Grant to pay to transport homeless vets

Mountain Comprehensive Care Center in Prestonsburg has received a \$19,500 grant to help buy a van to transport homeless veterans in Floyd, Pike, Magoffin and Martin counties to health care facilities.

Mountain Comp will also contribute \$10,500 to the \$30,000 project.

The grant, announced by U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers, is funded by the Department of Veterans Affairs' Homeless Assistance Grant Program.

"This grant will provide the resources for Mountain Comprehensive Care Center to purchase a new van to give more veterans access to vital medical services," Rogers said in a statement. "Our commitment and support for our veterans must be unwavering."

Coming to the rescue...

Rescue crews worked to remove Michael Rose from his car following a three-vehicle wreck in Prestonsburg which sent five people to the hospital with neck and back injuries Thursday morning. According to Prestonsburg Police, Rose, of Pikeville, was driving his Pontiac Grand Prix south on North Lake Drive when he ran a red light at the Music Street intersection. Rose's vehicle first grazed a Volkswagen Beetle driven by Michael Branham of Prestonsburg, who had just pulled into traffic, then veered into the northbound lane, where it struck a Chevy Blazer driven by Ricky Hughes of Prestonsburg, who had stopped for the traffic light. The collision reportedly narrowly missed a pedestrian on the adjacent sidewalk. Police were unable to estimate Rose's speed because no skid marks were left, an indicator that he had not applied his brakes. Rose, along with his wife Shirley and daughter Brittany, were taken to Highlands Regional Medical Center following the accident, as were Hughes and his son, Jason. Branham was not injured. Police said all drivers and passengers were wearing their seatbelts at the time of the accident and neither alcohol nor drugs were suspected to have been involved. Gerald Clark and Ralph Frasure of Prestonsburg Police are investigating the accident.

Money for projects passed by legislature on its way to county

Money set aside by the state legislature earlier this year for various Floyd County projects will soon be on its way to the county.

The Floyd County Fiscal Court gave County Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson the authority Wednesday to sign four agreements with the state Department for Local Government which will allow the money to be spent.

Topping the list of projects is a \$450,000 effort to expand water lines

in the county. Of that amount, \$50,000 will be spent by Prestonsburg Utilities to extend water service to the Whitaker area. The money will be used to install a new water tank, pump and lines.

Once that project is completed, the area served by Prestonsburg Utilities, covering nearly the entire northern half of Floyd County, will have water service in 98 percent of its homes, Thompson said.

The remaining \$400,000 will be used to extend water service to homes served by the newly-formed Southern Water District, which serves most of

the southern half of the county.

Although no specific areas in the Southern District were identified, Thompson has said he will release in coming weeks a five-year plan for extending water service to 95 percent of the county's homes.

Another agreement approved by commissioners will bring \$150,000 for parks and recreation improvements.

Thompson said work covered in the project includes the construction of at least five picnic shelters, as well

Free smoke detectors part of safety program

In an effort to reduce the number of fire-related fatalities in Floyd County, smoke detectors are being given away free for the asking.

FYI

Detectors are available by calling 886-9193, 886-9194 or 886-9195 on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The devices are being made available to anyone, regardless of income level, and feature top-of-the-line detectors professionally installed by local firefighters. Residents can also request as many of the detectors as they need.

The effort is part of a program being conducted by the state Department of Public Health's Injury Prevention and Research Center and is funded by the Centers for Disease Control.

The program is an attempt to increase fire safety in counties with high numbers of fire deaths and low numbers of homes with smoke detectors. According to Ron Clatos, a regional injury prevention coordinator with the Community Injury Prevention Program, between 20 and 30 percent of homes in Floyd County have no smoke detectors.

The detectors being given away feature 10-year lithium batteries which not only give the detectors long life, but also,

Locals nabbed in drug sting

The battle against drugs is still being waged in our area. Authorities in Floyd and Pike counties have been hard at work this week uncovering and exposing dirty drug dealings.

While most of us were rolling over to hit the snooze buttons on our alarms, law enforcement officials were already preparing for a day of surprise arrests.

A total of 20 arrests were made on Wednesday, all in conjunction with drug-related offenses. The arrests were the result of several months of investigation by Kentucky State Police Post 9, the Floyd County Sheriff's Office, the Pike County Sheriff's Office and the Pikeville City Police Department's K-9 squad.

The action began at 6 a.m. with Floyd County Sheriff John K. Blackburn, deputies Kevin Blackburn and Greg

Judge puts foot down over no-shows

Were you scheduled to appear in district court the morning of October 4? Did you fail to show up?

If so, you did your part to irritate District Judge James R. Allen and you need not expect to see a smiling face when next you encounter him.

Twenty-nine bench warrants were issued on Wednesday for defendants who failed to appear in court hearings before Allen. It was a situation that certainly got the judge's attention and proved to be quite unusual.

Allen issued an admonishment to the court in general that he did not take failure to appear in court lightly. He gave directions to Assistant County Attorney Jimmy R. Marcum to grant no dismissals on any failure to appear bench warrant and indicated that he would, indeed, be interested in having each person come before him to

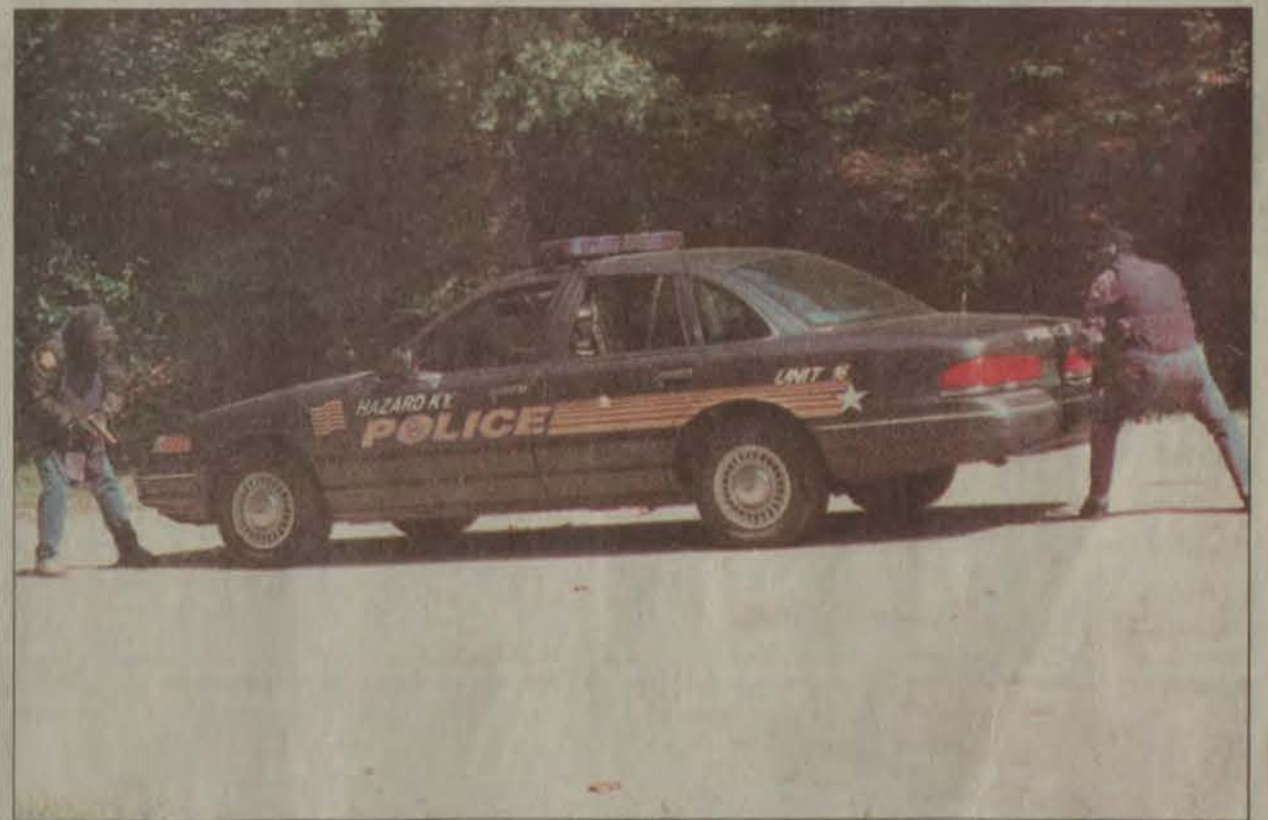

Adas Dean and Edith Burchett are a married couple who both appeared in district court before Judge James R. Allen on the morning of October 5. They both pleaded guilty to the charges before them and were each given sentences of two weeks in jail, six months probation, fines of \$550 each and court costs of \$102.85 each.

Edith Burchett asked the court for mercy because she has a 4-month-

old baby at home who is presently sick. The judge reminded her that it would have been a good idea to think of such things before attempting to break the law, but provisions for the adequate care of the child were made.

Edith Burchett is employed as an aide at Riverview Manor Nursing Home.

Roland D. Patrick was arrested at his home in Magoffin County on charges that he allegedly sold 8 ounces of marijuana to a cooperating witness working under the direction of KSP on June 28. A search warrant was also executed at Patrick's business, the Family Market, located on KY 114 on the Floyd County side of the Floyd/Magoffin line.

The Pikeville City Police K-9 force was used to sniff out and uncover drug paraphernalia, namely a glass drug pipe, that was found among clothing that was lying on a shelf inside the Family Market. Also found inside the store was marijuana that had apparently been packaged with the intent to sell.

Patrick is scheduled to appear in district court at 9:30 a.m. on November 15 to answer the charges.

Stephen Wright is accused of selling marijuana to a cooperating witness working under the direction of KSP on May 17. He is to appear in district court at 9:30 a.m. on November 8 to answer to the charges against him.

Bruce Hall has been charged with eight counts of intentionally obtain-

ing a controlled substance by withholding information that he was being prescribed similar controlled substances from multiple physicians during the same time period. The offenses allegedly occurred, respectively, on February 18, March 19, March 25, April 16, April 30, June 17, July 15 and August 19 in 1999.

He is scheduled to appear in district court at 9:30 a.m. on October 10.

Other arrests made in conjunction with the raid include:

- Scottie Duane Johnson, 18, of Pikeville, charged with cultivating marijuana.
- Rodney Akers, 34, of Pikeville, charged with first-degree trafficking of a controlled substance and trafficking of marijuana.

■ Luther "Luke" Baker, 32, of Ashcamp, charged with first-degree trafficking of a controlled substance and second-degree trafficking of a controlled substance.

■ Vince J. "Pete" Goble, 47, of Shelbyville, charged with first-degree trafficking of a controlled substance, second-degree trafficking of a controlled substance and third-degree trafficking of a controlled substance.

explain why they did not appear earlier.

Allen also indicated that he would be much more inclined to give stiffer fines and penalties in the cases than he would had they come to court at the appointed time.

Allen also noted that appearing in court is an opportunity to state your case and when one fails to appear that opportunity is lost for a time. He stressed that it is to each individual's advantage to appear in court on the correct date at the appointed time when under instruction of court order to do so.

Allen said that processing the paperwork for no-shows involves employee time and attention and that each person who fails to appear in court will be held responsible for at least court costs in order to offset that expense.

Thousands more U.S. coal miners newly eligible for free chest x-rays

More than 20,000 U.S. coal miners at nearly 600 mining operations are newly eligible to obtain free, confidential chest X-rays to detect traces of black lung disease beginning October 1, according to the U.S. Department of Labor's Mine Safety and Health Administration (MSHA).

During phase three of the Mines' Choice Health Screening, a program begun one year ago, MSHA will offer the free exams to more miners at operations in Alabama, Colorado, Illinois, Kentucky, Pennsylvania, Texas, and West Virginia, among several other states.

"Our goal is to end black lung disease," said Davitt McAteer, assistant secretary of labor for mine safety and health. "However, we need to know how widespread black lung is among today's working coal miners, and it would help us to know where those miners who may be afflicted with this

horrible disease are geographically located. Armed with that information we can better direct our resources at the problem."

MSHA randomly selects the mining operations at which miners will be eligible for the free tests each year. Eligible miners will be notified by MSHA during the upcoming fiscal year and given a list of participating medical facilities in their local area where the free chest X-rays may be taken. The X-rays may be taken at any participating medical facility nationwide.

In areas where no participating medical facility is available, mobile X-ray units will be dispatched to test eligible miners. X-rays taken are sent to the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) for examination. NIOSH will notify the tested miner of his or her results.

The free chest X-rays are confidential. Unlike a previous X-ray program that was paid for by mine operators, the new program does not involve any mine operators. Only the tested coal miner will be informed of the X-ray results. MSHA will collect statistical information on the numbers of miners being tested and those testing positive for black lung.

The agency hopes to provide the free X-rays to about one-fifth of all coal miners each year for five years so that every one of the nearly 90,000 coal miners nationwide will have the opportunity for the free exam during the five-year period.

During phase one and two of the program, which were conducted in six-month segments during the fiscal year 2000, about 60 percent of eligible coal miners took the free chest X-rays, with the exception of Kentucky, where there was a slight difference in administering the program. Unlike other states, all coal miners in Kentucky were eligible for the tests during the previous phase which ended September 30.

During the new phase, only selected miners in Kentucky will be eligible.

MSHA is encouraging all eligible coal miners to take the free chest X-rays. "There may be important medical information disclosed by these exams which could be of great concern to any coal miner and his or her family," McAteer added.

Working miners who have questions concerning the free chest X-rays

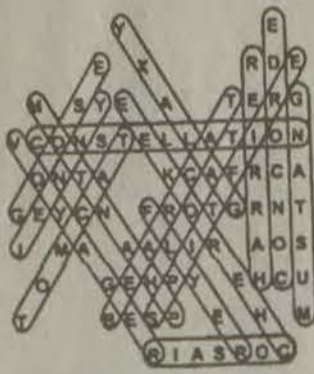
are asked to call toll-free 1-800-706-0735. Those calling after business hours are asked to leave a message to have their call promptly returned the following day. Only current, working miners are eligible for the free chest X-rays.

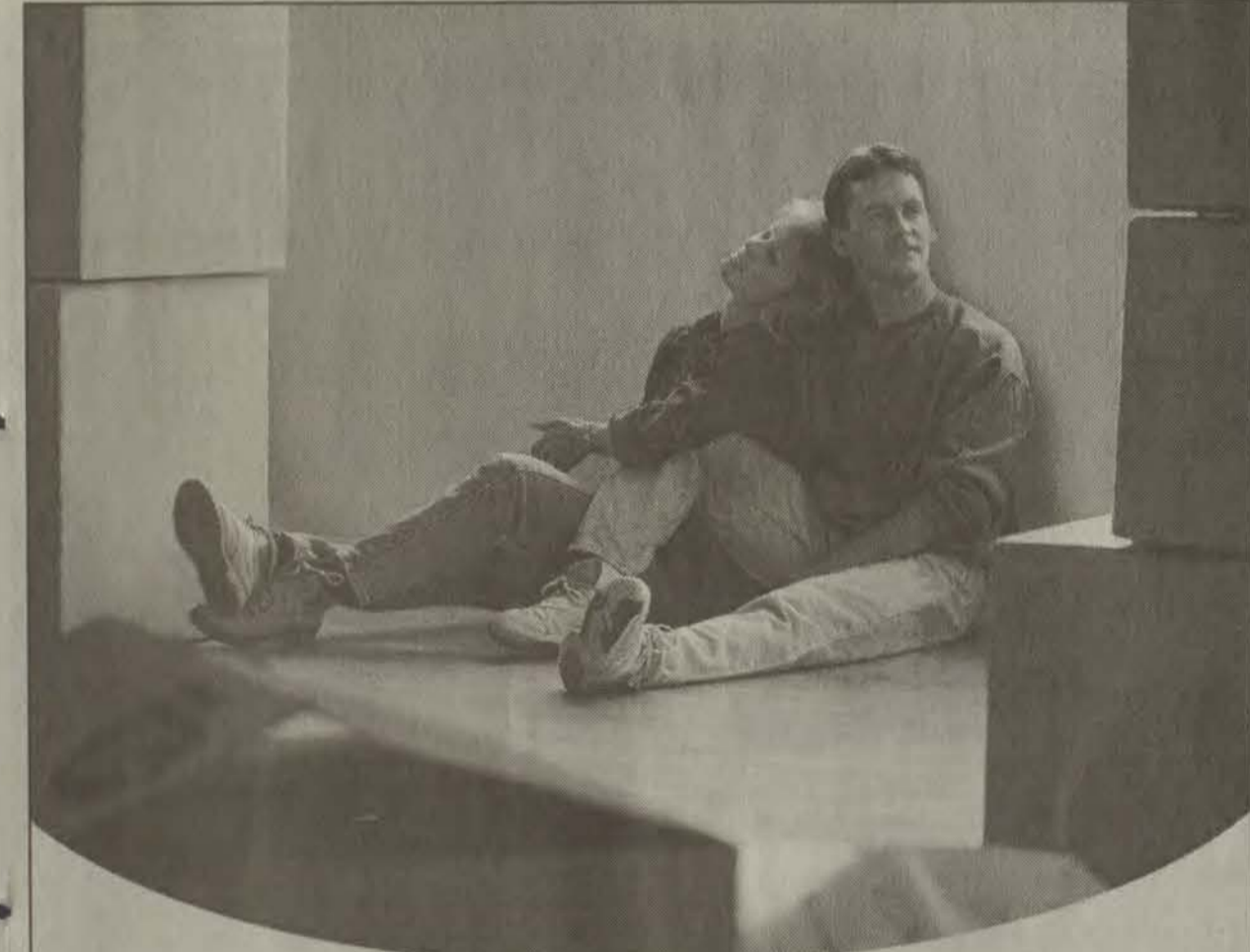

Undistributed funds

Deadbeat dads deserve all of the criticism they've received on these pages over the years.

It is inexcusable for a father — or, more rare, a mother — not to provide financial support for his or her children. It's also in violation of what the courts have ordered. It's unfair to the ex. It punishes the children. It burdens society.

But equally inexcusable is the disturbing finding that Kentucky's child-support program has failed to put millions of dollars in child support payments that the state has collected into the hands of the children the money is intended to support.

A new report, issued by the national child advocacy group Association for Children for Enforcement of Support Inc., or ACES, lists Kentucky among the nation's 10 worst states in distributing child support payments.

In all, ACES says there are \$11.1 million — more like \$10.3 million say state officials — that have been collected but not distributed in Kentucky.

Across the nation, ACES says there are some \$430 million in support payments that have been collected but not distributed.

At a time when less than a third of the non-custodial parents who are supposed to make child support payments do, it's essential that the payments that are made get into the hands of the children who need them.

We should note that Kentucky officials complained that the report by the Washington, D.C.-based advocacy group was unfair and inaccurate.

They quibbled with the amount that ACES says has not been distributed, pointing out that much of what the group says has not been distributed has been withheld for legitimate reasons, such as intercepted income tax payments, which have to be held for six months, support payments that are to be used to reimburse welfare payments, and advance payments.

And some of the problem entails finding custodial parents so that the child support that has been collected can be distributed. Some parents just can't seem to be found.

Regardless of what amount might rightfully be withheld, still there are millions of dollars in hand that need to be distributed.

And regardless of whatever obstacles to distributing it are encountered, as a collection agent for child support payments, the state must find a way to get child support payments out as efficiently and quickly as possible.

"That's a major obligation they have to fulfill," said Gary Ferguson, who heads Fathers on Rights for Custody Equality.

It's an obligation that must be met. Kids are counting on it.

School meals to go international

For over half a century, the federal government has provided nutritious meals in schools for children from low-income families. This has been one of the great government successes of the 20th century. Between the school lunch and school breakfast program, we serve nearly 35 million children a day, giving them the sustenance they need to learn and develop into productive members of society.

A few months ago, I started working with former Senators George McGovern (now the U.S. Ambassador to the U.N.'s Food and Agriculture Organization) and Bob Dole, two of the pioneers of federal nutrition programs, on an idea to use our domestic school meals effort as a model for a global initiative to feed undernourished schoolchildren.

Especially in the knowledge-based economy of the 21st century, education is a tool of upward mobility, a way for the poorest children to advance to the middle class. But in developing nations, 120 million children don't attend school, in part because their families need their labor. Millions more underperform and aren't able to get the full benefits of education, because they are trying to learn on an empty stomach.

Ambassador McGovern, Senator Dole, myself and others discussed our idea with President Clinton, who embraced it and has now announced a \$300 million Global Food for Education pilot program, which could feed as many as nine million children.

The program calls for USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation to purchase commodities—primarily soybeans, corn, wheat, rice and nonfat dry milk—from American farmers and donate them to selected countries for school and pre-school nutrition programs.

There is no one boilerplate, one-size-fits-all formula for this program. It is designed to be flexible, structured different ways in different places, tailored to the particular needs of each country involved. For example, a country could choose to have the commodities sold to pay for other important items or services, like cooking equipment, product storing,

transportation or processing.

Global Food for Education will be implemented with the help and cooperation of the U.N.'s World Food Program and various private voluntary organizations. We have yet to select the countries that will benefit. But we will target places with the most urgent need, and we will also be looking to help those who are willing to help themselves—nations willing to commit their own resources to the effort and nations already working to expand across to basic education.

Like any nutrition assistance effort, this pilot program is about more than just food. Because food is the most of basic of human essentials, Global Food for Education could create something of a ripple effect, helping battle some of the other problems of the developing world.

It will encourage more children to stay in school and reduce dependence on child labor. It has the potential to raise academic performance and increase literacy rates, thus building human capital and creating a more skilled workforce.

By furthering education, the programs could lead to expanded democratic participation and therefore more responsive and accountable public officials. Higher education and literacy rates can be an important initial step in the prevention and treatment of AIDS. And it's been demonstrated that when young girls stay in school, they bear fewer children. So our pilot program could lead to more responsible family planning, and therefore sustainable population growth and improved environmental conditions.

The United States has an important stake in the Global Food for Education program. First, as a leader in the international community, I believe we have a humanitarian responsibility to fight world hunger and malnutrition. The program also represents a domestic economic opportunity, as it will help boost farm income and relieve our farmers of some of their surpluses. We have to look at Global Food for Education as a long-term investment.

I am optimistic that it will be a success. I look forward to attracting more donors, including other developed countries, and turning this into a permanent effort, one that will both help people in need and serve American interests.

Where is freedom in the income tax debate?

The debate over income-tax cuts between George W. Bush and Al Gore reflects how far Americans have plunged in their understanding of what it means to be free.

If elected president, Bush proposes to cut income taxes by \$1.3 trillion. Gore is calling the plan "a tax cut for the rich" and has proposed his own \$500 million tax cut that purports to target the American middle class. The squabble over the details obscures the real issue that the American people should be reflecting upon — the meaning of human freedom.

When the Constitution called the federal government into existence in 1787, it failed to provide it with the power to levy taxes on income. This was not an oversight. It was commonly understood that freedom entailed the absolute right to keep everything you earned. If government had the power to take the fruits of your earnings, Americans once believed, then your position was no different than that of a slave.

That notion had been implicitly expressed 11 years before in the Declaration of Independence when Thomas Jefferson wrote that people were endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights and that among these rights were life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

Each individual is born with certain talents, qualities, characteristics and handicaps. In order to sustain his life, he uses his own personal abilities to either produce the necessities of life himself or acquire them by entering into mutually beneficial exchanges with others. The product of these exchanges constitutes income to the people engaging in them. Thus, income rightfully belongs to the person who has earned it because it is a direct result of the value that others place on the abilities that he brings to market.

For example, consider an opera singer who doesn't know anything about growing food. She offers her particular talents in the marketplace — singing in operas — and people pay to listen to her. That money rightfully belongs to her because her voice belongs to her. She takes that money — her income — and enters into exchanges with those whose talents lie in producing and selling food, clothing, and the like.

What's important to note is the revolutionary nature of American society that lived and prospered without income taxation for more than 125 years. Throughout history, governments had claimed the authority to tax or confiscate any and all of a person's income. Historically, people didn't question this power because the common belief among the citizenry was that government was supreme and the citizen was subordinate.

The Declaration of Independence and the Constitution inverted that historical relationship between government and citizen. For the first time in history, people restrained the power of government to seize any or all of their income. Thus, for more than 125 years, the American people, unlike all other people in history, were free to accumulate unlimited amounts of wealth and there was nothing their government could do about it.

Therefore, it is impossible to overstate the revolutionary significance of the Sixteenth Amendment, which was enacted in 1913 and which granted the federal government the power to levy taxes on income. From that point on, the relationship between government and citizen was inverted back to the age-old model of government as sovereign and citizen as servant. Because what mattered was not whether the particular percentage of the tax was high or low but rather that government had the power to set the percentage.

For example, let's assume that I have the power to force you to work for me and that I exercise that power by requiring you to work 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, for me. You would acknowledge that our relationship would be one of master and slave.

But suppose I decide to be nice and force you to work only two hours a day for me, four months a year. Has our relationship been changed? Not in the least. You are still my slave because I have the authority to determine the amount of time you are required to serve me.

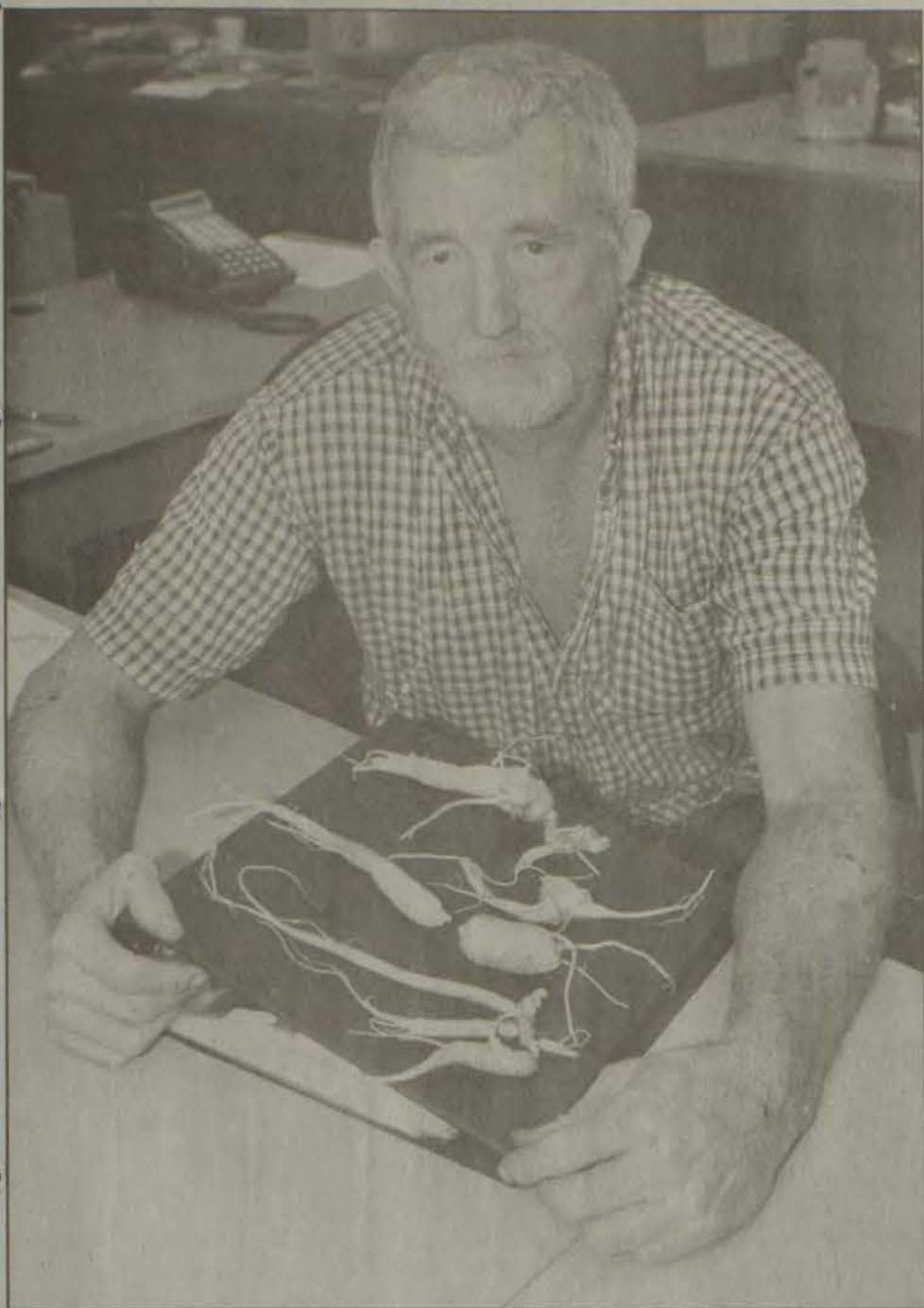

And this is the situation in which the American people are now mired. By having the power to set the percentage of tax to be levied on income, the federal government is now in the position of master and the American people are in the position of servant. Everyone's income is now effectively owned by the government and, because the government has the power to adjust the percentage of tax to be paid, what people are permitted to retain is actually just an allowance that the master provides the servants.

The tragedy is compounded by misconceptions about the nature of freedom. As the great German thinker Johann Goethe once pointed out, no person is more enslaved than one who falsely believes he is free.

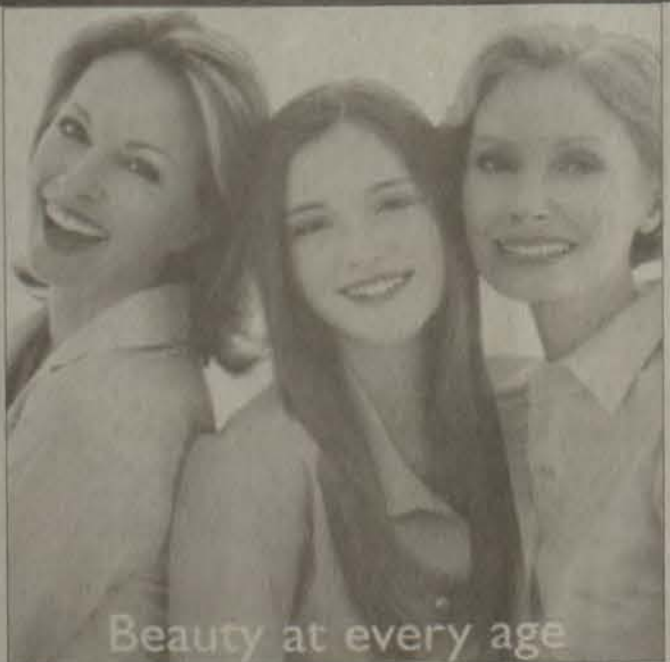

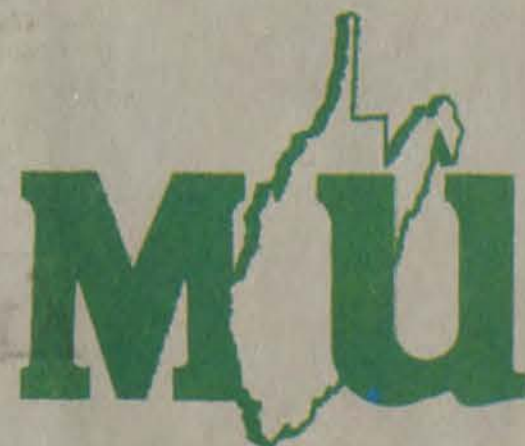

But you might want to bring a comfortable seat to get the fullest enjoyment out of the eight hours of bluegrass music that's promised as part of the Jenny Wiley Pioneer Festival.

The picking and singing starts at about 3 p.m. at the band shell in the Municipal

Parking Lot in downtown Prestonsburg.

Other members of the Monroe band are Alan Phelps on dobro, Ronnie Whitten on banjo and vocals, and Darrell Mosley, bass and vocals.

A local group that's making a name for itself nationally will also perform. Don Stanley and Middle Creek, all from Floyd and Magoffin counties, have performed from Florida to New York and points in between.

Stanley, lead vocalist and guitar player, is joined by his son, Josh Stanley, who plays upright bass and sings; Dennis Marshall, banjo picker and harmony vocal-

Vince Combs and the Shadetree Bluegrass Boys are coming from Ohio to take part in the bluegrass blast. They are well known

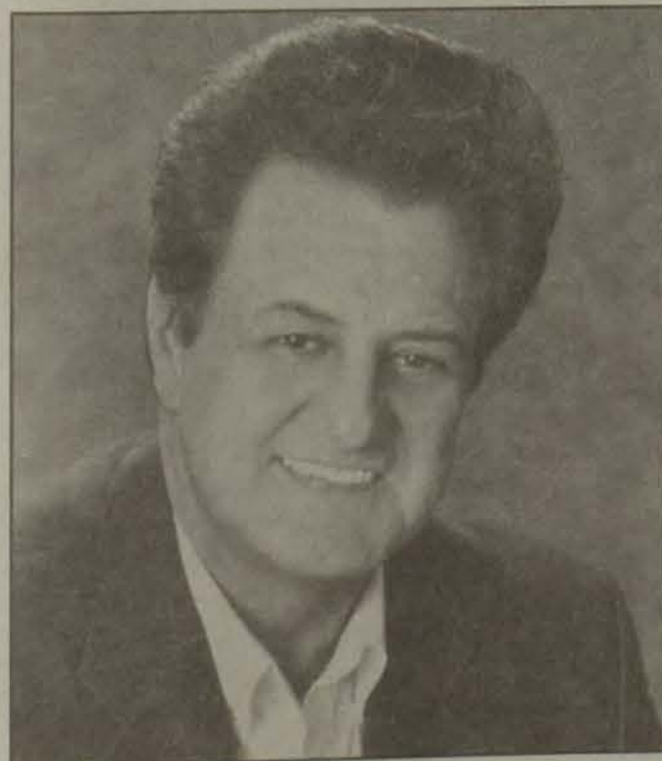
on the festival circuit.

KET airs series of election 2000 presidential debates in Oct.

Hoping to clarify their stances on important issues with American voters before the election on November 7, leading presidential candidates George W. Bush and Al Gore have agreed to participate in a series of three debates sponsored by the Commission on Presidential Debates.

Vice-presidential candidates Dick Cheney and Joe Lieberman will participate in one debate.

The first presidential debates aired on KET on October 3, and the other two will be Wednesday, October 11; and Tuesday, October 17 on a taped delay at 11 p.m. Each of the debates is followed by 30 minutes of analysis by members of The NewsHour with Jim Lehrer team.

"KET's decision to air the presidential debates on a taped basis

will provide an alternative service to those viewers not able to watch the debates live at 9 p.m. on the commercial stations," says Ginni Fox, CEO and executive director of KET. "Because of its Kentucky connection, however, we felt that it was important to air the vice-presidential debate from Centre College live as well as later in the

evening.⁸
The live vice-president debate preempts Mystery! and Fiesta in the Sky, which were originally scheduled to air on October 5, on KET.

Each of the three presidential debates will be moderated by Jim Lehrer, host of The Newshour with Jim Lehrer. Lehrer was cho-

sen as the sole presidential debate moderator during the 1996 election as well.

His unprecedented reappointment to the job has led New York Times columnist William Safire to dub Lehrer "America's Moderator" because he "has earned the trust of voters and pol[itician]s alike, and has demon-

strated his professional mastery of all three of the chosen [debate] formats." CNN's Bernard Shaw will host the vice-presidential debate.

Re-enactment marks pivotal Civil War battle

On October 8, 1862, Confederate and Union forces clashed at the Battle of Perryville. The largest military engagement in Kentucky pitted 16,000 Rebel troops against 58,000 Federals. A day of fierce fighting left 1,400 soldiers dead and dashed the Confederacy's chances of capturing Kentucky.

An annual re-enactment, scheduled this year for Oct. 7-8, recreates the bloody clash on the grounds of Perryville Battlefield State Historic Site. It is one of the few battles re-created on the original battle grounds.

Gates open at 9 a.m. Saturday. Throughout the day,

visitors will relive those* days with living history tours, period music by Saxton's Cornet Band, and household demonstrations. The battle itself will be re-enacted at 2 p.m.

At 8 p.m., ghost walks of the park will be held. A similar schedule applies for Sunday, including the battle at 2 p.m.

The event ends at 4 p.m.

Admission for either day is \$3 per car, truck, bike or motorcycle, \$10 per bus.

This year's event can be seen as a warm-up for 2002. Two years from now, Perryville will be the host for the national Civil War re-enactment.

Designing Woman

My friend Susan Stauter recently sent me a feature article that had been published in San Francisco Magazine (there was also an article in People Magazine, the one with George Clooney on the front, and an upcoming one in the November Cosmopolitan) about her jewelry-designer daughter, Jeanine Payer.

A picture of Jeanine accompanied the article, and, being a mother, Susan thought the picture was more provocative than she would have preferred. Actually, I thought the picture was beautiful and captured a glamorous innocence like Audrey Hepburn or Natalie Wood.

Jeanine designs original jewelry for the top stars, such as Harrison Ford, Mick Jagger, Susan Sarandon, Wynonna Rider, Seal, and Jessica Lange, just to name a few. Along with the article, Susan wrote her own personal critique that I found absolutely fascinating.

I thought it was particularly timely because of all the emphasis that everyone—including the presidential candidates—are putting on innovative learning techniques. And I thought you might enjoy reading about someone who pursued her dreams and

won.
 "Dear Sara,
 "Here is the San Francisco Magazine with Jeanine in it. It is all sort of amazing to us that this is happening to her; she says some days it is like she is living in a dream. Every day there is a new phone call, a new connection. She worked so hard for so long with only her dreams of the future, and now they seem to be coming true.

"It is odd seeing her in print like this. I look at the picture and it is like they have created another 'Jeanine,' a person who belongs to the media. To me, she is still my little girl who played endlessly with her dollhouse all by herself, an only child who was fascinated by tiny things. She even had a pet mouse at one time who lived in the dollhouse, and she would bring him tiny pieces of turkey on Thanksgiving and make him sit at a tiny table. We used to call her dollhouse 'Teensie Plaza.'

"Now she makes tiny things that are not so far away from the tiny accessories she made for her dolls. She once made them a set of tiny little books, along with tiny pencils that really could write. I think the whole 'impossibly small handwriting' started there.

"But the interesting thing is that when she was little and we were very poor, her dollhouse was just a piece of wood that one of the carpenters gave me from the scene shop at the theater. She had to create the whole place in her mind. She even had it worked out where the steps were and where the upper and lower levels started and stopped.

"When she finally was given a 'real' dollhouse, she didn't want to use it; she liked the one that demanded her imagination more. My friends, all of them struggling in those days, would bring her little things for

her dollhouse, and when people came over for rehearsals or parties, everybody always wanted to visit 'Teensie Plaza.'

"They would troop into her bedroom and there she was, with her cat 'Lady,' who was really a male (but who knew?). We found him scratching at the screen door one night, let him in, and he was named Lady and answered to it all his days. A little solitary child with a piece of wood for her dollhouse, full of tiny things, most of which she had made herself because we did not have the money for high-priced 'miniatures.'

"When I look at the picture of that little girl in the magazine, I remember the child who concentrated so hard and was dreaming and thinking the whole time she made little tiny books and pencils for a pet mouse and little dolls. I think that often we don't realize how important play is to children. It is their work.

"I am not talking about watching MTV or video games, but real creative play that involves using the imagination and transforming ordinary things into the dreams and visions of children. We rush them here and there, we shuffle them off to baseball games and dance class, but it is tremendously important that we allow them the space to really play, because that is the same space in which they dream. And sometimes dreams come true.

"When I see the picture of Jeanine, I think of the hard times when I was a 17-year-old mother, later raising her alone from the time she was two years old. When the politicians talk about teen mothers and how they and their children don't have a chance, I always want them to hear the story of Jeanine, who survived and triumphed over impossible odds, who taught herself how to weld and design and read books to learn her art form.

"Our society places a high value on the formal degree; we have little respect for the self-taught, the 'auto didact.' Jeanine has a high school diploma, but she knows more about keeping books and advertising and how to weld metal than anybody I know, because these things mattered to her and she wanted to learn them, she had to learn them to make her dreams come true.

"So it is interesting to look at the glamorous image on the page in the San Francisco Magazine. It will be even more interesting to see the way People Magazine portrays her. It is hard for me to believe some days that when I call her office and a well-modulated voice says 'Good morning, Jeanine Payer' that the voice is welcoming me to her business, and that her name means more than just herself.

"I suppose as a mother I will get used to it, but I have to admit, it is a strange journey, and I am not used to it yet. We laugh about how my students used to call her 'Mrs. Susan Stauter's daughter' because of the way the two words rhyme. Nowadays, I am 'Jeanine Payer's mother.'

"And we laugh about Teensie Plaza; we tell people that dollhouses can really pay off. But we are only joking. Because the image that I am always left with is of a little girl sitting in a room quietly arranging and rearranging tiny things on a piece of wood, stopping to make little things out of bits of paper and clay and carefully adding them to the mix. I never dreamed that the piece of wood the carpenter gave me that day would be the launching pad.

"And I never could have imagined that the little girl in the flannel nightgown would be the glamorous woman on the page in the magazine. It does feel like a dream some-days."

NEWS OF THE WEIRD

A New York appeals court ruled in July that a 53-year-old, serial-plastic-surgery patient, who became dissatisfied with her tucked-and-tightened body after 12 operations over a seven-year-period, could sue her doctor for malpractice, despite her consent to all surgeries, because she might suffer from the disorder that causes a person to think his body is ugly. (Doctors contacted by the New York Observer wondered which, if any, of their patients are totally free of the disorder.) The complaining patient has had work done on her nose, eyelids, chin, eyebrows, flanks, thighs, knees, breasts and tummy.

Central Illinois farmer Dan Aeschleman recently converted his land to a more lucrative use: attracting foxes and then selling their urine in pump-spray containers (\$11.95 for 16 oz.) to landowners to keep nuisance animals away with the "presence" of a predator. According to a September report in The Pantagraph newspaper of Bloomington, Illinois, Aeschleman says the tricky part — getting the non-domestic foxes to urinate in an orderly fashion and then collecting it all (10,000 gallons a year) — is a "trade secret."

THE CONTINUING CRISIS

A highlight of the East Finley Summer Festival in Claysville, Pennsylvania, in July

was the return of the popular "chicken-flying contest" after a 10-year hiatus. As explained by the Observer-Reporter newspaper of Washington, Pennsylvania, chickens are placed in ordinary mailboxes, which are then abruptly opened with a toilet plunger, which somehow sends them flying hundreds of feet, with the longest flight winning first prize. During chicken-flying's hiatus, said Festival sponsors, cow-patty bingo was featured but was not nearly as exciting.

The Al Salam Mosque Foundation filed a \$6.2 million federal lawsuit in August against Palos Heights, Illinois, which had reneged on a promise to pay the Muslim group \$200,000 to change its mind about buying a local building and converting it to a place of worship. The city council had made the cash offer, reportedly, because some council members preferred not to have such a prominent Muslim presence in the town. Then, when the Foundation accepted the cash offer, the Palos Heights mayor vetoed it, complaining that the offer was an "insult" to the Muslims.

The Kentucky group that's hit it big on both the rock and country music charts will perform at 8 p.m.

Formed in Berea in 1963 as the Exiles, the band went singular in name and hit the rock charts in the late 1970s, topping the charts with "Kiss You All Over" in 1978.

"An Innovative Spirit: The Southern Highland Craft Guild Celebrates 70 Years," a traveling exhibition, opens at the Kentucky Folk Art Center in Morehead on Thursday, October 12. This landmark exhibition is made up of 92 works produced in Southern Appalachia during the last seven decades.

An Innovative Spirit highlights the accomplishments of the Southern Highland Craft Guild and its members, with traditional and non-traditional objects made by more than 90 different crafts men and women, between 1930 and 2000.

The exhibition demonstrates the gradual evolution of certain craft forms over this 70-year period, explores issues of tradition and innovation, and illustrates changes that have taken place in the use of materials and design.

"If there is one constant in the objects made in this region over the past 300 years, it is innovation and change," writes Robert S. Brunk, in the exhibition catalogue. "The objects made by Guild members over the past 70 years are part of a much longer continuum of cultural memory, assimilation and invention. Why are we surprised that the objects keep changing? Are we afraid that something will be lost if we don't see objects familiar to us?"

Since its founding in 1930, the guild has nurtured the creative skills and promoted the work of craftspeople from 293 mountain counties in nine southern states, and has served as a model for many similar crafts organizations formed elsewhere in the country.

The guild's mission has been to bring together the crafts and craftspeople of the Southern Highlands for the benefit of shared resources, education, marketing and conservation. The organization's education role resulted in the development of this important exhibition.

"An Innovative Spirit: The Southern Highland Craft Guild Celebrates 70 Years," will be on display at the Kentucky Folk Art Center, through December 22. The Center, located at 102 West First St. in Morehead, is open Monday-Saturday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Sundays, 1-5 p.m.

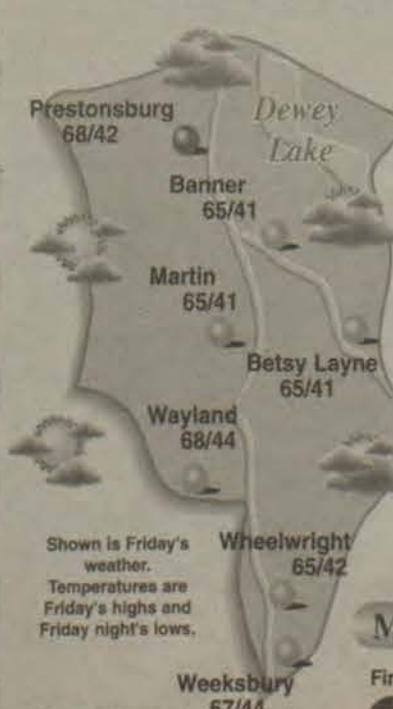

CRITTERS CORNER

I was concerned because I couldn't come up with this week's topic. Unfortunately, I now have a topic and wish I didn't.

One of my friends at church told me this morning that she had witnessed an act of cruelty this week, and was unable to do anything about it; the incident has haunted her ever since.

Seems that earlier this week, Gloria saw a man pull over on the other side of the road, across from the Wayland Methodist Church, and set a small dog on the ground. She assumed that the dog needed to relieve itself or was carsick, and the man was trying to keep it from making a mess in the car. She said the man then took a few steps back, ran at the dog and kicked it several feet, into the ditch, as if it were a football. He then got in the car and sped off. The dog ran after him, still faithful to his abuser.

Gloria lives on the hill and was too far away to get the license number, and was too shocked to yell at the man (not that it would have done any good, except to make her feel better). She does know it was a small blue car, possibly a Chevette, and has a fair description of the man.

The dog ran out of sight behind the

car, and Gloria had not seen it since. When she described it, however, I recognized it immediately as the small black-and-tan mixed breed I had seen several times this week. I thought it must belong to one of the neighbors, since I only saw it occasionally.

It doesn't do any good to question how someone could do this; we know all too well that it happens, and happens more often than we care to admit. I am also well aware that this man likely has returned home to behave the same way toward his wife and children.

And what a slap in God's face! To abuse His creations in His front door! (Not that where it happened is really important, but it seems to flaunt disrespect).

The dog is safe now, and sheltered. She is very loving and sweet when she has every reason to be otherwise. We are calling her "Lace," after an abused child who was a character in the Mitford series of books. She will no longer have anything to fear from the humans in whom she puts her trust. We really don't deserve dogs.

Before my blood pressure gets so high the top of my head

blows off, I'm switching to a discussion of what can be done about things like this. In Gloria's case, there probably wasn't anything else she could have done, since she could not read the license plate and did not recognize the man. This is a violation of the law, however, and it is something that can and should be prosecuted.

The Kentucky State Law which covers this is found in KRS 525.125 (a), which states in part: "A person is guilty of cruelty to animals in the second degree when...he intentionally or wantonly subjects any animal to or causes cruel or injurious mistreatment through abandonment..."

Cruelty to animals in the second degree is a Class A misdemeanor. It is punishable by up to one year in prison and/or a \$500 fine.

If you witness an act of cruelty or know of ongoing neglect or mistreatment of animals, you have several options. Either the Sheriff's office or the State Police can be contacted, and they will often investigate. Alternatively, you can work through the County Attorney's office to obtain a warrant.

The downside is that you do have to get involved if you want to follow through with prosecution. There has to be evidence

and/or testimony as to the abuse or neglect; you can't really make a complaint and not follow through with it.

The legal system can only do so much on its own.

Also, realize that the police are usually dealing with many other pressing matters. Animal cruelty cases tend to become low priority, not because the police are unsympathetic, but because traditionally, these cases are started with an emotional flurry, and then fizzle out as the witnesses contemplate having to testify.

Please keep in mind that an abused animal often is a red flag that spousal/child abuse is also occurring in that family. It wouldn't hurt to put in a call to Social Services too, especially if children are present. This agency is also overworked, and may not be able to investigate without more concrete evidence, but they have been alerted, and the call may add evidence to an ongoing case.

Many communities have begun to use cross-reporting between Animal Control and Social Services workers for the benefit of both agencies.

Violence and abuse are out there; they are all around us. At some point you will probably have to deal with them on some level. As long as people are outraged when they see a dog being kicked, realize that something should be done, and have the courage to do something when they can, there is hope for us as a species.

Norman Mailer, Pulitzer Prize-winning author and intellectual provocateur, is the subject of an exclusive interview featured on American Masters, the award-winning series of documentary profiles examining the lives of important figures and their impact on the nation's cultural landscape.

Ambitious, politically

involved and prone to controversy, Mailer has profoundly influenced contemporary American literature and thought. A Harvard graduate, he joined the Army during World War II to write a great war novel. The result, "The Naked and the Dead" (1948), became a critical and popular success, selling 200,000 copies in its first year and launching Miller, then only 25, to overnight fame.

Mailer went on to pen a collection of essays, articles

and stories, "Advertisements for Myself" (1959); "Barbary Shore" (1951), a Cold War allegory; and what is widely regarded as his best book, "The Deer Park" (1955), in which he explored the themes of sex, politics and money against the backdrop of Hollywood.

During these years, Mailer also helped found the Village Voice and for two years wrote a column expounding his philosophy of "hip" or "American exis-

tentialism"—a form of rebellion for a generation threatened by nuclear war.

Mailer won his first Pulitzer Prize with "The Armies of the Night" (1968). His second came in 1980 for "The Executioner's Song" (1979), an account of convicted murderer Gary Gilmore.

Mailer has led an active personal and professional life. Married six times and the father of nine children, he ran for mayor of New York in 1969 and has con-

tinued to write prolifically. Now approaching 80, Mailer still lives in Brooklyn, where he grew up.

an irregularity with a prescription. And "physician's assistant" imposter Gary Lee Stearley received excellent reviews from several doctors at Mercy Hospital, Pittsburgh, in June before being detected; he had previously "worked" hospitals in Seattle, Richmond and Washington, D.C.

No Substitute for a Loyal Dog: Sevier County (Tennessee) sheriff's dog Kysor was praised in a July Knoxville News-Sentinel report as so faithful that he withstood a stab wound to the head from a fleeing suspect, hard enough that the blade broke off, in order to maintain his grip. However, after the man plunged the knife in, he tried to sic his own dog on the weakened Kysor, but, according to a deputy, "He whistled for him, but his dog wouldn't come."

Forget About Asking Him to Consider a Trigger Lock for His Gun: In June, a federal grand jury in Springfield, Missouri, indicted Todd Morman Murray, 27, on charges that he stole 45 pounds of explosives from a chemical plant and "hid" them in his children's playhouse.

REVOKE THEIR PARENTING LICENSES!

According to Martinsville, Indiana, prosecutors, Judy Kirby, 31, mother of 10, intentionally

killed four of them in March after she drove into oncoming traffic for more than two miles and struck a minivan (also killing three of its occupants); her doctors say they will testify at her upcoming trial that she suffered from postpartum depression and should not be punished. And Jeane Newmaker, 46, was charged in Golden, Colorado, in September with child abuse for going along with a "therapy" in which four practitioners squashed her 10-year-old adopted daughter to death; the "therapists" were "rebirthing" the child (supposedly to compensate for an abusive biological mother) by getting her to simulate escaping the womb, but they accidentally suffocated her despite her more than 50 pleas for help over a 70-minute session.

HUMANS DISRESPECTING TRAINS

A young man suffered a broken arm when he was walking so close to railroad tracks that a passing train violently knocked his surfboard out of his hands (San Clemente, California, June). And a 25-year-old woman lost the toes on her right foot when she crawled under a slow-moving train as a shortcut to the correct platform (Mount Prospect, Illinois, July). And an inebriated man's life was

saved by his wife, who pulled him just in time from the path of a speeding train after he had lingered on the tracks to make an obscene gesture at the conductor (Trevor, Wisconsin, June).

LESSON TO KIDS: BE A TOTAL SCREW-UP, MAKE MILLIONS!

According to news reports in July and August, Mack W. Metcalf, 42, of Florence, Kentucky, has led a dismal life that included frequent drinking binges, some DUI and other traffic charges, drug selling, eviction for failure to pay rent, and a debt of \$31,000 in back child support. However, in July, he won a \$34 million lump-sum jackpot in the Kentucky Lottery. (His haplessness continues: Shortly after he was paid, he handed a woman \$500,000 as a gift, but later realized he was drunk and has now sued to get the money back.)

The Classic Middle Name (all-new): Arrested for killing his roommate (San Diego, August): Aryan Wayne Duntley. Arrested for killing a young neighbor girl (Oilton, Oklahoma, August): Robert Wayne Rotramel. Sentenced for murdering and

beheading a 20-year-old woman (Orange, Texas, July): Christopher Wayne Gregory. Application for DNA testing rejected in a murder case against him (Illinois, August): Randall Wayne Stevens. Convicted in the murders of five people at a car wash (Irving, Texas, September): Robert Wayne Harris.

LEAST JUSTIFIABLE HOMICIDES

Killed over Access to Mating: Edward William Heckman, 58, was charged in July near Jonesboro, Georgia, with killing his wife after she refused to have sex with him. Baby sitter Robert Cooper, 22, was convicted in June in Calgary, Alberta, of killing two young boys because they hindered his attempted seduction of their mother. A man in his 20s allegedly killed 11 people with an Uzi at a Bogota, Colombia, nightclub in

June after rejection by a woman.

ALSO, IN THE LAST MONTH ...

An off-duty police officer reporting for an MRI while armed had the superpowerful magnet suck his gun away and slam it against the machine, causing one round to fire into a wall (Rochester, New York). Singapore's leading newspaper published a how-to guide to having sex in cars, in support of the government's campaign to raise the birth rate. The mayor of a French resort town, which has no cemetery vacancies and a restrictive land-use law, prohibited dying except by people with burial space (Le Levandou).

The familiar story then follows the young Oliver from the public workhouse, where he is banished at age 9, to an apprenticeship with an undertaker and, eventually, the streets of London. Here he falls in with Fagin's gang and the infamous Bill Sikes. The colorful cast of characters includes the prostitute, Nancy, and the mysterious figure of Monks, who has an unaccountable grudge against the orphan.

"Oliver Twist," Dickens' second novel, was serialized in gripping monthly installments from 1837-1839. The young

Queen Victoria was one of millions who found this tale "excessively interesting."

Frontline on KET examines history of America's 30-year war on drugs

Frontline examines America's 30-year fight to stop the flow of illegal drugs into its borders with a special two-part program, "Drug Wars," airing Monday, October 9, and Tuesday, October 10, at 9 p.m. on KET.

Produced in collaboration with National Public Radio, the documentary interviews high-level government officials, Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) agents, drug lords, smugglers and users.

"While we are breaking new ground by looking at the political economy of the narcotics business, we are also taking a much needed step back," says series reporter Lowell Bergman, discussing the objectivity he feels is necessary to evaluate the nation's drug problem.

First, "Drug Wars" details how the war on drugs evolved from a war on crime waged during the Nixon years. U. S. servicemen in Vietnam were quickly developing

heroin habits, and Nixon's men reponded with controversial methadone treatment programs.

Then, the program documents the rise of the cocaine business in the 1970s and '80s and the inability of America's growing law enforcement community to counter the increasing flow of marijuana and cocaine. Then crack changed everything, forcing the nation's DEA agents to confront a new, more deadly drug—and a new order of drug

dealers.

Finally, "Drug Wars" reveals how U.S. efforts to stem the drug flow from Mexico in the 1990s were hindered by rampant corruption and collaboration between high-level Mexican officials and the country's drug smugglers.

Perhaps the most surprising thread running through "Drug Wars" is the consensus among drug enforcement officials interviewed that the strategy of interdiction and stiffer sentencing

should be replaced with one that emphasizes drug treatment, education and prevention. These were, ironically, the hallmarks of the original drug strategy begun under President Nixon.

The documentary examines influential politicians' defections from traditional parties, including Theodore Roosevelt's leaving the GOP to found and run under the Bull Moose Party in 1912, and the 1948 defection of both Strom Thurmond's Dixiecrats and Henry Wallace's Progressives from the Democratic Party.

Independent candidates' most notable successes are also explored, from George Wallace's winning 13 percent of the vote on the American Independent Party ticket in 1968 to independent candidate Ross Perot's claiming 18 percent of the popular vote in 1992.

Rural America preserved at 30th annual Bob Evans Farm festival

The year was 1971. The 26th Amendment lowered the voting age in the United States to 18. All in the Family and Masterpiece Theatre made their television premieres, first class postage increased to eight cents, soft contact lenses received FDA approval, and a new tradition was beginning at the Bob Evans Farm in Rio Grande, Ohio.

That was the year when Bob Evans Farms began what would become an annual celebration of the harvest season, inviting friends and neighbors "down on the farm" to experience the rural America of yesteryear.

Old favorites like the Hank Peters Lumberjack Show and the Reno Family Horseshoe Pitchers that have returned for more than a decade continue to draw large crowds.

The musical entertainment still features local artists and has expanded to include renowned groups

like The Rarely Herd, Jerry Weaver's Goodtime Jazz Band and The Original Briarhoppers.

The three-day festival, billed as "a weekend of fun for friends and family of all ages," invites visitors to enjoy the simple pleasures of the pioneer homestead, according to Bob Evans Farm Manager Ray McKinniss. "It's a unique event that celebrates tradition and offers a nostalgic journey into the past," he said. "For 30 years, the festival has preserved the rural heritage of this area for generations that otherwise might not have the chance to appreciate it."
