Floyd man's six-year fight with rare disease ends with his death Monday

Two months before finishing his freshman year at Betsy Layne High School, Kevin Wade Parsons fell victim to a mysterious illness.

On Monday, August 15, after a farewell bidding from his mother, Gail, Parsons died, ending a six-year battle with LaForda Body Disease, an affliction so rare that fewer

than a dozen cases have been diagnosed worldwide.

Parsons, a 21-year-old Harold native, was 15 and a straight 'A' student at Betsy Layne when he began suffering seizures that doctors first attributed to epilepsy. His condition worsened and within six weeks of the first seizure, every organ in his body "shut down," his mother said Tuesday.

"He couldn't do anything; he couldn't swallow, his speech was blurred and he had no control over his body," she said.

It took a year and a half to diagnose the cause of Parson's illness as LaForda Body Disease. Just eleven other cases have been documented around the world and there is no known cure.

Parsons battled the disease for the next four and a half years, spending most of that time in the University of Kentucky Medical Center, where he died Monday.

"He was a real courageous person; he fought real hard. He was a great all around kid and I'm going

to miss him greatly," his mother said.

Gail Parsons said a lot of prayers and summoned up a great deal of willpower during the ordeal her son was undergoing.

"I thought, if I can keep him around, someone will figure out what to do. With his father (the late Orville Parsons) being dead, he was all I had. I fought so hard to keep him," she said.

Gail Parsons spent just six nights

Bells will ring in new year next week

For whom the bells toll. Next Monday, August 22, they'll ring in the start of a new school year for nearly 8,300 Floyd County students and they'll signal the final countdown on a critical phase of education reform in Kentucky.

Approximately 575 certified employees of the school system will report to work this Friday, August 19 for a day of professional development and activity planning for the start of classes Monday.

"We're looking forward to a good, exciting year," superintendent Steve Towler said Tuesday. "We've done a lot of work this summer."

The 1994-95 school year marks a significant point in the implementation of the Kentucky Education Reform Act (KERA), Towler added.

"This year will be the long-awaited, true report card on how our schools are faring under KERA," he said.

This fall, probably in October, the school district will receive preliminary data from student performance tests taken last spring. Results of those tests will determine if individual schools have met state mandated scoring thresholds and if individual schools are eligible for rewards or subject to state intervention or assistance.

"We think many schools will go into the reward phase," Towler said.


This school year will also offer something new in the way of class scheduling.

Each school day will include six hours and five minutes of instructional time, five minutes more than usual, to provide for "early Wednesdays" twice a month.

On the second and fourth Wednesday of each month, classes will dismiss 45 minutes early to give teachers time for planning and development.

Performance testing will change slightly this year, too, with high school testing shifting this spring from the 12th grade to the 11th grade.

Fourteen of the system's 19 schools will have site based decision making councils in place this year.

Wheelwright officials seek ouster of one

Three Wheelwright City Commissioners want to oust a fellow board member for selling a piece of city property allegedly without the approval of the board.

At Monday's commission meeting, Commissioner Allen Taylor was accused by Commissioners Luther Johnson Jr., Charles Harmon and David Hall of selling a city lawnmower to an individual for \$35.

Commissioner Johnson asked city attorney Tim Parker how to begin impeachment proceedings against Taylor.

Parker advised Johnson that the sale of the lawnmower would be illegal without commission approval and that Taylor could be charged with malfeasance.

Taylor spoke up at Monday's meeting and said he wanted to talk about the issue. He explained that the lawnmower had been run dry of oil and had been stored on his back porch for 10 months.

"I had offers of five dollars and ten dollars for it," Taylor said. "Rodney Newsome offered \$35 dollars and these two (Harmon and Johnson) said sell it (during a discussion in

Harmon's living room)."

Johnson and Harmon disputed Taylor's claim.

Harmon added that Taylor had been going from house to house in the Wheelwright community claiming that he, Johnson and Hall were doing illegal acts as city commissioners.

"I'm tired of it," Harmon said. "I've had it. There are illegal things being done in the city, but not by us."

Mayor David Marlee Sammons asked the three commissioners if Taylor's actions could have been an oversight and appealed to them to let Taylor repay the money received for the lawnmower.

Johnson sternly said "no" and instructed Parker to review the process to oust Taylor.

Parker told commissioners that he did not feel it was appropriate to discuss the issue in public and recommended a closed session.

An objection was made by the press to a closed session on the issue, on a contention there are no provisions under exceptions to the state's Open Meeting law which allow that type of discussion to be held in closed session.

High court is asked to decide if prosecution allowed at hearing

The state Supreme Court will be asked to decide if a hearing to determine if accused murderer Clawvern Jacobs is competent to aide in his defense should exclude the prosecution and the public.

Before a hearing set to begin at 1 p.m. Tuesday in Prestonsburg, attorneys for Jacobs argued that the competency hearing should be held in private and exclude the prosecution team because testimony would include confidential conversations between Jacobs and his attorneys.

Attorneys for the commonwealth argued that they had the right to cross-examine any witnesses who may testify about Jacobs' ability to assist in his defense.

Jacobs is charged with killing Alice Lloyd College student Judy Ann Howard in 1986. Jacobs was convicted of the crime and sentenced to death in 1987, but his conviction was overturned earlier this year by the state Supreme Court, which ruled that the trial should not have been held in Knott County.

After hearing arguments in chambers, Floyd Circuit Judge John David Caudill, who was assigned the case, ruled that the hearing should be held in public. Judge Caudill granted the defense a stay on the hearing so that his ruling can be appealed to the

Supreme Court, but he reset the hearing to Thursday, August 25.

Kelly Gleason, an attorney for the Department of Public Advocacy who is representing Jacobs, said after Tuesday's proceedings that she wanted the press and prosecution barred from the hearing because "it is an issue between Clawvern Jacobs

and his attorney."

Jacobs has previously maintained that he is competent to participate in his defense.

Without saying what Jacobs' position is now, Gleason said it is a stressful situation "knowing that your

Pike authorizes suit over delinquent bill

While the Pike County Fiscal Court was authorizing its county attorney Monday night to take any action necessary to collect a \$216,000 delinquent account owed by the Floyd County Solid Waste system, Floyd County Solid Waste Commissioners at their meeting were disputing the bill.

At the Floyd Solid Waste meeting, Chairman Mike Vance told commissioners David Layne and Darrell Patton that it was imperative to resolve the situation with Pike County, and asked for their immediate authorization to resolve the issue with Pike

County Judge Executive Donna Damron. Vance said if he could report to Damron before Pike County's fiscal court meeting later that evening that he had been authorized to talk with her about the debt, it might prevent the Pike County Fiscal Court from taking legal action against Floyd.

"It will be a move in the right direction," Vance said. "We need to pay the legal debt we owe Pike County."

Layne queried about how much money Floyd County actually owed the Pike system.

Commissioners said the bill was \$214,000 and then it went up to

Floyd arrest made in probe of tire thefts

A Pike County man was arrested in Floyd County August 11 during an investigation into an alleged truck tire theft operation.

Christopher Hodges, 22, was lodged in the Floyd County Jail and charged with third-degree burglary and theft by unlawful taking as the result of a joint investigation by the Kentucky State Police, Pike County Sheriff's Department and the Pikeville City Police.

Five stolen tires were recovered from a residence on Branham's Creek and 18 truck tires were recovered from a barn loft at McDowell during the probe.

Reports of stolen tires have also been received from Betsy Layne and Island Creek companies.

State Public Service Commission to assume partial oversight of utilities

A ruling earlier this year by the state Supreme Court resulted in an order from the state Public Service Commission which will require municipal utility companies that provide services, mainly water, to seek commission approval for proposed rate increases.

The commission's order includes

the Prestonsburg City Utilities, but it will have no immediate impact on the utility company.

Utility manager Bill Harvey Howard said Tuesday that the order basically means that approval will have to be sought from the commission before any rate increases can be imposed on private water companies and water districts that purchase water from the city.

"Municipalities have never been

under the jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission (PSC)," Howard said. "This order only has to do with municipalities that sell water to water districts, such as Sandy Valley Water and Prater Water, or private water companies, like Auxier Water. In the future, we will have to notify the PSC of any proposed rate increase by the City of Prestonsburg."

Howard added that the order does not affect any contracts the city util-

ity has with water districts or companies and that it will not affect water rates charged to other cities that purchase water from the system.

The last increase levied by the city was in June 1993, Harvey explained, in order to generate additional funds to pay for expanding the plant's capacity from 3 million gallons a day to 5 million gallons a day.

\$269,000.

The \$269,000 bill included \$214,000 in tipping fees and late penalties, Terry Spears, executive assistant to Judge Damron, explained Tuesday.

After the state had shut the Floyd County landfill down, the county temporarily dumped its trash in the Pike County landfill. Earlier, Pike County had brought its trash to Floyd County, and the systems verbally agreed on the arrangement.

David Cooley, a former employee of the Floyd County Solid Waste System who said he was "involved when the deal was cooked," explained that Floyd County charged Pike \$7.50 per ton, and now Pike County charged \$23.50 per ton. Cooley explained that there were reasons for the higher rate charge because Pike County's operating expenses were higher.

"Be realistic," Cooley said. "We were operating a residential landfill. It was cheaper to operate."

"The issue is, was there a reciprocity to agree to the rate — if you accept our waste, we'll accept your waste," said Bob Myer, former director of the Floyd County Solid Waste. Myers also said that Floyd County has paid \$80,000 in payments to Pike County, and that those payments reflected the higher rates.

"It's a very unclear issue at best whether there was a formal agreement," he said.

"It's bureaucracy at its best," Patton said. "The person negotiating the contract verbally didn't write the check."

David Layne expressed the opinion that Vance could talk all he wanted, but the commission would not authorize him to make a settlement. Patton agreed, saying they needed to seek advice from their legal counsel. Floyd County Attorney Jim Hammond was absent from the meeting Monday.

Vance attempted to contact Damron before the 6 p.m. deadline to agree to a discussion on the issue, but was unable to talk with her because her son had been injured earlier that evening in a bicycle accident and was in intensive care at St. Joseph's Hospital in Lexington. The 14-year-old youth was listed in stable condition

Tuesday.

At Monday night's fiscal court meeting in Pike County, Reed Anderson, assistant Pike County Attorney, was authorized to take action to collect the money owed from the Floyd County dumping, Spears said. The court, however, gave Anderson a great deal of latitude, he explained.

"If Floyd County is willing to work something out to avoid a lawsuit, Pike County would consider any proposals," he said, also stressing that the fiscal court has been concerned that the issue has been allowed to "drag on this long."

"There needs to be a resolution very quickly in one manner or another," he said.

Spears explained that the rates Pike County billed were because the county is now operating "a landfill that is in full compliance."

"The regulations are far more stringent and far more expensive to meet than at the time we were dumping in their landfill," Spears said. "It's costing us about as much to operate it as we were charging Floyd County to dump. We're not making any money."


Spears said that in addition to paying Floyd County's tipping fees when Pike County was utilizing the Floyd system, that his county had provided Floyd County with two "expensive pieces of equipment" and two full-time employees.

"Pike County wants to have a good working relationship with Floyd County, but Floyd County must understand that this court has a responsibility to do what is right for Pike County, and they have decided to take whatever action it takes to collect money that is due to Pike County in this matter," he said.

Spears said Damron and Floyd County Judge Executive John M. Stumbo are making attempts to deal with the matter, and that Judge Damron is available to talk to anyone on resolving the issue.

No legal action has been filed, Spears said.

Parker said that he felt there was cause to discuss the issue in closed session and noted the objection.

Harmon commented that if the issue should be discussed publicly, he felt the commission should do so.

After further debate, commissioners instructed Parker to research the issue and said that a special meeting would be called to discuss ouster proceedings against Taylor.

Taylor, who is hard of hearing, did not appear to understand that the commissioners wanted to oust him from the board.

After Monday's meeting, Taylor said that he would still be on the commission after the others are long gone. He also commented that Johnson and Hall did not live inside the city limits, a charge that fellow commissioners have also made against Taylor.

Johnson and Hall also commented after the meeting that Taylor had allegedly illegally disposed of other city property.

Commissioners did go into a closed session to discuss city clerk Mary Ann Johnson. After about 10 minutes, they returned to open session and announced that no action would be taken.

Also Monday, commissioners:

- asked the city attorney to attend a code of ethics workshop to be held August 30 at the Big Sandy Area Development District to find out what should be included in the city's code, which has to be adopted by January 1995;

- tabled hiring an auditor for fiscal year 1993-94 until other proposals could be sought;

- agreed to purchase used swivel chairs which will be bolted to the floor behind the meeting bench so that commissioners will not have to find chairs to sit in at meetings;

- agreed to forward all calls on the police phone to the sheriff's department until police chief Mark Mays moved into the city;

- postponed a discussion on the unauthorized use of city equipment and offered no details relating to the issue;

- agreed to purchase a new police car;
- named Lowell Parker and Thomas Hereford to the utility commission; and

- assigned Hall to oversee city employee Ricky Bryant.

All commissioners were present at Monday's meeting.

Funeral services for Parsons will be held Friday, August 19 at 11 a.m. at the Hall Funeral Home Chapel. Burial will be in the Jeff Hunter Cemetery at Printer.

Jarvis baby's condition, doctor says "not life-threatening right now"

Several statements in Friday's article about the condition of the infant daughter of Terry and Tammy Jarvis of Allen need clarification.

According to Dr. Rakesh Sachedeva, pediatric gastroenterologist, who could not be reached for comment for Friday's article, and who is Terri LaShae Jarvis' doctor at Pikeville Methodist Hospital, the infant's condition is "not life-threatening right now."

Within the next two weeks, Terri will be transported to the Transplant Institute at the Children's Hospital in Pittsburgh "to be evaluated for a suitable donor" for a small bowel and liver transplantation, Dr. Sachedeva said in a telephone interview Monday. "She will go for five days for her work up."

Then the child will return to Pikeville where she will be under Dr. Sachedeva's care.

When a suitable donor is found (which could be up to two years), the child will be flown to Pittsburgh for the transplantation, the specialist said.

The doctor added that when the infant was born, she didn't have enough intestines to absorb her food. For the baby to survive, she had to be fed nutrients intravenously. The nutrients that have helped the infant survive also have their side effects. They are "a little damaging to the liver," Dr. Sachedeva said.

The baby's doctor at Cabell Huntington Hospital, Dr. Ratcliff, a newborn specialist who has taken care of her the past several months, referred her to Dr. Sachedeva at Pikeville. It was during a regular appointment that Dr. Sachedeva discovered that the child had a fever and that her blood sugar had dropped. Suspecting infection, the doctor placed the child in Pikeville Methodist Hospital.

Since Dr. Sachedeva is a stomach, liver and intestinal specialist, he has placed the baby on special medicine to protect her liver from further damage and to help her intestine "work a little better," he said. "Her liver has not stopped functioning, but it is damaged from the (intravenous) nutrition."

The doctor said he also recommended a transplantation of the intestine and the liver. "(The Pittsburgh

hospital) is the center for small bowel and liver transplantation," he added. "They will determine how soon she needs it."

The doctor said that Pikeville Methodist Hospital is working with Medicaid to pay for the child's transportation to Pittsburgh. But he said there is a need for a fund to pay for the transportation of the baby's mother, Tammy Jarvis, and her living expenses during her stay with her baby while in Pittsburgh.

PCC professor gives presentation in Canada

Hailu R. Bogale, a professor of engineering and mathematics at Prestonsburg Community College, attended the annual conference and exposition of the American Society for Engineering Education in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada this summer.

A sensitivity to this concept of truth elevates our understanding to a level where teaching implies learning and vice versa. Along with this line, after careful deliberation, the essential elements or components comprising teaching are identified. 

If this was any other country but America, last week's congressional defeat of an administration-backed crime bill would likely have signalled the end of Bill Clinton.

With crime being one of the most pressing concerns among Americans and with Democrats holding a majority in Congress, you might have expected the crime bill to become law without much ado.

It did not, and the defeat can easily be considered a vote of no confidence in the president's ability to manage the pressing affairs of this country.

In other democratic countries like England or Israel, votes of no confidence generally produce major changes in government, even new elections.

We don't do that here, preferring instead to give our presidents a set term in office.

Bill Clinton has a little over two years left in his first term and he is eligible to serve another.

Setbacks like this, though, suggest he

may be a lame duck already.

In Kentucky, the campaign for the 1995 gubernatorial race will kick off in earnest in about 10 weeks or, more specifically, on November 2, the day after this year's general election.

The seven months after that will be open season among the party brethren, who will snipe, ambush or otherwise bushwhack one another in an effort to convince voters they are the hope for the future.

After the primary votes are counted and a nominee is selected, the losers will fall into line behind their party candidate as if the bile they spewed forth just a few weeks earlier was the product of temporary insanity.

And then they'll redirect their venom toward the other party which, as they'll tell it, is the devil incarnate.

Real issues may or may not fit into the campaign agenda and the best man (or

woman) may or may not win.

Most times they don't...on both accounts...and the cycle begins anew. Depressing, isn't it?

For the first time since 1990, schools will open this year without a requirement to implement some aspect of education reform.

That's probably good news for educators and parents, who have been overwhelmed for most of five years with this reform and that reform mandated by KERA, the Kentucky Education Reform Act.

There's no question that everyone involved could use a breather, if for nothing else than to catch up on what's going on in our schools.

Just call this KERA's seventh-inning stretch.

Unless the General Assembly enacts some sort of overtime provision, implementation of the reform act will wind up next

school year.

It ain't over 'til it's over.

As far as we're concerned, education reform has been pretty successful but there are a couple of changes we'd like to see.

First, we think school board members ought to run for election on a district-wide vote rather than in their own little subdivisions. That could help eliminate what's left of the political overlords who still manage to stagnate true reform.

Next, we think small schools with proven track records of academic success ought to be treated at least as equals with larger schools when it comes to funding for academic programs and facility needs.

The studies have shown that small schools often do a better job educating students, so it makes no sense to put them last in line for funding.

We should be modeling our state school system after what works for the students, not what works for the balance sheet.

Martin quits solid waste board

Floyd County Solid Waste Commissioner Sheridan Martin has resigned his seat on the solid waste board. The announcement was made by board chairman Mike Vance during a meeting of the solid waste commission Monday night.

Vance said Martin had cited a lack of time to devote to the waste board because he had "too much going on."

Vance also discussed refunds that had recently been processed. The refunds had been given to those customers who had paid their Floyd County Solid Waste bills in advance, Vance said, but one refund posed a problem due to the amount of money involved. Because of a "prior miscommunication," Vance said, "one customer had her bill paid through the year 2,004."

"Someone had told her she had to pay one bill for herself and one bill for her husband," Vance said. Floyd County Solid Waste owed her for 123 months at \$6 per month, he explained, also asking for authority to "sit down and work out an arrangement with her."

Board members Darrell Patton and David Layne did not approve the suggestion, telling Vance to "write her a check real quick."

"If you make a mistake, you make it right," Layne said. "That's all you can do in this world."

Waste commissioners also discussed difficulties encountered in getting appraisals for equipment, some of which Rumpke wants to buy, owned by Floyd County Solid Waste, Inc. Floyd County Solid Waste has been making long-term lease payments for the equipment, and some of it is currently being used by Rumpke.

Ron Henke, district manager of Rumpke, said his company was interested in the equipment and hoped the board would soon have the appraisals completed.

Another area of concern to the three commissioners was a report Vance had received from the state Division of Waste Management that said the Floyd County Solid Waste Commission is not in compliance with guidelines issued by the state.

An implementation schedule from the state requires the waste board to develop and implement enforcement procedures for those dumping trash illegally; develop an education program; appoint an advisory committee; locate and clean up open dumps; distribute litter bags for an annual

clean-up campaign; hire an ecology officer; and develop a recycling/reduction program.

Before the meeting began Monday, Gene Frasure, an owner of a small business, complained to Rumpke's district manager that his bill had raised from \$11.50 per month to \$52. Frasure said he sets out only two bags of garbage weekly, and did not think he should be paying the business rate.

The contract between Rumpke and Floyd County Solid Waste states that "the fee for churches and mama/papa businesses who dispose of 150 gallons of waste or less per week shall be \$10 per month for waste collection once a week by Rumpke."

Henke told Frasure that his bill will be \$10 per month, and said that anyone who questioned their bill should call his office before the end of next week. Rumpke truck drivers will be monitoring the amount of bags picked up at these businesses, Henke said.

Henke said fees are \$10 per month for customers who average between one and four bags of garbage per week; \$20 per month for those who average between five and eight bags per week; \$30 for nine to twelve bags; \$40 for 12 to 16 bags; and \$52 for more than 16 bags, which fills up a 2-yard dumpster.

In other business, the solid waste board discussed:

- Landfill site cleanup. The site has been cleaned up, Vance said, and Frankfort is sending someone to look it over. Then a crown can be put on

the site, and it can be re-seeded, he said.

- A complaint from Paul Hughes about the garbage bill for Davidson Memorial Gardens. David Cooley, an employee of Rumpke, said the cemetery had always been a "big volume" producer and he didn't know "where they got that much garbage." Ron Henke suggested Hughes contact him to work out a solution.

- Calls that Rumpke had received from customers concerned about their bills. Cooley said the company had not returned all the calls because "there (were) too many," but those customers would be contacted by the end of the week.

- Toy trucks that Rumpke sells were listed on customer's bills. Henke said some customers had thrown away their garbage bill because they thought it was a bill for a toy truck.

- Rumpke will add two small trucks to their fleet.

- Hiring a collection agency to collect delinquent accounts owed to Floyd County Solid Waste.

- Calling a special session to discuss retaining personnel to man the office.

Several issues at the meeting were tabled due to the absence of Floyd County Attorney Jim Hammond. Issues tabled included the acquisition or sale of property, employment of a coordinator, ecology officer and clerical support, an ordinance, and possible legal action by the Pike County Fiscal Court. Those issues will be brought up during a special meeting, which will be scheduled later.

Kentucky receives \$3.5 million in food stamp bonuses from federal government for the fifth year

For the fifth consecutive year, the federal government has given Kentucky a multi-million dollar bonus for operating one of the most efficient food stamp programs in the nation.

Virgil Conrad, regional administrator for the Food and Nutrition Services in Atlanta, presented Cabinet for Human Resources Secretary Masten Childers II with a \$3,521,698 check on August 9.

"Kentucky singularly distinguishes itself year after year as a state that efficiently manages a large food stamp program," he said. "The credit for the low error rate goes to the solid local, state and federal partnership that is necessary to achieve this distinction."

Childers called the bonus "testimony to the professionalism of our career employees."

Department for Social Insurance Commissioner John Clayton said that low error rates are especially significant with the workload carried by local office staff.

"Maintaining one of the lowest error rates in the nation while providing assistance to more than a half million Kentuckians every month can only be accomplished through the diligent efforts of local office staff across this commonwealth," Clayton said.

"We also should recognize the hard work of central office management and staff in earning this bonus for the citizens of Kentucky."

Kentucky's error rate for fiscal

year 1993 was 5.18, which means that in nearly 95 percent of the food stamp cases, benefits were figured accurately. The 5.18 error rate was the nation's fifth lowest.

Hawaii had the lowest error rate with 3.75; South Dakota, 3.76; Alaska, 4.56 and the Virgin Islands, 5.15.

In comparison, the overall national error rate was 10.83.

However, Kentucky received 50 percent of all bonus money given nationwide by the federal government to states with an error rate of 6.0 and below. Bonuses are based on error rates plus the total amount of food stamps issued per month.

Since 1985, Kentucky has earned \$19,738,738 in food stamp bonuses.


That 37 cent increase was passed on to customers outside the City of Prestonsburg because three-fourths of the city's water is pumped outside the city limits, Howard said.

"One reason for the increase in rates outside the corporate limits is that the city of Prestonsburg built the first water plant in the county without any grant monies," Howard said. "They borrowed the money to build it. Since 75 percent of the water goes outside the city limits, we felt those customers should pay for the expansion, not the city."

Howard said the new order became effective on January 31, 1994.

"They tell me it's prestigious," Allan says. Tammy Wynette, as well as other country greats will be there. "There's a lot of gimmicky things in this industry, but this isn't," he said. "It's for independents—for people like me—to help them get started."

And Allan is hopeful that will happen when he takes his all-expense-paid trip to Nashville for the September 9-10 awards ceremony. —*Appalachian News-Express*

ban shopping centers, while the downtown shops close, and are renovated for use as professional offices. Downtown is not dead, it is changed. Would we really want to trade off the jobs that Wal-Mart provides, so we could still have a five and ten cent store downtown?

(III) Prestonsburg as a whole has grown. It has a better economic base (defined as the ability to generate income from outside its borders), than it has had in its history. Thunder Ridge, The Kentucky Opry, The Jenny Wiley Theatre, all of these things produce money for the hotels, restaurants, retailers, gas stations, and others in the area. As a result, the city benefits from the collection of more tax dollars; an occasional fine when a tourist breaks the law; being a higher priority for economic development and highway improvement grants; the list is almost endless. Even now, plans are in the works for a world class golf course to be constructed, and that will draw in more tourist dollars.

The coal boom is gone, and we are very fortunate to have a growing population, new industries, and increased tourism to support the area.

It is unfortunate that many people are unable to see the forest because the trees are in the way.

Mr. Imes will have to pay his fine; he was wrong and he will have to pay the price. If he can't accept that, then I don't care if he is age 16 or 60; he has some growing up to do. As for the city, I call on Mayor Fannin to increase the fine for illegal parking in a handicapped zone. If it's \$500 for littering, then handicapped parking should at least equate littering. 





Government help is available for home repairs and remodeling

Most homeowners are unaware that regardless of their income there are Federal, state and local programs that will help them repair and remodel their homes.

Government at all levels recognizes that neighborhoods are the basis of life in our country. When a neighborhood deteriorates, many things happen both physically and socially. When the homes look shabby, a neighborhood seems more attractive to crime and criminals. An area in decline is like a spreading cancer. As homes become shabby looking and in need of maintenance, the residents lose their desire to keep up the neighborhood. Streets become receptacles for trash, schools lower their standards and very quickly the selling price of homes in the area drops sharply. This accelerates the cycle of degeneration.

In order to keep and maintain the nation's housing and neighborhoods, government at all levels has programs to give homeowners money (that does not have to be repaid) for repairs or to lend them money at below market levels or at no interest. In many areas utility companies will either do energy conservation work free or at low cost and in other places will lend homeowners money at no interest to pay the contractor of their choice for the necessary work. In addition there are tax incentives to promote efficient energy use.

These programs are not restricted to low-income people, slum areas or urban neighborhoods. Owners of single or multi-family dwellings are eligible. While the grants do not have to be repaid, most of the loans offer low or no-interest, long terms and low payments.

Some of the other home improvements covered under these programs are: attic and wall insulation, new windows, outerwall siding, security doors, and locks, window guards, sidewalks and masonry work, bathrooms and kitchens, electrical and plumbing, new roofs, gutters, and downspouts.

Consumer Education Research Center, a national non-profit consumer group formed in 1969, has just published the 208 large-page, 1994 edition of Consumers Guide to Home Repair Grants and Subsidized Loans (\$16.95 plus \$3 p&h from CERC GRANTS, 350 Scotland Road, Orange, NJ 07050 or 800-872-0121) which lists over 7,000 sources of loan and grant programs offered by Federal, state and local government, utility companies and others; typical programs offered and how to qualify. Form letters for inquiries to these loan and grant sources are included as well as detailed instructions on determining your debt-to-income ratio for eligibility.

Robert L. Berko, executive director of CERC, tells us, "Some programs have no income ceiling and others allow income of as much as \$50,000 per year or more. There are even programs for which tenants are eligible and many allow loans to poor credit risks. In many areas, people with disabilities can receive grants to pay for needed repairs such as access ramps and widening of doorways."

Since it is important that the work be done properly, the book includes a section describing the rough cost of many jobs as well as advice on picking a contractor, negotiating a contract, and insuring that the work is done properly and for a fair price. And to help you communicate with your contractor, lawyer and lender, the book includes a dictionary of terms used by these professionals.







Strike

Baseball players want more revenue sharing. They think the owners are making too much money.

They also want to lower the arbitrator rule, as well as avoid a salary cap.

Baseball owners want to put in a salary cap because they say it is the only thing that will save America's favorite pastime. They have offered the players union a 50-50 share.

The players decided that enough is enough and they went out on strike August 12.

Floyd County is jammed with die-hard baseball fans who absolutely love the game. But to these die-hard fans, the remainder of the season is not that important.

"Personally, I don't agree with the whole mess," said McDowell's Terry Mullins. "These players make millions playing a kid's game. I think that the least a player can make is \$109,000 per year."

That is another area that the players want to see an improvement in. They want to raise the minimum salary to between \$175,000 and

\$200,000.

While Mullins views the demands of the players as "ridiculous," he puts part of the blame on the owners.

"The owners are partly at fault," he said. "They are the ones that spoiled them."

Mullins explained that the fans are the ones who pay the salaries and

are being overlooked in the fiasco.

"The best thing that could happen is for the fans to boycott the games, even if they do start back. We should just refuse to go to the park."

Like Mullins, many Floyd Countians are Cincinnati Reds fans. Their beloved Reds are currently holding a slim half-game lead in the

new Central Division of the National League.

"I've been a Reds fan all my life," said Mullins. "Here they are having a good year and they go on strike. Look at the Cleveland Indians and New York Yankees. It's been, what, since 1951 the Indians have done anything. The Yankees are back again (they

lead their division by eight games).

"Players like Frank Thomas, Ken Griffey Jr., and Mitch Williams are having great seasons. It has been one

of the more interesting seasons in a long time," he said.

David Dawson, who has worked with the youth leagues around Floyd County for several years, echoed the same sentiments as Mullins.

"It is just ridiculous," he said. "Baseball players are set for life just as the owners are. I think that each side should give some and let's play baseball."


Dawson said that the fans have a control in the matter and if they quit, "the owners and players would be broke."

"I think the fans should boycott the games," he added. "I don't agree with the salary cap the owners are wanting. I think the good player should make more."

Dawson feels that the players are concerned about their security in the game but he said, "That is something you earn."

Caba tosses for 344 yards, four TD's in 34-16 win

Magoffin County quarterback Mike Caba (6'1" 160 pounds) came out throwing and never stopped when the Hornets faced Betsy Layne in the opening game of the South Floyd Gridorama Saturday night at Wheelwright's Brackett Field.

Caba completed his first four passes of the game and led the Hornets to a 34-16 blitz of the Bobcats.

"That will be the main part of our offense this year," said Hornet coach Mick Caba.


Main part is right as the Hornets only carried the football seven times for a meager 26 yards.


If you love high school football, really love the pigskin game, then you will want to circle August 20 on your calendar and head to Jayne Stadium on the campus of Morehead State University.



Adkins a natural for Pikeville job

It's said one can never go home again.

But former Paintsville basketball player Keith Adkins did the next best thing. He came close to home to coach.

Adkins was officially introduced as the new assistant basketball coach at Pikeville College this past Friday.

Coach Roy Cutwright, who was recently named the schools' new head men's coach replacing Rick Scruggs, who moved on, said the choice of Adkins was a good one.

"I think he's a natural fit for us," he said. "He can come in and provide us, from a staff standpoint, some positive influences."

The 1988 Paintsville graduate started his college basketball career at Notre Dame. He left during his sophomore season and ended his playing days at North Carolina-Wilmington.

He set school records for the Seabawks in three-point field goal percentage (45.7) and free throw percentage (85.3).

Adkins is ready and excited about the new job.

"I've had an opportunity to learn the game under some of the most noted coaches in America," he said. "You look at Coach (Bill Mike) Rynyon, he's one of the most respected coaches in the state. Then I went on to play for Digger Phelps and then Kevin Eastman, who is now the coach at Washington State."

"So, I've been fortunate that I've learned the game under some quality coaches, and I've been around some quality people throughout my playing years. It's always been my interest to get started in college coaching, and I consider myself lucky to get started in the business under a quality guy, a quality coach and a good program."

Adkins said he is fully aware of his responsibilities and knows what will be at the top of the list this winter.

"We'll be graduating seven seniors, so it will be a very busy recruiting period for us," said the 25-year-old.

"I'm coming back home to Eastern Kentucky, and through my playing days, I've come to know several of the coaches in this area. It's not like I'm with no experience and no contacts."

In his high school days, Adkins was known as one of the top shooting

guards in the state. He set the Paintsville scoring record of 53 against Pikeville in 1988, which included 11 three-pointers.

Later that same year, he was named as the Kentucky Athlete of the Year by USA Today.

Cutwright said that he is satisfied with his choice.

"We don't think we could have done any better than Keith," he said. "Keith is a very knowledgeable person. As a player, he was a very talented and coachable person. And we're looking forward to challenging each other as coaches and improving each other as coaches."

on this," he said of the players and owners. "But with the football season ready to start, it doesn't make any difference if they play again or not."

While there is much concern as to whether the season will resume or not, for Pat Stancil of Wheelwright, she could care less.

"I don't keep up with the game anyway," she said. "I used to be a Reds fan and keep up with them, but I don't anymore."

Who is the bad guy in this mess? "The owners of course," she answered.

Jesse Little of Wheelwright believes the owners are not the bad guys, but that the players own that role.

"The players are the bad guys," he said.

Unlike most baseball fans, Little believes the season will resume with the regular season schedule and there will be a playoff and world series.

"It will take them about three weeks and you'll see both sides get serious about it," he said. "I think the season will go on."

Little feels the owners should have been involved at the bargaining table to start with.

"It's just all greed on both sides," said Little. "The owners should be involved in negotiations. The players are going to stick together on this one, but the season will get underway again."

Little views the owners' move as a way to break the players union.

Fred Dickerson, 80, of Inez, knows what it means to a business man to pay out as little as he can, having been in the drugstore business for 48 years.

Dickerson feels that the madness has to stop somewhere. "A ballclub has got to operate. I think the players are asking too much. It's got to stop somewhere. The owners have to pay millions to the players, as well as keep the parks open. They are just asking for too much."

Dickerson feels that a prolonged strike could hurt the game that is so popular with many, many Americans.

"It will hurt the game," he said. His brother James Dickerson, 85, of Prestonsburg, says the players are full of greed.

"I've played baseball for many years and have followed it for many years. It's just a matter of greed on the part of the players. Yes, they are the bad guys in this one."

"Baseball is just no fun anymore. There is no man worth the money they are getting to play baseball. No man is worth seven million dollars a year," said Dickerson.

"My daddy used to say that no man is worth \$100 a day. Someone should start a fan union and they need to go on strike."

Both Dickersons are avid Reds fans and recalled the days of the Big

Red Machine with Tony Perez, Johnny Bench and Pete Rose.

"Why, I can remember before those fellows," said James Dickerson. "I recall Bucky Walters, Paul Deninger and Frank McCormick. I've seen them all play. I saw Ewell Blackwell pitch for the Reds."

"The old Gas House Gang—boy! talk about a baseball team," recalled Dickerson. "They had Dizzy and Paul Dean, two of the best pitchers ever."

"Ted Williams was the best player that I have seen," said Fred Dickerson. "He fought in two wars, came back and hit .400. He had the best eyes at the plate compared to anyone."

"The players today have ego problems," said James Dickerson.

A strike by the fans seems to be, according to the feelings of most baseball fans, a reasonable course of action. But the only problem is that the fans cannot stay away from the ball parks.

A nationwide fan strike was called for August 11 as a way to protest the threatened strike by the players. But on August 11, most of the ball parks were crowded with fans wanting that last look-see before the strike.

The strike has been on going for five days now and no sign of any agreement is on the horizon. Many fans feel that the season is over, including the playoffs and world series, while others feel the playoffs and series will be played.

He was named to the Williamson Daily All-Area team three years running. He was a three-time State Wrestling Champion and went undefeated on the wrestling mat the last three years. He was named to the All-State team as a freshman in wrestling.

This past year, as a senior, he was chosen as the state's Most Valuable Wrestler in the state tournament by pinning all the opponents that he faced.

Stepp is expected to fully recover, but he will have to forego any contact sport.

The victory was the seventh of Chupp's two and a half year career and his first since switching to a GRT chassis just over a month ago. It also ended a streak of problems, including a crash while leading, that has kept him out of the Thunder Ridge victory lane.

"The \$6,000 win sort of makes up for the others," said Chupp. "Bob and Barbara Miller have put a lot of faith in me and I wanted to get this win for them more than for myself."

Applications for quota deer hunts will be delayed

Distribution of applications for quota deer hunts on wildlife management areas (WMAs) owned by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR) will be delayed until late August.

The agency will not receive applications in late July as expected. However, the original August 31 deadline for hunters to return completed applications will be extended to accommodate the delay.

More than 20 quota deer hunts will be offered on KDFWR-owned or operated WMAs this fall. Participants must apply on a form provided by the department and must be chosen by random computer drawing.

When the applications are delivered, they will be available from hunting and fishing license outlets and from the KDFWR Central Office in Frankfort.

Quota hunt applications for areas such as Land Between the Lakes (LBL), Ft. Knox and Ft. Campbell Military Reservations and Bluegrass Army Depot are directly processed by agencies other than the KDFWR.

Bassin' with the Pros

FIRST BASS TOURNAMENT WIN STILL SPECIAL FOR THIS VETERAN

Although he has won other national tournaments with far heavier weights, David Wharton's first major bass tournament win seven years ago remains special.

It was on Sam Rayburn Reservoir, Wharton's home lake, but he himself was not expecting to win.

"I was in fifth place entering the final day of competition and there were some excellent fishermen in front of me," remembers the Johnson Outboards Pro Staff angler. "Fishing

was extremely difficult, too, because of the changing weather. I knew it would be hard to catch enough bass to overtake the leaders."

To complicate matters even further, the lake level was low before the tournament began and it fell even lower during the competition. As a result, the bass moved from shoreline bushes out to deeper grasslines.

"I was in seventh place after the first day," explains Wharton, "and then moved up to fifth. I was catching

my bass on a Texas-rigged worm, usually one of the most dependable of all lures, but the changing weather and falling water made the fish hesitant to hit even that.

"I got in a lot of casting practice that final day."

As fate would have it, Wharton drew a first-flight starting spot the last day while the leaders drew second and third-flight berths. That meant he was among the first to weigh in so he had plenty of time to be

while the rest of the field brought their fish to the scales behind him.

"One by one the leaders were eliminated," remembers the Johnson pro, "and as each one came up short, I honestly breathed a sigh of relief."

"There was a lot of pressure on me to win the tournament because it was on my home lake where I was a full-time guide. Many thought I was supposed to win. I can't tell you how happy and relieved I was when that weigh-in was over."

Wharton's winning weight for the tournament was just 37 pounds, two ounces, which still stands as the lowest three-day total for a national tournament on Sam Rayburn. Most such events there take at least 45 to 50 pounds to win, and in a four-day national tournament three years ago the winner needed 86 pounds.

"I have since won other tournaments with a lot heavier weights," says Wharton, "but I'll never forget that first win. It was special for a lot

of reasons."

Colonel football team picked to win 1994 OVC Football crown

Coach Roy Kidd's Eastern Kentucky University Colonels have been picked to win the 1994 Ohio Valley Conference football crown in a poll of the league's head football coaches and sports information directors.

EKU, who rolled to its 16th OVC title last year and a perfect 8-0 record against league competition, received 12 of a possible 18 first place votes and 123 total points.

Middle Tennessee and Tennessee Tech each garnered three first place votes. MTSU edged the Golden Eagles for balloting for second place with 109 points to 104 for TTU.

"This is going to be a tough year in the OVC. Everybody is going to be better in the conference," said Kidd, who will be beginning his 31st year at the helm of the Colonels.

"If we can stay healthy, I believe we can have a good football team. But the key is to stay healthy. I think that was one reason that we were successful last year. We really never experienced any key injuries," Kidd added.

Rounding out the predicted order of finish were: Tennessee State, 76; Murray state, 72; Tennessee-Martin, 69; Southeast Missouri, 39; Austin Peay, 36; and Morehead State, 20.

Six Colonels received first-team notice on the 1994 pre-season All-OVC squad, three on offense and three on defense.

On offense, all three selections from EKU were offensive linemen: senior center Joel Woods of Pineville, junior guard James Hand of Louisville and junior tackle Jason Combs of Covington.

Senior All-American candidate Carlos Timmons of Brooksville, FL, heads those Colonels named to the first team pre-season All-OVC defensive unit. Also making that team were sophomore free safety Chris Guyton of Thomasville, GA, and junior strong safety Joe Smith of Casselberry, FL.

Eastern also had three Colonels that were named to the honorable mention pre-season all-conference unit. These included junior tight end Jason Dunn of Harrodsburg, senior defensive tackle Matt Childress of Troy, OH, and junior placekicker Marc Collins of Crestview Hills.

EKU, which finished 8-4 last season and participated in the I-AA playoffs for an unprecedented 14th time in the 16-year history of the I-AA playoff system, begins two-a-day practice sessions Tuesday in preparation for the September 1 opener at Western Kentucky.

Peabody to have quota deer hunt

Peabody Wildlife Management Area (WMA) will have two quota deer hunts this fall during the regular 10-day gun deer hunting season.

Hunters wanting to apply for the Peabody hunts, or any deer quota hunt offered by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR), must apply on official application forms provided by the KDFWR.

Last year, deer hunters who purchased a Peabody WMA permit (\$10) were allowed to hunt deer on the area during any deer hunting season. Hunter safety and deer management are the primary reasons for permitting only drawn applicants to hunt deer during quota hunts on Peabody WMA this year.

"People who apply for quota hunts on Peabody have a very good chance of being drawn," says Art Boebinger, acting director of the KDFWR's wildlife division.

Applicants drawn for the Peabody hunts will also need to purchase the Peabody WMA permit mentioned above.

Peabody WMA is located in Ohio and Muhlenberg counties between Pond River and Central City.

"I called the play," said Coach Daniels. "I thought the call for Slone to take the ball the first time was a good one. We wanted to go to Adam (Wright) on the second play. We thought with his speed he could get to the corner, but their safety came up with a heck of a tackle.

"On the two passing plays, we had men open, but a wrong read cost us yardage there. The second time they just had good coverage on us," he said.

"We need to work on finishing off the drive when we get down that close. It doesn't do you any good to get down there if you can't finish it off.

"Everybody has to pull together when you are that close," he said.

South Floyd's defense looked good throughout the first half as Coach Daniels played his bench. The Raiders did move into Hawk territory in the second half with less than five minutes remaining, but were unable to get to the goal line.

With 9:15 left in the game, Pike Central marched 72 yards on 10 plays to take a 12-0 lead.

running as he rushed for 179 yards on 10 carries. He scored two of the Hawks' touchdowns.

The Hawks totaled 241 yards on offense with 239 coming on the ground. Pike Central totaled 69 yards on their first series of plays and could only manage 7 yards the rest of the first half.

I was very pleased with the way we played," said Coach Daniels. "I thought we moved to the football better than last year. I was pleased with that. Naturally, we are still doing things that need to be corrected."


Coach Daniels said that the staff





Beaver lore can be surprising

Paradoxical though it may seem, the beaver is at the same time one of the best-known and least-known animals in North America.

Because of their unique habits and lifestyle, few animals get more press than beavers. Consequently, by the time most folks are out of grade school, they figure they know about all that's worth knowing about beavers, such as:

They build dams across streams; they construct expansive lodges out of mud and tree branches; they fell trees with their teeth; and when alarmed, they slap the water with their flat, paddle-shaped tails, making a sharp cracking sound.

Well, some of that is true insofar as it goes, but it doesn't go far enough. In reality, the notions most people have about beavers usually consist of more misconceptions than facts.

Take their dams, for instance. It's true that some beavers build them, but here in the Southeast where I live, there are a lot more that don't than that do. On streams and lakes where the water is already deep enough for their needs, beavers don't expend needless effort on dams.

Hey, any animal that's smart enough to build a dam in the first place is surely smart enough not to build one when it's not needed. I wish I could say the same for some of the humans who work for the Tennessee Valley Authority, the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation and the Army Corps of Engineers.

As for those famous lodges, they're really second-class housing as far as the beavers are concerned—

sort of an aquatic low-rent project. The beaver's dwelling of choice is a den dug out of the bank. It can be made with a lot less effort than a lodge, and it provides even better security. Beavers usually don't build lodges unless there are no handy banks suitable for dens.

Regardless of whether they live in dens or lodges, beavers do hit the water with their tails, but I don't think it's necessarily or even usually an alarm signal. I think they more often do it just for the heck of it or as a gesture of annoyance. And notice that I said they "hit" the water, not "slap" it. Everything I've ever read about beavers says they slap the water and make sharp cracking sound.

Not so, not so. Instead of a slap or a crack, what it sounds more like is a 50-sound rock being hurled into the water by a 1,000-pound giant at the speed of a Sandy Koufax fastball. It's something like KER-CHUNK!!! magnified about 100 times. The way sound carries over water, on a still night I'd guess you could hear it for at least half a mile.

The reason I have to guess on the distance is that the times I've heard it, it's always been quite close. And when you hear it close, it can make you jump half out of your skin or bring you bolt upright from the depths of sound sleep.

I've been awakened more than a few times when camped beside water that beavers inhabit. Since the only noise I was making was one of sawing logs, the beavers had no reason to be alarmed. My surmise is that they either smelled me or the ashes of my cookfire and were expressing their annoyance over the unwelcome intrusion—or maybe over my snoring.

The biggest misconception of all about beavers relates to their size. Ask the average person who's never seen one about a beaver's size and they'll probably tell you it's about like that of a small dog.

Not hardly. Their weight would be closer to that of a Doberman pinscher or a German shepherd, albeit contained in a much more compact package. Nearly everyone encountering a beaver in the wild for the first time is dumbfounded by how big it is.

I know I certainly was the first time I ever saw one. I was fishing on Grand Mesa in Western Colorado on a backwoods lake that I felt positive I had absolutely to myself. Therefore, I was flabbergasted and maybe even a little spooked when I heard what sounded like a huge rock someone had thrown in the water.

At the moment I heard it, I was moving to a new spot and was in the woods maybe 25 yards above the water's edge. I stopped and looked all around me but saw nothing. Then I heard it again—a giant KER-CHUNK!!!—and this time I saw the source of it.

My first thought was, "Good God almighty, they's a bear in the lake!" But then the beaver hit the water again with its tail, and I realized what it was. But I still could hardly believe the size of it. I watched in amazement until it sounded and went out of sight.

But there's one thing about that KER-CHUNK they make. It may scare the daylight out of you the first time you hear it, but once you've heard it and identified it, you won't ever again wonder what it is. It's such a distinctive sound you'll immediately know—unless, that is, there's a giant close at hand throwing rocks in the water.

They fill out a survey to forecast how the next season will go; canvass membership for favorites—UK coach, player, most unforgettable game—Rupp (with Pitino moving past Joe B. Hall), Dan Issel, and UK-IU, 1975.

The Klub's founders are Perkins, Arvel Fugate, Jack McKay and Jim Porter. The defining parts of these men, indeed all members is this: still woven into the fabric of their souls is Kentucky. It's deep woods, high meadows, strip mine ramparts and lush valleys. The sounds of banjo and dulcimer. And a band in Lexington, belting out On, On UofK.

If sights and sounds of home could be stirred into a single voice it would be Cawood Ledford's.

"I don't believe Cawood ever realized what big UK fans we are up here," Perkins says.

Probably not.

Fan(atic)s? No. These are reasonable, straightforward, plain-spoken men proud of their heritage. And UK basketball's traditions is a reservoir for the wonders and rich memories of home.

Depth of commitment? That's something else again.

Perkins and the founders have created an oasis, established a refuge for hard-bitten Wildcat loyalists in a land of suety Buckeye unionists who still talk about Woody and Hondo.

Member names are Newsome, Combs, Robinson and Fugate. Dye, Turner, Campbell, Porter, Penix and Ormes and Mayne, and the list goes on.

They are the northern vanguard, listening through static on wintry nights to hear the Wildcats "moving from the left side of your radio dial," or trying to pirate satellite coordinates.

Breakfast at Mom's

Featured speakers for the '94 O'High meeting were Larry Pursiful (UK captain, '62) and Earl Adkins (NCAA champion Fiddlin' Five, '58).

Before the assembly hour for members, a visitor must first experience breakfast at Mom's.

Situated at a junction on Hwy. 122 in Red Lion, four miles east of Middletown, Mom's Restaurant is a place one would expect to find in Prestonsburg, Falmouth, or Hindman. The decor is blue, walls covered with UK memorabilia.

Mom is Hilda Smith. A feisty blond who hails from Hindman and wears her 40-plus years well, packed into a pair of tight blue jeans and Wildcats tee-shirt. Her smile at visitors from Kentucky could pay the light bill.

"Wait'll your order gets here," Earl Adkins whispered.

A few minutes past 8 a.m. eggs, bacon and toast arrive at the long

table. A 45-rpm record dropped into place on the jukebox turntable and a twangy country song filled the room.

Seated between Adkins and Pursiful, a visitor looked up from his eggs to find Mom seated across the table. Without fanfare she launched into a lusty truckstop rendition of love me, don't leave me, or both.

Barely hurdling the high notes, Mom left the helpless visitor with a choice—stare into the eggs like a bashful kid or smile into the serenade as if it were coming from Reba McEntyre.

Mom's. The sounds are Kentucky, the aromas are too. And Hilda's ballad was about love jilted at a roadhouse ... or something. She finished, everyone applauded politely. She smiled and was gone.

Linville & Rose Lawn Baptist

Host for the Klub meeting was Pastor Shelby Linville, a straight-backed, good-natured man of the cloth, all 6-foot-5 of him. He wears a crew cut, smiles easily and still belows and shakes his head over a good Adolph Rupp story. At the end of one he is likely to epilogue an "amen."

Linville is ever ready with a vignette or two of his own involving "the old man" as many ex-UK players call Coach. Forty-two years ago Linville started at Enforcer for Rupp (today it's power forward), averaging 10.4 points on a team that conquered 32 of 34 foes and won the NCAA. Time frame? 1951. Lou Tsioropoulos was his whipper-snapper understudy.

Proud enough of his UK letters 1950-52, Linville enjoys his place in Trivia-logic too. First man to score a basket in Memorial Coliseum: Dec. 1, 1950, West Texas State.

Solo Time:

Memories of home & the 'Cats
Jim Porter (Franklin) is a retired school teacher (23 years) who was recognized last March by the Middletown Journal as "Ohio's No. 1 UK Fan."

Been a UK loyalist since junior high, but Porter saw his first Kentucky game when he was a sophomore at Morehead State. Today he is a season ticket holder.

His Ohio license plate reads: UK CATS. When Rick Pitino appeared at an athletic function in Middletown in 1993 who else to introduce UK's coach?

A man of owlish countenance and take-charge nature, Porter scribbled together an O'High Klub agenda over bacon and eggs at Mom's and a half-hour later opened the meeting dead on time.

After opening remarks and introductions, he did something special. One by one, O'High Klub members were invited to the podium. A solo time to share bluegrass home origins and a capsule commentary on UK basketball.

A magnificent catharsis, solo time. It opened a veritable spring tap, humor and fond memories and recollections gushing forth of home and the 'Cats.

Porter's son-in-law was among the first and confessed that a prerequisite to marrying into the family was a conversion experience to UK basketball.

Woody Kirkman (Dayton) grew up 10 miles from the Tennessee line in Western Kentucky. "Sometimes it was tough (to hear games on radio), but I've been a UK fan for 50 years."

Art Mayne (Tipp City): "Well, I come from Poplar Creek. Probly nobody here knows where Poplar Creek is, but I always listened to the 'Cats on radio."

Poplar Creek in Whitley County, someone said, Mayne was pleased.

Kyle Carmony (Franklin): from Black Star near Harlan. "Most memorable game I ever saw was 1959 when Bennie Coffman scored on a 3-point play with one second left to beat Maryland."

Whick Turner (West Carrollton): from Breathitt County. "Best game I remember was UK beatin' Temple in 1958, three overtimes."

Frank Newsome (Mt. Oreb) of Fleming County does a fair imitation of Cawood's patented "Good evening everybody..." opening.

Paul Bush (S. Lebanon) has not missed a UK game since he left the Marine Corps in 1953. "I remember one time somebody asked Bill Spivey, 'Are you really seven feet tall?' and Spivey said, 'That's not true, I'm six-foot, 13 inches.'"

Josh Robinson (Miamisburg): ties to Breathitt County. "I've been a UK fan since high school when I wore No. 10 because my favorite player was Dirk Minniefield. The best and worst moment of my life was the UK-Duke game (1992)."

Curtis Dye (Centerville): from Arjay in Knox County. "I remember going to bed and listening to UK

games, but had to put the radio under the covers so I couldn't always hear so good."

Charles Atkinson (Trenton) has had heart surgery twice. "Fortunately, both times the doctor was a former UK player."

Bill Penix (Huber Hgts.): from Boone's Camp, near Paintsville in Johnson County. "Most memorable game was 1955, UK-LaSalle. Cliff Hagan matched against Tom Gola. Hagan outplayed him."

Jim Campbell (Middletown). "My kids had Jim Porter for a teacher in school. We always heard to pass in his classes they had to know UK's starting five."

The O'High Klub is defined by Mayne from Poplar Creek, Whick Turner and Josh Robinson from Breathitt County, and the rest.

These men were boys who grew up with J.B. Falconer's "Hagan hooks it in!" ... Claude Sullivan's "Kentucky wins! Kentucky WINS the NCAA championship!" ... and/or Cawood Ledford's "write it down."

Pursiful & Adkins

Larry Pursiful and Earl Adkins, home boys from counties Bell and Boyd, know how O'High Klub members think and feel.

At UK each distinguished himself, did his part to help extend the legend of Kentucky Basketball, and make Coach Rupp famous too.

The O'High Klub fellowship received them warmly, like celebrities. Celebs because Adkins and Pursiful came out of Fairview and Four Mile and lived The Dream of boys up the holler in Breathitt, the cornfield flats in Muhlenberg, and east from Hickman, all the towns between with matchbox gyms.

Pursiful and Adkins lived and played The Game in Valhalla.

Surrounded by O'High Klub members, the two signed autographs and

looked back in awe a little themselves across the years.

Their reactions to these affections were genuine and fresh at a time when player interviews are pocked with "...you know(s);" and seminars are designed for them to 'deal' with media.

"Not everybody understands the way you folks do what UK basketball means to folks," Pursiful told them at one point. "It's special. I admit it, I still get excited. I still get chills at a big game sometimes. Guess I'll always be a UK fan too."

Applause. Seems almost loud enough to be heard in Breathitt County.





swear by them; furthermore, they apparently kept many of our ancestors alive and kicking.

Of course, nowadays I wouldn't take any of these old home remedies too seriously, and please understand that we're having fun here. But, since I kind of collect these things and my readers have been gracious enough to send me dozens of these old remedies, I thought I'd share them.

For instance, one reader suggested that the pain from

a toothache can be eased by boiling bark from the south side of a red oak tree, adding a pinch of salt and holding it to the aching molar. I'm glad we now have an ample supply of dentists, because as simple as it seems, what with my sense of direction and knowledge of trees, I'd be just as likely to end up with bark from the north side of a sycamore.





Mental activity helps ward off Alzheimer's disease

The James Michener 700-page workout?

It may be more beneficial than you think. In addition to the pleasure we get from reading, mental aerobics just might help keep us from developing Alzheimer's disease.

A recent study in Shanghai, one of seven such inquiries being conducted worldwide, has shown that levels of education have a profound effect on the ravages of Alzheimer's disease and other forms of dementia that chiefly affect older people. The Chicago Tribune reported. After studying more than 5,000 Shanghai residents ages 55 to 75, researchers found that, all other factors being equal, the uneducated subjects of the study had twice the risk of dementia as those with elementary or middle-school education.

Harvard neuropsychologist Marilyn Albert, who conducted a study of elderly Bostonians, says "having more education means not only that you develop your brain when you're young, but that you use it more through your life, and that produces some sort of protective mechanism that helps keep the brain from developing Alzheimer's disease."

A unique study by University of Kentucky researcher David Snowdon is also focusing on the connection between educational and later-life mental functioning. For the past seven years, Snowdon has been studying the School Sisters of Notre Dame congregation, comparing disease and death rates of the more educated sisters to those of the less educated.

Initial studies focused on sisters of similar age who represented a broad range of function and health—from those who were confused and bedridden to those still holding full-time jobs in the community. The more highly educated sisters lived approximately

four years longer, with a good level of mental and physical functioning, than those who had less than a bachelor's degree. At every age, between 20 and 95, the less-educated sisters had twice the mortality rates of the more educated.

"One explanation for this might be that higher cognitive function is due in part to higher-educated people having jobs—as well as recreational activities—that keep them mentally alive," says Snowdon, who is working with a team of other scientists


at UK's Sanders-Brown Center on this study. "Another line of evidence is that people who have a rich vocabulary early in life end up having high mental function later in life." These results have been determined, Snowdon explains, from examining words used in autobiographies written at age 21 and mental function assessed 60 years later.

"We also looked at what the sisters were writing at age 21, then looked again at what they were writing 25 years later, at age 46," says Snowdon. "Those sisters who improved their vocabulary between ages 21 and 46 had better mental function at age 80."

"My suspicion is," he says, "that more highly educated people have better connected brain cells." Snowdon goes on to say that one explanation for these stronger connections in the brain is that more highly educated people might exercise their brains more and thus end up with an agile brain in old age.

In discussing the nature of brain cells and the ongoing Nun Study, Snowdon says there is no reason to believe that brain cells are any different than muscle cells. "There's a lot of good evidence to back up the idea of 'use it or lose it,'" he says. "The women in our study keep very intellectually active, whether it's reading, playing scrabble or watching Wheel of Fortune. They refuse to simply resign themselves to downward mental decline."

As I proceeded to fluff and fold, I became more and more engrossed in this movie.

Anderson's character was raped by a man she had dated only twice.

The rape resulted in the birth of a son that Anderson chose to raise by telling him his father was killed in an automobile accident, rather than have the child know his father was in prison for raping his mother.

Ten years later the man—released from prison—shows up and Anderson is in a courtroom fighting against joint custody.

Although this movie was fictional and the judge did rule joint custody with limited provisions, the statistics that rolled before the credits were astounding.

It blew me away to consider the thought that there are women in this world of ours who are rape victims, go through hell and back getting their rapist convicted, and end up pregnant, and if that's not enough, they end up having to share custody of a child they've chosen to keep regardless of the circumstances.

Sharing custody of children from divorce is hard enough without having to even consider one day sharing custody with someone who's raped you.

This movie really got to me. My heart was aching for all those women who may be experiencing that kind of torment.

Then on Sunday, we picked up a Lexington Herald-Leader. There on page J3 the headline read, "Rape victim offers lesson to other women."

The letter to Dear Ann (as in Ann Landers), told of how a woman in her early 30s, celebrating a promotion, had a party in her own apartment. The woman was raped, not once but twice, by a male friend who had asked if he could stay awhile after the other guests had left, because he had had a bit too much to drink.

She never told of the rape. Statistics say, "Twelve million American women have been raped at least once in their lives. National studies show that 15 percent to 25 percent of college women have been victims of date or acquaintance rape or attempted rape at some point in their lives."

According to the Bergen County Rape Crisis Center in New Jersey: "Rape is not a crime of lust, it is a crime of violence. No person provokes rape by acting or dressing in a particular manner. The rapist is not always a stranger. Nearly 75 percent of all rapes are committed by a friend, relative or acquaintance."

What an awful thing to happen to another human being.

But things like this do happen and not just on our television screens, or in a syndicated column. They happen here, too. They're just not reported a lot of the time and they don't make the paper then, either.

A while back I received a phone call from a lady who wanted me to write a column on her experience without giving any lead way to her identity.

My gut was tied in knots over what she'd gone through. I felt so darn inadequate. I wanted to be able to help her in some way and yet all she was asking for was a column on a certain subject, and for the life of me I couldn't do it. I couldn't write the first word.

I was terrified I'd say the wrong thing, or ever worse, do even more damage. So, I continued to write my own experiences, which were a whole lot easier.

There may not be any answers in this column. And at times, one may laugh or one may cry.

Requests are made often on different subjects and being one who likes to please, I'll give it a try.

Watching a fictional movie, and reading a few statistics made one request a little easier to write.

After all, the awareness that something of this nature happens, and happens right in our own back doors, is what was wanted in the first place.

It just took longer to write about it, and for that I apologize.

**Tragedy at Fourmile:
History leading to a
mining disaster**

Although the mountains of Eastern Kentucky are centuries old the history of the white man in the region dates back less than 250 years.

Dr. Thomas Walker and his band of five men documented the discovery of Cumberland Gap in 1750, before venturing deeper into and building the first log cabin in the area that is now Kentucky.

Daniel Boone and other longhunters came in ensuing years, followed by thousands of pioneers who settled Kentucky and beyond.

Isaac Shelby was a large landowner in Southeastern Kentucky and became the state's first governor when Kentucky was granted statehood in 1792. Much of his large farm, which included the area that became Fourmile, is now part of Bell County, Kentucky.

Abraham Lincoln's parents migrated through Cumberland Gap a

few years later. In the mid-1800's, while Lincoln was president, the armies of blue and gray marched along essentially the same roads during the War Between the States.

Bell County was little more than a wilderness until coal was discovered in the 1880's. The railroads followed and workers were needed to build them and to work the mines and timber, and to build houses, stores and shops.

In the mid-1890's entrepreneurs started mining the abundant coal seams near Pineville, Ky. Most of the workers were recruited from other states during the influx of workers into the region. A town sprang up four miles from Pineville and it took the name Four Mile.

The mine owners built houses, schools, and churches for the workers. The houses were rented to the miners with the rent deducted from their pay. The homes were heated by coal and their pay was debited the amount of the fuel. The families shopped for food, clothing and household needs at the company store and these charges, too, were deducted.

The miners received little pay after the deductions but not much was needed at home. They could charge most anything they needed at the company store against future wages. The miners and their families felt secure and were satisfied. Their homes were more comfortable than most, they ate well, and they had a decent standard of living.

Over the next several decades Fourmile became a rundown coal camp and by 1945 most of the houses were dilapidated and worn. William E. Lewis, the owner of the mine had little difficulty in finding workers, however. Residents in Bell County and throughout the mountain area have a long history of industriousness.

"They come up at the end of the day exhausted, cramped, blackened," Dr. E. L. McClurkan, pastor of the Presbyterian Church of Pineville, told a reporter for the Chicago Sun in 1946. "They get their pay envelopes every Saturday night. With nothing needed at home many of them gather with their fellow miners at their favorite bar and drink."

"I have a lot of empathy for these

men," McClurkan continued. "It is dark underground, and cold and wet. Men walk stooped and fear gnaws at them. Loneliness grows in their veins.

"But Saturday night brings freedom for them. Freedom from the grind, the danger, the discomfort, the stoop in the back, the coal dust in the pores of their skin—and the coal dust in the back of their throat—the loneliness, the dark, the cold."

Christmas of 1945 was a happy time in Fourmile. World War II had ended and the economy was showing signs of prosperity. Miners were starting to buy cars, radios, phonographs and other consumer goods.

Santa Claus arrived in 1945 bringing presents and cheer. For the most part there was no money left when the men reported for work the following day. Yet the families were secure in that they could charge most anything they needed at the company store. That is, as long as the head of the house continued working in the mines.

But tragedy struck early on the morning of December 26, 1945. An explosion rocked the mine at Fourmile leaving thirty-one miners trapped.

In the days that followed the attention of the entire nation focused on Fourmile.

Good morning, senior citizens! It's 7:30—well actually 7:27. I keep my watch set three minutes ahead, hoping this technique will get me to where I am suppose to be on time.

A few minutes ago, when I walked into the Kentucky Benefits Counseling Program's office for senior citizens, at Legal Services in Prestonsburg, I saw what I see every morning when I first turn on the lights—a tray of client files that have been started, and a stack of telephone messages from senior citizens needing help. A quick count indicated there are 37 folders in the tray—each one representative of someone needing help, and 15 telephone messages from people I don't know and haven't talked with yet. From notations written by the receptionists, it appears that most of these callers are reaching out to us, hoping that this program can assist them in meeting their personal needs—as diverse and critical as some may be.

It is evident that this program needs dedicated volunteers committed to serving senior citizens in Eastern Kentucky. With more volunteers, requests on my desk could be expedited, volunteer workers would be available to do outreach in the hills and hollows of Floyd, Johnson, Magoffin, Martin, and Pike counties, and volunteers could serve as public relations liaisons in communities where you live.

One day, not long ago, one of our volunteers came to the office and worked as faithfully as if she had punched a time clock with the expectation of being paid. I knew she was going to work with me on that particular day so I had eight client files ready to hand her. Upon her arrival we conferred on the needs of each client. I made recommendations on how she might best be able to assist in meeting each person's needs. She went to work, using my ideas and incorporating some of her own, taking time out only for lunch. At the end of the day she was discouraged. She had worked painstakingly, all

day, and was not able to fill the needs of even one senior citizen. She was able to fill some of the needs of some of the people, but not all of the needs of any of them. You see, some senior citizens may have only one need, but most have a multiplicity of needs.

And sometimes we cannot close the file of a person with only one need because of the nature of that need.

On my desk, right now, is a client folder that has been there since mid-March. We were able to find relief for this man in some areas, but we still haven't found him a wheelchair lift. Eventually, I might have to contact this senior citizen and say, "I'm sorry. I've exhausted every possibility I know of in an attempt to find you a lift. There seems to be none available for those who, like yourself, cannot afford one." I don't want to believe that. So I will keep trying. Maybe someday, somewhere I will learn of a place that provides wheelchair lifts for those deserving senior citizens who cannot afford to purchase one. If you know of such a place—private organization, or government-sponsored program, please give me a call at 886-3876 or toll-free 1-800-556-3876. This man desperately needs one. There may be others like him. I want to know where to turn to find help for people with this need. So far as I am concerned, this man's case is not closed. His folder remains on my desk, a constant reminder that we can't meet all of the needs of all of the people all the time. But the Benefits Counseling Program for Senior Citizens doesn't quit trying. We're here on your behalf to do what we can for you.

Volunteers are so important to this program and to the senior citizens it strives to serve. It takes a lot of time to do what we do. This is evidenced by the fact that one volunteer worked so hard all day and still was unable to fill the needs of a mere eight senior citizens who had reached out to us for help.

If you are interested in volunteering as little as only eight hours a month helping senior citizens in Eastern Kentucky please call me. Senior citizens throughout Appalachia need you.

Natural control targets yellow fever mosquitoes

A clogged drain or gutter on your house may be more than just another headache to clean. It can become home—at least in the South—for mosquitoes that can spread yellow fever and other diseases.

The yellow fever mosquito, *Aedes aegypti*, breeds in water that collects in clogged gutters, bird baths, old tires—anything that collects water in tropical or subtropical urban areas. Yellow fever is not found in this country, but the mosquito's presence leaves open the potential for the disease to come here.

Now U.S. Department of Agriculture scientists may change that. They are ready to begin field tests in Florida this spring on a natural, microscopic organism that—in laboratory studies—kills yellow fever mosquitoes.

It's difficult to kill these mosquitoes with insecticides. That's because these pests multiply in hard-to-reach places and have developed resistance to the chemicals.

Entomologist James Becnel of USDA's Agricultural Research Service gave this scenario of what the organism does, as an alternative to chemicals: once the organism infects the mosquito, its spores hitch a ride in the pest's eggs and are spread to succeeding generations, eventually weakening and killing the mosqui-

toes.

"We need the field tests to confirm the organism's potential use as a new mosquito control agent," said Becnel, based at the agency's Medical and Veterinary Entomology Research Lab in Gainesville, Florida.

These are the first outdoor tests in the United States of a foreign microorganism to control *A. aegypti*, which is found throughout the southeastern states. The biocontrol organism, *Edhazardia aedis*, is a protozoan-like organism called a microsporidium. Becnel said it infects the aquatic stages of *A. aegypti* mosquitoes.

"It is specific to mosquitoes and, in lab tests, *E. aedis* has had no long-term adverse effects on animals or beneficial insects such as honey bees," said Becnel.

Originally found in Puerto Rico in 1930, the mosquito-fighting organism was rediscovered in Thailand in 1979 and brought to the agency's Gainesville lab for study in 1985. Becnel has been researching the organism in the lab since the late 1980s.

A. aegypti mosquitoes transmit not only yellow fever but also dengue, a disease found in Asia, Africa, South America and other parts of the world, including the Caribbean.

Dalmatians

It's as American as a Norman Rockwell Post cover, apple pie or the Fourth of July—yet the odds are long that not even the average fireman can tell you why the Dalmatian has become the firehouse mascot.

You'll seldom see a firehouse without the familiar spotted dog, but how did it come to be?

It was developed in Dalmatia, a region of Croatia along the eastern coast of the Adriatic sea, from stock probably introduced to the area by the nomad Romanies (Gypsies). The region is a former Austrian crownland, and it is believed the dog was developed there as a guard dog.

Most Dalmatians stand from 19 to 23 inches tall at the shoulders, weigh from 35 to 50 pounds, have a deep chest with extraordinary lung capacity, a spotted tail, thin ears, sparkling eyes and a flat, broad skull. It has a white coat with black or dark brown spots, with an exceptional memory which gives it added value as a performing dog for circuses and stage shows.

Though said to be a good watchdog, hunting dog and pet, it apparently was originally bred to be a coach dog.

There are accounts dating back to the 1600s in which both French and British noblemen took them along when they took journeys by horse-drawn carriage. They were also used to guard mail coaches.

The dog sometimes hitched a ride beside the driver, but usually ran alongside or under the coach. It protected the travelers from highwaymen and robbers.

Once at the destination, many

noblemen left the dog to guard valuables in the carriage and some insisted the dogs were actually better guards than were their drivers.

They were preferred over other breeds of similar size because they liked to run and were not afraid of horses, traits which made it possible for them to become useful as firehouse dogs in the early part of this century, when fire engines were still pulled by horses.

Almost every fire house had a Dalmatian as a working member of the department.

Their new job, however, was not to guard the firemen but to run ahead of the fire engine, barking to let people know the wagon was coming and they should make way for it.

The introduction of the internal combustion engine, however, soon made obsolete the horse drawn fire engine and the Dalmatian along with it. Not only was it too dangerous for the dog to chase the new trucks, but it was redundant—the trucks had sirens.

So the working dogs were pensioned and spent the remainder of their lives as pets and mascots.

They had also become a tradition, and many firehouses today still keep them.

Of course there's no veterinary purpose to the above account, except to explain that any veterinarian could have told you the history of the breed and how it may or may not relate to the qualities you may want in a pet.

If you're choosing a pet, you might find it wise to ask a veterinarian for advice. He or she can tell you the traits and qualities of the various animals, give you some idea of the expense they will be, tell you about local laws which may or may not affect you regarding the pet and give you some idea of what to expect with the animal.

Matching funds are available for marketing ag products

The 1994 Market Promotion Program is offering matching funds for companies marketing value-added agricultural products under a brand name. The MPP assists U.S. companies in exporting their agricultural products by sharing the cost of marketing and promotional activities.

U.S. produced branded foods, beverages, seafood, food supplements, pet food and intermediate products are eligible. The products must be at least 50 percent US agricultural origin by weight, excluding added water and packaging and may not be covered by another Foreign Agricultural Service cooperator, export incentive program or state export program.

Eligible activities include advertising, production of promotional materials, trade shows and in-store merchandising, to name a few.

The application deadline is September 15, 1994. A \$200 fee is due at the time of application. In addition, an assessment fee of 4 percent of the approved MPP funding level is required when the contract is signed. The application fee will be applied to the assessment fee.

The minimum request is \$5,000 per company, and no company shall receive a grant of more than \$270,000.

Is Your Child Ready For School?

State law requires all students to have on file at school certain records.

Entrance Requirements:

Pre-School, Headstart and Kindergarten (3-year-old special needs, 4-year-old special needs and income eligible)

1. Children attending kindergarten must be 5 years old by October 1, 1994.
2. Must have an official birth certificate. (Must be full size.)
3. Valid Kentucky immunization certificate.
4. Medical examination (KDE approved form 1671-410).
5. Tuberculin Test Certificate (CH-91A).

These items must be completed and proper certificate for each item submitted to the school principal on the opening day of school.

6th Grade

1. A second dose of MMR (Measles, Mumps and Rubella) immunization. (Immunization certificate must list all shot dates.)
2. A physical examination.

High School

Td-vaccination needed in high school when immunization certificate has expired.

The New American Burger from the American Institute for Cancer Research

Burgers, a staple in most family menus, are taking on a new look. For people who are trying to reduce the amount of fat in their diets, or are simply ready for a change, other ground meats offer an escape from the same old hamburger grind.

Ground chicken, pork, veal and turkey (even lean ground beef), can do just about everything that regular ground beef does. Because they contain little fat, however, lean ground meats need special handling and cooking methods that are different from regular ground beef.

Lean meats tend to dry out unless other ingredients are added to help keep the meat particles moist and separate. All ground meals should be mixed gently and handled as little as possible.

For a taste of Thanksgiving in August, make low-fat turkey burgers with cranberry sauce and stuffing. Mix together 1/3 cup plain low-fat yogurt, 1 egg and 3/4 cup herb-seasoned stuffing mix and let stand until moistened. Stir in 1/2 cup each of finely chopped onion and parsley, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Add 1 pound ground turkey, mix gently and form into six patties. Cook through and top with cranberry sauce before serving.

Pork burgers take on a Polynesian flair when mixed with finely chopped water chestnuts and green onion, 1/2 teaspoon each ground ginger and salt and 2 tablespoons each teriyaki baste and pineapple juice. Broil, basting with more teriyaki and pineapple juice, and serve with a pineapple ring.

THE NEW AMERICAN BURGER

Some burgers don't require any meat at all. You can make delicious Southern Bean Burgers by mashing 2 cups of cooked black-eyed peas and mixing with chopped onion, a lightly beaten egg, 1/4 teaspoon each salt and pepper, 2 tablespoons catsup, 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce and 3 tablespoons flour. Cook until well browned, firm to the touch, and no longer gooey when cut into with a sharp knife.

Applesauce and Worcestershire sauce give a marvelous flavor to extra lean beef or turkey burgers. Top with mustard, serve on whole-grain rolls or bread, and round out the meal with fresh vegetables.

APPLESAUCE BURGERS

1 lb. extra-lean ground beef or ground turkey
1/3 cup wheat bran
1/3 cup unsweetened applesauce
1 egg
1 1/2 tps. Worcestershire sauce
1 Tbsp. onion, chopped
1/4 tsp. pepper
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a large bowl, combine all the ingredients, mixing lightly by hand. Form into four patties, place on ungreased baking sheet, and bake for 45 minutes, or until juice runs clear when burgers are pricked with a fork.

Each of the four servings contains 90 calories and 4 to 5 grams of fat.

PIZZA BURGERS

1 lb. ground beef
1 medium onion, diced
1 4 oz. pkg. cheddar cheese
1 tsp. Parmesan cheese
1/4 tsp. oregano
1 can pizza sauce
Mozzarella cheese, sliced
Brown ground beef and onion. Drain off grease and put meat and onion in saucepan. Add cheeses, oregano and pizza sauce. Simmer until cheese is melted. Put on hamburger buns and place slice of mozzarella cheese on top. Put in oven at 350° until cheese is melted.

SALAD BURGERS

1 head iceberg lettuce
1 lb. lean ground beef
8 strips bacon, crispy
4 slices (1 oz. each) cheddar cheese

tomato slices
cucumber slices
carrot slices
Preheat broiler. Cut lettuce crosswise into 1 inch thick slices. Place 1

lettuce slice on each of 4 serving plates. Shape beef into 4 patties, broil until desired degree of doneness, turning once. Remove from oven and top each patty with 2 strips of bacon and a slice of cheese. Broil 2 to 3 minutes longer or until cheese is bubbly. Place on lettuce slices and garnish with vegetables.

TURKEY BARBEQUE

2 cups tomato-vegetable juice
1 cup diet cola
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
1 tablespoon bottled hot sauce
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
1 teaspoon garlic salt
2 cups cooked turkey breast meat, shredded
8 hamburger buns
cole slaw (optional)

In large saucepan, over high heat, bring vegetable juice to boil. Reduce heat to low and simmer juice down to half. Stir in cola, mustard, hot sauce, Worcestershire sauce and garlic salt; simmer 2 to 3 minutes to combine well. Add turkey to sauce mixture and simmer 15 minutes.

To serve, spoon approximately 1/3 cup turkey barbecue on bottom half of each bun, top with cole slaw (if desired) and remaining bun halves.

NOTE: Recipe may be cooked in slow cooker.

TURKEY BURGERS

1 pound ground turkey
1 egg, slightly beaten
1/2 cup plain bread crumbs
4 pimento olives, chopped
1 tablespoon fresh parsley, minced
1 garlic clove, minced
1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg
2 1/2 tablespoons sour cream
4 hamburger buns
8 slices cucumber
4 tablespoons crumbled Feta cheese

Preheat charcoal grill for direct-heat cooking.

In medium bowl combine turkey, egg, bread crumbs, olives, parsley, garlic, cinnamon and nutmeg. Evenly divide turkey mixture into 4 burgers, approximately 3 1/2-inches in diameter.

Grill burgers 5 to 6 minutes per side until meat thermometer reaches 160 to 165 degrees F. in center of burger and meat is no longer pink.

To serve, spread 2 teaspoons sour cream on each bottom half of bun. Place a turkey burger on each bun, top each with 2 cucumber slices, 1 tablespoon Feta cheese and top with remaining half of bun.

DIRECT-HEAT GRILLING

Remove top grill rack; open all vents. Mound 40-50 briquettes in center of low grill rack or bottom of grill and ignite briquettes. When coals become ash-gray (about 20-40 minutes), spread them evenly over lower grill rack or bottom of grill. Lightly grease top grill rack and re-position it over hot coals; place turkey on grill rack.

OLD FASHIONED STACK CAKE

7-8 c. plain flour
1 stick margarine, softened
1 lb. box light brown sugar
1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. apple pie spice
1 egg
1 c. buttermilk

After sifting flour (you won't use it all) into a large mixing bowl, make a well in the flour. Put in the margarine, sugar, salt, soda, spice, egg and buttermilk. Work into the flour by hand until dough is slightly stiff. Divide dough into 8 equal portions (about the size of a small teacup), knead on a floured board, then press into greased and floured 9 inch cake pans. Bake layers in 400 degree oven about 10 minutes (until brown). Sift unused flour back into storage container.

Filling:

4 c. fresh or canned applesauce or sauce made from cooked dried apples, 1 teaspoon apple pie spice and sweetened to taste.

Stack up layers with the applesauce between each layer. Do not put applesauce on top layer. It's best to stack layers while they are slightly warm, and if allowed to age a day or so in a tight container.

PINEAPPLE CASSEROLE

1/4 lb. butter
5 slices bread (crust removed) cut in cubes
1 can (#2 1/2) crushed pineapple with syrup
1 c. granulated sugar
3 Tbsp. flour
3 eggs, well beaten
Brown the bread cubes in butter. Mix pineapple, sugar, flour and eggs. Pour into a buttered 2 quart glass baking dish. Sprinkle buttered bread cubes over top. Bake uncovered in a 350 degree oven for 30 minutes.

COCONUT PECAN DELIGHT

1 1/2 c. flour
1/2 c. melted butter
1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened
1 pkg. vanilla flavor instant pudding
1 c. chopped pecans
2 2/3 c. flaked coconut
3 c. cold milk
1 (8 oz.) container whipped topping

Combine flour, 1/2 cup of the pecans and the butter and mix until flour is moistened. Press evenly into bottom of 13 x 9 inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees for about 15 minutes. Cool. Toast remaining pecans and 2/3 cup of the coconut on baking sheet at 325 degrees about 5 minutes until lightly browned. Beat cream cheese until very soft. Gradually add 1/2 cup of the milk and blend until smooth. Add remaining milk and the pudding mix. Beat on low speed about 2 minutes. Stir in remaining coconut and pour over baked crust. Spread whipped top-

ping evenly over pudding. Sprinkle with toasted coconut and pecans. Chill at least 2 hours.

TURKEY TERIYAKI BURGERS

1 pound ground turkey
1/2 cup finely chopped water chestnuts
1/2 teaspoon onion salt
1/4 teaspoon black pepper
2 tablespoons teriyaki sauce
1 tablespoon sesame seeds, toasted, divided
1/4 cup plum preserves
4 hamburger buns

In large bowl combine turkey, water chestnuts, onion salt, pepper, teriyaki sauce and 2 teaspoons sesame seeds. Evenly divide turkey mixture into four burgers, each approximately 1/2-inch thick.

On broiling pan, 3 to 4 inches from heat, broil burgers 3 to 4 minutes per side or until turkey is no longer pink in center.

In small saucepan, over low heat, combine preserves and remaining 1 teaspoon sesame seeds. Heat until preserves are melted.

To serve, place a burger on bottom half of each bun, drizzle sauce over each burger and top each with other half of bun.

Alcohol and boating: get the facts

The facts are in, and they prove conclusively that it is extremely dangerous to drink alcoholic beverages, even in small amounts, while operating or riding as a passenger on a boat.

Liquor is quicker

The well-known ability of alcohol to impair performance creates an even more hazardous situation when added to the stress of the marine environment. The motion, vibration and engine noise of boating combined with sun, wind and spray, accelerates the impairment caused by alcohol. Fatigue results and the operator's coordination, judgment, and reaction time are reduced.

Tests have proven one-third of the amount of alcohol that makes a person legally impaired on the road is enough to make a person equally impaired on the water. Alcohol can be more treacherous for boaters since they are less experienced and less confident on the water than on the highway. Recreational boaters do not have the advantage of experiencing daily operation of a boat.

In fact, boaters average only



about 110 hours of boating in an entire year. And in areas with seasonal boating, there can be months between boating outings or fishing trips.

Passengers beware

Alcohol, like a rocking boat, is noted for affecting equilibrium. Together they could result in "people overboard." Last year alone, falls overboard contributed to 431 accidents. Falls within the boat contributed to another 167 accidents.

Effects of alcohol consumption

Add the stress of boating to the usual results of alcohol consumption, and a truly perilous condition results. Drink-

ing alcohol produces certain physiological responses that directly affect safety and well-being.

- Judgment and skill deteriorate, affecting peripheral vision, balance and the ability to process information.

- Physical performance and reaction time are reduced.

- Alcohol reduces depth perception, night vision, focus and the ability to distinguish colors.

- Alcohol consumption can result in inner ear disturbance which can make it impossible for a person suddenly immersed in water to distinguish up from down.

- Because alcohol creates a sense of warmth, a person in cold water may not feel the

need to get out of the water before hypothermia sets in.

BWI is illegal nationwide

It is unlawful in every state to operate a boat while under the influence of alcohol or drugs. In addition to state boating while intoxicated (BWI) laws, there is also a federal law prohibiting BWI. This law applies to all boats in U.S. waters.

Penalties are severe

The Coast Guard and every state have stringent penalties for violation of BWI laws. These penalties include the possibility of a large fine, suspension or revocation of operator privileges and a jail

term. States have authority to enforce their own BWI statutes. Within state waters that are also subject to U.S. jurisdiction, there is concurrent jurisdiction.

Steps toward prevention

Because operating a boat while under the influence of alcohol is so dangerous, the Coast Guard is using a three-fold approach to reducing alcohol-related accidents.

1. Improved law enforcement in cooperation with the states.

2. An improved accident reporting system to identify alcohol-related accidents.

3. Widespread education and public awareness of the

dangers of alcohol. Every boater, whether an operator or passenger, should cooperate in spreading the word.

Boating safety education

Throughout the country each year, over 2,000 safe boating courses are offered by groups such as the U.S. Power Squadrons, the American Red Cross and individual states. Courses cover many aspects of boating safety—from boat handling to reading the weather. All courses include information on finding a course near you that will fit your schedule. Traveling with your huntin' dog

Traveling with dogs isn't easy. Traveling with hunting dogs, which tend to be excitable, can be even more of a challenge. Since you and your dog are accustomed to hunting together, it makes sense that you would want to take him on your long hunting trips.

The following are tips on traveling with your dog, either by car or by plane, and how to avoid some of the pitfalls experienced by hunters.

1. Plan ahead. If you'll be staying in hotels, find out which ones will let you keep pets. If you're driving, plan your route accordingly so you can make reservations in advance.

If driving, it's best to take your dog on a few short trips before loading him up for a long one. This will allow him to get used to traveling in a car. Note: Feed your dog about half of what you would normally give him before you embark on a trip. This will give his stomach a chance to get used to the feel of the road. Otherwise things could

get messy!

2. Have your dog "kennel" trained. Whether you're traveling by a car or by plane, your dog should be trained to enter a kennel or cage on demand. This will make the trip less stressful for you and your dog.

3. Have your dog vet-checked before you leave. Be sure to have all the appropriate paperwork if you're crossing state lines or leaving the country.

4. Bring items familiar to your dog. A favorite toy, your dog's own water and food bowls—these are items that will help your dog feel secure even though he's moving from place to place.

5. Stop to exercise your dog frequently. If you are traveling by car it is important to stop frequently for walks and bathroom breaks. Some vets suggest rest areas as the best place to stop, as many have areas for pets.

6. Take bottled water. Although you can usually find water for your dog, it's best to play it safe and take a supply of your own. It's no fun having a sick or dehydrated dog on your hands, so the more precautions, the better!

Your dog will appreciate your forethought, which will no doubt make his trip more comfortable. Then you can get down to the real business at hand, which is, after all, to go hunting!

Fish Hook Removal Made Quick and Easy

Any fishing trip can be spoiled if a hook accidentally becomes embedded in an ear, arm, leg or hand. Hook injuries are a common problem for anglers.

Since it could happen to you, it's mandatory that you learn how to remove hooks as quickly as possible, according to the fishing experts at Mariner Outboards. The relatively simple procedure can be done utilizing items readily available.

All you need is a short piece of fishing line to extract the hook. By applying ice cubes, the skin can be numbed. The technique described below will remove the hook with minimal pain.

The illustrations show the step-by-

step removal process.

STEP 1. First, remove the hook from the lure. Make a loop with the line; tie ends securely. Place the loop around the back of your wrist and run the remaining line between your thumb and forefinger.

STEP 2. Place the loop over the eye of the hook and snug it against the bend of the hook, as shown. With your thumb, apply pressure firmly on the eye of the hook. This steadies it and aligns

the barb with the entry hole. When you push down on the hook eye, the wound will spread open and the barb won't tear much skin or tissue when it comes out.

STEP 3. While maintaining downward pressure on the hook, quickly jerk the loop. The hook should pop out quickly. If an antiseptic is available, rinse the cut, cover with a bandage, and go back fishing.

Electric worm probe ruled dangerous to people

A weekend of fishing could turn deadly if you use an electric "worm probe" to gather fishing bait.

Worm probes are devices that use electrical current to shock earthworms to the soil surface. According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), since 1971 at least 28 people have been killed while using or standing near worm probes. Most of the fatalities were children.

CPSC has found that "Worm Gett'rs," a type of probe made by P&M Enterprises, use full-line voltage—110 to 120 volts—and pose an electrocution hazard to those who use them or stand nearby. CPSC urges owners of the probes to discontinue use immediately and to destroy the products.

About 30,000 P&M Worm Gett'rs have been sold by catalog and in retail stores nationwide since 1983. The probes consist of thin steel shafts that are inserted into unfinished wood handles. A small number were sold with a P&M rubber name tag hanging from the probe. The probe shafts are connected with 20 inches of 14-gauge insulated wire. One end of the wire is connected to an electrical plug that is inserted in an electrical outlet. (Worm Gett'rs were

sold as two-probe, six-probe and 12-probe models. They sold for about \$8, \$19 and \$27, respectively.)

The P&M Company has gone out of business, so CPSC urges consumers to stop using the worm probes immediately and to destroy them.

CPSC is the federal agency responsible for consumer products safety. CPSC is warning the public about this hazard as part of its mission to protect the public from unreasonable risks of injury and death associated with consumer products.

Let it go— Let it grow!

A few helpful hints
on releasing fish

- Play a fish as rapidly as possible. Do not exhaust a fish by playing it too long.
- Keep a fish in the water as much as possible when handling and removing the hook.
- Handle the fish gently. Do not squeeze a fish or put your fingers in its gills or eyes.
- Cut the line when a fish is deeply hooked. Barbless hooks are easier to remove.
- Revive a stressed fish by holding it upright in the water and moving it back and forth to force water past its gills.



Save your dog from the heat

Your dog is as prone to heat exhaustion as you are, and hunting in the heat can cause your dog serious problems. The worst part is, he can't convey his discomfort in words, so it's up to you to anticipate problems before they arise.

It's wise to start a hot hunting day with a light meal, about half of what you would normally feed him. You don't want him to feel sick in the heat, and you can feed him healthy snacks (kibble, biscuits, or dried, unflavored sausage) along the way if he becomes hungry.

Staying well hydrated is as important for your dog as it is for you, only more difficult. Your dog runs much faster and farther than you, taking up to 15 steps for every one of yours. (He's often off flushing birds and retrieving while you wait silently.)

Bringing a canteen of cool water will help avoid problems. It's wise to bring a receptacle from which your dog can drink, (tin foil makes a handy water dish in a pinch) but you'll also want to bring enough to splash on his belly if there are no streams for him to cool himself down.

Rest periods are also im-

portant. You should stop and rest your dog ten minutes out of each half-hour hunting session. Two five-minute breaks would be ideal, but if your dog is wide-ranging, that can be difficult.

Don't let him eat too soon after you finish your hunt. A half hour of brushing and pulling burdock off of him will be relaxing and will allow his system to slow down. Since dogs eat very quickly, it's important to give him this time to unwind so you don't upset his system.

When you are ready to feed him, start with half his normal ration. Give him the other half if he finishes quickly and seems to be looking for more. Then take a short walk so he can relieve himself, give him a few more pats, and you're on your way home.

Hunting with your children

Teaching your kids to hunt can be a rewarding experience for both of you. With the right preparation and planning, daughters and sons can learn the joys of hunting, and you can gain an enthusiastic hunting companion in the process.

The best way to start your kids on the road to responsible hunting is to familiarize them with gun safety. These are the most important lessons you can teach them. Children should also learn the components of their guns and should be adept at caring for and cleaning them.

If your children are going to hunt, it's important to get them guns of their own. An ill-fitting gun will cause discomfort and awkwardness and can make the experience of shooting less enjoyable. Although most .22-caliber rifles and airguns are made for kids, larger guns will have to be cut down. This is best left to a professional since cutting a rifle too short can put the scope too close to the child's face.

Once your children are familiar with guns, it's best to sign them up for training programs. Learning to shoot skeet will help them develop target skills, and groups like 4-H, Boy Scouts and the NRA offer youth programs for hunter marksmanship.

When your children are adept at gun safety and marksmanship, it's time to head into the field. Now, this is the part of the experience you've been waiting for!

Children are naturally curious and should be encouraged to help you search out deer and other wild animals. Your encouragement of them, whether they shoot anything or not, is imperative.

Remember in the early stages to let them hunt. Your role is to introduce them to hunting, not hunt for them. They'll need to make their own mistakes (unless they're safety-related) and figure things out for themselves. Hopefully, they'll enjoy it as much as you do and become avid hunters themselves, which would be a winning situation for all of you.

Oops! I forgot to pack my...

Ever gone on a hunting trip and forgotten your rifle? How about leaving your best rod and reel by the back door when you embark on a fishing trip?

Most packing errors aren't so blatant, but it seems that most people forget something when leaving on a trip, an occurrence that is exacerbated when the trip is into nature.

Bring a spare everything

If your gun or rod fails or becomes broken or lost, do you have a backup with you? The loss of one of these items could ruin a hunting or fishing trip, and packing a second is an easy way to prevent frustration.

It is also wise to pack more shells, lines, and flies than you think you'll need. Better safe than sorry is the name of this game!

Things you know better than to forget

(but might forget anyway)

- Rifle or rod and reel. These seem obvious, but when you're concerning yourself with so many small items it's easy to forget the obvious ones.

- Hunting/fishing license. If traveling out of state, be aware that some areas require you get permits and licenses in advance. Other areas simply require that you bring your active license with you so they

can issue you a new one upon your arrival.

- Hunting boots/waders. These are must-haves for any trip. An old pair of sneakers or other improper shoes can be soaked in a matter of minutes.

Creature comforts

There are some things you just can't find in the wild, which is part of why you're going there. However, there are a few items that most hunters and fishers wish for and miss... the first being toilet paper. Another often missed item is a pillow. If you're staying in a hotel, this probably won't be a problem, but if you're sleeping outdoors it can mean the difference between a good night's sleep and a stiff neck.

Be prepared: The Swiss Army knife approach to hunting and fishing

As usual, the Swiss Army Knife comes in as the most important item you can pack. It can get you out of many potential disasters. Some other items you may need are:

- Rain gear. (Just because it's sunny when you leave doesn't mean it's going to stay that way. With all due respect to weather reporters, be prepared for all conditions!)
- Sun Screen. Summer or winter, this can save your face and hands.

- Gloves, hat, scarves, and long johns, even in June! (You'd be amazed at the summer storm stories.)

- A first-aid kit. This should include bandages, disinfectant, an Ace Bandage, and any other items you think you might need.

Carry-on baggage

If you're traveling by plane, items that are fragile or hard to replace should be packed as carry-on baggage. These include cameras, binoculars and any prescription drugs you are taking.

Guns and rifles should be shipped in hard cases and must be declared. If you don't declare them, you run the risk of losing them and incurring hefty fines. Not a good way to start or end any trip.

Things you might not think of

The following is a list of things you might not think of but that could make a world of difference on your trip.

- Flashlight
- Needle and thread/safety pins
- Water purifying tablets
- Boot laces

Of course, the easiest way to decide what you need is to sit down in a quiet place and make a list. Don't do this while you are packing; do it well in advance. It's the best insurance that you'll remember the majority of the things you'll be needing!



Look before you shoot

As the hunting season approaches, we're reminded of the beauty of the outdoors and the fresh, crisp air that accompanies fall. It's a time when we look forward to marching through the woods, hunting with friends, family members, and yes, our trusty hounds.

As you're pulling hunting gear together and doing safety checks on your equipment this year, it's important to remember that safety doesn't stop with the hardware. A complete review of safety precautions is always wise.


The first and most important lesson of hunting is not to fire at anything that isn't perfectly clear. Moving objects may be birds or deer, but they might also be dogs or humans. Even if you've shot a target once and downed it, make sure you have the animal in full view before you fire again.

If you do shoot a target and it goes down, make sure you know the whereabouts of your dog and the rest of your hunting party before firing another shot. More than one family pet has been lost because it went after a fallen target and was mistakenly shot by its owner.

All members of your hunting party should be wearing an easily identifiable color (preferably blaze-orange) to differentiate them from the animals. If you hunt with a dog, it's a good idea to put a colorful vest on him or her too.

Last, don't hunt in diminished light. It's difficult enough to see targets in broad daylight, but fading light and multiple shadows throw in an added degree of difficulty. Remember, when the sun starts to dim, it's time to go in.

These breed of dogs can hunt

Hunting dogs, like hunters, come in all shapes, sizes, and abilities. Labradors, Chesapeakes, and goldens make excellent retrievers; setters and pointers are fast and wide ranging; and spaniels are the ultimate flushing dogs. So how do you choose a dog that's right for you? A quick look at some of their differences will help you narrow the choices down.

Pointing dogs

Pointing dogs are excellent hunters, and there is a wide range to choose from when looking for bird-dog qualities. The most well-known of this breed is the Pointer, which leads all pointing dogs in both field trials and the hunting field. The Pointer was originally used for horseback trials and has the speed and stamina to be a wide range dog. Most hunters today, however, hunt on foot, so the Pointer is being shaped into a medium- to close-range dog.

Other popular pointing dogs include the English Setter, which tends to range closer than the pointer, the German Shorthair, a multi-talented dog that was bred for pointing and retrieving, the

Weimaraner, another multi-purpose German dog with separate, distinctive markings, and the Brittany Spaniel, which is the smallest of the pointing breeds but the easiest to train.

Flushing dogs

The English Springer Spaniel is the preeminent flushing dog with its heavy bone structure and webbed feet for swimming or working in soft mud. The beauty of Springer Spaniels is their eagerness to please their masters in the field and their gentle dispositions in the home, making them wonderful all-around dogs.

Cocker Spaniels, which used to be favorable as hunting dogs, have been extensively in-bred and are now used primarily as show dogs and pets.

Retrievers

Retrievers are popular dogs both in the field and at home. The Labrador Retriever is by far the most popular upland bird dog in America. Labs have an affinity for the water, which led them to be used as waterfowl retrievers, a trait they are widely known for today.

Labs do get competition from other retriever breeds, however, including the Golden Retriever. Goldens are easily recognizable by their beautiful coats, but are as well-known for their excellent noses and superior intelligence. Chesapeake Bay Retrievers, probably related to the Labrador, are excellent water dogs. They have an incredible love of the water, ever water that is cold and rough.

Choosing a dog that's right for you

More and more often, tra-

ditional hunting dogs are being bred for the show ring. Therefore, it is important to look for hunting dogs that come from good hunting stock. For example: the Golden Retriever is a fine dog when it comes to retrieving game and flushing birds, but their silky coats have made them attractive for the home as well. Many more go home as pets these days than head out on the hunt, so it's important to buy from a sire and dam that were good hunters, not just wonderful pets.



Fishing with natural bait

Fishing with natural bait just seems...natural. When you consider over three-fourths of all fish caught in the United States are caught with natural bait, it makes you wonder what people are using besides the worms we all used as kids.

The answer is, plenty of things. Fishers are using everything from the traditional worms and baitfish to salmon eggs and clams.

Worms

Worms are what most of us grew up using for bait. They're abundant, easy to find, and easy to keep. Some of the types of worms used for fishing include the nightcrawler, manure worm and angleworm. Worms (and leeches, which are sometimes used interchangeably) are accepted as a rare treat by many types of fish, but are particularly successful in catching walleyes, sunfish, perch, and certain types of bass.

Baitfish

Minnows are the most common baitfish used in fresh waters, but they're certainly not the only ones. Shiners, crappies, and eels are also commonly used. You want your baitfish to be lively on the line; a colorful sheen is helpful but not necessary. Surprisingly, the sex of your bait can attract some fish, especially during mating season when males become more colorful. Some fish, like the catfish, rely on their taste and smell sensors to find food, so oily bait like smelt and shad are attractive.

Bait fish are effective in

catching most kinds of fish, including walleyes (who tend to go for shiners), pike or muskies (who prefer perch, smelt, and suckers), bass, salmon, catfish, and panfish. Remember when fishing for panfish that they require small bait (generally not more than two inches long).

Insects

Insects are also used in catching freshwater fish. Many insects used for fishing actually live in the water. These insects are used by fishermen when they are larvae, or immature insects.


The aquatic insects have tiny gills and will not grow wings until they become adults and head for land. Some examples are mayflies, dragonflies, and stoneflies.

Land-based insects are also used for bait. These include grubs, maggots, grasshoppers, and caterpillars. They're not usually found at bait shops and must be collected on your own, making them more difficult to find but just as effective, especially with fish like trout and panfish.

Other options

Some of the more unusual bait include frogs and salamanders, which are particularly attractive to large gamefish; crustaceans such as shrimp, crayfish, and scuds, which have a strong odor and attract fish through smell; and salmon or trout eggs, which emit a milkish substance with a scent that attracts other fish.

When choosing a bait, you can see that almost anything goes. So be creative and try something new. You never know what you'll catch!

Nation loves wildlife

Despite the nation's urban and suburban sprawl, wildlife-related recreation continues to be popular with more than half the population, early results of a federal survey show.

The findings, reported by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, show hunting, fishing and bird watching to be favorite pastimes.

Fishing remained a favorite, with nearly 35 million anglers at least 16 years old spending an average of 14.5 days each fishing during 1991, the survey year.

Hunting drew 14 million Americans 16 and older for an average of 17 days each during the year. Of those, 11 million stalked big game such as deer and elk, while 7.5 million pursued small game such as squirrels and rabbits. The remainder hunted other prey such as migratory birds, raccoons and woodchucks.

Over 76 million adults pre-

ferred to just watch, and they participated in activities such as feeding and observing wildlife. Wildlife photographers numbered 17 million.

Another 15.6 million people visited parks or natural areas to enjoy wildlife, and almost 14 million maintained plantings or natural areas to benefit wildlife.

The survey, conducted by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, was paid for through excise taxes on sporting arms, ammunition, fishing equipment, pleasure boats and motorboat fuels.

Comparisons with the last national survey, in 1985, are difficult because of survey changes made to discourage exaggerated reporting. However, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service reports that other information sources indicate a relatively steady level of participation in hunting and fishing nationwide since the last survey.

Tips For Easy Fish Filleting

Free Guide Available

There's more than one way to fillet a fish. Just ask any three fishermen! So, Buck Knives doesn't claim that this is the *only* way. However, Buck does offer these tips when using any of their fixed-blade fish fillet knives or "FishLocker" folding fillet knife.

1. Grip the head of the fish firmly and cut down to the spine — but *not* through it.

2. Guiding your knife parallel to the side of the fish, cut along the spine to the tail. Without cutting the side slab from the tail, flop the slab away from the head, as shown.

3. To remove the rib section, insert the blade close to the rib bones, then slice away that entire section. Do this before removing the skin.

4. Remove the skin from the fillet by inserting your knife at the tail and cutting the meat from the skin. Start your cut about 1/2 inch from the tail end of the skin. Turn the fish over and repeat this same procedure.



Everyone can enjoy camp

Camp is not a limiting experience. Types of camps vary, from summer-long camps to day-only camps. What's most important is finding the right camp for your child or your family.

Resident camp

Children stay for extended periods from five days to eight weeks. They sleep overnight in cabins, tents, teepees or another form of shelter and participate in a variety of supervised activities.

Day camp

Many offer a variety of programs for children ages five to 15. Most are coed and their programs are similar to resident camps without sleeping quarters. Campers are usually transported, often by bus or van, to the facility each morning and returned home in the late afternoon.

Travel and trip camp

Participants in trip programs move themselves to sites by hiking, horseback, canoeing or other self-propelled means. They usually stay in group campsites in national and state parks, or other outdoor surroundings. Participants carry tents and sleeping bags with them.

At travel camps, groups

are transported by car or bus to explore geographic and topographic places of interest.

Persons with disabilities

While camps provide facilities and services for a broad range of children, there are some that provide specialized services for persons with disabilities.

Contact the American Camping Association or one of your local social service agencies, such as the United Way, Easter Seal Society, etc., for programs in your area.

Session lengths can vary

Camp can fit within any

family's busy schedule. Sessions run anywhere from five days to a full eight-week session. Some facilities are in operation year-around and others offer special seasonal programs throughout the year.

Cost of camp

Camp remains a very affordable option for anyone—regardless of their background or where they live. Fees vary, but range from \$15 to \$55 per day for programs operated by nonprofit agencies, youth groups, or public agencies. Independently run camps cost between \$35 and \$80 per day.

Choose camps with accreditation to be safe

When you choose a camp accredited by the American Camping Association, you have assurance that many important questions already have been answered. These questions have been developed by professionals over a period of many years. They are questions the average person might not think of, but ones camp professionals feel are important to camp operation.

The accredited camp logo...the mark of distinction

The American Camping Association accreditation logo indicates that a camp's management is committed to operating in agreement with the highest standards established for camp professionals.

What does it mean if a camp is not accredited?

Accreditation is a voluntary program. Owners or directors of camps choose whether or not they wish to participate in the accreditation program. There are camps that may have fine reputations that choose not to be accredited. There are other camps that choose not to meet ACA standards or whose site or practices do not meet ACA requirements.

Fifteen percent of camps visited for accreditation annually do not meet minimum requirements and must make improvements or changes before accreditation is granted.

Does accreditation mean a camp is safety-approved?

Accreditation clearly signals the camp director's interest in the health and safety of campers. It also demonstrates the willingness of the camp administration to allow outside reviewers to observe the camp's programs and operations in light of standards that have been well-researched and evaluated by camp professionals.

Safety, of course, can never be guaranteed. How-

ever, families can be assured that accredited camps have voluntarily demonstrated a willingness to educate themselves about the standards of the industry and evaluate their own operations against those standards.


