No new taxes, 11 percent pay hike proposed :

School mediators reach accord



Something for everyone

Floyd County students and taxpayers are apparently the winners in a drawn out debate over school finances, employees salaries and instructional programs.

Disputing parties reached a tentative agreement Tuesday afternoon that could head off a threatened teachers' strike and cooled off fears of new taxes.

Floyd County Education Association (FCEA) president Carol Stumbo and superintendent Ron Hager released a joint statement Tuesday on the proposed settlement that calls for an increase in per child spending in the district to \$215 for instructional, library and teaching supplies; and will give an 11 percent pay hike to certified and classified personnel. The school district's property tax rate will remain at the current levy.

State Department of Education financial personnel were called in last week to mediate the talks between the teachers and administration after the two sides reached a stalemate in their talks over the budget issues.

Dr. David Thomas, deputy commissioner for the state, and Ron Moubrey, assistant superintendent of finance for the state, worked with both parties for three days to come to the terms of the agreement.

"This group in essence worked to develop a project whose framework centers on the children of Floyd County," Moubrey said Tuesday. "These people never lost sight of the project—that is the children of Floyd County."

Immediately following Tuesday's mediation session, the proposal was presented to members of the district budget committee who unanimously endorsed the agreement.

The proposal will be presented to the Floyd County Board of Education for approval at Thursday's meeting at Allen Central High School.

Both parties agreed to the 11-point agreement that included:

- \$75 per child for teaching supplies;
- \$15 per child for library supplies;
- \$175,000 for math manipulatives;
- \$50,000 for computer lab furniture;
- employing a technology coordinator;
- employing a Writing Across the Curriculum coordinator;
- employing 15 Writing to Read Aides;
- employing 10 aides for ungraded primary classes;
- adding three additional computer labs;
- provide counseling services at the Floyd County Technical High School; and
- an 11 percent pay raise for all personnel.

A separate agreement relating to non-budgetary items was also presented to the budget committee. The

proposal includes forming a district site based decision (SDBM) committee to assist in implementing SDBM in the school system and to inform teachers and parents about the school councils.

The second agreement also calls for:

- forming school budget committee procedures;
- continuing the district and budget planning committees;
- creating and funding a staff development/teacher resource center;

- creating grievance procedures for teachers;
- conducting a study of extended employment and extra service pay;
- not funding three assistant high school principal positions this school year; and
- allowing only a 10 percent difference in the amount of instructional funds spent at each school to bring equality in the school system.

"From an instructional point of view, it appears the primary concern

Eleven-Point Proposal

State and local mediators reached a tentative agreement Tuesday evening that could resolve differences between local school teachers and the Floyd County Board of Education. The eleven-point proposal includes:

- An allocation of \$75 per child for teaching supplies
- \$15 per child for library supplies
- \$175,000 for math manipulatives
- \$50,000 for computer lab furniture
- One technology coordinator
- One Writing Across the Curriculum coordinator
- Fifteen Writing to Read aides
- Ten ungraded primary aides
- Three additional computer labs
- Counseling services at the Floyd County Technical School
- An 11 percent increase in salaries for certified and classified personnel

For city employees :

Pay scales to be studied

An issue raised recently about the disparity in salary rates, compensation and work schedules for city employees, particularly fire department, police department and street department workers, could be solved within the next 60 days.

Prestonsburg City Council members voted Monday night to hire Paul Combs and Associates, Inc., a personnel consulting firm to address the city's plan. The firm plans to begin by reviewing all job specifications with department directors and other employees. In order to ensure equal pay for equal work, the employee classification plan must also be reviewed and/or updated, as well.

The plan works on a point scale and all council members felt this to be a fair and workable solution. Paul Combs, CEO of the firm, plans to begin work next week and estimates total project cost at \$1,500.

In other old business, Ordinance No. 10-91 and Ordinance No. 11-91 were adopted by council after their second readings. The first, 10-91, pertains to nuisances and the second, 11-91, pertains to 911 street numbering. Both will be published in their entirety.

Also presented to the council Monday was the street paving list for 1991-92. Streets listed were, in no particular order, West Scott Court,

from Branham Street to Arnold Avenue; underpass in West Prestonsburg; the South end of Mays Avenue; Third Avenue from Court to Graham Street; the lane between Ralph Davis Market and Joseph's Ambulance Service; Creekside Drive and Memorial Drive at Archer Park; High Street in West Prestonsburg at the foot of the hill at Ballard Tussey's; Hager Street from Central Avenue to Lee's parking lot; and Popular Street.

Two sidewalk projects were recommended by council members,

Clifton Street and Neely Street. Mayor Ann Latta said that the existing sidewalks were being replaced as needed and she suggested that the council wait until projects are requested by residents before building new sidewalks in places where they do not already exist.

Council members heard committee reports from the Personnel and Building and Equipment committees.

City wants to revise flood plain statute

Prestonsburg has an ordinance on its books requiring any new structure to be built two feet above the 100-year flood plain. This is the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) recommended level to insure a lower flood insurance rate.

Since the Corps of Engineers raised the flood plane by three to six feet within the city limits in April of 1990, the hardship on those seeking to build in Prestonsburg, with the self-imposed additional two feet, was brought to question at the city council meeting Monday, September 9.

Mayor Ann Latta proposed that the ordinance be amended, and the extra two feet be omitted. Latta said that the ordinance, in effect, was telling people they had to have cheaper insurance. With the proposed amendment, the level above the flood plain a person chose to build would be up to them, provided the run off of water did not affect a neighboring property.

According to Larry Adams, fire marshal and flood manager, however, amending the ordinance would also affect the city's insurance rating

Politics are behind ouster, Hager says

A hearing Monday in Floyd County Circuit Court conducted by special Judge Stephen "Nick" Frazier produced a lot of testimony, but no ruling in a dispute between school superintendent Ronald Hager and the Floyd County Board of Education.

Judge Frazier has asked for additional information on the suit and is expected to issue a ruling after September 16.

On the witness stand Monday, Hager claimed his ouster as secretary to the board last July was politically motivated because he had not supported the candidacies of the three members who voted to replace him.

Board chairman Ray "Shag" Campbell, vice chairman Tommy Boyd and board member Eddie Billips were "biased," Hager testified because he failed to support them in their campaigns for seats on the board of education.

The board of education appointed assistant superintendent Gary Frazier as the new board secretary at the July board meeting. After the July meeting, Hager informed the board he had a four-year contract to serve as secretary until June 30, 1992. The

board repeated their action to replace Hager at an August 8 special meeting. Frazier has been serving as secretary since the August meeting.

At Monday's hearing, Campbell, Boyd and Billips testified that Hager was replaced as secretary because he

Grethel man is killed in mishap

A 66-year-old Floyd County man was killed Tuesday morning after the car he was driving was struck by a coal truck that jackknifed near Harold.

Willie Tackett of Grethel was pronounced dead at the scene by Floyd County deputy coroner Glen Frazier.

Tackett was driving south on KY 979 in a Buick Regal when his car was struck by the coal truck driven by D.J. Hollins that jackknifed and crossed into the northbound lane, a spokesman for the Kentucky State Police said. Tackett's vehicle then struck a Chevy S-10 pickup truck driven by Hillard Newman of Grethel. Newman nor Hollins were injured.

Tackett's body was removed from the vehicle by the Floyd County Emergency and Rescue Squad by using the Jaws of Life.

Murder suspect hinted that gunfire was likely

A suspect in the Saturday night shooting death of a McDowell man at the American Legion Post 283 in Martin apparently warned a patron he was going to return to the bar with a weapon.

Floyd County sheriff's deputy Linzie Hunt said a witness told him that Frank DeRossett, 50, of Allen made the statement he "was going home to get (a) gun and clean this place out" about 45 minutes before Clive Case, 34, of McDowell, was shot five times with a .38 caliber handgun.

Hunt said Case and DeRossett argued shortly before the shooting about DeRossett apparently dismiss-

ing Case from his job at National Mines Coal Corporation several years ago. DeRossett was a foreman at the mines.

"There wasn't any physical struggle, the two just argued," Hunt said Tuesday. "DeRossett left and came back about 45 minutes later and started shooting."

Witnesses told the deputy that when DeRossett turned around after firing the gun the bartender of the American Legion grabbed the pistol out of his hand. DeRossett then walked 20-feet to a table and waited for police to arrive, Hunt said.

When he arrived at the scene, deputy Hunt found Case's body lying in front of the American Legion near the highway. "There were about 35 people standing around him," Hunt

said. "Several were trying to revive him, but it was too late."

Case had been shot twice in the chest and three times in the back, said Floyd County Coroner Roger Nelson. Nelson said several of the gun shot wounds Case received would have been fatal. The body was sent to Louisville for an autopsy.

Hunt said Case was on stage performing with the band when DeRossett allegedly shot him from a distance of approximately 12-feet. Case managed to crawl 45 feet from the back door of the establishment before collapsing near the road.

Larry Spears, 34, of McDowell, who was also playing with the band, was struck in the chest by a ricocheting bullet and suffered a bruise and an abrasion, Nelson said.

failed to provide the board with important information in a timely fashion and with withholding information; board members were not given their "working" agendas until the start of regular board meetings; lack of communication between the superintendent and the board; the position was on the July agenda to be filled; and for failing to comply with the state's Open Records law.

Issues at Monday's hearing included: what responsibilities and duties were performed by the secretary; the validity of Hager's contract after school laws were amended in 1990; and why the position was placed on July's agenda.

Hager testified that his duties as secretary included being the custodian of the school district's records; recording and preparing the minutes of all school board meetings; and preparing the working agenda for board meetings. He said he wanted to continue to serve as secretary to fulfill his contract with the board.

Under cross-examination by the board's attorney, Cliff Latta, Hager said he did not inform board members at the July meeting that he had a four-year contract because "things went so fast" and that three of the board members who voted for his contract in 1988 were present at the meeting.

Hager told Judge Frazier that the office of secretary and superintendent went "hand in hand" and immediate access to records of the board was imperative.

Frazier asked Latta if Gary Frazier could remove the district's records and store them in another location besides the administration building.

Latta said theoretically that could happen, but that would be violation of state law to remove the records.

Hager testified that the secretary's position was put on the agenda in 1990 and 1991 because it was "customary" and there had been state-wide confusion about the validity of multi-year contracts after the law was amended.

Under Kentucky's Education Reform Act, superintendents who serve as secretaries to school boards are no longer allowed to receive payment for that position. Hager's 1988 contract called for him to receive \$2,400 annually as secretary to the board.

Campbell made the motion to hire Hager as secretary in 1990 and it was seconded by Boyd. Latta asked Hager if Campbell included the words "per contract," as stated in the 1990 board minutes, in his motion.

"Or, did you use your poetic license as secretary to put that in the minutes?" Latta asked.

"I don't think the secretary has

any right to interpret to do that, but he can interpret the board's actions if they approve the minutes," Hager said.

In reference to Hager's testimony about board members being biased because of political affiliations, Latta asked Hager about being hired as superintendent.

"Who did you support in Mr. Billips' race?" Latta asked.

"I supported James D. Adams (20-year board member)," Hager replied.

"Are you not a protege of Dr. Adams?" Latta inquired.

"No, sir," Hager said.

"Was Dr. Adams not instrumental in bringing you up in the ranks and making you superintendent?" Latta asked.

"Dr. Adams voted for me (as superintendent)," Hager said.

"He didn't do anything on your behalf to have you hired as superintendent?" Latta countered.

"Not to the best of my knowledge," Hager said.

Latta asked Hager if he had ever denied access to public documents in violation of the state's Open Records Law.

Hager said he has not and an instance in 1989 concerning an Open Records request by a reporter was handled by then board attorney William Francis.

Hager was in Kansas on a hunting trip when a reporter was denied access to public records by Francis.

"Who were you with in Kansas?" Latta asked.

"About 14 people," Hager said.

"Was Dr. Adams one of those people?" Latta asked.

"Sure," Hager said.

When Latta asked how many times Hager had been hunting with Adams, Hager replied, "for the last 25 years or so." Hager said other board members had also accompanied him on hunting trips. Latta asked Hager if he had visited Adams at his Prestonsburg farm on numerous occasions and Hager replied he had.

Testimony by Campbell, Boyd and Billips centered on seeing the "working" agenda prepared by Hager for their monthly board meetings and the lack of information from Hager to the board members.

Campbell said the agenda for board meetings was "as big as a Montgomery (Ward) catalog, the big one—not a sale book."

"We didn't have time to review it (the working papers attached to the agenda)," Campbell said. "We sat down and it was put in front of us."

Board members began receiving their agenda books six days prior to the meetings in February after Billips' motion to that effect was approved by the board.

Boyd said he had asked, prior to

January's board order, to receive his agenda earlier, but Hager did not respond to his requests.

"We got a three-page outline before the meeting," Boyd said. "But, it didn't have who and what was on the agenda. We didn't get to see the real agenda until the night of the meeting."

Boyd said getting the agenda prior to the meetings has made a "big difference" in understanding what issues were put before the board.

Hager's attorney, Wolodymyr Cybriwsky of Prestonsburg, asked Boyd if he was confusing the agenda outline with the "working" agenda prepared by Hager.

"I could be," Boyd said.

Cybriwsky asked Boyd if Campbell included the words "per contract" when making the motion to appoint Hager as secretary in 1990.

"No sir," Boyd said.

Billips testified that he felt communication between the board and Hager was "sorely lacking" and he felt the board had a right to replace Hager as secretary by the appointment being on the agenda.

Floyd County Times reporter Susan Allen testified that Hager had told her the secretary position was put on the agenda "in case the board wanted to make a change."

On the stand, Hager denied having any conversation about the secretary issue with Ms. Allen.

Judge Frazier asked Latta to submit by September 18 an opinion as to the duties of the secretary and where school records should be kept.

Hager filed suit against the board on August 19 claiming the board did not have the right to replace him because of his contract.

Frazier is expected to rule on the issue next week.

Board members James Duff and Dr. Mary Hall did not attend Monday's hearing.

Board meet rescheduled

The September meeting of the Floyd County Board of Education has been rescheduled for Thursday, September 12 at Allen Central High School beginning at 6 p.m.

Board secretary Gary Frazier said Tuesday that the meeting was changed to give board members time to review a tentative agreement reached between teachers and the administration Tuesday, and several board members could not attend the meeting on Tuesday due to a conflict in schedules.

The meeting is open to the public.

was a quality instructional program," said assistant superintendent of instruction Gary Frazier. "Obviously, we didn't get everything we asked for, but I feel it was dealt with fairly. I agree this is a good foundation to build on in the future years. The taxpayers, who ultimately fund this system, came out a winner—taxes will not be increased. I think it's wonderful."

Stumbo said, "For once, the state department (of education) was a big help."

Janice Allen, FCEA executive committee member, said the group opted for a lower pay increase in order to boost the district's instructional program.

"We could've probably found the 13.5 (percent pay hike) but that meant raising the budget. We chose not to do that. We felt it was more advantageous to the district to keep it at 11 percent."

Superintendent Hager said the group developed good working relations and worked together for the children of Floyd County.

Hager also said a computerized purchasing process will be implemented in the district, possibly in the 1992-93 school year, that will generate all expenditures and purchase orders from the central office.

Teachers are expected to vote Wednesday (today) on accepting of the agreement and votes will be counted at FCEA headquarters at 4 p.m.

Teachers were asking the board for a 13.5 percent pay raise, but board estimates put a pay raise at six to seven percent for certified personnel.

Teachers and classified personnel voted last month and approved a strike authorization call from their leaders if deemed necessary.

Classified workers, which includes bus drivers, cooks and custodians, are asking the board for recognition as union members of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters.

Transportation director Earl D.

Ousley said Tuesday that bus drivers would not conduct a walkout Wednesday (today), but he didn't rule out a strike.

If bus drivers do stage a walkout, Ousley said they will be asked to drive their bus routes, but there are no plans for the district beyond that point.

"In the event of a strike, the bus drivers will be asked to make their bus runs," Ousley said. "We have no plans (what to do) after that."

Ousley would not say if classes would be cancelled if a strike is called.

William O. Goebel, Personnel Committee chairman, reported that four candidates had been interviewed for the position of Main Street Manager and the final recommendation was pending. Danny Hamilton, Building and Equipment Committee chairman, reported on a meeting with Bill Harvey Howard and Seldon Horn of the Prestonsburg City Utilities to attempt to alleviate drainage problems in downtown Prestonsburg. A monthly storm drain cleaning and maintenance program was recommended and established and the council authorized the purchase of a vacuum tube for the street sweeper to clean the drains.

Hamilton also reported that Mayor Latta had received a cheaper cost for the alarm system in downtown Prestonsburg through Southeast Alarm System. This system would have an initial hook-up of \$269 and a yearly cost of \$120 for monitoring and maintenance for subscribers. The council voted to go ahead with Southeast Alarm System.

In other committee action, council voted to let the Buildings and Equipment Committee review bids received and opened at Monday's meeting for dumpsters and trash barrels. Three companies bid on the dumpsters, 14 six-yard containers and 22 eight-yard containers, with total prices ranging from \$27,632 to \$23,650. Three companies also bid on the 90-96 gallon trash barrels with bids ranging from \$52.98 to \$63.25 per unit.

Other action taken by the council

included approving several standard operating procedures for the fire department in order to bring them into compliance with OSHA regulations. A total of four policies were approved and two were sent to committee to be further discussed.

Assistant Police Chief Roy Roberts was present to ask the council's approval to apply for a grant for a gun range on Cliff Road. The department already uses this unimproved site for target practice, and Cliff Salyers of Eastern offered to submit the grant paperwork to concrete the area and build a shelter and an out building if the site meets state safety specifications. Council approved permission to seek the grant. Roberts also mentioned that the department wanted to name the gun range, when completed, after the late chief of police Dickie Campbell. Mayor Latta said she thought this would be appropriate and it would be looked into.

Road blocks for Prestonsburg Pro Junior Basketball teams and the Pop Warner Football League (flag football for K-4 graders) were approved by council. The first to be on Saturday, September 14 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and the second scheduled for Saturday, September 28.

All council members excepted for Bill R. Collins were present at the Monday night meeting. The council has gone back to their winter schedule, meeting twice a month, and the next meeting will be held Monday, September 23 at 7 p.m.

provided by FEMA. The change would cost the city about 50 points.

Within the past year, FEMA has implemented a program similar to the ISO ratings for fire insurance, a community rating service.

Presently Prestonsburg is a non-participant in the new program. Only seven municipalities in Kentucky have applied for the evaluation and they have all been granted a lower rating (a nine on a scale of one to 10). According to Adams, FEMA will only lower a participant one level the first year. All other areas in Kentucky are rated as a 10.

Adams said that FEMA takes many factors into consideration in the evaluation, such as the flood gates and pumps and other action taken by the municipality to reduce the risk of flood damage. Different point values are assigned to each category. For example, the maximum credit issue for levy safety is 900 points, or for dam safety is 145 points.

Adams noted that the loss of 50 points would not hurt the city greatly, but it would not be an improvement. Although Prestonsburg has yet to apply for an evaluation from FEMA, all past inspections and other factors indicate that the city would be granted a lower NFIP (National Flood Insurance Program) rating.

A jump from a level 10 to a level nine, provides the greatest reduction in insurance rates than any of the other subsequent decreases, but each step a NFIP rate is lowered affords at least a five percent decrease.

"We have 217 flood insurance policies issued for the city," Adams said. "Those people, combined, are paying over \$71,000 in premiums for \$17 million worth of protection. If we can save them even five percent, that's a big savings."

According to the new 100-year flood plain, most of Prestonsburg, on either side of Route 1428 is under the flood plain. The new flood plain increased this disparity by three feet at PCC and up to six feet at Goble

Roberts.

With the present ordinance, the city will not issue a building permit to anyone building less than two feet over the existing flood plain. Insurance companies recognize the existing flood plain for commercial buildings at 12-inches above what the Corps established it to be.

Adams did, however, note that additions may be constructed on an existing structure without elevating the new portion above the flood plain, only if the new addition does not exceed more than 50 percent of the total worth of the present building. This is a one time grace however, and all additions thereafter would have to be above the flood plane to be permitted.

The city's efforts to protect properties from flooding are important to their obtaining federal monies and grants, Adams said. The federal government places the burden of flood enforcement on the city government and requires them to make efforts to decrease the risk of flooding. If FEMA issues flood disaster assistance money to a city and the city does not take measures to alleviate the problem of flooding in the affected structures, they will be put on probation and all homeowners will automatically be charged an additional \$25-\$50 on their premiums, Adams said, relating what he was told by a FEMA agent.

Ordinance No. 12-91, pertaining to alleviating the additional two-foot requirement for construction, was given its first reading at Monday night's council meeting. Mayor Latta informed the council members about the loss of a potential 50 points from the insurance ratings and told them they would have to decide what was best for the citizens of Prestonsburg, allowing them to build at the flood plane level, or keeping the 50 points.

Adams said that, in the long run, most builders would be better off building higher, even at an increased project cost, and consequently getting a lower flood insurance rating.

What is this aversion Americans have with dating documents? I am sure that most of us have experienced returning from vacation and finding an important message with no indication as to when it was written. How embarrassing it is to answer that week-old, month-old, or sometimes year-old note to which a reply had already been sent long ago. The letter certainly had a tone of importance and urgency, but there was one thing that bothered me. Nowhere in the letter did it state when O'Hare filed Petition No. 2493 or when the supposed Federal Hearing she was granted would take place. So I called the FCC (1-202-632-7000) from my touch-tone phone and heard a charming recorded voice give me a number of possible options, including information on Petition No. 2493. A new voice then informed me that not only had O'Hare presented her petition way back in December of 1974, but also that the FCC officially denied it on August 1, 1975. Yet, over the past sixteen years the FCC has continued to receive over 30 million pieces of mail from people

who believe the petition is alive and well. Certainly, several of the other nine people who probably received the same letter I did signed their names and mailed the forms in as requested, after xeroxing ten more copies to mail to their friends and relatives. Perhaps the only real winner in this well-intentioned but belated campaign is the U.S. Postal Service, which has collected about \$6 million in revenue from the stamps used to mail all the redundant letters.

All of this from an important, but undated, letter first sent out sixteen years ago and which continues to be circulated to this very date. Isn't there a lesson to be learned by this?

Coal severance tax program

An issue somewhat obscured by more high profile issues during this interim, but which may actually result in a major impact on state and local finances, is coal severance tax and how the program should be changed to provide the most significant impact per dollar.

After the failure during the last special session of the Legislature to increase the return of severance tax to local governments, I sponsored legislation that created a special task force charged with making an in depth study of the coal severance tax program. Specific factors of coal severance tax have been discussed carefully - for example, the feasibility of increased severance tax revenue returning to coal county governments (currently twelve percent of the severance tax collected is returned); the characteristics of "coal county" being redefined; and whether another portion of coal severance tax be set aside in a special fund for economic development of areas that will ultimately suffer from the regressive coal market.

Since the adjournment of the special session, the Task Force on Coal Revenue Allocation of which I am co-chairman, has been hashing through the many facets of this con-

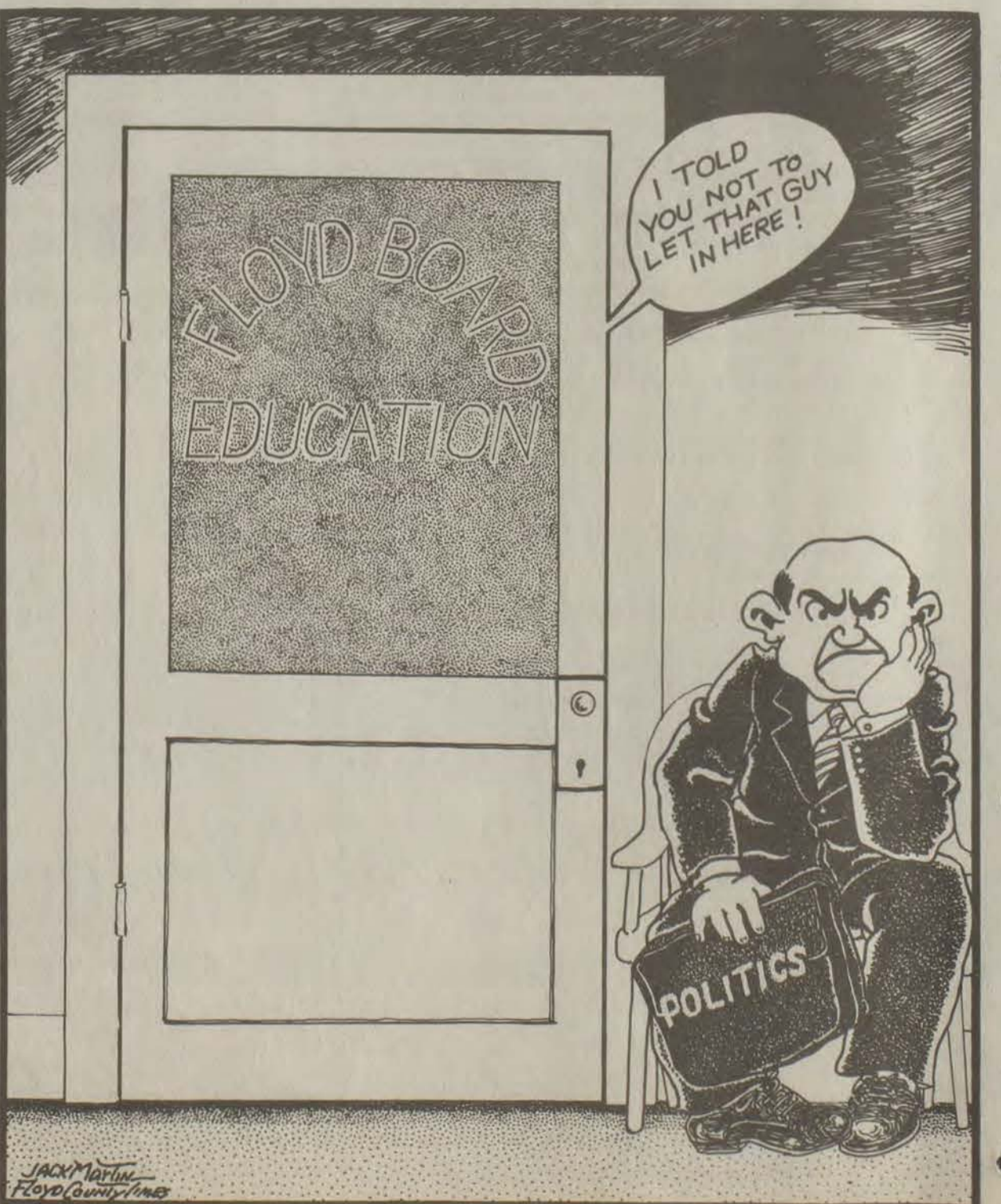
troversial issue. Experts from other states have frankly discussed their severance tax programs as well as county judges who now depend in a large degree on severance tax revenue to balance their budgets. Montana, Colorado, North Dakota and Wyoming have varied severance tax programs. In Montana 50 percent of all coal severance tax collections go into a trust fund and moneys from the income of the trust fund go into the state's general fund. It was also disclosed that the western states, with the exception of North Dakota, levy local taxes on the production of coal. In addition, western states set aside a portion of the severance tax revenue to support a bond program for local water projects. County judges told task force members that they would be glad to have specific directives attached to the severance tax money as there would be less struggle among local programs to secure a part of the appropriation.

As severance tax collection represents 4.4 percent or \$188 million of the state's General Fund, both the Senate and House chairmen of the Appropriations and Revenue Committee are members of the task force as well as legislators representing central Kentucky, northern Kentucky

and East and West Kentucky. Most recently, the task force has subdivided to draft a final report to the General Assembly. House members on the subcommittee are Joe Clarke, D-Danville and Michael Bowling, D-Pineville as well as myself. Senate members of the report subcommittee include Charlie Berger, D-Harlan, (co-chairman of the task force); Benny Ray Bailey, D-Hindman and Mike Moloney, D-Lexington.

In addition to compiling a report, the subcommittee is also expected to draft severance tax legislation to bring back to the full task force for discussion. It is almost certain that any legislation will contain as a prime factor economic development in the use of any additional funds beyond the twelve percent. And, those areas that have suffered extremely as the result of coal mining, for example, those communities that have no safe source of drinking water due to coal mining, will receive significant attention in the legislation.



Youth Transportation in Appalachia

(Part Seven in a series)

Even in our remote area of Appalachia, we young people tried very hard to keep up with the Jones. When the day came that we needed to go to the grocery store at Hippo for several supplies, we looked for a solution to keep from carrying the heavy load the long distance from the foot of the Middle Creek Hill at Hippo back to the mouth of Brush Creek. Old Barney, the mule, was our only solution. Others in our age bracket rode mules and Jackie Tackett owned a horse. So why should we let inexperience keep us from making our workload lighter?

Katherine went over her knowledge of how to rig Barney up. I did not have the slightest knowledge of the workings of harnesses. When we got him all saddled up, neither of us wanted to walk and lead him, so we decided that both would sit in the huge saddle. The trip was going fine and to speed things up we decided to trot Barney. My legs were not long enough to reach the stirrups, so there was no way to prevent my weight from carrying me forward in the saddle. This force pushed Katherine forward into a standing position - feet still in the stirrups, but standing above the saddle pommel, Barney still trotting!

Try as I may, I could not regain my position at the back of the saddle, Barney still trotting. Katherine held onto the reins tightly and pulled back, but I guess he was not accustomed to this type of manipulations and he refused to stop. Maybe he felt that the faster he went the sooner he would be rid of the burden on his back! Finally Katherine managed to rein him toward beside the road. Then she dropped one of the reins, forcing the mule to steer to the left in the fence, only, or I guess otherwise, we would have been deposited onto the dirt

road.

Oak Cooley saw our problem and came to our rescue. He held the mule while we rearranged ourselves on Barney's back - me behind the saddle instead of in it with Katherine. We had both wanted to ride and both wanted to sit in the saddle. Now due to her mule handling experience, she won out. Now she was normally seated in the saddle, and Oak handed her the rein which had fallen onto the ground. This time she tied the two ends together to prevent such a misfortune later. Without introducing any new ideas, we made the trip safely to the store and back home.

LIVING DANGEROUSLY ON MULE BACK

One evening late, Katherine and I decided to ride down to the mouth of the creek to visit the Jude Allen family. We could hear Chillie Allen's beagles running rabbits up on the hillside. He usually followed in the roadway on foot to listen to the chase around the hill toward Prater Fork.

It was later than we thought. It had taken time to locate Barney and saddle him. By the time we reached Chillie in the roadway, it was almost dark. Katherine kept complaining that the saddle did not feel right, and asked Chillie to check it. The girth which held the saddle onto the mule's back had worked loose. The saddle was in danger of sliding off into the roadway. Katherine would have gone with it, leaving me helpless on Barney's back, sitting on a pillow behind the saddle, on the mule's fat hips - our best arrangement for comfort on muleback.

Chile told us that if we did not know how to better saddle the mule, that we had better get off and walk home, which we did. Barney must have been a rather nice tempered mule, as he responded quite obediently to our commands most of the time. That was the last time we attempted to ride him, as the girth had worked loose and was in need of repair.

The next time we wanted to ride, we asked Floyd, Chillie's son, to let us ride his Shetland ponies, Seabiscuit and Ginger. Floyd patiently went to the pasture and caught them for us, but did not prefer to ride at the time. Never having any riding experience except with Katherine on Old Barney, I attempted to seat myself for a solo on Ginger. My effort was too forceful - I went on across the pony's back, and piled up on the ground on the opposite side. After much effort and little success I gave up trying. If I had to travel by horseback, I would never get anywhere. Chillie was always ready to joke with us. He told Floyd to help me into the saddle and lead the pony like a man and a woman who were often seen going up and down Highway 80 in the early 40s. The man walked and led the horse while the woman rode. That worked fine! Of course that

would put an awful lot of mileage on the man.

Sometimes I think that we don't appreciate progress enough. Our small cars/solve the transportation problem quite well, and hatchbacks are quite handy for taking things along with you, or picking up groceries. I wonder if we have at last reached the ultimate.

Global Warming:

Analyzing the controversy (Part 3)

Critics of the global warming hypothesis often point to the fact that the present rate of warming is less than half the rate predicted by the theory (McCuen, 46). To understand what they are talking about, let's consider the following scale:

C02 Concentration	Predicted Temperature Rise	Actual Rise
280 ppm	0.0°F	0.0°F
350 ppm	2.25°F	1.1°F
420 ppm	4.5°F	
490 ppm	6.75°F	
560 ppm	9.0°F	

The theory predicts that when carbon dioxide levels double from 280 ppm to 560 ppm, the temperature of the planet will rise 9°F. So far, we have come one fourth of the way towards 560 ppm. Accordingly, by now the temperature of the planet should have risen 2.25°F. In fact, however, it has risen only 1.1°F, or at the outside, 1.5°F. Therefore, say the critics, global warming isn't happening. Are you reassured by their argument?

Scientists tell us that a rise in carbon dioxide concentrations will be accompanied by other changes in the Earth's climate. For example, higher temperatures will cause more water to evaporate from the oceans. This will in turn produce higher levels of humidity. Furthermore, water vapor is itself a greenhouse gas, so higher humidity levels will trap more heat. Scientists call this effect a "positive feedback," because it reinforces or amplifies the overall warming trend. Another effect of increased evaporation could be an increase in cloud cover. Furthermore, this effect could be either positive or negative. High, thin clouds trap solar radiation, while low, dense clouds reflect it back into space. Therefore, an increase in cloud cover could either amplify or reduce global warming, depending on the altitude in which it occurs. Another positive feedback could occur as the polar ice caps begin to melt. This could reduce the amount of sunlight reflected back into space and increase the warming of the ocean (Oppenheimer & Boyle, 28).

There could also be negative feedbacks—processes which tend to reduce the overall warming trend. Increased levels of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere, for example, could stimulate plant growth, which in turn could remove greater amounts of carbon dioxide from the air.

At present, these positive and negative feedbacks are poorly understood. As a consequence, no one has

yet been able to design a computer model which takes them entirely into account. However, their very existence warns us that rapid and catastrophic climate changes are possible (Oppenheimer & Boyle, 28).

Since most of us would prefer to let the scientists settle this matter, the question on everyone's lips is this: what is the scientific consensus re-

garding global warming? Patrick J. Michaels, professor of environmental sciences at the University of Virginia, is one of a small minority of scientists who downplay the threat. On a recent Larry King talk show (July 20, 1991), he estimated that, of the hundred or so scientists in the world presently studying the problem, only 30 believe that it poses a serious threat to human existence.

However, Michaels' estimate may be conservative. In my review of the literature on the subject, I have been impressed by the large number of governmental agencies, scientific organizations, and environmental groups that are taking the threat seriously. The Environmental Protection Agency warned us about the problem as early as October, 1983. In that month it released a study called Can We Delay A Greenhouse Warming? The report predicted that global temperatures would rise 3.6°F by the year 2040 and 9°F by 2100. "All human activities are likely to be in some way affected," the report stated.

In the same month, the National Academy of Sciences issued a report predicting that in the next 50 to 100 years, a doubling of carbon dioxide levels would warm the Earth by three to eight degrees Fahrenheit (McCuen, 27). Furthermore, beginning in 1980, three international agencies, including the United Nations Environment Programme, sponsored a series of conferences on the subject, culminating in a meeting at Villach, Austria in the fall of 1985. The report issued by the Villach Conference warned that "while some warming of the climate now appears inevitable

due to past actions, the rate and degree of future warming could be profoundly affected by governmental policies on energy conservation, use of fossil fuels, and the emissions of some (non-CO2) greenhouse gases" (Oppenheimer & Boyle, 40).

Environmental organizations like the Sierra Club and the Natural Resources Defense Council have been issuing warnings about global warming for the past ten years. Dr. Stephen Schneider of the National Center for Atmospheric Research says: "The greenhouse theory is the least controversial theory in atmospheric science." NASA scientist Jerry D. Mahlman says: "We are virtually certain the climate will warm as these gases increase" (McCuen, 29).

Canadian meteorologists Gordon A. McKay and Henry Hengeveld, however, are more cautious. They write:

The global mean temperature has increased about half a degree over the past century, and the sequence of warm years in the 1980s includes the five warmest years on record. This trend is in phase with the increase in greenhouse gases; but because climate varies so much naturally, the cause is not proven beyond a doubt. Confirmation will probably take another ten years (Mungall & McLaren, 56).

So, how seriously should we take the threat of global warming? Let's return to the fact I started this essay with. According to geologist William S. Fyfe, sea ice near the North Pole is thinning rapidly, as much as

forty percent since 1976. If this continues, says Fyfe, "there could be a very rapid change in northern climate." Then he draws an analogy: "Remember what happens to the temperature of your drink when the ice cubes melt" (Mungall & McLaren, 17). Analogies are always false, and this is a crude simplification, but...

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Get ready for a space adventure

The sky is dark, the stars are bright and the night is just right for stargazing - even if it's just 3:30 in the afternoon. No, this isn't Alaska - it's the Hummel Planetarium in Richmond.

It may be the 10th largest in the United States, but there are only two others like it in the world. To see the special effects available at the Hummel Planetarium you would have to travel to France or Singapore.

What makes this attraction so special?

In most planetariums the images of the stars and planets are produced by the same projector. The projection system at the Hummel Space Theatre has separate projectors. In addition to the starball, there are five separate planet projectors and a sun projector.

Because the other projectors are separate from the starball, they can be used to represent comets and asteroids as well as other heavenly bodies. What's more, the system can break away from the Earth-bound limitations of most planetariums to give the illusion of space travel.

Because of the independent projectors, viewers can see how the sky looks from as far away as 9.3 billion miles. That means the audience can see the sky as they would from any known planet or moon in the solar system or any point in between.

The star projector is four feet in diameter and has separate lenses for more than 10,000 stars. A multimedia control system capable of handling hundreds of slide projectors or special effects and a six-channel, high fidelity Dolby stereo sound system complete the planetarium.

Regular showings, Thursdays-Sundays at 7:30 p.m. and weekend matinees Saturdays and Sundays at 3:30 p.m., include a large format movie with the Star Show. There is also a gift shop which carries items related to astronomy, space science and the physical sciences. The gift shop hours are 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Mondays-Fridays and during all public programs.

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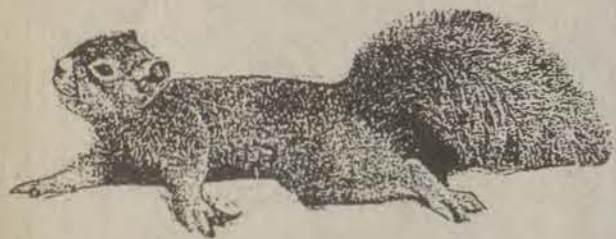
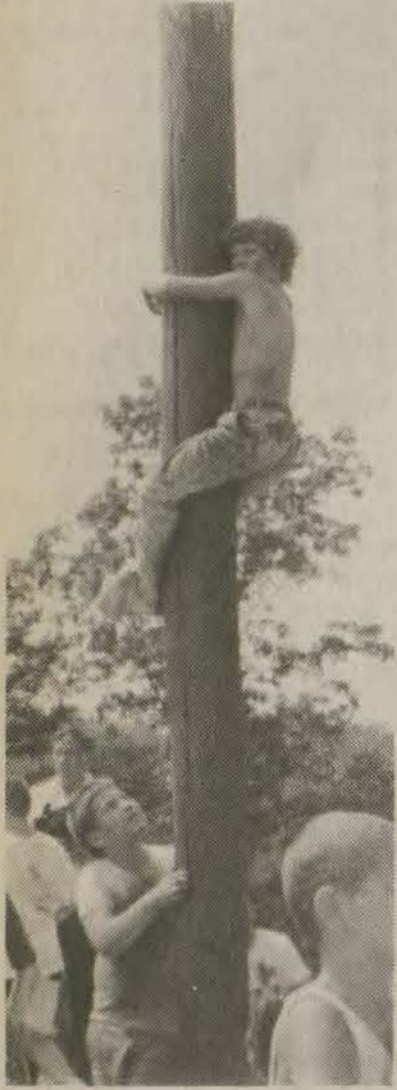
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National stress expert to keynote for women

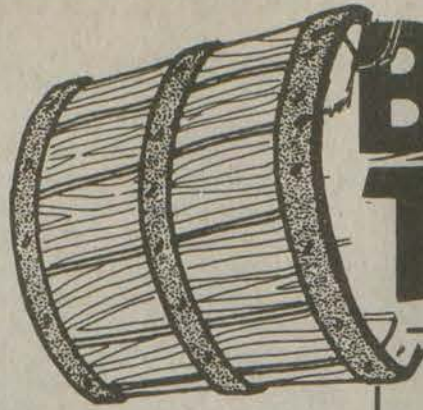

Betsy Layne Edges Hornets 8-6 For First Win Of Season

Not since the middle of the 1989 football season has the Betsy Layne Bobcats known the sweetness of victory when they defeated Leslie County for their straight victory in the '89 season. Well, the Bobcats got a taste of victory this past Friday night when they handed Pete Greene's young Magoffin County team an 8-6 setback at the Lloyd Hamilton Field at Betsy Layne. The win ended a night-mare losing streak of 16 consecutive games.

The win evened the Bobcat's record at 1-1 on the season and gave them a 1-0 district record.

The winning score came on freshman Byron Combs 1-yard plunge in the second quarter. The winning points were scored by James Keathley on the 3-yard conversion run.

"Byron (Combs) will be college material by the time he is a senior in high school," said Betsy Layne coach Gerald Newsome, "and he stays with it. I like to kid Byron about eating so many Little Debbie cakes. He loves those cakes and I like to kid him about it to keep things loose around here."

Magoffin County had taken a 6-0 lead as they scored their first touchdown of the season against the Bobcats. The Hornets had fallen in their first game of the season 41-0 to Shelby Valley. Magoffin County is a very young team under first year coach Pete Greene. The visiting Hornets scored on the last play of the first half. Benji Reed returned the Betsy Layne punt to the Bobcats 25-yard line after the Hornets held the Cats deep in their territory.

Brandon Jenkins picked up 2-yards on a run and John Rodriguez gained two. Shawn Perkins ran the next four

plays for the Hornets in gaining 24-yards and scored the Hornets first touchdown. The attempt for the conversion failed as the Hornets led in the second quarter 6-0.

Midway through the second quarter, Randy Woods gathered in his second interception of the game ending a Hornet threat. Woods ran the ball back to the Magoffin County 48-yard line before being brought down.

Running back Doug Hammond sliced his way for 8-yards. Keathley got the Bobcats a first down with 12-yards on two carries. It was a second and three after Jamie Kidd picked up 7-yards. An offside call against Magoffin County gave Betsy Layne a first down on the Hornets 16-yard line.

Hammond picked up 5-yards to the Magoffin County 11. After Keathley had no gain on a run, Kidd picked up 3-yards for a fourth and two situation. Byron Combs bullied his way up the middle for a Bobcat first down. Keathley moved the ball up to the five and on a second and goal, Combs took the ball over the goal line for the score. Keathley conversion run proved to be the winning two-points.

Betsy Layne had a touchdown called back when Hammonds struck pay dirt on a 2-yard run with 3:15 remaining in the third quarter. The score was nullified when Betsy Layne was flagged for a clipping call and assessed 15-yards on a penalty. The drive failed for Betsy Layne.

Keathley was the leading rusher for the Bobcats with 68-yards on 15 carries. Jamie Kidd added 30-yards on six carries and Byron Combs had 20-yards on seven attempts.

Magoffin County was led by Bran-

don Jenkins with 68-yards on the ground. Rodriguez carried for 51-yards.

After the game, Bobcats assistant coach Jody Cecil summed his feelings about the game this way. "Defensively, we played a great game. Offensively, we were slow in the first half but we did manage to score. I thought Jamie Kidd, Brian Bowling and Ashley Lykins played a great game."

According to Newsome, he felt that his defense stayed longer on the field than he wanted them to. "They were getting tired," said Newsome. "But against Magoffin County we started 22 different players (11 offensively, 11 defensively)."

Newsome said that he thought the freshmen who played looked good and he was impressed with what he saw. "Most of them started on the line in our 4-4 defense. They really helped on our outside defense."

"I think that Bowling did a great job for us as did Lykins at defensive tackle. Hamilton played a real good game for us and he is just a freshman. Offensively, we did well," Newsome commented. "We did get stopped inside their 10-yard line a few times but I think that was because we were so predictable. Mr (Alan) Osborne said that we needed to mix it up more when we got inside the 10-yard line."

Todd Akers had a good game for the Bobcats at fullback and Newsome said he was impressed with the way Akers played. "He tired out while he was out there. That is because he is inexperienced at the fullback position. Jamie Kidd, James Keathley and Doug Hammond gave us a strong two-back tandem. Kidd played a real

Prestonsburg Feels Yellowjacket's "Sting"

The first two games for the Prestonsburg Blackcats have been anything but pretty. The Cat's offense stalled out completely Friday night when Prestonsburg lost their second game of the young season to the Middlesboro Yellowjackets 30-0.

In Prestonsburg's first two games, the Blackcats have yet to score. It was the Blackcat's defense that showed their silver lining Friday night as they were on the field more than the offense. The young Blackcats, although they gave up 30 points, displayed a lot of heart in battling the more experienced Yellowjackets.

It only took the second possession for Middlesboro to put seven points on the scoreboard and a early 7-0 first quarter lead. After Prestonsburg ran three plays and punted, the Yellowjackets took over the football on their own 37-yard line. Middlesboro marched 63 yards in nine plays before striking paydirt. Ryan Prewitt, a 6-1, 186 pound senior running back, carried the ball the last 5 yards for the first touchdown. The extra point attempt was good for a 7-0 game.

In the drive, Middlesboro was penalized three times for 25 yards but still managed to move the football on mental mistakes by the younger Blackcats. It was Chad Tinnel that got the call the majority of the time for the Yellowjackets. Tinnel carried the ball seven times in the drive for 47 yards.

Prestonsburg had good field position at the start of the second quarter as they took the ball on the Middlesboro 40-yard line. Seth Hyden and Dwayne Garza moved the football to the Yellowjackets 23-yard line when Prestonsburg quarterback Aaron Tucker had a pass intercepted by Wally Money and the drive ended

with the turnover. Tucker seemed to have plenty of time to throw the ball as he was afforded good protection by his line. However, the pass was errant and picked off by Money.

Middlesboro made it a 13-0 game with 1:18 remaining in the first half when Prewitt hauled in a 27-yard touchdown pass from Yellowjacket quarterback Brian McCreary. It was the second completion for McCreary in the series of plays as he had earlier connected with tight end Eddie Stanley for an 18-yard completion in the drive. The drive took seven plays that covered 57 yards.

The Blackcats received the kickoff at the start of the second half as Robby Watson carried the football back to the Prestonsburg 38-yard line. Garza ran for 4 yards and Hyden picked up eight for a Blackcat first down. Prestonsburg's running game moved the ball into Middlesboro territory when Tucker was sacked for a 11-yard loss. Prestonsburg was forced to punt the ball to Middlesboro, however, the snap from center was bad to Watson and he tried to run the ball out and was stopped at the Prestonsburg 25-yard line giving Middlesboro excellent field positioning.

Middlesboro took advantage of the Prestonsburg mistake and senior running back Mike Earls split the Prestonsburg defense from 3 yards out for the touchdown and a 19-0 game. Tinnel ran the conversion for a 21-0 lead.

On the ensuing kickoff from Middlesboro, the Blackcats once again got good field position on a short kick. However, the way things had been running for Prestonsburg all night, Tucker was intercepted on the first play from scrimmage as Tucker's pass was picked off by Bryan

Houston at the 34-yard line once again giving Middlesboro excellent field position.

The Yellowjackets, running out of the wing "T" offense, capitalized on the Blackcat mistake and took a 27-0 lead on a 13-yard keeper by quarterback Brian McCreary. The extra point made it a 28-0 score.

The final scoring came for Middlesboro when they got a safety as a Prestonsburg player was brought down in the end zone. Prestonsburg then had to kickoff to the Yellowjackets giving them the football right back

with 9:34 showing on the clock. Middlesboro kept the ball on the ground in trying to run the clock down. Penalties and loss of yardage forced the Yellowjackets to punt the ball to Prestonsburg with 2:28 remaining in the game. Prestonsburg held possession of the ball for a total of 28 seconds when Tucker missed connection on three attempts. The ball went back over to the Yellowjackets for the final two minutes of the game.

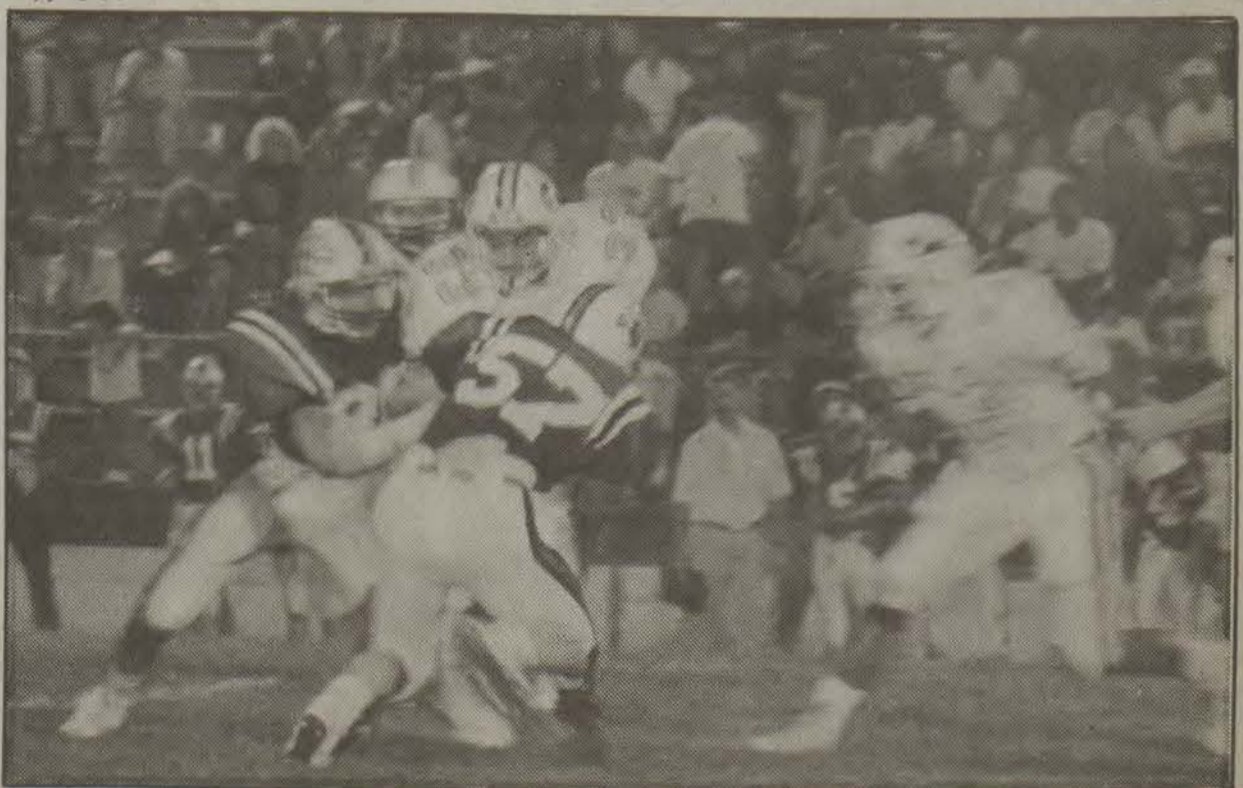
The loss leaves the Blackcats at 0-2 and Middlesboro won of the second

"Brad (Scott) is getting better at quarterback," said Jamerson. "He seems to be taking more control of running the team on the field. This is Brad's first year at quarterback and he keeps improving.

"James Howard and David Gilliam have turned it up a notch on

defense and are playing real hard. John Parrott has been moved back to fullback and he had some good runs for us. Chris Robinson, who is playing his first year, played a good defensive game for us and he works hard."

It continued to be all Fleming-Neon in the second half as they piled on another 22 points.

Scott was one for 10 in the passing department and had one pass intercepted. The Rebels, collectively, carried the football 37 times for 207 yards on the ground. However, with a minus 18 the net gain was assessed 115 yards in penalties on 10 flags, something that Jamerson feels is still way too high.

"It certainly is too high," said Jamerson of the penalties. "We need to bring that down."

The Rebels had three punts for 80 yards, an average of 26.7 yards per punt. Allen Central collected eight first downs. Freshman Brad Blackburn, off the injured list, had one carry for 23 yards. Parrott carried the football five times for 26 yards and Kevin Patton collected 15 yards on 10 carries.

good game on defense for us."

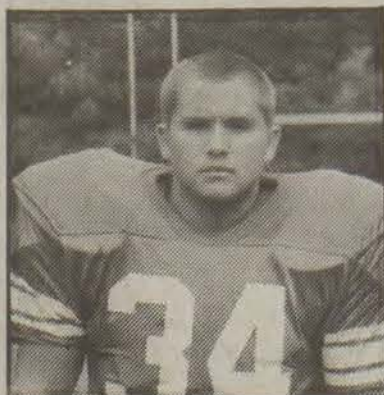

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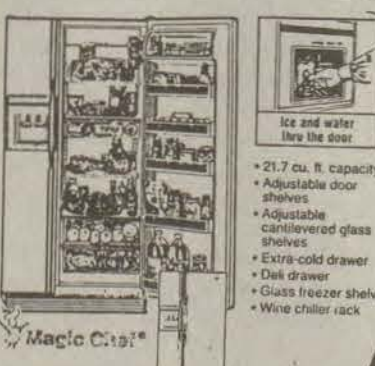
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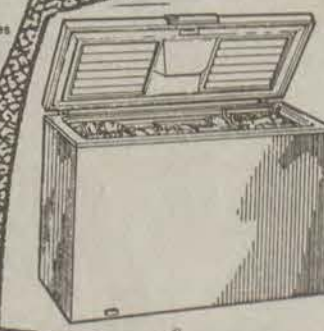

Trojans Lose To Johns Creek, 26-6

It took a combination of things for the Johns Creek Bearcats to post a 26-6 win over the Wheelwright Trojans Friday night at Brackett Field at Wheelwright. The scene looked more like a war battle field as the wounded were helped off the field and sped away in a waiting ambulance for a trip to the emergency room. The Trojans suffered many injuries to key personnel, that coupled with mistakes and penalties, made it a long night for the Trojans. The game was held up to attend to the injured for several minutes.

When the war smoke had all cleared, the Bearcats came away with their first win of the season as Wheelwright suffered their first setback of the yet young season.

All the scoring took place in the first half as the two teams battled on even terms in the second half.

"I was proud of my team and the way they came back and played in the second half of the game," said Trojan mentor Donnie Daniels. "They weren't showing much class in the first half as far as the game went, but they showed a lot character in the second half — and they showed a lot of pride also. They could have folded but they didn't."

Daniels said because of all the injuries his team suffered, his team was hindered offensively when he had to move a lot of people around.

"Our team just wasn't up to the challenge of playing Johns Creek tonight," Daniels commented. "They weren't prepared to play and, when a team is not mentally prepared to play, the blame goes to the coach. We just weren't prepared mentally or physically."

The game was very physical as two Wheelwright players had to be taken to the emergency room at McDowell via ambulance. Eddie

Shelton, who has known the injury route before after having to sit out all of last year, was sent to the McDowell Hospital in the first half with a leg injury. Later in the second half of the game, Charles Johnson followed suit and was taken to the hospital. In between all that action, Chuck Hutton was out for the rest of the game with an injured leg and running back Steven Jackson was helped off the field.

Nate Coleman got the first two scores for the Bearcats when he took a pass from Bearcat quarterback Chris Gannon from 27-yards for a touchdown and a 6-0 game. The conversion try failed.

The Trojans tied the game at 6-6 on Hutton's 1-yard run just before the end of the first quarter. The conversion try for Wheelwright failed also.

Coleman's second TD came in the second quarter on a 20-yard run to put the Bearcats on top 12-6. Hamilton Harris crossed the goal line in the second quarter on a 2-yard jaunt and it was 18-6. Gannon put the finishing touches on the Bearcat victory with a 2-yard run and the conversion made it a 26-6 game.

Wheelwright went to their mudcat offense in an attempt to catch up. It was the first time the Trojans employed the offense.

"You only use when you're down and want to get something going," said Daniels. "We had some good passes out but the ball was dropped."

The Trojans put together a good drive early in the fourth quarter when they moved the football to the Johns Creek 13-yard line only to see the drive stall out. The Trojans picked up four first downs on the series of plays. Justin Ray guided the drive at the quarterback position. Matt Johnson picked up a Trojan first down on a run

in the back field.

Johns Creek had a total yardage of 339-yards. The Bearcats had 32 rushes for 190-yards and picked up 149-yards through the air on 11 completions.

Gannon carried five times for 63-yards rushing. Harris had carries of 21 and 27-yards for 48-yards on two carries. Harris also had one reception good for 24-yards.

Wheelwright had 162-yards on the ground on 28 attempts. Trojan quarterback Steven Shelton passed for 92-yards - including a 80-yard completion — on two completions. The total offense for the Trojans was 254-yards.

"We still had a good offensive night with over 200-yards offense," said Daniels, "but we had so many penalties and fumbles that it hurt us in the good things we did."

The Trojans fumbled the football five times, losing it four of the five. They were flagged 11 times for 100-yards in penalties. Johns Creek had no fumbles and they were also penalized 100-yards on 11 flags. Shelton had two of his passes intercepted for a total of six turnovers for Wheelwright.

Individually, Arnold Adams rushed for 58-yards on nine carries. Hutton totaled 64 on the ground carrying the football six times. Jackson had 24-yards on six carries and Ryan Johnson carried five times for 14-yards.

Daniels said that the injured players were fine and would be ready to play in Friday night's game against Phelps. "We'll tape them up good and they will be ready to play. They will be alright. It, more or less, will be a day-to-day situation with them."

"We just didn't do a good job on our defensive assignments," the

Trojan coach said. "We didn't go to where we were supposed to go, but I give Johns Creek credit. They did a good job on us defensively."

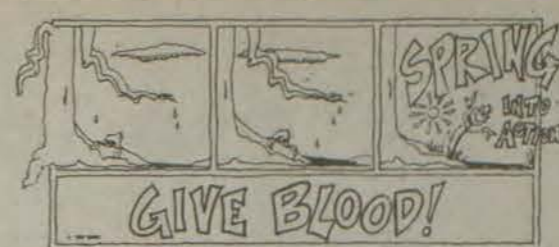

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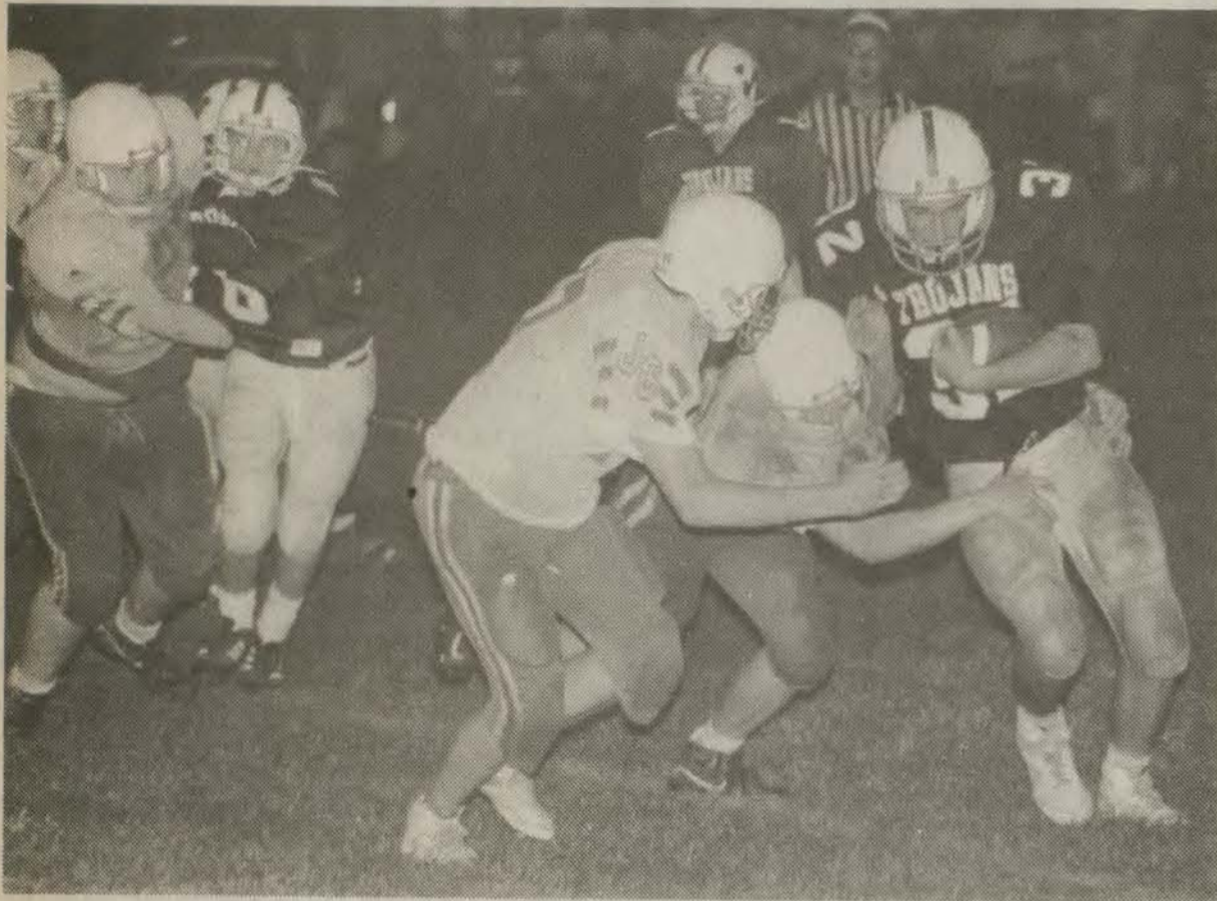

Kentucky Waterfowl Season Set

Establishing distinct zones for ducks and geese is a major step toward better waterfowl management in Kentucky. The move was made in conjunction with setting 1991-92 waterfowl hunting season dates by the Fish and Wildlife Resources Commission at its August 27 meeting.

Hunters may begin taking geese November 28 in the Western Goose Zone and December 13 in the Eastern Goose Zone. Goose hunting in both zones runs through January 31, 1992.

The daily bag limit for geese is seven birds which may include no more than two white-fronted geese. Western Goose Zone hunters may include three Canada geese in the daily bag, while hunters in the eastern zone may include two Canadas. The possession limit is double the daily bag.

The boundary between the Eastern and Western Goose zones begins at the Kentucky/Tennessee border at Fulton, extends north along the Purchase Parkway to I-24, east along I-24 to US 641, north along US 641 to US 60, northeast along US 60 to the Henderson County line, then along the Henderson County line to the Indiana border. All of Henderson County and the Henderson-Union Reporting Area are included in the western zone this year. Fulton County, continues its experimental goose hunting season through February 15, 1992.

The Western Duck Zone offers a split season for ducks, coots and mergansers beginning November 28 and running through December 1. The season reopens December 11 and continues through January 5, 1992. The eastern zone will have an uninterrupted duck hunting season beginning December 7 and running through January 5, 1992.

The daily bag limit is three ducks which may include no more than two mallards (no more than one female mallard), one black duck, two wood ducks, one redhead and one pintail of either sex. Canvasbacks may not be taken.

In addition to the daily duck bag, 15 coots and five mergansers (only one may be a hooded merganser) may be taken per day. The possession limit is double the daily bag.

The boundary separating the duck zones begins at the Kentucky-Tennessee border on I-65, runs north to the Green River Parkway at Bowling

Green, northwest along the parkway to Owensboro, southwest along bypass US 60, then north on US 231 to the Indiana border.

Moorhens, gallinules and sora and Virginia Rails may be hunted in a split season. The first segment opens October 5 and runs through October 28, while the second portion begins November 28 and continues through January 5, 1992.

Shooting hours during the entire waterfowl season are one-half hour before sunrise until sunset. Steel shot is required for all waterfowl hunting this year, nationwide.

Those wishing to hunt on Ballard and Henderson/Sloughs wildlife management areas (WMSs) must apply on standardized forms by September 30, 1991. Application forms are available from both Ballard and Sloughs WMSs, most hunting license outlets, state conservation officers and from the wildlife division office (#1 Game Farm Road, Frankfort, KY 40601).

The commission also extended the WMA deer quota hunt application deadline from August 31 to September 20, 1991. Changing the deadline

is an unusual happening, but it was made necessary this year because the fish and wildlife department ran out of application forms in mid-August.

In other action, the commission set 1992 turkey hunting seasons; the 14-day spring season opens April 15.

Walters is the tournament's leading amateur for the fourth time in the last five years. He equaled par with rounds of 71 and 69.

C.J. Benassi, Jr., assistant pro at

the host course, claimed the second prize of \$1,500. Benassi was the first round leader with a 65 and had 71 for a 136.

Benassi was trailing Hauer by a single stroke with three holes to play. However, Hauer pulled away for his four stroke victory by finishing birdie-eagle-par.

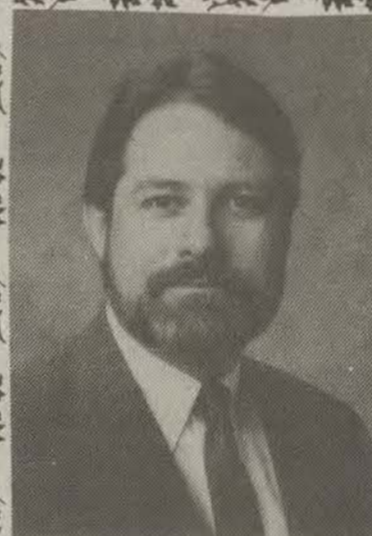

HUNTER TRAINING CERTIFICATION NOW REQUIRED...

As fall hunting seasons get into full swing, hunters are reminded that successful completion of a state approved hunter education course is now required for anyone born on or after January 1, 1975, who wishes to hunt in Kentucky.

Children under 10 may hunt without a course completion card, provided they are accompanied by an adult in a position to take immediate control of the child's firearm. Also, persons not required to have a hunting license are exempt from the hunter education requirement.

As with anything new, there are lots of questions and even some misconceptions about the requirement. Some of the more frequently asked questions are answered in the following:

"Must I complete the course before I can purchase my license?"

The law states hunters "shall, while hunting, carry a valid course completion card in addition to the appropriate Kentucky hunting license." (301 KAR 2:185).

The key words are "while hunting, carry..." Some folks are under the false impression that they must obtain their course completion card before they can purchase their hunting license. Not true. Some license sellers have mistakenly asked to see hunter training certification cards as a condition for selling a hunting license. That's beyond what the law requires.

"I hunt only on my uncle's farm, do I still need certification to hunt on family owned property?"

Anyone who falls within the age requirement and is required to purchase a hunting license is required to complete the hunter education program and be issued the certification card. The only persons who do not need the card are those who were born prior to January 1, 1975, or are legally exempt from buying a hunting license.

Hunting on family owned property does not necessarily exempt a person from purchasing a hunting license. If you're required by law to purchase a hunting license, and meet the stated age requirements, you'll

need to compete the hunter training course.

"I don't hunt deer, I only hunt rabbits. Do I still need to complete the course?"

The law makes no reference to game species. It simply says if you hunt in Kentucky, (and fit the specified age and license requirements) you must complete the training program.

"Will I get my card as soon as I complete the course?"

This one's easy. NO. Normally it takes less than 10 days for cards to be processed and mailed from the state fish and wildlife department's central offices in Frankfort. However, with some hunting seasons having already opened and more (including deer) just around the corner, the heavy volume of requests has reached the point where it's taking two to three weeks for cards to be issued. The best advice is don't wait until the last minute. If you're planning to hunt this fall, complete the hunter education course as soon as possible! The course is 10 hours long and takes three days to complete.

Hunters Training Officers do not, cannot and will not issue course completion cards on the spot.

"How much does it cost to take the training?"

The hunter training course is free and all necessary materials, including guns and ammo, are provided.

"I'm planning to hunt in another state which also requires hunter training certification. Is my Kentucky card acceptable in other states?"

Kentucky has a reciprocal agreement which covers all of North America. This means that your Kentucky course completion card is honored by all states which require hunter certification, as well as Canada and Mexico. Kentucky also recognizes certificates issued by other states.

"I lost my card. Can it be replaced?"

Yes. To obtain a duplicate course completion card, send \$2 along with your name, current address and date of birth to: Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, Division of Information and Education, #1 Game Farm Road, Frankfort, KY 40601.

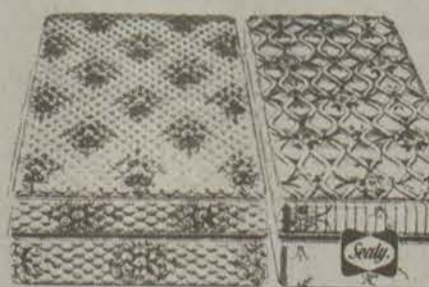
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Porter Returns To Open New Karate Gym In Dwale

For James Porter, his four years of college at the University of Kentucky have been rewarding. Porter just graduated from UK where he obtained a degree in nutrition and upon returning to Floyd County he plans to operate his own karate gym in Dwale. "My dad bought the old Dwale school building and I am working on it and remodeling it for a gym where I want to start teaching karate." For Porter it has been a desire of

his to take on such an adventure. Porter currently is a fifth-degree black belt and is working on his sixth-degree enroute to the highest level — seventh-degree. Classes for the new karate school will start on October 8. Porter said the school will deal with Shao-Lin style karate for now. Porter has been training in the art of karate under Hiang The, a seventh-degree black belt, since 1976.

The classes will be open to women who want to learn the art of self-defense. Special classes for children seven years of age and up will also be conducted by Porter.

Porter, who presently works for the Johnson County Health Department, said that the classes will be held on Tuesday's and Thursday's. All children's classes will gather from 6 p.m. until 7 p.m. All adult classes will be held from 7 p.m. until 8 p.m.

Porter is hoping that his previous students will get back into his classes and everyone is welcome to take part.

Will aerobics be part of the activities at the new gym? "Maybe later," he said, "we will have classes in aerobics. Right now we just want to concentrate on karate."

Porter said that all beginners begin working toward a white belt in their quest for the black belt. The white belt is basic self-defense instruction. Stance, punches and basic kicks are also taught at this level.

"Then a student works toward the next level which is the yellow belt," explained the karate expert. "Here they will learn some animal forms."

It is on to the blue belt and the bird system Tai Pang (means Big Bird). After a student has reached the third level they begin working on the green belt. The brown belt has three degrees that a student must attain — third, second and first. After the brown belt then the first degree in the black is the goal for each student.

"It takes a student about three years to get his black belt if he stays with it," said Porter. "It depends on how fast he learns everything. You have some students that start out and then quit as they get at each level. The serious karate student will stay. It is a weeding out process."

Porter said that despite being in the art for 16 years that he is still learning new things.

"We will teach about all the weapons and how to use them," he explained. "Weapons such as the sword, daggers and spears." Porter said that all the weapons are provided at the classes.

"It takes a tremendous amount of effort to learn karate and all the dif-

ferent forms," he stated, "Most students find out that it takes a lot of time to learn it all."

"It is still exciting to me even after being in as long as I have. I really enjoy it and I work hard at it."

Porter said that he recommends to his students that they work out on their own when not in classes. "Each student needs to work out about three hours a week. They can practice their kicks and punches in front of a mirror."

The students won't start sparring until they reach the white belt level. Then Porter suggests to his students that they begin to work out three to four hours a day.

"Karate is a rewarding sport," he explained, "in that it is good cardiovascular therapy, develops strength in the arms and legs, gives the students self confidence and self esteem plus teaches a person to defend themselves."

Porter will be starting his ninth year as an instructor and he has been an instructor at the UK Club for the past four years.

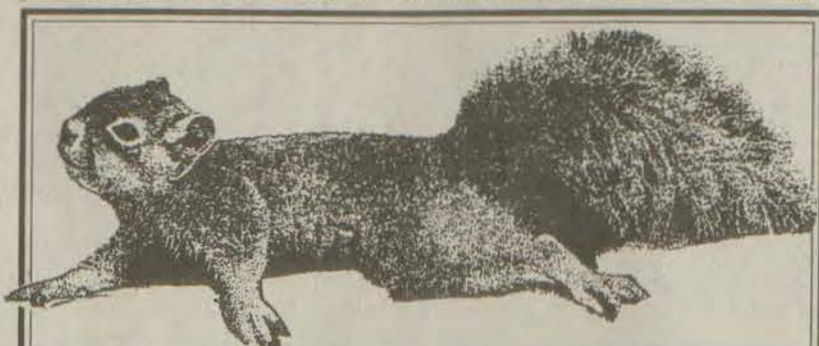
The cost of the classes are \$25 per month per student and there will be a limited number accepted for each class so early enrollment is necessary.

"We will take up to a certain number and then take names of all that want to be in the classes," said Porter. "Then as students drop out we will take on new ones."

Hopefully, this will help our grade school system which in turn will benefit our high school programs," stated Chaffin.

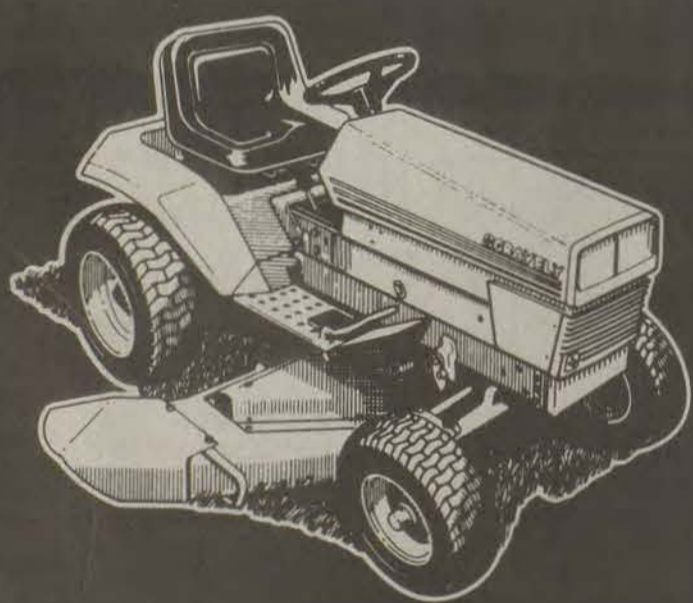
The Junior Pro basketball program has agreed to hold off the opening of their basketball season in order not to interfere with the new league.

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County Kettle

For some unknown reason I keep thinking about the upcoming cold weather, and as I received the following recipes, I am now beginning to plan ahead for Christmas. These candies will keep in a cool room for months and will still be fresher than any boxed candies you will be able to buy for the holidays.

The required candy molds can be bought at any candy shop and discount houses. Maybe at some grocery stores at a later date. These recipes call for tempered chocolate, that gives the candies a shiny professional look. A small dribbling of colored icing will let you know which candy is which before you bite into it.

TEMPERED CHOCOLATE

Semi chocolate squares.
Grate or finely chop the amount of chocolate called for in the recipe. Place two-thirds of grated chocolate in top of a double boiler, and heat, stirring constantly, over hot, not boiling water, until chocolate melts and temperature registers 15 degrees (MAKE SURE water is below, not touching top of double boiler.)

Remove top of double boiler and place on a towel. Add remaining one-third of grated chocolate to chocolate in double boiler, stirring constantly until melted.

Pour melted chocolate on to a marble or laminate surface. Using a spatula or pastry scraper, scrap and stir chocolate to smooth and cool it. When chocolate cools to 80-82 degrees, return it to the double boiler top.

Place top of double boiler over hot, not boiling water, and heat again, stirring constantly, until mixture reaches 87-91 degrees. Remove top part of double boiler and use choco-

late as directed.

ROYAL ICING (for decoration)

1 egg white
1/8 tsp. cream of tartar
1 c. sifted powdered sugar
Combine egg white, at room temperature, and cream of tartar in a small bowl. Beat at medium speed until frothy. Add one half cup powdered sugar, mixing well. Add remaining sugar and beat at high speed 4 minutes. Yield about 2/3 cup.

CREME DE MENTHE CHOCOLATES

1 (14-oz.) can sweetened condensed milk
2 tbsp. butter, or margarine
1/4 c. creme dementhe
1/8 tsp. peppermint extract
8 oz. tempered chocolate
green paste food coloring
royal icing

Combine condensed milk and butter in a small saucepan, cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil. Reduce heat, and simmer 5 minutes or until thickened, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, and stir in liqueur and peppermint extract. Set aside to cool.

Spoon about 1/2 tsp. tempered chocolate into each 1-inch plastic candy mold. Spread chocolate to cover bottom and sides of molds, using an art brush or back of spoon. Freeze 10 minutes or until firm.

Carefully spoon about 3/4 teaspoon of creme de-menthe filling into each chocolate filled mold, spoon about 1/2 teaspoon tempered chocolate over the filling.

Gently tap molds on counter to remove air bubbles. Freeze 10 minutes or until firm. Invert molds and remove candies.

Stir a small amount of food coloring into royal icing. Drizzle icing over top of each piece of candy. Store at room temperature. YIELD: 3 dozen.

RASPBERRY CREAM CHOCOLATES

Prepare recipe for creme de menthe chocolates, omitting peppermint extract, substituting creme de framboises for creme de menthe and substituting red food coloring for green in royal icing. Add red food coloring to filling mixture, if desired. YIELD 3.

WHITE CHOCOLATE SURPRISES

2/3 c. whipping cream
1 1/2 tsp. sour cream
8-oz. grated white chocolate or vanilla-flavored baking bars
about 1/2 c. powdered sugar, sifted
12-oz. tempered chocolate
2-oz. grated white chocolate, or vanilla flavored bars, melted

Bring whipping cream to a simmer in a heavy saucepan. Reduce heat to low and stir in sour cream. Add 8-oz. grated white chocolate; stir until chocolate melts, and remove from heat. Pour mixture into a buttered 9-inch square pan and freeze 20 minutes or until firm enough to hold its shape.

Place a large piece of wax paper on a baking sheet with powdered sugar. Spoon white chocolate mixture into mounds (about 3/4 teaspoons) on wax paper and freeze 10 minutes until almost firm.

Roll each mound of candy in powdered sugar to make a ball, set aside. Spoon about 1/2 teaspoon of tempered chocolate into each candy mold, covering bottom and sides as before. Carefully place one ball of white chocolate in each chocolate filled mold, pressing gently to flatten. Spoon tempered chocolate over filling. Tap molds to remove air bubbles. Freeze 10 minutes or until firm. Invert molds; remove candies. Drizzle melted white chocolate over top. Store at room temperature. YIELD 3 1/2 dozen.

CHOCOLATE CARAMELS

2 c. sugar
1 1/2 c. half-and-half
1/2 c. light corn syrup
1/4 c. butter
1 tsp. vanilla
14-oz. tempered chocolate
brown paste food coloring
royal icing

Combine first 4 ingredients in a large, heavy saucepan; cook over low heat, stirring gently, until sugar dissolves. Cover and cook over medium heat 2 to 3 minutes to wash down sugar crystals from sides of pan. Uncover and cook to firm ball stage (246 degrees). Stir in vanilla; remove from heat. Pour into a buttered 9-inch square pan without stirring; let cool. Remove from pan; shape into 3/4-inch balls. Prepare molds with tempered chocolate as before. Carefully place 1 caramel ball into each chocolate-filled mold, pressing firmly to flatten. Cover with tempered chocolate. Tap molds to remove air bubbles. Freeze 10 minutes. Invert molds and remove candies. Add small amount of brown paste coloring to royal icing and decorate each mold. YIELD 5 1/2 dozen.

CHOCOLATE NUT TEASERS

3/4 c pecan pieces, peanut halves, slivered almonds, or pistachio pieces, toasted
14-oz. tempered chocolate
nut filling
Spoon 1/2 teaspoon nuts into each

mold (4 1/2 doz). Spoon tempered chocolate over nuts in candy molds and on sides. Freeze 10 minutes or until firm. Spoon about 3/4 teaspoon nut filling in to each chocolate filled candy mold. Spoon tempered choco-

late over nut filling to cover. Gently tap the molds to remove air bubbles. Freeze 10 minutes until firm. Invert molds and remove candies. Store at room temperature. YIELD 4 1/2 dozen.

NUT FILLING

1 c. butter
1 c. sugar
2 tbsp. water
1 tbsp. light corn syrup
2/3 c. finely chopped nuts, toasted
1/2 tsp. vanilla

Melt butter in a heavy saucepan, gently add sugar, water, corn syrup, stirring once. Cook over low heat until sugar dissolves, stirring once. Bring mixture to a boil. Cover, reduce heat to medium, and cook 2 to 3 minutes to wash down sugar crystals from sides of the pan. Uncover and cook to soft ball stage (235 degrees). Remove from heat, and stir in nuts and vanilla. Pour mixture into a greased pan and cool.

NOTE: These candies are not nearly as hard, nor time consuming as they sound. They are good, and not nearly as expensive as the same ones bought in the stores, that may be as much as five years old. The first one will be the hardest, after that they will become faster and easier. These will not be found in cook books.

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Retail food prices rising at a slower rate in 1991

Retail food price increases are easing up slightly this year, according to an agribusiness economist at the University of Kentucky.

"We are seeing a smaller increase in average retail food prices the first half of 1991 than in 1989 and 1990," said Forrest Stegelin, an Extension specialist with the UK College of Agriculture.

"The average price consumers paid for food in grocery stores and restaurants rose just under 4 percent the first six months of this year, compared to a nearly 6-percent increase from 1989 to 1990," he said. "On an annual basis, the average retail food price probably will reflect only a modest increase from 1990 to 1991, as compared to the year earlier."

Consumers are seeing slower price hikes in food bought for home consumption than food consumed away from home, according to Stegelin.

"Food products showing the greatest price declines in the Consumer Price Index have the highest at-home consumption—things like dairy products, processed fruits and vegetables, and poultry products," he explained. "Conversely, major commodity categories with large CPI price increases include many food items commonly purchased away from home, as well as more highly processed meat, seafood, bread, cereal, fruit and vegetable products."

For 1991 as a whole, the U.S. Department of Agriculture expects a smaller increase in price of food bought for at-home consumption than for food consumed away from home, reversing a trend in recent years.

Grocery store food prices rose 6.5 percent from 1989 to 1990—a nearly

2-percent increase above the rise in prices for food consumed away from home.

"Despite rising retail food prices, Americans spend less of their income on food—a trend that began in 1975—due to large increases in personal incomes," Stegelin added. "Today, we spend less than 12 percent of our incomes on food, compared to just over 14 percent in 1975. Americans spent \$465 billion on domestically produced food in 1990."

The farm share is approximately 24 cents of each retail food dollar spent, with processing and marketing accounting for a lion's share of the remainder, Stegelin said.

"Of course," he added, "the farm share varies with the food item, usually decreasing on more highly processed foods. For instance, the farm share is only about 6.5 percent on cereal and cereal products."

Stegelin said a food analyst studying a national brand of corn flakes estimated the manufacturer paid about 14 cents for the raw materials in an 18-ounce box of cereal which sold for \$2.20 in the grocery store. The farm share was 10 cents; the other 4 cents went to the grain elevator and corn miller.

"The analyst estimated that advertising, marketing and sales cost 52 cents," Stegelin said. "The impact these costs have on the retail price of a national brand of cereal is more obvious when you compare the price of an 18-ounce box of a national brand cereal costing \$2.20 with a supermarket private label averaging about \$1.70 a box."

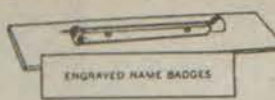

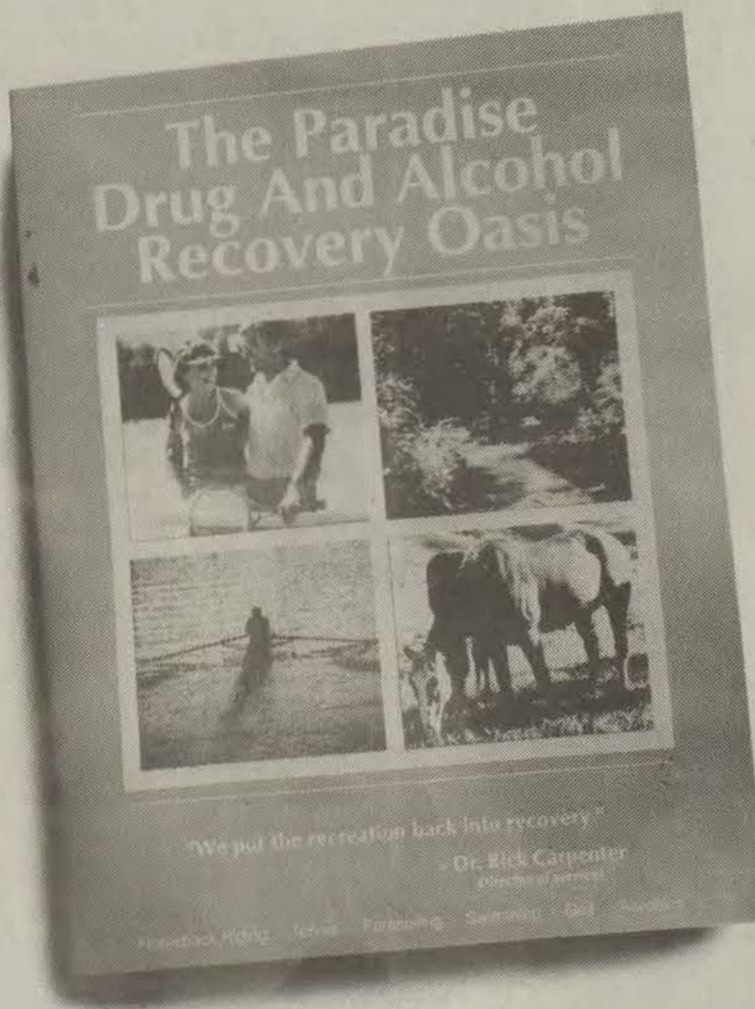

Dr. Wekstein addresses HRMC medical staff

The HRMC medical staff heard Dr. David Wekstein, associate director of the Alzheimer's Disease Research Center (Sanders Brown) at the University of Kentucky, advise that 15 percent of all older persons with symptoms resembling Alzheimer's disease can be successfully treated. Dr. Wekstein was the keynote speaker for the monthly medical staff meeting Monday, August 19.

Dr. Wekstein spoke about treatment trends and continuing Alzheimer's research. He also presented an overview of care currently being given the 43 Alzheimer's patients in Highlands Memory Disorders Clinic, which operates in conjunction with the Sanders Brown Center.

"The best response to Alzheimer's remains providing quality care for patients and their families," said Dr. Wekstein.

He continued by noting that there are several popular myths about the disease that physicians still have to contend with and that many persons mistakenly "self-diagnose" any sign of memory loss as Alzheimer's. "Unfortunately some of these people may in fact be suffering from a vitamin deficiency or a thyroid problem and not seek the professional medical help that could benefit them," stated Dr. Wekstein.

The best avenue of research appears now to be limited to post-mortem evaluation of brain tissue from Alzheimer victims, said Dr. Wekstein. To expedite this effort, the Sanders Brown Center has recently initiated a brain donor program.

Other guest speakers at the meeting were Dr. Alex Berger, Program Director for the Portsmouth Family Practice Residency Program at the Eastern Virginia School of Medicine, and Eunice Hall, Quality Assurance Utilization Review Coordinator at Highlands.

window sills to perk up the long, cold winter months ahead. There is another good reason to grow flowering bulbs in the winter months; you will have a chance to see which one you would prefer to have in your garden come spring. There are more and more different bulbs showing up in offices and homes, than the old standbys, tulips, daffodils and hyacinths. Have you tried freesias, delicate snowdrops, or the dark blue dwarf iris? These are very fragrant along with their beauty.

Bulbs can be forced into bloom the following winter, after blooming

outside in the warm weather months. They then do double duty. Freesias, narcissi and tulips should be watered after they stop blooming until the foliage has died back. If not in pots, dig the bulbs, place in pots and set back in a dark place, and let the plants lie dormant until fall. Begin watering the plants in late September or early October to bring them into bloom between December and February.

The more different bulbs you use inside for winter, the longer the winter enjoyment. If you are going to use bulbs you will buy this fall, store them in the refrigerator, until potting

time. Pot them at different times, about two weeks apart, to keep new blooms coming on for several weeks. If you wish them to all bloom at the same time, care must be taken to start watering them at the right time as so many different bulbs take different time spans to come into bloom.

Bulbs store their own food, so your potting soil need not be too rich. Make sure your pots have adequate drainage. Always place some kind of large objects in the bottom of each pot, to as keep the soil loose and the excess water drained off.

After your bulbs have been stored

in a dark place for about 10 weeks, and new roots have grown, and shoots or buds are just under the soil or, maybe begin to hoove up the soil, bring the pots out into the light and warmer temperature. The more light they get will make the difference in strong, stocky, dark green foliage, studded with blooms, or weak, lanky, flowerless plants.

Now is a good time to order your bulbs, for fall planting outside for early spring flowers. By the time your bulbs arrive and your location is decided upon and the soil made ready, it will be planting time. I do not go

along with this general rule of planting in November. Generally in this time span the ground is too cold and frozen too hard, also it is too cold to be outside working in the soil.

Bulbs can be ordered from any good dependable nursery company. Some companies have already sent out their bulb (fall) catalogs. They can also be obtained from local discount houses and feed stores. As I stated in an earlier article about bulbs, stay away from the cheap ones, as you get only what you pay for in the line of bulbs. The better ones cost more, and are worth it.

Following spurt, home sales resume sustainable pace in July

Following two months of extraordinary growth, sales of previously owned homes slowed in July, according to the National Association of Realtors. However, despite the monthly decline in activity, sales remained above the level posted one year earlier.

The association recorded a seasonally adjusted annual sales rate* of 3.35 million existing single-family homes nationwide last month, 6.7 percent below the June rate of 3.59 million units, which was the highest in two-and-one-half years. The July

resale rate was 0.9 percent above the July 1990 rate of 3.32 million units.

NAR President Harley E. Rouda said the fact that home resales nationally remained above those of one year ago—before the recession took hold—is a strong indicator that the housing industry has firmed up in many areas. "The market is holding strong," he said.

July's sales drop from June must be "viewed from the proper perspective," Rouda noted, pointing out that July's resale rate was higher than that for each of the first four months of

1991. The flurry of activity occurred in May and June reflected strong consumer optimism about the economy and a push by buyers to take advantage of low mortgage rates and favorable prices, he said. "Buyers flocked to the market, causing sales to jump. However, sales spurts cannot last indefinitely. Now that some pent-up demand has been filled, the market is easing back into a more stable course of growth," Rouda said.

He noted that mortgage rates edged downward in July, following a slight uptick in June. The Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp. reported that the national average commitment rate for 30-year, conventional, fixed-rate mortgages was 9.58 percent for July, compared to 9.61 percent for the previous month. The July average mortgage rate was down by about one-half percentage point from one year earlier. NAR expects rates to continue declining in the months

ahead. "We aren't looking for more sales surges. But, there are still plenty of people out there looking, and we do not expect sales to be steady," Rouda said.

The national median existing-home price was \$103,000 in July, up 5.0 percent from the July 1990 price of \$98,100, and up 1.0 percent from the June price of \$102,000. The median is the midpoint—half the homes sell for more, half for less. The yearly increase in the national price suggests there is less pressure on sellers to lower their prices, Rouda noted.

"Given the increase in buyer demand last spring, home prices have started firming up," Rouda said. Generally, the highest-cost markets are the ones still experiencing soft prices, due to weak demand, Rouda noted. In July, the single largest percentage of existing-home sales, 9.6 percent, fell in the \$100,000-\$119,999 range.

On a regional basis, the Northeast posted the sole resale pace increase from June to July. The Northeast recorded a rate of 580,000 units, up 1.8 percent from June, and up 5.5 percent from one year earlier. The Northeast has experienced increases in resales each month since March. The median price there was \$143,500 in July, up 1.4 percent from July 1990 and up 1.2 percent from June.

The July resale rate for the Northeast was the highest rate since December 1989, when the rate also was 580,000 units. Although some pockets of stagnation still exist, the region as a whole appears to have bottomed out, noted NAR Chief Economist John A. Tuccillo. "The Northeast is showing signs of life," Tuccillo said. "Buyers are coming back." Much of the activity is concentrated in the lower price ranges, he noted.

In the West, the July resale rate of 610,000 units slipped 1.6 percent from June, but jumped 10.9 percent from July 1990. The median price, \$144,600, was 3.5 percent higher than one year earlier, but dropped 2.7 percent from June. According to Tuccillo, the high-cost markets on the California coast remain in a slow-down that began in 1990. However, rather than staying sluggish, those areas have the economic strength to start recovering by the end of the year, he predicted.

The South posted a resale rate of 1.27 million units for July, down 14.8 percent from June and down 3.1 percent from a year ago. The South's median price was \$92,900 in July, up 4.6 percent from July 1990, and up 2.4 percent from June.

In the Midwest, the rate of existing-home sales dropped 3.3 percent from June to 890,000 units in July. The rate was 2.2 percent below that of one year ago. The median price in the Midwest was \$79,700 in July, up 4.7 percent from July 1990 and up 1.8 percent from June.

Currently, NAR is predicting sales of existing single-family homes to total 3.40 million units for 1991, 3.1 percent above the 1990 total.

There were 2.44 million existing homes available for sale nationwide in July, representing an 8.7-month supply at last month's resale rate. The monthly supply number, down from a total of 2.53 million homes in June, is the lowest since January. The decline in the inventory of homes indicates that demand is beginning to catch up with supply in many areas, Tuccillo noted. "There aren't as many buyer's markets now as there are a few months ago," he said.

The National Association of Realtors, "The Voice for Real Estate," is

the nation's largest trade association, representing nearly 800,000 members involved in all aspects of the real estate industry.

* The annual rate for a particular month represents what the total number of actual sales for a year would be if the relative resale pace for that month were maintained for 12 consecutive months.

Seasonally adjusted annual rates are used in reporting monthly data to factor out seasonal variations in resale activity. For example, home sales volume normally is higher in the summer and relatively light in the winter months, primarily because of differences in the weather.

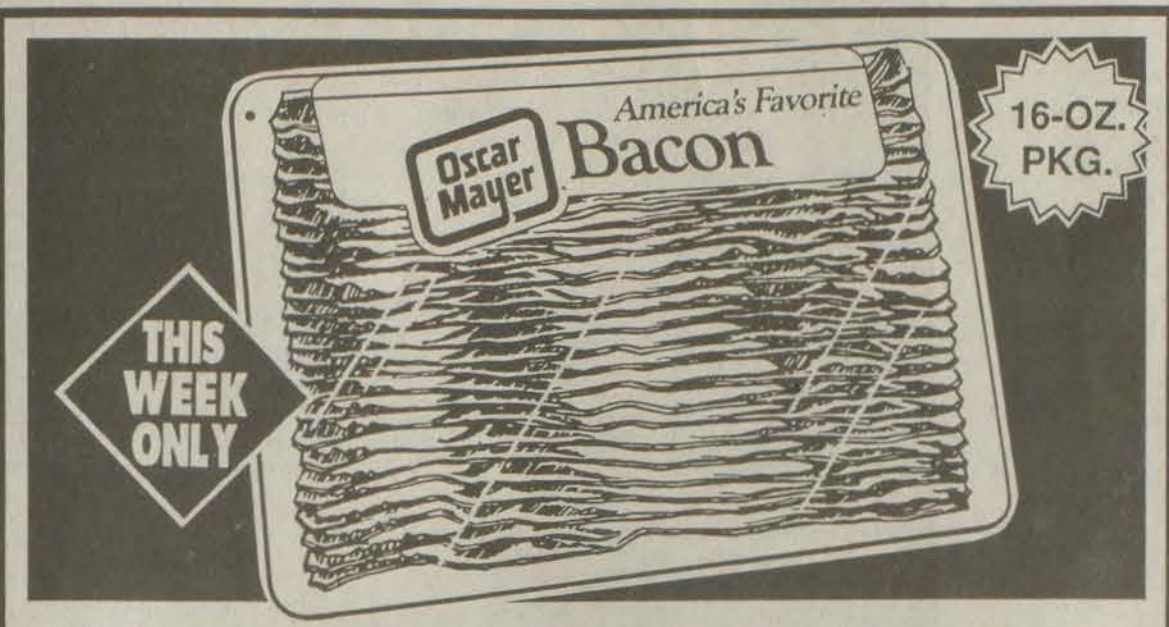
