Turner gets prosecutor job early following appointment

Five months before he is scheduled to become Floyd County's commonwealth's attorney, Brent Turner was given the job Wednesday.

Arnold Brent Turner, who was elected to serve as commonwealth's attorney for the 31st Judicial Circuit of Kentucky and would normally assume that position in January, has been appointed to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of John Earl Hunt.

Hunt stepped down in June after Patton appointed him to serve as an administrative law judge in the Department of Workers

Claims. Turner shall serve the remainder of Hunt's term plus his own term.

Turner was out of town attending a prosecutors' council in Lexington and could not be reached for comment.

In May, Turner easily bested former prosecutor Jerry Patton in the Democratic primary for the office of commonwealth's attorney and is practically assured the office in January.

No Republicans filed for the office and, with the deadline passing on Tuesday, no independent or third-party candidates filed either. The only possible challenge to Turner in November would have to come from a write-in candidate.

Patton asks for lawsuit to be dismissed

Motion claims campaign ads were protected by First Amendment

An unsuccessful candidate for commonwealth's attorney is asking that a defamation lawsuit brought against him by the Floyd County Board of Education's chairman be thrown out because, he says, the subject matter in question is protected by the First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution.

Prestonsburg lawyer Jerry Patton, who lost a bid for commonwealth's attorney to Arnold Brent Turner in May, has filed a motion based to dismiss the case brought against him by board chairman Terry Dotson.

Patton's request will be considered by Circuit Judge John David Caudill on September 8.

Dotson filed his complaint against Patton on May 22, seeking \$110,000 in damages for allegedly defaming Dotson's character.

Dotson claims that, through statements and innuendoes used in an ad campaign run in conjunction with Patton's candidacy, the board chairman was defamed and thereby "subjected to hatred, ridicule, contempt, shame and disgrace."

At issue in the dispute are statements in Patton's ads which Dotson says associate him with corruption.

"Terry Dotson faces a money judgment..." and Terry Dotson's "cronies in Frankfort, who appointed him, took control of the school district and then failed to defend the Board in court" are two of the statements Dotson says unfairly characterize him.

Dotson further contends that Patton insinuates Dotson was connected to or associated with Randy Kimbrough, a former associate commissioner of Kentucky Department of Education who pleaded guilty to embezzling hundreds of thousands of dollars.

A statement used in the ad says Kimbrough "is now under indictment for stealing over one-half million dollars of our school children's money."

But Patton is now citing a 1999 decision by the Kentucky Supreme Court which dismissed a similar law-

Fiscal court approves roads in brief session

The Floyd County Fiscal Court met briefly Wednesday morning to adopt several roads into the county road system.

In a special meeting which lasted just a couple of minutes, commissioners approved bringing five roads into the road system.

According to County Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson, who is now out of the hospital following an all-terrain vehicle accident last week, the roads needed court approval before the court's next regularly scheduled meeting so that work could be performed on them.

The roads include:

- Harold Stumbo Cemetery Road in Minnie, which is 300 feet long and 10 feet wide.

- Shepherd Cemetery Road in David, 600 feet long and 14 feet wide.

- Right Fork of Myrtle Road, located at the Left Fork of Abbott, 2,090 feet long and 14 feet wide.

- Blackburn Lane in Melvin, 700 feet long and 10 feet wide.

- Pine Street in Stanville, 250 feet long and 10 feet wide.

The road resolutions were the only business on the court's agenda. All members were present for the meeting.

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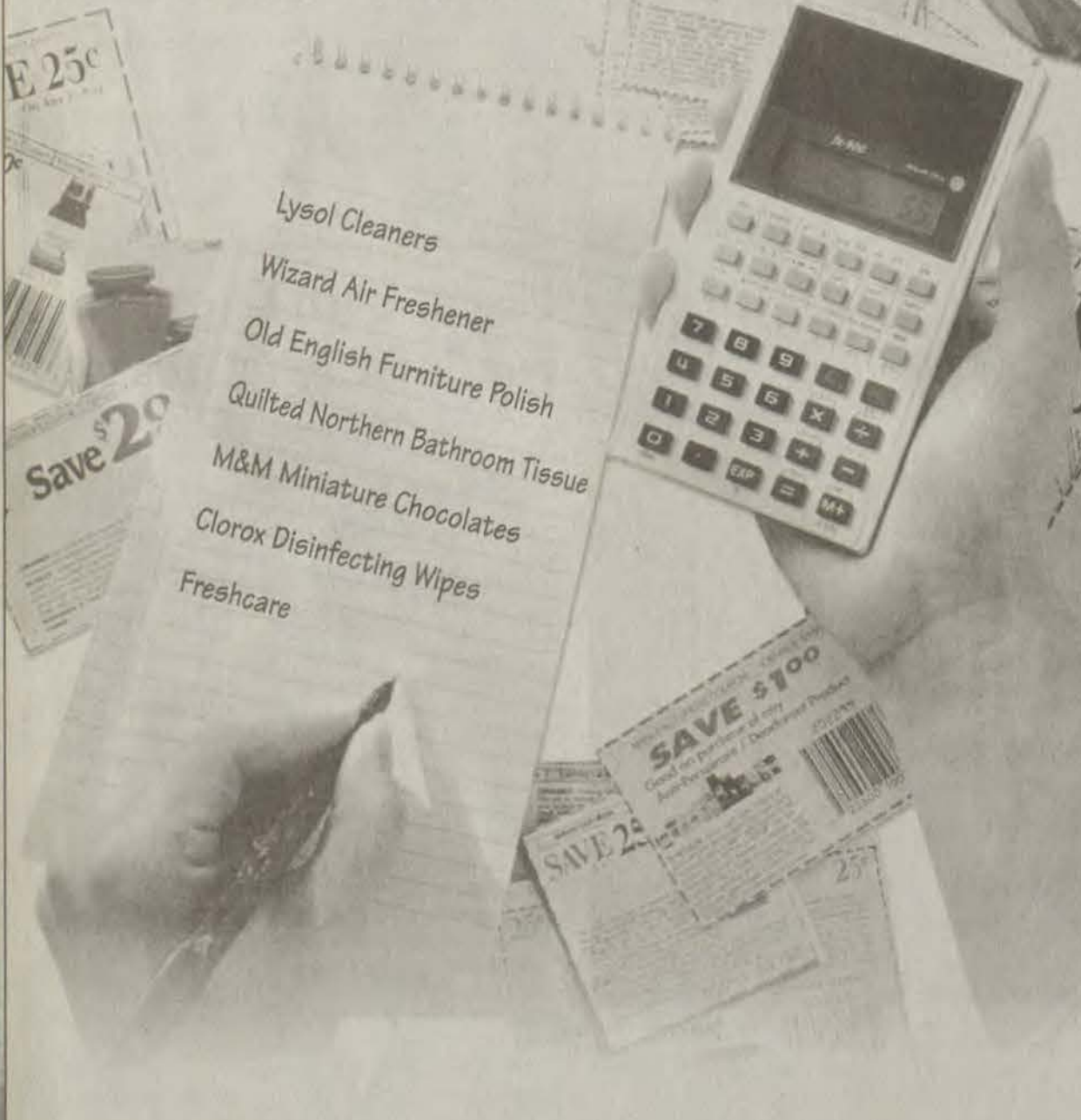

Free higher education guide for Kentucky high school seniors

Prestonsburg police and AAA say school's open, drive carefully

As the 2000-2001 school year begins, Prestonsburg Police and the Blue Grass Auto Club Safety Foundation are launching AAA's "School's Open, Drive Carefully" public awareness campaign.

This statewide effort urges motorists to use extra caution while driving during the early morning and mid-afternoon hours.

According to the Kentucky State Police, more than 9,500 traffic and pedestrian accidents occurred involving school children last year. Nationwide, motor vehicle and pedestrian fatalities are the number one cause of death among children ages 5 to 18.

"During the summer months, drivers forget about school kids, bus stops and crossing zones," said Heather Bowman, public relations coordinator for the Safety Foundation. "We are urging people, especially parents who are dropping their kids off at school, to pay extra attention when driving during the next few weeks to avoid a serious incident."

To help make drivers aware of the dangers, AAA Blue Grass/Kentucky will be posting special banners in public areas and distributing educational materials, and AAA School Safety Patrol members will be using extra caution when directing child pedestrians.

"Every year we have a new crop of children excited about their first day of school," said Bowman. "In a hurry to get to school, children often dash across the street without looking for approaching vehicles. At an average height of 3'-5", and eye level of about 35-40," children are at an extreme disadvantage. It is harder for them to see vehicles and in turn, for drivers to see them.

To help protect children, AAA urges motorists to follow these safety tips:

- Slow down in or near school and residential areas
- Drive with your headlights on—even during the day—so children and other drivers can see you
- Look for clues such as School Safety Patrols, bicycles, and playgrounds that indicate children could be in the area
- Scan between parked cars and other objects where children could dart into the road
- Practice extra caution in bad weather
- Always stop for school buses that are loading or unloading students.

This is the 66th year AAA has conducted School's Open—Drive Carefully campaign. Each fall,

AAA clubs distribute nearly two million pieces of educational material to remind motorists to drive with extra caution this time of year. The Blue Grass Auto Club

Safety Foundation is a non-profit charitable organization founded by AAA Blue Grass/Kentucky to promote traffic safety in 47 counties in central and eastern Kentucky.

KHEAA is the state agency that administers grant, work-study, savings, Federal Family Education Loan, and scholarship programs, including the Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship (KEES), to help students pay higher education expenses.

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Summer Heat: Dangerous For Your Car

(NAPS)—Think you get hot on a summer day? Consider your car, which endures hour upon hour of sun and heat exposure. While automobiles are designed, to some extent, to resist damage from the sun, they are still susceptible to the heat.

For example, on a 95° day, the dashboard of a car can reach 181°, the internal temperature of cooked poultry. The seat can reach 162°, the internal temperature of cooked ground beef. In addition, heat and prolonged exposure to the sun can cause the car's interior to fade, crack, discolor and chalk.

Also at risk are items kept in the car, such as cassette tapes, lip balm/lipstick, video tapes, film and CDs. Candy quickly turns into a sticky soup when left in a hot car.

And while there are simple ways to keep the interior temperature of the car down, not many people take such precautions. According to a survey commissioned by

Axius, less than 41 percent of Americans regularly use a vehicle sunshade—which could lower the inside temperature by as much as 49 degrees.

A sunshade is also a highly affordable option, costing about the same as lunch. Weigh this against the cost of replacing damaged CDs (about \$15) or video tapes (as much as \$99), and a sunshade becomes an even "cooler" idea.

What else can you do to keep the temperature in your car more bearable? Park in the shade and avoid wide-open spaces. Use a steering wheel cover.

Perhaps more important than heat is the damage caused by the sun's ultraviolet rays. Besides using a sunshade—which can block up to 99 percent of UV rays—tinted windows may be a smart choice. Washing and waxing a vehicle regularly, and using a water-based protectant on all rubber, plastic and vinyl areas, can also help.

If you have to get into a hot car, open the doors and wait a few minutes to let air in. Set the air conditioner to "recycle" before switching to "maximum." And to that end, make sure your cooling system is in good working order.

Doghouse can become hothouse during heat wave

When a heat wave hits like the one currently baking its way across much of the country, dogs who live outside can get awfully hot under the collar—and wish they had it made in the shade.

Beating the heat is extra tough for dogs, because they can only cool themselves by panting and sweating through their paw pads. Heat stroke can come on quickly and result in brain damage or death.

Doghouses, while essential for keeping Fido dry during summer thunderstorms, don't give much relief from the heat. In fact, a doghouse can actually act like an oven, trapping hot air inside.

Last summer, People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) conducted an informal test of temperatures inside doghouses on hot days. On a day when the temperature in the sun reached 89 degrees, the temperature inside a doghouse placed in a sunny

location was 88 degrees—just one degree cooler.

Meanwhile, the temperature in the shade was 80 degrees—a difference of nearly 10 degrees. On a 98-degree day, the temperature inside the doghouse was actually higher—100 degrees—while the temperature in the shade was 90 degrees.

Much better sources of shade are shadows cast by large buildings or, even better, trees, which provide additional cooling by releasing moisture from their leaves. Studies have shown that neighborhoods with lots of trees can have temperatures as much as 12 degrees lower than treeless areas.

Dogs who spend the day outside should always have access to shade and water. It's important to allow freedom of movement, since the shade moves throughout the day; a dog chained in a shady spot in the morning might be trapped in the sun by the

afternoon.

"Every summer we hear about tragedies that could have been prevented," says PETA Cruelty Caseworker Amy Rhodes. "Many people don't realize how quickly animals left in a hot car or outside without shade or water can succumb to the heat."

Watch for symptoms, such as restlessness, excessive thirst, heavy panting, lethargy, lack of appetite, dark tongue, rapid heartbeat, fever, vomiting, or lack of coordination. If your dog shows any of these symptoms, get her to shade immediately and call your veterinarian.

Lower body temperature gradually by providing water to drink, applying a cold towel or ice pack to the head, neck and chest, or immersing the dog in tepid water.

Prevent heat stroke by taking these precautions:

- Keep your dog indoors. If he must stay outside, avoid the hottest part of the day. Provide shade, water, and a kiddie pool. Keep drinking water in an anchored bucket or heavy bowl.

- Never leave a dog in a parked car. On a 78-degree day, the temperature inside a shaded car is 90 degrees, while a car parked in the sun can reach 160 degrees in minutes. Animals can succumb to heat stroke in just 15 minutes.

- If you see a dog in a car, take down the car's color, model, make and license plate number and have the owner paged inside the store, or call local humane authorities or police. Contact PETA for a supply of fliers on the dangers of heat stroke to leave on windshields.

- Don't carry your dog in the bed of a pick-up truck. This is always dangerous, but the heat brings the added danger of burning the dog's feet on the hot metal.

- Don't take your dog jogging except on cool mornings or evenings—and don't force exercise. On long walks, rest often and bring plenty of water. Hot pavement can burn dogs' paws; choose shady, grassy routes.

- Trim heavy-coated dogs' fur, but leave an inch for protection against insects and sunburn. Keep an eye on areas where hair is thin, like eyelids, ears and nose.

- Be a watchdog for chained dogs. Make sure they have food, water and shelter. If you see a dog in distress, contact humane authorities. Give the dog immediate relief by providing water.

suit.

In a libel case brought by former Middlesboro Mayor Troy "Frog" Welch against the Middlesboro Daily News, the court ruled that an advertisement which ran in that newspaper was protected by the First Amendment.

In the advertisement in question, two supporters of Welch's opponent made statements such as, "The city is broke because of [Welch's] management," "Frog has squandered over 1-1/2 million dollars in surplus money," and "Council members have been physically attacked."

The Supreme Court ruled in the Welch case that the "generalized rhetoric" in the advertisement was "not the language upon which a defamation lawsuit should be based, but instead is political opinion solidly protected by the First Amendment."

In his motion, Patton argues that the charges levied by Patton in his advertisements were less inflammatory than those cited in the Welch case and, therefore, Dotson's complaint should fall under the same criteria. For that reason, Patton's motion says Dotson's case should be thrown out.

"To allow the present case to continue, would be to effectively force the trial court to referee the punches and counter-punches thrown in election contests," the motion reads. "The Welch decision makes clear that this should not be judicial business. To hold any other way would chill the rights of those who engage in the most precious right we have — the right to speak our minds in elections."

Patton is represented by Prestonsburg attorney Ned Pillersdorf.

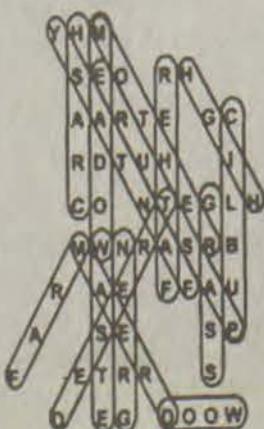
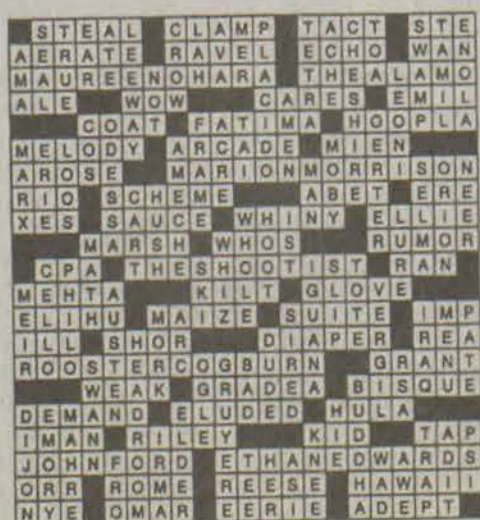

Universities need ways to boost faculty salaries

A report released last week by the Southern Regional Education Board showed that faculty salaries at Kentucky's public four-year universities in 1998-99 were middle of the pack compared with 15 other Southern states.

The report is a good example of how sometimes numbers can be misleading.

The Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education also compiled a salary list, but rather than comparing with other states, it compared each four-year university to between 15 and 19 other comparable universities. In most cases, the Kentucky schools did poorly.

The university presidents agreed with the list of benchmark universities, so chosen for similar size, purpose or mission. The benchmarks show what sort of competition Kentucky universities face when they hire faculty or try to retain them.

Considering all level of faculty, the University of Kentucky in 1999-2000 paid an average of \$62,400 a year, which ranked them last out of 20 in their list of benchmarks, \$5,550 below the median. (The closest school was Penn State University, \$63,200). The only school to fare well on the report is Eastern Kentucky University, which ranked sixth out of 18 schools at \$53,100 a year, \$2,400 above the median.

The numbers do not factor in the cost of living, usually low in Kentucky. Western Kentucky University ranked 14th out of 19 universities in average salary at \$49,700, but considering the cost of living by using The Salary Calculator at HomeFair.com, a comparable salary at top-ranked West Chester University of Pennsylvania would be \$56,795. The average at West Chester is actually \$63,500.

Low faculty pay has long plagued Kentucky schools and would seem to make the universities' case that they need better funding from the state. But another set of numbers from the CPE paints a different picture.

When considering the total public funding (state funding, tuition and fees) per full-time equivalent student for the school year 1996-97, Kentucky fared better when compared to the same benchmark universities. While every school except Kentucky State University was below the goal of being in the 55th percentile in funding, most of the schools ranked higher on the funding list than they did on the salary list.

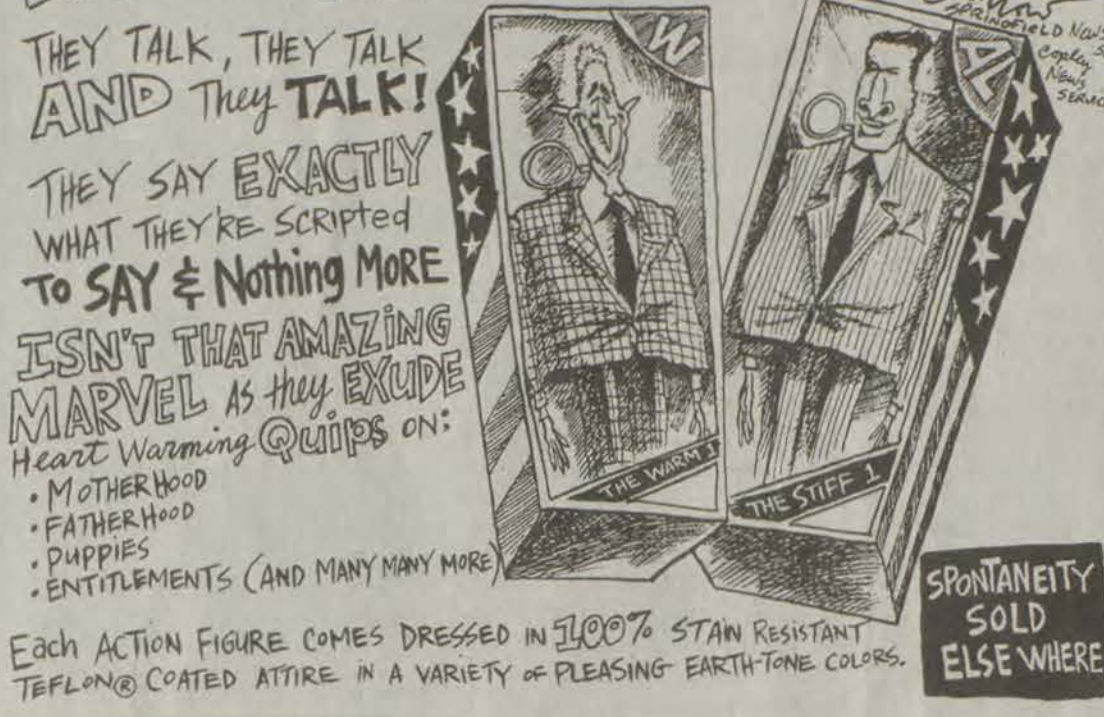
That means the leadership at each university needs to evaluate whether it is spending the money it receives as efficiently as it could. That has been the goal of the CPE, to convince the universities to close or consolidate some degree programs that produce too few graduates and spend their resources on areas where they can excel.

Gordon Davies, president of the council, continues to preach that universities need to spend less on buildings and more on people and programs. The state is unlikely to dramatically increase funding to any college.

Kentucky cannot build great universities without great faculty. These numbers reflect that finding ways to attract and retain them in today's competitive market will be difficult, but no less essential.

Ambush at the border

More Americans than ever before are traveling abroad this summer. Yet few people realize the rude surprises they could face upon returning to America. The Customs Service has become one of the nation's most intrusive, abusive agencies and the average traveler is at the feds' mercy.

You might think that you need not worry about invasive searches because you are obviously not a drug smuggler. However, a Customs handbook suggests that people can be targeted for invasive searches on the basis of such factors as appearing nervous, wearing baggy clothes, appearing sick, or being unusually polite or argumentative. These categories are broad enough to sweep into suspicion almost anyone an agent chooses to target.

And a search can be far more than a simple pawing through your luggage. If a Customs agent suspects you have swallowed heroin in condoms as a means of smuggling, you can be detained for up to 24 hours — until you have a bowel movement that government agents can properly inspect. A federal court ruled in 1997 that Customs inspectors were justified in forcing a woman to undergo a "stool search" in part because inspectors found a small container of Vaseline in her suitcase — which they claimed could have been used to help insert drugs into her body.

For decades, the Customs Service has denied that its agents racially target certain people for intrusive drug searches. However, a General Accounting Office report released earlier this year found that black women who were U.S. citizens were 90 percent more likely to be searched for drugs than were white women. The Customs Service is promising to fix this problem. However, since Customs has promised for decades not to rely on racial targeting, many people are skeptical of the latest promise.

And new indignities are on the way. The Customs Service is now deploying new BodySearch equipment that uses X-rays to see through the clothes of designated lucky travelers. The American Civil Liberty Union's Gregory Nojeim warned that the new body scanners could show "underneath clothing and with clarity, breasts or a penis, and the relative dimensions of each. The system has a joystick-driven zoom option that allows the operator to enlarge portions of the image." The BodySearch system has the capacity to save images of what it views — so travelers may now look forward to a new kind of trip souvenir: a picture of their private parts on file at some government agency.

There are also perils in the endless declaration forms that citizens must fill out. If you make a list of the products you are bringing back from abroad — and intentionally leave one item out — you could be prosecuted for making a false statement to a federal official, which carries a three-year prison penalty. Though the Customs Service very rarely uses such authority, it is another sword of Damocles hanging over citizens' heads.

One of the most frequent items that Americans smuggle is Cuban cigars. The Customs Service seized 90,000 smuggled Cuban cigars in 1997. If someone is caught with a sufficient number of cigars, the feds could prosecute under the 1917 Trading with the Enemy Act and the person could face up to five years in prison and a \$250,000 fine.

You can also face federal charges if you don't tell Customs agents that you are taking more than \$10,000 in or out of the United States. In 1998, the Supreme Court ruled that the federal government wrongfully confiscated \$357,144 from a Syrian-American at Los Angeles Airport merely because he did not fill out a Customs form declaring that he was taking his honestly acquired money out of the country.

The Customs Service responded to the Supreme Court defeat by sharply increasing its efforts to confiscate travelers' cash. In 1999 testimony to a Senate Appropriations subcommittee, Customs chief Ray Kelly declared, "Outbound currency seizures experienced a 59 percent increase in the amount of currency seized compared to the same time period in Fiscal Year 1997."

At Houston International Airport, 100,813 passengers were searched in 1998, but Customs inspectors were able to find pretexts to strip only eight people of their

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Gun auction slated for Frankfort

The first in a series of auctions to sell weapons that have been confiscated by law enforcement agencies throughout Kentucky will be held Tuesday, August 29, at the Kentucky State Police Supply Post at 1241 Louisville Rd. in Frankfort.

Inspection is scheduled to begin at 8 a.m., and the auction will begin at 10 a.m.

Two prior sales — one in July and the other last summer — included only weapons that were confiscated by the KSP in accordance with a 1998 law. The upcoming auction will be the first under a law passed by the 2000 General Assembly that requires local law enforcement agencies to turn over their seized weapons to the KSP for auction by the state Division of Surplus Properties.

The law states that firearms and ammunition are to be transferred to KSP within 90 days of their confiscation or abandonment unless they are retained for official use or can be traced and returned to the registered owner. The current law went into effect July 14.

Auctions have been scheduled once a month between August and the end of the year and will be limited to 500 weapons per sale. The

KSP began receiving weapons on August 1, and anticipates a cutoff date for weapons to be included in the August auction to be around August 15.

Other auctions scheduled in 2000 will be on September 19, October 17, November 14 and December 19 — all Tuesdays.

Anyone interested in bidding during the next auction must submit a photocopy of their federal firearms dealer's license, with an original signature, to the Division of Surplus Properties by close of business, August 24.

Proof of license should be sent to Mary Maxwell, Bid Clerk, Firearms Sale, Division of Surplus Properties, 514 Barrett Ave., Frankfort, KY 40601.

Individuals who were registered for the July auction will automatically be registered for August 29. Only those who are registered will be issued numbers to use in bidding the day of the sale and photo identification must be presented to the bid clerk to get a number. For subsequent auctions, the proof license for dealers will be due to Surplus Properties by the Thursday preceding the sale.

All weapons will be sold "where and as is," by lot number. A lot might include more than one weapon or parts of a weapon.

Full payment for items purchased will be required within one hour of the completion of the sale of the auction and must be made in cash, certified cashier's check, traveler's

check, money order or personal check from an in-state bank.

Out-of-state checks will be accepted only if they are certified or accompanied by a certified letter of credit from the bank of issuance.

All checks for the sale should be made out to the Kentucky State Treasurer.

The proceeds from the auction will be used to purchase body armor for local police departments under a grant program that is administered under the state Department of Local Government.

The Kentucky Auctioneer's Association will provide auctioneer services during the sale.

The July sale brought nearly \$33,000 for about 250 weapons during a three-and-a-half-hour auction.

Lightning, torrential rain ravage electricity service

Wave after wave of high wind and pounding rain, coupled with lightning, Wednesday night disrupted electric service to more than 7,600 American Electric Power customers across southeast Kentucky.

About 1,000 customers remained without electricity Thursday morning in the Hazard

area, while another 147 customers in Pikeville were expected to have repairs made by midmorning.

The storms rolled across the region between 9 p.m. and 10 p.m., and AEP repair crews were on the scenes throughout the night.

The company's South Pikeville Station was knocked from service and electric wires were knocked to the ground by falling trees throughout the city and surrounding areas. Most of Pikeville's electric service was restored shortly after 4 a.m.

In Hazard, about 5,500 customers were affected in Leslie, Breathitt and Perry counties. By daylight Thursday, about 1,000 scattered outages were reported across those areas with the hardest-hit communities lying in Muncy's Creek, Hyden, and Dry Hill.

AEP said all customers should have electricity restored by Thursday afternoon.

AEP reminds customers and residents that any downed electric line should be considered energized and dangerous. Instead of touching or attempting to move a wire, AEP should be contacted by calling 1-800-572-1113.

cash, including a Mexican mother with a baby and \$18,924. Customs' crackdown is known as Operation Buckstop. The Wall Street Journal reported in December 1999 that "each passenger [must] walk past a checkpoint of agents empowered to search bags, open mail and, sometimes, remove a suspect from a flight." Los Angeles immigration attorney Andres Bustamante observed that it is "common" for Customs agents to "approach Mexicans at the airport" during the holiday season "and take their money. They get a receipt and go on their way." The National Council of La Raza denounced Operation Buckstop as "racial profiling."

There are so many laws on the books that Customs agents can harass whomever they please. Americans must realize the high price they are paying for the power they have allowed the federal government to commandeer.

Governor wants legislature to consider garbage, recycling

Frankfort — Addressing the Synergy 2000 Environmental Conference Tuesday in Frankfort, Gov. Paul Patton announced plans to ask legislators to consider a statewide universal garbage collection and recycling program in 2001.

"We had a good debate on the issue and learned some things when we proposed this program in the 2000 session but I was AWOL," Patton told the group of environmentalists and county officials.

"Even though I gave you vocal support at that time, I didn't give you Paul Patton's full support, but I'm here to commit to you today that I will take that kind of approach this time around and I don't intend to wait until 2002."

The governor said he will either add the proposal to his call for a special session on workers compensation in February 2000, or if the constitutional amendment

allowing annual legislative sessions passes this fall, Patton will promote the initiative in that 30-day session.

Patton directed Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet Secretary Jim Bickford to "start from ground zero" and start today working on a proposal that includes input from the public, county officials, environmentalists, and legislators.

The governor set the general parameters saying, "This comprehensive program to clean up Kentucky and keep it clean must include four elements—universal garbage collection service, recycling, clean up of existing dumps and litter, and an education program."

The governor gave Secretary Bickford until December 1 to come up with a proposal, giving time to work with lawmakers before they meet in a special or regular session in January or February.

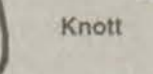

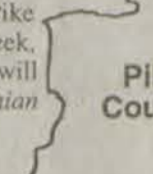

Both Prestonsburg (47) and Allen Central (32) have decent numbers.

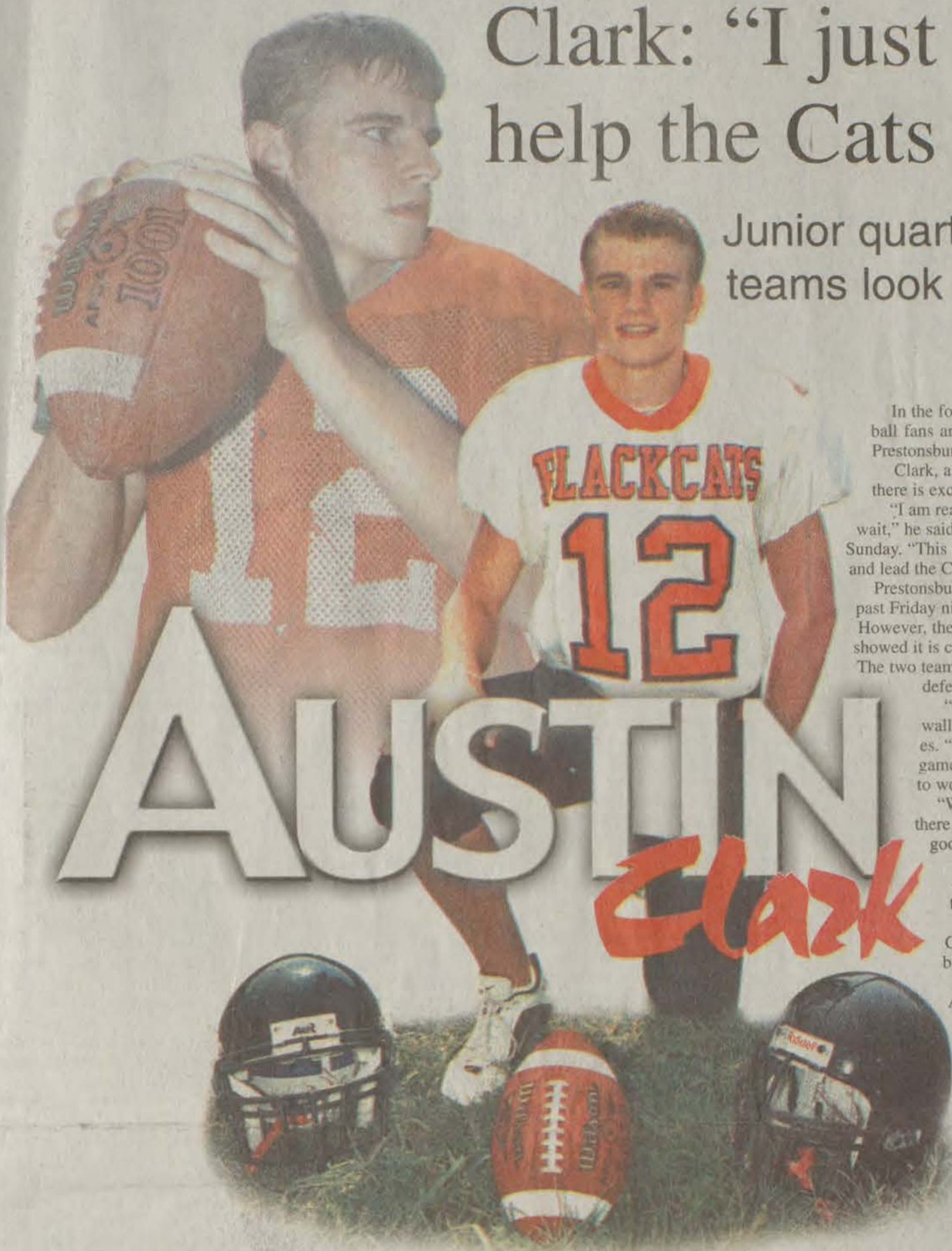
We are pulling for the Bobcats (as well as all county schools) and hope they have their best season ever.

Labonte, the talk of Indy

The hype turned out to be greater than the racing at Indy. In fact, if it hadn't been for the Labonte brothers, the race would soon be forgotten. Bobby and Terry Labonte gave the crowd something to remember long

after the checkered flag waved.

One brother, Bobby, won the race while older brother Terry watched. That wouldn't seem so unusual if hadn't been for the fact that Terry had started a record 655 consecutive Winston Cup races. The last time Terry missed the waving of the green flag signaling the beginning of a race

was the LA Times 500 at Riverside (Calif.) Raceway on November 19, 1978.

Terry suffered a concussion and a fractured leg bone in a crash at the Pepsi 400 on July 1. Even with the broken leg Terry was able to start the last race at Pocono before turning it over to a relief driver. The team was going to do the same at Indy, but during a practice run on Friday, Terry became dizzy and decided that it was time to step out of the car for this week's road race at Watkins Glen. But he might have to reconsider because the team has yet to find a driver for the car.

While all of the drama was unfolding with Terry, Bobby's day got off to a very emotional start when he was paired with Darrell Waltrip in a convertible to circle the track during driver introductions. As the two circled the track, the crowd of 300,000 plus gave ol' DW the ovation that his career deserved.

Only two days earlier DW qualified on the front row, which brought back memories of a career that will forever put him in the elite tier of Winston Cup drivers. In true Labonte style, Bobby told DW that it was just an honor to be riding with him and asked him to autograph his hat.

After 400 miles of racing, Bobby

once again heard the roar of the crowd. This time the crowd was recognizing him for his dramatic win. The win was a popular one, but a gesture on the victory lap showed that the victory wasn't the only thing on his mind. As he came down in front of the pits, he coasted his Interstate Batteries Pontiac to a momentary halt, in front of the Kellogg's pit before going on to victory lane.

NASCAR and Brickyard officials owe the Labonte family for putting some excitement into a race that contained very little on-track racing. The field got separated very early and from that point on it became a two-car show between Labonte and Rusty Wallace. Once Labonte was able to pass Rusty, he quickly stretched the lead out until he crossed the finish line with a 4.23-second lead.

The race only had nine official lead changes, which was a record-low for the event. Even the cars up front lacked the competitiveness to put on a show for the fans. Besides Labonte and Wallace, only the fourth-place finisher Jerry Nadeau passed for the lead on the track.

One would think with 18 of the 43 cars in the starting field being specially built for the Brickyard that the racing would be very tight. The close, side-by-side racing that Indy fans don't get to witness in the open wheel series never did develop. As Labonte passed Wallace the final time, the two did get into each other, which was about as much excitement as the race could serve up.

Clark said while the Cats will be basically a running team, they will throw the football as well.

"We are going to run the ball," he said. "However, we have some real good receivers and I look for us to pass more than we have in the past."

Matt Clay, a senior, returns to the split end slot.

"Matt is going to be a good one," Clark said. "We have two real good tight ends in Chris Spriggs and Kevin Younce. "Kevin will catch anything you throw to him."

Clark became the Cats' starting quarterback after the first two games last year. Seth Crisp started the first two weeks of the season behind center.

Prestonsburg finished with a 3-8 mark last season but made the state playoffs with three district wins.

SPEEDWAY, Ind. — Who could argue with the notion that, in the Brickyard 400, it was Bobby Labonte's turn? Every year at Indianapolis Motor Speedway, the Pontiac driver inched closer to victory lane. In his previous three starts at Indy, Labonte had finished second (1997), third (1998) and second (1999).

Justice was served at Indianapolis Motor Speedway on Saturday. Bobby Labonte was, to borrow the cliché, "due."

Sadly, so was Rusty Wallace, and it was Wallace's sad fate to watch helplessly as Labonte's Pontiac — the first of that make to claim this race — swept past him on the 146th of 160 laps. The pass ended a rather testy duel in which Labonte had shadowed Wallace's car for lap after lap.

Once clear, Labonte swiftly pulled away. After making the pass in the third turn, he and Wallace bumped at the head of the front straight, exiting turn four. By the next time around, however, Labonte was perhaps 50 yards ahead, and his

margin at the end, 4.229 seconds, was the largest in the event's history.

BUSCH GRAND NATIONAL

CLERMONT, Ind. — Ron Hornaday continued his rookie resurgence with a victory in the Kroger 200 at Indianapolis Raceway Park.

Hornaday is, of course, hardly the normal rookie, having prefaced his move to Busch Grand National with two championships in the Craftsman Truck Series. IRP marked Hornaday's second victory of the season.

Jeff Purvis finished second, followed by runaway point leader Jeff Green.

CRAFTSMAN TRUCK

CLERMONT, Ind. — Veteran Joe Ruttman put his Dodge on the pole and dominated the Power Stroke 200 at Indianapolis Raceway Park.

Ruttman led 143 of the 200 laps, holding off Lyndon Amick, Jamie McMurray, Mike Wallace and point leader Greg Biffle. Amick, normally a BGN competitor, collected a runner-up finish in only his second truck race of the season.

After injury, Mayfield's immediate driving future in

SPEEDWAY, Ind. — In the Indianapolis Motor Speedway practice session on the morning of Aug. 4, Jeremy Mayfield was in the wrong place at the wrong time.

Apparently as a result of oil dropped from Chad Little's ailing engine, Mayfield's Ford struck the third-turn wall of Indy. And while his injuries were not grave, they did knock him out of the race and put his ability to compete in the next several races in doubt.

Mayfield's Ford wobbled before spinning completely out of control and hitting the wall almost flush on the driver's side. A replay, while not

showing the accident in vivid detail, did reveal that the car in front of Mayfield's, driven by teammate Rusty Wallace, wobbled when it reached the same spot on the track. Joe Nemechek's Chevrolet also barely escaped an incident.

Mayfield was admitted to the hospital with "a closed head injury."

Dr. Troy Payner of the hospital's neurological staff said the injury would prevent him from taking part in the Brickyard 400, but Mayfield checked out of the hospital at 4 p.m.

Mayfield had qualified fourth, but Kyle Petty, who had failed to make the starting field, took over as driver of the car.

That, of course, meant that Petty

had to drop to the rear of the field for the start.

THE STREAK ENDS: The longest consecutive-starts streak in NASCAR history ended at Indianapolis when Terry Labonte elected not to compete in the Brickyard 400.

Labonte suffered a concussion and a broken right leg in a crash at Daytona on July 1, and lingering effects of the concussion caused dizziness when Labonte tried to practice in his No. 5 Chevrolet. Todd Bodine qualified the car, and after consulting with doctors, Labonte elected to pass up Indy and this week's race at Watkins Glen.

Labonte's streak of 655 races in a

row began with the Daytona 500 in 1979.

Independent Auditor's Report

We have audited the accompanying statement of receipts, disbursements, and excess fees of the former County Clerk of Floyd County, Kentucky, for the period January 1, 1999 through April 15, 1999. This financial statement is the responsibility of the former County Clerk. Our responsibility is to express an opinion of this financial statement based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and the Audit Guide for County Fee Officials issued by the Auditor of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statement is free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statement. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, the County Clerks office is required to prepare the financial statement on a prescribed basis of accounting that demonstrates compliance with the cash basis and laws of Kentucky, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than general accepted accounting principles. This cash basis system does not require the maintenance of a general fixed asset group or general long-term debt group of accounts. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statement is not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the financial statement referred to above presents fairly, in all material respects, the receipts, disbursements, and excess fees of the former County Clerk for the period January 1, 1999 through April 15, 1999, in conformity with the basis of accounting described above.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statement taken as a whole. The schedule listed in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statement. Such information has been subjected to auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statement and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the financial statement taken as a whole.

Based on the results of our audit, we have presented the accompanying comments and recommendations, included herein, which discuss the following areas of noncompliance:

- The Former County Clerk Should Not Have Received Salary in Excess Of The Statutory Maximum
- The Former County Clerk Should Have Published A Financial Statement And Presented The Financial Statement To The Fiscal Court
- The Libraries And Archives Grant Account Records Were Not Available For Inspection
- The Former County Clerk Should Have Expended Funds Only For Allowable Expenditures
- Former County Clerk Carla Robinson Boyd Should Have Avoided The Deficit of \$6,102 In The 1999 Fee Account
- The Fiscal Court Should Provide Funding To Former County Clerk Carla Robinson Boyd In The Amount Of \$10,781 For The Period January 1, 1999 through April 15, 1999
- Former County Clerk Carla Robinson Boyd Should Eliminate All Remaining Liabilities Of The 1992 and 1993 Fee Accounts In The Amount Of \$195,126
- The Former County Clerk's Office Lacked A Proper Segregation Of Accounting Duties

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued a report dated May 3, 2000, on our consideration of the former County Clerk's compliance with certain laws and regulations and internal control over financial reporting.

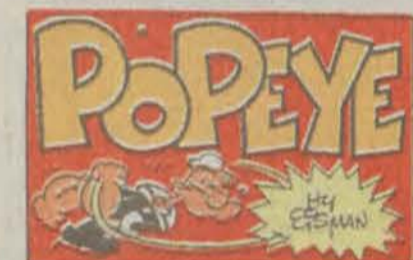

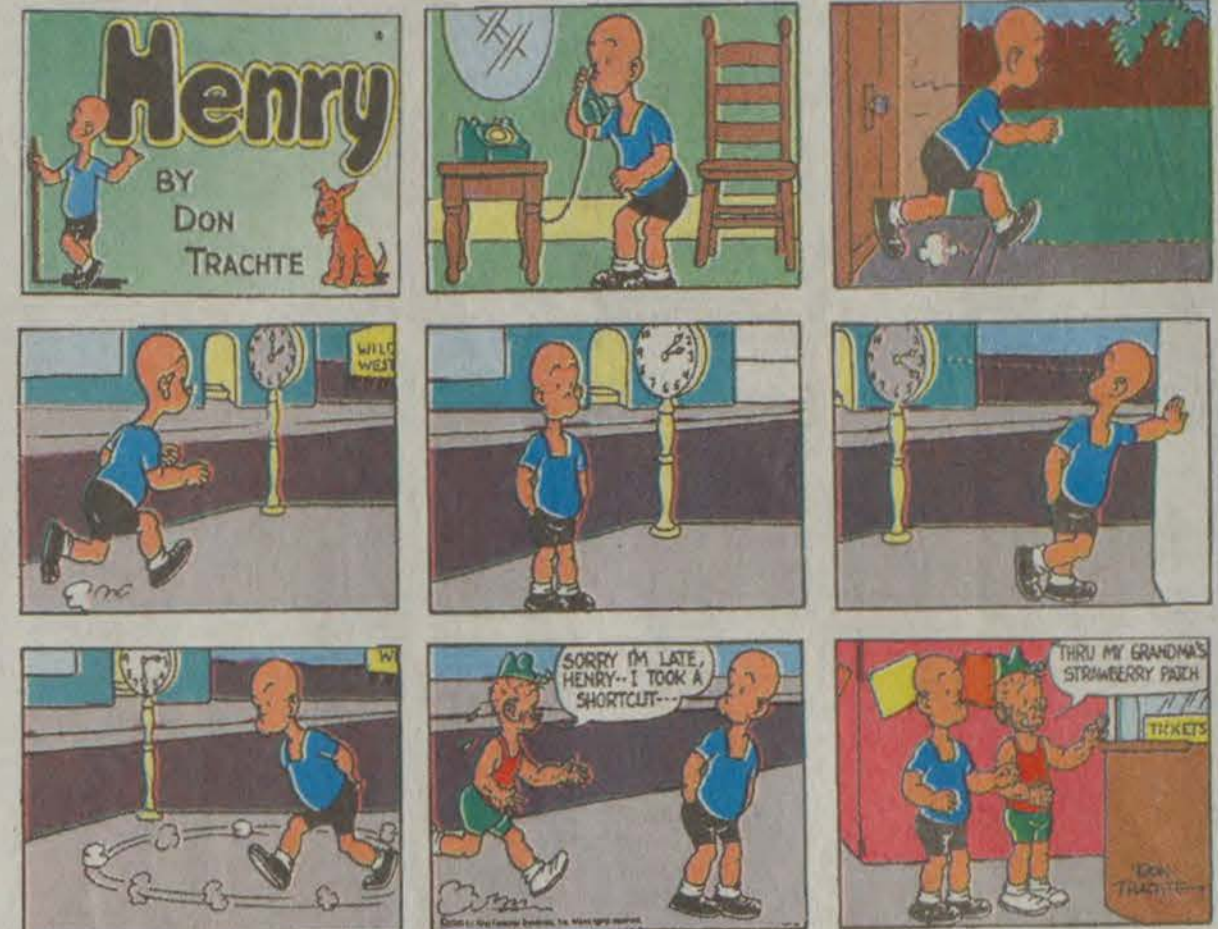

Get off the four lanes and maybe even the state roads with two or three numbers on the signs. You'll see treasures you'd forgotten about and places you'll wish you'd found sooner.








An accident waiting to happen

Sometimes you read something that touches your mind and your heart at the same time. This happened to our family the other night when my brother-in-law, Ed Crockett, e-mailed us with news of his recent automobile accident. I know you think the story of a car wreck might not be entertaining, but this one is a fascinating read:

Dear Family,
I was meandering down Midway Road trying to get my new lawn tractor tire filled with air. It is a beautiful two-lane road with numerous farms spread along its route. I looked ahead and saw the front end of an older car inching out into the roadway from behind some bushes. I thought to myself, surely they will not pull out, but then I could not see the driver (and obviously he could not see me).

I checked and saw the left hand side of the road was clear up ahead and decided — as a precaution — to veer over into the left

hand lane.

Apparently, since they were pulling out of a field, the driver must have had to "gun" the engine to clear the ruts. Just as I would have cleared the car, it lunged out into the roadway and clipped the right front fender.

I brought the car to a complete stop about one hundred feet down the road, but as soon as I had cleared the point of impact I heard a really loud crash. When I looked in my rearview mirror the car had been broad sided by a large pickup truck that was a couple of car lengths behind me (compact car lengths).

I immediately assumed someone was seriously killed, as a former mayor of Covington once stated. I pulled Melinda's cell phone (yes, I was driving her car) and headed back toward the site.

Out of the truck jumped a really angry redneck yelling at some very shaken up immigrant workers. "Anybody got insurance or speak English" was the first thing he yelled — and then asked if anyone was hurt. My 911 call was completed quickly and no injuries were apparent.

It was clear that a miracle had occurred as no one was injured. The large truck and other car had to be towed from the site. Melinda's car had a flat tire, when I finally got back to the car to see what had happened to it. The hood seems to have been pushed to the left somewhat, the left front tire punctured, the left front quarter panel is shredded and the left front door is pushed out of place.

I seemed to be fine — nothing seems pushed out of place on me.

Of course, no driver's license, no insurance — standard equipment for those living on the edge of subsistence. The most remarkable thing — other than the lack of injury — was there were four people in the field hand's car.

Within five minutes another van had passed that had several other migrant work-

ers in it. Then four more came walking up from the right hand side of the site and then five more came up within the next 10 minutes. By the time the Kentucky State Police arrived there were at least 14 migrant workers standing by the car.

The first thing the officer asked was, "Do you all speak English, who was driving, and show me your green cards." Panic quickly spread as they all responded by shaking their heads — no. Finally relief came over the group as the INS (Immigration and Naturalization Service) said they could not come to "handle" them.

I drive that road every day — twice a day. I never "see" them in the fields, walking or even driving. I did not expect them to have insurance. The gentleman in the truck only had liability. His loss may be total.

The trooper asked if I had full coverage and with the affirmative answer he said I would be OK — but if I wanted to make an issue of the event I could attend court and ask the Woodford attorney to aggressively pursue the no insurance charge — not likely. I work in the courts — I am already out more than I care to be on this experience.

As Melinda pointed out I should be glad that I am not injured. If the car had gotten in front of me instead of glancing off the left front I would have broadsided them and had the Ford tank plow into the rear of her car.

The present outcome far exceeds that thought.

Just goes to show you that you should always say good-bye like you might not see that person again. We all should have enough experience with that one.

My one good chance to roll out of the car (without major injury) and yell "whiplash" had to be wasted on some of the poorest people on the planet. But — I walked away, came back to a really nice house and ate some pizza.

Criminal charges for the migrant worker and total loss of his vehicle and thousands of dollars to the underinsured truck driver made my aggravation seem petty.

So started my weekend. To make matters worse — my lawn tractor still cannot move with the flat tire I brought back to the house in Melinda's now limping Taurus. Hope your week was better.

NEWS OF THE WEIRD

According to police and health department authorities in Huntsville, Alabama, in July, a father apparently purchased several poisonous snakes for his 13-year-old son to keep around the house as pets, but after the boy was bitten by one, he may have hidden the snakes for fear that they would be confiscated. Included are a black mamba (generally regarded as the world's deadliest) and a gaboon viper (only somewhat less deadly), and at press time, authorities could not rule out that the snakes had simply been released into the countryside, which would significantly lower the quality of life around Huntsville. Said a city health control officer, "It's a macho thing to have venomous snakes. I guess stupid supersedes macho."

Latest From Weird Japan

A June Wall Street Journal dispatch from Tokyo reported the trend of "serial divorce":

Young married women desiring to keep their maiden names on official documents circumvent Japanese law by momentarily divorcing when a government document is needed, and then usually remarrying their husbands immediately afterward. And cosmetics firms' sales of products to reduce or mask the odor of "noneal" are booming, according to a March New York Times report; noneal is a chemical released in greater quantity as people age and in super-hygienic Japan creates the unpopular "old man's smell."

Latest Religious Messages

In May, Italian female basketball star Fabiana Benedettini, 30, surprised her family and the sports world by abruptly taking vows as a nun and joining the Santa Margherita of Cortona sanctuary. Also recently becoming nuns in Italy: a marchesa, Ginevra Rossi di Montelera; a hotel heiress, Maria Luisa De Angelis (who abandoned her husband and children in the process); an

industrial heiress, Idina Ferruzzi; a volleyball all-star, Maria Teresa Ciancio; and, at least joining a convent temporarily, a porn star, Luana Borgia.

In June, the Civil Status Court in Alexandria, Egypt, ruled that the Islamic requirement for divorce (after certain preconditions are met, the husband tells the wife three times, "I divorce you") must be spoken in person and not delivered by e-mail. At press time, a similar question was at issue in a divorce case in United Arab Emirates.

An April New York Times dispatch from Zhdanovo, Russia (just north of Mongolia), reported on the cultural use of vodka as holy water in that Buryat region, whose predominant religion is shamanism. Mongol devotees sometimes sip vodka during the entire 90-minute services, which brings, according to one shaman, "moral calmness" and the improved ability to "talk to god" (although shamanism includes more than 100 gods).

First Things First: Catholic priest Charles

Mentrup, 41, was stabbed by a parishioner during confession in May; he survived but refused to identify the man who did it because of his vow of confidentiality. And at Christmastime 1999, a drunken guest disturbed the Cistercian monks of Caldey Island (Wales) by singing Welsh hymns and carols while they were celebrating their 12 hours of "Great Silence," but no one moved to quiet the guest because, after all, the monks could not speak.

Police Blotter

In March, according to a Dallas police report, pro hockey goaltender Ed Belfour, desperately trying to avoid a public intoxication arrest, offered two patrolmen \$100,000 to forget the whole thing, and by the time they were set to haul him to the station, Belfour had vomited all over himself and

New book, "Plan B," eases the way

"Plan B." It's becoming part of the vernacular—a catchword for the times when things don't go as planned, and one has to turn to alternatives. When planning a picnic and it rains, Plan B can be as simple as moving inside.

Topics range from solutions for lifestyle changes, affairs and unhappy marriages to getting unstuck from dysfunctional family situations, career and work crises, to moving past depression and anxiety and dealing with physical loss.

"Too many of us live our lives in a joyless, constricted manner," says Asker. "Is that all there is?" is a question many

ask. This book will help you look at your life in a new way and find solutions to your most pressing problems."

Asker says it is remarkable how often, once people let go of Plan A, they realize that their new plan for life can bring them the happiness that eluded them before.

52 accepted into crafts program

Fifty-two craftspeople were recently accepted into the Kentucky Craft Marketing Program (KCMP) at the annual June jury session, conducted by a panel of out-of-state craft professionals.

Forty-three of the accepted are new to the KCMP, and nine were re-jurying. Those re-jurying were either jurying new products or had not participated in a KCMP event within the past two years. The participants were selected from 106 applicants.

Newly-juried craftsman Theo Bee of Harrodsburg said, "The Kentucky Crafted logo is prestigious, and the crafts that display the logo are of high quality, similar to mine. Its distinction (the logo) sets that type of craft apart from others. If someone sees the logo they immediately think that it's a first quality craft."

Juried members have an opportunity to participate in wholesale and retail venues, such as the New York International Gift Fair,

Kentucky Crafted: The Market; Governor's Derby Breakfast; and a new statewide crafts tour available in the winter of 2000.

The Kentucky Department of Travel, along with the Craft Marketing Program, is updating a statewide crafts tour, "Guide to Crafts in the Commonwealth," to promote cultural heritage tourism as economic development.

Juried participants will be eligible for inclusion in the guide. Participants also may use the "Kentucky Crafted" logo, attend educational workshops, and receive technical assistance for their business and craft.

Jurors for the 2000 Session were Cease Giddings, Folkworks, Evanston, Illinois (retailer); Kim Sawyer, Watermark Cooperative, Camden, North Carolina, (craft administrator); Hal Stevens, president of Ohio Designer Craftsmen Enterprises Inc., Columbus, Ohio (returning juror), Joe Schmidlin, Schmidlin's Silversmithing in Louisville, served as the juried participant representative.

Four persons from this area were among those selected. They are Florence Newman of Trinkets and Things by FAN, Paintsville, quilted handbags; Florene Smith of Mamma's Mountain Crafts, Whitesburg, handquilted throw pillows; and Darwin and Janie Messer of Messer's Basketree, Leburn, traditional Appalachian split oak baskets.

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KET explores life, adventures of KY frontiersman Simon Kenton

Mistakenly believing he had killed a man in a duel, 16-year-old Simon Kenton fled his home in Virginia in 1771 to explore the undeveloped territories of Kentucky and Ohio.

Enormous for his day at 6 feet-2 inches and 200 pounds, Kenton towered—both in skill and in strength—over every other man on the frontier. By his death at age 81 in 1936, the one-time Virginia fugitive had become one of early America's greatest frontiersmen, and his life became the stuff of legend.

Premiering on KET Monday, August 14, at 9 p.m., "A Walk with Simon Kenton" offers a rare opportunity to uncover the man behind the myth. Actor Clancy Brown, of "Dead Man Walking" and "The Shawshank Redemption" fame, traces Kenton's journey from Virginia through Kentucky to Ohio, with stops at the places that made Kenton famous.

Through a blend of interviews, interpretation

of historical documents and modern exploration of Kenton's trail from the Kentucky Canelands through Maysville and Boonesborough into Ohio, Brown reveals details of Kenton's embattled relationship with the Shawnees, his friendship with Daniel Boone and his central role in America's westward expansion.

Brown explains how Kenton single-handedly saved Boone from

Shawnee attack during the 1778 siege of Fort Boonesborough. Brown also recounts Kenton's narrow escape from death at the hands of the Shawnees, who regarded Kenton as one of their greatest enemies and sentenced him to be burned at the stake.

Following "A Walk with Simon Kenton," KET continues its look at Kentucky frontiersmen with an encore presenta-

tion of "A Walk with Boone," airing at 10 p.m. The program features historians John Mack Faragher and Thomas Clark, who follow Boone's Kentucky trail from the Cumberland Gap and Red Lick Valley to the site of the original Fort Boonesborough and the last cabin Boone built in the state.

"A Walk with Simon Kenton" is a KET production, written, directed and

produced by independent filmmaker Keith Strandberg. "A Walk with Boone" is a KET production, produced and directed by Gale Worth. Both programs are closed-captioned for the deaf and hard-of-hearing.

the program focuses on wildlife habitat, conservation issues and wildlife management. A panel of experts from the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources—including wildlife biologists Laura Burford and Bill Moore and diversity coordinator Tim Stone—

pped the offer to \$1 billion.

Thieves With Identity Crises

Three gangs of cross-dressing male thieves were operating in three cities during May. Two of the three gangs cross-dressed as a distraction, in that the four black males working Annapolis, Maryland, stores were "very unattractive and obviously males," according to a police spokesperson, and the crew of four that hit stores in Calgary, Alberta, had been spotted parked in their car at a mall, donning dresses to resemble elderly women. However, a cast of about a dozen drag queens operating in Fort Lauderdale and Miami stores used their stolen credit cards mostly for female fashions and cosmetics.

Recurring Themes

News of the Weird reported in 1988 on an Indianapolis substitute teacher's suspension for arranging for the well-behaved kids in her fifth-grade class to line up and spit on the ones that had been bad, as they walked the line. Among this year's classroom line-up-and-punish incidents: A sixth-grade teacher allegedly assigned good kids to line up and punch a bad one (Somerset County, New Jersey, May); a preschool principal allegedly urged good 4-year-olds to line up and bite a bad one (Boston, June); and, in fact, second-grade teacher Madeline Raven, 27, allegedly had good kids line up and spit on a bad one, which forced the teacher to find the boy another shirt since the one he wore to school was thus cov-

ered with saliva (Sugar Land, Texas, April).

Undignified Deaths

A 22-year-old bungee jumper was killed in the Swiss Alps in May when guides for the tour company Adventure World, according to local police, failed to change cords after people had finished their earlier, much-longer jump. Two weeks earlier, at a regional track and field meet in Turnov, Czech Republic, an 18-year-old female athlete was hit on the head and killed by an errant toss by the country's best hammer thrower.

Also, in the Last Month ...

A 3-foot-long iguana escaped from captivity, prompting a police alert, given its propensity for aggression toward menstruating women (St. Austell, England). A soiled diaper, in a plastic bag left in a 100-degree sun for three days, combusted, setting afire the walls of two apartments, causing \$3,000 damage (Ennis, Texas). A disabled man had his motorized wheelchair stolen at gunpoint in a routine street mugging (Milwaukee). One of Rio de Janeiro's notorious bus thieves, who had just snatched about \$800 from passengers, escaped by leaping out a door but landed in the midst of a 400-officer police force guarding the municipal governor during a downtown ceremony.

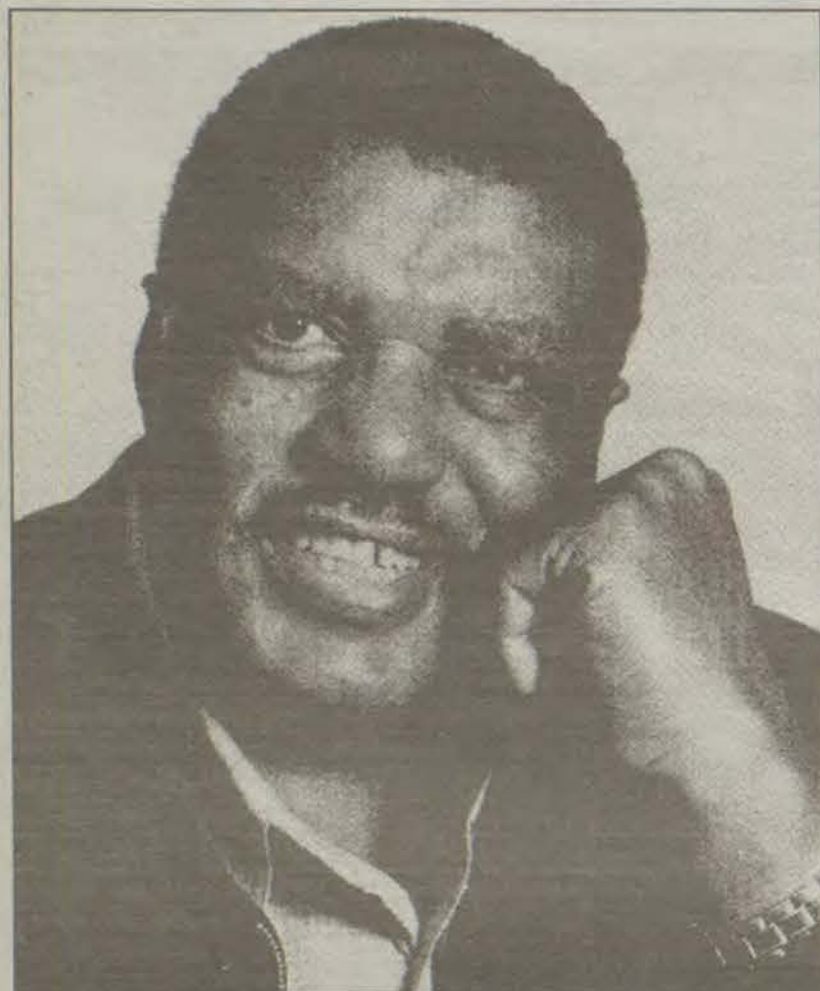
"My dream was to be a successful singer, songwriter and entertainer. I prayed that my music would be heard around the world and that God would give me the vision to use my music to

Free elk viewing tours available

This fall, the bugle of rutting elk will break out in the hills of eastern Kentucky. The breeding season for elk, also known as the rut, typically begins about the first of September and is marked by an incredible display of grunting, bugling and sparring between the males of the species.

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR) and the University of Kentucky (UK) want the public to take part in hearing and viewing rutting elk again this year.

Last fall, KDFWR and UK personnel led free public elk tours at Cyprus-Amax Wildlife Management Area (WMA), now called Addington Enterprises WMA, allowing those interested to hear the bugle of bull elk echo through the valleys and watch them gather cows into harems.

Some observers were even able to watch bull elk vigorously clash their antlers together and

battle over cows.

This year six bulls are four years or older and 28 are three years or older. These are the big, antlered animals that will bugle and spar this fall. These adult bulls and 20 younger bulls should produce the most intense bugling sessions heard in Kentucky in more than 150 years.

For those interested, representatives from KDFWR and UK will be leading elk tours again this year at Addington Enterprises WMA near Hazard. The guided tours will be given every Saturday and Sunday morning, September 9 through October 22.

Space is limited to 25 people per day for guided tours, so anyone interested must reserve a place by calling Tia Edwards at the KDFWR Information Center at 1-800-858-1549.

Special tours for groups with

more than 10 people will also be given during the week. For group reservations, contact Dan Crank, KDFWR wildlife biologist, at 606/378-3474.

Addington Enterprises WMA is open to the public for elk viewing throughout the year. Visitors to the area must purchase a \$10 yearly area user permit and view a five-minute safety film at the guard house at the entrance to the property before entering the area. Permits are available wherever hunting and fishing licenses are sold. The permit fee will be waived for those taking a guided tour.

To reach Addington Enterprises WMA from the intersection of KY 15 and KY 80 in Hazard, travel east on 80 for 6-1/2 miles. Turn left onto KY 476 and go 3-1/2 miles. Turn right on KY 1087 and travel 3/4 mile. Turn left and follow access road to guard shack.
