## Bill to curb unwanted telemarketing calls advances

Kentuckians would have more power to stop unwanted telemarketing calls into their homes if a bill that's halfway through the legislative process makes it into the law books.

House Bill 54, which is sponsored by Rep. Buddy Buckingham, D-Murray, would require more telemarketers to abide by the "no call" list lawmakers created last year. Though the list was created to let Kentuckians sign up to stop telemarketing calls into their homes, it hasn't lived up to expectations due to loopholes that let the majority of telemarketers call anyone they want.

House Bill 54 would get rid of most of the exemptions that let telemarketers ignore the list.

The legislation also would go a step further by creating a new "zero call" list that exempts no telemarketers. Kentuckians who place their names on this list would be able to stop all unwanted telemarketing calls into their homes.

# Ethics board considers fundraiser

A party given for County Judge-Executive Paul Hunt Thompson to help him raise money to pay off a debt left over from his days as sheriff was the topic of discussion at Tuesday night's meeting of the Floyd County Ethics Board.

In response to the recent event, the ethics board met at 5 p.m. Tuesday evening to discuss how the situation should be handled.

The ethics board, consisting Tuesday of chairman John Rosenberg, Peggy Bradford, Curtis Hall and John Porter

with board members Patty Murphy and Rhonda Burchette not in attendance, began the meeting by fielding questions from Floyd County Republican Party Chairman and Board of Elections member Bobby Stumbo.

Rosenberg dealt with the bulk of the questions by informing Stumbo, who had several questions concerning Thompson's rights as Judge-Executive, including whether there was any impropriety in the judge accepting the money, that he should contact the state Attorney General's Office as he did not have the answers

# Patients of embattled doctor arrested in Floyd County

On Tuesday, FBI officials, along with the Kentucky State Police and Johnson County Sheriff's Department, confiscated all the records on file at the office of Dr. Frederick Cohn, family practitioner in Paintsville.

Later that day, three of his patients were arrested and are currently being held at the Floyd County Detention Center in Prestonsburg.

Beatrice Caldwell, 35, and her brother, Lonnie Gray, 46, both of Manchester, and their nephew Billy Gray, 26, of Wooten, were arrested after a complaint from a motorist who passed them on U.S. 23.

According to police reports, Caldwell, who was driving, was allegedly extremely impaired and allegedly told officers she had taken Soma, Xanax and Lorcet 20. Her infant child was in the back seat of the vehicle.

Lonnie Gray allegedly told Trooper Rob Diddle of the Kentucky State Police that he had just picked up a prescription from Dr. Cohn and had given pills to Caldwell and Billy Gray.

Caldwell was arrested and charged with operating a vehicle under the influence of drugs, driving on a suspended license, no insurance, failure to wear seatbelts, second-degree wanton endangerment and refusal to submit to a blood test.

After her arrest, she was rushed to Highlands Regional Medical Center where she was treated and released to the custody of the Floyd County Detention Center. The child was given to social services.

Caldwell pleaded not guilty to all charges and is currently being held under a partially-secured \$50,000 bond. Her trial date is set for April 26 at 9:30 a.m. with Judge Eric Hall presiding.

Lonnie Gray was charged with trafficking a controlled substance in the second degree and second-degree wanton

# Fire breaks out at Wal-Mart

Prestonsburg Wal-Mart employees were given a three-hour-long lunch as management and cleanup crews worked to repair damage caused by a fire that occurred in the Prestonsburg Wal-Mart Tuesday evening.

It is not clear, as of yet, whether the fire was accidental in nature or may have been set intentionally, but the early stages of the investigation reveal there may be a chance the fire was not merely incidental.

The fire began at approximately 6:30 p.m. Tuesday evening in the toy section and adjoining Wal-Mart pharmacy.

There was fire damage, according to Prestonsburg Fire Chief Larry Adams, but there was no one injured and the fire was handled efficiently.

# Faster internet coming to Prestonsburg

Many residents of Prestonsburg will be eligible for an internet speed boost when BellSouth begins offering digital subscriber line (DSL) internet access in July.

The company announced Wednesday night that it plans to begin offering DSL service to 57 communities across Kentucky by

the end of the year.

DSL is a technology replacing traditional modem connections to the internet which offers speeds up to 50 times faster than a 28.8 K modem, said Amy Scarborough, BellSouth's regional manager for Eastern Kentucky.

Other advantages of technology are that small businesses can connect all of their computers through a single account and that customers

can use the internet and talk on the phone at the same time, Scarborough said. In addition, DSL customers are always connected to the internet, negating the need to dial up a connection each time they wish to use the internet.

The DSL service offered by BellSouth will be available at a cost of between \$40 and \$60 a month.

readily available. "Contact the Attorney General's office directly," Rosenberg advised Stumbo. "I don't think there's anything in this ethics code that says we govern, in any way, the procedures of the fiscal court. Preliminarily, there doesn't seem to be any violations." Rosenberg, after stating there seemed to be no violations, urged Stumbo to sit in and listen as the Thunder Ridge gathering given in Thompson's honor would be discussed in further detail during the course of the meeting. Upon reviewing ethic codes for Floyd County, the board found that determining if there had been a violation would be easier said than done. Although there are some ethics requirements that could, perhaps, bring the fundraiser into question, there are no specific rules in Floyd County that could apply. Rosenberg read from a code developed by the fiscal court that was pointed out during required training for ethics board members in the past which stated that "no elected official or appointed official or employee or member of his immediate family or business

organization of which he has an interest shall solicit or accept any cash or legal tender, gift, political contribution, promise of future employment, or anything of value if it would appear that any of these were offered for the purpose of influencing him directly or indirectly in the discharge of his duties." Although the code seems to strike close to the situation at hand, Rosenberg pointed out that the last of the provision, which stated that the gift, in Thompson's case, of cash, would have to appear to have been given with the purpose of influencing him directly or indirectly. Discovering what the motivation was, beyond being a friendly action taken in the donor's private capacities, could prove to be problematic. The ethics board hopes to find a solution to the scattered variety of codes that are dealt with across the state. "What we hope to discuss here is that the state adopt a uniform ethics code which applies in every county and has the same provisions that apply across the board," Rosenberg said Tuesday evening. This was eventually brought

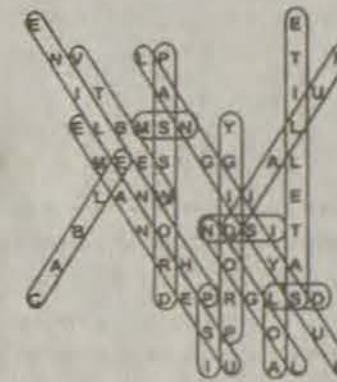
up during the meeting and, acting on a motion made by Hall and seconded by Porter, the commission members in attendance agreed to submit a written letter to legislators Greg Stumbo, Johnny Ray Turner and also Gov. Paul Patton asking that steps be made toward implementing a statewide code of ethics. Determined to be positive in their decision, the motion was made by Bradford and seconded by Hall, to study the codes "cover to cover" if that was needed before the next meeting to see if anything applied which had been overlooked to ensure there was nothing within their ethics code that brought Thompson under violation. Before adjourning Hall explained that although it seemed, as of now, that Thompson had done nothing to violate Floyd County's ethics codes, it still "didn't look pretty". "Speaking on behalf of the taxpayers," Hall said, "it don't look good, it's as simple as that." Rosenberg followed by asking Hall, then, if he would have accepted the money. "No, I wouldn't have taken it," Hall stated flatly.

DSL

The technology does have limitations, however. Most notably, the service is only available within a three-mile radius of the local BellSouth office. In Floyd County, that means will be available only to customers within three miles of the office located at 217 Lafferty Lane, located behind The Floyd County Times. Further limitations also exclude some business and residential customers from being able to use DSL. Scarborough said, amounting to roughly 50 percent of the customers within the three-mile radius. However, Scarborough said that 2,319 customers in and around Prestonsburg would be able to subscribe to DSL when it becomes available in July. In addition to offering DSL service directly to customers, BellSouth will also supply DSL service to local internet service providers at wholesale rates. Those ISPs can then turn around and offer the service to their

customers at retail rates, negotiating the need to switch providers. BellSouth's announcement is being greeted with enthusiasm from state and local leaders. "The Kentucky Public Service Commission must consider the impact its decisions have on increasing economic development opportunities in the state," said Martin J. Huelsmann, chair of the PSC, the state agency which regulates BellSouth and other utilities. "BellSouth's deployment plans go a long way toward meeting this goal. The deployment will also improve educational opportunities and provide wider access to consumers and businesses." In addition to Prestonsburg, other Eastern Kentucky communities which will receive DSL by the end of the year include Paintsville, Pikeville, Whitesburg, Beattyville, Corbin, Harlan, Middlesboro, Mt. Sterling, Pineville, Richmond, Stanton, Williamsburg, and Winchester.

"There was quite a bit of fire damage as well as smoke damage," Adams said Wednesday. "The flames were ceiling high and two shelves of merchandise were destroyed. They done a good job responding to it. They got to it pretty quick which was a help. The sprinkler system didn't even have a chance to come on." According to management, the store will have to be deodorized to get rid of the smoke smell, but evidence of the fire went beyond the smoky atmosphere. Wednesday afternoon, workers were busy restocking shelves and preparing the pharmacy for shipments to be ordered from Paintsville Wal-Mart to restore an undetermined amount of damaged medicines. A series of tape lines blocked off passage through the pharmacy isles and pharmacy workers made use of an electrical fan to subdue the smoke odor still lingering lightly throughout that section of the store. Wal-Mart management declined to comment on the nature of the fire stating that Larry Adams was investigating the matter further. "We're still looking into things. It looks weird, though," Adams explained. "On the videotape there are still some sections to review. Personally I think it may have had some help getting started. You like to think it was maybe a careless cigarette smoker or something, but we went through the debris and we didn't find a cigarette butt or anything else that would have indicated that it would have been caused in that way." In addition to reviewing the tapes and giving them detailed attention, Adams also plans to pursue further investigation on scene at the Prestonsburg Wal-Mart. "We're going to be interviewing the workers who were there

at the time and get what information we can from them so we'll know more about it," Adams said. There is no estimate on the cost of the damage, but there was fire and smoke damage which caused visible discoloration to the ceiling area just above the pharmacy and dry section. Also, several tiles were missing and will, presumably, need replaced. A count of the damaged toys and medicines will need to be completed before a total estimate of losses is finished.

## March is Severe Storms Preparedness Month

Gov. Paul Patton has proclaimed March "Severe Storm Preparedness Month." Special activities are scheduled across the state during the month of March to draw attention to the dangers of severe weather and how to protect against them.

"Severe Storms are possibly the greatest threat to the lives and property of Kentuckians," said Patton. "It is essential that our citizens understand how to appropriately prepare for and respond to these events."

Severe weather can occur at any time, however it is most frequent during the spring months. Severe Storms Preparedness Month is designated as a time to place specific emphasis on the threat of severe weather and how to

cope with it. As recently as last year, heavy winds, large hail, damaging tornadoes and flooding resulted in two presidential major disaster declarations for the Commonwealth, according to Kentucky Division of Emergency Management Director W.R. Padgett.

The Division of Emergency Management partners each year with other state, local and federal agencies, as well as businesses and private organizations to promote severe storm preparedness through publications and programs. This year's campaign, "Are You StormReady?" highlights a program from the National Weather Service, which recognizes counties and commu-

nities for their efforts to prepare for severe weather.

The House of Representatives approved HB 54 yesterday and sent the bill to the Senate for consideration.

Buckingham said the idea of creating a "zero call" list has been popular among people who want a way to stop unwanted telemarketing calls.

"Surveys show over 80 percent of Kentuckians find telemarketing calls irritating and

annoying," Buckingham said. "Last year, Kentuckians lost \$40 million to telemarketing scams. The elderly are particularly susceptible since they're often targeted by fraudulent telemarketers."

"My legislation doesn't prohibit telemarketing, but it does require telemarketers to respect the privacy of people who don't want their calls."

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people to peaceably assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

Monday evening's Floyd County Board of Education meeting offered the public some insight into what is inherently wrong with our county's educational system.

Personal agendas, rather than working board agendas, came, once again, to the forefront of the evening's highlights.

With accusations surrounding gender bias and personal vendettas comprising the better portion of an hour's worth of precious time, it is no wonder that we still find the educational process in our county moving forward at an equally comparable sluggish pace.

Monday evening's public display of discriminatory accusations only served to further spur the public's opinion that board members do not focus their attentions toward their motto of "Children First."

Our world is one in which personal prejudices, whether they be based on sex, color, income or other, are encountered every day.

In order to promote the common good while carrying out public business, it is necessary to put these encountered evils temporarily to the side, to be dealt with more effectively at later times.

In the listing of powers and duties of the Board of Education, it is stated that "all meetings of the Board, and any committees or subcommittees thereof, shall be held at specified times and places which are convenient to the public."

While convening at the evening hour of 6:30 p.m. is, without question, convenient to the public, remaining in session past the hour of midnight, is, most certainly, not.

Board members have made statements on several occasions that reflect their desire to see an increase in public participation of board meetings.

To continue with meetings that last for five and six hours and to expect the public to be interested in the discussion of personal grievances during these sessions is, most certainly, not a means to achieving this desired public participation and further stands to be perceived as being the very height of self-centeredness.

It most surely is not in accordance with putting children first, nor does it exemplify the models that we wish for them to emulate.

## The wild, wild west

Every so often history repeats itself. At least that's what they say. Harry S. Truman said the only news you'll ever get is the history you haven't read, and here lately I believe it more and more.

For some time now I've been an old west buff. The gunfighters, the law, and the outlaws. All that stuff is like candy for me. I've read every book written about Doc Holliday, Wild Bill Hickock, and Wyatt Earp. Something about the whole thing just appeals to me.

But living it is another thing altogether. With the recent trend in armed robberies and burglaries I've been toying with the idea of buying a nice pearl-handled, gleaming steel, death machine, (a.k.a., a gun). Actually, I'm lying, I've not thought of buying a gun, but I have noticed that it seems we've reverted back

to the old west days and perhaps I should consider some type of training that will ready me for a potential problem (maybe a well designed escape plan inclusive to all types of businesses).

It's difficult not to make a comparison when the evidence is all around. Think for a moment of all the things that come to mind when picturing the typical old west setting. The shootouts, the bank holdups, the horse thieves, the cattle rustlers. It's not the same in a larger city where a shooting or a robbery is normal and hardly makes a ripple in the day. But around here in a small town, when these things start happening, and start happening in triplet, such as the bur-

glaries last Tuesday, and is then followed by four armed robberies, all happening in the span of less than a full work week, one must realize this is more than just odd ... it's down right disconcerting.

I expect any minute for a lone tumbleweed to drift across the street followed closely by a menacing whistle. During the old west era there was the

constant presence of alcohol. Drinking led to arguments, arguments led to shootouts.

Today it's hardly any different. Now it's drugs, pills, cocaine, marijuana, all as common as drinking was then, sad to say. A key difference would have to be that without a prescription, in the case of pills, the items mentioned are not legal, whereas alcohol was then and is now to those old enough to purchase. But it's not legal to walk into a gas station and wave a loaded weapon in somebody's snout either, but that didn't stop it from happening four, count 'em, four times over the weekend across three counties, including two here in Floyd County.

First, understand that I'm not blaming any department for this increase. The police or the drug control units can no more be held responsible for this than the Sheriff of the old west could be blamed for the wild nature of men during that time. I'm sure that everything that can be done about this is being done.

It seems to simply be an increase in out-law-like activity, no real rhyme or reason, just an increase. I don't know what the factors are. Almost certainly one could point a finger at television depicting more vio-

## A nation of children

President Clinton took some flak in the closing weeks of his administration when he told a Rolling Stone interviewer, "I think that most small amounts of marijuana have been decriminalized in some places and should be."

The negative reaction was so strong that a Clinton spokesman said that the president was not endorsing decriminalization. You figure it out. I guess it all depends on what your definition of "should" is.

Shepherd Smith, president of the Institute for Youth Development, responded, "Decriminalizing 'small amounts of marijuana' is simply a euphemistic way of saying it's fine to smoke it, just don't sell it. So we now have the president of the United States on record again saying

to young people that smoking marijuana is basically OK."

Oh really?

Let me rush to the former president's defense. Since when is it an endorsement of an activity to say that it shouldn't be treated as a crime? There are many things that are perfectly legal to do that would best be avoided. Bungee jumping is the first example that springs to mind, but there are many others. Did you ever hear anyone say, "By making bungee jumping legal, we are sending a message to our kids that such risky behavior is OK"? Some people enthusiastically endorse bungee jumping. Search the World Wide Web and you'll find people who call it "the ultimate rush."

But is it accurate to say "we" — meaning society or the country — are telling kids that they should bungee jump? I don't think so.

Some people just don't get the point of a free society. The freedom to do something doesn't mean you ought to do

that thing. How basic can you get?

Yet we seem to want to teach our children the opposite lesson: if something is legal, then it is OK to do it. And that leads to the view that we should legalize only those things we want people to do. That's just nutty.

Under what used to be known as "liberalism" (today we say "classical liberalism"), people were free to do anything except that which was expressly (and justly) prohibited by the law, such as murder, robbery, rape, and the like. On the other hand, government could do nothing except that which was expressly (and justly) permitted to it. To use the imagery of political philosopher Stephen Macedo, government power constituted a few islands in a sea of liberty.

All that has changed now, thanks to the gang that appropriated the word "liberalism" about a century ago. Today, continuing with Macedo's analogy, liberty constitutes a

few islands in a sea of government power. We are quickly heading toward a situation in which, as someone once put it, everything that is not forbidden is required. In other words: total government. The price is the liberty, self-responsibility, and dignity of the individual. Contrary to the attitude of so many people today, that is no small price.

As Charles Murray, author of *What It Means to Be a Libertarian*, self-responsibility is what keeps our lives from being trivial. Everyone pays lip service to self-responsibility. But what is so misunderstood is that self-responsibility requires freedom. Try imagining one without the other. It's like trying to square the circle. It cannot be done.

The American political system has been seized by the idea that there are areas in which individuals may not be permitted liberty and self-responsibility. Drugs are one

such area. A hundred years ago people were trusted with the freedom and responsibility of self-medication. They could freely buy opiates and marijuana; Coca-Cola contained cocaine. A small percentage of the population harmed themselves with those substances. But there was no drug problem.

The drug problem was born the day government began passing laws depriving people of freedom and responsibility. Those laws gave us black markets with their attendant violence, organized crime, and law-enforcement corruption. They did something worse — if worse

can be imagined. They infantilized the American people. The results were predictable. The spheres of freedom and self-responsibility shrank radically — a point where no one is responsible for anything anymore.

If you treat adults like children, many of them will come to believe that that is what they are.

## Cold Weather, Higher Fuel Prices Cause Electric Bill Charges

Due to the record cold winter and skyrocketing natural gas prices, members of Big Sandy Rural Electric Cooperative will see additional charges on their bills in the upcoming months.

"The main reason for these charges is that the cost of fuel to produce electricity increased substantially, and because of the brutal cold winter," said David Estep.

David Estep stressed that none of the charges make a profit for the co-op. "The fuel adjustment is simply a pass-through of the fuel costs we incur during this high peak time, and if fuel costs less, the customers' bill will reflect a credit."

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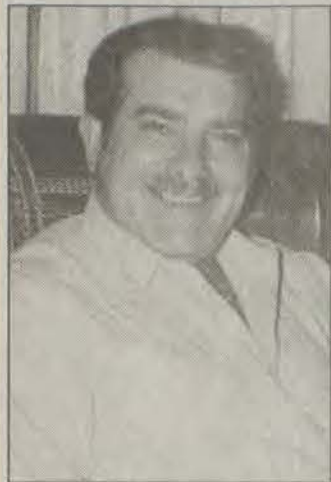

Hayes, who hit three treys for the game, buried his first one that gave the Rebels a 12-3 margin.

Mullins would bury a three-pointer and then complete an old-fashion three-point play and one of two free throw to give Allen Central a 19-7 first quarter lead.

Hayes opened the second period with a basket and Newsome connected on two free throws for a 23-7 game but Prestonsburg was not ready to concede. 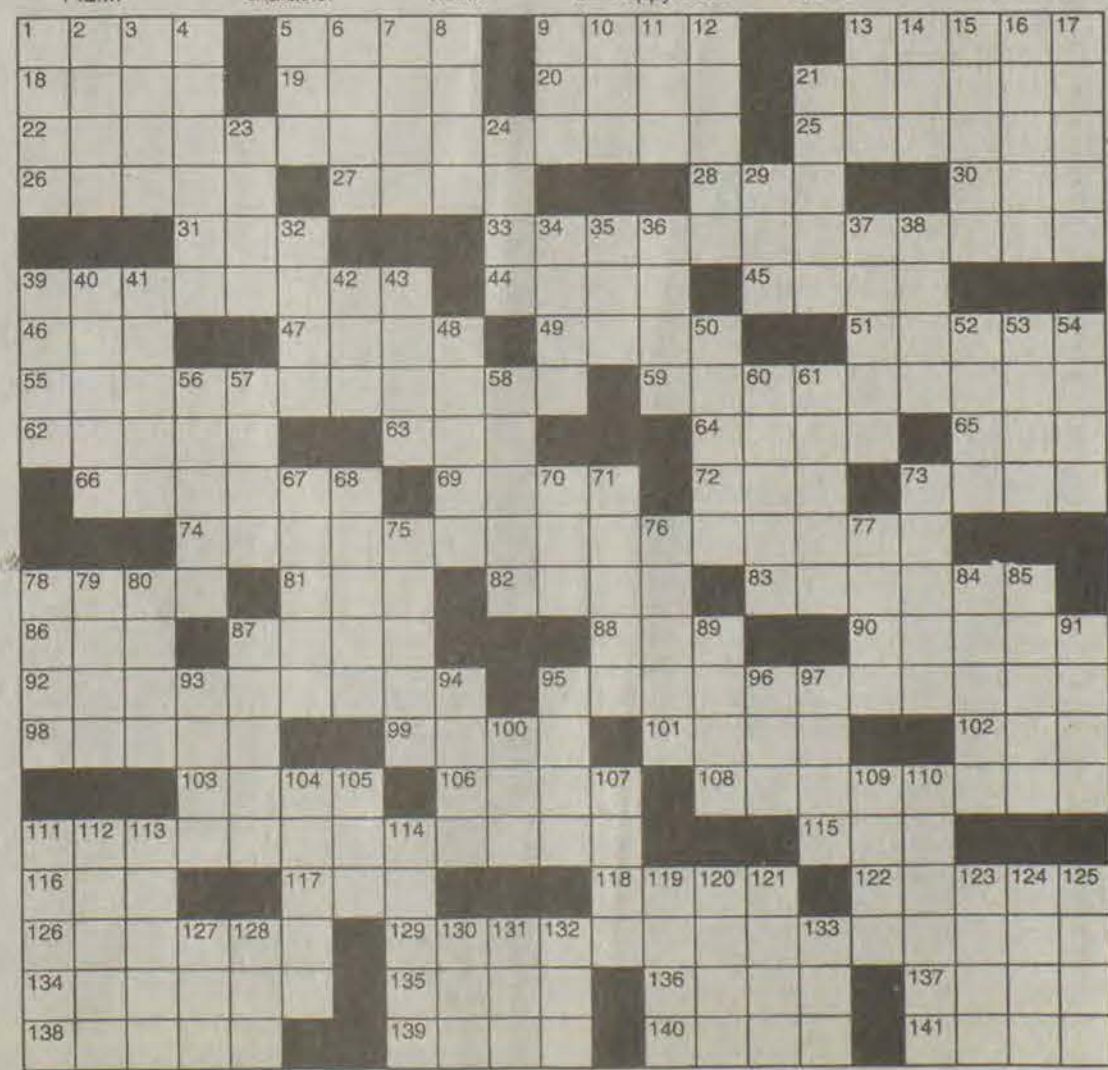

## "VACCINATION TALK"

Can you remember years ago when you went to the vet (which generally was at a county vaccination clinic) and asked for "shots", your animal was promptly given an injection against Rabies, and that was it? When I first started to hang around vet clinics to observe back in the early 70's, although I hate to admit it, the height of sophisticated medicine was being able to offer distemper shots also. Now "distemper" in dogs and cats is actually two totally different diseases, but since pet owners at the time were not as well informed as they are today, the vet just gave the appropriate shot and there was no discussion. Cats were seldom ever brought in anyway, unless there was a Rabies scare in the area.

Well, as the advertisement says, "We've come a long way,

baby!" When you schedule "shots" these days, the vet's staff immediately begins asking you questions: "How old is this animal?" "If this is a puppy/kitten, how long has it been off of its mother?" "Has it had any previous vaccinations?" "What kind and how long ago?" "Does the animal seem to feel well?" "Is this an indoor or outdoor animal, or both?"

The reason for all these questions is that there is no longer a "one-size-fits-all" vaccination that is given to every animal. The standard approach is now to tailor the immunization program to each particular animal.

Not too many years ago, there were very few diseases that we could prevent, so if we had a shot for it, we gave it. Today there are so many vaccines available we are concerned that we may actually overwhelm the body's defenses if we give too many. There is a

# News of the Weird

— In February, the Court of Appeal in Vancouver, British Columbia, began considering Doug Stead's challenge to his 1996 \$75 (USD) speeding ticket, which has so far cost Stead about \$75,000 (USD) in lawyers' fees to make his point that the province's system of photographing speeders' cars is unfair. Stead, who admits he was speeding, told reporters that his wife does not agree that this is a good way to spend the household budget but that, "If I let it go, I wouldn't feel good."

— Isn't "Kill the Referee?": In February, according to police in Fayetteville, Ga., after a youth basketball game (7- and 8-year-olds) that featured much bickering by a coach over referee Oliver Lewis Wood's "bad calls," the referee pulled out a knife and stabbed the coach. The referee, who by day is a Baptist minister, was arrested; the coach, who by day is a county marshal, needed 17 stitches.

— According to a February dispatch from an Orlando Sentinel reporter in Sabana de la Mar, Dominican Republic, 16

people attempting to flee to Puerto Rico in a homemade boat without food or water were kept alive for 12 days because one of them, a lactating woman, furnished each one several drops of milk per day (and received drops back, herself, from her sister's lips). The boat was eventually blown back to shore in the Dominican Republic.

## Cultural Diversity

— In January and February, as many as 70 million people journeyed to Uttar Pradesh state in India to celebrate the 43 soul-cleansing days of Hindus' Kumbh Mela festival, highlighted by spiritual bathing in a relatively sewage-free part of the confluence of the Ganges and Yamuna rivers. It was reportedly the largest single-purpose gathering in the history of the planet, but controversies included commercialization (Coca-Cola was sold in 115 kiosks); attendance by Hollywood spiritualists Madonna, Sharon Stone, Demi Moore,

and Richard Gere; and the presence of cars in the rivers as drivers attempted to bless their vehicles against future collisions.

— Floggings in the News: A court disbelieved a pregnant 17-year-old girl's claim of rape but still reduced her sentence for having sex from 180 lashes to 100 (and later restored her honor, after the man proposed marriage) (Zamfara, Nigeria, January). And education officials in Penang, Malaysia, established a new student code: one lash for each 10 demerits (for gambling, cussing, smoking, etc.); 30 demerits for hitting a teacher (January). And a man was sentenced to 20 lashes for using a cell phone on an airplane (Tabuk, Saudi Arabia, November). And a morgue attendant was sentenced to death for murder and rape, but a court decreed that first he would be given 80 lashings for drinking alcohol (Sana, Yemen,

## You won't believe your eyes!

"COLOR PLAY," which was created by Clifford Wagner Science Interactives Inc. and runs through May 6, invites you to play with colors through whole-body experiences, hands-on interactive activities and opportunities for fantasy play. Here's a peek at what you will see in COLOR PLAY:

■ Two different

lamps light the Yellow Light Room. The changing light dramatically transforms the paintings on the wall and other colors of the room. Under the monochromatic sodium light, everything is yellow or black. However, colors appear like magic when a white light is turned on.

cluster of diseases that are still felt to be so common (such as Parvovirus in dogs), or so dangerous (Rabies in dogs and cats), that they are part of what we call "core vaccines". These are the diseases that almost every animal will be vaccinated against. Other diseases are limited primarily to certain areas (i.e., Lyme disease), or are more likely to be a problem in certain situations (Bordetella in show dogs). In cases like these, there may not be a high enough risk to warrant vaccinating every animal against them. Some diseases, such as Leptospirosis in dogs, that have traditionally been part of the core vaccines, are being reevaluated and may be dropped from the standard schedule.

Some of the early vaccines caused more problems than they prevented. If you remember "blue eye" and "hardpad disease" that developed in dogs due to reactions or infections following canine distemper vaccination, you're giving away your age! Actual infection caused by vaccines is almost unheard of now, and improved manufacturing processes have greatly reduced the incidence of adverse reactions. There is always a chance of allergic reactions to any foreign substance, however, so they still occur once in a while following vaccination. Reactions can vary from mild itching to

full-blown anaphylaxis, which can be fatal. Obviously, there is a higher risk of reaction to vaccines that contain many different antigens, (the proteins that cause the body to build immunity to a particular disease). This is another reason we want to limit the number of diseases that we vaccinate against to those that pose the most risk.

Which vaccines are considered part of the "core" may vary somewhat from vet to vet. We each develop our vaccine protocol based on what we read in the veterinary journals, what we were taught in school, the literature provided by the vaccine manufacturers, and what we feel are the relative risks in our local area.

How often we give "booster shots" is another hot topic. Boosters are vaccinations given at intervals after the initial vaccination or series of vaccinations is given. The purpose is to "boost", or maintain immunity to the particular disease. The ideal approach is to only give boosters when the individual animal's immunity drops below protective levels. This can be determined by measuring blood levels, or "titers" of protective antibodies to each disease. Of course, this is more expensive and time-consuming than just giving another vaccine, so we tend to follow the practice of annual boosters for

most shots.

Vets are caught in a "Catch-22" on this one. It is very likely that immunity to many diseases lasts longer than a year, but we don't know which ones, and what the actual revaccination schedule should be. (As I understand it, the manufacturers of human vaccines are required to do studies to determine how long the immunity to their products last, so you notice we don't get too many yearly shots. This is expensive, and is not required for veterinary vaccines, so it isn't done.) The law says we should follow the vaccine manufacturer's suggestions, and those are usually for annual boosters. I still give my cats and dogs their shots yearly, and I will continue to do this until some study shows me conclusively that I should adopt a different schedule. I should note here that many Rabies vaccines are approved for three years; I tend to give them more often just because animals are exposed to so much wildlife in this area.

The next time you feel like you are having to play "Twenty Questions" at your vet's office, be patient; now you know that they are just trying to determine the best way to protect your pet! This has turned into a rather complicated discussion; so while we're on the subject, I'll continue it in future articles.

— The Apology and Gift Center ("We Say Sorry for You"), which opened in September in the port city of Tianjin, China, is thriving because so many Chinese are reluctant to endure the loss of face involved in a personal apology. — A drop in the vulture population around Bombay, India, has forced the 50,000-strong Zoroastrian community of Parsees to abandon its preferred "sky burials" (leaving corpses on high platforms to be devoured by the birds) in favor of using solar panels to decompose the bodies within five or six days. Disease and pesticides have reduced the number of vultures by 90 percent, according to a December South China Morning Post dispatch.

uncovering many surprises. A normally invisible wallpaper pattern, foot-steps on the walls and other things hidden around the room appear. Even your plain white shirt literally glows.

■ A row of Color Windows lines one side of the exhibit's Color Playhouse. Through these windows, the rest of the world turns green! Yellow! Red! Blue!

■ Color Creations shows how colored pictures are made. Even younger children enjoy rolling out the cyan, magenta, yellow and black transparencies that are used in four-color printing and watching a full-color picture appear.

■ The Big Kaleidoscope is big enough that a whole family or a group of kids can see the colorful patterns mix and change when one kid turns the crank. Go to the other end and your face can be in the kaleidoscope too.

"TAKE ANOTHER LOOK" invites you to learn the art of seeing by

observing ordinary, everyday objects in interesting and unfamiliar ways. Too often, we see only what we have come to expect or what's obvious upon first glance. But, with a new tool, a new technique or sometimes merely a new attitude, there is always something new to discover.

As you enter the exhibit, you are invited to use a video camera mounted on a 10-foot tower to scan the gallery and observe the scene from different perspectives. Watch as children delight to find their own place in the picture by panning, tilting and zooming to observe themselves seeing their world.

You can also view the world from the perspective of a model train 24 times smaller than a real one, or watch plants grow in time-lapse videos. Get a new perspective of yourself by viewing your head projected as a cylindrical map on a flat screen. Hand topography allows you to insert your hand into an aperture and view it on a video screen as a silhouette—as projections of

contour lines trace the hills and valleys of knuckles, tendons, the palm and thumb.

In addition, several low-tech stations encourage hands-on investigation through the use of mirrors, lenses, a shadow screen, diffraction gratings, maps, a pin screen and other tools.

"Take another look," which runs through April 30, was developed by the Children's Discovery Museum of San Jose with funding from the National Science Foundation. The Association of Science Technology Centers in Washington, D.C., manages the national tour.

The Louisville Science Center is a nonprofit educational institution dedicated to improving public understanding of science, math and technology through films, interactive exhibits and educational programs. The Science Center houses the only IMAX Theatre in Kentucky, serves more than 500,000 people annually and receives support from the City of Louisville.

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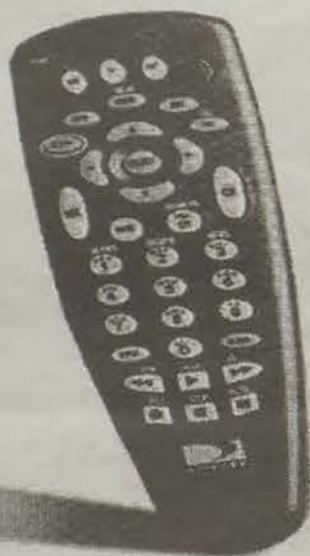
