Doctor shopper found guilty

HAZARD — A man who was accused of "doctor shopping" by an attorney general's investigator was found guilty Thursday in Perry County Circuit Court on 12 counts of obtaining a controlled

substance by fraud.

A jury returned a guilty verdict against Raymond Williams after deliberating approximately two hours.

Williams obtained large prescriptions of OxyContin by going to different doctors in 1999 and 2000 to get the same prescription.

Richard Counts, a public defender representing Williams, said it was true that his client visited two doctors, but said the doctors were exchanging letters about the case.

Williams "never withheld information

Sex case highlights changes in state law

HAZARD — Last Tuesday in Perry County Circuit Court, Harry Bobby Gene Walker quietly pleaded guilty to four felony sexual offenses that occurred between 1989 and 1995 when the victims were children.

The proceedings took place in the judge's chambers. The victims came into the room and emphatically asked an important question before they signed the plea agreement which sentenced Walker to 15 years in the penitentiary — "Will he serve at least five years?"

The judge explained that Walker would have to spend at least three to five years in prison, during which time he will participate in a sex offender treatment program.

After the plea bargain, Walker walked out the door to reinstate his unsecured \$100,000 bond with the probation office and left the courthouse. His formal sentencing is scheduled for August 2 when Judge Doug Combs will decide how much time he'll serve using the sex offender presentence evaluation from the Department of Corrections' Division of Mental Health.

New statutes under Megan's Law were enacted in 1999 to legally address the unique issues involved with sexual offenses. Within those statutes, the evaluation, treatment and registration of offenders was established to study those who have perpetrated

Blood supply dwindles as summer need soars

PRESTONSBURG — With the onset of summer and the upcoming Fourth of July holiday, health care professionals throughout Eastern Kentucky are concerned about "uncomfortably low" levels of blood currently available for the area.

The need for blood is always critical during summer months

and holidays, said Dawn Wheeler, donor resources consultant for the Central Kentucky Blood Center, which services all of Eastern and Central Kentucky, supplying blood to 70 hospitals and clinics in 57 counties.

According to Wheeler, people forget about the importance of donating blood during this time of year as they vacation or participate in other summer

activities.

"They put it on a back burner, and forget there's a need," said Wheeler. "What they don't realize is that this is the time we need them the most."

Warmer weather means more outdoor activities and traveling, which leads to a greater number of accidents, said Wheeler. As a result, less

Prestonsburg council search settles on Allen

PRESTONSBURG — Estill Carter's letter of resignation from the Prestonsburg City Council left a vacancy that now must be filled, a task Mayor Jerry Fannin and the rest of the council are wasting no time in approaching.

The city council will accept Carter's resignation during a regular meeting of the council tomorrow evening. Fannin said the council will then make a nomination for a replacement during the same meeting.

"At one time we talked about Robert Allen when Estill (Carter) was thinking about resigning the first time,"

Fannin said.

Fannin cited no other possible candidates after mentioning Allen as a possibility, saying there were presently no others in consideration.

"Usually, on something like that you just decide on one and if it don't work out you just go to another," Fannin said.

According to Kentucky law, if the city council vacancy is not filled within 30 days of a member's resignation, the governor will then step in and fill the position himself. The newly appointed member would then serve for the same period as if appointed by the legislative body.

Martin County man pleads to gun charge

PIKEVILLE — A Martin County resident, Timothy Allen Sizemore, will be sentenced September 10 in U.S. District Court in Pikeville after pleading guilty to violating federal law by having a gun after a felony conviction.

Kentucky State Police were at Anna Daniels' mobile home on Route 40 in Tomahawk in Martin County when they found guns and notified the U.S. Bureau for Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF).

The ATF agents searched the mobile home, which is where Sizemore was staying, on December 16.

During their search, agents found a loaded gun on the headboard of a bed. The gun was a Smith and Wesson .38 caliber handgun owned by Daniels, according to witnesses in a hearing June 11 in U.S. District Court.

As part of a plea agreement, Sizemore pleaded guilty to possession of the gun. He will remain on bond pending sentencing.

Quilts tell story for collector

WHITESBURG — "One of the greatest gifts you can give is a quilt. Just about every quilt has a story. That's what I like about them," said Bonnie Asher, a quilt collector who recently loaned some quilts for a display in downtown Whitesburg.

Some quilts from Asher's collection were hung at the Harry M. Caudill Memorial Library during the annual Seedtime on the Cumberland Festival.

Asher pointed to a quilt that she received from her sister, Shirley Baker, before she died of cancer.

"That quilt really means a lot to me, because I was in the hospital with cancer myself. I've had it 17 years," Asher said.

Baker, who died eight years ago, had taught first grade almost 30 years in Perry

County at Dennis Wooton Elementary.

Bonnie Asher grew up in Perry County in a coal camp at Bulan. She attended school at Dudley Junior High, a big two-story wooden building at Ajax Coal Co. which burned down.

Asher was formerly a newspaper editor in Cary, N.C. Her husband is William Asher, a professor in anatomy and physiology at Hazard Community College.

She is the daughter of Sherman and Amy Childers. Amy Childers, 90, is now in a nursing home.

Bonnie Asher began collecting quilts as a teenager after her mother-in-law gave her a quilt. She was 18, and she is now 71. She has about 40 quilts.

She tried to make a quilt herself, and found out it was difficult.

"After making my first one, I said, 'Never again!'" she said. Instead of making quilts,

she started buying them, and only paid \$10 to \$15 then. Now, quilts cost hundreds of dollars; occasionally, thousands.

Her collection includes a very old quilt, lined with raw cotton, which she got from her mother. The quilt was inherited from an aunt.

"This quilt is so wonderful. It was done in a fan, and the best quilters can't quilt like that today, and that cotton must have been hard to go through," she said.

She also has an old-fashioned quilt rack that lets down from the ceiling, like the quilt racks in the small old cabins, where the early settlers lived. When people come to her house to quilt, she lets the rack down. While they sew, she cooks for them.

Recently, her husband, William, got a quilt too. It came as a gift from two of his students.

The Ashers have a daughter, Amy, who is a nurse in Whitesburg.

New report shows Appalachian men at greater risk for death from heart disease

FRANKFORT — There are racial and ethnic disparities in heart disease death rates among men ages 35 years and older in Kentucky and in other parts of the United States, according to a new report, Men and Heart Disease: An Atlas of Racial and Ethnic Disparities in Mortality, released today by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and West Virginia University (WVU).

Men and Heart Disease provides a comprehensive look at heart disease death rates for all U.S. men and for the 50 states and the District of Columbia. The atlas also documents geographical and racial/ethnic disparities of heart disease deaths among men. Men and Heart Disease is the companion to Women and Heart Disease: An Atlas of Racial and Ethnic Disparities in Mortality released in February 2000.

The report includes maps showing geographic patterns within Kentucky boundaries of heart disease death rates for the years 1991-1995 for African American men, white men, and men of all races and ethnicities combined.

The Kentucky maps highlight substantial racial and ethnic disparities in heart disease and marked geographic differences in the burden of heart disease within each racial and ethnic group.

The maps and data contained in the report provides national and state health professionals and concerned citizens with the most-up-to-date information available to identify communities and populations of men at greatest risk of heart disease and in the greatest need of increased prevention efforts," said CDC Director Dr. Jeffrey Koplan. "The data can be extremely useful in planning and creating heart healthy living and working environments for men of all races and ethnic groups."

Men and Heart Disease national maps show that a man's risk of dying from heart disease depends in part on where he lives. Counties with the highest heart disease death rates for all men were primarily in Appalachia, the Ohio-Mississippi River Valley, the Mississippi Delta, and the eastern Piedmont and coastal regions of Georgia, South Carolina, and North Carolina. Counties with the lowest death

rates for men were observed primarily in the western regions of the U.S. along with parts of Florida, Minnesota, and Michigan.

"Clearly, community members on up to state policymakers and health officials must all work together if we are to successfully reduce the heart disease death rate disparities in our state, particularly among the men identified in the report," said Dr. Rice C. Leach, Commissioner for Public Health in Kentucky. "However, in the final analysis if we Kentuckians want to stop being listed as among the nation's most unhealthy, we have to decide to take better care of ourselves because government can't do it all. We have to eat less fat, do moderate exercise at least 20 minutes four times a week, and stop smoking so much. It's not easy but we can do it. We can change our behavior, we can reduce and prevent heart disease, and avoid the staggering health care costs needed to treat us if we don't."

Kentucky was one of the first of eight states in the country to receive funding from the CDC under a new national cardiovascular health program in the fall of

1998. Kentucky used the money to begin a major initiative in schools in conjunction with the Kentucky Department of Education. Examples of some activities that have taken place include community forums, curriculum development, health policy initiative training and staff wellness grants.

Another part of the grant consists of a Cardiovascular Health Coalition made up of public and

private partners to develop a cardiovascular health plan for Kentucky. This plan focuses on efforts to improve eating patterns, physical activity levels and reduce the smoking rates.

Men and Heart Disease also includes national maps of local economic resources, social isolation of older men, availability of medical care, and the geographic distribution of racial and ethnic populations.

"We'll make the nomination at Monday's meeting and then accept the nomination at the next council meeting," Fannin said on Friday.

Robert Allen, who has been an employee of First Commonwealth Bank in Prestonsburg since 1987, is no stranger to the city council. As well as his duties at the bank, Allen has also served on the city council before, his term lasting from 1994 — consequently the same year Fannin first was elected to office — until last year. Allen has only been off the council since finishing his term in January.

Allen, who was just appointed to a committee position for the city not long ago, says that even though he has not been on Prestonsburg's active council since the beginning of the year, he remains close to the issues he may face if voted to fill the vacancy.

"I have still kept a pulse on what's going on," said Allen. "I've kept in contact with the mayor."

Allen said Friday that his decision to leave the council at the close of his 2000 term was a "time out" for family and had nothing to do with circumstances at the time, explaining he felt "things were

good" with the council then. However, he also explained that he understood Carter's perspective, having served on the council himself for seven years.

"I think the reasons are he's got a lot of personal issues he's dealing with," said Allen. "... It's hard to say what's going on. When I was on the council we had a council that done very well in working together and I think we got a lot of things accomplished ... I was fortunate to work with excellent people who worked together to get things done, and that's the only way I know how to do things."

Who watches the watchers?

The events surrounding faked records at the Pentagon are bizarre enough that if a novelist tried to include them in a plot, a good editor probably would reject them as too far-fetched. Nonetheless, they apparently are quite real.

It is not commonly known, but the inspectors general's offices of various government agencies regularly check one another's work. The idea is to provide something like a fail-safe mechanism against fraud and incompetence. That was supposed to happen at the Pentagon: The military's auditors would be checked by counterparts from the Internal Revenue Service.

But an internal Pentagon report says the military auditors perceived that some of their work wouldn't pass muster. So instead of taking their lumps honestly, a group of 12 to 15 of them conspired to "fix" the problem by tossing out reams of genuine paperwork and substituting more satisfactory-seeming bogus documents.

For a while, it worked — until a Pentagon whistleblower leaked the scheme. Iowa Sen. Charles Grassley, who just stepped down as chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, began investigating, and the lid was off. The President's Council on Integrity and Efficiency, an organization of federal inspectors general, is looking further into the matter.

To say that this is wrong barely scratches the surface. To note that it cost the government \$63,000 just to create the misleading documents says little; that's walking-around change in an institution like the Pentagon.

No, the real problem lies in the potential damage to the credibility of the Pentagon and of inspectors general throughout the federal government. They're supposed to be the guys in the white hats, not black.

When the IRS inspector general's office found out, it withdrew its previous opinion that gave the Pentagon agency's work passing grades, now, because of that withdrawal, every current Pentagon audit has to include a disclaimer saying the work doesn't meet established audit standards.

Grassley says he's not even satisfied with the internal review that pinpointed the problem, since a senior deputy who performed it concluded in part that his boss (who ordered the review) was not implicated in the fakery. Grassley's right. We hope the Council on Integrity and Efficiency can complete a more arm's-length probe and report in full to Congress. If the facts turn out to be substantially as shown in the internal report, heads should roll. Civil charges should be filed.

Grading on the curve; It's dangerous work!

So have you heard about the state school board's decision to grade the CATS tests on a curve? What happened to the professional belief by educators that "all children can learn at high levels?"

The CATS test is designed to measure a student's performance against a particular set of predetermined academic standards and until now there has been no sliding scale, no curve. Until now our fourth-graders were evaluated against a clear set of standards, not against students from Lexington or Louisville, Bowling Green or Paducah. The intent of this test, from my perspective, is to see if Floyd County students can demonstrate a command of certain core concepts measuring both knowledge and skill.

Until now, students have had to meet certain content standards in order to be considered academically proficient, and what's so wrong with that?

Students, parents, teachers, administrators, superintendents and local boards of education, were beginning to recognize that certain standards are in place and that they were going to be around for a long time, as well they should be. If the basic premise of our educational system is that we are to produce students that have learned particular things that are important then we need to identify the body of knowledge and skills that our children must learn. That's what academic standards are all about. It is also the responsibility of the individual districts to so shape the educational experiences of our children that they have the best possible opportunity to demonstrate these standards and not just on the CATS, the ACT, and PSAT, but in the classroom and on the job!

It seems very clear to me that a specified set of standards is important in guiding both teaching and learning. Standards are meant to pro-

vide specific direction and apply to everyone equally. Standards are a way to measure against a norm and if our students are to become academically proficient by 2014, then the classroom experience must be guided by certain expectations that challenge our students. The challenge for the folks at KDE should be to match the appropriate assessment instrument with rigorous classroom instruction, rather than how to manipulate the results so that the system appears successful.

From my experience, grading on the curve works like this. When an entire group of students do poorly on an exam, the teacher may choose to lower the grading standard. For instance, if the highest grade in the group was 52 percent, then 52 percent becomes an A, and the remaining percentages are adjusted accordingly. In this way students don't feel badly about failure and teachers avoid their responsibility — it's a win-win situation, or so you would think.

Now I don't know how it is at your work, but at the Department of Transportation in Pikeville my evaluation as

an environmental scientist is not based on the performance of every other environmental scientist in the Commonwealth, but on my own performance as an environmental scientist. The final score on my evaluation in no way relates to anyone else's — there are a particular set of standards and I am evaluated accordingly.

In the Scouting program, members are not evaluated against each other, but against a predetermined set of standards offered to guide and reward success ... so what's happening in education?

What does this decision to curve CATS scores actually mean?

■ It means that now there is a way for Commissioner Whittoit to feel successful about proficiency by 2014 and shirk responsibility;

■ It means that now there is a way for members of the state board of education to feel successful about proficiency by 2014 and shirk responsibility;

■ It means that now there is a face-saving way for failing districts and substandard

professional educators to feel successful about proficiency by 2014 and shirk responsibility; and

■ It means that there is now a way for children who would not otherwise meet proficiency by 2014 to feel good about themselves and shirk their responsibility.

Nationally, Kentucky's kids are not doing that well anyway and to curve already bad scores fosters a false sense of security that one day will become for them a harsh reality. I recall the time I scored a 52 percent on a chemistry test in college and that was a B on the curved system. It made me really feel good about my B until I really began to look at the actual score - 52 percent is failing in anything else you'll ever do, I thought, so it should have meant a failing grade as well. At issue here for the Kentucky State Board of Education should be how to create a better testing instrument that will inform parents and the community about how well our schools are doing and whether children are learning, not tweaking the results so that we actually look better than we really are. A grade of 52 percent anywhere else would mean failure, but compared to others in my chemistry class, who took the same test, the letter grade told my mom that I was kicking butt in chemistry — and she never saw the percentage grade until now!

My employer would not tolerate me giving 52 percent, nor would my marriage, my parish, or would you as a voter! Individually this latest action of the Kentucky State Board of Education speaks volumes, but what does it say about us a society, community, and state?

It says that once again poor school districts will be judged against the more affluent districts. Poor children with fewer resources in the home will be judged against the more affluent children with computers, books, and parents who also have a good education. Those that have the resources will be made to look better than those who don't, and the rural will once again be pitted against the urban.

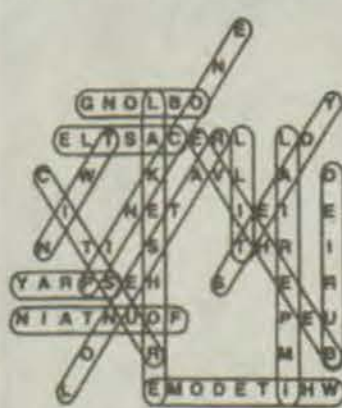
I had honestly hoped that the Kentucky Education Reform Act would afford us the opportunity not to repeat our mistakes as we went about creating a level playing field. Today, I am left only with a prayer, for I am personally disappointed in a system that rewards failure and shirks responsibility.

To the Kentucky State Board of Education I say don't do this, or you run the risk of being state managed by one of the remaining 49 that have the good sense not to follow in our footsteps.

To the Kentucky State Board of Education I say don't do this, or you run the risk of making successful students and those less successful eventually all feel like failures.

Mountain roads are curvy enough, don't make our educational system follow suit.

Governor Patton opens literacy summit

Gov. Paul Patton kicked off the Governors Literacy Summit in front of an audience of educators, community representatives and others last week at the Holiday Inn-Hurstbourne in Louisville.

Tom Bluemlein, Chasity Mitchell, David Sanders, and Karen Hawkins stood before a group of approximately 165 educators, public officials, and others representing various advocacy and civic groups from across Kentucky, and one by one, gave their account of how literacy ser-

vices have had a direct and positive impact on their lives.

The four participants stories:

■ Tom Bluemlein, 53, is an accomplished artist from Fort Mitchell. He is married, has two biological children, both whom

have dyslexia and one adopted child. Bluemlein, a Lloyd High School graduate, always had difficulty with reading. He said he couldn't go to college because he couldn't read to take the entrance test. At the age of 30, he was diagnosed with having dyslexia.

Bluemlein said, "I chose a career as an artist because I was embarrassed by the fact that I couldn't read."

He's been drawing and painting for 32 years. Bluemlein credits a special teacher who was sensitive to his learning style who made a difference in his life.

■ Chasity Mitchell, is a 17-year old high school junior at South Floyd High School in Floyd County. Chasity, who will be a senior in the fall, says she knew there was something different about herself. She said she hated to read aloud in class because she was afraid of what other kids would say if she 'messed up'. Later, at the age of 12, Chasity was diagnosed with dyslexia and soon thereafter enrolled in the East Kentucky Tutorial program where she has been a student for the past six years. She currently excels in her high school class and has tutored other students.

■ David Sanders is a 33-year-old man from Boyle County who has been enrolled in the local GED reading program for the past two years. Before attending

his reading classes, Sanders said he couldn't read at all.

"I didn't know I could even learn to read," Sanders said. "I'm living proof that people can learn to read. There are lots of other Davids out there and they just need a teacher to show them the way to read — someone to believe in them."

■ Karen Hawkins is a director with the Community Action program in Louisville and also benefited through reading programs. A member of her family attended Head Start; however since they did not get the proper follow-up services they continue to have reading problems today. Since Karen has developed her reading skills, she spends time teaching what she has learned to this member of her family.

"Education and literacy are the cornerstones of the future economic success of Kentucky and the well-being of every citizen in the Commonwealth. Despite some gains, the goal that all Kentuckians will have adequate literacy skills that allow them to be healthy, successful participants as workers, parents, learners and citizens has remained elusive," said Governor Patton. "This summit is another component of our commitment to do all we can to ensure that we meet the literacy needs of the Commonwealth."

The summit provides an opportunity for all interested parties to learn about Kentucky's current literacy status and the states ongoing and new initiatives and previous successes as well as facilitating new partnerships to meet Kentucky's literacy needs. The summit is sponsored by the Literacy Partnership, P-16 Council, and the Prichard Committee.

Among those on the agenda were Lois Combs Weinberg of the Council on Postsecondary Education representing the Literacy Partnership; Executive

Director of the Prichard Committee Dr. Robert Sexton, and Gene Wilhoit, Commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Education.

"The Summit was planned to provide an opportunity for those involved in Literacy initiatives to reflect on the progress made and collectively recommit to moving Kentucky forward," said Marlene Helm, Secretary of the Education, Arts and Humanities Cabinet.

The child is always the victim

One characteristic common to sexual abusers is a capacity for rationalizing their actions, mentally justifying an illegal, unacceptable, and inappropriate behavior as necessary and all right. Perpetrating the myth of the seductive or sexually promiscuous child by claiming its the child's fault is one way of doing this. Through this type of reasoning, the abuser shifts the blame for his/her actions onto someone else. In the same manner, incestuous parents often justify their own sexual behavior as a way of teaching the child, or keeping him off the street. These justifications ignore the abuser's responsibility as an adult, the child's vulnerability and dependency on the adult, and the long-term harm to the child.

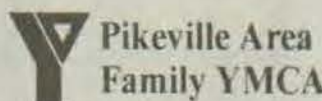

Chief justice lambert announces formation of political issues committee for family court constitutional amendment

Joined by several Family Court Judges from around the state, Chief Justice Joseph E. Lambert has announced the formation of a political issues committee to support passage of the Family Court constitutional amendment that will appear on the ballot in November 2002. In announcing "Family Courts for Kentucky," Chief Justice Lambert was also joined by First Lady Judi Patton, Senator Robert Stivers (the sponsor of SB 58), and Hon. Steve Catron, president-elect of the Kentucky Bar Association.

Family Court is a recent innovation in Kentucky. It proceeds from the idea that the problems of one family are best handled by one judge. "It allows the judge to work with families in an effort to deal with problems before they get out of

hand," Lambert said. "Families and children are vitally important to the future of Kentucky. It is appropriate that we have a court devoted exclusively to their needs without the additional responsibility of traditional criminal and civil cases."

Family Courts currently exist in 11 locations around the state. With passage of the constitutional amendment, it is hoped that expansion of family courts can continue until all Kentuckians are served with a Family Court. The committee, "Family Courts for Kentucky," filed its registration today with the Kentucky Registry of Election Finance. It will serve as the primary force behind the ballot initiative, and will work to educate Kentucky's citizen about the importance of Family Courts.

Let the buyer beware...

Most fireworks purchases are illegal in Kentucky

It happens every year. The weather warms up, we creep toward the middle of June, and suddenly, our roadsides and shopping center parking lots are sprinkled with tents of all shapes and sizes...all selling fireworks.

But before you visit one of these venues, Dave Manley, Kentucky State Fire Marshal, once again reminds you that all fireworks are not authorized for sale or use by the public in Kentucky. Per KRS 227.990(4) any person violating the fireworks laws or who knowingly induces another, directly or indirectly, to violate the provisions of those sections, shall be fined not more than one thousand dollars or imprisoned in the county jail for not more than thirty days, or both.

In order to comply with state law, you must read the label on the item to determine if it is legal to sell or possess in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Any firework that has wings, fins or other mechanisms designed to help the device fly is illegal. And if the firework carries a warning that includes these words—explosive, emits flaming pellets, flaming balls, firecracker, report or rocket—that device is illegal, as well.

Each tent is required to have a permit, posted in plain view, issued by the State Fire Marshal's Office. However, some of the vendors assume that the permit authorizes them to display and offer for sale to the public items such as firecrackers, bottle rockets, Roman candles, etc. all of which are illegal based on current law.

"Since 1996, 221 Kentuckians have been injured by misuse of fireworks. The tragic part of that figure is that most of the injured were not the actual fireworks shooter, as inebriated adults and unsupervised children account for most of the injuries. I can't say it enough. The safest way to enjoy fireworks is to attend one of the many public displays offered throughout Kentucky communities," continued Manley.

Manley encourages Kentuckians to use caution and common sense when purchasing fireworks, adding that even innocent looking sparklers can cause injuries to young children. "The Fourth of July is a day of celebration and pride for Americans. Please don't ruin the fun for you, your family, and guests by shooting off illegal fireworks."

Houchens, girls' state tourney announce partnership

Representatives from the city of Bowling Green, Houchens Industries and the KHSAA met in Bowling Green recently to conduct a press conference.

The press conference, held in Diddle Arena on the WKU campus, was to officially announce the corporate partnership between Houchens Industries and the KHSAA with regard to title sponsorship of the Girls Sweet 16 State Basketball Tournament scheduled for 2003-06.

In May Gary West of the Bowling Green Warren County Convention and Visitor's Bureau appeared before the Association Board of Control to make a proposal of a \$75,000 a year corporate partnership between Houchens and the KHSAA.

The KHSAA Board of Control selected Bowling Green as the site of the 2003-06 girls' state tourney, but directed KHSAA staff to pursue clarifications regarding the proposed sponsorship to verify that existing corporate partnerships would not be violated.

"When Bowling Green came to the table with their presentation and bid, history changed," KHSAA Commissioner Louis Stout said.

"This is an exciting day," Houchens Industries President and CEO Jimmie Gipson said. "Very seldom does a company have the opportunity to partner with a group like the KHSAA."

The partnership begins in 2003 and continues through the 2006 tournament. It includes a monetary sum of \$75,000 with the KHSAA directly receiving \$50,000. The additional \$25,000 will go to the local Bowling Green tournament organizing committee to help underwrite other tournament expenses.

Beginning in 2003 the tournament shall officially be referenced to as the Houchens Industries/KHSAA Girls' Sweet 16 State Basketball Tournament.

The 2002 event will also be held in Bowling Green at Diddle Arena, but was not a part of an earlier bid and was not part of the title sponsorship package.

Discarded fishing line causes problems

The problem of anglers discarding their used fishing line improperly is on the rise in Kentucky waters. Discarded fishing line on the ground or in the water can be lethal to waterfowl, shore birds, and aquatic life and still be there when the littlbug's grandchildren are adults.

"Wildlife can become entangled in fishing line causing death or affecting appendages," said David McChesney, regional program coordinator for the wildlife division of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR).

"This can also affect their ability to protect themselves and to go about daily activities like feeding. Entanglements generally have a tourniquet effect and restrict or cut off blood flow. They also create an environment for severe infections that can ultimately lead to death," noted the biologist.

Fishing line not only can kill wildlife, but also harms an area's aesthetic beauty and casts a bad light on anglers.

"It's not only an eyesore, but it's a bad reflection on anglers and on the sport of fishing," said Jim Axon, assistant director of fisheries for the KDFWR.

"Fishing line is an almost invisible threat. It's more of a threat than more visible waste."

"Discarded fishing line is common around any popular fishing spot," McChesney said. "Any bird can be affected and I've also seen turtles entangled in discarded fishing line."

Anglers should dispose of fishing line properly. If one is far away from a trash receptacle, line can be wound into a tight ball and stored in a pocket until it can be disposed of properly. Some fishing line companies offer recycling programs for spent fishing lines.

"It's part of a larger litter problem that we have in heavily fished areas," Axon said.

"Anglers should be environmentally conscious about these actions—everybody should be, but fishermen can play an important role in reducing this particular problem by leaving our lakes, ponds and stream banks more attractive for other users and safer for wildlife," he concluded.

ARCA race at Pocono goes to Tim Steele

LONG POND, Penn.-Winston Cup driver Ricky Rudd finally broke his 88 race losing streak as he won the Pocono 500 ahead of Jeff Gordon and teammate, Dale Jarrett.

He gained the lead from Jarrett on lap on Lap 176 and then held off Gordon over the final laps, earning his first win since joining Robert Yates Racing at the start of last season.

"I didn't even think about winning until I saw the checkered flag," said Rudd after earning his 21st career win. "I knew something had to go wrong." The win came in his 710th Winston Cup start and it was the first time he had won from the pole.

Rudd lost a late-race duel with Gordon a week ago at Michigan as Gordon won his second straight. And Gordon was in command throughout the first half of the Pocono 500, until a round of pit stops changed things around.

"Our car was pretty good today," said Gordon. "I got by Dale (Jarrett), but I knew catching Ricky was one thing and passing him was another."

"We did everything we could but things just didn't fall our way." Sterling Marlin (fourth) was the highest finishing Dodge.

"My hat's off to all the guys on the race team. We kept adjusting on the car and kept getting it better. We were a 20th place car when the race started and hit the fence on the first lap. We were pushing, but we kept working on it all day and freed it up. We weren't too bad at the end. We had a good car week after week, and we had a top-five car today at the end. It was terrible at the start, but we kept working on it and made it a top five car."

"It was a little frustrating to finish third last week because we had a car that could have won the race and probably would have won if those last caution flags hadn't come out. From what we had going on today, a fourth-place finish is great. We were too tight at the start and got into some early trouble."

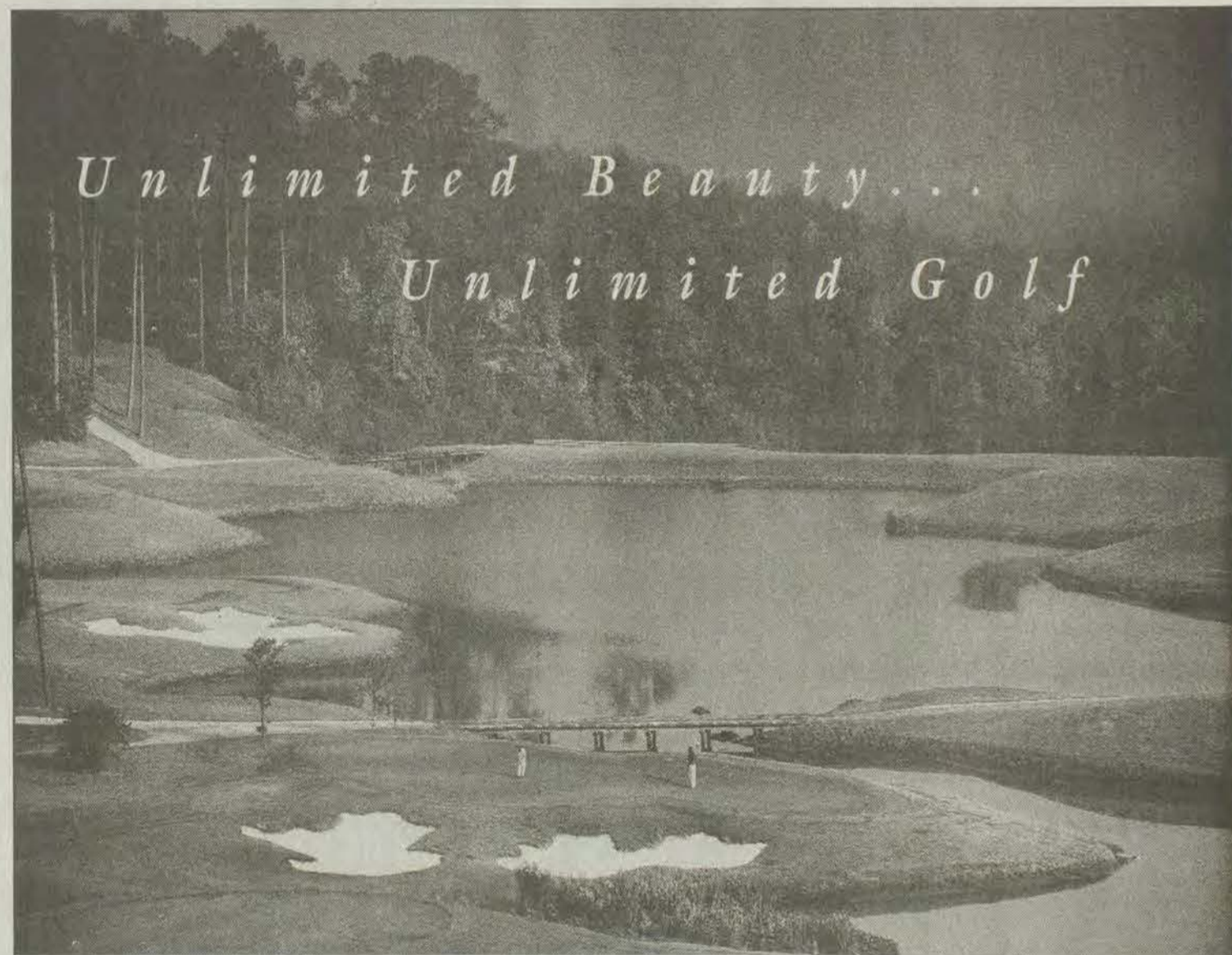

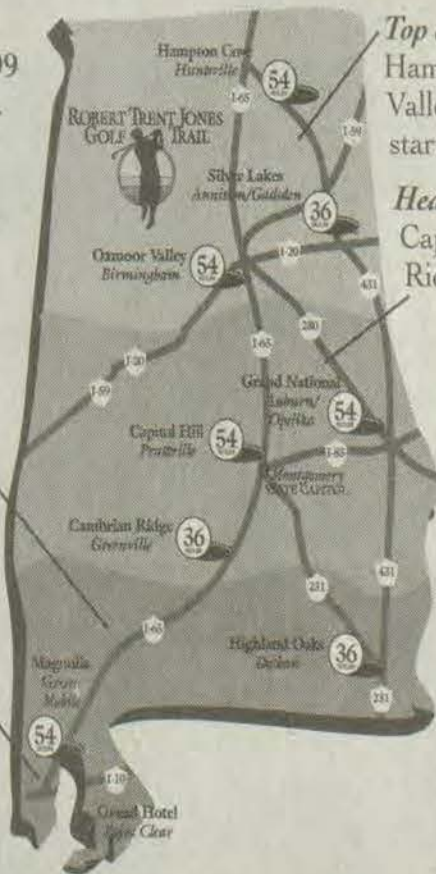

Bentley's COMMENTS

Cal Ripken Jr. announced this week that one of the greatest careers in baseball history would come to an end this September. He's given baseball in general and the Baltimore Orioles in specific all he had, and now it's time to move on.

Many view this as a sad thing, the ending of Ripken's career. But I beg to differ. Ripken's career should be celebrated, and he should be applauded. He has realized his destiny, and we are the better for it.

Every superstar has something that defines his career. It's the reason they, re stars. With Ripken, there's no question as to his. More than the 3,000 hits, than the 400 home runs, more than the 21 years in the league, mention Cal Ripken Jr. and immediately one thing springs to mind: The Streak.

It's kind of sad though that most people view him solely on that basis. Cal Ripken is more than that. He's a man's man playing a child's game, and for so many years, he played it as well as anyone who ever has.

Actually, I think Cal Ripken will be remembered for the wrong thing. The Streak is impressive, there's no doubt. Blue collar Americans have taken great pride in pointing to Ripken and their kind of guy, who goes to work every day and expects to put his time in, whether the rain sends him home early or duty calls for a little extra at the end of the day.

And they should be proud of that. Ripken's streak of 2,632 consecutive games will never be approached. Consider this: Today is June 24, 2001, and if a player started today he would

have to play every single game until roughly the all-star break of 2017 to reach his milestone.

Amazing. It will never be touched. When the day comes that professional baseball is no longer played or that the Lord comes back, the record of most consecutive professional baseball games played will be 2,632.

Still, it isn't the way Ripken should be remembered. When Cal Ripken began on May 30, 1982, he was to shortstops what Magic Johnson was to point guards: He was the oddball. Like Johnson, he was much too big for his position. At 6-4, 220 pounds, Ripken was far too large to play shortstop. He was a third baseman, or better yet, a first baseman.

At the time, everyone was looking for the next Ozzie Smith: A smallish, all-glove, no-hit thriller with the quickness to get into the hole for a grounder or dive up the middle for the dazzling stop and the cannon attached to the right shoulder to throw the would-be base-runner out.

Shortstops were position players who hit eighth in the lineup. They did not bat. If they hit .250, they were

above average. If they reached 40 RBI, they were terrific.

Then came Ripken. In the entire history of baseball, no single player has revolutionized a position the way he did. Yes, he was smooth in the field.

He was graceful. He could commit leather larceny and could throw like John Elway.

But there was something different about him. He could hit. He was a solid base runner. He could hit for average and he could hit for power. He hit cleanup more often than eighth, or in his American League, ninth. At this point in his career, Ripken is one of only seven players to have 3,000 hits and 400 home runs. Not seven shortstops; seven players.

Offensively, he is among the game's greats. Through Monday, he was 10th all-time in games played (2,921); 12th in doubles (594); 18th in hits (3,107) and RBI (1,652); and 29th on the all-time home run list (421).

Defensively, though, he was just as good. The two-time American League MVP won two gold gloves as a shortstop and has a career fielding percent-

age of .953.

Most importantly, however, he has changed the way the position is viewed. Consider the three players generally believed to be the best shortstops in the game today:

■ Derek Jeter is 6-3, 195 pounds, with a lifetime batting average of .319 and a home run every 10 games in his career.

■ Alex Rodriguez is 6-3, 215 pounds. He's a .311 career hitter with 209 homers in only 858 games. And seems as if I heard something about a \$252 million contract.

■ Nomar Garciaparra stands 6-0 and weighs 180, but consider his offensive presence. He's a .333 career hitter with 117 home runs in only 595 games.

Yet if these three had begun their careers when they were born - 1974, 1975 and 1973, respectively - they would have been moved to third base, left field or first base.

They weren't, however. They are shortstops. And for that, they can thank the guy who wears No. 8 and plays - for three more months, at least - just outside our nation's capital.

House opts against returning to West Virginia

J.R. House, expected to play catcher for the Pittsburgh Pirates, as early as next season, said Wednesday he will not leave the Pirates' Double-A Altoona farm club to play quarterback at West Virginia University.

House, torn for days about whether to keep playing baseball in a fast accelerating career or to pursue another lifelong goal of playing major college football, apparently was swayed to stay during a meeting Monday with Pirates owner Kevin McClatchy and other team officials.

House, considered the Pirates' top prospect, had dropped hints for days that he was leaning toward playing football and met last week with West Virginia coach Rich Rodriguez, who wants all of his quarterbacks on campus today.

However, House called Rodriguez on Tuesday night and said he wouldn't be reporting for summer drills.

"This is what I want to do, for sure," said House before the Reading-Altoona game Wednesday night. "I called coach Rodriguez last night to tell him, and he wished me the best of luck."

McClatchy, who attended the Monday meeting with interim general manager Roy Smith and McClendon, said House wasn't trying to strengthen his bargaining position or force the Pirates' hand by threatening to play football.

"The young man has an opportunity in front of him and I don't default him," McClatchy said. "He's being wooed to go back and be a hometown hero in West Virginia and none of us can understand the pressure he's under to play football."

"part of it has been a childhood dream to play baseball. He's not trying to hold anybody hostage."

It is possible that House could join the Pirates later this season, likely after they expand their roster on Sept. 1.

House hasn't played football since 1998, but is the leading passer in national high school football history with 14,457 yards at Nitro (W.Va.) High School. One of his former Nitro coaches, Scott Tinsley, recently spent more than a week with him, working on House's passing just in case he decided to play football.

Before House made his announcement, even his own family members had said they expected House to be on the field Sept. 1 when West Virginia opens against Boston College.

The two-sport House gave up his football career after the Pirates drafted him in the fifth round of the June 1998 draft and paid him a \$266,000 signing bonus. He hit .348 with 23 homers and 90 RBI last season at Class A Hickory and recently had a team record five consecutive extra-base hits for Altoona.

House was picked Monday to play in the All-Star Futures Game on July 8 in Seattle. He was the only Pirates farmhand selected.

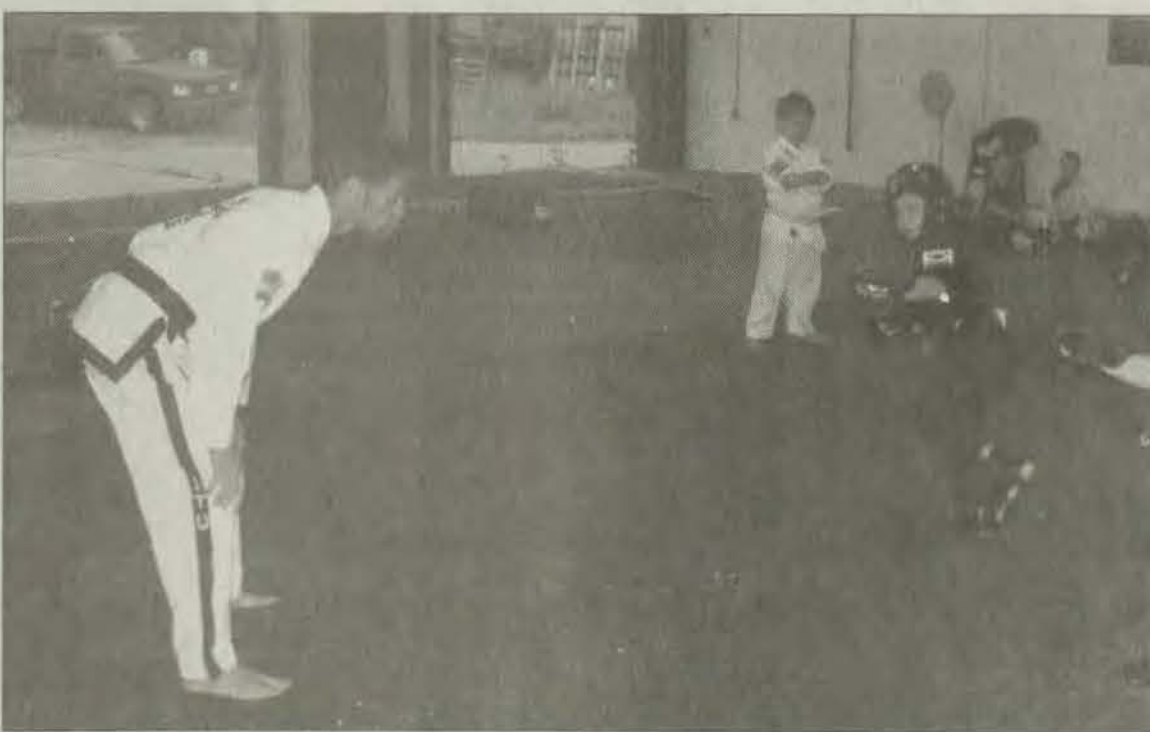

Dedication held at Paintsville Lake site

On Friday, June 15, state and local officials dedicated a new \$2.2 million campground and park office building at Paintsville Lake State Park.

Participants in the ribbon-cutting ceremony were Tourism Secretary Ann Latta, Parks Commissioner Kenny Rapier, Rep. Hubert Collins, and Sen. Johnny Ray Turner.

The campground includes 32 developed sites and 10 primitive sites, along with recreational facilities, two picnic shelters and a bathhouse. The developed sites are the first in the state park system to have individual sewer hookups.

D.W. Wilburn Inc. was the project contractor. Mellwain & Associates was the landscape architect, and the architect for the campground buildings was Myers-Jolly Architects. The consulting engineer was Kaiser-Taulbee Consulting Engineers. All the firms are based in Lexington.

The Finance and Administration Cabinet and the Department of Parks oversaw the project.

The Kentucky State Park System is composed of 49 state parks plus an interstate park shared with Virginia. The Department of Parks operates 17 resort parks with lodges - more than any other state. During the administration of Gov. Paul Patton, two lodges have been built and all 15 others have been renovated. Q My doctor tells me I have to meet my Medicare Part B deductible before Medicare will begin to pay on my bill. What is the Medicare Part B deductible for the year 2001?

A A deductible is the amount you must pay before Medicare Part B begins paying its portion of your medical bills. The Medicare Part B deductible for the year 2001 is \$100. As the first claims of the year come into the Medicare office, the amounts that are approved by Medicare will go toward your deductible. Once \$100 has been approved and applied to your deductible then Medicare Part B begins to pay a part of your medical bills.

Q Does Medicare Part A also have a deductible?

A Yes. The Medicare Part A deductible for 2001 is \$792. It is important to understand the Part A deductible is not an annual deductible. You will owe the \$792 deductible each time you are an inpatient at the hospital in a new benefit period. A benefit period is a way for Medicare to measure your use of services under Medicare Part A. A benefit period starts the first time you receive inpatient hospital care. A benefit period ends when you have not been an inpatient or received skilled care for 60 days in a row. There is no limit to the number of benefit periods you can have with Medicare.

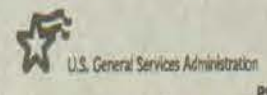
Q How will I know when I meet my Medicare deductibles and what I owe after Medicare pays?

A Medicare will send you a Medicare Summary Notice (MSN) every 6-8 weeks when you have claims processed. The MSN explains what was billed, approved, applied to your deductible, paid, or denied by Medicare. The steps to follow if you wish to appeal a decision made by Medicare will also be on the MSN. A phone number and address of the Medicare contractor will be on the notice if you have questions. Please take time to review each Medicare Summary Notice you receive.

State to hold Medicaid rates at current levels

FRANKFORT — Medicaid rates for a variety of Kentucky health care providers will be frozen at current 2001 levels due to the projected shortfall in next fiscal year's Medicaid budget, the Cabinet for Health Services announced today.

No services are being eliminated and no rates will be reduced as a result of this action.

"Generally, a significant number of our providers receive an inflationary increase in their rates at the beginning of the new fiscal year on July 1," said Interim Health Services Secretary Marcia Morgan. "This year, we real-

ized that it made no sense to raise rates while we are working to reduce inappropriate utilization of Medicaid services. Potential cuts to rates and services are still a possibility and are being reviewed."

Providers whose rates will be held at current levels include acute hospitals for inpatient care, home health, home care and personal care waiver, home and community based waiver, acquired brain injury, and preventive health (local health departments).

Some provider groups who have already reformed their rate methodologies or who receive low payments rela-

tive to other states or payors will receive the inflationary increase on July 1. These include nursing facilities (including pediatric, state and hospital-based facilities), intermediate care facilities for people with mental retardation, comprehensive care agencies, and psychiatric residential treatment facilities.

"Our goal with this move is to continue to work towards balancing our Medicaid budget without harming the state's most vulnerable citizens who require health services while being as fair as possible to the providers," Gov. Paul Patton said.

The decision will save an estimated \$20 million in state and federal funding during the 2001-2002 fiscal year.

"We are looking at all reimbursement methods as we review the Medicaid budget," said Kathy Kustra, Chairman of the committee that was appointed to review the Medicaid budget and make recommendations to Gov. Patton. "These are maintenance rates that, like the Certificate of Need moratorium recently signed by the governor, give us time to make additional recommendations as we attempt to balance

Ashland Inc. (NYSE:ASH) announced Monday that earnings for the company's third fiscal quarter, which ends June 30, will likely materially exceed \$2 per share, compared with \$1.83 per share earned last year in the corresponding quarter. Patients rights topic of Draud measure

FRANKFORT — With the United States Senate debating two versions of similar legislation, Kentucky State Representative Jon Draud has prefiled a bill that would allow patients covered by a health management organization the ability to sue when administrative decisions effect the level of medical treatment they receive.

"This bill simply extends the same level of accountability to health management organizations that we already require for corporations, small businesses and doctors and hospitals. We have to hold them accountable, particularly when we've got administrators making medical decisions when they don't have a license to practice medicine," Draud said.

If passed, Draud's bill would only effect medical decisions which do not meet the standard of health care services set by the prevailing standards and practices of the medical profession and the medical community. Only the insurance

company, not the employer who provides it to his employees, would be held accountable.

"This measure is not going to result in a lot of frivolous lawsuits. I am strongly opposed to additional lawsuits. Every step of the appeals and review process must be exhausted and an independent review board would have to review the claim before any legal action can be taken," Draud added.

All bills prefiled during the legislative interim are referred to the interim counterpart of the committee that will consider them during the next legislative session. Draud's bill will be considered by the Interim Committee on Banking and Insurance. Committee members can take a variety of steps, including approving the bill as prefiled, amending it with Draud's consent, or proposing amendments without his consent. However, changes have to

Retirement plan options for small business owners

SEP (Simplified Employee Pension), SIMPLE (Savings Incentive Match Plan for Employees), and Keogh plans offer small business owners and their employees a tax-favored way to save for their retirement. But which plan is right for your business? The Kentucky Society of CPAs provides the following overview to help self-employed individuals and small business owners understand the costs and benefits of the various plans.

All of these plans offer two primary tax benefits: (1) contributions you make to the plan for yourself and your employees are tax deductible and (2) earnings on the contributions are generally tax free until you or your employees receive distributions from the plan in later years. However, some plans have more restrictions than others, and it is important for you to be aware of these.

SEPS MAKE SMALL WORK OF BIG SAVINGS

A Simplified Employee Pension (SEP) Plan provides small business owners and self-employed workers with a low maintenance method for contributing to a retirement plan. With a SEP, employers are not required to file annual tax forms or reports with the IRS. Basically, you set up a plan in each eligible employee's name and then contribute the same percentage of salary to each account, including your own. SEPs are funded solely by employer contributions and are not reported on the employee's W2 Form. SEP plans feature flexible contribution levels that can be adjusted within plan limits from year to year—a plus for businesses that experience uneven sales results.

Thanks to high contribution levels (the lesser of 15 percent of salary or \$25,500 for employees and the lesser of \$25,500 or 13.04 percent of net income for the self-employed), owners and executives can put away more in a SEP than in a 401(k). However, because the cost of funding the plan—especially at higher levels—can add up, SEPs tend to be more attractive for businesses with few or no workers other than the owner.

SIMPLES MAKE RETIREMENT SAVINGS EASY

Congress introduced SIMPLE plans in 1997 specifically for small businesses with 100 or fewer employees. SIMPLEs allow eligible participants to make elective contributions of up to \$6,500 per year in 2001, compared with \$2,000 in traditional Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs). Employers must structure the plan to match (up to 3 percent of pay) employee contributions or, alternatively, to contribute a flat 2 percent of pay for each employee,

Although contribution levels for SIMPLEs are significantly lower than some other plans, matching costs can drive up a business's costs. On the other hand, SIMPLE plans escape many of the burdensome regulations to which other plans are subject.

KEOGH PLANS COME IN DIFFERENT PACKAGES

Anyone with self-employment income can open a Keogh, even if covered by a corporate retirement plan. A plan that covers an owner also must cover all eligible employees.

A Keogh plan may be structured as either a "money purchase" plan or a "profit-sharing" plan. The profit-sharing Keogh is more flexible in that it allows you to decide each year whether or not to contribute and how much to contribute to the plan. The money purchase Keogh provides the potential of a larger deduction than a profit-sharing Keogh, but the trade-off is that you are locked into contributing to the money purchase plan every year, regardless of your company's profits.

Keogh rules are more complex than those governing SEP and SIMPLE plans. There is both a dollar limit and a percentage of income limit on how much you can contribute to a Keogh plan

each year. The amount depends on whether the plan is a defined benefit plan or defined contribution plan, and whether the contribution is for the benefit of an employee or a self-employed individual. Because Keoghs allow larger annual contributions than other retirement plans for self-employed workers, they are popular with high-earning business owners.

Unemployment rates dropped in 98 Kentucky counties

FRANKFORT - Unemployment rates dropped in 98 Kentucky counties between March and April, rose in 17 and stayed the same in five counties, according to the Department for Employment Services, a Cabinet for Workforce Development agency.

The statewide unemployment rate declined from 4.3 percent in March to 4.1 percent in April. The state jobless rate has decreased the last three consecutive months.

From April 2000 to April 2001, jobless rates were higher in 74 counties, lower in 44 counties and the same in Bath and Owen counties. In April 2001, six counties had unemployment rates at 10 percent or above. Six counties recorded double-digit rates in March 2001 and seven in April 2000.

Oldham County's 1.8 percent jobless rate was the lowest in the commonwealth. Other low rates

were recorded in Fayette and Jessamine counties, 1.9 percent each; Franklin County, 2.1 percent; Bourbon County, 2.4 percent; Henry and Scott counties, 2.5 percent each; Bracken County, 2.6 percent; Shelby County, 2.8 percent; and Boone, Bullitt, Garrard, Mason and Owen counties, 2.9 percent each.

Monroe County recorded the state's highest unemployment rate - 18.6 percent. It was followed by McCreary County, 14.7 percent; Wayne County, 12 percent; Carter and Crittenden counties, 11.1 percent each; Lewis County, 10.2 percent; Elliott and Magoffin counties, 9.3 percent; Morgan County, 8.2 percent and Breathitt County, 8.1 percent.

Unemployment statistics are based on estimates and are compiled to measure trends rather than actually to count people working. Civilian labor force

statistics include non-military workers and unemployed Kentuckians who are actively seeking work. They do not include unemployed Kentuckians who have not looked for employment within the past four weeks.

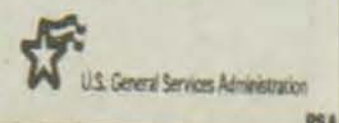

finally won a race, it had been 88 races since his last victory. Rudd's car owner, Robert Yates, fields two Ford Tauruses each week. One, Rudd's, is No. 28, and the other, Dale Jarrett's, is No. 88.

Past Winston Cup champion Dale Jarrett's run at the 2001 title slowed by injury, is hanging in the best he can. Jarrett suffered a rib injury in a qualifying crash in late May at Lowe's Motor Speedway, and the discomfort is at least partially responsible for the fact that Jeff Gordon has been able to wrest the points lead away from Jarrett.

A third-place finish at Pocono signaled Jarrett is almost fully recovered, and he is only 36 points behind Gordon as the circuit heads to the West Coast for the Sears Point road race.

What is the current status of your rib injury? "I wouldn't say I'm 100 percent, but it didn't bother me at all (at Pocono) — I mean not enough to make any difference — and I don't have a lot of soreness after the race. This is really the first week that I haven't had that, so I'm at the point where it's not a factor one way or the other anymore."

How much does it help to have a veteran teammate like Ricky Rudd? "It helps tremendously. Before Ricky came along, for a number of years there, gathering information and doing different things and trying to stay ahead of the game was totally up to Todd (Parrott) and our crew. Now we have someone we can rely on. They tell us things, it's something you can really believe in, and there's no substitute for that. Ricky (Rudd) has the experience. ... Todd and Michael (McSwain) communicate well, and Ricky and I communicate well."

How do you feel about getting Rudd in victory lane? "I'm really excited for Ricky and the entire team. I think, just like most everybody, we're amazed it's taken this long for them to win. It's just been circumstances, but if you keep putting yourself in that position long enough, it's going to happen."

Scott Eggleston, recently released at Dale Earnhardt Inc., accompanied the team to Road Atlanta for a test session and was on hand for the Pocono 500. Eggleston has not yet been hired as crew chief, however.

can find hidden gems amid summer TV doldrums

Lesley Boone helps keep NBC's wistful Wednesday hit *Ed* safely anchored in real life with her quiet but fully realized performance as schoolteacher Molly Hudson.

OK, face it. You've got several weeks at least before you can find out whether Dr. Mark Greene is going to stand by and let that bad guy die right in front of him. Or who the father of Rachel's baby is. Or whether the *Survivor* contestants will be just as petty and hypocritical in Africa as they were in Australia. Summer TV is clogged with reruns, new episodes of flops and brain-dead reality shows that look like something your Aunt Fern came up with while dusting her knickknacks. But canny viewers can take advantage of this off-time to discover some of TV's hidden gems - in some cases, performances that may be so effortlessly perfect that they pass almost unnoticed; in others, entire shows that may have slipped past because of inadequate promotion or deadly time-slot competition.

Here, in no particular order, are a few likely prospects for viewers to revisit or sample for the first time. Things tend to shift around a lot during the off-season, so check your listings.

■ **Gilmore Girls** (The WB Network, Thursdays). This endearing comedy-drama has sparkling dialogue reminiscent of the great screwball comedies of the '30s and quirky but recognizably human characters fumbling their way through life's twisted little surprises. It also has one of the best acting ensembles ever assembled for television. So what do you give a show that has everything? Your attention would be nice. Lauren Graham, Kelly Bishop and stunning teen newcomer Alexis Bledel are captivating as three generations of iron-willed women trying to get along together. If you lament the lack of true family entertainment on the tube, check out this charmer.

■ **Hattie Winston, Becker** (CBS, Mondays). Sure, everybody loves *Everybody Loves Raymond*, but the far less cuddly *Becker*, its time-slot partner, hangs on to that audience every Monday with far less hype and attention. The Ted Danson comedy about an abrasive doctor may be passed over at Emmy voting time, but it's a well-oiled comedy machine - and veteran actress Hattie Winston is one of its most valuable cogs. Just as her Nurse Margaret Wyborn keeps Dr. Becker's office running smoothly, so Winston quietly but shrewdly serves as a deadpan foil for both Becker's prickliness and the ditsiness of their inept assistant, Linda (Shawnee Smith).

■ **Janel Moloney, The West Wing** (NBC, Wednesdays). Granted, it's hard to hide on one of NBC's biggest smashes, but Moloney's character, White House assistant Donna Moss, usually has to score her points on the run, in the show's many zippy "walk and talk" moments, without the big speeches the other characters get. That's what makes Moloney so singular, because she has accomplished

every actor's biggest goal: giving Donna a life outside the frame, so we feel her bustling presence in the corridors outside even when she isn't on-camera. And, in a medium noted for its lack of subtlety, Moloney and co-star Bradley Whitford, who plays her boss, Josh Lyman, have established a complex relationship that is most compelling because of what is left unsaid. Lesley Boone,

■ **Ed** (NBC, Wednesdays). NBC's doggedly adora-ble comedy series became a moderate hit in its freshman season, but, like a puppy chasing its own tail, the whole thing would collapse in a quivering pile of whimsy without the bracing dose of reality provided by Boone, who plays schoolteacher Molly Hudson. Unlike her co-stars, Boone has no big "hook" for her character - she's not as wacky as Ed, not as gorgeous as Carol, not as out-there as Phil - but she has created a fully realized character who is warm and supportive yet capable of standing up and challenging her friends' wilder flights of fancy. In some respects, Boone has the toughest and least rewarding job on the show, but she keeps the wistful Ed from losing all touch with real life.

■ **James Marsters, Buffy the Vampire Slayer** (WB, Sundays and Wednesdays). It's a shame that this show's title puts off so many potential viewers, because as TV critics point out, Buffy is one of the best shows on television. Among its gifted ensemble, no one was stronger this past season than Marsters, whose vampire character, Spike, found himself unexpectedly thrust into the role of unrequited lover. The classically trained American

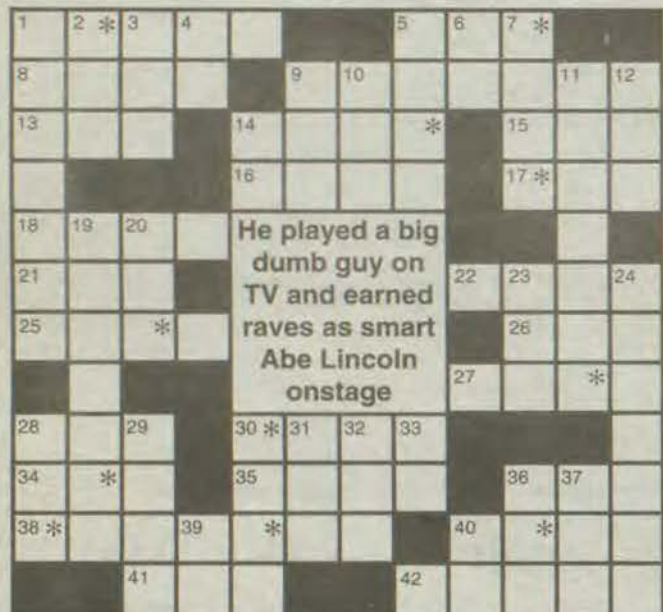

Critic Corner...

"SHREK"

I'm finding it difficult to keep my concentration while writing this review, because my face is STILL sore from laughing so hard from seeing "Shrek."

If you liked the computer-generated hijinks of "Toy Story" and "Toy Story 2," then you will positively love "Shrek."

The film stars the voice talents of Mike Myers (Shrek), Eddie Murphy (Donkey), Cameron Diaz (Fiona) and John Lithgow (Lord Farquaad) — more about them later.

But the real star of "Shrek" is the richly textured, almost photorealistic computer-generated images onscreen. Not only do the fairy-tale characters exude a reality of their own, but the lush landscapes and detailed environments and locations pull you into their world to the extent that you actually believe a place like Shrek's could exist.

More than 1 billion leaves were drawn to be placed on the thousands of trees; blades of grass billow gracefully

in the wind; dragonflies flutter carefree in the backgrounds; hair and clothing move realistically; facial expressions are surprisingly human, real. It is this attention to detail that captivates your imagination, and makes "Shrek" the benchmark by which all future computer-animated features will be judged.



However, all this magnificent artwork would be nothing if the film didn't entertain. Thankfully, "Shrek" delivers. In spades.

Mike Myers' portrayal of the misanthropic ogre Shrek is a masterful balance of comedic timing and humanity that will endear him to children and adults alike.

Eddie Murphy's Donkey practically steals the show as the wisecracking jackass and sidekick of Shrek's.

Cameron Diaz, probably Hollywood's most underrated comic actress, simply shines as Princess Fiona; and John Lithgow's Napoleon-complex addled Lord Farquaad is deliciously evil and hilarious.

I don't want to give away too much of the plot, because I want you to discover this film for yourself, but here's a quick synopsis:

Lord Farquaad has banished all the fairy-tale characters from his wannabe-kingdom. So the characters move into Shrek's swamp home, which angers the ogre who wants to live alone.

Farquaad, who needs to marry a princess to become king, sends Shrek on a quest to rescue Princess Fiona from a dragon and bring her back to Farquaad. In return, Shrek will get his swamp back sans refugees. So, Shrek and Donkey go on the quest to rescue the princess.

I'll leave you to discover the rest. See "Shrek." It's the funniest film of the year.

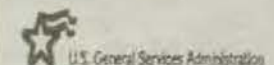

More than a dozen students from the Kentucky School for the Blind will clock in at Six Flags Kentucky Kingdom for several weeks this summer, in order to gain valuable job experience in the real world.

Beginning Tuesday, June 12, twenty-one visually impaired and blind students will begin training in several different areas of the park, including taking guests' pictures for season passes, making pizzas at Casa Mia, and working in park services to help keep the park in great shape. Job coaches from the School for the Blind will be on hand in order to place students in spots that match their abilities and to help train them in those positions.

This is the seventh year that Six Flags Kentucky Kingdom has teamed up with the School for the Blind for this educational program. In years past, students have been paid with funds through the Kentucky Department for the

Blind. However, this year, the students will be on the Six Flags Kentucky Kingdom payroll, making each student an active employee at the park.

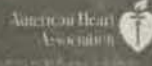

News of the weird...

■ "Pain is the sensation of weakness leaving the body," Phoenix "artist" Steve Haworth told a Phoenix New Times reporter in May, while he was arranging scenes for associates of his Church of Body Modification, including a horizontal full-body suspension (hanging for five minutes by rings in body piercings); a tug of war (full-force pulling contest using a rope held taut through rings on various body piercings); free-moving implants just below the skin that appear to be, say, a living bracelet; and various body alterations such as "Vulcan" ears, a ribbed penis, and a filleted male urethra. Haworth won't amputate anything, though (too "destructive," he said), thus displeasing his girlfriend, who wants to lose two toes in order to fit into smaller shoes, and he has not yet decided whether to honor another associate's request to be crucified.

■ High school senior Trevor Lofin scored a perfect 1600 on his SATs this year despite the potential handicap of having lived the previous three years with his mother and sisters in the back of their Chevrolet Suburban, the result of the mother's having lost her job as a physician in Fresno, Calif. Mother Cynthia Hamilton decided to home-school her kids and, in view of housing prices in California, found the family got along just fine without a house (though they recently moved into a one-bedroom apartment). Since the family turned to religion to get them through their ordeal, Trevor told the Los Angeles Times he would probably enroll in Bob Jones University in the fall.

■ Lawyers Living the American

Dream: A consumer who was oppressively required to buy a full season of NFL Sunday Ticket on DirecTV satellite service (instead of being offered a cheaper weekly rate) gets back \$9 to \$21, according to a class-action settlement announced in May, but the lawyers would receive \$3.7 million. And a consumer who was oppressively charged daily late fees by Blockbuster Video (without realizing how much they could amount to) gets back a few discount coupons, according to a class-action settlement announced in June, but the lawyers would get \$9.25 million.

No Longer Weird

■ Adding to the list of stories that were formerly weird but which now occur with such frequency that they must be retired from circulation: (45) The surgically removed humongous abdominal cyst that might total half the body weight of the patient, such as the 100-pounder excised from a 17-year-old girl in Cairo, Egypt, in May (far off the world record of 303 pounds at Stanford Medical Center in 1991). And (46) the unlabeled or makeshift urn containing a loved one's cremated ashes that gets mistakenly sold at a yard sale or thrift shop, and which unsettles the surprised buyer when he gets home and inspects his purchases, as happened to a woman in Dallas in May.

Weird Science

■ A research team from UCLA and the University of Pittsburgh (writing in an April issue of the journal *Tissue Engineering*) and another from Duke University recently reported success at collecting valuable human stem cells from ordinary liposuctioned fat, potentially ending

the need to collect such cells through controversial fetal-tissue procedures and painful bone-marrow extraction. Stem cells can make replacement muscle, bone and cartilage, and if they come from one's own fat, will not be rejected by the body. Also, as the researchers pointed out, Americans' fat cells are an abundant resource.

■ Centers for Disease Control specialist Charles Beard told the Los Angeles Times in April that he has created a genetically modified dung that might eradicate Chagas disease, which kills 50,000 people a year in Central and South America. Beard's meticulously manufactured bug poop looks and smells like the

real thing (made from ammonia, ink and guar gum) but contains special bacteria that prevent the so-called "kissing bugs" from spreading the disease, which they would do if left to their normal "diet" of eating their parents' dung.

■ The Bethesda Center for Reproductive Health and Fertility in Cincinnati announced in March that the previously glum conception prospects of a couple were suddenly improved because the father's limited sperm cells had been safely stored in a hamster egg until they could be implanted to his wife's egg. Normally, sperm cells lose potency when not used immediately, and in the case of a man who produced

fewer than 200 (instead of the millions most men produce), the attrition rate would have almost guaranteed failure. In May, the child was born.

■ Swedish scientists from the National Board of Fisheries reported in March that, after observing 117 pairs of trout engaged in sex (quivering violently with their mouths open, followed by the supposed simultaneous release of egg and sperm), they found that males always released their sperm at the end but that, half the time, the females cheated, withholding their eggs. The researchers speculated that the female was "faking an orgasm" as a mating strategy to preserve the eggs in case she ran

into a more-desirable male.

Cliches

Come to Life

■ According to documents released upon the settlement of a lawsuit in Kapolei, Hawaii, in February (involving sexual harassment claims against managers at a Safeway store), in one incident in the mid-1990s, a male employee who was spying on a female customer through a restroom peephole was injured when the woman realized she was being watched and shoved a toilet plunger handle through the hole, into his eye socket. (In the lawsuit, Safeway agreed to pay \$250,000 to a former employee who had made numerous allegations about some managers' behavior.)

■ Alton Brown, *Good Eats* (Food Network, Sundays, Wednesdays, Saturdays). He's quieter than Emeril ("Bam!") Lagasse and less over-the-top than Iron Chef, but the Georgia-based Brown is one of Food Network's stealth weapons. A likable hybrid of M. Wizard and Monty Python, Brown's delightful half-hour is as comfy as its homey title yet packed with information about food, encompassing history, the physics of cooking and recipes anyone can prepare, all presented in a delightfully daffy style that will engage both adults and small fry. The man also makes a darn fine grilled cheese sandwich.

■ *Castaway* (BBC America, most Sundays but schedule varies). If you find *Survivor* a tad lowbrow, this engrossing series follows a band of British residents who spend a year living as a community on the remote Scottish island of Taransay. What starts as a utopian social experiment soon collapses into a round of Brits Behaving Badly, as bitter backbiting and infighting mar an experience otherwise devoted to reflecting on their harsh yet stunning natural surroundings. The best reason yet to demand that your cable company carry this invaluable channel, if it doesn't already.
