## Another \$1 million is secured by Rogers

One of the final pieces of the funding puzzle for the development in Prestonsburg of a Mountain Arts Center was put in place Thursday by Congressman Hal Rogers.

Rogers said Thursday that a second \$1 million grant from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has been approved by the House of Representatives, with concurrence expected soon from the Senate. A similar grant was approved by the SBA last year.

Funding was included for the project, which could be under construction in a matter of weeks, in the 1995 appropriations bill for the U.S. departments of Commerce, Justice, State and the Judiciary.

"This is an important jobs project for Eastern Kentucky," Rogers said. "It will help attract more tourists to our area who want to learn more about our mountain heritage..."

The funds will also help bring the project back up to its original scope by allowing the construction of a recording studio at the facility. The studio had been trimmed from construction plans and proposed as an alternate because of funding restrictions.

"Now we can build it," Kentucky Opry board treasurer Bob Meyer said Thursday.

"Hal Rogers pulled a proverbial rabbit out of the hat," Meyer added. "People wonder how a Republican congressman can get line items passed in a Democratic Congress. I don't know how he got it, but I'm glad he did."

The Mountain Arts Center, to be built on Route 114, will cover 50,000 square feet and include a 1,000 seat theatre, classrooms for music and arts instruction and will also serve as the home of the Kentucky Opry.

## Open house is set for new senior center

McDowell senior citizens will host dedication and open house ceremonies at their new senior citizens center, located in the Viola Bailey Memorial Community Building, Sunday, August 21, from 2-6 p.m.

Speakers for the event include Senator Benny Ray Bailey, Representative Greg Stumbo, and Dr. Mary Hall, president of the McDowell senior citizen's board of directors. Elder Woodrow Pack will give the invocation.

McDowell senior citizens have been meeting in the new building since July 1. They previously met in the McDowell First Baptist Church luncheon room.

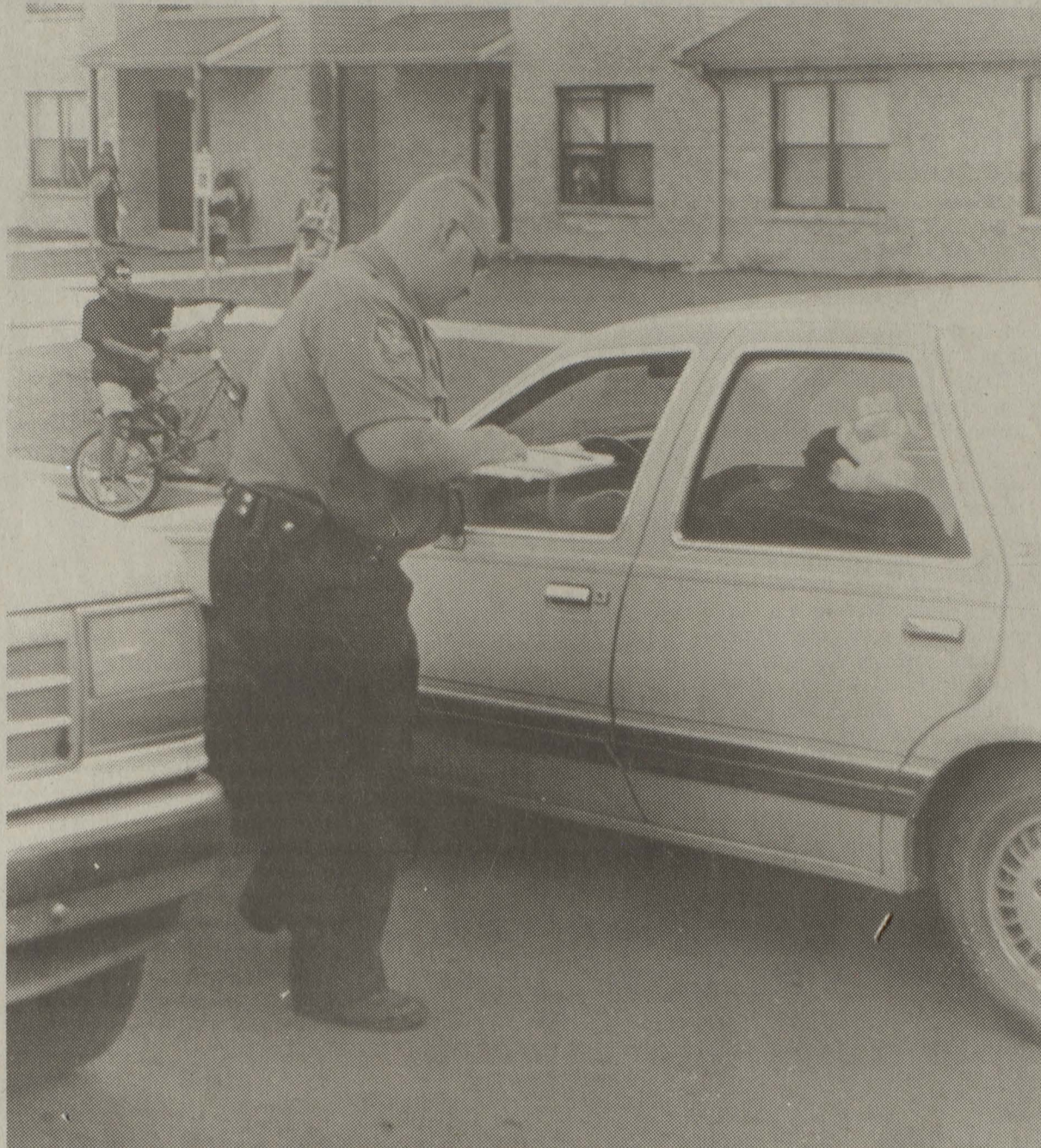
The new center has a craft area, television and VCR room, sitting and dining room, kitchen and a room for the pool players in the group. It also has a child day care facility which opens August 24.

## More funds okayed for Mud Creek housing project

U.S. Senator Wendell Ford announced Thursday that the Appalachian Regional Commission has approved \$98,000 in Section 207 funds to assist in the construction of 15 multi-family housing units for low-income families in Floyd County.

Ford said the Mud Creek housing project consists of four two-story townhouse buildings, parking areas and a package sewer treatment plant. The site will be located just north of the community of Grethel.

The ARC funds will be used for on- and off-site work to consist of clearing, grubbing, excavation, storm sewers and an access road.

## Forward in the Fifth plans to develop affiliate in Floyd

A leading education enrichment organization has targeted Floyd County as a place to establish one of its affiliates.

Forward in the Fifth Inc. was awarded a \$50,000 Appalachian Regional Commission grant to organize three local affiliates, and the agency hopes that one of those offices can be established in this county.

"We've worked in Floyd County for two years," said Jenny Eager, who works with Forward in the Fifth's local affiliate program. "There are a lot of people there who support edu-

cation. An affiliate is needed there."

An organizational meeting will be held September 15 to establish the local affiliate. The time and location of the meeting have not been set.

Forward in the Fifth promotes school improvement, and is an advisory program. The affiliates are organized by volunteers, who make the final decisions on education programs, etc.

"We don't tell our affiliates what to do," Eager said. "We offer them programs. We ask them what they

would like to see strengthened... We try to help them with different resources."

To establish an affiliate in the area, Forward in the Fifth needs a letter of endorsement by the school superintendent and volunteers that depict a "nice cross representation of the community," Eager said.

Forward in the Fifth, which has its headquarters in Berea, is also looking at the counties of Johnson, Knott, Letcher, Magoffin, Martin, Menifee, Morgan, Perry and Pike as sites to locate affiliates.

## Development group looking for director, board member

The search is underway for a new executive director for the Floyd County Development Authority and for a candidate to fill a vacancy on the board.

At Wednesday's meeting of the development authority, board members discussed how to proceed with finding a replacement for Darrell Gilliam, who resigned as director to accept a job in Franklin County.

Also Wednesday, board member Raymond Bradbury submitted his resignation, saying he wanted more free time.

In relation to finding a new director, the board agreed to let chairman Burl Wells Spurlock and Gilliam develop and place an advertisement in various trade magazines and newspapers.

"It is critical that we bring someone on board as soon as possible," Spurlock said. "We have a lot of balls up in the air and I hope we can keep them spinning."

Gilliam told the board that he would be available to assist them during the interim period before a new director is found. He added that he could not pass up the opportunity offered by Franklin County.

Board members thanked Gilliam and Bradbury for their service to the development authority.

In other business Wednesday, Gilliam told the board the results of a labor survey for jobs at a clothing manufacturing company expected to be located in Floyd County.

The Department for Employment

Services received 1,995 job applications for the clothing firm, with women accounting for 72 percent of the applicants. Fifty-one percent of

## KSP asked to aid search for missing man

State police have been asked to assist in the search for a Floyd County man who was last seen by family members on June 3, when he left his home in Pike-Floyd Hollow on foot.

A missing persons report was filed this week with the KSP for George Dee Howell, 61, more than two months after Howell told his sister Nancy Slone, that he was "going to Paintsville." Family members offered no explanation for the long delay in reporting Howell's disappearance, but indicated he may have been seen as recently as three weeks ago in the Pikeville area.

Howell requires medication, his sister said Wednesday, and without it, he could become disoriented and possibly even dangerous.

Howell has red hair, is six feet, one-inch tall and weighs 170 pounds. He

has blue eyes, a scar on his nose and a tattoo of a woman on his left arm. He was last seen wearing a white shirt, a brown vest, blue jeans and black boots.

Anyone with information of Howell's whereabouts should contact the Kentucky State Police in Pikeville at 437-7311 or the Floyd County Sheriff's Department at 886-6711.

## Guards added at project to stem drug flow

The situation has been likened to marshal law, but security guards hired to keep an eye on things at Left Beaver Townhouses are a temporary measure designed to thwart suspected drug activity in the housing project.

Last Friday evening armed security guards showed up unannounced at the complex, erected a barricade at the exit road and set up a sign-in, sign-out post at the main entrance to the homes.

Last week's arrival of the security personnel and their actions caught tenants off guard and prompted a meeting at the project Wednesday between residents and housing authority personnel.

Julia May, executive director of the housing authority, explained to the six residents who attended the meeting that the security measures were a temporary move until "we get a little more control over the situation." She said that the guards could remain at the project anywhere from a week to a month.

"It is not marshal law," May said. "Under HUD (the department of Housing and Urban Development) regulations, we have to do something to stop it. We have had reports of suspected drug dealing and drug use and HUD is on our backs to do something stringent. It is not a permanent situation."

May said that it is not uncommon to place guards at housing complexes to curb this sort of activity and added that a similar situation had occurred in the past at the Warco housing complex near Martin.

Tenant Joyetta Case commented that she did not object to the guards, but added that it caused some tension among residents because they were not informed beforehand. But most residents at Wednesday's meeting were not opposed to having security personnel on the project grounds.

Resident Dianne Artega told May that she objected to the provision that no one but residents would be allowed to enter the complex after midnight. Artega said that families may have out of state relatives coming for visits who could arrive after midnight.

May noted that if out of town visitors would notify residents they intended to visit, arrangements could be made to allow them to enter the complex.

That would not solve the situation, Artega explained, because many residents do not have phones and some relatives may make surprise visits.

May wouldn't budge on the issue, saying, "it is our opinion that this is the way to stop it now."

Floyd County Sheriff Paul Hunt Thompson, who was present during part of the meeting, said afterward

that he felt the drug problem was being exaggerated at the Minnie housing complex.

"It is no more prevalent here than it is in other areas of the county," Thompson said. "We are aware of the situation and we've been looking into it for about six weeks."

Thompson added that the problem stems more from people bringing drugs into the housing complex, than drugs being sold from within the facility.

May said Thursday that HUD regulations required that authority personnel address the problem from within the complex and attempt to stop all suspected drug activity.

Also Wednesday, tenants discussed other issues they were concerned about, including:

- the location of a horseshoe pit;
- quarterly inspections;
- installing stop signs and speed bumps; and
- installing recreational equipment for teen age residents.

Housing authority board member Eddie Patton and deputy director Patsy Ryan also attended Wednesday's meeting.

## Otter Creek man is killed in house fire

State police are investigating the cause of a fire at Wheelwright Wednesday evening that claimed the life of Glen Randall Johnson.

Johnson's home on the Left Fork of Otter Creek caught fire at approximately 7:30 p.m. and members of the Southeast Volunteer Fire Department responded to the scene.

Firefighters found Johnson's body during a search of the home after the fire was extinguished.

State police detective Joel Newsome said Thursday that Johnson's body was found in a hallway near a bedroom. Newsome added that there was no visible signs of trauma to the body and an autopsy was to be performed in Louisville Thursday.

The one-story home was not completely destroyed by the fire, Newsome said, and police suspect it started in a back bedroom. Johnson, 49, was the only one home at the time of the fire and no foul play is suspected.

Johnson was pronounced dead at the scene by Floyd County Coroner Roger Nelson.

The fire is under investigation by Newsome and state police arson investigator Barry McKenzie.

## Literacy poll to get data for campaign

A survey will be conducted during the next several months that will assess the literacy level of Kentucky's adults.

The Cabinet for Workforce Development's Department for Adult Education and Literacy will use the survey results for literacy education campaigns, planning worker retraining programs and other initiatives requiring literacy data.

The Department has contracted with the University of Kentucky's Martin School of Public Policy and Administration to conduct the survey. About 2,100 households across the state will be asked to participate later this year in interviews and literacy assessments. With the assumption of a 71.4 percent participation rate, the survey is designed to produce 1,500 completed literacy assessments of adult Kentuckians.

Teresa Suter, commissioner of the

Department for Adult Education and Literacy, said the survey will be the first statewide adult literacy assessment effort.

"We will collect Kentucky data comparable to the recently completed National Adult Literacy Survey," Suter said. "This is needed because our existing state data is limited to information in the last United States census, which only reported the levels of formal education completed by adults, not their proficiency levels."

Suter also said the privacy of survey participants will be protected. "A consent form will be signed by each person who agrees to participate in the study and results will be confidential," Suter said. "Names of participants will be used for mailing a \$25 payment to each person who completes the survey, and to verify that interviews and assessments were conducted."

**Rumpke service well underway**

It's been a little over a month and a half since Rumpke of Kentucky was awarded the county-wide trash service contract by the Floyd County Fiscal Court. Rumpke operations manager Ron Henke says things are going real well. There have been a few questions about the new contract. According to the contract, rates are \$10 for everyone.

"The county's bidding specs called for one price for all residential units," says Ron Henke. "This price will stay fixed for five years."

Currently the county receives 15% of Rumpke's revenues. The money will be used to help the county retire its solid waste debts. Once the debts are paid off the county may use the franchise fee profits in any way they want to benefit the county and residents. Mike Vance, commissioner of the Floyd County Solid Waste Board said that when all of the county's solid waste bills are paid off, the county may possibly look into a rebate system for the senior citizens. The criteria for that system will be determined at a later date.

Another question residents have about the new service is "Where does the trash have to be placed?" Henke said trash needs to be placed at the curb line of the nearest official county road.

"Rumpke trucks are not permitted to travel on private residential property," Henke said. "We will work

with the elderly and handicapped people who for health reasons cannot get their garbage to the curb line of the official county road. We will deal with the different situations on an individual basis and work something out," he said. "There have been many people throughout the county who have volunteered to get some of our senior citizens' garbage to the road for them," Henke said.

A third concern Floyd County residents have is the billing cycle. Rumpke bills three months in advance.

"We understand some people might not be able to pay all at once, and we will allow residents to pay \$10 a month as long as they keep their account current," Henke said.

Some businesses in Floyd County were also affected by the changeover in services.

"If a business has a concern, we encourage them to call our office," Henke said.

"Rumpke always works with communities we service and have always considered our relationship with our customers a priority," Henke said. "We are happy to be a part of the Floyd County family and took forward to doing our part to serve the community."

**PCC's professor Saffari receives Mosal scholarship**

Hassan Saffari, a professor of mathematics at Prestonsburg Community College, was the recent recipient of a Mosal Scholarship from Phi Theta Kappa, an international honor society of the two-year college.

Professor Saffari received the award during Phi Theta Kappa's annual international convention in Anaheim, California. Professor Saffari was one of only four advisors nationwide to be selected for this award.

According to a letter from Phi Theta Kappa's Executive Director Rod A. Risley, "Mosal Scholarships are presented to faculty members serving as volunteer advisors for Phi Theta Kappa chapters. This distinction signifies that the recipient has achieved a mark of excellence as a scholar among all two-year college faculty while establishing a record of distinguished service to Phi Theta Kappa."

Each Mosal Scholar receives a \$2,000 stipend to provide professional enrichment through a cause commensurate with the concept of the two-year college scholar.

**Bluestone Lake driftwood to be turned into wood chips**

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will be conducting a two-week test of natural drift removal from Bluestone Lake in mid August.

Madison Coal and Supply will remove the driftwood from the lake and place it into barges between August 8 and August 19. The barge will be pushed to the Bluestone Bridge Boat Launch area (commonly known as the "Pit") where the wood will be unloaded. B & W Land Clearing will grind the wood into chips beginning August 15.

Some of the wood chips will be placed on West Virginia Route 20 at an overlook area near the entrance to the launch area. The chips will be available for general public use and will be free of charge. Some state and federal agencies also have indicated an interest in the chips.

The Christian Appalachian Project (CAP) is searching for a person or organization which promotes justice, faith, hope, and love in their work with the disadvantaged in Eastern Kentucky.

The award highlights the similarities between the dreams and work of Dr. King and the Christian Appalachian Project. Both have sought to uplift and support the lives of the people they serve.

"Martin Luther King Jr. speaks to the human condition that is universally shared," said Michael C. McLaughlin, president of the Christian Appalachian Project. "In honoring his memory, we want to show that Christ's active presence is in the world today."

A \$5,000 grant will be awarded to the recipient to further their work.

On Bended Knees is the story of tobacco tycoon James B. Duke and his American Tobacco Co., which held a stranglehold on the tobacco industry. It is also the story of how the farmers banded together to fight the Duke "trust"—a fight which turned violent with the birth of the Night Riders, a militant group of masked riders who, under cover of darkness, terrorized farmers who refused to join their cause. Tobacco plant beds were destroyed and tobacco warehouses burned. There were whippings and murders—and entire towns were even taken over.

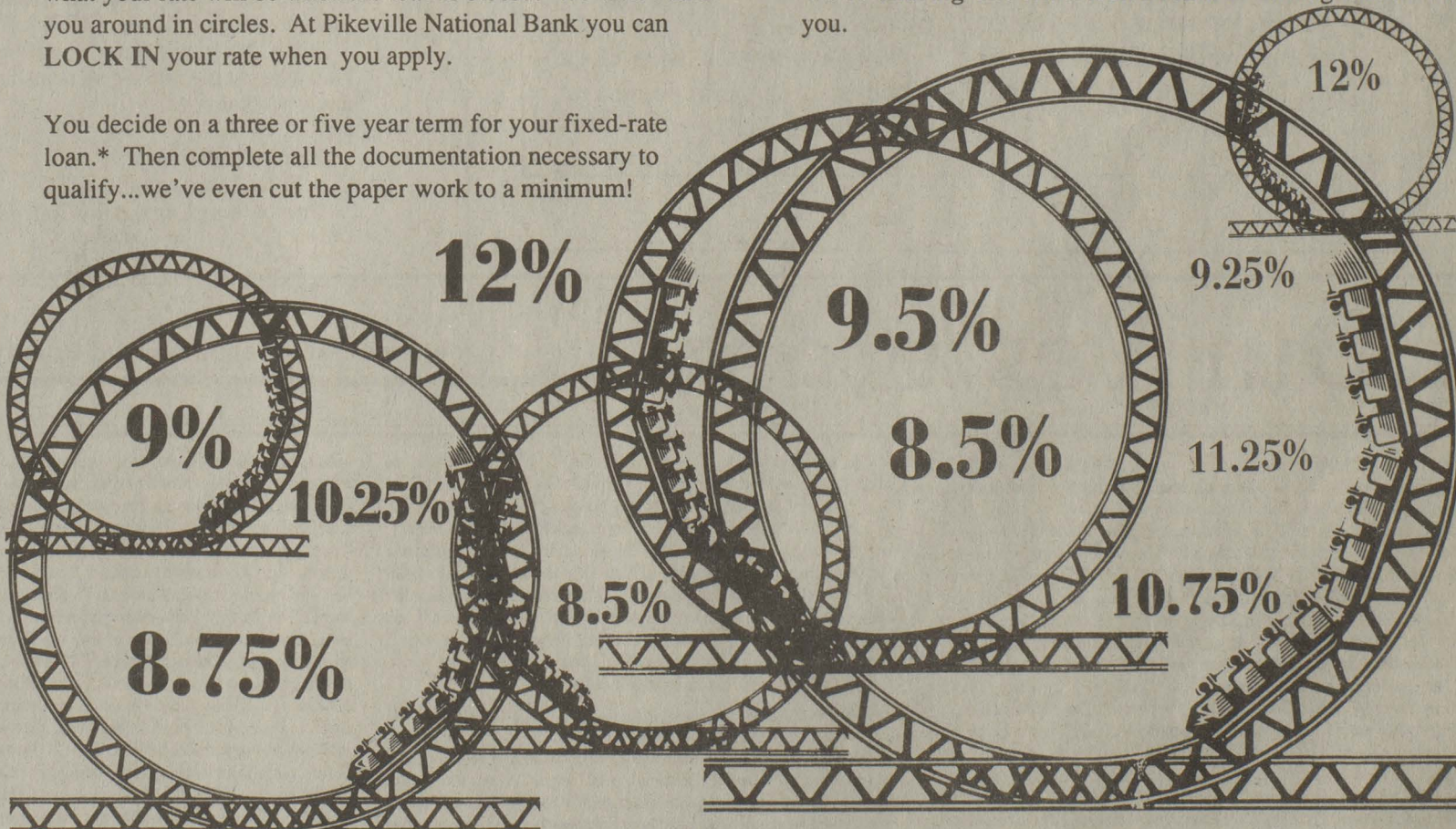

## Follow the Oregon Trail

Kentucky would do well to consider a welfare reform program in the works in Oregon that proposes to give needy folks in that state jobs instead of food stamps.

The Oregon approach is not by any stretch of the imagination a new idea, nor is the philosophy of 'workfare' as an alternative to welfare.

We need only to look back to the days of the Civilian Conservation Corps for a comparison.

In Oregon, welfare reformers are promoting a program called JOB Plus, which takes funds allocated for food stamp and unemployment benefits and turns them into salaries.

Not 'make-work' salaries, either, but on-the-job training pay for participants who join the workforce of existing companies.

We know of few small businesses, or large ones for that matter, who couldn't use an extra hand or two if they could afford them.

And, we know of few folks on public assistance who wouldn't rather be out earning a paycheck to support themselves and their families.

The JOB Plus approach creates opportunities for both. And, because it shifts the use of existing public assistance funds from handouts to salaries, it wouldn't cost the taxpayers an extra cent. Everybody wins.

Welfare recipients earn salaries equal to their prior public assistance and they get valuable training and skills that make them employable.

Businesses get the extra manpower they need at no extra cost.

The end result, of course, is to reduce the number of people on public assistance and lower the cost of those programs for taxpayers.

True welfare reform will never become a reality if we don't arrive at some means of providing hope and opportunity to those in need.

The Oregon idea looks like a good starting point for a real assault on poverty.

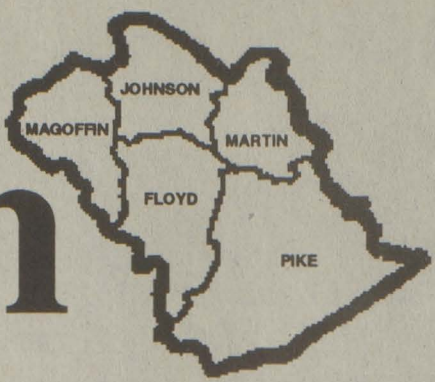

"Honest people make mistakes and those same people, when the mistake is discovered, correct those mistakes, and we have done that," Meade said. —The Paintsville Herald

Five different locations have been looked at, but the need for adequate space is a major hurdle, Pendleton said.

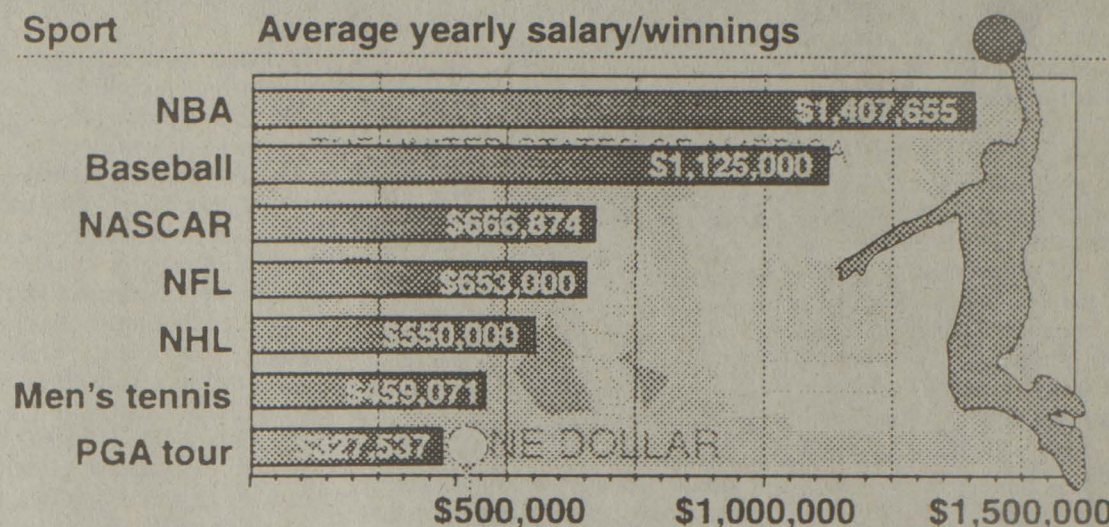
The bakery company needs about 4,000 square feet for the bakery and an additional 1,500 to 2,000 square feet for the distribution center.

## Floyd County students participated in recent Governor's Scholars program

Five Floyd County students, plus hundreds more from all over Kentucky spent five weeks this summer as participants in the Kentucky Governor's Scholars Program, an intensive learning and growth experience that just completed its twelfth year.

This participating from Floyd County were Aaron Bond, son of Jane Bond, who attends Prestonsburg High School; Joshua S. Flanery, son of Peggy S. Flanery, who attends Allen Central High School; Kathryn Mullins, daughter of Freddy and Della Mullins, who attends Prestonsburg High School; Jeremy N. Elliott, son of Wiley and Phyllis Elliott, who attends Allen Central High School; and Stewart E. Robertson, who attends Prestonsburg High School.

While their friends back home went swimming, worked at the video store or hung out at the mall this summer these teenagers, along with the hundreds of others, were creating things such as a 100-foot, inflatable plastic whale.

Others students were building working lasers and composing origi-

nal music for a synchronized laser lightshow, while still more tried John T. Scopes for teaching the Darwinian theory of evolution.

The program has always been known as an unparalleled opportunity for bright young people to unleash their imaginations and creativity, but this year's scholars went further than ever before to demonstrate that the best way to learn is by doing.

A sampling of the innovative projects undertaken by the 700 scholars includes:

- Constructing a full-sized replica of a blue whale. The whale, which is made of strong plastic and can be inflated with a large fan, was designed and built by biology students to call attention to the plight of this endangered species. This fall, students plan to rotate the model among their home schools.

- Building houses for Habitat For Humanity. Students worked at three sites in Northern Kentucky and Ohio, including an abandoned school that they helped turn into a community learning center.

- Literally digging into history by helping restore the historic site of the Battle of Perryville. Learning more about archaeology and history than they could ever glean from books and classroom lectures, their specific projects included restoring the office of physician Jefferson J. Polk and developing a walking tour of Perryville.

- Creating a three-minute laser light show with original synchronized music. Students concentrating in the physical sciences worked with those interested in fine arts, bringing two very diverse disciplines together to reach a common goal.

- Recreating the trial of John T. Scopes, calling on the talents and ideas of students in biology, philosophy, and political and social theory classes.

The Governor's Scholars Program focuses on interdisciplinary learning and on getting students out of the classroom and into the world.

Governor Brereton C. Jones said he hopes this year's Governor's Scholars take home with them a commitment to community service. "It is my sincere wish that historians of the future will look back at the Governor's Scholars of 1994, and say, 'this class made a real difference in the world.'" Governor Jones said.

The Governor's Scholars Program, which began in 1983, is funded through the Governor's Office, major grants from the James Graham Brown Foundation and Ashland Oil, and private donations. Such funding enables all of the scholars to attend the program without charge.

The Kentucky Humanities Council has contributed toward the program's teacher training for the past 12 years.

"Through their teamwork preparing for each year's program, these teachers, too, are part of the program's creative learning experience, not just at the campuses, but back home in the classroom," said Virginia Smith, the council's executive director.

Students are drawn from both public and private schools, from all regions of the state, and from all economic and social backgrounds. They spend plenty of time on academics, choosing from 15 subject areas in the liberal arts, but the program is placing increasing emphasis on moving scholars out of the classroom for a broader perspective on learning.

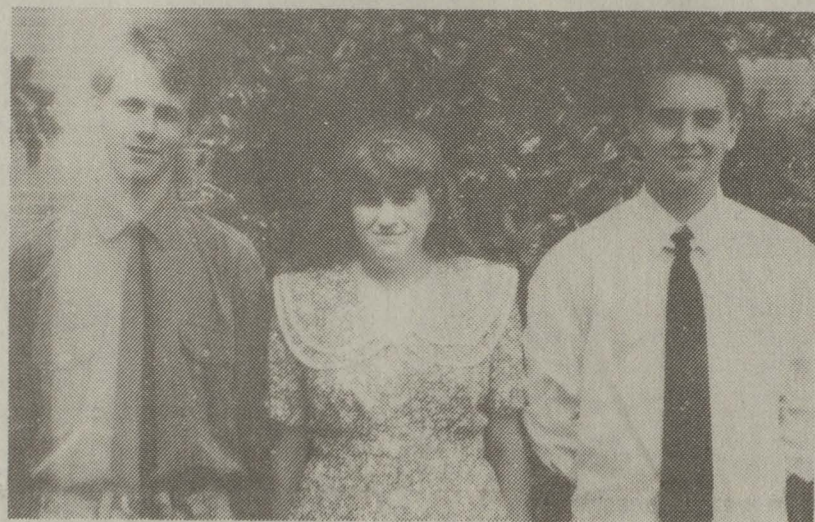

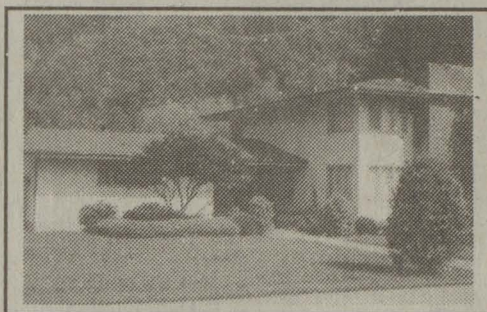

Music is a graduate of Johnson Central High School, and was a member of the school's academic team's quick recall that went to state competition. She is also a four-year member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

To be eligible for the MSU Alumni Award, at least one of the applicant's parents must be an MSU alumnus and an active member of the MSU Alumni Association. The student must be admitted as an incoming

freshman or transfer student; have an Admissions Index of at least 500; transfer students must have a 3.00 grade point average (one a 4.00 scale) for the equivalent of at least one full term.

The award, valued at \$650 per year, is renewable for three academic years if a 2.75 g.p.a. is maintained during each of the first two semesters and a minimum cumulative 3.00 g.p.a. for each semester thereafter.

To be eligible for the Presidential Scholarship, applicants must be admitted to MSU as an entering freshman; have a 3.75 grade point average (on a 4.00 scale) based on seven semesters of work; have a composite ACT score of 28, and submit a completed scholarship application to MSU.

The scholarship, valued at \$3,250 per year, is renewable for three academic years if a 3.25 g.p.a. is maintained during each of the first two semesters and a minimum cumulative 3.50 g.p.a. for each semester thereafter.

Students who successfully complete the Kentucky Governor's Scholars Program are automatically eligible for the Governor's Scholar Award. The scholarship, which pays the tuition costs of entering freshmen, is renewable for three years if the student maintains a minimum cumulative 3.00 grade point average during each of the first two semesters and a minimum cumulative 3.25 g.p.a. for each semester thereafter.

## Big Sandy Woodland News

This time of year most of the forest fire news we hear about comes from the western states. For us fire season is something to worry about in the spring or fall before or after the trees have leafed out. Though we might not face an immediate threat of fire, there are some commonsense steps you can take now to protect your home and woodlands. If you live near or in the woods, you might consider constructing a firebreak around your home. Don't be afraid to make it plenty wide. The closer crews can get their equipment to the fire, the more of your property they can protect. Similarly, if you have old road outs, from past mining or logging jobs crossing your property, keep them clear of storm damaged trees. These old roads can be effective fire breaks and access ways if they are maintained. Remember that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

While fire is generally destructive to the health and quality of our forests. The American Tree Farm System offers woodland owners an opportunity to improve forests. The nationwide program gives public recognition to private forest owners who do an effective job of growing trees as a crop. The objective of The Tree Farm System is to encourage private forestland owners to manage their woods for the increased production of tree crops, while also improving wildlife habitat, watershed protection, and outdoor recreation. If you are interested in becoming a member of The Tree Farm System, or just want to find out the particulars. Contact your KDF Service Forester at (606) 478-4495.

Each year, the Governor's Conference on the Environment provides a forum through which the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet can present topics and ideas that are important to Kentucky's Environment. This year's conference is entitled "Kentucky's Forests: Thinking Beyond Today." The conference runs Thursday, Sep-

tember 29 through Saturday, October 1 in Louisville. If you have a stake in the future of Kentucky's forests, you'll be interested in this event. Contact this office for more information.

Here's a sweet note regarding trees and bees. Kirk Shepherd from Floyd County says the blossoms from sourwood trees make for some fine honey.

I was lucky enough to taste some of the results and I'll agree. Sourwoods bloom in July and I've noticed they also make for a nice ornamental in many folks' front yard. If you are considering any landscaping, sourwoods might be a good choice for you and the bees.

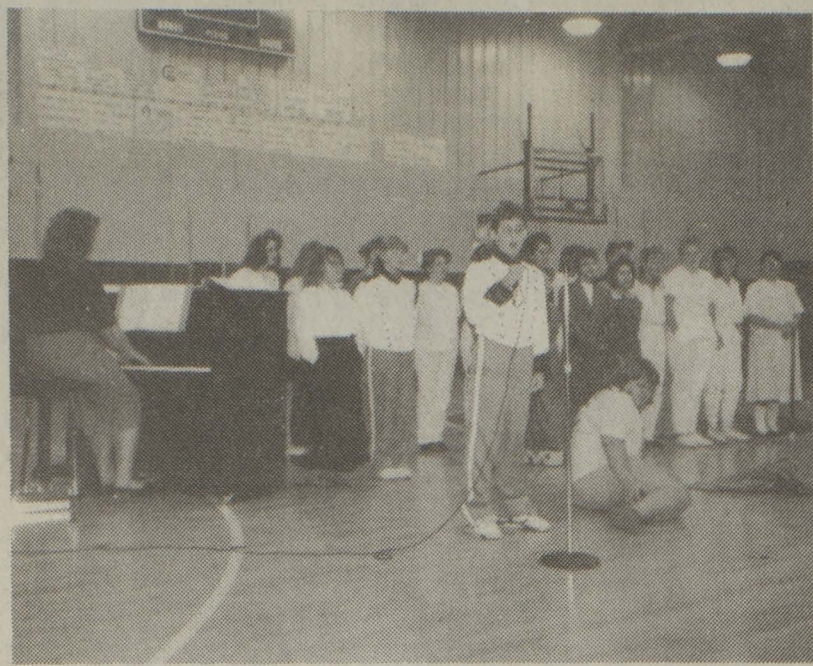

## Words of life

WHAT IT MEANS TO REALLY LOVE ONE ANOTHER

The alarm goes off at 6 a.m., but you want those extra few moments of sleep. The next thing you know it is 7 a.m., and you are late for work—again. You are in hot water. The boss has already told you that if you're late one more time he will put a new "help wanted" ad in the Floyd County Times. No time for a shower; no time for breakfast, you are heading out the door, when your next door neighbor walks up and says his car will not start; he is late for work. Can you give him a jump? His boss has told him that if he is late for work again there will be a new "help wanted" ad in the Paintsville Herald. There is no one else around who can help him out. What would you do?

"Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another (1 John 4:11). "This teaching of St. John on the necessity of loving one another is well known to all of us, but how many of us really and truly practice this kind of unselfish love? How many really loves his neighbor as he loves himself? How many would have given some excuse and have gone on their way to work, and how many would have helped out their neighbor in need? Yet, this is the criterion by which our love is judged.

Far too many Christians are so preoccupied with their own difficulties in life that they have little or no time to stop and help someone who is lying idly or helplessly by the roadside. We seem to always be in a hurry to get to where we are going, and we have no time to stop for anything not previously scheduled, even if that something is helping someone else in obvious need. We have become very cynical, thinking that anyone who says they are in need is out to con us or take advantage of us. Yet it is exactly by helping someone else in their troubles that we successfully overcome our own difficulties. For when we practice charity toward our neighbor "we abide in God and God abides in us," as St. John tells us, and if God is with us, it matters not who is against us.

Yes, it is God's plan that we travel to heaven in groups, in pre-arranged parties. God wants the whole group there, but in his plans some are less capable of making the journey, so that the able-bodied members and the more qualified ones, should have the opportunity of paying for their own passage by helping their needy fellow-travelers. This is part of God's love for us. He puts in our way the opportunity to prove our love for him by bestowing loving help on our neighbor.

Helping someone pay their bills, giving another a place to stay for the night, cooking a hot meal for a disabled neighbor who lives alone, serving a drink of water on a hot day to a laborer, giving away good used clothes to someone who needs them, visiting the sick or imprisoned, ransoming the captive, and burying the dead are all examples of the corporal works of mercy we can do to help our neighbors in need.

Let us look around and see who are those that God in his mercy has put in our particular traveling party. First comes our own family. Not only are we bound by ties of flesh and blood to help them in this life, we are

also bound by the commandment of charity to cherish them as we do ourselves. If we ourselves want to be saved—and that is why we are Christians—we must also want to have our families reunited with us later on. Husband and wife must help one another to live according to the Christian standards every day of their lives. Both parents must work in close and fervent cooperation to prepare their children not only to make a living in this world but especially and above all to make them good citizens of heaven.

After the family comes relatives, nearest neighbors, those we work with, and those with whom we have a casual acquaintance. They have next claim on our sincere Christian love. We cannot exempt ourselves from carrying out the spiritual works of mercy of instructing the ignorant, correcting sinners, advising the doubtful, showing patience to sinners and those in error, forgiving others, comforting the afflicted, and praying for the living and the dead. If we are truly charitable, occasions can be found for exercising these good works without having to leave our own hometown, or maybe our own street. Generous souls will, while carrying out the duties of charity at home, also find ways of spreading the faith in their neighborhood.

We all want to be saved, but first we must help our fellow-travelers on their way. These are not only the people who need bodily help, but also and especially those in need of spiritual light and encouragement—the sinners, the lax, the careless, and the lapsed Christians. They are the ones who most need our help. It is with these that Jesus would associate if He were among us today, as He did in Palestine. Mary Magdalene Zachaeus, and the thousands of other sinners of that day, are now in heaven because Christ had an encouraging word, a word of love and hope for them, and they reacted to his sincere love. Let us try to imitate that love of Christ, if only from afar, and our sinner neighbors too will react to the little ray of divine love which our charity sheds on them and which will cause us to say to our neighbor: "Sure, pull your car up next to mine."

## Students receive keys to fun

One of the biggest problems about taking a private piano lesson in years past was boredom for the student as well as for the teacher, according to music instructor Nancy Hale.

That has changed in the classrooms at the Hale Studio of Music at Harold because she has incorporated fun into her lesson plans by utilizing the Mayron Cole piano method of instruction with the technology of an electronic keyboard, the Roland digital piano.

"Piano lessons have totally changed from when we were all kids! It's certainly not like anything we've ever seen before," Hale explained.

She is using the digital piano with sequencer and sound module, eight student keyboards with headphones, a Roland teacher-student lab, plus a computer for the students to use when they are studying theory, rhythm, chord structure, ear training, and classical to pop technique exercises.

The electronic sound combined with the Mayron Cole group method is creating a "fresh, exciting atmosphere" in her studio, Hale said.

Mayron Cole, a music educator who lives in Houston, Texas, discovered through her teaching that students learned better and progressed much faster in group classes. She also realized that students learn better when classes are fun.

Cole's students progressed so fast using the group method that she had to write her own instructional books. While she was writing the books, she decided to incorporate fun into her lesson booklets, as well. She made the notes larger, on big lines, to make it easy for her students to read. She also illustrated the music with clever drawings of characters associated with the music.

"Ninety-nine percent of teaching is the mental effort — playing things up," Cole explained to reporter Julie Gilbert in the Houston Post. "It's like being a cheerleader. If you think something is dull, then it is dull, but if you think it's fun, then it will be fun."

When Hale heard about the program, she decided to give it a try, but first she wanted to talk to other music teachers who had used the program. She called Cole's company and asked for a phone number of the nearest teacher using the method, and they gave her the name of an instructor in Nashville.

Hale attended the Mayron Cole training sessions and became certified in the new piano method.

"It is this country's best group piano method. The music sounds really beautiful," Hale said. "My students love to play it."

In fact, they love to play it so much they don't want to miss a single session. "Parents have called and said, 'Little Brittany doesn't feel well, but she's begging to come to piano lessons,'" she said, smiling.

"By letting students play in a piano orchestra, they say, 'Wow, I'm pretty good!'" she said.

The Mayron Cole method gets students "one hundred percent involved in ensemble playing," Hale said. "We were raising a bunch of Prima Donnas who couldn't play in a group."

"Students today are so well acclimated toward electronics and computers that technology is not a problem. The kids are getting their keyboards out that they got for Christmas years ago," Hale said.

"I thought students were like me. They wanted to make a career out of music. I was stunned. They just wanted to play for fun. I just gave up and said 'Okay, let's play for fun.' Mayron created a curriculum of fun."

Hale's students performed their first operetta at Christmas using the new method. Students dressed in costumes of biblical characters when they performed the Christmas Story. They had speaking parts and then had to play their music. Because the stu-

dents were so young, Hale thought they had doubts about their ability to remember their lines and then their music.

"I thought 'There's no way these students could do this.' But they did great," she said.

Hale is excited about the program and she transfers that excitement into her classroom. "If a teacher is not excited, students are bored. Music is so exciting if you get an exciting curriculum, anybody can teach it."

Once, when a student transferred into Hale's school, Hale asked the student why she was returning after a long absence. The student replied that her former teacher just wasn't teaching the way he/she used to teach.

The student's mother explained that she thought the teacher had just "burned out."

"I understand," Hale told the mother, and explained that it can happen because private music instructors may teach the same lesson to seven students in one day. With the Mayron Cole method, Hale said, the program keeps a fresh and exciting atmosphere in the studio.

Hale, who grew up in Salyersville, has been teaching in Eastern Kentucky for the past 20 years. First, she moved to Cincinnati, obtained her degree in music from the University of Cincinnati, and taught there for 10 years before returning home to Kentucky in 1974.

Later, she became a member of the Kentucky Independent Music Teachers and served on its board. Hale is also a member of the national association of music teachers, and is currently serving as president of the Pikeville Area Music Teachers Association.

Hale has been out to prove that Eastern Kentucky students are among the top in the state after she heard a snide remark about Eastern Kentucky students that she will never forget. During a state meeting of music teachers which was held in Bardstown, she overheard one teacher comment that a superior rating received by students from Pikeville wasn't the same as the superiors received by students from Bowling Green.

The next four years, Hale entered her students in the Kentucky Music Teachers Association (KMTA) state competition. In order to compete, students had to receive a superior in local competition and comply with a repertoire.

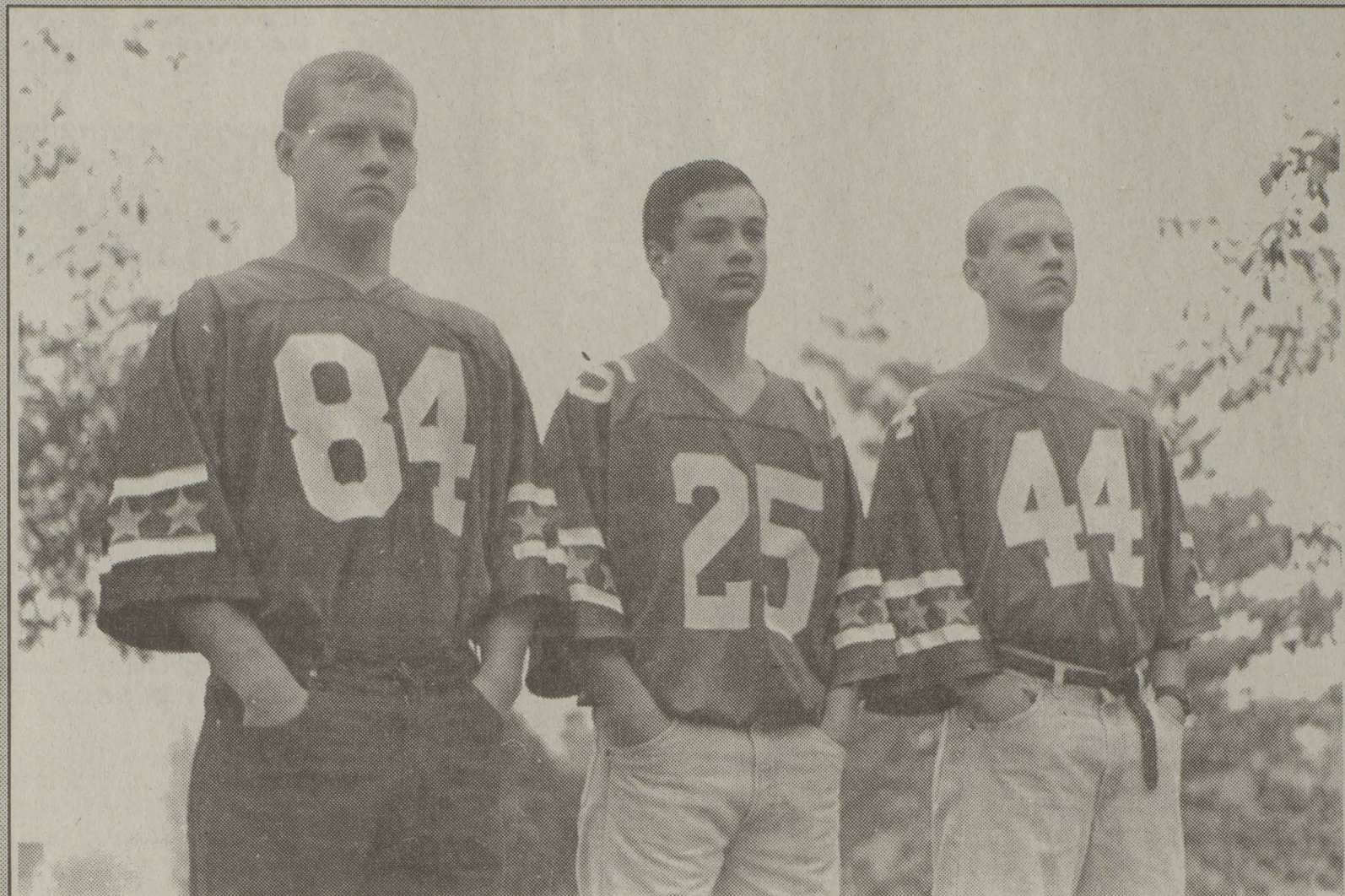

### Western Ky., Central Florida highlight Eastern basketball

Users of Cyprus Amax and Robinson Forest WMAs are reminded that beginning August 20, all terrain vehicles (ATVs) and other vehicles not legal for use on public streets are prohibited on both WMAs.

regular season will be a total wipe out.

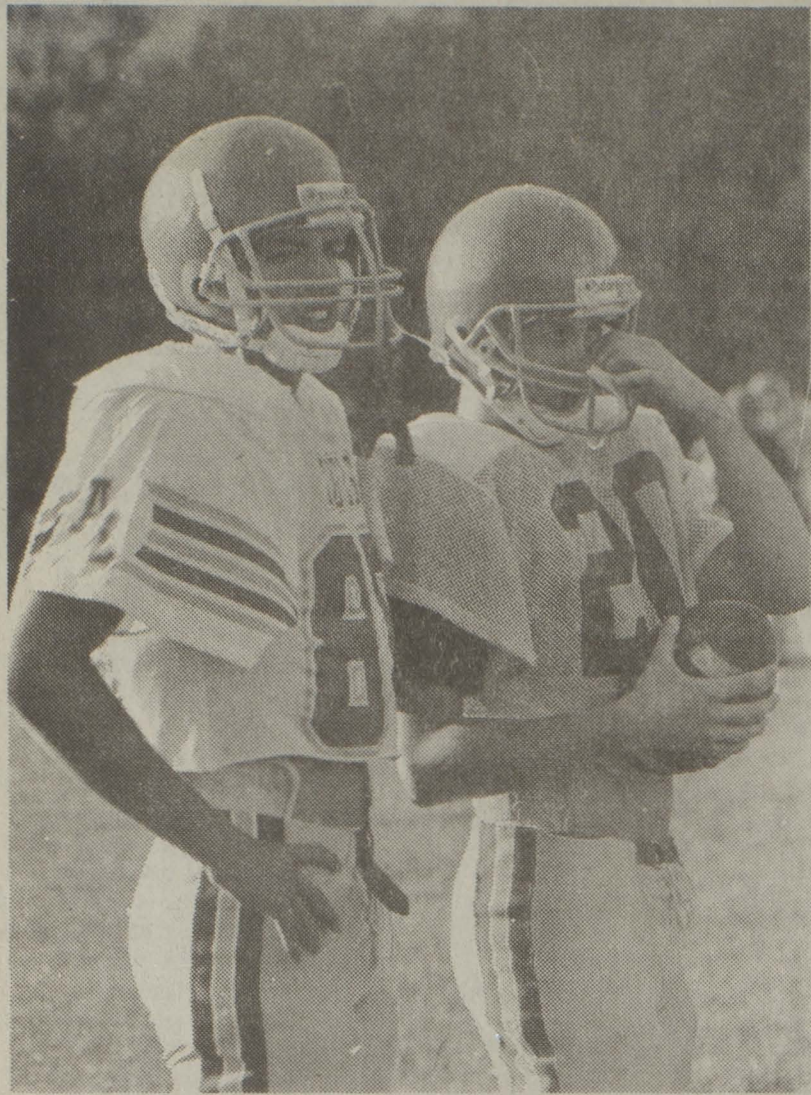
I hope that the strike is settled soon, but if they can't reach an agreement to resume the regular season, then I hope they do not have a play-off or world series.

The three-game series in the Astrodome to close out the regular season with the Reds would have been a great series.

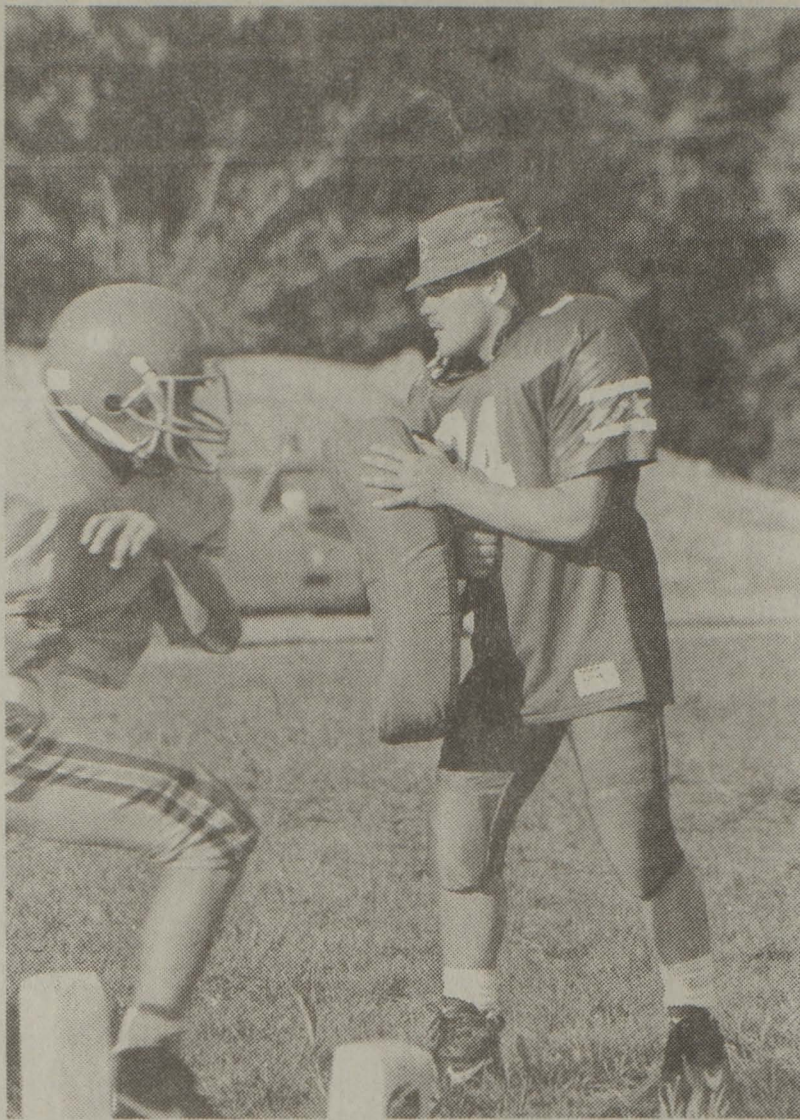

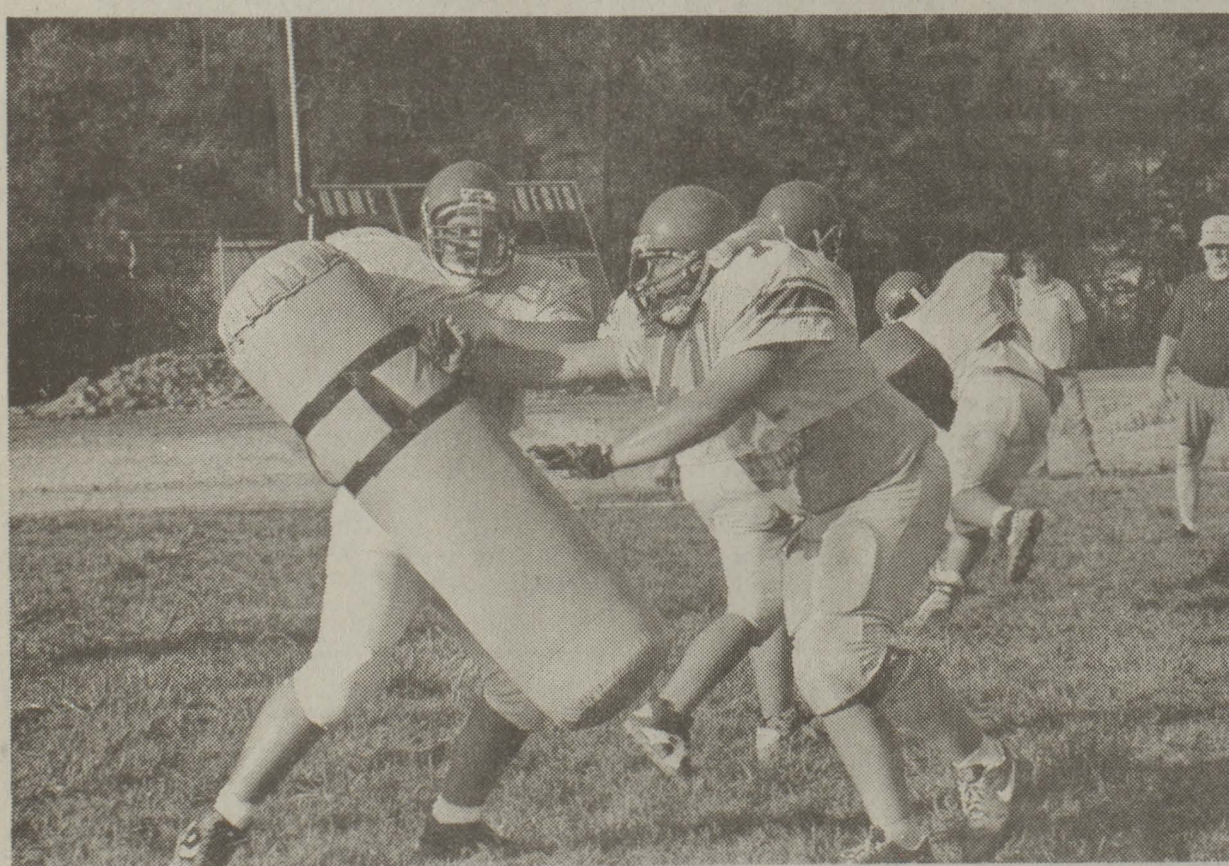
