## Judge dismisses board appeal

An appeal of an Attorney General's (AG's) decision, which said that three special April meetings by the Floyd County Board of Education were illegal, was dismissed Tuesday.

Floyd Circuit Court Judge John David Caudill ruled the appeal was not valid because neither party, the board of education nor board member Eddie Patton, was aggrieved by the AG's decision.

Patton sought the opinion in

May claiming he was not notified in writing 24-hours prior to special meetings held on April 4, April 26 and April 28. The AG ruled the board of education violated the state's Open Meetings Law by failing to give Patton written notice 24-hour prior to those meetings.

At Tuesday's hearing, Dan Rowland, who was representing the board, argued that the board had substantially complied with the Open Meetings Law and that there is a "25-year policy" of notifying board members of special meetings by phone. Rowland said that Linda

Wallen, a long-time secretary to the district's superintendents, had signed an affidavit regarding verbal meeting notifications. The attorney said he had "neglected" to bring Wallen's sworn statement to the hearing, but requested it be filed in the court record.

Patton's attorney, Doug Adams, countered that he would like to file an affidavit contradicting Wallen's. Caudill said he would allow them to do so.

Rowland also said that Patton had no standing in the case because he had not filed a notice to enforce

the AG's opinion within 60 days after it was rendered.

Adams countered that "who better" than Patton had standing to challenge the legality of the three board meetings. He said that it was obvious that the board violated the provisions of the Open Meetings Law by not notifying Patton in writing of the meetings.

"We ask the court to affirm the attorney general's opinion on the legality of those meetings," Adams said. "The board can back up and re-conduct the business taken at those meetings."

Adams added that he thought that when the appeal was filed it constituted a notice of enforcement on Patton's behalf.

Judge Caudill said neither side belonged in court.

"Neither the appellees nor the appellants have any standing," Caudill said. "None of the parties can be defined as aggrieved parties. Neither of these parties have any standing and the appeal is dismissed."

After the hearing, Rowland was

## Lawsuit is threatened over bid procedure

A Pikeville attorney is threatening to file a lawsuit against Floyd Judge-Executive Ben Hale and members of the fiscal court for accepting the highest of two bids for a backhoe.

The fiscal court accepted Wilson Equipment's bid of \$49,974 for a CASE tractor loader backhoe and rejected Phelps Equipment's bid, which was nearly \$500 less, during a special meeting Thursday.

A letter from Edward B. Atkins, an attorney who has been retained to represent Phelps Equipment, to the judge-executive indicates that his client's bid was rejected because the company does not employ Floyd County residents.

"Rejection of the bid on these terms is clearly in violation of the law regarding bidding procedures," the letter says.

The issue of Wilson Equipment being a county-based company was discussed during Thursday's special meeting, but the fiscal court also discussed the availability of parts for the backhoe.

Both companies advised the court that they had a service truck located in the county, but a spokesperson for Wilson Equipment also noted that his company has a complete service department in the county.

"Please consider this a demand that Phelps Equipment be awarded the contract for the sale of the backhoe/loader," the letter says. "If you fail to recognize Phelps Equipment and award it the contract for sale, I have been authorized to institute a lawsuit against you and the members of the Floyd County Fiscal Court."

Hale said Tuesday that the fiscal court considered Wilson Equipment's bid to be a better deal because of the easy accessibility to

## Floyd man among 10 holiday deaths

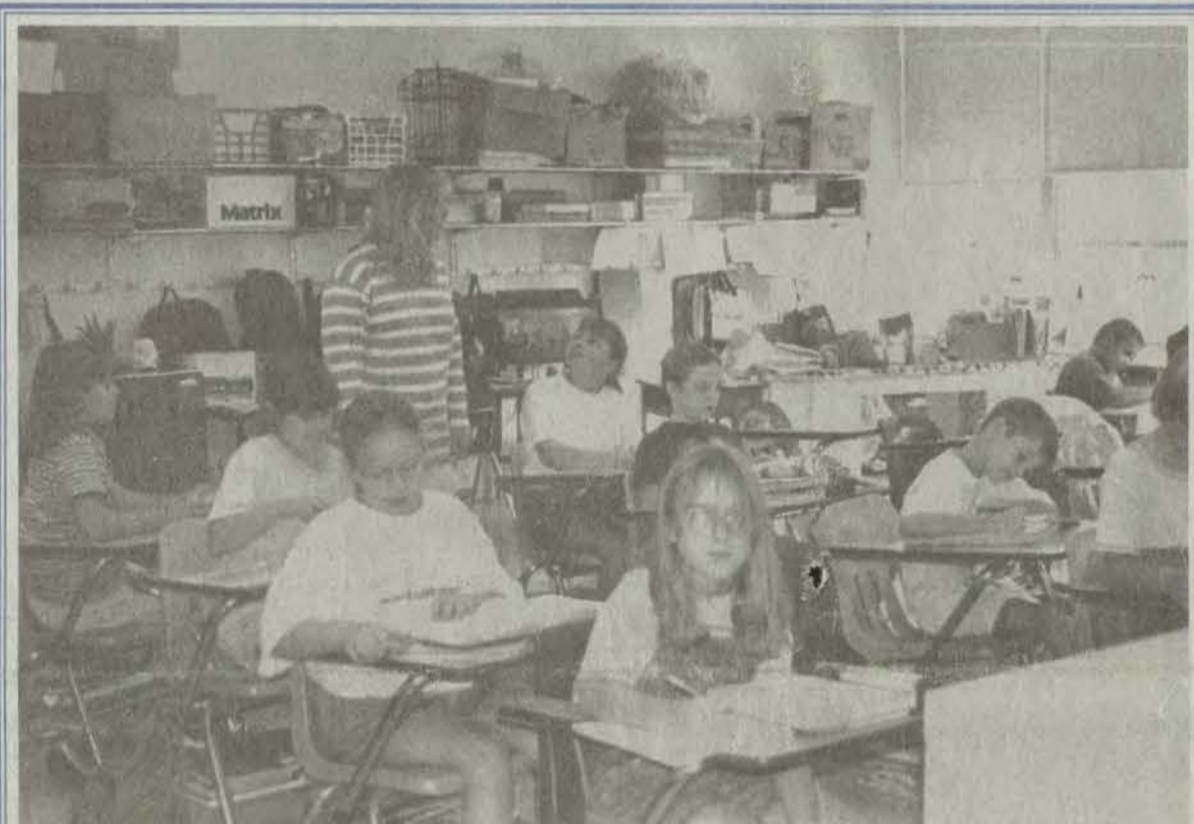

Thirteen lives were lost during the Labor Day weekend on Kentucky roads, including that of a Floyd County man who was involved in a head-on collision Sunday in Garrett.

Henry Branham, 76, of Lackey, was killed Sunday when he apparently drove his 1993 Chevy truck into the path of another truck on Route 550 in Garrett, according to a Kentucky State Police media release.

Branham was pronounced dead at the scene at 1:19 p.m. by Floyd County Coroner Roger Nelson.

## The Secret Of Their Success

Comprehensive Tests of Basic Skills (CTBS) results rank Harold Elementary's sixth-grade class among the top 10 percent of elementary schools across the state, and Principal Ernie Tackett said the school's success was made possible because "all the elements" were in place.

The 1996-97 test results, released last week by state education officials, showed that most Floyd County schools ranked below the national average in basic skills.

Harold Elementary's sixth-grade class was ranked 73rd out of 787 other elementary schools throughout the state, and Tackett said the students, teachers, and parents deserve all the credit for the school's ranking.

The principal said the students' work ethics and efforts; parental support; and the teacher's instructions were the elements that led to the school's success.

"She does an outstanding job in the classroom,"

Tackett said about sixth-grade teacher Karen Conn. "(The students) worked extremely hard last year and were willing to sacrifice."

Tackett, who became the principal at Harold Elementary in October 1996, added that support from parents also contributed to the school's ranking.

"The parents are real supportive of Mrs. Conn and were willing to bring the students to school activities," the principal said. "I am extremely proud of the group of kids, as well as Mrs. Conn. The students have left following groups something to shoot for."

The school's sixth-grade class received the highest ranking on the CTBS test results compared to all other Floyd County schools.

"I'm extremely proud of my sixth graders," Conn said Tuesday. "They put in the work and they made the achievement. It was their work that did it."

Conn agreed with the principal that parental support was a major contributing factor with the success.

## City is copless as police chief awaits hearing

Suspended Wheelwright police chief Tommy Engle will have to wait at least another week for a due process hearing on citizen complaints against him.

Wheelwright City Commissioners met in a special meeting at noon Friday to postpone Engle's hearing, which was scheduled for 7 p.m. Friday (August 29).

Commissioners Andy Akers and David Boyd were opposed to rescheduling the hearing, saying the town has been without a police chief long enough. Akers said Engle has been off the job for 40 days.

Boyd said four-wheeler riders have been zooming through the town and he's "tired of it." "The four-wheelers are driving this town crazy," Boyd said. "It's ridiculous."

City attorney Tim Parker recommended postponing the hearing because, he said, the city has not complied with some legal requirements for holding the hearing.

"We need to get some evidence from the state police and notify the complainants by certified letter of the hearing date," Parker said. "We are still within our 60-day schedule. I talked with Tommy Engle and he said he didn't care (if it was postponed)." Akers said he was in favor of keeping the original hearing date and that commissioners needed to have a police officer on duty. He appeared displeased with the delay.

"This should've been done before," Akers said referring to the notifications. "He's been off 40 days now."

Parker said he didn't like delaying the hearing either. "I don't think we have any choice."

Commissioner Jimmy Little said he opposed Engle returning as chief.

"Anybody (who) thinks I'm going to stand responsible for this man working under me is a pure idiot," Little said in reference to being a city commissioner.

Commissioner Akers made a motion to have the hearing as planned, but it failed on a 3-2 vote, with Mayor David Marlee Sammons voting to break a 2-2 tie. Commissioners Little and Luther Johnson Jr. voted to reschedule it. Commissioners then grumbled

## Jury takes just four minutes to issue acquittal

A Floyd County man was acquitted on two third degree arson charges by a jury which deliberated for only four minutes on Thursday.

William Joe Skeens, 33, of Banner, was accused on setting fire to a trailer and a car parked near a mobile home owned by Kyle Russell Lafferty in May 1993.

During a two-day trial last week, Skeens' attorney, Dan Rowland, used conflicting testimony from prosecution witnesses about what type of flammable agent was used to start the fire.

State police crime lab personnel indicated the blaze was started by a type of fuel oil, such as kerosene or diesel fuel.

Prosecution witness Joe David Fraley testified that Skeens had purchased gasoline and used it to start the fire.

Lafferty testified that there had been a conflict between himself and Skeens that started after Lafferty began dating Skeens' ex-wife.

Defense witnesses placed Skeens at his own home during the time of the May 11 fire.

## Two men arrested for coke trafficking

Two Floyd County men were arrested Saturday for allegedly trafficking cocaine, and Floyd detective Tommy Shelton said "sources" have indicated that one of the men has brought large quantities of cocaine into the county.

A month-long investigation led to the arrests of Lathe Hall, 52, and Jimmy Brown, 37, both of Turkey Creek.

The accused were arrested by detective Shelton and charged with first-offense trafficking in a controlled substance.

The detective said Monday that cocaine was confiscated from Hall when he was arrested, and cocaine residue and drug paraphernalia were found at each of the defendants' homes.

Hall is being held at the Floyd County Adult Detention Center in lieu of a \$10,000 cash bond. Brown was released from the jail Sunday after he posted a \$1,000 cash bond.

Detective Shelton indicated that additional drug-related charges would be brought against Hall.

"My sources have indicated that Hall has brought in large quantities

# Man charged with two DUIs on the same day

An East Point man was charged with driving under the influence (DUI) twice Saturday morning within a three-hour period.

David N. Bolden, 22, pleaded guilty Tuesday in Floyd District Court to both charges.

His penalty included a fine of more than \$600; seven days in the county jail; two days of community service; and a 12-month suspension of his driver's license.

According to court records, Bolden was arrested on the first charge around 12:55 a.m. by Kentucky State Police trooper Craig McGlone.

The trooper's report says Bolden was driving in an "erratic manner," and he failed several field sobriety tests.

Bolden's blood-alcohol (BA) level was .123. Drivers are consid-

ered to be under the influence with a .10 BA.

Less than three hours later, Bolden was arrested again by the same trooper and was charged with DUI, second offense. He failed the field sobriety tests a second time and had a BA level of .90.

Assistant county attorney Lance Daniels said Tuesday that under most circumstances, the DUI charge against 21-year-old defendants is usually amended to reckless driving when the BA level is below the .10 level.

However, Daniels refused to recommend that Bolden's charge be amended to a lesser charge because of the circumstances.

the equipment and company's parts store in the county.

"The fiscal court did what it felt was best for the taxpayers," Hale said.

The fiscal court authorized Hale to advertise for bids for the purchase of the new backhoe during a regular meeting on August 15, after the judge-executive told the court it was having to lease one.

Wilson Equipment told the court during the special meeting that the delivery date for the backhoe would be approximately 45 days, but agreed to provide the county with one at no cost until the new piece of equipment arrived.

Floyd County Attorney Keith Bartley said Friday that the letter was "obviously right" from the stand point of the lowest bid, but not from the best bid.

Bartley said the company's offer to permit the county to use a backhoe at no cost was also a factor in the fiscal court's decision.

State law allows governmental agencies to select bids on a basis of which is lowest and/or best.

of cocaine," the detective said, noting that Hall reportedly brought ten ounces into the county at one time.

Detective Shelton said cocaine sells for \$100 per gram on the streets, and there are 28 grams in an ounce.

"Dealers usually pay about \$1,100 for an ounce of cocaine and then sell it on the streets for \$2,800," the detective said.

Judge James R. Allen entered not-guilty pleas for both defendants during their arraignments Monday in Floyd District Court.

Preliminary hearings are scheduled for 2:30 p.m. September 10 to determine if there is probable cause to refer the cases to the grand jury.

asked who directed him to represent the board on the appeal since Jerry Patton is the school board's attorney and because the board had previously rescinded its actions taken at the April 4 special meeting where Rowland was hired as a conflict attorney.

Rowland responded that Patton told him the board had voted "at a meeting" to specifically hire him to represent them in the appeal.

Rowland was told that the board voted on June 30 to direct Jerry Patton to appeal the case and that Rowland was not specifically mentioned.

Rowland said it was his understanding from Patton that the board wanted him to appeal the AG's decision.

Minutes of the June 30 meeting indicate that the board voted "to instruct board attorney to challenge in circuit court, the opinion of the attorney general..."

Adams and Rowland said they are contemplating appealing Caudill's decision to the state Court of Appeals.

If no further appeal is made, the attorney general's ruling carries the force of law.

cess of the students. "Parents are essential to learning," she said. "Students have to have support at home."

The teacher said that she takes a "multi-sensory" and "common sense" approach to education.

Conn said hands-on activities and class discussions are educational tools that make learning fun.

"I tell my students that a lot of learning is common sense," she said. "I have them look for patterns and look at things in a common-sense approach — and learning gets easier."

Conn said that if students learn the basics, they can extend their education to other areas.

She said the school is very concentrated in reading and mathemat-

ics, and the sixth-grade students were taught by good teachers before they got to her classroom.

"The staff is very supportive and we build on each others' strength," Conn said.

Harold Elementary was also one of eight Floyd schools that exceeded its goal on the KIRIS tests in October 1996, and shared in an estimated \$27 million in rewards statewide.

KIRIS testing was implemented in the 1992-93 school year and the tests are given every year in grades four, eight and eleven.

Harold Elementary was one of only two Floyd County schools that has achieved reward status in two consecutive KIRIS testing cycles.

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## Deaths

The accident occurred at approximately 12:45 p.m. Sunday.

"(Branham)...was pulling onto Route 550 and pulled into the path of a 1997 Ford truck, driven by Ricky Smith, that was traveling westbound on Route 550," the KSP release says.

According to the coroner, Branham had been visiting a family

member at Baptist Bottom and was attempting to turn into the east-bound lane when his and Smith's vehicles collided.

Branham suffered massive chest trauma in Sunday's mishap, the coroner said Tuesday.

Coroner Nelson said Branham's vehicle was turned around in the accident. "Branham was going

toward Garrett, but his pickup truck came to rest in the direction of Wayland," he said.

The coroner said Branham was not using a seat belt when the accident occurred, and Smith was not seriously injured in the mishap.

KSP officials could not be contacted Tuesday for additional information about Sunday's fatal accident.

According to a prior KSP release, there were five fatal accidents on Kentucky roads in 1996 over the Labor Day holiday. Nine lives were taken on state roads in 1995 during the same period.

"The number of traffic fatalities are down from last year," KSP

Commissioner Gary Rose said prior to the weekend holiday. "The number of fatalities last year through Labor Day was 535. So far this year we're at 471 fatalities. That's 65 fewer fatalities, a significant number."

The death toll during this year's Labor Day weekend was the highest since 1984, when 14 lives were lost on Kentucky highways in accidents.

## Accused of sex crimes, Harold man surrenders

A Harold man turned himself in to local authorities over the weekend after he discovered he was being sought for a number of alleged sex offenses against a Floyd County high school student.

James David Howell, 27, was taken into custody Saturday and charged with two counts of sodomy; third degree rape, no force; and first and third degree charges of unlawful transaction with a minor.

Floyd Sheriff's Lt. Ricky Thornsby said Monday that at least two additional sodomy charges would also be brought against Howell.

According to an arrest warrant, Howell allegedly "engaged in deviate sexual intercourse... (and) engaged in oral sex with the minor and made the minor perform oral sex on him."

Lt. Thornsby said the alleged incident occurred on August 19 when Howell apparently picked up the alleged victim from an area high school.

The lieutenant said he executed a search warrant at Howell's residence on August 27 and obtained "some materials" from his house, but Howell was out of town during the search.

Floyd District Judge James R. Allen entered not-guilty pleas to Howell's felony charges, and a preliminary hearing is scheduled for 2:30 p.m. September 10.

Howell is being held at the

Floyd County Adult Detention Center under a \$25,000 partially-secured bond.

Judge Allen stipulated that Howell was to have no contact with the alleged victim if he was released from the jail.

## Project to transport patients from Floyd to Lexington denied

The Cabinet for Health Services last week nixed a project that would transport patients from Floyd County to Lexington.

Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington had asked the health cabinet to approved its plan to expand ambulance services to Floyd and Leslie counties. Part of the ambulance service's duties would be to transport patients from those counties to Lexington area hospitals.

The Cabinet for Health Services reviewed 40 certificate of need projects last week, the Central Baptist proposal was the only project denied approval. Twenty-five certificate of need proposals were approved, and decisions on 14 projects were deferred.

Among the projects deferred were proposals to establish rehabilitation agencies — a Pike County Physical Therapy Clinic in Pikeville and a Johnson County Physical Therapy Clinic in Paintsville. Each project was estimated to cost \$318,000.

## Grand jury considers indictments of youths

A Tennessee grand jury was scheduled to consider Tuesday whether to indict six Eastern Kentucky youths on murder and attempted murder charges for the brutal attack on a Tennessee family earlier this year.

The Greene County Grand Jury met September 2 to consider three counts of first degree murder and a single count of attempted murder against each of the youths.

Vidar Lillelid; his wife, Delfina; and six-year-old daughter, Tabitha; were killed during an apparent car-jacking and theft on April 6 while returning home from a Jehovah's Witness conference.

Two-year-old Peter Lillelid, who was shot through his right eye, survived the attack and is recovering with relatives in Sweden.

The accused — Joseph Risner, 20, of Paintsville; Jason Bryant, 15, of Marrowbone; Karen Howell, 17, and Edward Mullins, 19, both of Toler; and Natasha Wallen Cornett

and Crystal Sturgill, both 18 and of Betsy Layne — were arrested in Arizona two days after the attack.

They were in the Lillelid's van and were apparently attempting to cross into Mexico.

Prosecutor Berkeley Bell has said he wants to seek the death penalty for the adult suspects. Although a Juvenile Court referee decided in July that the juveniles would be tried as adults, the stiffest penalty they could receive is life in prison without parole.

Testimony during July hearings for the juvenile suspects provided strong evidence against the accused.

For instance, in Howell's possession was the Social Security card of Peter Lillelid and a lock from the diary of Tabitha.

In addition, a supervisor at an Arizona juvenile detention center, where Howell and Bryant were detained for a short time, testified that Bryant named himself as one of the shooters.

Remember this.

These are your schools. They exist for the single purpose of educating your children.

Everything else is irrelevant.

Whether we pass or fail is up to you, just like it always has been. We haven't earned very high marks up to now, but we're getting a shot at a make-up test.

What do you say we try to make the honor roll this time?

The good news is that Kentucky has recognized its accountability problems in time to correct them.

Now let's see if our leaders have what it takes to balance the scales.

## Father of accused tells other side of the story

Editor:

I am Roy Combs, the father of Jared Combs. On July 25, 1997, the FBI and state police arrested Jared at the Prime Time Clinic of the Hazard ARH.

He was charged with the burglary of the clinic some six months ago. They also made sure the local TV cameras were there to video the arrest of this "Big Time Drug Dealer." They took him to Ashland, and he was housed at the Boyd County Detention Center in solitary confinement until the following Tuesday.

This is their evidence. At 11 p.m. on the night of the burglary, the security guard assigned to the pharmacy saw Jared leave at 11:05, and Jared was seen driving away. During these minutes, Jared supposedly broke into the narcotics cabinet and took 14,000 pills, but at the same time, Jared, had a key to this cabinet. He supposedly walked out where he knew a security guard would see him with the drugs. All of this was based on the fact there was no forced entry, and no alarm was sounded.

Shortly after the burglary they installed a surveillance camera, and for a period of some four months photographed Jared's every move while on duty.

They supposedly showed Jared taking pills from an area for which he had no prescription. On one occasion he "appeared" to be "snorting" a pill up his nose at 2:00 in the afternoon in full view of some five other pharmacy employees. I don't know how he finished the shift, because the pill was a sleeping pill. I also need to point out that some 11 or more people employed at the hospital have keys and know the code.

The pharmacist who discovered the burglars was alone. She is the same pharmacist who kept inventory on Jared indicating that on some days there was as many as one or two pills missing which had no street value.

On one occasion Jared was shown drinking liquid from a bottle. It was determined this was Clariton. Jared had severe sinus and allergy problems.

The problem that exists with the court system, is that the Grand Jury won't have this side of the story. They meet on August 20 and on paper they will probably believe what the authorities want them to believe.

By the way, they searched his truck and found one bottle of Prozac which is an anti-depressant. They impounded the truck, they searched his home, and found one bottle of the same. His wife had a prescription for Prozac.

Sometimes you need to know the "other" side of the story.

A federal magistrate refused to detain him based on the evidence.

# Sunshine Lines

Senior citizens, for the past two weeks we have been discussing ways that you as a caretaker, or your caretaker, might find respite, or a break, from one's caretaking responsibilities. This week's article is the last of this series.

As we previously discussed, it is important that the person caring for a disabled or older person have time for him/herself to care for one's own personal business, medical and dental needs without feeling guilty. This respite is also necessary to keep in touch with what's happening within one's own family structure and in the community.

This week we will look at some organizations you might want to contact to see what kind of help they offer and what their guidelines are. Unfortunately, you will not find much out there in the way of free

services on a routine basis. However, there are many programs that have guidelines based on a family's income, and whether or not the person in need of care is covered by private insurance, Medicaid or Medicare, etc. If the person being cared for has a government sponsored insurance like Medicare, be sure to ask about the "Waiver" program.

Two of the most prominent programs are Hospice and the Adult Day Care centers. County health departments have assisted care programs as well as do many area hospitals. For more information on these, call the program in your area that best suits your needs, or call your county health department or your hospital of choice to check out what they have to offer.

Your local Community Action Program (CAP) might have funding available to assist in some situations. Whether or not they have this program available at the present depends on whether or not they received funding for it, and how much funding they received to carry it forth.

In most situations where funding has been made available, it has been drastically reduced in comparison to monies that were received in the past for similar projects. A decrease in an organization's funding allot-

ment, decreases either the services they can render or the number of people they can serve, or both.

If you were to look in the yellow pages of your local telephone directory the chances are great that you would find several private agencies whose business is to provide this service for a fee.

In some telephone directories one will find homemaker services listed. You might want to check those out. These businesses usually specialize in cleaning services but I am confident that there are some who would write a contract to include housecleaning and the oversight of your loved one at the same time.

It is my understanding that there are churches in Eastern Kentucky and organized women's groups that sponsor programs to provide respite to those who need it. However, I have not been able to establish names of churches or contact persons in women's organizations to call and inquire about the services they have to offer.

Some volunteers are working on this to see if they can come up with a list of contact people and telephone numbers. When a list is provided I will share it with you in a later issue of the Floyd County Times.

I know that there are many care-

takers who need a routine break, or this "respite" we have been discussing over the last three weeks. I encourage you to check out all options that are available, as well as those discussed in previous "Sunshine Lines" columns.

If you are 60 years of age or older or if you are the primary caretaker for a senior citizen feel free to contact your Benefits Counseling Coordinator for the Big Sandy area, Charles Slone, at 886-3876 or toll-free at 1-800-556-3876. Discuss your needs with him. He would be happy to check out the known options that are available and help you through the red tape.

Please remember how very important it is to check references on people before they are invited into your home to fill this role. Don't forget, I mentioned the wisdom of checking with a trusted attorney, your insurance company in regard to liability coverage, and if you hire someone talk with a CPA or tax consultant who can explain the withholdings and forms that need to be submitted.

I trust that each and every one of you found respite over the past Labor Day weekend. Yet, for many around-the-clock caretakers I know this was not possible. The need for organized, volunteer respite services in Eastern Kentucky is tremendous!

## Historians follow Daniel Boone's footsteps on KET

Daniel Boone's Kentucky trail proves to be amazingly fresh, as two noted historians take to the woods to find traces of the most famous pioneer in American history. Thomas Clark and John Mack Faragher visit places where Boone lived, fought and hunted, and each site along the way conjures up memories—some of them rather scandalous—of a complicated and often contradictory man. Their search is documented in KET's A Walk with Boone, a new one-hour program airing on KET at 8 p.m., Thursday, September 11.

Producer Gale Worth and his crew followed Clark and Faragher with hand-held cameras as they ventured from the Cumberland Gap to the Red Lick Valley, from the site of the Boonesborough fort to the last cabin Boone built in the state.

"When you walk in someone's footsteps, you can learn a lot about him," said Faragher, a Yale University professor and the author of "Daniel Boone: The Life and Legend of an American Pioneer," the critically-acclaimed biography published in 1992.

Clark, who taught at the University of Kentucky until his retirement, recently turned 94. He speaks about frontier days with an uncanny intimacy, as though personally acquainted with Boone and his family. Revelations about Boone include details of how his marriage fared during his long explorations. After one two-year absence, Boone

came home to find a new baby in the house, the result of a liaison between his desperately lonely wife, Rebecca, and Ned Boone, one of Daniel's younger brothers. By all accounts, Boone accepted the situation graciously.

Boone moved from Kentucky 199 years ago to settle in Missouri, then a Spanish colony. He left behind a failed business career as a merchant and land speculator, but he also left behind one of the great legends in our national history. "He (Boone) lost the land," said Clark, "but gained the fame."

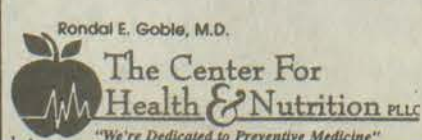

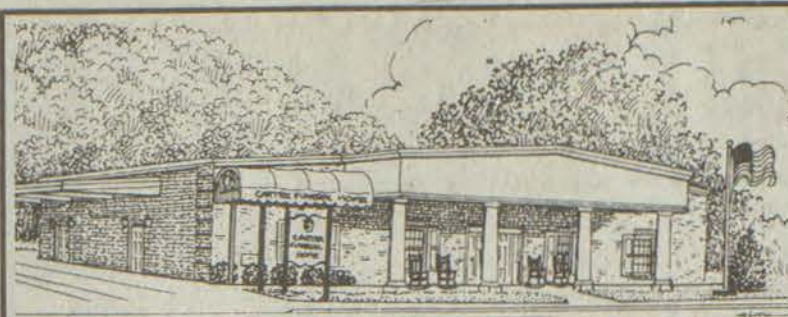

## Women launch businesses with help from business centers

Sandy Sheffield spotted an opportunity in opening a masonry company to help build schools and other buildings. But the Prestonsburg woman lacked the capital it took to launch her start-up firm.

"We didn't have any start-up capital. I worked. My husband's disabled," Sheffield says.

Sheffield didn't give up. She turned to Morehead State University's Small Business Development Center's Prestonsburg branch, which serves Floyd, Pike and surrounding counties, for assistance.

MSU's centers are part of a 14-center network located strategically throughout Kentucky and governed by the University of Kentucky's Kentucky Small Business Development Center, providing management and training services to existing and just-starting businesses. The help ranges from advice on marketing to helping new companies understand tricky tax laws.

The centers take special interest in providing help to firms launched by women and minority owners. And with good reason, since nearly 99,000 women-owned businesses now operate in Kentucky. Those businesses generated more than \$23 billion in sales in 1996 and employed more than 213,000 Kentuckians, according to Janet Holloway, executive director of the UK's Kentucky Small Business Development Center.

"Women-owned companies are the fastest growing sector in business today, and they make a tremendous contribution to Kentucky's economy," Holloway says.

The impact of women-owned businesses prompted the KSBDC to

hold its first "Women Mean Business" Conference in 1993. The fifth annual conference will be held Tuesday, September 30, at the Radisson Plaza Hotel in Lexington.

The conference will include sessions on how to expand a business to attract overseas customers; using the media to tell your business story; how to evaluate whether it's time to change or adapt your business to new conditions; and how to negotiate a win-win business deal.

Other sessions will focus on legal issues and ways women business owners can accrue the benefits of the new labor market created by the federal welfare reform effort.

The conference also gives women business owners the chance to meet other women who have successfully faced the challenges of today's business climate. It's an opportunity to learn how others targeted their markets, developed their products and adapted their strategies.

Mike Morley, director of the MSU Small Business Development Center in Prestonsburg, exemplifies the Center for Entrepreneurship's dedication to helping women business owners.

"I can't say enough about Mike Morley. He came in and talked to me and my husband, then he prepared projections on how much business we could expect to do," says Sheffield.

Morley's projections on Sheffield's business—Sandy Valley Masonry Co. Inc.—proved sufficient to encourage a local bank to provide a necessary loan.

But the bank loan—and Morley's continuing guidance and counsel—helped get the ball rolling.

"We have 10 employees, three

masons, and the rest laborers. We pay \$16 an hour to our foreman, \$14 an hour to our masons, and our laborers get \$10 an hour," Sheffield said.

"We're not rich right now. We're still sort of struggling from payday

to payday. But the business has money in the bank."

"Dr. Stanley said that he had been wanting to perform in Hazard for a long time and is greatly looking forward to being in this part of the country again," concert coordinator Danna Stamper said. 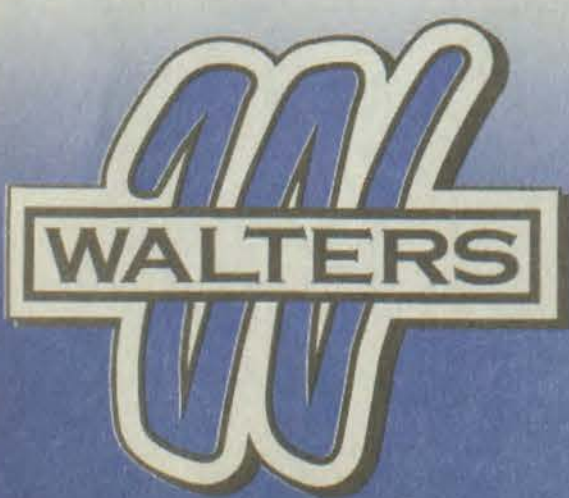

would have been better) this past Saturday afternoon at Commonwealth Stadium when sophomore Tim Couch (Leslie County) set a new school record by showing he was no "Couch Potato" when he completed 36 of 50 pass attempts in passing for 398 yards against state-rival Louisville in the Cats 38-24 win. Couch was intercepted only once.

His uncanny accuracy, passes, and threading between linebackers, has Wildcat fans thinking of a bowl bid come late December. But it is still early and one game doth not a season make.

The Prestonsburg Blackcats (0-1) scored all their points in the first half but found the Hazard Bulldog's (1-0) second half defense a surprise in dropping a 29-22 decision last Friday night at Hazard in the Pride of the Mountain Bowl.

The game was marked by constant penalty flags being thrown and frustration showing from both sides of the football field.

Taking care of the football was a problem for Prestonsburg as they fumbled the ball away seven times and had three interceptions for ten turnovers.

"Overall, we hustled and played like we wanted to win, but with so many fumbles and turnovers, it is hard to have any kind of field position," said the Prestonsburg coach.

Junior John Ortega stood out on both sides of the football with 13 defensive tackles and he rushed for 234 yards, scored three touchdowns and was named the game's offensive MVP for Prestonsburg.

The game had its dark moments as well with the Hazard fans heck-

Bill Willis, who was named the defensive player of the game for Prestonsburg, along with Ortega, accepted their awards, but, "...I really don't need another runner-up trophy," said Derossett.

The second quarter belonged to Prestonsburg as they scored twice in the period in taking the 22-8 half-time lead. Hall hit Ortega with a 14-yard touchdown pass for a 14-8 game after the run failed. Late in the period, the Blackcats were at the two when Ortega scored his third touchdown of the game from 2-yards out. Hall hit Seth Crisp with a pass for the two-point conversion,

and the Blackcats were in control 22-8.

But the second half was not to the liking of the Blackcats as Hazard scored twice in the third period to tie the game at 22.

Hazard quarterback Ronnie Grigsby hit Jon Olinger with a two-point conversion pass after French had scored on a 7-yard run to make it a 22-16 game. Following a Prestonsburg turnover, Hazard tied the game on Grigsby's 17 pass completion to Olinger.

After three quarters, the game remained knotted at 22 but the Bulldogs scored late in the fourth quarter when Grigsby connected with Olinger on pass play action. Olinger hauled in a 44-yard pass and raced to the end zone. Bebo Combs' PAT made it 29-22.

Prestonsburg's defense caused the Bulldogs some problems. They also came up with three fumble recoveries and two interceptions.

"Our defense did create some turnovers of their own," said Coach Derossett. Twice the Blackcats pulled off goal line stands to turn

# Brock, Burchett lead Paintsville past Raiders

Brock Taylor and Mike Burchett combined for 327 yards in leading the Paintsville Tigers to a surprising easy win over the South Floyd Raiders, 45-8, last Friday night in the first game of the Big Sandy Bowl at Paintsville.

Taylor rushed for 192 yards. Burchett had 135 for the Tigers who improved to 2-0 on the season while the Raiders fell to 0-1. Paintsville totaled 430 yards on offense.

"I'm just glad it was not a district game," said South Floyd coach Donnie Daniels. "They just ran over us."

The turning point in the game could have come early in the third period with the Raiders trailing 19-8. South Floyd moved the football to the Tigers' 3-yard line, facing a second-and-goal. On the second down play, there was confusion on the play to be run.

"They called the wrong play out of the huddle," said Daniels. Ketrin Mays, who had an outstanding run in the drive that began on the Raiders' 28-yard line, had rushed for 63 yards in the move up the

field but was thrown for a loss of six yards back to the 9-yard line and a third down play. Compton tired to hit Mays with a pass in the end zone, but the pass went incomplete. On fourth down play, Compton's pass again went over the head of his receiver giving the ball to Paintsville at the Tiger's 9-yard

line. The South Floyd defense broke down as Taylor took a David Castle hand-off and jaunted 91 yards for a touchdown on the fullback option to give the Tigers a 25-8 lead with 4:22 to play in the third.

Mays took the Paintsville kickoff and returned it 16 yards before

being caught on the sidelines. He fumbled the football and the Tigers took control again with 4:11 to play. On a first down play, Burchett raced 48 yards untouched for a touchdown and a 33-8 Paintsville lead.

South Floyd's Ketrin Mays scored the Raiders' only touchdown and conversion. The TD came on a 74-yard pass completion from Nick Compton. The two-point conversion gave the Raiders their only lead of the game at 8-7.

Paintsville led 6-0 with 4:29 left in the first quarter. Taylor scored from one-yard out and David Peters added the PAT for the 7-0 lead.

The Tigers led 13-8 at the half when they scored with 3:42 on Taylor's 14-yard run.

The Raiders turned the football over four times in the game when Paintsville picked off four of Compton's passes. Compton did complete 25 passes for 178 yards.

But the defensive line for South Floyd just could not contain Taylor nor Burchett, giving up long gainers.

Coach Daniels was going to live with the passing game, but went to

Last week before the Mountain Dew Southern 500, every article you read or interview that you saw had to be about Jeff Gordon's quest for the Winston Million. I know what you read from my pen last week was also about Gordon's attempt for the million dollars. It may well be the story of the year in NASCAR, but crew chief Ray Evernham had as much to do with the victory as Gordon.

Nobody could ever find fault with the tremendous driving talent that Gordon possesses, but sometimes even he needs that little extra boost that can be found in the pits. Last Sunday may have been one of the greatest calls that was ever made from a crew chief.

A late caution flag came out as Dale Jarrett was leading the race and the threat of rain increasing. It seemed for sure that none of the leaders would pit and that they would all stay out on the track to maintain valuable track position. For sure Jarrett did as he followed the pace car out of turn four toward the start/finish line until suddenly Gordon's Dupont Chevrolet ducked down on to pit road after being summoned by crew chief Ray Evernham. Jarrett quickly turned down onto pit road to follow the rest of the lead pack in, only to find himself losing the lead and having to be in the role of running down the leader once again.

Rick Hendrick stole Gordon from Davis and Ford in 1992 and put him in his new Dupont team. Hendrick asked Gordon if he had any idea who he wanted for a crew chief, and the young driver immediately asked for Evernham.

If you have ever listened on a scanner at the race then you know that Evernham is more than just a crew chief to Gordon. Ray not only calls the pit stops, at times he motivates and calms the excited emotions of the young driver.

Sunday's win was number nine for the team this year and put Gordon back into first place in the point standings. With Ray calling the shots with nine races to go it would seem that Mark Martin or any other driver would have to be at the top of their game to take the championship away from the Evernham-Gordon combination.

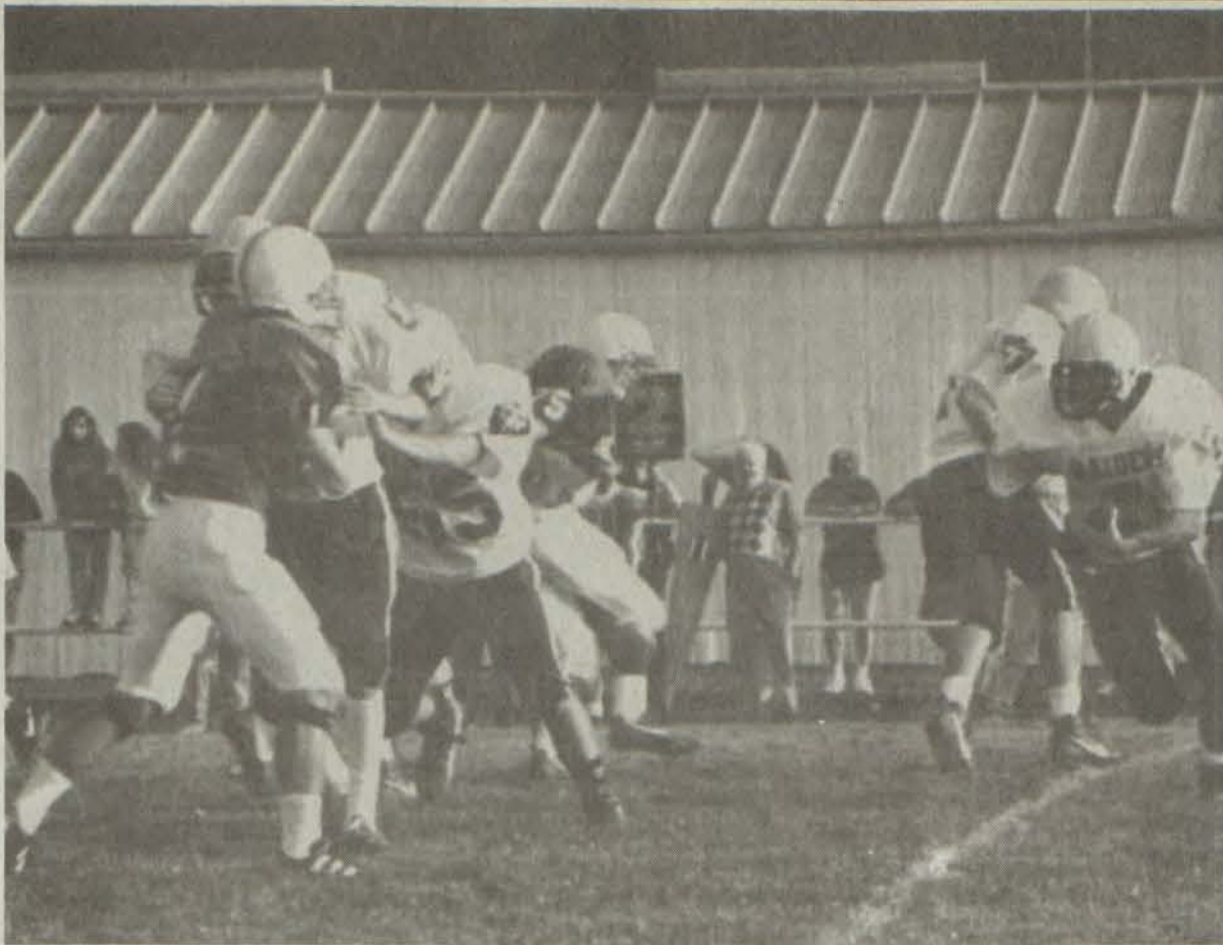
## A hunting reminder on the Paintsville Lake Wildlife Management area

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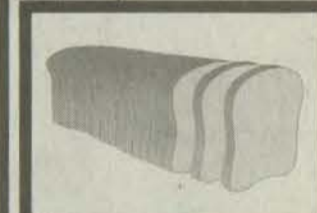
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# Sports in Kentucky

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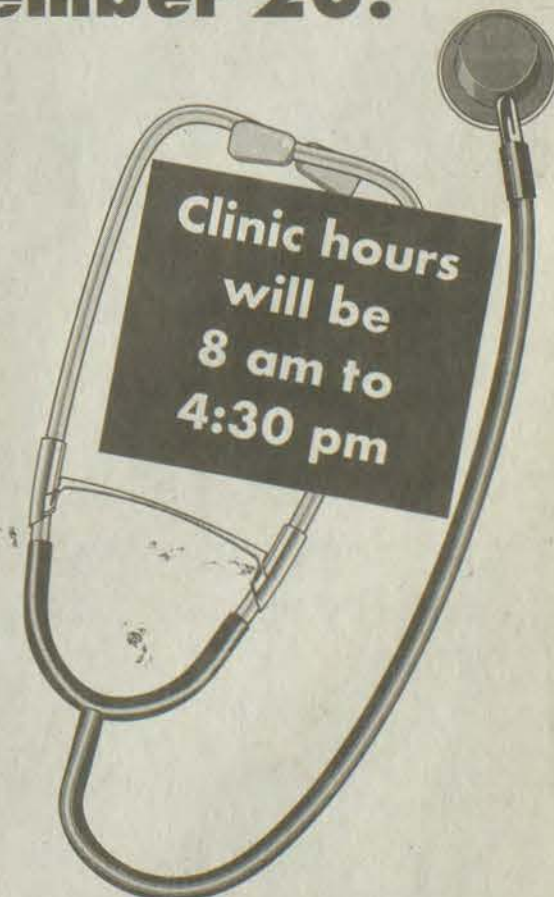

Hamilton has visited victory lane once, while driving Petty's number 43. That was the 1996 Dura-Lube 500 at Phoenix. He was the 1991 Winston Cup Rookie of the Year, and finished ninth in the 1996 Winston Cup points standings.

No announcements were made as to who will be the driver of Petty's #43 in 1998.

## SCHRADER OWES IT ALL TO JUNIE

When Ken Schrader returns to Richmond, Va., to drive the Skoal Bandit #33 in NASCAR's Exide Battery 400, memories of his early career will be stirred. For it was Richmond-based Junie Donlavey who saw the potential in Schrader to make it in NASCAR racing 13 years ago.

Schrader was racing late model Fords when he decided to pursue a ride in the Winston Cup series. He met Michael Kranefuss and Lee Morse, both Ford Racing executives at the time, and kept in contact with them. They introduced Schrader to Elmo Langley in 1984.

"I rented Elmo's Ford for five races in 1984," says Schrader. "We ran Atlanta, Charlotte, North Wilkesboro, Michigan, and Nashville. I ran out of money after three races, even with the financial help of some friends. Elmo let us run the last two races anyway. We made the show and brought the car home in one piece. I didn't set the world on fire, but I didn't tear up any cars either. I had just wanted the opportunity to run with some of my heroes and having that chance was a thrill in itself."

"Elmo let me have a taste of the big time and after that I wanted to race in NASCAR for a living. I called Junie Donlavey in the winter of 1984 to ask him for the

opportunity to run for Rookie of the Year, and he decided to take a chance on me. I can't tell you how thrilled I was to be driving for Junie."

Schrader drove for Donlavey full-time in 1985 and earned the NASCAR Winston Cup Rookie of the Year title, driving a Ford sponsored by Sonny King Ford in Anniston, Alabama. Although Schrader lived in St. Louis, Missouri, he frequently stayed in Richmond with Mike Smith, who continues to work for Donlavey.

"I wasn't financially able to relocate to Richmond," recalls Schrader, "but I felt like it was important to be at the shop to help the guys work on the cars. Mike was kind enough to let me stay with him. I didn't have a whole lot of money, so it worked out really well."

Schrader raced for Donlavey for three years until he received an offer from racing mogul Rick Hendrick in 1988.

"I feel like sometimes I owe it all to Junie for taking the chance on me back in 1985," said Schrader. "He took me in and gave me something nobody else could — the opportunity to drive in NASCAR."

Should Ken Schrader drive the Skoal Bandit car into victory lane at Richmond, September 6, one has to believe that Junie Donlavey would be awful proud of his rookie driver once again.

Schrader's other friend, Elmo Langley, won't be there to cheer him on. Elmo suffered a fatal heart attack prior to the NASCAR Suzuka Thunder 100 in Japan, November 23, 1996.

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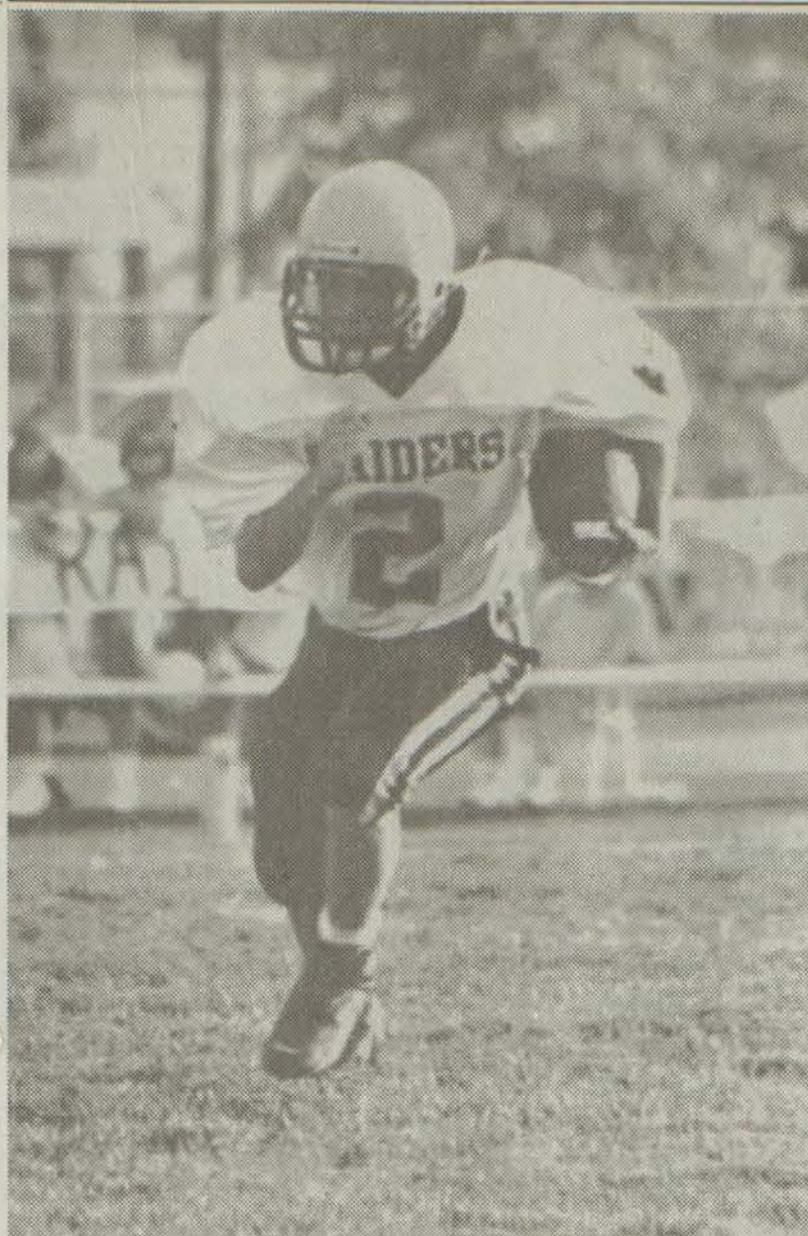

to hunt in the Johnson County section are urged to check this map, since a few areas close to the dam have been designated as "No Hunting Zones."

The 1997 hunting season dates for the Paintsville Lake wildlife management area have been set and are as follows:

1. Squirrel: Opened August 16, and closes after January 31, 1998. Open under statewide regulations, except closed during quota deer hunt.
2. Rabbit & Quail: Open November 1, and closed after December 31, except closed during the quota deer hunt.
3. Grouse: Open October 1, and closed after December 31, except closed during the quota deer hunt.
4. Furbearer: Open November 1, and closed after December 31, except closed during the quota deer hunt.
5. Fall Turkey: Open September 20, and closed after December 31. Open under statewide regulations, archery only, except closed during the quota deer hunt.
6. Deer:
  - a. Quota Gun Hunt, Antlered deer only, open November 1-2.
  - b. Open Archery Hunt, any deer, open September 20, and closed after January 15, 1998, except closed during quota deer hunt.

Note: All deer hunters must check in at the beginning and out at the completion of each hunt.

The Corps reminds all hunters that they are responsible for knowing where the proper hunting zones are located and knowing the hunting regulations, before hunting on the wildlife management area.

The Corps also posts these bul-

letins boards with park regulations and general hunting and fishing information. 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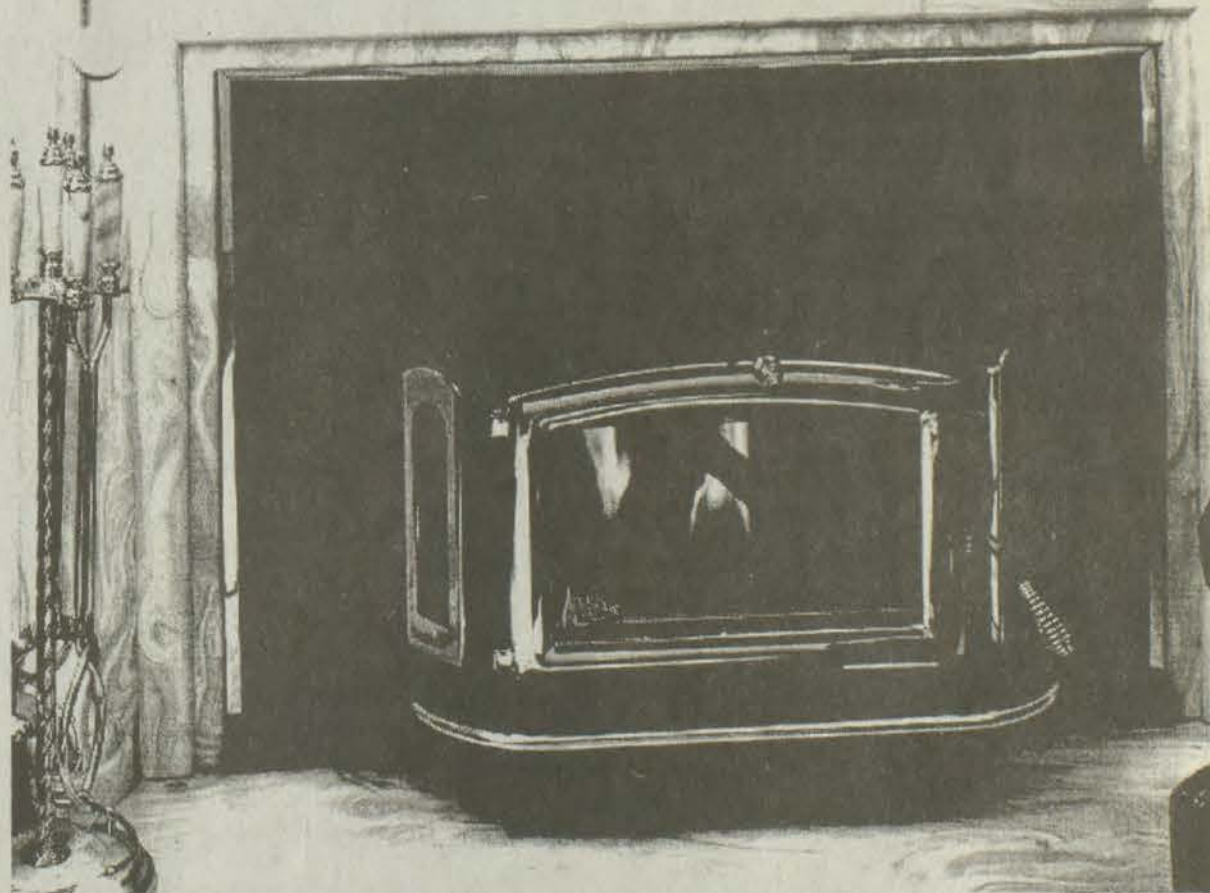

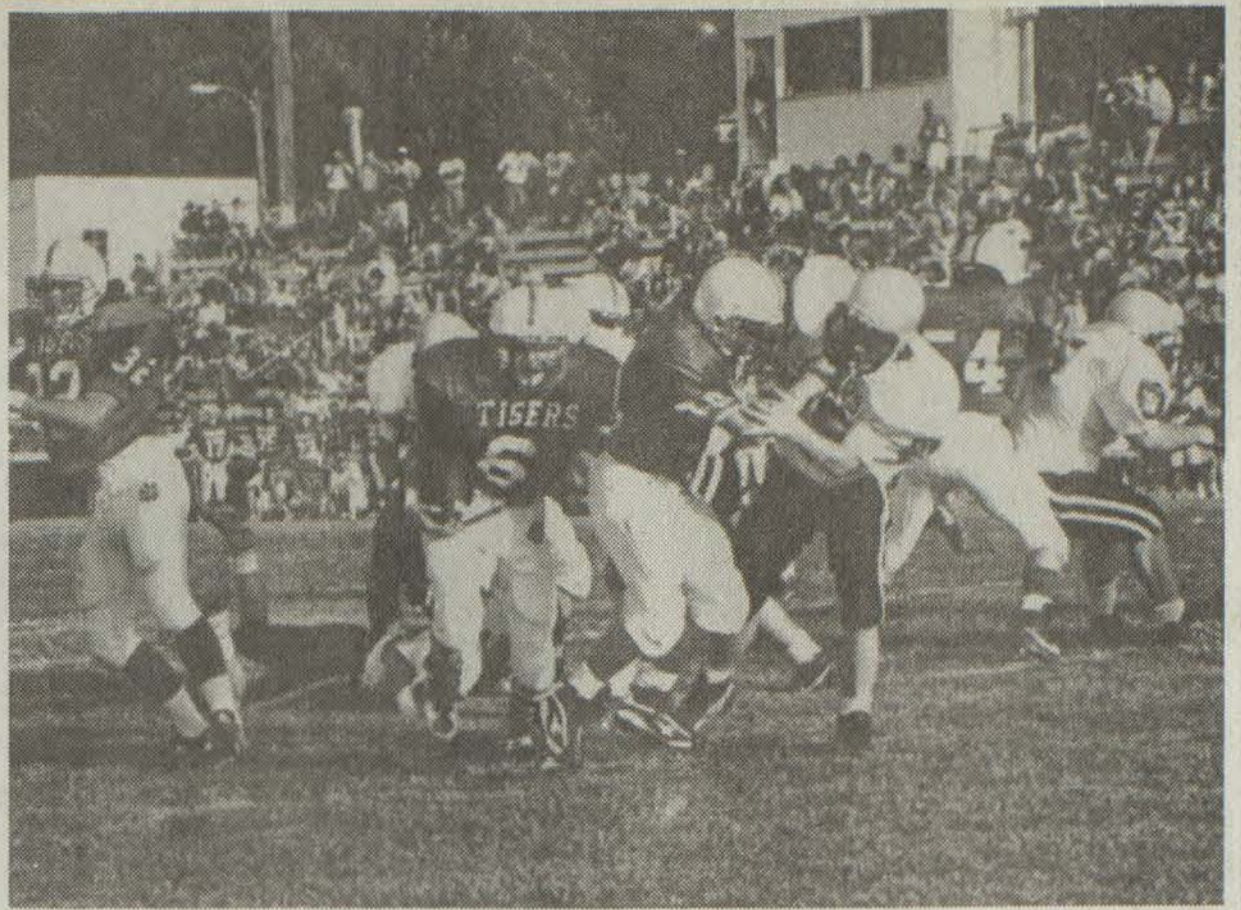
Despite Pennington's final effort to hold the lead, Muncy crossed the finish line for the win with Pennington finishing second.

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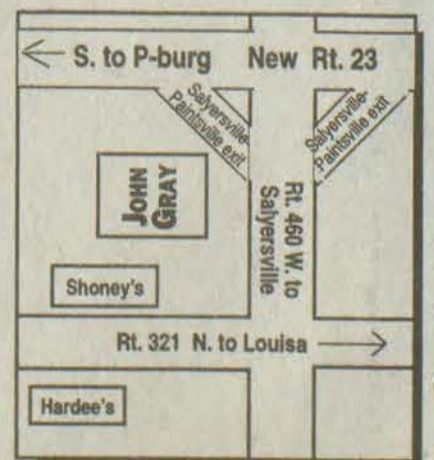

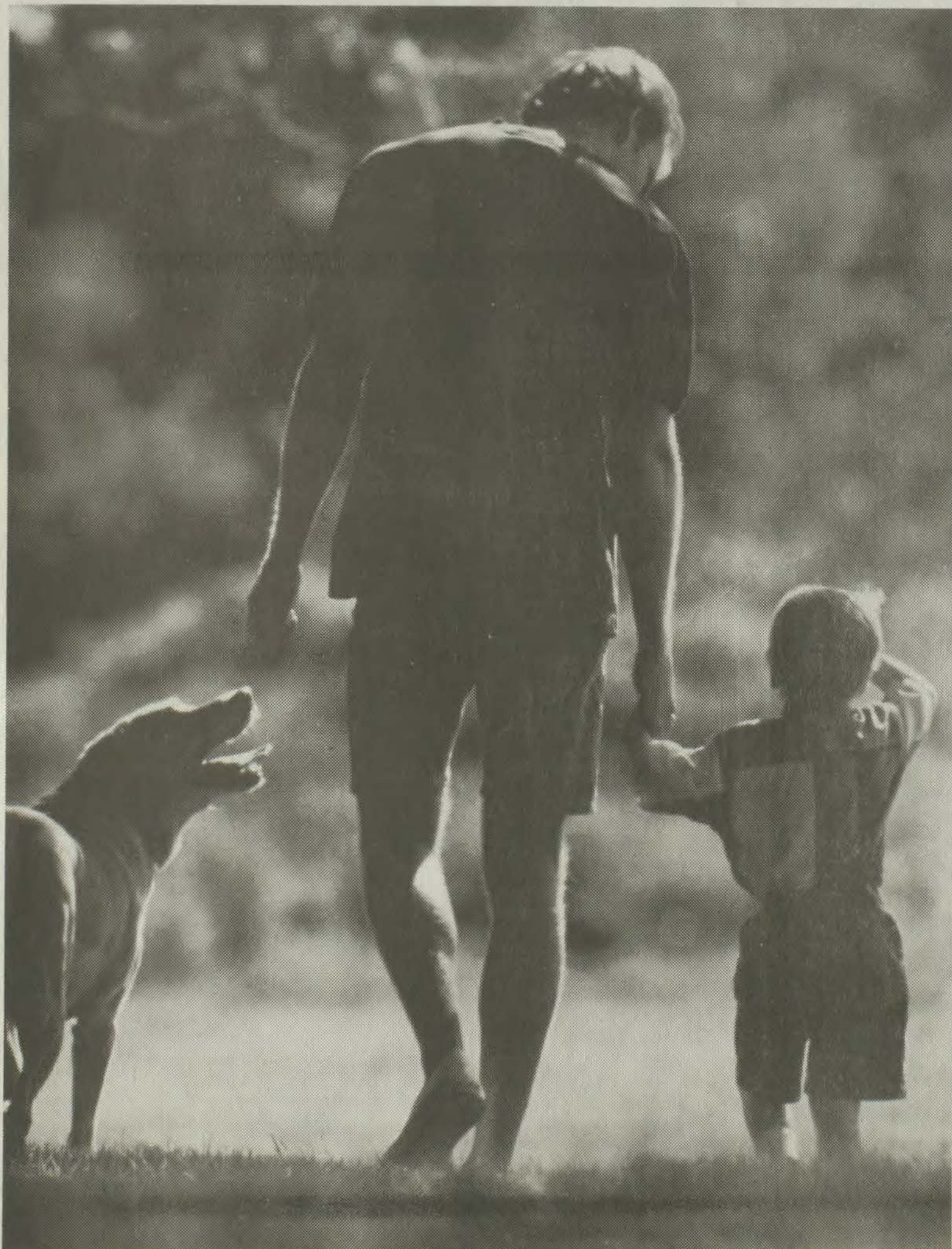

Other violations: Food protection. Improper storage. Uncovered ready to eat vegetables below first wire rack shelf in walk-in refrigeration unit. Bulk containers of flour

and meal — stainless steel containers used as scoops with no handles. Improper storage of wiping cloths in preparation area. Food contact surfaces not clean inside top of microwave and mixer head around nuts and bolts.

Non-food contact surfaces not clean. Wire rack shelves in preparation area soiled with food particles. Ceiling in preparation area soiled with grease around grill area. Hood over grill soiled with grease.

# When criticism comes your way

Seldom is it pleasant to be on the receiving end of a criticism or complaint. When people criticize and complain they are often in a negative or attacking mood. We feel their negative energy, and it's hard to take when people criticize who we are, what we say, or the work we do. But we can learn a lot from criticism; and learning to gracefully handle difficult circumstances builds character and provides a positive example to others.

## HERE ARE SOME POINTERS FOR HANDLING CRITICISM DIRECTED AT YOU:

- Stay calm. The person you are dealing with will immediately pick up on your mood. Instead of becoming angry, defensive or fearful, do your best to remain calm. When you are calm, you can be more receptive, creative, kind and strong. Concentrate on breathing deeply, gently, smoothly. Say to yourself and believe, "I'm open to learning and growing."
- Listen wholeheartedly. Hear the person out. Temporarily put your own thoughts aside and listen fully to what the person is saying. Listen not only to the ideas, but also to the feelings that are expressed, both verbally and non-verbally.
- Be receptive and open. Even if you don't like the person's approach or what he or she is saying, stay open. Do your best to see things from the other person's point of view. Remember that seldom is there only one right way of understanding or doing things. Usually a variety of ways will work well, each having its own merits. Stay open to new perceptions and approaches.
- Look for useful information. Ask yourself: Is there some helpful or interesting information here? Is this person touching upon a personal weakness that I would do well to correct? How could this result in our organization providing better service? Often there is a useful grain of truth even in criticisms that

are unkind and unjustified.

- Make sure you understand. Now that you've listened, make sure you have an accurate understanding of the person's criticism. Say something like: "Let me make sure I understand. What you are asking for is..." or "You're suggesting that I..." What's important is that you understand what the person is saying, not that you agree with it.
- Give a response. Say what you have learned and what, if anything, you are willing to do about it. If you are not sure what the person wants from you, ask how you can help. If you feel action is justified, state what you plan to do and by when. Or refer the person to a more appropriate resource. Sometimes the individual giving criticism simply wants you to listen, understand and care.

If you feel the criticism is totally unjustified, or the other person rejects your suggestions toward resolution, try not to get discouraged. Acknowledge his or her viewpoint, bearing in mind that there may be nothing you can do that would satisfy the person. Instead, agree to disagree and strive to keep the relationship intact.

- Express appreciation. If you can do so sincerely, thank the person for sharing with you. If you feel so led, accompany your thank you with a smile, handshake, or a pat on the back. In a close relationship such as marriage, a hug may be appropriate.

## OFFERING CONSTRUCTIVE CRITICISM

The main thing to remember about criticism is to use it sparingly—very, very sparingly.

This is particularly true in close friendships and in family relationships. We accomplish far more by accepting people as they are and by

liberally sharing sincere compliments and gestures of appreciation. If you can't decide if providing criticism is the best route to take, forget it.

However, at times constructive criticism is appropriate and important. In these cases the following guidelines will prove helpful:

- Put yourself in the other person's shoes. Take a moment and try to imagine how this person may be thinking and feeling.
- Decide to be kind and cheerful. Your intention to be kind and upbeat will play a major role in setting a positive tone.
- Pick a good time. Timing makes all the difference in the world. When possible, try to pick a time when you won't be interrupted, a time when both of you feel fresh and unpressured. Pay attention to your intuitive common sense; you'll know when it's a good time.
- Find a private place. When your criticism is directed at one person, usually it's best to talk about it in private.
- Start with a positive statement. Open with a sincere and energizing comment that confirms the person's worth and your appreciation for what he or she has done: "Delbert, you're one of the best reporters in the business, and your work has helped our newspaper stay on the leading edge."
- Briefly explain the problem. Give a specific example of you concern and why it's causing a problem: "Twice this month, Delbert, your articles were late and both times it caused a major problem in the typesetting department." Avoid dealing with several problems at once; stick to one primary issue. Criticize the behavior; not the person.
- State the changes you'd like to see. Ask for exactly what you want, and briefly explain the benefits.
- Listen open-mindedly. Allow the person to share his or her perspective on the issue. Stay open to new information.
- Close on a positive note. End with a word of appreciation, a smile, or a genuine compliment.

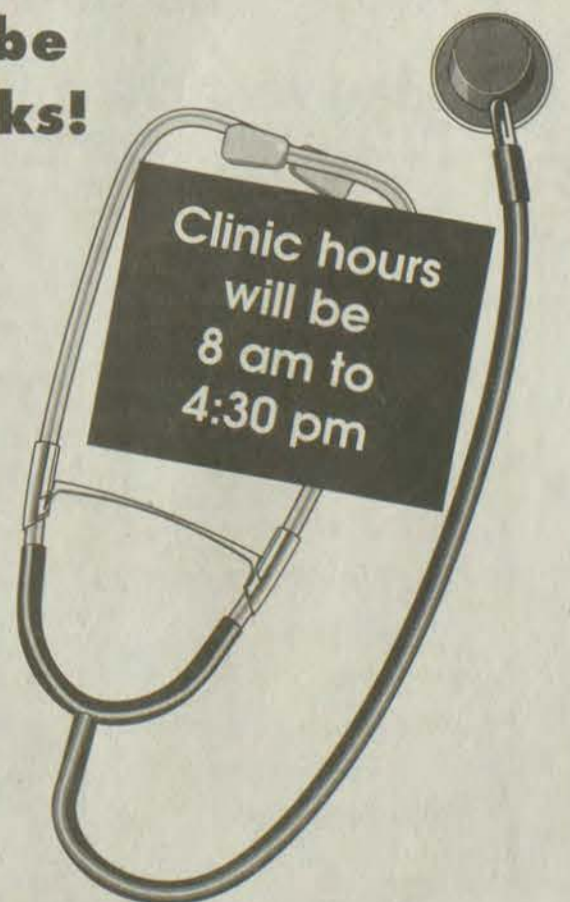

## September is Farm Safety Awareness Month

Awareness Month, so I would like to remind all farmers of the importance of keeping themselves, their families and their employees safe.

Because farming is as much a lifestyle as an occupation, the entire family, including children and "senior citizens," are exposed to the many hazards associated with the agricultural workplace.

In addition to the recognized problems with traumatic injury and death in agriculture, there are serious issues relating to the health of those who work in farming. Health problems associated with agriculture include hearing loss, arthritis, cancer, respiratory disease, infections, pesticide-related problems and emotional stress and depres-

sion. Noise, dust and exposures to toxins ranging from sunlight to agrichemicals account for many of the problems listed above.

Unlike most other industries, the majority of our farms are exempt from the enforcement of many government safety and health regulations. Farm families, therefore, must take on the responsibility of educating family members and workers about hazards, and implementing safety practices that pre-

vent injuries and illness.

During the month of September, the Extension Office will be hosting different activities to make people more aware of the importance of safety on the farm and at home.

A Safety Field Day will be held on September 13. We have a lot of great activities planned like a fireman rodeo, safety demonstrations and displays set up by different agencies where you can pick up lots of useful information.

The field day will be held in the back parking lot of the Prestonsburg Wal-Mart from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Come, join in the fun and activities that we have planned.

## Garden Phil-osophy

If you're planting your garden by the phases of the moon and signs of the zodiac, here's the information you'll need for the upcoming week.

### FALL GARDENS

Again I'll remind you, as I have for weeks now, time for planting vegetables that enjoy warm weather is sadly drawing to a close. Concentrate your planting now on vegetables that enjoy cooler, shorter days and cooling soil temperatures.

Check with your nurseryman, the county extension office, or the back of the seed packet for further recommendations. There's no need planting something that doesn't have time to produce, when there are plenty of things that do.

areas.

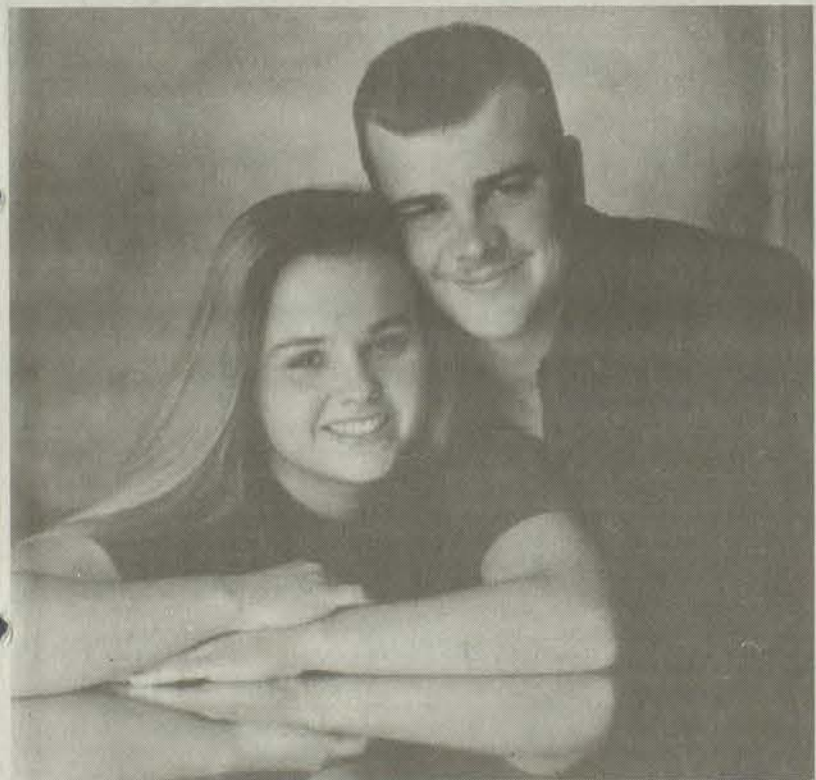

## Lean manufacturing makes Kentucky firms more efficient

Patricia Hall adjusted the lever on a machine that applied a label to a plastic housing, then added the housing to a stack of seven others. She flipped a switch, and her pneumatically powered chair slid four feet to another machine, where she performed another task with the plastic housings.

“She designed that chair herself. It increases the efficiency of how she performs her specific job,” said Vaulty Tyree, manager of Continental Metal Specialties Inc. in Stanton.

“Increasing efficiency” has become the watchword in Tyree's shop, which makes cartridges for laser printers built by Lexmark Inc. in Lexington. Continental Metal Specialties (CMS) have restructured its assembly system to identify and eliminate wasteful procedures.

CMS joined the ranks of more than 100 manufacturing plants statewide that are pursuing “lean manufacturing,” a philosophy designed to improve productivity.

Among the companies are the philosophy's founding firm, Toyota Motor Manufacturing Co., which employs some 6,000 workers at its Georgetown plant, to smaller companies like R/S Truck Body Co. in Allen and Clark Material Handling Co. in Lexington.

Lean manufacturing is a program launched by Toyota and the University of Kentucky's Center for Robotics and Manufacturing Systems to help improve the competitiveness of Kentucky firms. Manufacturing Systems to help improve the competitiveness of Kentucky firms. Manufacturing specialists from UK work with large and small companies to identify and restructure inefficient production areas.

According to Rod Heard, lean manufacturing program manager at UK, the program works with manufacturing plants of any size. “Typically we work in plants with 100, 150, even 300 people, but it works at small plants, too. Actually, even at large plants, what we usually concentrate on is a small area. Then we'll spread into other areas,” Heard said.

UK became involved back in the early 1990s, when Tom Lester,

dean of the UK College of Engineering, met a Toyota official at a Georgetown civic club meeting. Just a few years earlier, Toyota had opened its Camry plant in Scott County, and the official invited Lester to spend a few days working on the assembly line.

Lester and officials at the Toyota plant then began discussing the company's manufacturing philosophy, which was geared to minimize waste, both in terms of how manpower was assigned to tasks and in how materials were used and discarded.

The methods helped Toyota maintain a healthy level of profitability. But company officials also realized that they relied on part suppliers who also could benefit from using the lean manufacturing approach. And sharing the approach ultimately would benefit Toyota: By helping to increase efficiency in the suppliers' operations—and reducing the suppliers' own operating costs—Toyota would itself benefit from higher quality supplies.

Working initially through Lexington Community College, UK set up its program to spread the word about lean manufacturing. “We established an eight-member core group of faculty and extension engineers,” Heard said.

In 1994, the Center for Robotics and Manufacturing Systems designed a day-long simulation program where company executives make a mock product using traditional manufacturing methods. Then they make the same product using the lean manufacturing approach. The increase in efficiency has amazed the 3,000 executives who have participated in the

simulations, Heard said.

Two years ago, Tyree and other CMS officials attended a simulation.

“We got excited by what we saw,” Tyree said.

The simulation helped Tyree and other CMS officials to realize their manufacturing process was inefficient. They had several workers putting together various sections of the cartridges, and the workers were becoming bogged down by the time it took.

“In the old way, we may have had six people doing the same thing. That meant each worker needed the same kind of work bench, the same tools,” Tyree said.

Both Tyree and UK's Heard emphasized that plant workers must be brought into the decision-making process. Patricia Hall's pneumatic chair was her contribution.

CMS restructured its assembly approach to assign each worker to perform a specific task in making a cartridge.

When the worker finishes his task, he passes the cartridge to a colleague, whose task builds on the previous worker's. The new system also reduced the amount of tools and parts the company must provide to its workers.

“The new process greatly reduces the time it used to take to do the same job,” he said. He estimated a 6 to 7 percent increase in productivity.

The increased efficiency of CMS's system has improved the company's relationship with Lexmark, he noted. “It's improved the quality of the finished product,” something Lexmark officials appreciate, Tyree said.

## Edward Jones ranks No. 1 in Wall Street Journal stock picks ranking

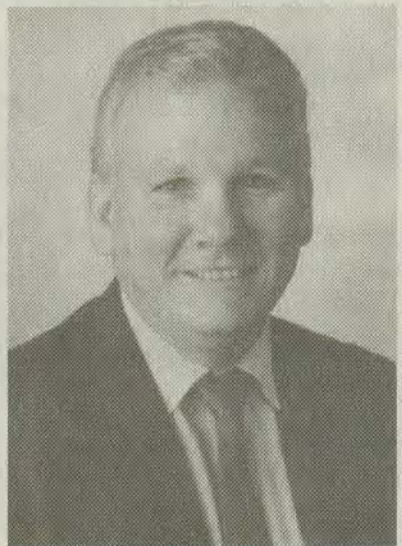

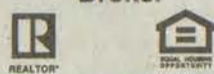

It's yard sale season, and the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet wants to remind citizens that while purchasing used child car safety seats may save money, it can also be very risky. Older models may not provide proper safety restraint, and over the years some have been recalled by manufacturers because of defects.

To find out which models of car seats have been recalled, citizens may call the Auto Safety Hotline operated by the United States Department of Transportation at 1-800-424-9393. For citizens who find the cost of new car seat restraints to be burdensome, the Cabinet advises them to check with their local health department and/or police agency. Many of these agencies have programs enabling them to either lend or sell the seats at a reduced price.

Automobile crashes are the number one killer and/or injurer of young children. In Kentucky, 23 children (under six years of age) died in car accidents in 1995. The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet has a Buckle-Up Hotline citizens may call if they see an unrestrained child in a moving vehicle and wish to report it. The hotline number is 1-888-235-8KID. Citizens can leave the car's license tag number, and the Transportation Cabinet will mail an educational kit to the owner of the vehicle. The kit includes safety tips and accompanying pictures that illustrate proper child restraint.

The information and Buckle-Up Hotline are a public service and strictly educational. No official records are kept.

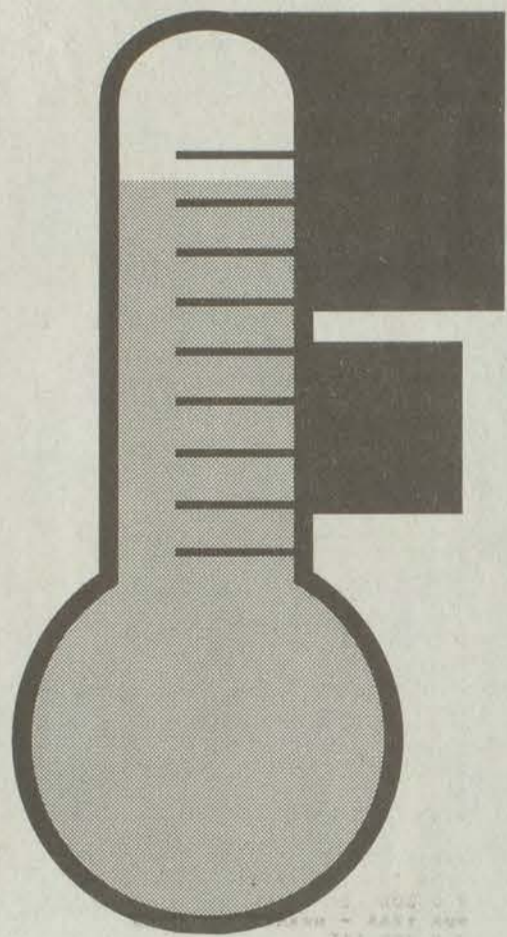

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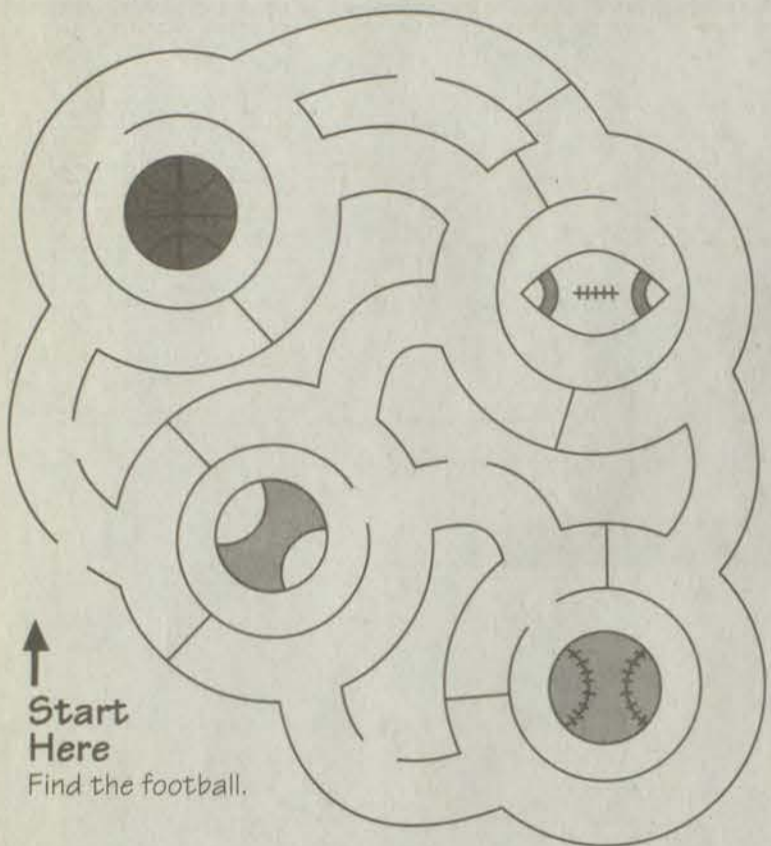
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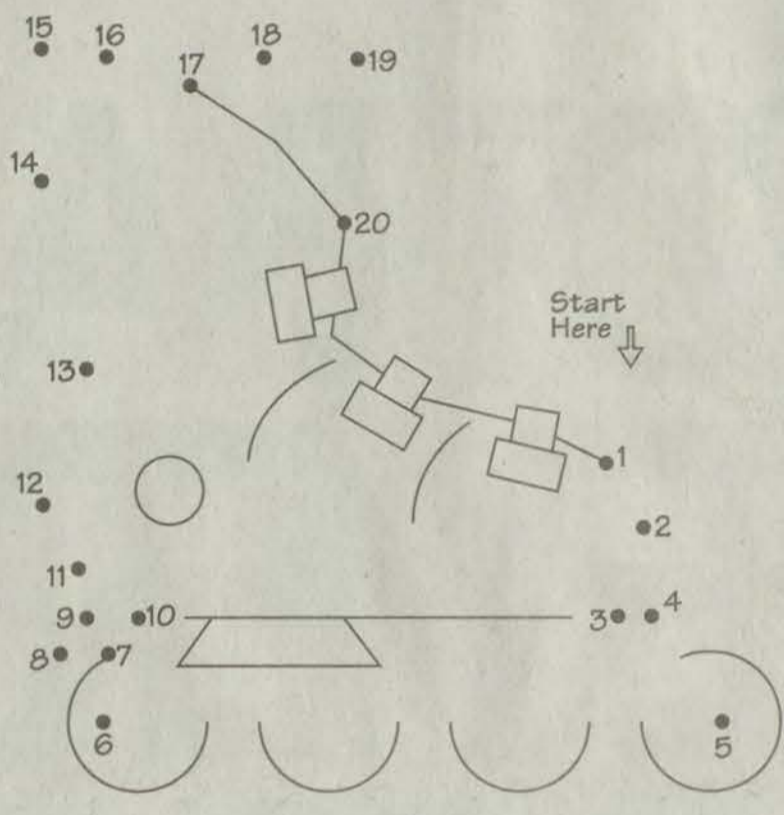

## Meteors

Have you ever seen a shooting star at night? If you have, then you've seen a meteor. A meteor is a speck of rock from outer space that falls into the Earth's atmosphere. When the rock enters the atmosphere, it heats up. When the rock gets hot enough, it begins to glow, and the result is a meteor. When many meteors happen at the same (or nearly the same time), it is called a meteor shower.

Most meteors don't stay in the sky very long. The reason is that they are very small (about the size of a grain of sand) and they get so hot that they burn completely away. Very few meteors are larger, and they don't burn up completely. When these meteors hit the ground, they are called meteorites.

Most meteorites are made of rock or iron or both. Some just look like ordinary rocks, so it can be hard to tell that they are meteorites. You don't have to worry about being hit by a meteor, though. It's almost impossible for this to happen.

At certain times of the year, meteor showers are common. One meteor shower will happen this year between August 9 and August 13. It's called the Perseid meteor shower because many meteors should appear in the sky near the constellation Perseus. You can read your newspaper to know at what time of night the meteor shower will occur, and where to look in the sky.

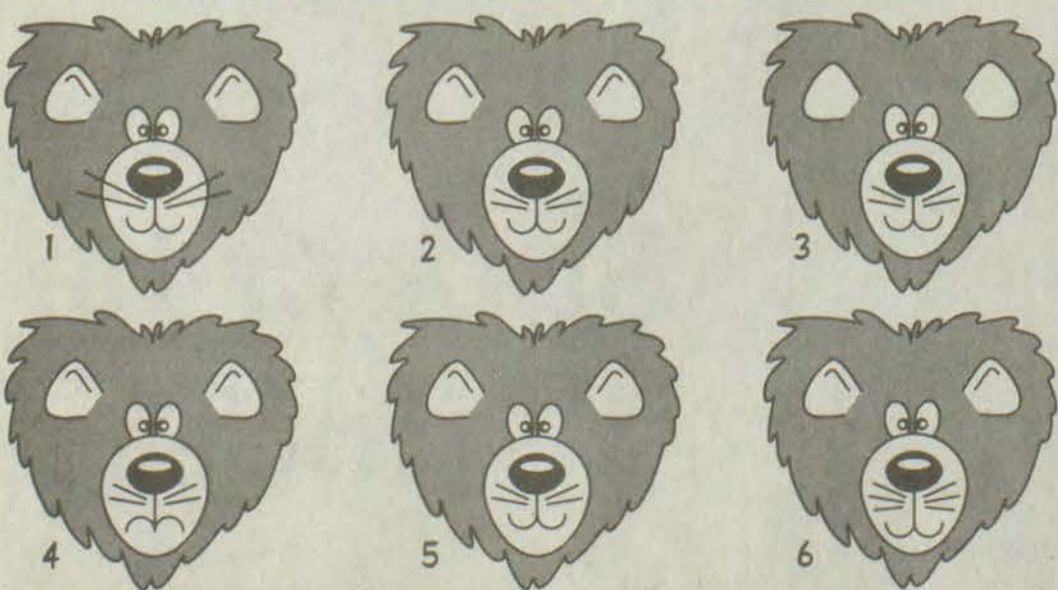

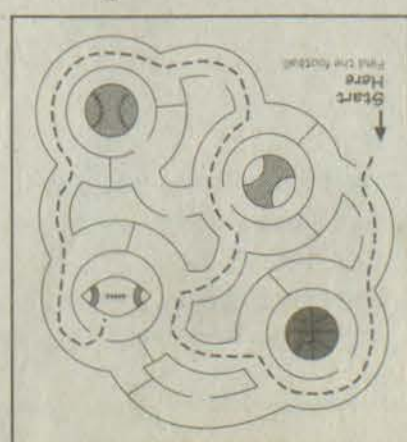
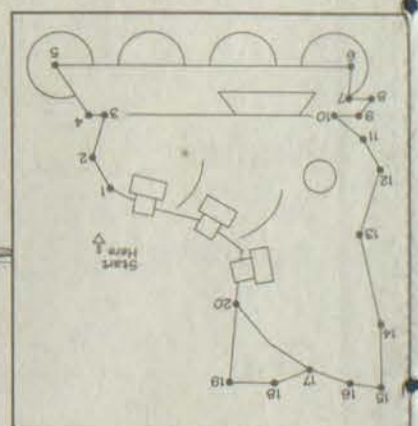
