Attorney hints that indicted mine inspector may alter plea

A federal mining inspector from Floyd County who was arrested Monday and charged with extorting bribes from coal companies may plead

Edward L. Kendrick, 56, of Melvin, pleaded not guilty Wednesday in U.S. District Court at Pikeville. But Kendrick, who is cooperating with federal officials, may change his plea, according to his attorney, Ned Pillersdorf.

"We anticipate filing a motion for rearraignment," Pillersdorf said, declining to go into details.

Another Floyd County man, Clifford Crum, 58, of Allen, and John W. Banks, 44, of Myra in Pike County, were arrested with Kendrick on Monday. The three U.S. Mine Safety and Health Administration inspectors were charged with accepting bribes from coal companies in the Pike district over the last four years for overlooking mining violations.

A Letcher County man, James W. Morgan, 49, who is a former state reclamation inspector, also was indicted on a bribery charge. His arraignment is today in Lexington.

Crum's trial is scheduled for June 15; Kendrick's is set for July 12 and Banks' for July 11.

Last month, McKinney sent a letter to the AG's office alleging that the secrecy of the grand jury had been compromised.

Council offers reluctant go-ahead to sewer plan

It looks as if construction on a new sewage treatment plant in Martin will begin this summer with the city council's award of construction contracts Wednesday night.

Council approved entering into ered by the grant monies. contracts with Charles Contracting and G & L Pipe Engineering to build the treatment plant, but the move was not without some minimal risks.

Libby Ratcliff with the Big Sandy Area Development District, told council that she had received a verbal commitment from the Farmer's Home Administration to the city of a grant \$107,000 needed to complete the \$2.6 million project.

City officials have already received grant monies to cover just over half of the construction costs. The city will have to get a loan for the remaining construction costs not cov-

The construction project has been delayed for months while right-ofway and condemnation cases have been pending in court. Ratcliff informed council Wednesday that those cases have effectively been settled, which paves the way for construction

Ratcliff told council that she felt comfortable that the grant would come through and advised them that the construction bids would expire May 15. She added that time was also running out on a \$579,212 loan application with the Kentucky Infrastruc-

ture Authority. If the contracts were not awarded, Ratcliff said that the project would have to be rebid which could result in higher prices and council was in danger of breaking up the funding pack-

Governor takes to the road to promote park upgrades

Governor Brereton C. Jones has "Save Our State Parks."

The governor's tour will include a stop next Thursday, May 19, at Jenny Wiley State Park.

"Kentucky's state resort parks, once considered the finest in the nation, are in need of extensive repair and renovation," Governor Jones said.

The week-long bus tour, which will include the governor, tourism cabinet secretary Crit Luallen, parks commissioner Mark Lovely and others from the administration, will begin in Louisville on Monday, May 16 with a news conference marking the start of Tourism Week in Kentucky. At that time, the governor will release the 1993 tourism economic impact figures.

> Governor Jones submitted to the 1994 General Assembly a list of 71 projects aimed at improving and enhancing state parks in Kentucky. He proposed financing the improvements through a \$100 million bond issue. However, the budget which was passed by lawmakers did not include any money for state parks, so Gover-

nor Jones vetoed that budget. "We cannot turn our backs on our state parks," Jones said. "This bond issue is a historic opportunity to achieve long-term economic benefits through strategic investment. Our state budget must include the bond

"Our state parks are vital to the issue to allow the parks system to retain the title of "nation's finest.""

The governor will call a special session of the General Assembly to pass a new, two-year state budget. In his tour next week, he will seek the support of people throughout the Commonwealth for the parks

"Last December, when I proposed the bond issue to save our parks, I promised to bring back the brilliance to the Kentucky Parks System, which has long been called the jewel of all state parks systems in this country," Governor Jones said. "The jewel's luster has been dulled by wear and tear. However, with the support of the people in this Commonwealth, that jewel will soon shine brightly

Legislature passes laws that help the hearing-impaired

sembly, several bills having an impact on deaf and hard-of-hearing persons were considered by the legislature. Members of the deaf and hardof-hearing community together with staff of the Commission on the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (KCDHH) worked many long hours writing letters, making phone calls, meeting with legislators and attending Senate and House Committee Meetings.

One important bill, which was passed, expands the Telephone Relay Service to include a TTY Distribution Program. According to Dr. Bobbie Beth Scoggins, executive director of KCDHH, "Relay services have greatly increased accessibility to the telecommunications system. However, deaf, hard-of-hearing and speech impaired persons still must purchase additional equipment that

> of the current surcharge for relay services will be used to fund the distribution program.

> The legislature also passed a bill which makes Kentucky's Interpreter Laws comply with the Federal Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). ADA requires that the court in any

> matter, criminal or civil, shall appoint and pay a qualified interpreter for persons who are parties, jurors, or witnesses. The new law also states

that "Interpreters shall not be required to testify regarding any other privileged communications without the consent of the person for whom they are interpreting."

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Combined Final Notification and Finding of No Significant Environmental Impact

The U.S. Department of Agriculture, Rural Development Administration (RDA) has received an application for financial assistance from the Prestonsburg-Floyd County Public Properties Corporation, SAI# KY920918-1287. The specific element of this proposed action is the construction of a 1,000 seat performing arts center in Prestonsburg near the intersection of KY Hwy. 114 and US 23.

RDA has assessed the potential environmental impacts of this proposed action and determined that the location of the proposed performing arts center would impact the 100-year floodplain, It has been determined that there is no practicable alternative to avoid this impact. The basis of this determination is as follows:

-The floodplain will be impacted by construction of the proposed -The proposed building must be located within the floodplain because

adequate alternate sites are not available.

-All practicable mitigation measures have been agreed to by the


-The proposed action conforms to applicable state and local floodplain protection standards.

-The Economic Development Administration, Appalachian Regional Commission and the Department of Housing and Urban Development through its Community Development Block Grant Program are also participating in this project.

RDA has also determined that the proposed action will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment and will not prepare an environmental impact statement.

Any written comments regarding these determinations should be provided within 15 days of this publication to Mr. Thomas G. Fern, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, 771 Corporate Drive, Suite 200, Lexington, Kentucky 40503-5477. FmHA will make no further decisions regarding this proposed action during this fifteen-day period. Requests to review the FmHA environmental assessment upon which this determination is based or to receive a copy of it should be directed to the FmHA District Office, 207 London Shopping Center, London, KY



No rooms at the inns?

A report issued this week concluded that Kentucky state parks are missing a chance at profitability because there are too few rooms at most to accommodate visitors.

Many parks in our area have no accommodations at all.

The solution, we think, is ob-

Open the way for private development.

Neither Paintsville Lake nor Yatesville in Lawrence County have any short-term plans to offer room and board for visitors.

That's a shame.

Thousands of people visit those lakes every year, but the state is unable to capitalize on the profit potentials because there is no way to keep those visitors there.

It makes sense then, since the state park system is so financially strapped, to use those facilities as experiments in privatization.

We suspect both Paintsville and Yatesville could have lodges up and running within a couple of years if private entrepreneurs were allowed to develop the needed facilities.

The entire region would benefit from such an arrangement,

too, and the state could pocket a percentage of the revenues without having to lay out any capital.

We could take the privatization concept a step further, too, by permitting new development and expansion at parks, like Jenny Wiley State Park, that already have some tourism facili-

Since Jenny Wiley is already established as a tourism attraction, we suspect it would be relatively easy to attract private investors to new projects...like the proposed golf course.

Most proposals for lakes in Eastern Kentucky would require the participation or approval of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, which owns the rights to much of the developable prop-

The Corps has never expressed much interest in making money at their flood control projects and the restrictions they apply to any proposed development are

But the lakes themselves should be the middle ground for a joint effort among state, federal and private concerns to solve the state parks' financial problems and, ultimately, save those scenic wonders from economic

Money is there for coalfield work; let's use it

If rich people in Southern California build houses on what amounts to loose dirt and then rains turn that dirt into rivers of mud, the sight of homes flowing down the sides of mountains is national news.

Cameras record every cracked foundation. The nightly news tapes men and women in work clothes (Calvin Klein jeans) trying to save the family heirlooms. Government declares the entirely predictable scene a disaster (the mud has flowed in Southern California for eons) and sends money, fast.

When people in McCreary County build houses and churches on perfectly good ground, but have the misfortune to live below an abandoned strip mine, forget the sympathy. When the old strip bench collapses and mud and rocks tumble down on church, trailer or stickbuilt home, there is no disaster declaration - and there

is precious little money.

And get this: The money is there to fix the problem. Where the federal government has to add to the deficit to clean up other disasters, the damage caused by abandoned strip mines is paid for in advance.

Since 1977, coal companies have paid \$800 million to fix the havoc caused by abandoned strip mines. In the last 16 years, only \$108 million of that amount has been used to firm up the land damaged by unscrupulous miners. So, while an abandoned mine in McCreary is slumping onto a cemetery and church, about \$700 million sits in a dusty account in Washington, D.C.

It's not right. Coal companies have paid to protect coalfield homes. The homes need protection. And \$700 million sits idle.

A congressional subcommittee met Tuesday to discuss the budget for the Department of Interior, where the moribund abandoned mine land fund can be found. Therefore, now is a good time for a test of the Kentucky congressional delegation.

Before you bring Kentucky any new projects, Sens. Ford and McConnell and Reps. Rogers, Bunning, Baesler, Barlow and Mazzoli, get the coalfields what they need. See that the abandoned mine land fund is used to protect Kentucky homeowners from disaster. — Lexington Herald-Leader

Forget more rooms; build lodge at Paintsville Lake

A legislative panel is looking into the possibility of building more lodge and cabin space at Kentucky's state resort parks. Before they add rooms at existing facilities, though, I suggest they build a lodge and some cabins at the state's forgotten park - Paintsville Lake.

I can think of no other park in Kentucky that has been ignored more than Paintsville Lake. Since it opened in the 1980s, the lake has been promised facility after facility by every official holding office. Yet, year after year, we see those promises dwindle

Paintsville Lake was supposed to be a godsend for Johnson County. Aside from flood control, the lake was supposed to help our tourism market and bring thousands and thousands of people to our part of the state. True, Paintsville Lake has attracted all kinds of fishermen and been featured in national publications, but it has yet to provide a reason for other people to

The General Assembly will return in special session in a few months to consider a two-year spending plan...

Considering lawmakers' reluctance to pump more money into park renovations - and even less enthusiasm for new facilities - it's likely that Paintsville Lake will again be left out of the state's spending plan.

State officials are trying to get private developers interested in building lodges, cabins, restaurants and other facilities at resort parks. My question is, why would developers want to spend millions of their dollars to construct facilities at state parks when the state is afraid to do it? As long as the state is hesitant about improving and expanding our state park system, private development is not going to happen.

And we know from experience that state officials apparently have little interest in Paintsville Lake. If they do, now is the time to show it. - Paintsville

Economy watch Social Security needs an overhaul by Kenneth Eskey

One of the great hoaxes of the
1990s is the fear that the Social Security system will go broke in the next
century, depriving present-day workers of their future rewards.

It's a fear that doesn't make much sense. Can you imagine Congress letting old people starve in the streets? But it serves as a useful rallying cry against deficit spending.

As long as Social Security surpluses are invested in government bonds to help finance the federal budget deficit, alarmists can claim the money won't be there when baby boomers retire.

As a practical matter, the bonds will be honored, even if it means raising taxes. But there's no denying that the Social Security system, as we know it today, is in need of a major overhaul.

Otherwise, the burden will become intolerable.

As a starter, the benefits paid to retirees with substantial incomes should be completely taxable. Why should young workers pay stiff Social Security taxes so that senior citizens with far fewer financial recommend can receive benefits tax-free?

Under current law, retired couples pay taxes on up to half the benefits they receive when their incomes exceed \$32,000 a year and up to 85 percent of benefits if their incomes are more than \$44,000 a year.

Single retirees pay taxes on up to 50 percent of their benefits when their incomes exceed \$25,000 a year and up to 85 percent of benefits if their incomes are more than \$34,000

And why should a retiree with income of \$40,000 a year pay any less in income taxes than a worker with income of \$40,000, especially when the older person may be more affluent?

"The elderly aren't poor, for the most part," says Reo Christensen, a retired political science professor who teaches a course at Miami University of Ohio. "Their net worth is nearly twice the national average. They live better—by far—than any elderly group in the history of the human race."

Federal law requires that the normal retirement age be raised to 67 by 2027, but why wait that long?

Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-III., who heads the House Ways and Means Committee, is proposing that the higher retirement age—67—be phased in by 2016, a reasonable date.

Rostenkowski has other ideas about protecting the solvency of Social Security. None will be seriously considered this year, but the idea is to stimulate debate about a subject that most lawmakers regard as political poison.

"Don't rile the old folks" is phony

With the ratio of workers to retirees falling from 3-to-1 to 2-to-1 by 2020, it's time to take a new look as where the burdens and benefits of Social Security should fall.



Certificate revoked for Pike teacher

A state agency has revoked the teaching certificate of a long-time Phelps High School teacher for having sexual relations with a 16-year-old student

The Education Professional Standards Board revoked the certificate of Gary R. Hunt for five years.

After the revocation on April 18, the Pike County schools terminated Hunt as a teacher at Phelps. District spokesman Bruce Hopkins said the dismissal was taken with regret and noted the allegations involve incidents that took place in 1087

The student, whose identify was deleted from a record of the proceedings obtained by The Associated Press under Kentucky's Open Records Law, claimed that she had sex with Hunt on three occasions in the spring of 1987.

Hunt, 45, is a Phelps graduate himself who has held a teaching certificate since 1972. He was formally notified of the charges of immoral conduct against him in September 1993 and the hearing to revoke his teaching certificate took place November 1993.

Hunt is appealing the disciplinary action against him. Lawyers for Hunt did not return telephone calls for comment on Tuesday.—Appalachian News-Express

Spears to be extradited

Edward "Mick" Spears, the Louisa man who is charged with shooting his wife, is going to be extradited from West Virginia.

After fighting the extradition for over a week, Spears signed the waiver Tuesday, and is going to be brought back to Kentucky where he is faced with a murder charge.

"He did sign his waiver (Tuesday)," said Kentucky State Police trooper Gary Kistner. "We

don't know when he's going to be extradited."

Spears was arrested in Huntington, W. Va., on
May 1 after his car crashed on the 5th Street exit

In West Virginia, he is charged with leaving the scene of an accident, DUI, possession of a dangerous and deadly weapon and brandishing.

After his arrest, West Virginia police found out that he had been charged with murder in Kentucky.

According to a police report, the Louisa Police Department had received a call on the evening of April 30 from Spears advising that he wanted to file a complaint against Jeff Kidd, his wife's exboyfriend, for driving up and down Ky. 3 past their residence on the point section.

Trooper John Marshall went to the scene and talked with both Edward Spears and his wife Ruth, and saw no sign of any domestic problems.

"Shoppers will be able to quickly compare products side-by-side to find the amounts of fat, cholesterol, sodium and other nutrients in a standard serving of those products. The AHA is very excited about the new label because we've been so involved with the development of the food labeling regula-

The AHA worked with a coalition of 20 health and consumer groups, urging congress to pass the Nutrition Labeling and Education Act of 1990 and then worked with the FDA and the USDA to develop guidelines to food labels.

The new food label usually appears on the back or side of product packages. The label will list key ingredients, including the amounts of total fat, saturated fat, cholesterol, sodium, dietary fiber, sugars and protein per serving.

The label will also list total calories and the number of calories from fat. This information can help consumers limit their total fat intake to no more than 30 percent of calories claims like "fat-free," "low-sodium" per day, the AHA recommendations and "low-cholesterol." for heart-healthy eating.

In addition to the new label, the FDA has standardized serving sizes to reflect the typical amounts that people actually eat. To make any health claims that imply the product is good for your heart, the product must meet strict guidelines for saturated fat and cholesterol.



"Maybe so. It's just that you do everything so well."


"No, I don't. It just seems that way to you because you don't do

News of the Weird

THE LITIGIOUS SOCIETY

—In February, New Mexico state patrolman Norman Martinez filed a lawsuit against a Santa Fe bar and its bouncer for injuries he suffered during an off-duty fight. Martinez is asking additional compensation for his broken nose because he can no longer properly sniff for alcohol on the breaths of drivers.

—Frances Bobnar of Adamsburg, Pa., filed a lawsuit against the Pennsylvania Lottery Commission in March, claiming that she and family members have spent more than \$150,000 on lottery tickets during the last 10 years but have never won.

— In November Tom Stafford of Mission Viejo, Calif., won \$8,500 in a lawsuit against a local golf course. He hit an errant shot that ricocheted off a steel pole and smacked him in the forehead.

—In February, Bernadette French, 36, won \$1.1 million in a lawsuit against the Wilmington (Del.) Hospital. French, who suffers from manic depression, gouged her eyes out and then claimed the hospital staff was negligent in allowing that to happen.

— In March in Louisville, Ky., former paralegal Merrell Williams, 52, added a claim to his disability lawsuit against his former law firm, Wyatt Tarrant & Combs. Though he admitted that a 29-year smoking habit contributed to his heart problems, he also claimed that in the course of working for the firm's tobacco clients, he was "horrified" to learn about complicity between tobacco companies to suppress data on the dangers of smoking and that he suffered stress knowing he had to keep such information secret.

—In January, Emmerson Phillips filed a claim against his employer, the Metropolitan Toronto Housing Authority, after he was turned down for sick leave. Phillips informed his employer that his daughter was getting married the following Sunday, that he intended to get roaring drunk at the reception and would probably have a hangover, and that he thus would be taking sick leave on Monday. The employer refused to grant the sick leave, but a local arbitration panel ruled in his favor.

— In September, Bob Jones of Berkshire, England, filed a claim for about \$1,200 with his insurance company for a loss he suffered during a power blackout. The body of his parrot, Polly, which was recently killed by Jones' dog, had been kept

in the family freezer for posterity, but during the blackout, Polly thawed and decomposed.

NAMES FROM HELL

— In a July story on odd names in England, the Wall Street Journal reported on the plight of a women's scholarly organization in the town of Ugley. Said spokesperson Irene Camp, "We try to call ourselves the Women's Institute of Ugley, but it never sticks."

— In November, there was a malfunction in the new telephone system in the public library in Edmonton, Alberta, which ordinarily would permit a machine to dial up a customer and announce by synthesized voice that requested materials were ready to be picked up. The system, which is referred to by its acronym, is the Electronic Library Voice Information System.






A basketball, football or even a baseball team is successful because a team works hard together and puts in many hours of practice during the course of a season.

But the Raiders have some good talent in some players who have proven they can play the game.


Pitching has been the sore spot for the Raiders as Coach Rose has had to rely on the youth corp of this year's team.

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


