Teachers' group, board member take aim at Boysen :

Watchdog asked to investigate top dog

The watchdog for education reform is being asked to investigate the top dog of education in state because of the events surrounding Floyd County's controversial search for a new superintendent of schools.

The role that Education Commissioner Thomas Boysen and his staff played in the search process has angered the executive committee of the local teachers group and board member Eddie Billips.

In a July 6 letter to Boysen, Billips claims that deputy education commissioner Dave Thomas told him that if the board did not choose Boysen's choice for superintendent they would feel the wrath of a state investigation.

The Floyd County Education Association's (FCEA) executive committee sent a letter Tuesday to Penney Sanders, director of the state's Office of Education Accountability, asking her office to investigate Commissioner Boysen and his staff; Kentucky School Boards Association (KSBA) consultant Ken Scott

and the Floyd County Board of Education. The committee claims that Boysen's candidate, Steve Towler, was hired by the board because of threats of possible removal from office by the department of education.

In his letter to the commissioner, Billips said Thomas told him that an investigation would continue in the district if the "wrong" candidate was hired. Billips said the conversation with Thomas occurred after Thomas' trip to Nebraska to interview the board's choice for superintendent,

William Zitterkopf.

"He stated that he felt Mr. Zitterkopf did not have the experience to be superintendent and outlined his reasons," Billips letter said. "He then made a statement that has caused me great problems. He stated that if we hired the wrong man, the investigation would continue, and if we hired the right man, then the department would help us."

Billips called Thomas' statements "obnoxious and overbearing" and said they were received "just as they were intended, as a threat of retaliation."

About 30 investigators from the department of education descended on the district in May to conduct an investigation and Boysen announced at that time "non-performing employees could be fired and school officials could be ousted" pending the results of that investigation.

Education department spokesman Jim Parks said Tuesday that the results of that investigation are not complete and he would not give an approximate date when those results could be expected. Parks said the department would have "no com-

ment" on Billips' letter to Boysen.

Billips and the teachers have also questioned the role of KSBA consultant Ken Scott in the selection process.

Thomas recommended that the board hire Scott to further investigate candidates for superintendent after controversial news reports surfaced about four of the five candidates selected by the screening committee.

Billips said in the board's first encounter with the consultant, Scott

Industrial authority members named :

Suit seeks to strip board

A Prestonsburg city councilman filed suit Monday in Floyd Circuit Court in an apparent effort to block a two-city industrial authority's plan to conduct a "best-use" study on the Paintsville-Prestonsburg Airport site.

Councilman Jerry Fannin alleged in his complaint that the members of a joint Paintsville-Prestonsburg Industrial Authority "are not members of a legally constituted body," and he

asked that the authority be enjoined from "taking any action in the name of the cities..."

The Paintsville-Prestonsburg Industrial Authority was formed in 1987 by ordinances adopted by councils in both cities. The six-member group, inactive since an initial meeting in 1987, was revived recently by both city councils and assigned the study on the controversial airport site.

A "best-use" study on the airport property—to determine the benefits of alternative uses for the 40-acre site—arose as a recommendation from the Big Sandy Area Development District during a joint meeting of Prestonsburg and Paintsville councils earlier this year.

The joint industrial authority was later directed to undertake that study and to make recommendations to both councils.

Fannin's suit contends that the terms of the authority members have expired and it alleges that those members have no authority to act in behalf of the cities.

The suit also suggests that certain members of the authority—Scott Perry, Ted Nairn, Dennis Dorton, and Dr. David White "have all, at one time or another, expressed an opinion stating the Prestonsburg/Paintsville Airport should be closed."

Fannin also alleges that efforts by the authority to "recommend a closure of said airport, or even to study the matter, is a sham and constitutes an illegal conflict of interest inasmuch as some of these defendants are also members of the Big Sandy Regional Airport's board."

Members of the authority were served with copies of the suit Mon-

Demotion was illegal, Tackett says

A former principal who was demoted to a homebound teacher in May has filed a lawsuit against the Floyd County Board of Education and the interim superintendent.

Thomas Tackett, who was principal at Adams Middle School, filed suit last week claiming that he was not notified of the move until after the May 15 deadline.

Interim superintendent Eldon Smith sent Tackett a letter dated May 14 notifying him of the demotion. Tackett claims in the suit that the demotion is invalid because he did not receive the letter before May 15, which he alleges was a violation of board policy and state law.

Tackett also claims that he was denied his rights to due process be-

New school sought for Middle Creek:

Group demands two resignations

A group wanting a new Prestonsburg High School built on a site at Middle Creek is calling for the resignations of two Floyd County school board members.

In an open letter to the board, John D. Sammons, spokesman for the citizens' group, has made four demands to the board of education that include the resignations of board chairman Ray "Shag" Campbell and board member Eddie Billips.

The letter said that Campbell should resign his position as chairman because of "his inability to effectively serve" in that capacity. Billips is being asked to resign due to "his lack of representation for the entirety of district one."

Other demands are to change the name of school to North Floyd High School and to begin construction at the site immediately.

Apparently, those demands will

not be met.

Board chairman Campbell had no comment on Sammons' demands and said "that's just one man's opinion." Billips concurred with Campbell's view.

"Any decision I have as far as resigning goes will not include Mr. Sammons requests," Billips said Tuesday.

As for the other issues, Billips said he felt it was Sammons who was not willing to represent the district in its entirety.

"As far as Mr. Sammons concerns he is the one who, in an open letter to the editor some months back, said what this county needed was a new high school in district one, a new grade school and a new central office," Billips said. "It seems his interests are a lot less focused for the entirety than are mine."

On the site issue, Billips said the board is waiting for approval from

At Allen commission meeting :

Wastewater plan protested

In their first meeting since April, Allen City commissioners heard objections from four residents Monday concerning the proposed location of a sewage treatment plant.

Chester Porter, Jerome Kinzer, Ray Clifton and Debbie Lumpkins told commissioners that constructing the treatment plant in the Hinton Hollow area would create a health hazard to those living there and would cause property values to plummet.

"There's not enough room there and I don't like it going in in front of

my home," Clifton said. "Let's get all the corporations together—Emma, Dwale, Allen and New Allen—and get everybody involved. We're going to be the ones paying for it."

Commissioners explained that two sites are under consideration, the one at Hinton Hollow and a location at Dwale. Acting mayor Elmer Parsons said the state owned the Hinton Hollow site and that if the state chose that site little could be done to prevent it.

"I don't care who owns it, you can't push it on people," Porter said.

Kinzer asked the commission what the debt service will be on the project. Parsons explained that the city is

seeking state and federal grants to help offset the costs of the \$2.8 million plant and that the city would have to get a \$1.3 million loan.

City clerk Bill Parsons told the residents the Dwale site was the first priority and would be selected if the majority of residents in Dwale agreed to tap on the system.

Residents suggested several other sites to locate the plant, one being the old garbage dump site. The commission said they would consider their suggestions.

In other business, commissioner

Coal ash landfill is subject of gathering

A group of concerned Floyd County citizens is meeting Thursday evening to protest the proposed construction of a landfill that will contain out of state coal waste.

The Ivel and Big Sandy Citizens Against Pollution committee, formed Monday at the Tom's Creek Freewill Baptist Church at Ivel, has expressed concern that a new facility proposed by Pikeville-based Costain Coal Incorporated will present a potential hazard to Floyd County, the community of Ivel and the Beaver-Elkhorn Water District.

The proposed facility is to be a residual landfill for the disposal of fly and bottom coal ash generated from combustion of coal from the coal-fired utility operated by A E S Cedar Bay, Inc., a Jacksonville, Florida-based power company.

Fly ash is a fine, silt-sized material consisting of largely spherical, sometimes hollow, glassy particles. Bottom ash is the coal ash that remains in the furnace after combustion.

Malcolm Layne, the president of the Ivel and Big Sandy Citizens, said that although the group did not wish to create any problems for the coal industry in Eastern Kentucky, they were extremely concerned about the environmental hazards the facility might create, particularly since the state of Florida, he said, would not allow such a facility.

"My feeling," Layne said Tuesday, "is that if it isn't good enough for the state of Florida, it's not good enough for the community of Ivel,

Korner Drug is no more :

P'burg landmark closes its doors

For years, the walls of the Korner Drug Store have echoed with the sounds of laughter, of old friends reminiscing, new friends meeting for the first time. Just about anyone who has grown up in Prestonsburg in the last four decades has fallen in love over a cherry coke or root beer float at least once at the "Fountain Korner." Sadly, however, those days have now been locked away in the cedar trunk of memory.

The Korner Drug Store has closed its doors. Rick Stone, owner of Korner Drug since 1990, last week sold the store to Rite-Aid Pharmacies, which will accommodate Stone's subscription customers at its Highlands Plaza location.

The Korner Drug Store itself now stands dark and empty, a silent testament to a bygone era.

Joe, Hearn and John Burke opened the store in 1948. The structure had

been built the previous year by John Allen and Benny Meade on the same site where the First Baptist Church burned in the late 1930s.

The store started small, but over the years the Burke brothers expanded, buying out an adjacent appliance store, a restaurant and the old C.L. Hutsonpiller pharmacy, to become the main attraction of the downtown area.

Henry Mayo, now Main Street Manager for the city of Prestonsburg, remembers the Korner Drug with a great deal of fondness and maybe a hint of regret.

"It's always been a hangout for all the local people," Mayo said. "It was the local meeting place. In those days, the Fountain Korner and the youth center were the only places in town.... It's sad that it had to close."

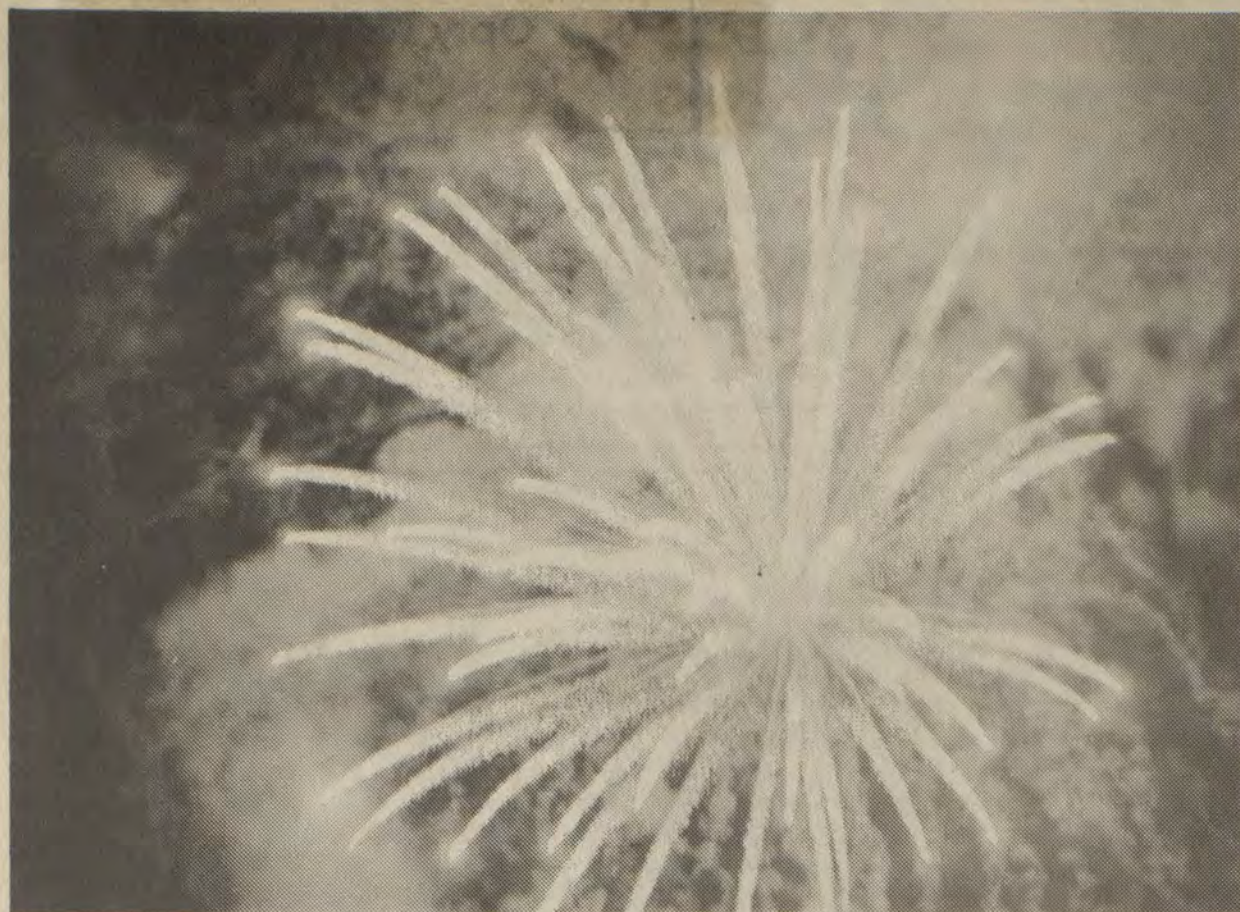
John Burke, one of the original owners, remembers the early days of the store when it was the only place in

Floyd County, Eastern Kentucky or the Commonwealth of Kentucky."

Layne voiced concern that the ash might contain certain metal contaminants, such as lead and mercury. He also said that since the ash would be transported and dumped near the river, there would be terrific potential for ash and dust to be swept into the air or into the river, thus contaminating the atmosphere and the water for the entire Beaver-Elkhorn Water District.

Tommy Westfall, Sr., co-vice president of the citizen's group with

Troy Cole, concurred.

"We just question why they don't keep it in the state of Florida," Westfall said. "If the material is non-toxic and non-hazardous, it just seems strange that it's regulated and has to be kept in a confined area."

Westfall added that the group is more concerned with the future of the landfill than the present, noting that although all necessary precautions may be taken now but things may change during the proposed 45-year lifetime of the facility.

"We've been here all our lives," Westfall said. "We just want to make sure our grandchildren are here twenty years from now."

Mike Francisco and Tom Mattox, engineers for Costain in charge of the proposed landfill, said Tuesday that they wished to allay any fears, doubts or concerns that anyone may have about the landfill.

Francisco said that the ash is neither toxic nor hazardous and that the ash was being transported to Kentucky not because the state of Florida refused it, but because Costain's exclusive contract with A E S Cedar Bay, Inc. stipulated that Costain take care of ash disposal.

Francisco said that the fly ash is used in Florida in much the same way as limestone is used in Kentucky, such as in concrete and asphalt and cover for gardens.

Mattox said that the waste is to be confined to the landfill because Costain does not want to take any chances.

"We're taking no shortcuts, doing nothing that will in any way sacrifice anyone's health or safety in the Ivel community or in Eastern Kentucky," Mattox said.

Francisco added that the landfill was designed following much of the same stipulations concerning municipal landfills. He also said that although there is the possibility that some of the ash might contain concentrations of certain metals, in order for it to be disposed at the Ivel facility, it must meet the same standards of metal concentration as drinking water.

An official from the Kentucky Cabinet for Natural Resources Division of Waste Management said that fly ash and bottom ash seldom contain hazardous contaminants, but as a precaution all ash to be disposed must first be subjected to a toxic characteristics leaching process which would determine its content. Materials that do not meet federal and state restrictions would not legally be allowed to be disposed of at the facility.

The Ivel and Big Sandy Citizens Against Pollution will meet Thursday evening at 7 p.m. with representatives from Costain coal, the Environmental Protection Agency and

state and local officials. The meeting will take place at Layne Brothers Ford at Ivel. Refreshments will be provided. All residents of the Big Sandy area are invited to attend.

Ann Bentley told the commission that several small children had been playing near the city streets and she was concerned that they would be hit by cars.

cause a pre-demotion hearing was not held. The suit also claims that Smith failed to record Tackett's demotion in the May 26, June 9 and June 16 board minutes.

Tackett, 52, also alleges he is being discriminated against because of his age.

The suit asks that Tackett be reinstated as a principal, for the return of lost wages and benefits and compensation for mental anguish, embarrassment, humiliation and loss of professional reputation.

A civil suit complaint lists only the plaintiff's cause of action.

said he would not hire any of the five candidates and recommended Towler to the board.

"Dr. Scott also stated that Dr. Jerry Austin had a 'fatal flaw' and that fatal flaw was his wife," Billips said. "He failed to tell us at that time that Dr. Towler's wife had a similar problem."

Austin's wife was convicted of five counts of altering prescriptions in Virginia. Towler's wife, a third grade teacher, was convicted of driving under the influence in Hardin County last year.

In Scott's second meeting with the board, Billips said Scott told them Austin's wife could control her problems and also informed them of Towler's wife's arrest. Billips said Scott told the board Towler was the best man for the job.

The board instead voted unanimously to hire Nebraska Educator William Zitterkopf for the position. Boysen later rejected Zitterkopf saying he did not have the experience to lead the Floyd County School System.

"The odor of this matter will linger across the state for some time to come," Billips told Boysen. "It is apparent that Dr. Scott had every intent to direct this board toward Dr. Towler. When you were brought into this state you were seen riding a white horse, now it appears that you are driving a whitewash truck."

"The only real change brought about by KERA appears to be the best 'good 'ole boys' that a \$1.6 billion tax increase can bring into the state," Billips continued. "Whatever the reason for your decision and your efforts, the results will be ones that you and your staff will have to live with for a long time. There are many questions you must answer as a result of these actions."

The teachers group was not as harsh on Boysen in their assessment of the selection process but said the "average person in Floyd County understandably believes that some sort of collusion has taken place" in the decision to hire Towler.

The teacher's letter to OEA said that Thomas had suggested that the screening committee "might want to bring" the names of Austin and Towler to "the attention of the local board" prior to his visit to Nebraska.

"The original plan involved the submission of two names that would be acceptable to the commissioner: Dr. Towler and Dr. Austin—the same names that had been submitted to the board earlier by Ken Scott," the letter said.

"In submitting this name, the commissioner began a process that basically eliminated any further work on the part of the screening committee and gave the local board the opportunity to claim that it was being coerced into a decision privately while publicly claiming that it was free to make any choice it wished," the letter said.

The board voted last Thursday to hire Towler for a four-year term beginning July 15. Board member Billips was out of the state and unable to attend that meeting.

For Your Eyes Only

WHEN SHOULD MY CHILD'S EYES BE EXAMINED?

A child's eyes should be examined shortly after birth, again before one year of age, and then before the age of 4 or 5 before starting school. Regular eye exams ensure that both eyes remain healthy and insure proper development of visual skills.

Remember that children may not complain about their eyes. Don't overlook routine examinations.

It is a myth that children have to be able to read to have their eyes examined. The eye doctor is trained to observe the reflection of light flashes in the child's eye to determine the need for eyeglasses. This test is called retinoscopy. It also may be performed by computer.

There are various ways a child with eye health problems enters the doctor's office from the health care system. At birth, the attending doctor may observe physical defects such as cataracts or irregularities of the eyelids, cornea, or retina. Later the pediatrician or county health department may detect crossed-eyes. Schools may perform screening tests to determine a child's vision.

Proper overall development of your child may vary directly with good vision. Adequate vision at play develops proper eye-hand coordination. Poor vision may produce eye fatigue and interfere with long periods of study. Thereby poor study habits may develop.

Don't take your child's eye health for granted. Although some parents feel inadequate upon learning that their child needs to wear eyeglasses, a second opinion may dispel those parents' fears. If a lazy eye is not detected and vision is not stimulated by eyeglasses early in the child's life, the eye may not properly develop. In such cases vision may not be recovered at maturity and the eye becomes what is known as a 'lazy eye'.

A red eye, pain in the eye, or abnormal pupil size are symptoms which require immediate attention. Those families with a history of vision problems or eye diseases must pay more attention to their children's eye health.

Although home tests are not a substitute for a professional eye examination, squinting is a sign of nearsightedness, holding reading material close may be a sign of farsightedness, and headaches may indicate astigmatism. Routine examinations are necessary where growing children's vision may change rapidly from year to year.

Only an eye examination by an eye doctor can insure proper development of your child and prevent loss of vision upon maturity. Have your child's eyes examined shortly after birth, again before one year old, and at age 4 or 5. Whenever redness appears or unusual habits appear, see your eye doctor immediately.

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE FLOYD COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION

The concerned citizens committee for a new progressive high school, above the flood plain, for Floyd County's district one, would like to place four specific demands on the Floyd County Board of Education. These demands have been carefully thought out, thoroughly discussed, and are the result of an eighteen-month disagreement with certain members of the board. With all due respect to the voters of district one and the utmost concern for the youth of our district the following demands are issued:

1. That the Board proceed immediately with the preparation phase for the Prestonsburg High School replacement facility on the only approved site in the district, that site being on the Board-owned Middle Creek property.

4. That Mr. Ray "Shag" Campbell resign his chairmanship of the Floyd County Board of Education due to his inability to effectively serve in this capacity.

It is our firm belief that these demands are being made in the best interest of all Floyd County in order to get our school system on a more progressive course. We expect these demands to be met in the immediate future.

the Kentucky Department of Education on an alternate site chosen by the board. The board is currently exploring the old Prestonsburg Drive-In site as the location for a new high school.

Billips said that site was picked because it would cost less to prepare it for construction. He added that "the whole concept" for the alternate site was "to save some of the \$3.5 million" it would cost to build on the Middle Creek property.

"We're trying to save every dollar we can so we can use it to benefit other students," Billips said.

town you could get a fountain soda. "In those days, the old Abigail Theatre was right next door," Burke recalls with a laugh. "They sold popcorn, but they didn't sell Cokes, so right after the movie was over everybody would come over to the store for a Coke."

Burke said that back then, Coca-Cola came in gallon glass jugs. They didn't have ice machines, so they had to buy ice in fifty pound blocks and run it through a crushing machine in the basement, then carry it upstairs to the store.

"One day," Burke said, "we used over 500 pounds of ice."

Burke is especially proud of the fact that since the day the store opened in 1948 until April 22, 1990, the day he sold it, it was family owned and operated. He and his brothers ran the business while their sister Ethel waited on customers. His son Johnny worked there for years as a pharmacist.

Unfortunately, all good things must come to an end. "Heam died a few years ago," Burke said, "and Joe's been sick and I'm 67. I just got tired of running the place."

Mayo attributes much of the reason for Korner Drug's closure to the

fact that many of the stores former customers now shop at larger stores such as Wal-Mart.

"I just don't understand it," Mayo said. "People just don't seem to want to shop downtown. Downtown, they want to park right in front of the door, but they'll walk two city blocks through the parking lot at Wal-Mart."

Mayo added that although several of the older downtown businesses have closed, the ones that remain are thriving.

"I think it's just a question of how you market your product," Mayo said. Mayo also said that although Korner Drug is now standing empty, there may yet be hope for the tradition to continue. As a part of the city's Main Street project, there is money available to prospective buy-

ers of the store to renovate and build a new facade.

"I've talked to both of the owners of the building," Mayo said, "and I've also got some people interested in putting some sort of business there, but nothing's been worked out yet."

Still, he said, it would be nice to have the old Korner Drug Store back.

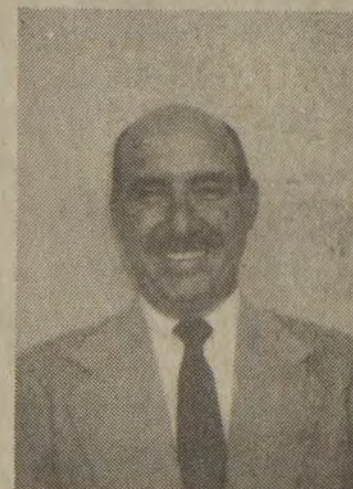

Floyd man treated for smoke inhalation as fire burns home

A Floyd County man was treated for smoke inhalation after he awakened to find his Wilson Creek home ablaze.

Delbert Gordon Stephens was

asleep when an electrical overload occurred in circuits near his bedroom, igniting a fire around 11:15 p.m. June 28. When Maytown firefighters arrived after being called to the scene by Stephens' sister, Connie Stephens, they found him outside the home. EMTs Brian Ratliff and Kenneth Scarberry treated him and requested an ambulance to transport Stephens to the hospital.

Maytown firefighters attacked the fire and contained it to the bedroom and utility area of the frame home.

"We doused it pretty quick," said Keith Hayes, Maytown volunteer firefighter. "It didn't take long once we got in there." Firefighters arrived on the scene within seven minutes of receiving the call. Twelve Maytown firefighters responded to the call.

In a separate fire, members of the Left Beaver Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Squad extinguished a car fire on July 4. Firefighters were called to the Bank Josephine parking lot in McDowell around 2 a.m. after a passing motorist spotted the blaze.

The car was totally destroyed. Firefighters said the blaze was of suspicious origin. Kentucky State Police were called to the scene.

Kentucky's share of the commodity pie slightly smaller

Though Kentucky will receive fewer commodities during July, August and September, Floyd County shouldn't see a difference in the amount of commodities distributed here, according to officials with the Big Sandy Community Action Program.

"For this quarter, we won't see a decrease in Floyd County (commodities)," said Glenda Smith, with the Big Sandy Community Action Program.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has notified state officials that Kentucky will receive 1.5 million pounds of surplus food commodities during July, August and September, fewer than the quarter's allotment last year.

The estimated value of the commodities shipped to Kentucky over the next three months is more than \$591,000.

"As in the past, we have been allocated fewer commodities during this last quarter of the federal fiscal year," said Mike Robinson, commissioner of the Department for Social Insurance, the agency that manages the federal surplus commodity program in Kentucky.

"Usually, we receive fewer commodities during the first and last quarters and receive larger amounts of commodities during the second and third quarters of the fiscal year. And this continues to be the case."

This quarter's 1.5 million pounds of foodstuff compares with the 1.7 million pound allocation for this time last year but is down from last quarter's (April-June) 1.9 million pounds.

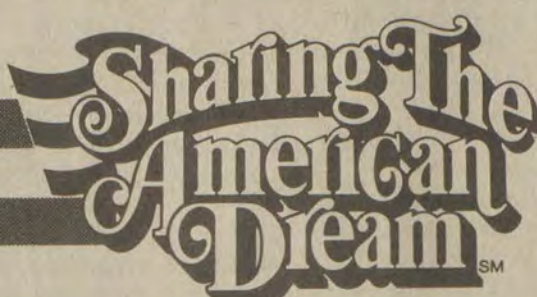

Coffee Break

"You done stomped on my heart,
and mashed that sucker flat..."
—words from a not so well-known country song

That pretty well sums up the way a lot of folks in Floyd County are feeling these days.

There is a sense of betrayal arising from the process used to select a new superintendent for the Floyd County schools.

A lot of trust went into that process. A lot of hope was pinned to it.

In the end, the process failed. Not because of those who participated in it, but because of those who devised it and then deserted it.

Some say time will heal all wounds but a broken heart.

Perhaps, but mending broken trust may be just as unlikely.

Here's some interesting stats, courtesy of the Heritage Foundation—a tax exempt public policy research institute—which has "for the fun of it" compared life as we knew it during the Carter Administration to life as we know it now...

•In 1977 there were 22 communist countries. In 1992 there are five.

•In 1977 the government deficit (in 1991 dollars) was \$114 billion. In 1992 the deficit is \$388 billion.

•In 1977 the number of state and local government employees totaled 12.4 million. In 1991 the total was 15.4 million.

•In 1977 the value of a one-dollar bill was \$1.00. In 1992 the value of a dollar is 47 cents.

•In 1977 11.9 million people had cable TV service. In 1990, 50 million had cable.

•In 1978, two percent of the country's households had VCRs. In 1992 the number is 77 percent.

•In 1977 the country's largest labor union was the Teamsters. In 1992 the largest union is the National Education Association.

In our fifteen-or-so years of

promoting economic diversity for Eastern Kentucky, we never imagined the day would arrive when efforts to create jobs for those who don't have them would have to be defended.

The controversy over the future of Combs Airport has presented just such a situation.

On Monday, members of a Paintsville-Prestonsburg Industrial Authority (of which we are a member) were sued in an effort to block that committee's attempts to conduct a best-use study on the airport property. The authority was asked to conduct that study by city governments in Paintsville and Prestonsburg.

The industrial authority has no control over the airport site, no authority to decide if it will be closed. The committee has been asked only to explore the airport site's potential, including its continued use as an airport.

For that, members of the authority stand accused of being part of some dark conspiracy, that their effort to "even study" the airport's potential as an industrial site is "a sham" and an "illegal conflict of interest."

What a shame.

The state legislature's Board of Ethics voted Monday to prepare regulations that would make it unethical for members of the General Assembly to accept more than \$200 in free game tickets in a three-year period.

Going by the "market value" of lower arena seats for UK basketball games, that means legislators may get to attend just one home contest every three years.

One legislator, Rep. Paul Clark, D-Louisville, didn't agree with the proposed limit on free tickets.

"I don't think a legislator can be bought with a ticket," he said. Yeah, right.

Some will sell their influence and votes for four hundred bucks, but not for a court-side seat at, say, a UK-Tennessee game.

Hahahahahahahahaha.

There's a lot of anger—and sadness—right now about what has happened during the search for a new superintendent in Floyd County. Some people cared deeply about finding a good superintendent and teachers have worked as hard at this as they did during the strike. I know teachers who went home Thursday night after the board meeting and cried. Some of us blamed ourselves for not being able to do more. I will always feel that I let the people of Floyd County and the five candidates down by not anticipating what some people will do to hold on to power.

I will always feel a certain amount of responsibility for what happened to these candidates in Floyd County. Good people were attacked when they were not present to defend themselves and their reputations damaged. I have never met anyone that I respect more than I do some of these five candidates. Dr. Edward Caputo is probably one of the most intelligent, caring people I have ever met. The people in Floyd County who didn't have the chance to meet him, though, will always think of him as a "lunatic" because that is how our county attorney described him at the fiscal court meeting. I have known very few people who care as much about children and education as Edward Caputo or are as intelligent as he is. The same is true of the other candidates. Those of us who met the five finalists know that we have lost some good people.

A great deal of the anger that people in Floyd County feel about how this search ended is being directed toward Commissioner Boyesen. The commissioner made some grave mistakes in how he handled the process here. I believe he, like the rest of us, has to share responsibility for what has happened. I have expressed my concerns about some of those actions in a letter to Dr. Penny Sanders and to members of the State Board of Education. As much as I wish that he had used better judgment, I also believe it is wrong to lay the blame for what has happened to us at his door.

Our local board members have to bear the responsibility for what has happened during this search process.

The local board did not give up its power, but they did open the door for the involvement of the commissioner. Some of the board members apparently made an arrangement saying that they would submit the name of the superintendent to Boyesen for final approval before they hired anyone. The important question is why they were willing to give up even this part of their responsibility. Were they afraid of being removed from office or charged with wrongdoing? If they were innocent of any charges, why would they give even this right up?

In spite of the agreement with the commissioner, the board was left with the power to hire the superintendent. It could have hired Dr. Jerry Austin, the first choice of the screening committee two weeks before he took a job with Harlan Independent School system. He was acceptable to the commissioner. There were three other candidates in the list given to them by the screening committee that they could have considered. The state department encouraged them to consider other candidates. They didn't. Boyesen recommended that the board reactivate the screening committee and continue the search. Our board said, "No." Boyesen sent a letter on June 23 urging the local board not to hire Towler if it had any doubts about him. The board ignored the recommendation.

Last week, Chairman Ray "Shag" Campbell ended the discussion about the hiring of Steve Towler as the next superintendent of Floyd County schools by telling people that the decision was final—the "board had spoken." I think it is really important to remember some of the things that the "board" has said during the search process.

"The board will have the final say-so (in the selection of a superintendent)." Campbell, Lexington Herald-Leader, May 6

"If the Commissioner turns down our choice, we have no squabble about getting another one...but we'll have the final say-so." Campbell, Floyd County Times, May 13th

"The board hasn't felt any pressure from Boyesen. He has never given us any ultimatum to go ahead and pick Dr. Towler or anything." Shag Campbell in the Courier Journal, July 1, 1992

"Campbell said that he would like to wrap up the superintendent search and if things went well in the question-and-answer session, the board would probably hire Towler on Wednesday. One the other hand, if teachers and the public turn up damaging information on Towler, the board would probably 'drop him like a hot potato.'" Courier Journal, July 2, 1992

Dr. Towler was, of course, not dropped like a "hot potato" after the meeting at Allen Elementary. There was, in fact, no board member present to hear the public questions and concerns. Our board members made the decision to hire Dr. Towler and give him a four-year contract. They ignored a list of concerns from the teachers in this county and a request that a site visit be made before Towler was hired just as they dismissed as unimportant a letter from State Representative Roger Noe pointing out that Dr. Towler's record with at least one site-based school in Hardin County was not a good one. According to the board members, they are convinced that this man can do the job. The people of Floyd County need to remember that.

A couple of weeks ago, Kim Frasure asked why we couldn't have a superintendent from Floyd County in the Times. I'd like to respond to her. No one on the search committee ever said that the candidate couldn't come from Floyd County. With the hiring of Dr. Towler, at least, Kim has a superintendent from Kentucky. After four months of serving on this screening committee, however, I'd like to say why I think we shouldn't have hired a superintendent from Floyd County or Kentucky for that matter. I didn't start off believing that. During the search I had read an application from someone in Floyd County with the kind of background and concern with teaching that I saw in the folders of the five finalists. I would have voted for that person. Today, I probably wouldn't.

There is a system in place here that is harming our children and I don't think that anyone from Floyd County or Kentucky for that matter is strong enough to break it. If you want proof, just look at how out time was spent during the search process—first, arguing about where the superintendent should come from. Am I a better teacher because I was born in McDowell rather than New Hampshire? If birthplace were an important requirement in selecting a doctor, the people of eastern Kentucky would be in serious trouble. We went from that argument to listening to malicious rumors, watching vicious hate mail being circulated, groups lining up to support and fight this

candidate or that one and then finally petitions being circulated in the schools. Where were the questions about education and children in all of that? It wasn't about them. This same kind of struggle goes on every year in the Floyd County school system. Instead of fighting over whether a superintendent should be from Floyd County or Nebraska, we have power struggles between Middle Creek and downtown Prestonsburg.

During the search process, some board members went to a political rally at the convention center rather than coming a few feet up the hill to hear superintendent candidates talk to the public. Teachers in this school system have been taken out of classes and tests interrupted so politics can be taken care of. Teachers—good ones—next year will be placed back at their schools. Why were they transferred? Because they had the courage to speak out and say what they thought. If there are teachers who would punish your child because of what you write in your column, Kim, where do you suppose they learned that behavior? If you want to know about fear, talk to some leaders in FCEA who have had their lives threatened but continue to fight for kids in this county. Then ask them why not a Floyd Countain?

Finally, There is a group of kids in Martin Elementary—whose parents ought to be madder than hell—who had a ceiling fall on their heads in a sixty-year-old building and have no lockers while we continue to put roofs and floors on gyms, while one board member is outraged because a gym can't be air-conditioned and other kids sit in million dollar buildings with access to computers and a modern library. We act as if we have just discovered the conditions at Martin Elementary and put up a fence which is supposed to make parents believe that somehow now things are equal. Why not a superintendent from Floyd County? Why are some of our special ed students tucked away in back rooms? Why are the no jobs here when our students graduate?

Why aren't all of our children going to school in clean, comfortable buildings? Systems with a great deal less money that Floyd County don't have ceilings collapsing around kids'

heads. When someone can show me that our kids—not our politicians or our school board members—but our students are somehow better off because a superintendent comes from Floyd County rather than Virginia, I'll be the first in line to support a Floyd County candidate. Then I'll worry about employing a local person or who the new superintendent's relations are.

Floyd County has educators as strong and as capable as any that I have met. The ability is here but good people get transferred. Buddies get rewarded. Those who speak out are punished. Our children suffer. Politics and personal gain and power are put before education and the schools have been taken away from the people they are supposed to serve. The problems with the search didn't come up, Kim, because we made the mistake of going outside the county. People would like for you to think it's about eastern Kentucky pride and taking

care of our own. It's not. Maybe an outsider would also have been taken over by the system, but if we could have had someone, even if it had only been for a few years who would truly have put our children first, maybe then we could have had some hope.

"As long as I am chairman of this board, people will never be involved in the selection of a superintendent like they were in this one." Shag Campbell to a representative on the screening committee in May.

The "Board has spoken" with its selection of Dr. Steven Towler—without us. They didn't really care what the public or teachers thought. They wanted us out of the process. I pray that Dr. Towler is a good, competent superintendent but if he isn't, if it is politics as usual, then the responsibility should be placed where it belongs, with Shag Campbell, Orville Duff, Mary Hall, and Tommy Boyd. If we don't have a good superintendent who will listen to people, I hope in November of this year, that the people of Floyd County finally rise up in anger, and take their school system back. It is long past time.

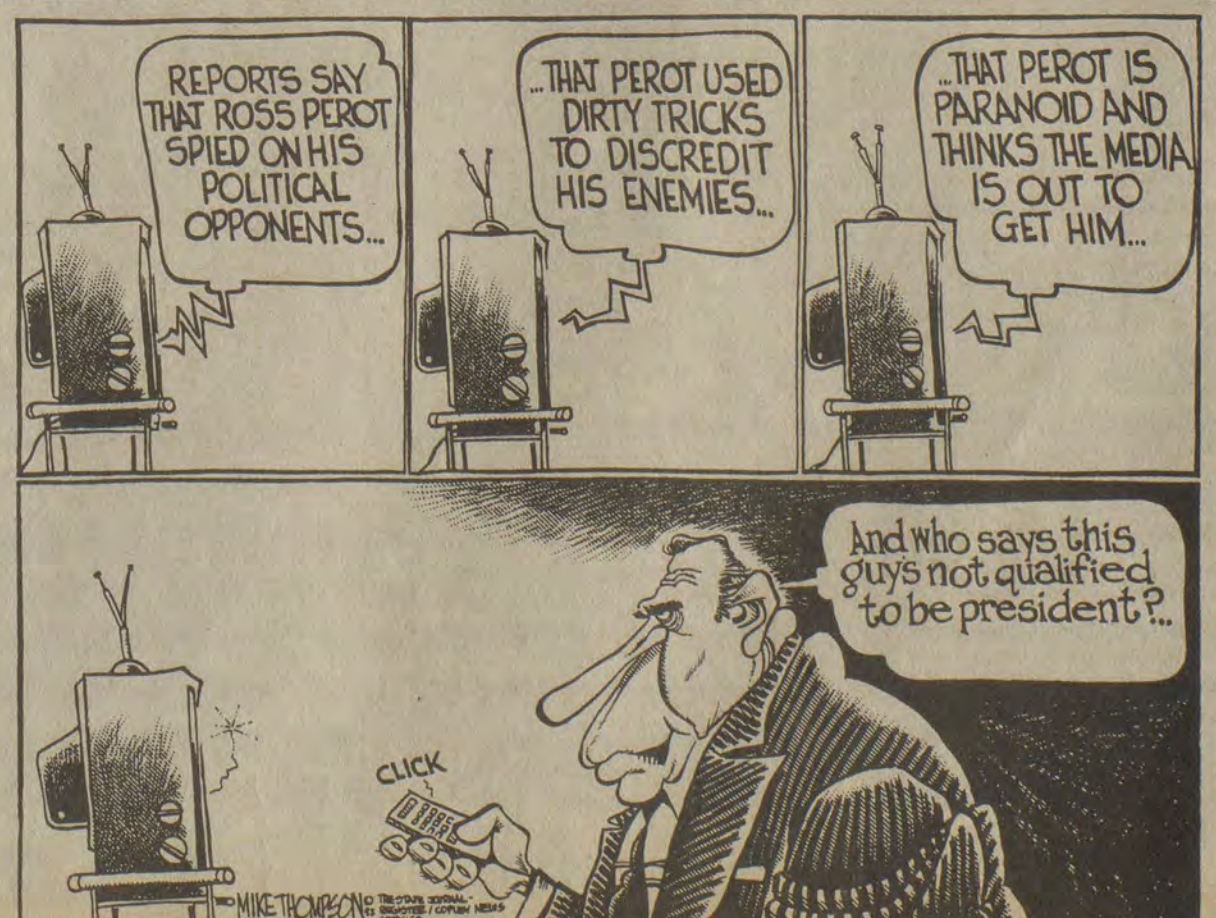

Highlands Auxiliary donates digital image system

Highlands Auxiliary has donated a digital image system to the cardiology department. This system will be used to enhance stress echocardiography testing by improving accuracy in making diagnoses, resulting in better quality care for patients with cardiac disease.

Stress echocardiography is becoming the most effective method of non-invasively detecting coronary artery disease. This technique uses a standard stress test where a person exercises on a treadmill with monitoring of blood pressure and an electrocardiogram and combines it with an echocardiogram to allow detection of abnormal areas of heart wall motion. If a patient has significant blockage in a coronary artery, one would expect not only to see abnormal electrocardiographic changes but to see associated abnormalities on the echocardiogram. Combining the imaging two technologies (echo and digital imaging) will drastically improve the diagnostic accuracy of this test.

Early Childhood Development program to debut at Morehead during fall semester

An interdisciplinary four-year degree program in Early Childhood Development will make its debut this fall at Morehead State University.

Housed within the Department of Home Economics, the program has been designed to meet the personnel needs of the region's school districts as they comply with provisions of the 1990 Kentucky Education Reform Act.

Under KERA, all school districts now must offer half-day developmental programs to four-year-olds considered "at risk" and similar services to handicapped children between the ages of three and five.

MSU gave this program the "highest priority" in its strategic direction of helping to improve the educational level of Kentucky's citizens, according to Dr. John C. Philley, interim vice president for academic affairs.

"The University is committed to supporting the public schools as they implement KERA-related activities and the B.S. degree in early childhood development responds directly to KERA mandates," Dr. Philley said.

"The College of Applied Sciences and Technology is pleased to have an opportunity to join with the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences in responding to KERA," said Dr. Charles M. Derrickson, dean of the College of AS&T.

"The challenges to higher education in assisting with KERA cut across disciplines and afford all of us an opportunity to demonstrate our commitment to serving the region," Dr. Derrickson added.

"In MSU's service region more than 40 percent of the children are economically-deprived which means that there is a dire need out there for trained early childhood professionals," said Dr. Marilyn Sampley, department chair. "Right now there are more job openings in this field than there are graduates from pre-school

instructional-related fields," said Dr. Sampley.

"And as more early childhood centers are established—both funded federally and by private enterprise—the need for trained professionals will increase," she added.

"MSU's program was created to fill this particular need," said Carolyn Taylor, MSU associate professor of home economics, who, with Dr. Sampley, developed the curriculum.

At present, the Kentucky Department of Education does not offer certification in early childhood, but a KDE task force was created and has recommended 11 competency areas in the field. "Our program includes coursework to meet those competencies which may become requirements once certification is established," said Taylor.

Currently, the interdisciplinary degree program's curriculum offers two options: one for teacher certification once that becomes available and another which is designed for those working in privately-franchised early childhood centers. The first option includes a minor in special education. Both of these options meet the recommended early childhood competencies.

Students graduating from the program will be prepared to plan, implement and evaluate early childhood programs; be qualified to administer early childhood development centers, and to work with children

who have special needs.

The interdisciplinary curriculum includes a wide range of classes in child development, nutrition and family life as well as introductory level courses in art, computers, literature for young readers, music, psychology and elementary science.

In addition to in-class coursework, MSU's early childhood program provides a number of hours of observation in early childhood settings, field experiences and eight to 12 hours of a practicum.

MSU's Child Development Laboratory, which is accredited by the National Academy of Early Childhood Programs, will be one of the main sites for clinical experiences.

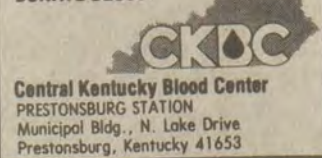

Highlands Cardiology adds Transesophageal Scope

Highlands Cardiology Department Center has upgraded its echocardiography equipment with the addition of a transesophageal scope. This new technology will permit more highly defined echocardiogram images of the heart.

An echocardiogram is a non-invasive procedure which allows for the assessment of the heart's various structures and their functions (a procedure specifically necessary for the diagnosis of coronary disease). It consists of a transducer placed at various locations on the chest emitting high frequency sound waves transmitted to the heart and returning as echos transformed into a moving picture of the heart and recorded on videotape.

During a transesophageal procedure the tip of the scope is inserted and manipulated within the esophagus. The tip can be advanced, withdrawn, rotated, and flexed in four directions, providing enhanced longitudinal tomographic views of the heart. Transesophageal Scope procedures can be performed on patients in which examination by surface echocardiography is not possible, one example being a patient on a ventilator in ICU.

Transesophageal echocardiography is considered an extension of a complete transthoracic echocardiographic examination. Easy access to the heart in almost all patients, safety, patient tolerance, and predictable high-quality images make it a procedure of choice in cardiac diagnosis.

Cancer Answers

Q: I am 17 and need to know the safest way to get a tan. Some of my friends say tanning beds are safer than laying out in the sun. Is this true?

A: No. There is no safe way to get a tan. Tanning from any source may cause skin cancer or premature aging of the skin. Both the sun and tanning beds produce ultraviolet radiation. This radiation can cause skin damage.

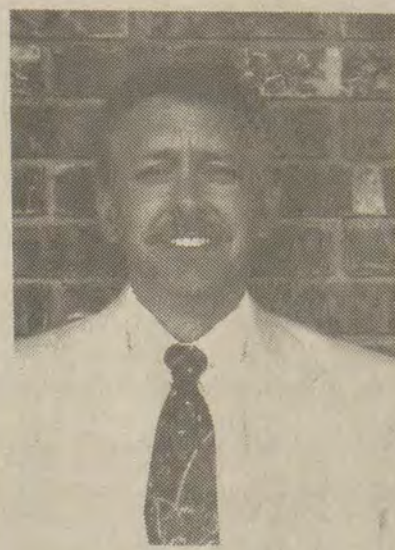
Q: My sister is a heavy smoker. Her three year old son coughs a lot. Could her smoke be hurting him? I think she would quit if she knew it was harmful to him. What is the best way for her to quit smoking?

A: Your nephew is being exposed to secondhand smoke. Studies show that children who breathe second-hand smoke have more lung infections and ear infections. This smoke often damages the growth of the child's lungs. Secondhand smoke can cause lung cancer in non-smokers. The smoke your nephew breathes isn't as strong as what your sister is inhaling. However, he is still affected by the harmful chemicals in the smoke.

There isn't one best way to quit smoking. Different things work for different people. If your sister has smoked for a long time, she probably has a strong nicotine addiction. Cutting down on the number of cigarettes she smokes each day might be easier for her than quitting "cold turkey". She might find that chewing nicotine gum helps ease withdrawal symptoms after she stops. Her doctor can give her a prescription for the gum. Stop-smoking programs can also be very helpful. HRMC Oncology Symposium addresses prostate cancer

Prostate cancer is the second most common cancer in men (lung cancer being first). Extensive media coverage has been given to all aspects of this disease which has been compared both in incidence and severity to breast cancer in women.

On June 11, Highlands Regional Medical Center co-hosted a medical education symposium at Jenny Wiley Lodge on the screening, diagnosis, and treatment of prostate cancer. Thirty three area physicians, nurses, and other health care professionals attended.

Dr. John Furcolow, Internal Medicine specialist, from Highlands and a member of the Cancer Committee, was the program host and introduced the three guest speakers.

Dr. Stephen Spires, Urologist at the Lexington Clinic discussed pros-

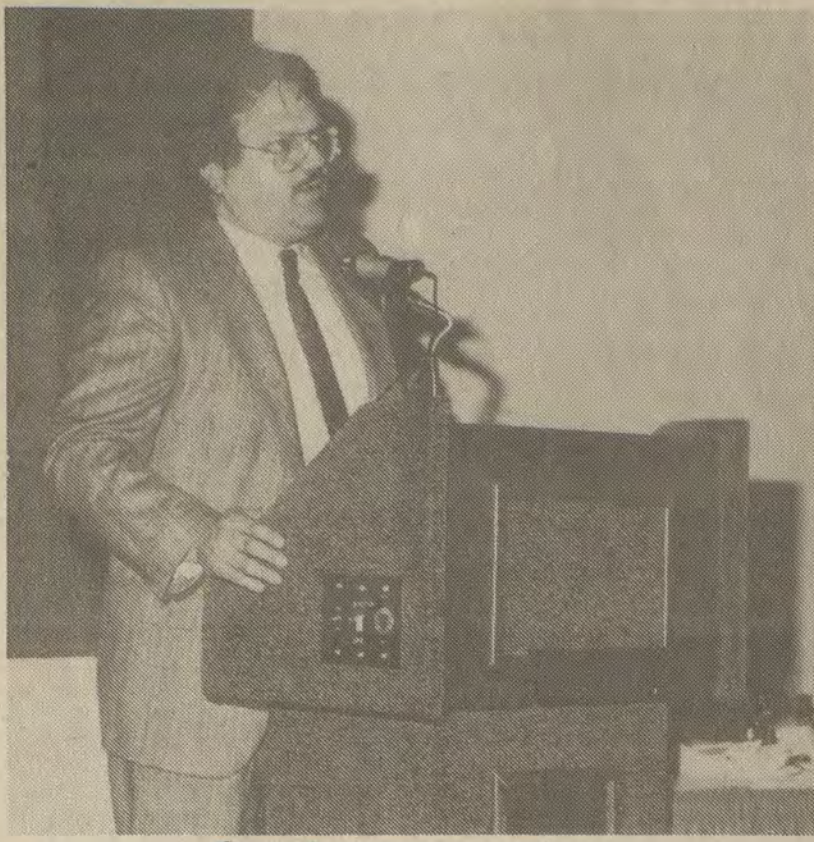
tate cancer screening techniques and tests used to diagnose and establish the extent of disease. Dr. Spires also stated that a digital rectal exam and a PSA (Prostate Specific Antigen) blood test should be a routine part of a man's physical examination (comparing it to a mammogram and breast exam for breast cancer diagnosis in women).

Dr. William John, Oncologist at Highlands and the University of Kentucky Medical Center, spoke on medical, hormonal and chemotherapeutic options available for treatment of prostate cancer and explained the advantages and disadvantages of each.

Dr. David Wood, Urologist at the University of Kentucky Medical Center, went on to detail surgical options in the disease, including new

technology involving the use of laparoscopy (which is now being widely used in gallbladder surgery). He also explained prostate cancer staging methods and how staging is used when deciding what treatment is best for a particular patient.

Highlands plans to conduct a series of continuing medical education programs (CME) for area physicians, a measure to assist community physicians in obtaining CME credits locally. A symposium on Rheumatology is being planned for the fall.

Although Crisp thought that he had escaped the church and preachers by joining the Army, he was wrong. A preacher was with his platoon the entire time he was in basic training. When he was stationed in Arizona, another member of the clergy was in his squad.

After his discharge, Crisp and his wife, Bonnie, began attending the Betsy Layne Free Will Baptist Church. Bonnie joined the church in 1962 and Richard joined in 1965. In 1968, he was drawn into the ministry. He felt that he didn't know the Bible well, so he attended Moody Bible College summer schools between 1968 and 1970.

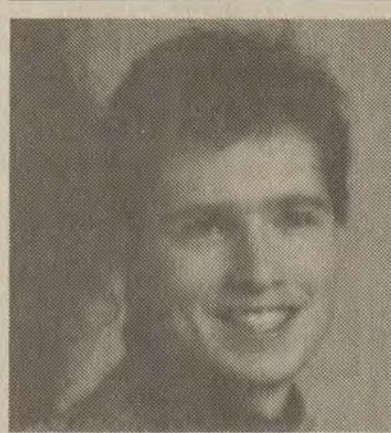
Over the next few years, Crisp took classes at Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, Tennessee, as well as Bob Jones University in Greenville, North Carolina. Finally, he transferred his credits to the Free Will Baptist Bible College in Moore, Oklahoma and graduated in 1989.

Immediately upon graduation, Mr. Crisp enrolled in the Bethany Bible College in Dothan, Alabama. In just

three years, he earned a four-year associate degree in biblical study. During those three years, he maintained a 4.0 grade point average. Mrs. Crisp also earned a Degree of Ph. T, which stands for "Putting Husband Through."

Now, Crisp is enrolled to earn his Bachelor of Theology degree. "It is my desire to work for my master of biblical studies and the doctor of ministry," he says.

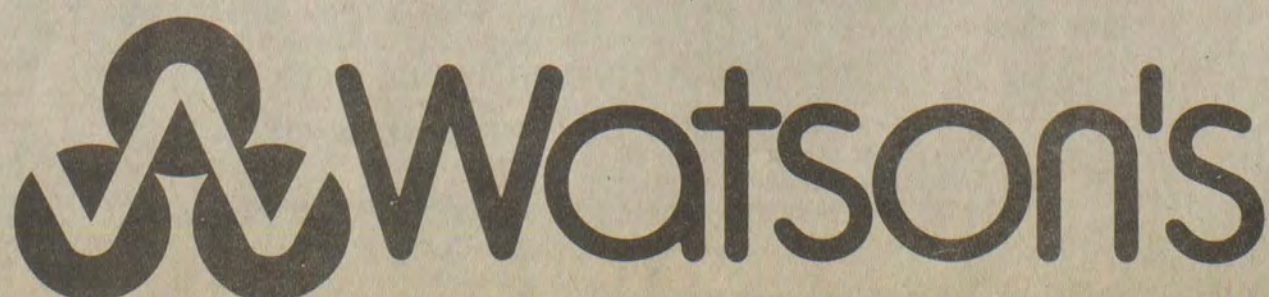

Hale powers Prestonsburg past Wheelwright

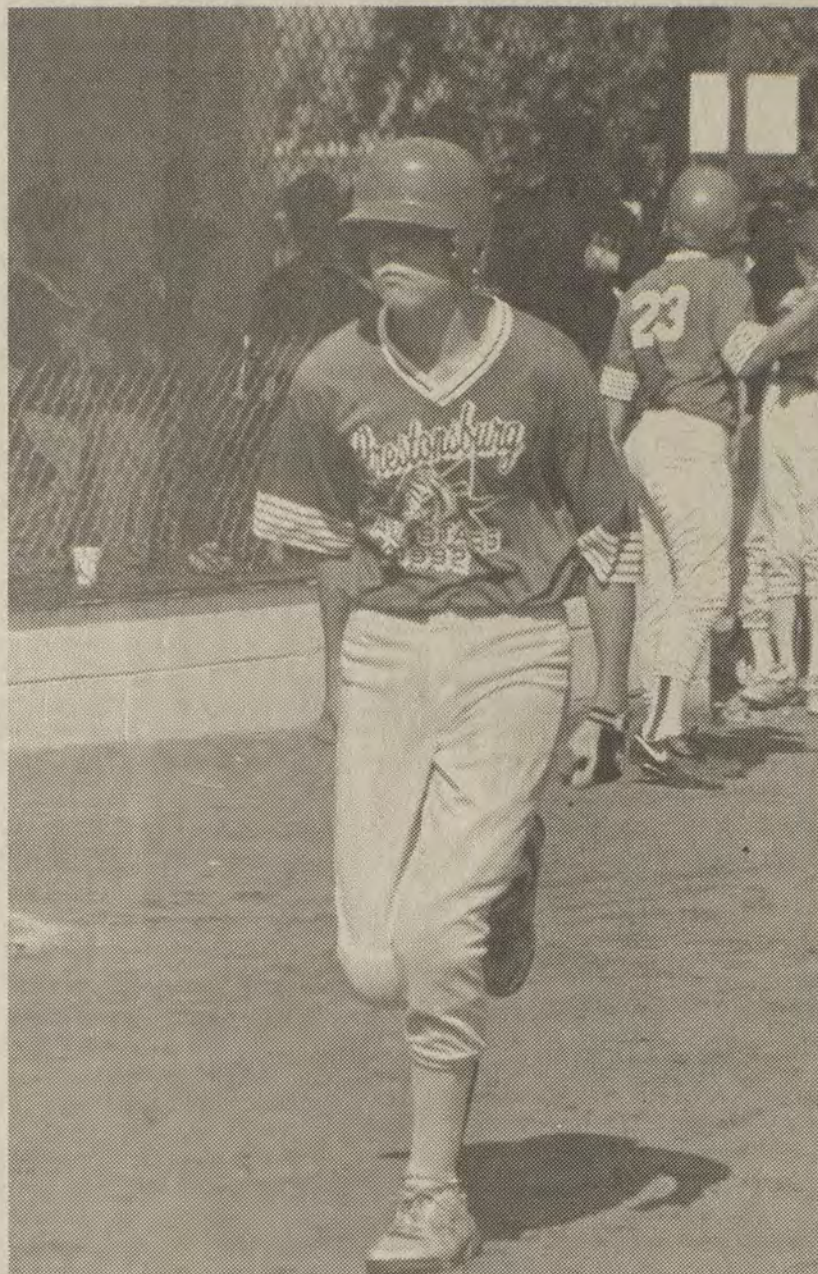
The District 7, Area 2 Little League All-Star tournament got underway at Archer Park this past Monday night as the classic event returned to Prestonsburg after a five year absence.

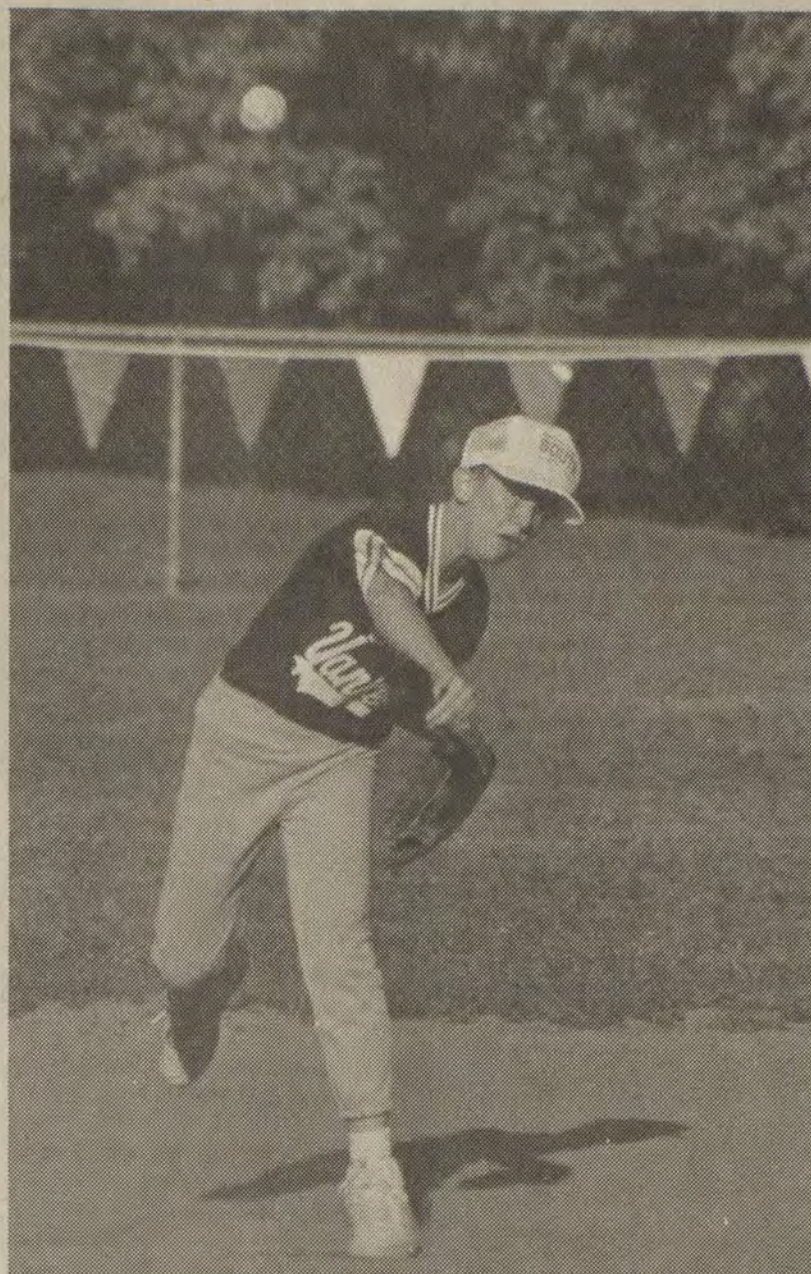

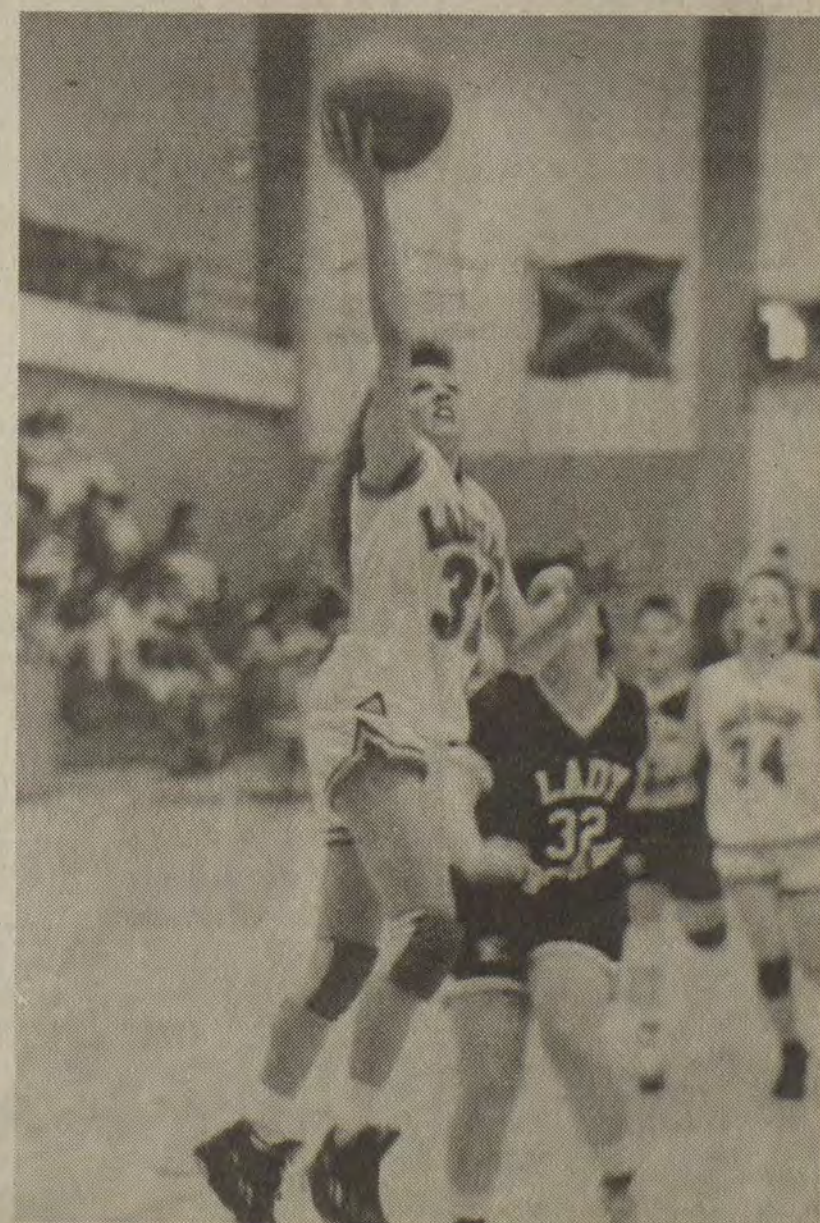

Major League baseball commissioner Fay Vincent set the baseball world on its ears when he personally took an active hand and overruled the wishes of the Chicago Cubs and New York Mets in announcing that next season each National League Division will have a new look.

Vincent ruled that the Cincinnati Reds and Atlanta Braves would move on to the Eastern Division and the St. Louis Cardinals (sorry Hoss) and Cubs would enter the Western Division.

There are some mixed feelings on the matter. While the baseball world hollers foul ball, the rest of the fans are going to run it out anyway thinking it will help the game.

The pros are that it is geographically right to put the Reds and Braves in the Eastern Division where they should have been all along. That's right. They are not western teams. St. Louis and Chicago is farther west than either one of the other two. So, to correct the geography mess that was made when the two leagues (American and National) split into divisional play, Vincent has done what no other commissioner has "dared to do before!"

And I believe the realignment will pit these two teams against each other even under more pressure-packed games. That would be good for baseball. Other rivalries with the Reds could be developed between the Reds and Mets. Montreal and Philadelphia have always been so-so games. But who knows what might happen with the new alignment?

I suppose judgment should be held until we see how it works. The news hasn't been out too long (since Tuesday) and already I have heard mostly negative comments on the move. Let me know how you feel about it by giving me a call here at the Times.

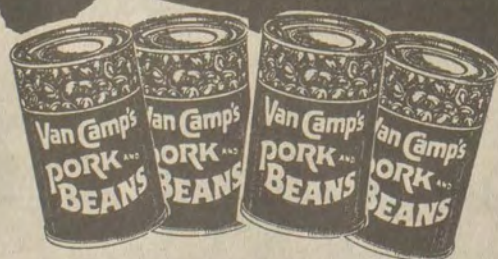

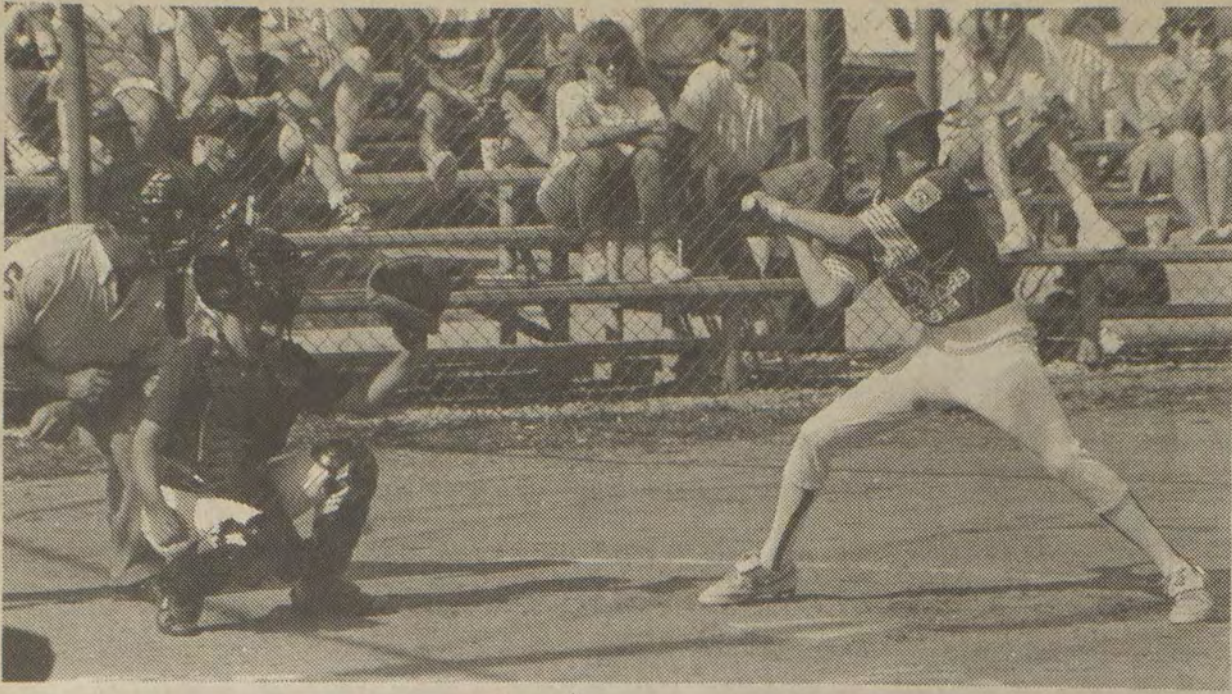

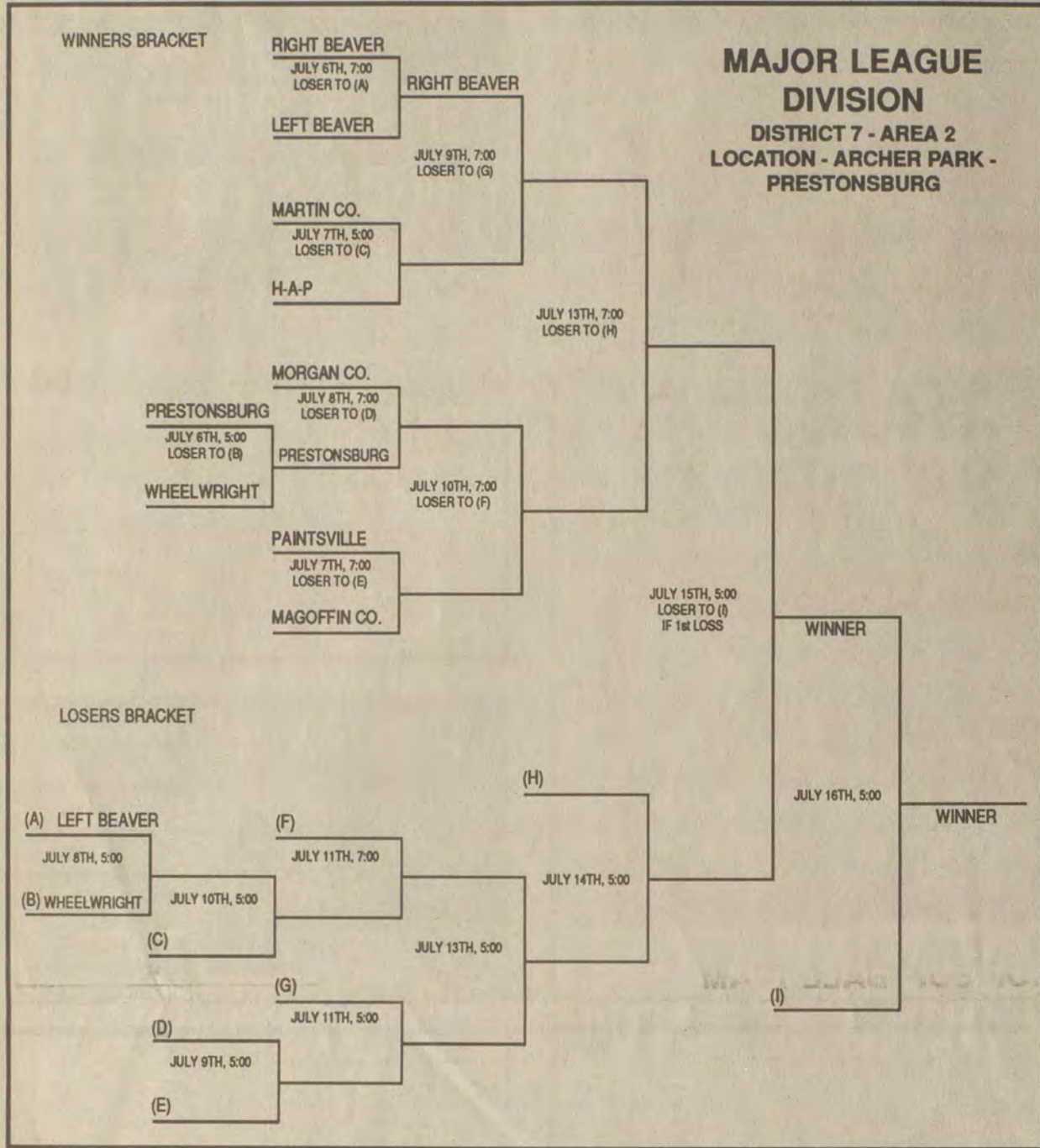

"We were running neck and neck

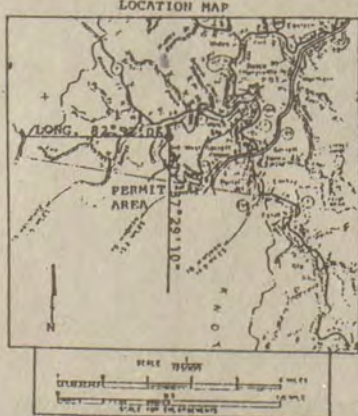
and we made the turn around at the same time. I pulled away and ran to about a 10-yard lead until he came on strong at the end."

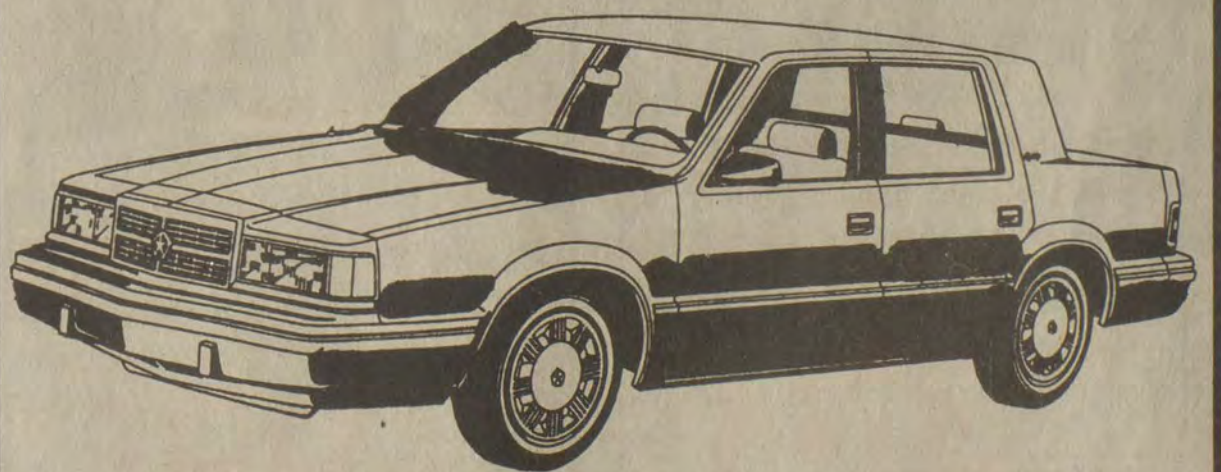

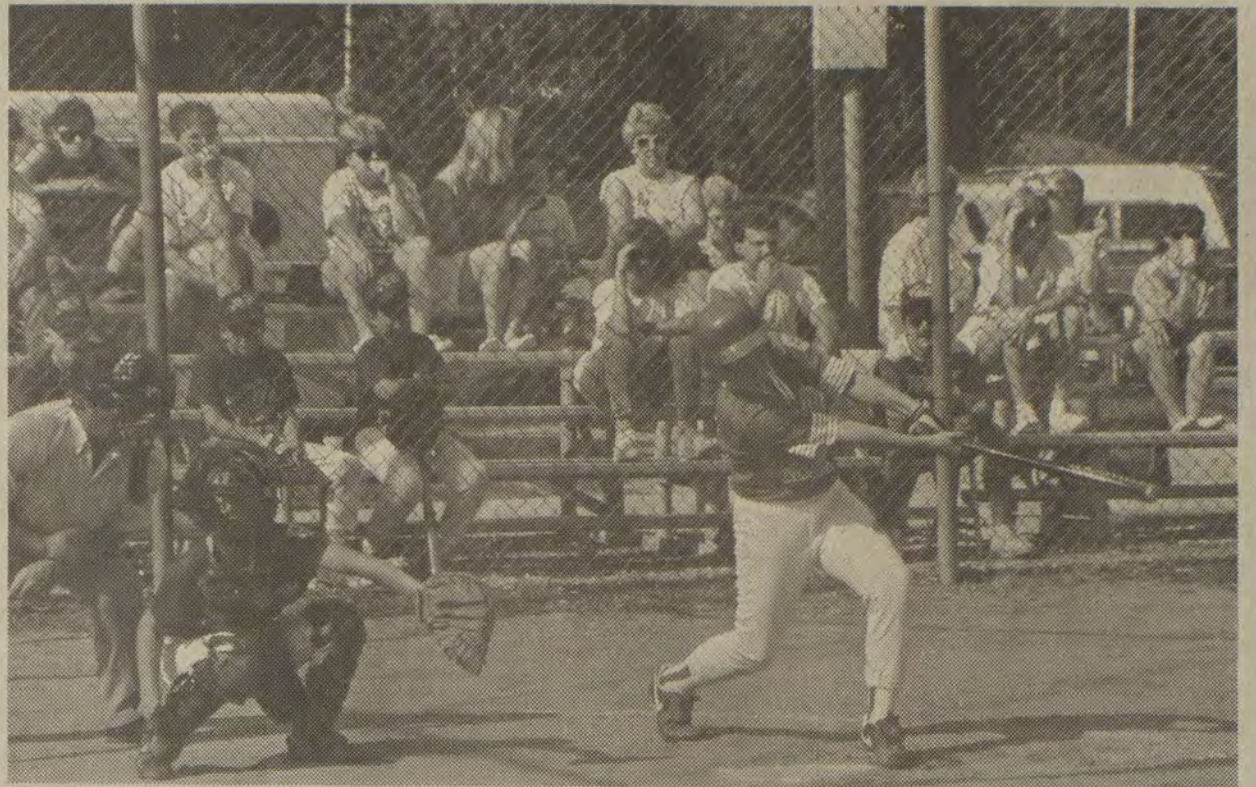
Bluegrass Games deadline nears

Here in Floyd County five softball teams have entered the Games.



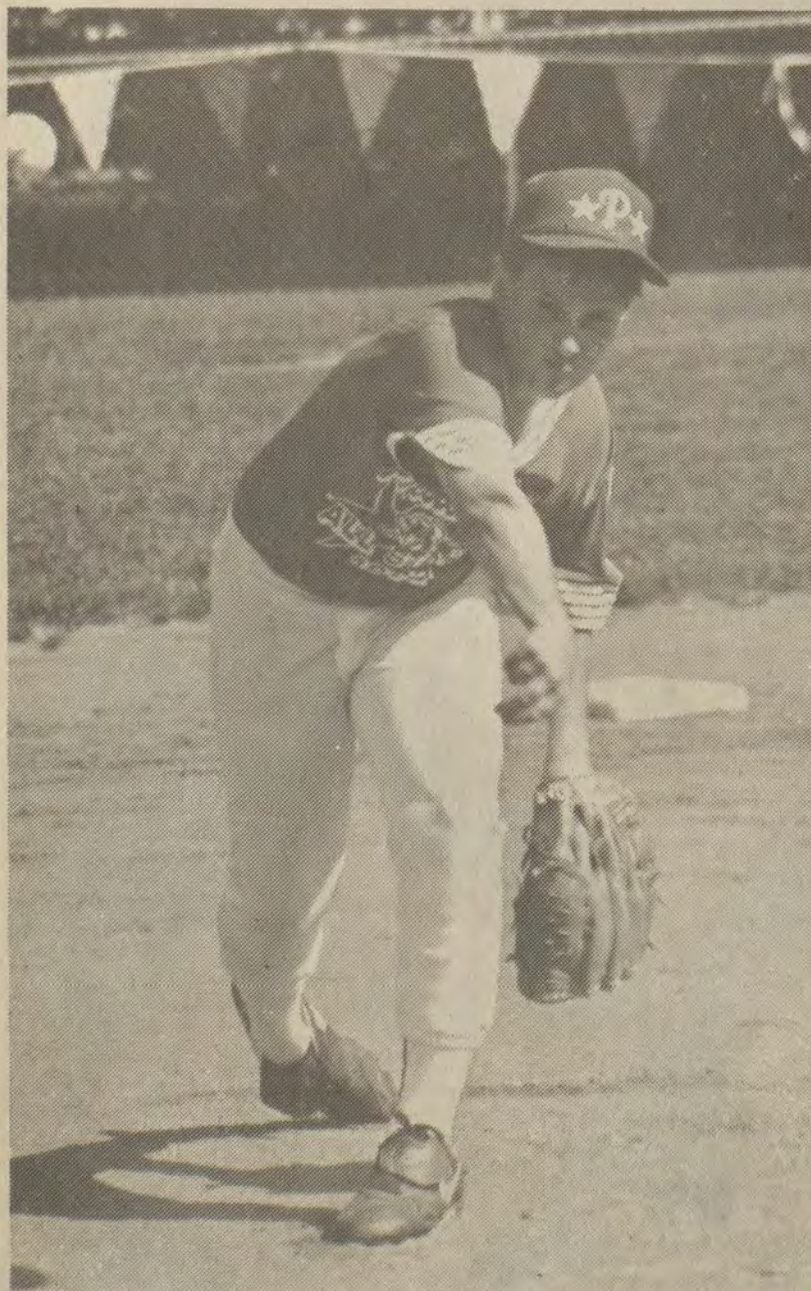

NBA Draft Analysis...

Shaq leads pack as new hoop stars emerge

Usher in the era of the Luv Shaq. Shaquille O'Neal, the number one pick in this year's NBA draft, should lift the Orlando Magic from cellar dweller in the Atlantic Division to a playoff team in one season. O'Neal is the next NBA superstar — if the Magic can pull some money out of the hat without blowing the lid off the salary cap.

The rest of the draft was extremely deep. Many of this year's rookies should make immediate impact on their teams. The top nine picks should all be starters next year. In fact, most of the players in this draft have at least a fighting chance to make a roster somewhere in the NBA.

Utah did not have a pick in this draft. A game day trade took it away. Here is a team-by-team rundown of the draft, with letter grades for their picks. Draft positions are in parentheses.

Atlanta Hawks: Adam Keefe, 6-9 F, Stanford (10); Elmer Bennett, 6-0 G, Notre Dame (38). Keefe is a widebody from the PAC-10 with great rebounding skills and a nice touch from up to 18 feet. Gives the Hawks a solid frontcourt with the return of Dominique Wilkins. Bennett could be a second round sleeper. He has good offensive skills, but can be a bit lazy. Grade: B+.

Boston Celtics: Jon Barry, 6-5 G, Georgia Tech (21); Darren Morningstar, 6-11 C, Pittsburgh (41). Barry as a questionable first-round pick with the Celtics already very guard-heavy. He's a very scrappy player with good range and a good bloodline. However, he's not quite the player his father Rick was. Morningstar is tough (as UK fans should remember from early in the season) and really helped himself at the rookie camps. Grade: C+.

Charlotte Hornets: Alonzo Mourning, 6-10 C, Georgetown (2); Tony Bennett, 6-0 G, Wisconsin-Green Bay (35). Mourning is exactly what the Hornets need — a shot blocker to save the mistakes of the Hornets' pressing defense. Underrated offensively. Like Chris Corchiani last year with Orlando, look for Bennett to hang around and contribute. Grade: A.

Chicago Bulls: Byron Houston, 6-5 F, Oklahoma State (27); Corey Williams, 6-2 G, Oklahoma State (33); Litterial Green, 6-1 G, Georgia (39); Matt Steigenga, 6-7 F, Michigan State (52). Critics say Byron Houston is too small to play power forward in the NBA. Tell it to Adrian Dantley. Houston is for real. With the Bulls shopping B.J. Armstrong, look for Williams or Green to stick. Probably Green. Steigenga is athletic, but a longshot. Grade: B.

Dallas Mavericks: Jim Jackson, 6-6 G, Ohio State (4); Sean Rooks, 6-10 C, Arizona (30). With Rolando Blackman traded, Jim Jackson will be called on to do everything for a team that needs everything. Jackson always wants the ball in the clutch, but needs to be more consistent throughout the game. Dallas needs a backup center and Rooks should fill in nicely. An excellent low-post scorer. Grade: A-.

Denver Nuggets: LaPhonso Ellis, 6-8 F, Notre Dame (5); Bryant Stith, 6-5 G-F, Virginia (13); Robert Werdann, 7-0 C, St. John's (46). Ellis is strong and quick — averaged double figures in scoring and rebounding for the Fighting Irish. Also has a mean streak a mile wide. Stith is steady, but needs work on ballhandling to be an effective guard. Offense isn't a problem — he finished as UVA's all-time leading scorer. Werdann is big, clumsy, slow, and a waste of a pick. Grade: B.

Detroit Pistons: Drafted Don MacLean from UCLA and immediately traded him, along with long-time benchwarmer William Bedford, to the L.A. Clippers for Olden Polynice. Not a bad move, since the Pistons need rebounding, but better players were still available for that. Look for other major moves from the Pistons very soon. Grade: C-.

Golden State Warriors: Latrell Sprewell, 6-4 G, Alabama (24); Pedrag Danilovic, 6-5 F, Belgrade, Serbia (43); Matt Fish, 6-11 C, North Carolina-Wilmington (50). Even with the pressing need for some kind of post play, Don Nelson went for swingmen in Sprewell and Danilovic to back up Chris Mullin. Sprewell is explosive and a great shooter, but has an attitude problem. Danilovic led his team to the Junior European championships and is a creator on offense. A bit undersized. Fish is an iffy project at best. Will probably be thrown back. Grade: C-.

Houston Rockets: Robert Horry, 6-9 F, Alabama (11); Popeye Jones, 6-8 F, Murray State (41); Curtis Blair, 6-3 G, Richmond (53). Where are these guys going to play? Houston has a glut of big men already, but they

may move Olajuwon before too long. Horry could be a star if he'd work at all. He has all the tools. Jones did poorly in rookie camps, weighing in at 300+, but may have NBA potential after all. Blair is a high-scoring guard that might surprise. Great one-on-one offensive player. Grade: C+.

Indiana Pacers: Malik Sealy, 6-8 F, St. John's (14). Sealy is silky smooth to watch, but at 185 pounds, is going to need beef to be effective at all. An excellent offensive rebounder and solid defender. Never loses his cool, which is important when playing on the same team as Chuck Person and Co. Indiana still needs a big man. Grade: B-.

L.A. Clippers: Randy Woods, 6-1 G, LaSalle (16); Don MacLean, 6-10 F, UCLA (19-from Detroit); Elmore Spencer, 7-0 C, UNLV (25). The Clippers took real gambles with three first-rounders. Woods is being compared to Tim Hardaway after a senior season where he averaged over 27 points per game. Very quick with excellent range. MacLean can score a ton, but is too slow to match up defensively with small forwards and is too thin to compete with power forwards. Poor rebounder. Bye, bye, Miss American Pie. Spencer is a great shot blocker with NBA size, but is very slow and has somewhat limited offensive skills. Grade: B if Woods is for real, D+ otherwise.

L.A. Lakers: Anthony Peeler, 6-4 G, Missouri (15); Duane Cooper, 6-1 G, USC (36). The Lakers have coveted Peeler for a long time. He's the type of player that can dominate a game and may be the spark the Lakers could use. Strong, excellent shot, great court awareness. His legal problems knocked him from a higher position. Will probably be a backup to Byron Scott. Cooper is a solid but unspectacular guard. Grade: B.

Miami Heat: Harold Miner, 6-5 G, USC (12); Isaiah Morris, 6-8 F, Arkansas (31); Matt Gelger, 7-1 C, Georgia Tech (42). The Heat are looking for a franchise player and "Baby Jordan" Miner could be just that. Probably the most exciting offensive player in college basketball, he needs to work on defense. Morris is a pure athlete and runs the floor extremely well. Gelger never lived up to his potential in college and probably will have a very brief NBA career. Grade: B+.

Milwaukee Bucks: Todd Day, 6-8 G-F, Arkansas (8); Lee Mayberry, 6-2 G, Arkansas (23). With two first-round picks, the Bucks moved the Arkansas MayDay connection north. Day can flat out score and is a surprisingly strong rebounder. Mayberry is the best point guard available this year. If Day can bulk up a bit and if Mayberry can keep Day from losing his cool, then the Bucks may have their backcourt of the future. Grade: A-.

Minnesota Timberwolves: Christian Laetner, 6-11 F-C, Duke (3); Marlon Maxey, 6-8 F, UTEP (28); Tim Burroughs, 6-8 F, Jacksonville (54); Chris Smith, 6-1 G, Connecticut (34). Like him or not, Laetner is the most versatile big man coming out of college in a long time. Plays inside and out and is tougher than people think. Finds a way to win. Maxey and Burroughs are excellent rebounders for a team that needs help up front. Burroughs embarrassed Eric Montross of North Carolina earlier in the year in a close loss. Smith is a fun player to watch, but may have trouble taking the NBA pounding initially. Even so, four keepers. Grade: A.

New Jersey Nets: P.J. Brown, 6-11 C, Louisiana Tech (29); Steve Rogers, 6-5 G, Alabama State (40). The last Louisiana Tech player drafted was Karl Malone. Brown is a project, but with excellent physical skills. Rogers is a sharpshooter, but a turnstile on defense. Grade: C+.

New York Knicks: Hubert Davis, 6-4 G, North Carolina (20). The Knicks are looking for outside shooting, Davis' forte. However, he doesn't

create well — the same problem Steve Alford had. Whether he's NBA tough remains to be seen. Improving on defense but still slow. Grade: B-.

Orlando Magic: Shaquille O'Neal, 7-1 C, LSU (1). One pick, the one pick. All hail the new NBA star, if the Magic can sign him. Anyone that doubts his talents should see him in person. It's frightening to think of what he'll do with a Scott Skiles to get him the ball. Grade: A+.

Phoenix Suns: Oliver Miller, 6-9 F-C, Arkansas (22); Brian Davis, 6-7 F, Duke (48); Ron Eells, 6-7 F, Louisiana Tech (49). I'll risk embarrassment and say Miller is a 320 pound waste of a first round pick. He doesn't rebound well for his considerable size and his defense and weight control are questionable. Davis is an amazing defender and finisher with an iffy jumpshot. A very inspirational player

for a team, but the Suns don't really need him with Kevin Johnson on the floor most of the time. Eells is another athlete — see the Nets. Grade: C-.

Philadelphia 76ers: Clarence Weatherspoon, 6-6 F, Southern Mississippi (9). With Charles Barkley gone, the Sixers get a 6-6 widebody with a good shooting touch, excellent work ethic, great rebounding skills and quick leaping ability. Sound like anyone familiar? (Well, except for the work ethic.) "The Spoon" could develop well under Doug Moe. Grade: A-.

Portland Trail Blazers: Dave Johnson, 6-7 G-F, Syracuse (26); Reggie Smith, 6-8 F, TCU (31). Still looking for the missing piece, the Blazers won't find it with either of these two, although Johnson will probably replace Danny Ainge as a scorer off the bench if Alinge moves on. Johnson led the Orlando rookie camp in scoring. Reggie Smith plays like Jerome Kersey. Why replace the original? Grade: C+.

Sacramento Kings: Walt Williams, 6-8 G, Maryland (7); Brett Roberts, 6-8 F, Morehead State (54). The Kings shocked everyone by taking Williams at #7 when they were expected to take a power player. However, Williams is a great athlete who can play three positions, although he turns the ball over more than he should. Has great range on the jumpshot and can sky. The Morehead Machine has already signed a contract to play professional baseball. Unless the draft's final pick impresses in preseason, he should stick to hardball. Grade: B.

San Antonio Spurs: Tracy Murray, 6-8 F, UCLA (18); Henry Williams, 6-2 G, North Carolina-Charlotte (44). San Antonio has been looking for a shooter. Rumor has it that Murray will be traded to Milwaukee for Dale Ellis. Either way, the players are similar — spot-up jumpshooters with great range, slow feet, and a head that's rarely in the game. Williams is the steal of the draft. He has one of the best strokes in the game, can create his shots, and is a solid defender. Remember his name. Grade: B+.

Seattle SuperSonics: Doug Christie, 6-6 G, Pepperdine (17); Chris King, 6-8 F, Wake Forest (45). Christie is the best player no one's ever heard of. At 6-6, he can run, shoot, and handle the ball. He rebounded from a career-threatening knee injury to have an outstanding senior season. Explosive first step. A perfect complement the Shawn Kemp show. King is a physical player that never lived up to his potential. An almost certain bust. Grade: B.

Washington Bullets: Tom Gugliotta, 6-10 F, NC State (6); Brent Price, 6-1 G, Oklahoma (32). The underachieving Bullets have long needed some fire, and Gugliotta is a gritty player. A "poor-man's Laetner," as he was called in the ACC, he can play inside and out, defends well, and has great stamina. Brent Price looks like his brother Mark, with about half the talent. Grade: B.

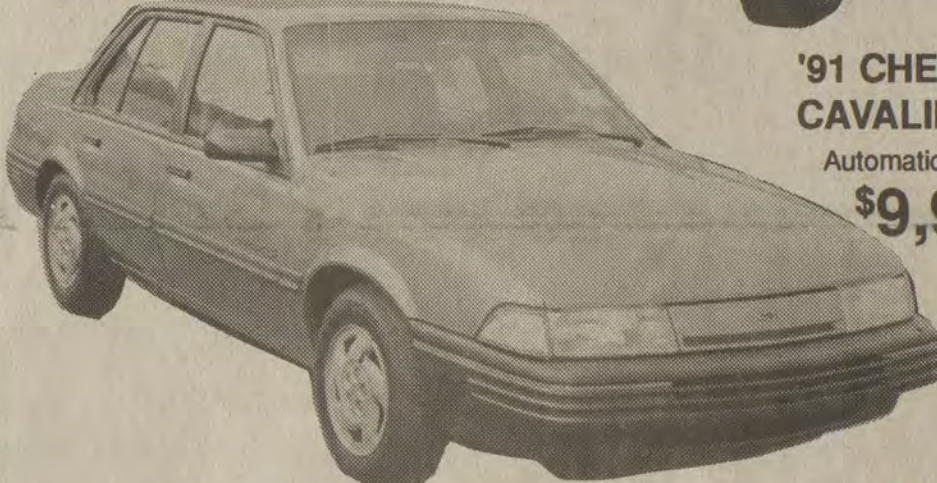

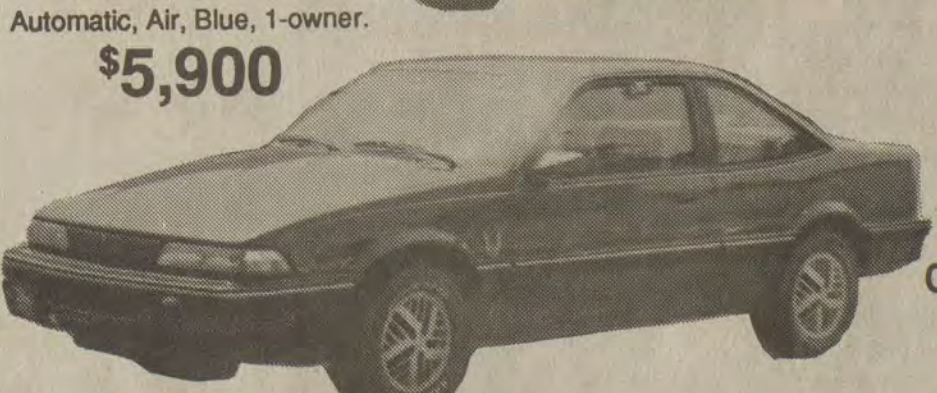

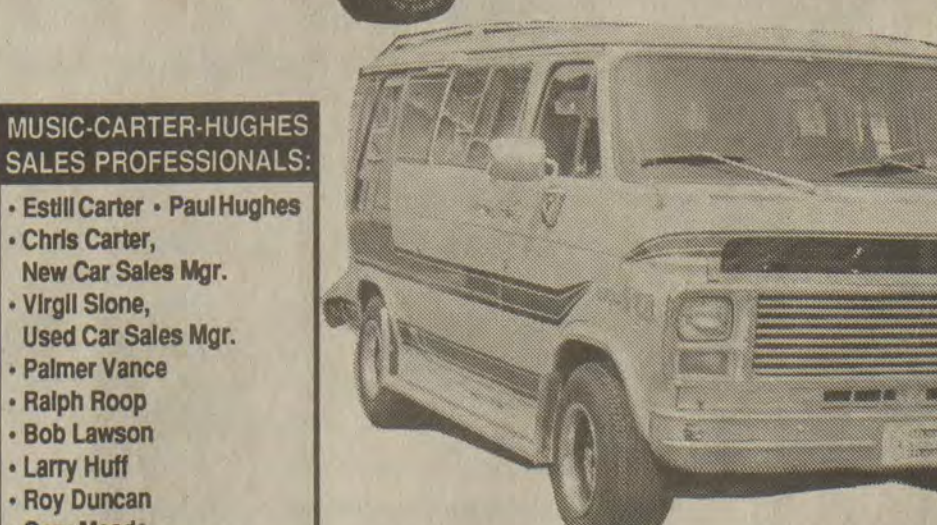

In the heat of summer, salads offer special appeal — they're quick, cool and healthy!

Take advantage of seasonal produce like ripe juicy tomatoes, succulent sweet corn and garden-fresh bell peppers, and pair them with other good-for-you ingredients like lean deli meats, reduced-fat cheeses and cholesterol-free noodles.

Rice is another taste booster for salads. Rice seems a light grain for summer. All manner of appetizing salad mixtures can be based on brown or white rice.

Fruit salads are also great ways to beat the heat. With fresh fruit on hand this summer, dice some peaches, slice some strawberries or cantaloupe; add green grapes or sliced bananas. Gently toss with cooked white rice and some peach-flavored yogurt, plus a dollop of honey.

Well-chilled, the fruit salad is a refreshing breakfast dish for the start of a hot summer day. Or you can serve it later as a light lunch, salad supper or late-night snack.

Summer Fruit And Rice Salad

1 cup white rice
1 (8 oz.) carton banana or peach low-fat yogurt
1 tablespoon honey
1 ripe banana, sliced
2 cups fresh fruits and berries, diced or sliced
1/4 cup chopped pecans, toasted
Cook rice according to package directions, omitting butter and salt. Transfer rice to large bowl and cool slightly. Combine yogurt and honey. Stir into rice. Cover and chill. Just before serving, stir in fruit and pecans. Yield: 6 servings; preparation time: 20 minutes, plus chilling. (Recipe from Uncle Ben's)

Hoppin' John Rice Salad

1 cup ham, coarsely chopped

1 cup onion, chopped and divided
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 tablespoon oil
3 cups hot, cooked rice (cooked in chicken broth)

1 (16 oz.) can black-eyed peas, rinsed and drained
1 teaspoon hot pepper sauce
1/2 teaspoon cracked black pepper

1/4 teaspoon salt, or to taste
2 slices bacon
4 cups green cabbage, very finely shredded

Cook ham, 1/2 cup onion and garlic in oil until lightly browned. Meanwhile, have rice cooking in chicken broth; use half white, half quick-cooking brown rice, if desired.

When ham mixture is cooked, stir in the cooked rice, black-eyed peas, hot pepper sauce, cracked black pepper and salt. Cook until thoroughly heated.

Meanwhile, place bacon in a large skillet; cook until crisp; set aside. Drain all but 1 tablespoon drippings. Add cabbage and remaining onion to drippings and stir-fry until crisp-tender.

Spoon cabbage onto a large platter. Ladle rice mixture into center of cabbage, crumble bacon over top. Serve hot or at room temperature.

Yield: 6 servings; preparation time: 45 minutes.

Sunshine Celery And Fruit Salad

2 1/2 cups sliced celery
1 pound sweet apples, cored and cut into 1/2-inch pieces (2 cups)
1 pound ripe pears, cored and cut into 1/2-inch pieces (2 cups)
1/4 cup coarsely chopped walnuts
3 tablespoons vegetable oil
2 1/2 tablespoons orange juice
2 tablespoons honey
1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
In a large bowl, combine celery, apples, pears and walnuts. In a small bowl, whisk together oil, orange juice, honey and cinnamon until blended;

pour over salad; toss to coat evenly. Chill. Serve in a lettuce lined bowl, if desired. Makes four to six portions; seven cups.

FRENCH POTATO SALAD

1 1/3 pounds (4 medium) all-purpose potatoes (preferably small red-skinned), cut into 3/4-inch cubes, unpeeled

boiling water
2 tablespoons olive oil
1 1/2 tablespoons white wine vinegar

1 tablespoon water
1 tablespoon Dijon-style mustard
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup green onions, sliced
3 tablespoons parsley, chopped

1 tablespoon fresh tarragon or 1 teaspoon dried, chopped

Seedless watermelons put damper on seed-spitting contest

The increased availability and economy of seedless watermelons might put a damper on seed-spitting contests at summer picnics, or the enjoyment of sitting under a shade tree spitting seed out in the yard.

Actually the term "seedless" is not entirely correct, according to John Strang, Extension horticulturist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. "You'll find soft, white seed similar to those in cucumbers and an occasional hard seed," he explained.

"The seedless watermelon, which is a triploid, was developed more than 40 years ago," he said. "However, it took many years of development work to make seedless watermelons price competitive with the seeded varieties. The seed are quite expensive, selling for \$70 to \$140 an ounce, compared to \$1.25 to \$25 an ounce for seeded watermelon seed."

Seedless watermelons ripen in early August. In recent years, they have been available in some grocery stores and fruit and vegetable markets primarily in metropolitan areas. The seedless watermelons generally cost about one-third more than the

seeded ones.

"They are smaller, usually weighing 10-20 pounds, have a longer refrigerated storage life and often are sweeter than seeded watermelons," he added. "However, you can't tell a seedless watermelon from a seeded one by simply looking at the outside."

"A number of varieties have been released in the past six or seven years," Strang said. "This year we have variety tests in Lexington, Quicksand and Casey County to further evaluate seedless watermelons as a commercial crop in Kentucky."

"In last year's tests, several varieties had high yields, outstanding quality and consistently few seed. King of Hearts looked exceptionally good. Tiffany, 5023 Super Sweet and SWM 8702 also looked very good. Some of the other high-yielding varieties had too many seed."

Strang said high yields and quality are vital to the success of commercial production. "Growers can't go for yield alone because of the high-value nature of the crop," he explained. "Consumers expect high quality because these are more expensive than seeded watermelons. Seedless watermelons should be worth looking into, especially for roadside market sales and for restaurant salad bars."

In addition to the high seed cost, seedless watermelon production is quite labor intensive, according to Strang.

"The high-priced seed have a low germination rate when seeded right into the field," he said. "So they are started in the greenhouse; then transplants are put in the field. The seedlings tend to start off slowly but once they get going, they surpass the seeded varieties in vigor."

"Because seedless watermelon pollen is sterile, it will not pollinate other seedless watermelons. Conse-

quently, seeded varieties must be planted in the same field for pollination. In an acre field, you would have two-thirds seedless and one third seeded watermelons. Growers usually need bees to be sure of pollination."

Strang said it is harder to determine the optimum harvest maturity of seedless watermelons because you cannot judge ripeness by looking at the tendril, a leafless, coiled stem extending off the vine opposite the watermelon. A seedless watermelon is ripe when the area that lies on the ground, or ground spot, turns from white to a cream or yellow color.

"Despite the high seed cost and labor intensiveness of this crop, the future looks good for Kentucky-grown seedless watermelon production and marketing," Strang said.

Food prices fall to year's lowest

Kentucky retail food prices fell 1.4 percent in May to their lowest point this year, dropping the cost of a 40-item marketbasket of foods to an average \$69.11, according to Kentucky Farm Bureau's marketbasket survey.

Salyersville had the lowest local marketbasket average in May while Henderson checked in with the high mark. Overall, volunteers working through Kentucky Farm Bureau Women canvassed retail food prices in 20 Kentucky communities.

Shoppers saved an average 97 cents on their food purchases in May compared to April, and the average was 30 cents below the previous low point for the year in January. A comparison with May 1991 is much more dramatic. The latest figure is \$3.31 below the year-ago average of \$72.42.

All six categories of foods in the marketbasket registered price declines in May, paced by a 3.8 percent drop for fruits and vegetables. Beef prices fell 1.9 percent and poultry and eggs were 1.3 percent lower. Prices on pork, dairy products and grain foods posted fractional decreases.

Twenty-six of the 40 survey items sold at a lower cost in May, including 10 of 13 meats. Ground beef dropped 16 cents a pound to \$1.39, the second lowest mark for that popular item in more than two years. Other bargains at the meat counter included T-bone steaks, chuck roast, ham and whole fryers.

Egg prices have plummeted recently, now resting at their lowest levels since June 1988. Fresh bell peppers and tomatoes were also sharply lower in May, as was vegetable oil and margarine.

Countering the downward trend were popular summer barbecue items such as rib eye steaks and pork chops, as well as boneless chicken breasts which sell robustly in the summer through fast food outlets. Idaho potatoes, butter, flour and potato chips also posted significant price increases.

Some cookware might contain hidden dangers to your family

Whether you're buying new cookware or using an existing set to cook or store food, be careful not to serve your family a dose of toxic metals along with the meal, advises a food and nutrition specialist at the University of Kentucky.

"Lead and cadmium toxicity are major concerns when you purchase cookware or use it to cook or store food," said Kathy Daly-Koziel, Extension specialist with the UK College of Agriculture.

"Lead is used in ceramic ware to give a shiny, smooth surface," she explained. "Cadmium is used to produce vivid colors in red, yellow and orange pigments. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) prohibits use of cadmium by U.S. manufacturers. However, it might be found in ceramic products made by a hobbyist or products manufactured outside the U.S. Both lead and cadmium can leach through a glaze that is not mixed, applied or fired properly."

Some decorative or ornamental cookware is exempt from FDA regulations. However, it must be labeled as follows: Not for food use — plate may poison food. For decorative purposes only.

Aluminum, copper and zinc are other metal toxins that can be incorporated into cookware, according to Daly-Koziel. "Whether these metals are toxic depends upon how they were used in the cookware," she said.

"In terms of safety, one of the better choices on the market is cookware made of anodized aluminum — a specially treated, hardened aluminum that has a non-stick surface," Daly-Koziel said. "Other safe cookware choices are aluminum with a hardened finish, stainless steel, non-stick coated types, copper lined with tin or stainless steel, cast iron and porcelain enamel."

Cookware that might be suspect for poisonous effects from metals can include ceramic, brass, enamel with highly colored interior, galvanized steel, glass with painted interior, leaded crystal, pewter, silver-plated, and unlined copper.

Cookware that might contain toxic metals should not be used to store or serve acidic foods such as fruit juices, tomato sauces and coffee. These foods can cause lead or cadmium to leach out quickly because the acidic interaction draws out the toxic metals. Over the course of time, acidic foods can pit an aluminum surface. Storage in glass or plastic containers is the recommended procedure.

Daly-Koziel offered the follow-

ing safety guidelines:

- * Use copper or pewter cookware or containers and collectibles for decorative purposes. Do not use it on a daily basis to cook, serve or store food.

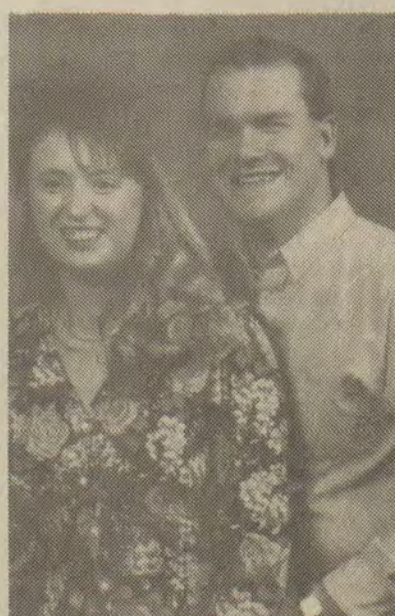
- * Avoid exposing food directly to copper cookware that is not lined with stainless steel or a no-stick surface that is in good condition.

- * Do not cook with chipped enamel ware because it can leach lead.

- * Crystalware may contain high amounts of lead. Do not store food or beverages in crystalware. Although occasional use is all right, avoid day-to-day use.

Daly-Koziel said kits are available for consumers to test cookware and other containers for lead. The kits range from \$10 to \$30. County extension offices have information on these kits.

A cookware safety display is one of nearly 50 exhibits planned for the Field Day on July 16 at the UK Research and Education Center in Princeton. "The display has examples of cookware that are sources of toxic metals, as well as safe choices," Daly-Koziel said. "The purpose is to alert consumers about products that are potentially unsafe and show them what products are safe."

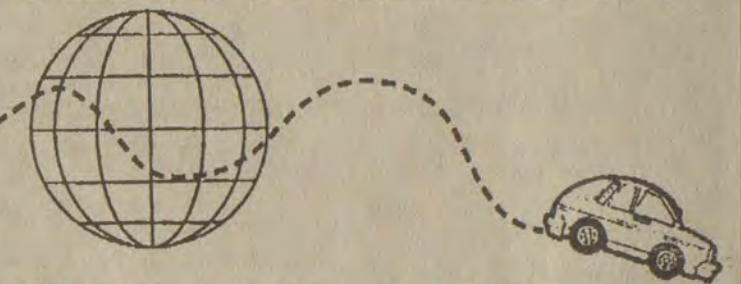

Both Hereford and Preston and the other Summer Program students "follow in the footsteps" of other former Highlands Summer students who have gone on the successful careers in healthcare.

Some of the most notable include Rodney Handshoe M.D., cardiologist; Blake Burchett, M.D.; and Ronald Goble, M.D.

As healthcare issues dominate current state and federal attention one fact is certain—the need for highly qualified healthcare professionals will not diminish. Highlands hopes that through the Summer Apprentice Program, exposure to the Medical Center's sophisticated computer network and state of the art technologies including CAT Scan, MRI, Cardiac Catheterization, Nuclear Medicine and Laparoscopic surgeries, the students will realize that eastern Kentucky is a very lucrative choice for careers in healthcare.

Managing Your Biggest Investment

The smart way to look at home improvements

What home improvements really pay off when the time comes to sell your house?

An important question for any homeowner contemplating moving or remodeling. And the only possible answer is a somewhat complicated one.

That answer starts with the fact that really major improvements — room additions, total replacements of kitchens and baths, etc., — rarely pay off fully in the near term.

It ends with the fact that small and relatively inexpensive changes can pay off in a big way in making your home attractive to buyers if your decision is to move now.

It's a simple fact, consistently confirmed across America over a very long period of time, that even the most appropriate major improvements are unlikely to return their full cost if a house is sold within two or three years.

Does that mean that major home improvements are always a bad idea? Absolutely not. It does mean, though, that if your present house falls seriously short of meeting your family's needs you need to think twice — and think carefully — before deciding to undertake a major renovation.

Viewed strictly in investment terms, major improvements rarely make as much sense as selling your present home and buying one that's carefully selected to provide you with what you want.

Even if you have a special and strong attachment to the house you're in and feel certain that you could be happy in it for a long time if only it had more bedrooms and baths, for example, there are a few basic rules that you ought to keep in mind.

Probably the most basic rule of all, in this regard, is the one that says you should never — unless you absolutely don't care at all about eventual resale value — improve a house to the point where its desired sale price would be more than 20 per cent higher than the most expensive of the other houses in the immediate neighborhood.

Try to raise the value of your house too high, that is, and surrounding properties will pull it down.

Here are some other rules worth remembering:

Never rearrange the interior of your house in a way that reduces the total number of bedrooms to less than three.

Never add a third bathroom to a two-bath house unless you don't care about ever recouping your investment.

Swimming pools rarely return what you spend to install them. Ditto for sunrooms — and finished basements.

If you decide to do what's usually the smart thing and move rather than improve, it's often the smaller, relatively inexpensive improvements that turn out to be most worth doing.

The cost of replacing a discolored

toilet bowl, making sure all the windows work or getting rid of dead trees and shrubs is trivial compared with adding a bathroom, but such things can have a big and very positive impact on prospective buyers. A good broker can help you decide which expenditures make sense and which don't, and can save you a lot of money in the process.

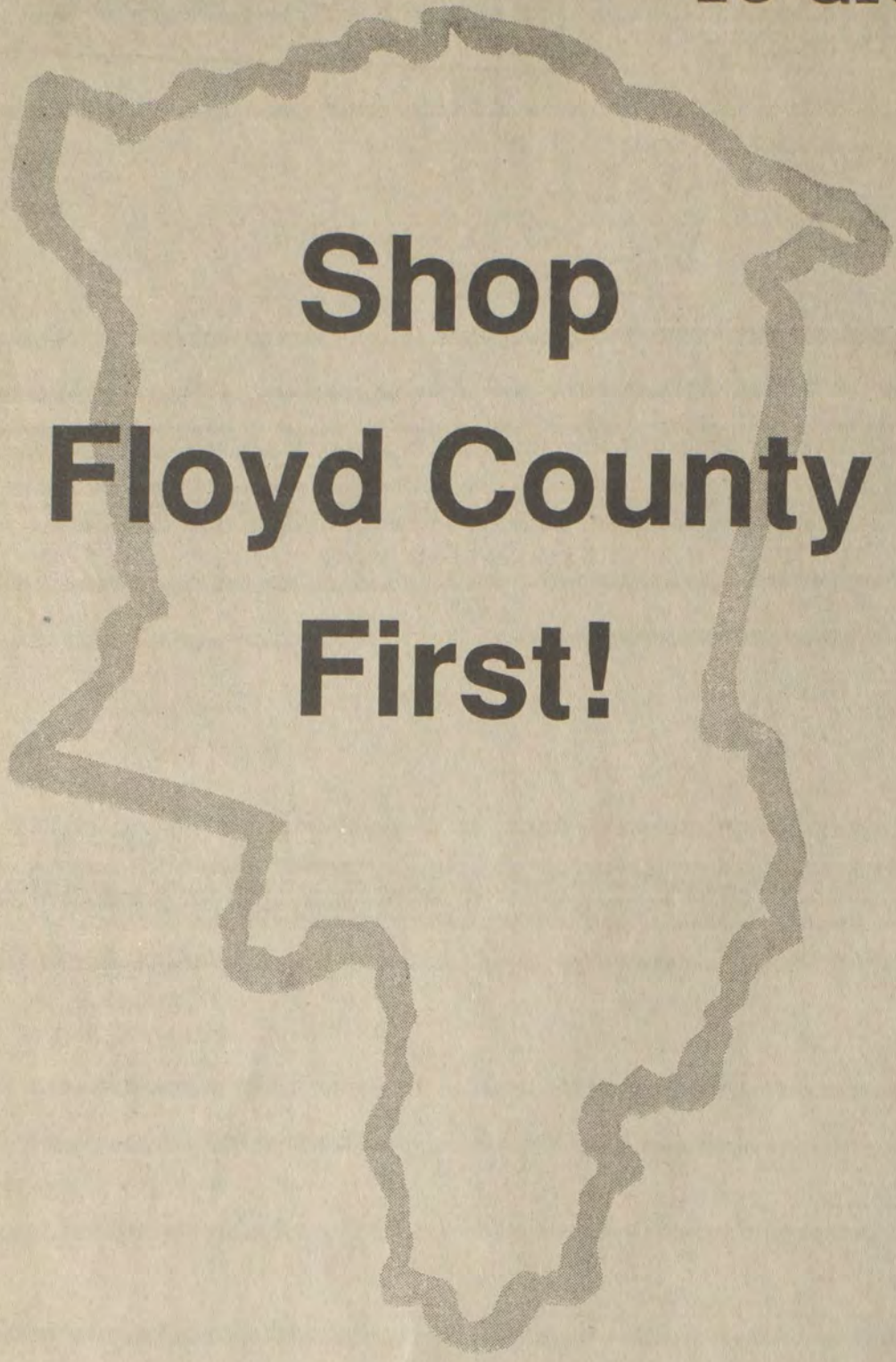
