## Bypro man dies in one-car accident

A 23-year-old Bypro man was killed Saturday night when the vehicle he was riding in struck a building at Melvin.

William T. Bailey died at McDowell Appalachian Regional Hospital just before midnight Saturday.

Bailey was riding in a vehicle operated by William J. Johnson, 16, also of Bypro. Johnson was transferred from McDowell ARH to the University of Kentucky Medical Center where he is listed in good condition.

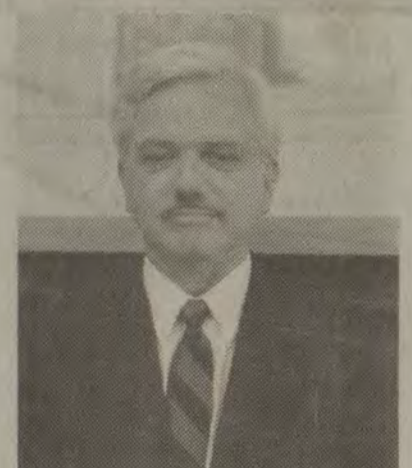
According to the police report, Johnson lost control of the vehicle on Route 122 at Melvin and the vehicle skidded approximately 100 feet and struck a building.

## Former IRS agent picked for school job

A former Internal Revenue Service agent has been named chief of operations for the Floyd County school system.

James M. Osborne, a Floyd County native, was chosen from 70 applicants for a job which was created in a district-wide reorganization of the central office.

"I'm very excited about this position," Osborne said in a press release. "It will be a tremendous challenge. I will do the best I can to accomplish the goals set by the board and Dr. (Steve) Towler."

Floyd superintendent Steve Towler said that Osborne's strong background as an auditor and manager was the deciding factor in his choice.

"Mr. Osborne's extensive experience auditing public funds weighed heavily in his favor," Towler said. "He has a solid background as a business manager and as a public servant."

Osborne's work history includes working for the IRS for the past two and a half years; working as a controller and administrative manager for Windfall Gold Corporation in Nome, Alaska from 1988-90; working as a financial examiner for the federal government from 1987-88; and as an audit supervisor for the Kentucky State Auditor's office from 1981-84.

Osborne is a graduate of Martin High School and served in the U.S. Army. After retiring from the Army as an intelligence sergeant, he earned an accounting degree from Eastern Kentucky University.

Osborne and his wife, Margie, live in Prestonsburg.

## Betsy Layne parents object to project cut

Opposition was voiced Saturday to the Floyd County Board of Education's vote last week to abandon the Betsy Layne 21-classroom addition project.

Charlotte Rogers, president of the school's parent-teacher organization, asked the board to reconsider its decision to cancel the classroom addition.

Rogers told the board that last week's decision to cancel the project caught parents "off-guard" and that they wanted the project to continue.

"It's not a matter of inconvenience, it's a matter of child safety," Rogers told the board. "We're not threatening civil disobedience. We are appealing to the Local Planning Committee (LPC) and the board to visit our school and take into consideration the building itself. There are a lot of safety hazards."

Rogers said she was not opposed to board member Brent Clark favoring a middle school in the area, but she said a grade school was also needed.

The board voted last week to cancel the school building project and to ask the LPC to put the project on the district's four-year building plan.

Board member Bob Isaac, who

also served as parent representative on the LPC, said the committee declined to address the issue because the group thought the project would be completed.

A group of Betsy Layne parents were expected to voice their concerns to a state hearing officer last night at the second public hearing on the school building plan.

At the end of Saturday's board meeting, hours after Rogers addressed

## Strict attendance policy is enacted:

# Hard line adopted for school no-shows

Floyd County School Board members adopted a strict attendance policy Saturday which they hope will reduce the system's dropout rate and boost attendance percentages.

Under the revised attendance policy, high school students who have unexcused absences for more than nine days per semester will not receive credits for classes missed.

Grade school students who have unexcused absences for more than 18 days per school year will not be eligible for promotion to the next grade level.

"It's a strong step forward," superintendent Steve Towler told the board. "We're trying to get the students who miss a lot of school. You'll get calls about this toward the end of the first semester when parents find out Johnny won't get a credit because he missed 25 days."

Students will have an opportunity to make up days missed by either attending Saturday school, after-school classes or summer school. If school work and days missed are not made up, the student will receive an incomplete grade which will be changed to an F for lack of performance.

Each school will have an appeals committee to review exceptional cases. Valid excuses will be reviewed by the committee and their decision will be binding.

Any further appeals can be made to the board of education.

Towler added that absenteeism is also a problem among school staff.

Schools that have site-based decision making councils may adopt the board's attendance policy or form one of their own.

Board member Brent Clark suggested that attendance could be boosted if the school day began at 8:30 a.m. rather than 8 a.m.

Towler said that a study would have to be conducted on beginning the school day later to determine what effects it would have on the system's transportation department, parent's schedules and "a lot of things."

Board member Bob Isaac said the board should support the attendance policy until the end of the school year.

In other action Saturday, some board members apparently have changed their minds about moving the instruction department out of the central office to rental space in downtown Prestonsburg.

When the July regular meeting began Tuesday, board members re-

jected the proposal by a 3-2 vote. Board members Eddie Billips and Bob Isaac voted for the move and board chairman Eddie Patton, members Brent Clark and Hattie Owens were not in favor of relocating the offices.

On Saturday, Patton said that "new information had come to light" and he felt the offices needed to be moved

## Rape suspect is found guilty on contempt of court charge

A Floyd County man who was accused of accosting a female juror during his rape trial was found guilty of contempt of court Tuesday.

Cisco Neeley of Hueysville was given 14 days credit for time served after his arrest July 14 when he was accused of making lewd comments to a female juror during a recess at his rape trial.

Floyd Circuit Judge John Caudill

also ordered Neeley not to have any contact with the juror and that he report weekly to his probation officer until the disposition of his rape case.

Neeley was accused of choking and raping a 15-year-old girl on December 5. Neeley also allegedly threatened the girl with a gun.

No new trial date has been scheduled on the rape charge.

## Ousley recognized at conference:

# Bus boss is best in state

Monday was Earl Ousley day at the Floyd County school system's school bus garage. Balloons waved high from picnic tables set up in a concrete area outside the garage and hot dogs sizzled on a grill as school bus drivers, their families and other well-wishers arrived for the informal celebration.

Inside, Ousley, transportation director of the Floyd County system school, sat at his desk, cool and collected, while a computer-generated paper sign hanging on the wall behind him told what the fuss was about. It read: Earl Ousley — Transportation Director of the Year.

Although this day he appeared to take the honor in stride, Ousley was anything but calm last Wednesday morning when the announcement was made. He was attending a Kentucky Department of Education Association of Pupil Transportation Directors conference in Louisville when he was singled out among 176 transportation directors as the best in the state. "I was in a state of shock," he said. "We apparently have a model program here."

It is a transportation program that has made state school officials sit up and take notice.

According to Chris Gates, parts inventory supervisor for the school system, state department officials visited the garage in May to look

over the unique computerized parts inventory system. The computerized program keeps up with garage inventory and bus expenditures on a daily basis. "They were well-impressed with it and recommended it to other Eastern Kentucky counties," Gates said.

In addition, Mike Roscoe, state director of pupil transportation, visited the garage at another time and "was impressed" with the transportation system as a whole — the bus routing system, driver training program and mechanic program, said Ousley.

In fact, at the conference "the parts inventory system was singled out by

## McGuire files motion :

## Judge Frazier asked to reconsider decision

An attorney for three former Floyd County school administrators has filed a motion asking Johnson Circuit Judge Stephen Frazier to reconsider his decision that the local school board did not violate the state's Open Meetings Law.

Judge Frazier refused to grant the administrators a temporary restraining order last week and ruled that school board had properly discussed a district reorganization plan in closed session during meetings on March 25, 27, 30 and April 3.

Prestonsburg attorney Mickey McGuire represents former administrators Pete Grigsby Jr., Tommy Thompson and Wayne Ratliff whose jobs were eliminated under the plan. The three filed a civil lawsuit against the school board and superintendent Steve Towler asking the board's decision to implement the reorganization plan be voided. The suit also asked that a temporary restraining

order be issued to allow the three to remain in their jobs.

Judge Frazier's decision said that the board was authorized to discuss the plan in closed session because litigation concerning the plan had been proposed.

Under the Open Meetings Law, a public agency can discuss proposed or pending litigation in an executive session.

At the March 25 meeting, McGuire handed out a proposed federal lawsuit against board member Eddie Billips he said he would file if the board did not adopt a reorganization plan proposed in January.

In his motion for Judge Frazier to reconsider the case, McGuire argued that the board cited discussions concerning personnel as the reason for a closed session, not litigation.

"The board has represented to this court that they announced the discussion of personnel, but, in fact, discussed litigation," McGuire's motion said. "If the school board announced they were going into closed

session to discuss personnel and then went into executive session to discuss threatened litigation, they have lied to the public and violated the law."

In a response to McGuire's latest motion, board attorney Cliff Latta called McGuire's claims "a combination of speculation, conjecture and fantasy."

"The court's July 19... order decided as a matter of law that the plaintiffs were not entitled to a temporary restraining order because they were not suffering irreparable injury and they had an adequate remedy at law," Latta's response said.

McGuire's motion also says that the Floyd County Times has filed an appeal "as to a new violation" of the Open Meetings Law by the local board.

Latta claims that is inaccurate. "This is simply not true," Latta said in his response. "The Times has asked the Attorney General for a clarification of the interpretation of KRS 61.810 (1) (f) since the passage of

KERA. The defendants applaud the action of the Floyd County Times and welcome the advice and counsel of the Attorney General's office."

The Times has asked the Attorney General's office for an opinion concerning a school board's capacity to discuss personnel issues other than those positions allowed by Kentucky's Education Reform Act. Section (f) of the Open Meetings Law says that a public agency may go into closed session to discuss issues which could lead to the appointment, dismissal or discipline of an individual.

Under KERA, a school board member cannot become directly involved with the hiring or firing of school personnel other than the superintendent, board attorney and board treasurer.

At a July 14 special school board meeting, the media objected to the board's move to go into a closed session to discuss personnel which superintendent Steve Towler said could lead to "the appointment or non-appointment" of personnel.

The board met in closed session on the issue, but no action was taken.

A hearing on McGuire's motion is set for Friday, August 6, at 9:30 a.m. in Johnson Circuit Court.

the board, superintendent Steve Towler told that board the project had to be placed in the district building plan.

Clark moved that the project be placed as priority 6b, the next project after building a middle school in the South Floyd area. Clark added that the plan could be changed if the board decided the project should be moved up on the priority list.

LPC chairman Jody Sword told the board that if the plan was altered it could delay new school construction.

Isaac agreed and said that to be fair the entire LPC plan needed to be looked at before making a change.

Board chairman Eddie Patton said the board appeared to be "standing pat" on their decision.

Clark's motion passed by a 3-1 vote, with Isaac voting no. Board member Eddie Billips had to leave Saturday midway through the meeting and did not vote.

The school board has already spent over \$450,000 on the Betsy Layne project. Expenses include site preparation, architect and construction manager fees and engineering costs.

In other action Saturday, school maintenance workers voiced their disagreement about statements made last Tuesday by board member Eddie Billips.

Billips said last week that he would not vote for pay raises for the maintenance department because repairs had not taken place at some schools that were requested almost a year ago. He cited science labs at Prestonsburg High School. Some lab stations either have inadequate plumbing or no water and that some drains have been stopped up for at least a year.

Hershel Conn, maintenance employee, told Billips Saturday that their department was being discriminated against and that it was not their fault repairs haven't been made at some schools.

Conn said that if workers are not notified by their supervisors about needed repairs, they cannot do them.

Billips defended his stance and said that his comments were directed at the department as a whole and not individuals.

"Until I get a clear understanding why repairs are not done, I stand by my vote," Billips said. "I don't feel I can vote an across the board raise until I get some information. I have no concept where the breakdown is and I don't have any reason to doubt what you say. But, until we get this problem corrected, I'll not back down."

Former building and grounds director Frankie Francis said that something was missing in the line of communication. Francis said it was up to school personnel to keep their schools clean and that maintenance workers were to do major repairs.

Board chairman Eddie Patton said that maintenance personnel were doing a good job and that internal communication appeared to be the problem.

The board voted last week to defer all raises in that department until a report is received from Naim Inc. which is conducting an extensive review of that department.

In other school construction updates:

• In a letter to the board, architectural consultant P.N. Feldman reported that new cracks have been found at Adams Middle School in a classroom in the C wing. The report said the cracks appear to have been caused by settlement caused by either soil consolidation or changes in soil moisture profile. The report also noted cracks in the cafeteria and gym walls which could have been caused by construction at a water plan adjacent to the school. Feldman recommended the site continue to be monitored.

• Architect Randall Burchett reported in a letter to the board that plans have been completed for a track at Allen Central High School and the bids have been requested for a retaining wall, fencing and light pole relocation. Board member Hattie Owens told the board that property adjacent to the track site was for sale. The board took no action on the property issue.

• Superintendent Steve Towler told the board that a temporary certificate of occupancy has been obtained for the new South Floyd High School.

Towler said, though, that plans have not been approved for the construction of a new gym at the school. The superintendent said he did not know when the project could be let for bids.

## New health services coming to area

An Indiana diagnostic health care service plans to expand its services into Floyd County.

Precision Medical Diagnostic Services of Evansville, Indiana has proposed to expand its existing mobile X-ray, EKG and Holter (long-term EKG), monitoring services to 34 Kentucky counties, including Floyd, Johnson, Magoffin, Martin and Pike counties.

The services will be offered to nursing homes, personal care homes, home health agencies, correctional facilities and private corporations.

No capital expenditure is involved. The Interim Office of Health Planning and Certification is considering the health care proposal under a nonsubstantive review. Nonsubstantive review expedites the formal review process required for a certificate of need; such review can be granted in certain cases as specified by statute and regulation.

Persons affected by the proposed change under review may request a public hearing on the application. Requests must be submitted in writing by July 29 to Richard Carroll, Chief Hearing Officer, Interim Office of Health Planning and Certification, 275 E. Main St., Frankfort, KY 40621.

The interim office plans to complete its review by August 23.

A campus nominating committee and editors of the publication have included the name of this student based on his academic achievements, community service, leadership in extra-curricular activities and potential for continued success.

He joins an elite group of students selected from institutions of higher learning in all 50 states, the District of Columbia and several foreign nations.

Roscoe as the best parts department in the state of Kentucky," Ousley noted.

As transportation director, Ousley oversees "approximately 100 people who work directly or indirectly in this department — bus drivers and mechanics," he said.

But his number one priority is the safety of the 8,500 pupils the bus system transports 10,000 miles a day.

Accordingly, since he took over the job four years ago, the system has purchased 60 new buses and equipped the entire fleet of 76 buses with two-way radio communication systems. In addition, Ousley requested a full-time driver training instructor for the department. "I requested that and Dr. Towler approved it," he said.

Dr. Stephen Towler, superintendent of Floyd County schools, was in the office listening and he nodded his head in agreement. "I'm real proud of Mr. Ousley," he said. "This is my fourth school system...Coming to Floyd County, it has been a real pleasure to work with Mr. Ousley. I think we have an outstanding total operation here. Years ago we didn't have this. Mr. Patton and Mr. Ousley updated it..."

Ousley's on-the-job experience in education has given him a well-

rounded perspective as transportation director. He has worked in the Floyd County school system for 33 years, 29 of those as a math teacher at Clark Elementary near Prestonsburg. Fourteen of those years he was also a school bus driver.

"I loved teaching," he said. "...But after a number of years, you feel like you need to move on to something different. I felt like I needed to move on."

Ousley is quick to give credit for the department's success to his fellow workers, such as Gates, Gary Artrip, driving instructor, and his administrative assistant Karen Johnson, who has worked with the department nine years. "She has done a fantastic job helping with the programs and all the workers here and the bus drivers have done a fantastic job helping," Ousley said.

Johnson gave credit to her boss. "I think the honor is very well-deserved. He works very hard and puts in long hours."

Ousley, who is 60, wants to remain transportation director "until I retire. I want to work this year and one more."

Until that time, "I want to continue with what we are presently doing and do what I can to improve it."

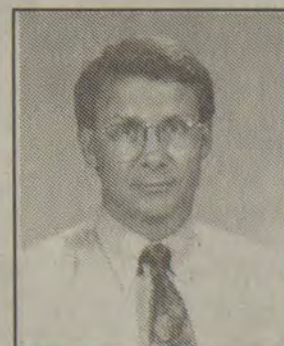

According to the arrest citation, Duncan said that Johnson hit him in the stomach and that while trying to subdue Johnson, Duncan twisted his leg and lower back.

Saturday's incident was videotaped by a "silent partner," which is a video camera installed in police cruisers to document arrests.

At a special called Wheelwright City Commission meeting Monday, announced prior to Saturday's incident, Johnson, who was wearing a sling on his left arm, claimed he was set up by police officers because he refused to vote to hire Duncan full-time at a special meeting last Thursday.

At last Thursday's meeting, Duncan told the commission that he had made a complaint to the attorney general's office concerning Commissioner Allen Taylor.

Duncan said Thursday that Taylor had told him prior to the May primary election that if he did not support former police chief Charles Harmon in his race for constable, he would lose his job.

Taylor, who has a hearing problem and who often cannot hear discussions at meetings, was present at Thursday's meeting.

When an audience member shouted to him that "Duncan was talking about you," Taylor made no comment on the allegations.

Duncan also said that Mayor Kenneth Johnson would not turn over police equipment to the department.

Concerning Saturday's altercation, Luther Johnson said he went to the Cardinal Mart to buy a pack of

cigarettes and that he saw the two officers whispering as he came out of the convenience store. The commissioner said the two officers asked him if he had been drinking and he said "no."

"Huff pulled out his night stick and said 'you're going to jail,'" Johnson said Monday. "I told him he was not taking me to jail because I was not drunk. If I had been drunk, I would've went to jail. Why didn't they arrest me for DUI when I got out of the car? They had the camera on me the whole time. I was set up."

The videotape of the arrest, however, contradicts Johnson's account of the incident.

At the beginning of the tape, Johnson is not seen, but he is heard talking with officer Huff about recent police activity in the city. Huff is heard trying to persuade Johnson to leave the premises.

After a short time, the camera shows Johnson, who is sitting on the edge of the police cruiser, and the officers. The film shows Johnson start to curse at the officers and then Huff telling Johnson he is being taken into custody.

Johnson refuses to be taken, starts cursing at the officers and the three men begin to struggle.

On the video, officers wrestle with and then hold Johnson down on the hood of the cruiser. He is eventually handcuffed and placed in the police cruiser. Johnson is heard saying the handcuffs are too tight and Duncan offering to and eventually loosening the handcuffs.

Johnson said Monday that his brother, Russell, helped put the handcuffs on him, but that does not appear on the tape. Russell Johnson is shown in the background.

"They weren't going to hit me with no night stick," Johnson said Monday. "I got mad as any individual would. I did not hit Duncan intentionally. They twisted my arm behind my back and threw me upon the hood of the car. I think the police chief was doing his best to hurt me. We don't need two people as police who a 140 pound man can whip."

Commissioner Johnson said that he intended to file charges against Duncan and Huff.

In a related issue, following Monday night's special city commission meeting, auxiliary policeman David Gray resigned from the department, apparently leaving the city without police protection.

Chief Duncan is off work due to his knee injury after Saturday's altercation with Johnson. Huff, who is taking a 10-week police training course in Richmond, returned to his classes Monday.

Gray was the city's only other policeman.

Also Monday, commissioners voted 3-2 to return control of the police department to Mayor Kenneth Johnson.

Commissioner Lowell Dean Parker was the supervisor for the police department, but Monday Commissioner Johnson moved that the department be given back to the mayor. Parker and Commissioner Andy Akers voted against the move. Parker and Mayor Johnson en-

gaged in a somewhat heated verbal exchange during the discussion. Parker objected to the proceedings concerning who would supervise the police department.

Parker said that Commissioner Johnson and Mayor Johnson should not vote on the issue because of the Saturday morning altercation.

"There's things going on here that ought to never go on," Parker said.

Parker was named to oversee the city's parks and recreation department, but he resigned that position later in the meeting. Parker said that he didn't have time to supervise that department because he needed to concentrate on his race for mayor of the city.

Commissioners also voted to go into closed session to discuss city police personnel issues.

Commissioners returned a short time later and Mayor Johnson reported that no action would be taken on personnel issues.

"As far as I can see, nothing was accomplished," Mayor Johnson said. "A few things were discussed, but nothing was settled."

Also Monday, commissioners voted to hire Roman Caudill to answer the telephone and dispatch for the police department.

Parker abstained from voting on the issue.

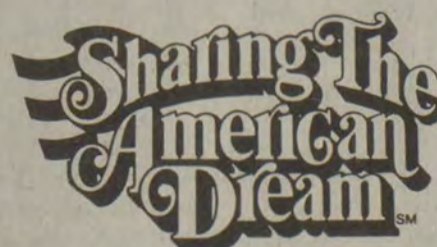

An interesting analogy has risen with the flood waters along the Mississippi and the fact that so many people have been disconnected from their usual source of clean, fresh drinking water.

While the victims of flooding are most certainly suffering, their plight is only temporary. But, for nearly three of every ten people on this planet, including many in Eastern Kentucky, access to potable water is non-existent.

You don't miss the water 'til the well runs dry (or flood waters knock out the water plant).

Rarely does an Act of Congress go by that doesn't cost money, but some states are taking the bull-headed by the horns by inviting their congressional contingents to come home and explain themselves.

### Gun control craze, a dangerous farce

The good people of this nation are scared. And rightfully so. Headlines and news broadcasts everywhere offer the same startling mayhem: Murder. Rape. Carjacking. Assault. Robbery.

Some think we're back to the Old West again, where everyone needed a gun.

Not so. The Old West was far safer. Old West violence was primarily limited to clashes with bandits, foreign nations or along frontiers.

This is not to say we should all start carrying guns in holsters again. But as history shows, the answer is not in disarming citizens either.

Unfortunately, public fear is creating misguided and ineffective gun control laws. Politically motivated police chiefs and police commissioners create the mistaken impression that police officers on the street support such laws

They don't. Law enforcement surveys show rank-and-file officers overwhelmingly oppose gun control. Their views are not being represented by their various association leaders.

Police officers know the dirty little secret: No matter how many gun laws are passed, criminals are unaffected. The vast majority of them obtain firearms illegitimately. Criminals get whatever they want, whenever they want it, from black markets selling hot guns at a fraction of their retail value.

Laws such as five-day waiting periods on gun purchases only infringe on the rights of law-abiding citizens to protect themselves—such as the college coed killed by a serial killer in Gainesville, Fla., who like her schoolmates was told by sheriff's deputies to go to another county to get a firearm faster.

Even outright gun bans in California, New York and Washington, D.C., failed to slow the crimes of murder, rape and armed robbery. In fact, Washington, along with New Jersey and Hawaii, experienced sharp murder-rate increases after passing tough gun control laws.

Meanwhile, we can only wonder "what if" about victims like the slain Florida coed.

Despite popular belief, guns do help in defending against criminals. Potential victims use firearms nearly one million times a year in self-defense—more often than criminals use guns. In nearly 98 percent of the cases, merely brandishing a firearm scares off a would-be attacker. Mishaps are rare. Private citizens mistakenly kill people only 30 times a year, compared with about 330 mistaken killings by police.

The numbers, compiled by the National Center for Policy Analysis, revealed that criminals succeed in disarming a victim less than one percent of the time.

No matter what our views on gun control, every law-abiding citizen is on the same side. Everyone wants guns kept away from criminals. Keeping them away from potential victims may only get more good people killed.

James J. Fotis is executive director of the Law Enforcement Alliance of America in Washington, D.C. He is the most highly decorated officer in his department's history, retired from his police force after suffering multiple injuries sustained in the line of duty.

for employee safety.

"Legally, we could be negligent if someone got hurt," Patton said.

Owens' feelings on the issue did not change and she said that as long as students are in old, dilapidated buildings, she could not vote for new office space.

"My child sits in school every day and watches the ceiling fall," Owens said.

Owens suggested that the central offices be housed in old school buildings that have been abandoned.

Towler said that it would be expensive to renovate the old school buildings.

Clark jumped into the discussion saying that there "is a bad atmosphere" in the district's central office and workers connive against themselves.

"You need to work together for the kids," Clark said. "It's hard for us as board members to vote for you all for anything. It's up to you all to straighten out the bad vibes."

Clark said workers acted "afraid" when he walked into the central office and that some employees churn out rumors to cause upheaval throughout the school system.

"Certain people feel you (connive) against yourselves and you deserve what you got," Clark said. "If you're going to do that, for what purpose, I don't know. We can start anew. You need to get together and work together."

Frankie Francis, director of student services, told Clark that "you can't put a stop on rumors" and that it needs to be noted when employees are doing their jobs. Francis added that people who don't do their jobs should be reprimanded.

Chairman Patton commented, "the only thing this board can do is hold the superintendent accountable for people doing their jobs and we will do that."

The board voted 4-1 to lease office space for a one-year period with a provision that "the absolute minimum" be spent on office furniture. Owens voted against the motion.

Also Saturday, the board heard from Delores Dingus, who complained about the treatment of special education students and their parents.

Dingus, who has a child with Down's Syndrome, said parents of special education students are treated poorly by administrative personnel. Dingus asked for more cooperation between administrators and parents. She also complained that in many of the teaching units there are not telephones or intercoms in case of emergencies.

"All these children have health problems," Dingus told the board. "There was no intercom in the room when my child went into cardiac arrest. They had to send a runner to get to a telephone. Teachers also need have CPR training. A child can die in the blink of an eye."

Dingus also said that during a hearing concerning her child, one school administrator remarked, "She thinks her son is a genius, she don't know he's retarded."

Chairman Patton told Dingus that he "didn't appreciate" school personnel talking to her that way and he encouraged her to file a formal complaint.

Patton instructed Towler to make sure parents are consulted and are allowed to be more involved at the school level concerning their children.

Dingus also asked that the board work to implement programs to teach special needs students skills related to jobs.

In other business Saturday:

The board heard from Libbi Hall who is spearheading the district's alternative education school. Hall reported that new programs are being developed to be implemented at the alternative school which she felt would help problem students be able to return to a regular classroom setting. Hall said the school will not be a dumping ground for problem students. Chairman Patton asked that board receive a monthly briefing on activities at the school.

The board heard from adult education paraprofessional Joyce Hall that state funding for the Adult Basic Education program is expected to be diverted to the David School. Hall said if that if the money is diverted, several employees in the program would lose their jobs. Hall told the board that it would cost \$20,000 to continue funding the program. Patton asked that a formal complaint concerning the funding cut be made the Kentucky Department of Education. Board member Eddie Billips asked finance officer David Johnson to put the money in the current budget and determine what would need to be cut in order to fund the program. Johnson is to present his report to the board at August meeting.

The board approved policy revisions concerning extended employment for site based decision making schools which would allow those schools to develop unique salary schedules; a revision that vacation days be renamed non-contract days; and a revision that would grant certified employees three personal days and classified employees two days.

The board awarded service contracts for security; elevator inspections, fencing, telephones, grass cutting and food service supplies.

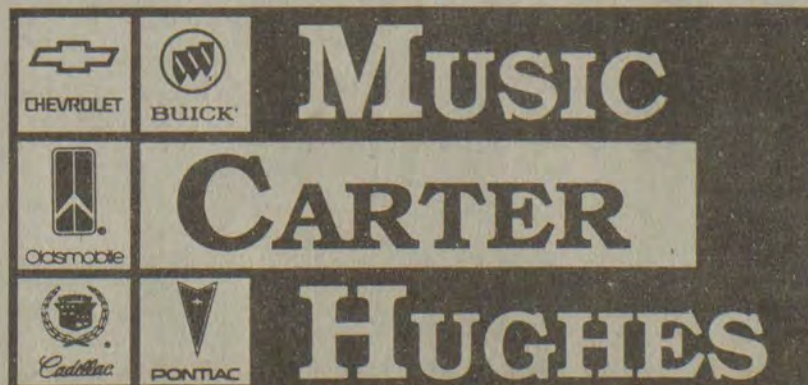

## Remembrances of James J. Carter

Editor:

This article may appear quite long, but I ask that you print it. The subject is about someone who not only was a personal friend, but also one who was a servant to his community and nation.

On 3 October 1988, he addressed a letter to me recalling the names of many of our mutual friends in Prestonsburg—several gone and others yet living. He said:

"We often reminisce about when you lived in Prestonsburg on Maple Avenue; you and Edgar; Frank and John Heinze; Louis Harkey Mayo and brothers Dick Erwin and Walker Porter, Jr.; Arthur Johns and William Thomas Archer; Bev, Cottrell, Estill and Roland Burchett; Freddie James; Bill and Jack Jones. Then on Graham Street there were David Darwin May, James William and Jack Salisbury, Billy Callihan; Second Avenue (now Arnold Avenue), there were Winston Burke, Bill Baker, Edmond and Lucien; Leo, Jack and "Muck" Carter; Babe and Bunk Friend; Bill Arnold and Jodie Spradlin, James and Billy Morrell; Jack and Dick and Geraldine Allen; Sam and Jimmy Hatcher, "Little Joe," Walter Scott and Monty Scott Harkins. Then there were: James and Lucien Lafferty; John Calvin Hopkins who lived on the hillside above town; Oliver Hanson Stumbo; Harold, Lex and Eugene Holcomb, Adrian and Ray Collins; Lon, Mary and Joe Hill; John and Ralph Archer; Fred, Bob and "Little Huck" Francis, and others I just can't remember or think of at the present time."

"Sometimes one wishes to recall the days of 'Cowboys and Indians,' shinnying up trees, hide-and-go seek, tracking, snipe hunting, playing with little toy cars on the river bank, etc., and those times were wonderful to remember. Sadly, some of them never grew up or advanced to some late age in life. It was grievous to learn of the death of Carthel Hill Smith whose submarine was sunk in the Pacific during World War II. But we all grew up together in a close-knit community, and together our lives were enriched in lasting friendships."

"Though many have moved away, as you, or have since died, their memories are etched in our minds. We are all richer for knowing and having known one another. God Bless you, our Friend..."

A few weeks before his death, I saw him in a Lexington hospital. Although his leg had been amputated, he still seemed as jovial as I had known him in childhood. He was still happy with those unlost days of our early growing-up years and said they were times to never be forgotten. Somehow, I sensed an unexpressed knowledge that he knew his downward steps were numbered; that his life was ebbing slowly toward eternity: "God, in his healing way, takes care of us." The room was still and we were alone. But he never knew that I was uttering a final muted prayer. And now, my eternal friend, God's servant and devoted patriot, James Joseph Carter, rests with the ages of time.

- There were 5,848 persons that played softball this year. That was 344 teams.

- The largest individual sport was track and field with 942 participants.

It was a great weekend in Lexington. I traveled from one end of the city to the other in trying to cover as much as I possibly could.

Also taking place was the Babe Ruth state baseball tournament at Veteran's Park in Lexington. I had a chance to cover the first game that our Floyd County team played. It made for a long day but I enjoyed every bit of it. I'm looking forward to next season.

# Record numbers turn out for opening of Bluegrass Games

Commonwealth Stadium, on the campus of the University of Kentucky, was very active Friday night as a record number of athletes and spectators gathered for the opening ceremonies of the 1993 Bluegrass State Games. Over 16,000 converged on the home of the Kentucky Wildcats' football team to take in the festivities that officially open the games.

Former University of Kentucky basketball standout Jamal Mashburn (the Dallas Mavericks' first round draft pick) was on hand to assist in the lighting of the Bluegrass State Games' flame.

The flame was lit during ceremonies in Frankfort earlier in the day. The torch was carried by runners from the old capitol building to Com-

monwealth Stadium.

Leo McMillen, who is a member of the Bluegrass Runners Club, carried the torch on its final leg into Commonwealth Stadium where he and Mashburn ignited the huge Olympic-style flame.

The parade of athletes was led by the Henry Clay cheerleaders who were followed by the athletes taking part in the Games.

Softball was the largest sport of the 25 offered in this year's Games. Over 340 teams registered for softball—involving 5,000 athletes. Soccer was the second largest. Over 200 soccer games were played.

The Bluegrass State Games' Carl Frey opened the ceremonies, welcoming all incoming athletes to this year's Games.

"The Bluegrass State Games has grown at a tremendous rate," said

Fry, "and this year offers three new events, making 25 sporting events that will involve over 18,000 athletes."

Fry told the large gathering of the massive undertaking of organizing such event as the Bluegrass Games and extended a "thank you" to the University of Kentucky for the use of their facilities because "the University of Kentucky has been a key to the success of the Games since its beginning."

"The Bluegrass State Games of 1993 will be the best yet," Fry told a cheering crowd. "We at Valvoline Oil (who, along with Coca-Cola, underwrites the Games) are committed to next year's games that will be held on July 29, 30 and 31."

Joe Burch, representing University of Kentucky President Charles

Weddington, welcomed everyone and stated that "UK was proud to be part of the Games since its inception."

"It's our pleasure to welcome you to the University of Kentucky and we are pleased to have you here," he said. "We want to congratulate each athlete and wish them the best."

Standing in for Lexington Mayor Pam Miller was Vice-Mayor Terea Isaac who brought a loud cheer from the thousands gathered when she welcomed everyone to Lexington, "the home of Jamal Mashburn."

"We here in Lexington are committed to making your stay in Lexington a pleasant one," said Isaac. "Athletics teaches us lessons. It also helps round out character in individuals."

Kentucky Governor Brereton Jones informed those present of the record number in attendance for the

opening ceremonies.

"It is the largest and greatest crowd to view the opening games," said Governor Jones. "It shows great respect for competition in the state. Some will know the agony of defeat and the thrill of victory."

For the third consecutive year, Bernice Shorpsshire, 91, of Paris was the oldest participant in the Games. Shorpsshire took part in two track and field events, shot put and the 1,500-meter walk.

The youngest participants in this year's Games were the tender young age of 3 years old.

The opening ceremonies of the Games started with a flyover by the Kentucky National Guard. Othello Pumphrey, after his outstanding rendition of the National Anthem, thrilled

Allen just returned from his seventh appearance in the state games and, once again, returned with yet another medal.

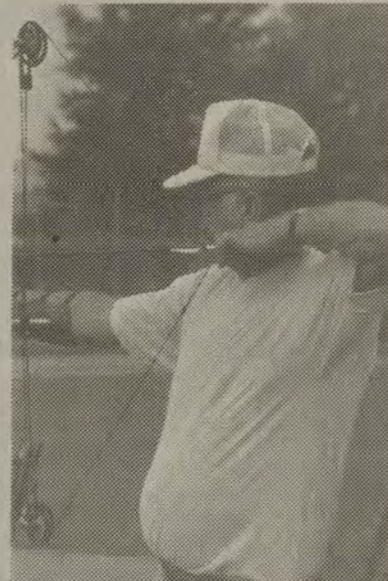
Allen made his first appearance in the Games in 1986 and has brought some sort of medal to Floyd County each year.

"Leslie and my wife compete in the shopping games," said James with a laugh. "They like to make the shopping places."

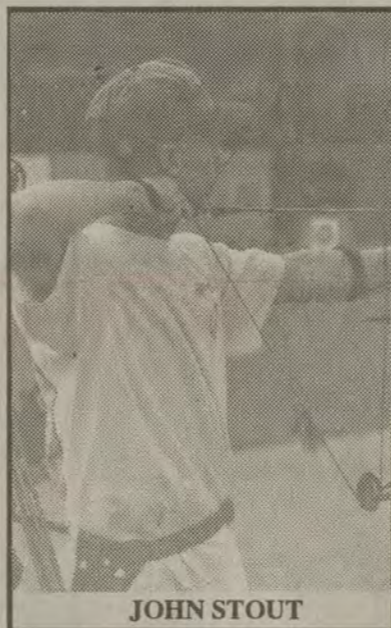
Leslie isn't without her interest in archery but elected not to enter the games.

John, who plays football for Prestonsburg High School, won a bronze medal for his third place finish in the Freestyle Unlimited. It also was his third medal in the three years of competition.

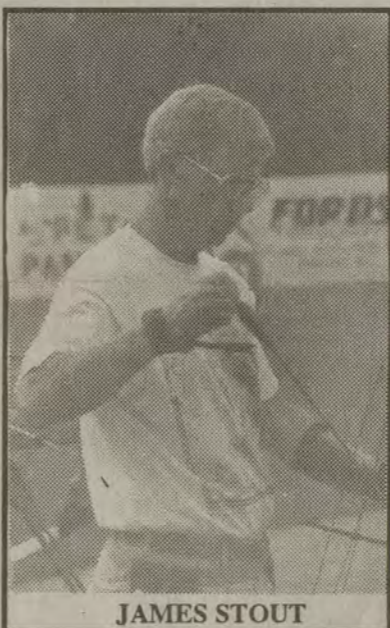

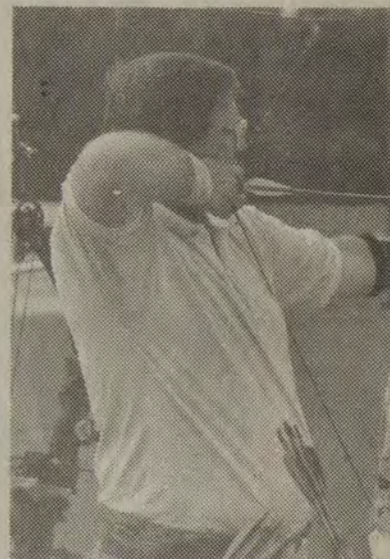
While the weather was uncomfortable, it didn't hamper Polk from winning two medals in the Games, giving him six in the six years he participated in the Games.

Seven runs were scored in the game between Paintsville Big League and Louisville Valley Monday at South Shore as the state Big League tournament got underway. All seven came as a result of home runs.

Bud Kidd cranked out a Brent Lynch fastball with two runners on base to lead the Paintsville team to a 4-3 win in game one.

In an earlier game, South Laurel defeated Greenup County 15-0.

Billy Elam was sharp on the mound after they gave Louisville three first inning runs. He threw goose eggs the rest of the way.

You knew that Elam was serious as his hat went sideways and he began to grunt with every pitch. The hard throwing righthander got some strong defensive play behind him.

Brad Tiller put the local team on the scoreboard early as he drilled a 2-2 pitch over the left center field fence (315-feet) for a leadoff home run and a 1-0 lead.

What followed made coaches Paul

David Brown and Johnnie Lemaster nervous. Brent Adams and John Holbrook singled and Barry Hall was hit-by-a-pitch to load the bases against Lynch with no one out and Paintsville threatened to blow out early.

Instead, they were an early bust as Kidd and Justin Hall went out on strikes and Jason Pinson forced Hall on a grounder to short, leaving the bases jammed and Brown upset.

Catcher Brian Evans took care of business in style in the first for Louisville as the two teams "talked trash." Evans put Valley in front 3-1 by drilling a long (330-feet) home run over the center field fence with two teammates on board. 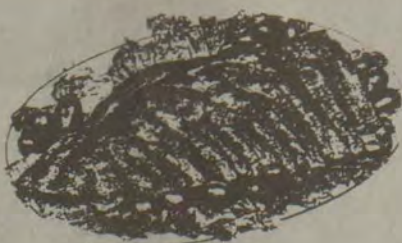

"It was so hot that we just came home after we finished shooting," he said. "We didn't wait around for the scoring."

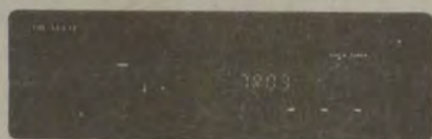

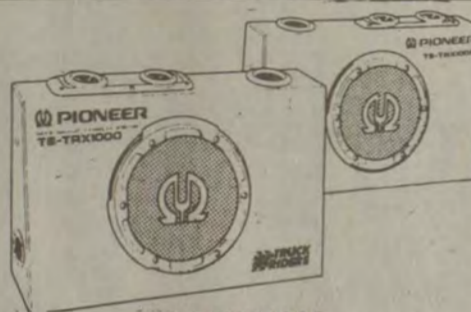

Ken's scored four times in the fifth and got two in the sixth to snap a 4-4 tie.

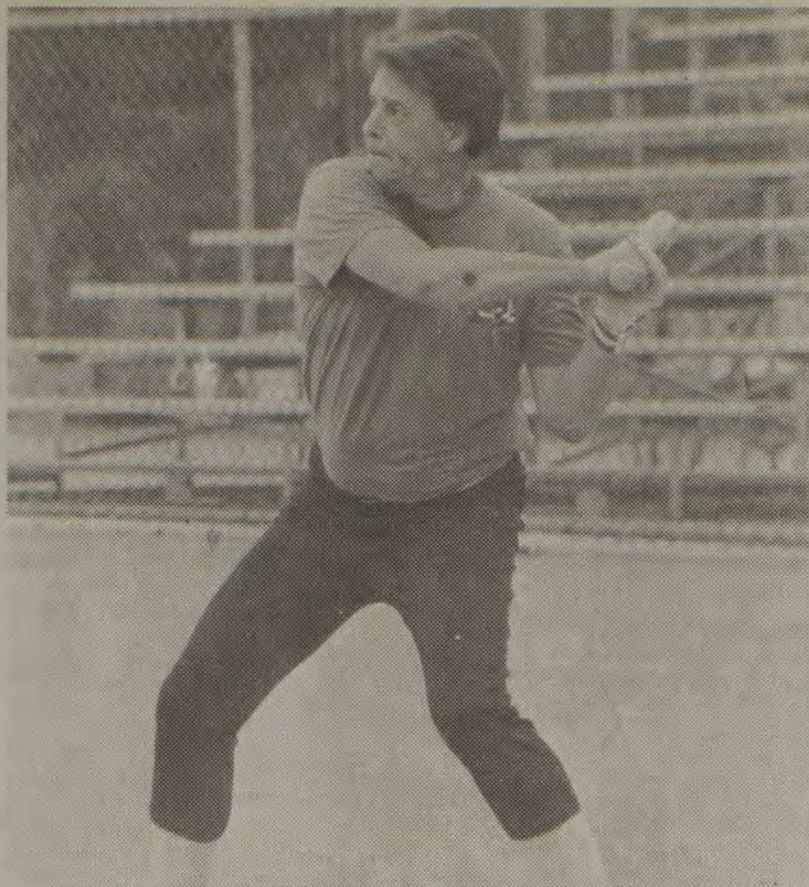
H & W provided a little more competition in game three but Ken's held on for a 8-5 win in an otherwise low scoring affair.

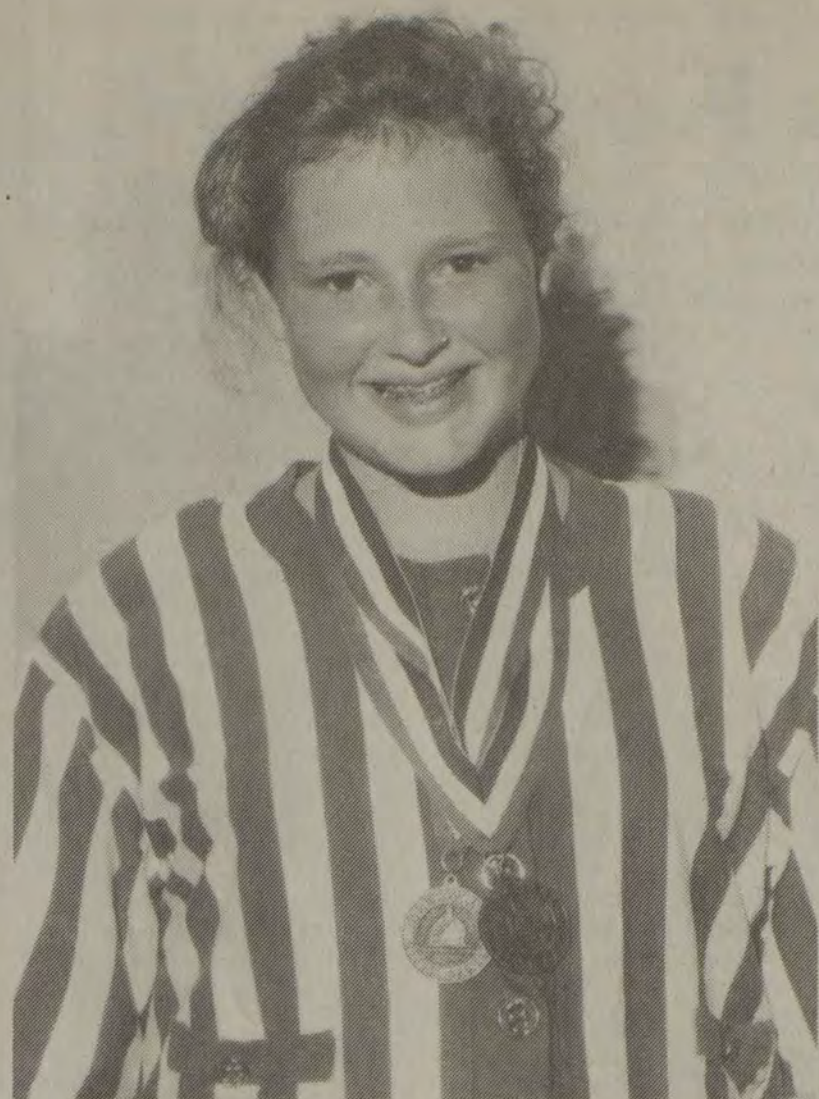

The threesome won the WSAZ three-on-three competition earlier in the summer and placed second in Charleston.

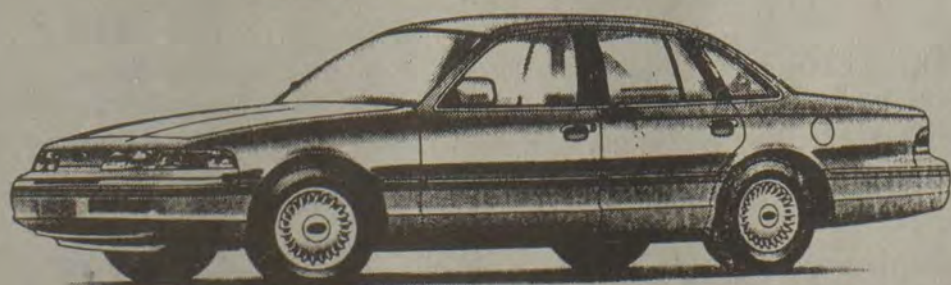

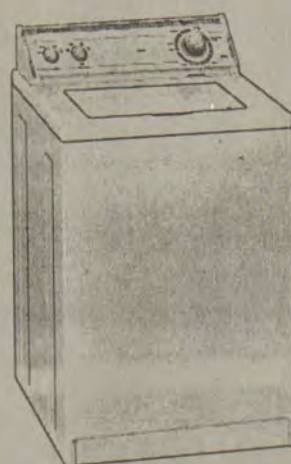

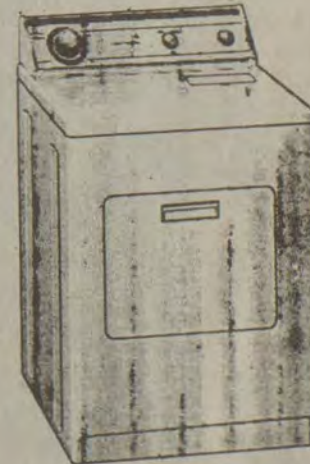

### PREPARATION FOR SUCCESS

Everybody wants to catch fish--the more the better. There are several things you can do to have a successful day. To start out you must be prepared. Preparation is one of the main keys to the secret of success. Let's look at some of the things that I have picked up through the years which I believe are very helpful. First you need to check the boat over. Make sure it is ready for the trip. Batteries need to be charged. Check the air in the trailer tires. Make sure the trolling motor works and the big engine turns over. After the boat, check your truck. Make sure the oil isn't low, the radiator is full, and the air pressure in your tires is correct.

Now let's look over your fishing equipment. First make sure that all reels are operating properly. Sometimes a not-so-smoothly operating reel simply needs cleaning and I have found that WD-40 works wonders on cleaning the gears of a reel. Then, be sure that the reels are properly seated and secured on the rod. While looking

at the rod, check it. Sometimes the eyes will have a piece of thread that has worked loose. If so, clip it and pull a small portion of epoxy to keep the threads from working loose again.

Line is very important to a fisherman. It is the link between you and the fish. Line size may vary depending on the water clarity, structure and lures you are fishing with. Always during actual fishing, check your line for frays and nicks in the line. You can do this by running your fingers down the line. Usually all you have to worry about is the last two or three feet of your line.

There are several knots that are designed to prevent the line from cutting itself when tension is applied during the hook set or when you're fighting the fish. Usually a good brand of line will have instructions on how to tie these knots. I personally use a palomar knot along with Triple Fish line.

Now let's look at the tackle you'll be using. One very important rule is a sharp hook. I use exclusively VMC hooks. The hooks that you get out of the box are very dull compared to the ones I fish with, even the razor sharp ones. I sharpen ALL my hooks as soon as I get them. They must be sharp enough to stick into my fingernail with just the slightest pressure.

They will actually hang in the fingernail by the weight of the bait alone. The reason for this is that a fish has a tough mouth and I want to penetrate all the way in the mouth no matter what part of the mouth the bait enters.

A fish may strike a bait any second. I always try to concentrate on where my lure is and where the fish may strike from, but sometimes you may be surprised and the extra sharp hooks will make up for this and increase the odds of getting that fish in the boat.

## Care Connection :

# Group links hospital patients to home

When Patricia Mills of Prestonsburg checked into the University of Kentucky Hospital for tests last week, she knew she could count on one thing.

A friend would be around to check on her soon.

Sure enough, Stephanie Baldwin arrived a short time later to chat, offer encouragement and ask whether there was anything Mills needed.

"It means a lot to know someone is here for you," said Mills, 66.

After a brief talk, Baldwin hurried off to other floors of the UK Hospital where she had to see an additional dozen or so of "her patients" from Eastern Kentucky.

Baldwin is not a doctor; she isn't even employed by UK.

She is part of the Care Connection, an unusual program in Lexington run by Highlands Regional Medical Center in Prestonsburg, 120 miles east of Lexington.

It works like this. When Highlands refers patients to Lexington hospitals for treatment or tests, Care Connection representatives are dispatched to meet them when they arrive.

They visit the patients every day they are here, offering comfort, running errands, giving pep talks, keeping families informed and generally trying to provide anything the patients might need to feel comfortable while they're far from home.

Program organizers say that is important for patients who may be intimidated by the prospect of putting themselves in the hands of strange doctors and nurses in an unfamiliar big-city hospital.

Although the service basically is intended for patients from Highlands, Care Connection tries to see any patient from Eastern Kentucky admitted to a participating hospital here.

"Basically, we're here to help all Eastern Kentucky patients," said program director Sandy Shackelford.

Care Connection's two-person Lexington office has operating

agreements with UK, Good Samaritan, St. Joseph and Cardinal Hill hospitals. It hopes to expand to all Lexington hospitals soon, Shackelford said.

Describing the program isn't easy because it has no definite outline. The services offered by Care Connection representatives run the gamut from the complex to the most simple.

Some patients may need nothing more than a hug and a friendly word. Another might need help contacting a social worker, or arranging for home health care after leaving the hospital.

Some requests are personal. Baldwin recalls buying super glue for a patient who wanted to repair her broken fingernails in the hospital.

In other cases, Care Connection might provide out-of-town family members with directions so they can fight through Lexington's traffic to reach the hospital where a patient is staying. Care Connection even has met families on the edge of Lexington and led them into town.

If loved ones can't come to Lexington, Care Connection will call them with word on how a patient is

doing. Or family members can call Care Connection's toll-free number to get information.

And the service isn't just for patients and their families.

Care Connection also keeps doctors back in Prestonsburg informed about the progress of patients they send here, Shackelford said.

"We're sort of a conduit of information for both ends; it kind of closes the loop," Baldwin said.

Patricia Mills knows that.

She first came to UK Hospital in April to be treated for a severe cardiac problem. She was hospitalized for 20 days and her husband Joseph, who was sick back home, couldn't be with her.

Baldwin, however, visited her daily.

"That meant everything to me; I don't think I could have made it through 20 days without her," Mills said.

"She helped me and she kept Joe informed about how I was doing.

"I looked forward to her coming every day because she was the one person I had to feel close to."

Care Connection is the brainchild of Lois Burchette, director of surgery and ambulatory care at Highlands.

One day in 1989 she overheard a cardiac patient in the Highlands emergency room refusing to be transferred to UK for treatment.

The man knew he needed help, but he didn't want to go far from home among people he didn't know.

Recalled Burchette: "It seemed to me that what we needed in Lexington was a hostess. Someone who could tell patients we'll greet you, help you, do whatever we can to make your stay better, and wave goodbye when you come home."

Highlands President Clarence Traum liked the idea. Care Connection began operations a few months later.

The program is financed by general hospital revenues, and patients aren't charged directly for the services they receive, Shackelford said.

## Watson wins Merit Scholarship

An Allen Central graduate is among the additional 1,200 winners of Merit Scholarships announced by National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC).

Heather C. Watson of Garrett has been awarded a Transylvania University Merit Scholarship. Watson plans to major in law.

These Merit Scholars are among a total of more than 6,500 distinguished high school graduates of 1993 who have been awarded Merit Scholarships in this year's competition.

About 115 private and 85 public higher education institutions, located in 42 states and the District of Columbia, offered Merit Scholarships this year for use at the sponsor college or university. College-sponsored Merit Scholarships provide between \$250 and \$2,000 for each year of undergraduate study. Winners were chosen by officials of the sponsor institution from among Merit Program Finalists who will attend that college.

Students in over 19,000 U.S. high schools entered the 1993 Merit Program by taking the 1991 PSAT/NMSQT, which served as an initial screen of some 1.1 million participants. In the fall of 1992, approxi-

mately 15,000 of the top scorers were designated Semifinalists.

Only Semifinalists, representing about half of one percent of graduating seniors in every state, had an opportunity to advance to Finalist standing and compete for Merit Scholarships. In order to become a Finalist, a Semifinalist had to meet extremely high academic standards, to be endorsed and recommended by the high school principal, confirm earlier test performance on a second test, and provide information about activities, interests, and goals. Winners of all Merit Scholarships were chosen from the group of 14,000 Finalists.

In addition to college-sponsored awards, two other types of Merit Scholarships were offered in 1993: National Merit \$2000 Scholarships, for which all 14,000 Finalists competed, were awarded on a state representational basis, and corporate-sponsored Merit Scholarships were offered to Finalists with qualifications of particular interest to the companies and business organizations supporting the awards. This year's recipients of these two types of Merit Scholarships as well as most winners of college-sponsored Merit Scholarships were announced in the spring.

## TRAVELLING RIVERSIDE BLUES

Wanting to wash away the bad aftertaste of St. Louis, with memories of the breakaway top and awful cover bands, we set out to quench our thirst for blues from the ever-swelling waters of the Mississippi in Memphis.

While twisting along 61, Marty spotted a great photo opportunity. In a field outside of St. Genevieve, Missouri, (a town which is now, unfortunately, underwater) we spotted a herd of cows grazing and wading in a small lake to beat the heat. We pulled onto the shoulder and the cows immediately stopped what they were doing to come over and investigate. We got out with our cameras to take some shots. When our beefy friends realized we had no food, they all wandered away, almost as if someone hit the "Bovine Recall" button. Thirty seconds later, they were all gone.

I hate uncooperative cows. Before we got to the Arkansas border, we passed Cape Girardeau, the birthplace of one Rush Limbaugh; Braggadocio, which is probably where Mr. Limbaugh has his summer home; and New Madrid, which the locals call "The Earthquake Mistake." Many of you probably remember the big quake predicted for last year which was supposed to have its epicenter in this small Missouri town. No one seemed particularly concerned and the ground seemed pretty firm to me.

We were in the home state of our President for less than an hour. Our brief view of Arkansas was almost entirely fields of lush green broken up by an occasional cemetery. We did see a gravestone for Mr. Clinton's approval ratings.

Now I don't mind most displays of religious belief, but just before crossing the Tennessee border into Memphis, I saw a billboard for a self-storage facility that puzzled me. The

sign read, "Rent storage HERE — where we believe now is the time for JESUS!" Isn't that a contradiction in terms for such a place? If the end of the world is nigh, doesn't that mean you won't need your earthly possessions anymore? Even so, I wonder how many people check to see if their stuff is still there three days after they lock it up.

We got to Elvis City, headed downtown, and got a room at the Peabody. (Nice, this expense account stuff.) However, we weren't able to see the world famous march of the Peabody ducks. At 11 a.m., these ducks come out of the elevator, walk across the lobby, and hop in a fountain where they swim around until 5 p.m., when they hop out of the fountain, saunter back to the elevators, and head upstairs for the night. Unfortunately, just before Duck Time, busload after busload of tour groups invaded the hotel and lined the lobby and mezzanine. If you're a hotel guest, you have no chance. Other than that, it was a posh place, except for a fire alarm during breakfast when a dryer caught fire. Never a dull moment.

That night, intent on finding the blues, we headed for Beale Street, once the blues capital of the world. Even on a Tuesday night, we could hear music coming from club after neon laced club: B.B. King's, the Rum Boogie Cafe, Blues Life, and on and on—good music, real music, blood, grease, loss and longing.

At last. Given, Beale has become a little commercial, with its t-shirt shops and souvenir places, but they aren't too obtrusive. Music is first and foremost on Beale.

(Even Jerry Lee Lewis has a club down there. It's 13 years old, but he says it's 16.)

We holed up in B.B.'s for the evening to hear a band called The King Bees. The place was packed, but somehow we found seats up front. The first half hour we were there, the

band got through three songs. Lots of instrumental jams, harmonica and sax solos, and conversation with the audience, just the way it should be. The set really gained speed with the appearance of one Miss Ruby Wilson.

Ruby sang a couple of songs each set with the band and brought the house down. She had a set of pipes straight from the choir. She has an album just released on B.B. King's label. During one song, she brought herself to tears singing. I was astounded, shocked, overjoyed and generally having the time of my life.

Near the end of the second set, Ruby started talking about how she loved men, especially men's legs. She looked down at me from the stage, pointed and said, "Say, boy, you got some real pretty man-legs!"

And the Viper was nowhere in sight.

Waking up refreshed after an evening on Beale, we paid a visit to the Great American Pyramid, known as the Tomb of Doom to basketball fans (also the sight of the 1994 SEC tournament). I never really thought about it, but all along the Mississippi, there are towns named after towns along the Nile in Egypt. Cairo, Alexandria and of course Memphis have analogs in Africa. Unfortunately for the Midwest, the Mississippi is still doing its best impersonation of the Nile.

We decided to skip Graceland, since we'd both been there, and dropped by Sun Studios instead. Sun is where Elvis did most of his recording, as well as other notables like Johnny Cash, Carl Perkins, B.B. King, Jerry Lee Lewis, Roy Orbison, Howlin' Wolf and, most recently, U2. It's very unpretentious, but it's still a working studio.

Marty and I did pay tribute to the King. On the way to Sun, we stopped at Baptist Memorial Hospital, where they wheeled Bloated Elvis that fateful night. They say that on the anniversary of the King's death, just at midnight, you can see his ghost trudging away from the hospital in search of ectoplasmic jelly doughnuts.

We also swung by the National Civil Rights Museum, which is built out of the Lorraine Motel where, on April 4, 1968, The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. was shot. There's a wreath in front of the room where he was staying. Inside is exhibit after exhibit of the history of the civil rights movement. The museum's a powerful place. A visitor leaves with almost a sense of dread, realizing what African Americans have gone through the last 400 years. I looked for pictures of my father in the museum, but found none.

## Bacterial leaf spot active in peppers

Hot, humid weather has caused bacterial leaf spot to become active again in peppers. This disease has been confirmed in plantings of processing and fresh market peppers in Kentucky.

While disease development slowed during dry periods, bacterial leaf spot can reproduce quickly and be reactivated in a short period of time under ideal conditions.

"During the prolonged cool, wet weather earlier, this disease developed slowly without much defoliation of the plant, but it began to develop rapidly when the weather turned hot and wet in late June," said Bill Nesmith, extension plant pathologist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

The disease is now causing more typical symptoms of leaf spotting. These include dark, water-soaked lesions or spots that have a greasy appearance, especially along the leaf margins. These spots turn brown or tan with age, and leaves become yellow and eventually fall off. Also, some spotting of fruit is occurring.

"Defoliation of the leaves is the most important part of the disease, because once the leaves fall off, the ability of the plant to develop and protect the fruits is lost," Nesmith said.

Bacterial leaf spot in peppers is

among the most difficult diseases to control. The bacteria reproduce rapidly under ideal conditions. "A million new bacteria may be present in 24 hours, where only one was present the day before," said Nesmith. "The bacteria double their rate of reproduction every 15-30 minutes."

The bacteria easily spread by plant-to-plant contact while the foliage is still wet and by rain and wind under wet conditions within the canopy.

Prompt and consistent control is critical in managing bacterial leaf spot in peppers, according to Nesmith.

"Since highly effective chemical rescue methods are not available, preventive chemicals must be kept in place to obtain satisfactory results," said Nesmith. "The 'wait and see' approach simply will not work with this disease."

Nesmith recommends using fixed copper or fixed copper plus maneb sprays weekly, or more frequently in rainy weather. Check the labels of each product used because rates of application vary from product to product.

"After the disease has shown extensive development, however, effective control cannot be obtained," Nesmith said.

Thorough coverage of the plant is critical, said Nesmith. High pressure hydraulic spray equipment or air blast spray equipment provides the best coverage against bacterial leaf spot of peppers as compared to hand-held sprayers. It is difficult to obtain effective results with hand-held sprayers.

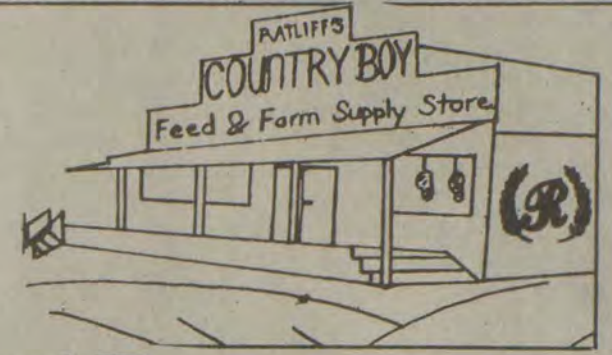
"It is important to remember that the disease can be reactivated with a change to hot, wet weather," Nesmith said. "Now that the disease is established, the threat of it will persist until frost."

## Invisible itches in the home:

# Insects to blame? Maybe not

Ever feel creepy, crawling things you can't see create itches on your skin? How about sensations such as skin irritation or stings like insect bites?

Almost everyone has, said Mike Potter, Extension entomologist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. And they can be quite annoying.

The bugs aren't always to be blamed though, Potter said.

"There are literally hundreds of non-insect agents capable of causing itching and skin irritation," he said. "Household products are involved far more often than are pests and they may cause skin reactions similar to insect bites."

Potter said products that most often cause problems include phosphate detergents, soaps, cosmetics, ammonia-based cleaning agents, hair products, medications and certain types of clothing, especially fire retardant kinds.

If a person with strange itching sensations or skin irritation has been exposed to any of those products, avoiding further contact may correct the problem, he said.

Itches also can be caused by environmental factors, such as dry air or airborne chemical irritants in homes where air is recirculated over and over, and health related conditions (one's emotional state can induce skin reactions that can be mistaken for insect bites), Potter said.

Finally, some of those skin reac-

tions might really be from obscure biting "arthropods," tiny insects such as fleas, lice, mites and chiggers.

"Fleas are the most common in the home, and they're usually associated with pets," Potter said. "However the presence of mice, rats, squirrels, squirrels or raccoons also can result in fleas infesting a home."

Although these tiny biting insects may be quite small, he added, most are visible upon close examination. Exceptions are the chigger and scabies mite which are too small to be

## Ground fires damage timber even when trees don't die

The kind of ground fires that Kentucky timberlands frequently encounter doesn't always kill the trees, but that doesn't mean there's been no damage.

"Forest fires can be an insidious destroyer of timber value even when the damage is not obvious," said Doug McLaren, Extension forestry specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

"The kind of fires we have often don't immediately kill large trees and people assume no long-term damage has been done," he said. "However, ground fires can wound trees beneath the bark which leads to condition called heartrot in the middle of the

tree trunks."

"If a person believes that insects too small to be seen are crawling over their skin, strips of cellophane tape may be patted over the area as the crawling sensation is felt," Potter said. "Most small biting insects move slowly and will be picked up by the tape if present."

People should be aware, however, that the vast majority of insects and pests encountered in the home cannot bite people, yet they are often blamed for itching or irritation caused by other factors.

## Safety Foundation offers tips for older walkers

We all do it. The "don't walk" signal comes on, but we dash across the street anyway, hoping we can beat the traffic.

Or we trust the signal and don't look both ways before we cross the street. But don't let a leisurely summer stroll or a walk to the grocery store turn into a nightmare, says the Safety Foundation of Blue Grass AAA. Because one in four pedestrian fatalities is someone 65 or older, the Foundation is stressing that older adults especially learn and review walking safety.

The Foundation suggests some simple rules to so older adults can walk smart this summer.

\* Before you enter the roadway, search for turning vehicles. Look left, then right, then left again, even if the light is green or the signal says walk.

\* Watch for vehicles turning left or making right turns, including right turns on red.

\* Look at the driver, not just the car. Be sure the driver of a turning vehicle sees you before you step off the curb.

\* Stop at the outside edge of any obstacle, such as a stopped bus, and look around it for vehicles that might be coming.

\* Don't assume that all vehicles will stop just because one has.

\* Wear or carry something light or

bright—like a white scarf—to make you more conspicuous, or wear retro-reflective materials if you must walk after dark.

\* Walk in front of parked cars rather than behind them. Watch for backup lights.

\* Don't panic if the "don't walk"

signal comes on before you have crossed the street. Continue to the other side rather than stopping or returning to the curb.

\* Don't assume it's safe to cross when the "walk" signal comes on. You must still look left-right-left before entering the roadway.

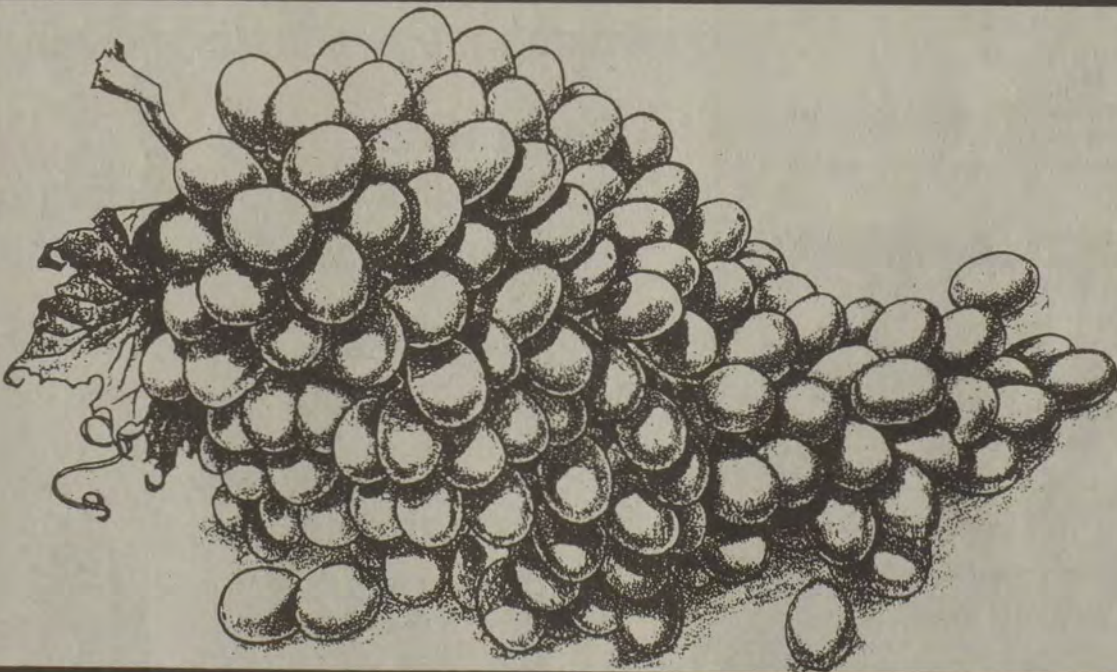

**Better Engineered Air Bags**  
(NAPS)—Here's information about air bags that many drivers will be able to live with. The first thing a driver wants to know about an air bag is when it will inflate. The air bag is designed to inflate in moderate to severe frontal or near-frontal crashes. The air bag will only inflate if the velocity of the impact is above the designed threshold level. When impacting straight into a wall that does not move or deform, the threshold for most GM vehicles is between 9 and 14 m.p.h. However, this threshold depends on the vehicle design and may be several miles-per-hour faster or slower. In addition, this threshold will be considerably higher if the vehicle strikes an object such as a parked car, which will move and deform on impact.



A GM safety engineer does one of many evaluation tests to check performances of air bags.

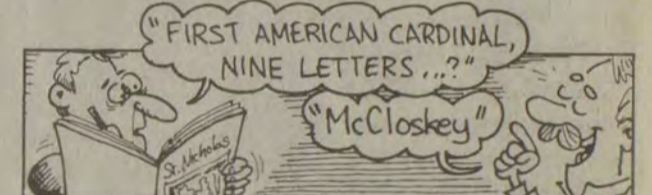
safety belts help keep occupants in the car and reduce the severity of contacts with the vehicle interior and other occupants. In addition, air bags inflate with great force. Safety belts help keep occupants in proper position for air bag inflation in a crash.

What makes an air bag inflate? Sensors in the vehicle detect the frontal crash. An electronic control module then triggers the inflator, causing a chemical sealed inside to undergo a reaction which almost instantly converts it to nitrogen gas. The gas expands, rapidly inflating a cloth bag inside the steering wheel or instrument panel.

If my vehicle is equipped with air bags, why do I need a safety belt? Air bags are designed to provide restraint in severe frontal impacts, but they are not designed to deploy in low speed frontal impacts, rear impacts, side impacts or rollovers. In these kinds of crashes, GM's air bag system requires no regular maintenance. The system checks itself each time the vehicle is started. A light on the instrument panel indicates readiness or problems. On GM vehicles this light says "air bag," "inflatable restraint," or "infl. rest." This light will flash seven to eight times when the ignition is turned on, and then go out if the air bag system is functioning properly. If the light doesn't come on, stays on or comes on while you're driving, the system may not be functioning properly and the vehicle should be serviced right away.
