More and more of the same is the report from the US Weather Service in Jackson. Today's forecast is for partly cloudy skies, with a 60 percent chance of thundershowers ("heavy rainfall possible"). High of around 80, lows tonight in mid-60s. Expect fog tonight and 40 percent chance of rain.

With little change, Thursday's reading is partly sunny, warm and humid; 60 percent chance of showers again, with highs in the mid-80s and lows at night in mid-60s. The extended weekend forecast contains a chance of showers each day, with about the same temperatures continuing.



Floyd County Fiscal Court at its regular monthly meeting June 16 reviewed three bids for five tandem trucks, agreed to pay the State Treasurer \$9,700 for the endloader, dump truck and four pick-ups the county received from the Division of Surplus Property, and closed Old Brush each.

For a time last week people throughout Floyd County were expecting to be routed from their homes by flood waters as heavy rains Thursday and Friday drove creeks and rivers above their banks.

Several counties west of Floyd saw severe flooding, but, except for a few low lying areas, the damage was minimal compared to past years.

Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo estimated that county roads sustained about \$150,000 in damages. In a letter, dated June 20, to Gov. Wallace Wilkinson, Stumbo declared that a state of emergency exists and requested assistance from the Gover-

Stumbo said eight bridges were damaged by flood waters. They include two bridges over Buffalo Creek and one each on Abbott, Bull, Eastern, Upper Right Beaver, Saltlick and Stone Coal creeks.

County crews have been working since Saturday on repairing the bridges, correcting mud slides, replacing pipes and mending washed out road shoulders, Stumbo said.

In an effort to stem additional flooding, officials of the US Army Corps of Engineers allowed Dewey Lake to back up which caused some flooding at Jenny Wiley State Park. Water spilling out of the lake at the See HEAVY RAINS, Page 2

Fly In, Drive Out May Be Possible

The Big Sandy Regional Airport, touted as a model of cooperation and progress, has been on idle since its completion about three years ago, but the facility may in gear if plans fly for an access road.

A deal struck recently between private corporations and public agencies could mean that users will have access to the airport "by this time next year," according to Floyd County Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo, a member of the airport board.

The airport, located in Martin County near the juncture of Floyd and Johnson counties, was built on a 150-acre reclaimed strip mine donated by Pocahontas Land Co. Land surrounding the airport, however, was not part of the bargain and the airport has not been accessible to public use.

The land on which an access road was planned is reportedly leased from Pocahontas by Enoxy Coal Inc.

Occidental Petroleum Corp. and an Italian government agency, has apparently been tightly patrolled because of employee/management

Stumbo said Pocahontas has given right-of-way for a road, and Southside Mining Co. has agreed to "strip and make a road that will be ready for surfacing by next April."

The judge also said the state "will spend \$1.3 million to surface" the road, which he said will be about two miles long. He added that the road will be about two miles long.

"It appears we've pretty well got it straightened out," Stumbo said.

The airport can accommodate "corporate aircraft and some commercial airplanes," said airport board member Burl Wells Spurlock, president of First Commonwealth Bank in Prestonsburg.

Stumbo said that when the access road and KY 3 are both completed, Prestonsburg residents will be only The coal company, jointly owned by about "20 minutes from the airport."

Residents of the community of Hunter got a little worried when a hole (top) appeared recently in the bridge over Left Beaver Creek linking them to KY 122. They watched as it gradually enlarged and until road crews closed the access temporarily. Floyd County Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo said Monday that county workers patched the hole last week and that he has talked with state officials about money to replace the bridge which is believed to be about 60 years old. Stumbo said a new bridge will cost about \$100,000. Local residents say the bridge, which has a five-ton weight limit, has been patched several times before.

Chamber Takes Regional Focus As Development Plans Evolve

Tim Hites is struggling to change a vision he has of how Eastern Kentuckians are perceived by outside

"I can see the guys in Frankfort sitting around and saying 'They (Eastern Kentuckians) can't get their act together. Why should we try to help them?" says Hites in trying to explain his leadership thrust in the Floyd County Chamber of Commerce this

What the rejuvenated chamber is attempting, with Hites as president, is to bring a "regional focus" to local development efforts.

"We want to promote whatever improves the quality of life in Floyd County," says Hites, "but we also know that whatever helps Floyd County or Johnson County or Pike or Martin or Magoffin helps us all."

Evidence that the chamber is operating with renewed vigor and purpose this year is the flurry of new memberships. With a yearlong goal of 100 new members, the chamber launched a membership drive in late April that has resulted two months later in 96 additions, just four shy of the 12-month goal.

Importantly, membership represents nearly every corner of the county, signifying that the organization does not take the Floyd County

The chamber also recently adopted a simple, easily remembered mission statement that capsulizes the scope of its purpose: To advance the commercial, industrial, civic and general interest of all Floyd County.

When Hites took over as chamber president, he acknowledged that he had much to learn. He approached the assignment with the same savvy and energy that has made him a successful businessman.

Hites admits to looking around to see what other chambers of commerce were doing. "If you want the flu, you

get around someone who has it; if you want to be a big flea, get on a big dog," he says seriously and matter-

Resolutely, he spent time with Gerri Kinder, director of the Pike County Chamber of Commerce, which he says has developed a workable structure with active members



Postscript

The Kentucky Supreme Court's recent action calling for reform of the state's school system is abrim with promise. Some of the glow brought by the announcement still lingers, and many Kentuckians still feel the tiny palpitation that hope, much like fear, creates in the pit of the gut.

A Supreme Court edict was not, however, necessary for many of us to know that Kentucky schools, particularly Eastern Kentucky schools, are substandard. And those who have followed reports of the nationwide decline in ACT and SAT scores or who have lived in other parts of the country know the problem is shared by many, many other states. Nationally, education is in sad shape, and we Kentuckians appear to be among those in the worst shape.

So, what now? That's the megabuck question.

Our august legislature has purportedly taken the matter in hand. The best we can hope for is that our elected officials, most of whom are legal minds, will take the issue of overhauling the educational system as seriously as they did the establishment of the lottery.

time to work out a sensible, rational, substantive and practicable plan of reconstruction. Following the Lottery Commission's lead, they might study what has been successful in other states and try to incorporate some of that success. They might also spend some time listening to the folks on the frontline of the educational battlethe teachers, particularly the ones who have been around enough years to have witnessed the continuing erosion of the system.

Once a strong reform plan has been drafted, the real work begins. We're not talking about the implementation. The big job has to come before that. The Kentucky population has be sold on the fact that change is needed, that the proposal will make positive changes and, most important, that education is important. And that's a tall order. As a former public relations person, I'd go into a quivering fit over that assignment.

The majority of Kentuckians, unfortunately, simply don't regard education as important, it seems. Else why would we be in such a mess? Reading this, you're probably the exception, part of a distinct minority.

Let us hope our leaders take the Otherwise, you would have put the paper aside (assuming you picked it up in the first place) after checking out who died, married, bought property, entertained company or wrecked. Think about it. What do most Eastern Kentuckians you know talk about, read, watch on television, or give money to? Why, we'd sooner give a thousand dollars to the NRA, the UK basketball team or a favorite politician than to have a tenth of that amount added to our utilities or prop-



Also the Court received \$2,396.96 from Sheriff Henry C. Hale for the Timber Tax collected. The county receives a Timber Tax bill from the state of \$4,080 and must make up the difference from the General Funds. This has happened for the past three years, according to Stumbo's office.

The Court also received \$740 from William Joe Kendrick, county electrical inspector, as the county's part of the \$2,960 he collected.

The closing of Old Branch Road, located at the forks of Old Turner Branch, was advertised three times and no complaints were registered. Thus, the Court moved to close it and return the property to the landowner, Ralph Spencer.

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Joint Effort May Mean Jobs For Handicapped

Federal and state agencies recently joined a national effort to increase the hiring of handicapped workers in Kentucky.

According to Carroll Burchett, an associate superintendent in the Kentucky Department of Education, "This agreement should result in more and better job placement services for persons with handicaps throughout Kentucky."

The agreement, in the form of a Memorandum of Understanding, is between the Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs (OFCCP), of the US Department of Labor and the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, and is designed to make both agencies more responsive to the needs of individuals with handicaps, according to Gordon Nichols, from the Kentucky Department of Education.

"As a result of this agreement, OFCCP now recognizes the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation as a major recruitment source for qualified handicapped individuals. We also are now approved as a resource to provide OFCCP with expertise in the areas of affirmative action, reasonable accommodation, architectural and attitudinal barrier removal, adaptive devices, worksite modification, job restructuring and evaluation of employees who experience problems working due to physical and/or mental handicaps," he added. "Vocational Rehabilitation ad-

ministers a \$30 million program with a staff of less than 500," he stated. "The money spent to serve clients is returned in the form of increased tax revenues in less than five years. We were doing a good job before, but this agreement will help us make the program even better."

Commission Okays Hospital's Request

The Commission for Health Economics Control approved, at its June 14 meeting, a request by Our Lady of the Way Hospital to establish a "swing

bed" program at its Martin facility.

According to Sr. Mary Fanning, chief executive officer of OLWH, a swing bed" is a bed used for both acute patient care and skilled nursing care for the same patient. This care is primarily for people who would otherwise need to be transferred to a nursing home to receive field nursing or rehabilitation care beyond what the hospital is authorized to give.

Fanning said patients would benefit since they would be transported less and they could remain in the local area. She added that this care is usually covered by Medicare and insurance that covers a normal nurs-

Similar programs were approved for hospitals in Barbourville, Bowling Green and Marion.

Disapproved at the commission meeting was a request from Mountain Manor of Paintsville to construct a 120-bed intermediate care facility in Johnson County.

Phone Affordable For More In County

Eligibility guidelines have been broadened for low income persons who need assistance in getting telephone service through South Central Bell's "Link Up Kentucky" program, according to a company official.

Any Kentuckian who receives Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Medicaid, Food Stamps or Supplemental Securities Income is eligible for the program which reduces the cost of phone installation, said SCB manager Art Willett.

Last year, 197 Floyd County residents received assistance with phone installation costs, Willett said, adding that many people who were not eligible last year may now be eligible. Recipients of aid are to be informed of the expanded guidelines this month through the state Cabinet for Human Resources, he said.

The "Link Up' program provides a 50 percent reduction of the total service connection and installation charges up to \$30, Willett said. Customers are responsible for additional service charges and for paying the monthly bill, he said.

The assistance program is a cooperative effort of the Federal Communications Commission, Cabinet for Human Resources, local telephone companies, Consumer Federation of America and the US Telephone Association, he said. It is funded through an assessment on long distance com-

Willett said persons who qualify for "Link Up" assistance and want to obtain telephone service may call SCB, toll-free, at 1+557-6500.

This past year students and faculty at Prestonsburg Community College saw the realization of a \$3.1 million project that was in the works for nine years - the completion of the Magoffin Learning Resource Center, A dedication ceremony for the building was held Monday, June 19, at 11 a.m.

Dr. David Roselle, president of the University of Kentucky, was the primary speaker, with the audience also hearing comments from State Rep. Greg Stumbo; State Sen. David LeMaster; Dr. Charles Wethington Jr., chancellor of the University of Kentucky Community College System; Robert Conley, chairman of PCC Advisory Board, and Prestonsburg Mayor Ann Latta. College President Dr. Henry Campbell presided.

The new building contains the college library, classrooms, art gallery, computer laboratory, developmental studies laboratories and faculty offices. The fourth building on campus, it is named for one of the counties served by the college.

Construction of a new science laboratory building, to be named for Knott County, will begin this fall according to President Campbell.

"The completion of this building and the planned construction of the science building exemplifies the commitment of the UK Community College System to providing adequate education facilities for the students attending PCC," Campbell said. "With an anticipated enrollment of 2400 students this fall, the building expansion program could not have come at a better time." quality of instruction and facilities are concerned," said Stumbo, add-

Roselle cited the improvements at PCC as a sign of change and an opportunity for the college to provide education to more students. "Improving the college-going rate of Kentuckians is a high priority of the Commonwealth," he said. "The more formalized education we have the better chance we have to improve our financial situation...and to be better citizens to this country."

He stated that PCC will continue to improve and grow and will someday possibly be a four-year college.

Rep. Stumbo spoke of the quality of education that PCC students receive and the state's obligation to see that it is equal to that of other stu-


"Children who go to a community college have a right to as equal an education as those who attend the four-year main campuses as far as

Great cooking is not always a result of following the recipe. This is why often times certain dishes do not taste quite like Mom's did.

Young people living on their own for the first time often spend a lot of time on the phone with their mothers trying to figure out how to cook that special dish for entertaining, or just every day baking and cooking prob-

This week County Kettle features a question and answer section, answers provided by Betty Crocker, to assist those in need of "Mom's advice" for some kitchen techniques. Q. How is kiwi fruit served?

A. Peel and slice fruit. Serve it alone, in fruit salad, to decorate cakes or as a garnish. Don't use it in gelatin dessert because an enzyme in kiwi prevents gelatin from thickening.

whip like they should. What is wrong?

A. Eggs at room temperature will whip better than cold eggs. Also, even a tiny amount of fat from egg yolk or other fats on a beater or bowl will lower the volume of egg whites. Use a non-plastic bowl such as glass or stainless steel because fat is more likely to cling to plastic.

Q. What is a caper and what kinds of recipes include them?

A. A caper is the floral bud from a shrub native to the Mediterranean countries. Capers are pickled and add

a salty-sour taste to cream sauces, creamed dishes and salads. They also can be used as a garnish for meats and

Q. What can I do to make smooth, Q.I have trouble getting egg whites to creamy potato salad? Mine becomes sticky and clumpy after mayonnaise mixture is added to cold, sliced potatoes.

A. Firmer, red (waxy) potatoes are referred for potato salad since they absorb less moisture from the dressing than mealy potatoes. These potatoes, cooled slightly, will hold more moisture from the cooking process then potatoes which have been chilled, so the potato salad will be moister (less sticky and clumpy).

Q. What will prevent scalloped potatoes from curdling?

A. Curdling is characteristic of scalloped potatoes because of a compound in potatoes that reacts with milk. Tominimizecurdling, use mealy potatoes such as Idaho or Russet and neat milk (don't boil!) before adding it to potatoes. Use a cream sauce instead of milk but expect a different eating texture.

Q. When I thaw frozen fish and panfry it, the fish is watery. What will pre-

A. After fish has thawed, blot excess moisture with paper toweling. Have fish well-chilled and, if desired, dip in a simple coating of beaten egg, saltand pepper. Fry fish in 1/8 inch of hot shortening, turning once until fish is lightly browned on both sides.

Q. The unpeeled shrimp is so much

less expensive, I like to purchase it that way, but I am unclear as to the proper way to clean it?

A. Fresh shrimp, cooked or uncooked, is easy to clean. After peeling, you can leave the tail on or remove it, use a small pointed knife to cut the length of the outside curvature. Remove the black sand vein and wash the shrimp.

Q. What would prevent bananas from

turning dark in fruit salad? A. Either sprinkle banana slices with juice from the citrus fruit (oranges or grapefruit) in salad or with lemon juice.

Q. How can I make juicy hamburgers on the grill? I usually buy ground chuck or ground sirloin.

A. Thicker patties will cook more slowly and more evenly and remain juicy longer. Shape 80 percent lean ground chuck gently into patties 1/2inch thick. Grill 4 to 6 inches above medium coals for about 10 minutes, turning once. Don't flatten during grilling with spatula because juices will be squeezed out. Salting before the meat is done can draw moisture to the surface leaving drier meat.

Q. When I deep-fry, the batter often separates from the meat. What will pre-

A. First, dry meat thoroughly before cooking with batter. Use a batter that has a minimal amount of added oil because a too-rich batter may slide off meat. Be certain the oil is at the temperature indicated on recipe.


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
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CUTTING CHOLESTEROL

High levels of serum cholesterol and of the fats called triglycerides have been clearly linked to heart disease. There are other risk factors, as well, notably smoking and high blood pressure, but lowering cholesterol levels can help reduce the risk of heart attack. In one study, the incidence of heart disease went down by 2 percent for every 1 percent drop in blood cholesterol. Experts believe that changing dietary habits, especially cutting out saturated fats and adding more fiber, is the safest way to lower cholesterol. However, when diet therapy alone does not reduce cholesterol significantly, cholesterol-lowering drugs may be used. Some bind to the bile acids from which cholesterol is made, and remove them from the body. Others prevent the production of cholesterol in other ways.

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HINT: Even if anti-cholesterol drugs are prescribed, a low fat, high fiber diet must be rigidly followed.

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



Prices Pinch Pocketbooks

A steep climb in the price of poultry and near-record potato prices helped inflate Kentucky's food price index by 1.4 percent during May, according to Kentucky Farm Bureau's "marketbasket" survey.

With chicken costing 16 percent more and other meats registering smaller increases, shoppers last month paid an average \$69.33 for 40 selected food items, up from \$68.35 in April and 11 percent above the May 1988 level.

Beef prices rose 1.3 percent and pork jumped 2.4 percent during the month, as continued strong consumer demand kept meat merchandisers busy, according to KFB. Eggs were 4.5 percent cheaper, with large eggs averaging 84 cents a dozen.

Fruits and vegetables were priced one percent higher, as a 10-pound bag of Idaho potatoes rose to \$3.24 average, the highest level in 10 years.

Grain-based foods rose 2.4 percent while dairy product prices declined 2.2 percent.

Boneless chicken breasts posted the largest price jump among the 40 items on the survey, rising an average of 47 cents a pound to \$2.27. Tbone steaks showed a 40-cent in-crease, averaging \$5.59 a pound, and pork loin climbed 25 cents a pound.

Among bargains on the survey list were a half gallon of vanilla ice cream, which dropped 23 cents to a \$1.47 average. Sirloin tip roast was 22 cents cheaper.

Comparing present prices to those in 1980, the Farm Bureau said some foods now carry price tags that are more than 50 percent higher. T-bone steaks, for instance, are 65 percent higher than in 1980, whole fryers are 75 percent higher, potatoes are 88 percent higher and vegetable oil is 62 percent more costly.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency gives notice of the proposed determinations of modified base (100-year) flood elevations, in accordance with Section 110 of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (Pub. L. 93-234), 87 Stat. 980, which added Section 1363 to the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (Title XIII of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 (Pub. L. 90-448), 42 U.S.C. 4001-4128, and 44 CFR 65.4(a).

These elevations, together with the floodplain management measures required by Section 60.3 of the program regulations, are the minimum that are required. They should not be construed to mean the community must change any existing ordinances that are more stringent in their floodplain management requirements. The community may at any time enact stricter requirements on its own, or pursuant to policies estailbished by other Federal, State, or regional entities. These proposed elevations will also be used to calculate the appropriate flood insurance premium rates for new buildings and their contents and for the second layer of insurance on existing buildings and their contents.

Pursuant to the provisions of 5 USC 605(b), the Administrator, to whom authority has been delegated by the Director, Federal Emergency Management Agency, hereby certifies that the proposed flood elevation determinations, if promulgated, will not have a significant economic impact on a substantial number of small entities. A flood elevation determination under section 1363 forms the basis for new local ordinances, which, if adopted by a local community, will govern future construction within the floodplain area. The elevation determinations, however, impose no restriction unless and until the local community voluntarily adopts floodplain ordinances in accord with these elevations. Even if ordinances are adopted in compliance with Federal standards, the elevations prescribe how high to build in the floodplain and do not prohibit development. Thus, this action only forms the basis for future local actions. It imposes no new requirement; of itself it has no economic impact.

Proposed base flood elevations along flood sources studied in detail are shown on the Preliminary Revised FIRM. Lessees and owners of real property in the City of Prestonsburg, Floyd County, Kentucky are encouraged to review these maps and related materials at the address cited above. 'Santa Barbara' leads daytime Emmynominations

Eden and Cruz still hold charm

The sun-drenched Southern California seaside community of Santa Barbara provides the provocative setting for the popular NBC daytime serial of the same name. Santa Barbara, which focuses on the rich and powerful Capwell clan as well as a myriad of other colorful characters, has become a leading force in daytime television.

Winner of the Outstanding Drama Series award in last year's daytime Emmys, Santa Barbara earned 13 nominations this year, more than any other daytime drama. The serial's nominations include "the big three" categories: Outstanding Drama Series, Outstanding Lead Actress (Marcy Walker) and Outstanding Lead Actor (A Martinez).

Winners will be announced Thursday, June 29, on NBC, during a live telecast of the 1988-89 Daytime Emmy Awards.

Walker plays the rich and lovely Eden Capwell, while Martinez plays the cool and charismatic Cruz Castillo, who is a policeman. One of television's most popular couples, Eden and Cruz were married in a lavish wedding ceremony in March of 1988, following a torrid and troubled four-year romance that kept viewers on the edges of their seats.

How could a screen romance keep viewers interested so long? "Part of (the relationship's) charm," Walker said, "is that the audience, from the very beginning, has been on our side. They have wanted to see us as man and wife. No matter what Cruz and Eden have gone through, there has always been strong support from our fans."

Said Martinez, "Marcy and I are still having fun working together. I hear stories often of other actors

who have gotten bored in such a long professional relationship. We couldn't pull it off if we were tired of working together... It's hard to explain what makes something work. We care for each other, and it shows on the screen."

Walker starred for three years on the daytime drama All My Children, for which she won three Emmy nominations. She began acting professionally just before her entry into college, when she was chosen from among 2,000 actresses for the lead in Mark Twain's Life on the Mississippi. Later she landed roles in numerous commercials and the cable TV productions Christian and Katherine and The Sisters' Room.

Martinez began acting at The University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA), where he appeared in numerous student productions. He made his professional debut with Patty McCormack in the film Born Wild.
