Acquitted on one charge:

Tackett guilty, appeal likely

Adams Middle School principal Thomas Tackett was found guilty of abuse of a teacher and acquitted of a harrassment charge Wednesday by a Floyd County District Court jury.

The jury deliberated for approximatley an hour before returing its verdict. The jury recommended a \$500 fine on the abuse charge. Special Judge Miller Kent Carter followed the jury's recommendation and levied the fine against Tackett.

Tackett was convicted of a charge arising from an incident at Adams Middle School on May 14 involving Gwendolyn Hammonds, a teacher at the school.

Tackett would not comment Wednesday on the verdict. Bill McCann, Tackett's attorney, said he would advise his client to appeal the conviction because he believed the statute was unconstitutional.

Hammonds said after the verdict was rendered that she was pleased with the conviction, but also disappointed that Tackett was found not guilty on the harassment charge.

"Everything he did to me that day was not allowed to be brought out," Hammonds said. "Also, he (Tackett) accused me of things I didn't do. He

Tackett testified in his defense that he had accused Hammonds of placing a Floyd County Education Association (FCEA) newsletter on his desk and that experience was disruptive, degrading and horrible.

"I didn't abuse Mrs. Hammonds," Tackett testified. "I didn't touch or curse her. I ordered her back to her classroom and told her not to come back to my office unless she had a serious problem with instructional materials or with her students.'

Tackett said he held the newsletter up to her face and told her it was unprofessional to put it on his desk. He said that the atmosphere had been tense the last school year because of the teacher's strike.

City woman cited for drug trafficking

A Prestonsburg woman was arrested Tuesday by Prestonsburg Police and charged with trafficking in a controlled substance within 1,000 yards of a school.

Brenda Pennington was arrested by Prestonsburg detective sergeant Jeff Stumbo and police chief Greg Hall after an investigation. Pennington allegedly forged prescriptions for schedule III and IV controlled substances, Stumbo said. She worked at a doctor's office in Prestonsburg.

A major highway bill containing several key road and bridge initiatives sought by U.S. Representative Chris Perkins passed by the U.S. House of Representatives Wednesday night.

The Intermodal Surface Transportation Infrastructure Act of 1991 (HR 2950), as the bill is known, would authorize \$151 billion over the next six years for highway and mass transit construction in the United Sates. The measure passed the House 342 to 83, more than enough votes to override a presidential veto.

The bill would be an economic and transportation boon for Eastern Kentucky, authorizing a new eastwest coast-to-coast highway that would run through Kentucky, a new interstate running along the Big Sandy River, \$79 million to widen a dangerous stretch of road around Coeburn Mountain in northeastern Pike County, and \$18.3 million to construct a new bridge spanning the Ohio River between Maysville and Aberdeen, Ohio, Perkins said.

The House bill, however, is not the only highway plan being discussed. The Senate has its own bill, which eliminates all of Perkins' proj-

David students have a brighter future thanks to a pond and nature areas near the school provided by the Soil Conservation District. Students will be able to view science and nature in action.

David School ponders a better education

Construction of a new pond at David, which has been underway since September, was completed earlier this month. The pond will serve as an outdoor classroom for the David School and will be developed as a nature area and recreational fa-

Nature trails, picnic tables, and bird houses will be located near the pond which is situated behind the site of the future David School. The pond will encourage stream, woodland, water and vegetation study.

The pond will also provide a second source of water for fire protection when the new David School is constructed. A water line was installed in the dam during construction and connected to a fire hydrant, acquired with the help of Floyd

County Judge Executive John M Stumbo, so that water could be readily pumped from the pond in case of emergencies.

The idea for the pond began early in the spring when Jeff Brown, district conservationist, realized the potential for the pond and surrounding area. Coordinating with the David School, Brown exchanged ideas with members of the school's staff regarding the development of the pond.

The Soil Conservation District provided funding for the construction and the project got underway in September. Equipment problems and heavy rains delayed the construction of the pond. It will be filled in March providing the weather cooperates. The surrounding area will also be developed over the next few years by students of the David School.

"No, I didn't," Tackett answered. Guidance counselor Jane Meek, testifying for the defense, said the student was upset over the incident between Tackett and Hammonds. Meek said she also felt the child was embarrassed because an adult had thought she had attempted suicide.

'The student had three or four scratches on her arm near the wrist area," Meek said. "She told me she had cut herself peeling potatoes."

Meek said a rift had developed between Tackett and Hammonds







HARVEST THE 'MOTOR VOTER' BILL THIS FALL

Sometime this fall, the U.S. Senate should take another run at passing the National Voter Registration Act, sponsored by Ky. Senator Wendell Ford, affectionately known in goodgovernment circles as the "motor voter" bill. An effort to bring the bill to a vote failed in July, but the supporters deserve another chance from the Senate leadership.

Motor voter needs to survive two Senate votes. The first is to cut off debate, which requires 60 affirmative votes. The second is to actually pass the bill. The effort in July to end debate fell just one vote short of success, and supporters of the legislation are determined to try again. Unfortunately, motor voter isn't high on the Senate leadership's list of priorities for passage before adjournment later this fall.

Motor voter would require states to offer voter registration by mail, at the time of driver's license renewal and at a wide range of federal and state government offices. The law would exempt Minnesota, which already offers motor voter registration.

That points up a major argument against motor voter: States traditionally have controlled voter registraof motor voter if they wish. Federal lis Star Tribune).

Supporters of the federal bill argues that states had decades to reform their voter registration procedures and have failed to do it. In some states, registration procedures are so cumbersome they appear deliberately constructed to keep people away from the polls. Moreover, stateby-state variations have become a severe impediment to voter participation as Americans have grown more mobile. It's time, supporters argue, to make voting as easy as possible by imposing uniform requirements in all 50 states.

Registration hurdles are not the only, or even the major reason Americans stay away from the polls. Enacting motor voter won't cure the nation's political ills. But it would eliminate unnecessary impediments that keep some Americans from voting regularly.

In recent years, a number of states have enacted motor voter legislation, and in most, the percent of voters

registering and voting increased significantly. The Senate can extend that favorable trend nationwide by acting soon to pass the motor voter tion and can enact their own versions bill. (Reprinted from The Minneapo-


