Prestonsburg business a total loss



Mike's B & W went up in flames in the early hours of Friday morning. The business was located on North Lake Drive in Prestonsburg. Firefighters were on the scene for most of the day Tuesday. Traffic had to be rerouted due to the location of the nearest fire hydrant, which was on the opposite side of the road. Mike Williams had owned the business for 21 years.

When the call came into the Prestonsburg Fire Department at 3:30 a.m. last Friday, Mike's B & W on North Lake Drive had already been burning for some time.

"It (the fire) had a real good head start on the guys," said city fire inspector Larry Adams, referring to the local force of firefighters who were at the scene until mid-afternoon.

Traffic on the busy thoroughway had to be re-routed until around 11 a.m. since the closest fire hydrants were on the opposite side of the road, Adams said. A hydrant on May's Branch in back of Pizza Hut

was also used.

The electronics retail store, automobile repair shop and all the inventory were a total loss. The business is owned by Mike Williams and the building by P.D. Pelphrey of Johnson County, according to Adams.

An insurance representative has estimated the loss of the building at about \$113,000, said Adams. Business owner Williams said yesterday he could not estimate his loss because all his inventory records were on a computer that was destroyed in the fire. "My hard drive is gone with all the inventory," he said.

Williams, who lives at Wittensville in Johnson County, has been in business in

Prestonsburg since 1978 and at the burned-out location for almost six years. "Twenty-one years was gone in five hours," he said.

The cause of the fire has not yet been determined, but Adams said he has been able to pinpoint the place where it started within a four foot square area.

Before he can do much more inspection into the cause of the fire, Adams said insurance inspectors will have to examine the damage, and then the section of the roof that burned and fell over the suspected starting point will have to be removed.

Adams said that despite the building's bricked exterior, it was a "basic 2x4 construction," and as the fire progressed the double roof



caved in. The fact that it had a double roof "made it worse," Adams said. "The heavy units on the roof brought it right down."

What made the fire even harder to fight, the inspector said, was the large amount of plastic materials in the electronic appliances that

the store sold. "It's not hazardous until it burns," he said. "We ended up with some pretty toxic stuff."

"We were fortunate not to have any injuries," Adams said, "because of the danger of the rooftop units and the poisons in the air."

Inspector tells school to fix flooring ASAP

Reporting conditions that the Floyd County Board of Education is aware of and has made plans to correct, the Floyd County Health Department last week cited Prestonsburg Elementary School for safety hazards in the auditorium and other violations.

Lack of gutters or other rain removal devices has allowed water to seep under the flooring of the auditorium over the years, and the floor near one of the exits has begun to rot. Another section of the auditorium has a buckle in the flooring.

According to the School Inspection Report, the floor has insufficient strength for walking. This part of the building is marked "Do Not Enter." While keeping students away from that part of the room, the school continues to use the auditorium.

According to the report, the condition must be corrected within 10 days of the inspection date, May 27.

At its last meeting, the Local Planning Committee (LPC) identified Prestonsburg Elementary as one of the schools that needs major maintenance work. Similar conditions exist at John M. Stumbo Elementary.

The committee agreed that the conditions causing the problem must be fixed before the floor would be repaired. This will require water removal procedures and may even call for a new roof.

The inspection report also cited the boys' bathroom for bad ceiling repair, cracked plaster and unclean walls.

The report also said the lighting in the hallway was not adequate. According to the report, 20 foot-candles or more of light must be in the area. The report did not indicate the level of foot-candles at the present time.

Cocaine found at Prater

A warrant for the return of a \$3,000 gold piece led law enforcement officers to an alleged cocaine dealer last week.

Floyd County Sheriff John K. Blackburn, Deputy Ricky Thornsberry and Deputy Matthew Slone went to serve a warrant on David Hurst, 33, of Orchard Branch on Prater Creek, and uncovered a supply of cocaine and other drugs valued at over \$20,000 Thursday evening.

Blackburn said he had a warrant for the gold piece and when he asked Hurst if he could conduct a search, Hurst first told him no. Blackburn then told Hurst he could get a search warrant, and Hurst agreed to the search.

Included in the confiscated items was \$2317 in cash in denominations of \$5, \$10, \$20 and \$100.

In addition to the cocaine, several pills of the prescription drug Loritab were taken.

Hurst was taken to the Floyd County Detention Center where he was charged with possession and

trafficking in cocaine and theft by unlawful taking in connection with the gold piece.

Hurst was released Friday from the jail on a \$30,000 bond, 10 percent cash.

Mother says school system responsible for student failure

Her son reportedly missed 78 days of school last year and failed his courses at Prestonsburg High School. Now, Lucy Burchett is holding the school system responsible for not informing her of the son's absenteeism.

The Prestonsburg woman has filed a complaint in Floyd Circuit Court, contending school officials were negligent for failing to tell her that her son, Lary Calhoun Jr., was missing so much school.

The suit names the Floyd County Board of Education, former Superintendent Michael King, former Prestonsburg High School Principal Thomas Tackett, teacher Elizabeth Frazier and the pupil personnel staff in the system's main office.

Burchett's attorney, Jerry Patton, said it is his under-

standing that his client received "no notification whatsoever" of her son's repeated absences, which amounted to more than 15 weeks spread out over the school year.

The complaint contends that Tackett, who has since retired as principal, "was ultimately responsible for (the student's) supervision while at said school."

It also says that Frazier, who was the student's home-room teacher, had the "duty ... to properly supervise him and monitor his absenteeism..."

School system Interim Superintendent Woodrow Carter said last week that PHS officials have records indicating that they did attempt to reach Burchett, the mother, on numerous occasions but were unsuccessful.

Burchett is asking the court for a judgment to cover "past, present and future mental and physical pain, suffering and anguish, future lost wages, medical and hospital bills, expenses and costs."

MSU library to be closed for two weeks

Morehead State University's Camden-Carroll Library will be closed to the public for two weeks, beginning July 31 and running through August 15, as it converts to a new online library system.

The library's current Unicorn system will be replaced by Voyager, which is the new statewide system approved by the Council on Postsecondary Education through the Kentucky Commonwealth Virtual Library, according to Larry Besant, MSU director of libraries.

"This advance notice will allow all our users to plan for this period when the library will not be available," he said. "Early August is a busy time, not only for MSU faculty members, but also for public school teachers in the region, who prepare for the next term by researching materials and planning special projects."

When MSU classes begin in the fall, the users will have access to many new databases as well as access to other libraries in the state, Besant said. "With a single online search, a vast pool of resources will be readily available."

During the two-week period, all services will be upgraded to be fully operational and staff will be trained on Voyager by August 15, Besant noted. MSU and KCVL will offer online or individual training and class instruction.

Besant is hopeful that the transition will be a smooth one, as this is the third major upgrade to its online system in the last

decade. The library first went online in the late 1980s, when the card catalog was replaced. However, Besant expects few problems because "our technical staff and users are among the

most experienced in the state." To prepare for the changeover, patrons of MSU's library are being asked to return all materials and pay all fees before Friday, July 30.

David School held its graduation ceremonies on Thursday at its new facility at David.

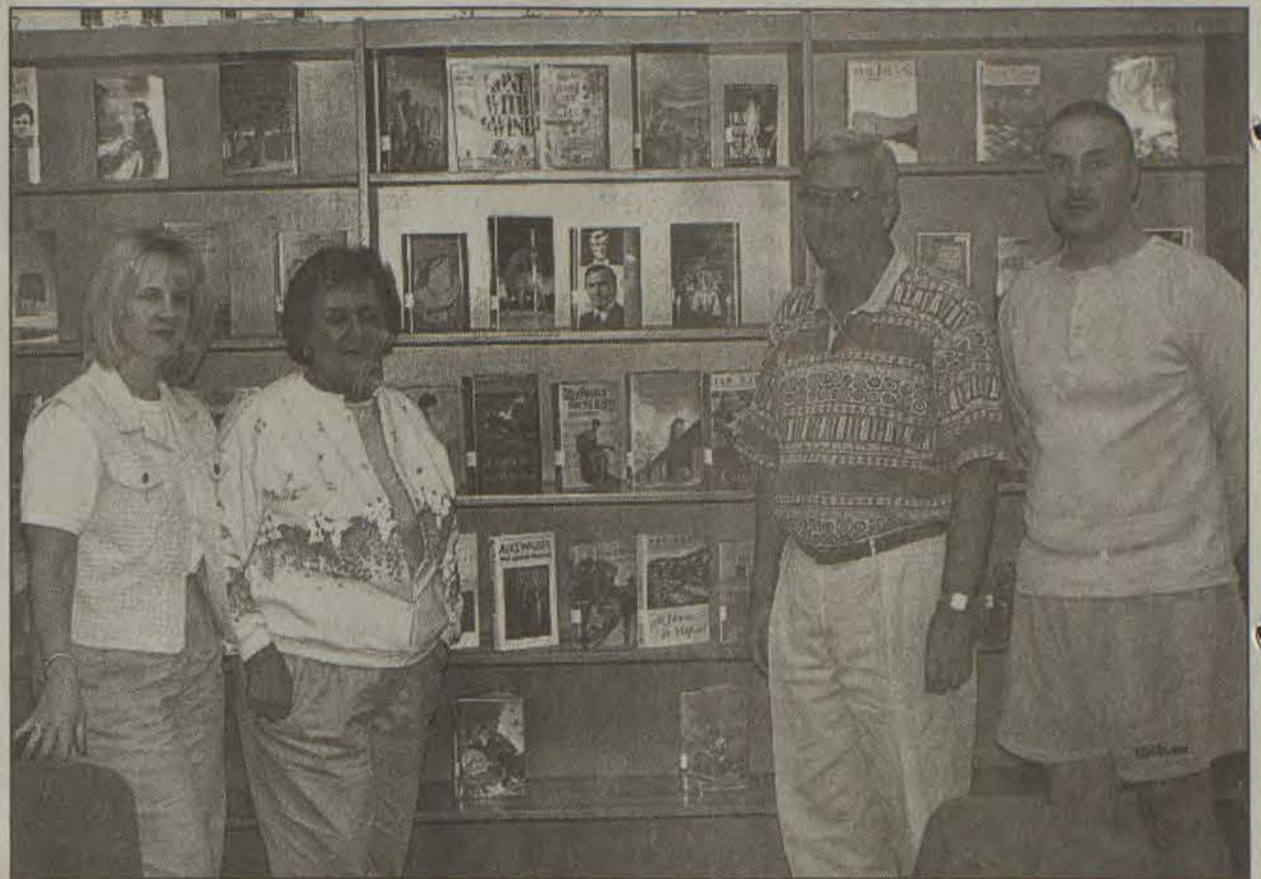

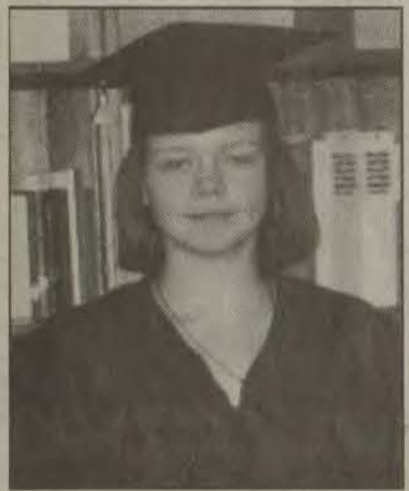
Prestonsburg and Johnny Robinson of Ypsilanti, Michigan.

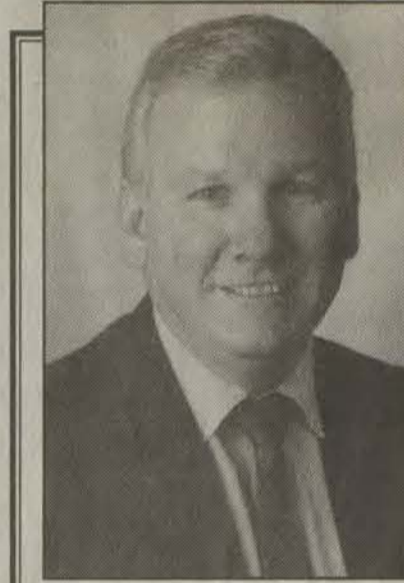

'It's official 'Josephine' is retiring

Editorial Listing

We've been reading lists, again, and wondering, again, why we don't see more Floyd Countians and more eastern Kentuckians on them — the good ones, at least.

For instance, this year's crop of Leadership Kentucky participants was released a couple of weeks ago. Of the 52 members of the "Class of 1999," only three persons are from eastern Kentucky. One from Hazard, one from Ashland and one from Morehead. None from the Big Sandy area.

The East Kentucky Leadership Conference has started a local version of the statewide training program, and that's well and good. But we should have more than three persons from this region rising to the top among candidates for the larger program. And, goodness knows, we need more and better leaders.

Some eastern Kentucky police departments were represented on the list of agencies that were to participate in Operation ABC Mobilization: America Buckles Up Children, but none were from Floyd County.

The departments that did participate vowed to have "zero tolerance" for drivers who did not properly restrain child passengers in their vehicles between May 24 and May 31. With traffic crashes reportedly the leading cause of death for children in this country, were our police saying that Floyd County children are less precious by not participating in this promotion? We hope not.

When the list came out earlier this year of 48 worker training projects funded by Bluegrass State Skills, only one was in eastern Kentucky. All of the projects to improve the skills of Kentucky workers and make them more marketable were developed by community and technical colleges.

The only program funded on this side of the divide was at Hazard Technical College, and, at \$615, it was the smallest of all the grants. Could it be we have no need of skills training in these parts?

Then, on the list of schools participating in KET's Safe Night Kentucky on June 5, none is in Floyd County. The event, planned in conjunction with the University of Kentucky Cooperative Extension, is part of a nationwide effort to promote non-violent behavior and to prevent substance abuse. The list is old now, so we hope some local schools and groups have been added.

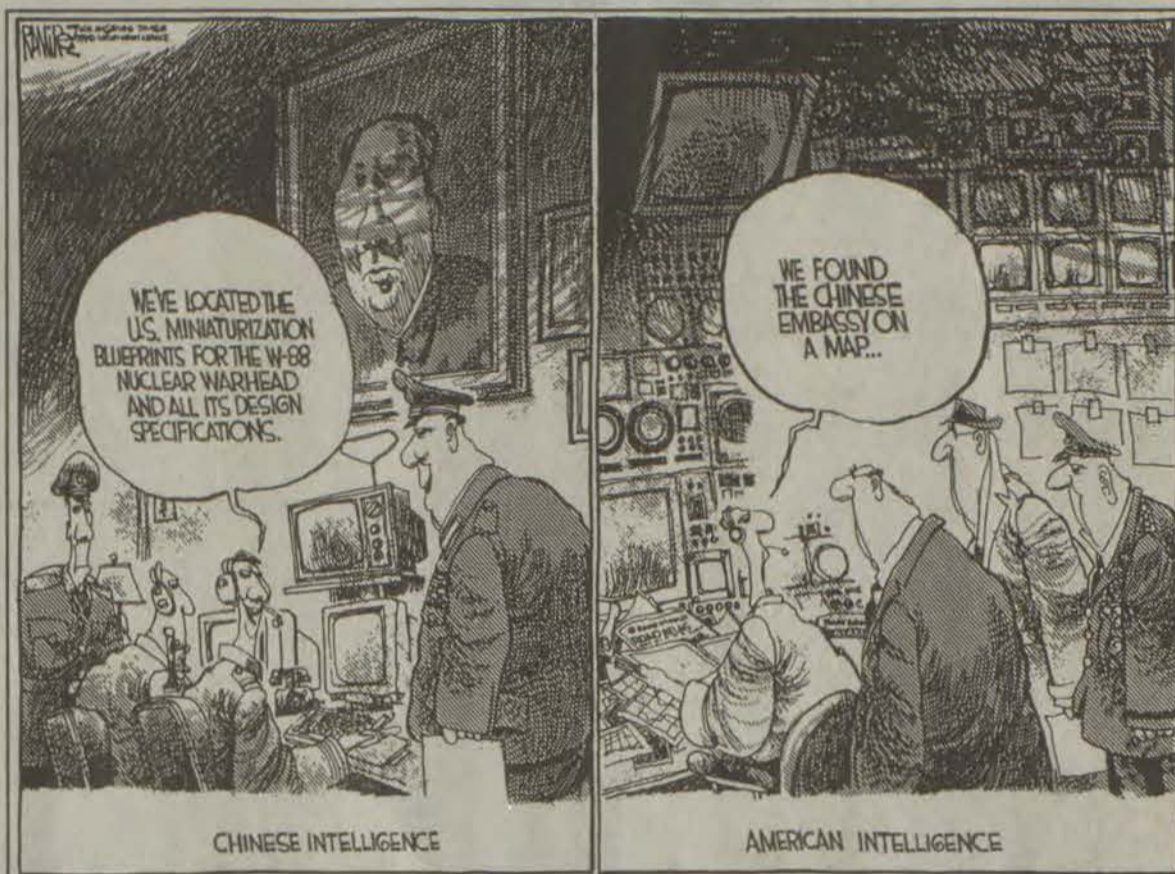
Just yesterday, the fax machine brought news of the latest round of Early Reading Incentive Grants for 24 projects across the state that hope to improve reading skills of primary-level students. A mere four are for schools on this side (Clay, Perry and Wolfe counties and Pikeville Independent). None goes to Floyd County.

Although we know this section of the state has not always received equal consideration when programs have been developed and prizes have been awarded, there's the possibility that sometimes we don't do enough to help ourselves.

Perhaps we don't always compete like we should for grants. Perhaps we're reluctant to take on one more project, even if it's for the public good. Perhaps we lack the skills and the leadership to participate.

We still don't have any answers, but we surely would like to see more local names and organizations on the good lists.

Say 'cheese'

I have a suggestion for each Floyd County school: At the start of next year or shortly into the year, each school should find some way to purchase a good camera for the school. Cameras that produce sharp images (if used properly) can be purchased for less than \$250 and that includes the flash.

If you want to go for a more expensive model, go for it. But remember who will be using these instruments. Camera equipment is not as forgiving as computers. The camera could be stored in the principal's office until it is needed and returned after each session.

That's only a start. A camera in a box is like a computer in a box — impressive-looking but non-productive. Teach children — yes, I said children — to use the camera. Give them some basic lessons and an owner's manual and they will be showing the instructor tricks in a few weeks. Teachers know how it is with computers — it'll work the same way with cameras.

At the elementary school level, the children would need to be fourth or fifth graders. (Fourth would be a good place to start the use of cameras so these children and their classmates could use it in some of their portfolio pieces.)

Remember, we are teaching these kids to do "real-world" writing. Well, much real-world writing includes photographs. In fact, the photographs may be the impetus that gets the child to work harder on his writing. Stranger things have happened.

Buying cameras will accomplish at least two important goals. First and foremost, it will open one more window of opportunity for students. Students can go on to make photography part of their vocation or they can take it with them as an avocation (hobby).

I took up photography in the middle of my teaching career and used it many times in school, and it certainly came in handy when I came to work for the paper. I was ready to take photographs the first day I was here. In fact, I had submitted photos to the papers for many years.

A second benefit is students can take photographs for stories they want in the paper. Many times we don't have photographs to accompany stories because we can't possibly cover all the schools all the time.

Photo Magic will develop the film for \$2 per roll (be it 12, 24 or 36 frames). The paper can pick a negative for the story and then return all negatives to the school. Teachers or principal then can decide if they want some of the negatives printed. Remember for \$2, you only get a roll of negatives.

If time is not a factor and getting to Prestonsburg is a problem, the film can be mailed to processors very inexpensively. They can even put the images on disk and the students can work with them on the computer.

Think what a wonderful success story it would be if some student became a Paula Goble, a Steve Porter or an Ed Taylor because he/she had access to a camera in the public schools.

I know what some of you are going to say, "We already have those things." Great. Now put them in the hands of students and let them produce images that we can use with their school stories.

"If we get a camera, will you help the kids?" I thought you would never ask.

Local housing authority is a winner

The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Kentucky State Office has informed Executive Director Patsy Ryan that the Housing Authority of Floyd County has earned a perfect score on its Public Housing Management Assessment Program (PHMAP) for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1998.

A public housing authority (PHA) is assessed in eight categories: vacancy rate and unit turn-around time, modernization, rents uncollected, work orders, inspection of units and systems, financial management, resident services and community building and security.

A PHA which achieves a score that is equal to or greater than 90 percent is designated as high-performer. With its high score, the Floyd County Housing Authority is eligible for other incentives, including extra incentives for scoring high on modernization.

This is the second straight year the FCHA has received a perfect score on PHMAP.

In a related item that contributed to the authority's top score, the maintenance staff was the recipient of the Kentucky Housing Association's 1999 "Maintenance Staff of the Year" award, for 249 units or less.

The KHA is an association of the state's 131 housing authorities. The award is presented annually at the maintenance training usually conducted in April of each year. The entries are judged by a committee of industry housing peers.

The entry for the local maintenance department was a joint effort by the executive director and property managers, coordinated by Donna Combs, manager of Ivy Creek Townhouses and Creekside Village.

"This example of teamwork is one of many things that makes it possible for the authority to maintain its High Performer Status with the Department of Housing and Urban Development," said Ryan.

According to Ryan, the Floyd County Housing Authority has been a High Performer since the inception of the PHMAP in 1991.

Ryan said one reason the Housing authority was able to maintain standards was because the board of directors give her support and flexibility.

America's joyride is over

The joyride America's drivers have been on because of cheap gas prices appears to be over, at least for now. The national average price of self-serve regular unleaded gas increased 18 cents since March 16 to \$1.15 per gallon, according to the AAA Fuel Gauge Report. The average is 7.1 cents per gallon higher than April 1998.

The highest gas prices in the nation can be found in the West, with California topping the list with an average of \$1.64 cents per gallon. The cheapest gas can be found in the Southeast, with Georgia remaining the only state with an average price still under a dollar. Georgia's average is the lowest in the U.S. at 97 cents per gallon.

Here in Kentucky, the average price for a gallon of self-serve unleaded regular is \$1.09 a gallon, up 19 cents in one month. Kentucky, which for several months had some of the nation's lowest average prices, ranks 21st this month.

In Lexington, a survey of 30 service stations shows the average price for a gallon of self-serve unleaded regular to be \$1.07, up 10 cents in one month.

Why the increase? So far, OPEC nations have kept their promise to limit the production of crude oil to 2.1 million barrels per day. Gas is refined from crude oil and until recently there has been a worldwide glut of it, keeping gas prices low.

In addition, with spring comes an

increase in car travel and a demand for more gas, so naturally supply and demand go to work to raise gas prices.

Summer vacation costs up \$3 per day, AAA predicts

Summer travelers will find an increase of slightly more than one percent in meal and lodging costs in 1999, bringing the national average daily cost for a family of four to \$213 per day, according to AAA.

The average cost of lodging for a family of two adults and two children remained at \$110 per night, the same as AAA's 1998 survey. However, meal costs rose three percent to \$103 per day for the same size family.

Kentucky ranked 40th in costs among the states at \$189 per day. The average daily meal costs for a family of four is \$107, while the average daily lodging costs for that same family is \$82.

North Dakota remains the least expensive state to travel in for a family of four with an average cost for meals and lodging of a thrifty \$158 per day. The next least expensive

states are South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas and Oklahoma.

The most expensive state for summer travel is Hawaii where meals and lodging for a family of four averages a hefty \$419 per day. The next most expensive states are New Jersey, California, Delaware and Louisiana.

AAA recommends that vacationers traveling by car should budget \$5.50 for gasoline for every 100 miles, based on the average national gas price of \$1.15 per gallon and a vehicle that gets 21 miles per gallon. It is also important for vacationing families to budget extra for entertainment, souvenirs and unexpected expenses.

Helping employers and workers understand Social Security

It's the tax workers take for granted. It's the money they don't see. It's also the benefit that many employers don't consider part of the benefit package they provide their employees. It's Social Security.

To help the many employers and workers who may not fully understand the Social Security program and its benefits, the Social Security Administration has produced a special kit of information—Social Security: What Employers and Employees Need to Know.

This information kit contains 12 factsheets—five for employers, seven for employees—that provide basic information about the Social Security retirement, disability and survivors programs. The kit also reminds employers that the 7.65 percent of workers' salaries they pay to Social Security is more than just a business expense; it's a valuable part of the employee benefit package.

The information in the kit—

- Emphasizes the importance of accurate wage reporting and the relationship between benefits and earnings.

Driving costs up .9 cent; SUV costs up .5 cent, says AAA

The cost of driving a car in 1999 will be 47 cents-per-mile on average — .9 cent-per-mile higher than last year, according to AAA. This is the smallest increase since 1994, when driving costs rose by only .7 cent.

AAA's annual Your Driving Costs study reports motorists driving 15,000 miles this year will spend an average of \$7,050 on auto-related expenses, up \$142 from 1998.

The increase is mainly due to higher ownership costs such as insurance, depreciation, license and registration.

Operating costs such as gas, oil, tires and maintenance, decreased .1 cent to 10.6 cents per mile as a result of lower prices at the gas pump. This marks the second straight year that operating costs have dropped.

AAA's cost estimates are based on computations made by Runzheimer International of Rochester, Wisconsin, a management consulting firm specializing in transportation, travel and living costs.

AAA's cost figures are based on a composite national average of three domestically built 1999

cars—a subcompact Chevrolet Cavalier LS, a mid-size Ford Taurus SE and a full-size mercury Grand Marquis GS.

These similarly equipped vehicles include air conditioning, automatic transmission, power steering, AM/FM stereo, dual air bags, antilock brakes, cruise control, tilt steering wheel, tinted glass and rear-window defogger. The costs are based on a four-year/60,000 miles ownership period.

The study also included driving costs for sport-utility vehicles and minivans. AAA says the cost to drive a 1999 Chevrolet Blazer is

53.8 cents per mile, up .5 cents from last year and 6.8 cents more than the composite average for passenger cars. The driving costs for a Dodge Caravan SE are 48.8 cents per mile, unchanged from last year and 1.8 cents more than passenger cars.

Driving costs in the study are reflective of personal driving and are significantly different from costs typically used to determine reimbursement for business-related use of a personal vehicle.

The information on the Chevrolet Blazer and Dodge Caravan are not used to determine the composite national average, but is included in the report to help buyers estimate driving costs for these vehicles.

Fiber optic sensors: A new way to protect the environment

When most people think about fiber optics, they think of telephone or cable service and visualize a bundle of glass or plastic threads. One University of Kentucky researcher is taking fiber optics beyond communications to produce highly sensitive monitoring tools to help the environment.

Since 1995, Sylvia Daunert, an associate professor of chemistry at the University of Kentucky, has been working on an NSF-funded project to produce fiber optic sensors that use bacteria genetically engineered to glow in the presence of very low—but still dangerous—levels of toxic substances.

This bioluminescence is created by altering the same proteins that make fireflies and jellyfish glow.

In this fiber optic project, Daunert is studying the toxic substances arsenic and antimony, a chemical used in matches.

"We've moved beyond luciferase, the protein that makes the firefly emit light, to a little bit more sophisticated system by using different proteins that can emit different colors," Daunert says.

"This is very exciting, because now we can detect many toxic substances at the same time just by looking at which color—red, green or blue—is emitted."

The bacteria Daunert and her colleague use is a non-toxic strain of *E. coli*, a very common bacteria widely used in biotechnology.

Daunert attaches these bacteria to the optic fibers by trapping them in solution behind a membrane.

"The membrane has pores that allow small molecules to pass through, so the bacteria are trapped; but compounds like arsenic or sugars can pass through," she says.

The advantage of using these optic fibers for environmental monitoring lies in their ability to act as remote sensors.

"This allows for in-situ monitoring, which means you place a fiber at the polluted site, say an industrial river that you want to monitor continuously. You can just leave the fiber there and monitor what is happening from miles away," says Daunert.

Although she hasn't explored the logistics of how this will work yet, Daunert points to the ease with which signals pass through fiber

optic wires across telephone poles or underground.

It may soon be possible for a farmer to monitor his water supply by checking a graph of the sensor output sent directly to his computer.

Daunert says such a process will be highly effective and feasible. There is currently no method to detect the low levels of toxic substances Daunert's engineered bacteria are designed to detect. "Our method is a billion times more selective for arsenic and antimony than current tests."

"Although we haven't done a market study, using our technology should be pretty cheap. Bacteria are very cheap and the instrumentation you need is not elaborate. A sensi-

tive, hand-held luminometer that measures the light emitted by our sensors costs less than \$5,000.

"The most significant thing I think we have done in the past four years is to demonstrate that we can use this technology not only to detect one particular toxic compound, but we can broaden it out to many different substances, even several different substances at once," Daunert says.

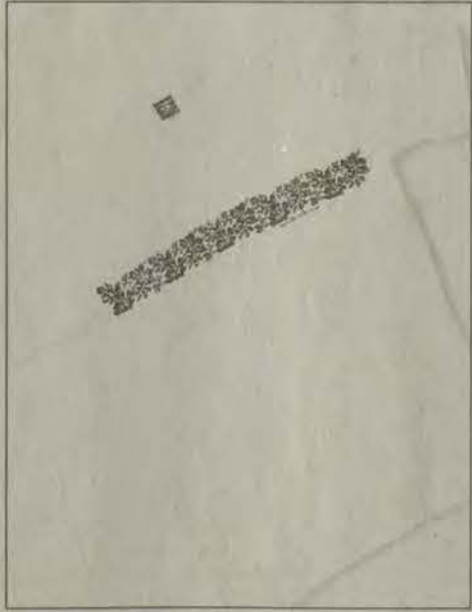

She plans to post a sign-up sheet

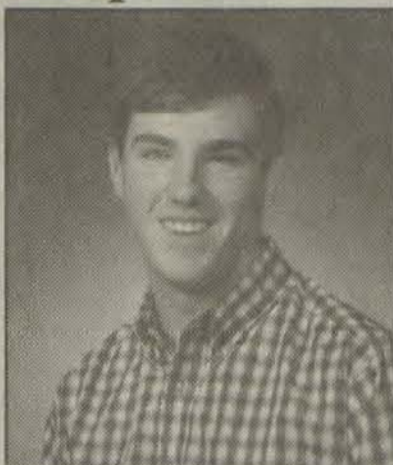
on the church's door. People can also sign up by calling her at 886-6548 after 3:30; or by e-mail: praise@se-tel.com.

Kentucky Central Life creditors to get \$50 million

Kentucky Insurance Commissioner George Nichols III announced recently that he is distributing \$50 million on behalf of policyholders and the guaranty associations protecting them when Kentucky Central Life Insurance Co. became insolvent.

The money comes from the sale or settlement of assets involving the former Lexington-based insurance company.

Franklin Circuit Judge William L. Graham approved the distribution as requested by Nichols, who serves as Liquidator of the company.

"We have now repaid \$177.2 million to policyholders and the guaranty associations who stepped in to assure Kentucky Central policies were honored," Nichols said. "This latest round of money comes from our great success in recent months of selling Kincaid Towers and reaching a \$10.95 million cash

and property settlement with former Gov. Wallace Wilkinson."

This is the third payment to policyholders and to life and health guaranty associations who loaned money or provided reinsurance coverage to Jefferson-Pilot Life Insurance Co. when it assumed and honored a majority of the existing policies. Added to today's \$50 million distribution was \$37.2 million in June 1998, \$40 million in May 1997 and \$50 million in February 1996.

For policyholders who chose not to participate in the reinsurance program or were not covered by the guaranty associations, distributions are made directly to them.

As insurance commissioner, Nichols is responsible for overseeing one of the nation's largest insurance insolvencies and liquidations. Kentucky Central was declared insolvent and ordered into liquidation in August 1994.

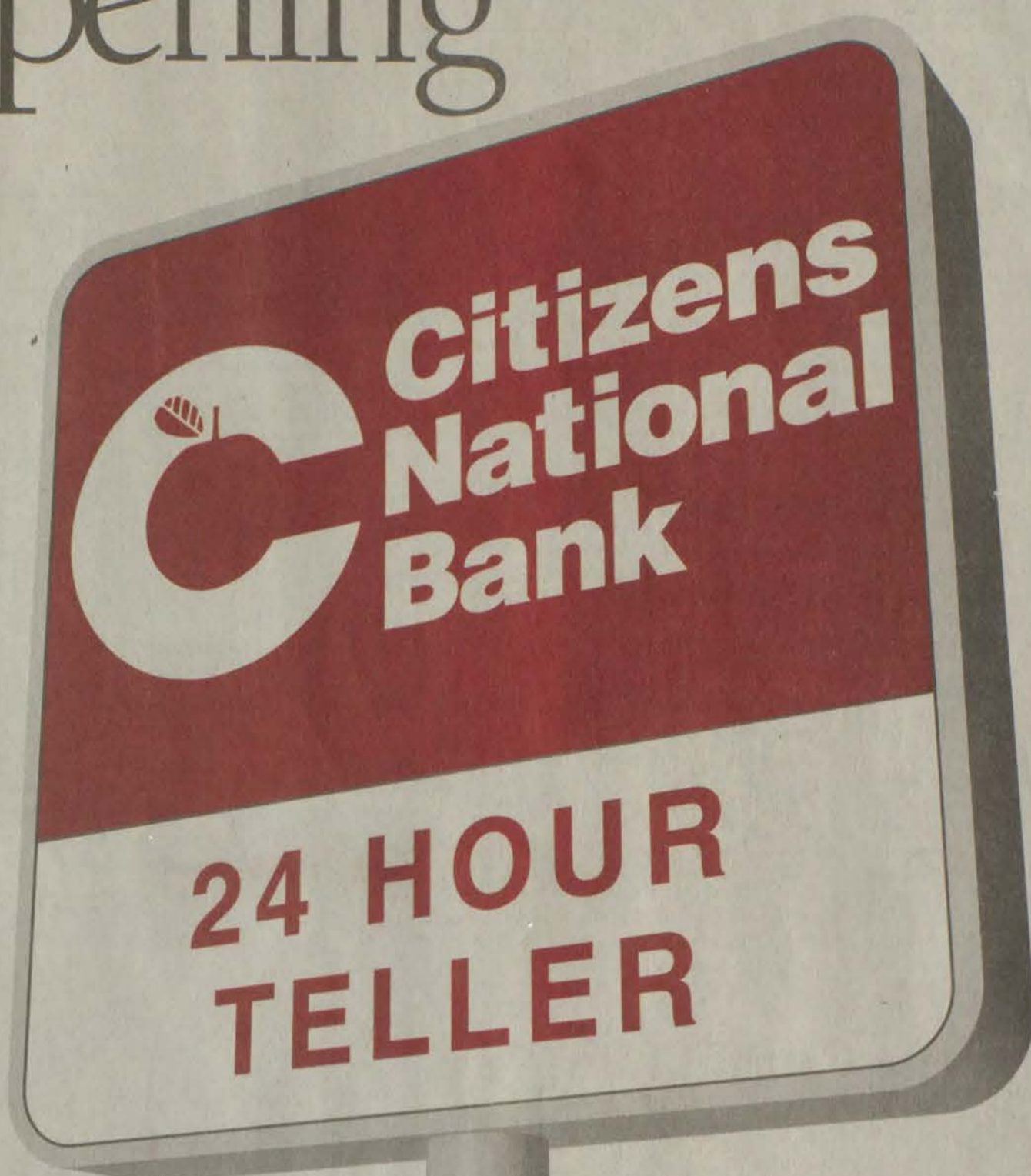

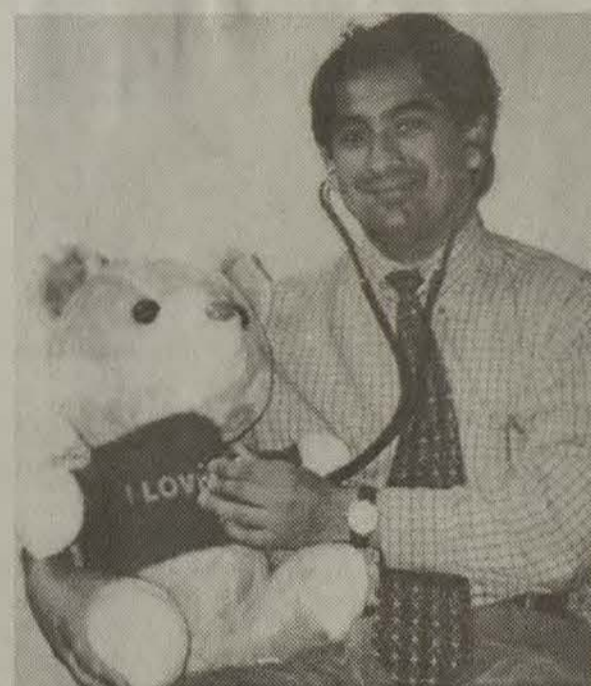

NASCAR Connection

All in a day's work

 The NASCAR Winston Cup Series Media Guide lists Tony Stewart as a Raybestos Rookie of the Year candidate. After being at Charlotte last weekend and watching Stewart's weekend unfold, I wouldn't be surprised if NASCAR sent out an updated biographical sketch on the Home Depot driver.

Stewart got the weekend going in the right direction Friday night as he ran away from the rest of the field in the second qualifying race for Saturday's running of the Winston Open. As soon as that victory was put in the record book he flew to Indianapolis in hopes of qualifying for the Indianapolis 500 on Saturday.

Arriving in Indianapolis after 1 a.m., Stewart awoke to a 9 o'clock wake-up call that informed him that it was raining in Indianapolis and that qualifying would be pushed back. Things continued to work out for Stewart, as he drew the No. 2 spot for qualifying and was able to go out around 11 and put up a speed of 220.653 mph. This puts the former Indy Racing League driver in the 24th starting position for the May 30 Indianapolis 500.

No sooner had he crawled out of his Indy car, he departed with a police escort to the airport for the two hour trip back to Charlotte. By 3 o'clock he was on the track at Lowe's Motor Speedway practicing for the Winston Open in hopes of winning the one transfer spot to the big event of the night, The Winston.

Stewart's victory Friday night put him on the outside pole next to

Mike Skinner for the 50 lap Winston Open. The race was actually over by the time the two drivers made it back to the start finish line for lap one. The two were side-by-side for the first half of the lap before Skinner pulled ahead in turn three, but Stewart got on the inside of Skinner to grab the lead and never looked back. That was the only close racing that Stewart had in the race as he went on to win by almost five seconds over second place finisher, Jimmy Spencer.

You would think that after winning two races and qualifying for one of the biggest races held in all of Motorsports that Stewart would be content by just making the field for the Winston. Stewart is a racer and, if you put him in a car and wave a green flag in front of him, he is going to do all that he can to make it to the front.

The Winston is only for winners and Stewart's Winston Open win put him in some pretty elite company. Although the field was only made up of 21 drivers, the field did account for 17 Winston Cup Championships and over 200 Winston Cup wins. Rookies just don't make this field but, after the weekend he had been putting together, Stewart had to believe that he belonged in the race every bit as much as any other driver.

Everyone knew that Stewart had a car that was hooked up, but this race he would have to start from the back and battle the likes of Gordon, Labonte, Martin, and Earnhardt. As the green flag waved to start the first 30-lap segment Stewart began,

his slow marched to the front. Then on lap 11 a major wreck put seven drivers out of the event, including the strong cars of Mark Martin and Dale Jarrett.

Stewart finished the first segment in seventh, but it was in the second segment that his car started showing some of the strength that it had in the Open. He finished second to Gordon in the second segment, setting up a 10-lap shootout in the third and final segment.

On the restart of the final segment, Gordon was called for jumping the restart and a new start was ordered. This time it was Stewart who got the good start and with the roaring approval of the crowd set sail for the \$200,000 winner's share of the purse.

The battle continued for several laps before Stewart pulled away from Gordon but it was to be Terry Labonte's night as he caught and passed Stewart with just a few laps left to capture the win.

Although he was disappointed that he couldn't hang on to the lead, when Tony reflected back on his weekend he had to smile. He had won two races, finished second in his sport's all-star race, qualified for the Indianapolis 500 and won \$155,037. Not bad for a weekend's work.

What will he do to top all of this? Next Sunday he will drive in both the Coca-Cola 600 at Charlotte and the Indianapolis 500. That's 1,100 miles of racing and it wouldn't surprise me to see him holding a trophy at the end of either.

Next generation of hoops hotshots show off for weekend on UK campus

The Nike Bluegrass Classic basketball weekend in Lexington was quite a showcase for ultra-hoophead fans to examine the next wave of college hot shots and jump-to-NBA wannabes.

Along with dunks, jukes and flashy one-on-everybody moves the event produced the usual recruiting scuttlebutt to feed the

fan grist mill. And, unfortunately, there was the predictable juvenile overhype by media-types and "recruiting experts."

Not content to chronicle the on-court magic accomplished by this or that player, one reporter hailed high school junior-to-be DaJuan Wagner, as the next Allen Iverson. An expert anointed East

St. Louis star Darius Miles as the next Kevin Garnett.

Iverson and Garnett, of course, are two kids made rich by NBA owners who forfeited the college experience. As the NBA playoffs go on this week, both are at home counting their money.

Hying Wagner-to-Iverson and Miles-to-Garnett has an entertainment value, I suppose, but the real bottom feeding came in a report about how and why a kid barely out of middle school, Wagner, could not be secured for interviews. Reason: His coach was displeased after his team's loss and Wagner's prima donna performance. But does anyone care what a 15-16-year-old has to say? A larger point here is, media efforts to interview a kid who already has a Who-Ha image of himself is one more example of the intermediate stage of what's wrong with amateur athletics. Too much, too soon.

Little wonder athletes become savvy operators (with entourage) at a younger age to a point, when they arrive at college the dynamics are "play me, and it had better be at a position my dad is happy with, or I'm outta here to another school."

Wagner and Miles and their blue chip brethren should be allowed to play (in their squeaky new Nike sneakers) to their coaches' satisfaction and to ooh-ahhhs of fans who pay to get in and that ought to be enough. I suspect it would be enough if

media-types stuck to goo-gaa adjectives about cross-over dribbles and 360 dunks and filed legitimate stories on how the NCAA squares the question: "doesn't staging this tournament on UK's campus on a spring weekend 'feel' like a recruiting advantage for somebody?"

COLLEGE TRANSFER LAMENT

For every Erik Brown (Morehead State) and Michael Bradley (UK), the "transfer" lament about lack of player loyalty to his college these days, is much too one way.

If college coaches and administrators want to stem the tide of student-athlete transfers, then more loyalty should be demonstrated at the outset of the recruiting process. And later, by being more judicious about recruiting "over" those already on scholarship.

Unrealistic to not recruit over current players? Probably, yes. But string-along time by savvy coaches is far worse than a college sophomore deciding he wants to move to another school.

There is an upside to college transfers in Div. I sports. A student-athlete must sit out a year from competition. Presumably, it is a perfect time to do what he or she is on campus for in the first place. Study and go to class.

Sports In Perspective

The word "great" and derivations thereof receive much exposure when members of the sports media are hard pressed to express adulation for their latest fun-and-games icon.

Of late the broadcast and byline types have rhapsodized over Michael Jordan, eulogizing him as the greatest basketball player of all time.

Not a few heads, many tinged with the frost of age, are prone to shake hourly in disagreement as memories of other performers come flooding back from the past.

When Oscar Robertson called it quits after 14 seasons (1961-1974) in the National Basketball Association, he led the league in assists (9,887) and converted free throws (7,694), was second in total points scored (26,710), third in field goal production (9,508) and total minutes played (43,886), and was seventh in scoring average (25.7).

At 6'5" and 218 pounds, Robertson held forth as a ball-handling genius and a standout per-

former at either end of the court.

"Quite frankly, I don't feel the players entering the pro game now are on a par with those of my era," he said recently. "When I was active the league had the likes of Wilt Chamberlain, Bill Russell, Bob Cousy, Elgin Baylor, Jerry West, Bob Pettit and Dave Bing."

The difference between then and now, in Robertson's opinion, is a matter of technique or, better put, the absence of same.

"Many of the guys playing in the NBA today have a shot and not much more," he said. "You see only a few guys now who can go to the right and left equally well, or shoot effectively with either hand. What's more, they don't pass and pick all that well. The players now haven't developed the tactics, the moves, to be consistently effective. So they just pop the ball on the run, force it up from all over the floor. The result is a sloppy and uninteresting game to watch."

Robertson believes money is the root of the problem.

"High salaries make today's pro players less pass conscious," he

said. "If you score more you make more money. That's why so many guys are going for the basket when they should be passing off to the open man. So the outcome is a shooting contest with none of the finesse the fans like to see."

Echoing these sentiments was Hal Greer, a Hall of Fame backcourt play maker and scorer with the 1966-67 NBA Champion Philadelphia 76er's.

I think of the pro game today as more or less schoolyard basketball," he said. "There's too much one-on-one action. Not enough rebounding off the offensive board and getting that second shot. The players are just not team-oriented."

Such was not the case in his era, Greer contended.

"We lived and died on pick-and-roll tactics that involved a close interaction of all the players offensively. The great Boston Celtic teams of my time featured pinpoint passing and precisely run patterns that cut a player free for the percentage shot. It was fun for the fans to watch."

Currently, the NBA subsists on a

brand of play that would have been quickly whistled to a halt in bygone days.

The reference here is to such dubious devices as carrying the ball or otherwise interrupting the process of dribbling, taking multiple steps to dunk a shot, shuffling the feet after breaking off a dribble, putting the ball on the floor with both hands and general pushing, shoving and wrestling for position,

all of which were simply not tolerated in a former time.

John Wooden, who directed UCLA to a record 10 National Collegiate Athletic Association titles, has lamented the negative influence the NBA is exerting on the younger players.

"The game has become too rough," he said. "People who want to see that kind of thing should go to a wrestling match or a prize

fight. The pros are setting a very bad example. Basketball is a game of skill and execution, not rough-house tactics."

It's fair to say that Michael Jordan is a great player in the modern era.

But the greatest of all time? Uh-uh. We're talking apples and oranges, good buddies.

Let's have a little truth in advertising here, if you please.

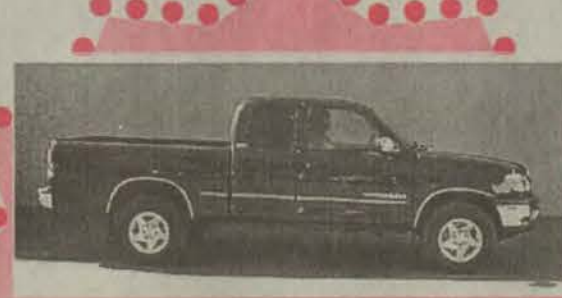

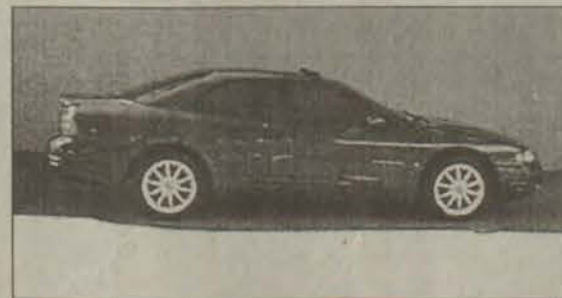

Kentucky first lady Judi Patton and Carol Jordan, with the Governor's Office of Child Abuse and Domestic Violence Services recently visited Pikeville Methodist Hospital's Sexual Assault Treatment Center.

Denise Miracle, certified Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE), Patton and Jordan toured the treatment center where forensic medical examinations of sexual assault victims take place. Miracle, a registered nurse, is specially trained and certified in the identification and collection of forensic evidence in sexual assault cases.

Miracle gathers samples that can be DNA tested and then documents injuries with photographs. Evidence is collected, labeled and documented using the latest technologies. Often

times the perpetrator is examined as well.

A team made up of the nurse examiner (either Miracle or Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner Teresa Epling), a law enforcement officer and a rape advocate respond immediately to Pikeville Methodist Hospital's emergency room when a sexual assault is reported. The sexual assault response team has seen 19 cases since the program was implemented in March 1998.

Patton was in Pikeville to announce funding for the creation of a local Children's Advocacy Center. Patton said she and the governor are championing the cause of Children's Advocacy Centers as a way to ensure that the investigation and prosecution of child sexual abuse cases are well coordinated in local communities.

Family meetings are usually held at a set time and place on a regular basis. A family meeting is a cooperative way of making decisions that affect all family members. Above all else, it is a time for being open and honest without fear. It's also a time for sharing concerns and hopes. Equally important, family meetings provide an opportunity for planning and having fun.

If you are a single parent with one child, you may be thinking, "Can just the two of us have a family meeting?" Absolutely. It can be a special time to plan fun events, listen to each other's dreams, and talk about problems that need to be addressed. Family meetings work well for all types of families throughout their various life cycle stages.

stages.

Many positives can come from family meetings. They are an excellent way to adjust to the changes that are part of everyday family life. Little problems can be resolved before they grow into major issues. Children like it when their ideas and suggestions are requested and respected. Feelings of trust, caring and competence develop, and family members learn to listen and use good decision-making skills. And we're all more likely to follow through with a decision when we have had a voice in making it.

Consider the following important guidelines for successful family meetings:

- Schedule your family meetings on a regular basis, perhaps once a month or maybe even once a week.

Give everyone advance notice.

- Prepare ahead of time what you would like to discuss during the meeting. Ask your children to make suggestions and help with what the family is going to ask about.
- Plan to hold the meetings at a

time when you will not be hurried or pressured to finish up quickly. Allow enough time to discuss key issues in a relaxed way.

- In the first few meetings, focus mostly on planning fun or recreational activities. Once family members

see the value of sitting down together to plan activities, they will be more open to solving problems and dealing with change.

- Start on time. Set a time limit and stick to it. Keep the meetings reasonably brief. This is particularly important if you have young children.

- Appoint or vote on a different family member to run each meeting. Drawing names works well.

- Talk about specific issues that have come up that week. Make time during your family meeting for everyone to express their feelings without interruption.

- Focus on real issues. Stay away from criticizing individuals. No put-downs. Deal with problems head-on. Listen to feelings; talk about solutions; get everybody's input.
- When one family member talks,

everyone else listens. Be patient with younger children. They may need more time to express their ideas.

- Expect conflict. The goal is not to start with agreement but to end with it. Differing ideas can help the family arrive at the best solution or decision. Put agreements into action as soon as possible.

- Remember, don't just talk about family problems. Plan fun activities, too.

- End your meetings with something positive like a game, a family hug, a joke or a simple snack.

During your family meetings, model good listening skills. Look at your child, spouse or older adult directly in the eyes when they are speaking. Use positive body posture, showing that you are giving them your full attention.



THINGS TO PONDER

Summer Memories

"In the good ole summer time. In the good ole summer time." Well, it's hard to believe it is that time of year again, especially with weather cooler than usual. However, the children's excitement about school ending can not be ignored. Like other times of the year, we all have great, special memories of summers past. Wouldn't it be nice if adults and children worked together for everyone to have a nice summer, plus an opportunity to create pleasant family traditions and memories?

A guess is that most everyone who grew up in our region, prior to the days of TVs, VCRs, and microwave meals and had only radios, cannot forget the impact that natural resources had on our lives. Our major entertain-

ment pertained to the creek with its wonders and cool delights. One favorite swimming hole began with really "large, flat" rocks with slippery green coverings that further enhanced one's ability to "go far." We wore holes in the bottom of our swimming attire, not necessarily a bathing suit. Once, when about eight years old, a same-aged cousin and I caught minnows from the creek and "fried" them. The "stove" was a galvanized bucket turned upside down with a fire underneath, while the "skillet" was the space below the bottom's rim. Crisco was brought from home. The hills also provided a major source of amusement. A huge oak tree on the ridge behind where we lived fit into various fantasies. Even though others talk of swinging on grapevines and climbing on

rocks during such summers, the dread of needing to climb down overwhelmed some kids (me).

Then there was the annual "summer vacation" after we moved from Pike County to Florida, which meant driving about 22 hours to Kentucky and back, in the middle of July. This time was chosen because nothing needed to be done in the citrus grove. July was so hot—everywhere, and especially going through Georgia. The long two-laned roads seemed to go on forever; counting tall Georgia pine trees was about the only thing to do. Of course, in those days, the average person's car did not have air-conditioners. Often we would struggle trying to decide to have the windows down with the hot air rushing in or have the windows up. Usually, Mother would remember to bring along a wet cloth for each. Then, dad made the decisions. The "Pit stops" occurred when the car ran out of gas and was not based on others' biological needs. Dad also strived to stay in the same motels coming and going, about halfway.

Needless to say, the motels did not have air-conditioners, but would have a rotating fan in each small room. It was such a relief when the chains of motels came along with really cool rooms and swimming pools. Since there was not such a thing as "fast food," meal time took forever. At the time, we did not think of ourselves as making fond memories.

Now back to the present, the upcoming summer, and some thoughts about what our families need today. Before school is completely done, parents need to discuss resources for child care and family entertainment. Of course, the choices are as numerous as anyone's ideas and interests. One way is to just think of what someone who has never been in our area might be interested in seeing and knowing about. So often, citizens do not know or have not investigated what is in their own back yard. The priority needs to be that all children are adequately supervised and not left alone. As discussed several months ago, it is still hard to believe that many folks would agree that it is OK for children as young as 10 to be on their own all day, while parents work. Parents need to take advantage of everything that is appropriate for kids. An opinion is that most churches would be pleased for children to attend every vacation Bible school. Some parents could share child care for a period of hours or by the day.

Needless to say, it is important for all adults to agree on the same rules and consequences ahead of time. Granny enjoyed recalling when she had a "tea party" for a granddaughter and her friends. The girls received invitations and arrived "all dressed up" for the unique occasion. Of course, younger brothers were included. Those who attended enjoyed receiving snapshots later.

Another benefit for kids is sleep-over camps, sponsored by 4-H, CAP, and various church groups, that provide a great opportunity to have new experiences. It is also nice that the kids can develop their abilities to get along with others and be more independent. This is a way that our children can learn to have more self-confidence and be aware that parents trust that they will do what is necessary.

Although the kids may feel that they are on their own, they do not usually realize that many volunteers are present and that strict guidelines have to be followed. There also are "educa-

tional" types of camps—computers, sports, cheerleading, etc.

Similar to other things in life, a pleasant summer that is enjoyed by all needs to be planned. Most importantly, allow the kids to have an active role in what is decided. Here's to a great summer for everyone and hopefully a chance to continue traditions or create a memory.

The Third Annual Sarah Reneé Lafferty MEMORIAL GOSPEL BENEFIT

On July 2, 1996, a beautiful baby girl was born into the loving family of Bennie and Pauletta Lafferty. She was named Sarah Renee Lafferty, and she was loved by all who came to know her. Bennie and Pauletta already had two beautiful sons and now that a daughter had arrived everything seemed perfect. Everyone was very pleased and excited about the arrival. For four months the Lafferty's were hysterically happy. They had three beautiful healthy children and they knew how fortunate that made them.

Then on November 18, 1996, when Sarah was only four months old, tragedy struck. The daughter who had been so desperately wanted and was now so very loved, was diagnosed with Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia. For the Lafferty's, life turned upside down on that day. How could this be happening? Yesterday had been so wonderful and today everything was a nightmare.

Immediately after being diagnosed, Sarah was sent to U.K. Children's Hospital where she began an intense regimen of chemotherapy. Once she achieved remission she was to have a bone marrow transplant. But first a donor must be found.

The first step in finding a donor was to check Sarah's two brothers, Nathan and James Michael, to see if they would match. On Thanksgiving evening 1996, the Lafferty's received news that neither son had the marrow type that was needed to save their sister's life.

After that news, the family was devastated, because they knew that the best chance of finding a match was from a sibling. But they were not willing to give up hope yet.

Sarah was placed on both national and international registers in search of a match. Here in Prestonsburg, a marrow drive was held with hundreds of people showing up to be tested. Each hoping they would be the match needed to save "Baby Sarah."

Even though the efforts of everyone was great, no match was found for Baby Sarah. The closest that had been found was an unrelated mismatch. Even though the donor marrow was not the perfect match, doctor's felt that the transplant was Sarah's best



chance of survival. The Lafferty's were informed that with the transplant, Sarah had an 80 percent chance of survival and without the transplant her chances were only 20 percent.

So on March 6, 1997, Baby Sarah received her transplant. On March 14, 1997, Sarah began running a high fever and continued to decline from there. Her little body was beginning to tire. She had fought so hard for so long, and now her body needed to rest.

On May 4, 1997, in the PICU of U.K. Children's Hospital, Sarah peacefully went to sleep in her mother's arms for the last time. Her fight was finally over and her pain had ended. But the loss felt by those who came to know her would continue on for some time. Baby Sarah's time with us was short, but in her ten months in this life, she touched more hearts than most of us can ever touch in a lifetime. And although we grieve for her daily and miss her desperately, we know in our hearts that she is no longer suffering. She can now run and play like she deserves.

A few weeks after Sarah's death, there was a Gospel Sing held at Stumbo Park in Allen in her memory. Originally the Gospel Sing was planned as a benefit to help the Lafferty family with the numerous expenses they were incurring while Sarah was in the hospital. After her death, however, the Lafferty's requested that the proceeds go to the Make-A-Wish Foundation in Sarah's memory. It was decided then that this benefit would continue each year and that the proceeds would go to a charity to benefit children, and would be in Sarah's memory.

On June 5, 1999, the Third Annual Sarah Renee Lafferty Memorial Benefit will be held at Stumbo Park in Allen, beginning at 5 p.m. All proceeds will be given to the National Children's Cancer Society. The Lafferty's would like to encourage everyone to attend the Gospel sing in order to raise money to help children, and remember one very special little girl "Baby Sarah."

Since Sarah's death Pauletta and Bennie has had a new addition to the family, Madison Brooke Lafferty, born Jan. 4, 1999.
