A removal hearing for two parent members of separate site based councils has been set for January 6 by the Floyd County Board of Education.

At Monday's meeting, board members voted to have a removal hearing for Clarence Risner, parent representative on Prestonsburg High School's council; and Joe Tussey, who serves on the Adams Middle

Faulty heater, gas fumes send workers home

A high level of carbon monoxide gas in the Floyd County Board of Education's Court Street offices sent several board employees home early

Several of the board's offices were shut down Monday morning after Prestonsburg firefighters discovered a low level of oxygen in a section of the building.

A faulty furnace had leaked the carbon monoxide, Kenny Crisp, fire department captain, said Thursday.

The fire department had been called to the building Friday when several employees complained of headaches and drowsiness, Crisp said.

At that time, the fire department personnel could not find any leaks, but firefighters told school board officials they would return on Monday after the office had been closed for the weekend.

The furnace was replaced, he added. Officials at the board of education could not be reached Thursday for comment.

Risner and Tussey have been declared ineligible to serve on their respective councils because they have a relative employed elsewhere in the school system. Both Risner's and Tussey's wives are employed as secretaries at Prestonsburg Elementary.

In 1994, the state legislature amended part of Kentucky's Education Reform Act to disqualify a parent representative from serving on a school council if the parent has a relative employed in a school dis-

In a letter board chairman Ray Brackett, state Education Commissioner Thomas Boysen recommended that the board take action to remove the council members.

Risner and Tussey disagree with the provision of the law that declares them ineligible to serve on their councils, claiming the law is discriminatory because it does not apply to administrators or teachers who serve on school councils.

Risner requested an opinion on the issue from the attorney general's office, which upheld the 1994 change

Risner said Monday that Commissioner Boysen's and the school board's stand on the issue is detrimental to parents who want to improve education.

The board had discussed the issue at a special meeting in November and agreed that they felt the law was wrong and that Risner and Tussey had done nothing wrong.

Outreach center the next best thing to house calls

For years, residents of the Wheelwright area have had to travel 35 country miles to visit the Floyd County Health Department, but this month those trips have been short-

The health department opened a satellite clinic at Wheelwright in the Potter Medical Building on December 8 to make health care more acces-

sible to people living in that area, Mullins, offers the same type of ser-Brenda Hunter, a senior administrative assistant at the health department, said Wednesday.

"A large portion of our patient load is in that area," she said. "Sometimes people had to break appointments due to bad weather. This is a medically underserved area and we hope it will help solve that problem."

The clinic, which is staffed by RN Lucreasie Reed and clerk Cindy

vice as the health department, including physicals, cancer screenings, Women-Infant Care (WIC), and

The home health program will not be offered at the clinic unless the need for the program increases in the area, Hunter said. She hopes the health clinic will be able to expand by adding more nurses to its staff, but it can't grow unless residents of the area utilize the services.

"If the need arises, we will not hesitate to hire more staff. We hope it gets to that point," she said.

Walk-ins are accepted at the clinic if a nurse is available, but the health department prefers that patients make appointments, she said.

The health department and the clinic's goal is to see its patients on a regular basis, Hunter said, and not just when they're sick with a cold.

"We want to see (the children) while they're well so we can look for problems, such as how their progression in growing," she said.

If the nurse discovers a problem during a routine physical, such as an inflamed throat, she can refer that patient to a doctor and the health department will pick up the bill. The health department will also pay for the medication.

At Wheelwright, the referral will be easier for patients, Hunter explained, because a doctor and a pharmacy are located next door to the

"It will be one-stop shopping for health care needs," she said.

Hunter encouraged residents of the area to use the clinic.

"If people don't take advantage of the clinic, we can't stay," she said.

Assistant Commonwealth Attornev Dan Rowland recommended the minimum punishment of ten years in prison, which means Lovely would have to serve at least five years before being eligible for parole.

Rowland said several factors led to the plea agreement, including the fact that there was alcohol involved in the incident and Lovely's low IQ.

Public Defender Harolyn Howard had said the stabbing was "self defense" in her opening statement where she also said Lovely had an IQ of somewhere between 55-62."

Formal sentencing for Lovely will be held on January 20.

Floyd County's Development Authority and the Big Sandy Area Revolving Loan Fund have agreed to loan a Floyd County lighting company \$100,000 for an expansion.

Details of RND's expansion and the loan terms were discussed in closed session Thursday by the development authority.

The \$100,000 loan will be added to an existing \$225,000 loan from Floyd County and First Commonwealth Bank. With the Big Sandy RLF loan, the county and the bank will have a first mortgage on RND's facility, Hammond said.

Big Sandy Area Development said Thursday that it is yet to be determined which agency will hold first lien on the facility.

Floyd County's school board will be getting its legal advice from someone else beginning in January with Monday's hiring of Prestonsburg attorney Phillip Damron.

Board members terminated the contract of attorney Cliff Latta, who has been the board's attorney for almost four years.

After a closed session, which included a discussion on personnel, board member Brent Clark made the motion to hire Damron and it was seconded by Eddie Patton. The motion passed 4-1, with Phyllis Honshell voting against it.

Board members gave no explanation for changing attorneys and Latta asked to address the board.

Latta explained that it was customary that board attorneys serve

from July until the following July and he asked if the board had been ond. dissatisfied with his representation.

Board member Patton said he thought Latta "had done a real good job" for the board.

Chairman Ray Brackett agreed with Patton's comments.

In other action Monday, the board voted to hire the firm of Martin Engineering and Construction as construction manager for the new Martin/ Maytown Elementary project.

Board member Phyllis Honshell asked if a vote could be postponed on hiring a CM because she hadn't had time to review the proposals.

Honshell said she felt she could not make an informed or "intelligent" decision on the issue without reviewing the proposals. She made a motion to postpone a decision if it was not an urgent issue.

Her motion died for lack of a sec-

Superintendent Steve Towler said that a decision would need to be made before the January board meeting and added that a special board meeting could be called if board members wanted to delay the decision.

Other board members made no comment on Honshell's request and Patton made the motion to hire Martin Engineering. Chairman Brackett seconded the motion and Honshell abstained from voting.

The board voted to table hiring a construction manager for the Prestonsburg High School renovation after it was decided to put a hold on the project.

Local hospitals in line for more funds

Santa Claus could have arrived early for two Floyd County hospitals which will receive extra federal assistance next year under a plan announced Wednesday by Human Resources Secretary Masten Childers.

Our Lady of the Way Hospital and the McDowell Appalachain Regional Hospital are two of 59 hospitals in Kentucky set to receive an extra \$200,000 for indigent care if the federal government approves the plan proposed by Childers. The plan means nearly \$83 million in federal funds would go into the state Medicaid budget to help hospitals care for the poor.

"It certainly will help us if the preliminary plan does go through," Jerry Haynes of the McDowell ARH

Our Lady of the Way and McDowell are two of the 59 rural hopitals in the state with fewer than 100 beds that would receive the extra \$200,000. The increase would mean Our Lady of the Way would receive \$699,778 in federal assistance for indigent care next year. McDowell would receive \$560,805.

The federal assistance money, however, is still down from last year. The 29 hospitals with 50 or fewer beds went from a little more than \$10 million in state funds to just over \$4 million for the upcoming year.

Hospitals with 51-100 beds saw their assistance nearly cut in half, going from \$16.5 million to \$8.8

Haynes said McDowell, which has 60 beds, received \$660,528 last year, including an extra \$200,000 from the

The money is given to hospitals as reimbursement for treating patients

tion continues, "it became apparent that the defendant executed checks and forged the endorsement of the co-signer and to date, the plaintiff's corporation has uncovered \$88,677.94 of fraudulently written checks which were all cashed by the defendant. Plaintiff is continuing its review of the financial records and expects additional checks to be discovered as this particular period only covered four or five months."

Gray claims that Coleman will "sell, convey and otherwise dispose of her property with the intent to hinder collection of these sums back to the corporation.'

Gray says the alleged embezzlement has jeopardized his business.

"Unless these funds are recovered immediately, the solvency of the corporation may be in jeopardy, which will create an irreparable injury to the plaintiff and its association with its primary supplier," the motion says.

Gray is seeking a court order against Coleman to recover the money that is allegedly missing.

A lawsuit represents only one side of an issue. Coleman could not be reached for comment.

A spring session will be offered at St. Camillus Academy. The London office hopes to offer two sessions each year.

Noting that only half of those awarded child support receive the full amount they are owed, Attorney General Chris Gorman recently unveiled a new "Most Wanted" poster designed to help authorities locate absent parents who consistently refuse to support their children.

parents deemed to be among the worst offenders in the entire state. The offenders owe a total of \$220,000 in back child support payments, have made no payments in the last six months, and have consistently eluded authorities attempting to enforce the court-ordered child support agree-

"These are parents who have abandoned and neglected their children," Attorney General Gorman said. "They are also parents with a choice pay their child support or run the risk of jail."

The posters will be distributed to all Kentucky state police posts, local police and sheriff's departments, media, circuit and county clerks, and other government and law enforcement agencies. They will also be displayed in public places such as schools, hospitals, and health depart-



Court ruling clears the way to end cockfighting throughout Kentucky

The Kentucky Court of Appeals has spoken: Cockfighting is illegal in Kentucky. It's time to enforce the law by putting an end to this cruel and barbaric sport.

The appeals court Friday upheld an August 1993 ruling by former Greenup County Judge James W. Lyon that declared cockfighting illegal in Kentucky. The ruling extends Lyon's decision — in his judicial district of Greenup and Lewis counties — to include the entire state.

An uncertainty over the legal status of cockfighting

in Kentucky has made law enforcement officers and prosecutors reluctant to move against those who promote the bloody sport. Many have been hoping the Greenup County case against Marvin Munn, who was charged with operating cockfights in the old Sunshine Elementary School near South Shore, would provide a definitive court ruling on whether cockfighting is legal in Kentucky...

This is not likely to be the final word on cockfighting from the courts. The ruling seems certain to be appealed to the Kentucky Supreme Court, which could either uphold or reverse it. Either way, it is likely to be months before the high court rules.

For now, the appeals court ruling has cleared the way for law enforcement officers to arrest and for county attorneys to aggressively prosecute those who operate cockfights. Twenty years after the Kentucky General Assembly first banned cockfighting, the sport is once again clearly illegal. May it always remain so. Daily Independent (Ashland)

Humane Society wants public's money, but nothing else

Members of the Paintsville Humane Society are taking a don't ask, don't tell attitude with the Paintsville-Johnson County Animal Shelter...

That was apparent last week when the Humane Society asked members of the Paintsville City Council to attend the organization's board meeting to discuss the animal shelter. Society members are wanting the council to come to their meeting to avoid the state's open meeting law, which requires meetings of government agencies to be open to the public. It also says that a quorum of a body such as city council constitutes a public meeting.

The (Paintsville) Herald takes the position that a meeting between the council and the Humane Society — or any private board for that matter — in which city business is discussed constitutes a public meeting. The apparent purpose of the proposed meting is to discuss the shelter and its current financial status, with the ultimate goal being to receive more funding from the city of Paintsville. That's city business, folks, and it must be discussed publicly.

Legalities aside, the approach the Humane Society is taking is absurd. This is the same organization that has made a plea to local governments and the public for more money to operate its Tutor Key facility. This is the same organization that already receives funding from the city council and the fiscal court on an annual

This is also the same organization that, for some reason, doesn't want its business known by the public. Why would anyone want to give money to such a group when we get nothing — including information about its operations - in return? An attitude adjustment is badly needed, don't you think? — The Paintsville Herald

Former U.S. Rep. Perkins pleads guilty

Speaking few words to the federal judge and without offering any comment to reporters, former U. S. Rep. Chris Perkins of Kentucky pleaded guilty Tuesday to felony charges of bank fraud, misuse of his campaign fund and making false statements on his financial disclosure form.

Judge Royce Lamberth scheduled Perkins for sentencing on March 13. Under the plea bargain he signed, Perkins of Mount Sterling, faces a likely sentence of 15 months to 21 months in

Under questioning from Lamberth, Perkins acknowledged he was guilty of the crimes outlined by prosecutor Thomas Eicher - benefiting from \$45,584 that had been improperly disbursed by his campaign, engaging in a check-kiting scheme that involved the House Bank, and knowingly under reporting his liabilities by more than \$900,000 on a House financial disclosure form.

Martha Amburgey of Redfox, Ky., Perkins' former secretary, pleaded guilty to aiding and abetting bank fraud and conspiracy to make false statements to the Federal Election Commission.

Amburgey's plea bargain does not specify what kind of sentence she will likely receive. Eicher said she would probably receive a lighter sentence than Perkins'. She will be sentenced March 14. — Lexington Herald-Leader

Federal court gets local suit

A lawsuit filed by a Johnson County couple against Ashland Oil and Ashland Exploration has been removed from Johnson Circuit Court and transferred to federal court in Pikeville.

The two companies, in a notice filed earlier this month, said U.S. District Court has proper venue in the lawsuit filed by T. C. and Norma Cantrell of Red Bush on behalf of their son.

The Cantrells sued the companies November 18 in Johnson Circuit Court, claiming their son Talmadge Cameron Cantrell was exposed to and injured by radium when they lived at Keaton in the Martha Oil Field, which is located in Johnson and Lawrence counties. The couple claim their son suffered "severe personal injuries and extreme emotional distress" by being exposed to the radium and other hazardous substances.

The Cantrells are seeking unspecified compensatory damages for their son as well as a jury

But Ashland Oil and Ashland Exploration removed the suit from Johnson Circuit Court to federal court, which they said has original jurisdiction.

'The complaint includes a claim arising under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act, which actions may be brought in the United States District Courts," according to the companies' attorneys, Danny C. Reeves and Bryan R. Reynolds of Lexington. — Paintsville Herald

Wreckage downs phone lines

A CSX train passing through Lawrence County derailed early Thursday morning blocking the road to Torchlight and knocking down communi-

CSX spokesman Tim Hensley said 14 cars left the rails due to an internal break in one of the rails that was not visible from the outside.

Hensley said the rails are inspected on a regular basis, but no break was found the last time they checked.

In all, the train consisted of two engines and 99 cars loaded with coal.

Hensley said each car carries about 100 tons of coal, but he was not sure how much spilled out.

The train was en route to Richmond, Va., from Shelbyville when it derailed six miles south of Lexington at mile post 30.2. — Big Sandy News





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

Forensics: a new addition to Floyd County Schools

On Thursday evening, December 1, the Floyd County Schools Forensics Program hosted its very first Lincoln-Douglas Debate at Prestonsburg High School. Twelve students from Prestonsburg and Johnson Central High Schools debated the following topic: When in conflict, community standards are of greater value than individual liberty.

This was the first competition in debate for both schools. Thus, this was a learning experience for students, coaches, judges and debate coordinators, who will use knowledge gained in this experience to refine their skills and to, in time, progress to higher levels of competi-certificates.





Hotline Operating

The KHSAA is now operating a toll-free hotline dedicated specifically for anyone wishing to report a potential rules violation. The hotline is the result of a January 1994 report by the Commission on Interscholastic Athletics, a task force implemented to study the KHSAA by the State Department for Elementary and Secondary Education.

The KHSAA had long been restricted by its own Bylaw 13, which required the principal or superintendent to submit a complaint in writing. Now, the bylaw reads, "Any person wishing to report a violation of the KHSAA rules may do so in writing or by reporting substantial information to the commissioner."

"I think previously our rules requiring only the principal or superintendent of a school to file a complaint severely limited our enforcement ability," Commissioner Louis Stout

Callers will be asked to provide the following information: a specific act or violation which is occurring; the name of the school, athletes, coaches or administrators that are involved in the violation; a date and time when the violation occurred or when it might take place again; and the name of the caller submitting the information. The caller's name will be kept in confidence unless legal

matters are pursued involving an abuse of a minor or criminal acts. The hotline number is 1-800-986-KHSA and operates on a

Toy inspectors check elves' work, consumers should do the same

During the year's most intense holiday season. toy-buying season, consumer product safety experts from the state De- wooden toys for small children as partment for Health Services are visiting retail stores to check for unsafe toys. Specifically, they are looking for playthings with small parts that pose a choking hazard, sharp edges or points, poor construction or unacceptable lead in paint.

Terry Wescott, consumer product safety branch manager, says that it's, be the only guiding factors for toy a good idea for all toy buyers to look selection. Look for items that will be for potentially dangerous playthings.

"Parents need to be aware of toy safety for two reasons," he said. "First, some toys that are OK for older kids are wrong for small children because of small parts or sharp points. Second, children sometimes misuse or break toys and create hazards.

"So parents need to look for unsafe toys as they shop and also keep an eye on their children's toys as they play with them."


Wescott especially cautions parents who have toddlers and older children playing with the same toys.

"Toys marked for children older than 3 usually have small parts that pose choking dangers for young children," he said. "It's important that parents take a look at all toys that come into the house to make sure that toddlers don't get their hands on something that could be dangerous."

He also suggests that parents regularly examine playthings and repair or discard damaged toys.

"Our inspectors cover as much territory as possible," said Wescott, "but we really rely on consumers to become inspectors themselves and tell us if there are dangerous toys we've missed."

SUMMARY OF ETHICS CODE ORDINANCE FOR **PUBLICATION**

City of Wayland, Kentucky

Ordinance No. 19951 An ordinance establishing a code of ethical conduct applicable to the officers and employees of the city and city agencies.

SECTIONS 1-4. Sets forth the title of the ordinance; the findings of the legislative body declaring the merits of the code of ethics; the purpose and authority; and definitions of words and phrases as used in the code of ethics.

STANDARDS OF CONDUCT SECTION 5.

Sets forth standards of conduct related to conflicts of interest in general. SECTION 6

Subsection (A). Sets forth standards of conduct related to conflicts of interest in contracts between officers and employees of the city and the city itself.

Subsection (B). Establishes a penalty and reads in

full as follows: Any violation of this section shall constitute a Class A misdemeanor, and upon conviction, the court may void any contract entered into in violation of this section. Additionally, a violation of this section shall be grounds for removal from office or employment with the city accordance with any applicable provisions of state law and ordinances, rules or regulations of the city.
