

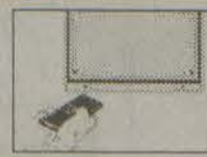

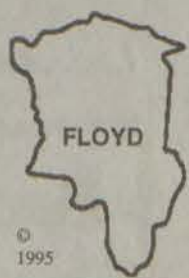

Lifetime of abuse stirs hate, hopelessness before help

Every 15 seconds, a woman is battered in the United States by her husband, boyfriend or live-in partner. The following story of an abuse victim occurred in Floyd County. Her name has been changed to protect her from retaliation by her abuser. Help for victims of abuse in the Big Sandy region is available by calling the Big Sandy Family Abuse Center's toll-free number, 1-800-649-6605.

Kate Kimper has been a victim since the age of eight.

Until a few months ago, Kate, now a grandmother, faced a daily

barrage of abuse. It had gotten so bad that each time her common-law husband placed his loaded pistol against her temple, Kate hoped he would pull the trigger.

She had even begun to agree with his accusations that she was seeing other men so he would kill her.

As a youngster, Kate was sexually abused by her father for several years until family friends took her out of her parent's home and welcomed her into their family. She thought she was safe, but she wasn't. Her substitute father wanted her to be his "girlfriend, too."

"I went from bad to bad," Kate said Monday as she recalled a past that offered no hope.

"I hated the world and everybody in it. My mind was on hate. I couldn't see the daylight because I had too much hate to see anything."

She especially hated God and couldn't understand why he would allow her to go from one abusive situation to another.

Kate was underage and couldn't leave her new home. She shut herself off from life. School was simply a place to go to escape for awhile. Kate began looking for a way out and she found it when a man she knew asked her to marry him.

"He was a good man, but I

didn't love him," she recalled.

Kate still thinks he was a good man, but he abused her with words. He totally destroyed any spark of self-confidence that she had left.

Because of the abuse she had suffered, Kate had built a wall of hate and resentment between herself and anyone who cared about her.

She had never experienced love until her children were born. She loved them dearly, but after their birth her hatred for her husband increased. She felt

he had put more responsibility on her than she could handle. How could she take care of her children's emotional problems, when she couldn't handle her own?

"I loved my kids. I have been forced into everything all my life. I let everybody use me as a doormat," she said.

Kate and her husband divorced. The children stayed with their dad because of their mom's emotional problems.

Kate had nowhere to go and had never been on her own. When she met a man who "worshipped the ground she walked on," she moved in with him.

Directed verdict is delivered to county

A former Floyd County road worker lost his bid Monday to get his job back, which he claimed was taken by a magistrate's wife, when a judge issued a directed verdict in favor of the fiscal court.

Arnold Daniels, 32, of Eastern, sued the fiscal court last October claiming that he had been laid off and his job had been given to Hattie Owens, wife of District Two Magistrate Jackie Edford Owens in January 1994.

Circuit Judge John David Caudill reluctantly ruled in favor of the fiscal court after hearing testimony in the case.

"The court has to separate its personal feelings from its judicial function," Caudill said. "Although the court may agree with the position of the defendant that the hiring procedures in this case may have not been appropriate, the court finds that he was terminable at will and there was no written contract of employment," Judge Caudill said. "For that reason and that reason alone, I issued a directed verdict."

Judge Caudill told jurors that if he was making his decision based on personal feelings instead of law, he would have made a different decision in Daniels' case.

"I'm not real pleased with what happened and the way it happened," the judge said.

At Monday's trial, Magistrate Owens testified that Daniels had been fired because he had a drinking problem, but that it was reported that Daniels had been laid off so

Former banker enters guilty plea

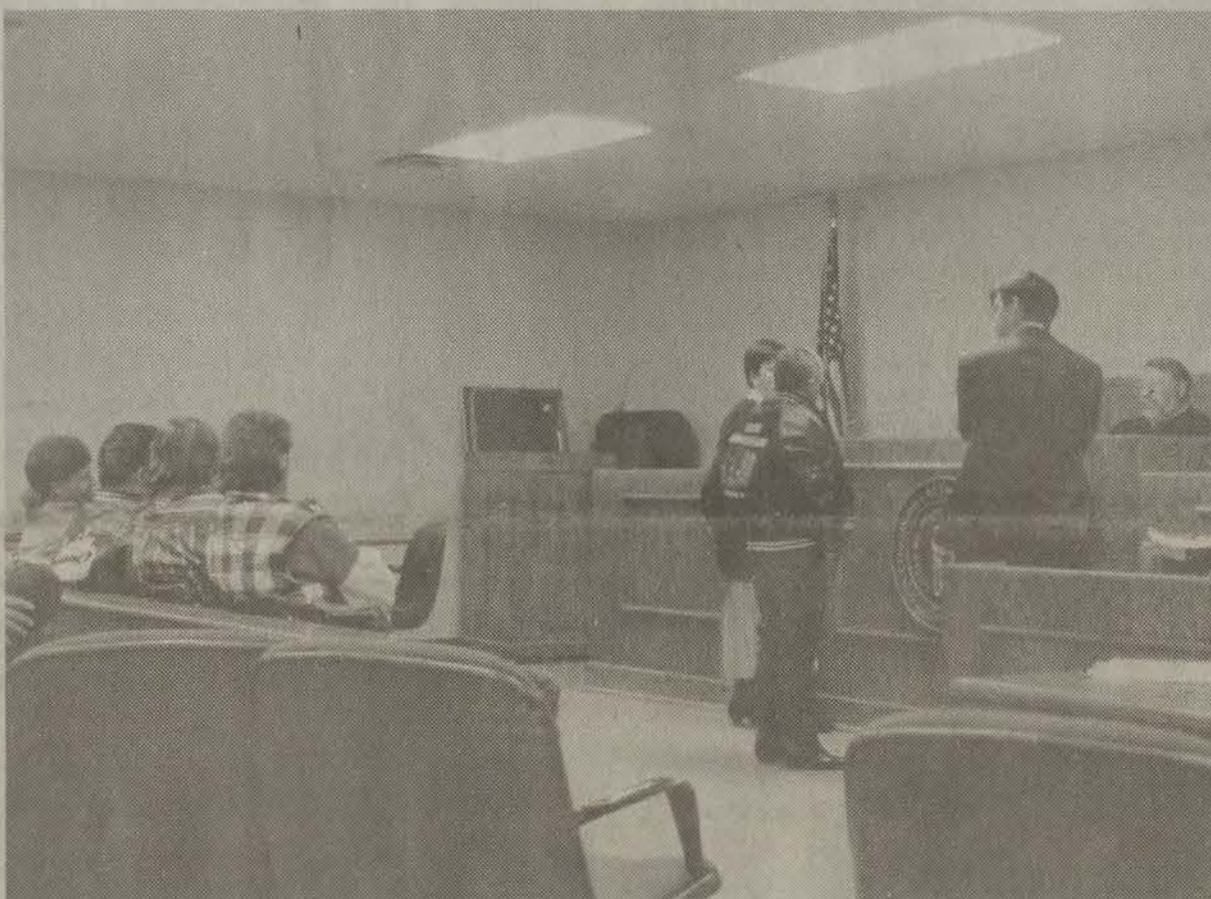
After nearly seven months of investigations, a former Trans Financial official has been charged with theft and embezzlement of bank funds.

Steve M. Newsome, who was branch manager of the Prestonsburg branch and loan officer for the Martin-based financial institution, pleaded guilty October 10 and accepted a plea agreement in connection with the charges.

He was not given an opportunity to enter an Alford plea which means the defendant does not admit guilt, but realizes there is enough evidence to convict him on the charges.

According to court documents, Newsome embezzled and misapplied and caused to be embezzled

Federal probe of county attorney resumes, more charges are possible

More indictments could be issued today (Wednesday) by a federal grand jury sitting in Ashland that is looking into the personal financial dealings of Floyd County Attorney Jim Hammond.

Grand jurors are set to begin their proceedings at 9 a.m. this morning and, according to a statement made by a U.S. Attorney last month, more charges could be filed against Hammond.

Hammond and his wife, Janie, were indicted last month on fraud and conspiracy charges related to the Child Support Enforcement Division of Hammond's office. The two are accused of falsifying time sheets/payroll records of Child Support Enforcement employees.

Last month, U.S. Attorney Joe Farnularo said "stay tuned" when asked if the federal probe relating

to Hammond was finished.

Any action by the grand jury today could be related to Hammond's personal finances.

In May, FBI agents served subpoenas for records and to individuals and financial institutions relating to Hammond's finances. Hammond's attorney, Bernard Pafunda,

confirmed in May that federal authorities were looking into Hammond's personal finances.

Officials have declined to offer any specifics beyond those listed in indictments, and they have not said if any other Floyd County officials are targets of their investigation.

Hammond asks to reinstate suit on 911 reimbursements

Floyd County Attorney Jim Hammond last week filed a motion to set aside the dismissal of his lawsuit against the fiscal court related to the county's E-911 system.

Hammond is asking Special Judge James Knight to reinstate his lawsuit, which seeks the return of E-911 monies collected by the

county for the past five years.

Last month, Judge Knight dismissed Hammond's suit in a hearing in Martin County Circuit Court, ruling that an ordinance establishing the system could be made retroactive to February 1990.

Hammond claimed in his suit that the court improperly adopted an ordinance earlier this year au-

Sheriff ends standoff with man's arrest

An Allen woman was injured Sunday night after a frightening encounter with a stranger who threatened to kill her and commanded her home.

Timothy Lee Slone, 35, of Allen, who was using the name Ronald Day, allegedly attacked Phyllis Hall, Slone's neighbor, on her porch about 8:30 p.m. Sunday and held a two-hour standoff with police.

Hall said Monday that she and her family had just returned from church when Slone knocked on her storm door and asked if her husband was home.

"I had just sent my daughter next door and my husband was outside around the corner," Hall said. "(Slone), I don't even know him, knocked on the door and asked if my husband, Steve, was home. I said, 'yes,' and then he started stepping in my door."

"I went out on the porch," Hall continued, and he put a shotgun in my face and said, 'I'm gonna shoot you. This is my house. I want you in my house.'

"I wrestled with him and he got inside the house," Hall said. "We both had hold of the gun. He hit me and told me he was going to kill me. I told him he could have my house, but just let me go. He said I could go, then he said he changed his mind and said, 'I'm gonna kill you.' He beat me in the left side of my head."

Slone stumbled back into Hall's home and she fled out the front door, she said. "I looked back and he had the gun pointed at the back of my head to shoot me," Hall said.

Hall tumbled down about 25 steps which led up to her front porch and flagged down a patrol car and told them what had happened, she said.

"I don't know why he did that," Hall said of Slone's alleged attack. I don't know how I fought him off. The Lord just helped me. I told my husband that I had a funny feeling

about that man. He just sits in the trailer and stares out all the time. I'm a nervous wreck."

Floyd County sheriff Paul Hunt Thompson and deputies, Allen police chief Virgil Conn and Kentucky State Police officers responded to the scene and surrounded Hall's home. State police repeatedly called to Slone to surren-

that the former road worker could draw unemployment benefits. "I don't think he was laid off, but he was laid off so he'd be able to draw unemployment," Owens said. "I've never (known former Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo) to protest unemployment."

Daniels' attorney, Mike Endicott, asked Owens, "If Mr. Daniels had been fired for drinking alcohol, he couldn't have drawn unemployment?"

"No," Owens answered. Owens testified that he had smelled alcohol on Daniels several times when he showed up for work on the road crew. Owens said that he had warned Daniels about his drinking problem.

"The smell of alcohol would knock you down and I called the judge," Owens said. "He told me not to let (Daniels) operate no equipment and let him sit in the truck and drive him around."

Daniels, who was hired in 1990, received a citation for driving under the influence in September 1990 and pleaded guilty to that in February 1991.

Daniels testified that Owens never warned him about drinking on the job and that he did not come to work intoxicated. As for the drinking and driving charge, Daniels said that Owens and his wife had helped him during the disposition of the case.

The DUI was an issue raised by the court's attorney, Allen Button, because when Daniels pleaded guilty, his commercial driver's license was suspended. When his license was suspended, Daniels could not drive a county truck.

Daniels testified that Owens never made an issue of the conviction and that county workers picked him up at his home and drove him to work while his license was suspended.

"(Magistrate Owens) knew about the DUI," Daniels testified. "Hattie even went down to see if she could get the fine reduced."

Owens also testified that Daniels' position had been eliminated as part of a routine four-year reorganization by the fiscal court. As part of that reorganization, the position of crew leader was created in each of the magisterial districts, Owens said.

Hattie Owens' job consists of

"doing FEMA work, answering the phone and helping carry out what the (judge-executive) wants done," Owens testified. He denied that he asked Stumbo to hire his wife and testified that the magistrates have no say who is hired as a county worker.

"The judge does the hiring and

firing," Owens said.

Hattie Owens testified that she had voluntarily worked for the county for the past eight years doing basically the same thing.

"I oversee the day-to-day work in the district, order supplies, work with the road supervisor and work

der.

Slone ignored the orders to give himself up and, donning bullet-proof vests, Sheriff Thompson and deputies Linzie Hunt and Steve Toy entered Hall's house after about a two-hour standoff.

"Deputy Steve Little and Virgil (Conn) went to the home prior to our arrival and saw Slone, who pointed the shotgun at deputy Little," Thompson said Monday. "They did what they were supposed to do—back off and notify us."

"We went through the upstairs and then went to the top of the basement stairs," Thompson said. "He was in the basement and I stood at the top of the stairs because that was the only place there was no exposure to Slone. I started talking to him."

"He wanted to know if Virgil was there and I said 'yes,'" Thompson said. "He wanted to know if Virgil could handcuff him. We got Virgil in the house and I told (Slone) to face the wall and side-step over to where we could

see him. I told him to lay down the gun before he was in my sights and he did."

Slone was taken into custody. Thompson said that Slone didn't appear "too intoxicated" and said that he felt the gunman may have been using drugs.

Thompson said that he made the decision to go in after Slone.

"It wasn't anything heroic," Thompson said. "The decision I made was based on several things. This time it worked out okay and hopefully it always will."

Thompson added that Slone apparently has a history of mental illness, according to information gathered by sheriff's detective Steve Toy.

Approximately 10 state policemen and six deputy sheriffs responded to the scene, Thompson said. State police had called for a special response team before trying to enter the home, Thompson said.

Slone gave his name to police as Ronald Day and he had rented a mobile home across from Hall's residence using that name, Thompson said.

Slone, who is originally from Martin County, was charged with three counts of first degree wanton endangerment, one count of wanton endangerment involving a police officer, one count of burglary and one count of fourth degree assault. He is being held on a \$35,000 cash bond.

District Judge James Allen set a preliminary hearing for October 25 at 2:30 p.m.

Hall said Monday that she intended to file additional charges against Slone. She added that she was treated for her injuries Sunday night and was seen by her physician Monday morning.

with the federal men during disasters," Hattie Owens testified.

Owens admitted that she is doing some of the duties that her husband did prior her being hired as crew leader.

County finance officer Deloris Dings, whose name appeared on Daniels' layoff slip, testified that when Daniels came to the judge-executive's office to inquire about his retirement benefits, he signed a statement saying he was resigning his position.

"Mr. Daniels came in and said he had gone to apply for unemployment and he had to have a layoff slip," Dings testified. "Judge Stumbo said to type him one. It was like when (Jailer) Roger (Webb) came in and laid off people at the jail and brought in his people like new jailers always did."

"When he came back the second time to withdraw his retirement benefits," Dings continued, "he had to have a letter saying either he was terminated or resigned."

Daniels testified that the letter of resignation he signed was part of some paperwork that was presented to him when he withdrew approximately \$2,500 of his retirement benefits. He said that he did not specifically see the resignation letter.

Endicott said he will appeal Judge Caudill's decision.

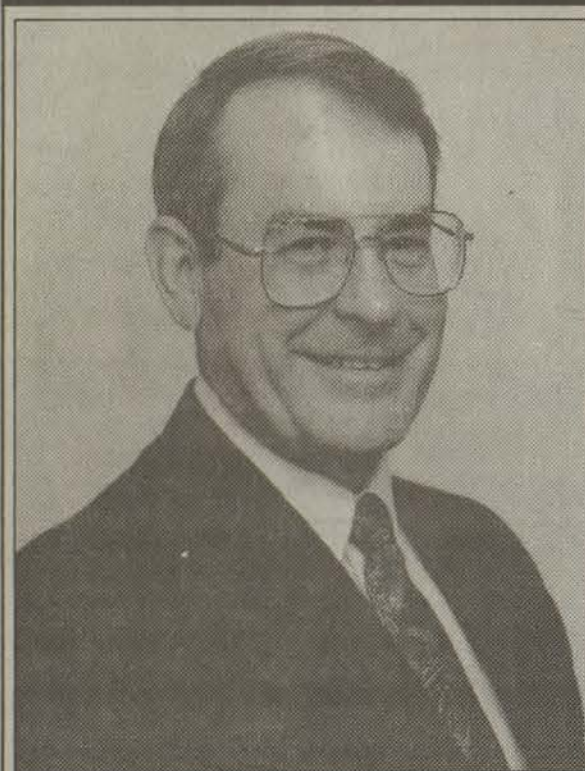

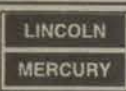

Enough is enough

No one, we suspect has been more critical of the county's foot-dragging on the implementation of a 911 emergency system for Floyd County than us, but it is time to call off the dogs.

We'll keep them under the porch, though, just in case the hunt begins anew.

There are a number of reasons behind our decision to put this issue on the back burner, too, and most have arisen in the last eight months, during the term of interim Judge-Executive Bob Meyer.

Note these items of progress:

- The 911 program has an advisory board in place.
- The 911 system has a designated home in the soon-to-be vacated old county jail.
- An implementation plan has been devised that could put the system on line by February 28, 1996.
- New fire tax districts have been created to eliminate unserved areas of the county.
- New dispatching equipment that will connect all county emergency service providers could soon be ordered.
- Financial concerns have been

basically resolved and 911 funds are being segregated into a separate bank account.

- A 911 coordinator has been hired.
- There is general agreement among the plaintiffs in a suit against the county that progress is being made, rapidly.

That's quite an improvement after five years of nothing. Enough to make us confident that 911 service will soon be a reality in Floyd County.

County Attorney Jim Hammond, though, apparently isn't satisfied and he has asked the courts to reinstate his suit that, in part, demands a refund of 911 revenues to county fee payers.

That proposal may be appropriate in the technical and legal sense, but it makes no real sense at all.

If Hammond's suit is reactivated, it can only mean further delays or it could possibly scrap the project altogether.

We imagine that most Floyd Countians prefer a working 911 system to Hammond's effort to block it further, and we urge him to withdraw his latest legal action, if not in deference to public protection, then in light of public will.

911 board selects communication system provider

In a marathon meeting Tuesday, Floyd County's E-911 board reviewed two proposals relating to a county-wide communications system which will allow the majority of the county's emergency service providers to have radio contact from one location.

Proposals and presentations were made before the board by representatives from Highland Communications and Big Sandy Two-Way Communications.

Allen Gillum, owner of Highland, and representatives from Communications Maintenance Inc. (CMI), of Indianapolis, Indiana, explained the services available from Orbacom Systems, the company which would manufacture the equipment.

Lane Dutton, representing Big Sandy Two-Way, discussed the advantages of using Motorola equipment.

After extensive discussions on the two proposals, board members opted to recommend to the fiscal court Friday the package offered by Highland Communications.

Highland's proposal is for equipment and installation of four complete dispatching stations; the construction of an 100-foot radio tower; an option for remote panels for base stations for Betsy Layne, Martin, Middle Creek, South East, Wayland and Wheelwright fire departments; and a system that will allow up to 50 channels for radio frequencies. The Toler Creek Fire Department was not included in any of the proposals because the department has no radio equipment.

The cost for the complete package is \$195,015.

Big Sandy's proposal offered basically the same equipment except the Motorola package was not entirely operated by computer and it was limited to 15 channels. The addition of channels would include a base cost of \$8,595 plus \$1,538 per channel.

Board members agreed that the Highland proposal would allow the county to expand the system in the future at a lower cost and they were

impressed with the capabilities of the system.

The Orbacom equipment was considered to be the more sophisticated of the two systems and board member James Campbell said he felt it "looks more to the future."

The two companies came close in the board's evaluation. Highland received a score of 85 and Big Sandy scored 80.

The board made its recommendation contingent on Highland's and CMI's reference checks.

In other business Tuesday: Board members agreed to recommend to the fiscal court a cost estimate for renovation of space in the old county jail to house the communications center. Architect Randall Burchett prepared a preliminary cost estimate which put the renovation at \$4,600. Board members agreed that that figure could go higher because the cost of wiring the space was not included.

A special meeting of the board will be held October 27 to review proposals for the purchase of 911 equipment. The time for that meeting has not been set.

Board members Alan Whicker, David Marlee Sammons and Magistrate Gerald DeRossett were absent.

Repairs to Wheelwright library could begin soon

Repairs and renovation of the City of Wheelwright's library could begin this month with city officials voting Monday to buy materials to repair the roof.

Mayor David Marlee Sammons told commissioners that once the roof is repaired work can begin to refurbish the inside of the building.

City clerk Mary Ann Johnson said the city signed a lease on the facility in 1973 and that the lease was still in effect.

Commissioner Andy Akers said that the city should "catch up" on the one dollar a year payment.

Johnson said the owners were "not worried" about the money and wanted to see the building used.

Ruth Daniels, who is working on the library project with the city, was to attend Monday's meeting, but was ill, Akers said.

Mayor Sammons added that Daniels will assist the city in getting books for the library. Sammons also said that the warden of the Otter Creek Correctional Facility informed him that prison labor can be used to renovate the building and county officials will haul debris from the site.

Funds for the roof repair will come from the proceeds of the sale of reddog owned by the city.

Police chief Tommy Engle asked commissioners about salaries for library personnel once the project is complete.

Sammons said that Daniels was working on that issue and that he had talked with senior citizens about volunteering.

Also Monday:

- Commissioners adopted an ordinance setting the city tax rate at 35 cents per \$100 valuation, the same rate as last year.

- Akers informed commissioners that work is continuing on the production of deeds for city property sold to homeowners for parking.

- Commissioners voted to give up to \$50 for a Halloween party and haunted house set for October 28.

- Commissioners voted to buy chief Engle a hand held radio and winter coat.

- Commissioners nixed a motion by Mayor Sammons to name Brian Boyd as an auxiliary policeman because Engle said Boyd's mother

Stonsburg complained of smelling a strong diesel odor.

Floyd County Disaster and Emergency Services Director Lon May said Tuesday that he received a call around 6:30 p.m. Monday from Lancer residents who said they had seen the rainbow sheen of oil floating on the river.

May confirmed the report and called water plants located downstream, advising them to shut off their intake valves.

The Prestonsburg water plant shut off its intake pipe in the Big Sandy River for about 14 hours Monday and Tuesday until the oil slick had passed, Sheldon Horne, superintendent for Prestonsburg Utilities, said Tuesday.

The water company had just filled its tanks and was getting ready to reopen its valves when the call came from May. Some residents may have experienced low water pressure, Horne said, but no one went without water service.

Some residents of the Lancer community had complained of experiencing headaches and sinus problems from the strong odor.

Investigators White and Sexton were investigating the incident Tuesday when they received word around 10:30 a.m. Tuesday that Mare Creek Sand Company at Allen was reporting that they had an accidental diesel spill.

The amount of diesel spilled into the Big Sandy and any fines that may be imposed against the company was unavailable at presstime Tuesday.

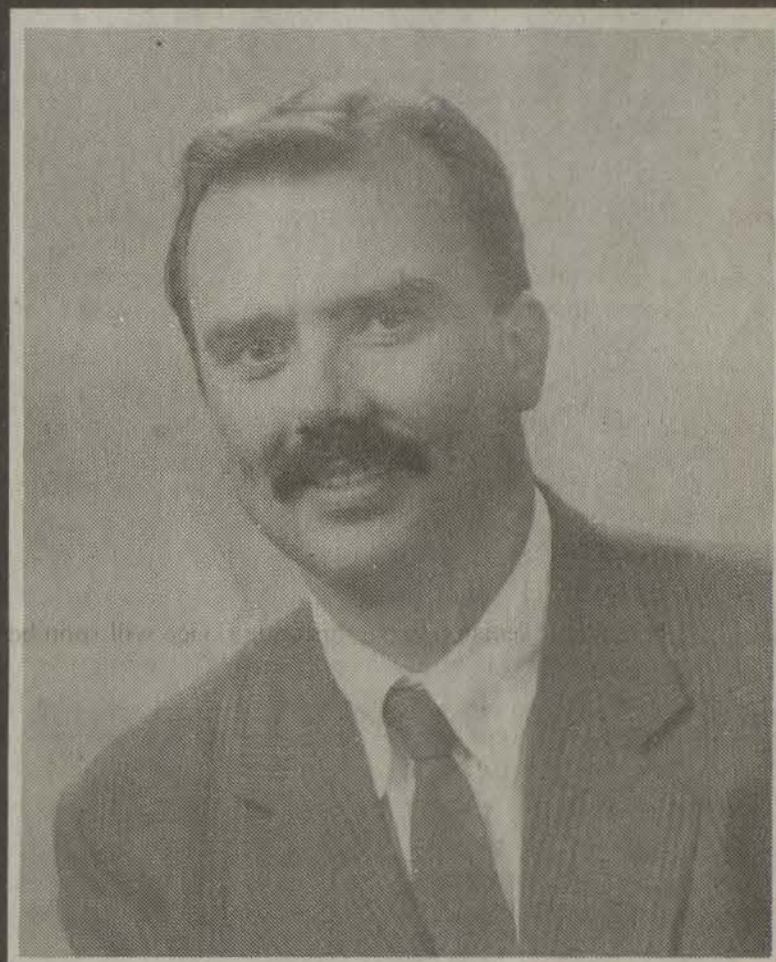

Abuse

Kate didn't realize it at the time, but her situation had just gotten worse.

Unknown to Kate, the man had abused his previous wives and he was extremely possessive. Kate was not allowed to go anywhere unless he went with her. The only places she was allowed to go were the grocery store and the doctor's office.

If she spotted an old acquaintance in the store, Kate hid by going down other aisles. If she talked to anyone, she faced the risk of having a gun pointed at her when she went home. She couldn't visit her children. Her children were afraid to speak to her and visits from them always provoked fights.

Kate's life consisted of sitting on the porch, watching the traffic go up and down the road.

"If someone blew (a horn) at me, Heaven forbid," she recalled.

When she became seriously ill

and doctors prescribed pain medication for her, Kate's abuser told her it was all in her head and she didn't need the medication. He began complaining that she was making him physically ill. Kate's condition later required several surgeries to correct.

"I more or less wanted to die," Kate said. "I was ashamed of what went on in my life. I couldn't hold my head up. I blamed God for awhile — why would he let things happen to me. I grew apart from my kids as they grew up. I wondered why I was in the world for everyone to abuse me."

Throughout the years, Kate left her abuser several times and went to stay with her family. Her abuser followed her and harassed the people she lived with until Kate felt that she was making their lives miserable too. She went back to her abuser.

"I sat and grieved for death. I prayed for death. I knew I'd go to hell, but I wanted to die," Kate said.

Finally, she heard about the Big Sandy Family Abuse Shelter. On Easter Sunday, when she and her boyfriend prepared to move to another apartment, Kate knew her op-

portunity had come.

"When he took a load out he went this way," she said, pointing in one direction with her right hand. "I took a load and went this way," she said, pointing in the other direction.

"When you push an old dog in a corner, what do you expect? Over the years, I just sat back in the corner. When someone is pushed back in the corner so far, they have to come out," she said.

She went straight to the shelter and found the help she needed to survive.

"I felt protected there. I knew he couldn't get to me. He couldn't threaten me. If I hadn't found the shelter, I wouldn't be alive today," she said, smiling for the first time during the interview.

"The shelter turned my life around. I wanted help, needed it and accepted it. I moved on with my life. They showed me that I was important, that I was a human being, and that I wasn't somebody's doormat."

At the shelter, she discussed her problems with a counselor. When the counselor heard her say that she had lost everything, including her soul, he put her in contact with a preacher.

Kate regained her soul and has since become active in her church family.

"For the first time in my life, I am happy. A lot of the women at the shelter go back (to their husbands) or find another boyfriend. I took my problems to the Lord. He gave me the strength I need. I know I can face any situation and I can deal with it."

Kate moved out of the shelter and into an apartment. At first, being on her own was scary.

"Every time somebody pecked at the door, I'd think 'Well, he's found me,' and my heart would

skip a couple of beats. Until you face (your fear) and confront it and shut that door, you worry, but then it's over."

With God's help, Kate faced her fears. Her abuser found her and knocked at her door. Kate prayed that God would open her mouth and let her not be afraid to tell her abuser exactly how she felt.

"I told him 'I don't love you now. I never did and I never will.' It felt so good," Kate said.

"I don't want to go back to that way of life, to that relationship. I'm happy and I'm doing something with my life."

Kate plans to return to school and complete her GED requirements. She hopes to do volunteer work at the shelter to help other women who have been victims of abuse. At last, she is enjoying the freedom to love her children and grandchildren.

and misapplied \$52,975.58 of funds that had been deposited in the bank. The documents show that he "took cash from the bank's vault, took cash from a customer's bank account, accepted loan payments but did not apply the payments to customers' loans, and took bank cashiers checks, and used the money from these activities for his own purposes."

Newsome resigned from the bank in February in the wake of the investigation and has made full restitution.

As part of the agreement, Newsome agreed to waive his rights for a trial.

His sentencing has been set for 4 p.m. January 2 in the U.S. District Court in Pikeville. Although no agreement has been made about length of the sentence, the maximum punishment authorized is not more than 30 years in prison, a fine of not more than \$1 million dollars, or both, a term of supervised release of not more than five years, plus a mandatory special assessment of \$50 to be paid to the U.S. District court clerk at the time of the sentencing.

based upon evidence, Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Dwight Stacey Marshall said.

"At the time the grand jury returned indictments, they thought the case mandated a trial," Marshall said. "But through the ongoing investigation and based upon new evidence, I thought the case merited these recommendations."

Jimmy Tackett and John Tackett both were originally charged with five counts of first degree rape. In exchange for the guilty pleas, the charges were merged to one count of third degree rape for both men.

Recommended sentences for both men were two years probation for five years, a sex offender treatment program in Pike County and no further contact with the victim. Formal sentencing will be November 17.

Jimmy Tackett remains free on bond until formal sentencing.

thorizing the 89-cent per month surcharge for an E-911 service. The ordinance was made retroactive to February 1990, when the county began collecting the special tax.

Also at the September 22 hearing, Judge Knight ordered that a suit filed by 10 taxpayers be held in abeyance because the plaintiffs in that case are satisfied with the progress being made on getting the emergency services system on line.

Hammond's motion, filed on October 12, asks for a new trial. The motion is set to be heard November 22 in Martin County Circuit Court.

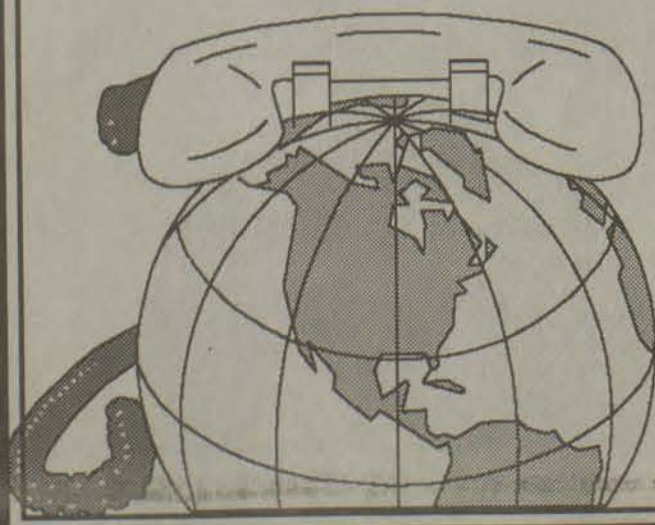

City workers disagree over overtime, are suspended

The new municipal parking lot was ready in time for Jenny Wiley Festival this year, but five Prestonsburg Public Works employees were suspended without pay because of it.

Tim Clark, head mechanic; Jeff Wells, maintenance worker II; Isaac Fitzpatrick, maintenance worker I; Ralph Fields, maintenance worker I; and Ken Sturgill, recycling, were suspended for refusing to work overtime Thursday evening.

"I put my eight hours in for the day and didn't feel like working over," Clark said.

Sturgill said he was unable to work the overtime because he had to pick up his wife and child.

Fields said he was not asked to work over, but got suspended anyway.

Tom Harris, public works super-

visor, said he told everyone in the department they needed to work over Thursday to get the parking lot ready for the Jenny Wiley Festival.

"The parking lot was not quite ready for the festival," Harris said. "I wanted the lot to be as safe as possible for the public."

Several of the workers declined to work over Thursday evening and he advised them they would be suspended, without pay, if they did not work, Harris said.

Harris said he was acting on authority of the mayor.

Clark said not everyone in the department was told about working over and those who did not work over would be suspended until Wednesday.

"I was talking to Tom over the radio and he said everybody will work Thursday night at the parking lot or be suspended for two or three days," Clark said.

Clark said he came to work on

Friday and Harris advised him he was suspended.

"I met with an attorney and was advised I didn't have to leave my job until I had a paper stating the number of days of suspension," Clark added.

All five employees were given written notice that they will receive a one day suspension without pay for refusing to work on Thursday.

"I was not asking much," Mayor Jerry Fannin said. "We were trying to get ready for the festival and I hardly ask anybody to work overtime."

"Paul Burchett and myself worked weekends and evenings to get the lot ready in time, but it wasn't quite finished," Fannin added. "It was everybody's job. Those who refused to work I gave an extra day off without pay."

City Attorney Paul Burchett said that by statute the mayor is invested with total authority over employees, including hiring and firing.

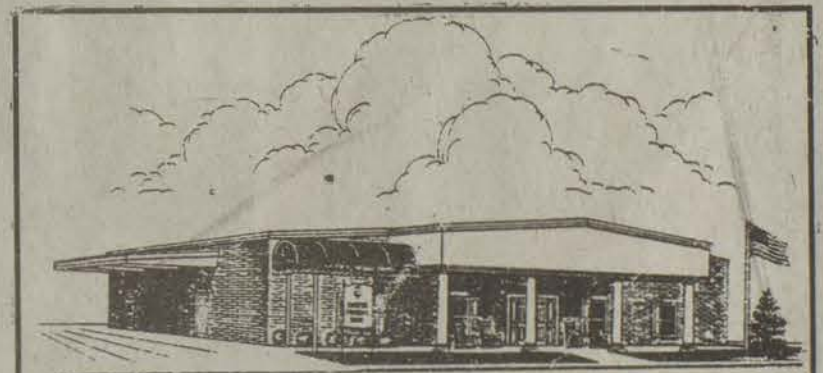

Panic disorder is real and treatable; therapy/medication available to help

A pounding heart, tight throat, difficulty breathing, and paralyzing fear would be normal if a car was about to run over you, but for some people these feelings are frequent and occur while doing normal, everyday routines.

Panic Disorder affects about ten percent of the American population at some time in their lives. If untreated it can become a chronic and debilitating disorder that adversely affects a person's family, work and social life.

Panic disorder is a type of anxiety disorder that is biologically based and is triggered by situational stressors, said Edward Maxwell Jr., M.D., clinical director of the

Department for Mental Health and Mental Retardation Services.

"A person with a panic disorder has an inherited vulnerability for it just like someone who has other biological problems like diabetes or high blood pressure. It is a real disorder and it is not caused by some flaw in a person's character.

The disorder raises a person's anxiety level beyond his ability to cope. Maxwell, an associate professor of psychiatry at the University of Kentucky, said the autonomic nervous system, which controls involuntary functions rises to a level of continuous hyperarousal like when someone is frightened.

Ordinary stresses lead to hyperarousal which may result in a panic attack. The person's physical reactions may include a pounding heart, abdominal pain, tight throat and chest, breathing difficulties, upset stomach and a smothering sensation.

Panic disorder can occur at any age, Maxwell said. It often goes hand-in-hand with other anxiety disorders or depression and may be accompanied by obsessive/compulsive behaviors and phobias such as a fear of traveling. Frequently a person will have a series of stressors during the day or week that has a cumulative affect and leads to a panic attack.

The public, medical community and helping professions have become more aware of panic disorder in the last 10 years. However, panic disorder is still often misdiagnosed. According to the Panic Disorder Education Program, people with panic disorder often undergo extensive, unnecessary tests and visit an average of 10 physicians before getting a correct diagnosis.

"Although we don't have a cure for panic disorder, people can learn

to manage it just like diabetes and high blood pressure by getting professional help to change their thinking and behavior and by using medications," Maxwell said. "We actually have higher success rates in managing anxiety disorders than high blood pressure and diabetes."

Maxwell said the treatment involves becoming aware of the panic disorder and learning coping

skills such as learning to relax and breathe, and changing their self-talk which increases the panic. A physician also may prescribe medication such as anti-depressants, anti-anxiety or beta blockers.

"Most people respond favorably to medication with symptom improvement and it doesn't become disabling. But a person with panic disorder may not have to take medicine for the rest of his life to control it.

"For most people, medication isn't enough just like with diabetes and high blood pressure, because the person has to make behavioral changes by using appropriate professional therapy. As with high blood pressure and other biological problems, situational stressors affect the problem," Maxwell said.

Farmers asked to make nominations for area Farm Service Agency committee

"Farmers and other eligible voters are asked to nominate candidates of their choice by October 30 for the Johnson-Floyd-Martin-Pike Farm Service Agency (FSA) committee election ballot," said Kathi Sparks, county executive director. The FSA committee was previously known as the ASC county committee.

The FSA area committee election will be conducted from November 24 to December 4 by mail ballot. FSA, an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, administers farm commodity, crop insurance, and conservation programs for farmers and makes farm ownership and operating loans.

Johnson, Floyd, Martin and Pike County farmers have the opportunity to nominate persons they feel would best serve their farm community on the area FSA committee. Farmers may request and receive nominating petition forms from the Johnson-Floyd-Martin-Pike FSA office located in Paintsville by call-

ing (606) 789-3766.

Ms. Sparks reminded farmers that to be valid, petitions must be limited to one nominee each, must include written certification that the nominee is willing to serve, if elected, and must be signed by at least three eligible voters in the local administrative area. Also, the petition must be received in the FSA office by the October 30 deadline.

Eligible voters may circulate or sign nominating petitions for as many candidates as they choose. Anyone wishing to nominate a farmer for the county FSA committee election may contact the county office for details, including eligibility requirements.

Farmers should petition for and elect those individuals they feel would do a good job as an FSA committee member. "FSA committees are essential in the administration of farm programs," Ms. Sparks said, "and we welcome all valid petitions."

their guests just as well by operating only these two units and closing the Fazoli's in Prestonsburg.

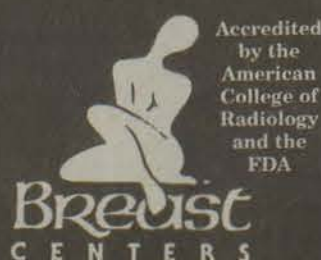

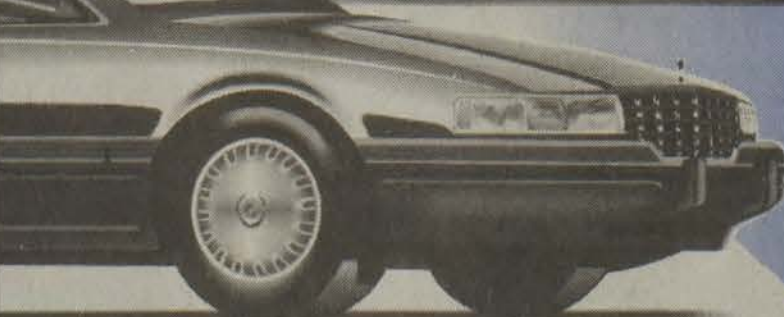

'Accept life, don't let it defeat you!'

Dreams. Goals. Ideas. They make us go. They keep us going. Without them, we would be without incentives in life to keep pushing, to keep moving ahead.

Marshall Edwards of Prestonsburg had dreams, set goals and had some of his own ideas about life. But all that came crashing down on him July 5, 1994 when an automobile accident left him 19 percent impaired.

You see, Edwards loved the arena of competing. He loved the thrill of racing and his goal was to run a race in each of the 50 states. He has competed in 31 states so far.

Before the accident, Edwards was busy running in marathons around the country.

"I had the pleasure of my second marathon ever running in the Boston Marathon," he said. "That was back in 1976. From that I set a goal to race in all 50 states. I have been very fortunate in that I have run in New York City, Chicago, the Orange Bowl in Miami, some of the biggies.

"I participated in the California International. I raced the Portland, Oregon marathon, which is probably one of the most fabulous races. Just the setting, the people, that kind of thing. I was most impressed with that."

Tackett rushes for 232 yards in 28-0 RW&B Bowl win

Battle of the Beavers goes to Allen Central over Raiders

Ding! Round three!

Round three of the annual Red, White and Blue Bowl was staged this past Friday night in front of a sparse crowd as the Battle of the Beavers continued between the South Floyd Raiders and Allen Central Rebels.

Round three went, as did the first two rounds, to Allen Central 28-0.

The South Floyd defense just could not contain the running of Beau Tackett and the Raiders' offense could find no holes in the Rebels' front line as they made it miserable for Raider quarterback Nick Compton. He was sacked five times for a minus 46 yards.

Tackett carried the football for 232 yards rushing and scored one touchdown. His longest gainer was 62 yards, and he broke away for pickups of 39 and 25 yards.

Coach Glenn Reeves sent his club onto the field with the running game in mind.

Quarterback Adam Coleman completed but four of seven attempts for just 22 yards passing. Thomas Jenkins was on the receiving end of four completions. One was for a six-yard touchdown pass and one a conversion pass.

Shane Blackburn, at quarterback in the fourth period, completed one pass to Nick Halbert for seven yards.

Ketran Mays led the Raiders' ground attack with 41 yards, but the bright spot for the Raiders was the running of fullback Chet McCarty who carried seven times for 47 yards.

South Floyd had only 36 yards rushing and Compton completed five of 15 passes for 55 yards giving the Raiders 91 offensive yards.

Gordon Reeves picked up 46 yards for the Rebels with Josh Reeves running for 36.

Coleman was sacked twice in the game

Edwards said he had also raced in some unknown places such as Keene, New Hampshire, Utah as well as New Orleans.

"I've run through covered bridges in New Hampshire," he said. "I raced in a marathon in New Orleans and ran it in two hours and 30 minutes which by most people's standards isn't that fast. I finished 81st. Fifty two of the first 81 all broke the Olympic qualifying standard that day."

Edwards says now his days of competing on foot are over, but it hasn't dampened his competition spirit. He does all his racing from a racer (wheelchair) especially built for him by Bob Hall in Walton, Mass.

"Bob had polio from age three and he has never raced on foot in his life," Edwards explained, "but he does these marathons. He developed and started crafting custom made wheelchairs for racers who are handicapped or impaired."

Hall custom fitted a racer for Edwards after taking his dimensions. The racer, according to Edwards, is very snug and weighs a total of six and a half pounds.

"It is made of very light aluminum and it has a very tight line for balance," he said.

Edwards said he was practicing one day at the Prestonsburg Community College track and found out how balanced it was.

"I was fantasizing about coming across the finish line and threw both hands up in the air like racers do when they finish," he said. "I laid myself on my back for about eight feet down there."

The wheelchair racer is like all racers. Although he is not restricted to a wheelchair, if Edwards is to continue to compete as a racer, he must do it in the special-made racer.

He owns a most recent victory in the Charleston 5K and just recently returned from Chicago this past weekend where he competed in a 26-miler.

"I finished 24th overall in two hours and 43 minutes," he said. "I'm not disappointed. The road was rough and bumpy. I'm proud of my accomplishments. I know now what it takes to win. It showed me a better way to train for future races."

Bart Bardwell, who runs a wheelchair camp, in Stewartville, Minn. was also at Chicago and Edwards said, "he was an inspiration to me."

What lies ahead? Edwards hopes to race in the Houston TennyCo 26 miler in January.

"I'll be racing for the big money," he said of the \$20,000 winner's fee that is awaiting someone. "The nice thing about the Houston race is that I have a brother living in the suburbs of Houston and he encouraged me to participate and my goal has been to race in a 26-miler in all 50 states."

"Another nice thing about Houston is it is going to be the last year probably they will have the Houston TennyCo 26 mile race because they are going to move their corporate offices from there," Edwards said.

Edwards will not be going into the Houston run blind and not knowing what he can do.

"I have checked out the times from the previous two years and if I do what I am capable of doing, maybe I will get a paycheck from

that race," he said. "The course will be flat with the exception of one overpass that crosses the interstate. And the lady told me that it was as flat as a pancake."

Edwards first viewed last year's accident as unfortunate. He's sort of changed his mind.

"That's correct. Maybe beside getting a better handle on life and what matters. I was raised by two conscientious parents, who would let me wander far enough away to learn they knew best. They weren't going to let me defy that."

"But the accident put things in a perspective that, yes, we're all one breath away from death. We all have a responsibility to someone else in this world. I'm not talking about a husband/wife relationship. I'm talking as friend to friend. In that regard, I feel from the accident it made me step back and look and realize there is someone special I am responsible to help and enjoy life."

"The good Lord had his arms around me in the wreck. I'm fortunate to be alive," he said.

Edwards stated that a lot of positives came from the wreck.

"It also, my accident, as unfortunate as it was, and for all the negatives we can think of that came from it, there are a lot of positives," he stated. "It was a major, major inconvenience for me. A major happening in my life. But when you look at my father's situation in his battle with

leukemia, this is so small.

"When you look around at other people, I still have my ability to carry on a job as best as I can. I won't give up my competitive spirit. And I'm not going to roll over and let this car accident keep me from pursuing living life as best as I can."

Even though his racing days are restricted to his specially built racer, Edwards said he still feels he can compete.

"Whereas all my running days was done by my legs, now it's all by my arms. Yes, I can still compete. It's in a wheelchair. I know I face dangers and one thing that concerns my mother is that I could get hit. But that is a risk I have to take. I'm going to remain competitive with it," he said.

The misfortune of the accident allowed Edwards time to think and reflect.

"If I could say anything to anybody it would be, 'May today be better than yesterday, but only half as good as tomorrow,'" he said.

Edwards has the support of his mother and father. But a very, very close friend, who he prefers remain unknown, acts as coach.

"A very, very close friend who understands me, who supports me and adds insight to my training, and is a very driven person herself, has been a big help. We were sitting and talking one day about racing and she gave me this quote. 'Good, better, best. Never rest until good is

better and better's the best.' If I can accomplish that, I don't want to just be good, I want to be the best. I want that to be a goal that I keep on reaching for. With her support, her encouragement that way, I have taken on a challenge to succeed."

Edwards wants to be an inspiration to others who find themselves in the same situation.

"That's right. I think the fact that I have learned to accept pain and anguish and it has helped me, in my job as a pharmacist, to be more understanding and considerate of people who are really fighting life."

"There was a time in my life, and my religion is something personal and private, but there was a time in my life when we thought we knew the answers. But what is really happening is when you turn it over and say you handle it, you've seen this movie, you know how it ends, and we take it day by day and no more than that. The accident's beneficial thing was, take life day-by-day and be most appreciative."

Edwards had some final words for those who are physically impaired or suffering from other ailments.

"Open your mind up to realize there is somebody much more powerful and wonderful than us," he said. "He's seen the movie, he made it and it is our responsibility, I feel, day by day to accept things and make it the very best we can with what we have. Accept life, don't let it defeat you!"

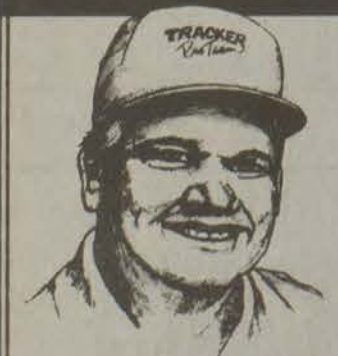

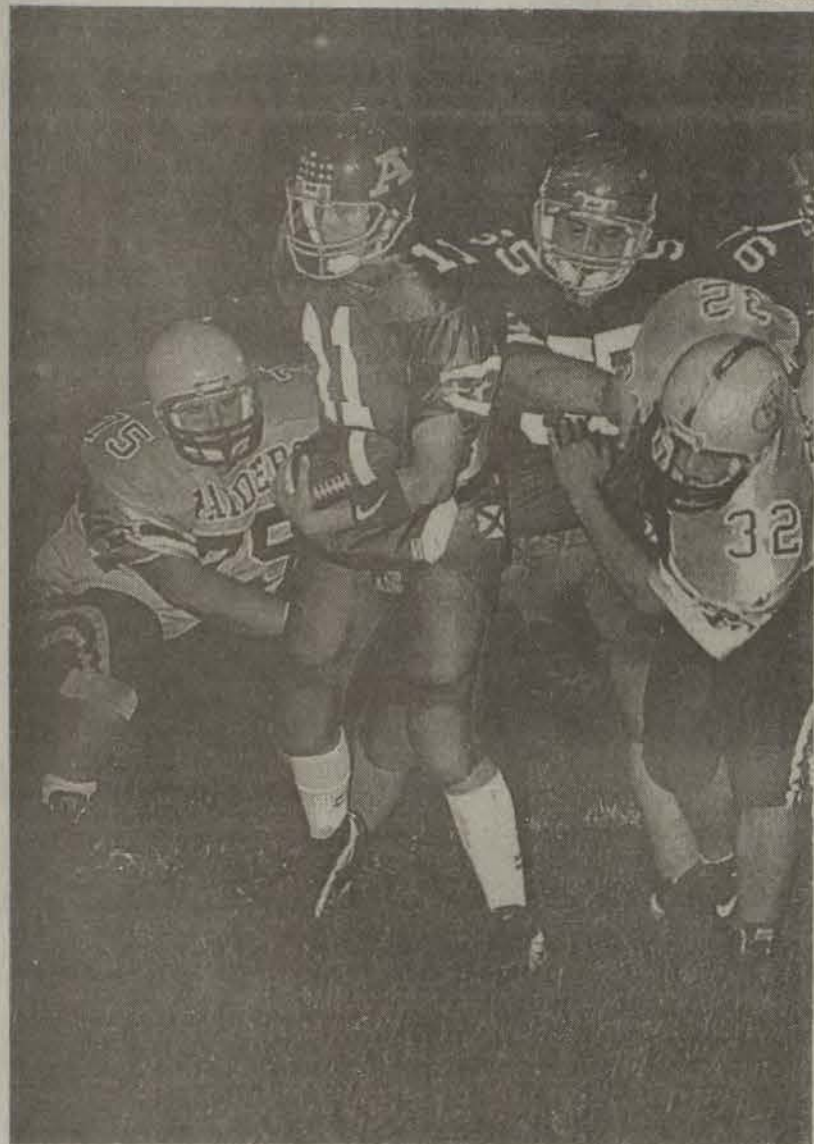

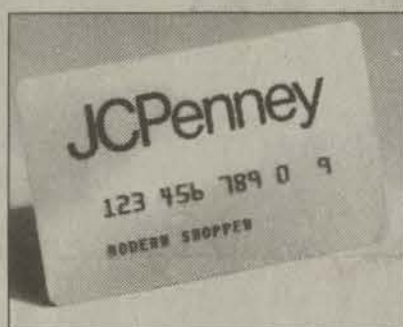

Powell County received six for 35 yards. The Pirates fumbled eight times, losing the ball five. Woolery was intercepted once.

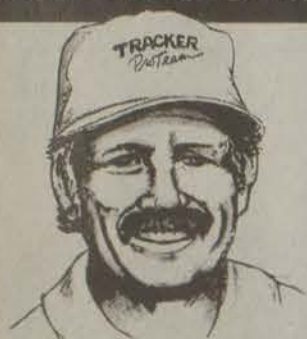

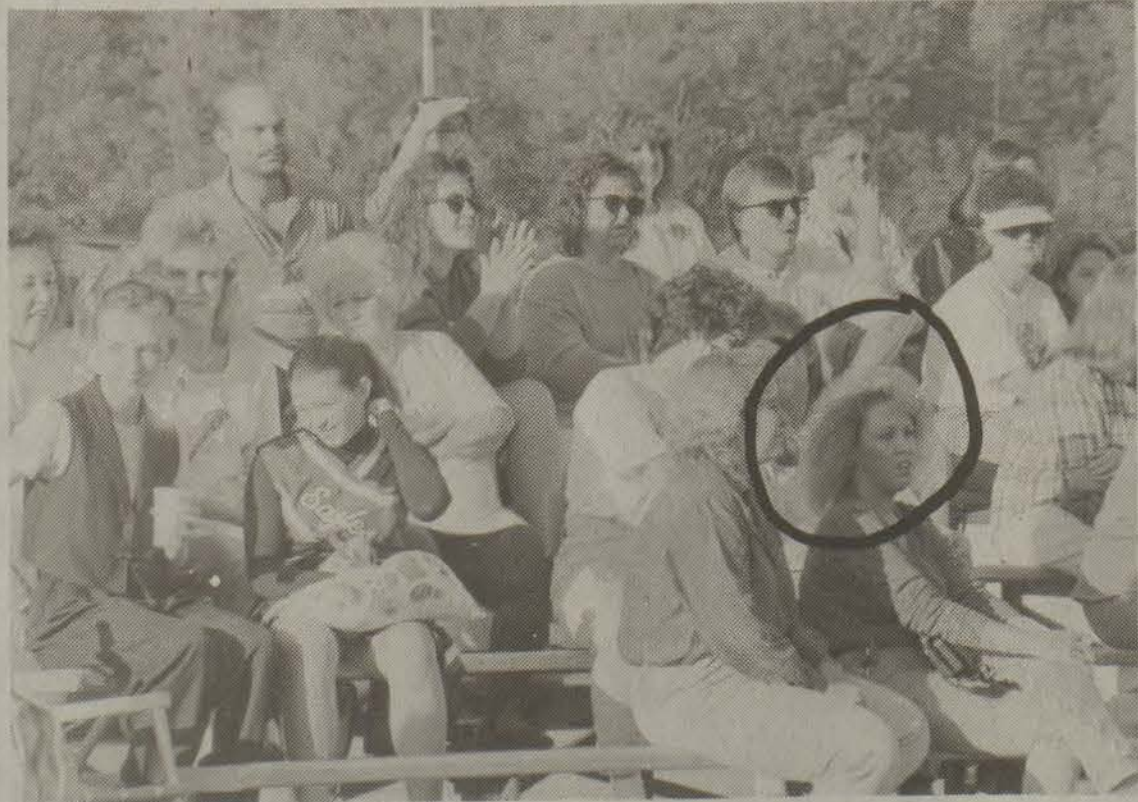
O'Neil has been writing two letters a day to the Leslie County basketball team, and reportedly told QB Tim Couch that he would have started at Tennessee in basketball last year.

Parson's second wish comes true

Every young man dreams of one day having a chance to meet his favorite baseball team.

Jeremy Parsons always dreamed of meeting the Chicago Cubs. That dream became a reality.

Jeremy's is a story of inspiration in a world that seems to be filled with racial unrest, war in other countries and stories of the millions who are starving around the world.

It is inspiring that a certain foundation enjoys making such dreams come true. Such a foundation is the Make A Wish Foundation out of Chicago, Illinois, and they made Jeremy's wish — well his second one — come true.

"They asked Jeremy what his first wish was," his father Johnnie Parsons said. "He said, 'I suppose a new Mustang is out.' When he was informed that it was, his second wish was to meet the Chicago Cubs, his favorite major league baseball team."

The foundation was eager to make the wish come true for the younger Parsons, who at the age of 16 years old is battling leukemia.

So on September 29, the whole family boarded an airline and headed for the "windy city" and a date with the Cubs. The entourage included his father, his mother Janice, brother Jonathan and sister Jenny for three all-expense-paid days in Chicago.

The group was picked up at the airport by the foundation and shuttled off to their hotel just a short distance from Wrigley Field, home of the Cubs.

"They were very nice to us," Parsons said. "They had a representative who met us and spent four hours with us taking us around and showing us Wrigley Field."

Jeremy learned about the foundation through a nurse at the UK Medical Hospital. Contact was made with the foundation and arrangements for the trip made.

It was special day for Jeremy and his folks as they met the Cubs and especially Ryne Sandberg, who made the trip to Wrigley Field just to meet Jeremy.

"He came out just to meet with Jeremy," Jeremy's father said. "It was a big day for him. Sandberg has always been his favorite player."

While Jeremy remains a loyal Cub fan, his father is a strong Cincinnati Reds fan. His dad related how he came home one evening and found the new fence he had installed painted with signs. The fence spoke loudly of Jeremy's team — "the Cubs Rule," "Sandberg the best," "Reds second best."

"That was six years ago and it's still there," Johnnie Parsons said. "I took a picture of it and I showed it to Sandberg when we were in Chicago. He likes Randy Myers (Cubs relief ace) a lot."

Jeremy also met Sammy Sosa, Mark Grace and Kevin Jenkins of the Cubs.

While still a Reds fan, dad broke down and bought a Cubs shirt and wore it, bringing a smile of amusement from Jeremy.

"He's a super young man," Johnnie Parsons said of his son. "He is very strong in academics in school (a junior at Betsy Layne High School). He is a 4.0 student and president of his junior class. That makes three years

that he has been class president. He was his freshman and sophomore years."

Last year while at the UK hospital, Jeremy, who is an avid UK fan, was visited by a group of UK players.

Jeremy collects baseball cards and gets to play a little bit of basketball at home even though he cannot actively participate in sports. The elder Parsons said his son is not one to sit and wait, and is as active as he can be.

"He was like a big brother to those smaller kids at UK," Johnnie Parsons said. "He was more concerned about them getting better than about himself. He seems to be at ease at home and he has had the support and prayers of many people. He's holding his head up and he's not letting it get him down."

The initial notification of Jeremy's illness was heartbreaking at first, according to his father Parsons, but Jeremy was able to look at it in a positive manner.

"When the doctor told him he had leukemia his heart broke at first," his father said. "Then Jeremy told the doctor that he looked at it as a learning experience. He had always wanted to be a doctor and he told the doctor that the best way to be a good doctor is to be a patient first."

That was back on March 30 of this year.

"He said that he wasn't going to sit down and quit and that he was not going out easy," Parsons said.

"He has a good attitude. He has gained 11 pounds. But he has more concern for his friends in the hospital than for himself."

Parsons said Consol of Kentucky, where he works, has been very supportive of him and his family during Jeremy's illness.

"They have been great," he said. "I can take off with no questions asked. They have been very supportive of me."

Jeremy played basketball at John

M. Stumbo Elementary and was labeled as a future standout in high school. He had complained of his side hurting him, according to his father, but didn't think much of it until later.

"He had been out playing basketball and his side started to hurt him," Parsons said. "It kept bothering him and we took him to the doctor to have him examined."

Parsons continues to be active in some areas and this young man's attitude is not one of pity for himself, but just wanting to make the most of things by just being a friend to others who are hurting.

UK'S WIN OVER LSU BRIGHTENS FUTURE, BUT CURRY WANTS IT BOTH WAYS

Kentucky scores a stunning comeback victory against LSU and coach Bill Curry wants it both ways already.

When it was suggested after Saturday's game that the remaining schedule lends itself to a big finish, Curry went to a yellow light, reminding reporters about the pitfalls of speculation. "It's usually wrong," he said, accentuating the negative.

The coach branded looking ahead (with optimism for a change) as "illogical human behavior. Neither were we terrible before (his game) nor are we wonderful now."

There's a new revelation. How long since the word wonderful appeared in a sentence with UK football? The Wildcats are getting better results because performance and player confidence always improve in direct proportion to offensive production, opportunity defense and better numbers on the scoreboard.

Puzzling however, that Curry would turn so quickly to scolding media (and fans, some of whom have used the bowl word), for being optimistic unless this was about lowering expectations. A luxury rarely available to a UK coach.

It is now "...illogical human behavior," to believe Kentucky has a reasonable chance against Georgia, Mississippi State, Vandy and Cincinnati. But if Curry chooses to be testy when his team is 3-3, what can fans expect if the Wildcats go 6-3?

The coach's remarks aside, it was a stunning fourth quarter rally for Kentucky fans Saturday. Most impressive: Mike Schellenberger's embrace of LSU's Kevin Faulk face-guard to face-guard at the UK three-yard line...Humvee-like Ray McLaurin soaring over a scrum of linemen on a third and one for a four-yard gain...It was Billy Jack Haskins tackling Pat Rogers at the UK five-yard line after the visitors' linebacker had picked up a Moe Williams fumble and steamed toward the end zone...Issac Curtis gamely limping on and off the field...Van Hile's diving interception...George Harris recovering a kickoff fumble.

And, it was the sight of Mike Archer trying to mask his joy as he stepped onto a press box elevator and began consoling long-faced LSU assistant coaches as the scoreboard glowed 24-16.

For long suffering UK fans, Saturday was all these things as the Wildcats used the last 15 minutes of a football game on Midnight Madness to take an opponent by the throat and defeat it.

POST-MIDNIGHT MADNESS PONDERINGS

WANTED! OWNERS OF MILLIONS OF DOLLARS IN UNCLAIMED ASSETS

The Kentucky Treasury Department may have good news for you! Money and other assets go unclaimed every year. Cash, personal property, and other funds are constantly turned over to the State Treasury because the rightful owners can't be found. Year after year, the Kentucky State Treasurer's Unclaimed Property Branch receives stock certificates, savings and checking accounts, unclaimed insurance payments and overpayments, gift certificates, lay-away deposits, utility deposits, paid-up life insurance policies -- even valuable jewelry and artwork, just to name a few.

How do assets end up as unclaimed property? The rightful owners could have moved away and can't be located. Someone could have forgotten to cash or close out a bank account from many years ago. It could be that a now-deceased relative never mentioned long-forgotten property.

We're here to help you get what's rightfully yours back to you. After a certain time period as specified by law, these respective assets are legally presumed abandoned. But the property still belongs to the rightful owners, and it's our job to try to reunite the owners with their property.

It's easy to claim what's already yours. The Kentucky Treasury Department provides this free public service of getting the property back where it belongs. State law requires anyone holding money or other personal property for another person to turn it over to the Kentucky State Treasurer after the specified time period. The property is held by the State Treasurer as custodian of the property, keeping the assets safe and secure. The property is never owned by the State -- only held until the owner comes forward. Once a year we publish a list of unclaimed property owners, with their last known address, in hopes they will see their names and contact us.

If your name appears on the following list, please write the company listed above your name to obtain your property. 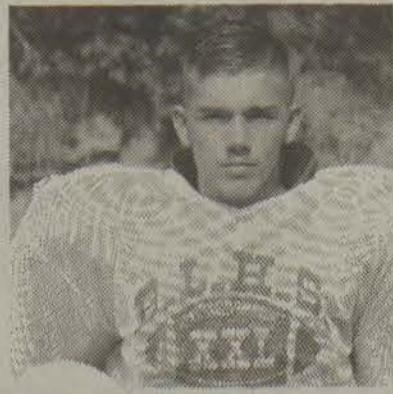

Magoffin County edges Allen Elementary, 26-20

Magoffin County's Ricky Arnett and Allen's Seth Crisp locked up in a personal duel when the junior Hornets came calling last Thursday evening at the Allen stadium.

Arnett rushed for 282 yards, scored four touchdowns and kicked a two-point PAT to send Magoffin County to a 26-20 win over the host Eagles.

Crisp was not far behind in totals as he ran for 222 yards, scored three touchdowns and ran a two-point conversion.

The bigger Hornets were just too much for the smaller Eagles, so coach Jackie Day Crisp sent his team in a modified looking "pole cat" set. The ball was placed in Crisp's hands for the most part of the game and he responded with some long runs.

Arnett, a big strong kid, would carry two or three defenders on his back for five or six extra yards.

Magoffin County took the opening kickoff and drove the football to the Allen 24-yard line where the drive stalled out when Crisp broke a pass attempt.

Coach Crisp then sent his team, on their first possession, to the different set offense and Crisp scored out of it on a 45-yard touchdown romp with 34 seconds left in the first period to give the Eagles a 6-0 lead.

Behind the running of Arnett and Bobby Preece, the Hornets moved at will against the defensive line of Allen. Arnett carried the football six times in the series for 41 yards and climaxed the drive by running the football into the end zone from four yards out to tie the game at 6-6.

On the ensuing kickoff, Crisp took the football and had a big return to the Magoffin County 38-yard line. But he fumbled the football away after being hit hard and the Hornets recovered the loose ball.

The Hornets made it to the Eagles' 19, but had to turn the ball over on downs. The two teams were tied at 6-6 at the half.

Still working out of the pole cat, Allen took four plays to move the football 72 yards for a 12-6 lead. Crisp broke to the left side, finding a hole and scampered 67 yards for the touchdown.

The lead was short-lived when Magoffin County got control of the football. Arnett opened up a hole for himself, broke two tacklers and

ran 62 yards for the TD to tie the game at 12-12 with 6:19 left in the third period.

After a three-downs-and-out series for Allen, the Hornets grabbed a 20-12 lead with 3:18 left in the third stanza. Arnett scored on a 22-yard run and then kicked the PAT to send the Hornets in front 20-12. The third period ended with the Hornets still holding the advantage.

Allen was plagued by some shaky snaps from center and a terrible exchange between Crisp and Mark Burchett. The Eagles were forced to punt the football and the Hornets took control.

But Magoffin County, who moved into Eagle territory, coughed up the football themselves with Crisp picking up the loose ball and racing toward the end zone from 46 yards out. Crisp kicked the PAT and it was a 20-20 game.

On their last series of plays in the game, the Hornets put the game in the win column when Arnett scored from eight yards out with 20 seconds left to play for a 26-20 score.

Allen got to run one play after the score as Crisp jaunted into Magoffin County's territory but was brought down at the Hornets' 24-yard line as time expired.

Two weeks remain in the elementary football season and will conclude with a gridiron classic at Paintsville on Saturday, October 28.

FINE-TUNING YOUR BOW

For accomplished archers with a balanced rig and a fine-tuned form, the next step is fine-tuning the bow. This requires a quantity of butcher/wrapping paper and a frame to hold it taut. The object is to shoot arrows through the paper at about 10 feet to find out how straight they are flying down range.

The arrows should go straight through. Off-set tears in the paper tell you the arrow is actually tipping, yawing or wobbling. Wobbling arrows are not only inaccurate, they also greatly reduce penetration. Up and down tears are corrected by moving the nocking point up for low-tail gashes and down for tail-high shots. Left and right tears are corrected by moving the arrow rest in the direction of the tear.

Other off-center tearing is the result of improper fletching, bad nocks or arrows, a seriously out-of-tune bow or "pilot error" on the part of the archer. Get your rig and your shooting form in good basic shooting shape before fine tuning.

Warrior is hopeful at a shot at the AWF heavyweight belt later.

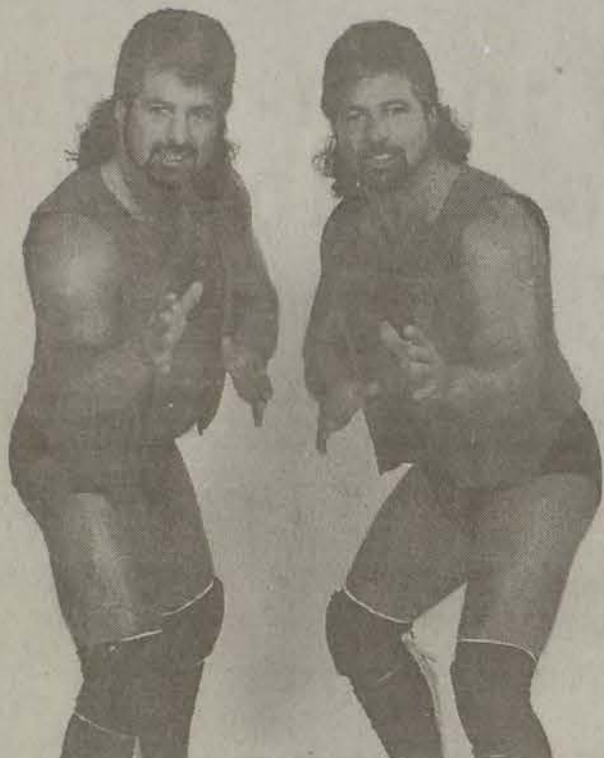

Blaze is the Smoky Mountain Wrestling former heavyweight champion and comes from Ashland.

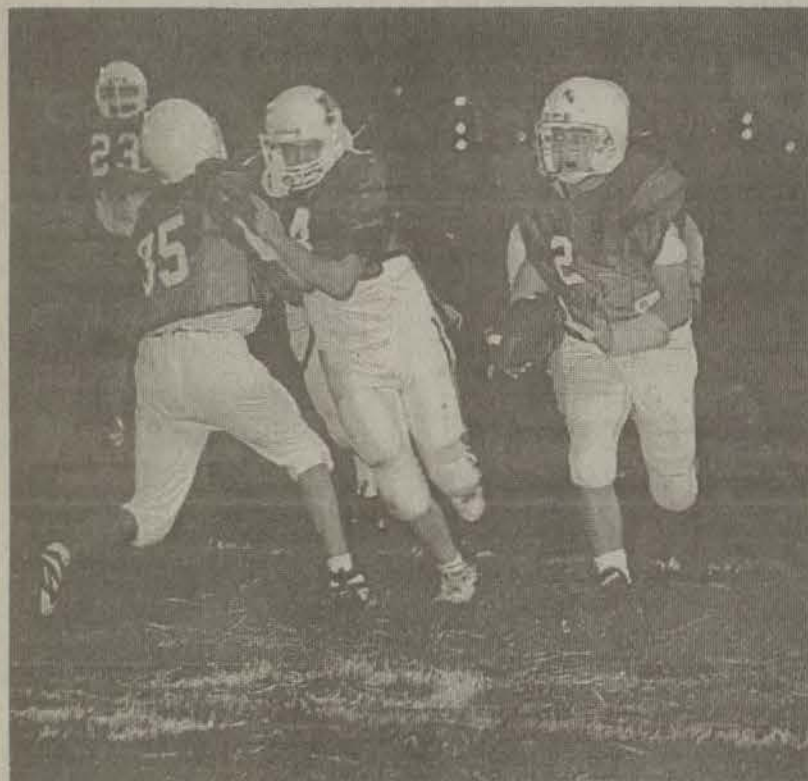
An autograph session will be held just before bell time so fans may get autographs of their favorite wrestlers. The doors open at 7 p.m.

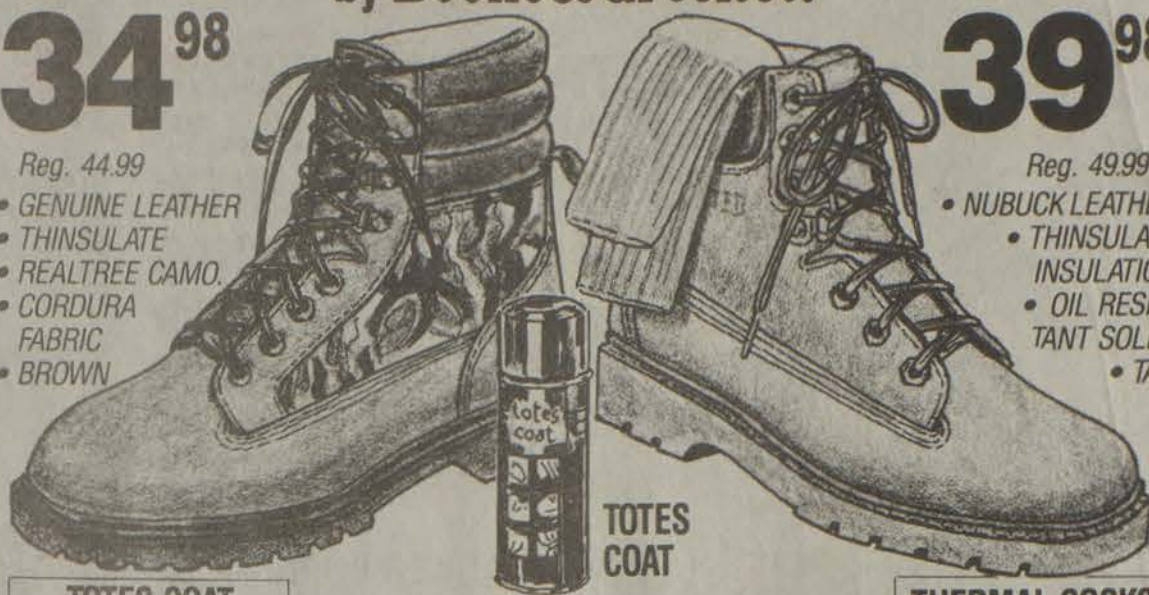

Ann Cook's honor

Col. Solomon P. Sharp was a leader in Kentucky politics in the early 1820's having served as a state representative, U.S. Congressman and Attorney General.

He was taken aback by the beauty of Ann Cook whose physical qualities and charm commanded the attention of nearly every man who saw her in Frankfort, Kentucky, in the early 1820s.

Col. Sharp's power and wealth allowed him to literally sweep the lonesome miss off her feet and into her boudoir. After a time he moved along with his life disavowing any promise or involvement with the heart-broken Miss Cook.

Many men wanted to help her to forget her former lover. She spurned every attempt until she happened to see Colonel Sharp squiring another young lady that she knew. It was more than she could take and she devised a plan to get even with Sharp.

A young lawyer, Jereboam Beauchamp, from near her home in Nelson County southwest from Frankfort, had attempted to win her affections repeatedly vowing to obey her every wish. She decided that if she confided in him she could persuade him to help her in gaining her revenge.

She was moved to tears as she truthfully told him about her relationship with Sharp. Young Beauchamp became irate at the treatment of the one that he cherished and felt a great sympathy for her.

"I will marry you without delay if you will avenge my honor," she implored him.

"You marry me and then I will have every reason to honor your request," he replied. "For then too, it is my honor that I will be avenging as well."

Beauchamp expressed his dislike for Sharp to his friends but they took his threats lightly.

A few weeks later, on November 7, 1825, Beauchamp rapped on the door of Sharp's home on Madison Street near the Kentucky State Capitol. Sharp had been elected Speaker of the House of Representatives and was to be sworn in to that prestigious office that very day. Undoubtedly Beauchamp lured him into opening the door on a pretext of state business.

"I'm here because of Ann," he blurted in the darkness as he thrust his knife into the man's chest.

The murderous deed was discovered soon after sunup and Kentucky officials rapidly put a plan of action into effect to catch the guilty person or persons. The Kentucky House of Representatives and Senate empowered Governor Desha to offer a \$3,000 reward for the apprehension of the killer or killers. Associates of the slain man and the city of Frankfort pledged additional amounts making the total reward \$5,000—an astronomical sum in that day.

One of the individuals in whom Beauchamp confided told authorities of his statements. Following an investigation he was indicted and found guilty of the murder. His pleas for leniency fell on deaf ears.

Beauchamp was sentenced to a public hanging. Ann's involvement in the plot came to the forefront. She was arrested but was soon released because there was no evidence to hold her.

Her kinship and affection for her husband had grown to the extent that she called on him in the dungeon of the Frankfort jail and refused to leave.

On July 7, 1826, the day Beauchamp was to be hanged, the couple was distraught and decided they would both die. Ann stabbed herself several times with a small knife and her husband followed her lead, stabbing himself.

When guards found them they were able to revive Jereboam. Ann was rushed to a hospital where, near death, she asked for her husband. Weakened, he was brought to her death bed where he held her hand and caressed her cheek and forehead in her final minutes.

Following her death, her husband, Jereboam Beauchamp, was taken to Lexington Pike in Frankfort where he was hanged.

At his daughter's request, Ann's father had the couple buried in a common grave in Bloomfield, Kentucky cemetery—interlocked in each other's arms.

Hiking through Jenny Wiley State Park

Fall colors are showing in Floyd County's mountains. A good way to view them is by hiking through the trails at Jenny Wiley State Park.

The park has five trails that wind along the lake shore or into the mountains. An assortment of Eastern Kentucky wildflowers that bloom in the fall and woodland that is cloaked in colors of red and yellow provide an up-close look at Mother Nature in her fall garb.

The trails offer some breathtaking views and now is a good, solemn time to view the color changes taking place along the paths, according to Ron Vanover, park naturalist.

Only the chirping of birds or the chattering of squirrels breaks the silence of the woodlands. In certain areas of the trails, a wind blows through the foliage and creates the sound similar to a waterfall.

On almost every trail, hikers will come in contact with some form of wildlife — deer or wild turkeys, Vanover said.

The five trails range from a short hike along the lake to a three mile journey into the mountains. The shortest trail at the park is the .2 mile walk from the May Lodge to the Jenny Wiley Boat Dock. Although it isn't the most colorful of the trails, the path offers a look at the park's abundant squirrel population. Entrance to the trail is at the back of May Lodge, near the dining room.

One of the most popular hiking paths at the park is the Lakeshore Trail, which can be walked at a leisurely pace for about 1.5 miles. The Lakeshore Hiking Trail is a gently sloping trail, but the exit at Cottage 123 is a steep climb.

The path follows the shoreline of Dewey Lake. Species of Christmas fern, ground cedar, papaws, maples, magnolias, hickories, hemlocks, tulip poplars, and a variety of wildflowers grow along the route. Occasionally, hikers may glimpse a white-tail deer on the bank across from the lake.

Near the end of the Lakeshore Trail, hikers can continue their trek into the park woodlands by taking the park's newest trail, the Steve Brackett Memorial Trail. Inmates at Otter Creek Correctional Center helped to build the Brackett Trail, which was dedicated September 30 in honor of the late Steve Brackett, district forester for the Eastern District of the Kentucky Division of Forestry.

The trail extends one mile and offers breathtaking views of cliff chains, various plant life, including oaks, poplars, hickories, maples and magnolias.

The Brackett Trail connects to the Moss Ridge Hiking Trail, which extends 1.3 miles to the top of the mountain and back. The Moss Ridge is a more strenuous, uphill hike ending with a steep, downhill trek.

Historians think that portions of the Jenny Wiley Trail were part of the route used by the Shawnee Indians who captured pioneer woman Jenny Wiley. The trail offers breathtaking views. Because of its rough terrain, park rangers advise hikers against traveling alone on the trail.

Along this trail, hikers can see species of white oaks, pine, tulip poplars, maples, hickories, American dwarf dandelion, various violets, and other wildflowers.

On the top of the ridge, service berries and an abundance of moss ground cover creates an atmosphere of harmony that is restful to the soul. The abundance of moss found on the ridge led to the trail's name.

White-tail deer, rabbits and squirrels often can be seen on the hillsides along this path. Layers of exposed rock are also visible on the trail. The rock is a type of sandstone known as Pennsylvanian Age, which is 200-300 million years old.

The most strenuous trail in the park is the Jenny Wiley Trail. Entrance to the trail is across from the marina, near Cottage 132. The trail is approximately 163 miles long, and ends at the Ohio River across from Portsmouth, Ohio.

State officials plan to close the trail sometime next year because most of the land is owned by private owners who have closed off portions of the trail. The 4.5 miles of trail within the Jenny Wiley State Park system will remain open, though, Vanover said.

This trail is thought to be a portion of the route

which the Indians took Jenny Wiley after her capture. The trail is marked with a bright blue blaze and has shelters and cistern water supplies at approximately 15 mile intervals. Hikers enjoy the experience of being totally within a mountain environment, while walking through the Appalachian terrain.

Because of the trail difficulty, no one should hike alone, Vanover advised. Vanover can provide a topographic map and information regarding the trail to hikers.

Work is beginning this week to add another path to the trail system. The trail will be located near the campground and will provide easy walking for senior citizens and other area residents who want to simply take a walk through Mother Nature's beauty without the exertion.

Vanover urges area residents to experience the trails each season of the year. The trails are open all year.

"The habitats are constantly changing," he said. "You get a different experience each year."

The trails close at nightfall.

For safety's sake

Before relaxing to enjoy the scenery, hikers should take a few precautions to ensure their safety and comfort.

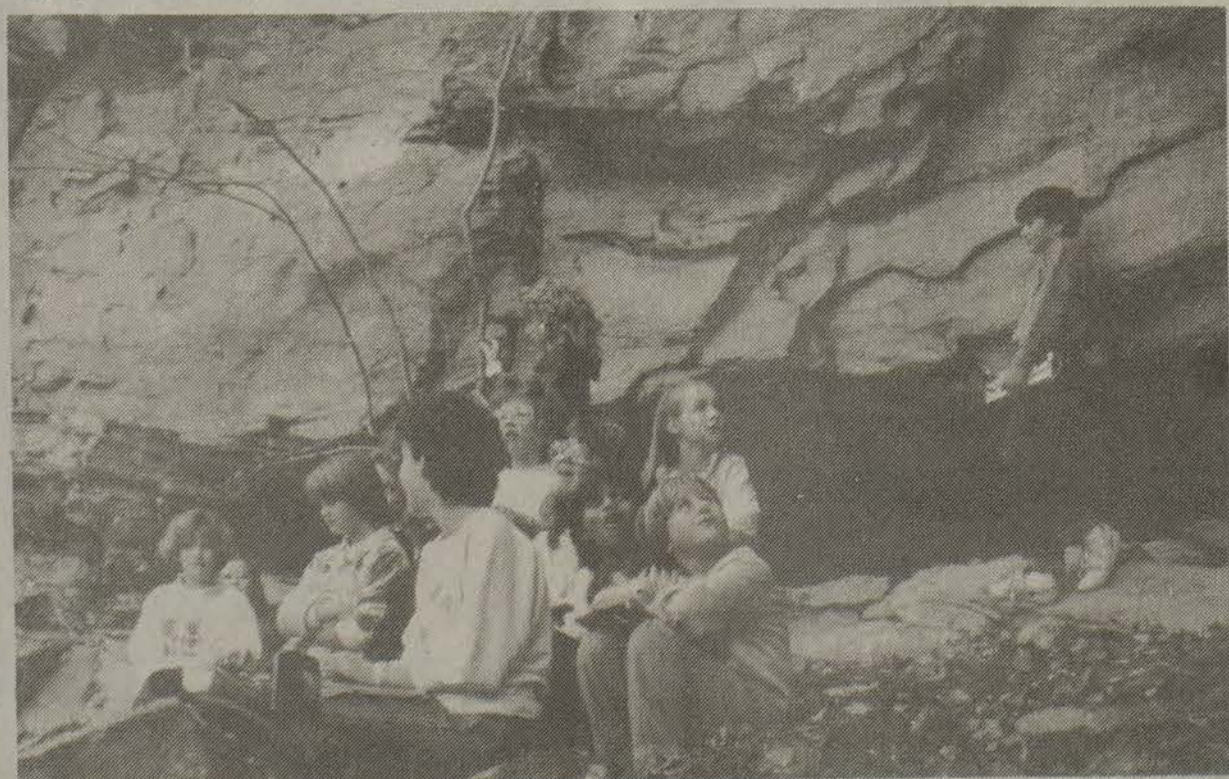
•Select a trail that makes sense to you. If you haven't hiked much, make sure the first trail you hike is short and not too rigorous for you.

•Regardless of the trail you select, make sure you wear comfortable shoes for hiking. Nothing dampens the pleasure of the vistas on a trail more than sore feet. Clothes should be comfortable as well.

•Apply insect repellent generously to ward off mosquitoes and ticks, which may carry diseases. Long pants help keep insects off as well as help protect your legs.

•Allan Worms, extension forestry specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, advises hikers to purchase and carry a good field guide to help them identify plants and wildlife along the trail.

The Kentucky Department of Parks offers "The Kentucky Trails Guide," which describes each of Kentucky's public trails. It's available by calling the Department of Parks at 1-800-255-PARKS.

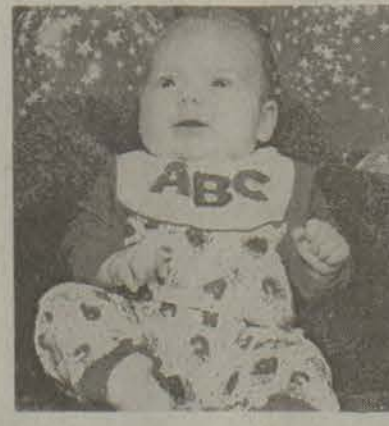

Our Lady of the Way conducts food drive program

The 50th anniversary of "World Food Day" was observed on Monday October 16, as proclaimed by the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization. Our Lady of the Way Hospital will recognize this occasion by holding its second annual food drive.

Hunger, is a condition in which people lack the basic food intake to provide them with the energy and nutrients for fully productive, active, and healthy lives. Hunger knows no boundaries, age limits, race or sex. It stifles the growth of our young; it weakens our old; it plagues millions of people across the world.

In Kentucky, more than 14.3 percent of children under the age of 12 and 15.8 percent of all other age groups go hungry every day. Causes of Hunger reports that globally, nearly 800 million people are chronically undernourished.

In the late 1960s through the mid 1970s, hunger decreased significantly due to expanded federal food and nutrition programs. However, between 1985 and 1990, the number of people in the United States lacking enough food to eat each month increased from 20 million to 30 million. Twelve percent of these 30 million were children under the age of 18. It is estimated that every fifth child in the United States faces hunger.

The world produces enough food for everyone to have 2,500 calories a day—150 more than the basic minimum. Over three-quarters of a million people are chronically undernourished not because food is unavailable, but because they cannot grow or afford to buy it. To meet the needs of the hungry, government food programs feed millions each year.

In 1993, 54.8 percent of Kentucky's families were eligible

to participate in federal assistance programs such as Aid For Dependent Children (AFDC) and Food Stamp Benefits. School-age children and the elderly are consid-

ered by many, to be the most affected. However, the number of women who are undernourished continues to rise daily. Nearly half of the women in the world suffer from iron deficiency anemia and a micronutrient deficiency in Vitamin A. Women, often seen as the caregiver primarily responsible for the well-being of the family, are discriminated against in society and in the workplace in increasing numbers. This discrimination also affects their children. In 1990, for every woman living in poverty, there were four children suffering as well.

The problem of world hunger is not one that can be solved overnight, but it can be solved. One way would be to alter our choices on a more conscious level. For example, in 1991, U.S. citizens chose to spend their money in the following manner.

—\$30.1 billion was spent on jewelry and watches, while only \$28.5 billion was spent on federal food and nutrition programs.

—\$47.8 billion was spent on tobacco products versus \$15.9 on foreign aid.

—\$32.2 billion was spent on toys and sporting goods, while federal housing assistance expenses were only \$17.2 billion.

—\$52.8 billion was spent on household cleaning and polishing preparations, while \$43.4 billion was spent on education, training, and employment services.

It is alarming that billions of dollars are spent annually on cleaning supplies, tobacco products, sporting equipment and toys, while hunger continues to exist in our nation.

Some ideas of transforming hunger may include:

—People can become stronger advocates on anti-hunger issues.

—The media can report issues on hunger, poverty, people and organizations involved in helping to solve hunger.

—Religious communities can teach social concern to help motivate involvement.

—People assisting the needy can expand their services and make efforts to influence government legislation.

—Local agencies can make strides in empowering those most affected by hunger and poverty.

The cure for hunger is in our grasp. Locally, food pantries provide for the needy all year. During the holidays, the need appears even greater. Contributions to your local food pantry are always welcomed and appreciated.

In recognition of "World Food Day," Our Lady of the Way Hospital provided the following service.

* FREE health screenings such as blood pressure, blood sugar and

pulse oximetry were conducted for those who donated three or more nonperishable food items toward the food drive

* Refreshments and balloons were available for participants
