



'Posse' pursues, suspect sprints

Officers from four separate agencies were involved in a vehicle pursuit and foot chase Tuesday night that ended in the arrest of Koree Thompson, 24, of Volga in Johnson County.

Thompson was pulled over at the University BP by Kentucky State Police Trooper John Hunt for a possible DUI.

When he was approached by Hunt, Thompson allegedly pulled a gun on the trooper, said Floyd County Sheriff John K. Blackburn. Thompson apparently tried to push Hunt away from him and fold into his vehicle.

Prestonsburg Police Department media logs state that Hunt was in pursuit of Thompson along University Drive to Cliff Road. Thompson led Hunt along Cliff Road to Cliff Church where he turned and headed back toward the mouth of the road, forcing Prestonsburg Officer Stevie Little into the ditch.

After a nearly four-mile pursuit, Thompson reportedly pulled

KDE sponsors public hearing

A Kentucky Department of Education (KDE) representative at the State Board Public Facilities Hearing, Tuesday night at Allen Central High School, asked for public comment, and teachers, coaches and citizens from three areas were there to talk about the proposed amendment to the local school system's facility

Teacher Debbie Walker was the first speaker. She told George P. Dundon Jr., program manager for KDE Division of Facilities management, that input was solicited

from parents and teachers on the school uniform issue, but such input was not sought concerning the amendment to the facility plans.

She told Dundon how inadequate she thought the facility at Prestonsburg Elementary is. Her list of problems included no hot water or ventilation in some of the bathrooms, urine and fecal smells in the bathrooms, and dangerous radiators, among other shortcom-

Walker said despite the inadequate conditions at her school, quality instruction is taking place. She gave her

PRIDE funds local projects

Four Floyd County schools have won grants for environmental projects from the PRIDE program, according to an announcement from US Rep. Hal Rogers'

The grants total \$17,465.

Allen Central Middle School will use a \$5,000 grant to develop an outdoor classroom and purchase materials for the construction of an outdoor shelter to serve more than 650 students.

Another \$5,000 grant goes to Prestonsburg High School to purchase equipment and materials for an outdoor classroom project that will serve about 730

May Valley Elementary will use a grant of \$4,675 to develop a wildlife trail as part of an educational project to serve about 350

The fourth grant, for \$2,790, is for Prestonsburg Elementary to purchase soil test kits, materials for bird feeders and other educational materials.

"We invest millions to clean up the mistakes of the past, but that will mean nothing if we don't prevent a repeat of those mistakes. Education is the key," Rogers said.

"These grants support outdoor classrooms, environmental education projects and student recycling projects across the region. We are investing in our young people as well as our region's future," he said.

Kentucky PRIDE - Personal Responsibility in a Desirable Environment was created by Rogers and Kentucky Secretary of Natural Resources Jim Bickford in 1997.

Under PRIDE's environmental awareness programs, educators, schools and other organizations from across the region compete for grants of up to \$5,000 each for programs that emphasize water quality

Runaway teen returns home

The parents of a local teen breathed a sigh of relief earlier this week after being reunited with their daughter. Sixteen-year-old Brandi Blocker had been missing since July 24.

The Weeksbury teen-ager and her boyfriend Gregory Russell of Roane County, Tennessee, had been in Baltimore, Maryland, staying with some

Blocker and Russell rented an office of a car dealership to sleep in when they first arrived in Maryland. They stayed there from July until September when Debbie McCarty offered them a place to stay.

Blocker said McCarty had seen that she was sick-

ly and became worried about her.

Michael and Debbie McCarty suspected Blocker was a runaway and threatened to turn her in if she did not admit to it, the Floyd County teen said Wednesday. The couple was able to get her to confess

to running away one evening while Russell was in police custody for "fooling around with a 14-yeargirl," Blocker said.

"The people had a feeling I was a runaway. I started crying and they called my mom and dad," she said.

When they received the call, Harold and Sherry Blocker notified the Kentucky State Police and the Maryland State Police of the situation and left for Maryland soon after.

"I knew they were worried. He (Russell) threatened me. If I called my parents, he said he would kill me," said Brandi Blocker. Russell had been abusing Blocker while they were living in the office, the young woman said, alleging that he had been beating

When the police arrived at the McCarty home, Blocker attempted to run from the officers, she said. The officers placed her in handcuffs and transported

If a school is labeled transitional, no major repairs can be made to the buildings at the school.

Duty said current data indicate that big schools are not better. She asked that both schools be changed to permanent schools and needed repairs be done.

Stumbo said the biggest fault she has with the plan is the uncertainty it creates for schools on Left Beaver. She said it was not clear what was being recommended. She asked the committee to "have the courage to spell it out and give us reasons" for the recommendations that have been made.

Stumbo said nothing was being done to help the two middle schools that were created by consolidation: Allen Central Middle and South Floyd Middle. "We just put them on the top floor of other schools and forgot about them," Stumbo said.

Belinda Osborne of South Floyd

Middle said the school has no way to expand and talked about the difficulty of sharing facilities with South Floyd High School. "South Floyd Middle is one long hallway," Osborne said.

Both Bud Reynolds and Connie Gearheart said they thought the original plan called for a middle school at South Floyd. Dundon said the plan he was reading from did not indicate that.

Reynolds said he would agree with the middle school teachers that the two schools got in each other's

Prefacing his statement with an assurance of impartiality, Dundon told the group that "one plan can't cure all ills." He also told the group the plan could be changed up to three times a year.

Dundon told the group he would take the comments from the speakers and prepare his recommendation. He said he would send his recommendation to Supt. Paul Fanning and any interested groups could get copies from the central office.

Rightly, we believe, Gov. Paul Patton retained his job. It is difficult to argue, unless you have a particular axe to grind, that the state and this region have not fared well under his reign.

Interestingly, however, is the fact that Reform Party candidate Gatewood Galbraith outpolled Patton in 17 precincts. This should fuel conversation and debate for some time.

Obviously, Patton's stands regarding the community colleges and workman's compensation ticked off some voters around here, but we can't help wonder if Gatewood's reputation as a marijuana/hemp proponent influenced some entrepreneurs who have been trying their hand at, um, gardening on mountain tops and river banks of late.

They say folks vote their pocketbooks all the time. Sounds reasonable.

Sheila Crisp Lee took about half the number of votes as Doug Hall, her opponent for Floyd Circuit Clerk. Half, of course, hardly counts in the end. But, the significance is that Lee ran as a Republican in a county that is overwhelmingly Democrat.

Against formidable odds, she won far more votes than there are members of her party. Regardless of political philosophy, that says something positive and hopeful about Floyd County.

Perhaps we are moving — albeit slowly — toward a multi-party county with checks and balances that don't now exist. No matter how high the caliber of the officials we have, the county benefits from choices and competition.

Congratulations are in order for Hall, the winner, but Lee deserves a pat on the back and assurance that she is not a

Congratulations, also, to David Allen Barber. He faced a big challenge, a multi-county contest against a seasoned

Nobody came close to getting as many votes Tuesday as County Clerk Chris Waugh, in his first campaign for elective office. This may put to rest the adage that nice guys finish last. Waugh is both a nice guy and a big winner.

Julie Paxton is, likewise, a winner. She conducted an intelligent, well-planned, well-organized campaign, upbeat and positive, which typifies how we expect she runs her judicial office. Thankfully, she was not harmed by the insidious, insipid charge of being an outsider.

Overall, Floyd County voters deserve a round of applause. While one-fourth of registered voters voting is not enough to turn cartwheels, it was considerably better than expected. Despite the rain, more than 10,000 Floyd Countians sloshed in to vote.

'Sweetness' memories

In the early-mid '70s, when I was working in Atlanta for the Office for Advancement of Public Negro Colleges, I was assigned to go to Jackson State University in Mississippi to take pictures and research a story on a university program of note.

The JSU public relations director scheduled, over a couple of days, meetings with a number of administrators, faculty and students.

As the PR man and I walked across the wooded campus on a sunny, autumn day, we met up with a handsome young man on his way to our shared luncheon.

I have a strong recollection of that meeting. The young man had rigidly perfect posture, muscles sculpted on a straight frame, stretched to make himself as tall as possible. His dark eyes fairly sparkled and his smile could not be contained.

On that walk, it was hard to carry on a conversation with him because of the distractions of young women sidling up to him, arching their heads and rolling their eyes, each hoping she could win one special, penetrating look. The young college men, likewise, scrambled for his attention, no doubt hoping to bask in his reflection.

At lunch I watched how he interacted with the other people around the table. He was ever respectful. He did not hog the conversation, although the others would have gladly deferred.

He listened to what others were saying, and he was extremely humble when someone heaped praise on him which was often.

The PR man was hyping the young Walter Payton for the Heisman Trophy. It was an idle effort since the picks did not come from small colleges and especially from historically black colleges. But southern blacks, like white Appalachians, learned long ago to live on hope.

I'm not a big sports fan, although at that time I was not long out of the Bulldog-crazy University of Georgia, so I paid a little more attention to collegiate football then. I'm not sure that if this young man had been someone other than Walter Payton I would have remembered him over the years.

I've followed his career these many years because he made such an impression on me that day. He was the opposite of what I expected from a star athlete, certainly of what I'd known at Georgia where jocks back then knew the world was theirs.

There was, as his NFL nickname indicates, a profound sweetness about him. I cannot quote any of his statistics, but I can verify that he was an unusual young man, the best of the best.

I was saddened when he announced last year that he had a serious illness, although as I recall he was positive that he could beat it. There was no aura of self-pity about him. That sweet smile shone as he talked about his illness.

It was surprising to learn this week that he did not beat it. I had confidence he would come out healthy and still shining. As corny as it might sound, perhaps God needed a boost and he asked Walter "Sweetness" Payton to join him.

GOSPEL ACCORDING TO ME

To everything there is a season

In Genesis, God promises Noah that for as long as the earth remains, the ongoing repetition of "seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, will never cease.'

These regularly scheduled seasons are brought about by the travels and revolutions of our planet, of course, and even now they're more dependable than the next breath you hope to draw.

What's interesting to me is that the writer of Ecclesiastes (traditionally said to have been Solomon) later adds to this law.

For him, not only do the workings of the earth, sun and moon have their specific times and seasons, but so does all of creation, including human endeavors.

"There is a time for everything," Solomon tells us, "and a season for every activity under heaven."

He says that, among other things, there's a proper time to be born and a proper time to die; a time to plant and a time to uproot; a time to weep and a time to laugh; a time to be silent and a time to speak.

I looked up the Hebrew words used in Ecclesiastes to convey this

The word translated as "season" means, literally, "a fixed or appointed occasion." The word translated as "time" means "a proper 'now." The word translated as "activity" means "pleasure," "desire" or "inclination."

In short, there's an appropriate time to engage in most any inclination we may have, a time actually fixed beforehand by God as good.

And there's a wrong time. The trick is in discerning God's

right timing from our errant timing. If you burst out laughing in the middle of a comedian's routine in a nightclub, for instance, you'll be considered one of the boys. But if you burst out laughing at a funeral, you may find yourself the object of

If you invest in stocks at the beginning of a bull market, you'll make a fortune. If you buy those very same stocks when the market has peaked, you can bankrupt your-

It's rarely our activities that are a problem. It's our timing.

For me, this is enormously enlightening. Every activity is beautiful, Solomon says, when conducted in its proper time.

As I've mentioned, my third book recently was published. (This week it's the No. 1 non-fiction bestseller at Lexington's Joseph-Beth Booksellers. Yee-haw!)



The city of Blaine survived a tough dissolution fight Tuesday, with voters deciding that their community will remain incorporated but deadlocking on who will serve an unexpired term as mayor.

Blaine voters defeated the dissolution question by just 15 votes. Unofficial returns Tuesday night showed 63 residents voting no on the question and 48 voting yes.

While the vote was close on the dissolution question, it was the race for Blaine mayor that will likely result in a recount.

High winds, blowing leaves cause hazards for drivers

High winds, rain and blowing leaves can be a dangerous combination for drivers at this time of year, according to the Blue Grass Auto Club Safety Foundation.

"Strong winds can cause a motorist to lose control of a vehicle or objects blowing across a highway may distract a driver enough to cause an accident," according to Lilla Mason, director of the Safety Foundation.

Leaves that stick to a road surface during rain, can also cause drivers to experience trouble with skidding.

AAA has the following tips for drivers in these types of conditions: RAIN & LEAVES

· Rain and wind will cause leaves to fall on the roadway, making roads slick and hazardous.

· Regardless of speech limits, reduce your speed before entering curves to avoid losing traction on wet leaves and going off the pavement. Wet leaves tend to collect in curves of winding roads.

· Use smooth starts and stops on roads with wet leaves. Avoid jack rabbit acceleration or jamming on the brakes when driving on wet

• Be prepared for anything. Sean low along the roadway for objects that could be blown into your path. Swerving to miss an object is safer than braking on rain slick road, as long as you can do it without hitting another vehicle or solid object.

• Keep in front of or behind high centered vehicles likely to swerve in a wind gust. Those vehicles include sport utilities, vans and empty tractor trailer trucks. Do not linger alongside while passing. Likewise, give such vehicles extra room when passing you.

· Be aware that windy conditions are often more severe in mountainous areas where "wind tunnels" are created by unusual topography. Also, when driving through an underpass, wind speed will decrease under the bridge, but suddenly increase when you come out the other side.

• Reduce your speed and increase your following distance in construction zones. Barrels and temporary road signs may blow onto the roadway.

· Be aware that when, entering or exiting a parked vehicle in windy conditions, a gust of wind may cause a door to fly open or shut with great force, causing injury.







That's how I size Kentucky's chances of winning at Mississippi State Saturday night and achieving bowl eligibility.

Because of a ridiculously soft schedule that enables Jackie Sherrill and company to avoid Tennessee, Florida and Georgia, Mississippi State's number eight nationally ranking and perfect record are suspect. Still, winning at Scott Field this year is no easy task.

But because State's offense is only mediocre, I think Kentucky will win this game if it scores 30 or more points. And barring another performance by the offensive line instead. like we saw at Georgia, I think Dusty Bonner will produce enough points with his offensive unit to get the job done. I know State's defensive numbers are outstanding, but again, look at the schedule.

Guy Morriss is a former O-line coach at MSU, so he knows well the creative blitzing attacks that the Bulldogs' defensive coordinator (Joe Lee Dunn) can employ. And now that his young blockers have lived through that onslaught from the Georgia defense and been able to study the tapes of it, I think Morriss' men will emerge as better

won the game. But, in volleyball, you must win by two points. So, the officials rounded the Mustangs back up to finish the game.



Charlie Gearheart comes home to visit

Traveling west along KY 80 between Eastern and Wayland, a sign stands reading Charlie Gearheart Highway.

Residents not native to Floyd County may ask who is Charlie Gearheart, just as they would ask who is Bert T. Combs, Wallace Wilkinson, or any name along our highways.

Floyd Countians, however, know he is the founder of Goose Creek Symphony.

Gearheart, now 60, has enjoyed a successful life as a musician. His band, Goose Creek Symphony, has allowed him to travel extensively across the United States and to experience an extraordinary life. But Gearheart admits openly he is a hillbilly.

Gearheart made a visit to Floyd County recently after traveling to these parts to visit his 95-year-old aunt, Byrta Link in Ohio. She has always been the aunt he "connected with" and she is one of the last of that generation of his family.

He also left his home in Arizona to "get away from all the phone calls."

The Goose is still flying. Goose Creek Symphony is still selling its latest album, "Going Home," released this spring. Plans are in the works for a possible second Goose Creek acoustic album.

Gearheart said the group has played a couple of venues acoustically this year and will be using this same format when they visit the Sipp Theater in Paintsville on November 13.

With an acoustic performance, Gearheart said Goose Creek can go places they were previously not able to. The normal group of six or seven doesn't have to be at an acoustic performance; therefore, less space is needed on the stage.

Four band members, Paul (Pearl) Spradlin, the band cofounder, Doug Hablena, Gary (Big Mack) Mackey, and Gearheart play the acoustic shows. The band plans to be back at the MAC in April of next year.

Goose Creek now works "in house," keeping all the band's functions, business, promotion, production and the works within the band, said Gearheart. "I'm too old. I don't want people telling me

what to do.'

Goose Creek is in Nashville for the fall. Gearheart said that since the group got back together in 1993, they have tried to tour every year during the fall and spring months with a couple of breaks in the middle to be with their families.


He will tell you proudly that his family is important to him. He and his wife Carolyn have been together for 30 years, and he said he talks to her every day.

Goose Creek and, therefore, Gearheart, is enjoying a resurgence on the music scene. Now in the business 31 years, they know what they like and they like what they do, said Gearheart.

NEWS OF THE WEIRD

— Scotland Yard detectives said they overestimated the number of dead in a fiery London commuter-train crash in October because some survivors had walked away quickly and left town, spontaneously deciding to start new lives. (Detectives know this because several changed their minds and returned home.) After an announcement that some bodies were burned beyond recognition, other people called investigators to say falsely that their estranged spouses were on the train, hoping for official death rulings so they could inherit marital property.

— After questioning Stephanie Loudermilk at length after her 28-yearold husband Bryan's death in June, police in Okeechobee, Florida, said in October that they believe he died accidentally in a sexual stunt gone wrong. Bryan's body was found in a specially constructed pit, beneath a board, which was underneath a rear wheel of his sport utility vehicle, and police believe Bryan enjoyed erotic thrills from being driven over. Stephanie also had videotapes of herself stomping rabbits and mice ("crush videos"), which Bryan had been selling on the Internet.

SILICON VALLEY BABYLON

Michael David Rostoker, 41, an electronics firm CEO, was arrested in San Francisco in September, allegedly on his way to meet his 13-year-old Vietnamese paramour whom customs agents say he intended to bring home as his wife. According to the agents, Rostoker had spent \$150,000 on the girl and her fami-

ly, and e-mail messages to her mentioned Rostoker's "needs" to have her stay thin, learn English, and have sex with him "often." Rostoker's arrest was underreported, perhaps because of ongoing media interest in Patrick J. Naughton, 34, an executive with the high-profile Infoseek, who had been arrested a week earlier in Santa Monica, California, and charged with arranging on the Internet to have sex with a 13-year-old girl, who was really an undercover officer.

GOVERNMENT IN ACTION

— After analyzing public records referring to members of Congress, the online news service Capitol Hill Blue revealed in September that 29 current members have been accused of spousal

abuse and 19 of writing bad checks, and that 71 have bad credit reports and 117 members have been involved in two or more bankrupt businesses. Included also are seven arrests for fraud, 14 for drugrelated charges, eight for shoplifting and three for assault. Also, just in 1998, 84 members were stopped on suspicion of drunk driving but were released when they claimed constitutional immunity.

— A special assessor for the British government offered Eddie Browning, 46, about \$125,000 as compensation for the six years he spent in prison for a murder he did not commit, but in March the assessor also told Browning that the amount would be decreased by about \$8,000 to pay for Browning's room and board during his incarceration, which the

assessor called a "lodging fee."

Legislative Oversight: Police in Anne Arundel County, Maryland, told outraged citizens in August that no state law requires people to report their relatives' deaths to authorities, and thus that Richard Lee Marshall's suspicious private burial of his 3-yearold daughter was legal. And in June, Pennsylvania legislature restored the state law against bestiality, which was accidentally repealed in 1995 when "deviate sexual intercourse" was decriminalized. (The purpose that year was to legalize gay sex, but lawmakers forgot that for decades, some states have equated gay sex with bestiality.)

CREME DE LA WEIRD

Computer programmer Lloyd L. Albright, 47, was arrested and charged with disorderly conduct in early August in a cave near Caldwell, Ohio, where he had gone to pre-

Earth by a meteor at 4 p.m. on Aug. 11. The sheriff had pursued Albright to the cave after hearing of a car loaded with survivalist supplies, including 16 guns and loads of ammunition. Said the sheriff: "(Albright) very sincerely thought there was a meteor that was going to come and hit the Atlantic Ocean and cause a tidal wave 200 feet high."

In an August profile, The Wall Street Journal estimated that Las Vegas hotel magnate Robert T. Bigelow may have spent \$10 million of his \$600 million-to-\$900 million fortune on UFO research, including an endowed university chair in "consciousness studies" and a science institute that investigates sightings. Bigelow vows to spend \$500 million to build the solar system's first space hotel.

- In August in St. Paul, Minnesota, mortgage broker John David Searle was sentenced to seven months in jail for what one Minneapolis officer guessed was only

pare for the destruction of the latest of "hundreds" of episodes of late-night peeping through women's windows. Said a St. Paul officer of Searle, who arrives at his crime scenes in luxury cars and carrying a stool and video camera, "This is almost this man's lifestyle and avocation."

Latest Fetishes: Police in London, England, announced in August they were searching for a man in his mid-20s who has been approaching women for nearly two years, grasping their hands, complimenting them on their fingers, and then attempting to chew off one or more of their nails. And in May in Milwaukee, Chad Hammond pleaded no contest to swiping a woman's underpants off her body at gunpoint in a convenience store.

THE NO. 1 TEST

In July, San Antonio, Texas, probation officers caught Micah Sheehan, 37, using a fake penis and tubing to lend authenticity to the dispensing of purchased urine in his mandatory drug test. Among the schemes athletes use in such tests, according to a September Washington Post story, are hiding pouches of clean urine in the vagina or anus and squeezing it through tubes obscured by pubic hair, or in extreme cases, injecting clean urine directly into the bladder. In another September Washington Post story, South Carolina urine seller Kenneth Curtis said he now only urinates professionally: "I don't waste any of my assets. It's literally liquid gold."

The fall foliage season of 1999 may be waning on the calendar, but the fact is that some of the best vistas of the season will linger through Halloween, thanks to a spell of Indian Summer.

That's right, the combination of frosty nights and sunny mid days this week has helped to put the finishing touches on the autumn hues. Now the oaks are coming on like gangbusters while the maple are holding onto their dazzling reds and oranges in spots. The result-one last picture perfect weekend for the procrastinating photographer in you!

Here is a look at some "can't miss" hot spots.

WEST VIRGINIA

MOUNTAINS

While the leaves are past peak in the mountains, some late color is keeping fall foliage enthusiasts happy in the Summersville Lake to Sutton lake region. Still, there are plenty of brown leaves in Nicholas County, so your best bet may be a drive toward Charleston on the Midland trail.

By the way, fishermen, both the Elk (Sutton dam) and Gauley (Summersvile dam) tailwaters have been recently stocked with rainbow trout, so you can double your pleasure by enjoying the late season colors and filling your skillet with some tasty rainbow.

CHARLESTON AND VICINITY

Jedd Flowers from the division of forestry says the leaves are at

peak through Kanawha and Putnam county. The trip up to the Yeager airport on West Virginia 119 is aglow (as I found out firsthand this past week). Along the Kanawha River, the late colors are due in part to the river fogs that help to bathe the shorelines every fall. Those warmer fogs help to extend their season an extra few days every year along Boulevard and MacCorkland Avenue.

One of my favorite spots is the drive out to Sleepy Hollow Country Club where the red and wine colors of the native deciduous shrubs offer a unique mix with the orange of the maple and emerging golds of the oaks.

RIVER CITIES AND NEAR-BY NEIGHBORS

From Beech Fork Lake to the Wavne National Forest (Ironton)-and from Riverbend Golf Club (Greenbo) state park to city park in Gallipolis and Krodell Park in Point Pleasant, the story is "illuminating" foliage. Start with the dazzling oranges and reds of the sugar maple, mix in the mellow yellows of the oak and then add a touch of burgundy from the dogwood—all this with the "evergreens" as a backdrop and you have mile after mile of flaming color.

CHIEF LOGAN AND NEARBY ENVIRONS

In Logan County, Forester Tony Evans says the trip on corridor G then onto WV 10 into Chief Logan State Park is at or maybe a shade past peak color. That means the golden browns of the beech trees, the ravishing reds of the sweetgum, and outrageous oranges of the maple are worth the trip on route 85 out to RD Bailey Dam and along state route 17 across Blair Mountain into Boone County.

JENNY WILEY STATE RESORT PARK

This section of Kentucky is known for its late season colors, often after the rest of the Bluegrass has browned out. Park Ranger Steve Markhum says this is a "very good year" through the Levisa Fork Valley with the yellows of the sweetgum stealing the show as of press time. Take KY 302 around Dewey Lake and enjoy the six-mile trip as you gaze across the emerald waters on your lakeshore drive.



CRITTERS CORNER

Did you ever think about how important eyes are to communication?

We're certainly aware of other people's eyes. We say of someone we are sure is lying, "He couldn't look me in the eye." If we think someone is dishonest, we may say he has "shifty" eyes. How quickly could your mother remind you to mind your manners if she caught your eye across a c r o w d e d room?

Eyes are even more important to communication

for animals that don't have a spoken language. Many non-human species depend primarily on visual and chemical (smell) means to communicate with each other.

Obviously, body language depends on vision for interpretation, but often the eyes themselves are used to transmit information.

By the way, this is an important point to remember if you have a blind pet: They may not automatically get along with other animals because they can't send and receive information normally. Animals who live with the blind individual usually adapt to the disability over time, and sometimes even seem to understand the problem.)

lent example of a species that has developed very sophisticated visual language. We are told as children not to stare at dogs; this is o o d g advice. In

most predatory species (including dogs, cats and humans), direct eye contact with another individual is used to mean confidence, dominance, or sometimes an overt threat.

A dog could interpret a person's stare as any of these things; the interpretation can vary depending on the temperament of the dog, the situation or other signals the person is sending unconsciously with his body.

In prey species (horses, deer,

goats, etc.), a stare is often associated with a predator. Watch a herding dog work a flock of sheep sometime. While he uses his body, a great deal of control is done with his eyes.

Border collies, in particular, are famous for their "eye." Herding breeds are actually dogs selected for their predatory drive; over time, this has been modified so they don't go any further than chasing and sometimes nipping or holding the leg of a sheep or cow.

The predatory stare is a useful concept to keep in mind if you have a horse that is difficult to catch in the pasture. Try approaching the horse

with your head turned slightly and your eyes focused down and away from the horse.

Approach

he turns away, you turn slightly and continue only when he stops moving. It's one of

where slower can actually be faster.

those cases

This is not going to work, of course, for the horse that just does not want to be caught,

but if he is just nervous and flighty, it may be enough to reassure him and allow you to approach. (For more on this concept, pick up a copy of "The Man Who Listens to Horses" by Monty Roberts.)

Dogs use an averted gaze and narrowed, sometimes rapidly blinking, eyes to indicate they intend to harm. Different degrees of looking away, combined with other postures and expressions, can be used to indicate friendliness, submission or fear.

Some scientists even feel that the markings on the faces of wolves help to make facial expressions more easily seen. This poses an interesting question: Have we unconsciously made it harder for our domestic dogs to communicate with one another by artificially changing their markings? We almost certainly interfere with communications when we dock tails and crop ears.

I'm not saying that solid-colored dogs are handicapped by this, but just that color may be significant sometimes. If your Siberian Husky has never seen other breeds of dogs, the first time it meets a black Labrador Retriever, he may need some time to get the hang of the other's "speech." It's usually not a problem, probably for the same reason that we understand English even when spoken with an unfamiliar accent

One of the most valuable things you can do when starting to train a dog is to teach him to make eye contact with you. Some dogs will do this more readily than others; obviously, bold, outgoing dogs will be more comfortable with this than more timid and submissive animals. I wonder if this is part of the reason that herding breeds do so well in obedience competition.

Ask the dog to "Look" or "Watch me" frequently during the day, whether or not you are actually doing a training session.

HOOFBEATS: Set against the red sand dunes of the oldest desert in the world, one courageous horse grows from an awkward colt into a magnificent stallion, triumphing against all odds at the edge of the rugged, inhospitable Skeleton Coast of Namibia.

In 1914, Lucky, a young foal, is born aboard a German supply steamer transporting his mother and other workhorses to Africa. Soon parted from his mother and terribly vulnerable, the foal is

adopted by an orphaned stable boy in a mining town. When the town evacuates due to encroaching war, Lucky is abandoned and ventures into the surrounding desert. Following the lead of a young Bushman girl and later an Oryx antelope, the foal learns how to survive in the harsh setting.

In this dramatic adventure, Lucky's journey eventually leads him back to the destroyed mining town where he protects a young mare, Beauty, and undertakes a heroic mission to defeat Caesar, a domineering stallion.

This is a good one for the kiddies. However, the more sensitive ones may find it too brutal. While it has a good outcome, some of the scenes may be a bit much.

GIRL INTERRUPTED: In 1965, after a session with a psychiatrist she'd never seen before, Susanna Kaysen (Winona Ryder) was diagnosed with Borderline Personality Disorder – an affliction with symptoms so ambiguous almost any adolescent girl might qualify – and sent to a renowned New England psychiatric hospital where she spent the next two years in a ward for teenage girls.

There, Susanna loses herself in

an Oz-like nether world of seductive and disturbed young women, among them Lisa (Angelina Jolie), a charming sociopath who stages a disastrous escape with Susanna, Daisy (Brittany

Murphy), a pampered girl with a predilection for rotisserie chicken, and Polly, a remarkably kind burn victim. Ultimately, assisted by the hospital's head psychiatrist, Dr. Wick (Vanessa Redgrave), and a no-nonsense ward nurse, Valerie (Whoopi Goldberg), Susanna, like Dorothy, resolves to leave this Oz and reclaim her life.

No other show approaches those numbers of purebred animals. Organizers, however, also produce events and exhibits that appeal to both industry participants and the general

The North American Championship Rodeo is a Pro Rodeo Cowboys Association (PRCA) event and is an invitational finals for cowboys who compete all year in a ninestate region (PRCA Great Lakes Circuit). 1999 dates are November 11, 12 and 13, and performances are 7:30 p.m. nightly in Freedom Hall.

Tickets are available through TicketMaster and Fairgrounds Box Office and are priced as follows: Thursday and Friday—\$17; Saturday—\$20. The Saturday performance typically sell out, so advance ticket purchase is recommended.

Since 1978, Louisville area school children have come to the livestock expo on prescheduled field trip visits. Last year the program was revised and expanded, and a new complimentary classroom curriculum was developed. More than 7,000 area grade school children are expected to participate in the program this year. The NAILE Education Program is sponsored by Kentucky Beef Council and Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation.

Once again WHAS Radio and Feeders Supply Co. have teamed up to sponsor the Childrens Barnyard, an Expo feature that has become an integral part of the education program. This farm animal exhibit is open throughout the expo in the East Wing. No separate fee is charged for Barnyard visits and all show visitors are welcome.

Another free exhibit is the Art of Wool Showcase. Visitors see wool carding, dyeing and spinning, as well as wool craft demonstrations. The Showcase opens on Saturday, November 6, in the East Wing, immediately adjacent to the NAILE Wool Show. The Wool Show is a national, fleece competition. Wool fleeces are displayed from November 12 until the end of the expo.

The NAILE exhibit section, an area known as the Giant Country Store, is more than livestock agriculture supplies. The entire KFEC East Wing is filled with booths offering everything from western wear to unique jewelry, crafts, home decorating items and more. A food court is part of the

Another NAILE tradition is the Stockdog Trials. This event is a sheep herding competition for Border Collies and their handlers. Scheduled this year for November 11-14, the outdoor trials are also open to the public.

In addition to the competition, Border Collie herding demonstrations are also conducted inside in the East Wing during the NAILE's second week.

The sale of Champions and Free Country Concert takes place at 7:30 p.m., on

Thursday, November 18. The Grand and Reserve Champions from three junior market shows-market swine, wethers and steers—are sold to the highest bidders.

A new sale record was set in 1998 when \$64,800 was paid by area businesses for the six animals. The animals, along with \$6,480 in fresh product, were then donated to Kentucky Harvest. This traditional food donation will take place again in 1999.

The sale is followed by a free concert featuring country music artist Brad Paisley.

One time admission to the giant exposition is \$5 for adults and \$2 for children. \$15 season passes are also available. Admission fee includes KFEC parking.

The NAILE is produced annually by the Kentucky State Fair Board and the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

All of Mad's famous features (including humor their innumerable "special" issues) are here, and these CD's even includes an exclusive roll of Mad toilet paper. This icon's humor doesn't ordinarily qualify as risque or 'X" rated, but occasionally it makes mildly scatological points! The CD's encom-

pass more than 22,000 text/graphic pages, covers (including a special cover browser), and innumerable shots of Alfred E. Neumann, Mad's mascot for more than half a centu-Spy Vs. Madvertisements (Mad accepts no advertising and these are clever spoofs), The Lighter Side, The Trash Heap, and every other Mad department is featured. There's enough here - and website at

www.madmag.com - to keep you laughing for another 50 years!

Installation is easy, requirements are basic (just Windows 9X/NT, a Pentium 90, 32 megs of RAM and 30 megs of hard disc space). One caveat: if you're not with familiar Mad Magazine and/or don't care for satire, this compilation isn't for you. For the irreverent, though, it's priceless!

mother to Mesa, Arizona, because she had severe asthma. In 1968, Goose Creek Symphony was established in Phoenix, releasing its first album in March 1970.

Gearheart had grown tired of playing bars and other people's music. And though it has had its share of members, Goose Creek has developed a hard core following over the years, known affectionately as Gooseheads.

Gearheart describes the sound "Appalachian-based, not commercialized, almost folk, with a rock, big band, and old-time country sound."

"It's an organic sound," he said. "It's very intricate. It's not commercial music. It's our own thing and it's a good time.'

Goose Creek's songs are not the everyday, three- to four-minute tunes.

"Some tunes go as long as 25 minutes, going through different movements and tempos," the founder said.

For 18 years the group was apart, closing the Goose Creek era of rock and roll. Before their breakup, they produced three albums for Capitol Records, one for Columbia, and two more by independent record companies.

Goose Creek also made appearances on the Ed Sullivan Show and at the Atlanta Pop Festival in 1977, which Gearheart said brought the band into the

They had success cover-Janis Joplin's "Mercedes Benz." It was their only Top-40 hit.

But the point came when the group agreed it was time to stop and raise the kids, said Gearheart.

"In late spring 1975, I took my kid and my wife and was going to migrate to Canada," he said. But his plans fell through, so he decided to go to Washington state to gather his thoughts.

"We stopped to eat at this little restaurant and stayed there 18 years," he

The West Coast proved to be the ideal place for Gearheart who wanted to take care of his "tribe."

"A lot of hippies had gone there. They were young. Graduated college. There were a lot arts and crafts. It was very progressive. There were a lot of barbecue parties, much like we are just starting to see here," Gearheart said.

Gearheart purchased a place, and he and his wife set up a couple of businesses, a green house for her and a fly fishing shop for him. All the while, the group kept a central office to stay in touch with one

"I left the music business and entered my fishing world," said Gearheart. Some of the fishing rods Gearheart sold were in the \$500-\$600 price range.

He dabbled in music through the years and even went into Canada to record an album entitled "Head for the Hills, the People are Coming." He also worked as a guide at Mount Baker, an active volcano.

"I got to the point that I felt like a pimp, letting people know where my fishing hole was.'

And with his children raised, the indoors finally got to him.

"I got bored being

indoors. It started getting to me. I came home from the shop one day and my wife looked at me and said, 'Getting tired of the shop? What do you want to do?'

"Let's go out playing music again," Gearheart responded. And Goose Creek was on the road

A few places that they have played include Down Home in Johnson City, Tennessee, and Breedings in Lexington. They also have a video out that gives the history of Goose Creek Symphony entitled appropriately, 'Goose Creek Symphony."

The group is said to have a fan base that stretches worldwide, especially into western Canada. Gearheart has a fear of flying which has kept the band from exploring that part of their fan base.

"If they could get me on

a plane, we could have played the World's Fair in Japan," said Gearheart.

He started playing music in the fourth grade. Playing the trombone at Maytown Elementary. Gearheart said he has marched up the streets of Prestonsburg many times participating in parades.

He started playing the drums at 15, and at 18 years old, with a hit single, "The Great Duane," Gearheart made an appearance on the Dick Clark Show. "I went to New York City by myself," said Gearheart.

His influences are rock and roll legends the Beatles, country greats Hank Williams, George Jones, Merle Haggard, and big bands like Duke Ellington.

As a native of Floyd County, Gearheart said he likes things the way they were. He has very fond memories of "the gang," when kids from six to 13 hung out together running up and down the creek bank, he said.

"I grew up around my family. You were around family. My fondest memories are of growing up on Goose Creek." Gearheart said he can remember the times when he would trade eggs for other things there on Goose Creek, a barter system now long gone.

He says the Indians have the right idea: You're not supposed to leave your roots or buried ancestry.

As for Goose Creek getting it back together and touring once more. Gearheart said it is not just for the people. "We also made the deal, we want to entertain ourselves," said Gearheart, who describes his craft as fun.

the founder of one of rock and roll's unique sounds and a tribute to the memory of the Appalachia of our

"I still don't know who did it (named the highway). I want to thank them for it. It's near embarrassing. I never really got to know who did it and never really got to say thank you. I want to thank the people in Floyd County, our people. I'm flabbergasted," he said.

While home, Charlie Gearheart took a step into what he calls his fishing world by visiting Paintsville Lake, but he didn't get away from all the phone calls.

Still, he was thrilled to come back to the beautiful fall-colored mountains of
