Acquitted on one charge :

Tackett guilty, appeal likely

Adams Middle School principal Thomas Tackett was found guilty of abuse of a teacher and acquitted of a harassment charge Wednesday by a Floyd County District Court jury.

The jury deliberated for approximately an hour before returning its verdict. The jury recommended a \$500 fine on the abuse charge. Special Judge Miller Kent Carter followed the jury's recommendation and levied the fine against Tackett.

Tackett was convicted of a charge arising from an incident at Adams Middle School on May 14 involving Gwendolyn Hammonds, a teacher at the school.

Tackett would not comment Wednesday on the verdict. Bill McCann, Tackett's attorney, said he would advise his client to appeal the conviction because he believed the statute was unconstitutional.

Hammonds said after the verdict was rendered that she was pleased with the conviction, but also disappointed that Tackett was found not guilty on the harassment charge.

"Everything he did to me that day was not allowed to be brought out," Hammonds said. "Also, he (Tackett) accused me of things I didn't do. He lied."

Tackett testified in his defense that he had accused Hammonds of placing a Floyd County Education Association (FCEA) newsletter on his desk and that experience was disruptive, degrading and horrible.

"I didn't abuse Mrs. Hammonds," Tackett testified. "I didn't touch or curse her. I ordered her back to her classroom and told her not to come back to my office unless she had a serious problem with instructional materials or with her students."

Tackett said he held the newsletter up to her face and told her it was unprofessional to put it on his desk. He said that the atmosphere had been tense the last school year because of the teacher's strike.

Hammonds had been near

Wheelwright class to sing at ceremonies

Wheelwright High School's American history class will be participating in a ceremony commemorating the 50th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor in Lexington, December 7.

The Pearl Harbor Commemorative Association will hold ceremonies at the Hyatt Regency Con-

vention Center and history students at Wheelwright High School will sing songs that were popular during World War II.

In explaining how her history class came to be invited to the ceremonies, Doris Osborne, who teaches American history at Wheelwright, said she read an article in a Lexington paper and decided to write for more information.

"I wrote Mr. Ellis McCollum about

the possibility of our history class taking part in the Pearl Harbor ceremonies in Lexington," said Osborne. "I received a letter back from him stating that they would be very pleased to have us take part."

"Our kids have such a distorted view of our government," she said. "They look at what happened in Iraq and think that all America has to do is go to war when they want to. I hope that the trip will enhance their knowledge of American history and our role in war."

Osborne, after learning of the invitation to take part in the ceremonies, was then invited to a meeting of the "Remember Pearl Harbor" committee on October 12. "After the meeting I came back and filed a field trip request with the board of education and received their approval to attend the ceremonies," she said.

Osborne said others were involved in preparing for the trip.

"Our band director, Dennis Bartley, has helped us very much," she said. "He sent some old World War II records over for our kids to listen to and he will be going with us to drive the bus. Keith Caudill of Pikeville has been a tremendous help as well as Jim Handy Caudill, music director at Pikeville College. I played the records for the class like 'Praise the Lord and Pass the Ammunition'."

City woman cited for drug trafficking

A Prestonsburg woman was arrested Tuesday by Prestonsburg Police and charged with trafficking in a controlled substance within 1,000 yards of a school.

Brenda Pennington was arrested by Prestonsburg detective sergeant Jeff Stumbo and police chief Greg Hall after an investigation. Pennington allegedly forged prescriptions for schedule III and IV controlled substances, Stumbo said. She worked at a doctor's office in Prestonsburg.

Stumbo said Pennington issued prescriptions for the drugs and on

several occasions controlled substances were issued contrary to what the doctor prescribed.

Pennington was also charged with obtaining or attempting to obtain a controlled substance by fraud, deceit and forgery.

In an unrelated incident, Stumbo and assistant chief Roy Roberts arrested a couple Wednesday on theft by deception and theft of services charges.

Howard Smith Jr., 30, and his wife, Gidget Smith, 23, of Allen were arrested for allegedly issuing bad checks to the Holiday Inn in Prestonsburg. Stumbo said the two were also wanted in Ashland on similar charges.

Thwarts Allen burglary :

Quick action credited

An attempted robbery of an Allen market was thwarted early Thursday morning by two newspaper deliverymen and a quick response by a Floyd County Deputy Sheriff.

Two men waiting to pick up papers near the Allen Food Mart ob-

served that the glass door of the market had been broken out and they saw a man in store. A call was made to the Floyd County Sheriff's office at 2:45 a.m. that someone was robbing the store.

Deputy sheriff Mike Slone was dispatched to the scene, arriving from Maytown eight minutes later.

The subject had fled the scene

shortly before Slone arrived, said deputy Mike Conn. The two men had placed their vehicle near the front door of the market with the headlights shining into the store.

Slone found several garbage bags in the store filled with over 40 cartons and 139 packs of cigarettes. Slone also recovered \$50 in cash.

In other activity, deputy Danny Jarrell took into custody Wednesday two female juveniles, ages 12 and 14, who were runaways from Ohio and recovered a stolen vehicle belonging to the juveniles' mother.

A tip was received by the sheriff's office that the two girls were at a residence in Steele's Creek near Wayland. Jarrell and a social worker went to residence and found the 12-year-old at the home. The juvenile told them her sister had gone to the Wayland Fountain, Jarrell said.

En route to the restaurant, Jarrell passed the sister driving the 1985 Oldsmobile, he said. He stopped the vehicle and took the 14-year-old into custody.

The juveniles' mother was scheduled to pick up the girls Wednesday night.

She urged young people to cross at these manned intersections.

Vote samples to be taken

A mock election on the November 5 general election ballot will begin today, Friday, at an Allen market and will continue through next Wednesday.

The vote, which is not binding, will be held at A.J.'s Market (formerly the Allen Midnight Market), which is operated by Howard and Alma Patrick.

The ballot used in the mock election will be similar to those which will appear on voting machines on November 5. Votes will be counted by County Court Clerk Carla Robinson Boyd and the results will be published in the Friday, November 1 edition of *The Floyd County Times*.

The mock election marks the sixth time a pre-election sampling has been conducted in Floyd County but the first time when a governor's race was on the ballot.

Voters must register before casting their ballots, may vote only once, and only persons aged 18 or older may participate.

The mock election is sponsored by County Clerk Carla Robinson Boyd, Statewide Press and *The Floyd County Times*.

Bradbury to take post

A Prestonsburg man was elected vice chairman of the Kentucky Coal Association October 18, at the group's annual meeting in Lexington.

Raymond Bradbury, former president of Martin County Coal Corporation, also accepted a position as chairman of the board for Martin County Coal, a subsidiary of A.T. Massey Coal Company.

"Raymond Bradbury has been a pioneer in Kentucky's coal industry since 1956 and will be able to share the wealth of his experience with the Kentucky Coal Association," said E. Morgan Massey, chairman of A.T. Massey Coal Company.

In addition to his responsibilities as chairman of Martin County Coal and his duties as vice chairman, Bradbury will maintain his position as safety coordinator for Massey Coal.

Road plans move ahead

A major highway bill containing several key road and bridge initiatives sought by U.S. Representative Chris Perkins passed by the U.S. House of Representatives Wednesday night.

The Intermodal Surface Transportation Infrastructure Act of 1991 (HR 2950), as the bill is known, would authorize \$151 billion over the next six years for highway and mass transit construction in the United States. The measure passed the House 342 to 83, more than enough votes to override a presidential veto.

The bill would be an economic and transportation boon for Eastern Kentucky, authorizing a new east-west coast-to-coast highway that would run through Kentucky, a new interstate running along the Big Sandy River, \$79 million to widen a dangerous stretch of road around Coeburn Mountain in northeastern Pike County, and \$18.3 million to construct a new bridge spanning the Ohio River between Maysville and Aberdeen, Ohio, Perkins said.

The House bill, however, is not the only highway plan being discussed. The Senate has its own bill, which eliminates all of Perkins' projects.

Building a future

David students have a brighter future thanks to a pond and nature areas near the school provided by the Soil Conservation District. Students will be able to view science and nature in action.

David School ponders a better education

Construction of a new pond at David, which has been underway since September, was completed earlier this month. The pond will serve as an outdoor classroom for the David School and will be developed as a nature area and recreational facility.

Nature trails, picnic tables, and bird houses will be located near the pond which is situated behind the site of the future David School. The pond will encourage stream, woodland, water and vegetation study.

The pond will also provide a second source of water for fire protection when the new David School is constructed. A water line was installed in the dam during construction and connected to a fire hydrant, acquired with the help of Floyd

County Judge Executive John M. Stumbo, so that water could be readily pumped from the pond in case of emergencies.

The idea for the pond began early in the spring when Jeff Brown, district conservationist, realized the potential for the pond and surrounding area. Coordinating with the David School, Brown exchanged ideas with

members of the school's staff regarding the development of the pond.

The Soil Conservation District provided funding for the construction and the project got underway in September. Equipment problems and heavy rains delayed the construction of the pond. It will be filled in March providing the weather cooperates. The surrounding area will also be developed over the next few years by students of the David School.

The project will also benefit the county. Currently, the Soil Conservation District is looking into the possibility of hooking fire hydrants up to other ponds to benefit the buildings and homes throughout the Big Sandy Region.

Tackett's office on May 14 to take a child who was thought to have attempted suicide, according to court testimony Tuesday.

Tackett testified Wednesday that he did not see the child when the incident occurred and had no knowledge that the student had attempted suicide.

"I didn't know why she had (dragged) that child through the administrative office," Tackett said.

"And you didn't try to learn why?" asked Dan Rowland, assistant county attorney.

"No, I didn't," Tackett answered. Guidance counselor Jane Meek, testifying for the defense, said the student was upset over the incident between Tackett and Hammonds. Meek said she also felt the child was embarrassed because an adult had thought she had attempted suicide.

"The student had three or four scratches on her arm near the wrist area," Meek said. "She told me she had cut herself peeling potatoes."

Meek said a rift had developed between Tackett and Hammonds

because Hammonds had been more actively involved in the strike than other teachers.

Meek, who Rowland described in closing arguments as a witness with selective amnesia, said she did not recall all of the exchange between Hammonds and Tackett. She described Tackett's voice as being moderately loud, but said he was not screaming.

Meek said emotions had run high at the school during the last school year because of the teachers' strike and an "ongoing dispute between teachers and administrators."

In closing arguments, McCann asked the jury not to penalize a "good man" because of the incident.

"Someone entered his private office and put that on his desk," McCann said. "That's like going into your house. Don't put a blemish on this man's record who has been in this system for 27 years."

McCann pointed out that the other witnesses involved in the situation did not bring charges against Tackett and they were employed this school

year at the middle school.

Rowland countered by saying that Hammonds was transferred to Martin Elementary because of the incident and the witnesses that didn't bring charges were re-employed at the school.

"Gwen Hammonds had brought a child to the office that needed immediate attention," Rowland said. "What she got was an awful lot of hostility. Mr. Tackett didn't know what the child was there for and he didn't care. He only wanted to take off on anybody he saw until he got himself satisfied."

Superintendent Ron Hager was not called as a witness in the case. He

was summoned as a witness Tuesday, but did not return to the trial Wednesday.

Osborne said that her history class will have an assignment to find former World War II vets in the area and interview them. The group will wear red, white and blue T-shirts furnished by the school's academic boosters. Around 30 students will be making the trip to Lexington from Wheelwright.

"I definitely will be taking a video camera along with me," stated Osborne. "We want to capture the ceremonies on tape and we hope to take a lot of pictures."

The "Remember Pearl Harbor" committee sent Osborne and her class a video of scenes of the actual bombing of Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941.

"I just wanted our kids to hear President (Franklin D.) Roosevelt's speech and where he said that it was a 'day that will live in infamy.'"

Osborne said the committee told her that her group could take as much time as they needed but emphasized that their part in the program would last approximately 30 minutes.

Activities will begin at 9 a.m. with a special memorial ceremony beginning at 12:55 p.m. honoring all those killed in action December 7, 1941. A

reception will follow at 6 p.m. and a banquet at 7 p.m.

Patriotic music will be provided by the Breathitt County High School band and the U.S. Army band from Fort Knox.

Officers from national veterans organizations will also take part in the ceremonies. Admiral James H. Finney, assistant to the chief of naval operations and a native of Auburn, Kentucky is the featured speaker at the evening activities.

There is no charge for the day's events and banquet tickets can be purchased at the door or by writing. Ticket Chairman, Pearl Harbor Commemorative Association, P.O. Box 12315, Lexington, KY 40582-2315.

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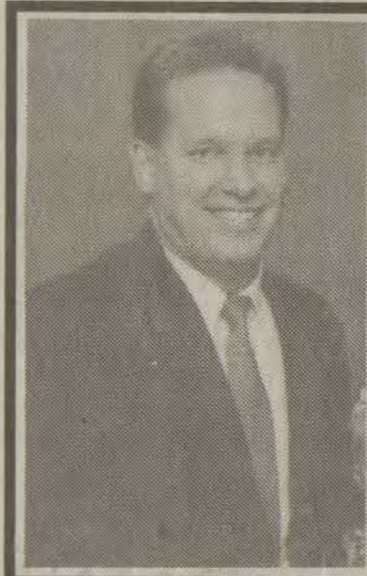

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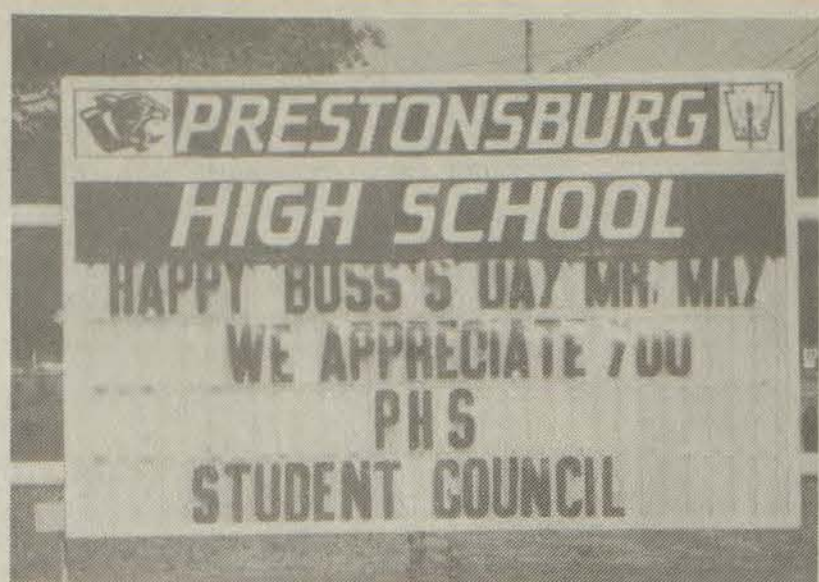
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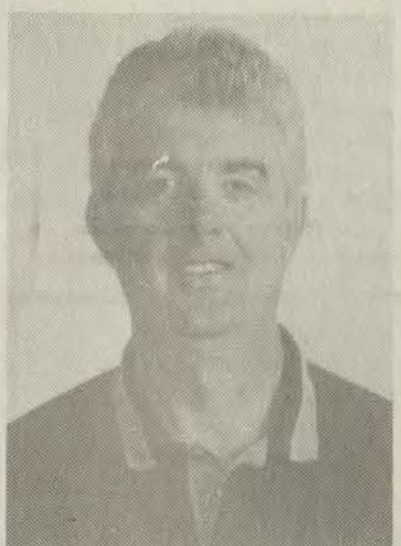
Boss's Day

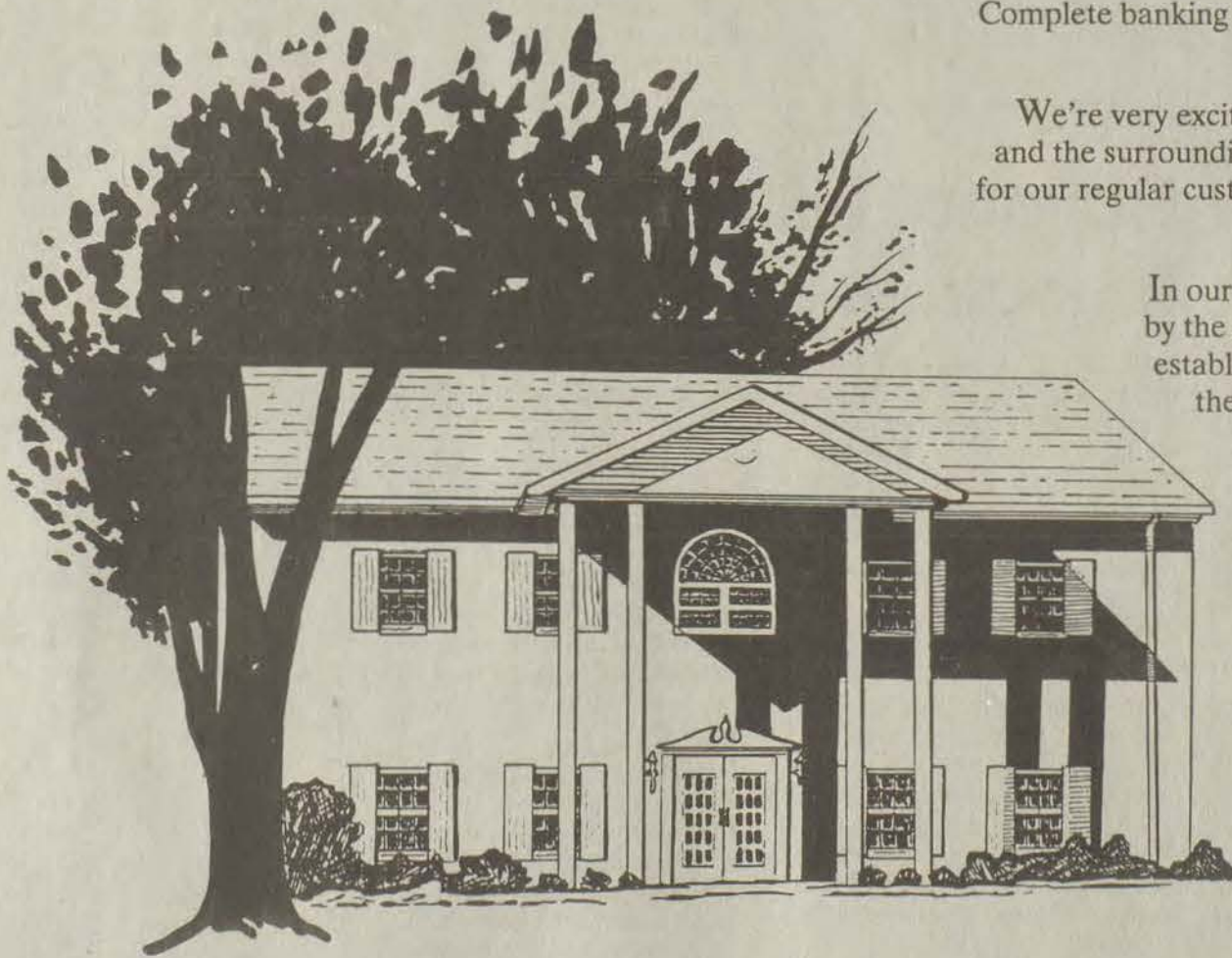

HARVEST THE 'MOTOR VOTER' BILL THIS FALL

Sometime this fall, the U.S. Senate should take another run at passing the National Voter Registration Act, sponsored by Ky. Senator Wendell Ford, affectionately known in good-government circles as the "motor voter" bill. An effort to bring the bill to a vote failed in July, but the supporters deserve another chance from the Senate leadership.

Motor voter needs to survive two Senate votes. The first is to cut off debate, which requires 60 affirmative votes. The second is to actually pass the bill. The effort in July to end debate fell just one vote short of success, and supporters of the legislation are determined to try again. Unfortunately, motor voter isn't high on the Senate leadership's list of priorities for passage before adjournment later this fall.

Motor voter would require states to offer voter registration by mail, at the time of driver's license renewal and at a wide range of federal and state government offices. The law would exempt Minnesota, which already offers motor voter registration.

That points up a major argument against motor voter: States traditionally have controlled voter registration and can enact their own versions of motor voter if they wish. Federal

motor voter legislation is unnecessary and a meddlesome usurpation of state authority.

Supporters of the federal bill argues that states had decades to reform their voter registration procedures and have failed to do it. In some states, registration procedures are so cumbersome they appear deliberately constructed to keep people away from the polls. Moreover, state-by-state variations have become a severe impediment to voter participation as Americans have grown more mobile. It's time, supporters argue, to make voting as easy as possible by imposing uniform requirements in all 50 states.

Registration hurdles are not the only, or even the major reason Americans stay away from the polls. Enacting motor voter won't cure the nation's political ills. But it would eliminate unnecessary impediments that keep some Americans from voting regularly.

In recent years, a number of states have enacted motor voter legislation, and in most, the percent of voters

registering and voting increased significantly. The Senate can extend that favorable trend nationwide by acting soon to pass the motor voter bill. (Reprinted from The Minneapolis Star Tribune).

National Bill of Rights Tour arrives in Kentucky

October 21, 1991—Ten tractor trailers, four vans, three Jeeps, two buses and a secure transport vehicle roll into Louisville next week from Chicago, Illinois, escorting a priceless cargo—an original, scribed copy of the Bill of Rights—which will be on display at the Commonwealth Convention Center as part of a 50-state tour presented by Philip Morris Companies Inc.

The exhibit, open to the public free of charge, features Virginia's original copy of the document, on loan from the Virginia State Library and Archives. The tour celebrates the 200th anniversary of the ratification of the Bill of Rights and will cover more than 26,000 miles over a

14-month period before the document is returned to its home in Richmond, Virginia.

"For the first time, the citizens of Kentucky have the opportunity to view this historic document in their home state," said Mary A. Taylor, director of special projects for Philip Morris Companies Inc. "The logistics of this enormous project have been overwhelming, taking more than 18 months of advance planning and arrangements."

The 15,000-square-foot exhibit, housed in a high-tech pavilion, presents a kaleidoscope of video images from Martin Luther King to Chief Justice Earl Warren, interspersed with other civil liberties issues falling under the protections guaranteed by the Bill of Rights. Film clips from classic movies, such as Mr. Smith Goes to Washington in which the principles of the Bill of Rights are eloquently and dramatically expressed, are presented on monitors throughout the exhibit. A musical fanfare heralds the arrival of the document itself and visitors stand within two feet of the parchment as it rises from beneath the floor.

The exhibit, designed to appeal to all age groups, will be on display from October 31 - November 3. Hours are:

October 31 - November 2: 10 a.m. - 8 p.m. November 3: 10 a.m. - 4 p.m. From Kentucky, the tour moves on to Milwaukee Wisconsin.

The Bill of Rights Tour is presented by Philip Morris Companies Inc., the world's largest producer of consumer-packaged goods. Its major domestic operating companies include Kraft General Foods, Miller Brewing Company and Philip Morris U.S.A.

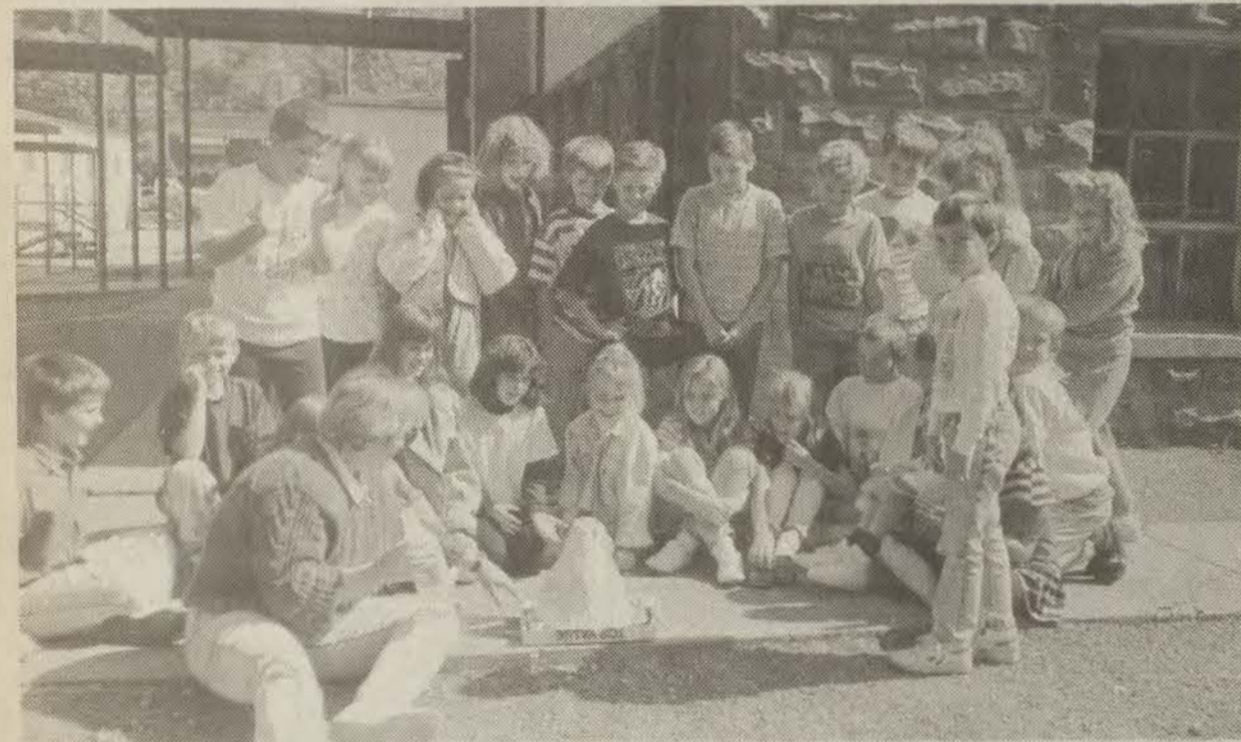


Employee of the Month

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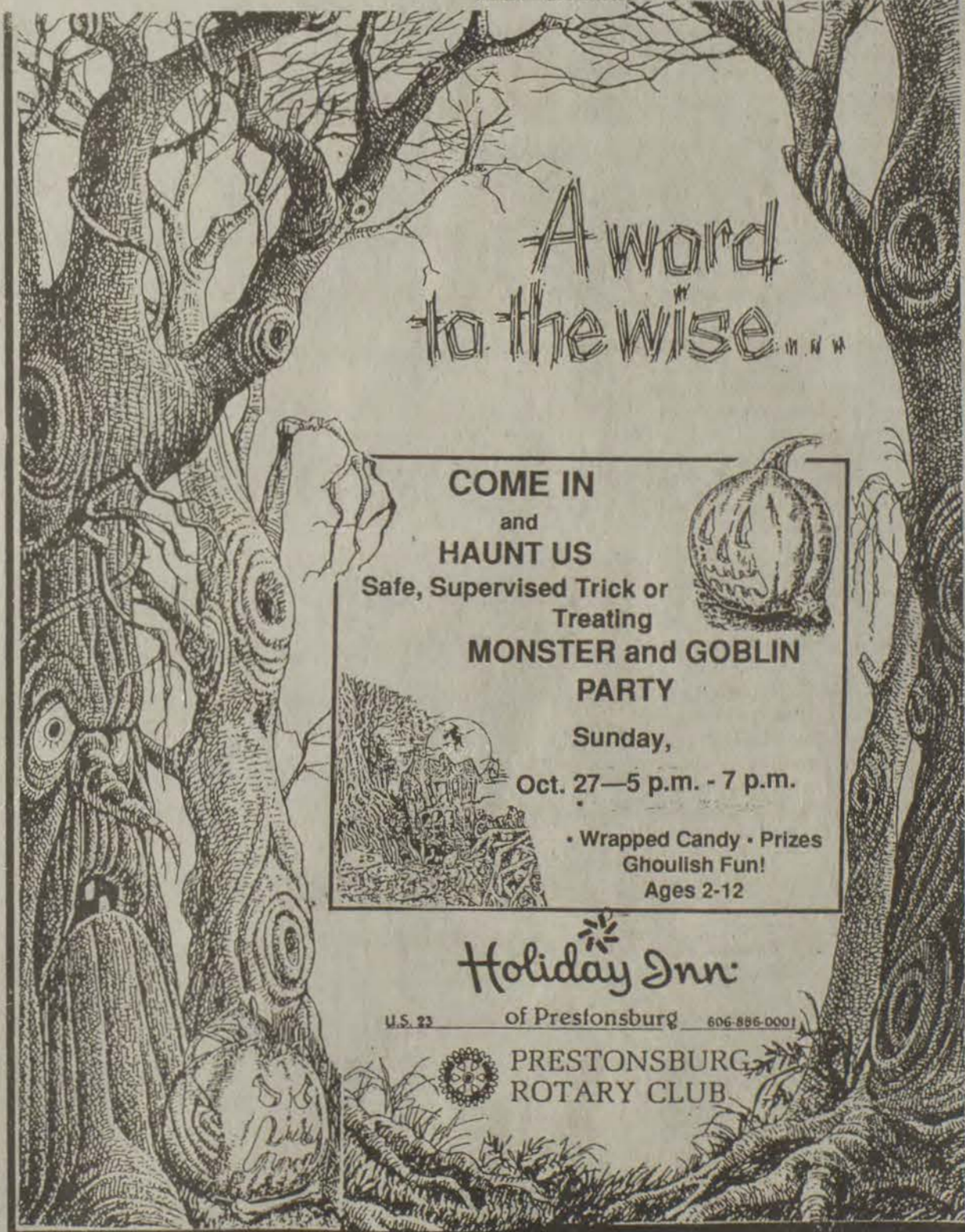

Take a look at films added to National Registry

For the third year, the National Film Registry of the Library of Congress has named 25 films to be preserved and stored. Based on the recommendations of educators, filmmakers, film historians and the general public, the Registry recognizes works that are "culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant." Here are two films so honored, both available on video.

I Am a Fugitive From a Chain Gang (1932)
Paul Muni delivers a powerhouse performance in this skillful adaptation of Robert E. Burns' autobiographical book. Muni is a World War I vet who finds himself the unwitting accomplice in a petty crime. Caught by the local police, he is sent to a

brutal work camp in rural Georgia, where he is beaten and humiliated by sadistic guards. Eventually, he escapes, only to be discovered and forced to become a fugitive.

Frankenstein (1931)

Sixty years later, there's no denying the power this film has. Colin Clive's taut, neurotic performance as Henry Frankenstein energizes every scene he's in, and Dwight Frye's portrayal of his hunchbacked assistant is similarly effective. The picture belongs, however, to Boris Karloff and his eloquent, childlike performance as the monster. (Look for the restored version, featuring the drowning scene that was edited out for many years.)

Bobcats "Hit Hard" But Falters In Second Half

It was the best defensive first half the Betsy Layne Bobcats have played all season. They came out in the first half against the Elkhorn City Cougars and were awesome on defense, giving the Cougars running and passing game problems. Jamie Kidd led the Bobcats defense as pads met pads on the gridiron.

However, the intensity that the Bobcats displayed on the defensive side of the line in the first half must have been left in the locker room for the second half because it was a different team that faced the Cougars on defense at the start of the second half.

The Cougars took the second half kickoff on their own 39 yard line and, 12 plays later, Cougar quarterback Kevin Rose raced in from 4 yards out for the game's first touchdown. Joe Leathers added the extra point to give the Cougars a 7-0 lead.

It didn't take long for Elkhorn City to put six more points on the board when, on a second-and-ten play, Joe Williams stepped in front of Jamie Kidd and intercepted an Adam Roberts' pass and returned the football 75 yards for the touchdown to put the Cougars up 13-0.

Elkhorn scored again with 1:03 left in the third period on a screen pass from Rose to tailback Eddie Morton. Morton raced 75 yards for the touchdown as he escaped two would-be tacklers and found an opening in the Bobcat line.

The final TD came on yet another turnover for the Bobcats as Chester Stiltner came up with his third interception of the game and jaunted — that's right — another 75 yards for the score to give the final margin of 26-0.

It was the first half play of the Bobcats that showed signs of coming around to challenge the Cougars.

Morton was thrown for losses on three different carries. He had one no-gainer. Rose was sacked twice by the defensive line of Betsy Layne in the first half. Betsy Layne's defense picked off two Rose passes with Clyde Bush gathering one and Bryan Bowling intercepting the other.

Betsy Layne was coming off the ball very quickly and showed a lot of determination in the first half. It was the offense for the Bobcats that got bogged down failing to move the football on the ground. The Bobcats also were without starting quarterback, junior Bryan Combs, who had to set out the Elkhorn game after suffering a bruised back in the Morgan County game. Adam Roberts replaced the injured Combs at the signal calling position and called a good game despite having three passes intercepted.

"Bryan should be able to go in the Napier game," stated Bobcat coach Gerald Newsome. "Our defense was spending too much time on the field."

In the first quarter Elkhorn got inside the Bobcats' 20 yard line only to have the Cats stall out the drive. Again, late in the second quarter Elkhorn moved deep into Betsy Layne territory only to give the football up to the Bobcats on downs as the Cats defense held their ground.

Just before the first half ended, the Cougars were knocking on the door again as they were once again inside the Betsy Layne 20 yard line. However, on fourth and 15 play, and a running clock, the Cougars attempted a field goal that wide to the right as the first half ended in scoreless duel.

Where Elkhorn had the chances to score in the first half, Betsy Layne had good field position only once in the half with the ball on the Elkhorn City 34 yard line. The drive was

stopped and Elkhorn took over on downs.

On the offensive side of the ball for Betsy Layne, they managed only 57 yards rushing on 28 carries. James Keathley picked up 36 of those yards on 12 attempts. Roberts had two completions — both to Hammonds — for 24 yards passing. Betsy Layne was penalized 55 yards on seven flags and had four turnovers. They fumbled the football twice, losing it once. Kidd had two kick off returns of 13 and 20 yards. Chad Wilson returned the ball once for 17 yards and Bowling had a return of 13 yards.

Elkhorn had a total offense of 276 yards on 196 rushing and 80 passing. Morris picked up 107 yards on 21 carries while Williams rushed for 54 yards on seven attempts.

Rose had two completions for 80 yards passing with Morris catching both tosses for 80 yards receiving.

Elkhorn City was penalized heavily in the game with 115 yards on 13 calls. The Cougars lost the ball on two interceptions. They recovered their only fumble. Leathers kicked two extra points for Elkhorn.

Betsy Layne will travel to M.C. Napier tonight as they face the Navajo's in a district match up.

"When we played Adams in the Right Beaver Classic, I don't think they took one outside shot against us," said Patton. "They shot mostly lay ups against us."

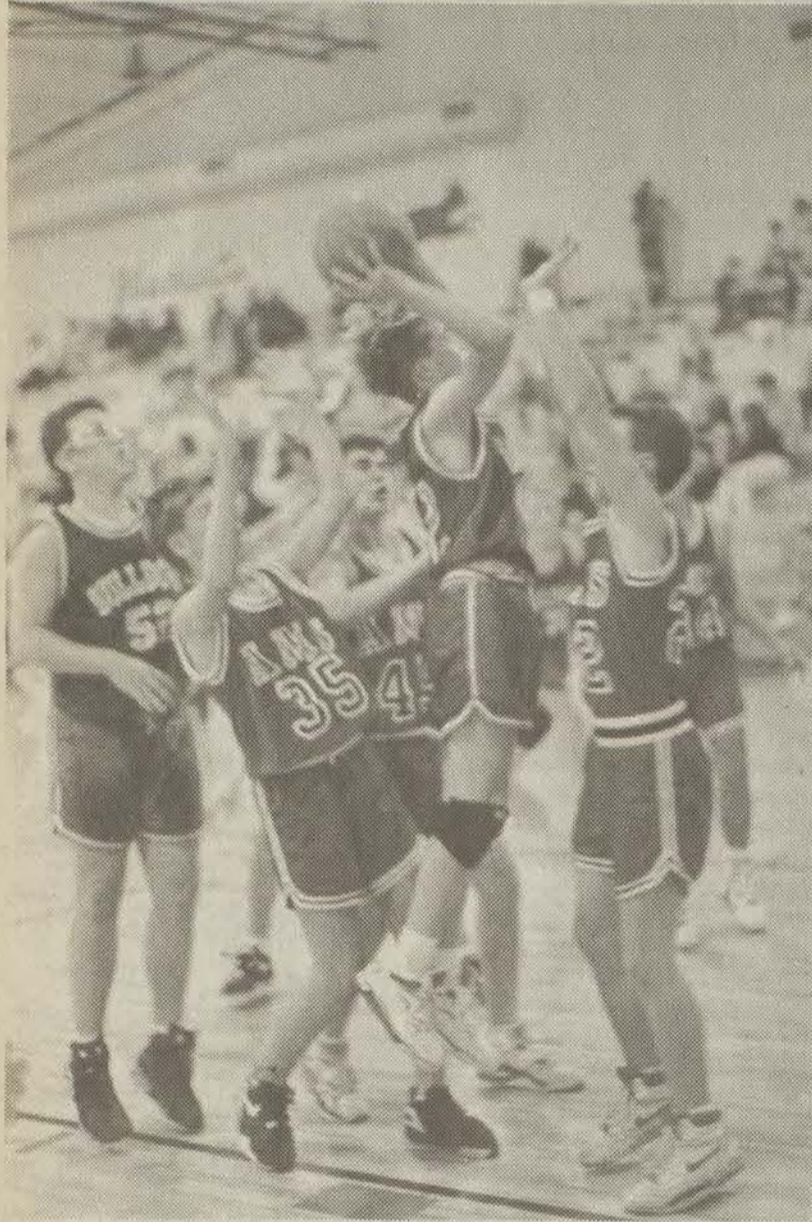
Duff went to the 2-3 zone in hopes of forcing Adams to shoot from the outside. The defense was working

Duff looked better on defense in the second half pulling to within six points 19-13, but an 8-1 run by Adams gave the Blackcats a 29-14 third quarter lead.

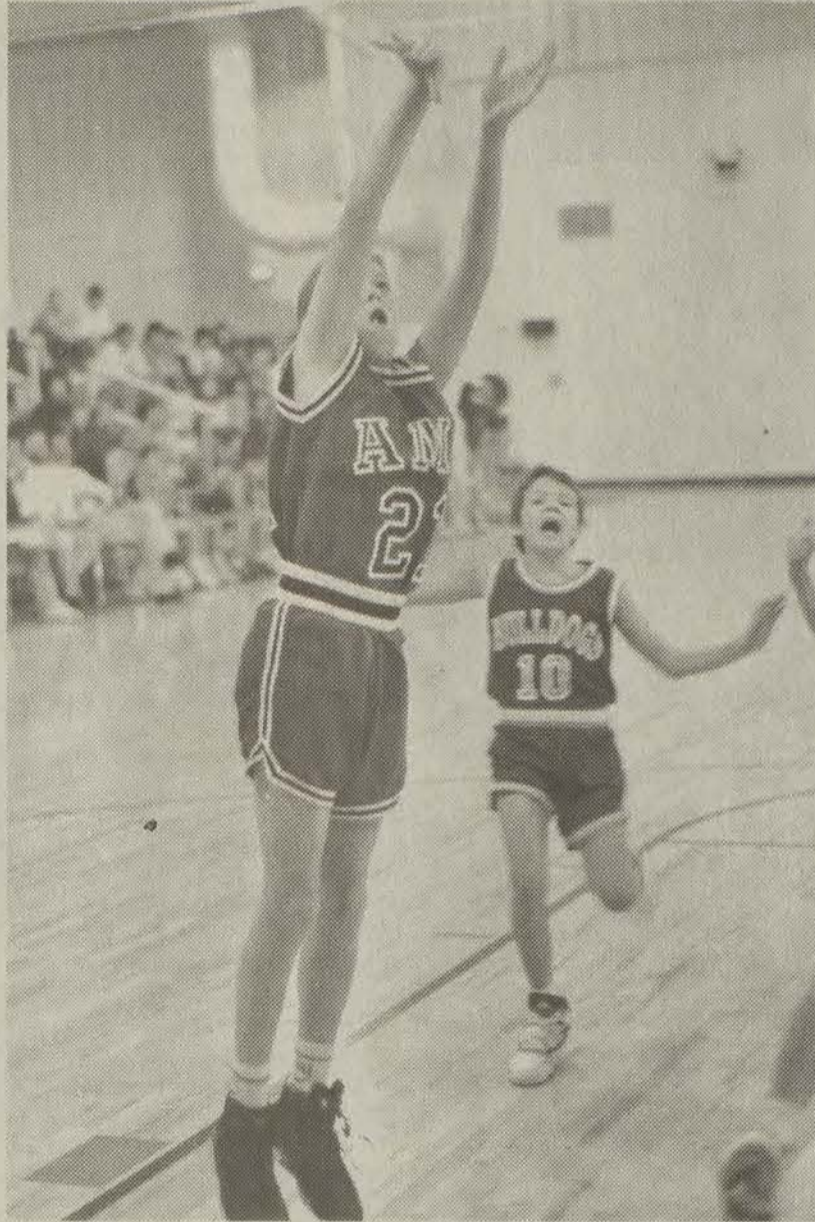

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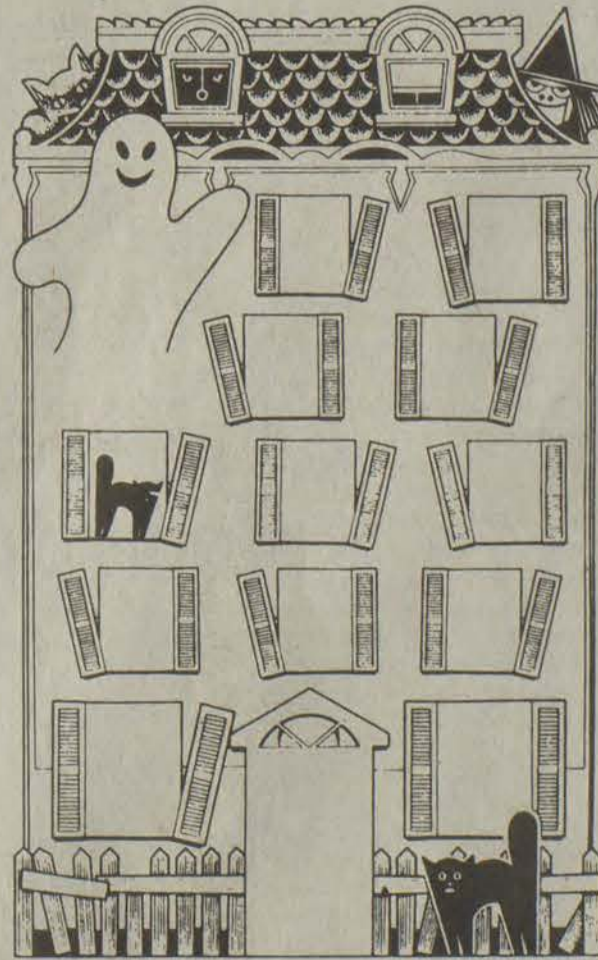

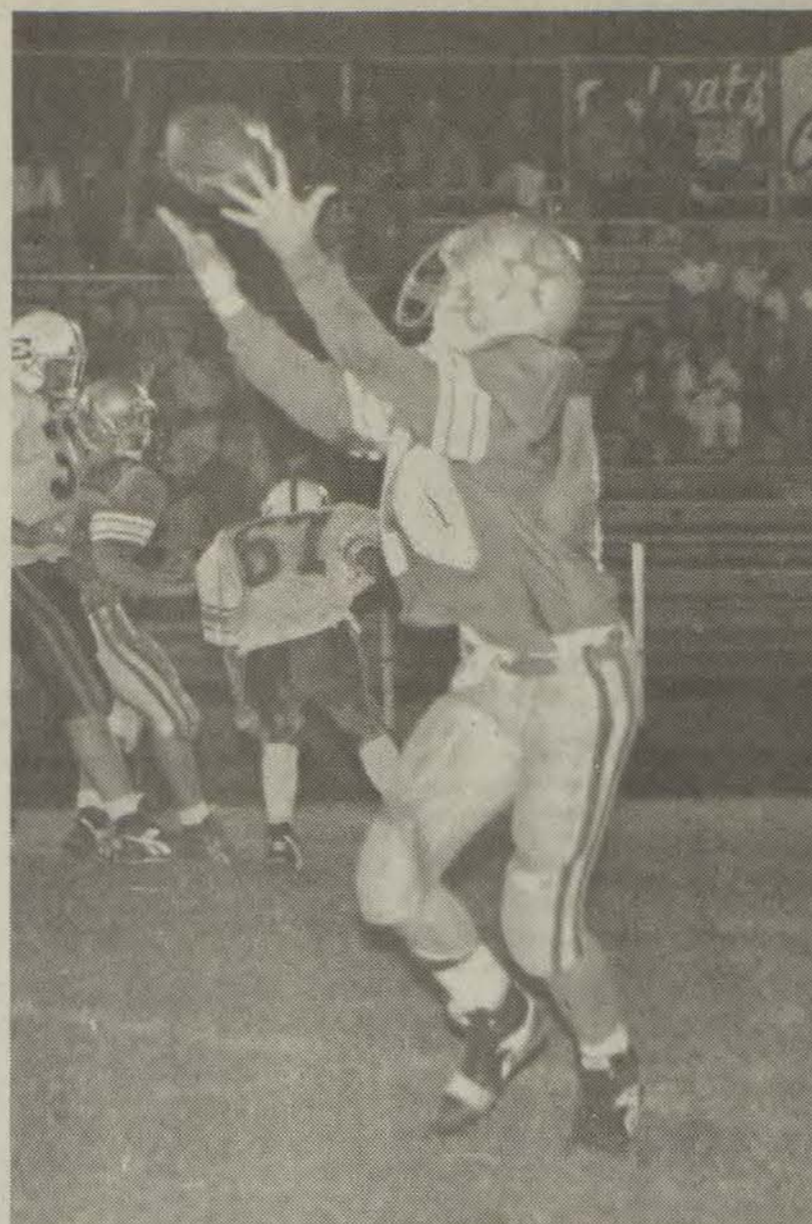

"Feix Field" Dedication Set For October 26

Western Kentucky University will formally dedicate its football field at L.T. Smith Stadium in honor of Jimmy Feix Saturday, October 26. The "Feix Field" ceremonies will occur at halftime of the Hilltoppers' home game with nationally ranked Northern Iowa, which is set to kick-off at 7 p.m. The University's Board of Regents named the field for Feix at its July 29 meeting. Feix has been a part of the athletic scene at Western Kentucky almost continuously since he came to the Hill as a freshman from Henderson in 1949. Since that time he has served Western as a student-athlete (1949-52), an assistant football coach (1957-67), head football coach (1968-83), assistant alumni

director (1983-85), director of alumni affairs (1985-86) and director of athletics (1986-91). He retired as athletics director June 30. The first Hilltopper ever to earn football All-America honors (quarterback, 1952), Feix is also the winningest gridiron coach ever on the Hill. The 16 Topper teams he guided as head coach won 106 games (almost double the second best total on that coaches' list). His teams claimed six conference championships and two NCAA national runner-up trophies. And, he coached

WKU 16 All-Americans who helped his teams post an overall record of 106-56-6, a very impressive 64.9 winning percentage.

For Betsy Layne, Rodney Hamilton tallied four points as did Edmund Yates.

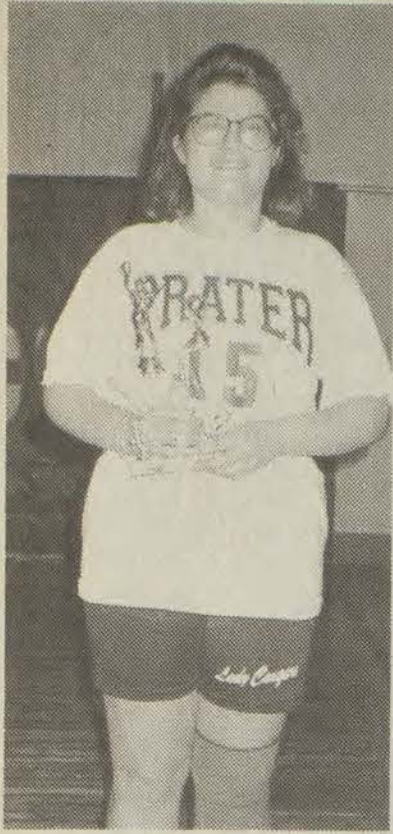
Betsy Layne hit on nine of 17 free throws while Auxier connected on 10 of 16.

Second quarter coldness hurt the young Hornets as Betsy Layne outscored them 17-8 in the period.

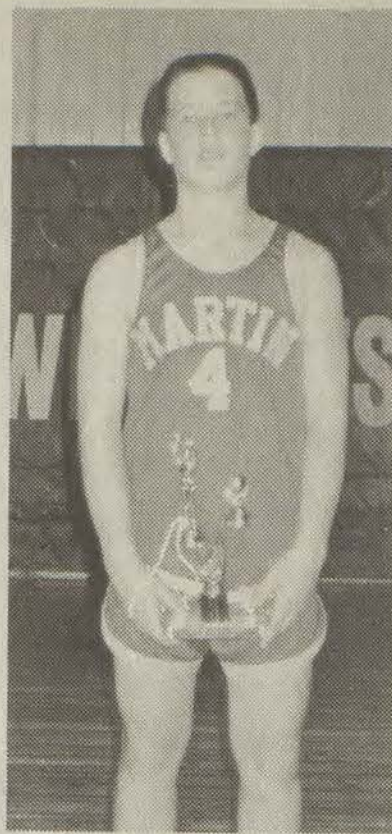

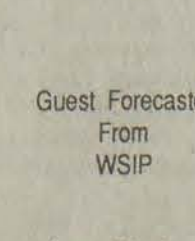

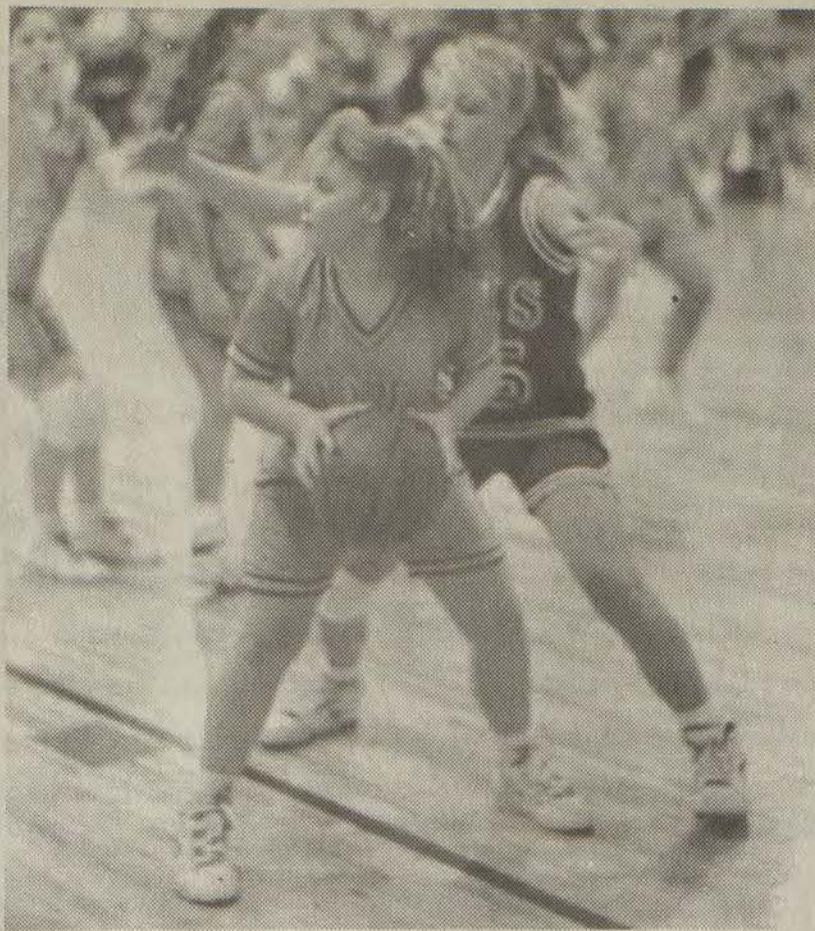

AN ORDINANCE IMPOSING A LICENSE FEE UPON INSURANCE COMPANIES FOR THE PRIVILEGE OF ENGAGING IN THE BUSINESS OF INSURANCE WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF ALLEN FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR 1992, AND THEREAFTER ON A CALENDAR YEAR BASIS; ESTABLISHING INSURANCE COMPANY LICENSE FEE RATES AS 6% OF THE FIRST YEAR PREMIUMS FOR LIFE INSURANCE, AND 6% OF THE PREMIUMS FOR ALL OTHER TYPES OF INSURANCE ACTUALLY COLLECTED WITHIN EACH CALENDAR QUARTER DURING THE CALENDAR YEAR 1992, AND THEREAFTER UNTIL AMENDED; ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE OF JANUARY 1 AND A DELINQUENCY DATE THIRTY (30) DAYS AFTER THE END OF EACH CALENDAR QUARTER; ESTABLISHING A PENALTY INTEREST CHARGE AT THE TAX INTEREST RATE AS DEFINED BY STATUTE; AND REQUIRING INSURANCE COMPANIES SUBJECT TO FURNISH ANNUAL COL-

LECTION INFORMATION. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF ALLEN:

SECTION 1: There is hereby imposed on each insurance company a license fee for the privilege of engaging in the business of insurance within the corporate limits of the City of Allen for the calendar year 1992, and thereafter on a calendar year basis.

SECTION 2: The license fee imposed upon each insurance company which issues life insurance policies on the lives of persons residing within the corporate limits of the City of Allen shall be 6% of the first year's premiums actually collected within each calendar quarter by reason of the issuance of such policies.

SECTION 3: The license fee imposed upon each insurance company which issues any insurance policy which is not a life insurance policy shall be 6% of the premiums actually collected within each calendar quarter by reason of the issuance of such policies on risks located within the corporate limits of the City of Allen on those classes of business which such company is authorized to transact, less all premiums returned to policy holders; however, any license fee or tax imposed upon premium receipts shall not include premiums received for insuring employees against liability for personal injuries to their employees, or death caused thereby, under the provisions of the Workers' Compensation Act and shall not include premiums received on policies of group health insurance provided for state employees under KRS 18A.225(2) and 18A.228.

SECTION 4: All license fees imposed by this ordinance shall be due no later than thirty (30) days after the end of each calendar quarter. License fees which are not paid on or before the due date shall bear interest at the tax interest rate as defined in KRS 131.010(6).

SECTION 5: Every insurance company subject to the license fees imposed by this ordinance shall annually, by March 31, furnish the City of Allen with a written breakdown of all collections in the preceding calendar year for the following categories of insurance; (a) casualty; (b) automobile; (c) inland marine; (d) fire and allied perils; (e) health; and (f) life.

SECTION 6: The proceeds of the insurance premium tax levied by this ordinance shall be paid to the city's General Fund and used to pay General Fund expenditures.

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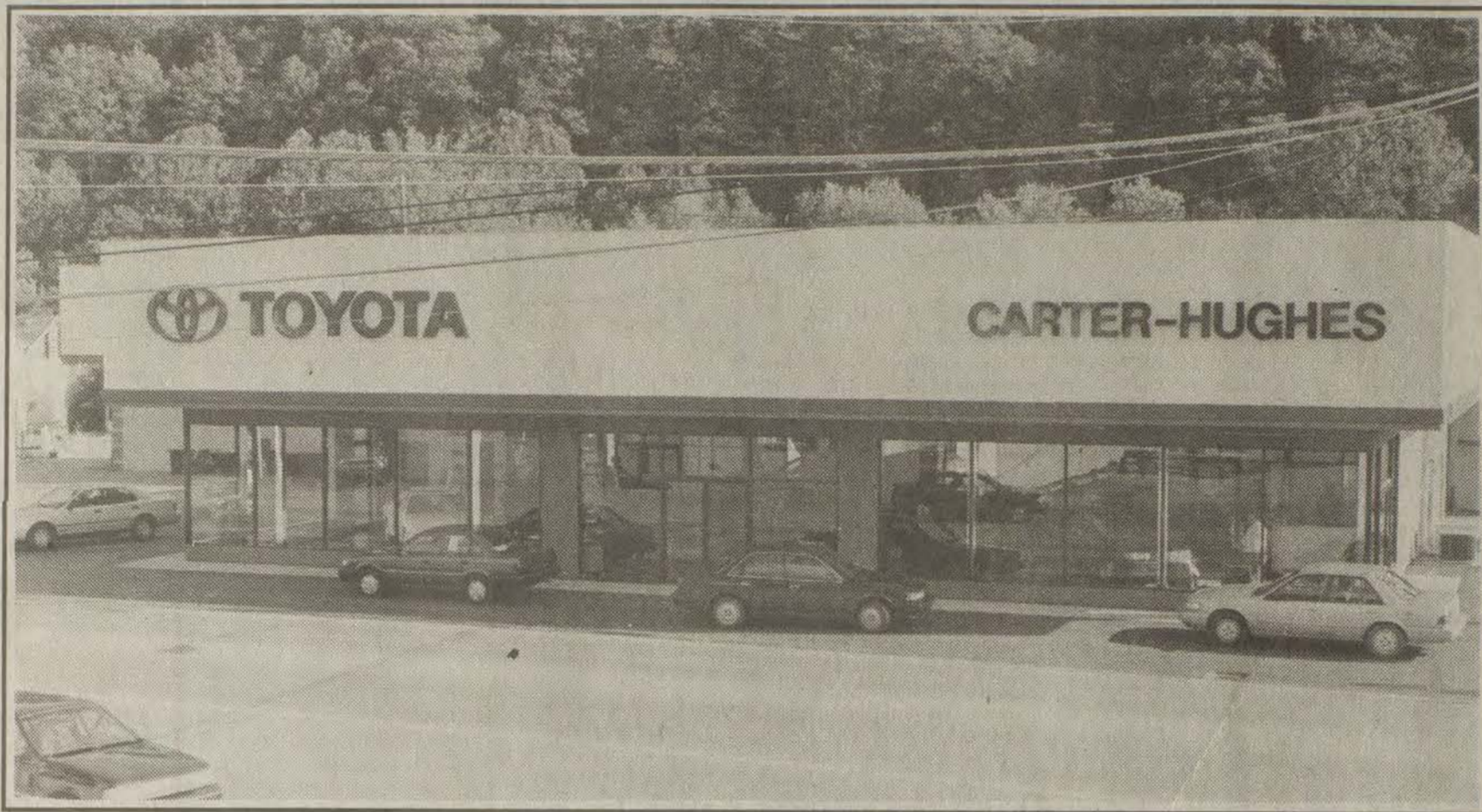
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
