Sheriff to get more officers

The US Department of Justice has OK'ed a grant of \$225,000 to the Floyd County Sheriff's Department to fund three additional law enforcement officers over a three-year period. The grant was announced by US Congressman Hal Rogers, who is chairman of the House Subcommittee that funds the crime fighting programs run by the Justice Department. Floyd County Sheriff John K. Blackburn has not yet received details of the grant.

sheriff Paul Hunt Thompson, cannot continue to serve under her husband, who took office in January.

County makes offer on Wheelwright gym

The Floyd County Fiscal Court is prepared to make an offer it hopes the local Board of Education cannot refuse.

After an executive session dur-

ing a special called meeting Wednesday, Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson said he and the county commissioners are willing to pay \$15,000 for the Wheelwright gym - with some strings attached.

Thompson said the fiscal court would ask the school board to re-

Union, and "anyone else the board deems necessary."

The \$15,000 figure, he said, represents the appraised value of the building.

The county has ambitious plans for the downstairs portion of the building. Thompson said he expects to spend some \$100,000 on renovations to create housing for volunteers who come into the area in the warmer months. (See related story.)

Thompson said he expects to use the first floor of the gym for housing from April to November and to open up the cafeteria and trophy area to community members who may want to use it for special activities during the other months.

The judge-executive anticipates using some grant money to accomplish the renovation of the proposed housing section of the gym.

Since the merger of Wheelwright and McDowell high schools into South Floyd High School six years ago, the Wheelwright gym has been used by elementary, middle school and community teams in the Left Beaver Creek area.

Housing volunteers

Floyd County Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson said 60 to 70 persons are already slated to be in the county on June 1 — most of them from the Appalachian Service Project of Johnson City, Tennessee - to begin work on improving housing for low-income area residents.

Don Akers, housing counselor for Appalachian Research. and Defense Fund (Appalred), is coordinating the effort to link volunteers with people who, have housing needs.

He has begun to screen local residents who need help in repairing their homes and cannot afford to hire someone to do it for them. (The service applies only to persons who own their own homes and not to tenant

McLemore comes 'home' to head resort park

When Mark McLemore took over as the new manager at Jenny Wiley State Resort Park Thursday, he was returning home.

"This is coming home," McLemore said at a reception hosted by park employees. "I look forward to getting involved with the park and with Prestonsburg ... Home for us (McLemore and his wife Linda) is in eastern Kentucky. We fell in love with eastern Kentucky, whether its Hazard, Corbin or Pineville.

About 10 years ago, McLemore was business manager at Jenny Wiley State Resort Park and he loved living in this area. His family hails from the Murray area of western Kentucky. He earned a degree in business management with a major in hotel management from Murray State University.

He started out as a clerk in a state park 20 years ago. He moved into the private industry field where he worked in the hotel business, including moving through the ranks in tion for their new the Holiday Inn chain.

McLemore returned to work in Kentucky State Parks and became the business manager at Jenny Wiley where he stayed for two years. He and his family then moved to Cumberland Falls.

"My goal was to become a park manager," he said in an interview Thursday. "A thought was always there that Jenny Wiley State Resort Park could be one of those places (to manage)."

McLemore achieved his goal and was promoted park manager to head Buckhorn State Park. His latest management was at Natural Bridge where he oversaw and took a hands-on approach to a \$5 million renovation project.

When he returned to Floyd County Thursday, he was greeted with open arms by park employees who had pooled their money for a banner displayed at the May Lodge entrance welcoming him and his wife back to the area. Employees also hosted a recep-

The new park manager said the sign made him "feel very humbled and very honored."

"I know these people are glad to see me. I feel that," he said:

He praised the employees, saying that he had worked with most of them when he was business manager at the park.

"I'm encouraged by the potential that's here ... More than anything else, it's the staff The staff is the key. They're the ones who do the work," McLemore said. "If I can give them the resources to do their job, then I've done my job."

The new manager said it's too early in his job for a plan of action, but he's got a few ideas in mind.

"He's already talking about upgrades. We talked about co-oping with other motels," Jim Goodman, directhe tor of Kentucky State Resort Park System, told employees and community members attending the reception.

jects to do, and professional organizations, among others.

"They bring in money for materials - and for spending - and it is important to support them for what they do in the community," Akers said

Kentucky Housing, which channels federal money into the state for housing for low-income persons, is funding Akers' position through Appalred.

Eddie Patton, the judge-executive's administrative assistant, is also working to get federal and state grant money to renovate the Wheelwright building for the volunteers. Patton worked with Kentucky Housing for several years and will be involved with the local effort to improve housing.

In fact, Patton said the county is looking at setting up a nonprofit agency to seek and accept grants and to coordinate home repairs. He said he has no idea how many houses in Floyd County qualify as substandard -- "too many to count."


He said the federal government generally ties the number to the percentage of persons living in poverty. In Floyd County, the number of households living below the poverty standard is estimated to be more than 30 percent.

Akers pointed out that a strength of the local housing program is its blending of federal, state and local resources, as well as the volunteers from the private sector.

Drugs no laughing matter, speaker says

"There's nothing funny about drugs, alcohol and violence" and "Having fun isn't supposed to kill us" were two of the many statements Russell Simon Jr., a Minnesota native and former prison inmate, tried to convey to the students at the four public county high schools on March 26.

Lola B. Ratliff, Floyd County Schools Title IV Coordinator, worked with Ernie Tackett of Opportunities Unlimited to set up this program called "Drugs, Prison, Gangs, Recovery and Success.

In his note to prospective audiences, Simon states, "I have a 'think straight' approach in which I tell people exactly how it is." And he does tell it like it is.

Simon built his talk around choices and decisions. It was the Friday before spring break and Simon told the students to think about their choices.

"I hope later you are not in this gym for two minutes of silence for a departed friend," he said, "because of a bad choice or decision."

Simon told the students, "As you sow, so shall you reap." He pleaded with them not to go down the same road he went and reminded them that it takes only about 10 knows where he is going when he

seconds to make a decision that dies. could destroy their lives.

Simon recounted how his family suffered from alcoholism and violence and how it indirectly led him to prison for assault with a deadly weapon during a drug fight. Simon said his father was a good father when he was sober but became a monster when he was drunk.

Simon painted a picture of prison that included violence. drugs, and rape. He said during his first day of prison life, other prisoners singled him out for a sex partner. He said he was never raped but received time in solitary confinement when he warded off a would-be attacker.

Simon told the students the way to deal with problems was to talk it over with someone. He said he didn't keep things inside anymore and neither should they. The saying "Big boys don't cry" is a burden placed on men, he said, because "Big boys (and men) do cry."

Simon said airing his problem, his AA meetings and his trust in God has helped him become a successful recovering drug addict. He said he had moments of "euphoric flashbacks" in which he could taste a drug.

At times like this, he said he depends on his friends and trust in God to get him through. He said he

domestic animals, and it was also a feeding ground for opossums on the pets' carcasses. There were found many pots. pans, and iron skillets.

In later years, it grew big and fat on washing machines. There boded wringer washing machines, automatic washers, clothes dryers, hair dryers and hair rollers. As it grew larger and older it became active during its life as a depository for all the name brand refrigerators: Sears, Kelvinator, Montgomery Ward, Cold Spot, Hot Spot, Hot Point, General Electric, and there was found a very elderly one named Crosby.

As the years went by, it became home to every make of television set that is imaginable. There were 12", 18" and the popular 21" screen television sets; of course, the screens were broken. Those were the good old days of black and white television.

In the later years the dump grew the large screens with olor. The table models were cast away for the large color consol floor sets. There was found one recent set that was the equal in size of a indoor movie screen when I was a boy growing up. In the very most recent years it became full grown on microwave ovens, tires, batteries, plastic hubcaps, and bags of garbage. Yes, there were several mattresses, standard, queen and king size. It became almost gorged on empty bottles of beer, pop, juice, and whiskey.

Over the years it was visited by many, far and near, to cast a few Styrofoam plates and cups. As the volunteer state work-

KFTC ADVOCATING BLACK MOUNTAIN

A statewide effort is underway to protect Black Mountain, Kentucky's biologically richest and tallest mountain from further strip mining. Kentuckians For The Commonwealth has filed a petition with the state of Kentucky to have approximately 21,000 acres of Black Mountain declared unsuitable for mining.

Black Mountain forms a significant portion of the headwaters of the Cumberland River. It contains several of the last remaining wild streams in Kentucky capable of supporting trout. It is home to Kentucky's only northern hardwoods forest, and a significant number of plants and animals that live nowhere else in Kentucky.

Surface mining on Black Mountain impacts water supplies and property values in the communities of the Clover Fork watershed, including Evarts. Strip mining on Black Mountain destroys what should be a part of the birthright of all Kentuckians.

Residents in Harlan County concerned about con-

tinued strip mining on the upper elevations of Black Mountain are asking that Floyd County citizens interested in protecting Black Mountain write a letter expressing their concerns and send it to: Protect Black Mountain, P.O. Box 482, Cumberland, Kentucky 40823.

These letters will be presented to state officials at a May 4 hearing on KFCT's petition to declare Black Mountain's upper reaches unsuitable for mining. Our goal is to receive a letter from every county in Kentucky and 2,000 letters total.

The meeting May 4 is at 6:30 p.m. at Black Mountain Elementary School in Kenvir in Harlan County and is open to the public. All are encouraged to attend.

KENTUCKY NEEDS TO LEARN FROM ITS READING SCORES

Kentucky heard some good news about itself a few weeks ago. For the first time ever, Kentucky's fourth grade reading scores surpassed the national average on the nation's most reliable test.

That news comes from the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP), the national organization that gives the tests. Kentucky was one of than Kentucky children. only three states whose scores increased

other two states were Connecticut and Colorado. Only Connecticut made a big- OUT Schools family visits to libraries: ger improvement in its score. Only eight

states had average scores that were significantly higher than Kentucky. Meanwhile, scores for the nation stayed the same, and scores for the southeast region dropped by one point.

This is great news for Kentucky. It shows we're making progress.

This news is even more special because Kentucky teachers are swimming against the current when it comes to reading. Researchers have proved that test scores go down for every hour of television a child watches. Kentucky children watch more television

than do students in most other states, read less for fun, and visit their local libraries less often.

In its most recent collection of figures about education, the National Center for Educational Statistics looked at television watching as part of a study on reading proficiency. Only four other states have more fourth grade children who watch TV longer

Surprising? Not really. About 900,000 Kentucky adults are in the lowest categories of literacy. Since records have been kept, Kentucky has been low, compared to other states, in the portion of its population that graduated from high school. About 16 percent graduated in 1940, for instance.

In many Kentucky households, the odds are high that adults didn't finish high school. Even those who

pose, have banks named after a local person? More peculiar, after a woman?

And for the words to be juxtaposed in such a precise way. Not the "Bank of Josephine," as some organization miswrites in its news releases. Not the "Josephine Bank," which sounds, well, not quite right. But The (capital T) Bank Josephine. What dignity! What resonance! What an honor for a very special lady!

That's not the only reason I am saddened by the name change. Nor is the fact that my own checks now have to be changed.

Even though I grew up in Johnson County, I grew up knowing about The Bank Josephine. It figured prominently in my grandmother's dream when she was a young wife and mother. I had the fortune to hear her tell the story many times, to share her hope and to mourn its loss.

My grandfather, Daniel Ward, worked for Northeast Coal in Auxier, and he and my grandmother started raising their young family in a coal camp house even before the windows were in, she would tell me.

They both wanted, however, to have their own farm, probably in the generous bottomlands in northern Johnson County where her family, the Castles, had settled a century or more before.

She said he ordered books about new farming techniques and read the agriculture sections of the Courier-Journal and the Cincinnati Post. She was adamant about the more primitive methods of growing by the moon and the signs of the zodiac.

They lived frugally and saved every penny that they could. They kept a cow on the old Ford farm on the edge of the coal camp and sold the milk they didn't use. They raised chickens and made money with the eggs.

She and her mother, who lived on Marrowbone in Pike County and visited several times a year, sewed all the clothes the family needed. And she took in washing to earn additional money.

On payday at the mining company, she took a percentage of Dan's pay and her own earnings and walked on the railroad track to Prestonsburg to deposit the money in a savings account at The Bank Josephine. This would have been somewhere between 1908 and 1915, certainly before 1920.

I picture her walking briskly on the track, a tiny woman, less than five feet tall, in a long, colorful dress, her black

just fall further behind, if they don't read well. I'll bet that at least one in every three of Kentucky 10-yearolds are in this group.

If reading is fundamental-and it is-we need to make even more progress if we want every Kentucky student to reach high academic achievement levels. Too often, the decisions we as parents make at home about reading to our children, watching television, or going to the library don't help our children learnto read. This is no excuse for teachers. Kentucky teachers, in fact, are starting to overcome these obstacles. (Poor children in Kentucky, for instance, did better on the NAEP test than those across the nation.) But all this tells us that schools have to pay more attention and make stronger efforts to reach all Kentucky children.

We know from test results that academic achievement in middle school and high school has not gone up as much as it has in elementary school. Lots of folks believe this difference in achievement scores is because, by the time youngsters reach middle school, too many of them are behind in reading. When these students start to deal with more complicated written material in social studies, history, science, or math, they don't read well enough to handle it.

Some skills-reading and writing-need lots more attention. In Kentucky, where not enough adults are literate, teachers must teach reading more skillfully than in other states when more adults can read well, where children read at home, and where people watch less television and visit libraries more often. Kentucky has to work harder and

smarter to catch up. We have to teach reading better, using what we know from our test results. As parents and grandparents, we need to read to our children, beginning when they are infants, and we need to limit television watching.

Kentucky reading test scores. like those from NAEP, prove the hard work of the past few years will pay off. We just need more of it. Robert F. Sexton is executive director of the Prichard Committee for Academic Excellence.

Over 34 years after tragedy, family finds lost nephew

A Magoffin County native and his wife were killed in an automobile accident in September Magoffin 1966, leaving behind a 17-month-old son who survived the crash. Almost exactly 34 years later, that son has been reunited with his father's family.

John Samuel Conley, the son of John Henry Conley and his wife Barbara, lived through the accident that claimed the lives of

his parents. He was raised by an adoptive family. Conley's parents were residing in Ohio at the time of

their deaths, but their roots led to the Falcon area of Magoffin County. His paternal uncles, Roy H. and Ray W. Conley, lost contact with the family raising John in the early 1970s.

Both held on to the dream of finding their nephew. Ray died last June, but Roy continued the search. That search eventually paid off and, in February, Roy and his family traveled to Ohio to meet John, who is an airline pilot, and share their family history with him. - The Salversville Independent
