James David Howell, 31. reached a plea agreement with prosecutors last August in which he pleaded guilty to one count of thirddegree rape, three counts of thirddegree sodomy and two counts of second-degree unlawful transaction with a minor. The charges all stem from a sexual relationship Howell had established with a teenage girl under the age of 16.

As part of the deal, Howell was ordered to serve five years in prison on each count, with the sentences to trial.

Plant which once served eastern U.S. being razed

The Columbia Gas Transmission Plant at Langley (Maytown), which has gone by several names through the years, including Warfield Natural Gas, United Fuel and the present name, will soon go the way of other older structures - it will be torn down, ending 73 years of service to the company and community.

Many people would assume the plant processed gas for local use — which the plant did — but the plant processed gas and sent it out on two 20-inch lines that carried gas to the eastern United States - areas as Massachusetts, Washington D.C. and Baltimore,

Maryland. The other pipeline went through the Kenova plant and piped gas to northern Ohio and other sites in that area, plus sites

on the east coast. These same lines will be in operation but none of the work will be done at Langley. Another plant, Kentucky Hydrocarbon just up the road at Wilson Creek, will do the processing and the Langley site will

just be a passageway for the gas. The plant was installed sometime around 1927 and employed the connection to the actual pro-

about 40 workers. The crew grew as the plant increased its capacity. The workforce leveled off and even began to decline as automation did jobs once required by manpower.



Charles Halfhill At this time, Columbia has nine employees at the site dealing with all the work that needs to be done in closing the plant. Of the nine employees, five are retiring on or near March 1 of this year. The other four employees will be given an opportunity to find jobs

elsewhere with the company. A new building has been built near the present site, but Supervisor Charles "Chuck" Halfhill says the building is a water treatment plant and has litcessing and piping of gas.

Halfhill has worked at the plant off and on all his time with Columbia with his first tenure coming in the 1970s. He has also worked at the plant at Boldman at Harold. A press release from Columbia Gas said Halfhill "served over the years in just about every position available at the station.

Through the years, the plant has had a good record for injuries considering the potential for disaster. In 1957, a line ruptured and one man was feared burned in the ensuing fire. But the man had dashed from the scene in panic and was saved from the inferno.

Earl Warren, of Eastern, remembers working at the plant when it employed the most workers. Warren spent 43 years at the plant before retiring in 1984.

Alice Baldridge, whose deceased husband retired as a maintenance supervisor at the plant, lives just up the hill from the plant and has seen the changes that have occurred through the years. She said she would miss seeing the plant and activities that occur there. Baldridge lent the Times photographs of the plant that had been taken through the years. Note: Alice is a sister to Times employee Jimmy Goble.

. Tourism asking businesses to map Prestonsburg's next 20 years

A vision of vision for Prestonsburg was presented to the Prestonsburg Tourism Commission yesterday. Fred James and Sam Blankenship asked the commission to considered mapping out the future of Prestonsburg at length.

Calling the plan "Prestonsburg has 20/20 vision," James said the 20-year projection will ask community leaders to plan for possible projects for Prestonsburg in the shortterm and long-term future.

Playing on the year 2020, the prospective goals by institutions like the Mountain Arts Center, Stone Crest Golf Course and private companies will map future objectives two to five or even 20 years ahead.

Blankenship cited the cut-through project in Pikeville as an example of a longrange goal. The funding for that project was not immediately available but because plans were laid, the money was earmarked in legislative goals and the project was

'Sooner or later you'll be on the plate," said Blankenship. "How can you get from point A to point B to point C without a road said Blankenship.

While economic prosperity is no guarantee, Blankenship encouraged the commission to dream.

"None of us can predict the future," said James. "It's not going to happen without a

Blankenship told commissioners yearly achievements were great and the commission has done well, but a long-range plan would ensure sustained improvement in the

"It doesn't cost any more to dream big,"

James proposed that many groups be contacted in the planning effort to put future dream projects on paper. A Floyd County planning group may be enlisted.

Floyd County will celebrate its 200th anniversary beginning in July. The commission has plans set forth for period celebrations inside Prestonsburg. At least four types of presentations or

events are being planned for July 1-4. Period programs complete with period dress will celebrate the bicentennial. Many ideas are being discussed for the

ceremonies to encourage tourists from across the state to join in the fun. Historical committees from Auxier, Wayland, Van Lear and other communities will be solicited for input on the festivities.

James would like to see many of the counties that split from the original Floyd County participating with programs or displays of their own. Political figures from those counties will be invited to participate.

Bids will be advertised for an exclusive vendor to endorse and produce memorabil-

Whitesburg center is mountain treasure

One of the true treasures of Appalachian Kentucky is known by very few, and we are the lesser for it.

Appalshop in Whitesburg "Appal" as in Appalachia - is a multifaceted center that showcases the best of the region but does not shy away from pointing out the worst. Mostly, though, the arts and education center celebrates Appalachian culture.

Appalshop is a child of the War on Poverty. It began quite humbly and simply as a single summer program to get area young people interested in filmmaking and cultural preservation, at a time of rapid cultural change when we were losing important skills and memories.

In more than 100 films and videotapes, Appalshop filmmakers have documented elements of Appalachian culture, have captured fading characters and traditions that are irreplaceable, and, in some, cases have pointed out long-time injustices.

The films, many of them award-winning, are distributed to schools and community groups, as well as other outlets. Many have been broadcast on KET and national Public Broadcasting.

From its late 1960s beginning, Appalshop has developed branches that touch Appalachian arts and culture at their roots. Out of a modern-looking building on Madison Avenue, just off

Whitesburg's downtown, the headwaters of the Kentucky River a few steps away, Appalshop is music, art, theater, film, radio and television.

Besides the filmmaking aspect, here are some other parts of the Appalshop

WMMT-FM Radio


Perhaps the best known facet of Appalshop is WMMT-FM, the least traditional station you're apt to find. At 88.7 on the FM dial, WMMT is not your everyday station. You won't hear the hits of the day by slick-talking disc jockeys or the high-toned intellectual emphasis of many public stations.

Instead, you'll hear lots of bluegrass and otherwise seldom-heard musical genres, played by volunteers who can be downright evangelical.

You'll hear Celtic music and oldtime hillbilly and folk tunes. You'll hear rock oldies - the Bobs, Seger and Dylan, are commonplace. You'll hear zydeco, alternative rock, punk rock, rhythm and blues, jazz, and the big band sound of the '30s and '40s.

The on-air personalities go by names like 8-Ball, Kahlua and Cappuccino, Gentle Ben, Wile E. Quixote, Catfish John, Starvin' Marvin, Little Debbie, The Chicken Man, Bronx Barney and Electric Bill - colorful folks who could be your neighbors

NEWS OF THE WEIRD

In January, government troops in Ratchaburi, Thailand, quashed a hospital takeover by members of the Burmese rebel gang "God's Army," largely ending the three-year victory run by the 200-strong Baptist fundamentalist insurgents headed by charismatic twins Johnny and Luther Htoo, now believed to be age 12. The Htoos, often photographed chewing or smoking tobacco, inspired devotion from grown-ups by their preaching, having persuaded disciples that they were invincible, immune from bullets and land mines and with the ability to summon thousands of "spiritual" warriors to help in battle. The twins escaped and are still in hiding.

Demand-Side Regulation: A bill introduced in the Vermont legislature (by Rep. Fred Maslack) in January would penalize any adult who chose not to own a gun, by requiring him to register with the state and pay a \$500 fee for the privilege of being unarmed.

People Certain to Get Beaten Up in Prison

In Chicago in October, Bernard M. Kane, 56, pled guilty in a scheme to sell \$135,000 worth of rancid seafood (labeled U.S. Grade A) to state and federal prison kitchens. And the next day in another Chicago courtroom, Richard Pergler, 41, was sentenced to 40 months in federal prison for bilking nursing homes and the government out of \$4.8 million in Medicare

payments for ordinary adult diapers that were passed off as medically sophisticated "external urinary collection devices."

Family Values

Last spring, Cambridge College (Middlesex, Massachusetts) told Carol Ann LeBlanc, 51, and her son Troy, 29, that they could no longer take classes together in their quest for graduate degrees in psychology. Since 1989, the two have taken their high school equivalency exam together, every class together at Lesley College (where they received bachelor's degrees), and every class together (to that point) at Cambridge College. The administration would not say why it broke up the LeBlancs, except that an instructor had remarked, "(T)here are some things that you wouldn't say with your mother present." In October, the LeBlancs filed a lawsuit against Cambridge.

Fifteen members of an alleged nation-wide ring of pimps were indicted in July in Minneapolis, 12 of whom are related to each other and known as the Evans Family. According to the indictment, Johnnie Lee Evans, Monroe Evans, Kiowan Evans, Levorn Evans, Clem Evans and others procured at least 50 women (some of them juveniles) on the street over an 18-year period and inducted them into a life of prostitution in Minneapolis and St. Louis, among other cities. An unindicted Evans daughter defended her father but was unable to explain to reporters how family members lived so well even though they had no

steady jobs.

In closing arguments in September in a Barrie, Ontario, murder case, the lawyer for Jack Heyden, 55, explained why the prosecutor's theory (that Heyden and his son conspired to kill a man) was ridiculous: because Heyden thought his son was "useless," "Mr. Heyden wouldn't hire his son to

cut the grass. Why would he hire him to kill somebody?" (However, in October, the two were convicted.)

Diane Haunfelder, 29, was charged with theft in Waukesha, Wisconsin, in January after her seven-year-old son ratted her out





(According to authorities, the woman said, "He wants what his mama wants. What am I supposed to do about it?")

Cliches Come to Life

Life Imitates Art: Rowan Atkinson, who plays the shy, bumbling Mr. Bean in the British TV series, fled on foot from onlookers in October after being involved in a car crash near Lancashire, England. According to a witness, Atkinson ran in the distinctively awkward Mr. Bean style ("His arms and legs were flapping") to a nearby factory, where he hid until reporters left.

Writing in a 1998 issue of the British Medical Journal, researchers concluded that physicians indeed have "unusually poor handwriting" — worse than that of other health-care professionals. In October 1999, a jury in Odessa, Texas, ruled that a physician's sloppily written prescription caused a pharmaeist to dispense the wrong drug, which contributed to the death of a 42-year-old man. (The family of the deceased said they were basically satisfied with their doctor's ability, except for his handwriting.)

Update

When Peter "Commander Pedro" Langan made News of the Weird in 1997, he had not yet outed himself as a transsexual-in-progress, probably because he had just been convicted of assault and firearms charges as the leader of a white supremacist gang in Ohio and feared what his neo-Nazi buddies might do to him if they knew he suffered from "gender confusion." In November 1999, a Columbus Dispatch story on Ohio inmates applying for statefunded sex-change operations revealed that Commander Pedro is now out of the closet, having requested the surgery and having asked guards to treat him as a woman.

Least Competent Criminals

Trevor Brian Smith, 26, was arrested for bank robbery in Cary, North Carolina, in January after police alerted banks in the area. The day before, the manager of a Central Carolina Bank had noticed a man pacing outside his front window, getting up his nerve, while wearing a large false nose, a bad blond wig and gold-rimmed clown glasses, and who had covered the front license plate of his car before approaching the door. The manager called the police, but as the man was set to enter, a passing fire truck scared him away. A similarly dressed Smith was arrested at another bank the next day.

A murderer sentenced to 92 years in prison but paroled after 21 years won the \$3.9 million Missouri Lottery. A kindergarten teacher was suspended after forcing a defiant blackboard-doodling pupil to lick off her graffiti (Oakland, California). The man in charge of enforcing Falmouth, Massachusetts, sexual harassment regula-

tions for the last nine years was fired, for sexual harassment. A Hawaii state senator introduced a bill to permit government workers to go to sleep during their coffee breaks. A man charged with manslaughter by DUI and released on bail on condition that he not drive, arrived late to his first court hearing, absentmindedly explaining to the judge that he had trouble finding a parking space (Olathe, Kansas).

(NAPSA)-Although most travelers don't expect to see more than an airport lounge at a layover city, it's a good idea to check the forecast before departure and pack your carry-on accordingly. The off chance that you may be delayed due to inclement weather can be sorely inconvenient without the appropriate essentials and weather gear.

Some airlines offer "passenger relief packs" for flights delayed over 45 minutes. The kits include a ten-minute calling card, a meal voucher and a discount coupon for another trip. You usually must ask for the kit however, not just wait for the airline to hand it out.

Music that cooks, that's what Chubby Carrier serves up. He calls it "high energy swamp funky music." Fans have described it as a one-of-a-kind blend of R&B, blues, zydeco soul, cajun, rock and roll, and gospel, a sort of musical amalgam driven by accordion and rubboard.

Categories are meaningless, however, for the man called "the Jimi Hendrix of the accordion." His music is as unique as it is infectious.

Carrier is a third-generation zydeco master, who learned his licks from his father and grandfather, and still gets on stage with the whole Carrier family (his brother is an accomplished player, too) for some fourway accordion gumbo.

His style is still deeply rooted in the zydeco sound he learned as a boy, but at his father's insistence. Carrier put his own mix together. "We still got that spicy gumbo," he says, "but we're adding a Sixties groove with horns and percussion. It's the whole pot of gumbo."

This mixture of old and new, tradition and innovation, keeps Carrier playing all year long, opening for such headliners as The Rolling Stones.

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Journey into Amazonia on KET explores world's largest tropical wilderness

Journey Into Amazonia, airing Wednesday, February 23 at 8:30 p.m. on KET, captures the spirit of the world's largest tropical wilderness—the Amazon Basin rainforest.

Recognized as one of Earth's natural wonders, the rainforest is comprised of swollen rivers, flooded forests and dense canopy. This program offers a close look at the rainforest and the rarely seen animals that inhabit it as they contend with the volatile waters of the world's largest river system. Rod Steiger narrates.

The first episode, "Waterworlds," features the churning waters of the world's mightiest river, the force that creates, destroys and shapes Amazonia. Water is to Amazonia as sand is to the Sahara.

It is the most crucial—and volatile—factor affecting the animals and plants that live in the biologically rich Amazon.

live in the biologically rich Amazon.
"The Land Reborn" reveals a world teeming with predators. Stealthy jaguars prowl, army ants swarm and tarantulas

bring down rodent prey as two-and-half-million square miles of rainforest emerge from the floods.

The program takes viewers from the margins of lagoon, river and flooded forest into a counterfeit paradise. This is evolution's workshop, containing plants and animals that natural selection has honed to occupy truly bizarre ecological niches.

"The Big Top" explores the luxuriant mantle of the world's greatest rainforest. Though scientists estimate that half the world's species live in the canopy of the tropical rainforest, little is known about this rarely glimpsed zone in which life and death dramas play out more than 100 feet above the forest floor.

The small troupe of multi-talented performers has shared the beauty of the Appalachian region across the United States and in many foreign countries.

Mixing music, monologue, dialogue and other dramatic techniques, Roadside Theater interprets and reflects mountain life. its history, music and art. The cast frequently performs for schools.

Headwaters Television

Like Appalshop Films, Headwaters Television preprograms Appalachian topics for the Public . Broadcasting System. Tradition and social issues are common topics.

Art

In the last few years, Appalshop has promoted works by Appalachian artists, making a gallery of its spacious lobby.

On display this month are paintings by Jeff

Seedtime

Forget the parades and beauty queens. Seedtime on the Cumberland is not your ordinary festival. Generally the first weekend in June, the Seedtime festival features demonstrations by Appalachian craftspeople, a performance by Roadside Theater, soup bean dinners, storytelling sessions, viewing of recent films, and loads of music from bluegrass to country to gospel.

Icing

In addition to its other offerings, Appalshop regularly hosts live music performances in its intimate auditorium by well-known bluegrass and mountain musicians.

Over the next few months, you can see the Lerry Stephenson Band (March 9), Melvin Goins and Windy Mountain (April 13) and the Lynn Morris Band (May 11). Showtime is 7:30 p.m.

Appalshop also frequently sponsors community forums on issues of concern to this region, such as welfare reform and

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


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
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

gious belief," Vessels told The Floyd County Times last week.

But while several other local governments allowed the display of the Commandments before Harlan. Pulaski and McCreary counties and several dozen have done so afterward, Vessels said the ACLU does not have plans right now to add any more defendants to the list. That's because Vessels said the ACLU chose to target Harlan, Pulaski and McCreary counties because they were representative of other local governments and because any decision in the case against those counties would affect all others as well.

Still, that does not mean the ACLU will not add Floyd or other counties in the future.

'We know (the other counties are) out there and we may choose at any time to file suit against the others," Vessels said.

And there is no guarantee that someone else will not file suit against Floyd or any other county for posting the Commandments. If they do, they could try to seek something the ACLU is not money.

Vessels said the ACLU is not seeking to line its pockets with the lawsuits by asking for punitive damages against the counties it has named in its lawsuit. The group is instead only asking for the courts to order counties to remove the Commandments. He did say, however, that the ACLU would seek reimbursement of its court costs.

"We're not in this for the money by any means, but there are courtrelated costs which will come from the taxpayers' pockets," Vessels

Although he said he was not familiar with the details of Floyd County's decision to allow the posting of the Commandments,







State merit system should stay untouched

The head of the Kentucky Association of State Employees thinks it is unfair that Kentucky's merit system limits the political activities of state workers.

So under the sponsorship of Sen. Joey Pendleton, D-Hopkinsville, Senate Bill 96 cleared the Senate State and Local Government Committee on a 9-1 vote last week. The bill would allow state employees the choice to assist in voter-registration drives, speak at political rallies and contribute to campaigns. Employees would still be barred from participating in political activities while at work.

It is interesting that a system that is being portrayed as regressive and interfering with basic rights to become involved in politics is in fact one of the only safeguards state workers have to protect them from political pressuring.

That is why this bill needs to be defeated.

Prior to 1960, state workers served at the mercy of whichever administration was in office. And to show their gratitude and loyalty for being employed, they were expected to stump for the candidates their bosses recommended.

If that were not enough, they also had a portion of their wages deducted to help fund the campaigns of whomever the administration was touting for various offices. For this, they were secure in their jobs - until of course, the administration that hired them fell out of favor with the voters. It mattered little if they were good at their jobs when they were hired; mattered even less when the new administration fired them.

Needless to say, this is not the most effective way to run government. So in 1960, new Gov. Bert Combs instituted a true merit system, designed to take the political shenanigans out of state employment. Workers no longer were automatically out of work when a new governor took over. Their wages were no longer garnished. And the rampant politick-

Since that time, the rules of the merit system have been tinkered with a bit, but their basic precepts are still intact. Workers can attend political rallies in their free time, but not take active roles.

Now come some legislators who want to emancipate state workers from the shackles of this oppression. Charles B. Wells, executive director of the state workers association, said the bill would insulate workers from on-the-job retribution for supporting a candidate whom a supervisor

But when Senate President David Williams pressed Wells for examples of when state workers have had their rights infringed, Wells offered none.

When systems are put in place to eliminate wrongdoing, there are going to be occasions when the rules may seem too stringent to some. But the system we have now helps ensure that Kentuckians have public servants who are free to do their jobs without political intrusion.

Let us leave it be.

Because we could not participate in the school sports, the church had youth sports and adult teams to fill the void. For the most part we stuck to the team, with many of us staying in the church specifically to help with or be on those

For the most part, the majority of kids will not participate in a sporting activity. Most will never be committed to the any sport nor ever share in the joy of those

The reason may be that their parents did not play so they do not teach their children to play. Or it could be the kids are just not interested in sports. In either case the group of kids that do participate is out there.

Year after year they have turned out to play Little League, then football, then Junior Pro basketball, and/or AAU basketball. Their lives, be it ever so slightly, are being disciplined to participate on a

They are being taught to do good for the team and to practice and grow. They are being taught to give their best efforts. They are taught how to win with grace and to lose with dignity. And sometimes they learn it's just a game. One of the most important lessons learned is finding out if one person lets down his/her guard the whole team suffers.

In Prestonsburg we have let our guard down and now our AAU teams are suffering. With already two to three games under their belts, the Prestonsburg AAU teams have had one practice.

They have been beaten badly by teams from Paintsville and Morgan County because of a lack of practice time, while those teams are practicing three to five days a week.

Our kids have been held back by a lack of gym time. Our AAU is beset by regulations that actually keep them out of the gym.

A gym has to be insured, it has to be free from other commitments, it has to be supervised by a member of the faculty, and we have to pay for it.

We, the coaches and parents, are reaching a small group of kids. By working with them, we keep them from many

distractions a young mind does not need. While they are getting or staying fit, they are venting their frustrations in play. But because of high score defeats, they

are also learning the art of humility. Any function or form requires practice, be it work, education, arts or games. Without practice, we are left feeling

incomplete and are left behind, even on the job. Humility comes at the hands of failure. Sadly, this competitive world has

placed winning and success hand in hand. In the games I have witnessed, our kids have been blown out of the water. It is true that something needs to be done about the emphasis the world has

placed on being a winner. But it is also true our kids need to develop their "talent" also.

Statistics show that most basketball players will not be pros (winning the lottery type of statistics). But basketball,

He opened his fist a bit. The straw wobbled, then fell to a 45degree angle.



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

In the coming year the CBN WorldReach message will be brought to 60 different countries, in 18 languages, in over 1500 original productions reaching a cumulative audience of 2.3 billion view-

City faces spending curb

Louisa officials were told last week to curb their spending or face the possibility of a budget deficit in the very near future - something that is a violation of state law.

Local CPA Dan Howard, in presenting the 1998-99 fiscal year audit to the city council last Tuesday night, told city leaders that money carried over from the previous year helped the city avoid a deficit during the last fiscal period. His audit showed that the city had an "excess of revenues and other financing sources" under expenditures of \$204,096. While the report indicated that the city spent more than it took in that Lawrence year, a \$256,233 fund balance at the beginning of the period helped the city's general fund end the fiscal year with a balance of \$52,037.

"This isn't as bad as what it appears," Howard told council members in explaining the perceived \$204,096 deficit.—The Big Sandy News





South Floyd had problems handling the Prestonsburg half-court pressure and turned the ball over six times in the opening period.


Hyden scored seven of the first nine Prestonsburg points in the second quarter as the Lady Blackcats extended their lead to 32-17 midway through the peri-





Allen put some distance between them and Fallsburg in the fourth quarter, with White scoring six



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
