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## Adams to quit post on court

After just one year in office, District Three Magistrate Tommy Neil Adams plans to resign his seat on the fiscal court today (Friday).

Adams said late Thursday that he is resigning from office due to health reasons.

"With my health problems I don't feel like I can perform my duties adequately," Adams said Thursday. "And, I feel that all county officials should carry their load. I want to thank everyone in district three that supported me."

Last year, Adams had a cancerous growth removed from his nose. He said Thursday that he may have to have some other surgery, but he declined to say whether it may be of the same nature.

Adams, 45, took office in January 1994, and was an outspoken member of the court. Adams pushed to get information about the county's solid waste dilemma and the controversial 911 emergency service, which has not yet been implemented in the county.

Last summer, when people tried to crowd into the fiscal court's tiny meeting room during a monthly meeting, Adams was in favor of moving the meeting site to the circuit courtroom in the Floyd County Courthouse. The court discontinued that practice of moving their monthly meeting after the marathon session that followed. Attendance at court meetings has since dwindled to less than a dozen people.

Although he will no longer be voting on the issues, Adams said that he will continue to take an interest in issues relating to county government.

"I will still be active, as a citizen, to work on issues like 911 and getting water lines in Left Beaver," Adams said. "I want to do anything I can as a private citizen to help repay the people that elected me."

Adams said that his resignation will be effective Monday, January 16.

As for a replacement, Governor Brereton Jones will have to appoint someone to serve as district three magistrate until November. Because Adams' seat was not vacated 134 days prior to the January 31 filing deadline, there can be no special primary election in May. Jones' appointee will serve until November. Leaders of the county's political parties will have to select candidates to run for that office in November. Whoever wins in the November election will serve out Adams' unexpired term, which ends in December 1999.

## Martin council will study plea for help

## Board puts extras on nepotism lists

Floyd County school board members voted Monday to toughen state nepotism laws by adding nephews, nieces, mothers-in-law and fathers-in-law of board members, the superintendent, principals or supervisors to the list of relatives which cannot be employed in the system.

The approved change in board policy would not apply to persons currently employed by the board, superintendent Steve Towler said Monday.

On Tuesday, Towler said that the hiring prohibition would apply to those already listed under state law, which are board members, the superintendent and principals. As for supervisors, the board policy is that relatives of persons currently employed in the system may be hired only if they will not be working directly supervising a relative or will not occupy a position in the same line of authority within the organization.

Under Kentucky's Education Reform Act, a relative is defined as a

father, mother, brother, sister, husband, wife, son, daughter, aunt, uncle, son-in-law and daughter-in-law.

In other action Monday, board members agreed to move the Drift Head Start center to the McDowell Elementary campus provided that no jobs are lost as a result of the relocation.

Board members have been wrestling with the issue of whether to

That date is also the cutoff for candidates interested in seeking an unexpired term for district judge in Floyd

### Too late for special primaries, law says :

## Parties make picks if ousters ordered

There will be no special primary elections this year in Floyd County, even if two prominent county officials are removed from office before the January 31 primary filing deadline.

Suits filed late last year seeking the ousters of County Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo and County Court Clerk Carla Boyd will have no impact on the May ballot, a spokeswoman for Secretary of State Bob Babbage said Thursday. The deadline established by law for filling vacancies through the primary process passed on January 9, according to Mary Sue Helm, and the January 31 date has no bearing on the issue.

Commonwealth Attorney John Earl Hunt is seeking the removal of Stumbo and Boyd under a ruling issued in late 1994 by the Kentucky Supreme Court. The high court said certain county officials who failed to comply strictly with state bond requirements must be removed.

A local court hearing on those ouster efforts has not yet been set, and the timing does not appear to be as critical as thought.

Responses to Hunt's ouster suits are to be filed by Tuesday by Stumbo and Boyd.

Kentucky Revised Statute 118.115 establishes the process for filling vacancies, should they arise in the county judge and county clerk's offices.

Under that law, a special primary would be required only if the vacancies were created at least 134 days before the May 30 election. That time frame would have established a deadline of January 9.

Should the local court order the judge's and clerk's offices vacated after that date, local political parties will select nominees for a special election in November. Prior to that election, the offices will be filled by appointments from the governor.

Ousted officials could not be reappointed or selected as nominees by their parties. Under the law, those officials would be ineligible for their former jobs for two years from the

County.

There will be no primary in the judicial contest, though, unless three or more candidates file for the non-partisan office.

If there are three or more candidates in that race, the top two vote-getters will square off in November.

If there are no more than two candidates, there will be a single election on November 7.

date of their removals.

Only one county official, Breathitt County Judge-Executive Nim Henson, has been removed from office so far under the Supreme Court's ruling. Since Henson was removed on January 6, three days before the January 9 deadline, a special primary election will be required this May in Breathitt County to fill his unexpired term.

Meanwhile, Kentucky's General Assembly may consider changing the penalty provisions of the debated bond

statute when it meets in special session later this year. The ouster issue could become moot if the law is changed.

House Majority Leader Greg Stumbo, D-Prestonsburg, said this week that state officials must first determine if the provisions of the bond statute can be legally changed to provide for a penalty more lenient than the penalty now in effect and if the lesser punishment can be made retroactive to apply to current officials.

## City project needs you, and your cans

In an effort to keep from raising garbage rates in Prestonsburg, the city recently began a recycling program, but residents and businesses aren't participating.

"If (the citizens) don't reduce the volume of waste, the rates could increase. If the volume is reduced, the rates could stay the same," Tom Harris, foreman of the city's public works department, said Thursday.

The city's goal is to keep an increase in costs under control by reducing the volume of waste it collects for transportation to Apple Valley Sanitation in Johnson County.

On collection days this week, the city had "zero participation in its recycling program," Harris said.

He seemed discouraged by the public's apathy toward the project,

but said the program is in an "infant stage."

"You have to crawl before you can walk," he explained.

Harris asked city residents and businesses to keep a separate garbage bag for metal and aluminum cans. Currently, metal cans, such as vegetable and soup cans, and aluminum cans can be placed into the same bag, Harris said. The bags should then be placed at the curbside for pickup by the sanitation crew.

The bags should not be placed in roll carts that are normally used for garbage, according to Harris.

"This helps the sanitation crew tell a difference between the garbage and the cans," he said.

The recyclable trash is picked up on Wednesdays and Thursdays. On Wednesdays, the collection will be

## None hurt in minor mishap with car, bus

No injuries were reported Wednesday afternoon in Prestonsburg when a car ran into a school bus hauling 19 grade school children.

The bus, which was coming from the direction of the Prestonsburg High School, was preparing to make a right turn at the intersection of Routes 1428 and 114, near the Kentucky Power Company office, in Prestonsburg, when it was struck in the rear by a car, Greg Hall, Prestonsburg police officer, said.

The bus had stopped to allow another vehicle to turn, Hall said, and the driver of a Beretta behind the bus could not stop because of brake failure. The front end of the Beretta went under the bus, the officer said.

Students on the bus told Hall that the impact felt as if the bus driver had hit a "bump" in the road.

No fines were issued.

# Hi Hat man indicted by Chicago grand jury

A federal grand jury in Chicago has indicted a Hi Hat man in a pension scandal involving the Chicago Housing Authority.  
Lyle "Pete" Neal, 52, of Hi Hat was indicted on 10 counts of wire fraud. Neal was one of two individuals accused of bilking the Housing Authority's pension fund out of more than \$13 million.  
Neal and Joseph Polichemi, 62, of London and Fort Lauderdale, had

allegedly told the authority that the pension money would be put in investments called "prime bank instruments."  
The two allegedly promised the investment was risk-free and would pay annual returns of 25-75 percent. Instead, the money went for personal use by the two defendants, the indictment claimed.  
The indictment charged that Neal

and Polichemi had lied about their credentials and connections. Apparently, Polichemi depicted himself as an international financier who had high-level bank connections, according to the indictment. When he was in the United States, Polichemi lived in a 20-room mansion on the waterfront in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida.  
The indictment also charges that the two had falsely claimed the investments were guaranteed by the International Monetary Fund. According to the indictment, they also claimed that Polichemi's company, Copol Investments Ltd., was one of the few firms authorized to trade in the investments.  
Neal, who at one time served a federal prison term for his role in a coal tax shelter, allegedly served as the salesman in the scheme, marketing prime bank instruments through a network of agents.  
In June, the Securities and Exchange Commission filed a civil lawsuit against Neal and Polichemi and John Lauer, son of the president of the Sara Lee Foundation and a former Chicago housing official.  
Since then, the commission has alleged that about half the housing authority's pension fund, more than \$17 million, might be missing. Only about \$1 million of that loss is covered by insurance, a representative of the housing authority's insurance carrier said.  
Lauer, who allegedly placed the housing authority's funds in prime bank instruments, was not named in the indictment. However, an indi-

vidual identified as "Person A" is named. The indictment claims that "Person A's" "corrupt assistance" helped the scheme to succeed and that he received \$4.1 million for his silence and his cooperation.  
In the lawsuit, the Securities and Exchange Commission claims that Lauer was paid \$4.1 million by Polichemi's company.  
Lauer's attorneys have indicated that he was a victim of a con game run by Neal and Polichemi. Neal's attorney, Jerry Anderson of Lexington, said that he is a "middleman in a fraud perpetrated by Mr. Lauer."  
Polichemi's attorney, who was appointed by the court, could not be reached for comment.  
An indictment is not an indication of guilt, but is a determination by a grand jury that the charges merit further court action.

move the center for the past few months. The school system received a Community Development Block Grant to move the Drift center to the McDowell campus in order to expand services for Head Start students.  
In the past, Patton and board chairman Ray Brackett expressed concern about moving the facility from the Drift community because of the outdoor recreational activities.  
Towler said Monday that concern had also been expressed about the loss of jobs by bus drivers who transport children to the Drift center. Towler added that those jobs would not be eliminated by the relocation.  
Also Monday:

- Patton explained his motion and vote at the December board meeting to hire Sam Martin as construction manager for the Martin/Maytown Elementary project. Patton said that Times editor Scott Perry launched a personal attack on him in an editorial after the December meeting. Patton said that Martin was not to blame for the delays on the South Floyd High School project, but that it was the construction site and the change in architects. Patton added that the Betsy Layne classroom addition is ahead of the construction schedule and the South Floyd gym project was completed ahead of schedule. Martin is the construction manager for both projects. Patton also criticized the Times by saying the school system had to pay to have the South Floyd gym dedication in the newspaper. Patton said he wanted to tell Perry "Happy New Year," apparently in reference to the title of the December 28, 1994 editorial.

- Floyd County Administrators' Association president Pete Grigsby Jr. asked the board to reconsider banning sporting activities on Sunday. Grigsby, who described himself as a concerned citizen, parent, past and present educator and as a Christian, said that parents and students were leaving church services early on Sundays to attend sporting events. The board took no action on the request.
- Dick Hall addressed the board for a second time asking that South Floyd's Raider Arena be renamed for

his sister and former board member Dr. Mary Hall. Dick Hall said that a previous board order called for the facility to be named after his sister. The board made no comment and took no action on the issue.

- Prestonsburg High School principal Karen Trivette asked the board to consider buying musical instruments for high school band programs. Board member Phyllis Honshell agreed and said that the board should set aside funds to promote the arts, music and humanities programs in the school system. The board took no action.

- Mary Baldrige addressed the court about equity in pay for the district's school bookkeepers. Honshell reminded Towler that the board had asked for the pay scales for bookkeepers. Towler said that he would provide board members that information in March.

- Shelby Steele of Harold asked the board to reconsider closing Harold Elementary as called for in the district's five-year building plan. Steele said that the elementary school had won many academic awards. She said that it would cause overcrowding to send students to Betsy Layne Elementary.

- Superintendent Towler reported that board chairman Ray Brackett, Patton and Jim Osborne met with Bob Tarvin with the School Facilities Construction Commission about additional monies for the Prestonsburg High School renovation project. Towler said that Tarvin said it would be unlikely that the district would receive any additional funds for the project.

- Towler said that the school system made a "bad call" to have school on January 6, with the prediction of an ice storm. Towler said the supervisors make "some good calls and some not so good calls" concerning having classes during inclement weather. He said that officials would be more careful in the future.

- Floyd County Sheriff Paul Hunt Thompson and Mountain Area Drug Task Force director Frank Fryman met with the board in closed session to discuss issues where the names of students could be used. The board called the closed session to discuss personnel.

## Animal clinic's medical waste is found at Jenny Wiley State Park

Local officials say that the discovery of a bag of medical waste at Jenny Wiley State Park several months ago is an isolated incident.

Floyd County ecology officer Lonnie May said Thursday that the single bag labeled bio-hazardous waste apparently came from a veterinary clinic.

The bag was found in a ditch at the park by someone looking for aluminum cans, May said. Park rangers responded to the scene and took custody of the waste.

Park ranger Walter Williamson said Thursday that the bag contained "1,000 or more needles and syringes." Through an investigation, Williamson said that the waste apparently came from a veterinary clinic.

Only one other instance of medical waste being dumped at the state park occurred several years ago, Williamson said.

May said that area Disaster and Emergency Services director David Chaffin assisted in the disposal of the waste. The items were resealed and taken to Medisun's medical waste incinerator at Auxier, May said.

May said that this is the first time since he was appointed ecology officer that he has encountered medical waste being dumped in the county.

May said that he and officers were unable to determine where the waste was generated.

# River committee fishes for old photos of Levisa

A group of Floyd Countians who have been fishing for an angle to promote the historical aspect of the Big Sandy River has scheduled March 11 as a day to preserve a pictorial history of the river.  
A River Awareness Committee, formed last week from a community meeting to discuss how best to utilize a \$5,000 grant the City of Prestonsburg had received, held an organizational meeting Wednesday to begin the planning process for the photo session.

Halbert said.  
In other business Wednesday, council voted to buy the police department a portable radar gun in an effort to deter motorists from speeding through their town.  
Last month council agreed to get tough on speeding motorists to protect elderly persons that cross the street through downtown and children using the school crossing.  
Police chief James Burke told council that the use of a radar gun borrowed from the City of Allen helped slow drivers through town.  
Also Wednesday, clerk Johnnie B. Stephens asked that the police department approach anyone seen roaming in the downtown area between 1 a.m. and 7 a.m.  
"I want the officers to ask why they are out (at that time)," Stephens said. "My house was broken into. There have been quite a few break-ins. This is getting to be a terrible place."  
Burke agreed that there has been a rash of break-ins in the city and it would be a good idea to follow Stephens' suggestion.  
Council directed the police department to approach anyone out in the area between those hours.  
In other business:  
Council agreed to contact property owners Peachie Collins and Tom Williams about the deteriorating condition of buildings they own downtown. Council sees the structures as safety hazards and are prepared to take action to raze the buildings.  
City attorney Tim Parker and Stephens reported that there is difficulty in finding residents willing to

serve on the city's ethics board. Parker said that the number of board members could be cut from five to three and that should consist of two people from the Democratic Party and one from the Republican Party. In the meantime, council should file financial disclosures with the county court clerk.  
Council agreed to reinstate medical insurance for city employee Bill Hackworth, who has been on medical leave since June 1994.  
Mayor Griffith was absent from Wednesday's meeting.

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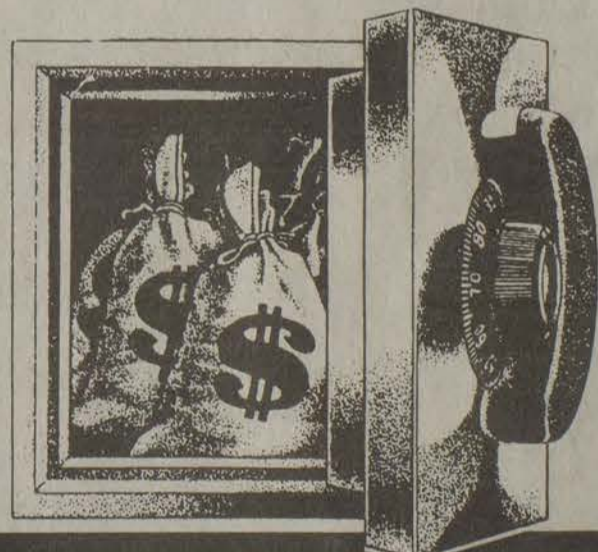

## Another law to break

The Floyd County Board of Education did the right thing this week by postponing the removals of two parent members of site-based decision making councils.

We would encourage the board and the affected council members to explore any avenue they can which may offer a way around the law making those members ineligible.

It's a goofy law and so are the arguments in favor of it.

Supporters say the statute, which prohibits parents from becoming school council members from serving if they have a relative employed anywhere in the system, is designed to protect councils from becoming overly politicized.

Other council members, including teachers and school principals, aren't subject to the same nepotism rules.

We don't know how the statute writers arrived at the conclusion that parents are more apt to be influenced by political motivations, but their thinking certainly makes little sense.

Maybe it doesn't happen, but

we're more likely to believe that school employees are more susceptible to pressures from higher up in the decision-making process than parents.

Besides, what possible difference could it make to a school council at, say, South Floyd, if a parent member's wife worked as a school secretary at, say, Auxier?

Interestingly enough, the situations two parent members are in now in Floyd County are strikingly similar to the issues faced by many county officials who are subject to removal from office for failing to comply strictly with an equally goofy law concerning performance bonds.

The state legislature may change that law in a soon-to-come special session.

They ought to take a look at the nepotism restrictions on parent members of school councils while they're at it.

Education reform is rooted deeply in the premise the parental involvement in the process is critical and necessary.

Restricting parental involvement through silly laws will likely encourage just the opposite.

## Pike jailer charging inmates \$10 a day

Inmates at the Pike County Detention Center aren't just paying for their crimes anymore. Some are paying for their stays, too.

Jailer Morris "Coon" Stratton last month started charging misdemeanor inmates \$10 a day toward their board. Although that's small in comparison to Stratton's \$1.2 million annual budget, he said every little bit helps.

"It beats nothing," said Stratton, who runs a 144-bed facility in the state's largest county. "And boy, these medical expenses and everything—we're having a hard time."

Stratton is taking advantage of a little-used law that allows counties to charge misdemeanor inmates a daily fee of up to 25 percent of their gross daily wages. Although that means he could charge more, Stratton will be happy to get \$10 a day from inmates.

Hickman County Jailer Joe F. Barber, vice president of the Kentucky Jailers Association, said many counties charge the fees for work-release prisoners. He was unaware of other counties charging ordinary inmates as Pike County does, but he said it would be a good idea.

The Kentucky Judge-Executives Association voted in December to file a "friendly lawsuit" against the state over payments for felony inmates. The state starts picking up the tab five days after sentencing, but counties think the inmate becomes the state's responsibility immediately upon conviction.

Jails' financial woes are partly attributable to decreases in the numbers of state inmates they are paid to house as more prison beds have become available.

Stan Wilkins, administrative assistant at the Pike County lockup, said his jail is losing about \$500,000

for inmates who are now being sent to private prisons like the Otter Creek Correctional Center at Wheelwright.

Barber said some misdemeanor prisoners can be in a county jail up to a year. But he said collecting from them is another matter altogether, especially when they aren't free to continue their jobs.

Prestonsburg attorney Ned Pillersdorf, who represents many poor defendants, said he is worried about the fees.

"I'm just concerned it would be discriminatorily enforced," he said.—Associated Press, Lexington Herald-Leader

## Vote-fraud charge against Bailey dismissed

An Eastern Kentucky judge dismissed one Magoffin County vote-fraud indictment last week and sent eight others back to a lower court.

All nine of the defendants were Magoffin County precinct workers and supporters of Judge-Executive Charles Hardin.

They were indicted on charges that they failed to ensure that voter assistance forms were properly filled out during the November 2, 1993 election when Hardin was elected to office.

Special Judge John Caudill of Floyd County made the decision last week after Commonwealth's Attorney Randy Campbell asked that the indictment against Paul Bailey, state highway foreman in Magoffin County, be dismissed. Campbell acknowledged that only eight members of the grand jury voted to indict Bailey, not the nine required by law.

Attorney Gordon B. Long said none of the voter assistance forms he saw appeared to be lacking any of the required information.—The Salyersville Independent

## Sheriff's budget approved, finances still gloomy

Although his 1995 budget has been approved, Pike County Sheriff Charles "Fuzzy" Keesee still hasn't found a solution to his financial woes.

During a special meeting Friday, Pike Fiscal Court members voted to approve the sheriff's budget, which included a \$160,000 supplement from the county.

That supplement, however, fell short of Keesee's original budget request for \$386,204 last month, when he asked the court to approve an additional allocation of \$226,204 to operate his department.

In looking for ways to boost revenues, Keesee said he, on the advice of a BOE member, submitted a bill to the school board for deputy services previously rendered at school functions.

Since that time, Keesee has said he was forced to cut back on services, and would not be able to furnish deputies for school functions.—Appalachian News Express, Pikeville

## Representative Deskins elected chairman

State Representative Herbert "Herbie" Deskins Jr. has been elected chairman of the Legislative Mountain Caucus. Deskins, who has been in the House of Representatives since 1976, received the unanimous approval of the 13 members of the caucus.

Deskins succeeds fellow Pike Countian, N. Clayton Little, as Mountain Caucus Chairman. Deskins is a Democrat and is known for his fiery floor speeches attacking the Central Kentucky establishment, especially the editorial board of the Lexington Herald Leader.—Staff report

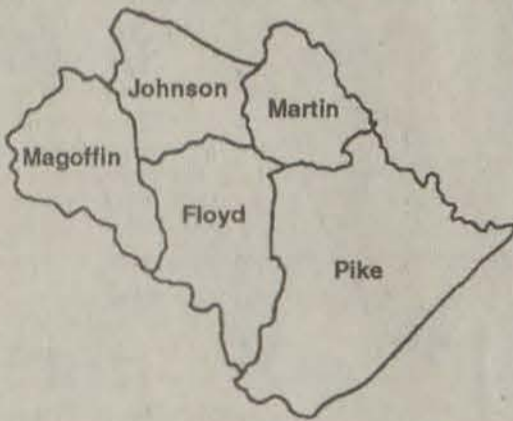

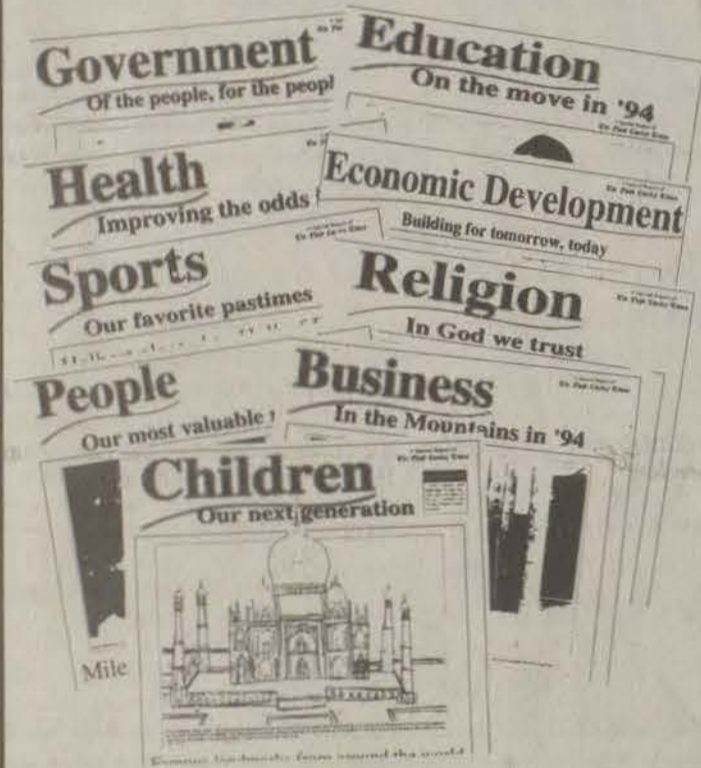

## Tipton among those honored at disabilities coalition breakfast

Senator Benny Ray Bailey, Hindman and Abilities Award Winner, Sheila Tipton, Prestonsburg Community College joined hundreds of Kentuckians with disabilities, their families, friends, and advocates who braved the lowest temperatures of this winter to breakfast with their state legislators and other leaders at the Frankfort Civic Center.

The January 4, event, hosted by the Kentucky Disabilities Coalition, was the fourth biennial "Breakfast with your Legislators" providing Kentuckians with disabilities the opportunity to discuss issues of importance with their elected representatives and senators. Leading gubernatorial candidates Bob Babbage, Larry Forgy, Gatewood Galbraith, and Paul Patton outlined their plans related to disability issues.

Governor Brereton C. Jones and Libby Jones welcomed the participants. The Governor stated to warm applause, "I want to thank you, because it was you who got behind the movement to try to pass meaningful health care reform in this Commonwealth...It is now illegal to discriminate against anyone because of any preexisting conditions."

Eight Abilities Award Winners from across Kentucky were presented by their state representatives and senators. Representative Kathy Hogencamp, Paducah, introduced this section of the program.

The Kentucky Disabilities Coalition is a state-wide alliance of 104 disability related consumer, family and professional organizations united in their efforts to achieve independence, choice, integration and empowerment in education, recreation,

work, living arrangements and leadership for the 620,000 Kentuckians with disabilities.

Patton said that it was "very impressive that you have here the Governor and Mrs. Jones, the four candidates for Governor and the members of the General Assembly. These are the people who will have the capacity to determine the future of this State... and that will help you achieve the goals that you desire. We have made progress but we still have more to do."

"Tax cut fever is sweeping this nation," according to Galbraith, "and I would ask that the people in power not let the political moment obscure their vision of what needs to be done for Kentuckians and Americans with disabilities. You cannot let tax cuts affect these modest programs and appropriations."

Forgy said "We have moved far. We must move still further. We must fund those things that are required by the Americans with Disabilities Act. We must move to tax incentives for employers who would use the worthwhile capabilities of those with disabilities."

"We passed motor voter, a tribute to Americans and Kentuckians with disabilities," Babbage said, "Because motor voter...invites Americans into the process. It is a basic act of citizenship which we now make more possible." Babbage further stated, "I want to be Governor because I know that we can do better."

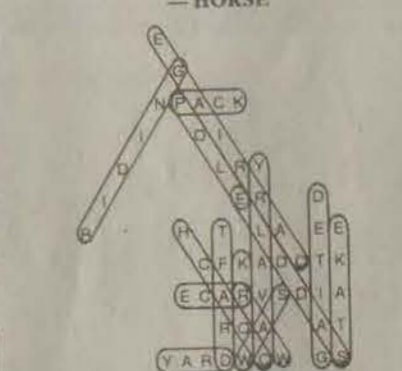

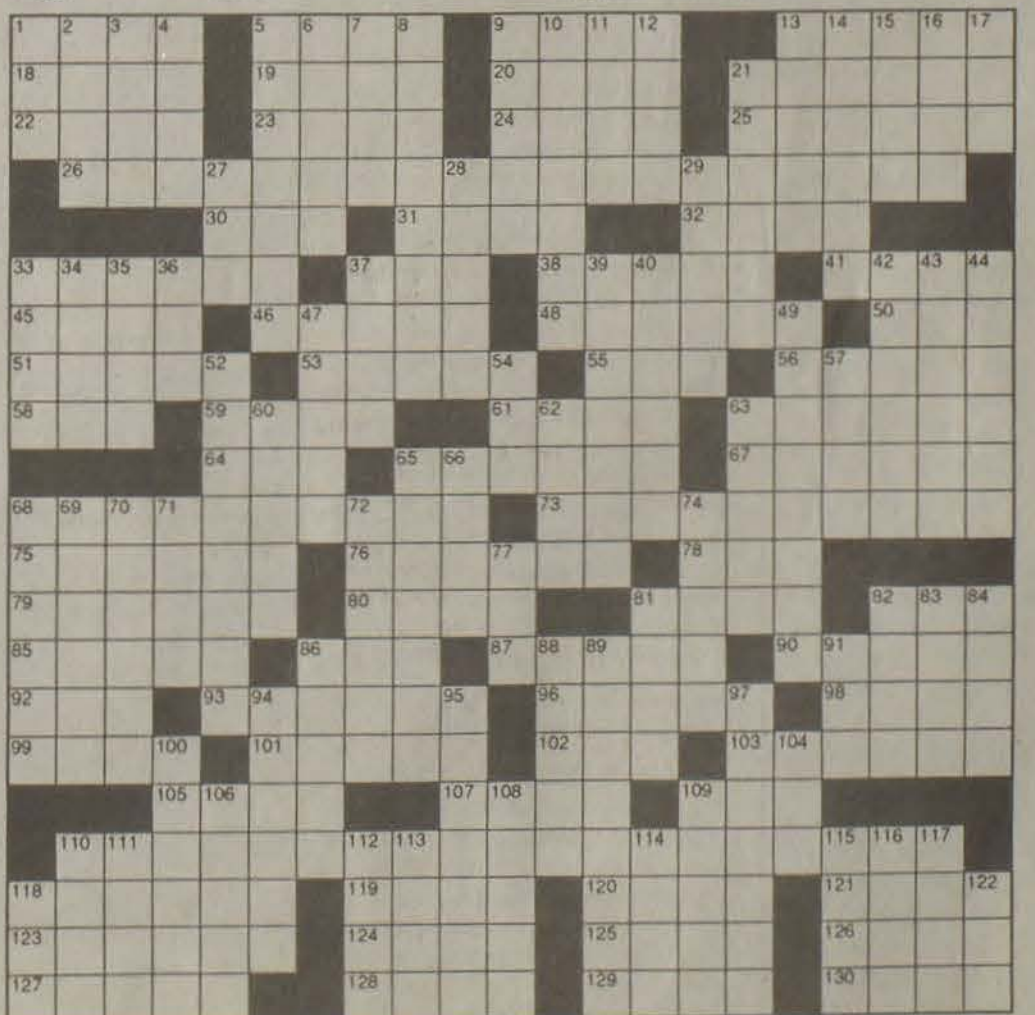

# Prestonsburg subdues South Floyd

Robinson, Ortega combine for 53 points in 82-76 win

The one-again, off-again Prestonsburg Blackcats were on-again Tuesday night when they handed the South Floyd Raiders an 82-76 conference setback at the Prestonsburg Fieldhouse.

But the win didn't come easy. Coach Gordon Parido's team had to go to overtime to put the Raiders away.

Prestonsburg went to 5-9 overall and 1-0 in the Floyd County Conference.

South Floyd dropped their second conference game while going 2-9 overall. The Raiders are 0-2 in conference play.

Prestonsburg held what appeared to be a safe five-point lead, 65-60, with only 1:06 left in regulation play.

Terrance Mullins connected on two free throws for a 65-62 game after Toby Robinson picked up his fourth personal foul with less than a minute remaining.

Clint Shutts extended the Blackcats' lead back to four, hitting the front end of a bonus shot.

South Floyd pulled to within two, 66-64, with 44 seconds left when Jason Shannon calmly hit two free throws.

Clint Shutts had a chance to extend the lead again, but missed the front end of a bonus free throw.

The Raiders rebounded the missed shot, but turned it back over to the Blackcats. J.P. Skeens went to the charity stripe for Prestonsburg after T.T. Pack fouled out with 26 seconds left, but he missed the front end shot.

"Our free throw shooting seems to come and go," said Coach Parido. "Tonight, when we needed them, we just couldn't make them."

Prestonsburg still controlled the regulation play after the Raiders missed from the outside. Brett James spotted Skeens open under the Blackcat basket, but the pass was a little long. The ball sailed out of bounds with nine seconds left to play.

Following a Raider timeout, the ball was placed in the hands of point guard Ryan Hamilton as he hurried up the floor. With the clock running and Prestonsburg defending a two-point lead, Skeens was whistled for a pushing foul as the horn went off.

Referee Jimmy Blankenship had

the clock reset with one second showing and with Hamilton standing at the line for a bonus shot.

"I thought we were in control of the ball game down the stretch," said the Prestonsburg coach. "We missed some free throws and fouled some people in the last minute that killed us."

Hamilton toed the free throw line with a section of screaming fans trying to distract him. But the senior guard hit the bottom of the net with both shots to tie the score at 66.

Prestonsburg threw the basketball the length of the floor where Robinson just missed a three-point attempt be-

fore the clock expired.

A layup by Ortega to start the overtime and two free throws by Shannon tied the game at 68-68. But Ortega hit the back end of a free throw for a 69-68 Prestonsburg lead.

Shannon's jumper at the other end was short and Ortega then buried a three-pointer to give Prestonsburg a 72-68 lead.

With 2:08 left in overtime, Robinson went hard to the basket for a layup where he was hit hard as he went up against the goal support. But he was helped up where he hit two free throws, a three-pointer and a 12-foot jumper that sealed the win for

the Blackcats.

"Toby took a nasty spill there," said the Blackcat mentor. "But he came back, got a deflection, and right after that a steal, and he made two free throws. Maybe it did wake him up."

South Floyd's biggest lead came at the end of the first quarter when they led 14-9 on Hamilton's three-point basket.

The Raiders led 3-0 and the game was tied at 3 on a James' trey. There was a tie at 5 and 7 before South Floyd took a 11-7 lead on consecutive layups by Terrance Mullins.

Prestonsburg had nine turnovers

in the first period and had 13 for the first half.

"We had a lot of unforced turnovers in that first half," said Parido. "Our players would cut one way and we throw the ball the other way."

"Our intensity was better the second half. We were more focused then," he said.

South Floyd scored eight unanswered points in the final minute and a half of the second quarter to over-

come a 42-38 Prestonsburg lead. The Raiders took a 46-44 lead after three quarters.

There were five lead changes in the fourth period before South Floyd caught the Blackcats and forced an overtime.

Robinson led all scorers with 27 points which included two treys. Ortega finished strong with 26 points and a three-point basket.

South Floyd placed five players in double figures which brought the praise of Coach Parido.

"South Floyd has people who can hurt you," he said. "When you first look at them, they don't look that impressive. But they can hurt you from all areas of the floor."

"And none of the players are great players by themselves. But at the same time, they work well together and they do so many good things out there."

Scotty Little led the Raiders with 15 points with a strong inside game. Mullins finished with 14 points while Hamilton had 13. Hamilton hit two three-pointers.

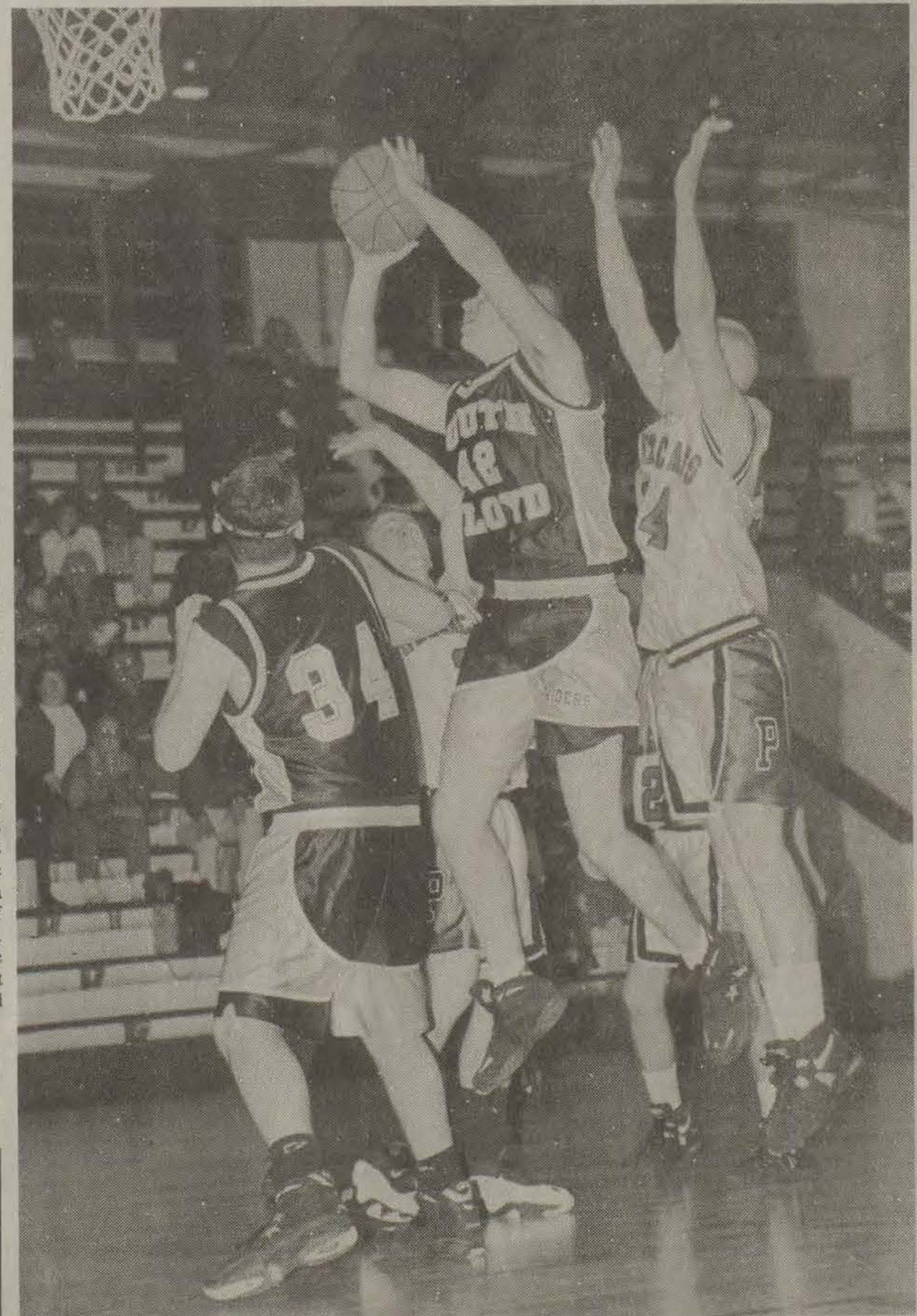
Shannon scored 12 points and T.T. Pack tossed in 10 before he fouled out. Pack was perfect from the charity stripe with four free throws.

Bear Stephens just missed double digits with eight points. Justin Ray hit a three-pointer and had four points.

Skeens netted eight for Prestonsburg. James' two three-point baskets gave him six points. Thomas Ratliff and Shutts totaled five each, as did Kevin Robinson. Robinson had a three-point basket.

Prestonsburg (5-9) travels to Magoffin County tonight where they will face Danny Adams' ballclub for the third time this season.

South Floyd (2-9) visits Johnson Central in a regional contest.

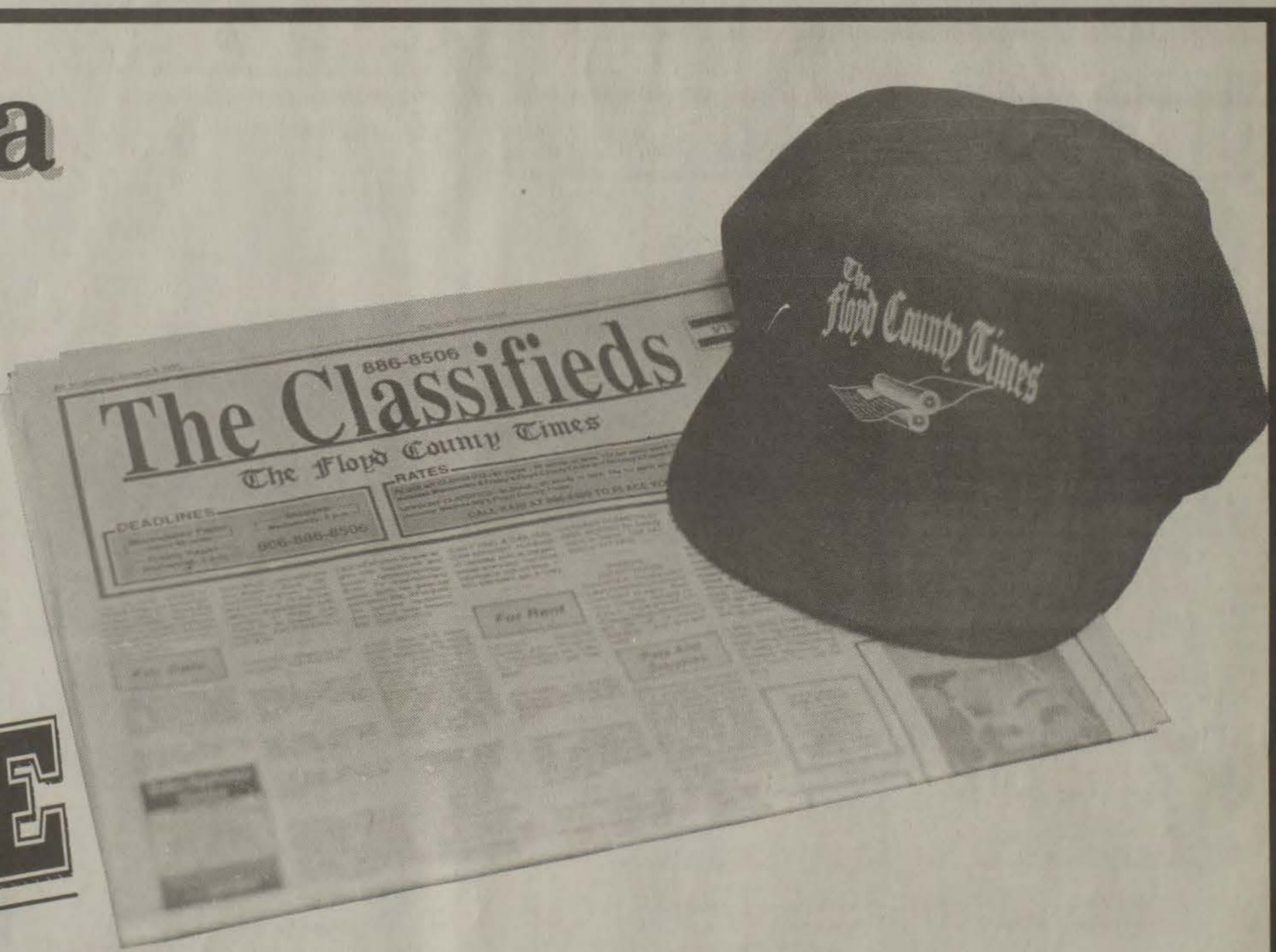

AN ORDINANCE OF THE  
CITY OF PRESTONSBURG  
AMENDING SECTIONS OF  
ORDINANCE NOS. 5-94  
AND 12-94

WHEREAS, the City  
Council of the City of  
Prestonsburg is desirous of  
amending certain sections  
of Ordinance No. 5-94 and  
Ordinance No. 12-94 relat-  
ing to the City Personnel  
Policy;

NOW THEREFORE, BE  
IT HEREBY ORDAINED by  
the City Council of the City  
of Prestonsburg, Kentucky as  
follows:

SECTION 1: Section E,  
Part V dealing with the Com-  
pensation Plan is hereby  
amended as follows:

E. Work week:  
The official work-week for  
all departments shall begin  
at 4:00 a.m. each Monday  
morning and end at 4:30  
p.m. each Monday morning.  
The City's Administrative  
Offices and Public Works  
Department will be open  
and available to the public from  
8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily.

The City reserves the right  
to change work schedules.

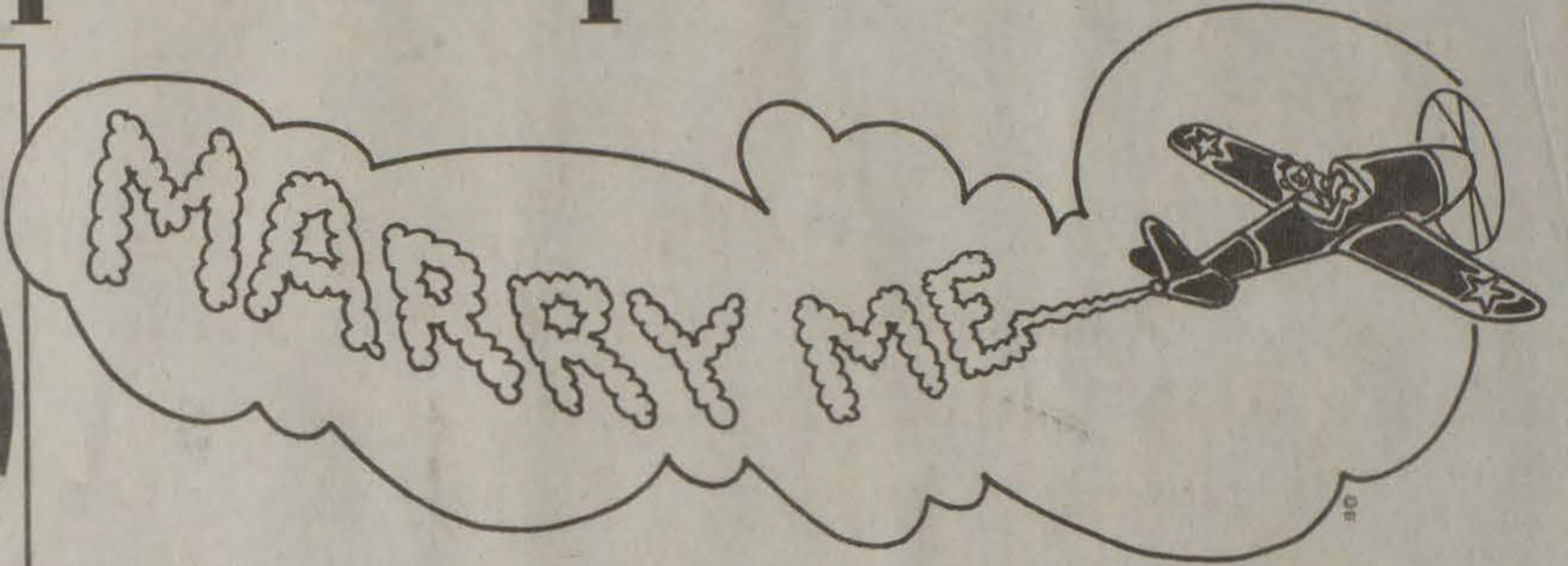
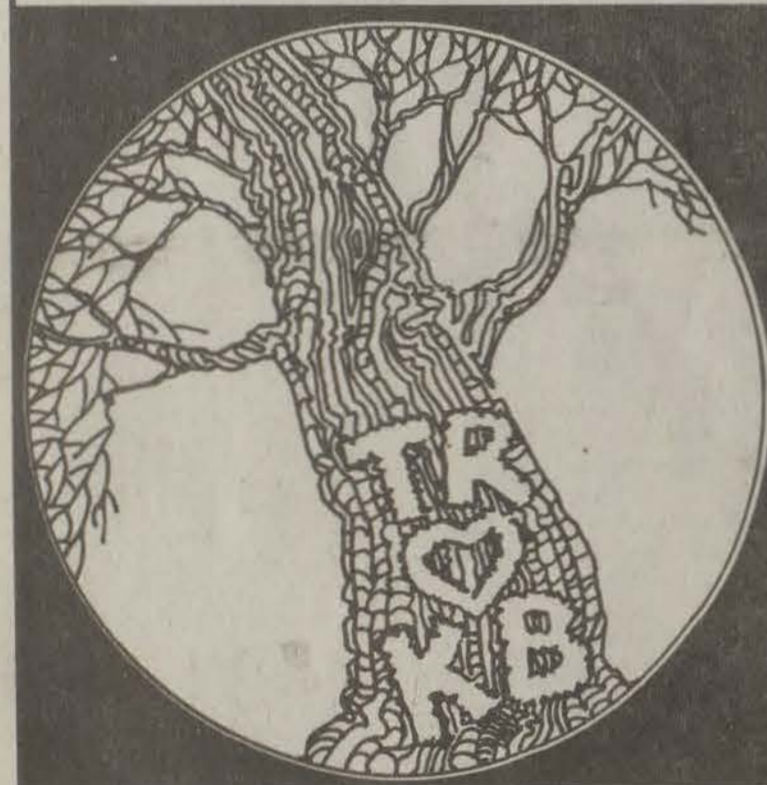
