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Grand jury hands down 10 indictments

A Floyd County grand jury issued 10 indictments on Wednesday. Of those 10, three allegedly worked together to steal from one man.

Archie Michael Jackson, Joseph A. Collett and Byron Keith Rister, all of Garrett, were indicted on charges that they participated in the theft and destruction of property belonging to a former Wayland mayor.

The three are accused of making several trips onto property belonging to Eugene Mullins and stealing various items.

Jackson, 22, was indicted on three counts of third-degree burglary, a single count of theft by unlawful taking, and one count of first-degree criminal mischief.

Joseph A. Collett, 20, and Byron

Keith Rister, 20, were each indicted on single charges of third-degree burglary, theft by unlawful taking, and first-degree criminal mischief.

The men are believed to have entered Mullins' property on ATVs. Authorities believe they took his property and sold it to a man in Knott County.

Brandon Murphy, of Garrett, is believed to have received some of the items and disposed of them knowing they were stolen. He was indicted on one count of receiving stolen property.

Other indictments include:

■ Charles Michael Salyer, 23, of Hi Hat, two counts of wanton endangerment. Salyer is accused of grabbing the steering wheel of a vehicle driven by Racheal Salyer, endangering the lives of Racheal and Austin Michael Salyer.

Voter registration deadline nearing

Want to vote in the primary election on Tuesday, May 23? If so, have you registered to do so?

The deadline to register to vote in the upcoming primary election is Monday, April 24.

County clerks' offices throughout Kentucky will accept voter registration cards until the close of business that day and will accept all registration cards postmarked on or before April 24.

"I encourage everyone who is eligible to vote and hasn't yet registered to go ahead and do so," said Kentucky Secretary of State John Y.

Brown III. Brown is the state's chief election official.

Brown said nearly 400,000 Kentuckians are eligible to register to vote but have not yet done so.

According to Connie Gray with the Floyd County clerk's office, Floyd County has 30,318 registered voters as of March 20.

Voters in Floyd County can register to vote at the county clerk's office in the old courthouse or at either of the branches at Betsy Layne and McDowell.

People applying for driver's licenses will be offered an opportunity to register at the time of applying for a driver's license.

High court to make rare appearance

Those interested in Kentucky's judicial system will have a "supreme" opportunity to see it in action when the state's highest court comes to town.

All seven members of the state Supreme Court will listen to oral arguments in Prestonsburg on May 10 and May 11 at the Mountain Arts Center, with sessions taking place at 9 a.m., 10 a.m. and 11 a.m.

The hearings will be open to the public. Following the last argument, a question-and-answer session will be held with the audience, but the justices will not answer questions concerning the cases before them during the two-day visit or any other pending cases.

Spectators will have the opportunity to witness a wide array of cases during the visit, including:

■ Burnett v. Commonwealth, 9 a.m. Wednesday, May 10. Burnett was convicted of trafficking in a controlled substance and being a persistent felony offender. At issue is the sufficiency of evidence to convict Burnett of trafficking, where a bag of crack cocaine was found in a car in which he was a passenger. Jury instructions are also an issue.

■ Kirby v. City of Bowling Green, 10 a.m. Wednesday, May 10. The issues concern false imprisonment and common-law negligence resulting from an arrest for theft by deception.

■ Taylor v. Commonwealth, 11 a.m. Wednesday, May 10. Taylor alleges ineffective representation in a case in which he was given the death penalty.

■ Unisign Inc. v. Commonwealth, Transportation Cabinet and Commonwealth, Transportation Cabinet v. Unisign Inc., 9 a.m. Thursday, May 11. At issue is a judgment ordering the removal of billboards along interstates.

■ Colbert v. Commonwealth, 10 a.m. Thursday, May 11. Colbert was convicted of trafficking in cocaine and marijuana. At issue is the suppression of evidence found during a warrantless search of Colbert's basement bedroom in a house where he lived with his mother and brother.

■ Miller v. Swift, et al, 11 a.m. Thursday, May 11. The issues concern...

Budget deal could come today

In an effort to get a budget passed before this fast-waning legislative session ends, the state Senate has approved a bill that would generate more money for the General Fund by imposing a tax on long distance telephone calls.

And though it had once appeared that the session could end without a

two-year spending plan, a conference committee made up of members of the House and Senate has finally reached an agreement.

The full legislature is expected to approve the budget on its last day, today. The House is also to approve the tax plan.

The Democrat-controlled House and Republican-controlled Senate had clashed over the budget after the House paid for many of its pro-

jects with a \$178 million tax increase. The Senate did not approve of that plan and as a result cut \$178 million from the budget, including funding for schools and over 400 community development projects.

Now, leadership from both chambers say the new tax plan, combined with a booming economy,

Robbery suspects, others headed to grand jury

A preliminary hearing for Dorothy Arnette, 59, of Royalton, the second suspect accused of robbing an 87-year-old Langley woman, was held on Wednesday.

Kentucky State Police Detective Lee Weddington testified Arnette had told Lanie Terry to stand in a corner, to keep quiet or she would

kill her.

Allegedly entering the home under the pretense to clean it, Arnette and alleged accomplice Tammy Slusher had no known weapons except for the ones allegedly taken from the Terry's residence.

Weddington testified he did not see Arnette with Slusher at any time during his investigation and none of the recovered stolen goods were

found on Arnette or in her residence.

Several small handguns were taken in the alleged incident. While most of Terry's things were recovered, the guns have not yet been located.

Arnette's attorney, Ed Spencer, made a motion to reduce the four charges of first-degree robbery,

theft, unlawful imprisonment and terroristic threatening to one charge, first-degree robbery, Spencer argued that the three charges were encompassed within the robbery charge by the parameters of the charge.

Assistant Floyd County Attorney Jimmy Marcum agreed with Spencer.

With Arnette's charge of robbery remaining, Judge Allen kept the conditions of release at a partially-secured \$5,000 property bond, with restrictions of no contact with the victim.

The preliminary hearing for a Harold man facing several charges for attempting to avoid a Kentucky State Police roadblock was also held Wednesday.

Jeffrey Newman, 35, was cited with 13 charges after he allegedly skidded to a halt and tried to reverse his direction just 200 feet from a roadblock, said Trooper Darren Stapleton.

Stapleton and Sgt. Bobby Johnson were parked off the road at the Toler Creek Fire Department with their lights flashing about 1 a.m. April 2. Stapleton said the officers heard the tires of Newman's vehicle screeching. Upon hearing the car, the two officers immediately jumped into their cruisers to pursue Newman.

Sgt. Johnson pulled directly in front of the vehicle in an attempt to pen in the vehicle that had traveled backward some 100 feet, said

Stapleton.

At that time, Newman allegedly pulled his vehicle into drive, narrowly missing the cruisers by a few inches, the officer said.

Sgt. Johnson, who was the first to approach Newman, walked up to the defendant's door.

Stapleton said after Newman exited the vehicle, a minor scuffle ensued. The two officers were forced to wrestle Newman to the ground, said Stapleton. They then placed him into custody and searched his vehicle. The search allegedly revealed a bag of marijuana inside the vehicle.

Newman was taken to the Floyd County Detention Center where he remained about 90 minutes before asking to be transported to a hospital, said Stapleton.

Newman, Stapleton and Johnson were said to have sustained minor injuries during the altercation.

The officer said no field sobriety tests were performed on Newman. But Stapleton said Newman had refused a breathalyzer test.

Newman was charged with first-degree fleeing or evading a police officer, first-degree wanton endangerment, two counts of fourth-degree aggravated assault, resisting arrest,

reckless driving, driving on a DUI-suspended license, no insurance, expired registration receipt, expired registration plates, DUI, possession of marijuana, and failure to wear a seat belt.

His case will now be considered by a grand jury.

The arresting officer in a case where a Raven man was believed to have attacked a 14-year-old girl appeared in a preliminary hearing unprepared.

Deputy Bobby Hackworth, who said he is still investigating the incident, said he had taken signed statements that said the fight could have been started by another adult male as well as by the defendant, Timothy Webster.

The incident allegedly happened Friday, March 31, during an auction

located at Estill.

As the hearing proceeded, Hackworth said he had checked with the 14-year-old's parents on the girl's condition. Apparently she had suffered a chipped kneecap in the skirmish.

The injury was less than life-threatening according to Webster's attorney, Harolyn Howard, who then asked that the charge be amended to fourth-degree assault.

The officer did not charge the other man in the incident but had arrested Webster, 38, for disorderly conduct and second-degree assault.

Hackworth said he did not cite the other male because he was not there to witness the altercation.

Webster's charges were amended to two misdemeanor counts of fourth-degree assault and disorderly

conduct. A pretrial conference has been set for 9:30 a.m. June 5. His bond was amended to a partially-secured \$5,000 property bond and he was ordered to have no contact with the alleged victim.

A preliminary hearing set for former Floyd County Conservation Officer Kevin Webb was continued. Apparently officers are still investigating the alleged incidents.

Webb, 29, of Drift was arrested for writing three checks over the amount of \$300 from the account of the Local Emergency Planning Committee and using them for his personal use.

He is also accused of five counts of second-degree forgery for allegedly utilizing committee funds for personal use, forging the signature of the treasurer on the checks.

will provide enough money to fund virtually all of the initiatives approved by the House, plus some.

To help pay for the projects, the state expects to pick up \$89.4 million for the General Fund over the next two years by placing a six-percent tax on all out-of-state phone calls. In-state long distance calls already carry the tax.

However, legislators said that the measure is "revenue-neutral" and does not violate any members' vows not to raise taxes. That's because the package also includes a cut in the tax employers pay on their unemployment insurance.

The legislature was able to make the insurance tax cut because the money from that tax goes into a fund for benefits for unemployed workers rather than the General Fund. And since unemployment has been down over the past several years, administrators for the fund said that the \$75 million that will be lost over the next two-year period could be absorbed more easily.

"I'm unapologetic," Williams said of the plan. "We need to have even broader tax reform."

The package, which passed 31-6 in the Senate, is a rewritten version of House Bill 996, the tax bill passed in the House but was snubbed in the Senate. The original version of the bill would have placed a seven-percent excise tax on all communications services such as satellite, cable and pagers.

Both House Speaker Jody Richards, D-Bowling Green, and Williams maintain that the project-laden budget is balanced based on the tax package and bright revenue forecasts for the coming months.

However, the administration has said that another factor also went into balancing the budget — a tax on access fees that long distance companies pay in order to use lines owned by local telephone companies.

That tax, which would raise about \$80 million over the next two years, is already in the law but has never been collected.

Both Richards and Williams insisted that they did not believe that expected funds from the access fees were used to balance the budget.

"We haven't been told by anyone that they're going to attempt to collect the access fee," Williams said.

Under the budget agreement, there are plans for about 180 new community development projects that did not originally appear in any version of the budget. Many of those initiatives, which include everything from \$100,000 for sidewalks in Walton to \$1.7 million for water and sewer improvements in Springfield, are in Senate Republicans' districts.

There's also \$6 million for an early reading program, \$400,000 for grants for dropout prevention programs, \$1 million more for reimbursements to foster care parents and a tax credit for Keeneland Race Course and Churchill Downs.

There will also be more funds for new road projects and a third campus for the Governor's Scholars Program.

Although Senate President David Williams had proclaimed a week earlier that as far as the budget was concerned, "pork is out, people are in," he said the new projects for Senate Republicans were only fair, since House members had gotten their share.

Both House and Senate leadership seemed glad that the state's \$14 billion budget is finally moving toward passage.

"The budget is largely the House budget," Richards said of the agreement. "We're obviously very, very pleased."

"We believe that we can come to a conclusion that everyone can declare themselves a winner," Williams said before the talks ended. "It's gonna be a good budget."

Patton signs Megan's Law, secures \$1.5 million in police grants

With the signing of Senate Bill 263 this week, Gov. Paul Patton strengthened Kentucky's role in monitoring sexual predators, while securing \$1.5 million in federal funds used for law enforcement and criminal justice system grants.

The Megan's Law portion of SB 263 amends the state's current sex offender law so that it is simpler and complies with federal guidelines and prevents the loss of ten percent of the federal Byrne Formula Grant or \$1.5 million over a two-year period.

Funds from the Byrne Grant are awarded to law enforcement agencies for such initiatives as community watch, prevention of elderly

abuse and family violence, drug taskforce and D.A.R.E.

Provisions of SB 263 require the expansion of the number of individuals who must register and the time period they must remain registered. The expanded registration requirements now include sex offenders who victimize a minor, kidnap and unlawfully confine a minor. Additionally, the registration period is increased from 10 years to a lifetime for many offenders.

The length of time offenders must notify local officials that they are changing their address has been shortened to the day they change residences or before they change

residences. The time period was 10 days once they moved.

A new provision limits an offender under supervision from residing within 1,000 feet of a high school, middle school, grade school, kindergarten, pre-school or licensed day care center.

The way information on sex offenders is given to the public has changed, too. The Kentucky State Police will now host a public Internet website that will offer photographs, addresses and a variety of other identifying information on sex offenders.

Local sheriff's offices released the information to the public previ-

ously. The KSP website is under construction and until a complete list of sex offenders can be entered onto the website, the agency will post offenders on the website as they are released. KSP plans to have a complete list of sex offenders by January 2001. The address of the KSP website is <http://ksp.sor.state.ky.us>.

The new law, also, changes how an offender's psychological assessments will be used. This assessment will be used by the court system in sentencing the offender, instead of determining whether he or she is a High, Moderate or Low risk offender.

The revisions to Kentucky's Megan's Law became effective April 11—the day Gov. Patton signed SB 263 that designated the provision as "emergency legisla-

Unemployment rates increase in 94 counties in February

FRANKFORT — Unemployment rates rose in 94 Kentucky counties between January and February, fell in 17 and remained the same in nine counties, according to the Department for Employment Services, a Cabinet for Workforce Development agency.

From February 1999 to February 2000, jobless rates decreased in 78 counties, went up in 34, and stayed the same in Breathitt, Bullitt, Clay, Daviess, Hardin, Jackson, Jefferson and Madison counties.

In February 2000, seven counties had jobless rates at or above 10 percent. Nine counties recorded

double-digit rates in January 2000 and 17 in February 1999.

Jessamine County's 1.8 percent jobless rate was the lowest in the commonwealth. Other low rates were recorded in Fayette and Woodford counties, 1.9 percent each; Scott and Shelby counties, 2.1 percent each; Franklin and Oldham counties, 2.4 percent each; Simpson County, 2.7 percent; Mason County, 2.8 percent; and Bourbon County, 2.9 percent.

Lewis County recorded the state's highest unemployment rate - 20.8 percent. It was followed by Monroe County, 14.3 percent; Magoffin County, 14.1 percent;

Nicholas County, 13.9 percent; Russell County, 12.3 percent; Harlan County, 12 percent; Letcher County, 11.7 percent; Morgan County, 9.9 percent; Breathitt County, 9.8 percent; and Taylor County, 9.6 percent.

Unemployment statistics are based on estimates and are compiled to measure trends rather than actually to count people working. Civilian labor force statistics include non-military workers and unemployed Kentuckians who are actively seeking work. They do not include unemployed Kentuckians who have not looked for employment within the past four weeks.

Pedophile bill puts focus at wrong point

The cramped space below the slimy underside of bug-ridden, rotting timber is actually too nice of a home for sexual predators who prey on children.

The sexual abuse of children is a vicious cycle, often leading many of the abused to become abusers themselves as adults, or at least to have trouble in relationships unless they have received counseling.

If Congress can help stop such abuse, more power to it. But what Sen. Mitch McConnell has introduced as a deterrent looks much more like political grandstanding.

McConnell introduced a bill that would require a five-year minimum sentence for anyone who uses the Internet to lure children across state lines to have sex. Even if children are not harmed and offenders are caught in a law enforcement sting, the five-year prison term would be in effect.

While we support harsh penalties for such vermin, this bill seems to have little of the deterrent factor its proponents endorse.

"There's really no evidence whatsoever that mandatory minimums have a deterrent effect," said Marc Mauer, assistant director of the Sentencing Project, an advocacy group that has studied the minimum sentence statutes that exist for drug offenders.

"If you can increase the odds an offender will be apprehended and convicted, then some people will think twice," Mauer said. "But there's really no proof upping the sentence is going to help."

McConnell is joined by Kentucky Rep. Ken Lucas, D-Richwood, as a co-sponsor of the measure in the House. Lucas said, "The Internet should be a . . . haven for our kids and should not become a nightmare for our parents."

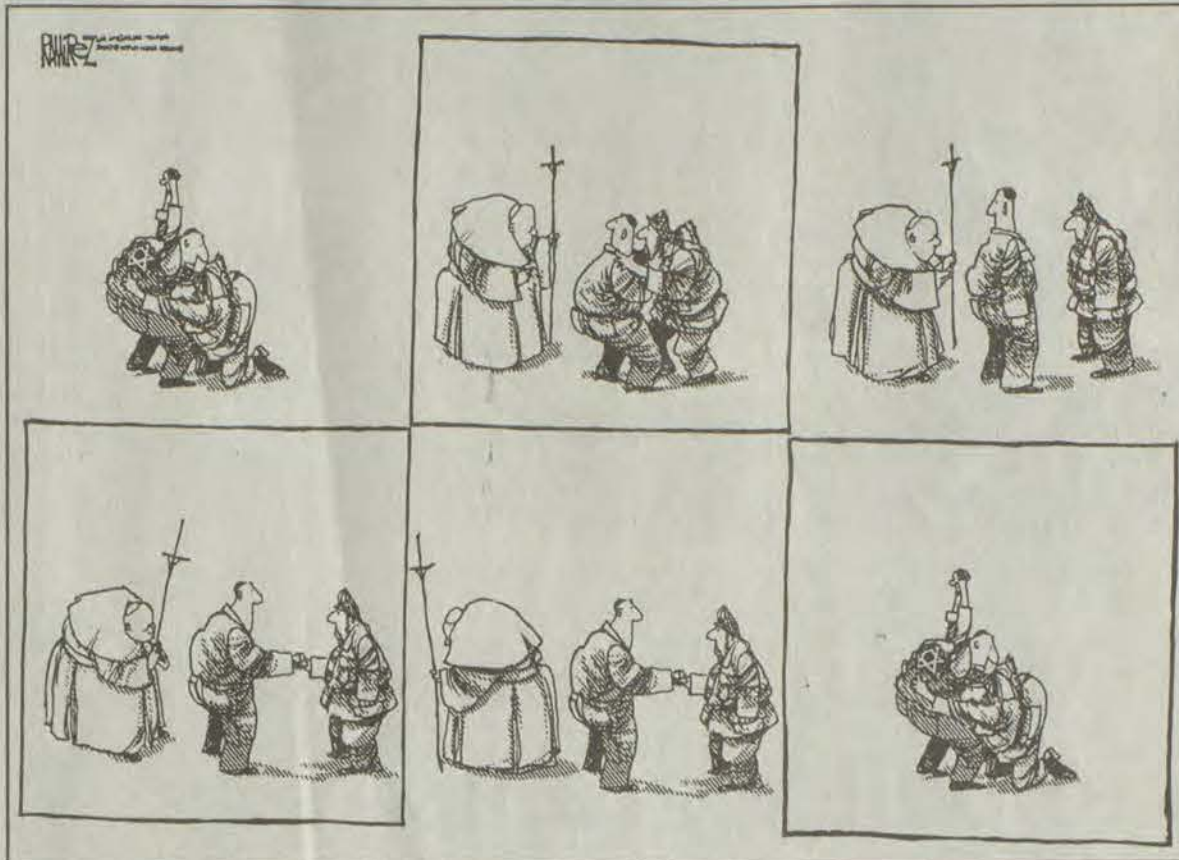
We concur. So why not come up with ideas to catch online pedophiles? Letting children become victims and then requiring more harsh punishment for the perpetrator is not much consolation for the child or his or her family.

Online predators are another example of how the many benefits of the Internet can be co-opted by the sinister intent of a handful of people. But it is a very real threat and one in which law enforcement can and must play a role in thwarting.

If Congress wants to help, it should come up with funding for local, state and federal law enforcement so each entity can employ specialists to seek out online pedophiles, perhaps pretending they are themselves young teens. Those tactics work sometimes now, but few departments have the manpower to designate someone solely for that purpose.

It is worthwhile that this issue is getting the attention of Congress, but while passing laws that limit the discretion of judges without resulting in improved protection may make for nice speeches, it does little to solve the problem.

Yet I must admit that I have never seen this game played with the cold, calculated efficiency as it is played by the political machine here in Floyd County. Actually, they remind me of old P.T. Barnum, the circus sideshow man who said, "Never give a sucker an even break."

According to the courthouse, Floyd County has about 43,000 residents. Among these are hundreds of schoolteachers, college professors, doctors, nurses, lawyers, ministers, dentists and social workers, all of whom have college degrees. We have literally thousands of successful business people, tradespeople and homemakers with high school degrees — and yes,

many of these good citizens have college degrees.

But have you noticed that these good citizens are never, repeat, never called upon to serve on any council or committee in Floyd County that has anything to do with buildings, money or political power? No, they are kept outside the loop.

I do not claim absolute, accurate figures here, but I have a gut feeling that there exists a "long list" of perhaps 50 people in Floyd County who get almost all the political appointments. Observation over the years indicates to me that there exists a "short list" of perhaps 30 people who get all the appointments and committee assignments where real power and real money are involved. And within that group of 30 people, there are five or six people who sit on a dozen or more committees, etc., and literally control virtually every dime of money that passes through our county.

I think it would be most interesting and informative to learn "who's who" on the various committees, etc., in Floyd County. Perhaps an inquiring reporter could do this as a story, or a political science student could do it as a research project.

Public accommodations — religion or business?

The age-old question of balance between individual freedoms and social equality has been at the crux of many American political dialogues ranging from slavery to civil rights to socialized medicine.

Today, however, this issue is redefining itself along the lines of religious liberties vs. civil rights.

A number of debates within Kentucky's 2000 General Assembly have touched upon this issue. The debates involve a proposed law that seeks to protect the right of religious organizations to dictate the use of their commercial property.

The measure would exclude "religious nonprofit worship and recreational activities and facilities" from the definition of "public accommodation, resort, or amusement" under Kentucky's civil rights laws.

The result would be to grant church-owned public accommodations special rights that are not given to secular businesses. The argument for this exemption — basically a license to discriminate not afforded other types of businesses — is that civil rights laws are a hardship on the religious liberties of others.

This proposal stems from an event in northern Kentucky, where a religious group owns a campground that it operates for the use of its members, and also as a public business to non-members.

In 1998, the campground was rented by a youth group that teaches an evolutionary biology approach to science that runs counter to the teachings of the religious association that owns the campground. The association wanted to deny the youth group's application to rent the campground, but felt it could not legal-

ly do so because of Kentucky's non-discrimination laws.

Is a new law really needed to balance deeply-held religious views against people's right to protection from discrimination?

Under current Kentucky law, any religious group can exclude individuals from its places of worship on the basis of race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, viewpoint, or any other reason. So the proposed measure would not actually change the law regarding worship facilities.

Our current laws also provide a mechanism for associations to restrict the use of their facilities. Private clubs, including religious-based organizations, are allowed to restrict the use of facilities solely to members and their guests.

That means it remains perfectly legal for a private club or organization to refuse membership to Jews, African-Americans or any other group. This exemption to civil rights law acts to balance community need for equal access with the individual's right to free association.

Thus, a religious group can already control use of its facilities simply by allowing members only.

The key difference comes down to money. As a public accommodation operating as a commercial business, an association benefits from rental fees.

Proponents argue that restricting such facilities to members only would not only cause the religious group to lose revenue, but would also remove these facilities from use by the community at large.

this subject of the human mind because it's so important.

You see, the New Testament indicates that, from God's standpoint, humans are made up of three main dimensions: spirit, flesh and soul.

The word "mind" is probably the nearest equivalent to "soul," although it's not totally sufficient.

Anyway, that part of us remains up for grabs.

One definition of soul from the ancient Greek calls it "the partition" or the "middle room." It divides our perfect spirit from our rebellious flesh.

Consequently, whatever we program into our soul, or mind, will determine which of those two other parts dominates our life.

For instance, if we allow our mind to wallow in the cesspool of

sin, negativity and bad information enjoyed by our flesh, then our mind and flesh combined will overpower our pure spirit. We can expect to lead a life dominated by turmoil, pain, depression, excess and futility.

If we train our mind to agree with our redeemed spirit and the promises our heavenly Father has made us, that is, if we learn to think as God thinks and to speak as He speaks, then our spirit and mind combined will generally overrule our flesh and force it to obey God's laws.

We can expect to enjoy increasing peace, patience, healing, pros-

perity and other heavenly benefits.

Thus Saint Paul warned us: "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what the will of God is, that which is good and acceptable and perfect."

will perform during the activity.

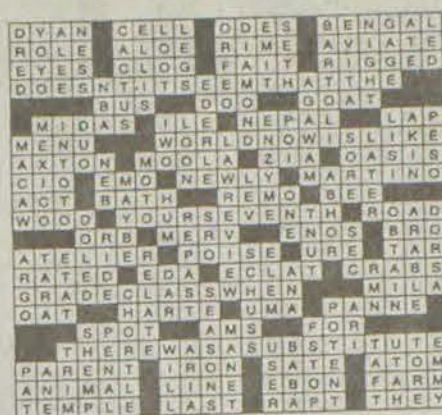

The unspoken footnote to this argument, however, is that the measure would allow religious facilities to pick and choose their customers, and turn away those with whom they disagree.

The measure does provide that a group holding a non-religious activity that is open to the public, such as a bingo or other fundraiser, could not discriminate on the basis of disability, race, color, religion or national origin.

And any organization that "teaches or advocates hatred based on race, color or national origin" would not be considered a religious organization under the proposed measure.

Supporters have repeatedly pointed out that the Kentucky Commission on Human Rights would mediate any complaints of discrimination resulting from this measure. Left unsaid is the fact that any victim would have to file a complaint, rather than having existing safeguards already in place.

Another constitutionally troubling aspect is that this proposal places the Commission on Human Rights in the difficult position of judging what is a legitimate religious belief, and what instead constitutes hate.

During committee testimony, proponents of the measure sidestepped questions of whether a ban on interracial dating constitutes racist hate or religious belief.

Balancing individual religious freedoms with the social good of

equal opportunities is a task calling for our greatest political wisdom. This measure would grant a special right to some Kentucky businesses that are denied to others, while dismantling decades of civil rights development.

Gov. Paul Patton has already vetoed one version of the measure, saying that all businesses must treat all Kentuckians equally. Our current laws already provide a means for groups to reserve their facilities as they see fit.

Seeking a balance of freedom and equality is a just endeavor. Unfortunately, this proposal is more

Need an extension to file KY tax return?

FRANKFORT — Taxpayers may obtain an extension of time within which to file their Kentucky income tax returns by filing an Application for Extension of Time to File, Form 40A102.

KRC also accepts a federal extension. Attach to the Kentucky individual income tax return a copy of Form 40A102, the automatic federal extension - Form 4868, or approved federal Form 2688 to avoid a late filing penalty.

If tax is due, attach a check made payable to the Kentucky State Treasurer to either Form 40A102 or a copy of the federal extension request and mail by April 17. (A

copy of the application for federal extension should not be mailed to KRC on April 17, unless tax is due.)

Because an extension of time to file a return does not extend the time to pay a tax liability, interest will accrue on the tax liability unpaid as of April 17, until paid.

In addition to interest, KRC may assess a late payment penalty. If a taxpayer can demonstrate that the delay in filing the return or remitting the payment is due to reasonable cause, penalties - but not interest - may be reduced or waived.

Form 40A102 can be downloaded from KRC's website www.state.ky.us/agencies/revenue.

IRS offers last-minute tax tips and local help

Have you waited until the last minute to file your federal income tax return? Don't stand in line, go online—e-file both your state and federal tax returns.

According to Kentucky-Tennessee IRS Director Gayle Morin, you can use e-filing to avoid most errors and to know that your tax return made it to the IRS.

"Last year," Morin said, "nearly 30 million filers discovered the ease and security of sending their tax returns to the IRS by phone or by computer. Online computer filing has nearly doubled again this year."

You can file by phone if you received a TeleFile booklet from the IRS, Morin said. "The booklet contains a special number that serves as your signature. You call a toll-free number that's open around the clock and file both your state and federal returns in about 20 minutes.

If you're due a refund, there's nothing to mail to the IRS."

The other e-file option is to file by computer. Basically, you have two choices:

1. Free or low-cost computer filing is available on the Internet. For details, go to the IRS Web site (www.irs.gov) and click on "Electronic Services," then on "Online Filing Software Companies."

2. Buy tax software and load it onto your computer. It greatly simplifies preparing your tax return, then you can use your modem to transmit your tax return to the IRS. Also, many tax preparers offer their clients e-filing.

Either method has proven to be fast and secure, Morin said. How fast? "If you e-file your return and choose electronic deposit of your refund," said Morin, "your money is usually in your bank account within two weeks or less."

If you still file a paper tax return, last-minute help is available, too,

Morin said.

• Where to get tax forms—IRS walk-in offices, many libraries, some post offices, IRS Web site (www.irs.gov), IRS TaxFax (dial 703-368-9694 from a fax machine)

• Where to get tax help—For tax help by phone or to find the location of a tax help site or IRS office near you, call 1-800-829-1040 (open every day, 24 hours)

Can't get your return finished by April 17? Be sure to send a filing extension request to the IRS by April 17, Morin said.

"Filing Form 4868 extends your filing deadline to August 15, but any taxes due should be paid by April 17 to avoid penalty and interest charges.

New this year—if by April 17 you use a credit card to pay taxes due with your 1999 return, an August 15 filing extension is automatically authorized." To charge your taxes to a credit card, call 1-

888-2PAY-TAX (there is a fee charged).

Morin added that taxes due with your 1999 return can also be paid electronically by Direct Debit, in the same way many people make mortgage or utility payments, if you file by phone or computer.

According to Morin, filers who simply can't pay taxes due may request an IRS installment agreement by filing Form 9465 with their tax return.

"It's very important that you file your tax return on time and pay what you can. Otherwise the late filing penalty is added to what you already owe," Morin said. "The IRS is willing to work with tax filers who are doing their best to comply with the tax laws."

Locally, the IRS office in Paintsville is open to assist tax filers on Friday, April 14, and Monday, April 17, from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. It is located at 812 F.M. Stafford Ave.

PRIDE is in the running for a national award

The PRIDE environmental cleanup program is a finalist for a national honor from the Public Relations Society of America.

The public education and community relations components of the program have made the short list of campaigns being considered for PRSA's prestigious Silver Anvil award. The final determination will be announced during ceremonies in New York on June 8.

"PRIDE means so much to the people of Eastern and Southern Kentucky in terms of improving and enhancing the quality of life there," said Ellen Gregory, of Preston • Osborne in Lexington, who served as the campaign's project manager.

"We're pleased to have played a small role in developing educational materials for the region's schools and communication tools for PRIDE coordinators in all 40 counties served by the program.

"We're most proud of the results the program has started to generate, but we are humbled that those educational efforts are being considered for a national award."

PRIDE stands for Personal Responsibility In a Desirable Environment. The three-year-old program was the collective product of U.S. Congressman Harold "Hal" Rogers (R-5th District) and

Kentucky's Natural Resources Secretary, General James Bickford.

"When we started PRIDE, our mission was simple: Make Kentucky great again," Rogers said. "We wanted to clean the rivers and streams, remove illegal trash dumps, and eliminate the problems of straight pipes dumping raw sewage into our precious waterways. We had hopes for success, but not on the order of magnitude that the program is experiencing."

Since its inception, PRIDE programs have involved pooling state and federal dollars for cleanup efforts, educational grants, community development opportunities, and rallying people together. To date, PRIDE has contributed to:

• Growth in the number of volunteers in counties deemed most at risk.

• Utilization of classroom educational materials by teachers and students in more than 400 schools.

• Providing loans totaling \$3.5 million to about 1,500 households enabling them to install effective septic systems.

• Volunteers logging more than 65,000 hours of service to clean up 326 illegal trash dumps, recover 23,000 abandoned appliances, police 565 roads throughout the region, and collect more than

47,000 bags of trash, 256 tons of scrap metal, and 116,000 used tires.

• A threefold increase in community education grants since the program's inception, with funds from grants used to buy 57 pieces of recycling equipment, install 23 surveillance cameras aimed at catching those who dump trash illegally and financing numerous appliance buy-back programs and illegal trash dump cleanup efforts totaling more than \$3 million.

Already, environmental education grants totaling more than \$520,000 have been distributed to schools to be used for projects such as outdoor classrooms and recycling programs. A recycling robot also will be used at schools in 10 counties.

Tony Turner of WYMT-TV serves as the president of PRIDE's board of directors. Jeff Speaks is the organization's executive director. Both expressed gratification, but not surprise, at the announcement that PRIDE is a finalist for the award.

"This project is so new and novel that we expected others around the country to sit up and take note," Turner said. "It's a testament to Congressman Rogers, Secretary Bickford and the people of our region that a program that

relies on cooperation among federal, state and local governments has been so successful."

As a result, other states are starting to look at PRIDE as a model for environmental cleanup efforts, Speaks said.

"We get calls daily from congressional offices, from staff members at natural resources cabinets and from industry planners," Speaks said. "They all want to know how it works, and why it works. The whole effort is something everyone in the region and the entire state of Kentucky can take pride in."

The PRSA awards competition in the environmental category was the most competitive of the three categories that one of the judges participated in, according to Gregory. PRIDE was the only campaign in those three groups to be unanimously recommended by the panel of judges as a finalist.

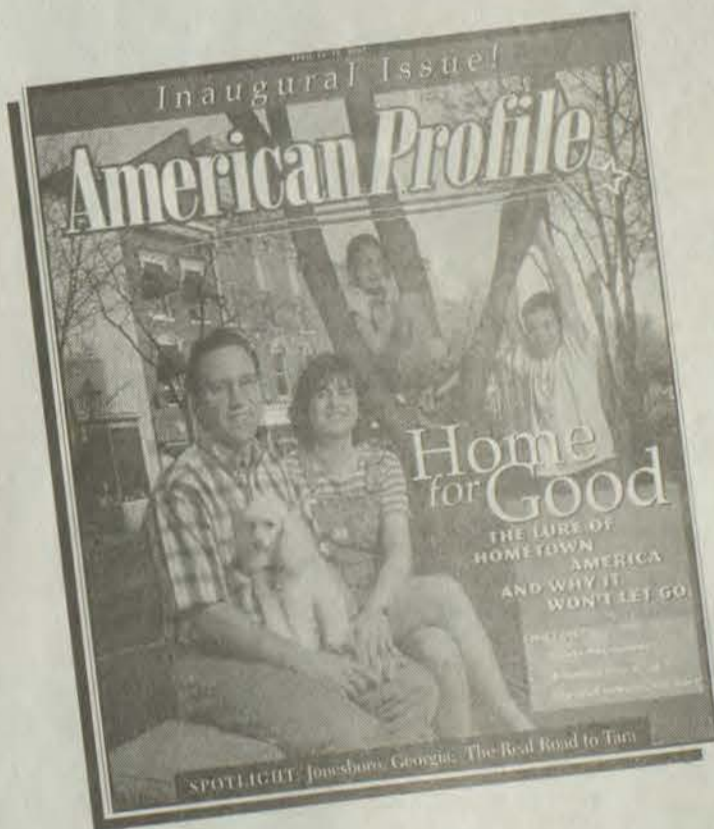

Social Security to sponsor study

Social Security is sponsoring the most ambitious national disability study of the American working-age population to occur in many years, according to Jim Kelly, district director for the Big Sandy Area. "This research project, the National Study of Health and Activity (NSHA), is designed to provide a more accurate picture of the needs of Americans with disabilities," Kelly stated.

The study began as a pilot in Cobb County, Georgia and Granville County, North Carolina, on January 29. It will expand to 80 cities in January 2001.

Kelly continues, "This study will provide a clearer picture of what disability looks like today in the United States. The results will help Social Security plan for the future by providing a better understanding of health, work and disability among working-age Americans."

The main objectives of the NSHA are to:

- estimate and project the number of people eligible for Social Security Disability benefits now and in the future;
- provide a better sense of how some people with disabilities are able to remain in the workforce while others are not;
- examine relationship between disability and retirement for older workers; and
- identify disability measures for use in national surveys.

All the information collected for this study is for research purposes only and cannot be used for current or future Social Security benefits. If the participants are receiving Social Security benefits, taking part in this study will not affect their Social Security check. All participant information will be kept private and confidential.

Kids Day is a special day set aside for the 9 and under age group where each takes part in seven special designed Olympic-style games.

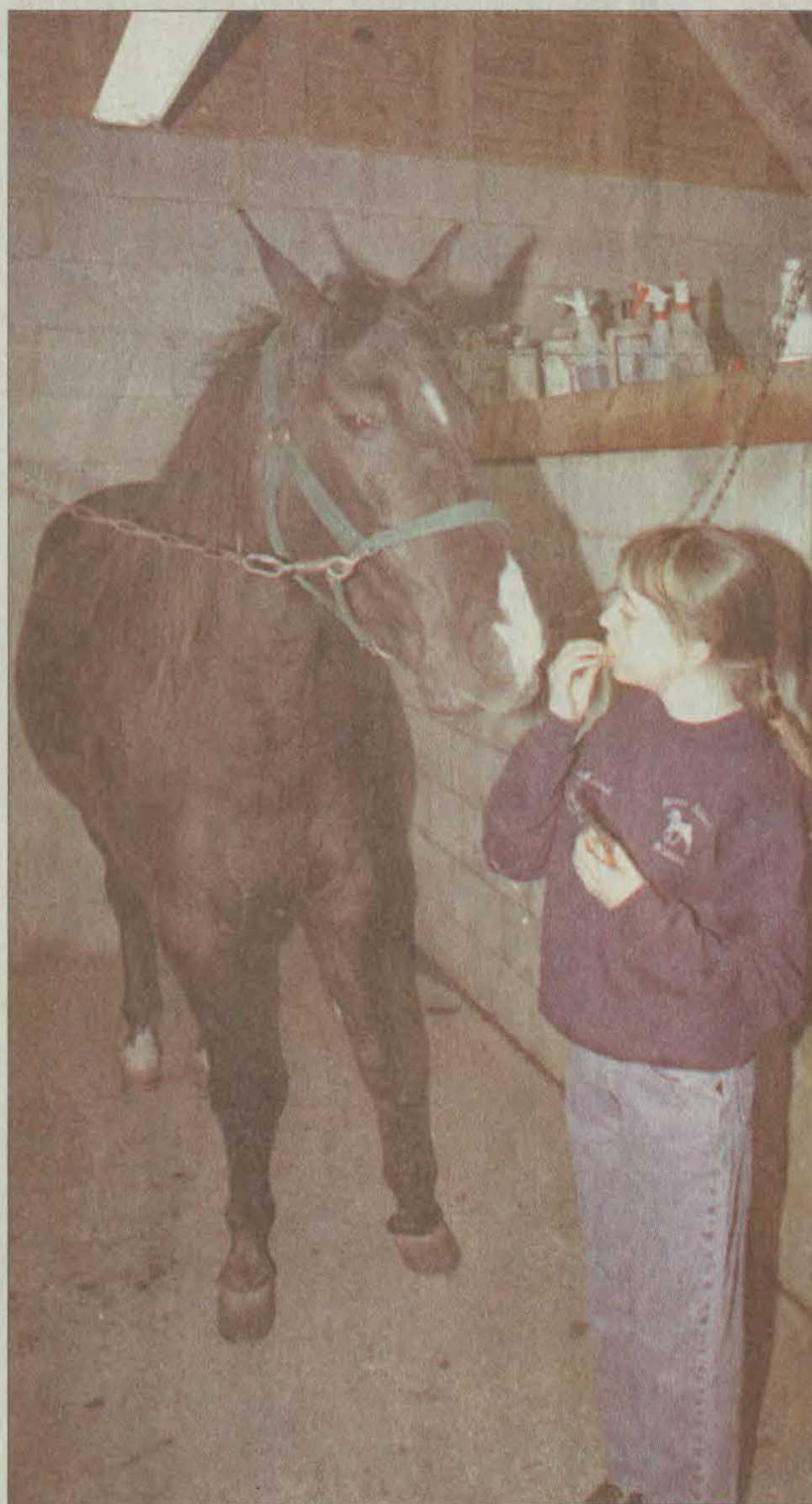

The Cabinet for Health Services notified Paul Howard by letter recently that his petition for the issuance of a certificate of Need for Salyersville Emergency Ambulance Service had been denied.

In the letter, dated March 28, the cabinet for Health Services informed Howard the Certificate of Need issuance had been disapproved based on inconsistencies with two criteria.

Howard, who currently serves as chief of the Salyersville Volunteer Fire Department, has been attempting to secure a Class I basic life support ground ambulance service to serve the Salyersville and Magoffin County area utilizing two vehicles.—*The Salyersville Independent*

Administrative Law Judge Ronald W. May said a local company's claim that a worker was not injured on the job is "long on suspicion and short on facts."

May rendered a decision April 4, awarding workers' compensation benefits to Retha Mollett, 45, of Tomahawk.

Mollett injured her neck and back, July 15, 1995, while working at a pizza restaurant for Mark H. Grayson Inc., of Inez. She filed a workers' compensation claim in August 1995, after Grayson refused to pay for medical treatment.

Throughout litigation of the claim, Grayson denied that Mollett sustained any work-related injury and inferred "this is a made-up injury."

Judge May said "the evidence is more persuasive that [Mollett] did sustain a work-related injury as she has alleged..." He ordered Grayson to pay

Building guns is a time-consuming project according to Mullins. Each gun he makes is unique. "No two are the same, and the sad thing is, they'll be more valuable after I'm dead," he said.—*Troublesome Creek Times*

Dressed in full hillbilly regalia — floppy felt hats, patch-covered overalls, buttons, brogans and the like — the men stand next to a metal plaque planted in the Pikeville City Park commemorating their creation in 1977 of Hillbilly Days, Pike County's annual display of

amplified Appalachian culture that will celebrate its 24th year beginning Thursday.

As he delicately holds the photo in his hands, more frail now than they were back then, the memories, he admits, don't come as quickly as they used to.

But Kinney, dubbed "Shady" Grady years ago by his Hillbilly Shriner counterparts, hasn't forgotten a single thing from the event's humble beginnings in 1977 to its historic heights reached in recent years when crowds right at 100,000 strong — more than 15 times Pikeville's population — crammed into the city for the three-day festival.—*Appalachian New-Express*

Williamson sights provoke interest

A building made out of coal and the plaintive words of an Indian chief, etched in stone, mingle in a slice of history in downtown Williamson, West Virginia.

The coal and railroad town on the Kentucky border, just across the mountain from Pikeville, contains a big chunk of Appalachian culture and history on a small corner lot.

The coal house, next to the Mingo County Courthouse, houses the Tug Valley Chamber of Commerce, a fitting resident, since the building promotes the most noted regional resource.

The building was constructed in 1933 out of 65 tons of coal, mined from the Winifrede seam and donated by the Leckie Collieries, Crystal Block Coal Co. and Winifrede Block Coal Co.

The coal was cut into blocks to look like black stone, forming the walls, two pilasters at the front and an arched entry.

To maintain the shiny black appearance and to keep the coal from deteriorating, the building is covered with weatherproof varnish every two years.

The idea of a coal building to commemorate the resource came from O.W. Evans, then manager of the Norfolk and Western Railways Fuel Department in Williamson.

According to an information sheet, materials, labor and cash were donated by local firms and individuals. The architect was H.T.

NEWS OF THE WEIRD

"I may be homeless," said former nurse Chester Goode, "but I'm the most stylish homeless person you'll ever meet." Goode, 46, was interviewed by a clearly impressed Miami Herald reporter in April, amidst the framed impressionist paintings, potted palms, fluted vases, decorative baskets, crystal decanter and a faux-antique phone (unconnected) in his classy, black-fabric-walled, tarpaulin-roofed space in the woods off 18th Avenue in Fort Lauderdale. Goode says he is driven by the need for quiet: "Boom-boxes, teen-age children, I just can't handle them."

Police called to a Giant supermarket in Yardley, Pennsylvania, in January arrested Samuel Feldman, 37, and charged him with one count of criminal mischief but suspected he is the person responsible for a three-year spree of squeezing, smashing and poking packages of bread and cookies in various area supermarkets, ruining more than \$8,000 worth

of goods. After the squeezer had struck more than 100 times in the area, Giant installed a hidden camera and, according to police, when Feldman was seen squeezing bread on the third separate occasion, he was arrested.

Latest Rights

According to a December Orange County Register story, Mark W. Dziga of Long Beach, California, had just filed an employment discrimination lawsuit against his former company, Boeing, for firing him because he chose to work in the nude at the office on Thanksgiving Day 1998 when he thought he was alone. A security guard turned him in for violating the company's dress code, and Dziga charged that his subsequent termination was illegal in that Boeing should have provided "reasonable accommodation" to his religion of shamanism.

The Connecticut Supreme Court ruled in October that workers have the right to express

themselves on public issues, but that Sikorsky Aircraft was justified in firing employee Gonzalo Cotto, who had objected to Sikorsky's pro-Gulf War stance by stomping on a workplace U.S. flag and blowing his nose on it. And Liz Anderson filed a federal discrimination complaint against employer USF Logistics in Indianapolis in November after the company ordered her to stop telling co-workers to "have a blessed day."

People With Too Much Money

In December, Graham Gund started a third version of his new multimillion-dollar house in Cambridge, Massachusetts, tearing out the foundation for the second time after deciding that he really wanted the house to look like the first version, which he had bulldozed down eight months earlier after it was nearly completed. And in January, a Newfoundland company announced it was taking reservations, at \$35,000 (U.S.) a seat, for a 12-hour sightsee-

ing tour in three-person submarines, 2-1/2 miles down to the sunken Titanic.

Smooth Reactions

Jealousy With a Flair: In December, the wife of a Cambodian undersecretary of state was accused of dumping five liters of acid on top of the 18-year-old girlfriend of her husband. And in October, a 43-year-old woman in Lake Ronkonkoma, New York, was charged with assault for allegedly taking a samurai sword and slashing off two fingertips of a woman she found in bed with her husband.

Recording legend brings his Little Big Band to the Jubilee stage

Vassar Clements is considered one of the world's most talented and versatile living fiddle players. His phenomenal ability to play virtually any kind of music — bluegrass, country, pop, rock, jazz and swing — has garnered him numerous awards, including five Grammy nominations and a track record that involves more than 2,000 recording performances.

Now, Clements takes center stage, bringing his own Little Big Band to Jubilee. This performance was recorded last summer at the Master Musicians Festival in Somerset.

Jubilee, a KET production in its fifth season, is produced and directed by H. Russell Farmer.

University Art Museum features artist Ellis Wilson

On April 9, the University Art Museum at the University of Kentucky opened an important exhibition of paintings by the African American artist and Kentucky native, Ellis Wilson (1899-1977).

A representational painter, Wilson's early work includes still lifes and portraits of family and friends. He was particularly interested in—and noted for—genre scenes of the daily activities of the African American community, and his paintings garnered several awards.

His portrayal of a worker in a New Jersey aircraft engine factory won the 1944 Guggenheim award, an award he won again in 1945, in addition to second prize in the 1952 Terry Art Institute National Contest.

These prizes enabled him to travel throughout the South and to Haiti where he produced many works of African American and Haitian daily life.

Margaret Vendryes, writing in the catalogue that accompanies this exhibition, notes that:

"Wilson made art for the sheer joy of recreating,

in color applied with forever dancing brushstrokes, what he witnessed in other people's lives. He was an insatiable recorder of the beauty that most take for granted."

The son of a barber and amateur painter, Wilson was born in Mayfield and attended Kentucky State College in Frankfort for two years before enrolling in the Chicago Art Institute, from which he graduated in 1923.

For the next five years, he worked in Chicago as a commercial artist and, in 1927, he was featured in a Chicago Art League festival alongside other prominent African American artists, such as Henry Ossawa Tanner, Edward M. Bannister, and Richmond Barthe.

Wilson moved to New York City in 1928, where he lived and worked for the rest of his life. In the 1930s, he participated in the Harmon Foundation traveling exhibitions and he produced work for the Works Progress Administration/Federal Art Project from 1935 to 1940.

During the war, he was commissioned by the Citizens Committee for the Army and Navy to create religious triptychs for

barrack and naval chapels.

"Ellis Wilson" opened on April 9, and continues through June 25. At 2 p.m., Martha Severens, chief curator at the Greenville County (South Carolina) Museum of Art, will present a talk entitled "Landscape Painting: Not Just a Pretty Picture," which will discuss Wilson in the context of other Southern artists. A reception will follow.

The exhibition catalogue, "The Art of Ellis Wilson" with essays by exhibition curator Albert F. Sperath, Margaret R. Vendryes, Steven H. Jones, and Eva F. King, will be available at the museum.

This exhibition was organized by Albert Sperath, director of the University Art Galleries at Murray State University. It premiered at the Murray State University Clara M. Eagle Art Gallery in February, prior to traveling to the University of Kentucky Art Museum.

Dante exhibit opens at Appalshop

"Memories from Dante: The Life of a Coal Town" opened at the Appalshop Gallery on Friday, April 7. It will be on exhibit until May 25.

The exhibit is one outcome of the Dante History Project, organized by People Inc. of Southwest Virginia to document the struggles and successes of Dante's citizens as coal mining fortunes cycled up and down during the first half of the century.

Since 1997, residents and former residents of Dante and nearby communities have contributed their knowledge and artifacts to create an impressive collection of more than 900 photographs and 44 taped interviews about life in Dante.

This town developed from the little crossroads of Turkey Foot in Russell County, Virginia, into a major coal center for the Clinchfield Coal Corporation and the Clinchfield Railroad at the beginning of the 20th century.

Clinchfield later became a subsidiary of the Pittston Coal Corporation.

Clinchfield closed the last Dante mine in 1959. Once a thriving, multi-cultural mining community of 3,800 people, today Dante is

a quiet town of about 950 people. However, the memories of a vibrant past remain.

The exhibit, displayed on 22 panels quilted by the Dante senior citizens, combines more than 120 photographs with the history and several of the personal stories which have been collected.

Dr. Jean Speer, Appalachian scholar and director of the Center for Appalachian Studies and Services at East Tennessee State University, contributed commentary which relates Dante's history to the region as a whole.

People Inc. of Southwest Virginia and the Virginia Foundation sponsors the Dante History Project for the Humanities and Public Policy.

"Of all my books," he wrote, "I like this the best."

CRITTERS CORNER

This week, I would like to introduce you to the Gentle Leader® headcollar for dogs, a unique piece of dogtraining equipment that I am really impressed with. It has been around for several years, yet I find that most people are unfamiliar with it.

When we head a horse, we use a halter, which allows us to guide him by pointing his lead in the direction we want. It would obviously be much harder to achieve this degree of control with only a rope around the neck, yet this is exactly what we expect of dogs.

Dogs wearing halters seem odd because we are not used to the idea. In fact, people seeing it in use for the first time tend to assume it is some sort of muzzle and that the dog wearing it is vicious.

The company has even started sending badges with my orders that say, "NO, IT'S NOT A MUZZLE!" to give to dog owners, who are having acceptance problems, to wear when taking the dog out in public.

The Gentle Leader® (which was originally marketed under the name "Promise") was developed by Dr. Robert Anderson, a veterinary

behaviorist, and Ruth Foster, a past president of the National Association of Dog Obedience Instructors. Although similar in appearance to a horse halter, it does much more than just provide control of the dog's head.

The Gentle Leader® is made up of two strategically placed nylon straps. The neck strap fits snug and very high on the neck just behind the ears—much differently than a standard collar. Pressure in this area is thought to simulate the pressure a mother dog uses to pick up her young puppies and thereby cause a calming reflex.

Pressure at the back of the neck also makes it difficult for the dog to pull forward, eliminating leash pulling.

The second strap fits loosely around the nose. When control is needed, pressure on the leash tightens this strap. Psychologically, this is thought to have a similar effect to a higher-ranking dog grasping the muzzle of a more subordinate dog in his mouth. This helps you tell your dog in his own language that you are in control.

When there is no pressure on the leash, the dog can open

his mouth fully, so he can eat, drink, and pant normally.

"Control" shouldn't be taken to mean the dog is made to feel like a prisoner. Once the dog becomes used to the halter, it seems to have a reassuring effect—that you are the leader and know how to communicate this to the dog. Most dogs are perfectly comfortable with someone else being the leader, as long as the communication is clear.

Of course, you can almost see the shock on the faces of those dogs that were pushing for the position of leader, when they realize for the first time that they are not the one in control. I have read that the dogs that really object to wearing the halter at first are the one that need it the most—those for whom control is an issue.

There are other head halters for dogs on the market, but of those I've tried, the Gentle Leader® is far and away the most effective. It's a little more difficult to put on than a simple collar, but once fitted (and the fitting should be done by someone familiar with the system), a quick release buckle makes it unnecessary to spend

time adjusting it each time. It is well worth the extra few seconds it takes to put on.

I use one when I take our Dalmatian, Desi, out in public to do children's talks. She is trained, but gets so excited around kids that she becomes hard to hold on a regular leash and collar for long periods.

During one of these programs she gave a sudden tug on the leash that pulled me off balance. I turned around to see her rolling away from me, having placed her front paws in the lap of a child in a wheelchair. I was horrified; the little girl and Desi both loved it.

When she was scheduled to ride in a parade on a fire truck with a dozen children, the halter was definitely indicated. Extremely shy dogs seem to gain confidence, and pushy dogs' manners become better. I have used it as part of a total behavior modification program to work with problem dogs, including aggressive ones.

A word of caution—any work with aggressive dogs should be done only with one-on-one professional help. The Gentle Leader® alone will not make it safe to work with these dogs.

Gypsy, a Border Collie in one of

our training classes, needed a halter to convince her that we would prefer her to walk on all fours. (She heeled beautifully, but on her hind legs.) She has now made the transition to the standard training collar and lead required in obedience trials, and appears to be on her way to completion.

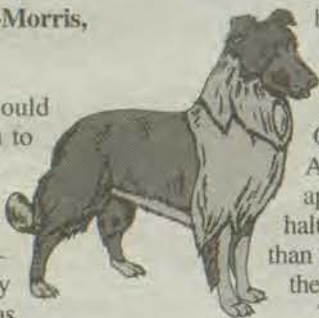
Another student, Roscoe, an Australian Cattle Dog, refused to walk at all until fitted with a halter.

Would these dogs have come around without the Gentle Leader®? I'm sure they would have, but how nice to have a humane alternative to speed up the process.

And then there was Butch the Mastiff—the only dog to date who not only literally pulled me off my feet, but dragged me halfway around the training area. And I used to work cattle! Trish, his owner, was as badly outweighed as me. Without the halter, our only alternative would have been to find an extra-large handler.

The more I use this device, the more opportunities I recognize where it might be effective.

The days of "there's only one way to do it" in dog training are behind us. This is among the best of the new products to come along to provide an alternate, humane and effective way to communicate with our canine companions.

accidentally landed on another man (Raver, India, November). Anglophobe Rage: One Quebec man was fined about \$700 (U.S.) for punching another because he addressed a postal clerk in English rather than French (Hull, Quebec, March).

In December, a 36-year-old, 280-pound man in Pontiac, Michigan, originally questioned by police because his stereo was too loud but then arrested on an outstanding DUI warrant, snapped his handcuffs off, creating a jagged edge, which he used to cut a hole in his stomach so he could pull his organs out to throw at rescue workers. "Reaching in and then tugging on stuff, and I mean tugging," is how Sheriff's Sgt. Matt Norman described the man's attempts.

No-Star Restaurants

In February, prominent French chef Jean Bardet had his restaurant in the city of Tours eliminated from the prominent Michelin Guide 2000 based on charges that his superior regional vintages were just cheap supermarket wine and that he had vastly inflated the uniqueness of his sea bass, veal, cheese and asparagus. Also in February, Quebec inspectors shut down the Comme Chez Soi restaurant in Granby temporarily after it was caught re-serving customers' discarded tartar sauce, coleslaw, bread and fondue, and not just from its own restaurant but from take-out food left behind in a motel owned by the restaurateur.

Least Justifiable Homicides

A 13-year-old boy was sentenced to 25

years in prison in December for killing his parents in retaliation for their not letting him go on a church field trip (Canton, Texas). And a 23-year-old man obsessed with the film "The Blair Witch Project" pled guilty in January to strangling his girlfriend because she insisted the movie was fiction (Grand Haven, Michigan).

A town council in Oslo, Norway, OK'd Muslim loudspeaker prayers on Fridays provided atheists had a separate chance to shout "God does not exist." Protesting women formed "Menstrual Avengers" to challenge a tax that covers feminine hygiene products but not condoms, sunscreen or incontinence pads (Sydney, Australia). A police officer who hurt himself punching a wall while arguing with his boss was ruled eligible for worker compensation (Hayward, California). A baby was born with a bullet wound on her bottom hours after her mother was shot in the abdomen during a carjacking (Johannesburg, South Africa). A British woman with 6 pounds of heroin strapped to her chest was arrested at an airport after her body piercing (in an unidentified but "intimate" location) tripped a metal detector (Istanbul, Turkey).

What's up with the weather?

KET examines global warming

Hurricanes, floods, blistering heat waves. The past decade has seen an increase in such climatic events, as well as record temperatures unmatched in modern history, prompting some to claim, "something's going on with the weather."

Are these changes the result of global warming? Is documented warming of the earth during the past century due to man's dependency on fossil fuels?

And if so, what can be done to prevent the catastrophic results some scientists say await us if global warming continues?

In "What's Up with the Weather?," airing Tuesday, April 18 at 9 p.m. on KET and Saturday, April 22 at 7 p.m. on KET2, Nova and Frontline unite to investigate one of the greatest scientific controversies of our time: the truth about global warming.

Scientists agree that so-called "greenhouse gases," such as carbon dioxide and methane, trap radiation from the sun and that the concentration of these gases has increased by one-third since the beginning of the Industrial Revolution.

Crazy quilter, tattoos, more on Kentucky Life

KET's award-winning series Kentucky Life explores some of the many ways Kentuckians express themselves Saturday, April 22, at 8:30 p.m. on KET. Dave Shuffett hosts.

First, Kentucky Life visits Kay Wimsatt of Whitesville in Daviess County. The former seamstress has "pieced" together a whole new way of expressing herself.

Known as a "crazy quilter," Wimsatt creates quilts that are quite a departure from traditional quilt designs.

Next, Shuffett takes a look at one of the world's oldest forms of art—body art. These days museums can be found for just about everything—even tattoos. Louisville's Tattoo Charlie's, one of only three tattoo museums in the world, opens its doors for the cameras.

Then, Kentucky Life introduces a man whose art is even more "underground" than tattoos. David Gulotta finds inspiration in the shadowy world of Mammoth Cave.

While most visitors come to the cave to marvel at its natural beauty, Gulotta sees this subterranean world in a whole different light. In this segment, viewers accompany him to the Mammoth Cave depths and see the abstract works that it inspires.

Finally, Kentucky Life turns back the clock in the little town of Dawson Springs, which in the early part of this century was a thriving resort town. That reputation drew the Pittsburgh Pirates to make their training camp there.

Now, the city pays homage to its baseball past at Riverside Park, an authentic wooden baseball park.

Inside, the building looks like any other, with paneled walls, carpeting, central heat and air, fluorescent lighting, and modern furniture. Brochures on sites to see throughout the state are abundant.

Of particular interest right now are materials on the Hatfield 2000 Reunion Festival, planned for June 4-11 in Williamson, Matewan, and Delbarton.

Around the same time, the McCoys have planned a reunion in Pike County, and the two formerly feuding families expect to get together.

In front of the coal house is a statue of Chief Logan, for whose tribe, the Mingo, the county is named. The adjacent county and city of Logan are named for the chief.

The Mingo chief was a friend to the white settlers, many of them influential, but the white man proved not to be his friend — as was often the case.

As peace treaties were being negotiated with the Native Americans, a couple of years before the American Revolution, a drunken soldier reportedly killed all of Chief Logan's family.

The chief was asked to join Lord Dunmore and other officers and chiefs to discuss peace, but Logan refused to attend. Instead, he wrote a letter to Dunmore, in which he eloquently shared his grief.

On a marker beside his statue, the words are etched: "I appeal of any white man to say if ever he entered Logan's cabin hungry, and he gave not meat;

if ever he came cold and naked, and he clothed him not. During the last and bloody war, Logan remained quiet in his cabin, an advocate of peace.

"Such was my love for the whites that my countrymen pointed as they passed and said, 'Logan is a friend of white men.' I had ever thought to have lived with you, but for the injuries of one man who the last spring, in cold blood, and unprovoked, murdered all the relatives of Logan, not even sparing my woman and children.

"There runs not a drop of my blood in the veins of any living creature. Who is there to mourn for Logan? Not one."

The authenticity of the letter was vouched for by Thomas Jefferson in his "Notes of Virginia," published in 1787.

Also interesting to see in Williamson is the massive flood wall, erected along the Tug Fork, which, along with the Levisa Fork, teams up to form the Big Sandy. The Army Corps of Engineers, which built the wall, had scenes from the area etched into the stone.

To get to Williamson, go to Pikeville on US 23 and turn left onto US 119 at the superstores intersection. The road has been widened in many sections and is far different than the winding, narrow trail of years ago.

The first Williamson exit (although still in Kentucky) takes you into downtown Williamson.

Daily free noon concerts, evening performances, and workshops in banjo and mandolin are also part of "Traditional Music Week" on campus of Morehead State University.

Previous winners of the "Appalachian Treasure" awards are authors Loyal Jones, James Still, Gurney Norman, Albert Stewart, and Billy C. Clark; artists Minnie Adkins, Ronald and Jessie Cooper, "Granny" Toothman, and Homer Ledford;

and musicians Jean Ritchie, C. Roger Lewis, and J. P. Fraley.

The award to Tom T. Hall honors a songwriter and performer with roots in Morehead, where he worked early in his career on WMOR radio. A member of the Bluegrass Music Hall of Fame, Hall has also authored several books of fiction and non-fiction.
