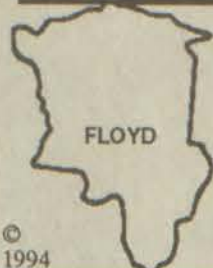

In a special meeting Thursday, Wheelwright City Commissioners voted 2-1 to ask the state police to investigate a questionable expenditure of funds by the city's utility commission, but they may have been one vote short of making it official.

## Bullet from rifle passes through wall, hits woman

Kentucky State Police are investigating an accidental shooting Tuesday morning which injured a Prestonsburg woman.

Ellavene Prater, 39, was apparently sitting in her living room when she was struck in the nose by a bullet accidentally fired by her son, who was in his bedroom at their home on the Left Fork of Abbott.

Police say that the 14-year-old boy was cleaning a .22 semi-automatic rifle when the gun was accidentally discharged. The bullet traveled through the bedroom wall into the living room.

Prater was struck in the right side of her nose and the bullet lodged under her left eye. She was transported to Highlands Regional Medical Center and later flown to Cabell-Huntington Hospital in West Virginia.

No charges have been filed in the case and the shooting is under investigation by state police detective Larry Woods.

## Court dismisses dispute over local bank takeover

A lawsuit alleging the use of House Majority Leader Greg Stumbo's clout to force two prominent bankers to sell their interest in a bank has been quietly dropped after 15 months of inaction, according to an Associated Press report.

The lawsuit was filed in February 1992 by Pikeville National Bank and Trust Co. Chairman Burlin Coleman and retired bank President Brandt Mullins. It came in response to charges of insider trading contained in a suit filed the previous month by

Mayor pro-tem Charles Harmon told commissioners Luther Johnson Jr. and Allen Taylor that there appeared to be a misappropriation of funds by the utility commission concerning some work done by a contractor last June.

Harmon said that he asked the unidentified contractor how much he charged per hour to do bulldozer work and the contractor told him \$50 per hour. Harmon said he then asked how much time he worked for the utility commission last summer doing work in Branham Hollow. The contractor worked "six to eight hours," Harmon said, and he was paid \$1,900.

"Six to eight hours of work equals \$400 tops," Harmon said. "I'm not accusing no one of anything, but I find this highly questionable."

Commissioner Johnson moved that the Kentucky State Police be contacted to investigate the utility department's "books" to find out where the money is going.

"I'm not taking the blame no more," Johnson said.

Commissioner Taylor voted against the investigation because he said he did not know the details of the situation and that the issue should be raised during a regular meeting.

"I'm not for none of this because I don't know anything about it," Taylor said. "It ought to be brought up in a regular meeting when the one who brings up the complaint, the other side can be here to give their side."

Harmon told Taylor that he was bringing up the complaint.

"We need an impartial agency to investigate this," Harmon said. "If there is no evidence of wrongdoing, it will be dropped. If there is evidence, I think we should do whatever needs to be done. If there is evidence of a criminal act, I think we should

## Korean War vet gets last medal after 42-year wait

Richard Crisp of Banner served as a front-line medic in a rifle platoon during the Korean War in 1951-52. But it wasn't until Wednesday, forty-two years later, that he received the last of his war medals.

Bob Mitchell, district administrator for Congressman Hal Rogers, presented the Commendation Ribbon and Medal to Crisp during

Wednesday's town meeting at the Floyd County Circuit Court courtroom in Prestonsburg. Mitchell was representing Rogers who was in Bowling Green for the funeral of U. S. Representative William Natcher.

Crisp, 64, had with him a wooden case that contained seven other medals he received just last year. The medals, each neatly displayed and labeled in the case were: National Defense Service, Bronze Star, Good Conduct with four battle stars, Presi-

dential Unit Citation of Korea Badge, United National Service Medal of Korea, Korean Service Medal, and Combat Medical Badge.

Crisp and Mitchell held up the medals, including the Commendation Ribbon and Medal, while the crowd of 40 at the town meeting applauded Crisp in tribute to his military service — and persistence.

Why did it take forty years to receive the first seven medals?

Crisp shrugged his shoulders and said, "That's just the Army's way of doing things."

As for the delay in receiving his Commendation Ribbon and Medal, Crisp said, "I tried for three years to get this one with documentation from my commander. The Army never answered. Hal Rogers got it in three months. I wrote him and sent him copies of my service documents. He wrote me back every month (as an update) for three months."

When asked how he felt to finally have his last medal, Crisp broke into a big smile. "It's something," he sighed as he looked at the green and white striped ribbon and gold medal cradled in his hands. "You just don't think that it will really happen after such a long time."

Adams said. The family discovered the kitchen area enveloped in smoke, and Cha tried to grab the fire extinguisher, Adams explained.

The fire started accidentally in the kitchen, Adams said, and not in the deep fryer as rumors indicated. Adams planned to visit the restaurant again either Friday or Monday, to confirm the cause of the fire.

Adams was also injured when he stepped on a nail during the firefighters' battle with the blaze.

"I stepped on it after telling everybody else it was there," Adams chuckled.

Adams had accidentally been sprayed in the face by a firefighter, and momentarily blinded when he stepped on the nail. Adams treated himself at the scene.

## Fire does extensive damage to business

A new Prestonsburg business suffered major fire and smoke damage early Wednesday morning, and its owner received minor injuries while he tried to extinguish the flames.

Ming Cha, owner of Ming's Dynasty on South Lake Drive, suffered first degree burns to his face and hands when he tried to pull down a dry chemical fire extinguishing system built into the exhaust above the cooking area, said Larry Adams, fire marshal for the Prestonsburg Fire Department. Adams said Cha was not treated at the scene or transported to the hospital for treatment of his injuries.

Cha, his wife and two sons were in the preparation area in the back of the restaurant around 2:55 Wednesday morning when they smelled smoke,

## David students are hot on litter's trail

A tourist who had not visited Dewey Lake for several years walked into the ranger's office Tuesday at Jenny Wiley State Park with a look of amazement on his face.

"Where did all this trash come from?" he asked the park's naturalist, Ron Vanover.

The question is one Vanover hears often.

Each time Johns Creek or its tributaries rise, trash is dumped along Dewey Lake's shores and some of its walking trails. Because he can't stop the illegal dumping, Vanover and a group of area students are cleaning up the trails.

Vanover and Carey Tichenor, chief naturalist in Frankfort, developed the Adopt-A-Trail Program, the first in Kentucky's park system. Similar to the Adopt-A-Highway Program, the trail clean-up plan gets area students involved in improving their community.

Because David School had been

committed to community service to the Army Corps of Engineers projects in the past, Vanover contacted Arner Whittaker, a guidance counselor at the school. Community service is a requirement for graduating seniors at David School, and each senior must have at least one semester in a community-improvement project.

The David students, Steve Hatfield, Shane Hicks, Chris Berger, Elizabeth Setser, James Stephens, Jason Lewis and Missy Hamilton, and Whittaker have adopted the Shoreline Hiking Trail at the park. Each Tuesday, for one hour, they will pick up trash along the 2.5 mile walking area.

Tuesday, April 5, the students made their first excursion along the trail and picked up ten bags of trash. They expressed amazement at some of the things they found, such as unopened cans of soda and snuff, empty whiskey bottles, ink pens and plastic jugs.

The students waded mud left by

## Practice makes perfect

Rash of escapes is making seasoned veterans of local authorities

An escape by three inmates at the Otter Creek Correctional Facility Tuesday night was short-lived when they were recaptured about 15 hours later.

Prisoners Johnny Stafford, 29, of Glasgow; Stephen C. Brown, 24, of Seebree; and Todd Matthew Holt, 23, of Sturgis were reported missing from the minimum security prison at 10:57 p.m. Tuesday.

Brown was taken into custody at 9:30 Wednesday morning by Floyd County Sheriff's deputy lieutenant Lloyd Powers. Brown was in Roop's Grocery at Weeksbury buying doughnuts and soda when he was apprehended.

Powers and deputy Johnny Layne had been in the grocery store about 10 minutes earlier showing store owner Barb Roop pictures of the escapees. Roop called the sheriff's office soon after Powers left and reported that Brown was in her store.

"I went up to him and asked him what his name was," Powers said. "And, he told me. I told him he was the man I was looking for."

During Brown's arrest, officers noticed two men on the hillside near the store and deputy Layne headed up the steep mountainside. Layne was joined by Kentucky State Police Trooper Bobby Day and the two caught Holt and Stafford about two hours later. They were hiding near the entrance to a cave.

Trooper Day and Layne handcuffed the two inmates together and brought them off the hill.

"I heard that Johnny (Layne) was on the hill by himself, so I took off up the mountain," Trooper Day said Wednesday. "I saw one of them standing near the entrance and I detained him."

At about the same time Trooper Day spotted Stafford, Layne saw Holt, who was trying to hide behind a large rock near the mouth of the cave.

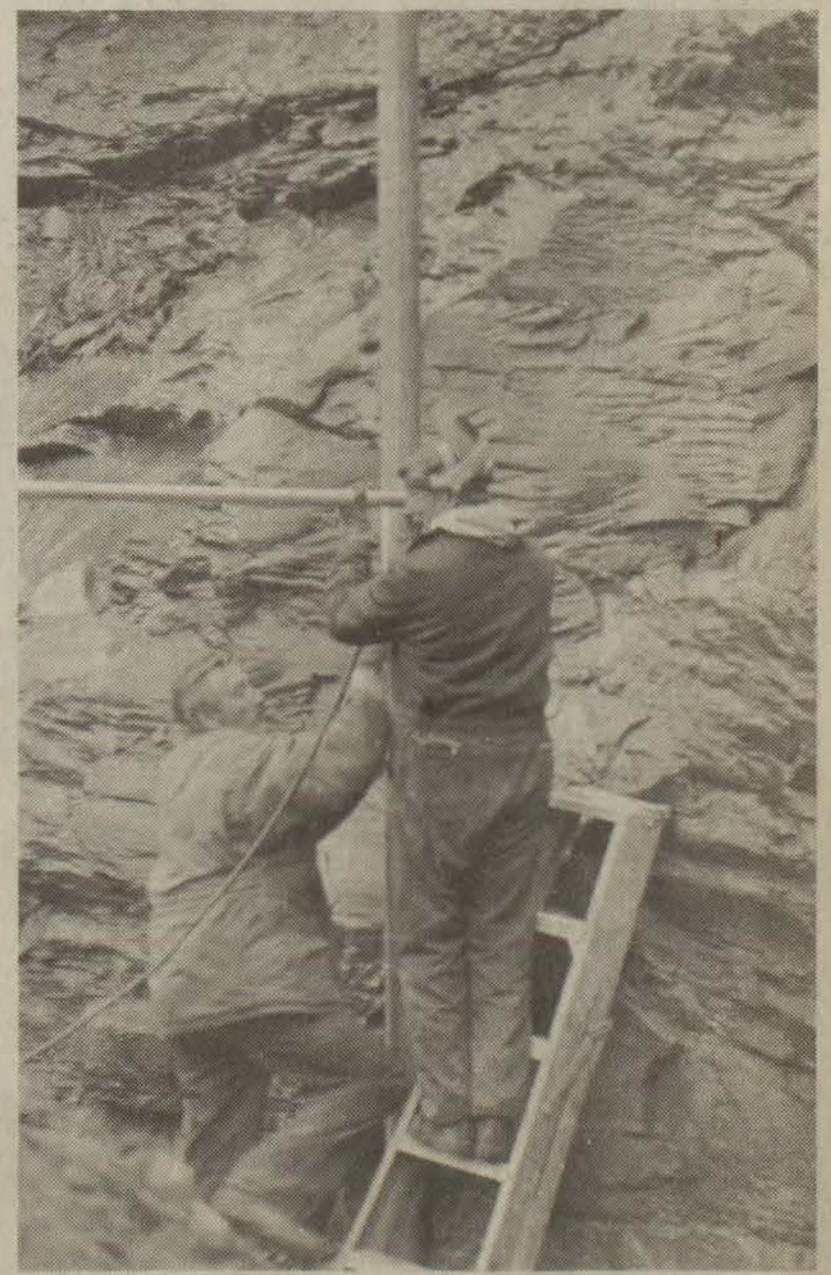

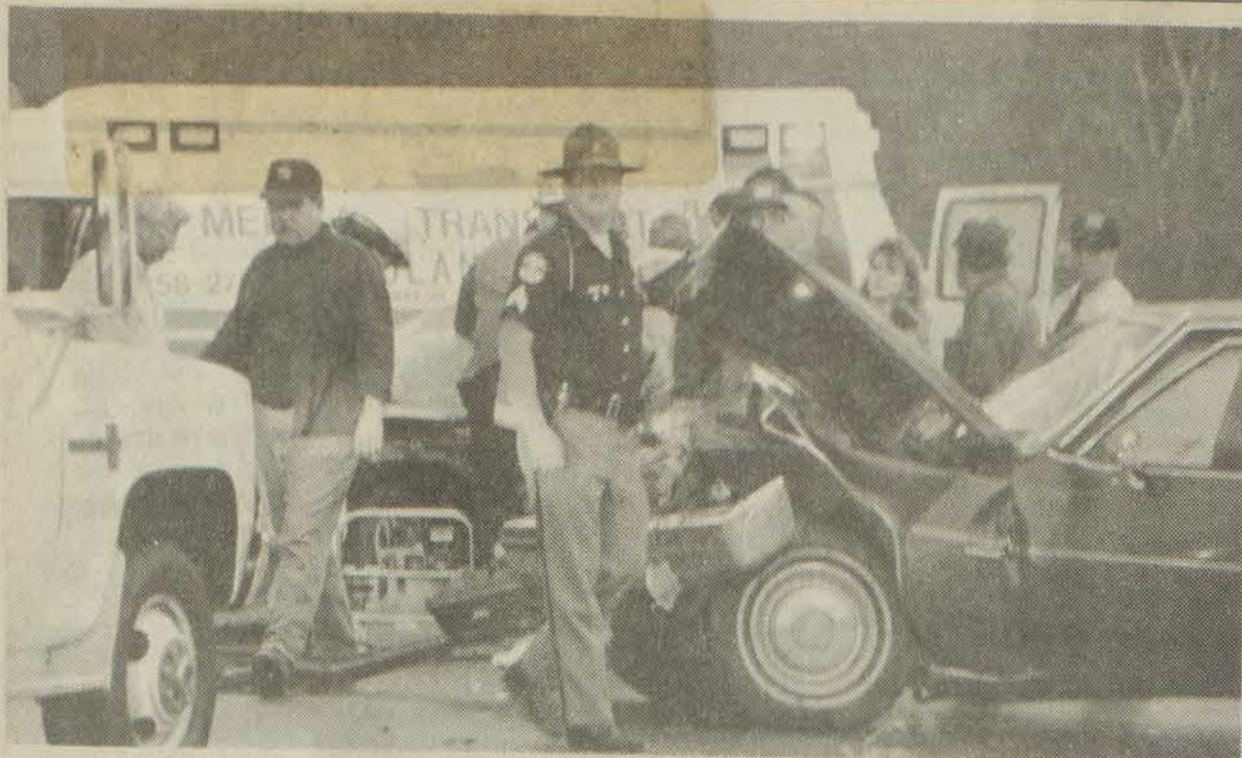

who had sought \$12 million in punitive damages. "I guess tempers flared, and things happened that neither of us wanted."

The FGC suit alleged that Coleman and others at the Pikeville bank used confidential information from FGC to acquire United Federal Savings Bank of Prestonsburg, a failed savings and loan. First Guaranty was under a security agreement with Pikeville National and had made a \$100,000 "good faith" deposit with Pikeville National toward the United purchase.

In a countersuit, Coleman and Mullins, who each owned 25 percent of First Guaranty's stock, alleged that Stumbo and other board members threatened to cause a run on the bank if they did not sell out.

According to court documents, the FGC board members met in Stumbo's office May 11, 1987, to discuss the possible buyout. The suit alleges that Stumbo said a "reasonable price" for Coleman's and Mullins' shares was \$8.5 million.

Coleman alleged that FGC Vice President Ben Spradlin called him the next day and said Stumbo and the other directors threatened to resign if their offer was not accepted. Spradlin also said the directors, their families and friends would withdraw their deposits, estimated at more than \$45 million, Coleman claimed.

On May 15, 1987, Coleman claimed Spradlin called with an ultimatum and said Spradlin and the others had talked about forming a new bank in First Guaranty's service area. Spradlin also allegedly reminded Coleman that Stumbo was "real close" to then-Kentucky Banking Commissioner Thomas B. Miller.

Coleman, Mullins and other shareholders agreed in October 1987 to sell all of the stock to FGC. Stumbo, who was not accused of threatening to use his influence personally, was on vacation and could not be reached for comment. Spradlin also was unavailable.

Late Floyd Circuit Judge Harold Stumbo, the lawmaker's father, stepped aside from the case in April 1992 because he owned interest in First Guaranty.

Being able to use acting and musical talents that had long since been pushed aside has been a special treat for those who haven't been able to perform since high school or college, Clark said.

prosecute."

The vote was 2-1 and Harmon declared that the motion carried and instructed city clerk Mary Ann Johnson to contact the state police.

Under state law, a majority of a commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but the majority of the commission must concur to take any particular action. Since the Wheelwright Commission is made up of five members, including the mayor, it would take three votes to transact business.

Mayor David Marlee Sammons and David Hall were absent from Thursday's meeting.

behind the rock and lay face down," Layne said. "Then we cuffed them. They didn't try to resist. It's history."

The three were caught less than a mile from the prison. When Stafford was asked why he escaped from the prison, he reportedly said, "to get away from these dumb hillbillies."

The three were arraigned on second degree escape charges Thursday in Floyd District Court. They are lodged in the Floyd County Jail and a preliminary hearing is set for Wednesday, April 13 at 2:30 p.m.

The three men were serving prison sentences on theft related charges. Holt would have been eligible for parole in July; Stafford's sentence would have expired in September; and Brown had a parole eligibility date in April 1995.

After Tuesday's escape, Floyd County Sheriff Paul Hunt Thompson criticized prison officials for the delay in getting a fence erected around the prison.

"I could've remodeled Rupp Arena quicker than they can put up that fence," Thompson said. "Escapes will be a lot more difficult when they finish the fence."

Thompson said that area police agencies' work on two prior escapes from the prison, involving five inmates, enabled law enforcement officials to apprehend the inmates quickly.

"Practice makes you better," the sheriff said. "These prisoners are not familiar with these hills. (Escapes) covered six or seven miles last time. They only covered three-fourths of a mile this time."

Otter Creek warden Tim Maguigan said Wednesday that bad weather has prevented workers from completing the fence, but he added that the fence probably won't prevent escapes all together.

Employees of the Fall City Fence Company were at the prison Thursday morning working on the fence. It is expected to be complete within two weeks.

Problem is, we usually don't treat the dog until the fleas start dining out...on us.

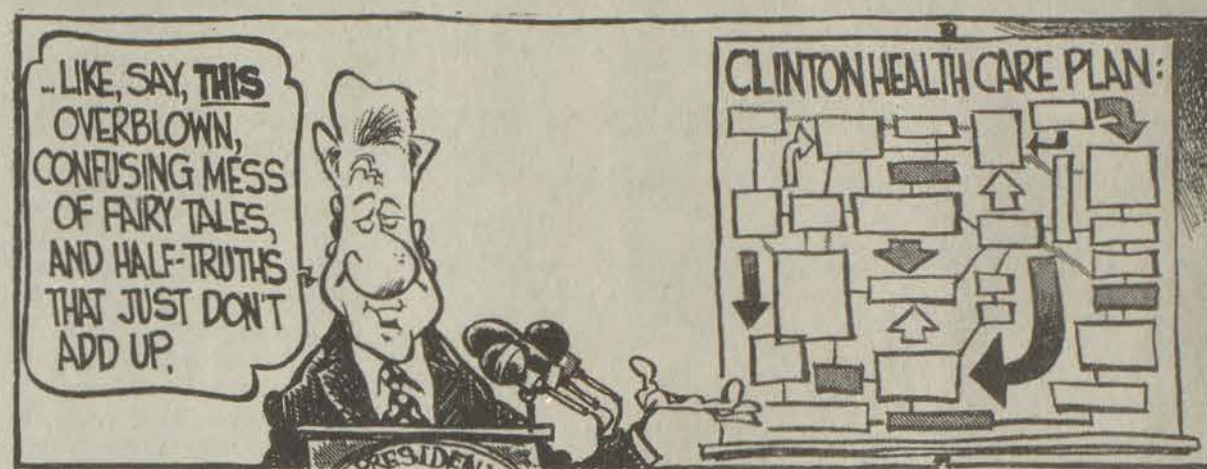
Then we fumigate everything, suffering the inconvenience and embarrassment along the way, then kick back and relax until the cycle begins anew.

K.B.L.A. will have a city bus converted into a coal miner's museum also at Hillbilly Days. There will be a lot of modern equipment, as well as some mining equipment from the 1800s.

One day can make a difference

"What a difference a day makes," according to a song written several years ago. The song probably wasn't written to address a Social Security issue, but it does. If you were born on the first or second day of the month, one day could make a difference and mean an extra month of Social Security benefits when you retire.

How can this be? Consider how being born on the first or second day of the month would affect someone who is just turning 62. You must be at least 62 to receive Social Security retirement benefits. And the earliest that you can be eligible for a retirement check is the first full month you are 62. That means that most people cannot receive a benefit for the month in which they turn 62. But the law also says that you "attain" your age the day before your birthday. So, if you were born June 2, for example, you legally attain your age on June 1 and you would be eligible for benefits for June because you're considered 62 for the entire month. Of course, if you were born on June 1, you also would receive benefits for June because you are 62 the entire month. (Even though you legally turned 62 on May 31, you couldn't receive any benefits for May because you weren't 62 for the whole month.)

The "born on the first or second" rules also apply to Medicare, with one important difference. Unlike Social Security, where you must be eligible for the whole month to qualify for benefits, you can get Medicare coverage for a month even if you're eligible for only one day of the month. That means if your 65th birthday is on June 1, you would be entitled to Medicare for the month of May because you legally became 65 on May 31. If your birthday fell on June 2, you would be entitled to Medicare for June.

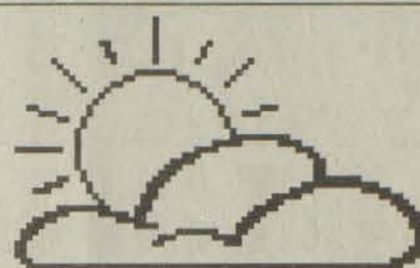

Harless to undergo a psychiatric evaluation at the Kentucky Correctional Psychiatric Center (KCPC) at LaGrange.

A report dated January 3 said Harless was "distracted, anxious, depressed and was voicing suicidal thoughts" when he was admitted to KCPC last November 4.

Harless said his "anxiety and fatalistic views were the result of stress derived from the upcoming sentencing hearing on the manslaughter charge," according to the report, written by KCPC staff psychiatrist Dr. Frank DeLand.

When he was later discharged, Harless was "mentally stable," DeLand said.

"Part of his quick recovery can also be attributed to his optimism concerning the upcoming sentencing hearing," DeLand wrote. "Should Mr. Harris perceive his sentencing as being beyond his capacity to handle, it might be likely that he would once again become extremely upset, necessitating close observation to prevent self-harm."

A motion for probation by Harless' attorney, Public Defender Mary Lou Chandler, was denied by Knight.

Chandler said Harless "has been and is deeply remorseful for what has happened." —*Paintsville Herald*

## Trooper pleads not guilty to forgery

A Kentucky State Police trooper pleaded not guilty to five felony charges for allegedly misusing money intended for undercover drug purchases. Perry Circuit Judge Douglas Combs Jr. set an Aug. 3 jury trial date for Mark Lopez, who is charged with five counts of second-degree forgery. The charges allege that in August 1993, Lopez forged the name of Trooper David Combs on a form used to record money paid to informants for drug purchases. Several Eastern Kentucky lawyers have asked that drug charges against clients be dismissed because of the charges against Lopez. —*Lexington Herald-Leader*

## Inez physician retires; medical board drops its investigation

A former Inez physician who was the subject of a formal complaint filed with the state Board of Medical Licensure has voluntarily retired to resolve the case.

John C. Adler, 74, who first established a practice in Inez in 1976, was the subject of a complaint because of inadequate record keeping and excessive or inappropriate prescribing of medication.

The inquiry was prompted by the January 4, 1992 death of Ella Rose Fletcher, whose mother, Mary Fletcher was one of Adler's patients. Mary Fletcher pleaded guilty in connection with the death of Ella Rose.

The inquiry charged that Adler overprescribed medication to four patients, whose identities were withheld, and that the physician kept no records to justify the number of prescribed medication. —*The Mountain Citizen*

### Harless sentenced to 10 years in 1991 death of Johnson boy

A Martin County man has been sentenced to 10 years in prison for the 1991 DUI-related death of a 14-year-old Boons Camp boy.

In a final order entered March 29, Johnson Circuit Judge James A. Knight handed the sentence to Tony Allen Harless, 30, of Tomahawk.

Harless, who had originally been charged with capital murder, pleaded guilty to first-degree manslaughter last October in the death of Jonathan Jason Smith.

Police said Smith was killed September 7, 1991, after a pickup truck Harless was driving struck the boy's motorcycle on Greasy Creek Road at Boons Camp. Harless was intoxicated at the time of the accident, police said.

As part of a plea-bargain agreement with then-Commonwealth's Attorney Leo Marcum, Harless pleaded guilty to the manslaughter charge on October 13, 1993, the day the case was set for trial. In exchange for the guilty plea, Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney John Triplett recommended the 10-year prison term.

Harless was initially scheduled to be sentenced last November, but the proceedings were postponed after he attempted suicide at the Big Sandy Regional Detention Center.

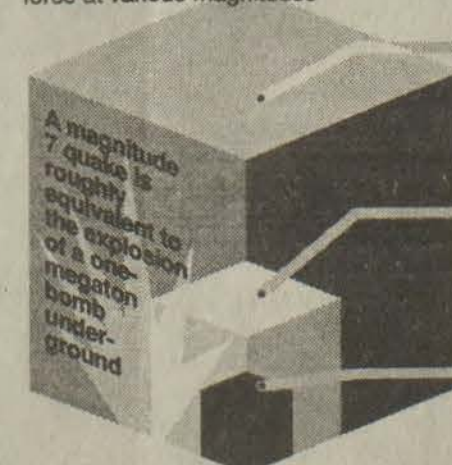

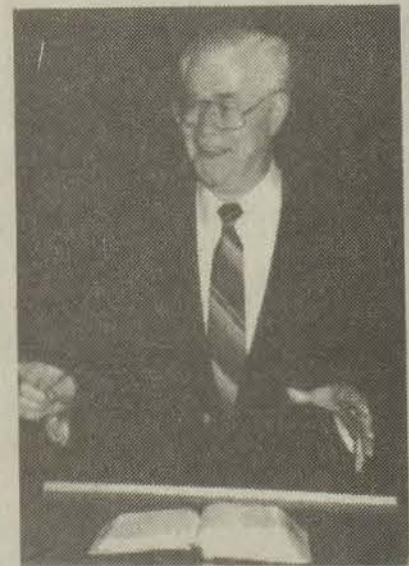

**Forensics:****Four schools advance to semi-finals, fourth place state champions named**

Four schools advanced to semi-finals and one student claimed fourth place at the statewide junior level forensics competition held at Bowling Green, March 24-26.

Brandis Bradley, a sixth grade student from Harold Elementary, claimed fourth place in the state for storytelling. Bradley defeated 59 other competitors in five rounds of competition to receive this honor.

After three rounds of competition, four district schools advanced to semi-finals: Adams, Betsy Layne Elementary, Harold, and Martin. To qualify for semi-finals meant that each competitor or team had to achieve a composite rank of 8-10 (depending upon the event) for the first three rounds of competition. The competition was tough since each category event had between 60-70 student contenders with an approximate number of 1500 total participants from across the state. 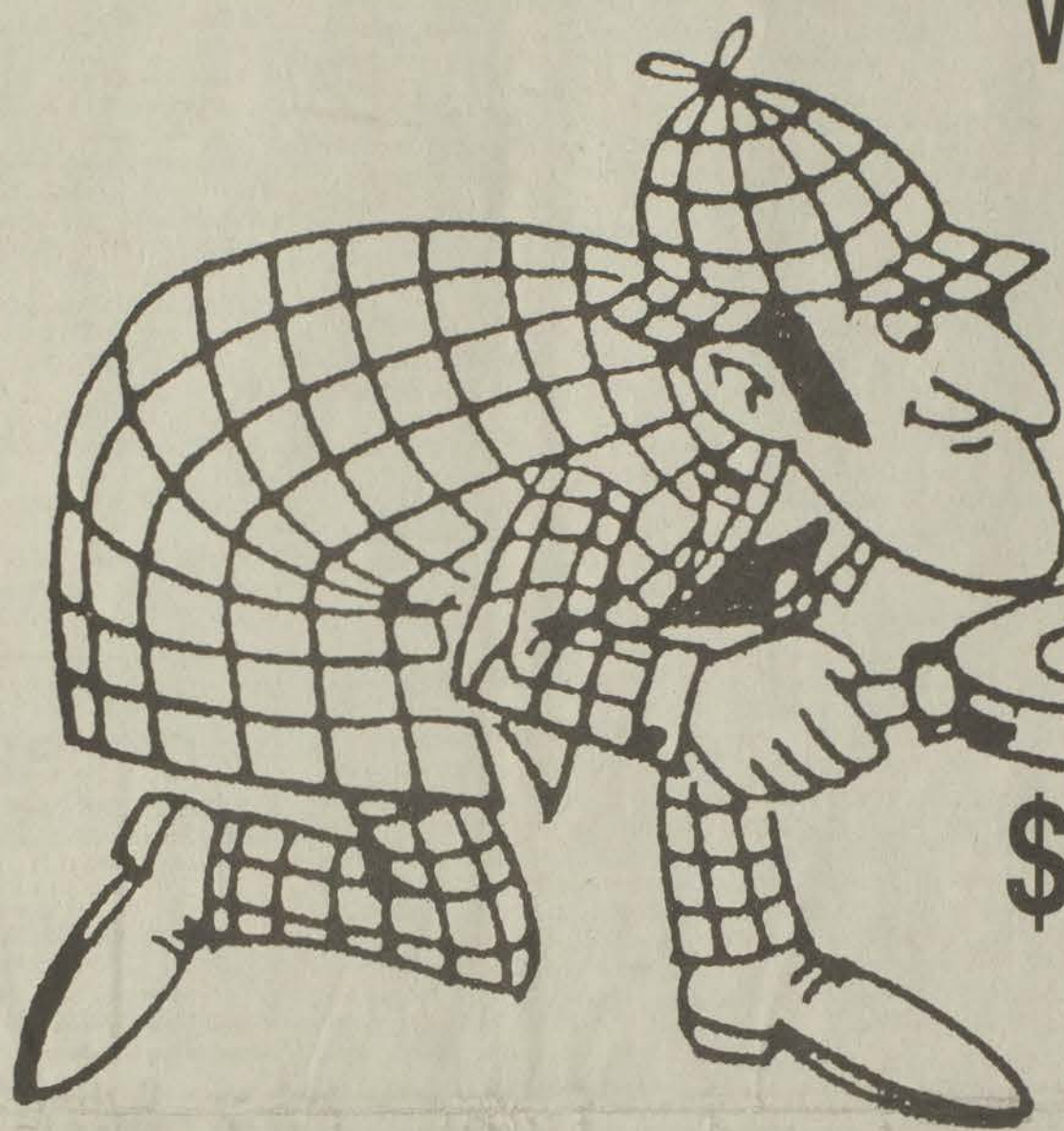

Doug Henry plays bass and Marie Burns' lovely voice adds to the style of Mac Benford and the Woodshed All-Stars.

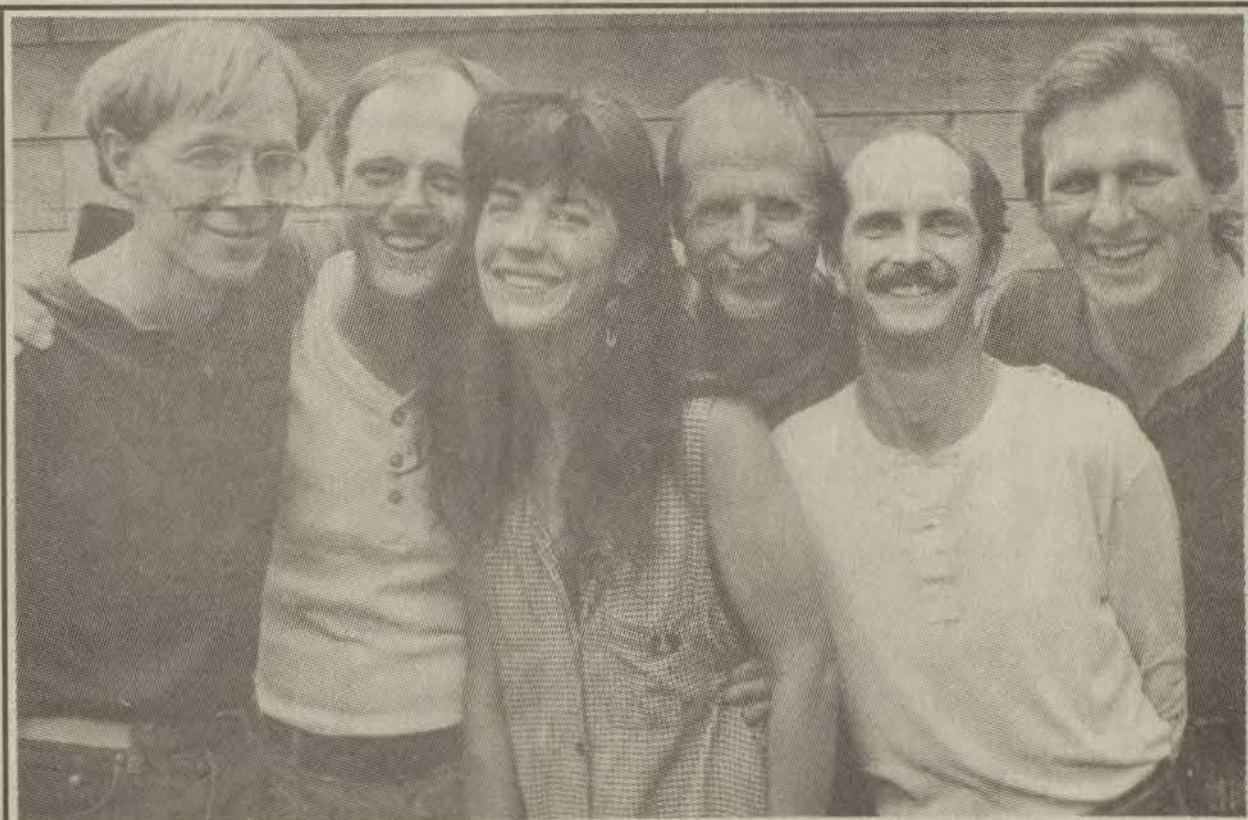

## News of the Weird

In what might set a new U.S. record for reluctance to part with deceased relatives, neighbors found the mummified body of Georgia Farrell lying on her sofa in Boise, Idaho,—in March. Authorities said she probably died in 1987 at the age of 88, but that the death was never reported by her son Robert, who lived in the house. One neighbor said she often asked Robert where his mother was, and that Robert replied, "Oh, she's in (the house)." (Last August, a Maple Heights, Ohio, man was reported not to have parted with his deceased mother for two years.)

### YOUR ELECTED OFFICIALS

—Mark A. Thomas announced in December that he would run for sheriff in Winston-Salem, N.C., this year. Thomas said he would be more effective at fighting crime than the incumbent because he is "criminally minded": He was convicted of theft in 1983 and of embezzlement a few years earlier.

—According to a recently filed lawsuit, Utah state Sen. Sara Eubank, a women's rights advocate, fired her employee Jacqueline Hedberg, alleging that Hedberg's productivity had dropped drastically. The principal cause of Hedberg's loss of productivity was that she had not been able to

recover emotionally from being raped in December 1992. Said a representative of the Utah National Organization for Women, "(The case) is a tough one for us."

—In February, the Dutch parliament passed a law forcing farmers in the Netherlands to reduce the amount of animal dung they can produce by one-third. The country has so much livestock that the dung causes massive water pollution. Farmers believe they can meet the new requirements by changing their livestock's diet.

—As of mid-February, after six weeks in office, Mayor Freddie Goode of Liberty, Ky., has resolved clashes in his new administration by firing four of the five members of the City Council (the fifth member is Mrs. Goode), the chief of police, the city administrator, two office employees, and the entire planning and zoning board. He attempted to have the council members arrested after their firing, and when the police chief refused, he ordered the chief arrested for "impersonating a police officer."

—A bill introduced in the Georgia legislature in January by Rep. Doug Teper of Alabama would require warnings in all hotel rooms that fornication, adultery and sodomy are illegal in the state. The bill also requires that the warnings be in Braille

and "internationally recognized symbols," which were not specified.

—Following the lead of former professional wrestler Jesse "The Body" Ventura, who was elected mayor of Brooklyn Park, Minn., in 1992, Jerry Kennett, who wrestles under the name "Khan the Warlord," was elected mayor of Bunn, N.C., in November.

### INEXPLICABLE

—The Washington Post reported last year on the 9-year-old war between India and Pakistan over claim to the Siachen Glacier in the Himalayan Mountains. The countries have largely resolved other parts of their 46-year-old border dispute, but the battle over the glacier continues, despite its uninhabitability and the casualty rate: For every soldier who falls to hostile gunfire, nine soldiers die from the blinding blizzards, the treacherous footing on the ice-encrusted peaks, and wind chills reaching more than 150 degrees below zero.

—The life sentence of Taro the dog was commuted in February, permitting his release from the Bergen County Jail and his deportation from New Jersey. Taro had been sentenced to die under the state's "vicious dog" law, but appeals had continued until

Taro had spent more than 1,000 days behind bars in his climate-controlled kennel and had cost state taxpayers more than \$100,000 in expenses.

### THE WEIRDO-AMERICAN COMMUNITY

In February, Cincinnati police confiscated Maria Grueter's 1978 Chevy Chevette parked on a city street after observing that it was "full of rats," according to one officer. Boxes, newspapers and food were crammed floor to ceiling in the car with just enough room for a driver, and a dozen rats were visible from outside the car. After an examination at a local hospital, Grueter was found to be mentally stable and in good health.

### LEAST COMPETENT PERSON

Darpan Patel, 20, was arrested in Glastonbury, England, in August after he had gone to the local police station to ask a question about his driver's license. According to police, when they asked, Patel freely gave his name. However, he also told officers that there might be a warrant currently outstanding for his arrest, that he didn't have time to deal with it right then, but that he would come back later to take care of it. Officers checked, found the the warrant, and promptly arrested him.

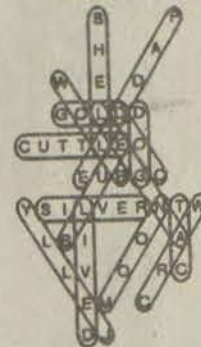

Browning spent almost all of the final three months on the disabled list.

Rijo gets no support and last year should have had a much better win and loss record than he posted. Rijo

left several games with the lead only to watch as the bullpen squandered the lead.

Smiley, like Browning, was disabled and missed most of the season. The key to the pitching staff will be Smiley. He must have a 14-game win season.

Hanson brings some promise as a solid fourth starter for the Reds.

The Reds will have to stay healthy and have banner years out of Reggie Sanders and Barry Larkin with Kevin

Mitchell playing more than last season.

Look for Mitchell to put more time on the field as he goes out for a great season simply because he will be a free agent next season. Hooking onto another lucrative contract will depend upon how well the overweight outfielder performs.

Roberto Kelly was another one who was part of the medic squad last season, as well as Barry Larkin.

Desiree Wallen placed third with a toss of 38 feet, 5 inches. Wallen is the sister of former standout Brian Wallen.

Wells did take first place in the women's shot put, although she and

Mullins had throws of 25 feet, 9 inches. Wells placed first when the scoring reverted back to the second throw of each participant. Wells was a half-inch better on the second toss.

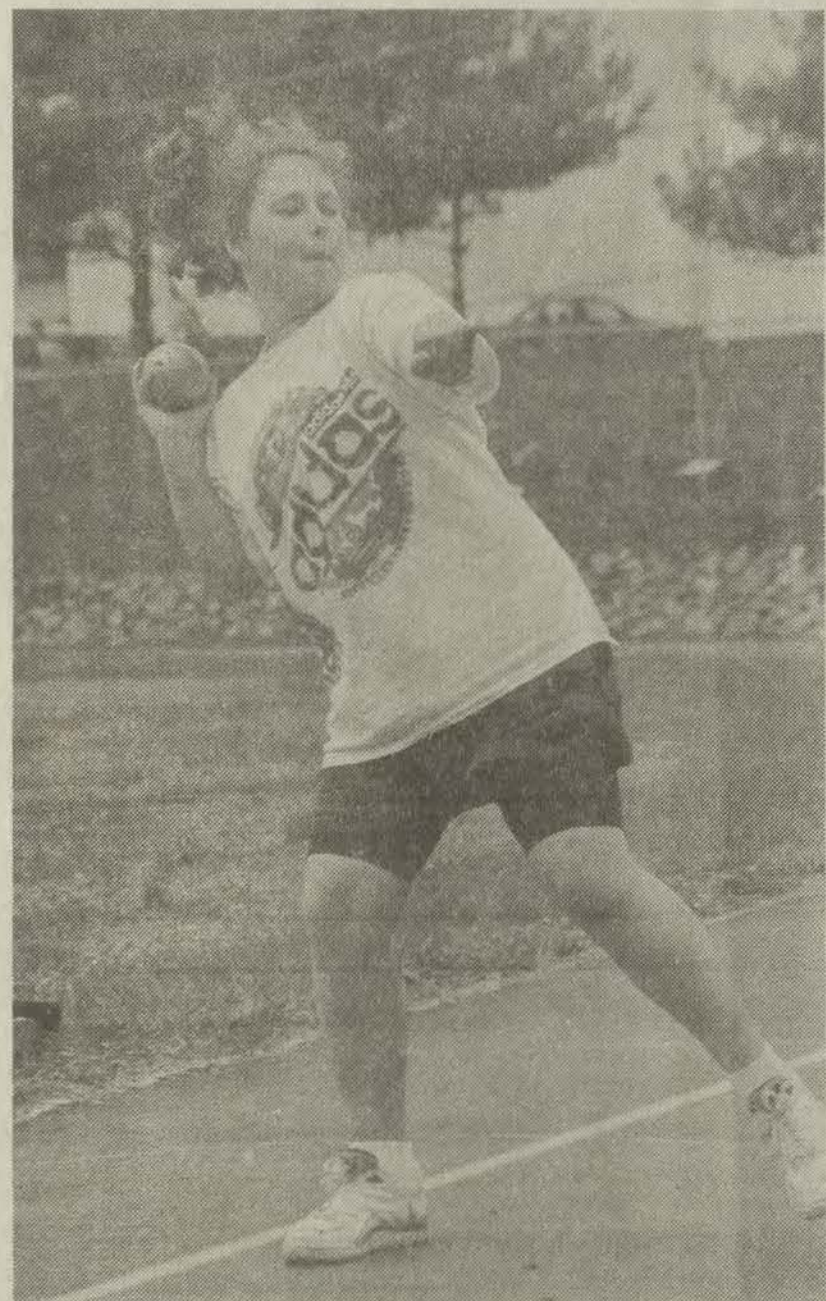
Wallen was third with her throw of 16 feet, 9 inches.

"Kevin, we've only had him in practice for two days," said the Allen Central coach. "He's still out of shape. If it had been on a different track, the edge may have gone to Mike."

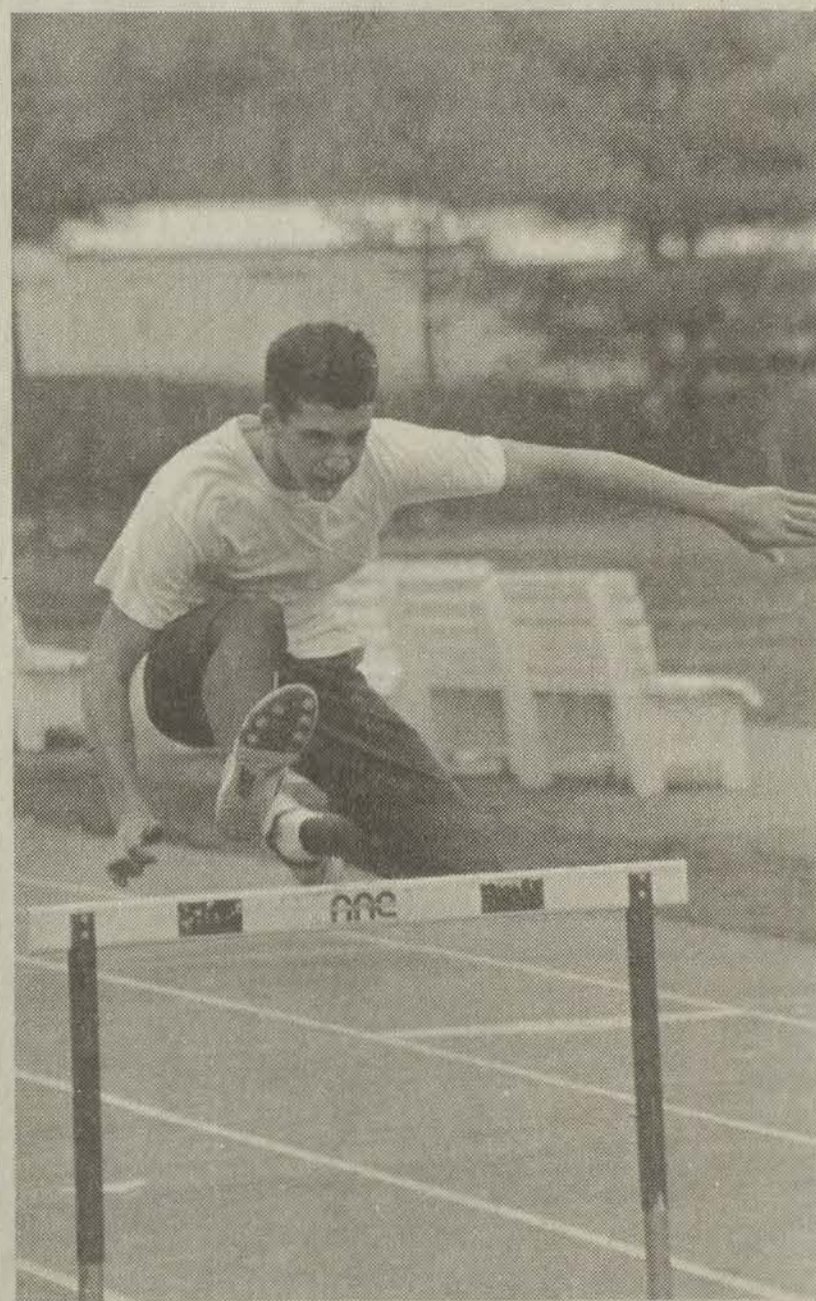
