# Water cleanup more promising Congressman Hal Rogers is

# **Former Auxier PTO** president indicted, along with 3 others

Yavonda Lazar, former president of the Parent-Teacher Association at Auxier Elementary School, was indicted this week on sex-related charges involving minors. Three others were indicted on charges related to the circumstance in which Lazar was involved.

Lazar, 29, was accused last summer of sex crimes involving underage youth at a party at Jenny Wiley State Resort Park after the elementary school's last graduation. The school was closed at the end of the 1997-98 school year.

A Floyd County Grand Jury returned indictments Wednesday against Lazar, whose current address is listed as Thelma in Johnson County; Lola McCoy, 35, of Second Avenue in Auxier; Paul

Rowe, 37, of Ward Avenue in Auxier, and Debbie Rowe, 35, also of Ward Avenue in Auxier.

For incidents that allegedly took place on June 8, 1998, Lazar was indicted on 11 counts. They include

· three counts of first-degree sexual abuse by subjecting unnamed minors to sexual contact through use of forcible compulsion, a Class D felony;

· four counts of first-degree unlawful transaction with a minor by knowingly inducing minors to engage in illegal sexual activity, a Class B felony; and

· four counts of third-degree unlawful transaction with a minor by procuring alcoholic beverages for minors, a Class A misdemeanor.

McCoy was indicted on eight counts. They include four counts of criminal facilitation, which is a

# Allen Central student charged

### Times Staff Report

An Allen Central High School student was arrested by Kentucky State Police Wednesday on a terroristic threatening charge.

The incident followed the discovery of six .38 caliber bullets on the floor of a stall in a boys'

restroom at the school in Eastern. The 14-year-old juvenile was not charged in connection with the

bullets, the KSP report said. ACHS Principal Patricia

Maynard called KSP Post 9 in Pikeville shortly after 9 a.m. to report the finding of the bullets. Troopers Rick Conn and Mike

Thorpe worked with school officials and officers of the Floyd County Sheriff's Department to conduct a search of the school.

According to the KSP report, they searched students' lockers. purses, backpacks and outer garments. No other ammunition and no weapons were found.

It was during the search that the student allegedly made threats toward police officers and minority groups, the report said. Terroristic threatening is a Class A misdemeanor that, for an adult, can carry a 12-month jail sentence.

The student was taken to Floyd District Court, charged and released to his parents, according to Interim School Superintendent Woody Carter.

Maynard said, in a prepared statement, that "all necessary actions are being taken by the school concerning the student's behavior.

She said, "You can be assured that all threats, jokingly made or otherwise, will not be taken lightly, and all precautions will be taken to ensure student safety."

Trooper Conn said the confiscated bullets have been forwarded to the KSP forensic lab for fingerprint analysis.

# **Family seeks judgment from** city and insurance company

The tragic death of a child last August has led to a formal complaint, filed in Floyd Circuit Court, against the City of Prestonsburg and the California Casualty Insurance Co

Prestonsburg firefighter Timothy D. Blackburn and his wife Tami are claiming that the city's negligence resulted in the death of their young son, Adam Patrick Blackburn.

The six-year-old child, who was also the grandson of long-time Prestonsburg Fire Chief Tom Blackburn, was crushed when he was pinned between a van and a fire truck at the fire department's North Lake Drive station on August 29.

In making the negligence charge,

Pikeville said the child should not have been able to get into an unlocked 1984 Chevrolet van, which he did.

The child apparently got out of the van and it began to roll, because, according to the complaint, it was parked in a "grossly negligent manner" which allowed it to "roll freely and independently" and to fatally injure the child.

The complaint claims the city and the fire department failed to "provide reasonable or adequate safeguards against the potential hazards to minor children on the premises.

The attorney, in the complaint, ties in the fire department's proximity to Prestonsburg Elementary School and the alleged potential for

Attorney William Johnson of school children to wander onto the city property and gain access to unlocked vehicles.

> Using the van as a case in point, the complaint says it was "left unguarded, unlocked, unscotched, and unattended near the public road and public elementary school." Johnson added Wednesday that he thinks this is particularly dangerous because children are attracted to the red fire trucks and related vehicles.

The complaint insists the city was negligent for allegedly permitting children "to play on, about, around, or in the vicinity of the equipment; Failing to warn children, especially Adam Patrick Blackburn, of the dangers involved in playing upon or in the vicinity of

# Wife of official wants court to decide on status

The Floyd County Sheriff's wife wants to get paid for her work and she's seeking help from the court system to do so.

Pamela Blackburn has petitioned Floyd County Circuit Court to review - and reverse a judgment of the county's Ethics Commission that her employment in her husband's office violates the nepotism section of the local Ethics Code.

She is also asking that she be given back pay for the time she has assisted Sheriff John K. Blackburn since he took office on

January 1.

When the sheriff first brought the issue of his wife's employment before the Ethics Commission in January, Pam Blackburn agreed to work without pay until the matter was resolved, with the understanding that if her employment was approved she would be paid for time worked.

Pam Blackburn's case floats in the gray, murky area that shrouds matters of ethics.

She was hired as a deputy by former sheriff - now judge-executive - Paul Hunt Thompson last November. Her husband was

# ostmaster retires after 47 years

In many small communities, the post office is the heart of the community. The postmaster then becomes a fixture in the lives of the people in the community.

The citizens of Dwale (ZIP code 41621) will tell you that has been the case with Pamela M. Elkins who has served the community for the past 27 years as the postmaster for the local office.

Elkins has been at the newer post office, located near US 23, for the past 18 years. Up until that time, the post office was located in a business farther away from the main highway exit. The post office then was operated from her husband's business, Elkins Grocery.

Through the years the post office has been operated out of such businesses as Dwale Coal Company Store, J. P. Lavens Lumber Company office, Willie Clifton Store, and, at one time, a trailer.

Elkins worked for 20 years as an assistant at the Dwale Post Office, making some 47 years of service to the people of Dwale.

Last Friday, friends, post office patrons, and postal employees from other post offices celebrated Elkins retirement and reminisced about events and changes that have occurred in Dwale during Elkins' tenure.

"Pam was always encouraging young people to work hard and realize their dreams," said Rita Davis Stumbo, who lives next door to the post office and helped plan the celebration.

"Pam was always helping people fill out bills, money orders and just helping any way that she could," added Donna Branham.

Gary Mitchell, who is the pastor of the church that Elkins attends, described her as "a Godly Christian

woman.

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



# Some better paths are chosen

A government-sponsored study indicates that alcohol is involved in two of every five traffic deaths. In the early 1980s, it was three of every five. Another study indicates that movies and television programs continue to be saturated with images of people engaging in substance abuse, including the abuse of alcohol.

Could it be that people watch movies and television without aping every form of pathologic behavior they observe?

Certainly, the two studies are subject to interpretation. If they truly reflect a drop in drunken driving, the cause is subject to speculation. But one thing is clear even from casual observation. Whether or not there's a lot of drinking on the screen, drunkenness, to a large extent, has been deglamorized in mainstream society.

Time was when a cocktail party was an opportunity to throw a few back. Now some people order a cola or a white wine and carry it around, sipping, until the napkin it came with is tattered and crumpled.


Time was when a jolly inebriate was the symbol of good times, good fellowship, a good host. Now the fellow guests tend to get nervous and embarrassed at the first sign of impairment. The hostess wonders if she will be sued if Fred runs over someone's doghouse on the way out of the neighborhood.

Winos are no longer comic figures. They are accurately recognized as part of the substance-abusing homeless. Old clips of Dean Martin, joking about double images and hangovers, seem dated.

There are exceptions. Binge drinking, which teenagers and college students of an earlier generation considered unmanly, as in "that poor slob can't hold his liquor," now seems to be treated as both manly and womanly in those groups.

But in some other groups, the culture seems to have shifted in the direction of more healthful drinking.

This is gratifying for a number of reasons. Perhaps too much fretting over the role-modeling of televised drinkers is a waste of time. People were enjoying and

# **OBSERVE INTERNATIONAL MIGRATORY BIRD DAY**

Editor:

In the month of May, hundreds of thousands of migratory birds take wing, returning to their breeding grounds, passing through the Southeast. This month, you may catch a glimpse of warblers, shorebirds and thrushes, to name but a few.

What you won't see are the many challenges that migratory birds face on their annual journey. So many, in fact, that the second Saturday in May is set aside each year as International Migratory Bird Day. to focus attention on this beautiful and fragile resource.

For the vast majority of people, birds represent their sole everyday contact with wildlife. Birds connect all of us, from city dwellers to suburbanites to country would be like without the incredible beauty rural farmers with the natural world. Migratory birds are an excellent indicator of the overall health of an ecosystem. When bird species are declining, we should be concerned. Habitat that benefits birdsparks, greenways and wetlands-also contribute to the quality of the human environment. Migratory birds provide significant economic benefits. An estimated 63 million Americans participate in birdwatching, generating more than \$20 billion annually. In fact, birdwatching is one of the fasted growing recreational activities in the United States, outpacing golf and rivaling gardening in terms of numbers of participants.


300 species of birds regularly visit or live in the Southeast Region. This is close to half of all bird species found in North America, north of Mexico.

The vast majority are nongame, migratory species. The Southeast supports 60 percent of all migratory bird species-"neotropical migrants"-that breed in North America and migrate to and from the tropics during winter.

Many bird species are in decline due to habitat loss, collision with man-made objects and predation from domestic animals. To survive, they must cross boundaries of eco-system, states, and nations, so protecting them must be a cooperative effort.

On May 8, take a few minutes to think what this and the rich biodiversity that birds provide.

# Callbacks

I have never liked telephones, at least not since I was a teen-ager, back when kids were not allowed to hang out on the streets and hoot and holler until the wee hours.

I once had a night-owl boss who would call his minions at all hours, including midnight or 1 a.m. or later. (He did not come into the office until 10 or 11 in the morning, but he would check to make sure that we were there at 8.)

Sometimes the calls began, "Pam, I've got a great idea I want to run by you." And, sometimes, they started with my name, a pause, and something like, "I'm really disappointed ... This is intolerable ... What were you thinking?"

I grew to loathe the sound of the phone. The very first ping! of the ringer sent chills up my spine and moaning into my mouth. I taught myself back then to ignore the ringing. At first, after letting a phone ring out. I would scurry to dial my friends to make sure they hadn't just called. Then, answering machines came into being to solve that problem. I've pretty much recuperated from that. That boss long ago went out of my life and I moved from that place. Despite the answering machine, I generally answer the phone when I'm home. What I hate about phones now is when I'm trying to reach someone and have to sit through a jumble of prerecorded messages, straining to make sure I understand the instructions. Monday morning was a frustrating case in point. Having received the money for my totaled car ("moderate" damage from the wreck almost two months ago) and having located a decent replacement, I began the process of purchase. Of course, if you've ever bought a car, you understand the juggling act that involves securing insurance for a car that you don't yet own and that you can't own until you prove you have insurance. I began by calling the number listed on my policy for my insurance agent. Turns out the number is somewhere in cyberspace — a centralized data collector located in Omaha or Dallas or Des Moines who takes information for agents in the rest of the country. Instead of my calling the agent directly, I call her and tell her everything and then she calls him and tells him what I have told her. Later, after he reads the e-mail message from the data collector, he calls me to get the additional facts I didn't know when I talked with her. I then called the bank, but there are no people there yet. Rather, I listen to a recording telling me that no one is in and what the hours are at every branch. When I do get through, I talk to two different persons before I contact the one I want, even though I asked for her by name. This done, I call the person I'm buying the car from and get the answering machine. After the message plays, telling me to leave my own

abusing alcohol long before the first cathode tube burped to life. They would continue to enjoy it, and sometimes to abuse it, even if a Y2K problem or a runaway virus darkened every screen in the land forever.

But it also means that people can change. It means that lives are being saved. It means that other cultural changes may be possible - the further deglamorization of smoking, for instance - without resorting to police-state tactics.

It means that tougher penalties for drunken driving and better enforcement have had the desired impact of getting people to look at their behavior, and not only look at it but change it when advisable. - Omaha, Nebraska, World-Herald

Last week I shook my head in dismay as I read the latest letter of attack by the renowned characterassassin and your ex-officio editor, Lloyd "Blue" Goble. I must respond. All of the quotes in this letter are from Mr. Goble's past letters published by your paper

Years ago he regularly took to task the local school board and politicians. Months ago, he inexplicably turned on Christians and "churches." He bitterly described the local churches as having "nearly demonic" preachers, controlled by "coal barons" and "politicians."

Church meetings, according to Mr. Goble, included the regular interaction and bargaining between the church members and the political powers, whereby the churches delivered votes, and politicians rewarded them by taking care of speeding tickets and delivering blacktop. uncommon, and unethical, for a college president to offer an instructor the opportunity to return for another year of teaching, and then renege on that offer. This is exactly what I believe Dr. Floyd did-and I have the e-mail to prove it.

From August through October of last year I competently completed my teaching duties and worked extensively on upgrading the college's web site. In fact, Dr. Floyd was so pleased with my work on the web site that in October she asked me to showcase the college's web. site at the PCC Board of Directors meeting. After attending that meeting, Dr. Floyd sent me an e-mail, dated October 30, in which she thanked me for "the good work" I had done on the college's web site.

At the end of her e-mail, Dr. Floyd asked me: "Are you interested in coming back to PCC next year? You are on a one year contract, right?" Based on Dr. Floyd's e-mail I believed, in good faith, that if I continued to competently perform my job duties, my one-year contract would be renewed, or that I would have the full support of the president for the regular, full-time position-which is all I would have ultimately needed to be rehired because, as Mr. Elliott's article reveals, it is the administration (i.e. the president), according to Dr. Floyd, that makes the final choice. "with input from faculty."

After reading Mr. Elliott's article it seems fair to conclude that Dr. Floyd has changed her position on my rehiring. In addition, she now appears to support the idea of replacing me with an instructor with a Ph.D., something that was apparently unimportant to her in October of last year. This change should have nothing to do with my job performance, because I received a positive performance evaluation in December and have continued to perform my job duties competently this semester.

Ultimately, I have little reason to doubt that Dr. Floyd's change of heart came because of remarks, 1 made during the January 1999 All-College Meeting. During that meeting I criticized certain policies of the administration. After that meeting, Dr. Floyd quickly severed me from my authority as the web master for the college's web site and also demanded that I return the computer she had given to me to use in my job duties.

Now to complete what I perceive to be her retaliation for my criticism of the administration, she is apparently reneging on her offer to have me return next fall.

Finally, with respect to a Deborah Lewis who called The Times to say "I agree with the dismissal of Mr. Kerr ...," it should be pointed out that to the best of my knowledge, Ms. Lewis has never enrolled in, or completed a course. under my direction. Therefore, I am unclear as to how Ms. Lewis has come to her conclusions.

I am hopeful that this letter clarifies why both myself and my students are disheartened by the college's failure to rehire me and why I personally feel a great injustice has been done, both to me and the students I serve.

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

school, give up my dream of becoming a writer and go to work at some job I hated to pay the forthcoming hospital bills and buy diapers and formula.

My journal reflects my innermost thoughts during those days, put down on paper for no one's eyes but my own, handwritten in sloppy, unedited drafts.

I knew I should be disheartened. Yet here's what I wrote from my courthouse to take the written test UK office on Monday, Oct. 11, 1982;

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
