They dipped, they flipped, and they rolled across the sky above the Big Sandy Regional Airport Wednesday, July 20, for charity.

Pilots from the Red Baron Stearman Squadron demonstrated the flying ability of their authentic, antique aircraft, the Stearman Model A-75 biplanes to publicize their "Crusade for Children."

The crusade, which is sponsored by Red Baron Pizza, will raise funds for the local God's Pantry food bank. Red Baron Pizza will donate a portion of the sales of all its pizzas sold from July 17 through July 30 to God's Pantry.

Several local residents were passengers in the biplanes as the pilots performed their synchronized stunt routine. One passenger, Roger Hill, manager of Foodland in Prestonsburg, said the thrill ride was "unbelievable."

As the plane taxied down the runway preparing to lift off, Hill had on his headset, his goggles, his parachute, and he said he kept looking at himself and asking "Am I really doing this?"

Up in the air in the open cockpit of the biplane, Hill was amazed at the beauty of the Eastern Kentucky landscape, and he said he kept asking himself "Am I really up here? Am I not dreaming?"

But, when the plane began its series of rolls, Hill said he became disoriented. He thought, "Am I up, or am I down?"

"Everything was going around ... I could see the ground and then I could see the sunball," he

Permit issue settled; work on jail okayed

In a gesture of goodwill, Prestonsburg Mayor Jerry Fannin ordered a work stoppage order lifted Thursday afternoon that was filed earlier in the day against the contractor building a new Floyd County jail.

Contractors D.W. Wilburn had been issued the stop work order at approximately 8:30 Thursday morning by Prestonsburg code enforcement officer Larry Adams.

Adams' order said that contractors had failed to obtain the proper state and local permits before starting the multi-million dollar project.

Floyd Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo said Thursday afternoon that the dispute centered on the amount of money to be paid to obtain the building permit. Stumbo said that contrac-

tors had paid the city \$10,221.65 for a permit, but city officials claimed that \$5,972.58 was still owed.

In a letter to job superintendent Bill Tussey, Adams said that Mayor Fannin instructed him to waive the remaining fees and that work could resume on the project immediately.

Mayor Fannin said Thursday afternoon that Prestonsburg "had enough problems" and that he wanted to work with the contractors and the county to resolve the dispute. He added that he is working with Stumbo to determine what fees, if any, remain to be paid.

"I want to try to work with them and go ahead and get the jail built," Fannin said. "I want to let them get back to working. I wish it had never gotten to this point."

Work on the jail project is expected to resume Friday morning.

Garbage dispute may go to court

A dispute between Floyd and Pike County officials about how much money Floyd County owes to Pike County for dumping garbage in that county's landfill may have to be resolved in court.

At Monday's Pike County Fiscal Court meeting, magistrates discussed the idea of suing Floyd County for over \$200,000, which officials claim is owed in dumping fees.

Magistrates took no action on the issue, but they made it clear that they are tired of waiting for their money.

Pike Magistrate Stirl Eddie Harris commented that Pike Countians feel the fiscal court had let the issue "fall to the wayside."

"We've got to absolutely take a

stance," Harris said at Monday's meeting. "We've got to do something."

Floyd County officials dispute the amount owed for using Pike County's landfill and have not discussed the issue since earlier this year.

Solid waste commission chairman Mike Vance could not be reached Thursday to comment on the issue.

Floyd's newly-appointed solid waste commission is working on a plan to resolve several issues left over from the old commission, including closing the old landfill at Garth. Commissioners have not discussed the Pike County debt.

In a statement Thursday from Pike County Judge-Executive Donna Damron, she said that county offi-

Stalking case is waived to panel

Although it is a case thousands of miles away, the events surrounding the O.J. Simpson saga have resulted in a Floyd County case of stalking being waived to the grand jury.

During a preliminary hearing Wednesday in Floyd District Court, Angela Johnson said her estranged husband, Darvin Johnson, had been stalking her and threatening to kill her. Angela Johnson testified that she had obtained a protective order against Darvin Johnson, but he had continued to follow her and threaten her during telephone conversations.

Trial commissioner Jack Hyden, who listened to testimony in the preliminary hearing, said that the O.J. Simpson case had increased awareness on the issues of stalking and domestic violence. Hyden said that, in part, led to his decision to waive the Johnson case to the grand jury for further review.

Angela Johnson was the only one to testify to her husband's alleged threats and that made the decision of whether to send the issue to the grand jury a tough call, Hyden said.

"What we have is her word against his," Hyden said after his ruling.

Board members Raymond Bradbury, H. D. Fitzpatrick, and Julius Martin were absent from the meeting.

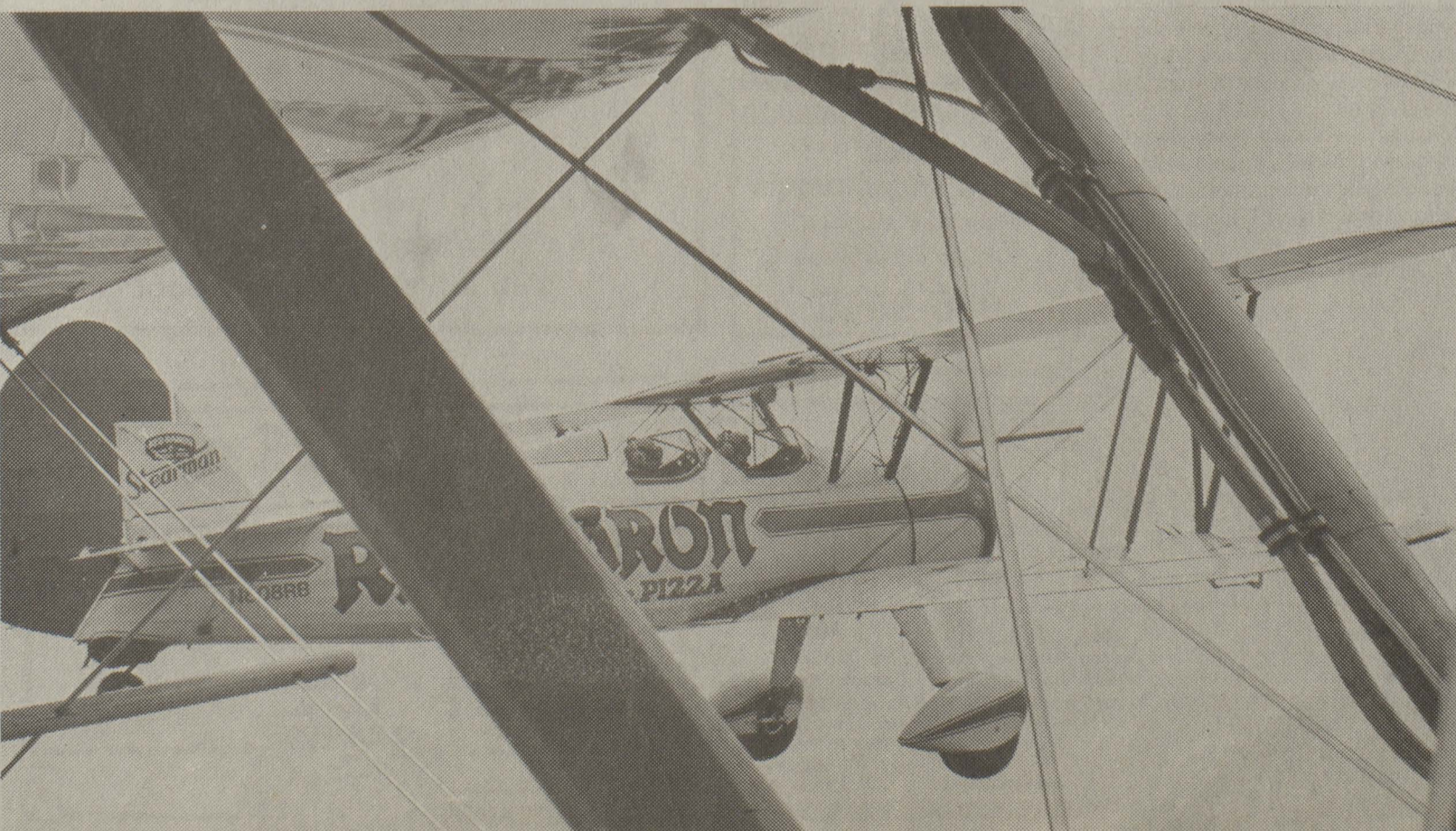

The commitment letter was given to the board to insure that R&S Body would relocate their company on the Davidson Property.

The board must give approval to authorize the engineer to go ahead before the engineer can begin work.

The fiscal court agreed last Friday

Governor launches CommonHealth group insurance for all Kentuckians

Friday, July 15 marked the start of CommonHealth of Kentucky, an opportunity for any Kentuckian to buy group health insurance with similar choices, benefits and premiums as state employees have.

"This is not only a first step toward universal coverage for all Kentuckians, but also a huge assist for small employers shouldering heavy health insurance costs," Governor Brereton Jones said, as he launched CommonHealth of Kentucky, "Group Health Insurance for all Kentuckians."

CommonHealth of Kentucky is a part of the Kentucky Health Care Reform Act signed into law by Governor Jones on April 15, 1994.

Described in the legislation as "State Employees Insurance Buy-in," CommonHealth provides health insurance coverage through July 1995, when the Health Care Reform Act calls for the creation of a statewide health purchasing alliance.

CommonHealth group members could choose to continue their coverage through the alliance, which will offer up to five insurance plans to individuals and employers of fewer than 100 people on a voluntary basis. Reform Act calls for the creation of a statewide health purchasing alliance.

CommonHealth of Kentucky and the future alliance offer them large-group rates, and businesses have the option of paying part or all of the premium, while the employee has the choices.

The CommonHealth group offers Kentucky Kare, the state government self-insurance that is statewide, and, in some counties, HMO plans: Alternative Health, a Blue Cross/Blue Shield affiliate in 19 counties; Humana Maximum Benefit Plan in 36 counties, and Lexington Health Advantage in 17 counties.

The firm will provide 250-300 jobs, according to Gilliam.

May House gets funding from historical society

A \$20,000 matching grant to begin renovations on the historic May House in Prestonsburg was approved this week by the Kentucky Heritage Council.

The funds will be used to begin the stabilization phase of the project. Renovations include repairs to the roof and flashing, some demolition, cleanup, painting and masonry work, said Robert Perry, president of the Friends of the May House.

The matching \$10,000 was raised through donations from local businesses and individuals.

to invest \$50,000 in coal severance money to determine if the 36-acre site can be developed into an industrial site.

The authority hopes to relocate R&S Body and offer part of the site to a clothing manufacturing firm.

Whether the clothing manufacturer locates in Floyd County depends on the number of people who respond to a labor survey application.

Gilliam said they were about halfway through that process and they had received over 700 responses.

He added that the firm was looking for about 2500 responses.

said. During the spin, Hill tried to press an intercom button on the control panel to convey a message to his pilot, but his fingers couldn't locate the button.

"I was trying to find it, but I couldn't find it," he said. "I wanted to tell the pilot 'This is all right!'"

Hill, who sat in the front seat of the two-seater plane, was amazed by the synchronization of the biplanes. "Once it looked like we were right on top of the other one. I felt like I could just reach out and touch the other one."

The Stearman biplanes were built in the late 1930s and 1940s as trainer planes to prepare pilots of the United States Army and Navy for the more advanced World War II fighter planes.

The squadron derives its names from the "real" Red Baron, Baron Manfred Von Richtofen, who was

famous during World War I for personally downing 80 Allied aircraft. The airplane he flew was bright red, hence the nickname "Red Baron."

In 1979, the Red Baron Stearman Squadron began barnstorming the nation. Flying nine months of the year, they have raised millions of dollars for children's charities.

The "Super Stearmans" of the squadron have all been restored to a standard configuration and modified for their current role as aerobatic airplanes, but few concessions have been made to change the romantic character of these venerable steel and fabric birds.

Each biplane is flown in excess of 600 hours per year. Piloting the two biplanes Wednesday were squadron pilots Brian Regan and Randy Brooks. David Siders, local marketing manager for Red Baron Pizzas, helped to organize the event.

Marijuana case waived to grand jury

A case of a Prestonsburg man charged with cultivating marijuana has been waived to the grand jury after a preliminary hearing Wednesday in Floyd District Court.

William Crandal Chapman, 21, of Prestonsburg, was charged July 12 with cultivating marijuana, more than five plants, by Prestonsburg police after a search of Chapman's home.

Police sergeant Mike Omerod testified Wednesday that officers found marijuana residue throughout Chapman's house and that eight marijuana plants were found growing on a hillside approximately 75 feet from the residence.

Sergeant Omerod also said that officers found various materials inside the home that are commonly used to grow marijuana. Items found included potting soil, fertilizer and fluorescent lights. Omerod testified that no type of plants were found inside the residence.

Trial commissioner Jack Hyden ruled that enough probable cause existed to suspect a crime had been committed.

cial understand Floyd County must resolve a "large debt" as a result of its solid waste problems. But, she also expects the county to pay its debts.

"We have been very patient, hoping that the reorganization and changes being made will result in Floyd County being in a position to pay their bill," Damron said. "We certainly don't want to do anything to harm our relationship with our neighbors because there are many other projects we are working on together to benefit our counties and our region. But our citizens and our magistrates are becoming very concerned that some comments made by certain persons on or associated with the Floyd County Fiscal Court seem to indicate they are not intending to pay this bill."

Damron did not identify who was allegedly making those comments.

"There were no other witnesses here today. With the O.J. case, I felt it would be best to let a grand jury hear it."

In his ruling, Hyden said he was "weakly" waiving it to the grand jury. A preliminary hearing on a felony charge is held in district court to determine if enough probable cause has been proven to show that a crime has been committed.

Assistant county attorney Bob Bishop asked that Darvin Johnson's bond be revoked because Johnson allegedly broke the provisions of that bond by calling his wife and threatening her.

Angela Johnson testified that her estranged husband had called her as recently as Tuesday night and threatened her.

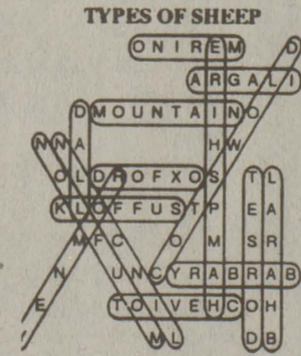
Hyden did not revoke Darvin Johnson's bond, but he reiterated that he was to have no communication or contact with his wife. Under the bond provisions, Darvin Johnson is to stay at all times 100 feet away from Angela Johnson.

Angela Johnson and Darvin Johnson apparently got into an argument outside the courtroom after the hearing, deputy sheriff Homer Neeley said.

Darvin Johnson went to the county

attorney's office to swear out a complaint against his wife and later appeared before Hyden, again. Hyden asked Darvin Johnson to explain to Bishop what type of complaint he wanted to file against his wife.

After discussing the issue with the public defender, Darvin Johnson told Hyden he would just "let things ride."

We live around people that have never worked hard or had to worry where the money was going to come from to pay their bills, but I did, and now I'm asking why? When you want rid of someone you eliminate them. But for me, all I have to say is that I've got the "Hill Street Blues."

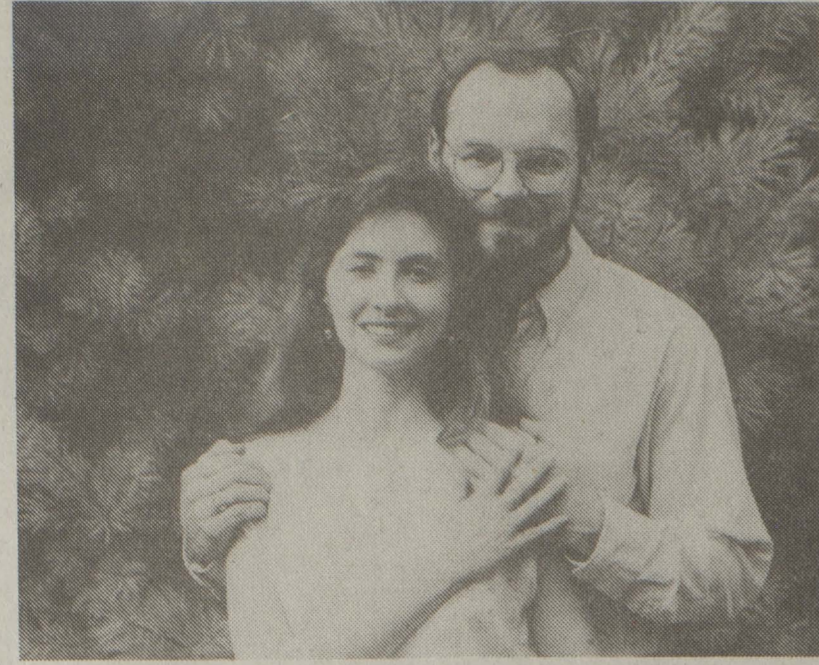

ROOTS

Nowadays, anybody can be a crook. It's hard to distinguish the good guys from the bad guys.

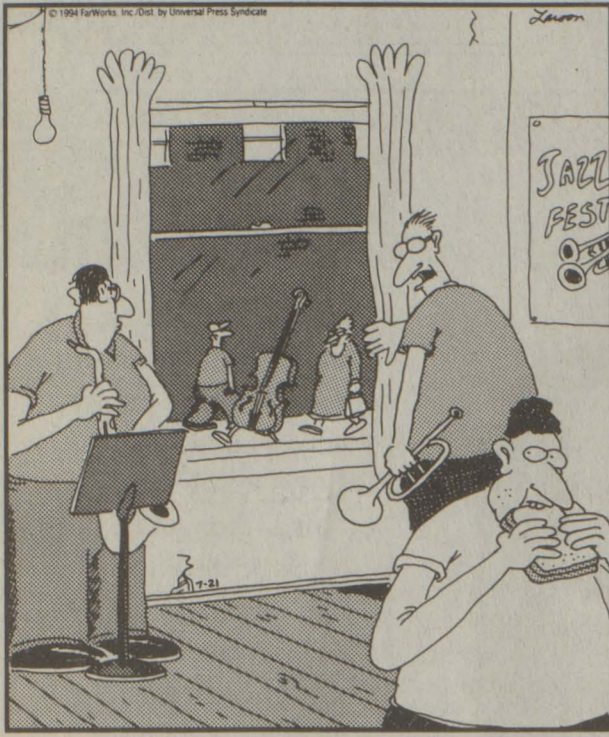

Jason Hackworth was the fourth of four pitchers the Prestonsburg 14-15-year-old All-Star team had to use in facing Pikeville for the District 7 Senior League All-Star Tournament championship.

Hackworth came away the winning pitcher as Prestonsburg posted a hard fought 14-10 win over the host team.

John Ortega and Jeremy Osborne led Prestonsburg from the plate with three hits each. Sammy Nelson collected two.

It took a five-run fifth for Prestonsburg to snap a 9-9 tie after Pikeville had scored five times in the fourth inning to tie the game.

James Taylor doubled home two runs in the fifth. Nelson, Jeremy

Osborne and Jason Blackburn had consecutive singles as three more runs scored to give Prestonsburg a 14-9 lead.

Pikeville scored a single run in the top of the seventh for the final 14-10 score. Chad Childers led off with a base hit and scored on a wild pitch.

Prestonsburg led 2-0 after the first inning and added to the lead with three in the bottom of the second for a 5-0 lead.

on a pop-up to first and Jamane Goodgame on a grounder to short.

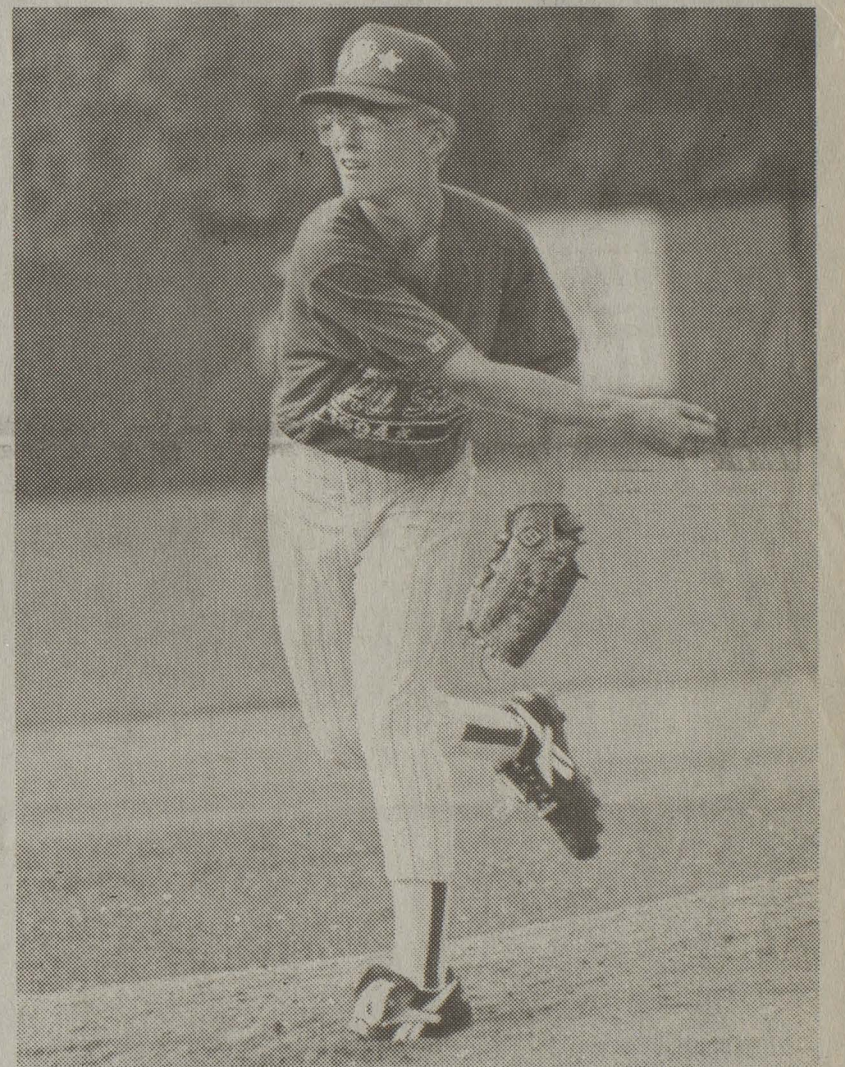
Prestonsburg extended its lead to 4-1 with two in the second. Seth Crisp's two-run single scored Dustin Crisp and Castle, who both walked.

Prestonsburg pitcher Wesley Samon pretty well had things going his way Monday night in Pikeville as the Prestonsburg 14-15-year-old All-Stars faced a strong Pikeville Senior League team in tournament action at the W.C. Hamby Athletic Complex.

Samons had yielded only one hit in the first four innings and was well in control. That is until the fifth when the bottom seemed to drop out.

Walks, hit batsmen and errors opened the door for Pikeville to score five times to defeat Prestonsburg 5-2 and force a second deciding game (Wednesday night).

Prestonsburg had just scored in the bottom of the fourth inning to take a 1-0 lead. Jeremy Osborne, who was hit by a pitch, came home on James Taylor's RBI single. Sammy Nelson had led off the inning with his second hit of the game, but was thrown out attempting to steal second.

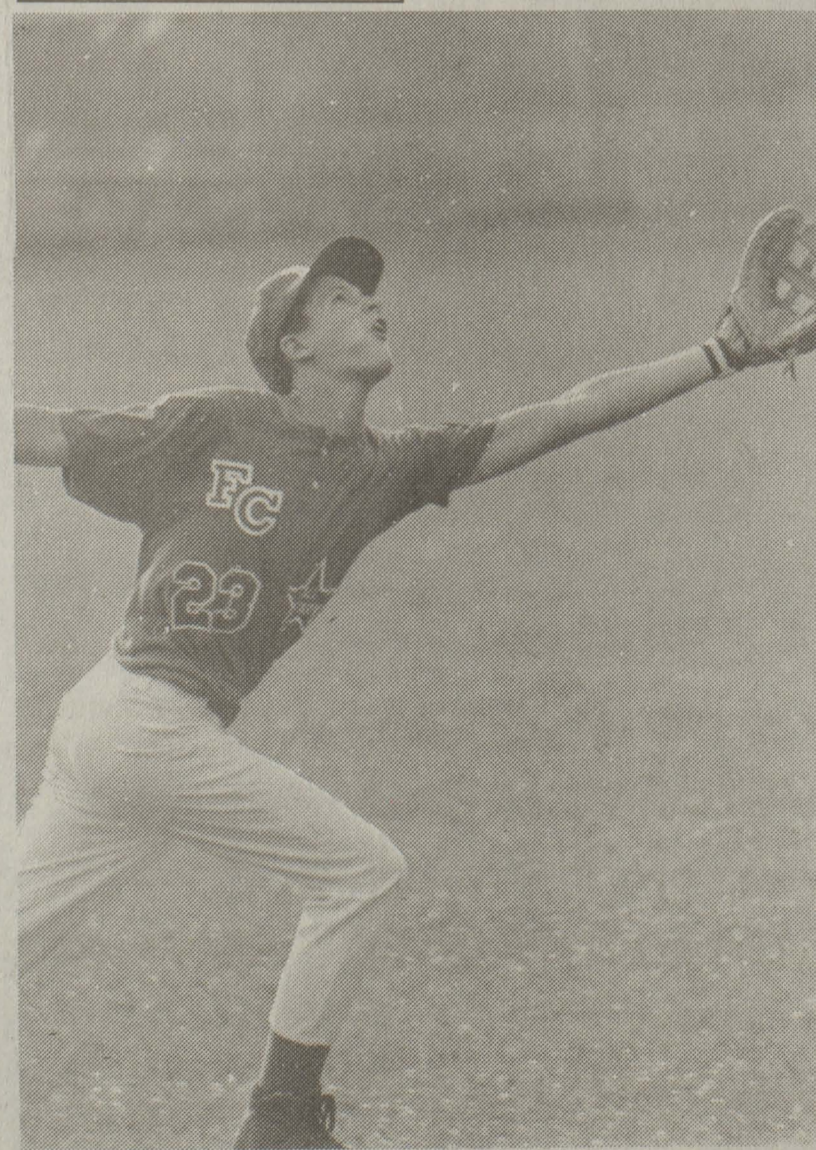
