

The Dump That Ate Wayland

Work was slated to begin this summer on cleaning up abandoned slate dumps in and around the town of Wayland. But so far, nothing has been done. Federal money was allocated last winter for the million-dollar-plus project, and the Wayland site was given a top priority. According to Gary Francis, local official with the US Office of Surface Mining, this is at least the second time funds have been appropriated for the clean up; some Wayland residents contend the reclamation has been promised even more

times. The waste build-up apparently occurred during the 1930s, '40s and 50s when Elkhorn Coal operated several underground mines in the area. In addition to health and other environmental hazards created by persistent fires, the bare slate hills continue to erode, washing debris and residue into area streams and clogging town drains. Francis said he is trying to identify the holdup of the project.

## **Teachers Take** Officials To Task

Floyd County teachers are determined to be heard.

Unhappy with local management of the 9,000-student school system and with state intervention that began in January, more than a dozen teachers representing their colleagues traveled to Frankfort Tuesday to present their concerns to members of the state Board of Education.

Teachers addressed the state board's Administration Committee Tuesday morning, capturing the ear of state board chairman Henry Pogue, a committee member. Additionally, Roberta Luxmore, president of the Floyd County Education Association, and other FCEA representatives are expected to address the full board today.

The teachers presented a written statement to the committee Tuesday, outlining their frustrations with the local district's failure to communicate with employees and fulfill past commitments.

"During the last 11 years, we've been waiting for others to determine our future, and in the process, we've been trying to teach," teachers said. Theeducators noted that "battles rage around the classrooms, and it hurts what happens in the classrooms. We want supervisors and administrators who will help us.

Educators also expressed dissatisfaction with a comment by Deputy Superintendent of Instruction Dr. Betty Steffy, who said at an earlier state board meeting that the local district has made two years' progress in six months.

The Floyd educators told committee members that the statement, if true, was "a startling revelation" to

The representatives also complained about a lack of information concerning the state department's intervention in the local district and asked why officials failed to take action after the local board did not reduce the number of administrators

in the district. Earlier, the local board had approved reductions in classroom teaching personnel, bus drivers, maintenance workers, janitorial staff and teacher aides.

The teachers said that in January, when the district was moved into Phase 3 under the academic bankruptcy law, they believed someone was willing to help them.

"We understand that the task undertaken is not easy, but we believed that you were willing to make tough decisions," educators said.

'Many of the points that the teachers bring up are just as frustrating to us. The political activity, the hesitation of the local board to move on recommendations and, to some degree, the non-cooperation with the local committee."

"From our viewpoint, conditions are no better in Floyd County, and in some ways they may be worse (since state intervention)," the statement read. Teachers alluded to the firing of Ed Patton, the district's transportation director, and to adoption of a local board policy prohibiting teacher strikes or sick-outs.

"We know that we're being told that if we want to keep our jobs, we'd better keep our mouths shut. Perhaps that is hard for some of you to understand, because most of you do not live with that kind of fear. You do not have to learn about where you'll be working the next year by consulting an article in the newspaper. How much dignity do you think any of those teachers felt? Your jobs do not depend on whom you choose to support in the next election. If this is happening with members of the state department in Floyd County, what will it be like when they leave?" the

#### Betsy Layne Man Moved To Action By Flag Decision

A Betsy Layne man, spurred by what he considers patriotic spirit, has become a political activist, somewhat to his own surprise.

"I'venever done anything like this before," said Steve Roberts, 34, the leader of a petition drive in support of making damage to the United States

Roberts expects to collect more than 3,000 signatures on petitions he is circulating in Floyd and Pike counties. He plans to gather up the petitions this weekend and send them to USSenators Wendell Ford and Mitch McConnell and to 7th District Congressman Chris Perkins.

Roberts said that when he heard of the Supreme Court ruling that burning of the flag was protected by the First Amendment to the Constitution, he "just sat around complaining about it. Then my wife told me to either stop complaining or

#### County Attorney To Local Vendors: X-Rated Material Not For Young Eyes

Floyd County Attorney David Allen Barber is warning all vendors of possible pornographic videos and magazines to get the materials out of sight of minors.

Barber said his office has recently received "numerous complaints from parents concerning pornographic videos and magazines which are displayed so that they can be seen by

He declined to name specific stores, but he did say he was concerned about "some video stores in the Harold area and some convenience stores that sell videos and magazines.

The county attorney said he was giving the stores a "grace period, a chance to put them (the materials) up." He said his office will begin to issue warrants to store owners who do not comply in a couple of weeks.

The penalty for a first offense in cases involving allowing minors access to pornography, a misdemeanor, is a fine of up to \$500 and/or up to a year in jail, he said. Subsequent offenses are Class D felonies and are punishable by one to five years in prison or, in some cases, a fine of up to \$10,000.

Under state laws on pornographic materials, a minor is defined as anyone under 18 years of age, he said.

"We are asking that all businesses selling or renting pornographic material display that material in areas not accessible to minors, or to display it in such a manner so that the pornographic nature is not seen by minors," Barber said.

The county attorney said he has sent letters to all relevant businesses he has been able to identify to remind owners of the display issue.

#### Wayland Board Approves Campaign Sign Ordinance The Wayland Town Board at last allow their campaign materials to stay

night's meeting enacted an ordinance designed to control the proliferation of election campaign materials within the city limits.

The new ordinance requires candidates who wish to post campaign literature in public areas to post a \$100 bond to the city clerk or city police before displaying the material. After an election, candidates will have two weeks to takedown all campaign materials and reclaim their bond

Candidates who do not remove campaign materials will forfeit the bond, according to the ordinance, and the money will be used to pay for having the materials removed.

Those caught posting campaign signs without permission will be fined a minimum of \$100 for littering, the ordinance says. If a candidate's material is found posted without permission it will be taken down by town officials.

The regulations do not apply to campaign materials posted on private property "so long as they are applied in a way as to prevent them from coming off."

The ordinance also provides that candidates who win a primary elec-

tion do not have to re-post a bond to

up through the following general election.

Police Chief Mack Stewart, who drafted the ordinance for the board, said the ordinance is part of an effort to keep the city clean. He said he has seen campaign posters that have been left on poles "for years at a time."

In other business, board members agreed to allow Danny Francis to serve as auxiliary policeman while Chief Stewart is on vacation. Francis will serve without pay.

In response to a citizen complaint about a build-up of bushes and debris at a culvert under KY 7, board members instructed townclerk Carol Stapleton to contact county, state and power company officials to get the culvert cleared out.

Stapleton reminded the board of a special meeting on Monday, July 17, at 7 p.m. at Town Hall to finalize the town budget for 1989-90.

Presentatlastnight's meeting were board members Gene DeCoursey, serving as mayor pro temp, Gene Mullins and Tommy Robinson. Absent were Hobert Webb and Mayor Patricia Murphy.

The next regularly scheduled meeting of the town board will be Tuesday, Aug. 1 at 7 p.m.

#### Same-Day Delivery Begins

Prestonsburg subscribers to the Floyd County Times may have noticed something a bit different of late — their newspapers are arriving on Wednesdays rather than Thursdays.

Known as "same day delivery," the newspapers are taken to the Prestonsburg Post Office during the wee hours of Wednesday morning, in time to be included on carriers' routes that day. In the coming month, the Times will expand its same-day delivery to cover all in-county subscribers.

"By early August, we hope that all Floyd Countians will receive their Times on Wednesday," said publisher Marty Backus Sr. "Providing the convenience of same-day delivery was one way we felt we could show our readers how much we appreciate them."

Prestonsburg residents were the first to receive same-day service because of the proximity of the city's larger post office to the Times offices, Backus said.

"In order to offer Wednesday delivery to other county residents, our in-county subscriptions must be taken to the Pikeville Post Office," the publisher explained. As a sectional center facility, the Pikeville Post Office handles larger volumes of second-class mail than other post offices in surrounding counties.

"Beginning with next week's issue, we hope to offer same-day delivery to all subscribers," Backus explained. "However, if the paper doesn't arrive on Wednesday, please bear with us - it may take some time to completely adjust our staff schedules to this new service.



More low-income Kentuckians are eligible for a maternal and child nu- and specific foods high in protein, trition program, due to annual federal government revisions in poverty levels, according to the officials with the state Department for Health Serv-

On Saturday, July 1, annual income limits for families applying for WIC, formally known as the special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children, increased between 3 and 4 percent. For example, the annual maximum income for a family of four increased from \$21,553 to \$22,385

Those families with incomes near the current maximums may become eligible, according to Peggy Kidd, state WIC director.

Almost 82,000 Kentuckians now receive WIC benefits monthly, Kidd said, as compared to 74,000 recipients in June 1988.

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

## CAP Closes Infant Care Center, Cites Lack Of Director As Cause Christian Appalachian Project has educational credentials are required.

closed Infant University in Martin, Floyd County's only day care center that accepted infants.

The move came after the resignation last week of center director Pat Gallagher, who led in the development of the center four years ago. Glen Taul, a spokesman for the agency at its Lancaster headquarters, said CAP was unable to find a credentialed director to replace Gallagher, and thus had to close the center last Fri-

"We decided it was best to close for the time being and go from there," said Taul. "We need to rethink the program and redirect."

The credentials Taul referred to involve state regulations that require a licensed day care center-to be directed by a person who has gone through a professional Child Development Associate program — which Gallagher had — or who has a college degree in early childhood education

or special education. Robert Rennick, who oversees state licensing of day care facilities in

17 eastern counties from his office in

He also expressed regret that Infant University has closed. "There is no other facility in the area that takes infants," he said.

Rennick said the closest center that cares for infants of working parents is in Pikeville, since two such facilities in Paintsville closed last year. The state official added that he is working with some centers that expect to expand their services to include infants by the fall.

A primary problem for regular day care centers, Rennick said, is meeting the stricter fire marshal requirements for serving infants. Infant University, located in a former church, met those requirements, he said.

Rennick said the requirements are more lenient for persons who want to open infant centers in their homes, and he is looking for interested persons in the county. Similar programs have succeeded in other counties, he said, buthe has received "few inquirles from Floyd County."

Taul said Infant University was originally affiliated with Mountain Christian Academy, also a CAP sponsored facility, but had become a sepa-

rate program four years ago. Gallagher has been its only director.

He said about 20 infants were enrolled at the center this summer. Most of the center's clients were children of working couples or of single parents who have to work.

'We're trying to work with parents to help relocate the kids to other programs," Taul said.

Attempts to reach Gallagher on Tuesday were unsuccessful.



#### Dr. Chalothorn Receives Support

Dear Editor,

I was working at Highlands Regional Medial Center a few years ago, when Dr. Sutip introduced Dr. Chalothorn to me, immediately he became "Dr. Charlie." From that time until now, Dr. Charlie has always been a competent and professional OB-GYN. I worked with him for several years in labor, delivery and post-partum. I cannot think of one OB nurse that didn't like to deliver with Dr. Charlie. By that, I mean he was easy to work with, and in case of an emergency he was always calm and always knew what to do.

As for his C-section rate - sometimes Dr. Charlie would wait all day with a labor patient. I never saw him do a C-section without a medical problem with either fetus or mother. I just wish the people who are going "to monitor" Dr. Charlie would forget the percentages on paper and work with him. Could they stand the pressure of waiting, while dealing with the patients family (sometimes requesting C-sections), possible fetal distress or injury to the mother? And just how long do you wait? If you wait too long, and something happens to the baby or the mother, you get a lawsuit. And what is the first question the lawyer asks? "Why didn't you do a C-section sooner?"

It has become a no-win situation. I couldn't even begin to guess the number of babies Dr. Charlie has delivered, but I'm sure there are a large number of healthy babies thanks to him. Perhaps some of you reading this would not have had a healthy baby without him. Dr. Charlie needs your support now, he has become a part of our community and we cannot afford to lose him. Who's going to deliver our babies? As an OB nurse, it is becoming impossible to afford malpractice insurance. I guess without a doctor or a nurse, that just leaves the "monitoring people" and the

Randy Bentley, 22, of Mud Creek, charged with trafficking in LSD, a class Cfelony, last week changed his plea of not guilty to guilty of a reduced offense-criminal attempt to traffic LSD, a class D felony

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

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












#### Health Department Recognition Week Declared July 23-29 By Gov. Wilkinson

July 23-29 has been proclaimed Local Health Department Recognition Week by Governor Wallace Wilkinson, to recognize public health departments in each of the state's coun-

"Their environmental services ensure the safety of our food, our drinking water, consumer products and many other things taken for granted," said the governor. "Their personal health services constitute a vital health care resource available to thousands of patients, particularly those with low incomes

According to State Health Commissioner Carlos Hernandez, in a typical day the health department does such things as inspect 27 restaurants, 15 grocery stores, 14 milk producers and 121 new sewer systems. They order 529 pounds of food destroyed, declare 2,740 gallons of milk

unsuitable of Grade A use, provide 1400 immunizations, provide 263 prenatal visits for expectant mothers, 2,700 family planning visits, and many other things.

During that same day they will spend \$178,000 and add about 1,200 new patients, "making Kentucky's investment in this statewide network of facilities, programs and trained personnel produced, disproportionately beneficial in the form of quality health care for Kentucky citizens of all ages," Wilkinson said

Hernandez added, "Much of what wedois invisible. We all assume that public water is safe to drink, that restaurant food is safely edible, that a glass of milk won't cause listeriosis. If the local health department shut down, Kentucky citizens would feel it pretty quickly - although they might not know what had happened."

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


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
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#### Veterans Questions & Answers

Answer: Yes. A recently-passed law provides a presumption of service connection for certain diseases that show up within 40 years after the veteran last participated in an atmospheric nuclear test. 
Question: My mother receives widow's benefits from VA. She recently entered a nursing home. Is she entitled to an increase in her death pension award?

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





thrust is that it will bring most Zone B policies into Zone A.

Public institutions will also feel the financial pinch. The Martin Student Center on the Prestonsburg Community College campus, currently out of the 100-year flood plain, will be rezoned. The flood plain will move an additional foot onto the property - interestingly, the exact height of water that seeped into the building during the 1977 flooding. The \$2 million building contains

the grill, bookstore, locker rooms, work and game rooms.
According to Dr. Henry Campbell,

PCC president, no other buildings on the campus will be affected by the proposed change

Campbell and Gardner agree that there may be little area residents can do to prevent rezoning of the 100year flood plain.

"This new study is only appealable based on scientific or technical data," notes Gardner. "The methods and data used by the Corps of Engineers to determine the revised flood elevations would have to be proven invalid for the city to have a successful appeal."

Campbell said the college is con-tacting the University of Kentucky and several Soil Conservation Departments, searching for studies similar to that done by the Corps.

He said the college would appeal only if it could find data that would support a challenge.

"The flag stands for freedom and that's what they were fighting for. I just wanted to speak up. I want to say that we don't like it (the court ruling) because the flag is more than a symbol," said Roberts, whose efforts garnered him a spot on WYMT-TV's evening news on July 4.

The document reads: "We the undersigned are in support of a Constitutional Amendment giving Congress and states the right to make flag desecration illegal. We furthermore believe that the Supreme Court's decision to allow such an act is a slap in the face of every true American."





The 1989 state real property tax rate has been set at 20.3 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation, according to Kentucky Revenue Secretary C. Emmett Calvert.

The rate is down from last year by four-hundredths of a cent,

The slight decrease is compensated by the creation of new property and increases in property values, Calvert

The revised rate reflects growth in the state and will not result in a lowering of the amount of tax money the state takes in, explained Floyd County Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo.

Property owners in the county will not see how the decrease affects them until later in the year, Stumbo said, since county tax rates will not be set until October. The county bills and collects property taxes for several governmental units, including the

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

## Egging It On: Local Firm Grows Through Years

Appearing almost as fragile as the eggs they built into one of the largest locally owned businesses in the Big Sandy Valley, George and Mary Jane Brown are, nevertheless, as hardy and fresh as the product they hawked in Floyd County for more than four " decades.

From a "peddler's route" on the Beaver Creeks, the Browns developed Brown's Food Service in Prestonsburg in the early 1940s. The original business had two employees besides the couple, operated with one truck and sold primarily chickens and eggs, bought from local farmers and marketed to families in the mining camps that flourished in the area.

Today, the business, relocated to Louisa in 1984, employs more than 100 persons and sells all kinds of food and related products. Customers served by the company, with 20 trucks today, have expanded from Floyd County miners to commercial food operations throughout Eastern Kentucky and southern Ohio.

Brown, who turned 90 on July 5, and his wife gave management of the company to their three sons when the business moved to Lawrence County, but the two still serve as consultants. For a couple of years after the move, the Browns drove to Louisa about three days a week to oversee the transition, Mrs. Brown says.

"One thing gave us a distinct advantage," Brown says in discussing the company's beginnings. "It was war time and nearly everything was rationed but chickens and eggs, and that's what we sold. Chicken took the place of other meats for most people."

"We've had people tell us that our

business built up faster than any mal College in Louisa. business in Floyd County," Mrs. Brown says proudly.

Most of the eggs being sold when the Browns came on the scene were "cold storage eggs." By selling eggs and chickens gathered fresh on local farms, the couple quickly snared the

"The big coal company stores all switched to Brown's chicken and eggs," says Brown, a slightly built, sharp-witted man. "We sold a pow-erful lot of eggs. Word soon gets

In addition to initiative, innovation was a key word in the Browns' business vocabulary. The business had the first automatic chicken olucker in the area. With what looked like a big rubber finger, the machine could remove feathers from three chickens in a minute.

"You should see the number of people who used to come in just to seeit," says Mrs. Brown, with a warm, infectious laugh that punctuates much of her conversation.

After about three years in business, the Browns began handling canned goods and frozen foods. They invested in the largest freezer in the area and took advantage of a new trend. "Frozen foods were just beginning to come in," Brown says, "and we soon had the largest stock of frozen foods in the area.

Though already in his 40s when he came to Prestonsburg to go into the food business, Brown had garnered a wealth of management and sales experience as a younger man. He began his professional career as a teacher in a one-room school, after receiving his first class teaching certificate from the old Kentucky Nor-

"On the first day, there were over 100 students at the school house waiting for me to come and open up," he laughs. After two years, Brown says he quit teaching "because it didn't pay enough." His salary, he remembers, was \$63 a month, less \$15 for room and board.

As a traveling salesman for Huntington (W.Va.) Hardware, Brownsold the first aluminum dinner buckets in the Big Sandy coal region. "Onestore bought 400 of them," says Brown of the product which became popular because it was light weight and wouldn't rust. "I sold thousands of them up and down the river."

Later Brown moved to Drift where he ran the commissary for Long Branch Coal Co. Making almost twice what he made teaching, he also handled the company payroll and issued scrip.

Van Lear in Johnson County was booming as a coal town and it was closer to his home in Lawrence County, so Brown went to work for Consolidated Coal as a tipple fore-

It was during his 15-year tenure at Van Lear that what he considers the most important thing in my life" happened: "I married her," he says, nodding to his wife of almost 56 years. Thad to pert near steal her," he smiles. "They (her family) didn't want to give her up. But she was of age and there was nothing they could do about

Still, the Browns waited a week before informing her family of the union. "After a week, I came to get her, and she brought her things out to the car. I was afraid to go in," he says.

# Corporate Influence On America Chronicled

As a nation, and as individuals, we are affected by the corporations which manufacture our products and provide our services. The following books from the Prestonsburg Community Library chronicle their growth, their decline, their influence, their origins and their power.

Buying Into America, by Martin Tolchin. For much of our history, Americans have circled the globe investing in overseas ventures, exporting their culture and intervening in foreign governments. Suddenly, everything has changed. During the past decade, that trend has steadily reversed. Foreign investors now own 16 percent of the total US bank assets; foreign governments and companies have bought banks, investment houses, land, skyscrapers, supermar-ket chains and publishing houses. Four of America's top 10 chemical companies are foreign-owned; the Japanese have bought 30 manufacturing plants in Tennessee alone.

This surge of foreign investment has been a shot in the arm for the American economy — but it is not a totally free lunch. Buying into America is the cogent full-scale report and Reviewed This Week

The Fall of The Bell System, by Peter Temin. The long-standing accommodation between the American Telephone and Telegraph Company and the United States government began to break down in the 1960s. This arrangement, under which the Bell System furnished low-cost, highquality universal telephone service to the public in return for a near-monopoly on most telecommunications services, became even more tenuous in the 1970s, then collapsed in the early years of the Reagan administra-

This book traces and analyzes the events that resulted in the breakup of AT&T, the largest corporate reorganization in history. AT&T's divestiture affected everyone in America. Among the many affected, it is only poetic and natural that Temin concludes that "on balance, business customers have gained...Residential customers have suffered."

This study reveals how private and public interests combine to shape corporate and public policy in 20th Century America.

The Decline of American Steel, by Paul Tiffany. Once the great symbol of American industrial strength, the steel industry by 1960 had begun its decline from world dominance, while its leading off-shore competitors primarily Germany and Japan - were surging into the world market. In the Decline of American Steel, Paul Tiffany attempts to explain what happened.

Focusing on the crucial interval from 1945 to 1960, Tiffany explains that "A combination of public policy failure, excessive labor demands and management conservatism accounted for the industry's subsequent prob-

Neither steel managers, nor union leaders, nor several administrations escape blame in this study.

The Rise and Fall of the Great Powers, by Paul Kennedy. Throughout history, some nations gain power while others lose it. Yale historian Paul Kennedy goes back five centuries to offer his analysis of global politics.

Beginning his story around the year 1500, Kennedy focuses on the critical relationship of economic to

military power according to their economic resources in defense of their economic interests," according to Kennedy. "But not even the largest economy can afford this indefinitely - hence the rise and fall of nations."

In what will probably be the most widely discussed part of this book, Professor Kennedy devotes his closing chapters to an analysis of great power politics since 1940 through the

The Global Market Place, by Milton Moskowitz. The author, a veteran corporate watcher, scrutinizes 102 companies under the microscope.

He penetrates the mystique of the multinational corporation and sorts through all the hype surrounding mergers, acquisitions, nationalizations and privatizations to create a clear and concise guide to who owns



Depending upon how they are put together, inert ingredients can affect the dissolution rate of the drug in the stomach. This, in turn, has an effect on how the drug is absorbed into the bloodstream. In many cases, the slight variation in the formulation of a generic will make little difference. However, those patients with epilepsy, asthma, diabetes, thyroid problems, heart ailments, and mental disorders may want to carefully monitor any switch to generics.



#### LeVar Burton hosts PBS series

The highly acclaimed public television show Reading Rainbow and the Library of Congress share more than the goal of encouraging young people to read-they also share LeVar Burton as host/spokesperson.

This year marks the seventh year for Burton to host Reading Rainbow, and is the first year for him to be a spokesperson for The Year of the Young Reader.

In July, Reading Rainbow offers five new programs to keep children interested in reading throughout the summer. Some of the stories presented in the PBS series include: a humpback whale who takes a wrong turn and winds up 64 miles up the Sacramento River; a young girl who learns about judging people when she wanders into a junkyard; a boy who helps his father have fun by making pizza together; a grump who never laughs or smiles until he has a dream that the whole world is laughing at him; and a dinosaur who has many hidden talents.

"Releasing new programs during the summer allows Reading Rainbow to capture the attention of children while they're on vacation. This is the time when it is easy for children's reading skills to slide," said Twila Liggett, the series' project director and executive producer.

Burton, also known as Lt. Geordi La Force on the TV series Star Trek: The Next Generation, returns as host for the new episodes. As spokesperson for The Year of the Young Reader, he has been appearing in public service announcements released earlier this year.

His own love of books stems from childhood. He confessed that when he was growing up in Sacramento, he was "pretty much a book-

worm" who would sit in his bedroom, book in hand, and listen to baseball games on the radio.

Burton was educated in Roman Catholic schools and originally intended to pursue a life of a cleric. After several years of seminary training, however, he decided to study drama and enrolled at the University of Southern California. Two years later, he went on his first audition and landed the part of Kunta Kinte in the television epic Roots. He turned in a stunning performance that earned him an Emmy nomination.

As host of Reading Rainbow, he seldom has to do any acting, however. He gets to be himself while showing children the fun and adventures they can have through reading.

"One of the great things about Reading Rainbow, Burton said, "is that it encourages kids to read for the right reasons-not because they should, but because it's fun. Pick up a book and you can travel anywhere in the universe. You'll never have a problem entertaining yourself, and you'll never have to be lonely." a TV Listing Inc


