





# Floyd convenience store clerk saves customer's life

the young woman's life.

For Happy Mart employee Shelia Tackett, saving a customer's life is all in a day's work.

For her quick thinking, Tackett received Happy Mart's "Who Got the Milk Award," which is awarded to employees who go an extra mile in their work duties and responsibilities.

Tackett, who has worked for the Harold store for seven months, never realized when she went to work for Happy Mart that she'd get the opportunity to use her two and a half years of nursing training and education.

"It was about two a.m. and this man came rushing in and asked us to call an ambulance, that his girlfriend was unconscious in the car," she recalled. "So after I got off the phone, I went out to the car to see what exactly was wrong."

But when a man entered the store in November and requested she call an ambulance because his girlfriend was unconscious in the car, Tackett stayed calm and put those skills to work — and in the process may very well have saved

"She just looked like she had passed out. She had a real weak pulse, if any at all, and her lips were blue. I tried to find out if she had any previous illnesses or sickness. I found out she had asthma."

Tackett then searched the woman's purse to see if she had any medication with her. Not finding any, she went into the store to see if she could find anything that would help the woman.

"We didn't have anything, so I went back to the car and checked to make sure nothing was in her mouth that she could get choked on," she said. "Her boyfriend helped me and we got her out of the car and onto the ground."

"I then began to give her mouth-to-mouth resuscitation for about three minutes and followed that with about four or five minutes of CPR. I checked her mouth again

because she started choking. She was conscious and opened her eyes, but she had a very weak pulse."

Tackett, with the help of the woman's boyfriend, sat the woman back in the car, and Tackett returned to the store to again call an ambulance.

"It had been about 14 or 15 minutes and I couldn't understand what the holdup was and I knew this woman needed medical attention," she said. "When I came back outside, she went unconscious again and started having convulsions. And we held her tongue to keep her from choking."

"I told her boyfriend to get

behind her and hold her up and hold her tongue. I decided to drive the woman to the hospital because the ambulance was taking so long."

Once at Pikeville Methodist, Tackett explained to doctors what had happened and made sure the woman was all right. She then drove the couple's car back to work, finished her shift and returned to the hospital.

"The lady suffers from asthma and seizures, but she hadn't been taking her medication, and the doctors said something she ate that day probably triggered the attack," said Tackett.

Tackett said the experience real-

ly gave her a good feeling of being able to help another person.

"I was glad that I was there and was able to help them," she said. "I was a little bit nervous at first, when everything started happening, but I got over it real quick because I knew she needed help and I couldn't panic."

"Then I got mad because the ambulance driver never did arrive. While we were still at the hospital and after we found out she was going to be all right, her boyfriend came out and kissed me on the cheek and thanked me for what I did. They got married shortly after the incident."

of Water; and Smokey The Bear from the forestry department will deliver the message of a cleaner, greener Earth to the students and parents attending.

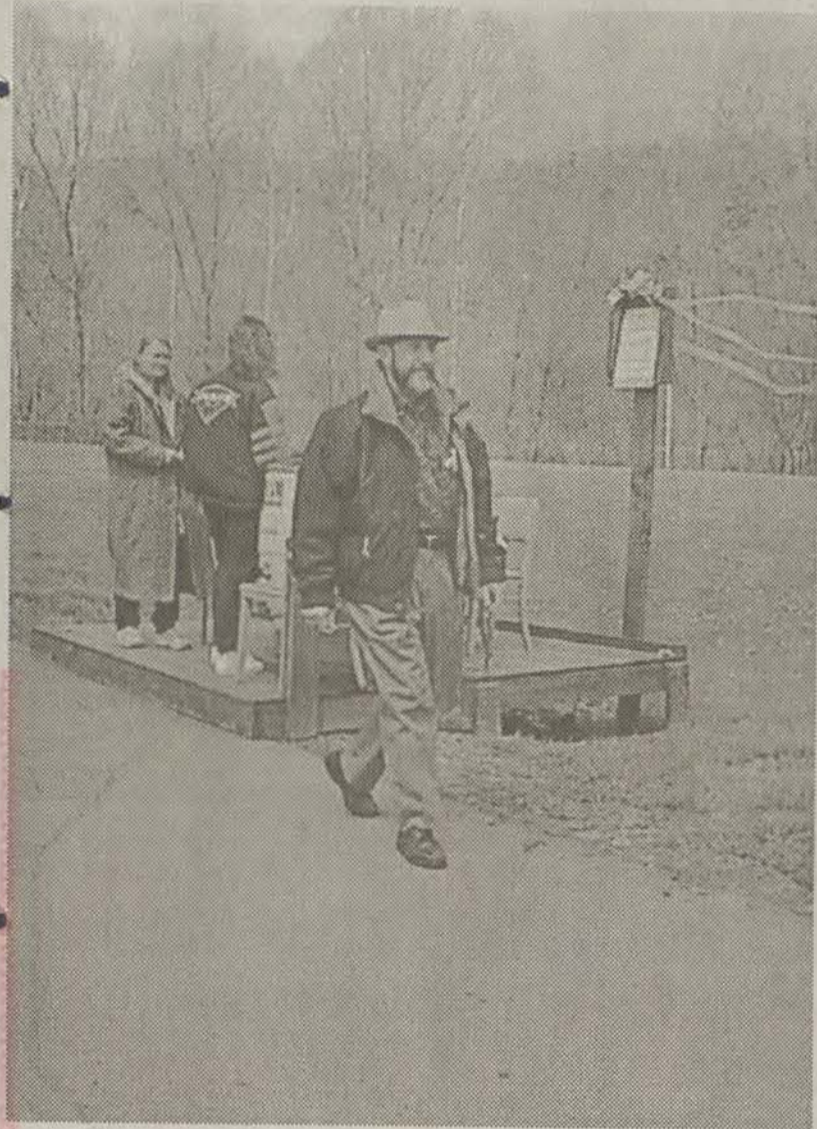

## Porter competes in photography competition

Steven G. Porter M. Photog., CPP of Porter Studio in Prestonsburg, recently competed in the Mid-East States Affiliated Print Competition hosted by the Professional Photographers of Ohio at the Hyatt Regency/Greater Columbus Center in Columbus.

Porter was one of the 332 photographers entered in this six-state regional competition. Each photographer is permitted to enter four prints. All four of Porter's photographs received the "Gold Corner" of acceptance with all four also receiving "Blue Ribbons."

Out of the 1194 prints that were submitted for judging, only 475 were selected to be awarded "Blue Ribbons" from all categories. By earning a "Blue Ribbon" at the Mid-East States print competition, the photographer will earn a merit when the print is submitted to the

International Print Competition of the Professional Photographers of America, which will be held in Orlando, Florida in July of this year. There, they will also be judged for acceptance into the Masters Loan Collection. If accepted, Porter's photographs will be in a traveling art exhibit, which will be on display in various art museums around the world. Porter has had a print in the Loan Collection for the past three years.

The event was judged by "Masters of Photography" from all over the United States. The Mid-East Regional competition consists of entries from Indiana, Kentucky, Michigan, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, and Ohio, and is one of the largest print competitions in the country.

Porter earned his Master of Photography Degree in Chicago

during August, 1995, and is currently working toward his Craftsman Degree. He needs lecturing or teaching merits to obtain a Craftsman Degree. He lectured to a group of fellow Professional Photographers in Huntington, West Virginia on April 8. The subject of "Fine Art Prints" was the topic of this seminar.

While participating in the competition and festivities in Columbus, the photographers were able to attend the 43rd annual Convention and Trade Show of the Professional Photographers of Ohio. This year the convention offered numerous programs and demonstrations offering new techniques and trends in today's photography. More than 180 trade exhibits featured the latest in photographic equipment and framing supplies available.

## Length of service or strength of service?

Up to now, all we know about the Floyd County School System's planned workforce reduction has been reflected in numbers.

Come April 30, though, the people caught up in this mess will be identified, giving a human characteristic to a financial crisis.

While the board's money crunch may be eased by these cuts, budget problems are only beginning for the victims.

We don't know yet who'll be getting the axe, but there is a better than good chance that many will come from the ranks of young and eager teachers who have everything the county school system needs...energy, education, excitement...to prosper under the criteria of education reform.

Everything, that is, but the one thing they need to keep their jobs.

Tenure.

Because they haven't worked long enough to earn that "golden parachute," it probably will make no difference how effective they are in their classrooms.

In education, seniority almost always outweighs sufficiency.

This is no indictment of teach-

ing veterans and we don't attempt to discount or discredit their contributions or experience.

It's just a darn shame that our current system puts more emphasis on length of service than it does strength of service.

We think it's time to change that and to bring the teaching profession into line with the real world, where job security depends on results.

Certainly, teachers deserve protection from the political beast that always lurks in the shadows of our educational system.

But the beneficiaries and the benefactors of that educational system also deserve assurances that they are getting the quality they're paying for.

Under the present setup, tenure is a one-sided deal that is protected by a very powerful, very influential organization... the Kentucky Education Association.

The KEA is the very group, though, that should lead the effort to level the playing field so those young and eager newcomers to their ranks don't become so discouraged that they give up on teaching altogether.

We need enthusiasm and accountability to reach our goals.

## Foster homes are needed in Floyd County

In view of April being Child Abuse Prevention month and many child abuse/neglect referrals being received, another on-going problem which needs addressing is the extreme need for foster parents in Floyd County. The first option we have is to place a child with a relative if the child has to be removed from an abusive or neglectful situation. But when there are no available relatives the child must be placed in a foster home. Many times the current foster homes we have are full and the children have to be placed in surrounding counties.

Since the month's activities are drawing attention to the fact of child abuse and the actuality that it does take place even in Floyd County (sometimes right next door to you), this letter is an appeal to the people of Floyd County to become aware of the need for foster parents so that our children can stay in the county. It is a traumatic experience to have to be removed from your home, but to leave friends, change schools, etc., should not have to be necessary if the people of Floyd County could realize the need for foster homes and fulfill that need. The number of children being placed outside the home is steadily

increasing. The number of foster homes must also increase in Floyd County or the children will have to be placed in other counties, sometimes very far away.

At the present time there are only six foster homes in the county who stay consistently full with children needing care. There are many misconceptions about foster parenting that may limit people from applying. Call us and we would be glad to share with you how much difference you can make in the life of a child.

## SHALL GARFIELD HOUSE ALSO GO?

(The following is an editorial by Norman Allen, reprinted from the September 7, 1977 issue of The Floyd County Times at the request of the friends of the May House).

Prestonsburg, the old Preston Station named for John Preston, pioneer surveyor, and the county seat of Floyd, the "Mother County" of a dozen or so Eastern Kentucky counties, should, one would think, have something more than a page in this or that volume of Kentucky history to show for its place in the annals of the past.

Instead, it threatens to become an all-new town dedicated to modernity, with nothing left to posterity except a few lines on a printed page.

The old is being forgotten or

sacrificed on the altar of progress.

Already, much of historical significance has been irrevocably lost. The old Harkins home was the first to go.

More recently, the Goble home and the old Clark Hotel have been razed.

The Johns residence on First Avenue, perhaps the oldest here, is in no present danger, since it is occupied by its owner.

The same status applies to the May home, which stands almost surrounded by modern homes and a housing development.

Now, it appears that the best-known historical spot here may go unless public interest shows itself, with city and county supporting its preservation.

This is Garfield Place, the ante-bellum home which during the Civil War was used by General Garfield (later President Garfield) as his headquarters dur-

ing the Big Sandy Campaign.

The old home, which has its back to the modern-day rush of traffic and fronts on the Big Sandy, the main artery of travel in the day when it was built, now is untenanted and its ownership has passed from the hands of the family which represented the original owners.

It follows that the old home will not be permitted to stand, untenanted, unused, to fall under the weight of the years and to gradual deterioration.

Its owner cannot be blamed for protecting his investment, if the community has no interest in it.

If no more is done than the deploing of what threatens to be almost a tragedy—as we are doing—the old landmark will join the others that have been leveled.

One or more modern homes will be built on the spacious grounds. Or perhaps a nice, shiny high-rise apartment building.

That is the challenge. This home has already been placed on the National Registry of Historic Homes. There are funds available for its restoration and maintenance. So we read—and do nothing.

The City of Prestonsburg and Floyd County could prevent this loss and make of the old home something for present and future generations.

It could be converted into a historical museum, perhaps with an arts and crafts center. The coal industry could use a portion of it to record and preserve the memorabilia that would tell others down the years of a time when the mining of coal was not only a fabulous success story but also a matter on which the future of the nation heavily depended.

The alternative is to do nothing—and lose something that is irreplaceable.

# Soil and Water Stewardship Week proclaimed April 28-May 5

Breakfast is a way to nourish the body for the beginning of a day, and breakfast also became a way Tuesday to nourish the Earth for the beginning of Soil and Water Stewardship observance for the Floyd County Conservation District.

The conservation district held a breakfast Tuesday at the May Lodge at Jenny Wiley State Park to prepare its leaders for the stewardship observance April 28 through May 5.

Educational material, such as coloring books and bookmarks, were handed out to church and school officials to be distributed throughout the county.

"We feel that through the churches and the schools, we can get the message of soil and water stewardship out," Jim Carter II, chairperson of the conservation district, said.

"If, as they say, each minister reaches 200 people, think how many we've reached with conserving our resources," he added.

The theme for the observance is "Harmony: People and Places," and is reflective of a classic definition of conservation given by Aldo Leopold, an early American conservation leader, according to Jim Rospopo, district conservationist. Leopold said: "Conservation is a state of harmony between men and land."

To emphasize the need for greater harmony between people and the place in which they live, the Floyd County Conservation District leaders encourages individuals and organizations to join the National Association of Conservation Districts in celebrating the annual stewardship week.

The Floyd County Conservation District began in 1950 and district leaders began helping farmers practice good conservation on their private lands, Carter said. "Today," he added, "we also offer assistance to cities, organizations and individuals who have an interest in conserving natural resources. Although our focus is still on soil and water resources, we have broadened our educational services to include wildlife and forestry concerns as they relate to total natural resource management."

The national observance of soil stewardship began in 1955 to create a greater awareness among individuals of their stewardship responsibility to care for America's natural resources, he said.

## Jenny Wiley among top visitors' sites

Jenny Wiley State Resort Park was listed among Kentucky's top 25 travel destinations in 1995.

Released by the Kentucky Tourism Development Cabinet, the list showed Jenny Wiley received 325,093 visitors in 1995 making it 24th on the list of Kentucky travel destinations.

Mammoth Cave National Park topped the list because of its two-million-plus visitors last year. Land Between the Lakes, a national recreation area in Western Kentucky, also drew more than two million travelers.

Kentucky Kingdom Thrill Park, a privately-operated attraction in Louisville, was the third top-draw attraction with 1.4 million visitors.

The top state park was Kentucky Dam Village in Western Kentucky which ranked fifth. The park drew more than a million visitors.

"I'm especially pleased," Tourism Secretary Ann Latta said, "that 11 of our 15 state resort parks made the Top 25 list.

In fact, the only three that didn't — Greenbo, Pennyrite and Buckhorn — were all closed last fall and undergoing total lodge renovations. They are due to reopen next month.

"The other 11 resort lodges will also be completely redone under the \$80 million parks renovation program we have underway. All the lodges will be open this summer," Latta noted, "with renovations proceeding in the off-season.

"With the improvements going at the parks," Latta said, "our numbers should grow as more tourists flock to the nation's finest park system."

## Talented and gifted students given gift of saving lives

A trio of Floyd County teens will be getting the hands-on education of a lifetime while possibly handling a few dead bodies.

South Floyd High School Senior Tammi Osborne and Allen Central High School Seniors Dennis Mayo and Colin "CK" Dingus are among seventy-two students statewide who may be selected to participate in the Professional Education Preparation Program (PEPP) at the University of Kentucky this summer.

Each of the Floyd County students is a participant in the Floyd County Schools Talented and Gifted program. Floyd County TAG students also visited the University of Kentucky Outreach Center for Science and Health Career Opportunities last

month for a demonstration in Gross Anatomy from U.K. Professor Donald T. Frazier.

Frazier, a Floyd County native, is chairman and professor of physiology in the UK medical school and one of the PEP Program's leading proponents.

PEPP is sponsored by the Council on Higher Education and is available to eligible students who are interested in a career in medicine or dentistry. Both the University of Kentucky and the University of Louisville sponsor PEPP summer workshops each year.

In the University of Kentucky Medical Center, UK PEPP students study as many facets of medicine as possible. Through visits to numerous different types of care facilities such as children's hospitals, psychiatric wards, and other health care providers, the students are exposed to a broad spectrum of experiences in health-related areas.

Last year, according to a press release from the Council on Higher Education, each UK PEPP student was allowed to spend a day observing actual surgical procedures. Also scheduled each year is a course in CPR, a tour of the anatomy lab where cadavers are studied by medical and dental students, a visit to the neonatal intensive care unit and hands-on experiences in dental laboratories, the release said.

The PEP Program places a strong emphasis on clinical experiences, exposure to health-related topics, and personal development. According to the Council, PEPP seminars tackle such serious healthcare issues as: the meaning of dreams; suicide and depression; normal vs. abnormal behavior; phobias; childbirth; geriatric medicine; bone marrow transplants; cosmetic and reconstructive surgery; the role of forensic medicine and dentistry in crime solving; and the use of hypnosis in medicine and dentistry (including demonstrations).

The students are also exposed to personal testimonials from survivors of catastrophic illness, critical transplant operations and drug and alcohol addictions.

Participants in the PEP Program

are also given the opportunity to work hands-on with medical and dentistry school students as an important part of their instruction.

According to the Council on Higher Education, PEPP participants at the University of Louisville can expect to spend most of their daily activities in the learning environment of the classroom engaged in such activities as "career exploration, problem solving, study skills, certification in CPR, service projects for homeless children, observation of microsurgery,

tours of medical and dental facilities and a team-building course."

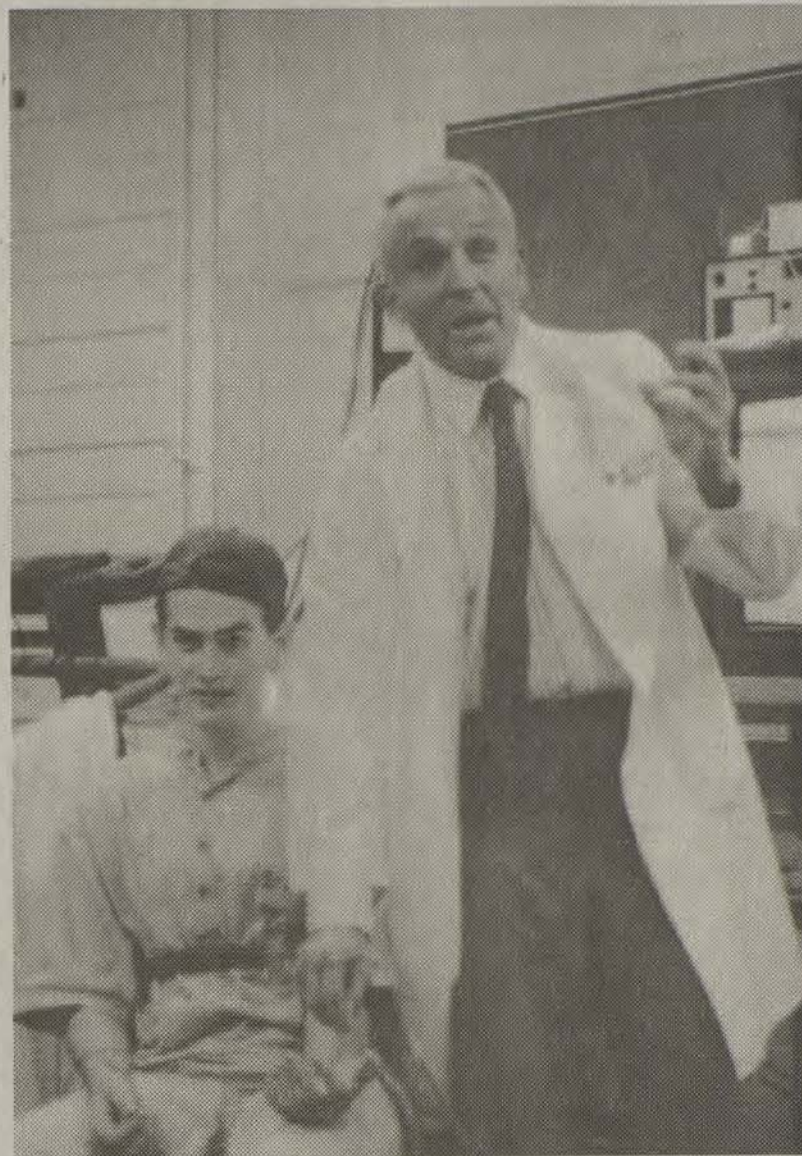
All expenses are paid on behalf of the PEPP participants, including the costs of lodging, meals and instruction.

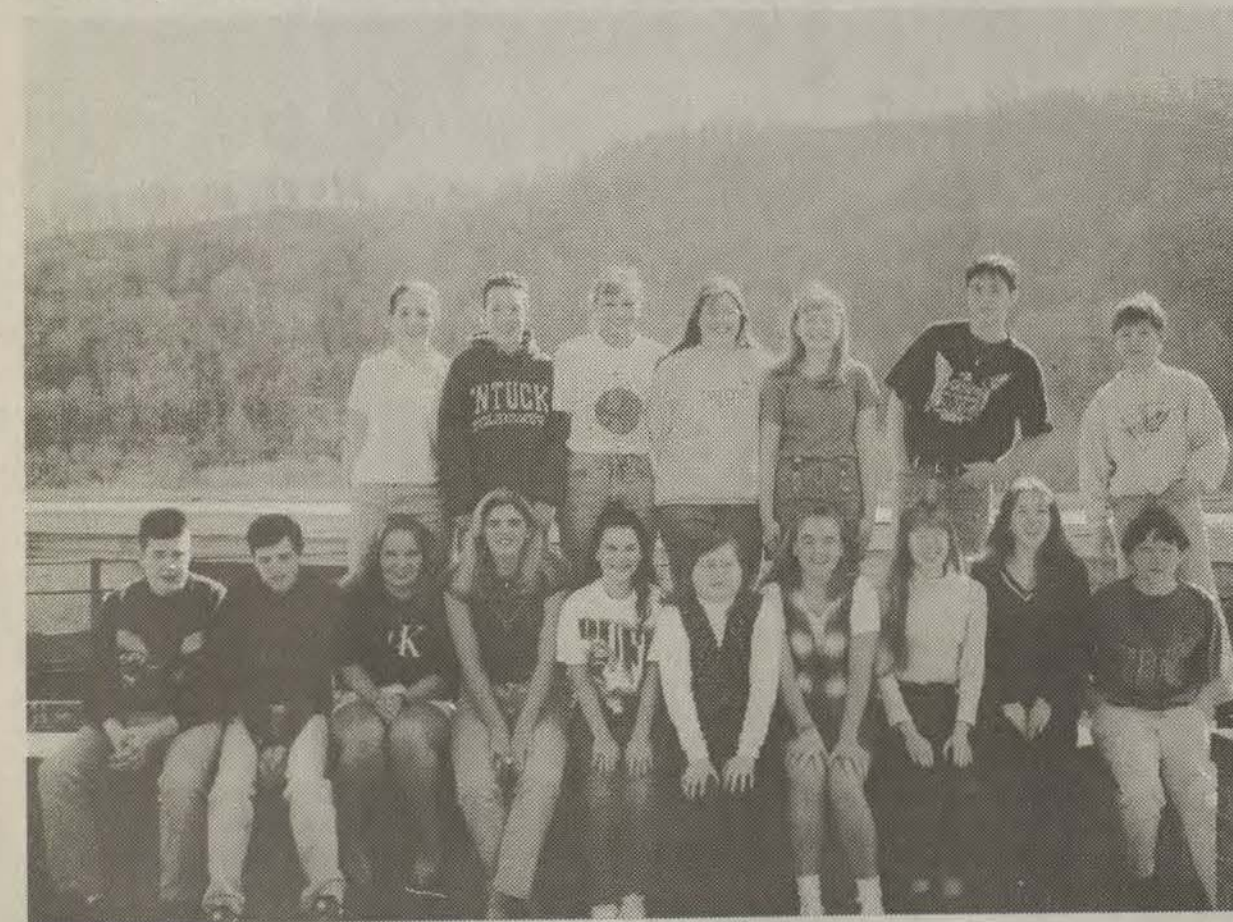

## Duff school named "School of the Day" on KET star channels

James A. Duff Elementary School received special recognition on Tuesday, March 26 when it was featured as "School of the Day" during a KET Star Channels' satellite course.
