Patton Not Rehired By School Board

The Floyd County School Board's annual 'cleanup" meeting — tradi-tionally late in June just before the new fiscal year begins - may have taken onnew meaning for Ed Patton.

Pattor, transportation director for the district this past year, was not rehired, but was replaced by Earl D. Ousley. The move was recommended by Superintendent Ronald Hager.

Patton, who has headed the transportation department for five years, came under fire by the local board late last year. An attempt to terminate

due process hearing. Afterwards, the local board took no action - keeping Patton as transportation director for the remainder of the year.

Patton said he was not notified before Wednesday's board meeting that he would not be employed in the

"All I got was the rumor," he said. 'No one has told me anything. I just know what everybody else knows, and I didn't know it until Thursday morning of last week."

Patton said district officials sent

Wednesday. He returned late Wednesday night.

"I got up Thursday morning and came to the bus garage. The people there said I wasn't hired Wednesday night at the board meeting," he said. "I went to the board . . . and requested two days vacation, started packing my things and retained a lawyer."

Patton has retained Prestonsburg attorney Ned Pillersdorf, who represented him last year during the due process hearing.

"I'm just shocked. With all we've been through last fall, I didn't think they would do something as stupid as that," Patton said.

Hager acknowledged Monday that he did not recommend Patton for reemployment.

Although declining to comment specifically because the issue is a personnel matter, Hager did say that

Hager said Patton, as a classified employee without a teaching or other certificate, is considered an "at-will" employee. As such, said Hager, the local board does not have to notify an employee that they will not be re-

"We will be filing an action in

litical retaliation," said Pillersdorf, Patton's attorney. Pillersdorf said he felt the board's action was "absolutely" related to last fall's allega-tions. He said he would seek punitive damages, suing some of the school board members personally.

"We'll sue the ones who we have evidence directly participated in the political retaliation," said Pillersdorf. He added that the evidence is similar to that brought out last fall during Patton's due process hearing, which

Stumbo said he has asked the Cabinet to monitor traffic on the bridge. "The bridge was not designed for the amount of weight that sits on itat peak traffic times," the legislator said. "Engineers have told me it is extremely unsafe. I'm calling on the Cabinet to try to alleviate some of the

Stumbo's proposal might have heavier trucks turning onto Mountain Parkway extension at the intersection of KY 114 and US 23 N, near Prestonsburg Village Shopping Center. Heavy trucks going north would likely go to Salversville, take KY 40 east and link back up with US 23 north of Paintsville.

"My concern is for the safety of the bridge and the safety of the traveling public. The bridge was not designed

Stumbo said he and local government and business leaders have met with Transportation Cabinet Secretary Milo Bryant to discuss the road situation in the area. He said that, besides the rerouting proposal, they discussed an alternative of limiting heavy truck traffic on the bridge during peak hours.

The bridge is generally most crowded during the morning and afternoon "rush" hours and over the noon hour.

"I've complained and complained and complained," said Stumbo. "But my feeling is that if you keep running into a brick wall long enough, one will have to give out."

According to Don Combs, cochair/management of the local council, the state secretaries of labor and economic development are expected to attend Wednesday's meeting.

A reception, also at Jenny Wiley, will immediately follow the state council's quarterly meeting. Both events are open to the public.

"We want this advisory council to be exposed to our area, and to our leaders," said Combs. "Generally, we

need more support and awareness of labor and management relations, problems and solutions."

The local council co-chair said Floyd County Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo plans to declare the week "Labor-Management Week."

Jury Recommends Life Sentence In Stabbing Death Of Ricky Hall

Circuit Court jury last week found Michael Lee Crisp, 25, of Dwale guilty of murder and recommended a life sentence.

Crisp had been accused of the stabbing death of Ricky Hall, a 33vear-old Prestonsburg man who was found dead Nov. 13, beside John's Branch Road near Maytown.

A key factor in the conviction was the testimony of Elmer (Butch) Lafferty Jr., also of Dwale, who came forward as a witness about a week after the crime, said Commonwealth Attorney Jerry Patton. Although

was not admissible in court, Patton said the witness' "story was supported by testimony and evidence."

In the murder, for which no motive was established, Hall reportedly received 34 stab wounds, including having his "throat cut from one ear to the next and a big hole in the back," Patton said.

The Commonwealth Attorney added that the case and trial had two "unusual" aspects. First, he said, the defendant did not take the stand in his own defense. Rather, the prosecu-

After a three-day trial, a Floyd Lafferty's passing of alie detector test tor said defense attorneys tried to convince the jury that Lafferty was the one who committed the crime.



"I look forward to questioning members of the school board in federal court under oath," he added.

Hager's recommendation, although approved by the local board, remains subject to approval by state Department of Education officials, as the local district is in Phase 3 of the academic bankruptcy law. The state exercises final control over all personnel transactions in the district.

Hager said he was not at liberty to say if the decision was related to allegations made against Patton last year.

'SICK-OUT' POLICY PASSED BY BOARD

At Wednesday's meeting, the Floyd County School Board also approved the draft of a policy that would prevent the district's teachers from disrupting the educational process - in effect, from repeating a "sickout" similar to that of October 1988.

policy prohibits employees, employee organizations and their affiliates from being involved in a strike against the district. In addition, according to the policy, they may not take partin, cause or encourage sanc-

tions, showdowns, sick-ins, picketing, refusal to cross picket lines, boycotts, interruptions of work, other public demonstrations or "any concerted effort which interferes with, impedes, or impairs the normal operation of the district or board."

According to the policy, the local district may take legal action against employee organizations, their affiliates or persons participating in such a

In addition, the policy states that the district will not pay salaries, wages or fringe benefits to employees for days when they fail, as a result of a strike, to report for work.

Employees violating the policy are subject to disciplinary action, including dismissal.

The county is now eligible for special assistance to help businesses, individuals and governments to recover losses created by the flood

Floyd Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo estimated damage in the county at about \$150,000. He said the federal government will reimburse the county at about 75 percent of cost to repair bridges and roads that were

Federal officials will also look at homes damaged by flood water, and low interest loans will be available to homeowners to restore residences, Stumbo said.



We have just celebrated our 213th anniversary as Americans. The freedoms publicly declared that July 4th over two centuries ago are endangered ... by Americans, over a piece

Granted, that piece of cloth is our flag, but I keep remembering 1952.

In that year, not so long ago, a book was published. It wasn't just any book - it was the Bible. But this was not the King James Version with which so many were familiar. It was the Revised Standard Version, and it broughtdown the wrath of thousands of people who thought it was heresy. There were instances like one in Rocky Mount, N.C., during which people gathered at church to burn copies of those Bibles. Those who did the burning may well have been quite sincere in their belief that they were burning the work of the devil himself.

What those people failed to understand was that they were burning a symbol, not the real thing. Whether the books they burned were inspired by the devil, or by God, was not what was important. What mattered was that God's word would prevail in spite of man's puny efforts to make a

The same thing will be true if we do flag burners the same way the Bible burners were done: ignore them. If I die a Christian's death, I die for God, not the Bible. Just so, all those who have given their lives as Americans have died for their country, not for the flag. The flag, like the Bible, is a symbol of something greater than itself. It is not our freedom, but a symbol of that freedom.

Yes, I'm proud of my flag. No, I do not like it when someone mistreats or desecrates it. I still cringe every time I see an American flag drag the ground, whether done intentionally or not. Yet, I do not try to have the perpetrator arrested for a crime.

I personally prefer "America the Beautiful" for our national anthem, instead of "The Star Spangled Banner," a song written about a single battle in our history, and one which honors war rather than the good things about our country. To this day, no one has tried to have me arrested for saying I don't like the choice made by Congress the same year I was born.


There are some who would say that our fallen soldiers, as well as those who still live, fought for the flag. Oh, I hope not. As Ernie Pyle said during the invasion of Normandy in 1944: "Then darkness enveloped the whole American armada. Not a pinpoint of light showed from those hundreds of ships as they surged on through the night toward their destiny, carrying across the ageless and indifferent sea tens of thousands of


young men, fighting for . . . for . . well, at least for each other."

We stand so close to the tyranny of China today. Can we not learn our lesson from their refusal to grant the freedom of speech? We raise our voices strongly when gun control is threatened. If we value our freedom to express ourselves, we should just as vocally protest any effort to crush even someone who disagrees with us. For over two centuries, we have been free to share any ideas we had, be it communism, socialism or anarchy. Only when we try to force others to agree with us do we overstep the freedoms guaranteed to us by the Bill of Rights in our Constitution.

If you choose to burn the flag to show your distaste for something in this great country of ours, I will be hurt by your act and might suggest that you find another country in which to live. But while you are in these United States, you have the right to express yourself, as long as it doesn't infringe on the rights of others.

Perhaps it is time we took our intense feelings down another road. We could take the anger we feel for someone who treats our flag thus that is, burning it - and channel those energies into helping the homeless, the poverty stricken, the emotionally deprived, or the charity of our choice. A six-pack of beer often costs less than soda at the supermarket, and no counter-ads or pro-health messages telling the truth about the drug alcohol are seen on the national media. Alcohol-related crashes are still the major causes of teenage death. Researchers tell us that simply hiking the user fees on alcoholic beverages could prevent one-half of these fatal crashes, help to curb illegal teenage alcohol use and bring in \$15 billion of federal revenue to offset the deficit.

The surgeon general has provided aroad map for action and a role model, in the form of the national "Coalition to Prevent Impaired Driving," a new fusion of alcohol policy and highway safety groups which finally agree that drunk driving is a public health problem, as well as a motor vehicle haz-

It has taken RID (Remove Intoxicated Drivers) a decade of hard work and bitter experience to arrive at these conclusions, now held to be self-evident by researchers and citizen advocates in both fields. We must finally tell the truth about alcohol and recognize the social impact of a completely alcoholized environment for youth and problem drinkers.

We must stop using stars, athletes and sex symbols to sell alcoholic beverages to our youth, put warning labels on all alcohol products and their advertisements as we did with cigarettes and stop glorifying beer with sports as the all-American dream. We must start treating alcohol as the most serious drug that takes more years of life from us than all other diseases, calamities or crimes combined. It's the entry drug for all other drugs. It's the drug that comes home to roost.

CHILD CARE PROGRAM MUST GUARANTEE FREEDOM OF CHOICE TO PARENTS

The shortage of safe and affordable child care is a serious national problem that is no stranger to Ken-

Just before taking the July 4 recess, the Senate approved legislation creating a child care assistance program for low-income working families. More than 70 percent of the money going to parents from this bill is in the form of tax credits. The measure now goes to the House of Representatives

for its consideration. The final version of the Senate bill included a major chance that Sen. David Durenberger of Minnesota and I sponsored to guarantee parental choice in the selection of child care services. This change was critical, because in its original form, the bill would have deprived parents of the right to use child care provided in a religious setting.

One of the goals of this new program is to increase the availability of hild care. In Kentucky, one-fifth of all child care slots are filled by churchsponsored providers. Representatives of the Kentucky Council of Churches and Kentucky Catholic Conference

"It is now well documented in professional journals, as well as in the large caseloads of mental health, social services, and criminal justice professionals that violence is embedded in the lives of American families. It seems ironic that the words 'family' and 'violence' are so closely tied.

"Violence implies destruction, hatred and hurting, while the word 'family' implies caring, love and joy We find, however, that these words are thrust together such that where there was once joy, there is fear; where there was trust, there is jealously and mistrust; and where there was love, there is hurt. Research shows that this unlikely combination of violence and families occurs at all levels, between spouses, in parent-child relationships, sibling relationships, dating relationships, and in the abuse of the elderly." (MH/MR Mental Health Institute)

Violence can take many forms. It can mean the non-accidental injury of one person by another, as in slapping, hitting or burning a child, a spouse or elderly relation. It can mean violence of a sexual nature, as in making sexual advances or engaging in sexual conduct with a child or elderly relation with the family. This is commonly referred to as incest or sexual abuse. Violence can take the form of emotional or psychological abuse, as in deliberate name-calling or threatening, even with a weapon. This type of abuse can actually be more damaging and its effect more long lasting than physical abuse. Violence can also take the form of

neglect, or not attending to the physical needs of a spouse, child or elderly relation. Physical needs include things such as food, clean/safe shelter, and affection, to name a few.

Studies have shown that violence in families, if allowed to go unchecked, has the tendency to become worse and worse. The effects of violence on families can be very detri-

Verdict Upheld; Keith Pennington Still Has 120 Years

The Kentucky Supreme Court has affirmed the decision of Floyd Circuit Court in the case of Wiley Keith Pennington, who was sentenced last year to 120 years in prison as a persistent felony offender on charges ranging from robbery to attempted murder to wanton endangerment.

According to the opinion filed with the Circuit Clerk's office, the Wheelwright-area man, in his appeal, challenged the attempted murder conviction and four other points in the local jury verdict.

Pennington was arrested in September 1987 after a high-speed car chase during which he was accused of shooting at police cars and of causing several other motorists to leave



What's in a Name?

John Scalf of Betsy Layne provided information on the origins of the place names Bosco and Harold, featured in the last What's In A Name? puzzle.

The area around Harold was once known as Laynesville, after James S. Layne, Scalfsaid. One post office was established there in 1828 and another sometime later. When the Laynesville post office closed, "people just called the area Harold," he said.

That moniker is apparently traced to Harold Hatcher, a local merchant and a descendant of James Hatcher who settled the Mouth of Mud Creek in the 1830s.

Although Scalf does not know where the name Bosco comes from.

he said that the Bosco post office was opened in the 1880s. A railroad at the time passed through what was known as Bosco Station. A few years later, the post office name was changed to Hueysville, after a Robert Huey. Scalf said that Huey was a native of Pennsylvania who apparently settled in the area, but his claim to fame is

"I've had parents call me at home and ask me if I was going to call the game that afternoon. I feel that the fans respect me as an umpire, however, I don't believe they do overall," Greathouse said.

Greathouse recalls an unusual game he called last year: "It was the second game in the Babe Ruth tour-nament between Paintsville and Hazard. We were in the fourth inning with the score 30-2, but the unusual thing was that it was 2:30 a.m. in the morning. Hazard puts a pitcher on the mound that had been into the gamealready as a sub, and Paintsville

protested the move. "Well, when we got around to get play started again, we found out that one of the parents on Hazard's team had taken their son home and Hazard had only eight players and could not field a team. It was called no game and had to be replayed.

There is too much name-calling in baseball games," he said. "I threw a fan out of the park once for namecalling.'

Tom Thacker has been calling games for five years. His biggest game was when he called the finals of the 15th Region tournament at Pikeville this past season.

"I think that they (fans) take advantage of a new umpire. There is no respect for umpires. They will question your judgment and it goes back to the problem we always have: the fans don't understand the rules. The coacnes are also weak on the rules of the game. Each league should hold clinics at the start of the season for the coaches. Go over the ground rules. It only hurts the kids."

For those umpires who get behind the plate for the meager amount they receive for their services, hats off to them for their courage.

Maybe one item should be added to those already on sale at ball park concession stands — a rule book.

Tips On Bass Boat Care Given

Unfortunately, says Evinrude Outboards Pro Staff angler and boat dealer Bo Dowden, many fishermen don't feel that way, and as a result, they often have to pay heavy mainte-nance and repair bills.

"The biggest mistake I see," says Dowden, "is that people don't prepare the boat properly for storage. You can't simply park your boat in your driveway, or even in your ga-

rage, and walk away.
"If you do, you're asking for trouble, and it can be expensive."

Boats left in this manner may still have water remaining in their lower units. If this water freezes, it can crack the lower unit and necessitate a major

Anglers planning to put a boat into storage anytime in the future, says the Evinrude pro, should follow these tips:

"Change the oil in the lower unit before storage. This will remove any water and prevent freezing. Even in hot weather, it's a good idea to get the

"Fill the gas tanks to capacity. This will keep water from condensing, because there isn't any air in the tanks. If you don't do this, the water formed by condensation will contaminate your gasoline and you'll have to drain

"It will also help to add some fuel conditioner to the gasoline," says Dowden. "This is available from most boat and outboard dealers, and also helps keep the fuel from going bad. Once you do this, crank the engine and let it run for about five minutes to

The batteries don't have to be removed, says Dowden, but should be disconnected. They should be charged about once a month to keep them from deteriorating.

Dowden also suggests fishermen out a fresh coat of wax on the boat, then store it in shady place. The wheel bearings should be greased, and the boat covered, if possible.

"After that," says Dowden, "the boat should be ready to go the next time you're ready to go.'





Farm Ponds Provide Enjoyment For Anglers

fishing hole was just a hop and a skip away? For many Kentucky landowners, that wish is a reality.

That's because their favorite fishing spot is as near as their own farm

Maybe you have a pond, but it's not exactly the place you want to go fishing. It's full of vegetation, or you just never can seem to get a bite. Such is not the case with farm pond owners who have taken advantage of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' fisheries technical guidance program.

A well-managed farm pond produces good, fishing, according to Carolyn Lynn of F&WR.

To apply, first contact the state conservation officer in Floyd County. The CO will get all the necessary in-

"If you'veconstructed a new pond on your farm and want to establish a ommendations. Sometimes electroommendations. This is a routine fish-study procedure which momentarily stuns fish and brings them to the surface, where they can be netted and placed in a live well for examination. Sometimes the

remove all the fish and start over, Lynn explains.

New ponds may be stocked, or old ones (with all fish removed) restocked with largemouth bass, bluegill and channel catfish, if desired. These fish are available from the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources for a \$10

fee. All of the "new" fish are fingerling size, one to three inches long. Bluegill and channel catfish are usu-

ally released in the fall, with largemouth bass added the following summer. With the correct balance of these species, the district fisheries biologist can create optimal fishing opportunities in the farm pond. The deadline to apply for the farm

pond stocking program this year is eptember 30.

Pondowners are are encouraged to give responsible anglers permission to fish, remember that private landowners have the final say on who may enter their property," Lynn added.

According to studies conducted in Kentucky, almost half of all anglers enjoy fishing farm ponds on a regular basis. "Part of the reason is because many pond owners are will-ing to share their fishing enjoyment with other anglers," she said.

Anglers who aren't able to follow the fish, or those who don't like deep fishing, will have trouble.

"Early in the summer, bass will be more scattered," says Evinrude Outboards Pro Staff member Larry Nixon, "and some may be shallow while others are deep.

"One of a bass fisherman's primary considerations this time of year is to cover as much water as he can.

That way, he can determine where bass are - and fish accordingly. This means using a lot of fast retrieve lures, such as the vibrating, cast and reel plugs, buss baits and perhaps the shallow running minnow imitation lures," the Evinrude pro explains.

"These types of lures should be used in the early morning hours. Later, a fisherman should change to plastic worms or jigs, worked around shallow cover, weedlines, or even deeper structure 10-20 feet deep."





Assistance Available For Restoring State Wetlands

Kentucky landowners have an opportunitý to get assistance in restoring former wetland areas on their property, under recently adopted rules of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP).

The next sign-up period for the program is July 14 through August 4 at the nearest office of the Agricul-tural Stabilization Conservation Serv-

Wetlands are crucial to waterfowl whose numbers have rapidly declined nationwide in the last 10 years. The decline is directly attributed to the loss of natural breeding and wintering grounds which have been drained and converted for agricultural purposes.

Although most waterfowl habitat destruction has occurred in Canada, any lost wetland, even in Kentucky, can affect waterfowl populations. (Remember that wood ducks nest in Kentucky.)

There's an urgent need to not only preserve existing waterfowl habitat but also to restore former wetlands to their original character and purpose, according to the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife.

it restored can play a part in preserv-ing this important part of the state's natural heritage. Earlier this year Kentucky farmers signed up a total of 185 acres for wetlands restoration, according to the department.

The expansion of CRP rules will allow landowners, whose land meets eligibility requirements, to voluntarily participate in wetland restora-

Persons who have owned land for at least three years with a former wetland area on their property, which has been in crop rotation for a minimum of two years during the period 1981-1985, may be eligible to participate in this portion of the Conserva-

tion Reserve Program.
Once the landowner signs up, the ASCS determines whether the property is eligible for CRP wetlands restoration. If eligible, the Soil Conservation Service will conduct soil tests to determine whether the land qualifies as a true wetland. If the soil qualifies as "wet," the landowner submits a bid to the ASCS office and plans get underway to restore the former wetland area.

Interested farmers should register for wetlands restoration at the nearest ASCS office between July 17

The hero, however, who made the biggest impact and who remains Muse's passion is the most famous masked man in the world—the Lone Ranger. Since he was a child, Muse has collected books, toys, audio and video tapes and other memorabilia on the Old West's number one crime fighter. Muse can recite the chronology of the Lone Ranger almost as if the fictional character, created on radio in 1933, were a historical per-

Muse has the lowdown on all the actors who've played the Lone Ranger from the first one on radio, Jack Deeds, to Klinton Spilsbury who starred in a 1981 movie that Muse considers a

Earl Graser, who played The Lone Ranger on radio from 1933 to 1941, for instance, was a "little wimpy-looking fellow," according to Muse. To keep the public image intact, the show's narrator Brace Beemer, who was more than six feet tall, appeared in public as the western hero, Muse says.

The actor who read the radio part of Tonto from the onset until the radio series ceased in the 1950s was John Todd, described by Muse as a "60year-old, bald-headed Irishman."

In Lone Ranger movie serials in the 1940s, Tonto was portrayed by Chief Thundercloud, and for the later television series, starring Clayton Moore, Jay Silverheels was the Indian. Both Thundercloud and Silverheels were apparently authentic native Americans

As with Batman, the look of the Lone Ranger has evolved over the years, Musesays. Pictures in the early books of the character show him dressed in a checked shirt, chaps, cowhide vest and 10-gallon hat. Muse says an artist named Henry Valleley created the familiar tight-fitting, light blue costume.

Tonto, the Lone Ranger's "faithful Indian companion," was originally depicted in Apache tribal garb, but Muse says that the early books explain that the sidekick was a member of a Potawatomi tribe that settled in

Muse's sources include just about every piece of printed material ever published on the adventures of the Lone Ranger. "One feature book and five comic books are all I don't have out of over 200 books on the subject," viuse says.

The collection covers 14 Big Little Books, 19 hard back books, a coloring book and numerous copies of Golden Books and pulp magazines, all on the famous masked cowboy. Included is a copy of the first edition of the first Lone Ranger comic book, published in the 1930s.

In addition, Muse owns 33 books about Tonto's adventures and 36 books featuring the Lone Ranger's horse Silver. He also has posters from Lone Ranger movies, along with bubble gum cards on the hero and a metal sign with the hero hawking Merita bread.

From his childhood days, Muse has several items he sent away for and has kept through the years, including a copy of the Lone Ranger pledge, two toy six-guns and holsters, and membership cards in the Lone Ranger Safety Cluband Victory Rang-

For storage purposes, the collection translates into seven boxes of comic books, two large boxes of Big Little Books and pulp books, and assorted containers for the other items.

He also has pictures of himself with Clayton Moore, the actor most identified with The Lone Ranger. Muse says he met Moore several years ago and has kept in touch with the 74year-old actor ever since.

Muse traces his fascination-near adoration-with the Lone Ranger back to his childhood. "I started listening to the Lone Ranger on radio about 1935," he explains." I was very

idealistic, very patriotic.
"The Lone Ranger stood for high ideals, encouraging you to be safe, obey your mom and dad, and so

Muse's collection also includes books and memorabilia about Captain Marvel ("I was a big fan."), Green Lantern and Spider Woman. In fact, he has all the comic books on the arachnid heroine, 50 in all, ranging "from her birth to her death."

Although he had hung onto items from his youth, Muse says his collecting did not begin in earnest until the late 1960s. "It was a spur of the moment thing. I suddenly decided to collect Lone Ranger stuff," he says.


At times the habit has been an expensive one. He paid \$60, for instance, for a 1939 Lone Ranger comic book that originally cost 10 cents. The Merita bread sign cost \$250 when he bought it 10 years ago.

On the other hand, the items have a good resale value, and in an occasional "financial pinch," Muse has

Muse often travels to festivals and shows where memorabilia are traded and sold. A few weeks ago, he attended the Roy Rogers Portsmouth, Ohio. "It's a big thrill to meet someone else who's interested,"

Among the collector's dreams is to open a museum, he says, so he can bring the superheroes' materials out of storage and put them on public

With the heat the way it has been, cooking is not a pleasant experience. No one wants to stay in a hot kitchen for any length of time. This week's County Kettle features recipes, taken from a variety of sources, that require little or no cooking and are cool entrees and snacks to please everyone.

STRAWBERRY-RHUBARB SHERBET

1 lb fresh rhubarb, cooked and cooled 1 lb fresh strawberries (2 pints) 2 egg whites

2 Tbsps fresh lemon juice Rinse rhubarb and cut into 1-inch pieces. Place in a microwave-safe

1 cup sugar

bowl. Add 1/4 cup water. Cover and cook on High power 4 to 6 minutes or until tender. Drain and set aside to cool slightly. Rinse and hull strawberries. Place all ingredients in a food processor; puree until smooth. Pour mixture into a 9" x 13" pan, and then place in freezer until mixture is partially frozen, about 1 to 1 1/2 hours.

Process until thick and light. Return mixture to pan and freeze. Makes about 8 servings; 130 calo-

HONEY VANILLA ICE CREAM

3/4 cup honey 1-1/2 cups milk

1 Tbsp vanilla extract

1-1/2 cups whipping cream

Beat eggs until foamy in a large mixing bowl. Gradually add honey; beat at low speed until well blended. Gradually blend in milk and vanilla. Chill at least 30 minutes. Whip cream until it forms soft peaks; fold into chilled mixture. Churn-freeze, using slightly greater portion of salt to ice than for other ice creams. After freezing, transfer ice cream to a plastic freezer container. Ripen in freezer at

least 3 hours before serving. Yields 2 quarts.







When a prescription calls for one teaspoon of medication to be administered to a child, a parent should not go to the set of kitchen stainless ware. The average teaspoon found in the household contains anywhere from 2.5 cc. to 7.8 cc. of liquid volume. In the middle of this range is the 5 cc. amount that the American Medical Association established in 1903 to be the standard measure of a teaspoon. Thus, it is obvious that a more reliable measure of 5 cc. can be had with the measuring cup that accompanies most children's medication. If one is not available, or it is lost, ask the pharmacist for a calibrated dropper, medication cup, oral syringe, or spoonlike device. The smaller a child is, the less room there is for error. A parent should never guess at a child's medication

amount. 

Flynn made his remarks on May the other side is the European/Japa- more than 100 reporters and public relations practitioners attending the National Association of Real Estate Editors annual spring seminar, according to Jeff Lubar, association representative.

"If we don't do something about housing affordability, if we don't change the attitudes in the political environment in which we live, our children and their children will not have the (home ownership) opportunity that you and I had," Flynn told reporters.

He said the solution to the housing affordability problem can be found at three levels: national, state and local. He stressed the need for the federal government to adopt a national housing policy. Among other things, that policy should raise the ceiling on loans insured by the Federal Housing Administration for home buyers in high cost areas and provide tax incentives to help families save for the down payment on a

Flynn, a realtor from Madison, Wisc., stressed that the mortgage interest deduction should not be further reduced, because "to make a change would send a terrible signal at a time when home ownership is declining...it would send a signal that the federal government does not support home ownership."

The mortgage interest deduction helps home buyers at all levels of the housing market, from first-time buyers to repeat buyers, he said. Further reducing the deduction, or eliminating it, would tighten the market, increase the cost of housing and hurt first-time buyers most of all, he said.
