

One killed, two injured in Allen accident

Teen driver loses control, strikes three pedestrians

Tragedy struck in the city of Allen Wednesday evening as three youths were struck by an oncoming vehicle, fatally wounding one teen and leaving another in critical condition.

Pedestrians Brandi Lynn Mosely, 14, Leanna Briggs, 16, and William Sosebee, 20, were walking along Main Street in

Allen when a vehicle driven by David T. The Way Hospital in Martin and then Cecil, 16, of Pikeville failed to negotiate a flown to the University of Kentucky curve and traveled through an intersection

A report released by the Kentucky State Police said that as Cecil tried to turn and apply his brakes, the 1995 Chevy Blazer slid into the three pedestrians, hit a block wall and then overturned, striking a parked vehicle.

Mosely was transported to Our Lady of

Chandler Medical Center. Suffering from internal injuries, she was pronounced dead at 1:38 am Thursday morning.

Mosely was a freshman at Prestonsburg High School. Guidance counselors from across the county convened at the school on Thursday. Principal



Harold man killed in **Ohio accident**

A Harold man died Monday after sustaining injuries while on the job.

Daniel Ray Taylor, a construction worker, apparently fell off a cherry picker while he was working on a job site in Hamilton, Ohio.

The Hamilton County Coroner's office reported that Taylor was wearing a leather safety harness when he fell about 10 feet. He died sometime later from internal injuries suffered in the accident.

The coroner's office said Taylor did not strike anything in the fall.

Taylor is survived by his wife, Chandrea Lea Frasure Taylor, and two sons, Brandon Christopher and Shawn Christian.

Committee gives nod to tourism, park

MAC receives \$92,500 grant from Education Dept.

U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers has obtained a \$92,500 grant to pay for additional educational programs at the Mountain Arts Center in Prestonsburg.

The money, to be provided by the U.S. Department of Education, will help the center acquire equipment for music education programs and provide expanded resources for music lessons and other educational outreach programs, a statement from Rogers' office said. Spending will be targeted to reach a greater number of disadvantaged students, as well as gifted children.

"The Mountain Arts Center has become an important cultural center for everyone and also an educational resource for young people across our region," Rogers said Tuesday. "I worked hard to secure this money so we can reach out to more and more young people, including those from our most disadvantaged families. This project will connect them with music education programs and performances they might otherwise never be able to see."

Rogers also said the grant would help the center meet increased demands for education programs.

Couple combines arts with religious teaching

It was church, but it was a unique spiritual learning experience.

Wade and Jennifer Burleigh, from the First Century Ministries headquartered in Jefferson, Oregon, teamed up to deliver the scriptures through the traditional word and through the media of wood, sculpting, blacksmithing and pottery.

For five days, the Burleighs have held the congregation at the Methodist Church in Martin in awe as Jennifer, dressed in the fashion of a woman in the time of Jesus delivered the word of God while Wade, dressed as a carpenter much like Jesus was, created an art piece to illustrate the lesson.

On Wednesday night, the lesson was about God's love for all of us and how he holds us in his hand protecting us. As the story was unfolding, Wade, working with both blacksmithing and wood, created a raised hand with a nail driven in it.

At the end of the sermon on Wednesday night, the art pieces that were created during the week were given to the pastor, Roy Harlow, and to members who invited the most visitors to the revival.

During the days of the week, the Burleighs presented a slightly different version of the program to over 1,000 students during their visits to Duff Elementary, Allen Central Middle School, South Floyd Middle School and Osborne Elementary.

budget plans

The Prestonsburg Finance and Revenue Committee met briefly Thursday to consider the 2000-2001 supplementary budgets for the city and the city's health care plan.

The committee looked at a 9.79 percent increase for health insurance. The increase will bring the city's monthly allotment to \$30,235 a month or \$362,820 annually covering city employees.

Along with a motion to approve the health care insurance policy, the committee passed motions to accept annual budgets for the Prestonsburg Tourism Commission and Archer Park.

The budget for the Prestonsburg Tourism Commission was reduced by \$7,859 dollars from the previous year. Changes in the budget include the hiring of a part-time graphic artist/secretary at \$16,000 plus expenses.

This was a raise of \$4,000 over the temporary secretary already in the office. The commission paid more than \$5,000 in graphic arts work last year, according to commission members. The benefits for the position were also raised by \$1,925.

Other increases allotted in the budget include \$1,500 extra for supplies, equipment and telephone; \$1,000 in travel expense; \$1,216 in vehicle expense; \$300 for membership; and \$2,000 for special entertainment.

Reductions in the budget were \$500 less for rent, utilities and maintenance; \$1,500 less for brochures; \$2,000 los for promotions (TV, radio, newspaper); \$1,000 less for Tri-Mountain Tourism; \$500 less for filming; \$300 less for hospital training; and \$10,000 for software.

The budget for Archer Park reflects a revenue total of \$338,880. Personnel expenditures totaled \$186,150, while expected operating expenses where listed at \$88,800.

Capital expenditures for the park, which include building and improvements, equipment, roads and paving, and major repairs, totaled \$58,800. A total of \$1,800 was listed as advertising for the park.

The motions for the budget approvals will be taken to the city council for final approval.

Coy Sammons said Mosely had a large number of friends seeking the aid of the counselors.

Briggs was also transferred from Our Lady of the Way to UK. She is listed in critical condition.

Briggs is a student at the David School, where grief counselors were also on hand to comfort students shaken by their classmate's injuries.

Sosebee was treated and released from the Martin hospital. No charges have been filed in

the incident at this time.

Mosely's death marks the fourth year in a row a Floyd County high school student has died at or near the end of the school year.

In the two previous years, students from Betsy Layne, South Floyd and Prestonsburg have died in traffic-related accidents.



The Rural Housing program makes loans for the purchase of new and existing homes. Loans are made to eligible applicants with low and very low incomes.

There is no required down payment; the loan can for 100 percent of the appraised value. Maximum loan amount is determined by what Income limits are as follows:

- 1 Person-\$19,400
- 2 Person-\$22,150
- 3 Person-\$24,900
- 4 Person-\$27,700
- 5 Person-\$29,900
- 6 Person-\$32,100
- 7 Person-\$34,300
- 8 Person-\$36,550

Limits can be adjusted according to the number in the household. The limits above are based on projected gross income over the next 12 months less eligible deductions.

Eligible deductions are: \$480 for minor children under 18 years old, full-time students 18 years or older. child expenses for children under 12 years old, \$400 for elderly/handicapped family which could include a portion of the family's medical expenses.


The Cabinet for Health Services' Brain Injury Services staff is sponsoring a discussion group in Thelma, for people with acquired brain injuries.





Where eagles fly

Thanks to the efforts of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, river otters, elk and bear again populate part of Eastern Kentucky, but the department had nothing to do with the most exciting wildlife to take up residence in these parts.

Instead, it was the bald eagles themselves who decide to build their homes at Yatesville Lake in Lawrence County.

In fact, the chick hatched in an aerie high in a red oak tree just a few feet from the man-made lake may be a first for Eastern Kentucky.

Even in pioneer days, bald eagles were not known to inhabit the mountainous region of Kentucky. Instead, they preferred the hardwood forests in the Ohio River bottom lands of Western Kentucky. Indeed, the first bald eagles in modern times to be successfully hatched and raised in Kentucky were born at Land Between the Lakes, the large nature preserve operated by the Tennessee Valley Authority between the Tennessee and Cumberland rivers.

Because of that history, no attempt was made to relocate bald eagles to Eastern Kentucky. Indeed, wildlife biologists did not expect the magnificent birds to locate any further east than Cave Run Lake.

But bald eagles have migrated through Yatesville Lake for about three years, and in February, they started to build a nest. For the birds to successfully hatch a chick on their first attempt in a new area is extremely rare.

The arrival of the eagles is likely to attract visitors to Yatesville Lake, but those hoping to get a glimpse of the birds need to do so with great care. Bald eagles are extremely private creatures that must not be disturbed by curiosity seekers. Signs have been posted at Yatesville Lake warning people to stay at least 600 feet from the nest. Heed them.

A few years ago, a bald eagle was shot and killed in rural Boyd County. No one was ever charged with the crime, which carries a fine of up to \$10,000 and a prison term of up to five years. How tragic it would be if what may be the first eagle family to ever locate in these parts was chased away by the curious or — worst of all killed by some cruel or careless hunter who can't tell an eagle from a turkey.

The jury is still out on whether the reintroduction of bear and elk to this region is a positive, but there is no question that the arrival of bald eagles — America's national bird — is a reason to cheer. For the first time ever, we can see these magnificent birds of prey in flight without traveling hundreds of miles.

-----Guest Column ------The wealth primary trumps Tuesday's primary

On Tuesday, May 23, we Kentuckians will vote. We will go to the polls and pick a candidate that we think will make the best president of the United States of America.

Yet, long before we get our chance to vote for a candidate, in fact, long before the first state primary took place, there was another election. Most of us didn't participate. Yet it was this other election that produced a very short list of candidates.

This other election is known as the wealth primary. Those candidates who raise the most dollars soonest become the "viable" candidates, and those who raise the most, more often than not, win the race.

The sources for this money don't look like the rest of America. Four-fifths of generous campaign donors have an annual income of \$100,000 or more, and nine out of 10 are white, according to a 1998 survey by the Joyce Foundation.

Texas Gov. George W. Bush won the GOP wealth primary long ago. By raising so much money so early, he forced several other strong candidates former vice president Dan Quayle, Elizabeth Dole and Lamar Alexander, among others — to drop out of the race. Even John McCain could not survive the money juggernaut.

Al Gore and Bill Bradley ran a tighter wealth primary. However, the fact that Bradley was taken seriously at all, was because he had managed to raise enough money to be considered a challenge. Even so, Gore's bigger war chest guaranteed his victory.

Kentucky is home to 3.7 million people, according to the last U.S. Census. In the wealth primary, the state is not at all well represented. In 1999, Kentucky residents supplied just \$1 million in large individual contributions of \$200 or more to presidential candidates, according to the Center for Responsive Politics.

The residents of just one ZIP code on Manhattan's posh Upper East Side, 10021, gave \$2 million — twice what the residents of the entire state of Kentucky gave.

The area of 10021 doesn't look like America. It's 93 percent white, with a median family income of \$101,959 in 1989. Sixty-five percent of persons 25 or older living in that exclusive ZIP code have a bachelor's degree or more.

For comparison, the U.S. median family income today is \$47,469 and 22.4 percent of Americans aged 25 or older have completed a bachelor's degree or more.

The same pattern holds true in Kentucky itself. Ten ZIP codes representing just 7 percent of the state's population are the source for nearly half of the state's large presidential contributions.

The top three ZIP codes, in descending order by contributions given, are 40207, in Louisville, \$114,656; 40502, in Lexington, \$63,977; and 40222 in Louisville, \$60,359.

Needless to say, these ZIP codes don't look like

Thus, many of the area's teens and preteens are bored.

I recently spoke with Collins, who also sits on the Prestonsburg City Council, about the lack of activities or activity centers in the city and across Floyd County for our youth.

We have no Boys or Girls Club, no YMCA nor YWCA. Little League baseball, Prestonsburg's Junior Pro Basketball, AAU Basketball, all address young athletes. Girl Scouts for the most part are for preteens. Boy Scouts are the same. But what about the children, like my daughter, who don't get involved in or turn away from sports?

On the other hand, as good as a proposed building for the youth looks, we may have the ultimate enemy against us. Many Japanese secret weapons intended to eventually take over the United States are hard at work. They have infiltrated most of our homes. These mind-numbing and addictive implements of war have dug themselves securely into our domestic environments and have spread like a deadly virus.

This germ warfare is not named meningitis, measles or hepatitis, but has names that are revered by our youth. At

that existed during my undergraduate years. It was a closeness much like that of the family unit.

I was reminded of the very first moment in which my years at Pikeville College began. Just as my parents and I arrived in front of Page Hall, we met two students coming down the stairs. I had met one already at orientation, when the other one, an upperclassman, who had already found out I was to major in music, said, "Hurry up and get unpacked. It's time for dinner." 'Where?" I asked. "The cafeteria. Where else?" he chided.

Mr. Caudill, for example, often wrote out structures and functions of various jazz chords on napkins for me. I still refer to those faded old napkins from time to time. He influenced me much more than he could ever know. Bill McCloud, my first private saxophone teacher at Pikeville College, had a great influence on me as well. He taught me how to read music and to be musical in my playing. Bill McCloud lit the flame and Gene Schindler nurtured it and kept it burning.

Gene Schindler gave me my first jazz mouthpiece. I loved that mouthpiece. I played with it for many years, until I almost bit through the metal, at which time it was retired. The faculty at Pikeville College saw potential in me that I could not see in myself. The climate at Pikeville College was nurturing, yet thought provoking and challenging. One instructor, Jeff Sandborg, was quite often heard saying, "No pain, no gain." Such qualities should exist at all better institutions.

There were many other opportunities offered me by Pikeville College that I would not have gotten at a larger institution. While larger schools tend to be more competitive (musically speaking) with only a

certain number of positions available, at Pikeville College, there was a need for everyone to participate. I soon learned of the discipline involved and rapport required for top-notch ensemble performances. Thus, I was given many opportunities to experience numerous different working ensembles that I may have not had in a larger setting.

I learned to sing at Pikeville College. I'm almost confident I would not have participated elsewhere. Many thanks to Jeff Sandborg. I now direct my very own jazz vocal ensemble (twelve singers, piano, bass and drums) at the university where I currently teach. This is just another one of the many skills taught to me at Pikeville College.

Along with an excellent foundation for higher learning, Pikeville College instilled in me the belief that I was equipped for success. When I graduated, the next logical step for me was to pursue graduate study and the transition was a smooth one.

attention. In both the Democratic and Republican presidential primaries, the issue of campaign finance reform rose in importance.

In fact, in many of the early primaries, exit polls showed that campaign finance reform ranked more important among voters than issues like abortion, education and world affairs. And three out of four of the leading candidates emphasized the

need for major reform. Second, there is a comprehensive solution to the problem. In Maine, Massachusetts and Arizona, voters have embarked on a bold new experiment. Rather than tinker with campaign contribution limits and other Band-Aid fixes, they have chosen to take private money out of elections.

Candidates who voluntarily agree to take no private money, and abide by spending limits, will receive an equal and limited amount of public money to wage their races. In the Bluegrass State, groups as diverse as the Kentucky Council of Churches, the Reform

tion called Clean Money Kentucky. The coalition's members sub-

scribe to a set of principles: limiting the influence of money on public policy; developing better ways for citizens to learn about issues and candidates; leveling the playing field so that a person doesn't have to be rich or have rich backers to run for office and win; freeing elected officials to serve citizens while they are in office, instead of concentrating on raising money; and ensuring access to public officials is open to all citizens.

Under such a system, candidates will no longer be beholden to a lic. And on Election Day, instead of having to pick from an array of candidates that have all been preselected by wealthy special interests, we'll all have a real choice, and a real voice.

Clean Money Kentucky is a nonprofit, non-partisan organization working to restore public officials' accountability to voters, rather than





ZIP codes nationwide that paid for the 1996 elections looks almost identical to those funding the 2000 presidential race.

Sixty-seven of the top contributing ZIP codes in the 2000 presidential race were among the top 100 contributing ZIP codes in the 1996 federal elections, according to data collected during the first nine months of the campaign.

Despite these figures, and the distressing reality they reflect, there is still reason to take heart. Money may have shaped the choice of candidates, but that's not the end of the story.

First, there is a growing awareness, among both candidates and voters, that the pernicious problem of big money in politics needs

Our civic leaders do a great job addressing the needs of every age group in our communities, but all to often we forget our kids.



The records of the Commonwealth Attorneys Office reveal in six years, Jerry Patton did try four sexual offense cases and won them all. What he's not telling you is he also dismissed 12 other sexual offense cases, plead 9 more sexual offense cases with no jail time served, and left 30 cases pending when he left office. Does he really believe that is a 100% conviction rate?

3rd - Jerry Patton says I'm an ineffective prosecutor. I remind him, and tell everyone, that Jerry Patton and I have faced each other in court two times during my term. First time, Jerry Patton's client was accused of sexually abusing a nine (9) year old girl. I watched Jerry Patton portray this child as a liar, both to her face and to the jury. The jury didn't believe Mr. Patton or his client. Jerry's client was convicted and went to prison. Has Mr. Patton forgotten this child and his client, a sexual predator, so quickly? I won. He lost.

The second time we met, Jerry Patton was defending one of his many clients that are charged with dealing drugs. Again Jerry Patton argued that his client was innocent, and a man who would never sell drugs to anyone. After I put on our evidence, both Jerry patton and his drug dealing client had a change of mind. Jerry Patton then eagerly admitted his client did in fact possess cocaine, and had in fact been selling drugs in our county. Jerry's client willingly agreed to serve three and one-half (3 1/2) years in prison.

Jerry, you say I'm an ineffective prosecutor. All I know is, I faced you twice in court, and when the day ended, both times I went home, you went home, but your clients went to jail. I believe even your clients would agree I did pretty good.



Also as part of the observance, the squad sponsored a poster contest among students at Osborne, Duff, May Valley, Stumbo and McDowell elementary schools.


The posters were displayed during equipment demonstrations, at which informational materials were handed out.



IF VOTER NEEDS ASSISTANCE IN VOTING

A VOTER MAY HAVE ASSISTANCE IF:

1. Voter is blind

.

- 2. Voter is unable to read English
- 3. Voter has a physical disability which prevents the voter from voting without physical assistance.

WHO MAY ASSIST THE VOTER:

- 1. Both Election Judges; or
- 2. Person of voter's choice except:-not voter's employer or agent of that employer-not officer or agent of voter's union-not a candidate to be voted upon.

WHAT IS THE PROPER PROCEDURE?

- 1. Voter completes the "Voter Assistance Form" (SBE-31) completely including the reason assistance is needed, and signs name.
- 2. If any person other than the election judges assists the voter, that person must complete the portion of the form which is an OATH that the assistor will operate the machine as directed by the voter AND this OATH must be attested by the Clerk signing.
- 3. If the election judges assist the voter, the Democratic and Republican Judges must sign the OATH at the bottom, BOTH JUDGES will enter the machine with the voter, where in the presence of each other, the machine is operated in accordance with the directions of the voter.

4. Election officers should list the name of each assisted voter on the "Record of Assisted Voters' (SBE-31A) form which should be returned with the election material as instructed.

VOTER MAY MAKE APPLICATION FOR PERMANENT ASSISTANCE TO VOTE

There is a portion of this form where the voter may request the Board of Elections to certify the voter as needing permanent assistance due to blindness or other psysical disability. If the Board approves the voter's request, voter will have permanent certification relieving the VOTER ONLY from the responsibility of completing the oath. Even if a voter is certified for permanent assistance, the assistor(s) must still complete and sign their portion of the Oath.

Violations of the laws regarding Assistance to Vote should be reported to the Board of Elections immediately and noted on the "Precinct Election Sheriff's Post Election Report" (SBE-53)

ELECTIONEERING

Electioneering is PROHIBITED WITHIN 500 FEET* of any entrance to a building in which a voting machine is located if that entrance is unlocked and is used by voters on election day.

Electioneering is defined in the law as:

- 1. Display of signs
- 2. Distribution of campaign literature, cards or handbills
- 3. Solicitations of votes for or against any candidate or question on the ballot in any manner
- 4. Solicitation of signatures to any petition

The PRECINCT SHERIFF has the responsibility of ENFORCING the ELECTIONEERING LAWS within 50 FEET OF THE ENTRANCES. VIOLATIONS OF ELECTIONEERING BETWEEN 50 AND 500 FEET should be reported to the Board of Elections IMMEDIATELY.

The precinct Sheriff may request the assistance of any law enforcement officer to maintain law and order at the polls, but it is strongly suggested that Precinct Sheriff make that request through the Board of Elections. (County Board of Elections phone number 886-3816 or 1-800-481-2009)

Any violations of the electioneering laws should be entered on the "Precinct Sheriff's Post Election Report" (SBE-53)

"The 500 foot prohibition does not apply to electioneering conducted within a private residence or establishment by persons having an ownership interest in such property UNLESS THAT PROPERTY IS THE POLLING PLACE.

Welfare recipient uses KCTCS education to set example

Married at age 16, a mother for the first time at 18, divorced at 22, the victim of a devastating automobile accident at 30 - Cynthia Deem endured a lifetime's worth of challenges before she turned 35.

With four daughters to feed and seemingly no other options, Deem went on welfare in 1996. She lacked the education to work in the fields to which she aspired - business and health care.

And, because she still was healing from the fractures and dislocations she suffered in the 1994 wreck, Deem didn't have the strength or stamina to return to her former line of work in the restaurant business.

But Deem wasn't satisfied to remain on welfare, and she knew she needed to set a positive example for her daughters. With the assistance of her welfare caseworker, Deem decided to enroll at Maysville Community College three years

The education that the 36-yearold Fleming County resident is receiving has turned her life around. "I wanted to give my daughters

the empowerment to know that they can do it on their own," Deem said. "They don't need to lean on anybody. Going back to college seemed the best way to do that.

Deem's success story is an example of how institutions in the Kentucky Community and College System Technical (KCTCS), with support from the state Cabinet for Families and Children (CFC), are preparing welfare-recipients for the world of work

The KCTCS Ready-to-Work program is funded by a \$2 million grant from CFC in 1999-2000. KCTCS is matching the grant with \$419,000 of its own resources. Ready-to-Work emphasizes:

That's why our Ready-to-Work coordinators cooperate closely with Cabinet for Families and Children caseworkers to ensure that welfare recipients who attend our colleges benefit from available services such as financial aid, transportation and child care," McCall said.

To ensure that welfare recipients are aware of education and training opportunities available to them, KCTCS has launched a public awareness campaign that features the slogan: "If you're ready to work, we're ready for you.'

KCTCS has distributed to colleges and CFC caseworkers brochures and posters that explain the Ready-to-Work program. Also, KCTCS is running a radio campaign to promote the enrollment of welfare recipients in summer and fall 2000 courses.

Deem is scheduled to graduate in December 2000 with an associate's degree in business management and a minor in psychology with emphasis on human resources. She hopes to combine her interests in health care and office work.

"I always wanted to be a nurse," she said. "But since I can't do that (because of her injuries). I'd love to be in the hospital atmosphere working in human resources or patient counseling."

Deem has a job in the work-study program at Maysville Community College. "They put us in places where we can apply the skills that we're learning," she said.

In the meantime, with an eye toward graduation, she is "putting in resumes everywhere. I've already had a couple of interviews. I'm supposed to start this summer in the home here nursing in Flemingsburg.'

Deem credits the influence that Mary Fischer, the Maysville Community College Ready-to-Work coordinator, and Becky Cannon, her caseworker, have had on her life. No matter how difficult her college courses are, Deem motivates herself through her desire to provide a positive example for her children.

"It's worth it when you see the look in your children's eyes when you bring home a paper with an 'A' on it. It gives them something to shoot for," Deem said.

"I've got to do something for my children, if not for myself.'





Polar Adventure Is One Cool Vacation

he New York Times reported in December that there was some controversy over exactly what spot on Earth would be the first to experience the new millennium. Kiribati actually changed its time zone so as to be the easternmost nation on the International Date Line. Pitt Island off New Zealand claimed that it would be the first inhabited land to see the first dawn. The U.S. government's official in charge of

drifts about 30 feet a year, and by tradition the marker for the Pole is moved to its true location a few hours into the new year. Finishing their work, the scientists placed a short bamboo stick with a red flag on top at the appropriate spot.

So that's where we were with about 10 minutes to go, the nine of us alone, staring at this ludicrously inadequate marker and wondering if we were the only people in the entire Earth's population who thought it important to be at the Pole for this historic

event. Where were the 200-odd staff members of the base? Partying inside, where it was AFRICA warm, of course; the outdoor temperature was minus-22 degrees. (We were pouring champagne into glasses only to watch it freeze before we could drink it.) But within minutes, about a hundred inebriated scientists and ANTARCTICA support personnel were sur-South Pale rounding the slender reed. Suddenly, we realized that nobody knew the exact time. This was disastrous! It was the only occasion in my life I ever felt I really needed Dick Clark to be there for me. To the rescue came Antony A. Stark, an astrophysicist at the base, who had a GPS unit with him, which receives the exact time from the satellite system. Stark began a countdown with one minute to go, and about a dozen people silently placed their hands one above the other atop the stick as the rest of the crowd pressed around us. The countdown was as intense as a rocket launch, and the seconds afterward just as loud. People hugged each other in their puffy down parkas, ran in circles through all the time zones, made toasts, posed for pictures, performed inane stunts, then silently drifted inside. Ten minutes into the new millennium, there were only we tourists alone in the cold at the South Pole. We quietly got into our plane and flew back north.

Go With the Flow for Best Crappie Action

Norman Rockwell portrait of crappie fishing today would depict a calm scene on a still lake or A would depice a can't scrappie fishing that most anglers know so well.

But growing numbers of anglers have discovered that to find abundant populations of the tasty panfish, they just have to go with the flow.

Rivers, creeks and streams harbor the most unmolested crappie fisheries of all. And if you look, you will discover crappie in a variety of other moving-water situations, including wind-blown areas, backwater bays, oxbows and newly flooded areas, as well as the power generation and floodgates of most large reservoirs.

Contrary to a long-held bellef in some parts of the country, crappie are attracted to current and can even be found in some of the most turbulent waters of the year. Current provides several desirable elements to gamefish. It offers more oxygenated water that is slightly warmer in the early spring and late fall, or cooler in the heat of the summer. It brings forage species to places where they can be ambushed easily. And it often provides an important range of depth that allows the crappie to quickly adjust to barometric pressure and other weather changes.

"There's nothing quite like catching crappie in rivers or other types of moving water," says Bill Dance, television-show host and crappie fanatic who regularly fishes the Mississippi River near his Memphis home for the prolific panfish. "There is nothing static about it."

Regardless of the source of the current, the universal key to catching crappie in moving water involves targeting objects that fishermen refer to as "current breaks." A current break, as the name implies, blocks off the flow and allows a calm pocket, or eddy, to form behind it. The most common current breaks include bridge pilings, barges, points, riffles and shoals, rockpiles, trees, brush, lily pads or other vegetation, stumps and boat docks.

"Any time the current strikes something, it does two things - it changes direction and it changes speed," Dance said. "And crappie know that. Remember that crappie will seek shelter from the faster water, but will maintain a position where they can feed easily."

ddies of various sizes are formed behind the current break at the point where the water swirls around the object before continuing on its normal path. These calm areas provide refuge from the heaviest flow, as well as a prime feeding station for crappie who position themselves strategically so they can dart out into the flow and assault an unsuspecting shad or minnow (baitfish occasionally make the fatal mistake of actually coming into the eddy).

To take full advantage of this predictable positioning, it is vital to cast upstream and allow a live minnow or artificial lure to float down along the edge or into the interior of an eddy in a natural manner from above the current break. That's Current Crappie 101.

The intersection where a ditch or creek enters a larger channel usually creates eddy pockets. Eddies are also found in the bends of a channel. Foam, leaves and other floating debris often collect in these sanctuaries, providing a visual clue to their locations.

Since many current breaks and eddies are located along or near the shoreline, they provide some rare crappie-fishing opportunities for bank fishermen.

Crappie experts agree that fish relating to running water tend to hold in depths of 10 feet or less. In most cases, the water movement and sometimes muddy runoff significantly hamper the fish's visibility. This keeps them relatively shallow and most susceptible to a slow, vertical presentation that remains in their immediate vicinity for as long as possible.

Then you spend up to a week staging a flight from southern Chile to the organization's base camp in the Ellsworth Mountains, followed by perhaps another week waiting for weather to clear for a dash to the Pole.

e reached the base camp easily, but for days the weather kept us from flying to the Pole. But conditions changed at literally the last minute, and nine tourists arrived on a Twin Otter ski plane a few hours before midnight New Zealand time, the time kept by Amundsen-Scott Base and, serendipitously, the first time zone after the Date Line. As we stepped out onto the ice, scientists were surveying the exact spot of the Pole. The 2-mile-thick ice sheet

You've heard of virtual reality, where activities are simulated and things appear real whether they are or not.

Well, David Copley and Scott Lish claim their Lazar Tag business is "actual reality."

"You are a part of the video game," says Copley, co-owner, with Lish, of The Shack, a new game center and restaurant in downtown Pikeville.

Lazar Tag, the hottest electronic game these days, had been available no closer than Lexington, according to Copley. The business opened on April 13 on Second Avenue in the old Dawahare's location.

The highly-touted game pits teams and individuals in battles with themselves and the electronic maze itself.

The action takes place in a 64'x40' "arena" — a series of rooms and hallways, rigged above and all around with computerized boards of wires covered in clear plastic boxes.

The electronic wizardry responds to the actions of the players, being disabled by the humans' quick reactions and disabling those not so quick or sharp.

Colored lights — bright purple, lime green, blinding yellow, for starters — assault the eyes and startle the nerves. Futuristic, loud music and dense fog add to the frenzy.

Players are equipped with vests and weapons that reveal comput-

My father, Charles O. Wheeler, was "Buzzy' Johnson County Clerk for 16 years (1950-1966). When first elected in 1949, two things distinguished him as a political pioneer - he was the youngest county official to ever hold office, and he only won by two votes. (An official recount had him the winner by three.)

Daddy used to regale his family with tales of his first run for office. As the story goes, right after World War II, he and several other veterans traveled throughout the United States selling portraits.

During one of their excursions, Granny Wheeler went down to the courthouse and filed Daddy as a candidate for county clerk. Granny wanted her wandering son home, and she knew the only way to do this was to find him a job. Then she set out to get him elected.

As Granny Wheeler trekked up and down every holler in Johnson County campaigning for Daddy, she reminded the voters that he was an ex-Marine who had been wounded during the war and that he wanted to help the people of Johnson County by being a 24-hour clerk. She promised that his office would be available to the public 24 hours a day, and no one needing assistance would be turned away.

At that time, there were many veterans who had many things in common with one another. They had just fought a terrible war for their country and they were back home trying to start. and support young families. They were comrades-inarms, and they had a genuine affection for one anoth-

When Daddy returned to Johnson County, he discovered that Granny had done her homework well because his name and face were becoming well-known to the voters.

It won't be as long as it has been

Daddy started accompanying Granny on the campaign trail and before long, the mother and son duo was a familiar sight throughout the county. Daddy told us that one day as he took his campaign door-to-door, he was met by a menacinglooking dog who stood guard over his owner's porch. Being a little wary of dogs. Daddy took his time before starting toward the door.

When the dog bared his teeth and growled, Daddy turned tail and started running, "Wait!" a voice called to him. "What are you running for?" Without missing beat, Daddy replied. B "County court clerk!"

Before he ran for his second term for clerk, Daddy had become known throughout the state as an up-andcoming Republican and was approached by the Kentucky Republican Party to make a run for United States Congressman from the 7th District

However, he declined because he was committed to fulfilling the term for which his friends had elected him.

At 6'4", he was a handsome, young man who pos- I can honestly say that the

sessed a magnanimous personality and contagious smile that forced you to like him before he ever uttered a word Once while he was in

Lexington attending a state fund-raiser for then President Dwight D. Eisenhower, Daddy wanted to shake hands with the president but the large crowd assembled prevented him from even getting close.

Without missing a beat, Daddy picked up a tray of food. While balancing it on one hand, he positioned it over his head and started yelling, "Hot stuff coming through!"

The crowd immediately fell back and opened up a space for Daddy to walk through. When he reached the president, he set the tray down, introduced himself, and shook his hand.

Because of my political background, it is no wonder that the closer it gets to election time, the more I am reminded of that very special period of my life when the people of Johnson County so kindly and graciously supported Daddy and our family.

Until I was 21 years old,

voters of Johnson County were responsible for seeing that my family was fed, clothed, housed and educat-

And if those things weren't enough, we were blessed to have a special friendship with them. A day rarely goes by that someone doesn't remind me of something my daddy did to help

News Of The Weird

In past years, a favorite summer fundraising game for some parishes in the Catholic Archdiocese of Cincinnati has involved placing a small rat on a roulettetype wheel, spinning the wheel, and selling bets on which slot the rat will stagger to. This year, however, according to a Scripps Howard News Service report, local animal rights activists have protested, but in early responses, at least one parish has vowed to continue the game anyway. Said one activist, "The Church said it was OK to spin animals. What's to keep someone from going home and putting their cat in a dryer?"

Fox Network's Far-Ranging Influence: On April 27, a reporter for Russia's RTR television arrived in the town of Ivanovo to shoot a piece on a housewife merrily feeding her family while her soldier-husband was away serving as a peacekeeper in Kosovo. However, the reporter had received word minutes before that the husband had just been killed on duty. Thus, the reporter shot some "before" scenes, in which the carefree wife earnestly spoke of her husband's imminent return, and then the "after" scene, featuring uncontrollable crying after the reporter broke the news to her.

Latest Hate-Crime News

In January, the general manager of a Ford-Toyota dealership in Lake City, Florida, told reporters that the acid-splashing vandalism on his lot should be punished as a hate crime because only Fords were hit. And in Berlin, Germany, owners of pit bulls and other aggressive breeds planned a May protest against proposed legislation to ban the dogs; organizers planned to dress their dog-victims with yellow Stars of David, which is what Third-Reich-era Jews were forced to wear as identification.

Police Blotter

Recent Weapons: In a bar fight, one woman hit another on the head with a toilet lid (Rock Island, Illinois, January). A 21year-old man wielding a small python robbed a convenience store (Oklahoma City, December).

Those Compassionate Canadians: The man who cleaned out the cash register at a Tim Horton's doughnut shop in Hamilton, Ontario, in February came back a few minutes later and returned the portion of the money that had been segregated as employees' tips. And in April, recently released sexassaulter Jody Robinson, 33, offered one of his kidneys to his 1996 victim, who is awaiting a transplant.

Great Detective Work: Suspicious police in Spokane, Washington, after questioning Harold Anthony Mazzei, 32, at a January traffic stop, decided to arrest him: The only way Mazzei could turn off his car's engine was using pliers and a screwdriver (and, indeed, the car was stolen). And in February, suspicious police in Chicago decided to arrest Steven Coleman, 24, for robbing a family sewing-machine shop and provoking a fracas while the owner was heating chicken noodle soup for lunch: Coleman was later spotted nearby with noodles in his hair. And in November, suspicious police in Sydney, Nova Scotia, decided to arrest a 38-year-old man on drug charges after encountering him dazed with syringes hanging from both arms.

Police in Dublin, Ohio, arrested alleged veteran thief Rudolf Nyari, 64, in April for taking a diamond bracelet from Leo Alfred Jewelers. Nyari had handled the bracelet, then left the store, after which an employee noticed it missing. Police, aided by a license-plate number, stopped Nyari just

Antique appraiser's day Washington's roadshow

The first Appraiser's Day ever held in the area took place in the 1700s village of Washington, (now part of Maysville), last August. This event was such a smashing success with people living up at 8 a.m., that the Historic Shopkeepers Association, which sponsors the event, has responded to public pressure and will hold not one, but two of these antique shows this year.

The first will be on Saturday, May 20, and the second on October 14. As previously, appraisals will run from 1 p.m. until 5 p.m. at the Washington Meeting House in the center of town.

Frank Farmer Loomis IV, nationally renowned appraiser from Cincinnati, will again do appraisals for the public.

Shows like this usually charge \$50 to \$100 per item, but the cost will be a nominal \$5 for this event on May 20. Loomis will not appraise guns, knives or jewelry, but every other antique is welcome. While in Washington, you are invited to visit the many antique, and specialty shops, eat at Brodrick's Tavern and Marshall Keys Tavern, have costumed guides take you on a tour of the village and its eight museums, and view the video in the 1790 log Visitor's Center.

A full-time appraiser, Mr. Loomis, at one time was proprietor of his own antique shop, was an antiques columnist for The Cincinnati Enquirer, a frequent writer for Antique Review and a writer for Cincinnati Magazine. He is an instructor at the University of Cincinnati on antiques and an appraiser for the "Something Special" section of the Big Sale of the Cincinnati Art Museum.

This event, one of the 10 special events in Washington this year, will be followed by Woodcarver's Day on June 11, and new this year is the Civil War Living History Weekend with a Ladies Tea, Gala, portrayals of Albert Sidney Johnston, Lee, Lincoln, Grant, the 2nd Regional CSA with more than 50 soldiers, a recruiting station, reenactments, displays, a doctor demonstrating medical procedures, church service, and soapbox preaching.



as his mother and father. Church and youth groups are also encouraged to bring teams.

In fact, The Shack owners consider the business a part of their Christian ministry. Lish is pastor of Family Worship Center in Pikeville, and Copley also preaches.

"We want to show that being a Christian is not a boring thing," Copley says.

Christian band posters line the walls of the restaurant and Christian music videos often dominate the big screen TV. College and professional sports are also shown on the TV.

Lazar Tag is not the only game available at The Shack. Two walls back of the restaurant area are lined with electronic games, and more are planned.

The restaurant concentrates on pizza and subs - at reasonable prices. "This is the only place where you can get a hunk for \$2," jokes employee Joyce Ratliff, referring to an ample pizza slice.

Pizza prices are standardized, with no extra charges for extra toppings. Dessert pizzas are also available.

A recent addition to the food line is a movie-style popcorn maker.

Memberships are sold for the Lazar Tag operation. Ranging from \$50 to \$75 annually, the memberships include savings on the cost of games and participation in special events, such as Midnight Madness, a late night opening planned for six times a year.

Regular Lazar Tag games are \$6.50, but a number of specials On Fridays and apply. Saturdays, if you pay for three games, you get one game free. On "Super Tuesdays," games are \$5 each or five games for \$20. Other specials are coming, Copley says.

Business hours are Monday-Wednesday, 10 a.m. to 10 p.m.; Thursday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.; Friday-Saturday, 10 a.m. to midnight; and Sunday, 5 to 10 p.m.



CRITTERS CORNER

I've been asked quite a few questions lately about dealing with cat claws. The questions include how to trim nails, how to stop cats from clawing inappropriate objects (furniture, draperies, people), what my opinion is on declawing, and alternatives to declaw surgery.

Cats can do some major damage with their claws, but it is important to understand that they are not on an intentional mission of destruction. As with many other behaviors, the use of claws is an instinct that may not have an appropriate outlet in the home environment.

Let's start at the beginning. Why do cats have claws? (1) They allow the cat to capture and hold prey. (2) They are a defense mechanism (3) They allow cats to climb, so they have more access to prey and to escape enemies (4) They are used to mark territory.

Obviously, claws are very important to cats, so it is in his best interest to keep them in good shape.

Claws are modified nails, and, like our nails, they grow from the end of the digits (fingers and toes, to us). Tendons allow cats to retract their claws when not in use; otherwise they would wear smooth like dogs' nails and lose their usefulness.

The only cat species that does not have the ability to retract its

tah; they bring down y in high-speed chases.

their prey in high-speed chases, and like dogs, they use their nails mostly for traction.

The ends of the claws, like our nails, are essentially made of dead modified skin cells, but near the base there is a blood supply and

nerve endings. This is the "quick" of the nail. As the claw grows out, the old outer cells loosen and fall off, almost like a snake shedding its skin.

Owners sometimes find these odd claw sheaths and think the cat has broken off a claw. Look closely, however, and you will see that these are hollow and papery, with no sign of blood.

So, in a sense, cats really are "sharpening their claws" when they scratch surfaces, but not in the same way we would hone a knife. Scratching serves other purpos-

es as well; it exercises the tendons that control the claws, and it leaves behind "cat graffiti" that tells other cats it was there. So, knowing that scratching is an instinctive and necessary behavior in the wild state, doesn't it seem much more logical to give the cat an acceptable outlet for the activity than to try to stop it completely?

Sure, you say, it makes perfect sense on paper. Trouble is, I already went that route. I bought him a scratching post and he won't use it. Generally, if a cat won't use a scratching post, there is a reason. Here's where you do a little detective work.

What is the cat destroying in the house? The couch? The door

frame? What makes these different from the scratching post? Most likely, texture and location.

> If the sofa is upholstered in chintz and the post is covered with sisal, maybe Tiger is trying to tell you that he just doesn't like the feel of the rough

covering against his feet. There's no law that says you can't recover the post. You may have to experiment with several types of fabrics and surfaces to find one he really likes.

To keep him away from the furniture while trying to redirect his scratch-

ing, try covering it with heavy plastic, placing double-sided tape on the corners, or applying an indoor pet repellant spray. You don't have to limit the cat to one alternative scratching site. If you provide several different possibilities, sort of a scratching post smorgasbord, you may find out more quickly what he prefers.

Some things to try are a variety of fabrics, posts of different heights, commercial scratching pads made of corrugated cardboard, and logs with the bark still attached. (Make sure these are not harboring insects or have been sprayed with any pesticides, fungicides, etc., before bringing them inside).

Also try placing them in different locations. Notice how the scratching activity seems to be the worst on corners of furniture and near doors? Feral cats mark things that protrude out into the environment and near heavily traveled areas.

> S c r a t c h i n g leaves both a visual mark and a scent, which is unnoticeable to us, from glands in the footpads. So even if you'd prefer to have the post back in a corner, it may do a better job near the door, and it's less of an eyesore than a shredded

This is another important point to remember: don't throw a wellused post away when it becomes worn and frayed. The cat has worked hard to get it to this point. He obviously likes the texture and the clawed surface reassures him that his territory is well marked.

sofa

Of course, there will always be a few cats that just refuse to give up shredding furniture, and, even worse, some that prefer to shred their owners, whether aggressively, or in play. Providing acceptable toys as targets of active play, as well as using behavior modification techniques, may curb these problems.

If you have a cat bent on destruction despite you best efforts to redirect his activities, what are your options? I'll discuss some of these next week.

The Continuing Crisis

However, Aguilera has done more than just top the pop charts and win musical awards.


