

Floyd retires

PCC president going to Harvard

After presenting part of her report and winding down an information-filled and fairly routine meeting, Dr. Deborah Floyd said she had some-

thing else to add and announced her retirement as president of Prestonsburg Community College at last night's Board of Directors meeting. Floyd, who came

to the college eight years ago, said she had been approved for a sabbatical typically a year of study - effective July 1 and for her retirement, effective November 15.

She said her immediate plans "include attending Harvard University this summer to study executive management." She said she had applied to Harvard last winter and was accepted several months ago. She added her sabbatical request was approved by the Kentucky Community and Technical College System (KCTCS) "a couple of weeks ago.

Apparently, the board members had already been told of

Floyd's intention to leave the college because a resolution affirming their support of her work was read by board member Hutchison. The lengthy resolution included the provision that she be named President

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

Parents burn ballots in site base election at South Floyd High School

Parents at South Floyd High School burned the ballots Tuesday night after they deemed a site-base election for two parent representatives had been conducted unfairly. The election was the second

attempt to fill the posts. The first election was held in May and won by Liz Sparkman, an employee of Worldwide Equipment, a company headed by Floyd County Board of Education Chairman Terry Dotson.

The second election was held Tuesday and the votes were burned before a winner could be determined and after parents had been allowed to vote for only one candidate - not two.

After the first election, parents protested that an announcement of open nominations had not been

Mining company seeks permission to landfill at Ivel for coal byproducts

Lodestar Energy, which operates mines in Pike and Floyd counties, has applied for a permit to build a landfill for coal byproducts on Ivy Creek Road in Ivel.

A news release from the state Division of Waste Management says Lodestar, which has operations on Ivy Creek, expects the proposed landfill to accept "combusted coal byproducts," such as fly ash and bottom ash.

However, Barney Walker, a member of the Floyd County Solid Waste Commission and an environmental activist, said no such landfill is in the five-year

solid waste plan which the county had to submit to the state last year.

"If the state goes ahead and issues a permit, they are bypassing (the local) ordinance," Walker said.

That ordinance, according to Walker, states that any wasting facility has to come before the Solid Waste Commission and/or the Floyd County Fiscal Court and a public hearing has to be held

"If the state issues (a permit), then Floyd County doesn't need a solid waste plan, which it required us to have," Walker said. At Martha's Restaurant at the

Magoffin couple tops in foster care

A Salyersville couple is on the list of the state's outstanding foster parents - 16 individuals or couples cited by the Cabinet for Families and Children at a ceremony at the Kentucky Horse Center on May 18. Mike and Gail Griffith have cared for 30 foster children, including children with severe medical problems and other special needs, during five years as foster parents. They also have three birth children and one adopted child and are preparing for the adoption of two sisters. They were singled out among foster parents in the Big Sandy Region and were presented a Regional Service Award.

Employment down

Bucking the statewide trend, unemployment rates were higher in the Big Sandy region in April than they were last year at the same time, according to statistics from the Cabinet for Workforce Development. In the recently released figures, the five-county region had an unemployment rate of 8.1% in April of this year, 1.1% higher than April of 1998. In Floyd County, unemployment was up by 1.1%, from 6.6% last April to 7.7% a little over a month ago. Unemployment was also up in Johnson (,7%) and Magoffin (.6%), but down in Martin (3.2%) and Pike (1%). In neighboring Knott County in the Kentucky River district, the unemployment rate was up 3.4% from last April to this year.

advertised, resulting in a limited number of candidates. Only three candidates had been nominated, according to James Rodney Johnson, a parent and a current candidate for the council.

Johnson said he knew the vacancy was coming up - parent representative Don Sparkman's two-year term expires and Joe Stewart is no longer eligible because his child graduates this year. Johnson said he wanted to run for the council seat and had watched the newspaper for an announcement of the election.

Regulations regarding site-base elections require that notification of elections be advertised, according to Jack Gray, manager of the School Council Development Branch of the Department of Education.

The elections are supposed to be controlled by parent-teacher organizations, but South Floyd High School apparently doesn't have an incorporated group.

the principal gathers the parents together for a meeting and that group determines when the elections will be held.

Parents have protested South Floyd High School Principal and have alleged that she unofficially campaigned for Sparkman at the parent meeting by praising Sparkman's participation in various school events.

'I don't think that's probably ethical, but not illegal," Gray said. "I would not recommend it."

Daniels did not return a call from The Times by presstime Thursday to respond to the allegation.

After the first election was voided, a new election was scheduled and nominations were again open. James Rodney Johnson, Liz Sparkman, Betty Tackett, Mike Hall and Debbie Engle were nominated.

The election date was advertised, but it stated that the polls would close at 6 p.m. Parents had planned to keep the election open until 7 p.m., Johnson said. The election was rescheduled with the 7 p.m. closing time.

At Tuesday's election, parents were told by facilitator Nadine Hicks that they could only vote for one candidate, according to Johnson. He said Hicks had appar-Debbie Daniels' role in the election ently misunderstood a recommen-

dation by the parents to let the top vote-getter serve the two-year term vacated by Sparkman and the second top vote-getter to serve the one year term vacated by Stewart.

"Nadine must have read that as voting for one person," Johnson said.

Jack Gray said there are no statutes to address the issue of the number of votes allowed by each person, but he said it is "always custom to have two votes" when there are two vacancies.

"If you have two vacancies to fill, ... each person should have been told to vote for two. They had five to choose from. They could have voted for one," he said.

When candidates and parents expressed concern that lack of the second vote by parents could have changed the election, Daniels apparently called Gray about how to handle the situation. Gray apparently told her to seal the box of ballots until parents could determine if they wanted to conduct a third election

Someone suggested counting the ballots before they were sealed, but that caused disagreement, according to Johnson.

"I said, 'If you're not going to count them, then you've got to

"Call it a mistake ... Go back to the point where you made the mistake and start from there. The mistake occurred when the parents were told to vote for one candidate

.. There's no use bringing up what happened ... When you start counting votes, you're stirring up animosity," he said.

Gray said parent groups need to cooperate with their principals in scheduling dates for the election.

"Parent groups need to be aware of potential problems (regarding the school schedule) and decide based on that information," he said.

The election for the parent representatives is scheduled for Tuesday, June 8.

Johnson said Wednesday that he planned to file a formal complaint with the Office of Education Accountability that evening. Johnson said he wants the state to oversee the election.


"There's so much animosity right now, I think we can't agree (on how to conduct the election,)" he said.

He added that parents had told him they could have voted "30 times" if they had wanted because a stack of 200 to 300 ballots were on

a table for parents to pick up. The only identification required by parents is an initial beside their children's names.

Only parents with children who will be attending the high school next year were eligible to vote, according to Gray. Only parents of eighth grade, freshman, sophomore, and juniors could vote. Parents of seniors are not eligible, Gray said.

Calls to the Office of Education Accountability to see if a complaint had been lodged about the election were referred to Dr. Ken Henry, who did not return the calls Thursday.



Addressing continues to plague 911 system

Address changes/verification and road names for 911 addressing continue to present problems for the Floyd County 911 Advisory Council.

Chairman Jim Caldwell said 130 Floyd County roads have been mapped and addressed, with 70 of those entered into the computer and verified. Caldwell said he didn't know how many addresses this accounted for, but he estimated it to be about 900.

After Caldwell explained what work Jodi Hall and her two workers have completed, Hubert Puckett from Abbott Creek said he was having problems with his mail because of so many addresses. He said the post office had informed him that his mail would be stopped if he did not change his address.

Puckett is using a Highway Contract (HC) address. Postmaster Edith Risner said anyone using an HC address should get a 911 address. Risner said some mail coming to an HC address will be sent back. She said the best solution is for everyone to use one of the 911 addresses.

Anyone who has not been notified of a final 911 number should not make changes to the numbering on mailboxes until the final notification comes from 911, according to Caldwell.

When the mapping is completed, the numbering will be on an odd/even basis. The houses on the right from point of origin will have even numbers and those on the left will have odd numbers. For example, if you go up Abbott Creek off US 23 all the house numbers on the left should be odd and all those on the right should be even. Any address that does not follow this pattern now will be changed. Caldwell said houses that were off just a few feet would not be changed. but added if they were off enough for a structure to be built in between, a change would be necessary - usually by one number. Gary Dotson, from Prestonsburg 911, said it is important that people put their 911 number on the structure, or if the structure is far from the road, he suggested landscaping signs that point to the house. "Let the emergency service people know where you are," he admonished, adding that if mailboxes are used, the 911 numbers should be placed on both sides of the mailbox. Road signs and lack thereof are causing some problems. Daniel P. Gullett from the Left Beaver Rescue Squad said some of the information

coming up on the screen is from enhanced 911 and is not correct. He said his crew ended up calling the number back in one instance to get directions to the house. He added that this method takes too much time to be practical

Caldwell said the road signs come through the fiscal court, and he does not know when they will be erected. He did say that once a sign is put up, it will be the correct 911 name for that road or street. Streets with two or more names are causing emergency crews problems.

Bill Dotson said the fire, ambulance and police departments should have a session on map reading once the maps are released. He said he "didn't want to insult anyone" but many people, including some in these departments, needed information on reading maps. "On your way to an emergency situation is not a time to find out you can't read the map," Dotson said.

Caldwell asked P. R. Long from Appalachian Wireless to make appointments with each of the departments to check on the condition of pagers. Long made several appointments for this week and next to check the pagers. Long also told the departments he had some pagers to give until pagers are returned from wheing repaired.

Terry Triplett from the Garrett Fire Department said he has a listing of landing sites for helicopters, but the sites are not on Healthnet's list and are "useless." At present, the only sites in

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

Caldwell said he would provide a list with the paging number for each of the Floyd County departments at the next meeting, which will be on July 7.

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

Extend UK Extension

A couple of mountain leaders are pushing a revolutionary concept: The Extension Service should help rural landowners grow and market vegetables.

This may not strike the casual observer as all that revolutionary. In a tobacco state like Kentucky, why wouldn't the Extension Service help small farmers learn how to produce something new?

But anyone familiar with the University of Kentucky's College of Agriculture understands. Before Sen. Benny Ray Bailey and Dr. Grady Stumbo try to drag Extension agents out to creek-bottom tomato patches for strategizing against mold outbreaks, the pair of Hindman Democrats should take on something easy, like curing cancer or ending world hunger.

OK. We're exaggerating.

But only a little.

The UK Extension Service is ill-equipped and/or unwilling to assist growers who want to raise and sell produce.

County agents know about tobacco and cattle and soybeans. But few have the expertise to assist vegetable growers. Agents who make the effort to help their county's farmers with something new like raising and selling vegetables, risk marginalizing themselves with the Extension Service. And, if, heaven forbid, the project flops, the agent risks being branded with that failure forever.

Innovation doesn't stand a chance in such a climate — even though rural Kentucky needs innovation in the worst way.

UK's Extension Service must improve its ability to nurture small-scale innovation and help farmers learn how to market new products. If UK's not up to the challenge, Kentucky State University's small-farm experts would be.

Kentucky's leaders must help the Extension Service change to meet the needs of rural Kentucky. Bailey and Stumbo could be especially helpful.

As chairman of the Senate appropriations and revenue committee, Bailey should bring financial pressure and resources to bear. Stumbo should use his position on the UK board of trustees to push for changes in the Extension Service.

The two apparently arrived at this issue via the prisons springing up in Eastern Kentucky. Bailey and Stumbo hope prisons will become customers for locally grown produce, perhaps re-igniting interest in agriculture in coal-mining areas where farming has all but died out. To that end, Bailey has in mind another change that would be a boon to the rural economy statewide. He wants to revise purchasing laws to give special consideration to Kentucky-grown produce when state parks, prisons, schools and other agencies are buying food. This is a terrific idea; the General Assembly should do it next year.

A human family tree has branches stretching back into the dim past. People who want to inspect the interconnections of those branches up close genealogists — now have an exceptional new resource.

Members of the Mormon Church travel the world to research their ancestors and other people as part of their religious practice. The church has been gathering data for a century and has assembled an archive of genealogical data second to none, with information on two billion people from all over the world.

Recently, church officials inaugurated a Web site, www.family-search.org, that contains information on 400 million of those people. In the next two years, the church expects to add another 600 million names from 110 countries.

The collection of names is an awesome accom-

Each man, woman and child has two parents, four grandparents, eight great-grandparents, 16 greatgreat-grandparents and on and on. Each ancestor is an individual who slept and ate, talked with friends, felt the sunshine and perhaps even thought about his ancestors, too. The trace of life begins with each individual and stretches into history, each person building on the genes and the past of the people who produced him. The family of man is enormous, both in its numbers and complexity.

If the Mormon Church's archive can stir an interest in the past, if users can get a hint of the wonderful diversity of the human species, then it will have





I hope Josephine would have liked that.





Pack told he will not return in basketball

Blackcat coach looking for reasons for decision

The most successful boys' basketball coach in recent years for Prestonsburg High School was told earlier this week he would not return to the helm of the school's basketball program. Coach Jackie Pack said the only reason he was given was that "it was best for Prestonsburg."

School principal Coy Samons informed Pack of his decision not to rehire him this past Monday. Pack said he was surprised about the notification.

"He really didn't give me an answer, only that it was best for Prestonsburg," Pack said. "Even as late as last week I was told I would be back."

Pack has been head coach the past four seasons. It was well documented the problems Pack had last summer when he was relieved of his duties at the local high school because of "improper conduct" allegations. Then-interim superintendent Mike King fired Pack from his position last year as both coach and teacher. Pack won a victory in the courtroom and was reinstated by the court.

"I asked Mr. Samons to give me a reason, just one legitimate reason, and he only said it was best for Prestonsburg," Pack said. "That is all he would say. Best for who? The politicians, doctors, businessmen. It is certainly not best for the kids."

Principal Samons was contacted at the high

school. He preferred not to comment on the situation until after Thursday night's site base council meeting.

The drama unfolded, according to Pack, when on May 6 the site base council made a unanimous decision to rehire all the school coaches for next season.

"Mr. Samons told me on May 7, it was all over, 'you are the coach,'" Pack said. "Somewhere in the neighborhood of May 21, Mr. Samons decided to post all coaching positions, but again tells me everything is okay, he's just covering himself."

Pack said that on May 27 the posted list had only one name for the job of head basketball coach at the school and that name was his. But things soon changed.

"The listing had been up for a week. I checked the list at 1:30 and my name was still the only name," he said. "At 2 p.m. of that day, it had five names, meaning four other people were added between 1:30 and 2 p.m."

The action to hire all coaches back, made at a previous site base council meeting, according to Pack, was rescinded on a motion made by baseball coach Russell Shepherd.

"On Monday (May 27), Mr. Samons called me in and told me that I would not be recommended by him as coach of basketball or golf next year."

Pack turned the Prestonsburg basketball program

After walking Amanda Griffith and with runners in scoring position, Slone got Rachel Doderer to pop out and struck out Megan Hall to end the game.





HOW DID BEING A WINSTON CUP DRIVER AFFECT YOUR PERFORMANCE AT INDY? "The nice thing about being in the Winston Cup Series is that it has trained me to deal with 500-mile races. Knowing the fact that I had to run 600 race laps, as opposed to 1,100 miles, my mind-set toward a longer race helped me relax a little more in the car ... and be more patient. Now that I have run a couple of 500mile races, I know that I have to be patient at the beginning of the race to conserve myself physically, as well as the race car. It was a long day, more demanding physically than mentally. DESCRIBE THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN DRIVING A WINSTON CUP CAR AND AN INDY RACING LEAGUE (IRL) CAR. "If you start out with the IRL cars you have the different wings and the underbodies. The turbulence of the air becomes a critical factor with the handling characteristics of the car. You need to know how to handle that going into the race. Your turbulence will be at the start of the race and since we were starting 24th, I had to be pretty careful. I think my experience in the last three years in IRL has prepared me for starting






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Floyd retires

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

Parents burn ballots in site base election at South Floyd High School

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Parents at South Floyd High School burned the ballots Tuesday night after they deemed a site-base election for two parent representatives had been conducted unfairly. The election was the second

attempt to fill the posts. The first election was held in May and won by Liz Sparkman, an employee of Worldwide Equipment, a company headed by Floyd County Board of Education Chairman Terry Dotson.

The second election was held Tuesday and the votes were burned before a winner could be determined and after parents had been allowed to vote for only one candidate - not two.

After the first election, parents protested that an announcement of open nominations had not been

Mining company seeks permission to landfill at Ivel for coal byproducts

Lodestar Energy, which operates mines in Pike and Floyd counties, has applied for a permit to build a landfill for coal byproducts on Ivy Creek Road in Ivel.

A news release from the state Division of Waste Management says Lodestar, which has operations on Ivy Creek, expects the proposed landfill to accept "combusted coal byproducts," such as fly ash and bottom ash.

However, Barney Walker, a member of the Floyd County Solid Waste Commission and an environmental activist, said no such landfill is in the five-year

solid waste plan which the county had to submit to the state last year.

"If the state goes ahead and issues a permit, they are bypassing (the local) ordinance," Walker said.

That ordinance, according to Walker, states that any wasting facility has to come before the Solid Waste Commission and/or the Floyd County Fiscal Court and a public hearing has to be held

"If the state issues (a permit), then Floyd County doesn't need a solid waste plan, which it required us to have," Walker said. At Martha's Restaurant at the

Magoffin couple tops in foster care

A Salyersville couple is on the list of the state's outstanding foster parents - 16 individuals or couples cited by the Cabinet for Families and Children at a ceremony at the Kentucky Horse Center on May 18. Mike and Gail Griffith have cared for 30 foster children, including children with severe medical problems and other special needs, during five years as foster parents. advertised, resulting in a limited number of candidates. Only three candidates had been nominated, according to James Rodney Johnson, a parent and a current candidate for the council.

Johnson said he knew the vacancy was coming up - parent representative Don Sparkman's two-year term expires and Joe Stewart is no longer eligible because his child graduates this year. Johnson said he wanted to run for the council seat and had watched the newspaper for an announcement of the election.

Regulations regarding site-base elections require that notification of elections be advertised, according to Jack Gray, manager of the School Council Development Branch of the Department of Education.

The elections are supposed to be controlled by parent-teacher organizations, but South Floyd High School apparently doesn't have an incorporated group.

the principal gathers the parents together for a meeting and that group determines when the elections will be held.

Parents have protested South Floyd High School Principal and have alleged that she unofficially campaigned for Sparkman at the parent meeting by praising Sparkman's participation in various school events.

'I don't think that's probably ethical, but not illegal," Gray said. "I would not recommend it."

Daniels did not return a call from The Times by presstime Thursday to respond to the allegation.

After the first election was voided, a new election was scheduled and nominations were again open. James Rodney Johnson, Liz Sparkman, Betty Tackett, Mike Hall and Debbie Engle were nominated.

The election date was advertised, but it stated that the polls would close at 6 p.m. Parents had planned to keep the election open until 7 p.m., Johnson said. The election was rescheduled with the 7 p.m. closing time.

dation by the parents to let the top vote-getter serve the two-year term vacated by Sparkman and the second top vote-getter to serve the one year term vacated by Stewart.

"Nadine must have read that as voting for one person," Johnson said.

Jack Gray said there are no statutes to address the issue of the number of votes allowed by each person, but he said it is "always custom to have two votes" when there are two vacancies.

"If you have two vacancies to fill, ... each person should have been told to vote for two. They had five to choose from. They could have voted for one," he said.

When candidates and parents expressed concern that lack of the second vote by parents could have changed the election, Daniels apparently called Gray about how to handle the situation. Gray apparently told her to seal the box of ballots until parents could determine if they wanted to conduct a third election

Someone suggested counting the ballots before they were sealed, but that caused disagreement, according to Johnson.

"I said, 'If you're not going to count them, then you've got to





Addressing continues to plague 911 system

Address changes/verification and road names for 911 addressing continue to present problems for the Floyd County 911 Advisory Council.

Chairman Jim Caldwell said 130 Floyd County roads have been mapped and addressed, with 70 of those entered into the computer and verified. Caldwell said he didn't know how many addresses this accounted for, but he estimated it to be about 900.

After Caldwell explained what work Jodi Hall and her two workers have completed, Hubert Puckett from Abbott Creek said he was having problems with his mail because of so many addresses. He said the post office had informed him that his mail would be stopped if he did not change his address.

Puckett is using a Highway Contract (HC) address. Postmaster Edith Risner said anyone using an HC address should get a 911 address. Risner said some mail coming to an HC address will be sent back. She said the best solution is for everyone to use one of the 911 addresses.

Anyone who has not been notified of a final 911 number should not make changes to the numbering on mailboxes until the final notification comes from 911, according to Caldwell.

When the mapping is completed, the numbering will be on an odd/even basis. The houses on the right from point of origin will have even numbers and those on the left will have odd numbers. For example, if you go up Abbott Creek off US 23 all the house numbers on the left should be odd and all those on the right should be even. Any address that does not follow this pattern now will be changed. Caldwell said houses that were off just a few feet would not be changed. but added if they were off enough for a structure to be built in between, a change would be necessary - usually by one number. Gary Dotson, from Prestonsburg 911, said it is important that people put their 911 number on the structure, or if the structure is far from the road, he suggested landscaping signs that point to the house. "Let the emergency service people know where you are," he admonished, adding that if mailboxes are used, the 911 numbers should be placed on both sides of the mailbox. Road signs and lack thereof are causing some problems. Daniel P. Gullett from the Left Beaver Rescue Squad said some of the information

coming up on the screen is from enhanced 911 and is not correct. He said his crew ended up calling the number back in one instance to get directions to the house. He added that this method takes too much time to be practical

Caldwell said the road signs come through the fiscal court, and he does not know when they will be erected. He did say that once a sign is put up, it will be the correct 911 name for that road or street. Streets with two or more names are causing emergency crews problems.

Bill Dotson said the fire, ambulance and police departments should have a session on map reading once the maps are released. He said he "didn't want to insult anyone" but many people, including some in these departments, needed information on reading maps. "On your way to an emergency situation is not a time to find out you can't read the map," Dotson said.

Caldwell asked P. R. Long from Appalachian Wireless to make appointments with each of the departments to check on the condition of pagers. Long made several appointments for this week and next to check the pagers. Long also told the departments he had some pagers to give until pagers are returned from wheing repaired.

Terry Triplett from the Garrett Fire Department said he has a listing of landing sites for helicopters, but the sites are not on Healthnet's list and are "useless." At present, the only sites in

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



Extend UK Extension

A couple of mountain leaders are pushing a revolutionary concept: The Extension Service should help rural landowners grow and market vegetables.

This may not strike the casual observer as all that revolutionary. In a tobacco state like Kentucky, why wouldn't the Extension Service help small farmers learn how to produce something new?

But anyone familiar with the University of Kentucky's College of Agriculture understands. Before Sen. Benny Ray Bailey and Dr. Grady Stumbo try to drag Extension agents out to creek-bottom tomato patches for strategizing against mold outbreaks, the pair of Hindman Democrats should take on something easy, like curing cancer or ending world hunger.

OK. We're exaggerating.

But only a little.

The UK Extension Service is ill-equipped and/or unwilling to assist growers who want to raise and sell produce.

County agents know about tobacco and cattle and soybeans. But few have the expertise to assist vegetable growers. Agents who make the effort to help their county's farmers with something new like raising and selling vegetables, risk marginalizing themselves with the Extension Service. And, if, heaven forbid, the project flops, the agent risks being branded with that failure forever.

Innovation doesn't stand a chance in such a climate — even though rural Kentucky needs innovation in the worst way.

UK's Extension Service must improve its ability to nurture small-scale innovation and help farmers learn how to market new products. If UK's not up to the challenge, Kentucky State University's small-farm experts would be.

Kentucky's leaders must help the Extension Service change to meet the needs of rural Kentucky. Bailey and Stumbo could be especially helpful.

As chairman of the Senate appropriations and revenue committee, Bailey should bring financial pressure and resources to bear. Stumbo should use his position on the UK board of trustees to push for changes in the Extension Service.

The two apparently arrived at this issue via the prisons springing up in Eastern Kentucky. Bailey and Stumbo hope prisons will become customers for locally grown produce, perhaps re-igniting interest in agriculture in coal-mining areas where farming has all but died out. To that end, Bailey has in mind another change that would be a boon to the rural economy statewide. He wants to revise purchasing laws to give special consideration to Kentucky-grown produce when state parks, prisons, schools and other agencies are buying food. This is a terrific idea; the General Assembly should do it next year.

A human family tree has branches stretching back into the dim past. People who want to inspect the interconnections of those branches up close genealogists — now have an exceptional new resource.

Members of the Mormon Church travel the world to research their ancestors and other people as part of their religious practice. The church has been gathering data for a century and has assembled an archive of genealogical data second to none, with information on two billion people from all over the world.

Recently, church officials inaugurated a Web site, www.family-search.org, that contains information on 400 million of those people. In the next two years, the church expects to add another 600 million names from 110 countries.

The collection of names is an awesome accom-

Each man, woman and child has two parents, four grandparents, eight great-grandparents, 16 greatgreat-grandparents and on and on. Each ancestor is an individual who slept and ate, talked with friends, felt the sunshine and perhaps even thought about his ancestors, too. The trace of life begins with each individual and stretches into history, each person building on the genes and the past of the people who produced him. The family of man is enormous, both in its numbers and complexity.

If the Mormon Church's archive can stir an interest in the past, if users can get a hint of the wonderful diversity of the human species, then it will have





I hope Josephine would have liked that.





Pack told he will not return in basketball

Blackcat coach looking for reasons for decision

The most successful boys' basketball coach in recent years for Prestonsburg High School was told earlier this week he would not return to the helm of the school's basketball program. Coach Jackie Pack said the only reason he was given was that "it was best for Prestonsburg."

School principal Coy Samons informed Pack of his decision not to rehire him this past Monday. Pack said he was surprised about the notification.

"He really didn't give me an answer, only that it was best for Prestonsburg," Pack said. "Even as late as last week I was told I would be back."

Pack has been head coach the past four seasons. It was well documented the problems Pack had last summer when he was relieved of his duties at the local high school because of "improper conduct" allegations. Then-interim superintendent Mike King fired Pack from his position last year as both coach and teacher. Pack won a victory in the courtroom and was reinstated by the court.

"I asked Mr. Samons to give me a reason, just one legitimate reason, and he only said it was best for Prestonsburg," Pack said. "That is all he would say. Best for who? The politicians, doctors, businessmen. It is certainly not best for the kids."

Principal Samons was contacted at the high

school. He preferred not to comment on the situation until after Thursday night's site base council meeting.

The drama unfolded, according to Pack, when on May 6 the site base council made a unanimous decision to rehire all the school coaches for next season.

"Mr. Samons told me on May 7, it was all over, 'you are the coach,'" Pack said. "Somewhere in the neighborhood of May 21, Mr. Samons decided to post all coaching positions, but again tells me everything is okay, he's just covering himself."

Pack said that on May 27 the posted list had only one name for the job of head basketball coach at the school and that name was his. But things soon changed.

"The listing had been up for a week. I checked the list at 1:30 and my name was still the only name," he said. "At 2 p.m. of that day, it had five names, meaning four other people were added between 1:30 and 2 p.m."

The action to hire all coaches back, made at a previous site base council meeting, according to Pack, was rescinded on a motion made by baseball coach Russell Shepherd.

"On Monday (May 27), Mr. Samons called me in and told me that I would not be recommended by him as coach of basketball or golf next year."

Pack turned the Prestonsburg basketball program

After walking Amanda Griffith and with runners in scoring position, Slone got Rachel Doderer to pop out and struck out Megan Hall to end the game.





HOW DID BEING A WINSTON CUP DRIVER AFFECT YOUR PERFORMANCE AT INDY? "The nice thing about being in the Winston Cup Series is that it has trained me to deal with 500-mile races. Knowing the fact that I had to run 600 race laps, as opposed to 1,100 miles, my mind-set toward a longer race helped me relax a little more in the car ... and be more patient. Now that I have run a couple of 500mile races, I know that I have to be patient at the beginning of the race to conserve myself physically, as well as the race car. It was a long day, more demanding physically than mentally. DESCRIBE THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN DRIVING A WINSTON CUP CAR AND AN INDY RACING LEAGUE (IRL) CAR. "If you start out with the IRL cars you have the different wings and the underbodies. The turbulence of the air becomes a critical factor with the handling characteristics of the car. You need to know how to handle that going into the race. Your turbulence will be at the start of the race and since we were starting 24th, I had to be pretty careful. I think my experience in the last three years in IRL has prepared me for starting




