No obligation to hire Towler, Boysen says :

Board still has right to choose

The Floyd County Board of Education is under no obligation to accept Education Commissioner Thomas Boysen's candidate for a new superintendent.

Commissioner Boysen sent a letter to board Chairman Ray "Shag" Campbell Tuesday saying Floyd

County's choice for a new superintendent is a "decision (that) belongs to the people of Floyd County."

In a June 23 letter, Boysen nixed the board's choice for superintendent, Nebraska educator William Zitterkopf, because, Boysen said, he lacked the experience necessary to takeover Floyd County's School System. Boysen recommended that the board interview Hardin County

superintendent Steve Towler. Towler announced in January that he was resigning from that position for undisclosed reasons.

Towler reportedly had "personal problems" and some members of the Hardin County board felt it affected his leadership ability in that district.

A public forum was held at Allen Elementary Tuesday night to give community members an opportunity

to ask Towler questions.

Boysen's letter Tuesday was in response to a press release from the Floyd County Education Association (FCEA) which said the board should be considering at least three other candidates chosen by a search committee in May.

The FCEA release also said the

Off-duty policeman killed while cycling

A Kentucky State Police sergeant stationed at the Pikeville post died tragically Sunday afternoon after the bicycle he was riding was struck by a four-wheel drive vehicle on Route 3 near Inez.

Sgt. Larry Prater, 41, of Ivel, was riding his bicycle during off-duty hours with his friend Smith "Butch" Bradley, of Prestonsburg, when a Chevrolet Blazer driven by Daniel Ray Hopkins, 45, of Naoma, West Virginia, inadvertently struck him.

Prater was pronounced dead at the scene by Martin County Deputy Coroner Mitchell Preece.

Neither Bradley nor Hopkins were injured. Although no charges have been filed, the accident is still under investigation.

Prater grew up at David and graduated from Prestonsburg High School in 1969. From there, he attended Eastern Kentucky University in Richmond, from which he graduated in 1972 with a degree in Police Administration. In recent years, he had sought further education at Ashland Community College, Morehead State University and Prestonsburg Community College.

He had also received training at the National Police Academy at Northwestern, Indiana.

Upon graduation from the Frankfort State Police Academy in 1973, Prater was assigned at the Pikeville Post, where he worked until 1980 when he was transferred to the Ashland Post.

In February, 1990, Prater was promoted to the rank of sergeant and was reassigned to the Pikeville post.

Although Prater maintained a small, temporary residence at Ivel, his permanent home was in Ashland with his family.

Prater is survived by his wife, Estie Brown Prater and their 18 year old son Justin, who both currently reside in Ashland, and his parents Harmon and Catherine Prater, of David.

Funeral services for Prater will be today, Wednesday, at the Carter Funeral Home chapel. Reverend Vernon Slone will officiate. Burial will be at the Davidson Memorial Gardens at Ivel.

Coroner's nephew drowns after jump from bridge

The nephew of Floyd County Coroner Roger Nelson apparently drowned Monday at Carr Fork Lake in Knott County after he and a friend dived off a hundred-foot bridge.

The body of 23-year-old Dennis Ray Fletcher was recovered Tuesday morning in approximately 60 feet of water by the Knott County Rescue Squad, Knott County Coroner Ken Gayheart said Tuesday.

Fletcher, of Wyandotte, Michigan, and Jim Pierce of Lincoln, Michigan, jumped off the Arshman Creek Bridge at the marina at approximately

5:30 p.m. Monday. Pierce surfaced just after jumping and attempted to find Fletcher after he failed to surface. Gayheart said Fletcher apparently drowned after the "hard fall" from the bridge.

Gayheart said the search was called off Monday night because of a severe storm that had moved into the area. The search resumed at 8 a.m. Tuesday.

Deputy Coroner Chester Watts said Tuesday that the two men had been attending a family reunion in Leitcher County over the weekend.

The coroner's office did not order

Police tight-lipped on robbery investigation :

Suspect might be linked to W.Va. heist

City police and federal authorities may be closing in on the identity of the suspect who robbed the North Lake Drive branch of Bank Josephine Friday, but they have declined comment on reports the suspect may be linked to another holdup.

A description of the suspect sought in the June 26 robbery at Bank Josephine reportedly resembles that of a suspect who on June 9 robbed a branch of Huntington Federal Savings and Loan Association at Westmoreland in Wayne County, West Virginia.

The method used by the suspect in the West Virginia robbery was also similar to that used in the Prestonsburg holdup.

According to reports from Huntington, a white male, approximately six feet tall entered the Westmoreland branch and handed a teller a note which read: "This is a robbery. I have a gun. Give me your money." The robber fled with an undisclosed amount of cash and took the robbery note with him. The robbery occurred at 11:27 a.m.

In the Prestonsburg heist, a man of similar description presented a note to a teller, demanding money. Police have not disclosed the contents of the note or the amount of money taken

from the bank.

No weapon was seen by victims of either robbery.

The suspect was photographed by bank security cameras in both holdups.

The Prestonsburg robbery occurred at 2:30 Friday, June 26. The suspect was described as being a white male, approximately five feet, ten inches tall and weighing about 175 pounds. The suspect left the bank on foot, reportedly fleeing the scene in a late model blue or green car which had been parked at SuperAmerica.

The Bank Josephine robbery is under investigation by the Prestonsburg City Police, the Kentucky State Police and the FBI.

Auxier home is destroyed in Friday blaze

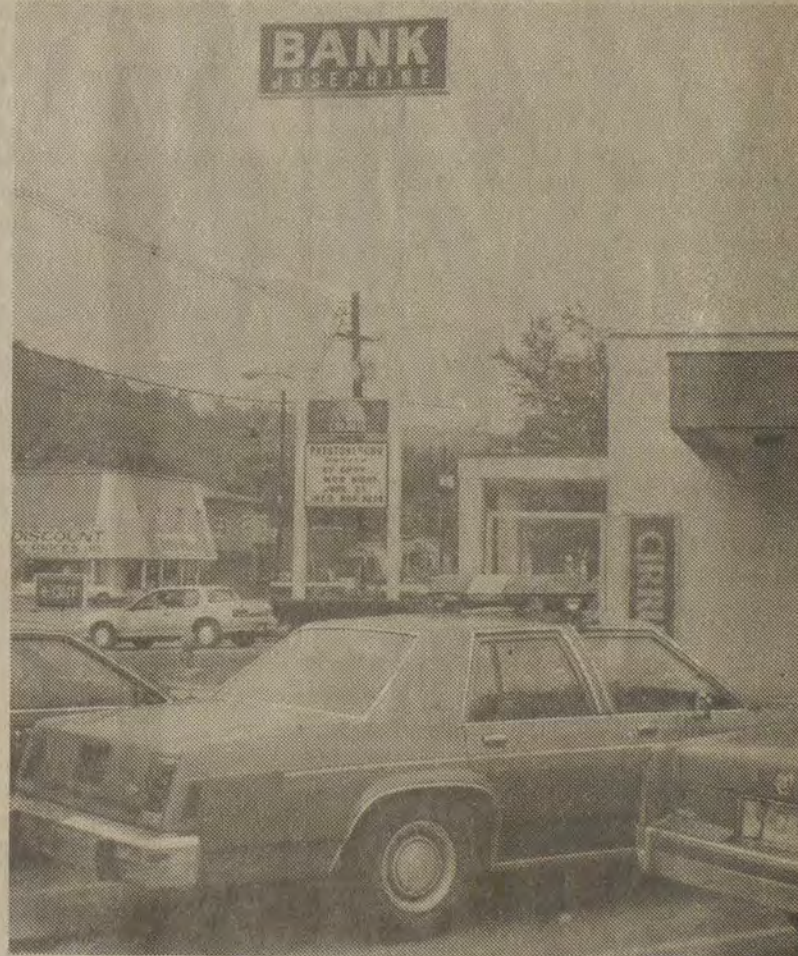
Firefighters from both the Auxier and Prestonsburg fire departments combated a fire at the home of Cecil Jarrell Friday morning and quickly extinguished the blaze.

Mike Wells of the Prestonsburg Fire Department said Friday that an anonymous caller informed the Auxier Volunteer Fire Department that Jarrell's home was engulfed in flames at around 11:27 a.m.

Auxier units quickly responded, but called the Prestonsburg department for further assistance.

Members of the Floyd County Sheriff's office also responded, but were unnecessarily delayed by motorists who refused to yield to emergency vehicles.

Preliminary investigations reveal that the fire started in one of the bedrooms, and was presumably caused by electrical malfunction. Officers of the Pikeville post of the Kentucky State Police are currently investigating the incident.

Disabled brother and sister left homeless :

Condemnation ends eviction fight

Willis Craft moved his wife, Imalene, and two small children, Linda and Eugene, into the little white house on Burke Avenue in Prestonsburg seventeen years ago. Linda, now 25, and Gene, now 26, still live there. That is, they did until today.

Today, Wednesday, July 1, they're being evicted. Their landlord, Alex Howard, wants them to move. The courts have upheld his wishes.

"They can't force me to rent to them if I don't want to, can they?" Howard said.

The normal rigors of a relocation, forced or otherwise, are compounded because, due to a congenital spinal defect, Linda has been confined to a wheelchair virtually since the day she was born.

Gene is also temporarily disabled due to a 1991 auto accident that broke his hip, gave him whiplash and dislocated four disks in his spine.

Since their mother died last year and their father died in 1985, Gene

was left alone to help Linda cope with her physical disadvantages.

Gene says that Howard's efforts to have them evicted began when their older brother Clarence and his wife Brenda moved in with them to

help Linda and allow Gene time to attend physical therapy and search for a new job.

"We were already paying \$150 a

Floyd Sheriff's Dept. news

The Floyd County Sheriff's Department will be holding its annual D.A.R.E. and Kentucky Sheriff's Boys and Girls Ranch roadblock beginning Friday, July 3.

Checks will be delivered on July 3

from his position for allegedly allowing an ineligible player to play in a soccer game and for conduct unbecoming of a teacher. The newspaper reported that Towler had mentioned firing Phelan to the board in closed session before the decision was made, which "appears to be in conflict with the 1990 school reform act."

Under the law, a superintendent must inform the teacher he is being fired before notifying the board of his action.

After a three-day hearing, a tribunal ruled that Phelan upheld Towler's action.

OEA recommended no action against Towler as a result of the agency's investigation.

Thomas said that Scott has assisted other boards of education in superintendent searches and it was not unusual for a board to hire Scott for his services.

Towler was one of the 104 applicants who originally applied for the Floyd County position.

When asked why no other applicant's names from the 104 persons who applied for the job had been submitted to the board with Towler's, Thomas replied that perhaps there were no other qualified candidates and it was not unusual that Towler was the only candidate recommended to the board.

Thomas said he was not aware of any questions raised pertaining to Towler's performance as superintendent of the Hardin County system.

The News-Enterprise in Elizabethtown, reported last year that Towler's firing of a soccer coach and hiring of a football coach raised eyebrows in that system and prompted an investigation by the state's Office of Education Accountability (OEA).

Reports said that Towler had hired Joe Jagers, a football coach at Fort Knox, two months before he was hired as a teacher in that district, a violation under Kentucky's Education Reform Act.

OEA found that Towler did not follow proper procedures when he hired the coach when no teaching positions were open at that time, the newspaper reported. Towler responded that he may have violated the "literal interpretation of the law" but that it was no deliberate attempt to circumvent the law.

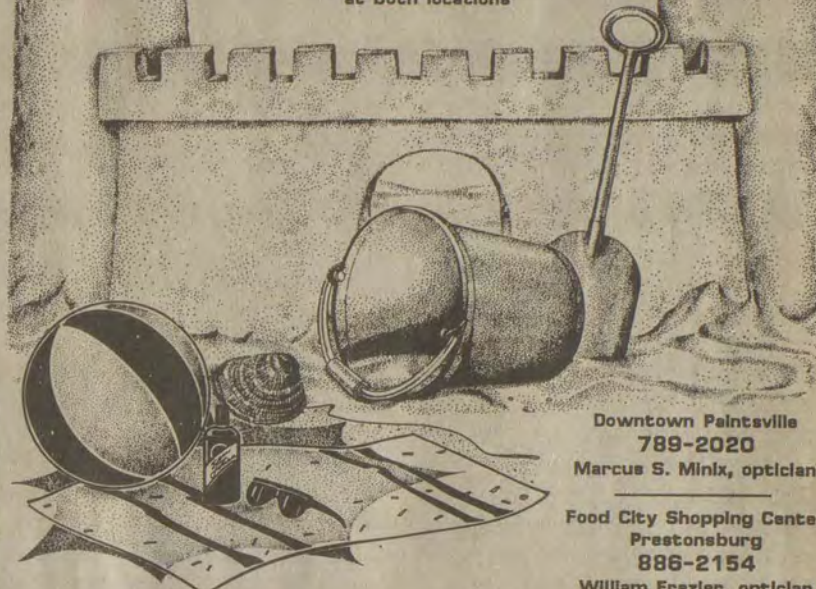

Freedom Friday declared

In order to convince more Kentuckians to participate in elections, Governor Breton Jones has proclaimed that Friday, July 3 will be designated "Freedom Friday."

The Freedom Friday project is the brainchild of the newly-formed Democracy Incorporated of Kentucky, a nonpartisan, nonprofit foundation that was created to promote voter education and registration and to improve voter participation. The program theme is "Freedom Makes It Possible, Voting Makes It Happen."

Although nearly two million Kentuckians are registered to vote, less than one million participate in elections on a regular basis. Another 800,000 Kentuckians are eligible to vote, but are unregistered.

According to Secretary of State Bob Babbage, "The day before the Fourth of July seems the most appropriate time of the year to focus on the rights and responsibilities of voting.... On July Fourth, our nation focuses its attention on independence and freedom more than any other time of the year."

Freedom Friday will include an MCI-sponsored toll-free voter registration line. Kentuckians can call 1-800-92K-VOTE and request that voter registration forms be mailed to their homes.

The State Board of Elections has also approved a voter registration mail-in form.

Democracy Incorporated is implementing these programs because many people have said they are not registered to vote because the current system for registration is often inconvenient.

Democracy Incorporated has asked organizations in each of Kentucky's 120 counties to work with the county clerk to conduct a special event to celebrate the day, and to request that area churches and public facilities ring their bells and sirens at noon on Freedom Friday.

State income tax checks should be in mailboxes in early July

State Treasury officials are gearing up to get long-awaited state income tax refund checks out early next month.

The Kentucky State Treasury Department is making emergency preparations to expedite refund checks once the State Finance and Administration Cabinet issues its authorization, expected to be July 1. Treasury employees will work overtime after normal working hours and during the 4th of July holiday weekend to process the checks so they can be forwarded to the Revenue Cabinet for mailing.

"We in the Treasury are concerned about the thousands of taxpayers who have been waiting weeks to get their refund checks," said Frances Jones Mills, State Treasurer. "Every effort will be made and every needed employee will work around the clock up

to and during the 4th of July weekend to get those checks out!"

Earlier this month the State Finance Cabinet announced that all remaining refund checks would be held for up to a month so the General Fund could be balanced on June 30, the end of the fiscal year.

The Treasury cannot write refund checks until an authorization is made from the Finance Cabinet. Once that approval is given checks are normally processed in 24 hours time. But because of the multitude of refunds checks due this time, it would take over 80 hours to process them.

With the extra effort from the Treasury Department, the Revenue Cabinet will be able to get the checks for mailing purposes much earlier. Working only normal scheduled hours would have delayed delivery to the Revenue Cabinet for up to two weeks for the final checks.

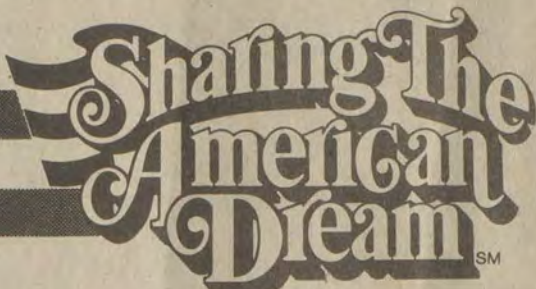

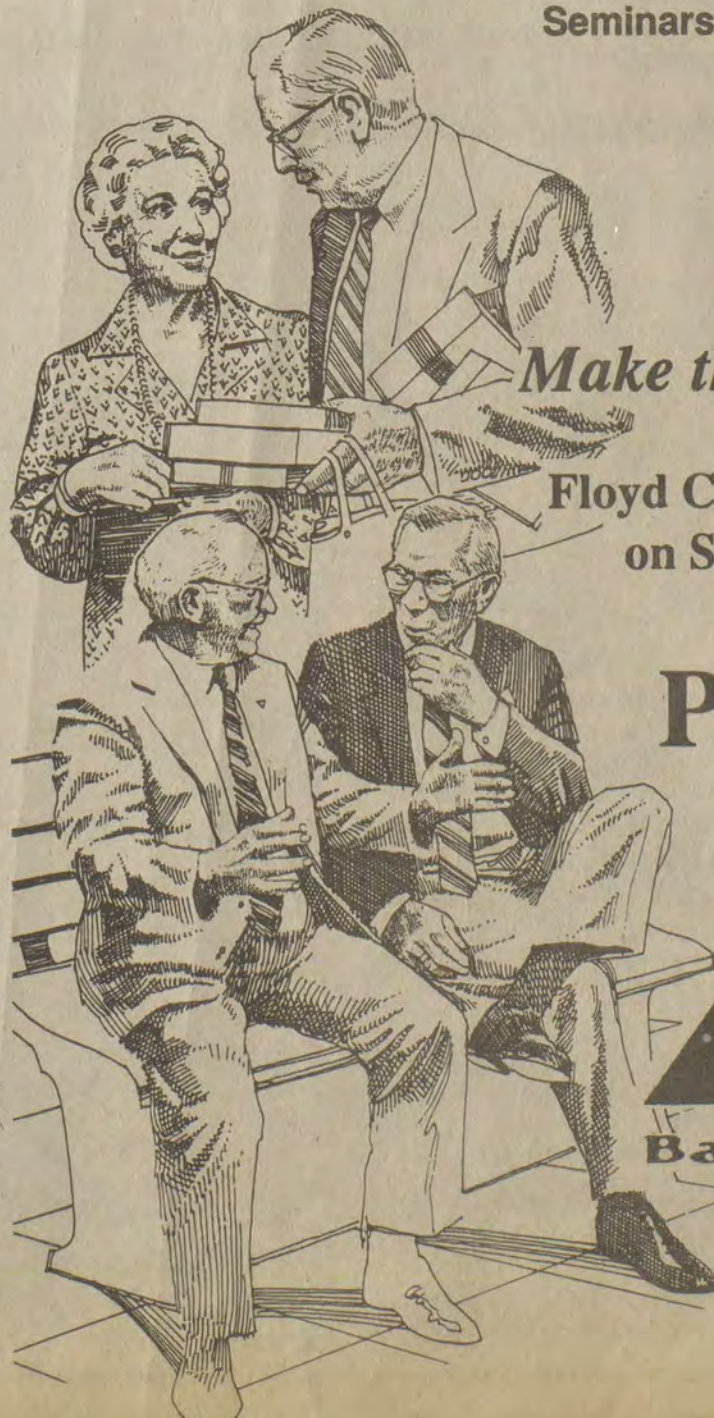

month," Gene said. "When Clarence and Brenda moved in, he wanted \$300."

Gene added that when he offered Howard the normal \$150, which was all they could afford, he refused it.

"I wouldn't mind paying that kind of money if the place was worth it," Gene said, "but we've tried to get him to fix the place for years and he won't do it.... The water heater was busted, but he wouldn't replace it. The Christian Appalachian project bought us a new one.... The toilet's broken, the wiring's bad all over the house."

In order to prove his claims, Gene asked the county fire marshal, Larry Adams, to inspect the house. Adams condemned it.

Since the Crafts were ordered to vacate the premises three weeks ago, they have been frantically searching for a new home. Unfortunately, their efforts to find one have been hampered by a lack of funds. Since Gene is out of work and his lawsuit against the party that caused his injuries remains unsettled, their only means of income is Linda's Social Security check and a meager monthly payment from the Veteran's Administration for their father's war efforts.

Clarence is also unable to work. Two years ago, while working for a construction company in Georgia, he fell 22 stories from the top of an uncompleted structure, breaking nearly every bone in his body.

"The only reason I lived through it at all is because the wooden support beams I broke through on the way down slowed my fall," Clarence said.

They have also been unable to gain residence at a low-income housing facility, due to the long waiting

list and brief amount of time to move.

They think they may have finally located a place to live, but they can't afford to buy a power box or a water pump. While electricity and working plumbing may seem only a modern convenience to most, they are necessities for Linda.

The Crafts will be staying with friends until they are able to obtain both lodging and electricity, but they don't want to impose too long.

"I don't know what we're going to do," Gene said. "I guess you might as well call us homeless. I never thought things would turn out like this.... all we want is a home."

It's that faceless number on the other side of the cathode tube that make up the real audience.

Maybe undeclared presidential candidate Ross Perot is right about at least one thing. Maybe in this day and age, big trees falling in the forest of current events don't make a sound unless recorded on television.

He is the candidate most responsible for making this the Presidential Campaign of Television Talk Shows or Trial by Arsenio. "Larry King

He talks in a rambling patois of business and Babbitt, Patton and Puritan, all delivered in that funny Texas twang with which impersonators are having a field day. Damn the media, but always use the media, full speed ahead.

"Optimize, optimize, optimize." That's what he says he's going to do about national health insurance, or was it the federal deficit? Or maybe it was both.

Perot wants a high-tech, old-fashioned, pure democracy. Give the viewer a voice, reach a consensus, implement several dozen plans, see which ones work and are cost-efficient before they are written into law. Then, "optimize, optimize, optimize."

His energy and humor are infectious, until you stop and try to deter-

McConnell's Comments

GETTING AN ELECTORAL COLLEGE EDUCATION

The recent phenomenon of Ross Perot has once again bought forth an age-old debate on one of the most crucial components of our political process: the Electoral College. There are no classes or degrees given by this "college." Rather, it is a collection of "electors" selected by the voters of every state in each presidential election, who then cast their ballots for the presidential candidate who receives a majority of the popular vote in the states these electors represent.

Each state receives a share of electors based on the number of Senators and Congressmen it has. The beauty of this system is that it requires winning candidates to have a broad base of support; and, it gives added weight to voters in smaller states like Kentucky. So far, so good. But, once every decade or so, a third party candidate throws his hat into the presidential election ring and prompts a flurry of dire predictions, fanciful scenarios, and proposals to abolish the Electoral College.

In the past we have seen George Wallace, John Anderson, and now, Ross Perot emerge as rising stars on the political horizon. The first two flared brightly, then fizzled; the latest is still sizzling at the moment. All of these candidates sparked proposals to do away with the Electoral College. These periodic reviews of the presidential electoral process have been fascinating exercises in second-guessing the Founding Fathers and speculating as to the outcome of so-called solutions, were they to be enacted.

I have come away from these discussion and debates with renewed appreciation for the work our Founding Fathers did in drafting the Constitution. They devised a system

which, more than 200 years later, ensures that a quarter of a billion people living in fifty states and several time zones can still thrive as one cohesive nation.

Still, there is one element of the Twelfth Amendment which should be modified. Currently, in the event no candidate attains a majority of Electoral College votes, the House of Representatives becomes responsible for electing a president. Each state delegation is given one vote. That means California has the same vote as Vermont; Texas has no greater voice than Rhode Island. This provision is not democratic, nor is it representative of the citizens of our fifty states.

I have introduced a constitutional amendment to rectify this shortcoming of the Twelfth Amendment, while preserving the Electoral College. If an electoral deadlock occurs, my resolution would require a runoff election between the top two recipients of Electoral College votes. In the extremely unlikely circumstances that the runoff election produces a tie vote in the Electoral College—a scenario that defies mathematical probability—the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court would cast the tie-breaking vote for the candidate with the largest share of the popular vote.

The 1992 presidential election has raised the bizarre possibility of a three-way race, ending in an Electoral College deadlock and the decision being thrown to the House of Representatives. However, this unusual circumstance does not justify the abolition of such a crucial part of our electoral system. With some modification, the Electoral College will continue to be a successful and necessary component of the presidential electoral process for the next two centuries and beyond.

In a recent 5-4 decision, the court said schools are not allowed to have prayers at ceremonies or celebrations—not even at graduation!

This decision deeply disappoints and angers me. The Supreme Court has taken us another step further away from the values upon which our nation was founded.

Justice Antonin Scalia, writing for the four members of the court who disagreed with the decision, said it "lays waste to a tradition that is as old as public-school graduation ceremonies themselves."

I agree completely with Scalia, Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist and Justices Byron White and Clarence Thomas.

CEREBROVASCULAR DISEASE & STROKES

Cerebrovascular disease refers to disease of the arteries which carry blood through the neck to your brain, eyes, and face. In normal circulation, blood travels up the carotid arteries on each side of the neck to the brain. The carotid artery divides into two branches, the internal and the external. The internal carotid artery delivers blood to the brain and the external artery supplies blood to the face. As we age, a disease called atherosclerosis can affect the normal circulation of blood through the carotid arteries.

Atherosclerosis, also called "hardening of the arteries," can contribute directly to a stroke. It is a slow, progressive disease that may have its beginnings in early life. In atherosclerosis, much like rust in a pipe, the inner walls of the arteries are made thick and irregular by deposits of fatty substances such as cholesterol. The internal channel of the arteries become narrowed and the blood supply to the brain, eyes, and face is reduced. When this happens, a clot is likely to form depriving the brain and other organs of blood. The results could be a stroke.

Stroke afflicts an estimated 1.8 million Americans. Each year over 250,000 people die from stroke. During a stroke many of the nerve cells in the brain die. Because nerve cells control movements, a part of the body may become paralyzed. If the right side of the brain is affected, the left side of the body is likely to be paralyzed. A person who has suffered a stroke may also have trouble speaking or understanding speech, reading, writing or remembering. Personality changes may also occur.

The effects of a stroke may be slight or severe, temporary or permanent. A person can suffer a stroke and completely recover within a few days. The severity of the problem depends

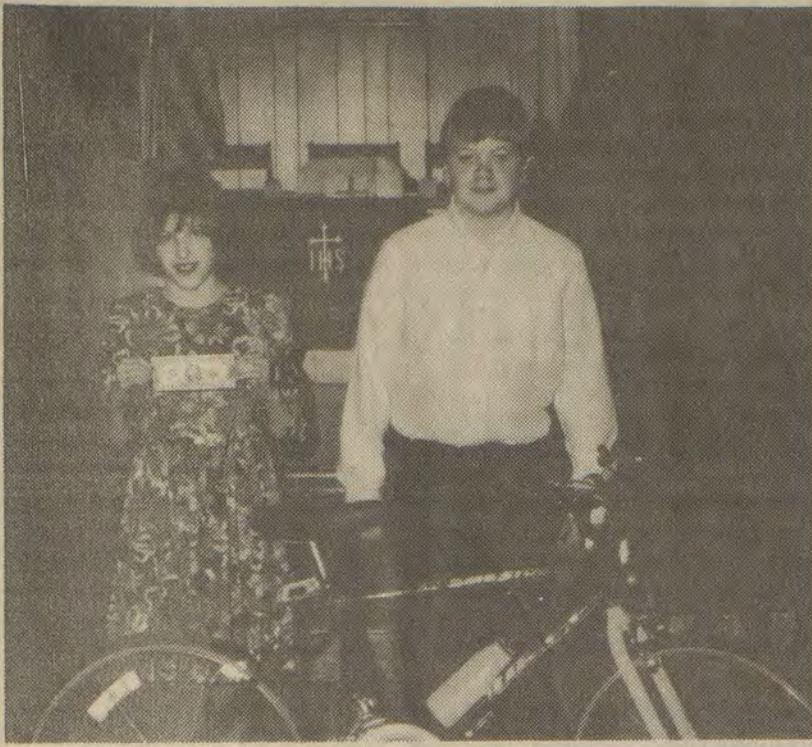
on the extent and location of brain cell damage and how effectively the body can compensate and restore a blood supply to injured areas of the brain.

Two major conditions can keep the blood supply from reaching the brain, causing a stroke. The first occurs when the blood flowing through an artery to an area of the brain is blocked by a clot. Most often a clot forms in the artery at the site of the blockage. But, sometimes a clot breaks off from an artery somewhere else in the body and travels through the larger blood vessels until it becomes wedged in a smaller artery in the brain.

The other condition that interferes with the flow of blood to the brain is bleeding or hemorrhage, also known as cerebral hemorrhage. It occurs when a diseased blood vessel bursts

in the brain, flooding the tissue with blood. Cells nourished by the artery are then deprived of blood and cannot function. Cerebral hemorrhage may also occur as the result of a head injury or when a blood-filled pouch, called an aneurysm, bursts in the brain.

Fortunately, Vascular Surgeons now have sophisticated methods of diagnosis and medical and surgical treatment which can reduce the risk of stroke.

Greater Tuna hits stage at Jenny Wiley Theatre

In its 28th season the Jenny Wiley Summer Theatre is introducing non-musical theater to the Big Sandy Valley. Judging by Wednesday's opening night performances of Greater Tuna, comedy without music at JWST should be a smashing success.

Folks, there are quite a few misconceptions about Greater Tuna. It is not, as some have reported, a science fiction play; nor is it a rewrite of the story about that old guy in the ocean. No, it's not, it's not, it's not, it's not, it's not!

Greater Tuna is an outrageous comedy about the quirky resident of Tuna, "the third smallest town in Texas." In this enlightened community the winning entry in a high school essay contest is entitled, "Human Rights: Why Bother?" and rock 'n roll records are burned, except Elvis and Buddy Holly "because they're good Southern boys and they'll be forgiven." Truth be told, this play transports the audience from Eastern Kentucky to "deep in the heart of Texas;" and it's a delightful journey! It is, it is, it is, it is!

As director Mike King explains, "It's a light-hearted look at life in a small town in Tuna, Texas, but you don't have to be from Texas or even a small town to recognize these characters." All the action takes place one late summer day, opening and closing with news broadcasts from the local radio station, which has the significant call letters OKKK.

The play's real magic is the cast. Two actors, Jim Ligon and Scott McGee, portray TWENTY of Greater Tuna's finer citizens, male and female. Ligon and McGee exhibit true comedic talent and marvelous stamina, as they sort out the population of Tuna.

"It's very easy to do these characters," said McGee, "because I'm from Mississippi and I know all of these people." Ligon added, "That's true. Bertha is partly my mother and a few other ladies I grew up knowing in Alabama and Pearl is a composite of everybody's grandmother."

This play would challenge any director, but director Mike King expressed his admiration for the actors, "I had it easy because [Ligon

and McGee] are two great actors who came into rehearsal with great ideas, great comic timing and a great understanding of the material.

King continued, "The real challenge is the costuming. The costume designer and the dressers have a tremendous responsibility in planning to make sure everything is done right and to make sure the right costumes are under other costumes.

Actors Jim Ligon and Scott McGee agree, "the dressers are always on top of everything." They are literally putting you into your character and they are absolutely vital to this production."

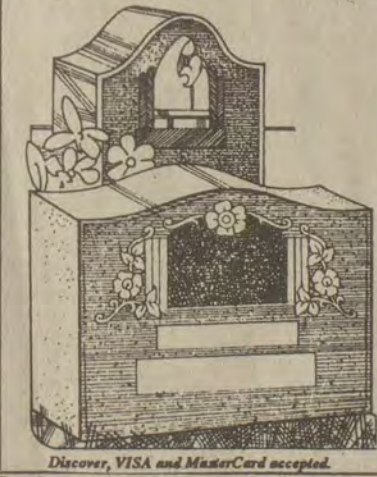

Cancer Answers

The Cancer Information Service is part of the Kentucky Cancer Program and is supported by the National Cancer Institute.

Q: My husband and I are trying to cut the fat in our diets. We stay away from fried foods and are eating more salads. Don't we still need to be careful about what we put on our salads?

A: You do need to be careful when choosing salad items. Be "picky" when adding high-fat foods such as regular salad dressings, olives, cheese, egg, fried noodles, nuts, bacon bits, and deli salads made with regular mayonnaise.

You can limit the fat by topping your salad greens with raw or cooked vegetables, diced turkey or chicken, fruit and berries. Choose low-fat or nonfat dressings or make your own

using nonfat yogurt, a little reduced-calorie mayonnaise, vinegar or lemon juice and herbs. Just one ladle of regular dressing (2-3 tablespoons) can add more than 20 grams of fat and 180 calories to a salad.

The National Cancer Institute recommends that only 30 percent of your daily calories be from fat in the foods you eat. If you eat 1,600 calories a day (average amount for women), try to limit fat to 53 grams a day. That one ladle of regular dressing has almost half this amount of fat.

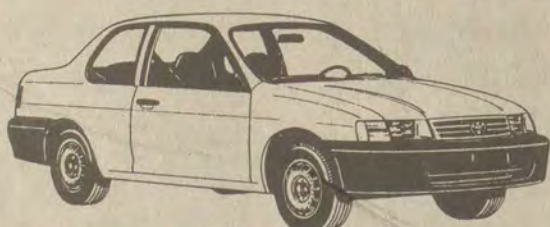

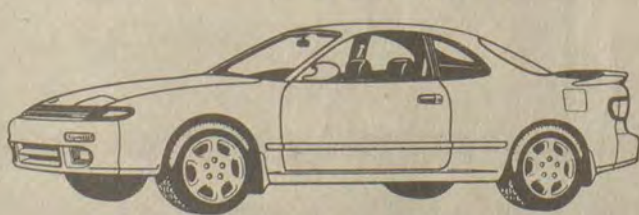

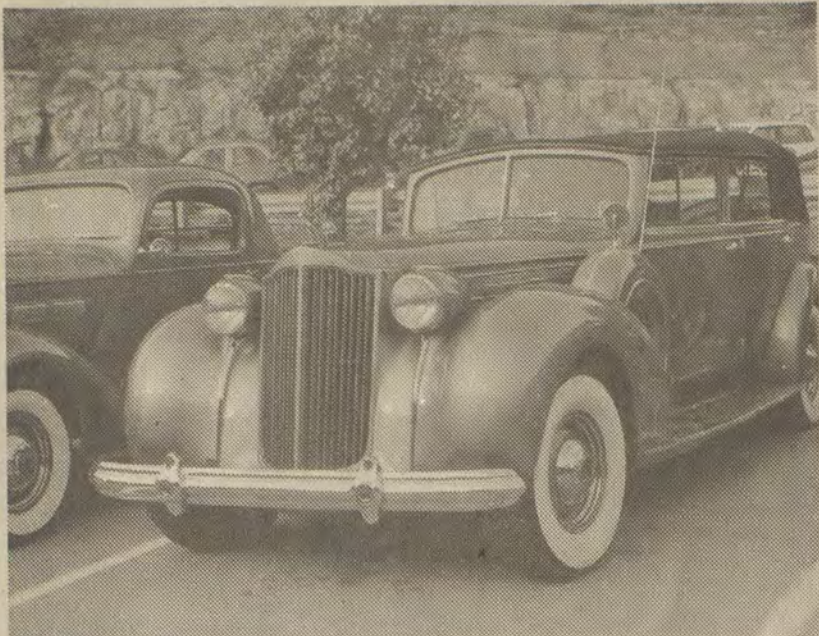

Vintage Packards are reminders of slower pace

Want to know about a Packard: ask the man who drives one.

Several Packards, including two 1937 classics, rolled down the "blue road" of U.S. 23 into the Prestonsburg Holiday Inn Friday. The men and women who drove them, members of the regional Blue Ridge Packards, were en route to a national car show in Columbus, Ohio, and stopped overnight in Prestonsburg to enjoy the "pretty scenery and the friendly folks," said Emerson Duke of Chesnee, South Carolina, and president of the national chapter.

The club members said they prefer the "blue roads," roads marked in blue on older maps as those less traveled. They prefer the leisurely pace and the country views of the blue roads instead of the hectic pace of the four-lane highways.

The club members also expressed

an interest in seeing Eastern Kentucky because the area played an important part in the history of Packard automobiles. A 1940 directory of Packard dealers lists nine Packard dealers in Eastern Kentucky, including one in Pikeville owned by the family of Steve Bowling of Louisville.

"Some very small towns along U.S. 23 had Packard dealers, and that's very unusual," Duke said. "These cars were very expensive."

"That would be like having nine Mercedes dealers today. They were luxury cars," said Becca, wife of regional director Darvin Kuehl of Highlands, North Carolina.

Packards were rare even in those days, Mrs. Kuehl said. Only a million Packards were produced during the Packard Motor Company's years of production, from 1899-1956. The car was pure quality from top to bottom and featured technological advances, Duke said. The 1940 Packard was the first car to have an air conditioning

system.

The 1937 Packard was a real turning point in cars, said Darvin Kuehl. The car featured better brakes, hydraulic system, and better steering.

The Packard Company's simple motto: "Ask the man who owns one," became a byword. The slogan came about, according to Duke, after someone wrote to the company asking for a brochure about Packards.

The company didn't have any brochures, so the boss told his secretary to tell him to "ask the man who owns one."

That was Packard's motto in 1937 and that's the Packard motto today, said Duke.

Many things came from Packard engineering. Packard Motor Company invented asphalt. "After the war, Packard used to test tanks," said Duke. "The tanks tore up the concrete roadways and the company had to invent something else." That something else was asphalt highways.

Packard Motor Company was also the licensee for Merlin Aircraft engines, and they produced P.T. boat engines, Duke explained.

The Packard automobile touched the hearts of collectors even during its years of production. A club formed in 1953, three years before the production of Packards ended. Because the club is a marque club (it focuses on a single make of car — Packard), the club encompasses all Packards, valued from \$4,000 to \$300,000 or more. The national club has 3,400 families enrolled, and the regional lists 110 families.

Packard owners take pride in the restoration of their automobiles and go to great lengths to trace the ancestry of their car, occasionally hiring private detectives. One thing that makes the search so difficult, said Duke, is they didn't have titles back then.

Kuehl, who owns a 1939 Packard 12 convertible sedan, is currently searching for the original owner of his sedan convertible. His search has come to a dead end with the 1956

purchase of the car because that owner cannot remember who he purchased it from. Kuehl refused to give up, though.

"Only 20 were made," Kuehl said. "And they were only afforded by the extremely wealthy. They sold for over \$5,000 in 1939, which could be comparable today to several hundred thousand dollars."

"They were either owned by someone very famous or very wealthy," he said.

"My mother was making \$70 a week teaching school," Duke said, who explained that he had traced the ownership of his 1937, 115C Packard to a Cornell University professor, who was born in Mercer County, Pennsylvania.

"He bought it in his 25th year of his being at Cornell and never sold the car. He was 93 when he died," said Duke.

Other Packards making the trip through Prestonsburg were a 1937 120C, a 1941 120 Touring Sedan that was named 1989 National Show Winner, and a 1953 Clipper Deluxe.

"Cars are the glue that holds us

together, but it's the people who make the club," said Kuehl. Approximately 14 individuals were part of the Packard touring group. Most of them travel together to various shows and on tours.

Owners of the Packards said they get some unusual looks when they drive down the roadways. "We've had people hanging out their cars taking pictures," said Mrs. Kuehl.

"People in a new Mercedes stopped, then asked us 'what is it?'" said Duke.

Most people, though, want to know how much it costs and what's the mileage...or "where do you get the

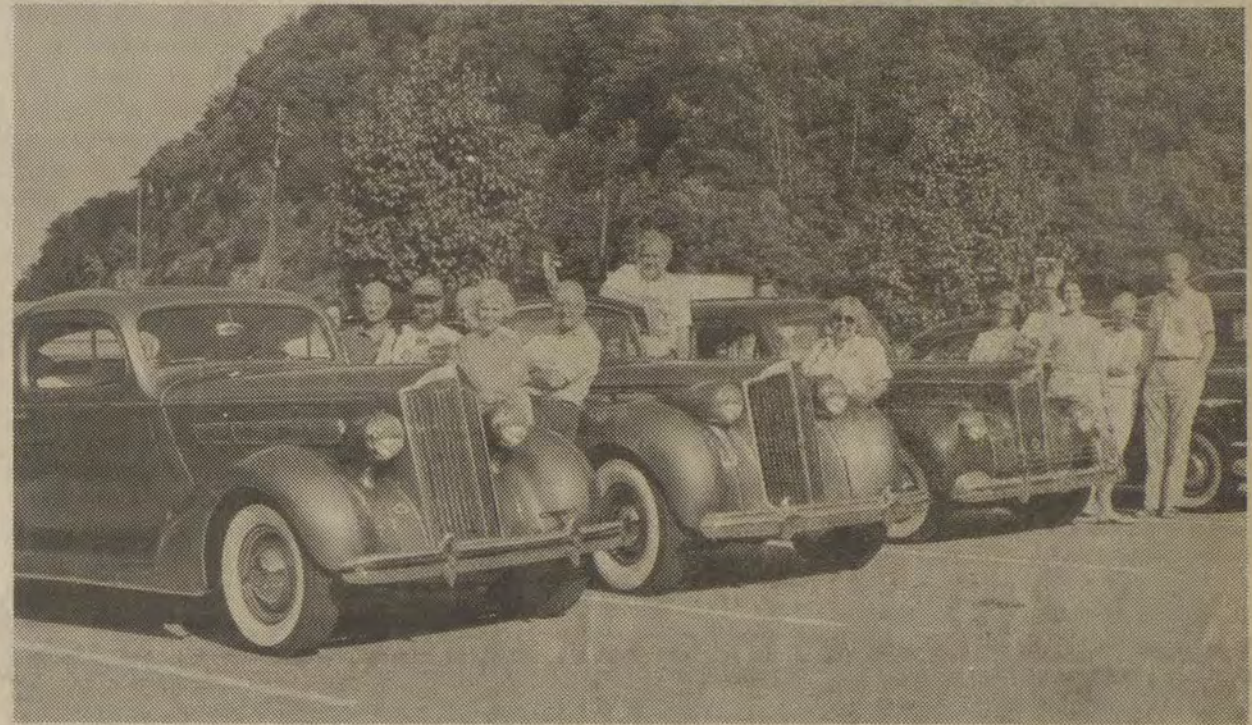
tires," Kuehl said. The teens always want to know how fast it will go, said Kuehl.

Duke said he gets pretty good mileage, about nine miles to the gallon with his 1937 model. Parts, including tires, are available to keep the cars on the road, both explained.

As far as speed, though, Duke would only say that the cars will drive at modern speeds.

One thing weighs heavily in the minds of hearts of Packard collectors — the conversion of Packards into street rods. "When cars are modernized, then they are lost forever," said Duke. "It's really discouraging."

Some of Kentucky's best-known potteries

Pottery is one of the staples of life in civilization. Its products are necessary for daily living and also have many ornamental uses. When settlers first came into Kentucky, they brought their own dishes and utensils, most of which had been manufactured in the colonies. The first known pottery in Louisville was in operation as early as 1815.

The Ohio Valley has been known as a ceramics region with many potteries in Kentucky, Indiana and Ohio. The Kentucky Geological Survey Bulletin No. 6, published in 1906, details clays which are conducive to pottery-making in several parts of Kentucky, and lists potteries that were established in a number of counties at the time. Some of Kentucky's fine ceramicists have turned their work into prospering long-term businesses. At least four of the state's potteries have enjoyed widespread recognition and trade.

Bybee Pottery in Madison County is said to be the oldest pottery west of the Alleghenies that is still in operation. James Eli Cornelison founded the pottery about 1845, and the family still use the same methods of operation to make tableware that is sold in state and national parks throughout the southeast. The Cornelisons

use china clay dug from a pit near the pottery and every piece is handmade, thus keeping production limited and designs always in demand.

One of the largest potteries in Kentucky at the turn of the century was in Paducah. Owner J. Andrew Bauer was born in Indiana around 1857 of parents who had emigrated from Bavaria. About 1879, he began working in his brother's large pottery in Louisville. In 1886, Bauer moved to Paducah where he purchased a small company already in operation and opened the Paducah Pottery Company. The company grew to boast at least two warehouses, with an L-shaped factory in the middle, and several kilns. It was described as the finest pottery in western Kentucky and had about 75 employees, as well as several travelling salesmen. Products of the pottery included milk jars, dishes, crockery, flower pots, coolers, chums, and vases.

John Bauer, who was born about 1852, was J. Andrew's brother. John Bauer founded the Preston Street Pottery in Louisville about 1879. It was here that J. Andrew Bauer served his apprenticeship before moving to Paducah. The Preston Street Pottery plant included three large kilns, storage yards and a switch of the L&N Railroad.

John Bauer's company had a long history which led eventually to ties with the modern company known as Louisville Stoneware. When John Bauer died in Louisville in 1901, his wife Susan became the proprietor. By 1903 the business had been renamed Bauer Pottery Works. In 1906, the Bauer Pottery Works and Louisville Pottery Company are listed in the city directory at the same address; in 1907, Bauer Pottery Works closed and Louisville Pottery opened in a new location.

Louisville Pottery Company was run by S. O. Snyder, as President, and Keith P. Snyder as Secretary. In the early 1930's, Keith Snyder became president of the company; his son-in-law, John B. Taylor, was named presi-

dent of the company in the early 1940's. The company was famous for its Cherokee brand of hand-turned pottery and used more than 150 shapes and designs. It had a large business among gift shops and other retailers.

When John B. Taylor retired in 1970, John and Vivian Robertson purchased all the molds, patterns, and equipment of the Louisville Pottery Company and reopened the plant at a new location on Brent Street under the name Louisville Stoneware Company. Louisville Stoneware Company has flourished for over twenty years. It is famous for dinnerware, crockery, and accessories. Its wares are sold in shops around the country.

depictions of animals, people, and nature were so sought after that her work became known internationally. One of her more famous designs for dinnerware, "Brown Fleck", featured tan coin dots on a background of brown; other designs were inspired by the works of Picasso and Chagall. Mrs. Hadley died in 1965 at the age of 54; Mr. Hadley died in 1991. Hadley Pottery Company is still in business under the direction of Mr. Kenneth Moore.

Mary Alice (Hale) Hadley, born in Terre Haute, Indiana, was the daughter of a pottery owner. She majored in art at Indiana State Teachers College and studied at DePauw University. In 1930 she married

George E. Hadley and the couple later settled in Louisville. Mrs. Hadley began making her own stoneware dishes about 1940 because none of the available patterns suited her tastes. Her hobby grew to become the Hadley Pottery Works, which opened in 1944. George Hadley, an engineer, designed and built much of the equipment used in producing his wife's designs.

The Ohio: Whose river is it anyway?

The Ohio River, named Ohiyo by the Iroquois Indians (meaning "grand river"), extends for 981 miles, and it may seem that at one time or another the boundary of almost every mile along it has been questioned. The Ohio River forms parts of the boundaries of Ohio, Kentucky, Indiana, West Virginia, and Illinois. The disputes center on the issue of the actual boundary of each state on the river, and the jurisdiction which each state may exercise on the river.

In 1603 King James I of England granted to the Virginia Company of London "... all those lands, countries and territories (sic) situate, lieinge and being ein that place of America called Virginia ..." including "... all that space and circuit of lande lying from the sea coaste of the precinct aforesaid up unto the land, throughoute, from sea to sea, west to northwest ..." James could not possibly have known how much land he had granted and what kind of conflicts would arise. The land in this charter included the Ohio River and what is now Kentucky.

The present-day dispute over ownership of the river originates in Virginia's 1784 deed of cession of the Old Northwest to the national government. The enabling act of 1789 granted to Kentucky "all right, title, and claims as well as soil as jurisdiction, which the said commonwealth hath to the territory within the limits of the Virginia charter, situated, lying, and being to the northwest of the Ohio River." The vagueness of this statement proved to be the chief stumbling block in the interpretation of boundary rights.

The first legal debate concerning boundary rights occurred over a piece of land that extended from the Indiana shore near Evansville. During low water it resembled a peninsula and during high water it was an island. The conflict developed when both Kentucky and the Federal Government issued patents for this land. In 1820 the dispute was presented before the United States Supreme Court in *Handley's Lessee vs. Anthony*. Chief Justice John Marshall denied Kentucky's claim:

The boundary of the State of Kentucky extends only to the low watermark on the western or northwestern side of the river Ohio; and does not include a peninsula, or island, on the western or northwestern bank, separated from the main land by a channel or bayou, which is filled with water only when the river rises above its banks, and is, at other times dry. When a river is the boundary between two nations or states, if the original property is in neither, and there be no convention respecting it, each holds to the middle of the stream. But when, as in this case, one State (Virginia) is the original proprietor, and grants the territory on one side only, it retains the river within its own domain, and the newly erected State extends to the river only, and the low water mark is its boundary.

In 1898 the Supreme Court upheld Marshall's decision in the case of the Henderson Bridge Co. vs. Henderson. The Supreme Court set the boundary at the low-water mark. The questions that keep arising involve the location of the low-water

mark, particularly in 1792 when Kentucky became a state.

Almost 100 years after the Henderson Bridge case the same haunting question of the location of the border is still in debate. In 1990, in settling a Kentucky-Illinois boundary dispute, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled once again that the state line is at "the low-water mark on the northerly side of the Ohio River as it existed in the year 1792."

Kentucky's main concern regarding the boundary dispute involves revenue. At present Kentucky collects fishing and boating license fees, taxes from goods sold from floating barges, and property taxes from barge-loading facilities that extend into the river.

Because of the financial implications the question of "who owns the river" may never be resolved. For over 150 years the Supreme Court has not deviated from its original ruling, and most of the bordering states have unwillingly conceded Kentucky's right of ownership, at least temporarily.

Prevention of tick bites helps avoid diseases

Warm weather in Kentucky always brings more outdoor activity—and possible exposure to tick bites, which can transmit Rocky Mountain spotted fever and Lyme disease.

In 1991, 31 cases of Rocky Mountain spotted fever were identified along with 44 Lyme disease cases. In 1990, Kentucky had 11 Rocky Mountain spotted fever cases and 18 cases of Lyme disease.

State health officials are urging Kentuckians to take measures that can prevent tick bites.

Clarkson Palmer, M.D., communicable disease branch manager in the state Department for Health Services, says that precautions are especially important in the summer months when ticks—and people—are most active.

days after the fever, a rash usually appears first on the wrist and ankles and then spreads to the rest of the body, thus the term "spotted fever."

With Lyme disease, the first stage begins three to 32 days after a tick bite. Again, flu-like symptoms are present—fatigue, chills and fever, headache, muscle and joint pain or swollen lymph nodes.

Another sign of Lyme disease is a peculiar circular skin rash that appears where the tick bite occurred and then expands. The patch can vary in shape and appears most often on the thigh, groin, trunk, armpits and, in children, on the face. The center may clear as the patch enlarges, giving a ring-like appearance. It may be warm but usually not painful.

If not treated, Lyme disease can cause arthritis and have effects on the nervous system that may include numbness, pain, stiff neck and severe headache or muscle weakness of the face or limbs. Heart irregularities may occur.

Lyme disease also is treated with antibiotics, with early treatment usually bringing about a rapid recovery. Delayed treatment can leave patients with recurring symptoms or permanent damage.

"Anyone who has been bitten by a tick should watch for the symptoms of either Rocky Mountain spotted fever or Lyme disease," Palmer said. "If they even suspect that some of the symptoms are present, they should contact their physician because early treatment is the key to complete recovery from these tick-borne diseases."

"Both Rocky Mountain spotted fever and Lyme disease are quite serious illnesses," he said. "While some people might view the precautions as bothersome, they're well worth the time and effort involved if they can prevent either of these diseases."

Palmer recommends the following precautions to prevent tick exposure:

- *Wear a long-sleeved shirt tucked into long pants; tuck pant legs into socks or boots; tape area where pants and socks meet to keep ticks out;
- *Spray insect repellent listing "permethrin" as the active ingredient on pants, socks and shoes but not on the skin. Repellents listing "DEET" as the active ingredient may be sprayed on the skin.
- *Avoid walking in the brush and tall grass;
- *Keep pets away from infested areas, and check for ticks on pets and remove them.
- After being outside:
 - *Promptly remove and wash clothing;

*Inspect your body carefully and remove attached ticks with tweezers, grasping as close to the head as possible and gently tugging the tick free without crushing the body. If tweezers are not available, cover the fingers with a tissue;

*Wash hands and the area of the bite immediately with soap and water, and keep the bite area clean;

*Do not try to crush the tick. Instead, flush it down a toilet or save it in a tightly closed vial for later identification.

The severity of Rocky Mountain spotted fever ranges from mild to fatal. The disease can be treated effectively with antibiotics, but early diagnosis and treatment are critical.

Palmer says the symptoms of Rocky Mountain spotted fever are a fever and possibly chills, headache and muscle aches occurring three to 10 days after a tick bite. One to three

The truth about child sexual abuse

In only its second meeting, a task force led by Attorney General Chris Gorman is dispelling myths about the sexual abuse of children.

During two days of riveting testimony from both victims and offenders, the Attorney General's Task Force on Child Sexual Abuse learned that abuse occurs regardless of race, gender, family income or geographic location. Instead, the only common denominator appears to be that the victims are vulnerable, especially to a person in position of authority or trust. Task Force members also learned that there is no such thing as a stereotypical offender, and that

women also commit acts of child sexual abuse.

"There can no longer be any doubt that child sexual abuse is a threat in every level of our society," Mr. Gorman said. "Now more than ever, our guiding principle must be accountability. We must make the offenders more accountable for their actions, and we must make the system more accountable to these young victims."

The Task Force meets on a monthly basis in Frankfort, and includes among its members judges, prosecutors, legislators, health care workers and representatives of many other disciplines. Its goal is to bring about changes in both public policy and state law, all aimed at the protection of Kentucky's children.

Veterinary program extended at Morehead

Morehead State University Veterinary Technology Program's full accreditation status has been extended through Dec. 31, 1993.

The certification was granted by the Committee on Veterinary Technician Education and Activities (CVTEA) of the American Veterinary Medical Association following review of MSU's program.

"The faculty members are to be commended for their hard work in maintaining the high quality of this program," said MSU President C. Nelson Grote. "We have continuously met the rigorous standards set forth by the accrediting agency; this record stands for itself."

The program is designed to produce veterinary technicians that are qualified to assist in all areas of vet-

erinary work, according to Dr. Scott Rundell, assistant professor of veterinary technology. "Because of the strong teaching environment, students learn practical skills that are well received in the marketplace," he said, noting that hundreds of program graduates have been placed in jobs.

One asset of MSU's program, that is not duplicated by very many other programs, is the resources available at the University farm. "Not many schools have the farm animal and equine population we have," Dr. Rundell said. "A great number of students, who come to Morehead State to study veterinary technology, come for this reason."

Another aspect that appeals to the students is the Pet Rehabilitation

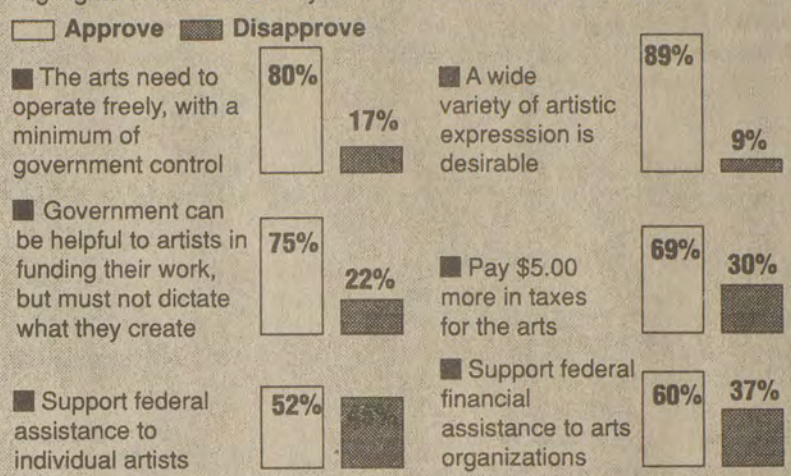
Program. While providing teaching cases as well as a public service, homeless and injured animals are accepted to be rehabilitated and placed in permanent domestic settings.

Upon completion of the program, some students assist in private veterinary practices, but in recent years, more are going into institutional settings, Dr. Rundell said.

The Vet Tech Program began as an associate degree offering at MSU in 1977 and has retained full accreditation status since that time. It is administered through the Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources in the College of Applied Sciences and Technology.

night for the duration of the summer.

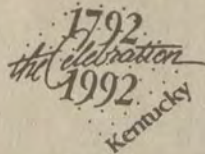

New laws to help victims of domestic violence

There are these numbers: over 13,000 reports of women experiencing violent assaults or threats by a spouse, partner or former mate; 64 domestic homicides by a spouse or partner; over 5,000 women and children sheltered at spouse abuse centers plus 800 on a waiting list. That was last year in Kentucky alone.

Now there are these numbers: HB 115, HB 445, HB 256, SB 80, SB 103, SB 160. They mean greater protection and support for Kentucky women and children and perhaps fewer injuries and death added to the numbers above.

The bill numbers represent the landmark package of new and strengthened legal "tools" for combating domestic violence. The new laws go into effect July 14.

One of the most impressive new laws, according to Carol Lewandowski, outreach coordinator for the Big Sandy Abuse Center, is House Bill 115. Previously, domestic violence laws applied to married couples. House Bill 115 extends the laws that provide for protection and prosecution to unmarried couples (defined as two people living together who receive their mail at the same residence). National studies show that boyfriends and ex-boyfriends commit 32 percent of domestic violence.

"Another great thing" about the new laws is that Emergency Protection Orders (EPO) must be accepted by court clerks. Before, said Lewandowski, clerks could let the EPOs "sit there."

"In the past there have been breakdowns and the orders haven't gone all the way through," she explained.

Another important change is HB 445 which makes stalking a crime in Kentucky.

"Most of the time, they (the abuser) will follow you (their victim) in their cars, or find where you're staying," said Lewandowski. "Until now, you couldn't do anything about it."

HB 445 is prevention, said Kathy Frederich, adult protection specialist in the Department for Social Services.

"When the intent to harm someone and the threats seem real because of a person's conduct, the stalking law is a tool to stop serious injury or death before it happens — and you can't overstate its importance,"

Hicks awarded pharmacy degree

Janet Elizabeth Hicks received her B.S. in Pharmacy from the University of Kentucky, June 6, 1992. During her course of study, she was on the Dean's List each semester and graduated with high distinction. She was the recipient of the 1992 Pfizer Pharmaceutical Community Internship Award for excellence in community pharmacy practice.

Frederich said.

Only three other states have a stalking law — but some 40 states are considering one, she said.

Stalking is defined as "an intentional course of conduct directed at a specific person which seriously alarms, annoys, intimidates or harasses; which serves no legitimate purpose; and which would cause a reasonable person to suffer substantial mental distress." A "course of conduct" is two or more acts showing a consistent purpose.

Stalking becomes a felony if the offender has a deadly weapon, has been convicted or pled guilty within five years to a felony or a class A misdemeanor, or if the stalker has been served notice of a protective order or criminal complaint concerning the same victim.

Other key changes in Kentucky's domestic violence laws include:

•By July 30, emergency protective orders (good for 14 days) are to be made available around the clock from district courts at no charge to the person seeking protection and without a residency requirement.

•Emergency protective orders have been expanded to include sexual abuse, to award emergency temporary custody of minor children, and to ban "any contact or communication with the petitioner except as directed by the court." Orders have already prohibited abusive actions, destruction of property, and being on the shared premises.

•An emergency protective order may be replaced by the court after a full hearing with a domestic violence order effective for up to a year that may be reissued annually.

•The courts must immediately notify all law enforcement agencies throughout Kentucky of an order issued or any changes made, through the computerized Law Information Network of Kentucky (LINK).

"This (law) will clarify a lot of things," said Lewandowski, who explained that previously if an individual filed an Emergency Protective Order in one county and then moved to another county and the abuser violated the order, then, in most incidents, the individual would be told to refile the order in his or her present place of residence.

•Law enforcement officers must make an arrest when they have probable cause to believe a protective order has been violated; the violation

is a criminal offense.

•Circuit courts must consider domestic violence as a factor in determining child custody and visitation issues.

•In self-defense cases where a victim of abuse kills the abuser, a past pattern of repeated serious abuse shall figure in the new definition of "imminent danger," and be admissible evidence.

•Rape with an object is added to the definition of sexual offenses — an addition important to those sexually assaulted by a spouse or partner.

During the month of May, the Big Sandy Family Abuse Center sheltered 20 victims and their families. The center is also available to those who are seeking answers to their questions about the court processor or who need their support in the courtroom.

Kentucky and MCI provide voter registration by phone

Secretary of State Bob Babbage said that beginning July 3 registering to vote in Floyd County will be as easy as calling 1-800-93K-VOTE on the telephone.

Babbage explained that citizens can enter their zip code on a touch-tone phone and be automatically connected by MCI to the county clerk in their county of residence.

The clerk can obtain the caller's registration information and enter it into a computer. That information will be processed by the Department of Information Services (DIS), a voter registration card will be completed and mailed directly to the caller, Babbage explained.

Callers using a rotary dial phone will be automatically connected to the State Board of Elections for registration information.

The MCI system will directly link callers to their county clerk during the hours of 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. (EDT). After-hour callers may leave their request on a voice recording device and have their calls returned the following day by State Board of Elections staff.

Once the voter registration card is signed by the registrant and returned to the county clerk, the individual is registered to vote.

"Many people say they are not registered to vote because it is inconvenient," Babbage said. "Now with MCI's innovative program, registering to vote is as simple as making a phone call."

Babbage said that over 800,000 Kentuckians are eligible to vote but are not registered. Currently the state has 1.9 million registered voters.

Babbage, who by virtue of his office is the chief election official of Kentucky, said several other secretaries of state are interested in developing similar programs in their states.

"This election year will be a watershed year in American politics and each vote cast in every local, state and national race will carry greater importance than in any election year in recent memory," Robert L. Goldsmith, vice president of national accounts for MCI, said.

The MCI program is one of several voter registration programs Secretary of State Babbage has implemented since taking office last January. Babbage explained that one of the main goals of his office is to work to increase voter education, registration and election day turnout.

Babbage, whose duties include serving as chairman of the Kentucky Board of Elections, noted that the state board approved mail-in voter registration forms at its April meeting.

GED, college degrees keep inmates from returning to jail

Education is the key to recycling the disposable human resources of society was the message delivered Friday night (May 15) by one of those resources.

The speaker, Philip W. Rasmussen, was one of four inmates of the Eastern Kentucky Correctional Complex who became the first graduates of a Morehead State University program offered at EKCC through the University's Licking Valley Extended Campus Center.

MSU President C. Nelson Grote, along with other MSU administrators and faculty members garbed in traditional academic regalia, joined with corrections officials to conduct a special commencement program at EKCC for the graduating inmates and their families.

Rasmussen of Crystal Lake, Ill., Randall W. Isaacs of Lima, Ohio, Freddie E. Blackburn of Pikeville and Donald G. Sargent of Dry Ridge received the Associate of Arts degree from MSU.

Comparing the college education program to the battle to save the environment, Rasmussen said that

MSU's and other comparable programs were "taking the old, discarded, nonproductive, self-doubting, destructive elements of society and reintroducing or recycling them into humans with pride and self-esteem, self-worth and hope."

The 32-year-old inmate, who has been in custody in Kentucky for eight years, called for a constitutional amendment guaranteeing a college education for all and not just for the privileged.

Rasmussen told the commencement guests who included families of the graduates that the diploma symbolized an apology to "those people who tried to tell us we didn't know it all when we thought we did." Noting that President Harry S. Truman had said, "Ultimately it is what we learn after we know it all that is important," Rasmussen added that the diploma shows that "we are ready to listen and learn, ready to accept social standards and willing to be recycled into society—if given the opportunity."

The diploma, he added, "means that we care about ourselves, about restored pride and self-esteem and the possibilities for the future." He told the audience that he had watched thousands of inmates leave who had not wanted to return, but that countless had because they left with the same addictions, lacking necessary job skills and usually were just "going out on vacation. I can tell you because I was one of them."

He said that clear skies, sparkling fresh water and green grassy meadows represent the environmental dream, while upward mobility, prosperity and liberty were the American dream.

"To be somebody and to make something of yourself through education is our dream. We are part of the race to save the planet. We are all in this war together and tonight, there are four new victories in the battle," he concluded.

In his remarks, Dr. Grote, who conferred the degrees, said that his father has always told him that education is something that no one can take from you. "Education is truly an asset to everyone. You young men have earned your degree; you worked hard and you achieved academically. You deserve to be recognized and respected for your academic accomplishments," he told the graduates.

EKCC Warden Michael O'Dea, who welcomed the guests to the program, praised Dr. Grote for his efforts in getting the program launched at the complex.

MSU began offering college courses at EKCC in 1990 and currently approximately 50 inmates are taking MSU classes. University officials are exploring the possibility of adding upper division courses to the program, according to Dr. Marc Glasser, MSU dean of graduate and extended campus programs.

According to national statistics, 43 percent of all released inmates return, but that percentage drops to 18 for those with GEDs and even lower, to between 10 and 14 percent, for those who earn an associate degree.

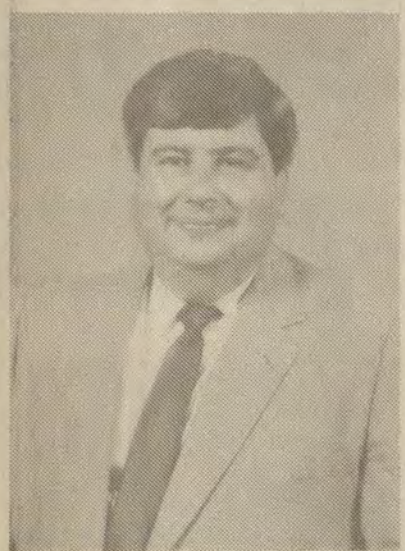

Beaver Creek Little League president Jimmy Goins has had a very busy week. The new league president laid out a 20 game schedule for his league this season and now it has caused the Little League teams to push to get their current tournament over with this week because of the start of the All-Star tournament next week in Prestonsburg.

Goins is using two diamonds to play the double elimination tournament and one is not fit to play Little League baseball on. The Minnie Park is unsafe because of the very rough infield and outfield.

This past Monday night I was at the tournament games at the Minnie Park and noticed how many kids, especially around the second base area, that almost got hit in the face with the ball because of a bad hop on the rough infield. The same held true in the outfield.

The softball teams, and that is the only place they have to play, has made the Minnie field an unsafe place to play.

However, maybe next year the solution will be solved when the new Drift ball diamond is fixed for Little League play. Little League diamonds need fences around the outfield. The Drift diamond does not have one but I understand one is going to go up. That will be fine. The Minnie Park has a fence but for softball purposes only.

Allen Central captures 10 state titles in Junior Olympics

Even though the high school track and field season ended a month ago the Allen Central team continues to run and pile up the medals.

The local high school's team won 10 state titles in the just completed Kentucky Junior Olympics in Frankfort over the past weekend.

Todd Howard, who will be a seventh grader at Maytown Elementary this coming school year, won first place in three events. Howard won the 3000-meter run in a time of 11:54 for first place. He then turned around

and captured the 800 meters in 2:44 and placed first in the 1500 meters with a posted time of 5:55.

"Todd was dragging there for a while," said Allen Central coach Dewey Jamerson. "He had went to Rick Pitino's basketball camp just before the Olympics and I asked him if they worked him hard at the camp. He did well for us."

Chris Bailey had one first place finish and two second places. In the javelin throw, which is not a high school event and new to Bailey, his

toss of 77 feet and 3 inches was good enough for first place in the Olympics. Bailey, also an eighth grader at Maytown, finished second in the shot put with a throw of 37 feet and then took second in discus at 79 feet, 11 1/2 inches.

Maytown Elementary continues to send the promising young track and field stars and Levi Wells is no exception. An eighth grader at Maytown next year but a big part of the high school squad this past season, Wells is being tutored by coach For-

rest Hughes, who also teaches at Maytown, to be an up and coming discus thrower in high school. Wells also throws the shot put. In fact, Wells took first place in the shot put with a throw of 42 feet, 4 inches. A toss of 113 feet won first place for Wells in the discus. Wells placed second in javelin with a throw of 65 feet, 7 inches.

The twist in the Olympics was that Wells and Bailey had to compete against one another.

"It was too bad that they had to go

against each other being they are on the same team," said Jamerson. "But that is the way it is in the Junior Olympics." Howard, Bailey and Wells all participated in the Youth Division of the Olympics.

In the Intermediate Division of the Olympics, Shawn Robinson took first place in the discus event with a toss of 99 feet. Robinson, a freshman at Allen Central this past year, will be one of the promising young field

scored to make it a 2-1 game.

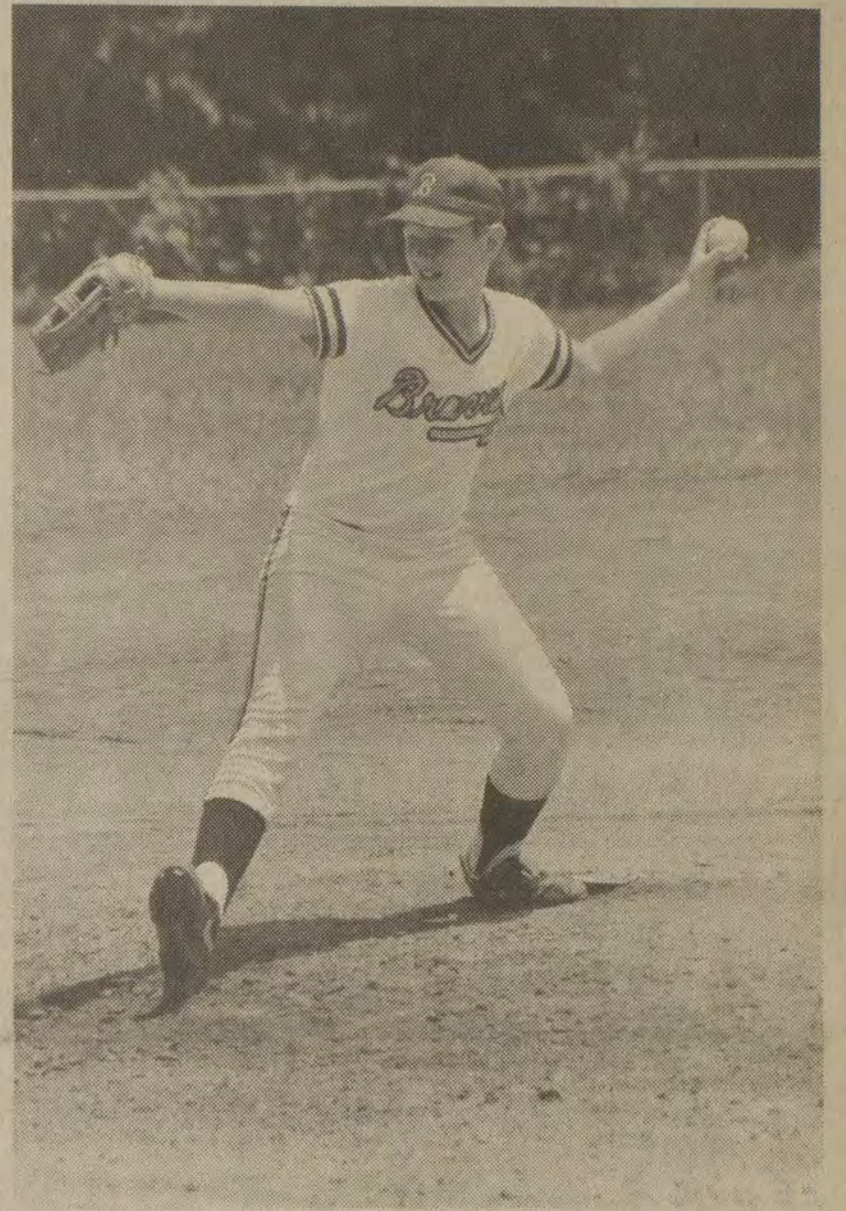

Griffith had a two-run single in the third inning when the Blue Jays scored their final two runs.

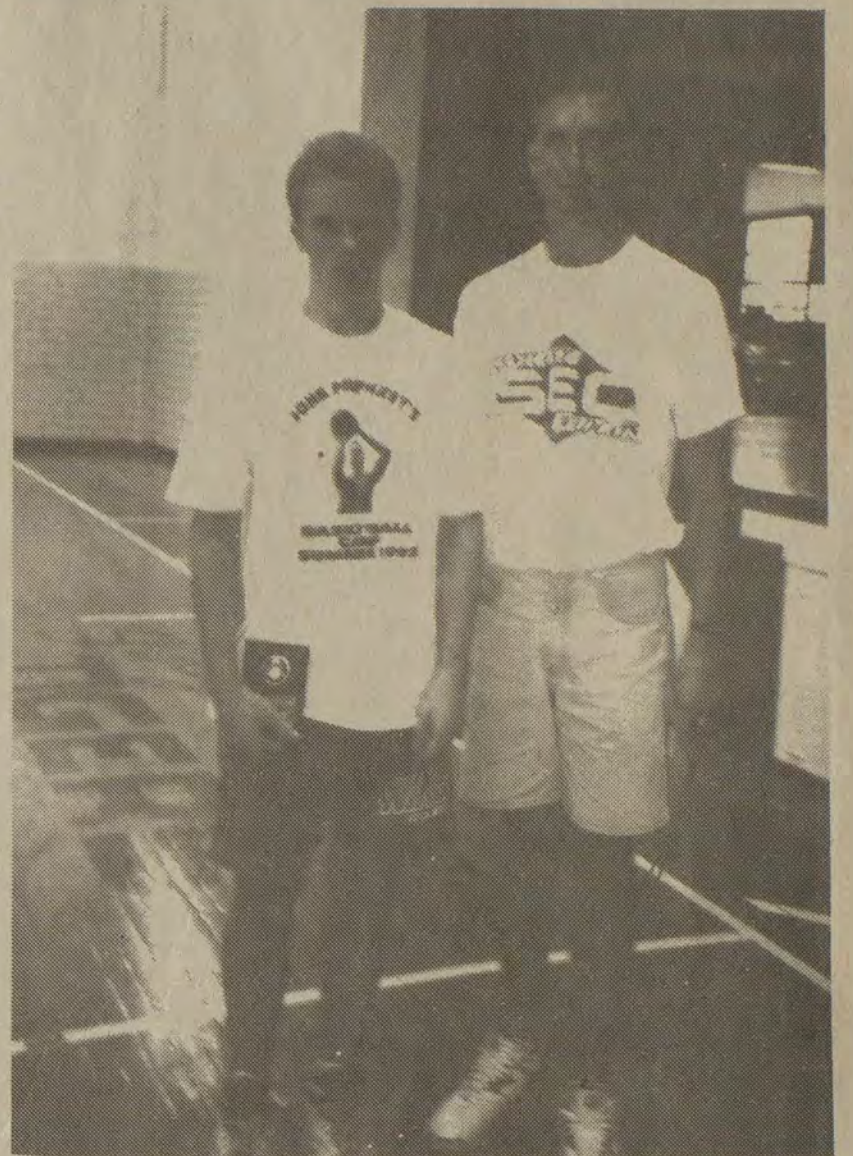

FIRST NIGHT BASEBALL GAME

But as managers discovered that there was a decisive advantage to having a pitcher who knew how to throw a knuckleball or a spitball, batting averages declined drastically.

In 1893 the distance between home plate and the pitcher's mound was changed from 50 feet to the current 60 feet and 6 inches. Batting averages soared.

Press release from the Floyd County Education Association

We are asking the Floyd County Board of Education to continue the process that has begun in this county by re-examining the three candidates that have been submitted to them by the search committee. This local board, in fact, has not gone with the recommendations of the search committee. They failed to recommend the committee's top choice — Dr. Jerry Austin — and its second choice Dr. William Jutras. Three of the five candidates that the screening committee recommended to the board are still available and interested in the Floyd County position. Chairman Campbell and our local board of education has been told by the commissioner and his staff that they do not have to choose Dr. Steve Towler and have, in fact, recommended that the search committee be reactivated. Our local board has refused to do that, just as they refused to consider the two top candidates recommended by the committee—including the one approved by the state department.

We have been given no valid reason as why we shouldn't be looking further at the candidates submitted by the search committee. Dr. Jutras and Dr. Cummings apparently have been dismissed from consideration by our board because at one point in their careers, they were not rehired by their board. In Dr. Towler's case, that has happened twice to our knowledge—once in Ashland and now in Hardin County. Dr. Jerry Austin was not considered because of a personal incident with his wife. We have heard equally disturbing rumors about Dr. Towler's personal life. If this board is considering Dr. Towler in spite of a these factors, we see no reason why Dr. William Jutras, Dr. Frank Cummings, and Dr. Edward Caputo should not be considered as well.

Members of the Floyd County Education Association have spent the last week investigating Dr. Towler's performance in Jenkins, Ashland, and Hardin County. That investigation has raised serious concerns that we are outlining in a report to the local board of education. They center around Dr. Towler's ability to lead our district and we believe that these findings deserve further investigation and study. We expect

the Floyd County Board of Education to look in greater depth at any candidate that they may consider for this position. Interviews conducted by our local board with Dr. Jutras, Cummings, and Caputo were very short—sometimes lasting only thirty minutes.

The role of the Kentucky School Board Association and their consultant Ken Scott in this entire process is questionable. We would hope that if this board feels the need for an outside consultant, that they would acquire the services of an organization whose sole purpose is something other than to support and promote Kentucky administrators.

We believe that the State Department of Education acted inappropriately when it submitted the name of Dr. Towler as a "prequalified" candidate. Combined with the veto power given to the commissioner earlier by the board of education, the submission of this name gives the appearance that the selection has already been made by the commissioner and his staff. If this is not the case and if the department wants to assure that we have a real choice, we believe it needs to take further action. We don't agree the submission of Dr. Towler or any other candidate's name was appropriate, but the only way to correct this action as this point might be for the commissioner and his staff to submit the names of other candidates that they would consider acceptable so there is truly a choice and not the appearance that the choice of a superintendent is being dictated to us.

We are also asking that our local board of education live up to the responsibilities that have been given to it by the people of Floyd County. Already, we have lost the power to make the final selection of a superintendent because of the cloud of wrong doing and investigation that hangs over this local board. To give up this final right of submitting the names of candidates to the commissioner for his approval would mean that the board is completely relinquishing its responsibilities to the people of Floyd County. On the other hand if this is part of some plan of the local board, to wait until the anger in Floyd County toward the state department has reached a fever pitch and then return to the selection of a local

candidate when the people of Floyd County have grown tired of the whole mess, we want to assure the local board that we will oppose that with every means available to us.

We are not willing to be placed in a situation where a decision of this magnitude has to be made in a "crisis mentality." The local board had Dr. Jerry Austin's name in plenty of time to consider him and hire him. They chose not to do so. Now we are being told that there is no more time left—that all the potential candidates have been hired and out of a field of one hundred candidates, Dr. Towler is all that is left. We don't believe that.

We have said consistently that this is one battle that we will fight to the end. It is for the children and they deserve more. People have told us on several occasions that we may have to settle for less than the best in a superintendent because of the reputation that Floyd County has. We are not willing to accept the fact that the children of Floyd County must continue to pay for the lack of good leadership. We think that there were five good candidates that came to Floyd County in May—some better than others, but they were individuals that not only could have helped us move forward with reform and instruction but could have helped us hold our heads high statewide and be proud of the leadership that we have. For what has turned out to be purely personal and selfish motives, people have attempted to "smear" them and dismiss them. We want our board and elected politicians to start putting our children before politics. Along with us, the people of Floyd County need to be asking why certain people are fighting so hard to prevent someone from the outside from coming into Floyd County or why this local board is willing to give up its responsibility to independently select a candidate that it will submit for approval to the commissioner. We need the help and support of people in this county. The children of Floyd County deserve the best leadership that we can find—no less and that is worth taking the time to do right.

A FRIEND REMEMBERED

Delmon Howard was 84 years old when he died in 1985, but he left a legacy of wit and friendliness to many people who knew him. He had been a farmer, postmaster and teacher, but his most lasting profession was as principal of the Betsy Layne School.

After his retirement, he enjoyed his daily visits to the post office where I was postmaster. He could have had his mail delivered, but he didn't want the service. He wanted a reason to get out and see people, and he certainly brightened our working days.

We had several mutual interests, especially his stories. He loved the telling and I enjoyed the hearing.

So here he was again with his usual good humor. He visited with other people in the lobby and talked about the news of the day.

He picked up his newspaper and a couple of letters he had laid on the counter and I thought he was leaving. But he turned toward me and asked, "Did I ever tell you about the time Sid was refereeing a ball game and got caught up in his own exuberance?" (Sid Meade was a favorite subject who came across in living color.)

"What happened?" I asked. I watched the familiar twinkle in his eyes as he recalled the state high school basketball tournament of some years ago. He said, "Sid and another referee were calling the game and the championship trophy was at stake."

"The score was tied and the fans were on their feet as the teams came up the floor. A key player was in charge of the ball. Realizing the next point scored would be crucial to both sides, Sid got caught up in the excitement and blew his whistle for no apparent reason."

"The player stopped abruptly and caught the ball in the bend of his arm. The fans could read his lips as he asked, 'What was the call for, ref?'"

"Quick answers were usually no problem for Sid, and he desperately needed one here. 'Well,' he sputtered, 'it was for dribbling the ball in a congested area!'"

CLASSROOM TALES

David Hinchman, principal of Harold Elementary School once shared another Delmon Howard remembrance with me. "Did you ever hear the story A.D. Carpenter tells about Mrs. Howard's English class?" he asked.

He explained that their English text book had a chapter on mariners

and courtesy, and they had discussed in particular showing respect for others.

"You should always be careful," explained Mrs. Howard, "to be courteous to parents, teachers and people in special positions."

"That's why," she continued, "I call our principal 'Mr. Howard' at school and he call me 'Mrs. Howard.' Of course we use first names at home but you'll never hear either of us doing it here for we want to set the right example for you students."

Just as she finished that sentence, the door flew open and Mr. Howard came bustling in. "Myrtle!" he exclaimed, "I've lost my keys! Do you have any idea where they might be?"

The class broke up and thus ended a nice lecture on setting examples.

How much minable coal is left in Kentucky?

Fact #1: Kentucky is the second leading producer of coal in the United States. Fact #2: Kentucky is the leading producer of coal east of the Mississippi River. Fact #3: Coal is a finite resource—it simply won't last forever.

The availability of coal resources for economic development is of vital concern for Kentucky and the nation. And since the 1950s, various studies by U.S. and state geological survey teams have been conducted in order to determine how much coal remains in the state. Now in its fifth year, an ongoing coal availability study is being conducted by the Kentucky Geological Survey (KGS) at the University of Kentucky to revise estimates on the amount of coal that remains and that is possible to mine using current technology.

An obvious problem in making such calculations is that what is being

measured is underground—sometimes far beneath the surface. "There are two standard approaches to figuring out how much coal exists," says KGS coal geologist Gerry Weisenfluh. "Some coal seams lie in hills above the valley bottoms, more or less in a horizontal plane. In both natural outcrops and roadcuts you can see some of the coal. We measure the thickness of coal in these places and the area of the seams underlying the hills. We then make estimates of the change in coal thickness over the area and use this information to determine the original amount of coal for each seam."

The measurements get a bit trickier when the coal is below the valleys and can't be seen at all. In this case, Weisenfluh says, "exploration core holes" can be drilled into a seam at several points, and core samples—actual cylinders of the coal—can be

pulled up. The core samples are then measured and a thickness is determined for each seam in the core hole. Researchers can infer from this data the total thickness below ground.

Determining the amount of coal in Kentucky is an important initial step in the project, says KGS geologist Warren Anderson, but "the real issue is how much of this coal is potentially minable, and how does that translate in terms of years of productivity for the coal industry." Anderson explains that the simple presence of coal does not mean that it is available for mining.

"There are, for example, environmental considerations, land-use and technological restrictions to mining the coal—a number of things that have to be taken into account if we want a realistic picture of potential minability."

This 10-year project, now approximately half-completed, has some midterm results. To date, six quadrangles (each an area of about 54 square miles) in Eastern Kentucky have been measured by the researchers, who estimate the original existence for these areas of about 3.4 billion short tons of coal (a short ton = 2000 pounds). Of this amount, 14 percent has already been mined out or has been lost in the mining process. Three percent of the coal is unavailable because of land-use restrictions (cemeteries, power lines, major rivers and streams, municipal areas), and 32 percent is unavailable because of technological restrictions—primarily seams that are too thin for underground mining.

In addition, of the available coal resources in Eastern Kentucky, only half is believed to meet acceptable EPA emissions standards. According to assistant state geologist James Cobb, "In order to comply with EPA standards, coal for power generation now has to meet certain criteria, dealing primarily with sulfur content. The nature of the restrictions is an important policy question for coal-producing states like Kentucky."

Cobb says that the "biggest surprise" to come from the study so far is that not nearly as much coal is available for mining in Kentucky as was previously thought. "We can say now that earlier estimates of coal were exaggerated because restrictions to mining were not taken into account," Cobb says. "The amount of coal that is minable under current economic and technological conditions is considerably less than previously thought." He explains that earlier estimates made by the U.S. Department of Energy are far more optimistic than those made by the current study.

Cobb adds that this more scientific look at coal availability in Kentucky should be particularly relevant to policy-makers in the state.

"People are very concerned, for example, about how coal severance tax monies are allocated. Policy-

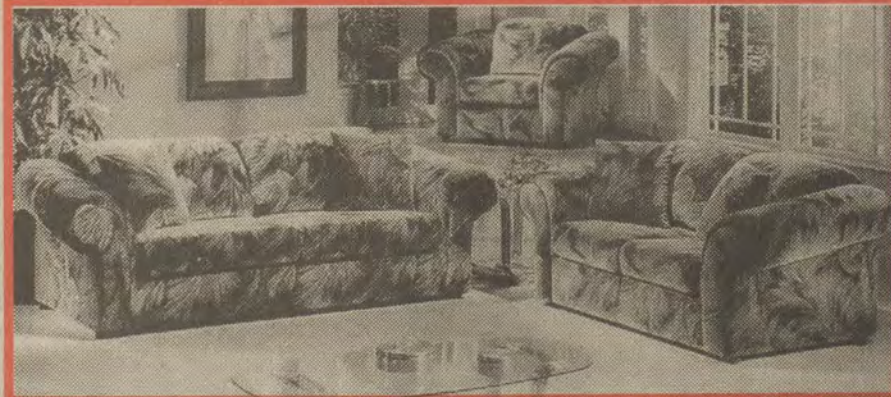

July is "National Hot Dog Month" and this is also the year of the Olympics, and so, why not become adventurous and combine the flavors and foods of other countries with a traditional American favorite—the hot dog.

Take for example, the peanut which originated in Africa and then traveled to the U.S. to become one of our most popular foods. Combine the two in a curry sauce for a truly international food presentation created in the kitchens of The National Hot Dog & Sausage Council.

The spices and flavors of Asia are combined in Frank Oriental Stir-Fry, a dish that is rapidly becoming an American standby.

FRANKS WITH PEANUT CURRY SAUCE

(Yield: 4 servings)
1 pound hot dogs
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 celery rib, finely chopped
1 small onion, finely chopped
2 tablespoons flour
1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon curry powder
2 cups chicken broth
1/2 cup natural peanut butter
1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons half and half
1/2 cup chopped roasted peanuts, to garnish
Crisp celery leaves, to garnish
TO PREPARE SAUCE: Melt butter in saucepan, saute' onion and celery until tender. Remove from heat; add flour and curry powder to form a smooth paste. Gradually add chicken

broth, stirring constantly, cook over medium heat until thickened. Turn heat to low, add peanut butter and half and half, stir until peanut butter melts—do not boil. Keep warm.

TO PREPARE FRANKS: Cut each frank diagonally 3/4 the way through in 4 to 5 places. Drop in pan of boiling water and heat until curled in spiral fashion.

TO SERVE: Spoon 1/4 cup peanut curry sauce onto serving plate; place 2 spiral franks on top. Garnish with a sprinkle of chopped peanuts and leaves of celery.

FRANK ORIENTAL STIR FRY

(Yield: 4 servings)
1/2 pound franks, cut in penny-wise slices
3 tablespoons sherry
2 tablespoons soy sauce
3 teaspoons cornstarch
2 tablespoons vegetable oil
1 medium yellow onion, coarsely chopped
6 green onions, cut in 1-1/2 inch lengths
1 tomato, peeled, seeded and diced
2 ribs celery, cut in 1-inch diagonal slices
1 clove garlic, crushed
1-inch piece fresh ginger, pared and grated
1/4 ounce can bean sprouts, drained
20 ounce can pineapple chunks, drained (reserve 1/2 cup liquid)
1/2 cup hot water
1 teaspoon instant chicken bouillon
In a small bowl, dissolve 1 teaspoon cornstarch in 1/2 tablespoon

each of sherry and soy sauce. Add frank pieces; mix to coat evenly. Let stand for 1 hour.

Heat 1 tablespoon oil in large skillet, add franks and cook 3 minutes until evenly brown; reserve and set aside. Add remaining oil, stir fry vegetables and pineapple chunks an additional 2 minutes or until heated through.

Dissolve chicken bouillon in water. Combine with 2 teaspoons cornstarch, 2 tablespoons sherry, 1-1/2 tablespoons each soy sauce and pineapple juice. Add franks and soy/sherry mixture to vegetables and pineapple in skillet. Continue to cook until thickened and well glazed. Serve with rice, if desired.

FRANK-LY PAELLA, BARCELONA STYLE

(Yield: 6 to 8 servings)
1 pound franks
2 cups white rice
16 cocktail size mini franks
8 ounces Italian sweet sausage or hard salami, thinly sliced
1/3 cup olive oil
3 cloves garlic, sliced
1 medium onion, coarsely chopped
1/4 teaspoon saffron, crushed
4 cups chicken broth
1 medium tomato, peeled, seeded and diced
1 green bell pepper, seeded and diced
1 red bell pepper, seeded and cut into thin strips or 1 jar whole pimento, drained and cut into strips
Bay leaf
Salt/Freshly ground pepper
Preheat oven to 350°F.
Cut four franks into quarters lengthwise. Slice remaining franks

into 3 pieces. Heat 2 tablespoons oil in large skillet, add frank strips and pieces—strips will curl; remove and set aside.

Add 1 tablespoon oil and cocktail franks and salami slices. Lightly brown; remove and set aside. Add remaining oil, garlic, onion to skillet and cook, stirring for 3 minutes. Add rice and saffron, cook and stir until rice turns golden. Add chicken broth and bay leaf. Bring to a boil, cover, and simmer 20 minutes. Salt and pepper to taste.

In a shallow 4-quart oven-proof casserole, arrange rice, sausages, tomato, and bell peppers so that some of each show on top. Heat in oven 15 to 20 minutes.

GRILLED SAUSAGE TAPAS (APPETIZERS)

(Yield: 8 to 10 servings)
1/2 pound fully cooked smoked sausage, cut into 1-1/2 inch pieces
1/2 pound fully cooked bratwurst, cut into 1-1/2 inch pieces
1/2 pound fully cooked bologna, cut into 1-1/2 inch pieces
1/2 pound fully cooked thuringer or summer sausage, cut into 1-1/2 inch pieces
10 pineapple chunks, drained
1 delicious red apple, cut into wedges
1 summer squash/zucchini, cut into 1 inch pieces
2 small onions, parboiled, cut into wedges
4 firm plum or cherry tomatoes, halved
4-6 whole medium mushrooms
1 each small green and red bell pepper, cut into 1-1/2 inch squares
LEMON PEPPER MARINADE/ SAUCE: Yield: approx. 1-1/2 cups
3/4 cup olive oil
3 tablespoons red wine vinegar
1/3 cup fresh lemon juice
2 teaspoons grated lemon rind
1 clove garlic, minced
2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon thyme
1/4 teaspoon freshly ground pepper
1/2 teaspoon salt
In a large mixing bowl, add Lemon Pepper Marinade ingredients. Beat with a wire whisk until well blended. Add sausage pieces and coat well, turning with a spatula. Marinade in refrigerator at least 1 hour, turning occasionally. Preheat grill. Alternate sausage with fruits and vegetables on skewers in an attractive fashion. Place kabobs on grill; brush generously with remaining marinade. Grill 5 to 6 minutes—turning as needed. Brush with marinade. Serve immediately when hot.

Stir chili mix into uncooked ground beef. Add two small cans whole peeled tomatoes including the juice and mix into ground beef mixture. (HINT: If possible, use a blender to puree tomatoes.)

Next stir chili beans or red kidney beans into mixture. (Blending beans in blender also makes cooking quicker and easier.) Mix well.

Last add tomato paste and again mix well.

Cook on slow temperature, stirring often. (This recipe is excellent for crockpot cooking; stir as needed.)

If a blender was not used, then when beans are soft, use a potato masher and mash beans and tomatoes into mixture during cooking process. (Careful, first remove the pan from burner and mash gently. Hot liquid can accidentally be splashed out of the pan.)

Continue slow cooking until the sauce's odor makes you so hungry, you've got to have a hot dog.

NOTE: If a crockpot is not used, check the sauce often to prevent scorching.

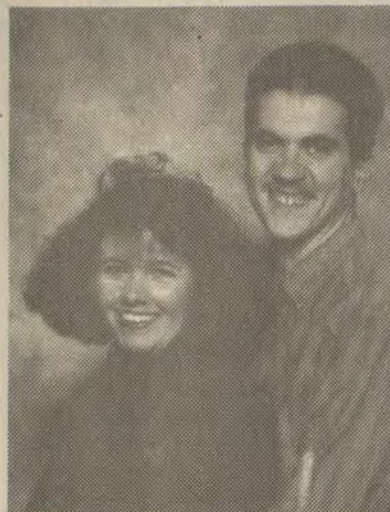

makers need sound information upon which to base decisions. It makes a big difference when considering severance taxes and the state's economic future if the resources are estimated to have a 400-year, 100-year, or 50-year life. It now looks like the 50-year time frame is more realistic." Developing new technologies could also be affected by some of the implications of this study, Cobb says. "With present technology, it's not feasible to mine by underground methods a seam of coal that's less than 28 inches because of the size and efficiency of mining equipment. This study points out that there is a significant resource that could be made available if new technology, such as robot mining machinery, were developed."

Free tree ID guide book available

"What Tree Is That?," a pocket guide for identifying trees, is available free-of-charge from The National Arbor Day Foundation.

The 72-page guide will help you identify 135 different trees found in the eastern and central U.S.

Well-known trees are included: oaks, maples, spruces, and pines. Also species such as horsechestnut and mockernut hickory, sassafras and shadbush, persimmon and pawpaw and pagodatree and pecan.

Dozens of drawings illustrate the trees' leaves or needles and their acorns, berries, seed pods, cones, etc. "What Tree Is That?" is organized to make it easy to identify trees in a simple step-by-step fashion.

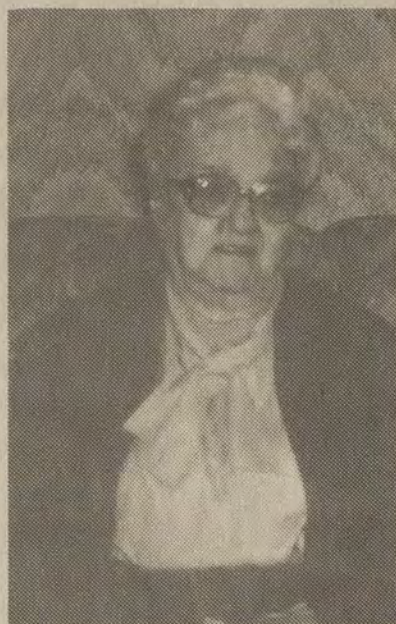
Morrison reported that he and his wife and Libby Martin, another Board member, attended the recent health forum held at Jenny Wiley State Park.

BALANCED BUDGET AMENDMENT—BOON OR BAD FOR SENIORS? There's a lot of talk during this election year about an amendment to the Constitution that would require the federal government to do what state governments have to do: provide a balanced budget every year. (Of course, states don't have the responsibility of defense, border patrols, domestic and international emergencies, and other factors that can make the comparison between the two entities—the federal government and state governments—unrealistic.)

We've already seen how the states—in order to balance their budgets—have had to raise taxes as well as cut back drastically on providing services to their local communities because of cutbacks in funding from Washington. What will Washington cut back when they have to meet their constitutional mandate?

According to critics of the balanced budget amendment, we can expect drastic cuts in education, health care, and many of the Social Security programs now in effect, including Medicare.

In the next several weeks, you will be hearing much more about this subject. The White House plans a campaign to raise support for the legislation. The amendment's opponents also plan an educational blitz. I recommend that you contact your Congressperson—who may or may not be in favor of the amendment—and ask what the status of entitlement programs would be in this situation.

The idea of the balanced budget, of course, is to get a handle on the deficit. But as I've said before in this column, it would be breaking faith with Americans if this contract we've had with our government over 50 years would be scapegoated to try to solve a financial mess that exploded

over the past 10 years.

"SMART" DRUGS CAN BE A DUMB IDEA: Some older folks are involved in a dubious effort to try to combat Alzheimer's disease or other age-related problems of mental decline by using certain so-called "smart" drugs that are supposed to enhance mental performance. But, according to a report in the May, 1992 issue of "Pharmaceutical Representative," the FDA has never approved a drug for enhancing memory or improving intellectual functions.

BREAK THE PRESCRIPTION CYCLE: Many seniors are in the habit of asking for a prescribed medication to deal with every physical problem they have. Talk to your doctor and agree on which of your problems can be handled without medication. You'll probably find you feel much better once you stop taking so many drugs.

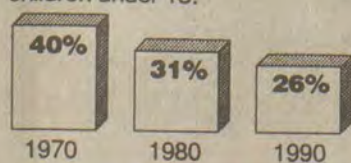

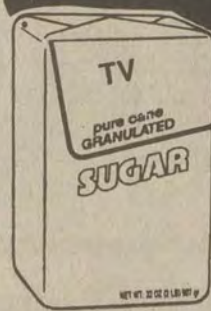

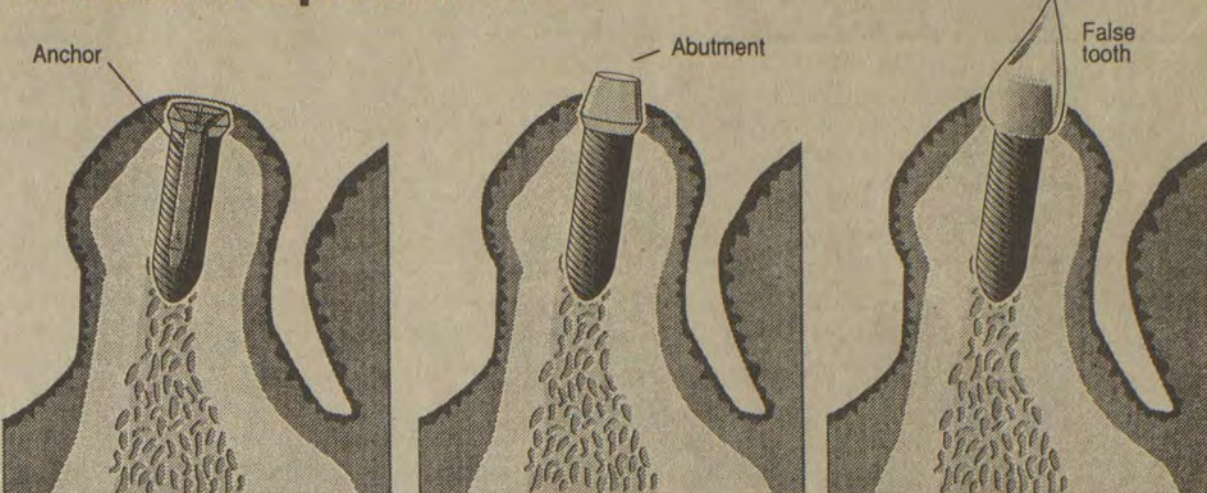

Lawn and garden care:

The "in" activity of the '90's

You gave up jogging when your knees blew out and your shoes started costing more than your car. Tennis left you with a sore elbow and an inferiority complex every time your opponent aced you on a serve. The health club membership began gathering dust right after you wrenched your back doing full body curls, and besides, you were already spending so much time away from home that you forgot your kids' names.

In the '90s, more and more Americans are finding exercise, relaxation, a respite from stress, and a sense of personal accomplishment literally right in their own back yards.

Lawn and garden care, the beautification of one's immediate environment, is showing a resurgence of interest among people of all age groups, who have come to recognize that the lawn spreader, the garden hoe and the rake have become the '90s arsenal in the quest for physical fitness and personal fulfillment.

"We're seeing a virtually unprecedented growth of interest in all aspects of do-it-yourself lawn and garden care," says Tadd Seitz, Scotts chairman and CEO. "People are recognizing that working on a lawn or garden is an inexpensive and rewarding way for the whole family to get out in the fresh air, get some exercise and feel a real sense of accomplishment."

Economic factors may be providing some of the impetus for the "back-to-the-back yard" movement. Consumers looking for value for their recreational dollars are finding that lawn and garden care provides an excellent return on a relatively small investment. Realtors note that well-kept lawns, gardens and landscaping add significantly to the resale value of a home.

"It's truly one of the most cost-

effective activities a consumer can get involved in," says Seitz. "Good quality tools, equipment and supplies are affordable, and the only other investment, your time and labor, can be as much or as little as you want it to be. You're limited, really, only by your imagination."

Environmental concerns may also be behind the rekindled interest in lawn and garden care. Consumers seem to be heeding the message that well-maintained lawns and landscaping have benefits far beyond the cosmetic, providing protection against soil erosion, pollution, noise and other problems of an urbanized environment.

"From grade school science classes, most of us learned that green plants are oxygen providers," says Seitz. "But now we're all becoming more aware of the dozens of other environmental benefits that come with healthy, growing plants."

For many, the simple recreational benefits of lawn and garden care are enough to get them into the yard with sleeves rolled up. Many consumers mention that working in the yard simply makes them "feel better," a reaction supported by psychologists who have looked into the effects of pastoral settings on human personality.

"It's a great way to relieve stress and clear the mind of the problems of the work place. The back yard can provide a retreat of sorts; a kind of health spa-at-home for the mind and body," said Seitz.

Whatever the motivations, industry sales figures certainly reflect the resurgence of home lawn and garden activity. O.M. Scott & Sons, the nation's leading producer and distributor of lawn and garden products,

has seen an increase in sales of its products despite inclement weather this spring.

"The interesting point about the sales increase is that much of it seems to be coming from people who haven't done much in the way of lawn and garden work before now," says Scharade Radtke, director of Lawn and Garden Marketing.

Response to the Scotts consumer hotline (1-800-543-TURF) is another indication that lawn and garden work is gaining widespread popularity. Last year, Scotts experts handled 180,000 calls from consumers who asked for advice on every conceivable lawn and garden topic. This year, calls to the consumer line numbered 32,300 in May alone (compared to 25,600

last May—an increase of 26 percent for the month).

Managing Your Biggest Investment

FINDING THE KIND OF HELP YOU REALLY NEED

Whether you're planning to sell your house, sell your house and buy another, or become a homeowner for the first time, the support of a good agent backed by a strong system can make all the difference.

How do you go about finding a good broker? You can hardly do better than by starting with what your eyes and ears tell you in your own neighborhood or home town. If you see a brokerage that's well established and apparently involved in a good many listings and sales, that's a good preliminary sign.

If you ask around and hear good things about a broker or agent, that too is a good sign. If your inquiries turn up evidence pointing to a history of good business performance and high integrity, you're probably on the trail of someone worth talking with.

And that's the logical next step: to visit and talk with the people who seem most impressive on the basis of what you've seen and heard.

Conduct your appointments with agents and brokers as interviews, remembering that you're the prospective employer and the broker or agent is the applicant. You're in charge—or should be.

Don't be shy about asking questions that really dig in. Ask the people you talk with about their experience—how many listings they've had in the past two or three years, how many houses they've sold in the same period, how much of the local market they handle. Ask for references, and

check them out.

If you have some knowledge of contract, financing, closing procedures and the like, put that knowledge into questions that will help you see who really is knowledgeable and who isn't. Ask something that will require getting back to you later—and see who's responsive and who isn't.

Ask if the office you're visiting is connected in some way with a national relocation service. Such a connection can send lots of highly motivated buyers in your direction. And don't fail to ask about your project. If you're looking for someone to sell your house, ask for recommended prices. Then ask for facts that justify any recommendation you don't understand.

Ask for ideas on how to market your house. Ask whether that marketing will include open houses—and, if so, how soon and how often. Watch for evidence of enthusiasm, creativity, and the kind of optimism that's firmly rooted in the realities of the situation. You want an optimist, but not a cockeyed optimist.

Finally, ask for a guarantee that everything promised will be delivered. And ask for that guarantee to be put in writing, with a written assurance that non-performance will free you from any and all contractual obligations.

Does this sound complicated and more time-consuming than just handing the job over to somebody your sister-in-law's manicurist recommended last year? Well, it is more complicated. And it does take more time—in the beginning. But it can pay off a hundredfold over the long term.

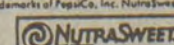
