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Beetle outbreak losing steam

HAZARD — The devastation of pine stands in Eastern Kentucky has landowners worried about the future of their pine trees.

The large number of reports of dying trees received by the state Division of Forestry office in Hazard prompted federal funding of an upcoming aerial survey in the nine-county region from Letcher to Estill counties. Rangers will con-

duct a visual inspection and plot the extent of southern pine beetle infestation on maps for research and conservation efforts.

According to Perry County forest ranger James Madden, the southern pine beetle will have a massive effect on the pines while the destructive infestation runs its course.

"For those with infected pine stands, they may as well consider them gone," said Madden.

He explained that the pesticide

Lindane can be used on individual trees to prevent beetle infestation, but once the beetle has burrowed under the bark, extermination becomes impossible.

Forester Chuck Hedglin explained that pesticide use was impractical due to the toxicity of the chemicals which kills all surrounding vegetation and would have to be sprayed from the air to cover remote stands.

Hedglin said the beetle's destruction "spreads like wildfire"

from the epicenter of pine beetle infestation outward to all trees in a stand. The needles on the dying trees turn from green to yellow, red, and finally brown as the tree's nutrient system is cut off by the beetle.

According to Hedglin, southern pine species such as native yellow pines, shortleaf pines, non-native Virginia, loblolly and pitch pines are favored by the insect. However,

Father and son plead not guilty to drug charges

LEXINGTON — James and Joseph Lee Miller, a Perry County father and son, were arraigned May 25 in Lexington before U.S. District Chief Judge Karl S. Forester after both entered pleas of not guilty to several drug-related charges.

The case, originally set to be heard in federal court in Pikeville, was moved to Lexington after a conflict of interest on behalf of the

Miller's brought about a motion heard by U.S. District Judge Joseph M. Hood.

Hood, after hearing the basis for the motion and making his decision concerning the conflict, which arose in connection to the two defendants' close kinship, requested the case be reassigned to Lexington in an order on May 21, stating he had been subjected to too much information about the case while hearing the conflict

Charge filed over attempted drugstore robbery

PIKEVILLE — Law enforcement officials and others battling the illicit trade in prescription medications which has swept the state often point to a rise in violent crime as a side-effect of the growing problem.

Such was the case as a Breathitt

County man was indicted on three counts

May 17 in U.S. District Court for a March 10 incident in which he allegedly attempted to rob a Breathitt County pharmacy at gunpoint.

The indictment stated Gary Wayne Stidham allegedly attempted to take from a Family Pharmacy in Breathitt County an unnamed controlled substance with an estimated replacement value of not less

than \$500.

This attempt made up the first count of Stidham's indictment, with the following two counts in direct connection with the March 10 incident.

The court further alleges Stidham had in his possession during the robbery attempt a rifle which brought the second count against him for using, carrying and brandishing a firearm during the course

of the pharmacy robbery.

The third count of Stidham's indictment was a charge linked to a domestic violence order issued against him in Breathitt County District Court filed on February 26.

Stidham's alleged possession of the rifle during the robbery attempt violated

PERRY — The Homeplace Community Center has new directors, Eva and Donnie Miller, both originally from Perry County.

The Millers came back to Eastern Kentucky from Michigan, where they worked as missionaries with the non-denominational New Tribe Mission. Eva Miller grew up at Buhan and Donnie Miller is originally from Chavies.

The Homeplace, located in an elk preserve along the Knott and Perry county line, offers "just about anything for people to come in and enjoy," Eva Miller said.

They will operate the Homeplace Community Center, which offers space for reunions,

birthdays and picnics, a gymnasium, a playground, a walking track, tennis courts, athletic fields and a fishing pond.

The Homeplace is open seven days a week, with gates closing at 10 p.m.

Both Donnie and Eva Miller work on the grounds, which includes the community center and cottage, each with kitchens and meeting rooms; a public gym inside the barn; the Troublesome Creek Volunteer Fire Department, and the Homeplace Clinic.

"Everybody here is real dedicated," said Nolan Allen, chief of the fire department. "This is the focal point of this community, this is something like you never see anywhere else."

Family wins battle in mineral rights war

HINDMAN — Family owned land can often bring many benefits to those who may be in line to inherit such property. In fact, there could be much to profit from if land inherited from family members consists of such a precious resource as coal, a mineral that has brought considerable wealth to a number of Eastern Kentucky families in the past.

The heirs of Alamandar Martin, a man who was once a prominent citizen of Knott County and the grandson of a Revolutionary War soldier, not to mention the sole owner of an estate of thousands of acres of what were then rugged mountain lands, have organized themselves into a single corporate entity known as the A. Martin Gamble Company.

Now, after hiring experts to assist them, they have regained control of land nearly lost through a lack of

estate management in past generations.

The company was granted a temporary restraining order in Knott Circuit Court on May 24 against Kentucky May Company and other companies who have been mining on what they have proven to be land they own as recently as March 16 of this year.

The land in question, a 125-acre plot stretching from Knott county to parts of Letcher county, is believed to contain some of the highest BTU, lowest sulfur and ash coal reserves left in the middle Appalachian range. Because of this, the land has been sought by mining companies for several years and has, in fact, been subjected to mining by various companies such as Kentucky May Company and various others mining and drilling parties, according to A. Martin Gamble Company's com-

Pike pair charged with selling pills

PIKEVILLE — Senior U.S. District Judge Henry R. Wilhoit Jr. granted motions for two arrest warrants for Gregory Newsome and Tammy Miller of Pike County on May 17 during indictment proceedings in Ashland, connecting the two in a series of alleged drug related offenses prosecutors claim took place from January through December 2000.

The indictment included a combined four counts of possession with intent to distribute, one count of conspiracy, four counts of aiding and abetting, one count of possession of a firearm and one count of acquisition of a controlled substance. The indictment also includes a criminal forfeiture count asking that Newsome and Miller turn over to the court a cash amount of \$5,825 reflecting prosecutors' belief the money was intended to aid in the couple's alleged controlled substance violations.

According to the indictment, both Newsome and Miller allegedly committed the offenses through

misrepresentation, fraud, forgery, deception or subterfuge, or trickery.

This method of obtaining controlled substances has often been revealed through investigative efforts finding several offenders forging prescription medications and then attempting or actually filling them at various hospital or professional pharmacies in the area.

Newsome was charged with all six counts in the indictment, as well as the forfeiture count.

Miller was charged with all counts within the indictment except count three, which alleges Newsome was found in possession of a firearm on September 25 after having been convicted of a domestic violence offense in Pike County District Court on April 12 the same year.

According to the indictment, Newsome and Miller allegedly assisted each other three days earlier on September 22 in Pike County in obtaining the pain killer OxyContin, and on the same day Newsome was allegedly found in possession of the firearm, the couple was found to have allegedly attempted to distribute the pre-

scription drug, which is intended to be used by cancer patients and others with serious illnesses.

The indictment concludes by claiming Newsome and Miller did distributed OxyContin on December 15 and attempted to do so again four days later.

Newsome faces a possible 20-year prison sentence and 10 more in connection with the firearm charge as well as another possible four-year sentence in connection to the aiding and abetting charge of

the indictment. The possible 20-year sentence could include a fine of \$1 million, while the additional four-year possibility adds another \$30,000 in fines with the firearm count carrying a possible \$250,000 fine.

Miller, although excluded from the firearm charge, still could face 20 years imprisonment and an additional four for the aiding and abetting charge the court claims occurred on September of last year.

he said some incidence of white pine infestation has occurred.

Due to the last three years of drought conditions and the lack of sub-zero temperatures last winter, the beetle has thrived and spread to cover the nine-county region, said Hedglin. Twenty-five years ago, an outbreak of infestation occurred in the southern tip of Perry County. Now the beetles have infested trees all the way north to the Ohio River and west to Casey County. In the South, many states have lost thousands of

acres to the beetle.

According to Sara Sanders, forest health specialist with the Division of Forestry office in Frankfort, the infestation may soon run its course.

"Some of the natural predators such as the checkered beetle are starting to outnumber the southern pine beetle 3 to 1," Sanders said. "We are encouraged from this and think the infestation is slowing down. This may be the last year of the southern pine beetle outbreak."

plaint filed in Knott County Circuit Court in July 1998.

That complaint, filed on behalf of A. Martin Gamble Company, which had been made administrator of Alamandar Martin's estate by order of the Knott County District Court on June 11, 1998, was against Reedy Coal Company, Consolidated Coal Company and Equitable Energy Resources Company and asked to quiet the title and for ejectment and injunctive relief in addition to money damages from the defendants.

According to the complaint, Nancy Cook, Brenda Cook and A.B. Smith, members of A. Martin Gamble Company and rightful owners of the estate, claim the companies "conducted mining and drilling operations upon the surface of the property" and had been extracting minerals from the property in violation of their interest in the property.

Martin's heirs perhaps had not

been so intent on preservation of the land, however, as stipulated within the 1998 complaint, stating they had ensured an agreement with Knott County Coal to mine the area.

This proved important, nonetheless, as the complaint as recently led to a Knott Circuit Court decision order granting a temporary restraining order against Equitable Resources Energy Company Inc.

According to the order, permission was granted to ensure this temporary protective step after consideration found that Martin's heirs would be subject to further loss or damage were the complaint and subsequent evidence presented not taken seriously.

In the 1998 complaint,

Consolidated Coal was said to have "interfered and applied pressure" upon Knott County Coal forcing a cancellation with the previous lease agreement between the coal company and Martin's heirs.

This resulted, according to the complaint, in a sizable monetary loss of the potential profit which would have been taken from Knott County Coal's mining of the area. The complaint further detailed this loss by estimating that, had the lease continued and Knott County Coal been able to continue mining under the agreement, the coal mined, would have equaled 2,857,000 tons. This would have meant a loss of approximately \$5 million for the Martin heirs. In addition, the complaint stated the land owners would have also lost

an estimated \$70,000 in timber taken from the land.

According to documents from A. Martin Gamble's chairman, O. Dathan Cook, Kentucky May Coal Company, has, as a result of this recent decision to grant the temporary restraining order, been charged with "systematically mining coal from the heirs of a deceased Appalachian man ... Martin's heirs, who reclaimed their inheritance and made positive legal advancements in protecting those interests, noted that many families, having been in similar situations, were all too often "beaten down and legally out-manuevered" when attempting to acquire what was rightfully theirs to begin with.

Now that these combined heirs have won the first battle, the war must also be decided through decisions made by the Knott County Circuit Court, which must now wrestle with the problem of what to do about the massive and substantial encroachment upon their mineral estate.

motion, according to Gerald Derossett, an attorney with the law office representing both men.

The arraignment came after a May 17 indictment which claimed both men were involved in a drug-related incident on November 1 in Perry County.

Prosecutors have asked the Millers to answer to a combined seven charges, including distributing OxyContin and possession of a firearm during and in relation to a drug trafficking crime.

The original count one of the May 17 indictment said that the alleged drug offense in early November may have been preceded by previous, as of yet unknown, possible offenses dating as early as January 1, 2000.

The indictment charges that during the November incident, both James and Joseph Lee allegedly distributed 16 OxyContin pills and were also allegedly found to be in possession of 223 more OxyContin pills which they allegedly intended to sell.

Both men were indicted for allegedly possessing a firearm, specifically a .380 caliber semi-automatic pistol, during and in relation to a drug trafficking crime.

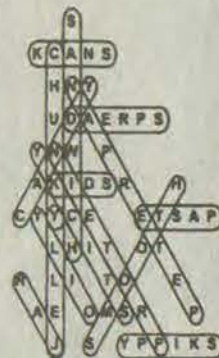
This count also resulted in separate charges on both father and son, as each had previous

Biographical sketch of Dr. Russell Anderson

Russell Anderson was born in Floyd County, Kentucky, and raised in a house with "three rooms and a path." As a young boy he got his first job working in the coal fields for fifty cents a day. Later he bought himself a mule, and made \$2 a day plowing in the corn fields. As time went along, he continued to work at different jobs that would earn him money. He trapped muskrats and minks early in the mornings and would stretch their hides. Then in the fall he would mail them to Sears and Roebuck and Montgomery Wards for money. Later he got jobs working in timber and sawmills and in construction. Then he got a job mining coal, and was the number one coal loader out of a large group of men. In 1955, due to the instability of the work in coal mines, he left Southeast Kentucky and moved to Ypsilanti, Michigan. There he started in the drywall business. He was an unsaved man who had never once heard a clear presentation of the gospel of the Lord Jesus.

Mr. Anderson then met a young lady in Michigan who was from Middlesboro, Kentucky. As he tells the story, "After preparing one meal of southern fried chicken, he told her to name the date"—he wanted to marry her. Soon after marriage Mr. Anderson heard the gospel of the Lord Jesus and was saved, September 13, 1959.

In 1960, a builder that Mr. Anderson was working for, went bankrupt and did not pay Mr. Anderson, which caused him to go broke. In these difficult times, even though he could not sometimes take a paycheck himself, he never missed paying a bill, and in fact never missed tithing one week. As he says it, "I missed some paydays, but god never missed one from me."

Due to an old fashioned work ethic he learned as a boy, and with his new found partner, the Lord Jesus Christ, he continued in business. God miraculously began to bless him. In fact, in just a little over seven years he became a millionaire. He increased his giving from 10% to 30% for what God had done for him. In only a few years he became a multi-millionaire. As time went along he continued to increase his giving to God. By 1970, he was giving the Lord 50% of what he earned.

Through the years God has continued to bless him and he has continued to invest in the Lord's work. In 1972, he co-founded Hyles-Anderson College with Dr. Jack Hyles, pastor of First Baptist Church of Hammond, Indiana. This is now the largest fundamental Baptist College in America. He has helped to build colleges in Mexico, Haiti, and the Philippines, and recently co-founded Commonwealth Baptist College in his home state in Lexington, Kentucky. In 1998, he gave \$1.50 for every \$1.00 he made. In 1999 he gave over \$30,000 per day to the Lord's work which totals more than 20 million dollars for the Lord's work. Over the years he has financed the building of more than 100 churches throughout the world.

In 1999, he made a promise, with the Lord's help, that he would help to see over 1,000,000 souls come to Christ in the next seven years. He has employed men around the country to win souls full-time. At the current rate, he will beat the goal of 1,000,000 souls, and could in fact more than double that amount. He also promised, with the Lord's help, to start another 200 churches besides the 100 already started around the world in the next few years.

Brother Anderson now travels around the country speaking to challenge laymen and preachers alike to not only prove God with their money, but to win the lost to Christ. 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Sisters reunite after 28 years

HAMILTON, Ohio — Sisters Lula Jones Ritchie and Vina Jones Crawford grew up during the Great Depression on a family farm near Pigeonroost in Perry County. They lived a simple life that is typical of their time and heritage. During the week, they did chores and worked a small plot of earth with their parents and six other siblings. On weekends, they retreated to the hills to swing on grapevines, dig swimming holes and explore the forest.

As they grew older, the sisters attended Dudley High School together. At 16, Vina married and left Lula and her family behind. She traded her country life for a home in Hamilton, Ohio, a bustling city on the outskirts of Cincinnati that is commonly referred to as Little Chicago.

After the move, said Lula, the years drifted by and the sisters led their busy, separate lives. They were reunited briefly in

1974 at their brother Shelby Jones' funeral. After burying their sibling in Jackson, Vina returned to her home and the sisters again lost touch.

Several years later, Lula decided that she wanted to find her sister and strengthen their relationship. For 19 years she attempted to contact Vina, but

said it was as if she had simply vanished.

After 20 years with no word from the lost sibling, family members told Lula that her beloved sister had probably passed away.

"Everybody said that she might be dead but I just wouldn't give up," said 76-year-old Lula of her 82-year-old sister. "I just had to see for myself."

Then, in March, Lula finally received news of her sister. She contacted a family member in Hamilton who said Vina was

very much alive and provided Lula with a telephone number and a street address.

"I called the number and heard Vina's voice..." said Lula. "I told her I was coming up to see her and she said, 'Really?' and I said, 'Yes!'"

Lula quickly planned a trip to her sister's residence in Hamilton. In a matter of days she left her home in Bonnyman, in Perry County, in anticipation of a joyful reunion with her long lost sister.

"Seeing her for the first time in all those years... I felt like I could just take wings and fly. It pleased both of us to death," said Lula with emotion.

The sisters spent several days getting to know each other again. They talked about the times they shared as children on their parents' small farm and about the families they raised in the years they were apart. Vina was overjoyed to learn that another sister, Lona, was alive and residing in nearby Indiana.

Lula said that since their reunion, they have vowed to never lose touch again. The sisters now share phone calls and Vina is planning a trip home to the mountains in the near future.

"We were very close growing up... we won't lose touch like that again," stated Lula.

the terms of that February domestic violence order.

U.S. District Court Judge Joseph M. Hood issued a bench warrant for Stidham's arrest on May 18 in connection with the charges the day after the indictment was presented.

If found guilty on the first count Stidham could face up to 25 years in prison, a \$1 million fine and three years supervision upon release.

Count two would garner not

more than seven years consecutive to the first count, while count three could find Stidham facing an additional 10 years and a fine of \$250,000.

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Jackson City Hall getting facelift

JACKSON — Coal severance tax money is being tapped for a project to renovate Jackson City Hall.

According to Mayor Mike Miller, the entire building, which currently houses the mayor's offices and police station, will be completely remodeled.

"There will be approximately 24 feet added on to the back of the building," said Miller.

The building will include a new city council room (which will be about twice the size of

the current one), and there will also be an elevator put inside the building to bring the building in compliance with federal Americans with Disabilities Act, which says that public buildings must be accessible for the handicapped.

The building will remain a two stories. The police department will be divided into its own section. The rest of the building will be closed after-hours, something that is not possible at this time.

Some rooms to expect to see upstairs are a conference room, a kitchen and lounge, and a fire-proof storage room for files.

A house divided

By defecting from the Republican Party and handing control of the Senate to Democrats, Vermont Sen. James Jeffords has shattered Washington's fragile political equilibrium. It is difficult to see how the shift in power — and a return to divided government — can serve the nation's interests.

The truth is that President Bush, despite finishing second in the popular vote last November, assembled a bipartisan coalition in Congress during his first four months in office. Passage by both the House and Senate of his landmark \$1.3 trillion tax cut, the first major tax relief in two decades, demonstrated Bush's capacity to forge consensus on both sides of the aisle. This was a historic achievement, considering that Republicans held only a slim majority in the House and had only tenuous control in a Senate split 50-50.

Now, however, Jeffords has sown chaos in the Senate, upending the delicate balance of power and making it more difficult to advance major legislation. Jeffords' about-face may gain him the chairmanship of the Education, Environment and Public Works Committee, a post denied him by GOP leaders but promised to him by Sen. Tom Daschle, D-S.D., the new majority leader. But the Senate's political convulsion is fundamentally negative: It gives Democrats more leverage to stifle the president's legislative agenda; yet with Republicans still in charge of the House, it in now way empowers Democrats to enact their own measures.

At a minimum, the White House will have to work harder — and smarter — to attract moderate Democrats and keep Republicans united behind the president's legislative priorities. In matters when the Senate exercises special constitutional power, such as confirmation of judges, Bush likely will have to compromise more than in the past.

But the president should stick firmly to his conservative principles and, when necessary, go over the heads of lawmakers to sell the agenda to the American people. That is exactly what Bush did successfully in building support for his tax cut. Like Ronald Reagan 20 years ago, Bush discovered that boosting popular support for his major initiatives is the most effective way to gather votes on Capitol Hill. With the Senate in Democratic hands, the president will have to build his majorities one at a time, issue by issue.

Unsurprisingly, the transfer of leadership in the Senate has prompted Democratic lawmakers to call for a more bipartisan approach by the White House. But bipartisanship is a two-way street. Sen. Daschle's strident attacks on Bush's programs are certainly not a promising omen for future relations between the White House and the Senate. Our hope is that Daschle and other Democratic leaders will recognize that, after seven years in the minority, gaining control of the Senate imposes an obligation to put partisanship aside in order to serve the country's common interests.

Leave no millionaire behind

The campaign slogan was "leave no child behind" but we wonder if this was a Bush gaffe and he meant "millionaire."

Congress has now adjourned for a long week of Memorial Day holiday and the \$1.35 trillion tax reduction bill is set to become law. This legislation phases tax reductions in over 10 years from fiscal year 2001 (ends Sept. 30) through fiscal year 2010 and the millionaires are definitely favored. What's wrong with that? Plenty.

Congress has not acted on a budget for 2002 and some additional expenditures for 2001 seem likely. Tax reductions are a form of expenditure and reasonably they should be considered along with other expenditures such as for education (leave no child behind), infrastructure (our highways and bridges are crumbling and airports are overcrowded), defense and missile defense (a high priority for Bush), prescription drugs for the elderly, and the list goes on. The GOP strategy is to spend the resources on tax cuts and thus prevent the growth of government regardless of the

national need. These drastic changes extend for 10 years into an uncertain future. This seems like foolhardy policy.

These tax reductions are based on 10-year surplus projections by the Congressional Budget Office, which the CBO itself warns are subject to many uncertainties. Earlier CBO forecasts, for much shorter times, have been in error by a hundred billion or more. In fact the current surpluses are created by accounting rules; these funds belong not only to Social Security but to some 150 other government trust funds (Medicare, military and civil service pensions, highway and airport funds, etc.). Total federal debt has continued to increase, a burden for our children and grandchildren. The actual 10-year cost is not as advertised but will be at least \$1.7 trillion; this is because the CBO projections, assumed the surpluses would be used to pay down government debt so that using funds for tax reductions will increase the interest charges on the larger debt, estimated to cost at least \$350 million.

Some of the tax reductions are effective January 1, 2001. The child tax credit increases from \$500 to \$600, and most taxpayers will receive a refund check (probably in August) of \$300 (singles) or \$600 (couples). Those with incomes of less

than \$6,000 (singles) or \$12,000 (couples) will get less. This will provide a small stimulus to the sluggish economy.

The tax rate for the lowest incomes will drop from 15 percent to 10 percent, help to a group that pays some of the highest taxes (because of the 7.65 percent payroll taxes for Social Security and Medicare). Decreased taxes for low-income people are desirable but they are deceptive since they provide political cover for the many times larger cuts for the wealthy. There are many gimmicks such as the deduction of college expenses up to \$4,000; this provision is dropped in 2006. The tax reductions are cleverly crafted to provide increasing tax reductions in future years as surplus numbers become larger (and more uncertain).

The millionaires will have to be patient but will be rewarded. They will benefit from phased-in tax rate reductions (28 percent drops to 25 percent, 31 percent drops to 28 percent, 36 percent drops to 33 percent and 39.6 drops to 35 percent) as they phase in over the next five years. The tax-free estate limit goes to \$1 million (from \$675,000) next year (these limits can be doubled for couples) and increases each year until it is

\$3.5 million in 2009 and the estate tax is abolished entirely in 2010 (a good year for a billionaire to die!).

Paul Krugman (economist and writer for the New York Times) says "... the Bush tax cut looks affordable only thanks to financial trickery that would have landed the management of any publicly listed company in jail ..." Tom Daschle, soon to be Democratic majority leader in the Senate, says Congress will ultimately will have to come back to "make corrections."

We view this legislation as primarily a political document and not a tax reduction plan. It provides the ammunition for the battle for control of Congress in 2002 and ultimately for the presidency in 2004. The annual cost, \$30 billion this year, will be less than \$100 billion in 2004, at the end of the Bush first term, but increases to almost \$200 billion by 2010.

There appears to be one final and little noticed feature: unless reenacted by Congress in 2011, all provisions are rescinded. That is a good feature since we estimate the cost in the second 10 years (2011 to 2020) to be \$4 trillion, just when millions of new retirees will be causing financial difficulties for Social Security and Medicare. Stay tuned.

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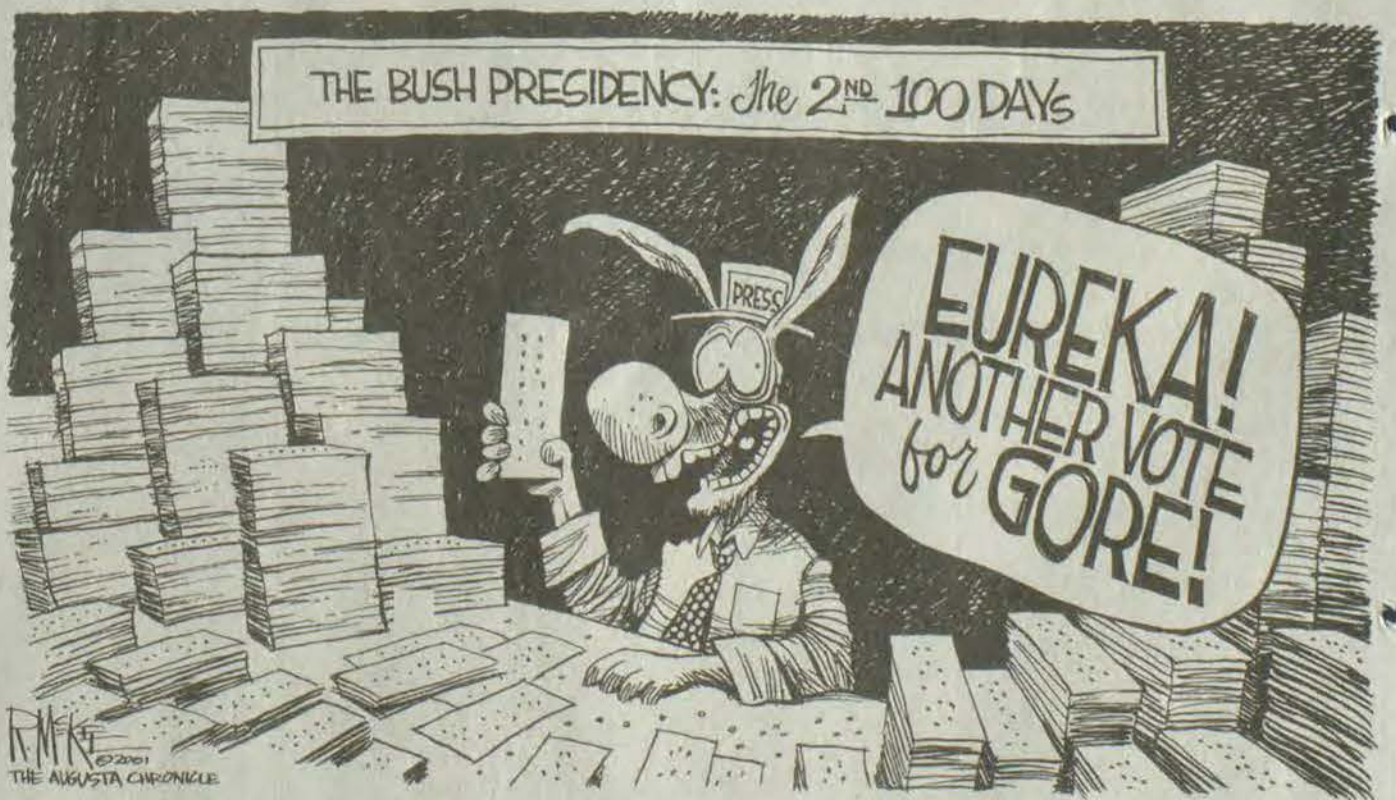

What is the Agriculture Water Quality Act?

The Agriculture Water Quality Act (AWQA), KRS 224.71-00 through 224.71-140, was passed by the Kentucky General Assembly in 1994. The goal of the Act is to protect surface and ground water resources from pollution as a result of agriculture and silviculture activities.

How does this act define agriculture and silviculture?

An 'agriculture operation' is any farm operation on a tract of

land, including all income-producing improvements and farm dwellings, together with other farm buildings and structures incident to operation and maintenance of the farm, situated on 10 contiguous acres or more of land used for agriculture or silviculture or devoted to meeting the requirements and qualifications for payments to agriculture programs under an agreement with state or federal government.

'Silviculture,' in general sense, is that part of forestry that involves growing and harvesting trees.

Who does this act affect?

The Agriculture Water Quality Act will impact all landowners with 10 or more contiguous acres conducting or allowing the conduct of agriculture or silviculture production on their land. Landowners will be required to develop and implement a water quality plan based upon guidance from the Statewide Agriculture Water Quality Plan.

What is the statewide Agriculture Water Quality Plan?

The Statewide Agriculture Water Quality Plan consists of best management practices from six different areas—crops, livestock, pesticides and fertilizer, farmstead, silviculture, and streams and other waters. This statewide plan will serve as a guide to individual landowners as they develop individual water quality plans.

How does an individual develop and implement his/her agriculture water quality plan?

Landowners must assess their operations and determine if they need an agriculture water quality plan. Existing farm plans may be incorporated into this plan. Once the assessment is complete, the landowner must choose the appropriate best management practices for his/her operation. A producer workbook has been developed to landowners in assessing agriculture and silviculture operation. The workbook summarizes the best management practices included in the Statewide Agriculture Water Quality Plan.

Who has the responsibility to develop an agriculture water quality plan?

The landowner has the respon-

sibility to prepare an Agriculture Water Quality Plan that best meets the needs of the particular farming operation. This plan belongs to the landowner. It must be available in the event a water pollution problem is identified and traceable to that agricultural operation. A self-certification form, located in the Agriculture Water Quality Producer Workbook, can be filed with the local conservation district.

What is the time frame for developing and implementing an individual plan?

Individuals have until October 23, to fully implement their individual plan, with one exception that relates to activities along or in streams or other water bodies. These best management practices must be implemented now as the activities are also regulated through the Federal Clean Water Act. They relate to minor stream crossings, removal of sand and gravel from streams, bank stabilization, and stream and wetland filling and excavation. Under these circumstances, the landowner should contact the Kentucky Division of Water for guidance.

available?

Technical assistance is available for landowners. Professionals with the Cooperative Extension Service, Natural Resources Conservation Service, Farm Service Agency, Kentucky Division of Water, Waste Management, Forestry and Conservation, and Department for Health Services can provide educational resources and technical information. These professionals are familiar with the Act, the Statewide Plan, and the process for implementation.

Financial assistance may be available from a variety of sources. Both state and federal programs have monies available for projects which protect our water resources. Additionally, your local conservation district has information available about water quality related cost-share programs. However, the lack of cost-share assistance does not relieve the landowner of the responsibility for developing and implementing a water quality protection plan.

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Governor Patton Orders Limited Certificate of Need Moratorium

Frankfort, Ky. - Citing the Medicaid budget crisis, Gov. Paul Patton has issued an executive order declaring a limited moratorium on the state approval of a number of health care programs and services.

The order, which takes effect immediately and lasts through April 15, 2002, places a moratorium on the state's Certificate of Need (CON) process for new construction and expansion of personal care, nursing home, nursing facility, intermediate care, skilled care and Alzheimer nursing home beds; fixed or mobile magnetic resonance imaging units; physical rehabilitation hospital beds; home health agencies; adult day health programs; private duty nursing agencies; ambulatory surgical centers and open heart surgery programs.

The order does not affect pro-

jects that have already received CON approval. It also does not apply to hospital acute care beds, neonatal units, organ transplant programs, cardiac catheterization services and several other programs that require CON approval.

The purpose of CON is to control the unnecessary duplication of health care facilities and services that increase the cost of health care.

In the order, Gov. Patton noted the impact that the CON process has on the

Medicaid budget. "We're taking the Medicaid budget problem very seriously and there are no easy solutions," Gov. Patton said. "This limited moratorium will control spending and illustrate the seriousness of the issue while it gives us time to find solutions and make recommendations to the 2002 General Assembly."

The Executive Steering

Committee on Medicaid and the Cabinet for Health Services recommended the moratorium. For the current year, the Medicaid budget is short \$82 million. Next year, the projection is a \$200 million plus shortfall for the Medicaid program in state and

federal dollars.

The limited moratorium through April of 2002 will allow the steering committee to review CON issues and the Medicaid budget and make recommendations to the 2002 General Assembly.

"One of the greatest areas of concern we have is the budget imbalance projected for fiscal year 2003," Interim Health Services Secretary Marcia Morgan said. "It is essential we take steps such as a CON moratorium to begin to deal with this

imbalance."

The order makes provisions for approval of CON applications for emergencies and safety code compliance.

The three previous administrations imposed or continued CON moratoriums in Kentucky.

'The Kentucky Encyclopedia' now online

Morehead State University's Camden-Carroll Library and Institute for Regional Analysis and Public Policy have partnered with the University Press of Kentucky to make authoritative, historical information about the state available through a web-based service by creating an online version of "The Kentucky Encyclopedia."

Dr. John E. Kleber, MSU professor emeritus of history, edited the original, hardback book, published by the University Press in 1992. It covers a multitude of historical topics such as art, busi-

ness, education, politics, religion and sports.

The task of transforming the encyclopedia into a website has taken about three years — from initial discussions through full implementation. All entries in the print and CD-ROM versions of the encyclopedia are included in the online version, which consists of 2,138 separate entries interconnected by 51,273 textual hyperlinks. The entries have been enhanced using a descriptive tagging system, which allows for special search and display capabilities on the Web.

The interface and search features were designed by Dr. Scott Wymer, director of Morehead State's Center for Virtual Appalachia, and Tom Kmetz, a librarian in Camden-Carroll Library. Helping with the project were MSU seniors Brad Hamlin and Bethany Slone, and freshman Cephas Slone, all of Morehead.

"The online version of 'The Kentucky Encyclopedia' is a wonderful resource for everyone, but it will be of particular interest to students and those doing genealogy work," said Craig Wilkie, assistant director and business manager of University Press. "The online format allows for a full search of the text of the encyclopedia, which should make it an invaluable research tool for Kentuckians."

"Kentuckians everywhere will benefit from the important step of putting this basic reference work online," said Larry Besant, library director. "I don't doubt that the added tagging and search features will allow some clever students and teachers to discover new ideas about the state's history and life."

"We are excited about the online version of 'The Kentucky Encyclopedia,'" said Dr. David

Rudy, IRAPP dean. "This will significantly increase the accessibility and use of an already vital resource for Kentuckians," he added.

Subscriptions for access to the digital encyclopedia will be made available to public schools, colleges, universities, government agencies, public libraries, non-profit organizations and businesses sometime this summer.

Museum survey reveals history very much alive in Kentucky

History is alive and well in Kentucky. So alive and well, in fact, that among the 120 counties, there are more than 430 museums and historic organizations open and offering programs and services, and another 40 or so new museums in the works.

Not to mention that more than six million people, more people than live in Kentucky, visited history-related organizations and institutions over the last year.

"It's astounding when you look at it," says Karla Nicholson, community services branch manager for local history for the Kentucky Historical Society. "Our reach in and out of Kentucky is growing—along with the interest."

The numbers come from "The State of Museums and History Organizations in Kentucky," the first comprehensive study of museums and history organizations and their economic and human impact in the state. Results were announced Friday by representatives from the Historical Confederation of Kentucky, the Kentucky Association of Museums and the Kentucky Historical Society.

"These are hard numbers, and some pretty exciting information" says Nicholson. "In the past, we have always had ideas of the strength of museums and historical interest in the state,

but this gives us clearly measurable numbers. And the numbers are impressive," she added.

For example, in the last 10 years, there has been a 25 percent increase in museums or historical organizations opened in the state, and today there are more than 2,700 Kentuckians employed by museums and historical organizations. There also are more than 9,000 volunteers.

"Kentuckians love their history," says Dr. J. Kevin Graffagnino, director of the Kentucky Historical Society. "All but three counties in the state have at least one history organization or museum, and most have many more. In fact, history museums are the fastest growing type of museum in the state."

Budgets for the museums and organizations total more than \$96 million, but that does not tell the real story of the state of museums in Kentucky. "Our figures show that statewide, our organizations are providing great service with very few dollars," said HCK President Patricia Gordon Michel.

Slightly more than a quarter of statewide groups operate on less than \$5,000 a year. A total of 57 percent operate on less than \$50,000 a year. Only 11 percent have budgets of more than \$500,000, she said.

Collection-wise, the organizations and museums care for more than 3.7 million artifacts. These range from ventriloquism dolls and paraphernalia in Kenton County to Coca-Cola memorabilia in Elizabethtown to the Underground Railroad in

Mason County, to coal mine-related materials in Harlan, Pike and Muhlenberg counties.

"Whatever you look for with Kentucky roots, you can find it somewhere," says Nicholson, pointing to the legion of other museums about science, about natural history, and planetariums, zoos and arboretums.

As for their impact on the economy and education, "it is nothing less than amazing" says Graffagnino. Last year, more than 828,600 school children either toured or engaged in educational programs at museums and history organizations. Another 100 college students collected on the job skills through internships, and, all told, state history organizations and museums served more than 6.3 million people, more than the population of Kentucky.

Broken down, there were 3.98 million who toured museum and historic sites, 744,600 who took part in festivals and special events, 796,700 who attended programs and educational activities for children, families and adults, and the previously mentioned more than 828,000 school children.

This does not begin to count the people who "visit" these organizations and museums by other means—the Internet, e-mail, and such.

"These are people, who came not only from Kentucky," Nicholson said, "but from all over the country and, in fact, all over the world. Our history is being shared around the globe."

Study: Drivers spend 36 hours waiting in traffic each year

U.S. commuters and travelers spend almost entire work-week waiting in traffic each year, according to a national traffic study that was released this month.

The Texas Transportation Institute measured road congestion in 68 cities across the country. Eleven sponsors, including the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet, were involved in the study.

"The findings will provide elected officials, policy-makers and commuters with statistics to help make future road decisions," said Dean Blake, executive director of the Plantmix Asphalt Industry of Kentucky. "They will be a helpful tool in deciding the amount and location of new construction. The statistics also show that we must continue to find ways to speed up construction, so traffic congestion caused by work zones is limited."

Here are some of the study's statistics and conclusions:

■ The average annual traffic delay for U.S. motorists climbed from 11 hours in 1982, to 36 hours in 1999.

■ Nationally, delays quintupled from 1982 to 1999, in areas of less than 1 million people—even more than in the largest U.S. cities. All size categories in the survey showed more severe congestion during that time period.

■ The total congestion cost for the 68 cities measured in the study was \$78 billion wasted in time and excess fuel costs.

■ One dramatic finding: Louisvillians sit in traffic longer than New Yorkers. The number rose from eight hours of traffic delay in 1982, to 37 hours in 1999. The congestion cost to Louisville—measured in terms of wasted fuel and time—was \$530 million.

■ Researchers said no single answer exists for the worsening problem of traffic jams. But widening roads, increasing operational efficiency, and improving management of construction and maintenance projects were cited as solutions.

■ The report noted that road expansions slowed the growth of congestion. Travel time grew three to four times faster in areas where road expansion did not keep pace with increases in traffic volume.

"To upgrade and improve roads, we must ensure that our road funds are sufficient to meet increased traffic loads," Blake said. "Members of the Plantmix Asphalt Industry of Kentucky work closely with the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet in being part of those solutions. Newly paved asphalt roads can be opened to traffic almost immediately, because no curing time is necessary. In addition, the speed of asphalt construction means that work often can be done at night, which also minimizes construction delays."

■ are underinsured and meet these income guidelines may also be eligible.

■ Uninsured or underinsured women age 18 and over are eligible for cervical cancer screening services.

"I cannot stress enough the importance of clinical exams and mammograms to Kentucky's women. They are our first line of defense in fighting this terrible disease that strikes at the heart of our Commonwealth," said First Lady Judi Patton, who chairs the Governor's Task Force on Breast Cancer and is honorary

chair of the Kentucky Breast Cancer Coalition. "Our health departments, physicians and hospitals provide these valuable services to our local communities, and I encourage every woman over 40 to get a mammogram this year and every year."

During 2000, 13,887 women received screening or diagnostic mammograms and 24,791 women received cervical cancer screenings through the Kentucky Women's Cancer Screening Project.

During the 1998-99 fiscal year, 115 breast cancers were detected through the screening project. Seventy-three (or 63 percent of cancers) of those were detected in the early stage, when treatment is most success-

ful and women can look forward to a normal life expectancy.

Experts stress that all women are at risk for breast cancer and the earlier breast cancer is detected, the better a woman's chance for survival. Breast cancer incidence increases with age.

Women age 40-44 are nearly twice as likely to be diagnosed with breast cancer as women age 35-39. The incidence rate doubles at the 50-54 age group and continues to increase past age 55.

Experts also say a mammogram, or breast X-ray, can detect a tumor before a woman or her physician can feel it. Women diagnosed early by an annual mammogram experience a 90 to 95 percent survival rate.

The Kentucky State Park System has geared up for the summer travel season. Visitors to the "nation's finest" park system will find a new golf course and two new campgrounds completed just in time for summer.

Perhaps the most notable project is the new championship golf course at Pine Mountain State Resort Park near Pineville in southeastern Kentucky.

Contractors are putting the finishing touches on the course's pro shop and parking lot, but with temporary facilities in place, golfers may now play the scenic, links-style course. The course, called Wasioto Winds, was designed by internationally recognized golf course architect Michael Hurdzan.

Park Manager John Brock said golfers will be struck by the course's beauty. It occupies an undulating valley criss-crossed by a meandering stream and guarded by majestic mountains. Native plants such as rhododendron and hemlocks were used to landscape the course. Unlike many Kentucky courses,

Wasioto Winds will remain green virtually year round, because of the extensive use of an upscale, cool-weather turf called L-93 Bent Grass.

Other course features include wide car paths, a practice range, two practice putting greens, and an indoor-use training center.

The course includes five par 3 holes and five par 5s. True to its links nature, the course is relatively flat, with water coming into play from three lakes, a creek and several wetlands areas. Six arching bridges span the water throughout the course.

Greens fees are \$25 during weekdays, \$30 on weekends. Cart fees are \$11.

Marshall's Brooks selected to participate in Rawlings Home Run Challenge at World Series

Marshall University senior first baseman Jason Brooks has been selected to participate in the 2001 Home Run Challenge on Thursday, June 7 at Rosenblatt Stadium in Omaha, Nebraska.

The competition will be held in conjunction with the opening ceremonies for the 2001 College World Series. The event will be televised live by ESPN2 from 8-10 p.m.

The Home Run Challenge, sponsored by Rawlings, will include a total of eight seniors - four from Division I, two from Division II and two from Division III. The participants for the event were chosen based on two things - total home runs during the regular season and average number of home runs per game.

The Sayre, Oklahoma native, was awarded Louisville Slugger NCAA Division I All-American second-team at the designated hitter position. Brooks joined Jason Knoedler of Miami (Ohio) on the second-team. Brooks finished his final season with a .374 batting average and a school record 23 home runs. His 73 RBI not only set a new Marshall record, but also broke the old-Mid American Conference record.

It appears Jeff Green is back on familiar ground, the top of the Bush Series.

With his win this past Saturday at Lowe's Motor Speedway in Concord, N.C., the Owensboro native took over as BGN points leader with a slim 19-point lead. The win was Green's first in 12 tries at the track; however, it was crew chief Harold Holly's second.

Another Green also found his way among the top-10 finishers on Saturday. David Green finished ninth. Fans will get to see all three Green brothers compete against each other again when the Busch Series travels to Kentucky Speedway for the inaugural Outback Steakhouse 300 on June 16. Mark Green will return to Busch action at Kentucky in the No. 55 Davis & Weight Motorsports Ford.

"It will be really nice to go back home," Green said. "We have been working really hard to prepare for our Winston Cup debut at Indianapolis, but we really wanted to run this Kentucky race."

"I am excited about getting Kerry in the car," Waltrip said. The Brewco Motorsports teams of Kevin Grubb and Jamie McMurray struggled at

Lowe's on Saturday. Busch qualifying was rained out resulting in a starting grid set by owners' points. Grubb started the race 24th and McMurray in 25th. McMurray was able to stay in or near the top-25 all day, but found it difficult to work his way through traffic on the difficult track and finished where he started, 25th.

Grubb suffered transmission problems. After going behind the wall to replace the transmission, the Timberwolf team was able to return to the track to finish the race, but finished 46 laps down for 33rd. Waltrip also attempted to compete in the Busch event Saturday but suffered mechanical problems during the parade laps prior to the start of the race and was credited with a 43rd-place finish.

The Winston Cup Series was also at Lowe's Motor Speedway over the weekend, competing in their longest race of the season, the Coca-Cola 600, on Sunday.

Things are starting to look up for Jeremy Mayfield. He followed his strong performance at The Winston the previous weekend with a 10th-place finish in the 600.

The weekend didn't get much better for Waltrip. He followed up his extremely early exit on Saturday afternoon with a finish of 28th on Sunday night.

There were a few on the track this year, but Waltrip is waiting until the Pepsi 400 in Daytona in July to show off the one special paint scheme he'll be running in 2001. Other than that, Waltrip and the people at Dale Earnhardt Inc. are keeping a pretty tight lip about it.

Both the Busch Series and Winston Cup series will be in action at Dover Downs in Dover, Del. this upcoming weekend. Jeff Green will be pulling double duty as he will pilot his regular ride, the No. 10 NesQuik Ford in the Busch race on Saturday and then drive the No. 30 AOL Chevrolet from the Richard Childress Racing stable on Sunday.

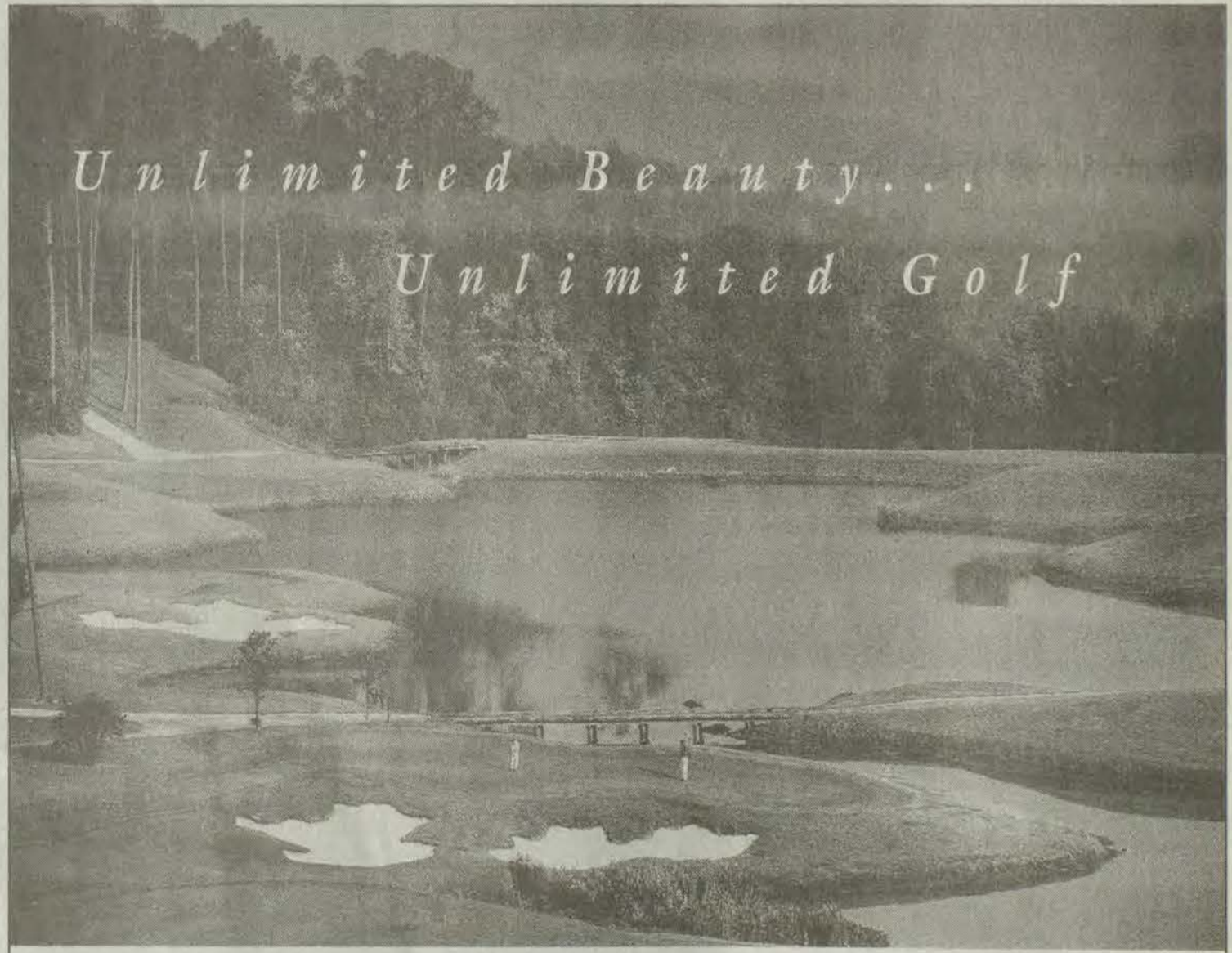
One of the park system's newest parks is Nolin Lake in Edmonson County, north of

Free elk viewing tours available

This fall, the bugle of rutting elk will break out in the hills of Eastern Kentucky. The breeding season for elk, also known as the rut, typically begins about the first of September and is marked by an incredible display of grunting, bugling and sparring between the males of the species.

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR) and the University of Kentucky (UK) want the public to take part in hearing and viewing rutting elk again this year.

Last fall, KDFWR and UK personnel lead free public elk tours at Cyprus-Amax Wildlife Management Area (WMA), now called Addington Enterprises WMA, allowing those interested to hear the bugle of bull elk echo through the valleys and watch them gather cows into harems.

Some observers were even able to watch bull elk vigorously clash their antlers together and battle over cows.

This year six bulls are four years or older and 28 are three years or older. These are the big,

antlered animals that will bugle and spar this fall. These adult bulls and 20 younger bulls should produce the most intense bugling sessions heard in Kentucky in more than 150 years.

For those interested, representatives from KDFWR and UK will be leading elk tours again this year at Addington Enterprises WMA near Hazard. The guided tours will be given every Saturday and Sunday morning, September 9 through October 22.

Space is limited to 25 people per day for guided tours, so anyone interested must reserve a place by calling Tia Edwards at the KDFWR Information Center at 1-800-858-1549.

Special tours for groups with more than 10 people will also be given during the week. For group reservations, contact Dan Crank, KDFWR wildlife biologist, at 606/378-3474.

Addington Enterprises WMA is open to the public for elk viewing throughout the year. Visitors to the area must purchase a \$10 yearly area user per-

mit and view a five-minute safety film at the guard house at the entrance to the property before entering the area. Permits are available wherever hunting and fishing licenses are sold. The permit fee will be waived for those taking a guided tour.

To reach Addington Enterprises WMA from the intersection of KY 15 and KY 80 in Hazard, travel east on 80 for 6-1/2 miles. Turn left onto KY 476 and go 3-1/2 miles. Turn right on KY 1087 and travel 3/4 mile. Turn left and follow access road to guard shack.

Swimming advisories continue in Kentucky

The Kentucky Division of Water and the Department for Health Services are continuing swimming advisories that have been in place for several areas of the state for several years. Water sampling for the 2001 recreational season has begun for the Licking River, the North Fork of the Kentucky River and the Upper Cumberland River, and results indicate that previous advisories should remain in effect.

Kentuckians should avoid swimming and other recreational contact with waters in these areas of the Commonwealth because of the presence of high levels of fecal coliform bacteria. This type of bacteria, present in human and animal waste, indicates the presence of untreated or inadequately treated sewage. The bacteria create a potential

for acquiring infectious diseases, particularly diarrheal illnesses.

Swimming advisories remain in effect for the following:

Upper Cumberland River

■ The Cumberland River from Fourmile Bridge (Highway 2014) to

Pineville at the Highway 66 Bridge and from Wallins Creek Bridge (Highway 219) to Harlan.

■ Martins Fork from Harlan to the Cawood Water Plant.

■ All of Catrons Creek, all of Clover Fork and all of Straight Creek.

■ Poor Fork from Harlan to Looney Creek.

■ Looney Creek from the mouth to Lynch Water Plant Bridge.

Illegal straight pipe discharges, failing septic systems and bypasses from sewage collection systems contribute to water quality problems in the area.

North Fork of the Kentucky River

The swimming advisory continues for the North Fork of the Kentucky River upstream of Chavies. Numerous illegal straight pipe discharges of sewage contribute to water quality problems along this section of the river.

However, water quality has continued to improve and is approaching an acceptable level for swimming in some stretches

of the river. Licking River

The Licking River from Banklick Creek to the confluence with the Ohio River remains under a swimming advisory. The advisory includes all of both Banklick Creek and Three Mile Creek. High fecal coliform pollution in this area is caused by combined sewer overflows and sanitary sewer overflows.

Urban areas

The agencies also recommend against swimming or other full-body contact with rivers in and directly below urban areas, particularly after a significant rainfall. This recommendation is for urban areas along waterways throughout

Kentucky because of the increased potential for exposure to pollution from illegal straight pipe discharges, bypasses from sewage collection systems and combined sewer overflows.

Both the Division of Water and the Department for Public Health continue to monitor these areas. A number of programs are implementing solutions to resolve these problems.

CONCORD, N.C. — The Coca-Cola 600 had a magnificent winner and a glorious survivor. Jeff Burton won NASCAR's longest race for the second time in three years, and Tony Stewart finished a fast-closing third to quiet critics who doubted he had the endurance to excel in both the Indianapolis 500 and the Coca-Cola 600 on the same day.

The victory was most important for Burton because it signaled the end of a season-long slump for the driver who finished third in the 2000 Winston Cup points standings.

In the season's first 11 events, Burton had only two finishes in the top 10.

"Never give up," Burton said. "We need to do more of this. There are still hard times ahead, but this was an awfully big night for this race team."

Stewart made up for an early bobble — he had to start at the back of the pack anyway — and drove the

fastest car on the track for most of the final 100 laps. During that time, he charged from eighth place to third, quieted any suspicions about his endurance and was closing rapidly on the second-place finisher, Kevin Harvick, when Burton took the checkered flag.

BUSCH GRAND NATIONAL

CONCORD, N.C. — Jeff Green and Matt Kenseth engaged in a spirited duel for the victory in Saturday's CarQuest 300, with Green's Ford surviving a bit of pushing and shoving on the final straightaway to win by about three-quarters of a car length.

As the 200-lap race made its way to a thrilling conclusion, Green and Kenseth managed to gain a slight edge on Jason Keller, Green's teammate and the third-place finisher. Green held on to first place by taking a tighter line through the turns, but that plan broke down a bit in the final three laps as Kenseth drew ever closer.

Dale Jarrett vs. Tony Stewart

Late in the Coca-Cola 600, Jarrett and Stewart raced for over 20 laps before Stewart finally slipped past Jarrett to take fifth place. Once clear of Jarrett, Stewart took off, moving up to a third-place finish as he obviously drove the fastest car on the track in the closing stages. By the time he finally got clear of Jarrett, however, it was too late to catch leader Jeff Burton or second-place finisher Kevin Harvick.

Stewart was once 18th, is now sixth and has nearly halved the distance between himself and the points leader."

Like his father and many other NASCAR drivers of note, Sterling cut his teeth running weekly features at the famous fairgrounds track in Nashville, Tenn.

Winston Cup drivers still the oldest racers in the world

In the last three years, the average age of the drivers in the Winston Cup Series has dropped by three years, but it is still the oldest of the world's major motor-sports series.

The average Cup driver is now 36, 10 years older than the average age in Formula One. The average age in CART is 30, and the Indy Racing League average is 33.

HENDRICK SUCCESS: Over the years, cars owned by Rick Hendrick have won eight Winston Cup races, 11 pole positions and three Busch Grand National races at Lowe's Motor Speed-

way, which is located just a mile from the team's shops.

■ **STILL SIDELINED:** Bobby Hamilton Jr. again drove the No. 33 Chevrolet of Andy Petree Racing in the Coca-Cola 600, replacing injured Joe Nemechek.

Nemechek suffered a broken sternum and arm, both on the right side, in a practice crash last week at Dover Downs (Del.) International Speedway. Subbing for Nemechek in the Winston Open and No Bull Sprint on May 19, Hamilton, who is the son of Nemechek's teammate, finished 12th and fourth, respectively.

"Bobby was smooth and solid in both races, and he showed us a lot of the potential he has," Petree said. "The fact

of the matter is, he deserves a chance to run the 600. We feel that way and the people at (sponsor) Oakwood Homes feel that way. But it goes even further than that. We think Little Bobby is the best driver we can get right now."

■ **THE LAST STEP'S A DOOZIE:** Dale Earnhardt Jr. thinks the 100 extra miles in NASCAR's longest race do exact a toll on drivers.

"Charlotte has always been a good track for me and for the team, and we all learned a lot in the last two years about running 600 miles instead of 500," Earnhardt said. "The last 100 miles are incredible. Your vision gets blurry and you are so tired that it's hard to keep your focus on the race."

"I think we're a better team and much more consistent by far right now compared to where we were last year, even though we had won some races. We just missed the setup at the start of The Winston, but we got the car handling like old times by the last 10 laps, and I think we can use that knowledge for the 600."

■ **NEW SPONSOR:** The youngest of the three Wallace brothers, Kenny, has come up with a sponsorship deal with C.F. Sauer Co. of Richmond, Va. In 15 of the remaining 25 races, the Eel River Racing No. 27 Pontiac will carry the sponsorship of one of the Sauer brands, Duke's Mayonnaise.

Q What is the difference between doctors and suppliers that are 'participating' with Medicare and doctors and suppliers that are 'non-participating' with Medicare?

A Participating doctors and suppliers agree to accept the Medicare approved amount as payment in full. These doctors and suppliers 'accept assignment' on all claims they file to Medicare. Non-participating doctors and suppliers with Medicare may choose to accept assignment on a case-by-case basis.

Q What is assignment in Medicare?

A Assignment is an agreement between Medicare and doctors and suppliers of health care equipment (like wheelchairs, oxygen, braces, and ostomy supplies). When doctors and suppliers agree to accept assignment they accept the Medicare approved amount as payment in full. If a doctor or supplier chooses not to accept assignment, their costs are often higher, which means you may pay more out of pocket.

Q If my doctor or supplier does accept assignment on my Medicare claim what will I have to pay?

A You will only have to pay a co-insurance that is 20 percent of Medicare's approved amount on most services, any non-covered services, and any amounts applied to your Medicare Part B deductible. Medicare pays the doctor directly.

Q If my doctor or supplier does not accept assignment on my Medicare claim what will I have to pay?

A If the doctor chooses to file a 'non-assigned' claim, you may be billed 20 percent of Medicare's approved amount on most services and an additional 15 percent above Medicare's approved amount. The 15 percent above Medicare's approved amount is called the limiting charge. You may have to pay the entire bill at the time you get the service and Medicare pays you directly. Limiting charges do not apply to Medicare claims from suppliers that do not accept assignment and ambulance services.

Q Are there situations when doctors or suppliers must accept assignment?

A Yes. Doctors and suppliers must accept assignment

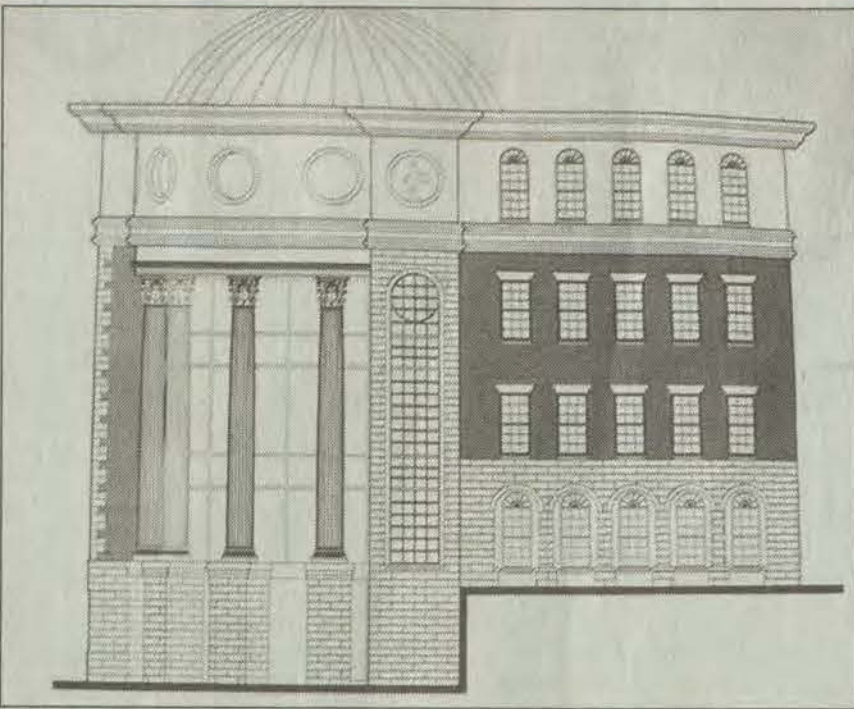

**Know your rights if your
creditors decide to sue**

"If you're behind on your debts your creditors can do a lot more than make annoying collection calls," said Mike Kidwell, vice president and co-founder of Myvesta.org. "Some people think they can hide from their creditors forever. That kind of behavior will most likely end up getting you sued."

Myvesta.org has released a free publication called "What To Do If You Are Sued," which explains your rights when your creditors take legal action against you.

According to Kidwell, "The first thing you should do when you are served with a complaint is to file an answer. In small claims court that can be as simple as signing it and returning it to the court or writing an informal letter. The method depends on the state where you live. Answering a com-

USDA Rural Development announced today that USDA has modified the requirements for its Multi-Family Housing Guaranteed Loan program. Loans for acquisitions can now be used to purchase and rehabilitate existing housing units.

Developers are being encouraged to rehabilitate existing units, using the \$85 million in loan guarantee authority remaining for the fiscal year, which ends August 31, 2001. Previous regulations only allowed funds to be used for new construction of rental housing units.

Under the Guaranteed Rural Rental Housing Program, USDA provides loan guarantees to lenders, who in turn provide loans for the construction and rehabilitation of multi-family housing complexes in rural areas. USDA will guarantee the lender's loan, up to 90 percent of the total development cost.

Units financed under the program are available to families whose income does not exceed 115 percent of the local average. The program also makes available Interest Credit Assistance for 20 percent of the loans guaranteed. This assistance allows USDA to buy down the loan interest rate to the appropriate federal rate (AFR).

Program applications and procedures were published in the Federal Register on December 26, 2000, and amended on February 16, 2001 and May 2, 2001. Interested lenders may apply the third Thursday of every month until funds are exhausted.

LEXINGTON — Baker Communications became the only Lexington advertising agency to win an ADDY award at the district level and advance to the national finals in the annual creative advertising competition sponsored by the American Advertising Federation.

Baker Communications won in the Trade Publication Division for a multi-page spread ad for Lane's End Farm. Raul Escudero Jr., art director at Baker Communications, was responsible for the design. Joyce Fogleman of Lane's End was the copywriter and Lee Thomas the photographer.

Fewer than 10 percent of the 512 entries in AAF District 5 — which included local ADDY winners from cities in Kentucky, Ohio and West Virginia — advanced to the national judging. I thought it would be neat to combine a photo of a yearling at the sales with a stock market ticker tape and write the horses' names with the first three letters capitalized and larger, looking like the stock symbols for companies. It was an opportunity to do something other than just make a list of the horses."

The effort, Escudero said, is a good example of what communication and teamwork between client and agency can produce. "It's a perfect example of how an agency and a client can collaborate. It just worked out great."

The ad appeared as a two-page spread in The Blood-Horse magazine. Lane's End Farm, always a leading consignee at Central Kentucky horse sales, was an ideal candidate for the IPO idea.

Entries for the ADDY awards competition are from advertising that appeared in 2000.

Q How do I find out if a doctor or supplier is participating with Medicare and will 'accept assignment' on my Medicare claim?

If you have questions about Medicare assignment, look in your Medicare and You 2001 Handbook or call 1-800-MEDICARE and request the booklet 'Does Your Doctor or Supplier Accept Assignment?' (Publication No. HCFA-10134) Both the handbook and the assignment book can be found on www.medicare.gov.

plaint shows the judge your commitment to resolving the issue."

In civil court, answering a complaint becomes much more important. If no answer is given, a default judgment will most likely be entered against you. At that time most states will give you a chance to explain why you didn't answer and 30 days to do so. If you don't file an answer within those 30 days, the default judgment becomes final and the party who sued you can take immediate action to collect any money awarded to them.

"To answer a complaint in a civil court, you need to either admit or deny each statement made in the complaint," said Kidwell. "It's best to consult a lawyer when responding to each statement. In most states if you don't raise certain defenses the court will assume that you have waived those defenses. A lawyer will help you to make sure you don't miss anything."

My own personal road started here where I decided to pursue an English degree in hopes of one day teaching high school English. I was a member of the Student Government Association and Fellowship of Christian Athletes and played on the last slow-pitch softball team and the first fast-pitch softball team ever at Pikeville College. I am so grateful to Bill Baird who was the coach, friend, and mentor that gave me the chance to be a part of a college athletic team. But after my sophomore year, I became restless, and a little disillusioned with the English path, so I took an "exit" off my college path and transferred to Belmont University in Nashville, Tenn.

I wanted to explore a life-long talent and passion of mine — music. Although I loved Nashville, and had an overall wonderful experience there for one-and-a-half years, my path soon led back home. I learned that it's true what they say about there being a million places in Nashville to showcase your talent, but I can guarantee you there are a million people standing in line at each of those places. You have to truly want something like that to put the time and effort into it. I never fancied that starving artist lifestyle. I just always wanted some record executive to "happen upon" me singing and we'd sign a record deal. But that only happens in movies, and so I came home.

Not only did my immediate family welcome my backtracking to Pikeville with open arms, but so did my Pikeville College family. I was in the middle of my senior year of college and wasn't at all sure of or happy with my chosen major. So I did what any independent, fearless and slightly neurotic female would do — I changed majors.

I made the decision to enter the Elizabeth Akers Elliot Nursing Program. In two very short, very educational and very hard years, my little, personal, higher education road ran right across the graduation stage at Pikeville College. I had done it! I was a 1999 college graduate. I was an R.N., and I already had a great job waiting for me at Pikeville Methodist Hospital. Even as proud (and relieved) as I was to have gotten this far, I knew there was so much more I

pus, the students will have an opportunity to meet the author and discuss the book.

Summer Orientation also will offer information about the parents' association, FFAST (Families and Students Succeeding Together). All parents will be given a parent's handbook and calendar of the year's major academic, social and athletic events. They also will receive regular mailings and invitations to selected events throughout the school year.

In an effort to place students in appropriate classes, placement tests will be administered during Summer Orientation for the first time. Students with ACT scores below an 18 in English or Reading, or below a 22 in Mathematics, are required to take placement tests. The tests are scored and used by the advisers during the afternoon session.

For all students, Summer Orientation will include small-group tours, informational sessions and displays, lunch and an afternoon advising/registration session, after which students will leave with their fall schedules in hand.

Parents are encouraged to participate in an agenda planned specifically for them. They'll attend special programs and have opportunities to visit with various administrators. Services available to students will be explained and a guided tour will be offered.

New freshman and their parents also have the option to spend a night in a residence hall. Sessions are scheduled for June 19, 20, 21, 23, 26, 27 and 28, and July 28 and 31. Students who already have been admitted should have received information about orientation. Each of EKU's five academic colleges will be represented to welcome and advise new freshmen interested in their programs. Any admitted student who has not received information about orientation should call (859) 622-3311. Students must schedule in advance the day they plan to attend.

Charming Chenoweth looks destined for stardom

It turns out Benjamin Franklin was wrong about that whole "death and taxes" thing.

Every now and then, another far more pleasant certainty comes along - such as the one that Kristin Chenoweth is going to be a very big star.

Actually, "very big" maybe an odd way to describe the petite Tony winner who stands just under 5 feet tall, but then most critics agree that her talents transcend mere inches - and mediocre projects. At 32, Chenoweth makes her TV series debut Tuesday, June 5, in

Kristin, a middling NBC sitcom that casts her as an idealistic young actress from Oklahoma who finds herself working for a corrupt New York tycoon (Jon Tenney) while waiting for her

big break. Larry Romano, Ana Ortiz, Christopher Durang and Dale Godboldo also star.

The actress and her character, Kristin Yancey, share the same small hometown - the Tulsa suburb of Broken Bow - and the same Baptist upbringing, but don't try to pigeonhole either Kristin.

"It's not my life, or even based on my life, but there are certainly aspects of my life in it," Chenoweth acknowledges. "What I think is different about this show is that it isn't just about a fish out of water in New York. It's really about two different people with two different hearts ... and how they change because of one another. "I wanted to make sure that we were very careful. If you speak with a Southern accent and you're petite and you're blond, people immediately go, 'Ding-dong!' But Kristin is really smart, she's got it going on and she's much more aware than people think she is."

No one is underestimating the real-life Kristin these days, and with good reason. The dazzling Chenoweth is hot, hot, hot after winning a Tony Award for her virtuoso turn in a Broadway revival of You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown and stealing the show as brassy Lily St. Regis in ABC's Emmy-winning Annie.

A lot of ink is being spilled about her, chiefly by writers straining to capture her in print without making her sound like the long-lost Olsen Triplets.

See, Chenoweth is, well, nice. Not sugary sweet, but sunny, with an open what-you-see-is-what-you-get confidence that is wildly at odds with the usual synthetic Hollywood product. In short, she is enchanting enough to bewitch a roomful of exhausted, cynical and hypoglycemic TV critics on press tour into becoming her courtly champions.

If she's faking it, Meryl Streep should look to her laurels, because there's a new girl in town. And this one sings everything from grand opera to Broadway standards.

"Obviously, gospel was a great influence on me, growing up in Oklahoma, because I went to church," Chenoweth says. "That's kind of how I got my start. ... I got a lot of training at Opryland."

"At college (Oklahoma City University), my voice teacher said, 'I'm going to open up your voice and teach you how to sing anything you want, but first I'll teach you to sing opera.'" Her studies toward a master's degree polished a soprano voice that The New York Times hailed as "sharp enough to etch monograms into Baccarat crystal."

After winning a Metropolitan Opera audition, Chenoweth seemed headed for the international opera world until she went with a friend to a New York theater audition, totally on a whim.

"And this guy comes to meet me, like, 6 at night and says, 'We'd like to offer you the job.' And I said: '... Uh, "' she says with a laugh. That slapdash beginning launched Chenoweth on a stage career ranging from straight comedy (Epic Proportions by Friends co-creator David Crane) to operetta (Candide, "one of the things almost no one saw but I am proudest of") to musicals culminating in the 1998-99 revival of Charlie Brown, for which she won a Tony Award as the title character's cranky little sister, Sally.

She previously had crossed paths with Kristin creator John Markus while auditioning for a busted NBC pilot. About the same time she also landed a prominent role in American Movie Classics' Paramour, which never aired. "I can't

And what a final round it would be if Webb and Annika Sorenstam were paired together, pitting the world's top two female golfers against each other. Sorenstam, the Open champ five years ago at this same course, has been red-hot in 2001, winning five tournaments in her first nine starts.

Major League Baseball

One man's misfortune is another man's opportunity. Such is the case with the St. Louis Cardinals, who play the third game in a four-game set against the Cincinnati Reds. With slugger Mark McGwire sidelined virtually all season, J.D. Drew has turned potential into production. He's among the league leaders in home runs (barring injury, he'll easily surpass last season's total of 16) and has been hitting above .300. On the Reds' side, Ken Griffey Jr.'s torn hamstring has provided players such as Michael Tucker and Alex Ochoa with increased playing time.

The Simpsons

Horner acquires a computer and takes to it like Bart to a skateboard. He even cre-

Part 2, The Impressionists: Capturing the Moment, airing Monday, follows the movement into the end of the 19th century, when it finally became accepted by the mainstream.

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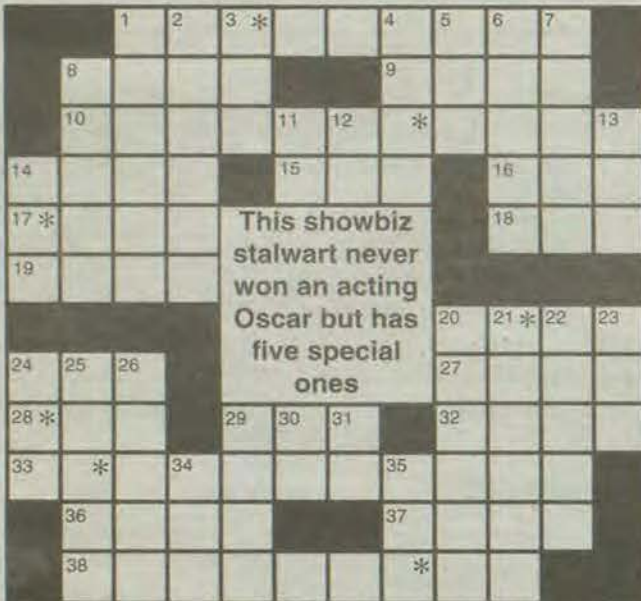

Suggested soy products for recipes include soy flour (1/3 cup minimum), whole soybeans (1/2 cup minimum), tofu (1/2 cup minimum), edamame soybeans (1/2 cup minimum), soy cheese (1 cup minimum), or soymilk (1/2 cup minimum). All of the recipes must be classified

as a quick and easy main dish with a total preparation/cooking time of one hour or less.

You must be a Kentucky resident to enter the recipe contest. Please submit as many recipes as desired. All entries must be typed or legibly handwritten on separate sheets of paper, and must be post-marked by June 15. Recipes must include the contestants name, address, phone number, and county Extension Agent. The recipes will be judged by an appointed board in order to make final selections.

The top three recipes will advance to the Cook-Off, which will be held at the Kentucky State Fair in Louisville, in August.

Prizes include expense-paid trips for the three

recipe finalists, plus...first place, \$500; second place, \$300; and third place, \$200. All groceries purchased for the Cook-Off will also be reimbursed.

All entries will not be acknowledged or returned, and become the property

of the Kentucky Soybean Association.

New acquisitions and new photographs in the collection

As of June 1, audiences will have the opportunity to see a beautiful nineteenth-century double portrait, a silkscreen portraying characters from Kurt Vonnegut's Slaughterhouse-Five, the famous photograph of the milk-drop coronet, and a tender mother and child scene by a celebrated French Impressionist—all in the same exhibition. These works are among the many acquired by the University of Kentucky Art Museum in 2000 and 2001, enhancing its already impressive permanent collection. New Acquisitions will be on display from June 1 through September 30, 2001.

Paintings acquired through purchase and gift include an important double portrait by Lexington artist William Edward West (1788-1857). Elizabeth Henrietta Young and Anne Elizabeth Mercer is a poignant portrayal of the uncertainties of life in the nineteenth century: one sitter was painted from life, while the other is a rendering from a photograph after the young girl's death from tuberculosis. The museum also will exhibit a late work by Paul Sawyer, and paintings by other regional artists, including Henry Chodkowski, Tarrence Corbin, Joseph Burks, and James Roy Hopkins. An early still life by Abstract Expressionist William Baziotis will also be on display.

Additions to the museum's extensive collection of works on paper include etchings by seventeenth-century Italian artist Salvator Rosa, silkscreens by contemporary artist Ralph Steadman and

novelist Kurt Vonnegut, and the first purchase by the museum's Collectors group, Mary Cassatt's Quietude. A color lithograph, Gloves, by Cincinnati-born artist Jim Dine and a wood engraving titled My Studio by New Hampshire artist Herbert Waters will also be exhibited.

In a related exhibition, New Photographs in the Collection, the museum will display works purchased in 2000 and 2001 with the Robert C. May Photography Fund, including photographs by Louis Faureer, Max Yavno, Harry Callahan, Robert ParkelHarrison, Arthur Siegel, and Harold Edgerton will be featured. In addition, gifts to the museum's photography collection, including works by Betty Hahn, Beaumont Newhall, Anne Noggle, James Baker Hall, and Ray Jones, will be featured.

The museum's new sculpture acquisitions include a large stainless steel work by contemporary sculptor Ernest Trova. Profile Canto 5-3 was installed outside the entrance to the museum last fall, and is a striking interpretation of Trova's signature image, Falling Man. The sculpture's balanced, energetic shapes complement the museum's three other outdoor works of art by George Rickey, Richard Hunt, and Bob Haozous.

News of the weird...

— The Mexican government announced that beginning June 15, it would distribute "survival" kits to its citizens crossing the border illegally into California and Arizona because they face such a rugged journey. Included in the kits are bandages, aspirin, drugs for snake and scorpion bites, dry meat, granola, 25 condoms (or birth-control pills), and anti-diarrhea medicine. Said a Mexican official, "Those who've gone to the U.S. have told us (what) they need."

— According to a petition filed in Common Pleas Court in Dayton, Ohio, in May, Boomer, a golden retriever, is the plaintiff suing the Invisible Fence Co. because the electrical charge to his collar, triggered when he attempts to leave his guardians' yard, was too strong and, according to an Associated Press dispatch, caused him severe emotional distress, for which he asks \$25,000. Boomer's guardians, Andrew and Alyce Pacher, who purchased the "invisible fence" and permitted the electrical charge, were not sued.

Court Rulings on the Edge

The Iowa Court of Appeals ruled in March that an unarmed man who had disguised his face and ordered a convenience store clerk to give him "the money" (and who then took \$110 and ordered the clerk to lie on the floor) committed theft but not "robbery" because the clerk was never in

"immediate, serious" danger. And a judge in Brooklyn, N.Y., ruled in April that police had no legal cause to stop a young man seen running from a building holding his hand to the side of his hip because there are other explanations than that the man had a gun (although he was, in fact, holding onto a gun).

Omnipotent and Omnipresent

— Inmate Chad Gabriel DeKoven's lawsuit against the Standish prison in Bay City, Mich. (and several other defendants), was tossed out in April as frivolous, despite DeKoven's insistence that he is the "Messiah-God" and rightfully president of the United States (in that, since his name is "Chad," he figures that many thousands of punch-card votes last November were symbolically for him). However, Judge David M. Lawson did compliment DeKoven's typing, his "lengthy expositions" on his deity, and his "disciplined effort" in assembling his 125-page brief's exhibition of numerical analysis and secret codes that prove he is God.

— Recent Messages Received: A 34-year-old man was stabbed to death in February, allegedly by his mother-in-law at the command of God and a Ouija board (Chickasha, Okla.). And a convenience store clerk was hacked to death with a machete in February, allegedly by a man ordered into action (and praised for his good work) by God (Bellefonte,

Pa.). And a 39-year-old man was arrested for torching a theater in which 12 mentally retarded adults were watching a movie, also on the command of God, who apparently also told the man he didn't need a lawyer because He would be representing him in court (Vincennes, Pa.).

— Divine Wisdom: Rev. Richard C. Weaver, 55, the Sacramento preacher who penetrated the Secret Service detail to shake President Bush's hand on Inauguration Day, said it was God who had gotten him access to the restricted area; the Secret Service was embarrassed, especially since they were on the lookout for Weaver, who had told them at President Clinton's 1997 inaugural

that he would be back in 2001. And passerby Ray Hutcherson, who happened upon a truck spill of processed chicken on a Houston freeway in March, and who stuffed his car with the birds, summed up his good fortune: "Anytime you get anything free, it's got to be the work of God."

Feuds

— Following the death in a March auto accident of abrasive Greenpeace founder David McTaggart, the internal backbiting that has long characterized the environmental organization passed on to veteran activists Paul Watson and Patrick Moore, based on Watson's longtime feud with

McTaggart and his upcoming Hollywood movie of Greenpeace exploits. According to a National Post report, Watson plans to fulfill his longstanding promise to urinate on McTaggart's grave, and Moore was exploring a lawsuit because he had heard that his character in Watson's film (starring Pierce Brosnan) was a tyrannical bureaucrat. Watson himself is offended that Moore, when he left Greenpeace, went to work for the Canadian forestry industry (a "running lap dog whore to corporate power").

— In 1986, 15,000 tons of incinerated ash in Philadelphia was loaded onto a barge, which set off for disposal. After seven

countries refused to accept it, the captain lied about the contents to get Haiti to take some of it and then outran the Haitian military when they found out the truth. The captain and crew have long since moved on; the barge has been recommissioned (after probably dumping most of the ash at sea); but the 3,000 tons remained on a Haitian beach until April 2000, when Waste Management Inc. was hired to bury it. However, Georgia, Ohio, Virginia and Florida have now rejected it, and in April, the owner of the barge currently holding the ash sued Waste Management for \$490,000 in storage fees for the now-15-year-old cargo.

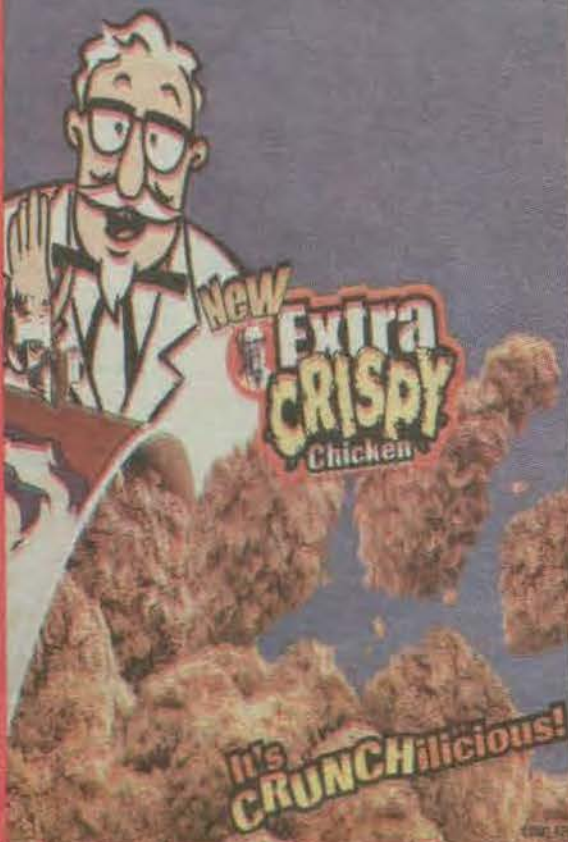
