milk
2 tsp. vanilla extract
Grated nutmeg
Beat the egg whites in a large bowl until stiff but not dry. Gradually add the sugar. Set aside.

In another large bowl, beat the egg yolks until they are lemon yellow. Fold in the egg whites.

In a third bowl, beat the cream until it's stiff, then add the cream to the eggs. Finally, add the milk and vanilla, stirring gently. Chill.

Sprinkle the grated nutmeg in each individual glass before serving. You may want to stir the eggnog before serving, too. If desired, you may add less milk and 1 cup of rum or a mixture of 1/2 cup whiskey and 1/2 cup cognac.

HOT SPICED TEA PUNCH

12 whole cardamom pods, or substitute whole allspice
1/2 tsp. whole cloves
1 stick cinnamon (about 2 inches)
4 tsp. Darjeeling tea leaves
1 bottle (750 ml.) hearty Burgundy
1/4 cup honey
Cinnamon sticks to garnish
In large saucepan, bring 1 quart plus 1 cup water and spices to a boil.

Remove from heat, add tea, and stir. Cover and steep 5 minutes. Strain and return to saucepan.

Over low heat, add wine and honey and warm gently, stirring occasionally, about 5 to 10 minutes (be careful not to boil). Pour into punch bowl or ladle into mugs; garnish with cinnamon sticks. Makes two quarts.

GINGERBREAD BOYS

3 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1 tsp. baking soda
1/4 tsp. salt
1 1/2 tsp. ground ginger
1 1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon
1 tsp. ground cloves
1/2 cup butter, softened
3/4 cup sugar
1 egg
3/4 cup molasses
1 tsp. grated lemon peel

Frosting:

1/3 cup egg whites
3/4 cups confectioners' sugar
Blend flour with baking soda, salt, ginger, cinnamon, and cloves in a medium bowl.

In a large bowl, beat butter and sugar at high speed until light and fluffy. Beat in egg, then molasses and lemon peel until well blended.

With a wooden spoon, stir in flour mixture, then mix with a wooden spoon or knead with hands until smooth.

Divide dough into four parts, wrap each in plastic, and refrigerate overnight.

Preheat oven to 375 degrees and grease cookie sheets.

Roll out one part of the dough at a time on a floured pastry cloth or board to 1/8-inch thickness.

Cut into gingerbread boys with cookie cutters or with a floured knife and place on cookie sheets, spacing about 1 inch apart.

With a sharp knife, make a small hole at the top of each cookie through which to thread a ribbon, if desired.

Bake 6 to 8 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool cookies on racks.

In the meantime, in a medium bowl at medium speed, beat egg whites and confectioners sugar to make a smooth, stiff frosting, about 1 minute. Cover with a damp cloth until ready to use.

To decorate cookies, spoon frosting into a pastry bag fitted with the smallest round tip. Work with bag about one-third full.

Twisting bag with even pressure, pipe frosting along borders of cookies and within to form hair, features, and clothing of gingerbread boys.

Let frosting dry, then store in a covered tin.

Yield: About seven dozen cookies, depending on size.

CANDY CANE COOKIES

2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1 cup butter, softened
1 cup confectioners sugar
1 egg
1 tsp. peppermint extract
1 tsp. vanilla
Red food coloring
Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Blend flour and salt in a small bowl.

In a large bowl, beat butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in egg and extracts well, then stir in

flour and salt.

Divide dough in half and color one half with 8 drops red food coloring; refrigerate, wrapped in plastic, for 2 hours.

Working with 1 teaspoon of dough at a time, form 5 inch long, pencil-thin cylinders of each color.

Twist one cylinder of each color together to look like a candy cane.

Bake 12 to 15 minutes.

Cool on racks and store in covered tins.

Yield: About four dozen cookies.

DOUBLE DELIGHT BOURBON BALLS

1 package (6 ounces) semisweet chocolate bits
3 tbsp. corn syrup
1/2 cup bourbon
1 package (8 ounces) chocolate wafers, crushed
1 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup confectioners' sugar
1/3 cup chopped candied cherries

Sugar

Gently melt chocolate in a double boiler over low heat.

Remove from heat and stir in syrup and bourbon; cool to room temperature.

Meanwhile, in a large bowl, mix wafers, nuts, confectioners' sugar, and cherries. Add the chocolate mixture and stir to blend.

Let stand for 30 minutes.

Shape into 1-inch balls with fingers.

Roll in sugar, then refrigerate, covered.

Yield: About 2 1/2 dozen candies.

FRUIT AND NUT DIVINITY

3 cups sugar

1 cup light corn syrup

1 cup water

3 egg whites, beaten stiff

1 tsp. vanilla

1/2 cup chopped nuts

3/4 cup candied fruit

In a 2-quart saucepan combine sugar, corn syrup, and water. Cook, stirring, until sugar dissolves. Then cook to hard-ball stage (260 degrees).

Pour syrup in a thin stream into beaten egg whites, beating at medium speed until mixture begins to thicken.

Add vanilla, candied fruit, and nuts. Then beat with wooden spoon, lifting high to incorporate air until candy is very stiff.

Pour into buttered square pan to cool. Cut into squares.

Let dry until firm and wrap individually in waxed paper or store in a tightly covered tin.

DOUBLE CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIES

1 3/4 cups flour

1/4 tsp. baking soda

1 cup butter or margarine, softened

1 tsp. vanilla extract

1 cup granulated sugar

1/2 cup dark brown sugar, firmly packed

1 egg

1/3 cup unsweetened cocoa

2 tbsp. milk

1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts

6 ounces (1 cup) semisweet chocolate chips

Combine flour and baking soda, and set aside.

Use an electric mixer to cream butter. Add vanilla and sugars, and

beat until fluffy. Beat in egg. At low speed beat in cocoa, then milk. With a wooden spoon, mix in dry ingredients just until blended. Stir in nuts and chocolate chips.

Drop by rounded teaspoonfuls onto nonstick or foil-lined baking sheets.

Bake at 350 degrees for 12 to 13 minutes.

Remove from oven and cool slightly before removing from baking sheets. Yield: Three dozen.

WHITE CHOCOLATE

MACADAMIA NUT CHIPPERS

2 cups flour

1 tsp. baking soda

1/2 tsp. salt

1 cup butter or margarine, softened

3/4 cup granulated sugar

3/4 cup brown sugar, firmly packed

1 egg

1 tsp. vanilla extract

12 ounces (2 cups) white chocolate chips, or bulk white chocolate cut into 1/4-inch chunks

1/2 cup macadamia nuts, coarsely chopped

1/2 cup coconut (optional)

Mix flour, baking soda, and salt, and set aside.

Beat butter, sugars, and egg until fluffy. Stir in dry ingredients. Blend in the vanilla. Gently stir in the chocolate, nuts, and coconut.

Drop by tablespoonfuls onto ungreased baking sheets, placing cookies a few inches apart.

Bake at 375 degrees for 8 to 10 minutes until golden brown.

Cool slightly, and remove to wire racks to cool completely. Yield: Two-and-a-half dozen.





Dayton Man Researches Floyd County Ancestors

Clarence E. Shepard was born in Ohio and has never lived in Floyd County or Eastern Kentucky, but he probably knows as much about the ancestors of local residents as anybody here.

The Dayton man has researched census records, vital statistics and family ancestry books relating to Floyd and Magoffin counties for almost 20 years.

"I got started in 1969 when my father became very ill," Shepard said. "I began to spend time talking to him about his people and became interested in looking up other relatives."

His father, the late Martin Shepard, was born on the Left Fork of Middle Creek but the family left to settle in northern Kentucky and southern Ohio when Martin was young.

The talks with his father led to an aunt, Mintie Stevens, in Greenup County and through her to his family's roots in Eastern Kentucky.

Between 1969 and 1984, Shepard said he spent a week every spring and fall in the area, talking to elderly people and looking up genealogical information.

His research has resulted in a long list of publications which he makes available to people interested in their local ancestry. He has spent hour upon hour transcribing microfilm records from the Kentucky Historical Society on censuses, births, deaths, marriages and other transactions in Floyd and Magoffin.

"The microfilm is really difficult to read," he said. "Often I had to force myself to keep reading it."

After compiling his research, Shepard typed stencils, ran off the information and bound it in sets.

His research on the Baldrige family, leading from Robert Baldrige who died at Middle Creek in 1878, has led to the publication of a book, *A Small Twig from the Baldrige Tree*. Prominent surnames in the book include Conley, Akers, Click, Fraley, Haywood, Music and a host more, he said.

Shepard is about 600 pages so far, into his current book dealing with the Hale and Shepard families and their offspring. Their origins are centered on Spurlock and Left Fork of Middle Creek and "over the hill to Hippo and Garrett and in the head waters of

Licking River."

Shepard, who was born in Portsmouth, has lived in Dayton since 1950 and is retired from National Cash Register Corporation.



Swallow pride, give a toast to 'The Golden Girls'

My Three Sons aired on ABC from Sept. 29, 1960 until Sept. 9, 1965. It then aired on CBS from Sept. 16, 1965 until Aug. 24, 1972.

Q: Could you tell me what ever happened to Christopher Jones who played the handsome Major Doryan in the film, Ryan's Daughter? Wasn't he once in a television series? —Cave City, Ark.

A: In researching your Christopher Jones, I find the following film credits: Chubasco, Wild in the Streets, The Looking Glass War, Three in the Attic and Ryan's Daughter. His one and only television series aired in 1965, The Legend of Jesse James. Jones starred as James.

Books And Things:

PCC Library Collection Covers Collectibles

The obsession to collect things is a curious phenomena. The following books from the PCC library covers the many, many items which have been collected.

The Encyclopedia of Collectibles. Sixteen volumes of stunning pictures and superb commentary on everything imaginable that a person might collect.

From typewriters to tints, marbles to metals, beer cans to bicycles and comic books to caricatures, this collection of collections is what you expect a work whose name is "encyclopedia of..." to be—a little bit about a whole lot.

With suggestions of how to display treasured pieces, discussions of monetary worth, and lots of general knowledge about things collected (like how a person ever got on those tall bicycles), this is a book for the professional collector, the amateur hobbyist, anyone considering collecting, or simply a person who likes to look at pretty pictures.

The chapter on botanical prints has illustrations by Bonelli, Ehret and Redoute. The chapter on cars has photos of a 1916 Stutz Bearcat, a 1902 Waverly road wagon, and a 1907 Locomobile Type E Tonneau. There's chapters on carousel animals, cash registers, fishing tackle, door stops and fans.

The 16 volume walk through the alphabet of collectables will provide enough information about each to familiarize even a novice to its world. *100 Years of Collectible Jewelry*, by Lillian Baker. This is a book about jeweled conceits and adornments of yesteryear, (1850-1950), which have become today's treasured heirlooms and sought-after collectibles.

Side-stepping the "king's ransom" type of jewelry, this book aims at the heirlooms of the ordinary citizen and the nouveau rich. It is a report of the conceits popular in the years when jewelry became a product for

everyone.

So rather than drooling over pictures of "Hope" type diamonds, this practical book shows us jewelry our mothers and grandmothers might have worn. It will send us off to flea markets or into dusty trunks to match an ancestor's treasures with what is pictured here.

Collector's Guide to Antique American Clocks, by Marvin Schwartz. People in a modern industrial society are obsessed with time, and therefore with watches and clocks. This book, about the collecting of the time pieces which have ruled our lives, is an enlightenment in the history of the subject as well as a delightful picture book of their different housings.

From stately colonial grandfather or long case clocks to the familiar round alarm clock, this small book traces the evolution of telling time in America.

Along with an index, the book is invaluable to the collector for its listing of prominent American clockmakers and manufacturers.

Collecting and Restoring Wicker Furniture, by Richard Saunders. "Wicker is not a material in itself, but rather a very general classification covering all woven furniture."

It covers such materials as rattan, cane, reed, willow, raffia, fiber, rush, and various dried grasses.

Besides teaching a novice about a

material she thought she knew about, this book covers: early wickerwood furniture, the golden age of wicker (mid 1800s), wicker at the turn of the century, as well as how to restore wicker furniture, and American manufacturers of wicker furniture.

From picture frames to baby buggies and rocking chairs to tea charts, this book is a delight to anyone who daydreams of expansive, columned porches and plant draped sun rooms when the word "wicker" is mentioned.

Collecting Photographia, by George Gilbert. Photographia is anything that has to do with photography—the camera, the subject, or the photographer.

With cameras ranging from the early wet plate models of the 1800's to the binocular camera of the detective trade, subjects from the famed Sarah Bernhardt to the social documentation of immigrants at Ellis Island, photographers from Napoleon Sarony to Mathew Brady, this book is a gold mine of photography.

A real attention getter in the first chapter is that "a single Daguerreotype of Edgar Allan Poe sold for \$9,250 and resold to a collector for \$38,000," and that "a set of six Daguerreotypes purchased at a flea market for \$18 were sold to the Library of Congress for \$12,000."

Don't burn any old photo albums until you read this book.

Antique Silver and Silver Collecting, by John Culme and John Strang. The authors of this book have attempted to give the reader a basic knowledge of the lasting aspects of silver—its stylistic development, its method of production, its social and historical background, and its value as art.

While the first chapters deal with the English and American silver of the 18th Century, the largest part of the book is devoted to the silver of the 19th Century.

A George IV teapot, a William IV taperstick, a George IV salt cellar, a Victorian silver gilt vase—they're all pictured here.

With the expert advice of the paired silver expert and the historian, this book will give you the knowledge to distinguish styles and designs of various silversmiths and firms.

Illustrated with over 90 pictures and enhanced by an index, glossary, and bibliography, its a good introduction to a fascinating and utilitarian art form.

The Collector's Encyclopedia of Dolls, by Dorothy Coleman. Dedicated to the person who never outgrew their love of dolls, this truly encyclopedic effort pictures dolls of

all types, countries, and times.

Being more interested in manufacturer and dollar worth, this is not a particularly pretty book for the flipper of pages, but for the serious collector, it is probably just what is needed.

It identifies trademarks by country and date, categorizes dolls by type, and attempts to show all the working parts.

A gigantic job—it covers everything from the American Bisque Doll Company to the Zulu Doll.

Collecting Political Americana, by Edmund Sullivan. The advent of the two-part system generated an increasing need for candidates to seek

support directly from voters. Thus, sparsely at first and later in torrents, a tremendous variety of objects have been made, all of them intended to persuade voters to vote for a candidate and not for his opponent.

Political Americana can come in many forms—bubble gum cigars, clocks, hats, buttons, tin lanterns, torchlights, banners, prints and cartoons.

This book shows them all and relates the interesting stories that go behind the giveaways.

A good introduction to a provocative and timely hobby that can be "intellectually, emotionally and financially satisfying."



They each wore a black tuxedo with teal cummerbunds and bowties. The groom wore a white tuxedo with black cummerbund and bowtie.


B.J. Ousley of Prestonsburg was in charge of floral arrangements and directing the wedding.




students assembled outside for this ceremony.



ORDINANCE NO. 21-88

A COMPREHENSIVE REGULATORY ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY RELATING TO THE CONTROL, LICENSING, OPERATION, ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT OF THE SALE AND CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES.

WHEREAS, by ordinance dated August 23, 1982, the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky did enact Ordinance No. 8-82, relating to the regulation, licensing, operation, administration and enforcement of the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages; and

WHEREAS, the Kentucky General Assembly, during its 1982 regular session adopted Senate Bill No. 273, which provided for the sale of alcoholic beverages by the drink for consumption on the premises in cities of the fourth class where prohibition is not in effect; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky did adopt and pass Ordinance No. 10-88 relating to the regulation and sale of alcoholic beverages by the drink, adopting the provisions of Senate Bill No. 273, as specified in KRS Chapters 241, 242, 243 and 244, et. seq.; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 8-82 and No. 10-88 contain provisions which are consistent and compatible in most areas, but yet are vague and in conflict in others, which said conflicts should be remedied or removed as the case may be by different provision thereunder; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky realizes the need to revise and restructure the two ordinances hereinabove specified in order to resolve said conflicts, and to establish a consistent and more definitive regulatory policy governing the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages whether by the drink or otherwise; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, having determined that an economic hardship exists within the city and that the closely regulated sale of alcoholic beverages by the drink or otherwise could aid economic growth in the city.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky as follows:

SECTION 1: This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Economic Development Alcoholic Beverage Control Ordinance" of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky.

SECTION 2: Definitions: Words used through this ordinance, unless the context requires otherwise, shall have the same definitions as set out in the Kentucky Alcoholic Beverage Control Law (KRS Chapters 241, 242, 243 and 244) of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, and all amendments and supplements thereto, unless specifically defined herein.

2.1 "Alcoholic Beverage" means alcoholic brandy, whisky, rum, gin, beer, ale, porter, wine and all other spirituous, venous, malt or fermented liquors, liquids and compounds, whether medicated, proprietary, patented or not, and by whatsoever name called, containing more than one percent (1%) of alcohol by volume, which are fit for use for beverage purposes.

2.2 "Bona Fide Restaurant" means any retail establishment which derives more than 50% of its gross revenues from the sale of food for consumption on the premises for at least two meals per day, including lunch and dinner, and has a minimum seating capacity of 100 persons at tables.

2.3 "Carry-out" means any retail establishment which has as its purpose, among other things, the sale of alcoholic beverages for consumption off the premises and for the purposes of this ordinance, shall include retail package liquor stores. It shall include, but not be limited to, grocery stores, markets, express-type markets by whatever name known, bait shops, fruit and vegetable markets, drug stores and similar premises.

2.4 "Distilled Spirits" means any alcoholic beverage, except malt beverage and wine.

2.5 "Malt Beverage" means any fermented undistilled alcoholic beverage of any name or description, manufactured from malt wholly or in part, or from any substitute for malt, and having an alcoholic content greater than one-half of one percent (1/2%) by volume and not more than 4.8% of alcohol by weight or 6.02% of alcohol by volume.

2.6 "Person" means any natural person, corporation, partnership, joint venture, or unincorporated association of persons or any combination thereof, and the shareholders, officers, agents, servants, and employees thereof.

2.7 "Premises" means the premises described in the City license issued pursuant to the terms hereof and the applications therefor.

2.8 "State" means the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

2.9 "State License" means a license authorized by KRS 243.030 to 243.680.

2.10 "Tavern" means any retail establishment for which the primary purpose of existence is the retail sale of alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises, derives less than 50% of its gross revenues from the sale of food, or any retail establishment for which the primary purpose of existence is entertainment, and which may, in addition to entertainment, offer food and/or alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises.

2.11 "Traffic in alcoholic beverages" means any action, business or transaction in regard to the production, storage, transportation, distribution, sale, delivery, and transfer of alcoholic beverages.

2.12 "Wine" means the product of the normal alcoholic fermentation of the juices of fruits, with the usual

cellar treatment and necessary additions to correct defects due to climatic, saccharine and seasonal conditions. It includes champagne and sparkling and fortified wine of an alcoholic content not to exceed 24% by volume. It includes preparations or mixtures vended in retail containers if such preparations or mixtures contain not exceeding 15% of alcoholic by volume.

SECTION 3: CITY ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE CONTROL ADMINISTRATOR; APPOINTMENT; SALARY.

3.1 The City Mayor shall, consistent with provisions of KRS 83A.150, (7) (b) and KRS 241.170, appoint a city alcoholic beverage control administrator (hereinafter referred to as "City ABC Administrator") subject to the approval of the city council of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, hereinafter referred to as the City Council.

3.2 The salary for said office shall be fixed from time to time by the city council.

3.3 The functions of the City ABC Administrator shall be the same with respect to city licenses and regulations, as the functions of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board of the Commonwealth of Kentucky (hereinafter ABC Board) with respect to state licenses and regulations, except that no amendment to these regulations proposed by the City ABC Administrator may be less stringent than the statutes relating to alcoholic beverage control, or than regulations of the ABC Board. No regulation of the City ABC Administrator shall become effective until it has first been approved by the City Council.

3.4 The City ABC Administrator before entering upon his duties as such, shall take the oath as prescribed by Section 228 of the Constitution and shall execute a bond with a good corporate surety in the sum of not less than \$5,000.00, and shall faithfully perform the duties of his office pursuant to the provisions of Section 62.060 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes, et. seq.

3.5 The costs of the bond given under this Section shall be born by the City of Prestonsburg (hereinafter the "City").

SECTION 4: LICENSES: As used in this section, "License" means any premises licensed by the City to sell alcoholic beverages whether by the drink for consumption on the premises or otherwise, and relates to the sale of any combination of the same.

4.1 For the privilege of causing, permitting and engaging in the actions, business, and transactions authorized thereby in regard to traffic in alcoholic beverages in the City of Prestonsburg and pursuant to the authority of KRS 243.070, there is hereby established a corresponding city license for each of the State Licenses described in the attached schedule. The actions, business, and transactions authorized and permitted thereby and the expiration dates thereof shall be and are the same as those of the State Licenses to which the City Licenses correspond and which are indicated and described in the Sections of State Law indicated in the attached Schedule. The fees for such City Licenses shall be the maximum allowed by law as indicated on the attached Schedule.

4.2 No person shall cause, permit or engage in any of the actions, business, or transactions authorized by such city and state licenses within the city without both a valid city license and a valid state license therefore.

4.3 No person, firm, or corporation conducting a place of business in the city patronized by and open to the general public, or any private club as defined by KRS 243.270, who does not hold the necessary license or licenses, as herein provided, shall permit any person to, or shall he, sell, barter, loan, give away, or drink any alcoholic beverages on the premises of his place of business, nor shall any proprietor of any unlicensed premises patronized by and open to the general public, or any agent or employee of that proprietor, have in his possession any alcoholic beverages on any portion of his premises which is open to the general public.

SECTION 5: FORM AND CONTENT OF CITY LICENSE.

5.1 All city licenses shall be in a form as may be prescribed by the City Council and shall contain:

(a) The name and address of the licensee;

(b) The number of the license;

(c) The type of license;

(d) A description by street and number, or otherwise, of the licensed premise;

(e) The name and address of the owner of the building in which the licensed premises are located;

(f) The expiration date of the license;

(g) A statement in substance that the license shall not be a property or vested right and that it may be revoked at any time pursuant to law.

5.2 Each kind of license shall be printed so as to be readily distinguished from the other kind of licenses available.

SECTION 6: APPLICATION FOR LICENSE AND ISSUANCE:

6.1 Subject to the limitations and restrictions described herein, city licenses shall be originally issued by the City Clerk/Tax Collector and renewed by him upon the expiration thereof upon receipt of the following documents and fees more than thirty (30) days prior to the effective date of an original license and more than fifteen (15) days prior to the expiration date of any license to be renewed:

(A) A written application together with the truth of the information, statements, and representations therein attested by the signature and oath or affirmation of the applicant. The form and content of such application shall be prescribed by regulation of the City ABC Administrator; however, provision for the following

information, statements, and representations shall and must be included therein:

(1) All information required by KRS 243.390 to be contained in the application for state licenses.

(2) A consent by the applicant to the search of the licensed premises by any peace officer at any time for any purpose, the removal therefrom of any evidence of any crime or other violations of law; and the use thereof in any trial or hearing in regard thereto.

(3) The names, addresses, photographs, and finger prints of the applicant and all shareholders, officers, agents, servants, and employees thereof.

(4) The approval of the applicant, the application, and the premises described therein by the City ABC Administrator.

(5) Documentary evidence of a valid state license which corresponds to the city license for which the application is being made.

(6) The applicable fee, paid in cash or by certified or cashier's check, for the city license which is the subject of the application.

6.2 Applicants for any license involving the sale, manufacture or traffic of any alcoholic beverage shall first advertise their intention to apply for a license by publishing a Notice of Intention to apply in the local newspaper having the largest circulation at least twice within a thirty (30) day period. The applicant shall be responsible for the publication fees.

6.3 Application by a bona fide restaurant, which meets the qualifications as hereinabove defined, for a license to sell alcoholic beverages by the drink for consumption on the premises shall be accompanied by records sufficient to establish to the City ABC Administrator that the applicant derives a minimum of 50% of its gross revenues from the sale of food for consumption on the premises for at least two meals per day, including lunch and dinner, and has a minimum seating capacity of one hundred (100) persons at tables. The City ABC Administrator shall review all records which the applicant restaurant must submit as a part of its application for a license, and the City ABC Administrator shall determine if said restaurant meets the criteria contained herein.

6.4 Application by a hotel, motel or inn for a license to sell alcoholic beverages by the drink for consumption on the premises may be issued if it is found by the City ABC Administrator that said hotel, motel or inn contains not less than fifty (50) sleeping units and has dining facilities for not less than one hundred (100) persons at tables. Upon application, the City ABC Administrator shall immediately inspect personally the premises and file his report with the City Council that said inspection revealed that the applicant in fact had the requisite number of sleeping units and dining facilities and the City Council may thereafter approve the issuance of said license.

6.5 Nothing contained herein shall be in any way interpreted to allow for the sale of alcoholic beverages by the drink for consumption on the premises in connection with any business in which a part of the commercial transaction consists of selling, at retail, staple groceries, or which is used solely as an entertainment facility and does not meet the criteria of a "bona fide restaurant" as defined herein.

6.6 It shall be permissible for a licensee, who under KRS 244.330 is permitted to operate one bar, counter or similar contrivance in said licensed premises under said retail drink license, due to modern business practices and the enhancement of economic development and opportunities, particularly associated with meeting or convention business, and the larger interior areas of some licensees and the recreational facilities directly associated therewith, that it may be necessary to provide for more than one bar within said hotel/motel/inn licensed premises under this ordinance to effectively serve the patrons at such premises. A supplemental bar may be allowed to said hotel/motel/inn licensee if such licensee can show the ABC Administrator the need for such supplemental bar. A supplemental bar license may be issued to a hotel/motel/inn retail drink licensee upon showing to the City ABC Administrator of good cause and need for the supplemental license, and the license may only be issued for the use on the premises directly associated with the applicant's existing retail drink license as part of the entire business of said license facility.

6.7 Within thirty (30) days of the date of the application for an original city license and fifteen (15) days of the date of any application for renewal of a city license, the City ABC Administrator shall, by mail or personal delivery thereof, notify the applicant, in writing, of either the approval thereof or the disapproval thereof or whether a hearing in regard thereto shall be held thereon.

6.8 As is similarly set forth in KRS 243.450, the City ABC Administrator shall not approve any application for a city license if:

(A) The applicant, the application or the premises described therein do not fully comply with the provisions of this Chapter and all laws in regard to alcoholic beverages;

(B) The applicant and/or any shareholder, officer, agent, servant, or employee thereof has caused, permitted, or engaged in any act for which the revocation or non-issuance of a state or city license is authorized, including, but not limited to, those acts as are defined by KRS 243.100, 243.450, 243.500, or 244.120;

(C) The applicant and/or any shareholder, officer, agent, servant or employee thereof had a state license

or city license which was revoked within two (2) years of the date of application, where the premises or any portion thereof described in a state license or city license revoked during such time;

(D) Any statement or representation in the application is false; or

(E) In the exercise of sound discretion, the City ABC Administrator determines any cause or reason for refusing to approve any application reasonably related to the purpose and objective of this Chapter and the State Laws and regulations of the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board. Among those factors that the City ABC Administrator shall consider in the exercise of his discretion are: Public sentiment in the area; Number of licensed outlets in the area; potential for future growth; type of area involved; type of transportation available; and financial potential of the area.

SECTION 7: PERSONS WHO SHALL NOT BE LICENSED:

(A) No person shall become a licensee under this Chapter who

(1) Has been convicted of any felony or misdemeanor directly or indirectly attributable to the use of alcoholic beverages within two (2) years preceding the application;

(2) Is under the age of 21 years;

(3) Is not a citizen of the United States and has not had an actual, bona fide residence in this state for at least one year before the date on which the application for the license is made. This division shall not apply to applicants for manufacturers' licenses, to applicants that are corporations authorized to do business in this state, or to persons licensed on March 7, 1938;

(4) Is a partnership or corporation unless each member of the partnership or each of the directors, principal officers or managers of the corporation or partnership has not been convicted of any misdemeanor or felony directly attributable to the use of alcoholic beverages, is 21 years of age or more, and is a citizen of the United States.

(5) Has had any license issued under KRS 243.100 relating to the regulation of the manufacture, sale, and transportation of alcoholic beverages revoked for a cause or has been convicted of a violation of any such statute, until the expiration of two years from the date of the revocation or conviction; or

(6) Is a partnership or corporation, if any member of the partnership or any director or principle officer of the corporation has had any license issued under any statute relating to the regulation of the manufacture, sale, and transportation of alcoholic beverages, revoked for cause or has been convicted of a violation of any such statute, until the expiration of two years from the date of the revocation or conviction.

(7) No license to sell alcoholic beverages shall be granted to any person, firm or corporation who is delinquent in payment of any taxes due to the city at the time of issuing a license; nor shall any license be granted to sell upon any premises or property, owned or occupied by the licensee upon which there are any delinquent taxes due to the city.

7.2 No license to sell alcoholic beverages shall be granted to any person, firm, or corporation for the sale of alcoholic beverages on any real property owned or maintained by the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, including, but not limited to, parking lots, sidewalks, roadways, alley ways or streets. The City Council of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky may authorize such sale upon the exercise of sound discretion.

7.3 No license to sell alcoholic beverages shall be granted to any person, partnership, firm or corporation who has permitted the use, sale or trafficking of controlled substances as described in KRS Chapter 218A, to take place on the premises whether known by the applicant or unknown. Any such use, sale or trafficking of controlled substances as defined by KRS 218A upon any licensed premises may result in the immediate revocation or suspension of any license issued to said premises, and may further prohibit the named licensee from receiving any license relating to the sale or trafficking of alcoholic beverages within the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky for a period of two years thereafter. Any applicant who has been convicted of an offense relating to the use, sale or trafficking in controlled substances as defined in KRS 218 A, shall not be issued a license under this ordinance for a period of at least two (2) years from the date of such conviction.

SECTION 8: EXCEPTIONS TO LICENSE APPLICATIONS AND HEARINGS:

Any resident of the City of Prestonsburg may file with the City ABC Administrator Exceptions to an application for the sale of alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises and the City ABC Administrator shall conduct a hearing upon said Exceptions. The City ABC Administrator shall thereafter reduce his findings and recommendations which shall be presented to the City Council for acceptance, in whole or in part, or rejection in whole or in part.

Any party aggrieved by the final action of the City Council may file an appeal with the ABC Board, Frankfort, Kentucky within thirty (30) days from the action of the council, and no license shall be issued until the matter becomes final and non-appealable. The City Council, in the exercise of sound discretion, may direct the City ABC Administrator to issue said license the appeal notwithstanding, if it has been established that the applicant otherwise meets all qualifications as hereinabove specified for issuance of a license for the sale of alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises.

SECTION 9: HEARINGS: Should a request for a hearing be made, the City ABC Administrator is

to hold said hearing pursuant to the general practice procedures found in the Kentucky Rules of Civil Procedure and the following shall apply:

(A) Definitions: All words are used as defined in the alcoholic beverage control law of Kentucky (KRS Chapters 241, 242, 243, and 244), unless otherwise specified;

(B) Appearances: Any applicant or licensee may appear and be heard in person, or by duly appointed attorney, and may produce under oath evidence relative and material to matters before the Board;

(C) Briefs: Briefs may be filed at the request of the ABC Administrator, or at the option of the applicant or licensee;

(D) Rules of Evidence: The rules of evidence governing civil proceedings in courts of the Commonwealth of Kentucky shall govern hearings before the City ABC Administrator; provided however, that the hearing officer may relax such rules in any case where, in his judgment the ends of justice will be better served by so doing;

(E) Subpoenas: The City ABC Administrator shall have subpoena power for such hearings and shall at the request of the applicant made with names and addresses of those desired, issue with subpoenas;

(F) Transcripts: Upon request and at the costs of the applicant or licensee the hearing may be transcribed;

(G) Decisions: All decisions shall be written and based upon evidence developed at the hearing.

SECTION 10: EXPIRATION DATE; FRACTIONAL FEES: All licenses issued pursuant to this ordinance, shall expire on June 30 of the year following the year in which said license was issued. Application for renewal of licenses shall be submitted no later than thirty (30) days before expiration thereof and shall be made pursuant to Section 6 above.

SECTION 11: TRANSFER OF LICENSE; LOST OR DESTROYED LICENSE:

(A) No license issued by the City to sell alcoholic beverages at retail shall be transferrable or assignable to any other person or any other premises, or to any other part of the building containing the licensed premises, unless the transferee or assignee has submitted application to the Administrator and the same has been approved, as provided for in KRS 243.640 and 243.645.

(B) A lost or destroyed license may be replaced by the City Clerk/Tax Collector for a fee of \$10.00 for issuing said duplicate license.

SECTION 12: PREMISES SELLING GROCERIES, GASOLINE, AND THE LIKE PROHIBITED FROM OBTAINING LICENSES:

(A) As prohibited in KRS 243.280, no City license shall be issued to sell malt beverages at retail within or upon any premises from which gasoline and lubricating oil are sold or from which the servicing and repair of motor vehicles is conducted unless there is continuously maintained an inventory on the premises for sale at retail of not less than \$5,000.00 of food, groceries, and related products valued at costs.

(1) The term "food and groceries" referred to in this division (A) shall mean:

(a) Any food or food product intended for human consumption except alcoholic beverages, tobacco, and hot foods and hot food products prepared for immediate consumption;

(b) Seeds and Plants to grow food for personal consumption.

(2) This division (A) shall be effective to each malt beverage retail license which is no longer eligible for a retail malt beverage license hereunder upon the expiration of any current license issued by the State Malt Beverage Administrator.

(3) The provisions of this division (A) shall not apply to any licensed premises which sells no fuel or other marine fuel.

(B) As prohibited in KRS 243.230 no city license shall be issued to sell distilled spirits or wine at retail by the drink or package from any premises used as or in connection with the operation of any business in which a part of the commercial transaction consists of selling at retail staple groceries, or gasoline or lubricating oil.

SECTION 13: PREMISES DOING MAJORITY OF BUSINESS WITH MINORS PROHIBITED FROM OBTAINING LICENSE:

No license shall be issued to any person, firm, or corporation at any store or any place of business where the majority of its business consists of selling school books, school supplies, food, lunches, or drinks to minors or to a business that is a penny arcade or similar establishment that receives the majority of its business from minors, regardless of the distance of that store or other place of business from a church, school, or hospital.

SECTION 14: APPLICANT TO PAY FOR OWN LICENSE: The license tax for every license issued under this Chapter shall be payable by the person who makes application for that license and to whom is issued the license; and no other person, firm, or corporation shall pay for any license issued under this Chapter. In addition to all other penalties provided in this Chapter, a violation of this Section shall authorize and require the revocation of the license, the tax for which was paid by another, and also the revocation of the license, if any, of the person, firm, or corporation so paying the license fees of another.

SECTION 15: REGULATORY LICENSE FEE: (A) A regulatory license fee is imposed on the gross retail receipts of alcoholic beverages of each license issued under this Chapter. The license fee for the effective date shall be 2%; thereafter the City Council may adopt at the budget adoption for the fiscal year, those percentage rates as shall

be reasonably estimated to insure full reimbursement to the city for the cost of any additional policing, regulatory, or administrative expenses related to the sale of alcoholic beverages. The fee shall be in addition to any other tax, fee, or license permitted by law, but a credit against a fee shall be allowed in an amount equal to the license or fee imposed under this Chapter and such regulatory fee shall be applied annually from July 1, 1983.

(B) Payment of the fee shall accompany the tax returns for use by the City Council and shall be submitted to the City Finance Director by the twentieth (20th) day of each month for the proceeding month's sales; one-twelfth (1/12) of the fee required under this Chapter shall be deducted each month as credit.

(C) Failure to pay a monthly remittance within ten (10) days of the due date constitutes a violation for which the license may be suspended or revoked.

(D) Penalty for failure to file a return and pay the monthly remittance by the due date is 20% of the tax for each thirty (30) days or a fraction thereof. The total late filing penalty shall not exceed 25% of the tax; however, in no case shall the penalty be less than 20% of the tax.

(E) Interest at the rate of 20% per annum will apply to any late payments.

SECTION 16: REPORT OF WHOLESALER: Every wholesaler of alcoholic beverages who sells within the city shall report to the finance director of the City, on a form to be provided by the finance director, the following information:

(A) The names of all retailers to whom alcoholic beverages were sold in the preceding quarter;

(B) The gross revenues received by the wholesaler by each retailer; and

(C) The total quantity of alcoholic beverages sold to each retailer in cans, cases, or kegs, as appropriate provided that the information provided to the director of finance is calculated to permit the director of finance to determine the quantities of cases, cans and kegs received by each retailer.

SECTION 17: HOURS: Premises licensed under this ordinance may remain open for business daily from 9:00 a.m. until 2:00 a.m. prevailing time, and shall have their "last call for drinks" at 1:30 a.m., except that no sale of alcoholic beverages by the drink as called for herein may be made after 1:00 a.m. on Sunday until 9:00 a.m. on Monday, and said licensed premises shall not sale any alcoholic beverages on Christmas Day (December 25), nor on any election day during the time when the polls are open. All persons except for employees, agents or licensees shall be off the premises no later than one hour after the close of sales.

SECTION 18: COMPLIANCE WITH REGULATIONS AND PROHIBITIONS: (A) At all times during which any person has a valid city license issued pursuant to the provisions hereof, that person shall fully comply with all the rules, regulations, requirements and prohibitions set forth in this Chapter.

(B) A city licensee shall comply fully with all of the provisions hereof and all of the rules and regulations of the City ABC Administrator in regard thereto; all provisions of the State Statutes and the rules and regulations of the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board in regard to the licensed premises and the actions, business, and transactions conducted thereon subsequent to the issuance of a State License therefore and prior to the expiration, revocation, or suspension thereof which are hereby incorporated herein and made applicable to all city licenses corresponding thereto, the premises described therein, and the actions, business, and transactions conducted thereon; and the city licensee shall comply fully therewith.

SECTION 19: MAINTENANCE OF STATE LICENSE: A city licensee shall maintain the state license to which the city license corresponds and fully comply with all state statutes and the rules and regulations of the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board in regard thereto.

SECTION 20: DISPLAY OF REQUIRED LICENSES AND CERTAIN SIGNS: As required by KRS 244.083, a City Licensee who has a valid city retail distilled spirits, wine, or malt business license shall cause to be displayed in a conspicuous and prominent place on the licensed premises. Each of the following documents so that they may be seen and observed by all persons entering the licensed premises:

(A) A sign or place card at least 8 inches x 11 inches in size with the following message printed or displayed thereon in 30. or larger type:

"Persons under the age of 21 years are subject to a fine up to Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) if they:

(a) Enter licensed premises buy or to have served or delivered to them any alcoholic beverages; or

(b) Possess or purchase to attempt to purchase any alcoholic beverages; or

(c) Misrepresent their age for the purpose of purchasing or obtaining alcoholic beverages."

(B) All valid city licenses issued therefore and the state licenses to which they correspond. The failure to so display such licenses shall be prima facie evidence that no such valid licenses have been issued or exist and all actions, business, and transactions authorized thereby conducted on such premises are illegal and in violation of the provisions hereof and the state statutes and regulations of the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board in regard thereto.

SECTION 21. CRIMINAL CONDUCT ON PREMISES PROHIBITED:

A City Licensee shall not cause, permit, or engage in any conduct upon the licensed premises by either the commission of a prohibited act or the omission of a required act which is a crime or other violation of any law, rule or regulation of any governmental agency having jurisdiction thereof or any officer or agency thereof. Any such conduct upon the licensed premises by any person may result in the immediate revocation or suspension of the license, and may subject the licensee to other penalties as more specifically set out hereafter.

SECTION 22. CONDITIONS, PROHIBITIONS AND RESTRICTIONS:

All licenses granted under this ordinance shall be subject to the following conditions, prohibitions and/or restrictions and all other provisions of KRS 241, 242, 243 and 244, other ordinances and regulations of the City applicable thereto:

(A) Every licensee hotel/motel/inn shall be entitled to serve such beverages as said licensee is entitled to serve upon the issuance of a license under this ordinance and in such room or rooms at banquets, dinners and where meals are served; however, no hotel/motel/inn shall maintain or operate or permit to be operated more than one bar or room where alcoholic beverages are sold which is open to the general public without first obtaining a separate license for each bar or room which is open to the general public in accordance with this ordinance.

(B) Each licensed premises shall at all times be conducted in an orderly manner and no disorderly, riotous or indecent conduct shall be allowed at any time on any licensed premises and no nuisance suffered, permitted or maintained thereon.

(C) No gambling or game of chance shall be permitted in any form on such licensed premises. Dice, slot machines, or any device of chance is prohibited and shall not be kept on such premises.

(D) It shall be unlawful for any licensee licensed under this ordinance to have or maintain any radio receiving apparatus on such premises which is intentionally adjusted so as to receive police messages broadcast from the Prestonsburg City Police Radio Station as it is now or may hereinafter be operated. In addition to other penalties provided for the violation of this section, the Chief of Police or City Administrator shall have the authority to confiscate any and all such radio receiving apparatus.

(E) It shall be unlawful for any licensee under this ordinance to sell, to smoke or keep or permit to be sold, smoked or kept upon the licensed premises any marijuana or controlled substances as defined in KRS 218A. It shall be unlawful for a licensee except licensed drug stores, to keep or sell or permit to be sold or used on the licensed premises any narcotic or barbiturate drugs. In addition to other penalties set out in this ordinance for the violation of this section, the City ABC Administrator shall also have the authority to revoke the license issued to said premises.

(F) The licensee shall be responsible for maintaining security on his premises which shall include providing adequate outside lighting, to permit customers to utilize the parking area and to promote the safety, health and welfare of the general public utilizing the licensed premises. Security standards are further necessary to discourage unlawful activity in and around the licensed premises.

(G) No license shall be issued to any person, firm or corporation for the sale at retail of any alcoholic beverages at any store or any other place of business where the majority of its business consists of the selling of school books, school supplies, food, lunches or drinks for such minors in respect of the distance of such store or other place of business from the church, school or hospital.

(H) It shall be unlawful for any licensee under this ordinance to give away or offer to give away anything tangible of value as a premium or prize in connection with the sale of alcoholic beverages.

(I) No licensee or agent or employee of the licensee shall permit any person to become drunk or intoxicated on the premises, nor shall any licensee permit any drunk or intoxicated person to remain on the licensed premises.

(J) No licensee or agent or employee shall permit any person or persons, other than employees of the licensee, to open any bottle of distilled spirits, wine or malt beverages, and no container of distilled spirits, wine or malt beverages shall be opened nor its contents consumed on the licensed premises unless the licensee holds a retail drink license.

(K) No person under twenty-one (21) years of age shall enter any premises that is licensed for the sale of alcoholic beverages by the drink for the purpose of purchasing and receiving any alcoholic beverages. No person under twenty-one (21) years of age shall possess for his or her own use, or purchase or attempt to purchase or have another purchase for him or her, any alcoholic beverage by the drink; no person shall aid or assist any person under twenty-one (21) years of age in purchasing or having delivered or served to him or her any alcoholic beverages by the drink; no person under twenty-one (21) years of age shall misrepresent his or her age for the purpose of inducing any licensee or other employee to sell or serve any alcoholic beverages to such person. No person under twenty-one (21) years of age shall use or attempt to use any false, fraudulent or altered

identification card or paper or any document to purchase or attempt to purchase or otherwise obtain any alcoholic beverage.

SECTION 23. BUSINESS TO BE CONDUCTED CONTINUOUSLY. EXCEPTIONS:

(A) A city licensee who has a valid city wholesale or retail distilled spirits, wine or malt beverage license must conduct the actions, business and transactions authorized thereby upon the licensed premises.

(B) When no such actions, business or transactions are conducted thereon for a period of ninety (90) consecutive calendar days, the city license therefore shall become null and void and revoked by the City ABC Administrator unless:

(1) The city licensee is unable to continue in business at the premises for which a license is issued due to an act of God; casualty, the acquisition of the premises by any Federal, State, City or other governmental agency under power of eminent domain; acquisition of any private corporation through the power of eminent domain granted to it, whether such action is voluntary or involuntary; or a loss of lease through failure of the landlord to renew the existing lease; and

(2) A prior to the discontinuance of the business at the licensed premises or immediately thereupon if such is due to an act of God, the city licensee delivers to the City ABC Administrator a written statement signed by the City Licensee and verified by the oath or affirmation thereof indicating the discontinuance of business at the licensed premises for any of the causes or reasons described herein.

SECTION 24. SALES TO BE CONDUCTED OPENLY:

No person holding a license under the provisions of this Chapter shall sell any alcoholic beverages behind blinds or screens. All sales shall be conducted openly and without any attempt to hide them or screen them from public view.

SECTION 25. RIGHT OF ENTRY. Search and Seizure:

Every applicant procuring a license hereby consents to the entry of police or other duly authorized representatives of the city or state at all reasonable hours for the purposes of inspection and search, and consents to the removal from the premises of all things and articles there had in violation of city ordinances or state laws, and consents to the introduction of those things and articles in evidence in any prosecution that may be brought for those offenses.

SECTION 26. REVOCATION OF LICENSE:

(A) Pursuant to the procedure set forth in KRS 243.480 through 243.590, city licenses may be either revoked or suspended by the City ABC Administrator upon the occurrence of:

(1) Any violations of the provisions of this Chapter or ordinance or any other alcoholic beverage control ordinance of the city.

(2) Any violation of any provision of state law in regard to alcoholic beverages or other rules and regulations of the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board in regard thereto; or

(3) Any other cause, reason or circumstance for which a state license may be revoked or suspended by the Board.

(B) However, city licenses must be revoked by the City ABC Administrator upon the occurrence of any cause or circumstance which requires revocation of state licenses pursuant to KRS 243.500 or the revocation of state license which a City Licensee corresponds. Further, with the approval of the City ABC Administrator, a licensee may, as an alternative and in lieu of part or all of the days of any suspension, pay the following sums to the city as set forth in KRS 243.480: Distillers, rectifiers, vendors, brewers, and blenders: \$1,000.00 per day. Wholesale Liquor Licensees: \$400.00 per day. Wholesale Beer Licensee: \$100.00 per day; Retail Drink Liquor Licensees: \$25.00 per day; Retail package liquor licenses: \$25.00 per day; Retail Beer Licensees: \$10.00 per day; and all remaining licensees: \$10.00 per day.

(C) The procedure for the revocation or suspension of a city license shall consist of a written notice signed by the City ABC Administrator and mailed to the licensee at the address of the licensed premises by Certified Mail, describing the cause, circumstance or occurrence and the time and date thereof for which the city license may be revoked and indicating the time and place of a hearing in regard thereto at least five days thereafter at which the licensee and the representatives thereof shall be heard thereon. The hearing shall be conducted by the City ABC Administrator in the city and according to the procedures herein above specified for hearings, and in accordance to the procedure prescribed by the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board for hearings by the Board as supplemented by the regulations of the City ABC Administrator. The City ABC Administrator shall control and make all decisions in regard to the introductions of evidence and shall hear all arguments in regard thereto. At the conclusions of the hearing, the City ABC Administrator shall issue a written decision in regard thereto and mail a certified copy thereof to the licensee at the address of the licensed premises by certified mail or registered mail.

SECTION 27. PENALTIES:

The following penalties shall be in addition to any criminal prosecution instituted in the Floyd District or Circuit Court against any alleged violator and fines hereunder shall be payable to the City ABC Administrator:

(A) Any person, firm or corporation that holds a license for the retail sale of alcoholic beverages who knowingly provides, by sale or gift, directly or indirectly alcoholic beverages for the

use or consumption by any one under the age of twenty-one (21) years, shall for the first offense, be fined in the sum of \$500.00, and shall have his license suspended for a period of seven days; and for the second offense, his license shall be suspended for a period of fourteen days, and he shall forfeit his bond made at application for the license; and for the third offense shall be subject to a fine of \$2,000.00 and revocation of his license.

(B) Any person twenty-one (21) years of age or older, not being a licensee, who shall provide, by sale or gift, alcoholic beverages for the use and consumption by person or persons under the age of twenty-one (21) years shall be fined, for each offense, the sum of \$500.00.

(C) Any person who violates any provision of this ordinance for which a penalty is not otherwise provided, shall be fined not less than \$10.00 or more than \$500.00, or imprisoned in the county jail for not more than six months, or both.

SECTION 27. SEVERABILITY: Action by a court of competent jurisdiction declaring any section, sub-section, phrase or word of this ordinance to be invalid, unconstitutional and/or void shall not affect the remainder of this ordinance which shall remain in force and effect.

SECTION 28. FORCE AND EFFECT:

This ordinance shall be in force and effect, as of the date of passage of Ordinance No. 10-88, nunc pro tunc, on the 22nd day of August, 1988.

SECTION 29. CONFLICTS:

All ordinances or any parts in conflict with the provisions herein are expressly repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Winter Heating Safety Tips Listed

As Kentuckians turn to wood stoves and space heaters to warm their homes and cool their utility bills, Department for Health Services officials offer the following safety tips to prevent injuries and deaths.

Wood stoves and fireplaces: Most burns and deaths associated with these heating methods result from improper installation and creosote buildup.

—Always follow manufacturer's instructions for installation, especially those concerning the surface the stove is placed on and distance from the wall.

—Most wood-heating fires occur in chimneys. Chimneys should be inspected regularly and repaired when necessary. Chimneys should be cleaned by a qualified chimney sweep every year to prevent accumulation of creosote, a tarlike residue that can build up in chimneys over time and catch on fire.

—Never burn trash, charcoal or plastics in a wood-burning appliance. These items can overheat and start a fire and/or release pollutants.

—Keep a fire extinguisher nearby and install smoke detectors.

—Collect ashes in a metal bucket with a metal cover.

Kerosene heaters: "Flare up" fires and air pollutants are two dangers associated with kerosene heaters.

Electric heaters: These appliances provide good temporary heat, but they are not designed for extended use or as a substitute for central heating.

—"Flare up" fires, or uncontrolled flaming, can occur with the use of improper or contaminated fuels. Always use 1K kerosene as a fuel and accept no substitutes.

—In an enclosed room, pollutants from kerosene heaters can accumulate and become harmful. To prevent this situation, set the heater wick at the level recommended by the manufacturer and adequately ventilate the room.

—Never use an extension cord with an electric heater.

—Do not use electric heaters near water because of the possibility of electrocution.

General safety tips: Despite the type of space heater used, consumers should follow a number of

general safety tips.

—Keep children and pets away from space heaters.

—Never use a space heater overnight in the room where anyone is sleeping.

—Install smoke detectors on all levels of the home.

—Do not stand close to a heater when wearing long robes, nightwear or other clothing that could come in contact with the heater. Keep heaters away from upholstered furniture, draperies and other combustible materials.

—Do not use a space heater for a clothes dryer or foot warmer—it can cause fires and burns.


