Turner joins treasurer in search

State Sen. Johnny Ray Turner of Drift has teamed up with state Treasurer Jonathan Miller to help find the owners of millions in unclaimed money and other property.

Miller enlisted Turner's help during a reception sponsored by the National Association of State Treasurers Wednesday evening in Frankfort.

Miller said that \$40 million in assets sits in the state's Unclaimed Property Fund, waiting to be returned to owners.

"Kentuckians don't need a flashy game show or Regis Philbin to be a quick cash winner," Miller said. "Thousands are owed money or other assets from the state's Unclaimed Property Fund. We need the help of local legislators to return money to residents who are entitled to it."

Turner received a list of Floyd Countians named in

Burglars go on spree through county

Three businesses — Nelson-Frazier Funeral Home, Floyd Funeral Home, and Mountain Comprehensive Care's greenhouse in Prestonsburg — were burglarized Tuesday night and early Wednesday morning.

Robbers gained entry through a side door of the sales office at the Mountain Comprehensive Care's greenhouse. The door was apparently kicked open leaving a door facing split and a muddy footprint plastering an area close to the doorknob outside.

According to greenhouse supervisor Ralph Frazier, several items were taken but, other than a broken door facing, little damage was actually done to the building or the premises.

Among the items taken were a microwave, a toaster, a VCR, a lawn mower and various tools.

The items were stolen from the work area, located near the back of the sales office, sometime during the night.

The loss is estimated to cost, according to Kentucky State Police reports, around \$475.

Along with the Greenhouse, two local funeral homes were robbed as well Tuesday night and early Wednesday morning.

Roger Nelson of Nelson-Frazier Funeral Home spent most of Wednesday morning helping his staff clean and

repair extensive damage to a front office. "There were things taken, but most of it was damage," Nelson explained. "A typewriter was destroyed. Of course, the window was damaged and the Venetian blind. There were some silver medallions in the drawer that's not there anymore. And probably close to a hundred dollars."

According to Nelson, the total dam-

age, combined with the money taken, will cost an estimated \$2,000 to replace and repair.

Nelson explained that they became aware that someone had broken in at around 4:30 Wednesday morning as they received a death call and responded.

A concrete block from a walk just out-

Slickened highways kill one

Unexpected freezing rain and snow, which sent the Highway Department rushing to get salt trucks to assist drivers, disabled highways early Thursday morning resulting in a car accident in Millard that left two men injured and one dead.

As commuters crept slowly along work routes, negotiating poor road conditions and driving with extra caution, one man was minutes away from falling victim to unforgiving bad weather in a fatal crash.

The accident occurred at approximately 7:45 a.m. along US 460 when Joe D. Slone, 32, of Pikeville lost control of his 1989 Oldsmobile along the snow-covered road. In an attempt to regain control, he crossed into the east-bound lane and struck a guardrail before re-entering the road.

As Slone re-entered, traveling west in the eastbound lane, he struck a 1992 Chevrolet truck driven by William Cobb, 33, of Salyersville, and his pas-

Shortfall growing; options limited

Kentucky's Medicaid shortfall is \$21.4 million larger than originally estimated, bringing the total of additional money needed to run the program this year to \$82.2 million, said State Budget Director Jim Ramsey.

Ramsey said the state has met with many groups, including Medicaid providers, to try to come up with solutions to deal with the soaring costs.

He presented the Senate Health and Welfare Committee with several possibilities the state is looking at to cut the costs and address the problem. But he stressed none of the options have been decided upon.

"This is not the final deal," Ramsey said. "We are looking for input, we are looking for ideas."

One option that is being discussed, Ramsey said, is intergovernmental transfers. In that process, money that has already been allotted to something

Board ready to seek bids for SFHS football field

In its third meeting in less than two weeks, the Floyd County Board of Education reconvened late Wednesday afternoon in a 5:30 p.m. meeting held in the Adams Middle School Library.

All board members were present, and, shortly after convening, agreed to meet in executive ses-

sion to discuss litigation, property, and personnel matters with board attorney Mike Schmitt.

Upon reentry into the public forum, the board was addressed by its architect, Joe Jones, who recommended that authorization be given to begin advertising for bids in Kentucky news services in regard to the South Floyd High School athletic project.

Jones informed the board that

the Kentucky Department of Education required advertisements to be run for a minimum of 21 days before the review and acceptance of any incoming bids.

"We have been waiting for the legal title to the land, and now we have it," said Jones. "Now we just need to be given the authorization to take bids. I recommend that that authorization be given."

The board issued a unanimous vote in favor of bid authorization.

Next on the agenda, Supt. Paul Fanning introduced finance director, Matt Wireman, with a request to Wireman "to refresh our memories" in regard to discussions held this past Saturday, as another "work" session was introduced for further discussion.

Wireman informed the board that he had collected further data

in regard to the "pay-off" amounts of board loans and retirement incentives.

Wireman said that the KISTA (retirement incentive) bonds would pay off next year, so therefore, it would not be "cost-effective to pay these bonds off now."

Wireman, however, did say that in connection with other

else in the budget would be transferred to the Medicaid program. That would earn the state some money because the more that is in Kentucky's Medicaid program, the more money that it will earn in federal matches, Ramsey said. But, he said, the IGT had to be done cautiously. Any money the federal government gives in matching funds has to be used for the Medicaid program.

The state is also looking at regulations and legislation such as enacting co-pays or

generic prescriptions that they hope would shave some of the costs.

But even if the General Assembly and the state enacted all the possibilities being discussed, Kentucky would still come up almost \$26 million shy of what it needs to run this year's program.

And, the only savings the cabinet felt the state could count on for sure was a \$3.1 million reduction in dispensing fees for pharmacies, which may be reversed by legislation

this year.

The Senate Health and Welfare Committee passed Senate Bill 107 Thursday, which would return the dispensing fees to \$4.75 for regular prescriptions and \$5.75 for long term care prescriptions. The fee had been dropped to \$4.51 for all prescriptions in January because of a study that said the fee being paid was too high.

Denton, who sponsored the bill, said she understood the financial strain the Medicaid program is under right now, but that she didn't feel it was fair to balance the budget on the backs of one group.

Many of the legislators said the study was flawed. They said the cabinet used an incorrect definition of the word "average," and said that led to the lower costs estimates.

Several lawmakers were also concerned that they had

not been more involved in the decision-making process to lower the cost once the study was done.

But not everyone approved of the legislation. Senate

Minority Floor Leader David Karem said that he agreed that the cabinet used the wrong definition of average, but was against legislation that would go back and change something

that has already been done.

"I think this over-reaches," said Karem, D-Louisville. "It's more than swatting someone on the wrists who are trying to do their job."

side the funeral home was found in the front office, having apparently been hurled through a broken window near the desk.

The lock was broken on the desk and the drawers had been tossed, but Mr. Nelson found it strange that certain items were overlooked.

"They must have had the lights off because you can see right here is an expensive camera they could have taken," Nelson said, pointing out a camera sitting atop a filing cabinet. "They didn't take the collection money right beside the window. They just went through

the drawers and the money bags looking for money."

When asked if he felt the vandalism and theft of his funeral home and that of Floyd Funeral Home could be related, Nelson commented that he had talked with Floyd Funeral Home and felt the same procedure was undertaken at both places.

Corey Vickers at Floyd Funeral Home related many of the same details of their burglary in an interview Wednesday afternoon.

"They went through every drawer we got, but they didn't

vandalize anything," Vickers said. "All they did was take a small amount of cash ... and a couple of items that were associated with the cash — deposit books — that just happened to be in the pouch that the cash was in."

Vickers went on to say that although there had been no damage, unlike Nelson-Frazier, it seemed logical that two funeral homes being burglarized the same night would indicate a connection.

Detective Lee Weddington

of the Kentucky State Police continues to investigate the Floyd Funeral Home and Nelson-Frazier burglaries, and Detective Joey Howard, also with the Kentucky State Police, is investigating the burglary at Mountain Comprehensive Care's greenhouse. There are no suspects in any of the three at this time.

Kentucky State Police asks that anyone who has information concerning the burglaries contact them at 433-7711 or toll-free at 1-800-222-5555.

sury.com. Turner also said local residents can contact their county clerk's office or call the state treasurer's office at 1-800-465-4722.

Unclaimed property typically involves items left forgotten in safety deposit boxes, or cash from unclaimed payroll and vendor checks, much of which is stored in a vault beneath the Capitol grounds.

right back into the classroom, and not miss a beat," he said.

Next, Joyce Watson, interim director of instruction, was next to address the board, informing them that she had again met with the county's principals to further discuss staffing considerations. Watson commented that staffing was much easier accomplished in P-8 schools, than in P-5 schools, but that, nonetheless, the "open conversations with the principals has been very valuable."

Watson further said that to accomplish desirable staffing in each school, that costs would not be proportionate to current allocated funds. Watson had compiled, in working with the principals, several different staffing options which she presented to the board with the use of overhead projections.

When asked by the board which of the options was most favored by the principals, Watson replied, with a very large smile, "Option 1 - the 'dream sheet.' All the principals want to work toward (the utilization of) option 1, and they are willing to take any money from anywhere."

In response, Supt. Fanning said that "we would have to deal with local revenue issues in a very aggressive manner in order to accomplish option 1."

Option 1 offers a student-teacher ratio that enables smaller class sizes and thereby, more individualized instruction. It also offers permanent staffing in related arts.

Phil Paige, director of human

resources, next presented a revised worksheet analysis of total staffing allocations.

Paige told the board that a revision of this work sheet had resulted in "big changes" in high school program staffing, as well as in primary staffing.

The revised analysis gave each county school "in the neighborhood of a 22-1" student-teacher ratio.

Board member Johnnie Ross asked if this analysis could be effectively used as a "guide" for site-based decision-making councils, and Supt. Fanning replied that "perhaps, not so much as a 'guide,' but rather, a perspective."

Board member Carol Stumbo asked Paige, in regard to the numbers shown on the analysis, as well as in regard to "McDowell, Osborne and South Floyd schools, make it real for me."

Paige answered, after a brief pause, "Carol, that's really a question for a council."

Stumbo then replied, "A 'point 3' counselor or a 'point 3' media staffer, tells me that we are a long way off from where we need to be."

Paige then commented that he felt the questions Stumbo had in regard to staffing figures were "really financial questions, Matt (Wireman) would be more able to answer those than I would."

Paige told the board that an implementation of Option 1 would "add about 24 staff members."

"I think I could do this; if I were told to implement this plan in two years, I think I could do

it," Paige said.

As the discussion continued and remarks were made in connection with Title I funds, Glen Hendrix, curriculum consultant for the state management team, commented that "if you can't staff with regular allocated funds, then you can do it with grants, etc. But, you cannot mix allocated funds with Title funds."

Supt. Fanning then commented that when schools are "given all resources, they can then allocate."

In regard to the implementation of Option 1, Stumbo said that to do so "will take time."

Ross then commented that "Yes, it will take time, it will take a long time, that's why we need to start now."

In a final comment to the board, Paige said that he felt that, "Analysis 3, revised, is best for the coming year based on the amount of funding we have." He also commented that he would like to see more funding in the high schools, that it was encouraged that the greater majority of Title I money be spent in the lower grades, and that less of it be spent in the higher grades, but that he still, however, would like to see more funding going into the high schools.

"I would like to see this county offer a Commonwealth's diploma, and I would like to see more funding in the elementary-related arts," Paige said.

The board will meet again in a regularly scheduled meeting that will be held on Monday, February 26, at May Valley Elementary School in Martin.

Cleaning Kentucky

To those who take their weekly trash pick-ups for granted, the Kentucky legislature's debate over statewide, mandatory garbage collection is confounding.

Why wouldn't people want their garbage hauled away? What is preferable about throwing it deep into the backyard or loading it into the car and taking it somewhere else?

And yet, objections continue. Last week, as a House committee considered the Gov. Paul Patton's proposal, lawmakers examined it line by line with a caution rarely employed. Their wariness was obvious.

Rep. Woody Allen worried that putting garbage out for collection, as is done throughout the United States, would allow dogs and other animals to get to it and make an even bigger mess.

Reps. Robin Webb and Keith Hall both registered that they were "very concerned about personal property rights" — as if the damage done by discarded pesticide cans, paint and batteries doesn't affect anyone but the landowner.

In the past few years, Gov. Patton and House Majority Floor Leader Greg Stumbo have offered various plans for cleaning up Kentucky. Central to both of their strategies has been a requirement for universal garbage collection.

This session, the Governor's version offers the more practical approach. It would rid the state of illegal dumps, which hurt economic development and tourism, and push the responsibility for garbage collection to counties, where it belongs.

Oddly enough, what should be the central piece — mandatory door-to-door garbage collection — appears to be absent. Yet that probably won't interfere with achieving the goal.

A county could be exempted from door-to-door pick-up only if it cleaned up all of its illegal dumps and then remained clean. If a county's actions fail to meet that test when the state re-evaluates every year, says Natural Resources Secretary James Bickford, the offending county would then be forced to clean up the Governor's way — by providing weekly door-to-door collection.

This ensures that, one way or another, Kentucky will be cleaner. No doubt, many of the counties now resisting door-to-door collection will end up with exactly that kind of plan. The counties with the greatest number of illegal dumps, for instance, probably won't have the resources to clean them up by the Jan. 1, 2003 deadline. Counties with more manageable problems could experiment with other approaches to curbing illegal dumps, although it's perplexing, in this day and age, why they would want to try.

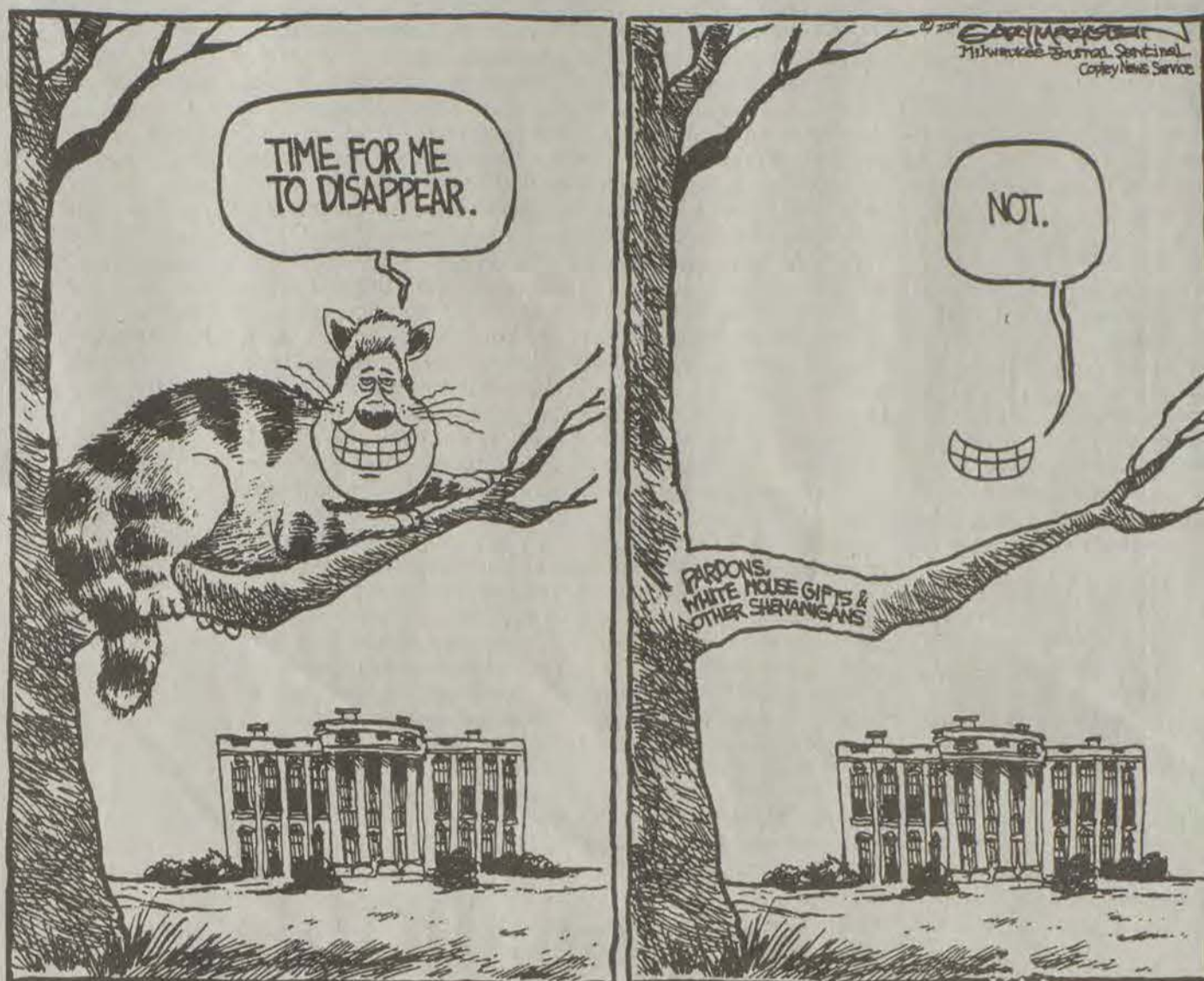
The Governor's proposal, HB 237, is not the strongest, most comprehensive plan possible, but it still represents a big step forward. Even so, some House members are threatening to diminish it through amendments. They don't like, for example, the penalties counties would suffer for not cleaning up.

But garbage collection is nothing to fear. It's a service lawmakers should be eager to bring to their constituents.

Kentuckians fool themselves if they equate their rebelliousness about trash collection to some noble, independent streak worthy of Daniel Boone.

Actually, the refusal to handle garbage in a healthful, community-wide fashion is something very different: backward behavior that betrays the pioneers who risked and endured so much to achieve a better life.

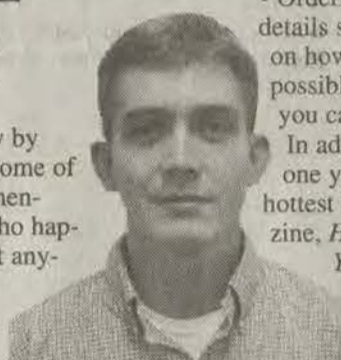

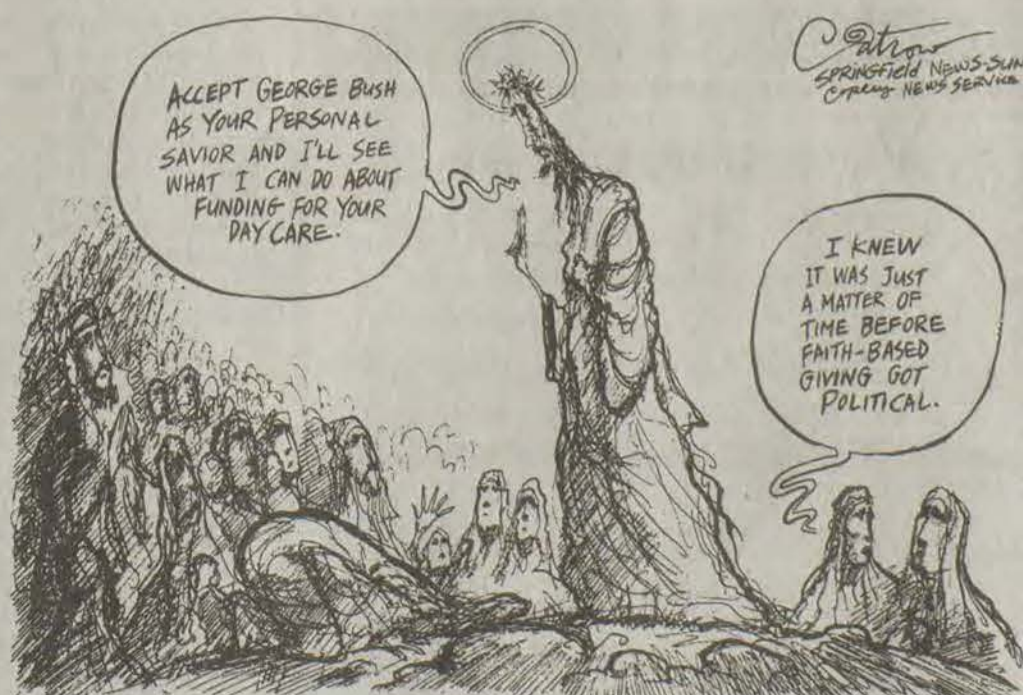

Branham led Pikeville with 15 points. Chase Gibson tossed in 13 with Matt Corbin scoring eighth.

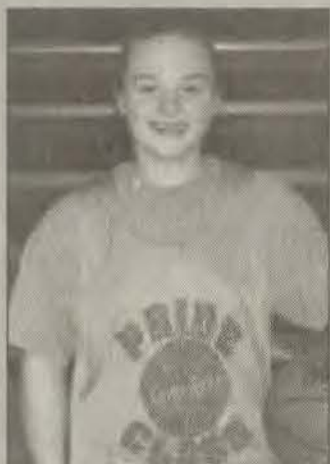

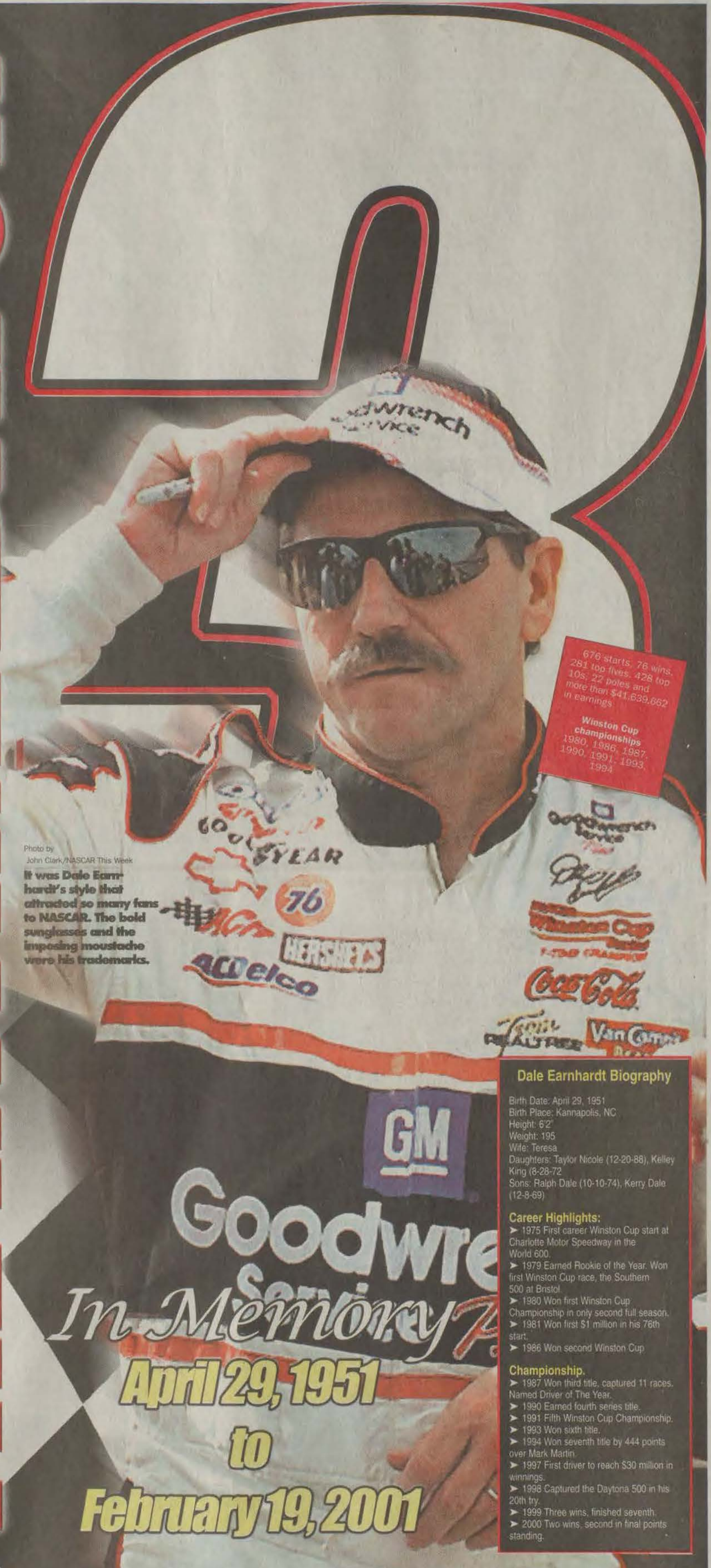

Critter Corner

THE NOTEBOOK:

When I first started practice, I would be asked a somewhat odd question from time to time, or something would happen that would defy explanation. Rabies clinics, especially, seemed to be the source of lots of these anecdotes. After driving miles and miles of back roads in the blazing sun and/or pouring rain (usually while running late), and switching repeatedly between being furiously busy and bored silly, everyone is starting to get slap-happy. Misspelled signs, unusual lawn decorations and the ingenuity of home-made cat carriers become a source of entertainment. If a dog lifts its leg and urinates in someone's sock, the moment is relived over and over the rest of the day. Eventually, I started writing things down in a spiral-bound notebook. (We always refer to it as "THE NOTEBOOK"; officially it has another name, but it's probably best just to let that one alone). We kept this notebook handy and carried it faithfully on Rabies Clinics for twelve years or so. Some of the incidents were out-and-out hilarious; others were only funny if you were there. A few entries even I no longer understand. When it finally began to fall apart and we were forced to start a new one, the original was misplaced. I thought it was long gone until the other day when Trish found it wedged behind a file cabinet. In honor of its recovery, I thought I'd share some of the gems we've collected over the years.

I think I've mentioned before the difficulty of carrying on a normal conversation between clinic staff and pet owners during a county vaccination clinic. The presence of multiple strange dogs way too close together, small children, struggling cats, traffic jams and a general state of confusion, turns getting the simplest information onto a Rabies certificate a major undertaking. The fact that a friend, neighbor or relative has often been coerced into bringing someone else's animal for shots does not help matters.

The following are actual responses to routine questions asked while filling out certificates:

Q: What is this animal's name?

A: a. I don't remember.
b. I should know...it's a hunting dog.

c. He's got a big ole long one on his papers.

d. It starts with a T.
Q: What kind of dog (cat) do you have?

A: Part Collie and part Shepherd, with a little bird dog in his nose.

a. He's purebred: half chow and half German Shepherd.

b. He's a good watchdog.
c. Part Chihuahua and part funny-name dog.

d. She's some kind of good brand-name cat, I just forget what it is.

Q: Is this animal over a year old?

A: He will be in two months.

a. I don't know. He just wandered in five years ago.

b. We got her when my

— In San Francisco in January, a 33-year-old woman was viciously attacked and killed by a neighbor couple's dog in the hallway outside her apartment, causing a furor in the city and temporarily running the state's electricity crisis off the front page. The neighbors (husband, 59, wife, 45, both lawyers) were revealed three days later to have adopted the 38-year-old man who gave them the dog, who is serving a life sentence at Pelican Bay prison and who was allegedly directing a dog-training business from his cell, supposedly to supply friendly dogs for companions and as models for his drawings. The prisoner-artist, Paul "Cornfed" Schneider, was also revealed (1) to be a member of the white-supremacist Aryan Brotherhood and (2), according to a San Francisco Chronicle report, to own several sexy photographs of one or both of his new parents.

— Political Reform: Vermont state Sen. Robert Ide proposed a bill in January to ban "factually incor-

rect or false" political ads, with the liars paying fines of up to \$5,000. And three Puerto Rican legislators said in January that drinking on the job by their colleagues was getting to be a problem and introduced a bill to outlaw it, enforced by four random tests a year, which is similar to a bill introduced in December in the Ontario legislature, requiring members to undergo three random urine tests a year and to report for rehab if they test positive.

— According to a report in a February issue of New Scientist, a doctor and female patient in North Carolina inadvertently discovered a side benefit of an electrical device manufactured by Medtronic Inc. (Fridley, Minn.) that is surgically implanted near the spine in order to block the pain associated with symptoms of Parkinson's disease: The device can also tap into the nerve that produces orgasm. The doctor, Stuart Meloy, heard one woman's distinctive moan; he had an inkling about a second woman when she complained that the device was useless in blocking pain

but nevertheless refused to let him adjust it.

People Different From Us

A 45-year-old man pled guilty in January in Dunedin, New Zealand, to stealing huge amounts of mail over the past four years, which he had stored (some of it rotting or rodent-eaten) to a height of about 3 feet over entire rooms of his house, with the explanation that he was "lonely and liked reading other people's mail." Among the stash were lots of checks, but no attempt had been made to cash them; the man appeared motivated only to pass the time by reading.

Sensual Crimes

In December in Las Vegas, Don D. Astorga, 31, was sentenced on federal smuggling charges; airport police had found 12 baby lizards (including two endangered monitor lizards) stuffed in his crotch. And Austrian botanist Johann Ziflinger

car dealer, who will serve as the Leadership Cabinet Chair. The Leadership Cabinet is a group comprised of 25 volunteers from Kentucky and beyond who give input on the museum design and exhibits, serve as general ambassadors by articulating campaign goals, and provide assistance in the identification, cultivation, solicitation, and stewardship of donor prospects for the campaign.

The mission of the Kentucky Music Country Museum and Hall of Fame is to highlight Kentucky's music heritage; honor the contribu-

tions of Kentucky music artists to American culture; educate youth, scholars, and music fans of the world; and maximize the economic impact of Southeastern Kentucky and Renfro Valley on the Kentucky tourism industry.

Construction on the Kentucky Music Country Museum and Hall of Fame began January 5, 2001. The general contractor for the project is Hacker Brothers Construction, Corbin. The architects are CMW Inc. in Lexington, and the design firm for the exhibits is Jack Rouse Associates in

Lexington.

With 16,600 square feet of exhibit space, the vision of the Kentucky Music Country Museum and Hall of Fame is to develop a quality experience that will inspire, excite, and educate all people within the region and the entire Commonwealth, as well as visitors from all across the United States.

"Kentucky music has a story to tell and this museum and Hall of Fame serves as the perfect venue," Mrs. Patton said.

May 2002 is the scheduled opening date of the museum.

The Continuing Crisis

— Good News for the Incredibly Sensitive: In January, the Scottish Fire Service Fairness and Diversity Forum in Edinburgh declared that the term "fire-fighter" was "too aggressive," thus deterring women from aspiring to the job, and recommended that the title be changed to "firemaster." And in December, the school board in Cecil County, Md., scheduled a vote early in 2001 on a policy that would ban the game of dodgeball and other "activities requiring human targets," as inappropriate for young children.

— Latest News From the Lower Intestine: In January, a jewel thief in Perth, Scotland, finally passed (with the help of laxatives) several items of jewelry that he had swallowed during his getaway four days earlier in a home burglary. However, Robert Vienneau, 34, withstood a heavy barrage of laxatives in early December as police in Magog, Quebec, attempted to recover a \$10,000 (U.S.) diamond ring he admitted swallowing during a heist of Duvar Jewellery; as of press time, no ring has yet emerged.

— Lawyer Richard J. Cotter Jr., a member of the genteel Boston establishment (and once a friend of President Kennedy), who died two years ago, was revealed, upon the reading of his will, to have been a longtime (yet closeted) supporter of white supremacists. According to a December Associated Press story, Cotter left \$650,000 to pro-Nazi organizations, thus astonishing his friends and colleagues.

Leading Economic Indicators

— According to a January London

Daily Telegraph dispatch from Rio de Janeiro, there was such demand for silicone breast implants in Brazil last year that surgeons were complaining of the late hours they had to keep, and supply houses ran out of the 250 ml size in November, necessitating a waiting list. Brazilian women's demand for such surgery in 2000 very nearly equaled American women's, despite the wide income difference in the two countries.

— In November, officials and workers from North Korea began dismantling the 175-year-old Ushers brewery in Trowbridge, England, which their government had just purchased, and made plans to reconstruct its every brick, vat and valve in a suburb of the capital of Pyongyang, in an attempt to improve the quality of domestic draft in the country that might be making a serious effort to join the rest of the world. The deal was arranged when the North Koreans responded to an ad that offered the facility for sale for about \$2 million (U.S.).

Least Competent People

John Robert Broos Jr., 57, was charged with obstruction of justice in Barron County, Minn., in December after reporting that he had been mugged in a robbery in the parking lot of the St. Croix Casino in Turtle Lake. Broos appeared to have been beaten up, but he was apparently unaware that a parking-lot surveillance camera had recorded the entire "incident." Broos was seen returning to his truck after losing \$50 gambling, then walking over to a light pole, banging his head against it three or four times, reaching down for some dirt and gravel, and smearing it against his face. Then, still on camera, he checked his look in the truck's mirror, apparently was not satisfied, and smashed his head several more times before returning to the casino and reporting the "robbery." Said the prosecutor, "In this profession, it's hard to be surprised anymore."

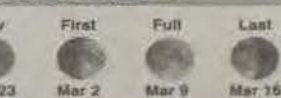
Jenny Wiley State Park

2. Consider "custom designing." Have a local seamstress create a copy of the original. Seamstresses often can buy fabric at wholesale or at discount from retail. And there are no costly alterations because your dress is made to fit. Look in your local newspaper or phone book to find a seamstress to work with you.

3. Wear your mom's dress or borrow a friend's gown. A seamstress can restore a vintage dress inexpensively or you could spend a few hundred dollars altering or jazzing up the dress, much less than retail costs for a brand-new one.

4. Order a bridesmaid's or less formal gown. Bridesmaid's gowns can be ordered in white. So for a less formal wedding, you can get a bridesmaid's gown for just \$75 to \$150. Even if you take it to a seamstress to spruce it up, it would still cost less than buying an

actual bridal gown.

5. Shop at bridal outlet stores. Most large cities have these stores. At vintage shops you may even find a beautiful classic dress for less.

6. Check bordering states. Sometimes you can find the same gown at a store in a nearby state for less money.

7. Surf the Web. Several Web sites sell brand-new, name-brand gowns at 20 percent to 40 percent off retail. For the easiest search, log on to Top100websites.com. With one click of the mouse, you'll have access to the most popular sites on the Internet in any one of more than 120 subjects, including weddings.

Family wedding eases children's anxieties

(ARA) - Approximately one in four U.S. marriages involve divorced or widowed parents with young children. Oftentimes, children have a difficult time

accepting the idea of a parent remarrying, and it's easy for them to feel left out or even threatened by the new family member. A new wedding ceremony,

however, helps put children's tensions at ease by joining not only the bride and groom, but also the entire family.

Unlike traditional ceremonies, the Family Medallion Service, created by Christian Church minister Dr. Roger Coleman, incorporates children from previous marriages into the lifetime commitment that is usually reserved for the bride and groom. After the couple has said their vows, the children join them at the altar where each child is given a gold or silver medal with three interlocking circles. The symbol represents family bonding in much the same way a wedding ring does between a husband and wife. By integrating children into the service, Dr. Coleman helps them to realize that the new family member is not only making a commitment to their parent, but to them as well.

Dr. Coleman created the service after seeing first hand that the role of children in existing wedding services was insufficient. "I was frustrated that virtually every traditional wedding ceremony focused entirely on the bride and groom," said Coleman. "I ended up developing a ceremony that clergy of all faiths could use to recognize children. It encouraged and helped parents to talk

to children prior to the actual ceremony and to discuss the importance of children in the marriage."

Dr. Coleman has filled a ceremonial void for thousands of families including George and Melody Green's. "When George and I decided to incorporate the Family Medallion ceremony into our wedding, we had no idea what a beautiful and moving tribute it would turn out to be," said Melody. "Our children now know more than before that they are loved and cherished - and that we all are one brand new family!"

Experiences like the Green's have been common when merging families use the Family Medallion Service during a wedding ceremony or other special occasions like births, baptisms, birthdays or religious holidays. The special service signifies love's willingness to include others and provides positive support for new families. Each year over 15,000 families will incorporate the Family Medallion Service into their wedding.

Brides and grooms: 10-minute quiz determines your financial compatibility

(ARA) - So you're partner popped the question months, maybe even weeks and gave you a ring, but have you popped the really big

question? You know, the question that involves the "M" word?
