Stumbo objects, seeks summary judgment instead :

# McKinney wants vote fraud suit dismissed

A civil suit arising from the May 1993 Democratic primary election in Floyd County took two unusual turns last week, just as the deadline arrived for submitting the case to a special judge.

The first twist came Thursday, August 18, when the suit's accuser, radio station owner Dale McKinney indicated that he would ask that his

complaint against Floyd County Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo be dismissed. McKinney, who lost his bid to unseat Stumbo in the 1993 primary by just over 2,000 votes, accused Stumbo in a civil suit filed in June 1993 of election fraud.

On August 5, fifteen months after the suit was filed, special Judge Doug Combs of Perry County, ordered McKinney to complete depositions of witnesses by Friday, August 12. McKinney's attorney, C.K. Belhasen

instead advised last week that he would ask Combs to dismiss the complaint, suggesting in a note to Combs that McKinney had indicated he "cannot afford to proceed and feels the county's best interest will be served by dropping this action."

Belhasen's formal motion for dismissal, submitted Tuesday, outlined reasons in addition to financial concerns for the request.

Noting that his efforts to secure immunity from prosecution for wit-

nesses who might support claims made in the complaint had been denied by Judge Combs, Belhasen said he "does not believe (McKinney) can obtain the testimony necessary from the various witnesses who have taken the Fifth Amendment..."

Belhasen also alleged in his motion for dismissal that some witnesses, who had been secretly tape recorded "incriminating themselves," had committed perjury during the taking of depositions.

"In spite of this," the attorney added, "no action has been taken in the courts of Floyd County to charge anyone with (perjury) or any other offense related to this case, though it is obvious that these individuals either lied on the tapes, or lied under sworn testimony in a proceeding in the Floyd Circuit Court."

"Nonetheless," Belhasen wrote, "in view of all the circumstances, plus the fact that Dale McKinney no longer can afford to finance this action, it

would be a travesty to waste any more of the court's time and, accordingly, the case should be dismissed."

The request for dismissal prompted the second odd turn, this one from Judge Stumbo who, through his attorney Arnold Turner, objected to the proposal.

In a letter to Judge Combs dated August 19, Turner wrote that "though in a more typical litigation any defen-

## Board to seek info on hazing incident

Floyd County school board members are asking for a full report on a hazing incident that happened at Prestonsburg High School's football camp earlier this month, which resulted in three players being suspended for two games and one player being kicked off the team.

At Monday's school board meeting, board member Eddie Patton asked superintendent Steve Towler for a detailed account of the incident and why one player was penalized harsher than the others involved.

"I want to get the full details and why punishment was different for the individuals involved," Patton said. "Also, is there a history of hazing and who is supposed to be supervising students while it is going on." Hazing, a method of harassment, intimidation and humiliation, is often associated with initiation rites for newcomers in a variety of organizations. Hazing is usually associated with all-male military schools and gained its notoriety from incidents that have occurred at those institutions.

On Tuesday, superintendent Towler explained that a hazing incident occurred which involved inappropriate behavior by upper classmen toward freshmen members of the team.

Prestonsburg High School principal Karen Trivette and football coach Bill Letton investigated the incident, Towler said, and determined what punishment would be handed out to those involved.

An attorney for the player kicked off the team has requested a full hearing on the incident in front of the school board, Towler said Tuesday. The superintendent said he would recommend that the board hear the case.

Towler explained that the board

Board members voted Monday to pay \$409,400 for a site for a Betsy Layne Middle School, which includes other undisclosed expenses, and to submit a BG-1 for the site cost to state officials for approval.

## Lawnmower money went to city, commissioner says

A Wheelwright City Commissioner, who has been accused by fellow board members of illegally selling a city lawnmower, apparently turned over the proceeds of that sale to the city in February.

Allen Taylor was accused at last Monday's city commission meeting by commissioners Luther Johnson Jr., Charles Harmon and David Little of selling the lawnmower for \$35 without city approval.

The three board members asked city attorney Tim Parker to review how to begin impeachment proceed-

ings against Taylor.

At that meeting, Wheelwright Mayor David Marlee Sammons said that Taylor's actions may have been an oversight and pleaded that Taylor be allowed to repay the money.

A copy of the February 1994 financial report for the city shows, however, that the city received \$35 from the sale of a lawnmower.

Taylor said this week that he resented the implication that he had not turned over the money to the city, adding that Harmon and Johnson gave him approval to sell the lawnmower.

Taylor said he will raise the issue again at the September commission meeting.

Board member Eddie Patton asked superintendent Steve Towler if the board had to know the entire cost of a project ... site acquisition, site improvements and construction of the school ... before a BG-1 was submitted to the state.

Towler said that the board did not have to estimate the entire project cost in order to submit a cost estimate to acquire a site.

Mark Ryles, with the state Division of Facilities Management, said Tuesday that a district could submit a BG-1 for site acquisition only, but that the department would have to know the project cost before approval could be given for the purchase.

Under state regulations, if the cost of a site for a new school exceeds 10 percent of the total project cost, the State Board for Elementary and Secondary Education must approve the purchase.

Towler said Tuesday that the district plans to use excess funds from last year and funds anticipated to be received this year from state matching funds for school building projects.

Under the state funding formula,

## Panel indicts for murder in sibling slaying

A Toler Creek man was indicted Monday in connection with last month's shooting death of his brother.

A Floyd County Grand Jury returned a murder indictment against Jackie Ray, 45, for allegedly shooting his brother, Allan Tommy Ray, 41, of Lexington, during an argument at Jackie Ray's home last month.

The murder charge against Ray was one of 40 indictments returned Monday by a grand jury, which also included two first degree wanton endangerment charges against a former Wayland policeman.

Doug Harvey, of Wayland, was indicted for allegedly firing a shot toward Joyce Martin and Carl Ray Martin in April 1993, during an assault on Wayland police chief Danny Francis.

The alleged shooting incident occurred during a dispute between Francis and some members of the Martin family at Joyce Martin's residence.

Carl Martin and Wade Martin were charged with assaulting Francis and were acquitted by a Floyd County jury earlier this year.

Other indictments issued Monday: • Rodney Blackburn, of Endicott, second degree escape for allegedly escaping from the custody of deputy Homer Neeley on August 2, while being escorted to district court with 11 other prisoners.

• William Crandal Chapman, of Prestonsburg, cultivating marijuana for allegedly planting and cultivating five or more marijuana plants.

• Sheila Hall of Beaver, second degree assault for allegedly cutting Margie Lewis with a knife on May 24.

• William Scott Howell, of Lenoir, North Carolina, two counts of second degree assault for allegedly driving his vehicle into an automobile on April 2, occupied by Timothy Wayne Isaac and Katrina Isaac.

• Sheila Hardin, of Inez, 49 counts of fraud for allegedly making false statements to obtain a controlled substance; 41 counts of second degree forgery; and 26 counts of making false statements to obtain a controlled substance.

• Danny Spurlock, of Printer, first degree stalking for allegedly stalking

## Joseph is accused in fed true bill

A Prestonsburg businessman who operates ambulance services in Floyd, Johnson, Magoffin, Wolfe and Knott counties has been named in a 299-count federal indictment alleging a scheme to defraud Medicaid of thousands of dollars.

Paul Joseph, a former mayoral candidate in Prestonsburg, was accused in the 83-page indictment issued August 18 by a federal grand jury in Lexington of conspiracy to defraud the federal government, mail fraud and Medicaid fraud. Joseph is also accused of aiding and abetting mail and Medicaid fraud.

The indictment outlines an alleged conspiracy involving Mountain Ambulance Service, Inc. in Campton and Campton Ambulance Service, Inc. It makes no mention of P&B Ambulance Service in Prestonsburg, which is co-owned by Joseph.

In addition to Joseph, the federal indictment names Gayle D. Howes, owner of Campton Ambulance; Jeffery B. Joseph, of Prestonsburg, a

## Pike woman dies, husband injured in motorcycle mishap

A motorcycle-car collision at Harold on Saturday night claimed the life of a Pikeville woman and seriously injured her husband.

According to a state police report, Ronnita Adams, 41, of North Mayo Trail, was killed at approximately 10:45 p.m. when the 1993 Harley Davidson motorcycle she was riding was struck by a 1983 Ford Fairmont driven by Delmar E. Hamilton, 24, of Teaberry. The victim's husband, Robert, 40, who was operating the motorcycle, suffered neck injuries and a broken leg.

The accident occurred when Hamilton, who was traveling northbound on Route 23 at Harold, attempted a left turn across the southbound lanes and crossed into the path of the Adams' motorcycle which was traveling south.

Ronnita Adams was pronounced dead on arrival at Pikeville Methodist Hospital. The victims were wearing helmets. Hamilton and the passengers in his car were not injured.

## Letcher man swipes ambulance at wreck

A Letcher County man is facing nine felony charges in connection with last Thursday's assault on ambulance personnel and the theft of an ambulance responding to the scene of a car accident.

Robert Tackett, 44, of Burdine, is accused of assaulting Lifeline Ambulance emergency medical technicians Diane Burke and Clyde Burke and driver David L. Little when they responded to the scene of an accident involving Tackett at Abner Mountain near Wheelwright last Thursday evening.

Tackett allegedly kicked Diane Burke out of the back of the ambulance and forced Clyde Burke and Little out of the vehicle at knife point, according to court records. Tackett allegedly took off in the ambulance

and forced another vehicle off the roadway while fleeing from the scene.

When state police trooper Ronald Peppi arrived at the scene of the accident, Lifeline employees told the trooper that Tackett was intoxicated and disorderly and he had fought with the EMTs and stolen the ambulance. Tackett had already left the scene.

Peppi found the ambulance parked at a church at Wheelwright and Tackett was allegedly staggering around outside the vehicle, according to the police citation. Tackett was taken into custody and taken to McDowell Appalachian Hospital for blood tests.

A not guilty plea was entered for Tackett on Monday morning in Floyd District Court on six counts of first degree wanton endangerment; theft by unlawful taking; first degree criminal mischief; and fourth degree assault.



# Officials hope to keep garbage out of the courtroom

Officials from Floyd and Pike County will try to reach a compromise in a dispute on how much is owed to Pike County by Floyd County for garbage disposal.

At Friday's Floyd County Fiscal Court meeting, magistrates authorized County Attorney Jim Hammond to take the appropriate steps to settle the dispute, even if it means filing a lawsuit against Pike County.

Last week, the Pike County Fiscal Court took similar action, directing their assistant county attorney Reed Anderson to work to resolve the issue.

Pike County claims that Floyd officials owe over \$200,000 for garbage disposal in that landfill, but Floyd officials maintain they owe far less than that amount. Floyd officials claim that former Pike Judge-Executive Paul Patton made a verbal agreement with them to accept Floyd County garbage at a rate of \$7 per ton. The current Pike judge-executive and fiscal court say there was no such deal with Floyd County.

Although both sides in the issue have mentioned filing lawsuits, the parties hope that the matter can be resolved outside a courtroom.

On Friday, Magistrate Tommy Neil Adams made a motion that the court file suit against Pike County for breach of contract.

"They threatened to sue us, let's sue them," Adams said.

Magistrate Jackie Edford Owens

said that he would like to see the issue resolved without a lawsuit.

Adams added that Floyd County was willing to pay Pike County what was owed if the two county governments could agree on a price.

Hammond said he would contact Pike County Attorney Gary Johnson and try to resolve the issue without a court battle.

In a statement released Tuesday, Pike Judge-Executive Donna Damron said Pike County officials are willing to work with the Floyd Fiscal Court.

"Our court authorized the assistant county attorney to take whatever action he deems appropriate and necessary to collect this money," Damron's statement said. "They did not instruct him to file suit against Floyd County, although that is an alternative as a last resort.

"We hope to meet with (solid waste chairman) Mr. (Mike) Vance and Judge (John M.) Stumbo this week to discuss the issue. We would prefer to work this out without going to court. We think it has dragged on long enough and needs to be resolved."

A report on the issue is expected at the September Floyd Fiscal Court meeting.

In other discussions Friday, Eric Herrin, whose home is located directly behind where the new jail is being built, told the court that contractors had encroached on his property. Herrin added that he and his family would not be able to live in their home because of the noise.

Herrin also told the court that he felt like an outsider because no one

had approached him about the jail being built in front of his home.

Hammond advised the court that he felt contractors had encroached on Herrin's property and urged them to consider some type of settlement with Herrin.

"In our haste to do a good thing, we failed to do things for the people most affected," Hammond said. "Our suspicions are that we have encroached on his property. If we have, we are liable for the value of the home immediately before and after the encroachment."

Hammond commented that he had advised the court to look at purchasing Herrin's and his neighbor's, Georgia Hyden's properties.

The court took no action on the issue.

Also Friday:

- The court agreed to mail quarterly checks to area senior citizen centers so that center directors would not have to be present at the court meetings to receive the funds.

- Jailer Roger Webb introduced Doug Copley, a representative of a computer firm, who talked to the court about installing a computer system at the jail. The system would allow jail personnel to take photos of everyone who came into the facility and would store the jail's daily records. The jail would receive over \$100,000 worth of computer equipment which would be paid for by inmate's use of the jail phone. Webb told the court he was bringing the issue before the court as a courtesy, but the court decided to further investigate the issue.

- Larry Tackett expressed concern about routing a road at Hen Pen near Melvin Elementary. Tackett said the change would create a dangerous intersection in the area. Magistrate Adams said the process was already underway, but he would take a second look at the proposed change.

- Medisin representative Bob Ford asked the court to revise its solid waste plan concerning limits on the amount of waste generated by the company's medical waste incinerators. The court told Ford to take up the issue with the Floyd County Solid Waste Commission.

- The court agreed to contribute \$2,000 to the Floyd County Slone Mountain Squirrel Festival.

- The court denied a request from the Floyd County Red Cross for funds to aid families whose homes have burned. Bob Ford announced that his company may be able to assist the Red Cross with the request.

- The court appointed Mike Vanderpool to a seat on the solid waste commission. One seat on the commission remains vacant.

All court members were present at Friday's meeting.

# Prestonsburg City Council members put salve on sore spot between fire, police departments

Prestonsburg's City Council took about 15 minutes Monday to douse a fire that has been smoldering for much of the past eight years.

Council attempted Monday to close a gap in pay scales and work schedules between city police and fire departments, an issue that has been a regular sore spot for city officials and employees for quite some time.

The disparity apparently results primarily from hourly work schedules and guaranteed overtime hours.

"The obvious solution," council personnel committee chairman Robert Allen said Tuesday, "would be for police and fire department employees to work the same schedules. That's not possible, though, because state law sets the maximum hourly schedule for fire departments."

Council voted Monday to set police department work schedules to 36 hours one week and 48 the next for each two-week pay period. That system guarantees police officers eight

overtime hours each pay period.

Fire department employees will work 80 regular hours every two weeks and will get an additional 16 hours of overtime. Council adopted a new hourly pay rate schedule Monday for fire and police personnel which is based on years of service and which attempts to close some gaps between the department salaries.

Also during Monday's abbreviated session, council agreed to table the second and final reading of a comprehensive ethics policy for city officials. City attorney Gary Brown suggested that council members scrutinize the policy carefully before its adoption.

All members but Hansel Cooley were present for the regular meeting.

# Firefighters bring home fire at Cow Creek under control

A Cow Creek home was damaged by fire Saturday afternoon, but it was saved from destruction by the quick response of the Cow Creek Volunteer Fire Department.

The fire damaged two bedrooms in the one-story brick home of Hattie Jarrell of Slick Rock, and the rest of the home received minor smoke damage, said Jim Caldwell, Cow Creek fire chief.

Firefighters saved the home from destruction, Caldwell said, because neighbors had noticed the smoke before the fire got completely out of control.

"This was one of the best responses we've had," Caldwell said. The fire

department received the call around 1:50 p.m. Saturday and were battling the blaze within ten minutes, he said. Eight volunteer firefighters, manning two pumper trucks, responded.

"If fire departments receive a call promptly, then homes can be saved," the fire chief said. "Then you can respond and do some good."

Only two rooms of the home were destroyed because firefighters ventilated the structure, he said.

The fire began in one of the bedrooms and, although the cause of the fire has not been determined, Caldwell thinks it may have been electrical. Arson is not suspected in the blaze.

The Jarrell family was not at home at the time of the fire, Caldwell said, because they were attending a family birthday party at Prater Creek.

# State police investigating stabbing at State Road Fork

The stabbing is under investigation by Kentucky State Police detective Joel Newsome.





dant would welcome such a move, I ask the court to refrain from entering an order of dismissal."

Instead, Turner asked the court to "follow its own orders" in relation to its demand for proof from McKinney.

could reverse the school's decision if they felt the action taken was inappropriate. Towler said that, to his knowledge, Trivette and the coaching staff at Prestonsburg had thoroughly investigated the incident. He said he would stand behind Trivette's decision unless other information was uncovered.

Towler said that hazing had been "going on for years," but he did not approve of the practice.

"It is an unfortunate incident," Towler said. "A student has the right to be protected when being supervised by staff. (Hazing) is wrong and unacceptable behavior."

Principal Trivette could not be reached Tuesday for comment.

There is no specific section on hazing in the student code of conduct, but Towler said that it implied in the student's rights section that the behavior associated with hazing would not be tolerated.

The board is expected to address the matter on or before the September board meeting.

manager of Mountain Ambulance and Campton Ambulance; Ralph R. Gross, an employee of both ambulance services; and John Burnett, a driver and dispatcher for both companies.

The conspiracy alleged in the indictment suggests, among other charges, that the ambulance companies encouraged Medicaid patients to take unnecessary ambulance trips and filed false claims with Medicaid. The indictment alleges that Medicaid was defrauded of more than \$200,000.

The mail fraud charges stem from allegations that the U.S. Postal Service was used to process fraudulent Medicaid claims.

Neither Joseph nor his attorney, Phil Damron, of Prestonsburg, was available Tuesday for comment on the indictment.

An indictment by a grand jury is not an indication of guilt but a determination that the case merits further judicial action.

And, noting that the time for submitting evidence had expired, Turner requested that the judge issue a summary judgment in favor of Stumbo.

"(T)he people of Floyd County have been waiting for over a year to hear an impartial determination of what this plaintiff's evidence establishes," Turner wrote. "Anything less than findings based upon the evidence of record will forevermore leave the vicious allegations made by Mr. McKinney against John M. Stumbo unanswered and the public unsatisfied."

Several witnesses have given testimony through depositions in the lawsuit, but none have implicated Stumbo in any wrongdoing or supported the suit's claims that Stumbo was guilty of election fraud.

Meanwhile, as the dispute appears headed toward a conclusion in civil court, a criminal investigation into allegations of public corruption in Floyd County appears to be very much alive.

The criminal probe arose last March at the request of a Floyd County Grand Jury, which asked the state Attorney General's office to investigate allegations made by McKinney and others.

In an August 9 letter to Belhasen, assistant attorney general Larry Fentress confirmed that the attorney general's office "is engaged in a review of certain allegations of public corruption in Floyd County," and he asked that copies of depositions taken in McKinney's suit be forwarded to his office.

Ed Lynch, a spokesman for Attorney General Chris Gorman's office, offered no details Tuesday on the status of the probe.

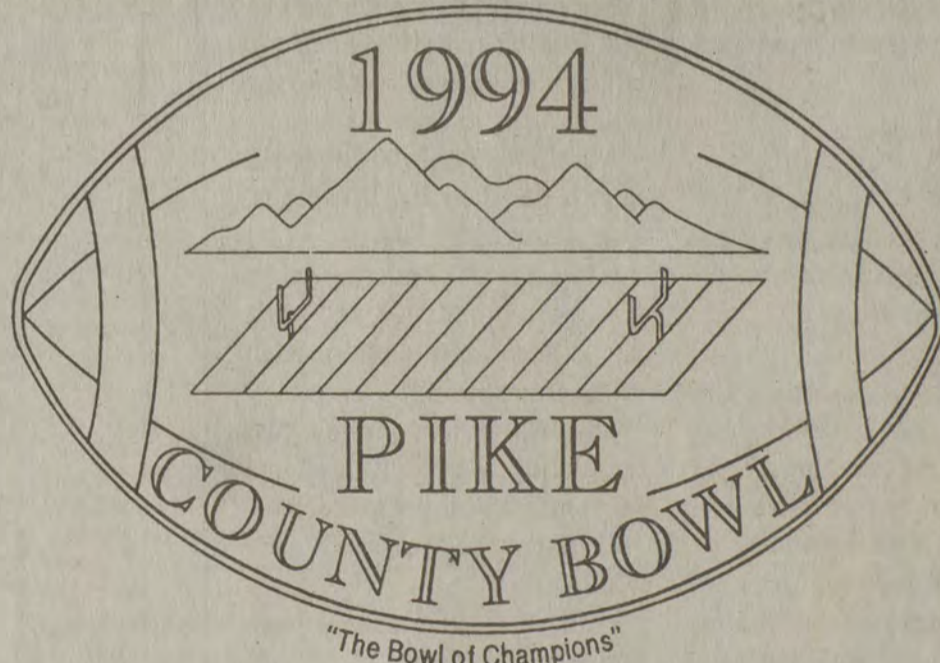

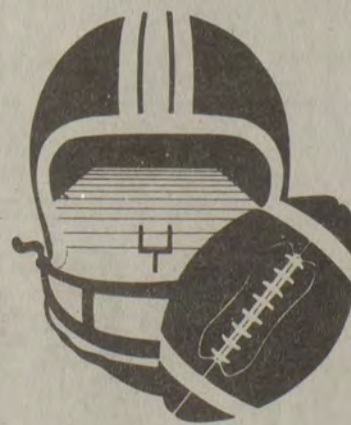

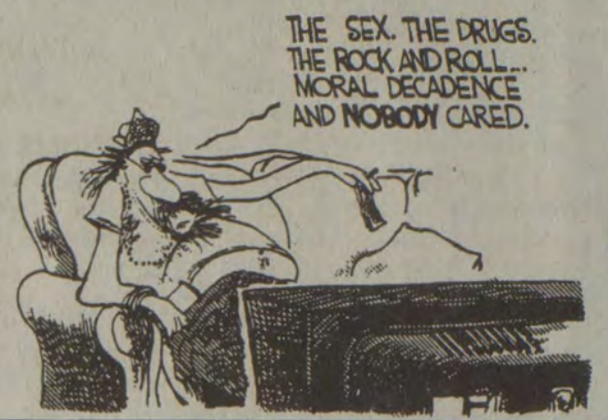
All of those necessities could have been taken care of months, even years ago.

### Handicapped veteran agrees with letter writer

Editor:

I agree with the letter in your paper, August 17, by Joe D. Weddington Jr. Hooray for the police officer that wrote the guy the ticket.

I am a veteran. I was in a war that I didn't ask to be in and as a result of the injuries I received in that war, I am confined to a wheelchair for life.

I agree that the fine should be \$500 dollars for any able-bodied person who parks in a handicapped parking space. I use the term able-bodied person because I personally have witnessed people in their late teens and twenties driving cars and vans with handicapped tags or plates parked in handicapped parking spaces at shopping centers and other business, and get out and literally run into the place they wanted to go.

It most certainly appears that a lot of people think the state and federal laws concerning the handicapped were written for disabled cars and not for disabled people.

The fact that people drive a vehicle with a handicapped plate or tag doesn't grant them the right to park in a handicapped parking space, only their medical record gives them that right, and by law you must have proof if questioned by a police officer.

So to the police officer that wrote the guy the ticket, I would personally

like to say thank you for doing your job and keep up the good work by enforcing the law to the letter. And thank you Mr. Weddington for speaking out for the handicapped.

The incident at the Holiday Inn was just a minor incident in comparison to the situation my wife and I encountered at the Floyd County Courthouse on August 8, 1994. A few days before the above date, I received a notice from the Floyd County sheriff that if I did not pay the \$27.87 tax that I owed he would sell my property.

On the above date, my wife, who is also disabled, went to the courthouse to pay the sheriff the tax. When we arrived at the courthouse there was no place to park. The sheriff deputies' cars had all the handicapped parking places taken. We had to find a parking place some distance from the courthouse. While in the sheriff's office, I asked a deputy if I had no handicapped tag, would he give me a ticket? His reply was, and I quote, "not from me you would not."

I would like to remind the sheriff and all his deputies that they are bound by law to obey the law, as well to enforce the law. No excuses and no favoritism to any one. We, the handicapped, must obey the law, and no excuses or favoritism would be accepted.

My wife and I filed a written complaint with the deputy that was in the sheriff's office on the above stated date. Did the sheriff see the written complaint? I can not answer that, because I have not received any reply.

We're just speculating here, but now that DNA tests have positively linked OJ to the scene of the crime, there's a reasonable

chance for a shift in the line of defense from 'not guilty' to 'I-did-it-but-I'm-not-responsible.'

Too many blows to the head on the football field?

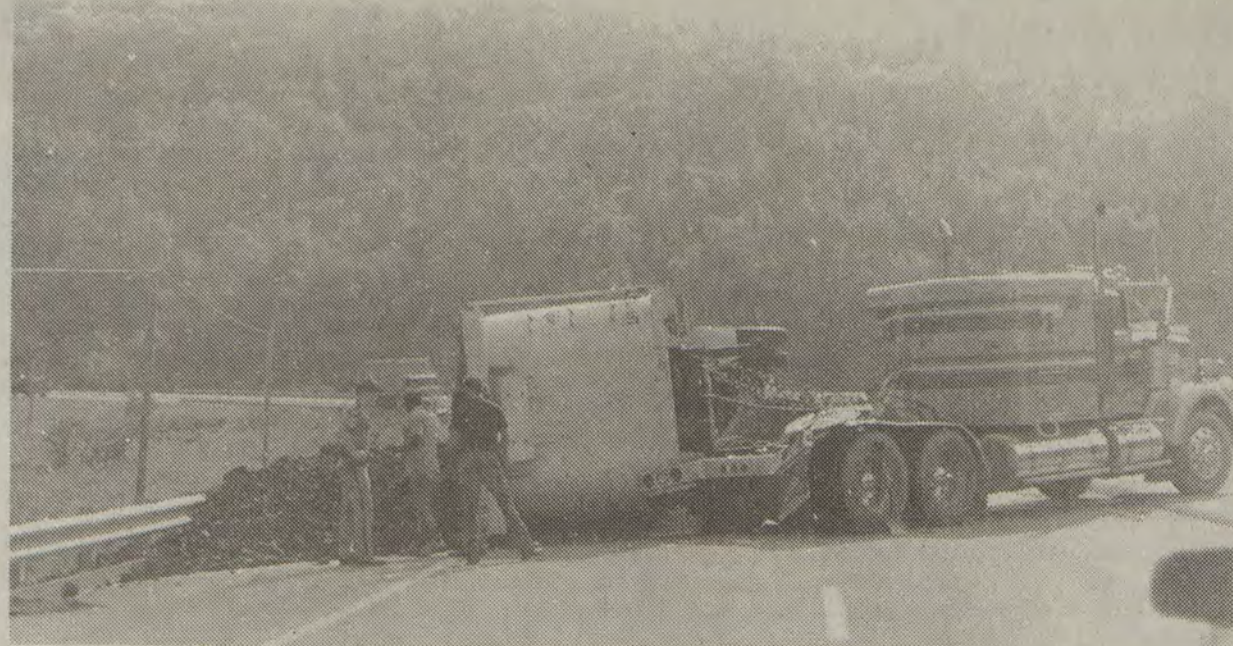
Schools are back in session for what is likely to be the most critical year yet for measuring academic progress under the Kentucky Education Reform Act.

school districts must obligate a minimum of five cents per \$100 valuation of property in a district to the building fund.

The board passed a resolution Monday, which raises the amount of participation in the funding formula from five cents to 6.75 cents per \$100 evaluation. That move is expected to generate \$350,000 for the building program.

The school district will use those funds, coupled with monies from the Kentucky Facilities Support Program and capital outlay monies for the site purchase. Board members also hope to find enough monies from those sources to acquire additional property to build athletic facilities at South Floyd and Prestonsburg High Schools.

Towler noted Tuesday that the district does not have enough funds at this time to complete a major renovation project at Prestonsburg High School. The superintendent said that there are only enough funds to complete part of the project.

Ryles said Tuesday that if a BG-1

is submitted for the Betsy Layne Middle School site, the department will ask for a cost estimate and will also examine the district's financial ability to complete the project.

Other school construction projects underway in the district include an addition at Adams Middle School and Betsy Layne Elementary, and a new Martin/Maytown Elementary.

School officials also hope to gain additional funds by closing out construction accounts for the Duff and Allen Elementary school projects.

The only way the district could realize some financial relief from an excess funds in those accounts would be to use those funds to reduce their bond indebtedness.

Since state School Facility Construction Commission funds were used to build those two schools, any remaining monies are required to be used either to make additional improvements on the projects or go toward paying off the bonded indebtedness on the projects.

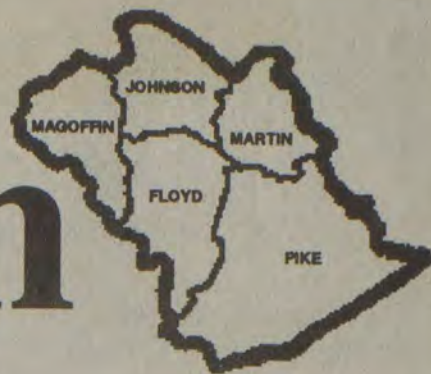

The Community College Council serves as an executive committee for the Senate of the Community College System in exercising the functions delegated to the Senate by the Governing Regulations. The council also serves in an advisory capacity to the Chancellor for the Community College System on all matters relative to the welfare of the System which he may bring to the council or which it may suggest for discussion.

## Louisa bone marrow drive planned

Louisa residents are having their first Bone Marrow Drive with a goal to put 100 people on the National Registry (NMDP). A Representative of the bone marrow program will be available during this special event, September 10, from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at 123 S. Main Cross Street, Louisa.

Every year, more than 16,000 children and adults in the United States are diagnosed with fatal blood diseases such as leukemia. For many of these patients, a bone marrow transplant is the only cure. However, such a transplant is possible only when the patient and donor have matching marrow types.

Nearly 30 percent of the patients in need will find a matched donor

within their family. The other 70 percent of patients must search for an unrelated donor. These patients will turn to the National Marrow Donor Program's (NMDP) Registry of volunteer marrow donors in the hope of finding a match.

At any given time, the Registry is being searched on behalf of more than 2,000 patients. The odds of finding an unrelated donor vary from one in 100 to one in 1 million, depending on the rarity of the patient's marrow type. The odds are generally higher for African American, Asian American, Hispanic and Native American patients. Because marrow types are inherited in the same way as skin, eye

and hair color, the best chance of finding a donor is within the patient's

racial background. Minorities are currently underrepresented on the NMDP Registry, so the need for minority volunteer donors is particularly great.

Anyone between the ages of 18 and 55, in good general health, can potentially become a volunteer marrow donor. After being educated about the donation process and signing a consent form, volunteers give a small blood sample (2-3 tablespoons), which will be tested for marrow type and listed on the NMDP Registry. For the convenience of the volunteer, this is done at the same time of the blood draw; and there will be no cost since this is in conjunction with the blood drive.

If a volunteer donor matches any of the patients searching the NMDP Registry, he or she has the opportunity to become a donor. The marrow is then collected from the rear of the pelvis in a simple surgical procedure performed under anesthesia, and the donor usually stays overnight in the hospital. A few days after the procedure, the donor is back to his or her everyday routine, although he or she generally experiences a dull ache in the lower back for about a week. Within several weeks, the donor's body naturally replenishes the donated marrow.

### Jackson weather station to stay open

The Jackson Weather Station will remain open and will receive a complete \$5.5 million modernization, including a new NEXRAD Doppler Radar that "will bring the station into the 21st Century and better protect Eastern Kentucky," U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers said Friday.

The Jackson modernization was included in the 1995 Commerce, Justice, State and Judiciary Appropriations Conference Report which passed overwhelmingly. Rogers, the ranking member on the Subcommittee that wrote the final version of the legislation, said it was approved by the Senate and now heads to President Clinton's desk for final approval.

Aware of local concerns about weather coverage and after discussions with National Weather Service officials and Secretary of Commerce Ron Brown, Rogers decided to push for the new NEXRAD (Next Generation Radar) Doppler system which far surpasses the old radar. It provides greater clarity and accuracy, early detection of damaging winds and can estimate rainfall amounts for use in river and flood forecasting.

"The NEXRAD is a computerized radar that is more sensitive and more powerful than the old system," Rogers said. "With Eastern Kentucky's terrain, it is vital that we get better coverage in Jackson to protect our families from disastrous weather and flash flooding."

"Right now, our region is on the fringes of coverage from stations in

Louisville, Knoxville, Tennessee, and Charleston, West Virginia," Rogers said. Without Jackson, there are just too many holes where there is little or poor weather service coverage."

Rogers said the Jackson station was established following the disastrous 1977 floods to provide better emergency weather service to the region prone to flash flooding.

"The Jackson Station is here because there was not adequate coverage to protect Eastern Kentucky," Rogers said. "This modernization will bring Jackson into the 21st Century with the latest and best equipment, assuring many families and businesses in Eastern Kentucky that there will be no surprises from Mother Nature."

Each year, Rogers and local officials have waged a battle to keep Jackson open, but with the new radar, Rogers said the station will be secure long into the future.

# All College Meeting at PCC prepares faculty and staff for new year



Guest speaker

Dr. Anne E. Mulder was the guest speaker at Prestonsburg Community College's All College Meeting on Thursday, August 11. Dr. Mulder, a Western Kentucky native, is program professor of Higher Education for the Center for the Advancement of Education at Nova Southeastern University in Fort Lauderdale, Florida.

"We are making history," Dr. Deborah L. Floyd, president of Prestonsburg Community College, told the PCC faculty and staff at the college's annual All College Meeting August 11. "This marks the 30th anniversary of the community college system in the Commonwealth of Kentucky and you are a part of this dream here in Prestonsburg Community College. You, individually, in your classrooms, on your jobs, in your offices, you are here to make a difference, to touch lives."

The All College Meeting is an annual event designed to prepare the college faculty and staff for the beginning of a new school year. 1994 fall semester classes at PCC begin August 24.

Dr. Floyd also told the faculty and staff that, as individuals or as a cohesive group, they can and do make a difference.

"Individually, collectively, we are here in Eastern Kentucky to make a difference and collectively, our energy, our enthusiasm and our expertise, working together will bring our team even more power in helping to

make a difference in the lives of the Eastern Kentuckians served."

Guest speaker, at the meeting were Dr. Anne E. Mulder, program professor of Higher Education for the Center for the Advancement of Education at Nova Southeastern University in Fort Lauderdale, Florida.

Dr. Mulder, a native of Western Kentucky, began her address by wishing PCC a Happy Birthday! She noted that she left Kentucky over 30 years ago, before there was a community college system in Kentucky.

Dr. Mulder left Kentucky for Michigan, where she held various faculty and administrative positions in Michigan postsecondary institutions. For nearly nine years she served as president of Lake Michigan College, one of Michigan's 29 community colleges.

"I'm almost a missionary when it comes to the issue of the community college," Dr. Mulder told PCC's faculty and staff. "I feel that the community college is such an important piece of life in the communities that we all live in across this great country and I

feel that the community colleges are at the very heart, the very lifeblood, if you will, of those communities. To be a part of the beat of that lifeblood is to be such an exciting thing."

Dr. Mulder said the community colleges are "a vibrant and vital part of our areas" maximizing the opportunity for the development of each individual within the community."

She complimented PCC on the River Walk, campus cleanliness, and proposed new student health clinic which could be operational as early as the 1995 spring semester. Dr. Mulder said the student health clinic is "an exciting opportunity," predicting that PCC "will become a model institution for the state, region and maybe for the country" in the area of student health care at the community college level.

Dr. Mulder urged the faculty to impress upon their students that learning is a lifelong commitment. "Are you creating within your institution and within your students who we serve the philosophy that education is an on-going process? That we have

to see it as a lifelong responsibility? That we cannot ever stop learning?"

She also urged the educators to develop an international perspective among their students. "Are we in our classrooms integrating the reality of the world around us through the services and systems that we represent as community college educators?" she asked. "The world you are living in will demand that kind of understanding."

In addition to addressing the All College Meeting, Dr. Mulder also spoke to PCC Committee Chairs on "Empowerment: A Key to Success," attended a President's Cabinet Meeting and attended Division meetings.

Jim Goble grew up around horses, so it was just natural for him to keep that love for horses after he and Pat Goble married.

"We bought him," said Pat Goble. "He ran in Lexington before we bought him and brought him here."

After purchasing the horse, the Gobles employed veteran trainer Bill Fawcett. The next step was to find a driver for the Race Bike.

"We have Jeff Cullipher as our driver," she said. "He drives all of our horses. He's an excellent driver and we're very pleased with him."

The trainer hires the driver, who

Racing season in harness racing runs throughout the year. Although Thunder Ridge ends its season September 11, the Gobles' horses will travel with Fawcett to Pennsylvania for fall racing. They will return to Lexington in the spring and then return to Thunder Ridge for the summer months.

"They just rotate from track to track," said Goble. "Once we turn the horse over to our trainer, we have no more dealings with the horse."

Goble said that Thunder Ridge is good for the community and that she is "enjoying it all."

The Cardinals were faced with a third-and-five situation when Jewell found an opening on the left side. Jewell was covered at first on the side but a breakdown on the part of the Rebel defense allowed him to get loose.

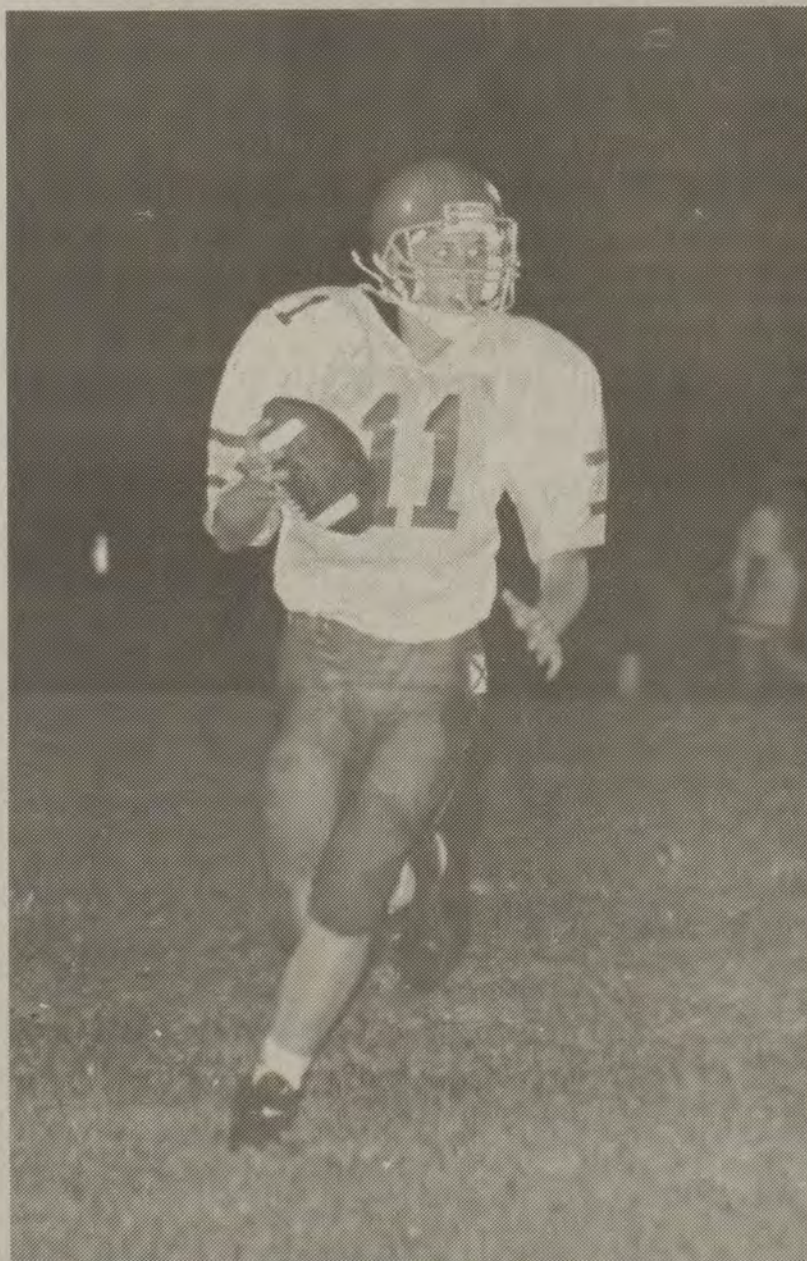
"We had a breakdown in our line," Coach Reeves said of the play. "Our defense just didn't pick up where they should have."

**Still another Hall of Fame for Grigsby**

Another Hall of Fame!

Gerri Grigsby, the nation's all-time leading scorer in both boys and girls basketball, will be inducted into her fourth Hall of Fame when the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame in Louisville meets this coming Monday evening in Louisville.

Grigsby is already a member of three halls, having being inducted into the KHSAA, Kentucky/Indiana and National Federation Hall of Fames.

"I don't know if there is another Hall of Fame for her to be inducted into after this one," said her father Pete Grigsby Jr. "We're very proud of her and her accomplishments. As a country girl from a small school, she did really well for herself."

It is not an unknown fact that Grigsby starred at McDowell High School where she amassed 4,385 total points to top all national scorers.

The amazing aspect of Grigsby's career is that she played only three years of basketball at McDowell. The Title IX program did not come in effect until the 1973-74 season when she started playing as a sophomore.

In 95 games as a starter, Grigsby averaged 46.1 points per game at McDowell with game highs of 81 and 66. The 81 point mark is the fifth best nationally in history.

She holds the national record for points scored in a season (1,885) and her junior-year total of 1,421 ranks third, according to the National High School Sports Record Book. Her senior year at McDowell she had a phenomenal 49.6 points-per-game average.

# Local bodybuilders learn from competition

"There is a lot of preparation for a meet of that caliber," said Burrus.

"It's good that someone from Eastern Kentucky can go down there and perform in front of a large crowd and win," said McKinney. "To go down there and do as well as we did."

McKinney placed second in the National Physique Committee Bodybuilding Championships in the heavy-weight division.

Leaving Louisville, McKinney made his way to Kingsport, Tennessee, where he took first place in the

men's heavyweight division, winning over 30 other competitors.

Howard was in Louisville in the Kentucky State Championships and placed second in the middleweight division. Howard had just won the Thoroughbred Classic in Lexington the week before.

The trio works out at McKinney's Top Dog Gym in Prestonsburg. They have dedicated themselves to their sport and have several meets in mind for next year.

Besides being competitors themselves, they also help others who want to get involved.

"We've worked with football players. We've worked with women. We worked with Mary Reffitt, who was Miss Teenage in Kentucky and competed in the Miss USA pageant in Hollywood," explained McKinney.

for three years and been in competition for two of those years.

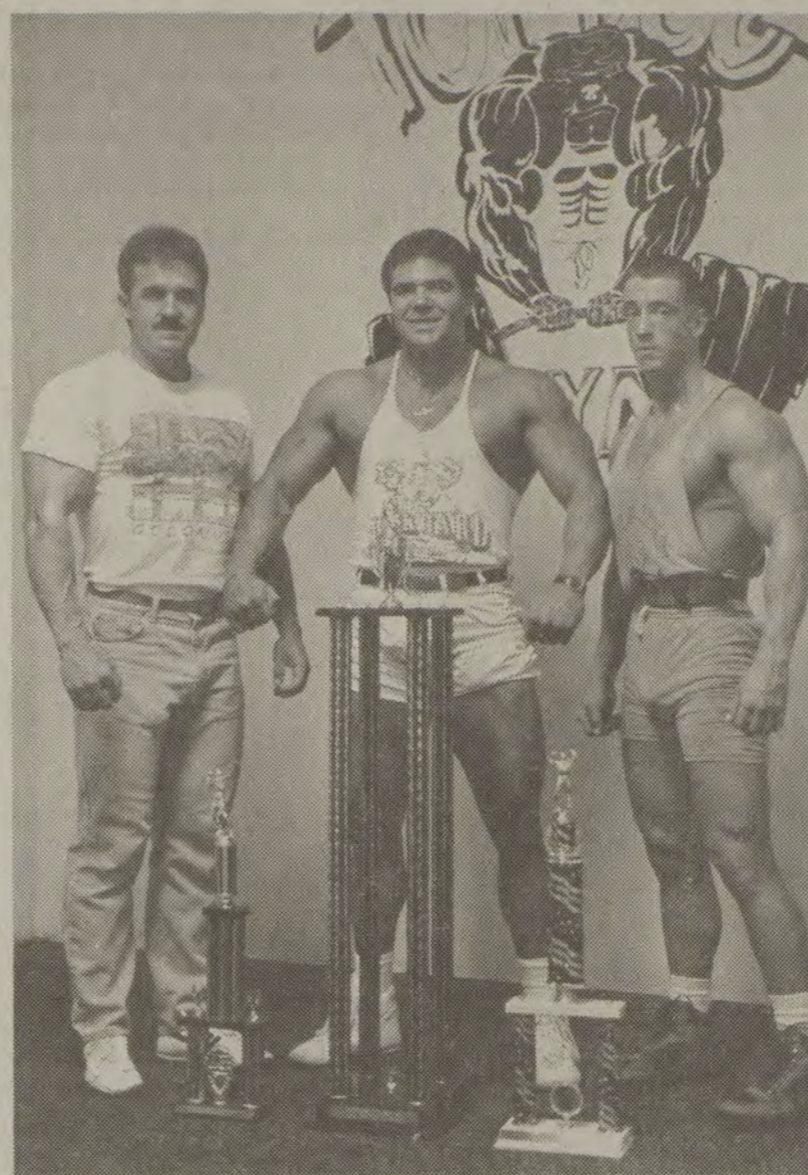
"I count myself fortunate to be doing as well as I am," he said.

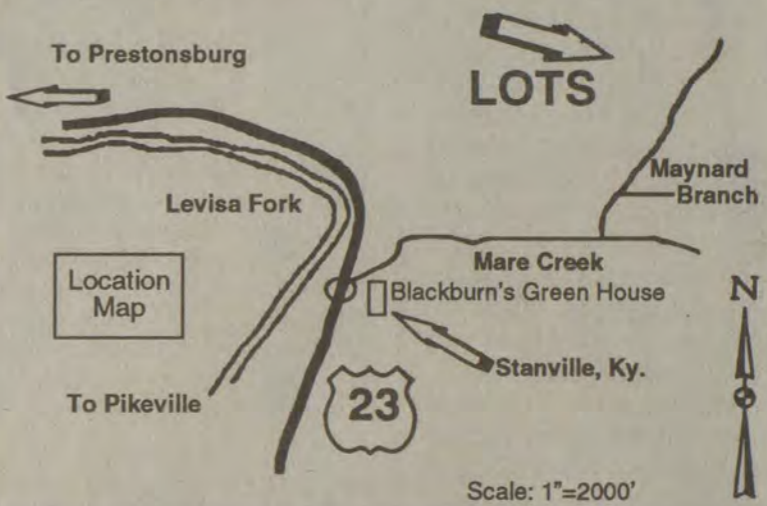

# Horse training is a seven-days-a-week job

Ever thought about entering the profession of training horses to become good harness racers? You may want to talk to some of the trainers at Thunder Ridge before making that decision. The weeks are long and so are the hours. The pay is dependent upon the success of the horse or horses that you train.

"If you don't love it, you won't last long," said Bill Fawcett of Fawcett Stables, who has been in the business of training horses for the past 15 years.

Fawcett, who lives in Carrollton, Ohio, says that he likes it here in Eastern Kentucky. He worked previously in Lexington. "I liked it in Lexington and decided to come up here this year," he said. "Thunder Ridge is a nice facility and they have an excellent track." Fawcett got his start in the training business by just hanging around the track in his hometown and occasionally getting permission to jog the horses.

"You go to the track and if you like it, you talk to some people and get involved," he said. "That's how I got started."

Fawcett said much is involved in becoming a trainer in harness racing. "Well, first in harness racing, the standard bred horse is the best harness horse. Then you have to have all your equipment, jog carts and race bikes," he said. "It's a seven-days-a-week job. You have to feed the horses three to four times a day."

Fawcett has ten horses at Thunder Ridge, plus two in the Pennsylvania area, that he trains. He jogs the horses at Thunder Ridge nearly every day, "but we give them one day off to rest."

"The horses race once a week," he said. "There is really a lot involved in training horses."

Fawcett said that he arrives at the stable area around six in the morning and works until two.

"Then I come back at four, then I leave around eleven," he explained.

Fawcett's morning consists of jogging and exercising the horses.

The veteran trainer would like to

see more people in the county educated about harness racing and about the difference in the horses. He said that while a stallion can become a good harness horse, the standard bred is the best.

He said that in the standard bred there are two different gaits -- trotters and pacers.

"They're bred in the breeding," he explained, "most of the time. Not a hundred percent. You have track bred horses that pace or pacers that trot."

"A pacer moves his right front and right hind legs together. We have what is called a hobble that is split. Each leg goes into one part and the other leg in the other."

"A trotter moves his right front and left hind together. They are the better of the two to watch, but a harder gait to keep in stride," he said.

While the low purses at Thunder Ridge are normal for a new facility, Fawcett said that it would be difficult to make a living with just one horse. That is why he has ten. He owns some of the horses and he trains others for owners like Jim and Pat Goble of Stratton Branch.

"Pat and Jim's horse (Danny's Dancer) has been a surprise somewhat," said Fawcett. "We felt when we bought the horse it was a bottom class claimer."

What is a bottom class claimer?

"A claiming race is where you put a horse and you put a price tag on him," explained Fawcett. "Anybody who has a license, if they want that horse, like 15 minutes before a race, they can put in a claim and when the race starts, it's their horse. The large class here is \$2,000 and that is where we started."

Since then, Danny's Dancer has been moved up two levels which makes the competition tougher.

"What they paid for him, we could start him out there. He did good (winner of four of five races) so we moved him up a couple of classes."

Fawcett said that he had seen Danny's Dancer run before the Gobles bought him and he liked what he saw.

"We liked the way he looked," he said.

Fawcett hopes to be in the business another 15 years and finds the job as exciting as ever.

"Absolutely! I want to keep going. If you don't like it, you won't be in it long. You like it or you don't."

"I like working for myself. I like the challenge that it presents. Different horses have to be treated different ways. The atmosphere of the whole thing—I like it a lot."

Fawcett, who hires the drivers (in harness racing they are drivers, not jockeys) looks for the best driver he can find. He said that there has to be a line of communication between the driver and trainer.

"We look for someone who will listen and talk to you about how the horse handles," he said. "The trainer knows the horse better than the driver. You want the driver to take your advice."

"We generally talk a few minutes before each race. Once the trainer gets to know the driver, there's not a whole lot to say."

The horse is trained with the driver using a jog cart. At race time, the driver rides in a race bike.

Fawcett said that it appears that he will be returning to Thunder Ridge next season with 10 or 12 horses. He will travel to Pennsylvania after the racing season closes September 11 at Thunder Ridge and will remain there

until next April.

Fawcett likes Thunder Ridge and thinks the track owners have done a great job in the short time they had to put things together.

"It is different than other tracks we have been at," he said. "It's the first year and it's new to the area."

"The track itself is real good. It wasn't ready in the barn area when we got here. But they've done a pretty good job with it. It has a good future."

Fawcett said that publicity was lacking in making the public more aware of the facility.

"They (Thunder Ridge) don't have anyone in that department. I think that if they went out and hired a publicity director and try to get people involved in (harness racing) and teach them what Thunder Ridge is all about, maybe people here would get more

interested and buy horses.

"They had to hustle to get the place open, but next year they need to promote harness racing more," he said.

The Ohio trainer thinks that the motor speedway and the dust it creates isn't good for the horses and the two seasons need to be separate.

"They should have horse racing first then start the car racing," he said. "The dust is bad for the horses and it is hard enough to keep the horses breathing good to run a race."

"The noise, they get used to that. But the dust does bother them. If they can't breathe, they can't finish a race. That's the hardest thing in this business, is keeping their lungs clear."

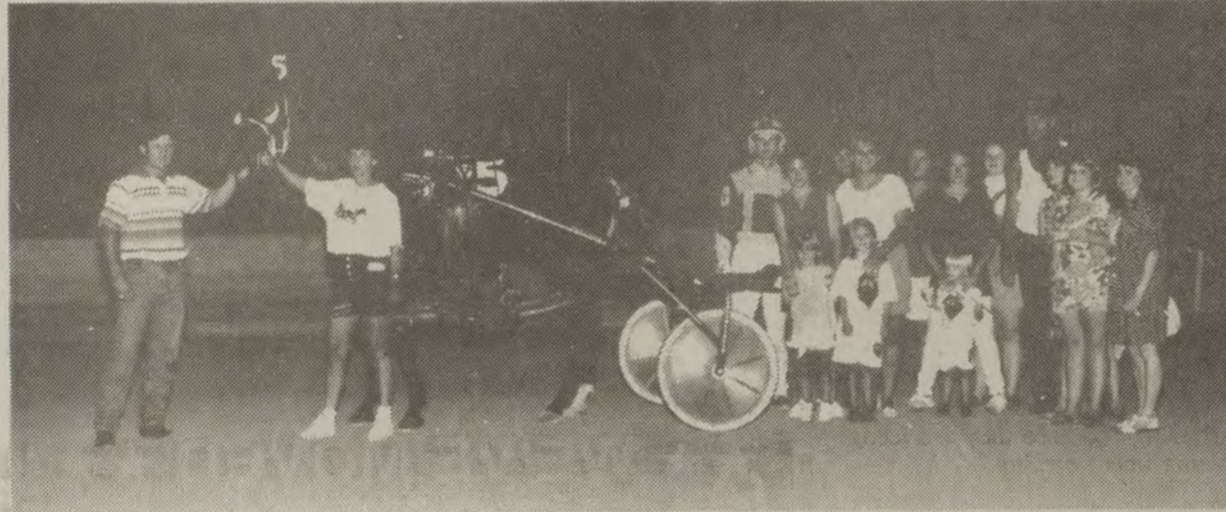
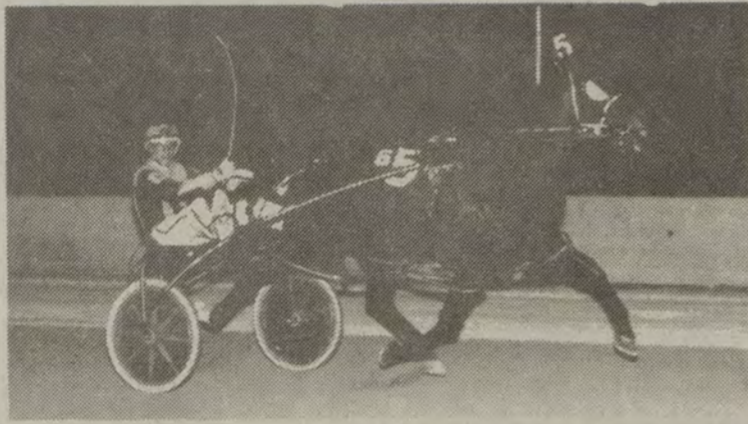

# Bassin' with the Pros

## TOPWATER FISHING STARTS IN EARNEST THIS MONTH

If given a choice, most bass fishermen prefer spring over all other seasons because the fish are shallow and easier to catch.

Not David Wharton, a former guide on Sam Rayburn Lake in Texas. He likes the summer.

"Summer means topwater fishing," says Wharton, a veteran bass tournament pro and member of the Johnson Outboards Pro Staff. "It's exciting, it means big bass, and it's easy."

Topwater fishing generally begins in May in the deep South, but by June, lakes throughout much of the rest of the nation have warmed enough that surface plugs will draw vicious strikes from active largemouth and smallmouth bass.

Wharton's three favorite topwater lures can be categorized as chuggers, concave-faced plugs that pop and spit water; slush baits that feature one or more propellers; and walking baits that sashay from side to side when retrieved in quick jerks.

"Water conditions usually determine which of these lures will be the most effective," explains Wharton. "For example, with a slight ripple on the water, or when I'm fishing very fast, I use a chugger. When the surface is calm and I'm fishing slower, a slush bait is usually much more productive."

The walking baits normally produce fewer strikes, explains Wharton, but larger bass. He likes to use these lures in calm water, but others have equal success in choppy conditions. He also uses them when fishing over deep water because they pull fish up from the depths.

"In the summer, the best times to use topwater lures are normally early and late each day," adds the Johnson pro, "but if you see fish activity at mid-day, then by all means consider using a topwater lure."

"Also, if you've been catching bass on the bottom with a worm or jig and suddenly the action stops, the bass may have moved up to suspend, and a topwater lure often starts bringing strikes again."

Wharton's best-ever topwater bass, a giant weighing more than eight pounds, hit a walking surface lure at mid-day. The water was calm and the sky was bright.

"Don't put away your topwater lures just because it's hot and bright," he says. "I've seen many times when topwater lures produced excellent catches during the hottest part of the day."

Wharton prefers to fish topwater lures around vegetation, boat docks, or the shaded sides of bushes and trees. He uses a six-foot light action rod and 14 pound test-line.

Regardless of the type of tackle or lure being used, the one key rule about fishing all topwater lures, Wharton emphasizes, is not to get in a hurry when using them.

"You don't ever want to cross the ripples," he says. "You make a cast and let the ripples die. Then you move the lure."

## BASS PATTERNS OFTEN CHANGE THROUGHOUT A DAY

If there's one bit of advice bass tournament pro Charlie Reed can offer to younger anglers, it is to learn the meaning of versatility.

"Don't get locked into one technique and stay with it even when the

bass aren't biting," says the Johnson Outboards Pro Staff angler and winner of the 1986 Bass Masters Classic\* world championship.

"Bass patterns can change very quickly, often for reasons we aren't even aware of, and to be successful, you have to recognize when they change and adjust your fishing accordingly."

The most obvious indication things have changed is when bass suddenly stop biting, says the Oklahoma pro, but sometimes a pattern will change

even though they still hit lures.

"It's the force of the strike itself that may change," says Reed, "or perhaps the number of casts you make between strikes. You may be happy because you are getting occasional fish, but what you have to recognize is that you could be catching many more fish if you change something."

"That something could be as subtle as a new lure color, a slower or faster retrieve, a different lure, or perhaps a change of depth."

If bass suddenly stop biting, Reed

suggests changing lures before changing places. The bass may have become too accustomed to seeing that particular lure, or simply been spooked, especially if bass have been caught and released in that spot.

"Sometimes bass on the bottom will move up a few feet to suspend, or suspending bass may move down to feed. Your lure may not be reaching them," says the Johnson pro. "Whatever lure you're using, try something different to see if you can generate a strike."

The way bass are actually striking a lure can also be an indication of a pattern change, especially if the strikes become much more tentative. Again, the solution is to change to a lure with a different action.

Cloud cover, wind, an approaching storm, falling temperatures, current, and changing water clarity are just a few of the factors that can change patterns very rapidly, says Reed.

"I have experienced days when I knew bass were in the area I was

fishing but I couldn't do anything to get a strike," remembers Reed, "and then a breeze would start and create a ripple on the surface. Within minutes, I'd catch bass."

"Naturally, I have also experienced just the opposite, too. A good bass fisherman has to learn to be aware of these little things because they can certainly make a big difference in whether or not he catches fish."

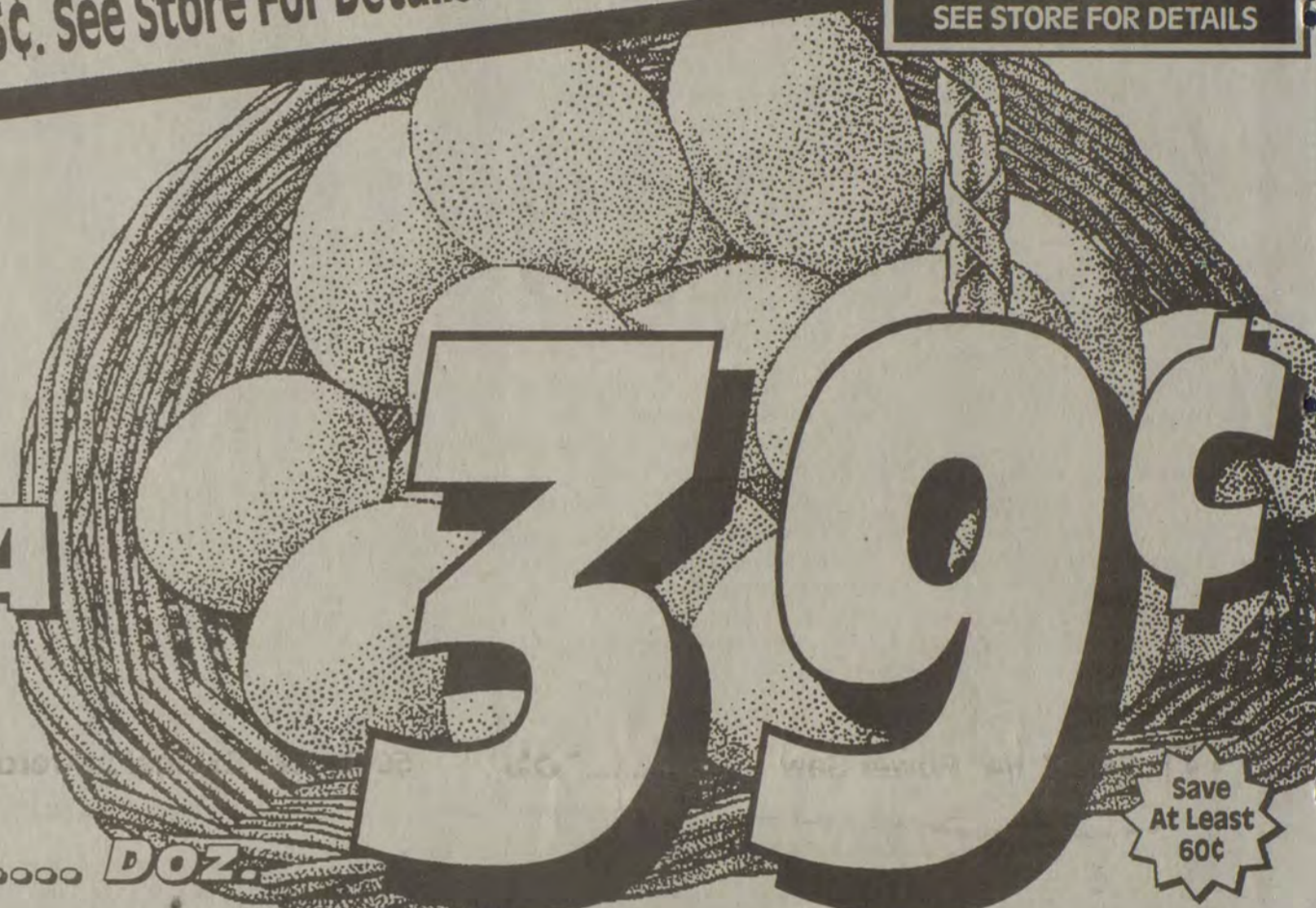

# Sports in Kentucky

**Good news: State's fans get UK-UofL and EKU-WKU on the tube**

Football fans in the Commonwealth get a feast Sept. 1 and 3.—EKU-WKU on Thursday, UK-UofL on Saturday.

Good news: University of Kentucky football season ticket holders will sit in on seven games of a schedule rated 21st in the country (Sagarin Ratings).

Bad news: Sagarin predicts the Wildcats will finish 4-7.

Says here, Bill Curry's team will take a 3-1 record to Auburn Sept. 29. If that happens, Kentucky will finish 74 or 8-3 if UK can upend Georgia at home or Tennessee in Knoxville.

Footnote: Yes, I'm the fellow who predicted last August that Kentucky would play in the Peach Bowl.

Good news: the Kentucky-Louisville 7:08 EDT kickoff is a week-and-a-half away and will be televised just the way C.M. Newton told Sports In Ky. two months ago it would be, point-to-point, to Louisville only.

Bad news: WDRB-TV, Ch. 41 will join the game in progress after 8 p.m.

**EASTERN-WESTERN**

Good news: 8 p.m. EDT kickoff Thursday, Sept. 1 in Bowling Green. Game will be televised live by WTVG, Ch. 36 in Lexington, WHAS, Ch. 11 in Louisville and Sports South on cable. It will be available to 4.5 million households across 11 states.

Good news: Excellent regionalizing decision by ABC-TV execs for Sept. 10, allowing UK and Louisville fans to see their favorite team on the road on the tube.

Fans from, say, Shelbyville eastward, can watch the UK-Florida game on ABC, 3:30 kickoff; Louisville Cardinal fans can tune in UofL-Texas on the same network, same time.

**BILL CURRY**

Bill Curry is a fascinating fellow. Too frequently these days, I suspect Kentuckians, sports fans and not, fail to appreciate the substance of this man and our state's good fortune having him here.

As the sports landscape continues to be muddled by Dream Teamers bent on proving 'something,' a baseball strike that makes hateful headlines about money, Money, MONEY, the University of Kentucky's football coach provides a reality check, a little fresh air.

From UK's football media guide, a section that precious few in my business will pay much attention to, Curry expounds on important issues that reach well beyond the province Howard Cosell dubbed the jockocracy.

**Playoff for Div. I football.**

"The most important people in the process are and always will be the players. There is so much discussion about the fans deserving a (national) champion. Well, why do the fans deserve a champion? (As Americans) there are certain things we deserve—freedom of religion, speech, freedom to be treated like human beings. But nobody said we deserve a playoff system. That's not in the Constitution."

UK's coach, who has served on the NCAA playoff feasibility panel, asks, "What is the benefit for the players? I don't see it. Until I see a benefit for the players, I'm not going to endorse any kind of expansion to the season."

Academic recognitions. UK football received its fourth CFA Academic Achievement Award last year.

"It's almost a shame that we honor

programs that have graduated over 70 per cent," Curry says. "Why wouldn't you just do that? Our goal is to graduate all of them."

Should players be compensated?

"Players are compensated. They are compensated extremely well. What players are getting now in terms of education is worth a lot of money."

NOTE: With two children in college, Amen.

Coaches being paid by athletic equipment companies to have their teams wear a certain shoe.

Curry says his superiors at Georgia Tech, Alabama and Kentucky okayed his taking compensation from shoe companies.

"(But) I've made a decision recently not to keep the money," he says. "I'm not going to be standing there with money going into my bank account, with my players wondering if I'm putting this particular kind of pressure on them to wear (a certain shoe). I'm going to use the money in charitable causes or I'm going to put it back into the program some way."

Despite a Peach Bowl trip last year, UK is picked to finish no higher than 'middle of the pack' in the SEC again. When will Kentucky receive the credibility it hopes for?

"After you win a couple of championships," Curry says. "Not one, but a couple. The first one they call a fluke. You need to win it two or three years and then they'll start giving you too much credit. Then you'll be called a dynasty and you'll be knocked on your rear-end. It's all out of perspective. The pendulum swings too far—too far negative, too far positive. You're either terrible or you're just awesome. In fact, it's seldom either of those cases. It's almost always somewhere in between."

"And I don't care about getting credit. I care about performance."

**Bill Curry**

**DEREK ANDERSON: UK?**

Indications are Derek Anderson might not be able to keep his secret until then, but the Ohio State star has scheduled a news conference this Friday where he may announce plans to transfer to the University of Kentucky.

A junior-to-be, Anderson is a Derrick Miller look-a-like who is a jet with a broader range of skills. If he transfers, the 6-5 wingman must sit out a year and have two seasons eligibility left.

Anderson would then join a UK backcourt that could be crowded—6-1 senior Tony Delk, 6-1 junior Anthony Epps, 6-4 junior Jeff Sheppard, 6-5 sophomore Allen Edwards, 6-3 Cameron Mills (walk-on), and whoever Kentucky might sign.

Downside. Taking Anderson, UK could compromise its chances of signing 6-6 wingman Ron Mercer... unless Rodrick Rhodes declares for the NBA draft next spring.

Nevertheless, if Anderson signs on, what a coup for Rick Pitino. Without investing time, energy and money in recruiting, UK will have landed a Louisville-area player (Doss High) already proven at Div I., and penetrated Jefferson County for a blue chip for the first time since Winston Bennett ('83).

**RALPH WILLARD**

This might be the year Johnny Majors makes the turn, takes Pittsburgh football 'back to the high life again.'

Hear that, Ralph?

Ex-Western Kentucky coach Ralph Willard says he looked into his crystal ball and saw the Sun Belt being squeezed out of Div. I basket-

ball. Time to jump ship, take the Pittsburgh job.

But, according to Steel town sports writer Mike DeCourcy, "(Willard) certainly bought himself a lot more aggravation in the bargain. (Such sweet guys, those Golden Panthers boosters)."

Not to worry though, the Pitt job is just another rung on the ladder on the way back to the (real) high life in Lexington. Right, Ralph?

**MR. BASKETBALL VIEW 'DISPUTED'**

Said in this space recently that Kentucky's high school coaches 'blew it,' failed to do their homework in selecting Elton Scott Mr. Basketball 1994.

"So, who should have won it?" a telephone caller asked.

State's best player was Greg Buckner of University Heights and he qualified academically to play college basketball immediately (at Clemson).

State's best student-athlete: Probably Tony Pietrowski of Corbin. Student body president, Pietrowski was a solid student. He led his team to a 30-plus win season; and he qualified to play college basketball as a freshman (at LSU).

Since candidates for Mr. and Miss Basketball are normally quick to be recognized, I believe the selection process could be made vastly more efficient if a youngster's athletic, academic and citizenship credentials were gathered, packaged and submitted to the KHSAA in February.

First week in March the KHSAA could distribute resumes to voting coaches with ballots arriving soon after.

**ON THE MOVE**

Todd Conley (Elkhorn City), a Mr. Basketball candidate last season, changed his mind about Georgetown College and has enrolled at Pikeville College...Danyell Macklin (PRP), having botched his scholarship at Western, Ky. University, has transferred to Sullivan College, according to a WKU spokesperson... And, Brad Divine (Muhlenberg North) has left Eastern Ky. University and may enroll at Western Ky.

If Divine signs with Western, the 6-2 guard will have two years eligibility left. Says here, the southpaw would be a fine catch for Coach Matt Kilcullen joining Michael Fralix and filling a vacancy left by Keith Willard.

Divine is quick, a good perimeter shooter and a savvy floor leader.

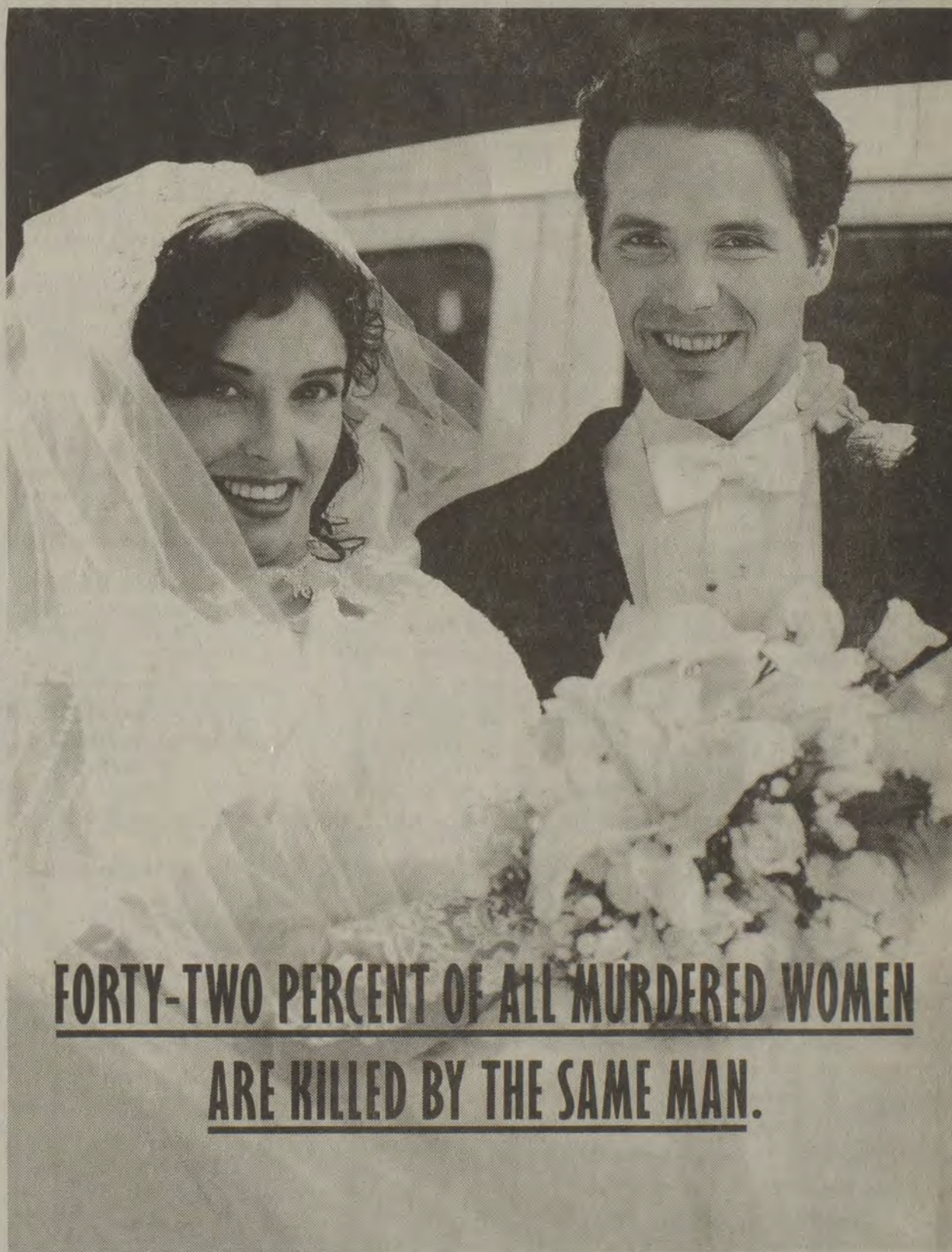
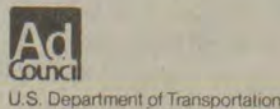

With August upon us, a lot of fellows I know are already honing their arrows and checking their gear to get ready for the coming deer season.

Always having been a gun hunter myself, I never had the affliction quite that bad. Still, I well remember when the tingly anticipation of waiting for the season to open and getting everything ready for it was nearly as much enjoyment as the hunt itself.

Alas, those days are long gone for me. It's been more than 20 years since I last drew down on a deer, and it may very well be that I'll never shoot one again with anything more potent than a camera. But on the other hand, maybe it all depends on how hungry I get.

At the rate our federal, state and local governments keep digging into my pocket for taxes, I may soon have to take up deer-hunting again just to keep myself fed, particularly if Bill and Hillary can push their cockamamie health scheme through. For my part, I'd rather succumb to an uninsured illness than be taxed to death.

The last serious deer hunt I went on was in the Jefferson National Forest in Smythe County, Va., back about 1973. There were plenty of deer about, but my pals and I were having real trouble crossing paths with any of them that were legal. Half a dozen of us had been camped out and beating the bushes for nearly a week, and while we'd seen plenty of does, we'd not had a sniff of a buck.

In fact, the only thing we had to show for our efforts so far was a single wild turkey that one of the fellows had shot and which promptly went in the pot. Trouble was, by the time the turkey was divided six ways, it only provided the makings for one good meal. We needed venison bad.

And that was the shape of things when we fanned out and took to the woods with flashlights well before daybreak on the next-to-the-last day of our hunt.

To tell the truth, I guess a lot of the edge had already worn off my hunting urge before I made that trip, because the whole time I was on it I just couldn't force myself to work up any serious interest in trying to get a deer.

It's safe to confess it now; on that next-to-the-last morning, as soon as I

got to the place I'd previously picked out to hunt and wriggled myself into a nice comfortable position with my back resting against the bole of big hickory tree, I promptly went off to sleep.

When I woke up, it was bright daylight. Through the trees I could see the golden orb of the sun several degrees above the eastern horizon, which meant I'd slept for at least an hour. At first I thought I'd awoken because the cold was beginning to get to me, but then I heard a telltale crunching in the frosty leaves somewhere down below me.

Because of the way the slope lay, I couldn't see the source of the crunching. But I could tell clearly enough that it was a feeding deer, and the direction it was moving would soon bring it into view.

"Aww, it's probably just another durn doe," I thought, but I nevertheless eased off the safety of my rifle and brought it into a shooting position, using my knees as a brace.

There was once a time when being in such a situation would've had me shivering in anticipation, with goose bumps breaking out all over and hair standing on end. Now I felt no more excitement than you'd get from hearing a ground squirrel.

"It's because it's probably a doe," I thought. But then the deer came into view, and the first thing I saw was the golden sunlight glistening on the polished tines of a dandy eight-point rack.

No goose bumps. No shivers. No hair standing on end. "Well, durn it, the fellows are needing meat," I said to myself, and I settled my sights behind the foreleg. It was an easy shot at a range of no more than 70 yards. But there was a bit of brush in the way, so I decided to hold my fire until the deer was in the clear.

I watched as the buck shuffled slowly along, snuffling the leaves for acorns, pausing here and there to take a nip of browse, and my pulse kept beating at the same sedate, unstimulated rate.

Finally the buck moved into the clear with nothing at all between it

and the muzzle of my gun. The sun flashed on the polished antlers and gleamed richly on the thick winter coat. And I just couldn't bring myself to squeeze the trigger.

"Well shoot," I told myself, "two more days of beans ain't gonna do us no harm."

But when my pals regathered at lunch time, I kept my mouth circumspectly shut. Heck, I didn't want to get drummed out of camp.

Fishing in the spring will give us an opportunity to use a lot of shallow water patterns. As the fish move into the shallows and prepare to spawn, one of the most productive methods to catch and land them is with a floating worm and the famous Slug O. Both of these baits will catch fish year round, but the best results seem to come while the water is around 60 to 65 degrees.


I, myself, usually fish a floating worm on spinning tackle. I'll use a medium heavy action 6' tall St. Croix rod and a ball bearing spinning reel. I'll spool on 12lb test Triple Fish line and use a 3/0 VMC worm hook. Then I'll move into the shallow spawning flats and fish it by twitching the worm with short twitches. A lot of the time you'll actually see the fish nose up and look the bait over before he'll actually take the worm. Then what I'll do is shake the rod tip to make the worm quiver. A lot of time this will entice the fish to inhale the bait. When fishing a floating worm, fish it in the flat back of pockets and bays and along shallow creek channels. It comes in a variety of colors, but white or chartreuse usually works for me.

The Slug O made by Luncker City is probably the best thing to come along since the plastic worm. This bait is so real looking it is unbelievable. The action of the Slug O is tremendous when it is worked with a rod twitched vigorously then let settled for about 3 seconds and then worked again. This will draw bass out in a hurry. This bait will catch quality fish regularly. I like to fish it in some of the same places as I do the floating worm. The tackle I'll use is a 6'-6 1/2' St. Croix bait casting rod with 17-20 lb. test Triple Fish line. The Slug O comes in two sizes. One is about 3" long. This one I'll use with an offset 3/0 VMC hook. The 5' Slug O I'll use an offset 5/0 VMC hook.

If you try some of these techniques this spring, I'm sure you'll be happy with your catch.

During the "Health Horizons '94 Camp," sponsored by the medical center and Southeast Area Health Education Center, the students, ranging from eighth grade to twelfth grade, had the opportunity to observe health care professionals in their fields of expertise.

The students shadowed laboratory, cardiac diagnostic, and respiratory therapy technicians, physical therapists, radiologists, pharmacists, dietitians, as well as nurses as they went about their duties in the nursery, Breast Center and outpatient surgery.

Students also learned through presentations from health care practitioners about health care professions and employment opportunities.

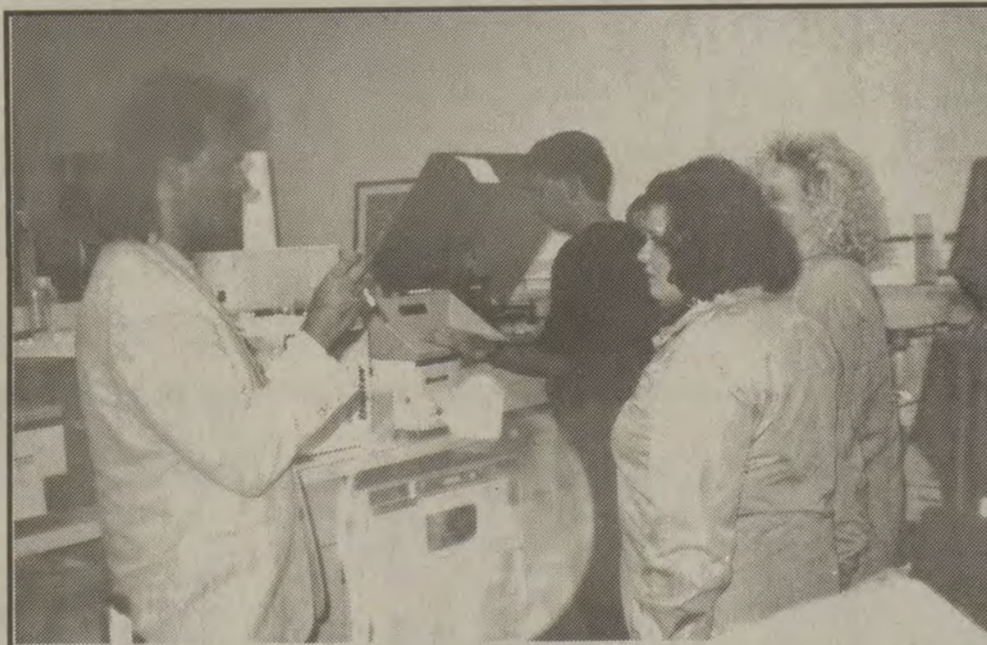
"We want to encourage younger students to pursue health care careers and to help them choose those careers and prepare themselves academically," said Glenda Hughes, a director of SAHEC, who also served as camp director. "Everyone here (at the medical center) has been helpful in sharing their background...and they gave the students really practical advice about their professions."

It's a treat to see my son hug Jolly Green Giant Man as I used to do. And I can hardly wait until we can dust my Hot Wheels from their case and race them on the floor together.

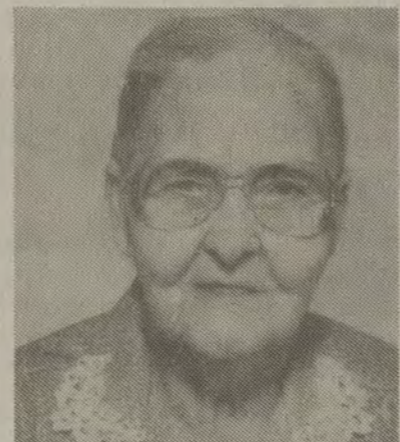

## Leftover grass clippings do more good than harm

Grass clippings do not increase thatch or contribute appreciably to disease problems. Removing them robs grass of needed nutrients and adds to the mountain of yard waste going to landfills.

"Many people still believe that grass clippings increase thatch, a tight layer of organic matter that accumulates between the soil surface and grass leaves," said A. J. Powell, Jr.,

Extension turf specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Powell said thatch is caused by several factors—excessive nitrogen fertilization, an acid surface soil, frequent irrigation and reduction in earthworms.

"Removing clippings doesn't affect thatch accumulation," he added. "Since clippings contain 75 to 80

percent water, they decompose easily into humus. Clippings not removed occur only in upper surface layers as a "pseudo" thatch. Actually, a little thatch is desirable because it helps moderate temperature extremes at the soil surface."

Disease prevention is another reason people remove grass clippings, according to Paul Vincelli, Extension plant pathologist.

"Clipping removal is not usually an important factor in disease control," he said. "While removing biomass slows down fungus, most serious disease problems occur in the summer when grass grows slowly and produces few clippings."

In a two-year study, a UK researcher found that removing clippings had virtually no effect on dollar spot development, compared to leaving clippings.

"Results of another study indicated that mulching mowers, which leave clippings, don't increase lawn diseases," Vincelli said. "The results showed that finely ground grass residue provided an excellent environment for microorganisms that suppress fungal diseases. This seemed to show that mulching mowers could favor natural biological control."

One of the best reasons to leave clippings is that they are a source of important nutrients, Powell said.

"Clippings add fertilizer, maybe as much as 25 percent of the lawn's annual needs," he said. "One thousand square feet of a well-fertilized lawn can produce up to 400 pounds (dry weight) annually of clippings containing nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium and minute quantities of many minor nutrients."

"Another good reason to leave clippings is that you reduce the amount of yard waste going into land-

fills," he added. "Grass clippings constitute a large part of the yard waste that ends up in already bludgeoning landfills. The cost to build and maintain landfills comes out of your pockets, either in higher taxes or user charges. It just makes good sense to leave lawn clippings on your yard."

For people who just must remove lawn clippings, Powell offered these common-sense alternatives to the landfill.

Scatter clippings lightly over a low-maintenance turf area or vacant lot. Be sure to scatter rather than dump them in a pile.

Use them to mulch around ornamentals or between garden rows. An inch-thick application will reduce weed competition, conserve soil moisture and supply nutrients. Turn clippings under this fall to improve soil tilth and provide additional nutrients.

Add grass clippings to the compost pile. Clippings alone are difficult to compost; so add tree leaves, wood chips, garden weeds and the like. Hasten the compost process by turning or churning the material frequently, keeping it moist, and adding soil, fertilizer and lime occasionally.

"If you use clippings as a mulch or compost, be sure the lawn hasn't been sprayed with a herbicide a few days before mowing," Powell said. "Some broadleaf weed herbicide residues might damage mulched plants."

## ABOUT ANIMALS

### Dog attacks

From time to time you see signs warning about vicious dogs and every now and then you read about apparently unprovoked dogs attacking people, often children.

Pit bulls seem to be the choice target, though Rottweilers, German Shepherds and Dobermans are occasionally accused.

Which stands in a curious opposition to all that is said about the dog being man's best friend.

But then, each set of circumstances is different, and you'd have to know each individual set of circumstances to determine whether the charges made about dogs being vicious are true. Common sense tells you that among all species of living things, including man, there are occasional mean-spirited and sometimes vicious individuals.

But this does not necessarily make each member of any species vicious.

True, some breeds of dogs were not bred primarily for their qualities of companionship. The Doberman Pinscher, for example, was deliberately bred by Louis Doberman of Apolda, Thuringen, Germany, around 1890 for use as a guard and watch dog. It was later adapted for use by police and as a war dog. The German Shepherd first appeared as a breed around 1899 to guard sheep, but was easily adapted as a guard and watch dog.

Sometimes they make excellent pets, but always they make good watchdogs. This was their purpose.

Most of the animals we call "pit bulls" are either Staffordshire Bull Terriers or crossed with that breed, which were originally bred as fighting dogs. Originally, this breed was

denied recognition from The Kennel Club because it was a fighting dog.

The Rottweiler was bred as a working dog, where it pulled carts in Rottweil, in southern Germany. It was also used as a cattle drover, with a strong guarding instinct.

The instinct to guard their turf is therefore common to all four of these breeds, and people who keep them as well as people who encounter them might do well to remember this.

While most of the time well-trained dogs will remember their manners, when left alone, some of them will occasionally revert to their instincts.

What does an owner do, then, to protect others and himself? He or she will keep the animal restrained and not allow it loose on the sidewalks or streets.

What do you do if you encounter such an animal? Perhaps most important is to not make eye contact and convince the animal you are challenging it's territory. Neither run nor stop, but back out of the situation in the same manner you got into it. Don't quarrel, don't challenge.

Warn children where yards in which dogs which might potentially attack are located and warn them to keep away. Only rarely will dogs leave their territory to attack, unless they follow an intruder out.

Your veterinarian can instruct you how to protect your animal from strangers, if you are a dog owner, and how to protect yourself from strange animals. He or she is trained in such things, partly for self defense but also to help you.

Veterinarians can also tell you which breeds are more likely to attack, and how to tell the difference between a dog which is vicious and one which is merely defensive or protective.

### Rotate pastures :

## Prevent mastitis?

Yes, it will.

One thing dairy farmers can do to help their never-ending battle against mastitis in their herds is to use the rotational grazing method, said Bill Crist, extension dairy specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

"Everybody knows that to rotate cattle from pasture to pasture is a good practice to better use the forage," Crist said. "But not everybody knows that rotating pastures also helps prevent mastitis."

Research at UK found that places where cows congregate can have a

higher bacterial load than even stalls which are bedded with sawdust, he said.

"Those areas where cows congregate can be under shade trees, close to feed bunks or anywhere they gather and lie down," Crist said. "Hot, humid weather may result in even higher concentrations of the bacteria."

Cows and heifers within two or three weeks of calving through calving time are at the highest risk of mastitis, Crist said. If all animals cannot be rotated from pasture to pasture, top priority should be given to those animals.

### Severe form of BVD could threaten Kentucky cattle

A new, atypical form of Bovine Viral Diarrhea (BVD) virus could represent an emerging concern for Kentucky cattlemen.

The severe form of the disease has been reported recently in dairy herds in Pennsylvania and in beef cattle in West Virginia, said Duane Miksch, extension veterinary specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

"This more severe than usual form of BVD is associated with a different appearing virus from that which causes classic BVD," Miksch said. "A similar outbreak occurred in Ontario last year and a significant death loss of both young and adult cattle occurred."

The documented cases of the atypical BVD virus in Pennsylvania and West Virginia is significant for Kentucky, he said, because a high proportion of Kentucky cattle are unprotected and at risk because they are either unvaccinated or inadequately vaccinated.

One method of the spread of the disease is by introduction of infected cattle into susceptible herds.

Symptoms include high fever (107 degrees or higher), off feed, difficult breathing, decreased milk production and diarrhea sometimes bloody. Death can occur within 48 hours after onset.

How can cattlemen minimize risk?

Vaccinate all cattle over six months of age, Miksch said. Killed virus vaccines require a two-dose priming vaccination series followed by frequent re-vaccinations. These vaccines are safe for pregnant animals but may not protect the fetus from infection.

Modified-live virus vaccines only require a single initial dose, but they should not be used in pregnant cattle. Periodic boosting of this vaccine with a killed virus vaccine is recommended.

Miksch also recommended that purchased cattle should be vaccinated and isolated for three weeks before entry into the herd.

"Maintain a closed herd as much as possible," he said. "Test incoming cattle for persistent BVD infection before they are allowed contact with the herd. Avoid overcrowding, stressing and mixing of cattle."

Whether these management practices will prevent all losses to the new, exceptionally acute form of BVD is not proven, but reported outbreaks have usually occurred in unvaccinated or inadequately vaccinated herds, he said.

Miksch added that BVD vaccination should be a part of the overall vaccination program outlined and monitored by the farmer's veterinarian.

## "Pack the pyramid" with a week's worth of creative sandwich ideas for school lunches

Every fall, the ringing of the school bell signals an age-old question facing parents everywhere, what to prepare for lunch that is nutritious and that kids will eat. The answer is as close as your bread box, and is a long-time school lunch staple—the sandwich. With a little variety and creativity, sandwiches can be fun, good-tasting and nutritious.

Dr. Liz Applegate, an author, mother of two and nutritionist from the University of California at Davis, reinforces the fact that sandwiches are a good way to help children meet the dietary guidelines set forth by the USDA Food Guide Pyramid. Some of the following recipes were created by Dr. Applegate to provide a week's worth of healthy lunches that are guaranteed kid-pleasers.

### RIDDLE ROLL-UPS

2 slices IronKids Bread  
2 ounces low-fat cream cheese, softened  
1 carrot, diced small  
1 rib celery, diced small  
1 T. green scallion leaf, diced small  
1/4 red bell pepper, diced small  
Salt and pepper

Mash cheese with a fork and stir in other ingredients. Season to taste. Flatten slices of bread with a rolling pin. Spread each with half cream cheese mixture and roll up. Fasten with a toothpick through a piece of paper with a riddle written on it.

Toss salad ingredients together, refrigerate until ready to use. Flatten bread slices with a rolling pin, fit into a custard cup and let dry in oven. Fill with 2 T. of chicken salad. Wrap in plastic wrap.

### KID'S CLUBWICH

2 slices IronKids Bread  
2 oz. grilled chicken (about 1/2 of a boneless breast)  
1 strip lean bacon, crumbled  
1 T. low-fat grated Monterey Jack cheese  
1 t. honey mixed with 2 t. mustard

### BIT-OF-HONEY ROLL-UP

2 slices IronKids Bread  
2 T. peanut butter (without sugar)  
1 T. honey  
2 T. chopped, dried fruit, like apricot

1/2 banana  
Spread each slice of bread with 1 T. peanut butter and 1/2 T. honey. Sprinkle with 1 T. fruit and place 1/4 banana diagonally in the middle of each slice of bread. Roll the bread around it. Fasten with toothpick, if necessary.

### CHEESY PINEAPPLE 'n' HAM SANDWICH ROLL-UPS

1 container (8 ounces) cream cheese with pineapple, softened  
1/4 cup chopped walnuts or pecans  
1/8 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice or ground cinnamon  
6 corn tortillas (about 6-inch)  
1 package (6 ounces) thinly sliced ham (about 18 slices)  
6 to 12 lettuce leaves

In small bowl, combine cream cheese, nuts and spice; mix well. For each roll-up, briefly cook corn tortilla on both sides in non-stick skillet (about 1 minute). Do not brown. Cool slightly. Spread about 1/6 of the cream cheese mixture over tortilla to within 1/2 inch of edge. Lay 3 thin slices of ham, overlapping across center of tortilla. Top with 1 or 2 lettuce leaves. Roll up and wrap in plastic wrap. Makes 6 sandwich roll-ups.

NOTE: Can also be made with wheat flour or whole wheat tortillas (about 6 1/2 to 8 inch size). It is not necessary to heat wheat flour or whole wheat flour tortillas before making roll-ups.

### PEANUT BUTTER 'N' FUDGE FILLED BARS

2 cups firmly packed brown sugar  
1 cup (2 sticks) margarine or butter, softened  
1/4 cup peanut butter  
2 eggs  
2 cups Quaker oats (quick or old fashioned, uncooked)  
2 cups all-purpose flour  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
1/4 teaspoon salt (optional)  
1 can (14 oz.) sweetened condensed milk (not evaporated milk)  
1 package (12 oz.) semisweet chocolate pieces

2 tablespoons peanut butter  
1/2 cup chopped peanuts  
Heat oven to 350°F. Beat together sugar, margarine and 1/4 cup peanut butter until creamy. Add eggs; beat well. Add combined oats, flour, baking soda and salt; mix well. Reserve 1 cup; set aside. Spread remaining oat mixture onto bottom of ungreased 13 x 9-inch baking pan. In medium saucepan, combine condensed milk, chocolate pieces and remaining peanut butter. Cook over low heat until chocolate is melted, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; stir in peanuts. Spread mixture evenly over crust. Drop reserved oat mixture by teaspoonfuls over chocolate mixture. Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until light golden brown. Cool completely; cut into bars. Store tightly covered. 32 Bars

### DINOSAUR COOKIES

Yield: 12-20 dinosaurs  
1/2 cup granulated sugar  
1/2 cup brown sugar  
1/2 cup butter (1 stick), softened  
1/2 cup peanut butter  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla  
1 egg  
1 cup all purpose flour  
1/2 cup whole wheat flour  
3/4 teaspoon baking powder\*

1/4 teaspoon salt\*  
1/2 cup chocolate chips  
\*You can use self-rising flour instead of all purpose; omit baking powder and salt.

Directions: In large mixing bowl, beat sugars and butter until light and fluffy. Add peanut butter, vanilla and egg; mix until smooth. Combine flours baking powder and salt in small bowl. Gradually add flour mixture to sugar mixture until well blended.

Refrigerate dough from 1 to 24 hours—depending on your schedule. Roll one-half of dough on lightly floured board to 1/4-inch thick. If it is sticky, put some flour on your hands. Cut with 3 to 5 inch dinosaur cookie cutter. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Add chocolate chips, laying them sideways around the back and down the tail of cookie and one for the eye. Repeat with remaining dough. Bake in preheated 350°F oven for 12 to 18 minutes or until golden brown. Cool slightly before removing to wire racks to cool completely.

Note: When refrigerating dough, cover with plastic wrap and drape with a dish towel. Let the dough soften again before rolling out.

Measuring Flour: Flour does not have to be sifted if lightly stirred and spooned into a dry measuring cup. Fill the cup, then level it off with a straight edge (knife or spatula). When measuring dry ingredients with a spoon, level off the same way.

In my mind's eye I see and hear replays from parents and grandparents as they busily buy clothing and last minute school supplies for their young 'ns. I am flooded by memories of my own school daze—of my mother and my grandmothers as they hustled about to get me ready to go on my way.

As a little towhead I remember being eager for school to start. I skipped kindergarten because it didn't exist in my neck of the woods in those days. As a mother I got caught up in last minute shopping for my daughters and the "I need this" and "I need that" tactics that children masterfully employ the days right before and the early weeks of each new school year.

I recall battling with time restraints and making financial maneuvers in late August and early September just so we could get the girls "ready" for school. And, of course, there had to be lunch money, money for book rental, gym suits—we called them "monkey suits" in my day—art supplies and violin lessons, not to forget Brownie and Girl Scout uniforms. Back then it cost an arm and a leg to get the kids on their way. It still does.

All grandparents and senior citizens reading this have lived long enough to know that it is only through taking advantage of today's educational opportunities from pre-school

through college, and beyond, that today's young people—our children and grandchildren—will be able to comfortably afford to raise a family. Besides coal mines, that are already far more sophisticated and competitive than when we began to raise our families, there will be new job opportunities here in Eastern Kentucky, but we are a long way from being industrialized. It hasn't been easy for most of us. It will be even harder for our grandchildren. They must be encouraged to take advantage of educational opportunities.

As I sit here reminiscing, and mentally philosophizing, I feel the warmth of the sun as it has risen further into the morning sky. The mist that was so dense, is gone. I'm getting a bit too warm. The sun is causing a glare on my notepad. I ponder, as I remove the kitten from my lap, and take hold of my empty coffee cup, "What is the greatest legacy my husband and I can leave our children and grandchildren?" The greatest legacy we can leave, in addition to our love, is getting them to understand the importance of getting a formal education. If we—you and I—can instill this in our children and grandchildren, they will be forever grateful.
