

Hammond has declined comment on the issue.

In May, FBI agents delivered approximately 30 subpoenas related to the case to financial institutions, local court reporters and Floyd Judge-Executive Bob Meyer. Most of the subpoenas apparently sought documents related to the investigation.

"I used to get beat up a lot and I didn't want to get beat up anymore. The only way to survive was to learn to protect myself," said Troy Burchett, explaining why he began studying martial arts when he was 16 years old.

Now at age 25, Troy is teaching others how to defend themselves by teaching free martial arts classes. Among his students are several who are handicapped. "One girl I'm working with is partially blind. Two others have learning disabilities," the instructor said. "My brother, Johnny, is taking classes and he is partially

The kicker is that Troy is legally blind, himself. "Doctors said that my pupils didn't develop with age-they're like a three-year-old's. I can't get a driver's license, basic stuff like that." But his poor eyesight hasn't kept him from pursuing a meaningful career.

Another lesson Troy is attempting to instill in his young protégés is the importance of selfacceptance. It is a lesson he had to learn him-

"I've learned that no matter what disability you have, if you want something, you can have it. You can accept what you've got or be dis-

As for karate, Troy and three assistants are teaching what he calls "simple stuff," such as throws, locking, and grappling, to the students

who range from age six to middle-aged adults. To the children, karate is more of a sport. Most of the adults have a more serious purpose

"I teach a lot of single parents," Troy said.

Kentucky State Police trooper John Hunt testified Wednesday in a preliminary bearing that Combs fled the vehicle he was driving and three, in the car near Tackett Fork at Mud Creek. The children were not

Hunt said that the vehicle rolled 30-40 feet over an embankment and landed in a shallow creek. Floyd Deputy Sheriff Homer Neeley, who was with Hunt during the chase, got the two children out of the vehicle while Hunt captured Combs, the trooper said.


The Prestonsburg Properties Advisory Committee decided to sell two front parcels of land near the Mountain Arts Center during their meeting Tuesday.



The development could be education or tourism related, Carter said.

Advisory committee chairman Paul Hughes said the restrictions haven't been written up yet, but they are proposed to ensure the development of the land is compatible to the Mountain Arts Center and to Morehead State University's education center.

Restrictions will include a time limit on developing the land and architectural styling that is compatible to the other buildings.

Now at the age of 25 and with a Bachelor's Degree in family studies, he's heading for Japan on July 27 to do full-time missionary work with the Southern Baptist Journeyman pro-

As a journeyman, Carpenter will not be allowed to come home to the States for two years. His parents, though, can visit him and he can talk to them on the telephone.

That will be tough, says his mom, Delores.

"I feel specially blessed but feel a mother's sadness that I won't see him in two years," she said. "I dedicated him to the Lord when he was young for him to be used by Him. I feel like anytime the Lord calls, he'll be physi-

"The last six weeks, I had a penthouse, maids, everything - all the luxuries you could imagine. That experience taught me I can live in a wide range of living environments."

He also discussed the reserved attitude of the Japanese people and said he was not concerned about breaking through that reserve.

"I have learned that the most important thing in my walk with God is that I am to be open and available to share the good news of Jesus Christ. I have also learned that God is not concerned with my abilities as He is with my availability. I am open to wherever God wants me to go and to whatever He wants me to become through the International Service Corps," Carpenter said.

Carpenter's interest in missionary work was sparked in 1989 when he became part of the Southern Baptist's Creative Performance team in Virginia Beach, Virginia. In 1990, when he went to Israel on a mission, he said he "felt called and had a peace about

Republican Will T. Scott, a Pike Countian like Patton, is running for Attorney General.



Budget balancing 101: college kids I will forget, show me and I might are the teachers

How did the federal government grow so large? Why did American taxpayers cough up nearly \$58 billion dollars in interest alone on the national debt in January? And how did the federal budget deficit reach more than \$150 billion last year?

No one seems to have good answers to these questions. The fact is the federal government has grown out of control, and programs and services are being reduced to help pay for the huge budget deficit.

But one thing is for certain. If the federal government continues to spend federal dollars irresponsibly, future generations will be the ones who pay for it.

Fortunately, the country's future business and government leaders might prove to be more responsible than their predecessors thanks to educational programs that teach young people how to deal with money before they become elected officials or small-business owners themselves.

One such program is Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE), a 20-yearold organization founded in Texas to teach college students about business, entrepreneurship and the free enterprise system. The outfit's idea is to give students hands-on experience. Their motto says it all: "Tell me and

remember, but involve me and I will learn"-quite a positive learning tool.

To teach others about business, some students develop lesson plans games, coloring books and video tapes. And many students tutor younger children. Participants also have produced and appeared on television spots and programs; written, published, and distributed thousands of flyers, pamphlets, booklets, and books on economic issues to elementary school-aged students; and operated businesses such as campus snack bars and book stores.

Once the students form collegiate teams to present their outreach programs, they are judged by a panel of national business leaders and entrepreneurs, proving that competition is a way to mispute stud

The impact of the program has been far-reaching. To date, some 4,000 education programs have reached nearly two million school children, more than one million college students, and in excess of 66 million citizens around the country.

And the program continues to grow. This year was record breaking as more business leaders joined judges panels, greater numbers of colleges participated and the amount of financial support hit new levels. And last year the organization crossed international borders as teams from Canada and Europe competed.

Early to recognize the importance of economic education was the 600,000 member National Federation of Independent Business, the nation's largest advocacy group for and train teachers; others create small business, which plays an active role in competitive events.

With all the talk about ballooning deficits and careless spending, it's refreshing to see America's next generation of leadership taking a keen interest in fiscal accountability. With a little imagination and a lot of guts, they could be the generation that might have to answer such questions as: "What was a federal budget defi-





# News of the Weird

THE WEIRDO-AMERICAN COMMUNITY

- In April, three members of San Francisco's Bay
Area Carnivorous Plant Society pleaded guilty to
smuggling more than 200 rare plants into the U.S. from
Asia. Said another society member, who speculated on
their motive: "Carnivorous plants can really give you
an obsession. ... I started out with a Venus's flytrap 35
years ago. ... You get one and you want another one."

-- Phoenix police arrested a Christian school headmaster, Michael William Wetton, in March and charged him with child abuse. A woman and her 15-year-old daughter had met with Wetton to consider enrolling the girl, and, according to police, Wetton demonstrated the school's Christian discipline by forcing the girl to strip and submit to a paddling while reciting the Lord's Prayer.

- Denver police arrested Milton Edward Anderson, 63, in March and said he was their principal suspect in a wave of about 200 recent brassiere-slashings (right cup only) at retail stores. Anderson denied the charge-but admitted he was wearing women's underwear at the time he was arrested.

- In March, librarians in Santa Clara and Santa

Cruz counties in California were on the lookout for a mystery slasher who had removed the pages from poetry books in several libraries. Speculated the editor of a poetry magazine interviewed by the San Francisco Chronicle, "The poetry world attracts people on the fringes. ... Maybe this person thinks these poems should be in a different style or form, or wants them to rhyme."

- In February in East Moline, Ill., Benjy G.
Kremenak, 39, pleaded guilty to having stalked a
woman for nearly three years. His hearing had been
postponed from May 1994 because the judge at that
time became alarmed when Kremenak several times
during the hearing spontaneously broke out singing his
rendition of "Chapel of Love."

-- In December, Charles Moody, 34, was arrested in Louisville, Ky., and charged with killing his mother and brother, wrapping the bodies in plastic so that some features were visible, and leaving them at curbside for garbage pickup. He told onlookers quite unconvincingly that they were only fake bodies. Said a local psychologist interviewed by the Louisville Courier-Journal, "[Moody's] is a classic example of denial that will be taught in classrooms for years."

-- In April in Haddon Heights, N.J., police charged Leslie Nelson with the murders of two police officers who had come to her home to serve a warrant for weapons violations. Nelson resisted arrest and barricaded herself inside for 14 hours. The 6-foot-2 Nelson,


who had recently undergone a sex-change operation to cease being Mr. Glenn Nelson, was seen during the standoff at a window in the home holding a rifle while clad in G-string and halter top.

-- In January, months of investigative work by the Warren (Ohio) Tribune-Chronicle resulted in murder charges being filed against a man for a 1978 murder that had been officially reported as a suicide by county coroner Joseph A. Sudimack, who had retired in 1987. Still being investigated are several other of Sudimack's "suicide" determinations, including one case of a man who was shot and run over by a bulldozer; another of a man who was found hanged, on his knees, with toilet paper stuffed in his mouth; and another of a man who died of carbon monoxide poisoning from an inoperable lawn mower.

- Danny Strickland, 34, was arrested in Savannah, Ga., in November after a shoot-out with police, and charged with killing his father. Among the evidence against Strickland was a to-do list he had made for disposing of the body (e.g., nail windows closed, repair bullet holes, melt bullets) and some equipment he had purchased to dispose of the body (e.g., a meat grinder).

-- In January, attorney Lawrence Gottfried, 50, was sentenced to 15 months in prison for destroying documents during his tenure with the Board of Veterans' Appeals in Washington, D.C. According to
