**Couple escapes serious injury in wreck, fire**

The Prestonsburg Fire Department and Ambulance Service respond to the scene of a one vehicle accident near the community of Dvale Wednesday. The driver of a pick-up truck apparently lost control of his vehicle while traveling south on US 23.

The vehicle left the right lane, crossed the highway and jumped the guardrail into the northbound lane, said Mike Wells, interim fire chief. Minor injuries were sustained by a West Virginia couple, whose vehicle caught fire in the incident.

Firefighters were on the scene for about an hour putting out the flames and cleaning the area, Wells said.

"The fuel pump kept spewing gas on to the engine," said Wells. "There was a lot of stuff in the truck. There was a lot of debris on the road."

Wells said the accident could have been much worse.

"It had the potential of being real bad if something came down the northbound lane."

The couple was transported to Highlands Regional Medical Center.

"They were very lucky," Wells said.



**Agencies to take services to Wheelwright**



The basement area of the Wheelwright gymnasium will soon become offices for many of Floyd County's community service agencies. Remodeling of the downstairs area is in progress. It is now serving as housing for the Appalachian Service Project.

Floyd County Health Department officials, Floyd Fiscal Court, and the Wheelwright City Commission have teamed up to bring residents in and around Wheelwright quicker access to a host of relief agencies.

Fifteen to 16 agencies are expected to have offices or hold single day services in the city. The Department for Employment Services, Social Security Insurance, Mental Health, Big Sandy Area Development District, Christian Appalachian Project, Community Action Program, Sandy Valley Transportation and Social Services are a few of the agencies that may be involved.

A new approach to beginning aid is expected to be used at the site. Agencies will attempt to shorten the process of getting residents through the system by sharing a common database while preserving

the integrity of the customer/agency confidentiality.

"We want to have one intake for all agencies," said Carol Holbrook for the health department.

Nearly all the services require the submission of the same facts, Holbrook said. A database of those facts would shorten the process of getting the aid started.

The program is part of the Vision 2000 plan by the health subcommittee and has been in planning for well over a year, Holbrook said.

A September to early October opening date is hoped for in the project. Crews will renovate the basement area of the old Wheelwright gym for the office spaces.

The health department has plans to implement a pilot program called Simplified Access or Single Point of Entry at Wheelwright. The programs will take a proactive approach to health care instead reactive, said Holbrook.

**Volunteers perform secret labor of love**

Week seven has come and nearly gone for a volunteer service visiting Floyd County. Sixty-six volunteers will pack their bags and prepare for a Saturday departure after giving some area residents a little bit of unconditional love.

This week's group hails from Texas, Illinois and Iowa. Ranging in ages from 15 to over 60, these volunteers are part of more than 500 that will come to the aid of Floyd Countians.

The crews come in for a week, arriving on Sunday and leaving Saturday morning, said Jamie Holnick, third year staff member and center director for the Appalachian Service Project in Floyd County. ASP is an all-volunteer program that lends aid to citizens of central Appalachia.

Holnick, who is a former volunteer, leads the ASP in the county as center director. She is part of a four-member staff that keeps the project moving along.

This is the fourth visit by the non-profit agency into the county and the second stop over in as many years. The group outlines a plan to help the financially unable to receive emergency home improvements at no cost to the homeowner through a system of referrals that is gathered throughout the year.

The repairs could involve any sort of problem in the home, including the building of wheelchair ramps, roof repairs, plumb-

### Candidates file for city council, board positions

The November general election is beginning to take shape for Salyersville and Magoffin County as several candidates have now filed for a variety of different positions.

Along with national and regional races, local voters will also be filling positions on the Salyersville City Council and the Magoffin County School Board, as well as selecting a Magoffin County Circuit Court Clerk and a county Conservation Supervisor, come election time.

The local races are expected to spur interest, as well as voter turnout, which has been lower than normal for the past two elections.

### EPA could veto MCC mine permit

Last year a federal judge in Charleston, West Virginia suspended mining permits in the Mountain State that employed the use of mountain top removal. This method threatens the elimination of some stream by valley fills, leftover waste consisting primarily of rock and soil used to fill hollows.

Now a Martin County coal company faces the possibility of losing its permit after the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency threatened to veto the Army Corps of Engineers' approval of a permit for Martin County Coal Corp. Similar permits in West Virginia have come under fire by the EPA due to requirements of the Clean Water Act.

More than a year ago, the EPA informed the Kentucky Department of Surface Mining that it was not in compliance with permits according to the Clean Water Act.

### Historic budget gets approval from city council

The Louisa City Council last week approved the city's budget for the current fiscal year — and made a little history in the process.

By giving a second reading to the plan during a special meeting last Friday, council members approved Louisa's first \$1 million budget, which according to Mayor Michael Sullivan, will provide improved services to city residents.

Although the new fiscal year began July 1, Sullivan didn't present his proposed spending plan until its regular monthly meeting on July 11. Council members, however, tabled a first reading until they had one more time to review the budget. Council's initial nod to the budget came during a special meeting Tuesday, July 18; final approval was given during a second session held last Friday.

The new budget is nearly \$67,000 more than the spending plan approved last year by council members. The increase is due to a rise in several revenue sources, such as property taxes, licenses and permits.

### Tornado?? Big Wind? It caused considerable damage in Morgan

Officials from the U.S. Weather Service Station in Jackson who inspected tree damage near Ezel in Morgan County last Friday, decided the trees had been damaged by straight-line winds, not a tornado, during a storm that swept through Eastern Kentucky on July 14.

The fast-moving weather front, accompanied by a weather service tornado warning for the Ezel and Stacy Fork communities just moments before it struck, uprooting trees, downed power lines, and damaged crops, homes, and other property in the Ezel, Mize and Caskey Fork areas.

During an inspection the same day of storm damage in Jackson County, weather service officials determined that it was a small tornado, not just winds, that hit the community of Annville.

Jim Keeney, a weather service official from Jackson, said that a weak tornado with winds of 70 to 80 miles an hour went through Annville, knocking a mobile home off its foundation and seriously injuring one occupant. It also ripped the roofs off houses and trailers, and knocked down garages and trees.

JWT's Intern and Apprentice Company will present the show as "Free Theatre in the Park" at the Jenny Wiley campgrounds and at the Mountain Homeplace in Paintsville. Performances at the park campgrounds are set for July 29, and August 2, 5, 9, and 16. The Mountain Homeplace performance will be Saturday, August 12. **Old flywheel will be Martin's reminder of Columbia's Beaver Creek station**

A 14-foot diameter, 15-ton flywheel, one of the crucial operating pieces of Columbia Gas Transmission Corp's Beaver Creek Compressor Station, will be removed and placed along KY 1428 to enhance the entrance to the city of Martin and serve as a monument to the station and all the company employees who worked there over the station's lifetime. Beaver Creek Compressor Station completed operations in January after 73 years of reliably pumping natural gas from the gas fields of eastern Kentucky to mar-

kets across the northeastern United States. Work will begin July 31, to dismantle the station and remove all remaining equipment.

The dismantling and remediation of the Beaver Creek site along KY 80 will involve several contractors, including Ray Fencing, Rose Service and general contractor WRS Infrastructure & Environment.

Dismantling will involve the use of heavy equipment on site to demolish the buildings, foundations and other facilities, and the use of heavy trucks to haul away salvage,

waste and debris. Work is expected to be complete by mid-November. Ray Fencing already has installed a fence around the perimeter for safety reasons.

Beaver Creek Compressor Station played a major role over the years in helping to build the market for natural gas in the eastern United States. Its construction in 1927 helped ensure delivery of reliable natural gas service through interstate pipelines to consumers in Washington, D.C., Baltimore and other East Coast points.

While the station has stayed in the same company's hands over the years, the names of that company changed from Warfield Natural Gas to United Fuel and Columbia Gas Transmission.

Recent changes in the company's markets dissolved the need for the station's services, resulting in its closure in January.

**State receives foreign language grant**

Frankfort — Kentucky is one of only four states to receive a federal Foreign Language Assistance Program (FLAP) grant to help promote foreign language learning in elementary schools, the Department of Education has announced.

The \$130,000 award will be used to design curricular tools and provide professional development for teachers of world languages. Half of the funds will pay for a team of teachers to develop a program of studies.

The other half of the funding will be used to pay for foreign language teacher academies. These academies will provide intensive, long-term professional development in elementary foreign language theory and methods to 30 teachers. The department piloted one academy in June in cooperation with Kentucky Educational Television and the University of Kentucky. Besides receiving research-based instruction in second language acquisition, teachers were also shown the strategies and technologies necessary for teaching elementary school students with diverse learning styles.

Ten teachers participating in the academy opted to receive graduate credit through the UK education or foreign language department.

"In order to secure the state's position in the global economy, Kentucky students need to be able to communicate in a world language," said Jacqueline Van Houten, foreign language consultant for the department. "That instruction should start before children's window of opportunity to acquire a language closes."

"Until four years ago, Kentucky's foreign language teachers were only certified to teach in grades seven through 12. One benefit of this grant will be the academy's capacity to retrain those teachers in effective elementary pedagogical methods."

The academies will be held in June of 2001. Applications for the academies will be distributed through the department's Regional Service Centers and the Kentucky Council for the Teaching of Foreign Languages (KCTFL). The applications also will be posted on the department's website.

A selection process has not yet been determined, but will address need for professional development and equity of regional representation.

Foreign languages are not currently part of Kentucky's Core Content for Assessment; however, an increasing number of middle schools are adding foreign lan-

guages to their curriculum in order to help students meet the new Kentucky college admission requirements.

In 1999, the legislature approved a regulation requiring students seeking admission into any four-year Kentucky college or university to have two units of a non-native language and its culture.

## Editorial

### Let voters see the candidates, not just their ads

Unlike some campaign reformers, we see the value in politicians having to raise money. It forces them to hone a message and get support. It winnows out candidates who aren't serious, or viable, or willing to work.

But in recent years, the dependence on fund-raising has grown so much that Americans have begun to wonder whom the folks they elect really represent. Meantime, another shift has taken place, this one in TV newsrooms. Studies show that broadcasters are devoting less news time to stories on government, politics and campaigns.

As a result, the pressure to raise money for TV ads continues to grow, and those ads have become the primary form of communication in the months before an election. And they aren't exactly full of dependable, accurate information. Often, they tend to be deceptive and inflammatory. They attack; they reduce huge issues into sound bites.

It's probably no coincidence that the public is also losing interest in the political process. Voter turnout in the 1996 election was lower than it had been since 1924. The mid-term election of 1998 had the lowest turnout since World War II.

There is probably no simple solution to getting people engaged, but a small group based in Washington has a modest idea for a way to start that certainly can't hurt. Paul Taylor of the Alliance for Better Campaigns is traveling around the country advocating that television stations devote five minutes a day to a serious discussion of candidates and issues during the last 30 days of political campaigns. He has found several allies in Kentucky. They include former Govs. Brereton Jones and Louie Nunn and Common Cause.

Five minutes a day isn't much to ask, given broadcasters' obligation to perform public service in return for their free and exclusive use of the public air waves.

Mr. Taylor and his group don't care how broadcasters use those five minutes — "Let a thousand formats bloom," they say — although they are "partial to segments that foster spontaneity and straight talk, that push candidates beyond spin and sound bites." Five minutes a day would help candidates, voters — and newsrooms, as well. It wouldn't hurt those who are responsible for the news to become more informed on the candidates and the issues candidates espouse.

This is not an easy idea to sell. Broadcasters are reluctant to give away time when they make millions on campaign ads — and when they can cite the lack of interest of viewers as an excuse for not doing so. Members of Congress are happy with the status quo, too, since it gives them a bigger advantage over challengers.

But there has to be a better way to inform voters than the way candidates are doing it now. That's especially clear in larger states, where candidates and voters have a less personal relationship than in Kentucky.

The Alliance for Better Campaigns is pushing a reasonable starting point. Broadcasters should be willing to give it a try.

### Reader says Bird legend is untrue

Editor:

In the Floyd County Times Lifestyles section, dated July 19, 2000, a story was presented by Rebecca Derossett about the Confederate soldier buried near the Old Bull Creek Road.

The article states that, "He had been killed by Union soldiers, in retaliation for a Confederate raid on Union supplies at Wireman Shoals..." This is not accurate. I'm certain that this information was preserved in local lore, and has become as ingrained as the "truth," but this is not the case.

There is abundant information available about the Bull Creek skirmish in which Corporal Bird lost his life. In this small battle, which occurred the night after the raid at Wireman's Shoals (thus on December 5, 1862), the Union forces (made up mostly of Pike, Floyd, and Johnson counties rather than "Yankees") were moving up the Prestonsburg side of Bull Mountain when they ran into a Confederate force coming up the other side.

As both groups reached the gap through which the road passed, shooting broke out and the Unionists were driven off after a fight of less than an hour. They reformed in the days following at the mouth of George's Creek and eventually became the 39th Kentucky Mounted Infantry.

Corporal Bird (or Burge), a Virginian, was killed facing his enemy rather than on his knees and at the mercy of bloodthirsty northerners. He died in battle, fighting for the cause in which he believed.

To state that he died in retaliation for the Wireman's Shoals raid confuses and mis-states the facts, and diminishes his sacrifice, as well as impugns the names of the Floyd and Pike counties who faced him in battle at this place.

Corporal Bird was a Confederate hero who met his death bravely at Bull Mountain.

### Computers in class

Ever since Vice President Al Gore claims he invented the Internet, President Clinton has been committed to giving every classroom and eventually every student access to its wonders. Today, about 94 percent of America's public schools are online.

The eventual cost — maybe \$100 billion — was counted as peanuts compared to the economic returns that would flow from a new generation that was smarter and more productive.

If the state of education is any indication, a lot of that money is going down the drain.

At first, Clinton's heady vision of the future attracted few skeptics. No longer. Almost every month, a new book questions the wisdom and practicality of computerized education. A few expert objections were listed in John Rosemond's Parent and Child column recently. A sampling:

Psychologist Jane Healy fears that early use of computers (before the fourth grade) may interfere with proper brain development. She also argues that computers stifle learning and creativity. Theodore Roszak, university professor and author, would wait until high school to introduce computers. Computers download information, they don't teach children to think, he says.

The instant gratification of downloading off the Internet "discourages study, reflection and observation," asserts Clifford Stoll, author of "High-Tech Heretic."

It also encourages pervasive cheating, from grade school to graduate school, a U.S. News & World Report investigation found: "The Internet has revolutionized the way students do research — and made plagiarism a breeze."

Having computers doesn't guarantee they're used. Vicki Rafel, a vice president of the National PTA, said, "We are seeing lots of schools where they have the equipment and very frequently it's either underused or not used at all."

Lack of technical training among teachers accounts in part for underuse, though not all teachers are con-

vinced computers are worthwhile.

A recent report from the Heritage Center for Data Analysis noted that many early studies of computers in classrooms employed highly trained researchers rather than ordinary teachers. "The advanced training and experience may have facilitated the learning process, making the effect of computers alone difficult to ascertain," the report said.

Most early studies attributed at least a modest level of achievement gain to computer use. But a new Heritage study found no difference between the reading achievement of students who use computers and those who don't.

Old-fashioned remedies such as new textbooks and music programs might possibly be the best way to improve children's academic performance, concluded Kirk Johnson, Heritage policy analyst. That doesn't mean there is no place for computers in the classroom, he said, but suggests they may not have the effect on academic achievement some expect.

"We are in the midst of a technological stampede," states an ad in the New York Times. The ad is one of a series sponsored by a coalition of 80 nonprofit organizations concerned about megatechnology's effect on the culture and the economy.

Though acknowledging the benefits of the Internet, the latest ad focuses on potential harm. It knocks the urgency of political leaders to put every classroom online: "This, despite research that immersing kids into high technology doesn't make them happier, more creative, alive, or smarter. It may do the opposite: make them lonely, alienated and depressed."

Clearly, growing numbers of experts and educators are either jumping off the computer bandwagon or demanding that it slow down. Technology will continue to make profound changes in how children are educated. It is up to advocates and dissenters alike to see the changes benefit children and the world around them.

## New book says genes to blame for obesity

(NUE) — Science has determined that 70 percent of an individual's body mass is determined purely through genetics. For many obese people if not most, no matter how hard they try to lose weight, they can never attain their ideal body image.

But many — about 40 percent of Americans — still try, with fad diets. And they still are getting fatter and fatter. Why? Because few understand the underlying causes of obesity, according to Dr. J. Thrifty genes are designed to allow a person to survive periods of starvation by promoting body fat storage when food is available. Thus, without the occasional periods of starvation, the thrifty genes simply continue to add more and more body fat producing obesity.

The 424-page book also addresses the lifestyle and psychological component of obesity,

such as "emotional eating" — a stress-reduction behavior that involves overeating and binge eating.

Developing specific stress reduction techniques, confronting specific psychological issues and taking the right medications to deal with the biological and genetic aspects, along with increasing physical activity and forming a lifelong eating plan, are some of the tools people can use to fight their obesity.

"It Can Break Your Heart" contains chapter summaries that allow readers to get an overall understanding of the information without delving into medical terminology. The book is packed with up-to-date information, including food charts to help dieters count calories and eat more healthy. Seven appendices cover commercial diet plans, university-based programs, definitions and nutritional information on fast foods.

The book asserts that people who truly want to deal with obesity can do so by being smart consumers and by making changes in their lifestyles. Understanding how people's thrifty genes produce obesity is the key to coping with the problem.

ing, electrical work, floors, or any number of things, said Holnick.

The group has time for little more than the work. There is no time to check out local attractions. Holnick said after working out in the summer sun, "They are tired from the heat and stuff and want to sleep."

While the group provides the muscle to move the construction projects, the materials are not free. Each volunteer crew pays a fee that is used to obtain transportation and materials. An individual fee provides the group with housing and food.

The crews travel to the sites with their lunch in tow and begin. Working from 9 a.m. to about 4 p.m., they return to their base for showers and dinner.

They meet every night to socialize, Holnick said. A one-hour program of music, singing and educa-

tional training to build the team attitudes is held every night. This time gives the volunteers time to socialize and to get to know their peers, Holnick said.

Volunteers involved in the Appalachian Service Project come from across the country, said Holnick. They are required to have at least finished their first year in high school before they are allowed to sign up.

ASP is a home repair/home building ministry affiliated with the Board of Discipleship of the United Methodist Church. ASP invites high school youth groups with their adult leaders, college groups, adult groups, individuals, couples, and families of any religion or denomination to join

their ministry.

Holnick hinted that during a good part of the summer, volunteers are students either in high school or college.

ASP was founded by the late Glenn "Tex" Evans, a Methodist minister at Frakes. While Evans was director of the Henderson Settlement, he founded ASP with 50 volunteers.

Described as a wise and gentle man, Evans was said to devote his ministry to enhancing life, eradicating pain and poverty, and motivating young persons to Christian discipleship and the proclamation of the gospel.

With the original 50 volunteers, ASP repaired four homes in the Barbourville area with \$800. Since

then the group has grown to over 12,000 volunteers, said Holnick.

Since its founding in 1969, more than 150,000 volunteers have helped repair, renovate, and/or build hundreds of homes annually.

The aid is specifically for the central Appalachian parts of Kentucky, Tennessee and West Virginia. Kentucky counties served by ASP include Floyd, Pike, Lee, Breathitt, Knott, Owsley, Perry, Letcher, Clay, Leslie, Harlan, Knox and Bell.

ASP has been almost secretive in its visit, not allowing the group to be photographed in action nor divulging the residents who have been helped. The group has nearly completed its nine-and-a-half-week tour of service in Floyd County.

done in the community. That assessment suggested the need for the facility.

"Sister Kathleen (Weigand) adopted a health survey and used the data to collaborate with the health department," said Holbrook.

The new branch, which is currently under construction, is expected to be open sometime in September but will not immediately be a full service office.

"We plan to move along as the need arises," said Holbrook.

According to the survey, the community's greatest need is addressing the health care needs of the elderly.

"We will start with the older population," Holbrook said.

The office will offer the elderly

cancer screening, address diabetes concerns and education, and cardiovascular care.

There is a real need in the region for cardiovascular care, said Holbrook, who said the eastern Kentucky has been labeled cardiovascular alley for its high rate of heart diseases and ailments.

The cardiac care will include a risk assessment, factors, and identify potential causes.

"We will do some intervention to

keep people out of trouble," she said.

Future programs could include women's and men's health care. Mammography, prostate cancer screening, diabetes intervention, smoking cessation, and young safe sitter programs may be in the wings as time progresses, Holbrook said.

The health department has branch offices in the city of Wheelwright, in Betsy Layne, and inside the Mud Creek Clinic.

Spurlock said at first there was some chance he would assume head coaching duties as girls' softball coach.

"I never envisioned myself as a head football coach," he said. "But in the last two years, going on my third, I have grown to love football. Especially I love Friday nights."

Spurlock said the thing that motivated him last year was "the Paintsville game here."

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
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# 10,000 to 15,000 vintage cars heading for Louisville

Between 10,000 and 15,000 street rods will be on hand at the Kentucky Fair & Exposition Center within the next two weeks as the National Street Rod Association presents its 31st Annual Street Rod Nationals. The dates for the city's largest vintage car show will be August 3, 4-5 and 6.

This will be the sixth time the NSRA Street Rod Nationals have been held in Louisville and an all-time high number of participants and spectators are expected this year. All of the fair grounds will be utilized for the event as well as most of the buildings, which will house over 250 manufacturers and dealer displays and other attractions.

The host organization, NSRA, defines a street rod as a modernized vintage vehicle that must be of pre-1949 manufacture. These vehicles are equipped with the latest options available on the newest model vehicles, including but not limited to disc brakes, air conditioning, cruise control, tilt steering wheel.

Most of those attending have updated the engine and drive train to enable the owner to cruise down the highway in comfort and safely maintain the speeds traveled by more modern vehicles. This enables owners to drive their vehicles from all over the United States and Canada, as well as some shipped from overseas and driven from the coast to attend. All vehicles must be driven on to the grounds.

This is truly an international gathering of fine vintage automobiles of every description. The NSRA Street Rod Nationals is the world's largest participation event and spectators from around the world attend the event annually.

Billed as an "East meets West" affair, the first Nationals were just that as rodders from every part of

# Sports in Perspective...

On July 2, Arnie Weinmeister died of cancer at the age of 77. His passing was a back page item in the Seattle area news.

For the average man on the street this might not seem to be an unusual occurrence. Except for the family of the deceased it was hardly a newsworthy item.

Not so.

Back when professional football was still seeking a place to hang its star in the American sporting galaxy, Weinmeister prevailed as a power to be reckoned with in the play-for-pay gridiron game.

A native of Canada who drifted south in search of his fortune, he flashed briefly but most radiantly across the skies of money football.

The word dominant, used indiscriminately all too often, applied to

in its most legitimate sense to Weinmeister, that good big man much sought after but rarely found. Blessed with both size and speed he held forth as the finest lineman of his era, perhaps any era.

After graduating from the University of Washington as a standout performer, he became the object of a bidding war between the Boston Yanks of the National Football League and the New York

Yankees of the upstart All American Conference. He chose to display his skills in the Big Apple for the munificent sum of \$8,000 per annum, big money in the late 1940s.

Weinmeister stood 6-4 and tipped the beam at 235 pounds sans steroids and a morbidly obese diet so common today. He could play tackle on both sides of the ball with equal facility and often did so. What set him apart from his breed was a truly eye-opening fleetness of foot.

As a member of the Yankees, he routinely outraced all of his teammates save for Buddy Young, a diminutive running back possessed of Olympic sprinter's speed. During preseason camp the big Canadian would be pitted against the fastest rookie recruits but never once failed to reach the finish line first.

New York head coach Ray Flaherty told the media, "Arnie is the best fullback prospect in the pro game."

Following both the 1948 and 1949 campaigns Weinmeister was voted to All AFC honors. When the league folded, Weinmeister and a

sometimes quarterback and secondary defender named Tom Landry moved across town to the New York Giants.

Said Landry of his friend, "Arnie was bigger than most linemen who played at that time. He could operate all over the field because he had more speed than most backs in the NFL."

During this period the Cleveland Browns boasted the most potent and versatile attack in the professional ranks. But the Giants prevent corps, bulwarked by Weinmeister, consistently frustrated the likes of such Hall of Fame players as quarterback Otto Graham and fullback Marion Motley. Now strictly employed as a defender, he started at tackle but frequently moved over to end in passing situations. It was this facility that prompted an important innovation in the way football would be played in the years ahead.

Steve Owen, the Giants field boss, devised the "umbrella defense" which would give the opposition a much different look than they had ever seen. New York

lined up in the team's conventional 6-1-4 prevent alignment until the ball was snapped. At that time the ends dropped off to become linebackers and the tackles operated as ends. In the secondary the backs formed an umbrella configuration, an elementary zone arrangement designed to keep enemy receivers inside the perimeter.

Al DeRogatis, a fellow tackle with Weinmeister, recalled, "When the ends dropped off the line to cover the outside receivers and Arnie and I became ends, the offensive lineman didn't know who to block, or quite what to do. We thoroughly confused their assignments and got good pressure on the passer."

In the wake of the 1953 season, Weinmeister jumped to the Canadian Football League for more money. He finished his career there.

Despite just six years in the American pro game Weinmeister was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1984.

He was that good.

## Massey Coal Hatfields and McCoys Senior Bowl to feature local talent

This Saturday night, senior football players from Kentucky and West Virginia will take part in the fifth annual Massey Coal Hatfields and McCoys Senior Bowl.

Both squads have been busy practicing all week in preparation for the all star gridiron war.

To some the game is somewhat of a re-enactment of the legendary Hatfield-McCoy family feud. The annual game takes its name from the feud between the Hatfields and McCoys that took place in Pike County and bordering Matewan, W.Va., which lies just across the bridge from Pike County. The bowl has become a favorite among the people of Matewan and Pike County.

The West Virginia All-Stars, coached by Matewan assistant coach Danny Perkins, are the Hatfields, while the Kentucky All-Stars, coached by former Pike Central head coach Paul May, are the McCoys.

The Hatfields and McCoys Senior Bowl pits the best graduated seniors from southern West Virginia against those from eastern Kentucky. The teams are made up of 30 players.

From Kentucky, players are drawn from Floyd, Johnson, Lawrence, Martin and Pike counties. From West Virginia players are recruited from Mingo, Logan, McDowell and Wayne counties.

Betsy Layne graduate Bradley Brooks is a member of the Kentucky squad, and should get some carries tomorrow night. Brooks is a big burly running back who can also cut it outside. The Betsy Layne alumnus could also be found over on the defensive side of the ball at any one of the linebacker positions.

Brooks will be playing his college football at Campbellsville College later on this fall.

Prestonsburg's Seth Crisp, Kyle Shephard and Hank Mullins will also be suiting up for the Kentucky squad. The trio of Blackcat graduates will be also playing football on the next level this fall.

Crisp and Shephard will be teammates of Brooks at Campbellsville, while Mullins will be a part of the inaugural football program at Pikeville College. All three players had outstanding careers at Prestonsburg.

Crisp is number two on the depth chart at the quarterback position for the Kentucky team. Belfry's Jonathan Wright will lead the Kentucky all-stars. Wright was a highly touted recruit who ended up signing with Pikeville College.

Recruiters from several colleges will be at the bowl game, looking over players who have yet to sign with a college.

Matewan High School coach and

bowl director Danny "Yogi" Kinder feels the game is a good tune-up for the college season, or a spotlight for those who have yet to sign with a college program and would like to do so.

"For a lot of the players, it's their last ballgame," Kinder said. "It's a chance for the kids who can go on to college to play a one last game and to get ready for football practice which starts in just a few days. For those who haven't signed with a college, it's an opportunity for the kids to show they can play at the next level."

Kinder said college coaches from Pikeville College and other small colleges across Kentucky will be scouting players at the game. Coaches from member schools of the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WVIAC) are also expected to have representatives at Saturday night's game.

Kinder hopes interest in the bowl will grow, and hopefully create more money for the game.

"We will be awarding a \$500 scholarship to a player from each team," Kinder said. "We're trying to find sponsors to help create more money for scholarships."

The Massey Coal Hatfields and McCoys Senior Bowl is a continuation of West Virginia's longest running senior bowl game, the Kiwanis Senior Bowl, which started in the 1950s and ran until the mid-1990s when it was cancelled due to financial troubles. The K-Bowl had problems finding housing for players coming from all over the states of Kentucky and West Virginia, and it was put on indefinite hiatus.

Kentucky leads the rejuvenated four-year series 3-1. Saturday's game kicks off at 8 p.m. at Matewan High's Tiger Stadium.

## Sears added to Wildcats' roster

Cory Sears, a 6-6 swingman from Corbin, has accepted a scholarship offer for the 2000-01 academic year to play basketball at the University of Kentucky, Coach Tubby Smith announced last Saturday.

Sears was a 1999 Associated Press honorable mention All-State selection for Corbin High School where he averaged 20.5 points, eight rebounds, five assists and three steals as a senior, leading the Redhounds to a 26-5 record. Last season, he attended Hargrave Military Academy where he averaged 16.5 points and 5.0 rebounds per game in leading the prep school to a 20-3 mark.

"Cory Sears is now part of our team and we're very excited to

have him on board," Smith said. "Like all our incoming freshmen, we expect him to make an impact, whether it's in practice or in games."

Sears was one of 12 players at Hargrave last season to earn a Division I scholarship. At Corbin, he was named the South East Kentucky Conference Player of the Year in 1999, and as a junior

and senior, made the 13th Region All-Tournament team and the 13th Region All "A" Tournament team. During his junior season, Sears averaged 17.4 points, 5.0 rebounds and 2.5 assists per game as the Redhounds finished 21-9. As a sophomore, he was a key reserve as Corbin advanced to the 1997 Sweet 16.

"Cory has an ability to shoot the outside jumper and play on the perimeter," Smith added. "And at 6-6, he gives us added size outside."

Sears becomes the fifth freshman on the Wildcats' 2000-01 roster, joining Cliff Hawkins, Gerald Fitch, Erik Daniels and Matt Heissenbuttel.

the country were on hand, and although the numbers may have been small by current standards, the turnout was better than had been expected by the event's promoters. It was a beginning, and the concept of a national meet for street rodders was proven.

During the first Nationals, plans for a national organization were unveiled and before the weekend was over nearly all of those present were members of the National Street Rod Association and some had even signed up for lifetime membership. Today those farsighted individuals who opted for a Lifetime Membership in NSRA are the envy of most other members as they have most definitely gotten their money's worth ... several times over.

While those who were present during the first Street Rod Nationals were convinced a nation-

al organization and a national meet were feasible, it was the second Nationals a year later in Memphis, Tennessee, that proved the organized rod movement was for real. The event was moved from a corn patch to a fairgrounds and with an increase in the number of street rods to 1,200, there was little doubt that the potential for continued growth of The National Street Rod Association and the NSRA Street Rod Nationals had barely been tapped.

The Street Rod Nationals has grown constantly and in 1978 when the event went to Columbus, Ohio, for the first of seven visits, the registration topped 5,000 for the first time. Nine years later, again in Columbus, the number of registered street rods topped 9,000 for the first time. A year later on their first visit to Louisville, the magic number of 10,000 was surpassed.

As early as 1974, when the number of street rods registered was 2,400, finding a facility large enough to stage the event became a problem. For this reason, only a few cities have served as hosts for the premier activity in street rodding and for many years the event rotated among them.

Cities that have been used are Columbus, Ohio (1978, 1981, 1984, 1987, 1990, 1993, 1996); Louisville (1988, 1992, 1994, 1998, 1999); St. Paul, Minnesota (1974, 1977, 1979, 1982, 1985, 1989); Oklahoma City, Oklahoma (1983, 1986, 1991, 1997); Memphis, Tennessee (1971, 1975, 1980); Tulsa, Oklahoma (1973, 1976); Peoria, Illinois (1970); Detroit, Michigan (1972) and Syracuse, New York (1995). In 1998, a multi-year agreement was signed to make Louisville the host city for the NSRA Street Rod Nationals through the year 2010.

## Back in time — wa-a-a-a-a-y back

The time is approaching for a trip back in time — way back in time.

The Ohio Renaissance Festival begins August 26 and continues on weekends through October 15, near Wilmington, which is northeast of Cincinnati and southeast of Dayton, in the state's agricultural heartland.

The festival is a living history lesson about life in the Middle Ages in the British Isles, where most of our ancestors came from. It features pageantry, crafts, food and games, presented in a virtual time warp.

Participants can choose from nearly 100 shows a day on 11 stages and performance areas. Period crafts will be demonstrated and sold at more than 130 "shoppes," and six food buildings will provide such food delicacies as turkey legs and steak on a stick.

In the 30-acre, re-created 16th century village, more than 150 costumed performers will play the roles of peasants and royalty, allowing visitors to rub shoulders with the likes of Queen Elizabeth I and her court.

Among performers who are on the schedule this year are:

- The Tartan Terrors, a Scottish dance troupe that combines comedy and dance.
- To The Hilt, male and female gypsy duo who fight with swords, fists, staves and a variety of other weapons (including sharp wit and, reportedly, sharper tongues).
- Dragon Tales, featuring an eight-foot baby dragon who learns about life outside its shell.
- The Beggars of Mearth at the Muditorium, featuring three "beggars" who perform in Ohio's first "muditorium." You can figure out the rest. The festival flier implies you should not wear your best clothes.

# NEWS OF THE WEIRD

by CHUCK SHEPHERD

Eight farmers in the town of Nemaha, Iowa (population 112), have taught themselves to perform various square-dancing routines (do-si-do's, promenades, etc.) while seated on, precisely maneuvering, their tractors, according to a June San Francisco Chronicle dispatch from the heartland. However, an apparent problem for the farmers is that all are males, while square-dancing is a couples activity. Thus, four of the dancers operate their tractors while in calico skirts, under the apparent belief that cross-dressing is more acceptable than having an overtly same-sex dance partner.

### Suspended for Being Effective Artists

In April, high school junior Charles Carithers was suspended from the prestigious Latin Academy in Boston after complying with a class assignment to write a horror story. In Carithers' tale, a menacing student cut off the

teacher's hand with a chain saw, which the real teacher interpreted as a threat. Said Carithers in defense, "If I wrote a student killed his taxi driver, that doesn't have the same effect." And in January, senior Sarah Boman was suspended from Bluestem High School in Leon, Kansas, for the rest of the year after complying with an assignment to create art that emphasizes an idea, rather than an object. She drew a large mural of jumbled words representing, she said, the rantings of an "obsessive, compulsive, paranoid" madman, but that, too, was interpreted by the teacher as a threat to her. (After appeals, both suspensions were lifted.)

### Awsome!

In Clacton, England, in March, a freak gust of wind propelled Chris Grimes, 17, holding his oversized kite, for a half-mile at a height of 25 feet, until he touched down in a mud bog. And in Fairhaven, Massachusetts, in May, a 65-year-old woman was hit by lightning and lifted from

the ground into the back of a pickup truck, reaching a height of 12 feet, according to witnesses; she was taken to St. Luke's Hospital in New Bedford but not seriously injured.

### Not My Fault

In February in East Providence, Rhode Island, the family of the late boater William J. Hussey, 55, filed a wrongful death lawsuit against the city, arguing that Hussey's fatal heart attack was caused by Assistant Harbor Master Paul J. Williams during a 1998 incident. However, according to police reports, all Williams had done was to yell at Hussey, who was maneuvering his boat without required navigation lights. Hussey's nearly last words were, to Williams, "Mind your own (expletive deleted) business."

In February, former Chicago municipal treasurer Miriam Santos was released from a prison work camp near Pekin, Illinois, when her federal extortion conviction was overturned on

appeal. She met immediately with reporters and announced that she would try to regain her old job at the next opportunity and said, about her crime, "I am probably the first woman to go to jail (merely) for PMS-ing."

In March, a representative of a private prisoner-transportation service in North Dakota told the legislature that the reason convicted murderer-child molester Kyle Bell escaped from the company's bus in October was that prison officials failed to inform the company that Bell was an escape risk. The paperwork on his transfer, said the company, showed only that he was serving a life sentence.

Mark Merrill, 38, filed a lawsuit in February in Gary, Indiana, against Donald Trump, alleging that the reason Merrill turned to bank robbery (in Peotone, Illinois, in 1998 and Mokena, Illinois, in 1999) was excessive debt, in that the floating Trump Casino in Gary fed his gambling addiction by enticing him to wager, even offer-

## Visitors to get bang out of new acquisition

Visitors to White Hall State Historic Site are sure to get a bang out of a recent acquisition.

A small brass cannon that once belonged to Cassius Marcellus Clay, the fiery 19th century emancipationist and minister to Russia, has been donated to the site. The donor was a descendant, Field Clay Benton of Denver. He also gave the park a pair of brass candlesticks that Clay owned.

During a recent reunion of Clay descendants, Parks Commissioner Kenny Rapier also announced that the Kentucky Historical Society has lent to White Hall portraits

of Czar Alexander II and Czarina Maria Alexandrovna. Clay became close to them during his tenure in Russia during Abraham Lincoln's presidency. The paintings will be on display through October.

The donation of the cannon is a coup for the historic site. It figures prominently in the fascinating story of "the Lion of White Hall."

The story is told that Clay used the cannon after his shocking marriage to teen-ager Dora Richardson, who married Clay when he was in his 80s. As recounted in the book "Cassius Marcellus Clay: Firebrand of Freedom," Clay's marriage scandalized the community and an armed seven-man posse approached White Hall to confront the old man and seek to rescue the girl.

"Clay had dealt with mobs before, and he knew how to deal with this one," author H. Edward Richardson relates.

"He carefully loaded his cannon with grapeshot mixed with nails and tacks, chiseled pieces of harrow spikes, jagged horseshoes, out sections of trace chains, grated lead, and an assortment of nuts and bolts."

The posse members shouted to Clay to let the girl go. Dora then told the group that she had no wish to do so.

Clay took aim on a maple tree near an entrance gate. The posse made the tactical mistake of retreating to the cover of the tree and, when Clay told the posse to leave, the men opened fire.

"Clay fired his cannon and, scoring a direct hit, shattered the dead limbs of the water maple into splinters. The members of the posse retrieved their frightened horses and beat a hasty retreat up Clay Lane."

The cannon—unloaded—will be on permanent display in the White Hall mansion.

drawn to Steven, despite his apparent indifference and dangerous proclivities.

Readers are in the game, too, as Griner's carefully orchestrated language and descriptive details draw them into Jean and Steven's world and intensify their sense of foreboding and unease.

# X-MEN

In making "X-Men," director Bryan Singer ("The Usual Suspects") had a tough job: Deliver a big-budget action movie that would not only attract a mass audience, but also satisfy a legion of comic book geeks who were ready and willing to nit-pick the film's inconsistencies ad nauseum on the Internet.

And, by crikey, he pulled it off.

"X-Men" is a smart, funny, thoughtful and full-out action-and-special-effects extravaganza.

The film, like the comic that debuted in 1963, is an allegory for civil rights and intolerance. Around the world, humans are genetically mutating into homo superior — humans with extraordinary superpowers.

Senator Robert Kelly (Bruce Davison), a Joe McCarthy

wannabe, takes advantage of people's fear and ignorance and begins a witch hunt to round up and register all mutants in the United States — the first step in what will ultimately become a war of genocide against the mutants.

Attempting to ward off a war between humans and mutants is Professor X (Patrick Stewart). Professor X runs a private school for mutants and believes that humans and mutants can live together in harmony.

On the professor's side are his X-Men, who use their powers for good: Cyclops (James Marsden) can shoot crimson power blasts from his eyes; Dr. Jean Grey (Famke Janssen) is a telekinetic; and Storm (Halle Berry) has the ability to control the weather.

The bad guys are led by Magneto (Ian McKellen), an Auschwitz survivor with the ability to manipulate metal with his mind. Magneto believes that the only way humans and mutants will be able to live in harmony is if he can transform the world's leaders into mutants. And he has a machine that will do just that.

On Magneto's side are the shape-shifting assassin Mystique (Rebecca Romijn-Stamos); Sabretooth (Tyler Mane) a beefy dude who growls a lot; and Toad (Ray Park) a half-man, half-toad, who has a 30-foot tongue, the abili-

ty to hop really far and some kind of asphyxiating projectile puke.

To aid Professor X and the X-Men in the battle against Magneto are newcomers Wolverine (Hugh Jackman), a superstrong mutant with metal grafted to his skeleton and razor-sharp claws that bolt out of his fists, and Rogue (Anna Paquin), a teenager from the South with the ability to suck out a person's life force with merely a touch.

The relationship between Wolverine and Rogue is the main emotional focus of the film and both Jackman and Paquin play their roles beautifully — even though it is at the expense of learning more about the other characters.

And that is first of the film's minor flaws — there are so many characters that we never really get enough time to get to know all of them.

The second is that this is the first of three movies, so some of the plot points won't be resolved until the sequels come out, which makes "X-Men" feel a little like the pilot for a TV series rather than a stand-alone feature.

Still, this movie was so good that I'm glad there'll be two sequels. It's about time Hollywood got a comic book movie right.

## Kentucky Life profiles artist, steeple-maker, miniature horses

A world-famous artist returns to Kentucky for a hometown exhibition in the next edition of Kentucky Life.

Hosted by Dave Shuffett, the program also visits a Campbellsville steeple manufacturer and explores the attraction of miniature horses on a Metcalfe County farm. The program airs on KET at 8:30 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 5.

First, artist Joe Downing takes time out to talk about his art and influences. A native of Glasgow, Downing has lived and worked as an artist in France for most of his career.

His colorful multimedia works have been displayed around the globe, and he was recently honored in his home state with the Governor's Award in the Arts.

Next, Kentucky Life cameras enter Tec-Fab Inc. of Campbellsville, one of only a handful of manufacturers in the United States that produce spires and steeples from aluminum. Tec-Fab steeples have been placed in all 50 states and every province in Canada.

Finally, Kentucky Life spends time on a Metcalfe County farm devoted to the animal synonymous with Kentucky: the horse. These cute critters, however, are dwarfed by their Thoroughbred cousins.

Jean Daniels, who raises the frisky and loveable miniature horses, says they are just like regular horses except "they eat a lot less."

Kentucky Life is produced and directed by Joy Flynn. Series writer is Ellen Ballard. Segment producers for this program are Dave Shuffett, Marsha Hellard and Gale Worth. Craig Cornwell is executive producer.

## 'Olmsted' looks at architect's exceptional park system

Frederick Law Olmsted was a wanderer, a writer and ultimately the most influential American landscape architect of the 19th and 20th centuries.

Best known for designing New York's Central Park, Olmsted painted a green swath across Louisville that has defined the city. KET presents a look at the extraordinary life of Frederick Law Olmsted and his influence on Kentucky's largest urban center in "Olmsted in Louisville," airing Tuesday, Aug. 1 at 9 p.m. on KET.

Born in 1822 in Hartford, Connecticut, Olmsted was raised a gentleman. He never finished college, however, and moved to New York when he was just 18 to work as a scientific farmer.

That proved unsuccessful, and after travel abroad, a stint as a reporter and a failed publishing venture, Olmsted took a chance and entered a contest to design New York City's Central Park. He won and in the process set a course for his life that would land him in the annals of American history.

His body of work spans the country, including New York's Central Park; the U.S. Capitol in Washington, D.C.; Boston's park system, the Emerald Necklace; the Biltmore estate in North Carolina; and the 1893 Chicago World's Fairgrounds. Louisville's park system was the last project of Olmsted's distinguished career.

This ambitious project, designed in Olmsted's twilight years and constructed just prior to the end of the 19th century, features a system of three parks: Cherokee, Iroquois and Shawnee, each highlighting the strength and individuality of that particular part of the city.

## Free elk viewing tours available

This fall, the bugle of rutting elk will break out in the hills of eastern Kentucky. The breeding season for elk, also known as the rut, typically begins about the first of September and is marked by an incredible display of grunting, bugling and sparring between the males of the species.

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR) and the University of Kentucky (UK) want the public to take part in hearing and viewing rutting elk again this year.

Last fall, KDFWR and UK personnel lead free public elk tours at Cyprus-Amax Wildlife Management Area (WMA), now called Addington Enterprises WMA, allowing those interested to hear the bugle of bull elk echo through the valleys and watch them gather cows into harems.

Some observers were even able to watch bull elk vigorously clash their antlers together and

battle over cows.

This year six bulls are four years or older and 28 are three years or older. These are the big, antlered animals that will bugle and spar this fall. These adult bulls and 20 younger bulls should produce the most intense bugling sessions heard in Kentucky in more than 150 years.

For those interested, representatives from KDFWR and UK will be leading elk tours again this year at Addington Enterprises WMA near Hazard. The guided tours will be given every Saturday and Sunday morning, September 9 through October 22.

Space is limited to 25 people per day for guided tours, so anyone interested must reserve a place by calling Tia Edwards at the KDFWR Information Center at 1-800-858-1549.

Special tours for groups with

more than 10 people will also be given during the week. For group reservations, contact Dan Crank, KDFWR wildlife biologist, at 606/378-3474.

Addington Enterprises WMA is open to the public for elk viewing throughout the year. Visitors to the area must purchase a \$10 yearly area user permit and view a five-minute safety film at the guard house at the entrance to the property before entering the area. Permits are available wherever hunting and fishing licenses are sold. The permit fee will be waived for those taking a guided tour.

To reach Addington Enterprises WMA from the intersection of KY 15 and KY 80 in Hazard, travel east on 80 for 6-1/2 miles. Turn left onto KY 476 and go 3-1/2 miles. Turn right on KY 1087 and travel 3/4 mile. Turn left and follow access road to guard shack.

## Louisville Convention Bureau signs on with Passkey.com

Internet reservation system will offer 24/7 convention housing services

The agreement with Passkey.com has been endorsed by the Task Force Committee of the Greater Louisville Motel-Hotel Association. The majority of its member hotels are expected to participate. Reservations can still be processed by the bureau via phone and fax, however, aggressive marketing and information strategies will steer delegates to the website.

"We see this arrangement as part of our ongoing effort to remain competitive in the marketplace," said Bureau President and CEO Ronald L. Scott. "As other cities intensify and integrate their housing and reservation services, so must

we. Passkey allows us to remain in control for our clients while substantially extending our service."

Currently, bureaus in Indianapolis, Charleston, Seattle, Providence and Salt Lake City, among others, are using Passkey. In addition to its on-line reservation service, Passkey also offers event registration and travel planning.

"We're looking forward to the real-time reporting functions this system provides," said Director of Convention Housing and Services Doris Sims. "We'll have a much more accurate and immediate picture of room availability for the area which will help us fill more rooms while offering more service."

## World-famous New River trains will roll again this October

In cooperation with AMTRAK and CSX, the Collis P. Huntington Railroad Historical Society will operate four, 300-mile, world famous New River passenger trains, October 21, 22, 28 and 29, originating in Huntington, West Virginia.

AMTRAK locomotives, and a mixture of late model Horizon, Heritage and Amfleet coaches, Amtrak-approved lounges, heritage diner, dome lounge and an open platform private car will make up the trains.

These four, one-day round trips are sponsored by the railroad historical society, a non-profit educational, and charitable organization celebrating its 41st anniversary.

Passengers on these trains will traverse all of the 65-mile long New River gorge where the only indication of modern civilization is the track of the old C&O Railway and white water rafters.

The trains will leave Huntington's old C&O Depot, and now CSX office building complex on 7th avenue and 9th street each day at 8 a.m.,

making stops in St. Albans and Montgomery, West Virginia, to pick up passengers before going on to Thurmond where it will make a one hour stop at the restored historic depot and National Park Service visitors center.

Then it's on to Hinton, where arrival is scheduled for about 1 p.m.

In Hinton, passengers can enjoy a street fair with arts, crafts, food, and entertainment during the scheduled three-hour lay-over. Following the lay-over the special train departs for the return trip home to Montgomery, St. Albans and Huntington where the scheduled arrival is about 7:30 p.m.

The round trip fares are as follows; Adult coach, \$109; special dome coach, \$139, all seats; children in regular coach (3-12) \$79; and premium service, \$189, which covers seating in a lounge, parlor, or diner/lounge as available, with continental breakfast at the seats and dinner prepared on board.

Finally, private car passengers, paying \$299 each, will be seated in an old-fashioned railroad business car which has a

formal dining room, lounge area, and rear observation platform. There, three meals will be prepared on board by the car's own chef and host.

All coach passengers will receive a continental breakfast as part of their ticket price.

There will be a snack/souvenir car where food and souvenirs will be

available. Tickets are on sale at the society's Kenova office at 1429 Chestnut St., Kenova, West Virginia. Coach tickets only will be available after August 14 at AAA offices in Portsmouth and Ironton, Ohio; Fountain Hobby Centre in Charleston; the Tri-state Travel Co. at 1309

Winchester Ave., Ashland; the Ashland area Convention and Visitors bureau, 1507 Winchester Ave.; the Cabell/Huntington Convention and Visitors Bureau on Third Ave., across from the Civic Center, Huntington, 1 step travel at the Huntington Mall, and Nitro Hobby Center, Nitro.

All other types of tickets must be purchased by mail or phone through the society office.

Tickets, free New River train trip flyers, and information on many other special trips are available by calling 304/453-1641.

Group discounts of 10 percent are available for 15 or more people.



# CRITTERS CORNER

Last time, we began a discussion of chronic kidney failure, which is a fairly common problem in older cats. Some of the warning signs include decreased appetite, weakness, weight loss, increased thirst and urination, dehydration,

and a foul smell on the breath. These signs can be very obvious, very subtle, or absent, depending on the severity of the problem.

Also, other disorders, such as severe dental infections or diabetes, can cause similar signs.

For these reasons, it is important to have an older cat that just "isn't right" checked out by your vet immediately. Once a cat reaches about seven years of age, it is a good idea to have some blood work performed once or twice a year, to screen for problems.

So what will your vet look for to test for kidney disease? After a history and physical exam, blood is usually drawn for analysis. This may be sent off to a laboratory, or often, can be run right in the vet's office. The two tests that are most often used to detect kidney problems are the BUN and Creatinine.

I know all these medical terms can sound like so much mumbo-jumbo, and it is even worse when someone is trying to explain it to you and you're worried about your pet. That's why I like to explain as many as I can, and in as simple language as I can in these articles. I may leave out some of the technical details, but hopefully, you will have the main ideas.

BUN is short for Blood Urea Nitrogen. BUN and Creatinine are breakdown products of proteins, which are normally removed through the kidneys. If the kidneys are not doing their job, these compounds will be present in higher than normal levels in the blood.

Actually, there will not be any elevation in these values unless more than 50 percent of the kidney's available tissue is damaged. That's why the second kidney is present for backup, and why animals and people can do just fine with only one kidney. This is a lot of damaged tissue, but at the same time, it is usually far from

complete absence of kidney function.

Your vet will look at other values in the blood panel also, such as potassium, sodium, protein, and the red blood cell count, to determine the extent of the kidney disease and related disorders. He or she will probably also perform a urinalysis to confirm the results of the blood panel and to detect any additional problems.

OK, so your cat has a diagnosis of chronic renal failure. What does that mean, in practical terms? Unfortunately, this is a progressive, incurable disease that will ultimately be fatal. That's the bad news. The good news is that incurable does not mean untreatable or uncontrollable.

(Please remember that we are talking about a very specific type of kidney failure here; there are other, transient types that have a much better prognosis, and still others that are so severe that they result in death within a few days despite treatment.)

This form of renal disease generally is responsive to treatment that takes some of the stress of the remaining, overworked, kidney tissue. Fluids are the mainstay of treatment for chronic kidney disease. The body needs lots of fluid to dilute some of the toxic compounds that build up in the blood. Since the kidneys are not filtering as effectively as they should, the more fluids going through the kidneys, the more toxins that will be flushed out.

Your vet may also prescribe a diuretic. This seems contradictory, to go to all the trouble of putting extra fluid in, and then give drugs to pull it back out again. Actually, the body's system for regulating fluid balance is often deranged, and the diuretics just help keep the fluids moving.

Fluids usually need to be given by injection, since they generally are needed in much larger

quantities than the animal will be able to take in by mouth. The fluids used will usually also contain electrolytes and other substances the sick cat needs.

Once rehydrated in the hospital, you may be shocked to find that your vet may want YOU to continue injections of fluids at home. This is not as bad as it sounds. Cats and dogs are blessed with abundant skin that is much more loosely attached to the underlying tissue than it is in humans. A fairly large volume of fluid can be given under the skin (subcutaneously) with minimal discomfort to the animal.

The cat may look like the Hunchback of Notre Dame for a couple of hours, but the fluid will be absorbed quickly.

Depending on results of blood tests, you may also be given vitamins, antibiotics and/or a potassium supplement to administer at home. Expect regular rechecks and periodic adjustments

of the treatment regimen to keep the cat in the best condition possible. The cat may need to be re-hospitalized occasionally to deal with new problems as they crop up.

In most cases, your vet will recommend a specific diet that minimizes the load placed on the kidneys while still providing adequate nutrition for a geriatric animal. Unfortunately, many of these are pretty bland, and the cat may refuse to eat them.

With dogs you can usually wait until they get hungry enough to eat, but don't have that option with a cat who is already ill, and likely to be a picky eater besides. If your cat turns up his nose at the food after the first couple of tries, call your vet, who knows the individual case. He may be able to tell you something to use to enhance the flavor without adding stress to the cat's kidneys.

One safe thing to try is warming the food a little in the microwave. Warm foods release odors more easily, and the smell of food is very important to cats.

Although not all of them respond well, I've seen many cats in chronic renal failure gain months, and sometimes a year or more, of good-quality life using supportive techniques such as these. When the end finally comes, it may be easier to let go, having had this gift of extra time.

I hope this has answered some questions and given some cat owners a glimmer of hope.
