Wheelwright fires only police officer

WHEELWRIGHT — The city of Wheelwright is, once again, without a police officer.

Newly acquired policeman Ricky Newsome was dismissed from duty during a 7 p.m. special-called Wheelwright City Council meeting Thursday night.

Newsome was hired as the sole Wheelwright police officer in April.

The placement came at that time when Wheelwright's then-current police officer, Charles Johnson, was dismissed in connection to training complications.

Johnson had been attempting to attend training sessions in Richmond without success when Newsome was finally hired to patrol the city.

'Nobody knows where he's at," a member of the council explained Thursday night when asked why the action was taken against Newsome.

The decision was made after an executive session which lasted approximately 10 minutes when council member Bruce Johnson made the motion of dis-

The motion passed with a 3-2 vote as Mayor Marlee Sammons and council member Andy Akers voted against the

Sammons and Akers failed to comment on the reason for their outnumbered vote. However, Sammons has mentioned during past meetings the strong need for maintaining the pres-

HAZARD — A Perry County man faces a murder charge following a report issued by a grand jury Tuesday.

PRESTONSBURG - Lightning never strikes twice in the same place, or so they say. Two wrecks which occurred Friday afternoon almost simultaneously on North Lake Drive, however, suggest the contrary.

Maker of OxyContin sued again

MANCHESTER — A class-action lawsuit filed in Clay County Circuit Court seeks restitution for people throughout Southeastern Kentucky who contend they have been adversely affected by the prescription drug

The lawsuit, filed by Peter Perlman of Lexington and Bill Hayes of Middlesboro against Purdue Pharma, Abbott Laboratories, Dr. Ali Sawaf and Pineville Community Hospital, alleges that addiction to OxyContin, which is manufactured, marketed, promoted,

sold, and/or distributed by the defendants, continues to be one of the "primary social ills" of Southeastern Kentucky.

It is the latest in a series of lawsuits that have been filed against Purdue Pharma and Abbott Laboratories in West Virginia, Virginia and Kentucky, including a multi-million dollar suit filed by the West Virginia Attorney General's Office.

"I first became aware of problem with OxyContin while doing research for a column I write," said Hayes. "It became apparent to me after substantial research that the makers of OxyContin had very aggressively marketed the very dangerous drug and that it was being

recommended by its maker for uses like moderate pain.

"People with arthritis and chronic low back pain are taking this drug. This drug is like a modified form of morphine, and these people

have become hideously addicted to it.' The lawsuit alleges that addiction to OxyContin has led to "serious" social problems including addiction, drug abuse, other self-destructive and criminal acts related to OxyContin, and a "dangerous and vicious black market" of the drug.

The suit also alleges that the drug, which is

Coal slurry permit still under review

DUNRAVEN — The 159acre coal slurry impoundment permit sought by Coastal Coal Company is still under review by two government

The Department of Surface Mining in Frankfort and the Mine Waste and Geotechnical Division of the Mine Safety and Health Administration in Pittsburgh are currently examining maps and core drilling samples from the abandoned mines and pond

basin near Dunraven in Perry

The permit involves 443 acres: 159 acres for the coal slurry impoundment with a 100-foot dam and the remainder for a proposed refuse field of course byproduct from coal processing.

The permit is one of four which would give Coastal Coal the right to mine and process coal in the area. Two permits mining approved for mining the #4, #5 and Amburgey seams in

Breathitt County teachers denied pay raise for now

JACKSON - Last week, the Breathitt County Board of Education held a meeting in which they discussed several topics, one whether or not to give the teachers an increase in their pay.

Lillian Trent, the Breathitt County Education Association president, suggested to the board that teachers should get a 2.2 percent of superintendent on July 1.

"This is not a raise," said Trent. "It's a cost-of-living adjustment."

This motion, however, was not seconded. Board member Kelly Noble Jr. said he would rather try to give bigger increases to the staff.

The board later agreed that new Superintendent Larry Wood should be part of any decisions that involve a raise. Woods takes over the position



supposed to be used for severe pain, has been "deceptively marketed and over-prescribed" by doctors for mild pain, stating that OxyContin is "not suitable or fit for the purposes advertised by the defendants."

The lawsuit asks for restitution for Rodney Howard, 28, and his family; James Presley Craig; the estate of Gus Dale Robbins Sr.; Micheal Lee lost "everything of value" to increased from \$40 million in milder drugs. Daniels, 32; George Allen Saylor, 30, and his family; Robin Griffin, 29; and the estate of Johnny Johnson Wynn.

All of the plaintiffs in the lawsuit were allegedly prescribed OxyContin and became addicted to the drug while taking those prescriptions. The lawsuit alleges that many have them including their jobs and, in the case of some, their lives.

Two plaintiffs named in the lawsuit have died of an OxyContin overdose. Gus Dale Robbins Sr., died in December 1999. In October, Johnny Johnson Wynn also died.

According to Hayes, profits from the sale of OxyContin have treat arthritis without first trying

1996, to over \$1 billion in 2000.

Hayes said the "aggressive marketing" of OxyContin is attributed, in part, to an online website called Partners Against Pain. According to Hayes, the organization allegedly advertises or implies the use of OxyContin is appropriate to

Perlman and Hayes are seeking, among other types of relief, a declaration that the defendants must "disgorge" their profits received from the sale of OxyContin for the benefit of the plaintiffs, an unspecified amount of punitive damages, the establishment of a fund for a medical monitoring program, a

public awareness campaign to alert the general public of the health risks and problems associated with OxyContin, and a \$3 million trust to maintain a permanent substance abuse rehabilitation facility.

Federal energy secretary will attend groundbreaking for power plant

HINDMAN — U.S. Energy Secretary Spencer Abraham will join elected officials July 2 to break ground for EnviroPower's 524-megawatt power plant in Knott County.

The plant is expected to be in operation by 2004.

In announcing the ceremony, EnviroPower Inc. emphasized that the new facility will utilize the latest in clean-coal technolo-

coal-fired generation plant permitted for construction in 20 years. It is also the first plant in Kentucky to use innovative technology, which will produce less

than one-fourth of the total emissions of existing coal-fired

Gov. Paul Patton said that the plant "will help prove to the country that coal can and should play an important role in helping address our nation's significant energy needs without jeopardizing our responsibility to be stewards of our environment and natural resources.

"The National Energy Plan is The facility is the state's first a comprehensive and balanced approach to solve America's national energy challenges while ensuring that we maintain a strong and healthy environ-Abraham ment," 'EnviroPower's utilization of a cornerstone of that plan - cleancoal technologies - will help us achieve that important goal.'

Abraham is attending the groundbreaking to draw attention to the technology to be used. He will be joined by the three Republican Congressmen who represent the area - Sen. Mitch McConnell, Sen. Jim Bunning, and Rep. Hal Rogers.

"Clean-coal technology isn't a theory that exists only in a classroom," said Harold Sergent, president and CEO of EnviroPower, an independent power producer with offices in Lexington. "It isn't a concept. It's a reality. Power plants have made tremendous progress in reducing emissions through innovative technology.

"This facility represents a giant step forward in proving that coal-fired generation facilities can - and should - play an important role in addressing our country's pressing energy

President George W. Bush's proposed energy policy highlights coal in addressing the nation's energy needs. Coal is

Blackouts in California and energy needs along the East Coast have focused national attention on how electricity is produced and on plans to expand generation capacity. But in helping answer the country's energy needs, EnviroPower's president said that it is important to recognize the environment too.

"We have to be stewards of our country's energy needs, but of our environment as well," Sergent said. "At EnviroPower, we realize that we share this land with others. We have an obliga- in an important respect. It will tion to provide jobs and econom- burn "gob piles," or waste coal,

But we also have an obligation to protect the environment of our neighbors and our country.

To that end, Sergent said that Kentucky Mountain Power, the subsidiary which will operate the plant, will take unprecedented steps to protect the environment. According to spokesmen for the agency, the National Park Service issued a letter concluding that emissions from the plant will not have an adverse impact on air quality at the Great Smokey Mountains National

In addition, the plant is unique

left over from mining for fuel. Millions of tons of gob piles dot the landscape of Eastern Kentucky and represent a significant environmental hazard.

Sergent also said that the economic benefits of the facility in a region in need of jobs and development should not be overlooked. The plant will directly hire 50 people. Another 600 to 1,000 jobs will be created during the three-year construction phase. The plant is not a peaking unit, it will operate 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

In addition, more than 100 people will be hired by the companies which haul fuel and limestone. In all, the project will pump more than \$4.8 billion into the economy for construction, equipment and costs.

EnviroPower has also donated nearly 1,000 acres to the state for a regional industrial park.

EnviroPower is also working with the state to improve access from Route 80, including a heavy haul bridge. A new \$50 million water line will be built by EnviroPower for the power plant, but will also supply the industrial park and growing communities.

"We have done our best to put together a plan for this facility that is sensitive to the environment, the needs of our neighbors, and for economic growth and development in our region," Sergent said. "The result of this facility will be economic growth and the production of low-cost baseload power in an environmentally sensitive and responsi-

"In that respect, this facility represents the latest in technological innovation to provide the best in service for our region and our country."



the Dunraven area of Perry County near the North Fork of the Kentucky River.

According to residents and miners who live near the site. the Amburgey seam runs below the riverbed and could pose a threat to public safety and the environment if tunnels were mined near the proposed slurry

Additionally, miners who worked the area say the ridge next to the proposed pond is honeycombed with mine shafts dating back to the 1920s before accurate maps were drawn or recorded for state reg-

Jan Misner, whose family owns land near the site, has been questioning the safety of the permit since before the Martin County disaster on October 11, when the bottom fell out of a 75acre coal mine waste pond operated by Martin County Coal near Inez.

The pond apparently collapsed into an abandoned underground mine; then spilled over 250 million gallons of sludge into tributaries of the Big Sandy River, blackening 75 miles of river, while killing fish and shutting down water systems.

A state investigation determined that documents provided by Martin County Coal misrepresented the width of the barrier between the slurry pond and an abandoned, underground mine.

The distance was less than 10 ft. in some places, although the coal company reported a 70 ft. rock barrier between the pond and the mines.

As a result of the disaster, at least 10 lawsuits are now filed at the state and federal levels, with an estimated 300 plaintiffs suing Martin County Coal.

Among the allegations, Martin County residents contend the company used incorrect

maps to build the impoundment; injected unauthorized slurry into the deep mines; weakened coal pillars; removed too much coal from mines beneath the impoundment; ignored warnings from federal inspectors after a smaller failure in 1994; and exceeded the permitted elevation limits of the impoundment.

In a document dated May 25, Martin County Coal claimed that "an act of God," or unspecified "forces of nature" caused the impoundment to fail. They also reasoned that if negligence was involved, it occurred five years before the lawsuit when the statute of limitations expired.

Considering the past disasters with coal slurry impoundments, Jan Misner explained her

"All I'm saying is look at this and look closely ... They need to make sure they are putting the slurry on a good, solid basin and that the dam will be safe. Core drilling should be completed around the perimeter to make sure the base is solid."

Critics continue to cite the chief flaw with impoundment structures as the shifting of ground due to abandoned coal mines under or near the dams.

Regarding the problem of the shifting ground, Kentucky environmental lawyer FitzGerald had earlier said, 'Where you have previous underground mining, you should not be constructing impoundments."

According Perry to Campbell, a coal loader for over 20 years, the ridge beside the proposed impoundment was mined extensively.

He reported the existence of hundreds of line tracks and headings in Jake's Campbell's Branch, some of which connected to earlier mining shafts that

date back to the Blue Diamond operation that started in 1913.

"We worked all the coal out Jake's Branch," said Campbell.

According to Everett Back, who mined in the area, the mining operation went completely around the mountain and started about one mile from the river. Back reported that some of the deeper veins were also mined.

If the #5 vein was deep mined, that will still be above the pond," said Clyde Cook, permit reviewer for the Department of Surface Mining.

He explained how he started reviewing the permit two years ago by conducting on site evaluations with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

After examining all the maps available, he will study the core drilling samples to see if there is evidence of tunnels around the

perimeter or underneath the proposed site.

The proposed slurry pound would start about 400 feet from the river and is designed to hold 38 inches of water without discharging, said Cook.

He reported that the MSHA office in Pittsburgh will also conduct a geotechnical investigation where the offices can compare core samples to discover if there are abandoned mines in close proximity to the impoundment.

While critics and the coal company wait, the investigation continues into the feasibility of the coal slurry pond and its loca-

"If we issue the permit, we have to justify what we approved," said Cook. He would not comment on whether the permit was feasible until the review was complete.

WHITESBURG - Mimi Pickering started learning about film, video, and media at Appalshop workshops in 1972. Her interest for artistic work found expression in film making, where she enjoyed documenting the people of Appalachia and giving voice to their concerns.

Pickering soon began her film career and has since produced, directed and edited several documentaries that have been shown on PBS, at schools and at

Appalshop festivals and events. "One of my hopes in making documentaries is to provide my audience with the opportunity to see others who are making changes, or calling for changes by inspiring questions and getting involved in finding solutions to problems in their communities. I hope to help the audience become better informed about the lives of real people," explained Pickering with Hazel Dickens' music, most

about her films.

Pickering's newest film, "Hazel Dickens: It's hard to tell the singer from the song," premiered last month and was shown at the Seedtime on the Cumberland Festival Whitesburg on June 8.

Pickering was inspired to create the documentary about singer and songwriter Hazel Dickens' life and music of the 1960s after listening to her sing about the "feisty working women of Appalachia."

"Since I first learned about Hazel's music, I have been moved and impressed by her ability to capture the sense of the ordinary women and the social issues of the day in her lyrics," explained Pickering.

One of the female pioneers in music, Hazel Dickens grew up in West Virginia and is known as the first lady of old-time country and bluegrass music.

In addition to film, Pickering hosts a volunteer radio show on WMMT FM. "Biscuits and Ham" features women singers and songwriters of country, folk and alternative rock. With all her creative projects in the works, Pickering stays busy in music and film while working as a staff member at Appalshop.

Perry, and her son, Gary, 11, who was a passenger in the other vehicle, were also uninjured.


"This place is dangerous," said Willa Hurd, a friend of the Crider family who stopped to help. "Something needs to be done before somebody gets

"In a situation like this, you're depending on the other guy," said Roberts, "and an honest mistake can turn into something extremely dangerous. Don't trust people and don't wave people across.'

Mayor Jerry Fannin said in an interview on Friday that he would write a letter to the state Department of Highways in Pikeville and ask them to look into the possibility of putting a traffic light at the intersection.

"Putting lights in there might make it a safer road," said Fannin. "After today, I see the need for it."

Strengthening DUI law was right decision

the legal blood-alcohol limit to operate a vehicle from 0.10 to 0.08, naysayers said the legislation would have little effect in taking drunken drivers off the streets or saving lives.

They came armed with studies, like one from North Carolina that concluded "there was little clear effect of the lower BAC limit." And a 1999 report from the U.S. General Accounting Office that said lower limits will have little or no influence on reducing accidents or deaths.

These opponents, led by the National Restaurant Association, said that a 0.08 law would only target casual drinkers, who are not the people causing deadly accidents.

Supporters countered with their own studies. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration said the 0.08 law reduced fatal crashes by an estimated 8 percent in 1999, and if all 50 states had the law, 590 lives would have been saved.

But Rep. Rob Wilkey, D-Franklin, who led the fight for a tougher DUI law, felt these arguments were missing a critical factor — the effect the law would have on reducing the "culture of tolerance" toward drinking and driving, which seemed so pervasive throughout the state.

In a series of forums last year to address the issue, Wilkey said he was confident alcohol-related fatalities in Kentucky could be reduced by 12 to 18 percent under the new law. This would be done not necessarily by more arrests but by sending the message that drinking and driving — even at a minimum level — will not be tolerated, he said.

Admittedly, eight months isn't a lot a time to get a firm handle on the impact of the new law, but early returns from local law enforcement indicate Wilkey was on target with his assessment.

"The law is getting the point across," said Mark Applin, a Kentucky State Police trooper. "We've seen a lot of designated drivers during our road checks."

Lt. J.D. Marksberry of the Daviess County Sheriff's Department says the law has made people more aware of the consequences of drinking and driving. "I think they're watching how much they drink a little closer and having more designated drivers," he said.

The fears that the law would lead to a crackdown on casual drinkers have not proven true. Of the 120 DUI arrests made by the KSP since the law went into effect, only 12 were of drivers with a BAC between 0.08 and 0.099. What it is doing is causing people to think twice before they have that extra drink at dinner or happy hour.

That's significant when you consider that even at a BAC of 0.05, a driver can have a delayed reaction time of 1.5 seconds. Driving at 60 mph, that delay is equivalent to traveling an extra 132 feet — nearly half a football field — before stopping.

It will be some time before we know what effect the new law will have on reducing fatalities, But we do know it seems to be eroding the "culture of tolerance" toward drinking and driving.

Accomplishing that feat alone will make arguments against the legislation seem inconsequential.



A hot issue: Global warming

European leaders gave President
Bush a cool response to his adamant
stand against the Kyoto global warming
pact. During the presidential campaign
last fall, Bush said that carbon dioxide,
was a "pollutant" and that he would support legislation to reduce this pollutant
from power plants. After becoming president, Bush wrote "I do not believe ...
the government should impose on power
plants mandatory emissions reductions
for CO2, which is not a pollutant."

According to the dictionary a pollutant is "a harmful chemical or waste discharged into the water or atmosphere." This fits carbon dioxide since it causes global warming.

The United States has large coal reserves and currently generates 52 percent of its energy from burning coal. Coal is dirty, producing sulfur oxides (acid rain), mercury (neurotoxin) and other pollutants which can be removed at some cost. A more fundamental problem is that coal produces twice as much CO2 per unit of energy produced as natural gas (for oil the figure is about 1 1/2 times). Gasification processes which require more research before being commercially viable, can reduce the CO2 problem. Plentiful supplies and low prices for natural gas, which burns clean, increased its use in recent years for gas burning electric power plants. This has reduced the use of coal and caused serious economic problems for the coal mining industry.

The five electoral votes of West Virginia, a major coal producing state, were crucial to Bush becoming president. West Virginia coal tycoon (William Harless), after years of battling coal miners, mobilized them to vote for Bush with promises of more jobs and for the first time in years secured the votes to win for Bush. He also raised a lot of money for the GOP campaign. Vice President Dick Cheney is from Wyoming, a major coal mining state whose coal has lower impurities and is easier to mine. That industry, after years of decline, is now booming. Coal interests were lavish in support of the Bush campaign (with little for Gore) and they now enjoy the benefits.

How certain are we that global warming is occurring? Dozens of studies all agree, including the science academies of 16 nations that signed a statement saying that the Kyoto protocol "represents a small but essential first step toward stabilizing atmospheric concentrations of greenhouse gases." The recent U.S. Academy of Sciences study emphasized that global warming was real, getting worse and caused mostly by human activity.

Although publicly embracing this report, Bush continues to reject Kyoto and suggests that any agreement must bind China and India. China produces just over 10 percent of the carbon dioxide per capita as the U.S. and has dramatically reduced these emissions by 17 percent since 1995 while its GDP grew 36 percent. By contrast the U.S. emissions continue to increase with a much slower growing economy. India is also increasing energy efficiency. U.S. participation is important since we produce 25 percent of world emissions but have only 5 percent of world population.

A major Bush objection is that Kyoto would cause serious economic dislocation and damage the American lifestyle. Although some business leaders support Bush, many others are actively working to reduce their emissions and plan for continued reductions. The U.S. population-adjusted CO2 per unit of GDP is one of the highest in the world; other nations with a standard of living comparable to that of the U.S. have proved that their economies can thrive yet produce only one-half the CO2 per GDP of this country.

The Wall Street Journal article,
"Many Utilities Call Conserving Good
Business" gave several examples:
Seattle City Light saved enough energy
to power the entire city for 18 months,
Sacramento Municipal Utility saved the
equivalent of building one huge new
plant. Some publicly owned utilities are
also having the same experience.

Energy saved means less CO2 and less global warming. DuPont publicly recognized in 1991 that there was enough scientific evidence linking greenhouse gases to global climate changes that they took action. While expanding their business they have reduced greenhouse gases worldwide, on a CO2 basis, by 50 percent, and have committed to an additional 65 percent reduction by 2010. Other companies are doing the same.

The Bush administration is wrong on all of its assertions: 1). Science strongly supports greenhouse gas global warming; 2). We can meet Kyoto requirements without harming our economy; 3). Developing nations like China have shown that they can and are doing their part. And as an added major bonus, we can substantially cut energy consumption, thus reducing our reliance on unstable foreign supplies and eliminate the need to drill in environmentally sensitive areas such as ANWR. Let us tell the Bush administration this is the best way to go.



The Forest vs. the Trees on Patients' Rights

"Patients' rights" legislation is once again taking center stage in Washington, D.C. The new leadership in the Senate is making the curbing of the HMO industry a priority and the nature of the subject overall is making it news.

Health care affects everyone, so when our elected officials talk (or even just posture) about it, most Americans do, indeed, listen. In that way, it is unlike so many other issues that are debated in our nation's capital; it is truly important to one and all. Unfortunately, it is also one of the more complicated policy issues that legislators can grapple with. Not to mention one of the most financially significant. Whether you purchase health insurance on your own, sell health insurance to others or provide it to employees, the cost is critical. There are billions of dollars involved - the health-care industry as a whole (including not just insurance, but the care itself - doctors, nurses, hospitals, pharmaceuticals, medical supply companies, and on and on) makes up one-seventh of our overall economy. There is much money to be made, and to be lost.

And if the money alone didn't make this thing huge, the level of passion surrounding an issue as important as our health has helped turn it into one of the media's favorite issues.

So we read about it in the paper. We see it on TV. And it is still difficult to decipher the "truth" about the "patients' bill

Is it good for patients or not worth the cost? Is the insurance industry telling the truth? Or are they protecting their enormous assets? Are so-called consumer groups telling the truth? Or are they fronting for fat-cat personal injury lawyers? The forest and the trees become one.

There is one group in the lobbying fray who, I promise you, is not interested in whether they make or lose money. They are only interested in being able to afford health insurance for themselves, their families and, hopefully, for their employees. And they are interested in protecting themselves from being sued for decisions they weren't involved in Period. Who are these people? They are America's little economic engine-that-could: small-business owners.

They, their families, their employees and their employees' families represent threefifths of the nation's 43 million uninsured lives. To them, the so-called "rights" in this legislation are meaningless. Having health insurance is the only thing with real meaning to them, and the "bill of rights" does nothing to help them

Those in the small-business community who are insured are struggling each year to afford the cost of increasing premiums. The Congressional Budget Office has determined that the "rights" bill will increase premiums an average of 4.2 percent. That number will mean between difference "insured" and "uninsured" for thousands of these people. There is legislation in Congress that would address the problem of the uninsured. A new law allowing the creation of Association Health Plans, for example, would help the smallbusiness community in particular. It is therefore disappointing to me that "patients' rights' takes up so many headlines when it really only addresses such a small aspect of our overall health-care troubles.

If you, like so many Americans, are passionate about improving health care in this country, please take a few moments to look at the big picture, to think about whether "patients' rights" legislation is anything more than just a bandaid that would give a temporary sense of justice and a political feather to some groups. Think about how we can get this phenomenal free market of ours the chance to lift the quality of the system up while bringing the prices down. And if you need to sort out the forest from the trees after watching the evening

news... just ask your favorite small-business owner what the biggest challenges are, and what they think ought to be done. They are the real experts.



Low-interest loan programs to help people with disabilities are renewed

wo innovative low-rate loan programs established last year that make it easier for people with disabilities to buy assistive technology equipment have been renewed for another year.

The Kentucky Assistive Technology Loan Programs. administered by the Kentucky Assistive Technology Loan Corporation (KATLC), offer its low-rate loans to qualified applicants to finance home modifications and the purchase of assistive technology devices.

Under one loan program, the KATLC, in a partnership with the Fifth Third Bank Kentucky Inc. and the Kentucky Housing Corporation, offers low-rate loans to qualified low-to-moderate income individuals who need home modifications. Examples of home modifications include wheelchair ramps, widening of doors and remote environmental controls that allow a person with limited mobility to adjust room temperature or turn on lights.

The second KATLC low-rate loan program is open to any individual at any income level. It provides loans to qualified individuals for home modifications and other assistive technology devices, such as wheelchair lifts for vans.

To participate in these programs, applicants must be individuals with disabilities, parents or guardians of individuals with disabilities or nonprofit organizations serving people with disabilities.



GEAR-UP, NASA, and East Ky. Science Center put extraterrestrial objects in local classrooms

GEAR-UP funded the meteroite kits valued at \$300 per kit. The teachers will be able to take their kits back to their classrooms to be used during classroom instruction of science.

They traveled through space, fell to Earth and are going to schools in Eastern Kentucky.

Everything from comets to meteorites landed in the hands of teachers attending a free summer solstice workshop conducted by the East Kentucky Science Center and the NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory's Solar System Educators Program, June 18, at Prestonsburg Community College.

Attendees received kits containing the extraterrestrial objects courtesy of the East

schools could not afford the meteorite packet."

Raymond Shubinski, director of the East Kentucky Science Center, estimates the value of the kits at around \$300.

The kits consisted of Allende, which contains molecules older than earth; a stony meteorite from a witnessed fall; an iron meteorite from the Russian Sikhote-Ahlie fall of 1947; and an etched piece of meteorite from the Gibeon-Africa discovery.

As part of their learning experience, teachers had to identify the meteorites and then assemble their kits.

Also during the workshop, teachers learned about NASA's Cassini and Stardust missions. Program presenter Eric Thomas had teachers create a comet from dry ice, cola and potting soil. Thomas gave the teachers computer disks containing instruction for several other classroom projects, including making comets from ice cream. The disks also contained shareware and presentations that teachers can use in their classrooms.

Thomas is one of 15 Cassini-Hugens Educator Fellows providing educational outreach for NASA's Jet Propulsion Lab's Mission to Saturn and Titan.

At the end of the workshop, each teacher received a certificate of completion and a piece of jewelry containing a meteorite chip. Door prizes of a watch and a necklace made from meteorites were awarded. Wade Crabb of Bryan Station School in Lexington won the watch. Lynn Duncan, with Wesley Christian Academy in Allen, won the necklace.

Other teachers attending included Garlene Layne Crutcher, Betsy Layne Elementary; Tammy Meade, Betsy Layne Elementary;





GOOD AND FAST PIT CREW MEMBERS NEEDED

Brian Perry is the pit crew coach and jackman on the No. 92 Kodiak Dodge Intrepid R/T with driver Stacy Compton. The 30year-old native of Madison Heights, MI has been with Melling Racing for a year and works as a shop mechanic during the week. He also works with the pit crew three times a week on pit stops and conditioning and has resorted to some creative methods to find potential pit crewmembers.

Some teams have changed as many crewmembers as engines this season. An experienced overthe-wall crewmember's stock has risen faster than an over-thecounter IPO. The single-car teams, a vanishing breed on the NASCAR Winston Cup circuit, have found it tough to compete with the bigger outfits for experienced crewmen. Perry talks about competing with multi-car teams and how difficult it is to find and keep quality pit crewmembers.

"Most of the good guys who have been working on pit crews for four or five years have gone with the big teams like Gibbs and Yates and Hendrick. Some of those guys are really good, and make I'd say make between \$700-\$1,200 on Sundays. They're guaranteed that kind of money if their car makes a lap or not. If they get off the plane and their car doesn't complete the first lap, they still get paid. Quality pit crew guys can make good money. A Busch team has paid me \$500 just to be the jackman on their car. Most of the pit crew guys are Weekend Warriors, but some of them work at the shop full-time, too."

"The ones who don't work at the shop usually have good, secure full-time jobs. We put a want ad in (NASCAR) Winston Cup Scene for pit crew guys. I went around to fire departments and police departments looking for guys who were doing what they wanted to do during the week but wouldn't mind making a few extra bucks and having some fun at the same time on weekends. I'd say 90 percent of the policemen and firemen like what they're doing, and you know they're going to be in fairly good shape."

"Some of them came out and watched our pit practice, but so far no one has wanted to pursue it. Most of them say they're glad they came out and saw what it was all about, and then they say, 'thanks, but no thanks.' "A person has to have a high desire to win to work on a pit crew. 
California's football stadium, which sits atop a major fault line, is getting a \$100 million remodeling to make it earth-







I have heard about a new medical benefit program for some military retirees called TRICARE for Life (TFL). What do you know about

The new program called TRICARE for Life (TFL) starts October 1, 2001. It provides expanded medical coverage for military retirees that are Medicare eligible, including retired guard members and reservists; Medicare-eligible family members and widow/widowers; and certain former spouses if they were eligible for TRI-CARE before age 65. You must have Medicare Part B to be eligible for TRI-CARE for Life. If eligible, you get all Medicare-covered benefits plus all TFLcovered benefits. If you use a Medicare provider, Medicare will be the first payer for all Medicarecovered services and TFL will be the second payer. TFL will pay all Medicare co-payments and deductibles and cover most of the costs of certain care not covered by Medicare.

How can I get more information about TRICARE for Life (TFL)?

For more information on TFL you may call 1-888-363-5433 or visit the website on the internet at www.tricare.osd.mil.

Does Medicare cover screening mammograms?

Yes. Medicare Part B will help to pay for one screening mammogram every 12 months for Medicare eligible women age 40 and older. The test must be performed by a facility certified by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). The Medicare Part B deductible does not apply to this test. Medicare pays 80 percent of the approved amount, which leaves a 20 percent coinsurance payment that you will have to pay. You may have some type of insurance to go with your Medicare that will pay the 20 percent.

State seeking 100-year-old businesses

FRANKFORT — In an era when dotcom companies come and go like brief summer showers and mergers absorb nameplates like black holes, business longevity is the rarity, rather than the rule.

But long-lived companies do exist, and to recognize them, the Kentucky Historical Society, in conjunction with the Cabinet for Economic Development, the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce and the Education, Arts and Humanities Cabinet, is seeking for-profit businesses that have been part of the state's economic landscape for the last 100 years.

The Kentucky Centennial Business Program looks for Kentucky businesses that have been in continuous operation since January 1, 1901. Designation as Kentucky Centennial Business is free to qualifying companies that complete a two-page application and provide evidence documenting the age of the business.

Suitable examples of evidence may include copies of old ledgers, business records, articles of incorporation or other materials documenting the operation of the company. Any type or size business can participate, and the only requirement is that the company be a for-profit enterprise that has operated continuously in Kentucky for a minimum of 100 years. Existing designees of the program include funeral homes, banks, newspapers, manufacturers and retail stores.

Once admitted into the program, businesses receive the following benefits:

- Statewide publicity.
- Certificate of distinction.
- Recognition at the Kentucky Industrial Development Council annual meeting.
- Use of the Kentucky Centennial Business logo.
- One-year membership in the Kentucky Historical Society.
- Free consultations on preserving historic business records and artifacts.

"We hope the program will encourage companies to save their historic records and artifacts," said James Wallace, assistant director of the Kentucky Historical Society. "The materials from these companies are absolutely essential to help tell the story of Kentucky's economic history."

The Kentucky Centennial Business Program is now in its sixth year with more than 260 businesses participating. Deadline to applications is September 1. For more information or an application, call Jim Wallace, Kentucky Historical Society, at (502) 564-1792, ext. 4449.

Kentucky unemployment rate holds steady at 4.1 percent in May

FRANKFORT - Kentucky's unemployment rate remained at 4.1 percent from April to May, according to the Department for Employment Services, a Cabinet for Workforce Development agency.

Kentucky's May 2001 jobless rate was slightly above May 2000's rate of 4 percent. The U.S. jobless rate decreased from 4.2 percent in April to 4.1 percent in May.

"While Kentucky's unemployment rate held steady from April to May, we saw an employment increase of more than 16,000 jobs in May," said Carlos Cracraft, the department's chief labor market analyst. "In fact, we usually have a small increase in the unemployment rate at this time of the year, but not this year."

Seven of the nine major job sectors had employment increases in May, Cracraft said,

Kentucky job growth in May was led by the services sector, which added 3,200 jobs. "Many of the new services jobs were the result of seasonal hiring for summer. Three-fourths of the new jobs were in amusement and recreation services, which is a sure sign of the onset of summer vacation season," said Cracraft.

Business services added 800 jobs, hotels and other lodging places, and health services had 600 more positions each. Personal services showed a decrease in jobs of 1,300 as tax season came to an end. The services sector has recorded the greatest employment growth in the past year with 17,800 more jobs since May 2000.

Agriculture made up lost ground with 2,500 more jobs in May. Cracraft said the sector typically adds workers in May as the planting season gets underway.

The trade sector gained 2,100 more jobs in May, all of which were in retail trade establishments. Within retail trade, eating and drinking establishments, and food stores were up by 600 positions each, and automobile dealers rose by 300 jobs.

The construction sector had the next largest increase with 1,900 new jobs in May. The special trade category accounted for 900 of those new jobs,

while 700 were in heavy construction and 300 in general building contractors.

The mining and quarrying sector had 100 more jobs in May than in April.

The finance, insurance and real estate sector added 100 jobs in May.

The government sector also recorded 100 more positions in May. A 2,100 drop in jobs in state education was offset by gains in local government (900), state government (800), local education (400) and federal government (100).

On the downside, jobs in manufacturing continued to decrease in May. The manufacturing sector reported a net loss of 800 positions as durable goods fell by 500 jobs and nondurable goods jobs decreased by 300 positions. "The manufacturing sector has lost jobs in each of the first five months of 2001," Cracraft

The transportation, communications and utilities sector recorded 400 fewer positions in May.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics monthly estimate of the number of employed Kentuckians for May 2001 was 1,918,899. This figure is up 16,577 from the 1,902,322 employed in April 2001, and up 14,354 from the 1,904,545 Kentuckians employed in May 2000.

The monthly estimate of the number of unemployed Kentuckians for May 2001 was 82,548. This figure is up 1,057 from the 81,491 unemployed in April 2001, and up 2,311 from the 80,237 Kentuckians unemployed in May 2000.

The monthly estimate of the number of Kentuckians in the civilian labor force for May 2001 was 2,001,447. This figure is up 17,634 from the 1,983,813 recorded in April 2001, and up 16,665 from the 1,984,782 recorded for May 2000.

The civilian labor force includes nonmilitary workers and unemployed Kentuckians who are actively seeking work. It does not include unemployed Kentuckians who have not looked for employment within the past four weeks. Employment and unemployment statistics are based on estimates. They are compiled to indicate employment trends rather than actually to count numbers of people who are or are not working.

It's your money!

I have spent much of this spring promoting the October launch of Kentucky's Affordable Prepaid Tuition Program (KAPT), which will help make it easier for families to afford a college education by guaranteeing the cost of tomorrow's tuition at today's lower prices. What I have learned

as I have traveled the state has been illuminating. Kentuckians are genuinely hungry for new ways to help them prepare for their family's financial future.

In today's consumer-driven, credit card culture. Americans tend to focus on buying the newest, the best, and the most expensive often to the detriment of their long term savings. This not only affects the personal finances of individuals, it affects all of society on the most profound level. The result is that as the baby boom generation approaches retirement with little saved, the government - and the taxpayers - may be left holding the

How do we, as public policy leaders, promote shortterm sacrifice in order to ensure long-term economic stability? This question, among others, was the topic of my first "Savings Roundtable" held in

Lexington this past week.

Serving as a brainstorming session to open the dialogue on these crucial issues, I was joined by civic, business, political and academic leaders from across the state. During an intensive 90-minute roundtable discussion, we discussed several major concerns as well as several possible solutions.

Among them:
Women and savings: When it comes to long-term personal financial health, women are often at a significant disadvantage. Not only do women make seventy-six cents to every dollar a man earns, but only a third of these women

are offered retirement plans. Further, half of all working women take time off from work to care for their families, thereby diminishing their potential retirement income. Women tend to save less than men and also tend to make more conservative - and often less lucrative - investment decisions. Education is clearly needed. In Ohio and a few other states, the State Treasurer orga-



nizes "Women & Money" seminars that are completely free both to the participants and the taxpayers. Would this be worthy and feasible in Kentucky?

Long term health care: The issue of the cost of long-term care is emerging as a national crisis. With 40% of Americans needing to enter some type of long term care facility, by 2010, older Americans - or their children and grand-children - will spend some \$ 52 billion to pay for nursing home assistance. The cost of long-term care is rising faster than inflation and projected to grow by 5 % a year. Roundtable participants dis-

cussed the need for a thorough examination of options to promote savings for long term care. Policy possibility: Should we develop a state pre-paid long term health care program, modeled after Kentucky's Affordable Prepaid Tuition plan?

College students and credit cards:
While credit cards are a way of life, and
most companies act responsibly, it is
clear that some bad actors in the industry are preying on vulnerable
Kentuckians, who wind up building
mountains of enormous credit card debt.
This is particularly true on college campuses, where companies often spread
from cafeterias to classroom buildings

tempting these students with free t-shirts, soft drinks, and pizza. Further, some minors are receiving solicitations at very early ages, not knowing how they appeared on the vendor lists. Should we pursue legislation such as that pending in California, which would regulate credit card marketing on college campuses?

Building savings for Kentuckians with lower incomes: One third of all income comes from savings and investment, yet half of American families have total savings of \$1000 or less, and 53 % of American workers earn \$18,000 or less. In Kentucky, this problem is especially acute among minorities and our beleaguered family farmers. What is the policy potential of such proposals as that of British Prime Minister Tony Blair who seeks to provide every newborn child with a savings account? Is there a reasonable way to promote education, starting in the elementary school classroom, to encourage all

To follow up on the

To follow up on the progress of this exciting meeting, I am appointing a Commission later this summer. The Treasurer's Commission on Savings will have two primary objectives: (1) to identify and develop the curricula for initiatives to promote savings education and financial literacy; and (2) to propose legislation, where necessary, to protect Kentuckians from predatory practices and create programs that encourage savings for retirement and long term health care. This is no 30-day or 60-day pro-

ject. Instead, I look forward to many months -even years- of intensive policy discussions, to seek the broadest consensus possible and to ensure the viability of any solutions that are developed.

Any program we develop will reflect my personal vision of the role of government. Unlike some who feel we should remove government entirely from our lives, and others who want government to solve all of our problems, I prefer the so-called "third way"; where government equips people with the tools they need to solve their own problems. With this approach, I believe we can truly help all Kentuckians thrive in the new 21st century economy.



News of the weird...

In recent New York City and auctions, according to a May report in the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, Tom Friedman's "Untitled" (a Styrotoam cup of evaporated-coffee stains, pinned to a piece of wood along with a ladybug) went for \$30,000 at Phillips Auctioneers; Robert Gober's "Broom Sink" (a fancifully constructed wash basin) earned nearly \$500,000; and Jeff Koons' life-sized ceramic "Michael Jackson and Bubbles" (the chimp) sold for \$5.6 million.

■ Golfers cannot play on courses in Germany without a license, which applicants must earn by passing a written test and a skills test in putting, chipping and driving, according to a June dispatch in The Wall Street Journal. Golf association officials defend the requirement for keeping away slow-playing novices, but they estimate it might take about \$800 or more for lessons and classes just to get the certificate.

■ Hard Times for Rape Victims: In St. Petersburg, Fla., in June, a 29year-old rape victim, still shaken up and in a hospital gown after being treated, was arrested and ushered off

to jail when a routine check revealed that she had three outstanding judicial warrants (failure to pay a traffic fine, failure to pay an unlicensed-dog fine, and allowing her young daughters to miss school). Also in June, in Albany, N.Y., Supreme Court Justice James Canfield performed the wedding of Robert Gorghan to his girlfriend, Cheryl, only minutes after Gorghan had been sentenced in another courtroom to 25 years in prison for the serial sexual assault of Cheryl's daughter over a 13-year period. (Canfield is notorious for marrying the just-convicted, which he said reduces the likelihood that they will engage in homosexual sex in

More Good News for Breasts

■ Following rucent FDA approval and as a safer alternative to surgery, doctors have begun offering the \$2,500 Brava Breast Enhancement vacuum device that its developer says can increase cup size by stimulating tissue growth, although the contraption must be worn for 10 hours every day for 10 weeks, pulling tissue gently inside its vacuum domes. And a researcher in Melbourne, Australia, told a recent meeting of surgeons that he had

grown breast tissue in rats, mice and rabbits, and that, if it could be done for humans, it would allow women to grow larger breasts. And a 31-year-old woman in Frankenmuth, Mich., reported, in June that a nail that flew up from her lawn mower's blade and that could have penetrated her heart was deflected by her "liquid-curved" Maidenform bra; she said that "a higher power" had told her that day to wear a bra for lawn-mowing.

Compelling Explanations

■ In March, the Yakima Indian Nation performed two rain ceremonies (ancient rituals involving fruits and berries) in the Washington mountains to bring an end to the drought plaguing the Northwest and then sent the bill for expenses (\$32,000) to the region's electricity provider, Bonneville Power Administration, pointing out the (slight) increase in rainfall afterward. Nonetheless, Bonneville declined to pay.

Testifying at his sexual molestation trial in Leeds, England, in March, psychic healer Terence Wood, 41, admitted that he might have put his hands inside the clothing of the four complaining females but that he was unaware he was doing anything wrong: "When I'm healing, I'm in an altered state, and I just go where the

spirit tells me the pain is. I close my eyes. My hand becomes very, very hot.*

Tom Wahl and his wife, Suzi, were convicted in St. Louis in April of "prostitution," in that a jury found that they had engaged in sex for money, even though they were having sex only with each other, at paid sex-education "seminars" the couple ran. Their lawyer's unsuccessful closing argument compared the Wahls to a golf pro trying to teach duffers the proper techniques for swinging a club. That would not be "golf," said the lawyer, it would be a demonstration of techniques, and thus, a demonstration of sex techniques would not be "sex."

Min May in Denver, Richard M. Young, 43, filed a federal lawsuit against his ex-employer, Ohio Casualty Insurance, for firing him after an incident in which he kept sheriff's deputies at bay for six hours while wielding a gun in a shopping center parking lot, threatening to kill himself. Young said he has a mental illness, which the company is required to "accommodate" under federal law, and that just because he wanted to kill himself doesn't mean he doesn't want to continue working for Ohio Casualty. Young's job at the

company was regional manager of litigation.

In separate lawsuits filed in January, two teen-age boys claim that York, Pa., personal injury lawyer Mark David Frankel fondled them inappropriately when the boys, with their mothers, went to Frankel's office to discuss injuries they had suffered in auto accidents. According to the lawsuits, in each case Frankel quickly attempted to examine the boys' buttocks, thighs and genitals, claiming that he could detect injuries that doctors often miss. According to one mother, Frankel said he needed to examine those areas because, if a doctor had diagnosed a head injury and a foot injury, there was usually another injury in between.

The younger man, wearing a sauna suit, was found duct-taped and hand-cuffed to a chair and apparently choked to death after, according to news reports, being force-fed 2 1/2 pounds of peanut butter.

■ A 34-year-old man was shot to death over a piece of sweet potato pie (Atlanta, January). A man was stabbed to death allegedly by his girthrend when he brought her home a McDonald's ham, egg and cheese baget instead of the two Egg McMuffins she requested (Martinez, Calif., March). A 48-year-old man was shot to death, allegedly by his wife, after a fight over their satellite-TV controls (Orlando, April). A 37-year-old man was beaten to death, allegedly by his roommate, in a fight over the thermostat setting (Dallas, May).

(She is my first cousin's granddaughter, so does that makes her my first cousin, twice removed, or my third cousin? I could never get that straight.) She would have been my grandmother's first great-great grandchild, and I regret that they will not have an opportunity to know one another.

Gorilla Exhibit coming

The \$15 million, four-acre Gorilla Forest Exhibit now under construction at the Louisville Zoo will open May 2002, with gorillas from Chicago. Louisville Mayor David L. Armstrong announced recently that the first troops of gorillas to inhabit the Louisville Zoo's Gorilla Forest Exhibit will be coming from Chicago's Lincoln Park Zoo.

The animals, which are rare Western lowland gorillas, are scheduled to arrive in two groups. The first troop should reach Louisville in early 2002, with the second troop following in the fall.

Louisville Zoo Director, Dr. Bill Foster indicated that a total of 11 gorillas are likely to make the journey. He did add that, "Because we are dealing with animals, this is a dynamic process. The staff at Lincoln Park Zoo will work with population management experts to determine exactly which and how many gorillas will be moving to Louisville as the time draws nearer."

sulting with UPS, Lincoln Park of our colleagues from other Zoo staff and other experts in the field to develop a detailed plan for the move.

Mayor Armstrong expressed his appreciation for being associated with a Zoo that has a national reputation for gorilla conservation. He added, "Our Gorilla Forest Exhibit will be one of the finest gorilla facilities anywhere, and we are pleased and proud that Lincoln Park Zoo is entrusting us with the care of their animals." The Mayor continued, "The gorillas that will be in the Gorilla Forest are ambassadors for their kind. They will help us teach children and adults alike about their uncertain future in the wild. And our children will be the conservators and stewards of our future."

Lincoln Park Zoo is transferring animals to prepare for construction of a new Great Ape House. The gorillas will be on loan to the Louisville Zoo for three to five years. According to Dr. Foster, "Our ability to populate the Gorilla Forest in The Louisville zoo is con- Louisville is due to the success zoos in breeding these animals. Gorillas from other zoos will eventually make their way to Louisville, but this will all be determined over time, and based on Species Survival Plan (SSP) recommenda-

Today's zoos cooperate to manage animals in ways that are most beneficial to the species. For example, the movement and breeding of Western lowland gorillas in North America is managed by the Gorilla Species Survival Plan (SSP) of the American Zoo and Aquarium Association (AZA). This is done to maintain as much genetic diversity in the gorilla population as possible. One of the ways that the SSP accomplishes this task is by carefully and scientifically selecting each animal's mate.

Lincoln Park Zoo: a leader in gorilla conservation

Lincoln Park Zoo began in 1868 with a pair of swans, making it the oldest zoo in the country. Today more than 1,100 mammals, reptiles and birds reside on 35 acres of Chicago's lakefront. One of the most visited zoos in the country, Lincoln Park has become worldrenowned for its successful gorilla breeding program.

On August 15, 1930, a 2 1/2 year-old gorilla arrived at Park Zoo from Lincoln Cameroon. His name was Bushman and he became a Chicago legend. Since that time, an amazing 44 gorillas have been born at the zoo garnering Lincoln Park Zoo the nickname Gorilla Town, USA.

Louisville Zoo:

Although only 32 years old, the Louisville Zoo offers an extensive animal and botanical collection. More than 1,300 animals are displayed in naturalistic habitats on the 134-acre facility, conveniently located in the middle of Louisville. It is a top attraction in Louisville (second only to the city's Waterfront Park) and 11th in Kentucky. While its primary focus is as a recreation, education and conservation resource for the region, the Zoo appeals to all ages and draws almost 700,000 visitors annually.

"PEARL HARBOR"

This summer's most over-hyped "event movie," "Pearl Harbor," is proof positive that a film can be both a blockbuster and a dud much like "Titanic" was.

The historic atrocity isn't so much the bombing of Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941, but this film's depiction of the events and total disregard for the spirit of time in which the attack occurred. None of the characters looks, acts or speaks the way Americans did during that era.

That's because "Pearl Harbor" isn't a movie about history. It's a summertime popcorn flick with pretty, one-dimensional characters who have "love issues" (for the chicks), and lots of explosions (for the dudes).

It's just set during the 1940s in much the same way "Happy Days" was about the 1950s. Everyone wore '50s clothes, but

their haircuts, values, dialogue and sensibilities were firmly rooted in the present day. "Pearl Harbor" is just like "Happy Days" - only louder, longer and more boring.

This more than three-hour loogie stars Ben Affleck (Rafe McCawley) and Josh Hartnett (Danny Walker) as two childhood buddies from Tennessee (though Josh is the only one who attempts an accent) who volunteer (they're from Tennessee, get it?) for the Army Air Corps.

While at training camp, Affleck falls in love with a nurse (Kate Beckinsdale). Their passionless love affair takes up the first hour and a half of the film.

Since America isn't involved in the war in Europe, Affleck volunteers to fly for the British RAF. During a mission, he is shot down and presumed dead. So, Ben's nurse girlfriend sleeps with his best

the audience is looking at their watches wondering where the Japanese are.

America is shocked. America is stunned. America wants payback. So, Jimmy Doolittle (played by Alec Baldwin) leads his famous raid on Tokyo. Ben and Josh volunteer for the raid. One of them dies, which ties up the messy love triangle thing. America wins the war. The

The only redeeming thing about "Pearl Harbor" is that while watching this debacle, I kept thinking of some of my favorite World War II pictures: "Patton," "Sands of Iwo Jima," "30 Seconds Over Tokyo," "From Here To Eternity." For the price of admission to "Pearl Harbor," I - and you - could rent those great films. I suggest you do



Gorilla Exhibit coming

The \$15 million, four-acre Gorilla Forest Exhibit now under construction at the Louisville Zoo will open May 2002, with gorillas from Chicago. Louisville Mayor David L. Armstrong announced recently that the first troops of gorillas to inhabit the Louisville Zoo's Gorilla Forest Exhibit will be coming from Chicago's Lincoln Park Zoo.

The animals, which are rare Western lowland gorillas, are scheduled to arrive in two groups. The first troop should reach Louisville in early 2002, with the second troop following in the fall.

Louisville Zoo Director, Dr. Bill Foster indicated that a total of 11 gorillas are likely to make the journey. He did add that, "Because we are dealing with animals, this is a dynamic process. The staff at Lincoln Park Zoo will work with population management experts to determine exactly which and how many gorillas will be moving to Louisville as the time draws nearer."

sulting with UPS, Lincoln Park of our colleagues from other Zoo staff and other experts in the field to develop a detailed plan for the move.

Mayor Armstrong expressed his appreciation for being associated with a Zoo that has a national reputation for gorilla conservation. He added, "Our Gorilla Forest Exhibit will be one of the finest gorilla facilities anywhere, and we are pleased and proud that Lincoln Park Zoo is entrusting us with the care of their animals." The Mayor continued, "The gorillas that will be in the Gorilla Forest are ambassadors for their kind. They will help us teach children and adults alike about their uncertain future in the wild. And our children will be the conservators and stewards of our future."

Lincoln Park Zoo is transferring animals to prepare for construction of a new Great Ape House. The gorillas will be on loan to the Louisville Zoo for three to five years. According to Dr. Foster, "Our ability to populate the Gorilla Forest in The Louisville zoo is con- Louisville is due to the success zoos in breeding these animals. Gorillas from other zoos will eventually make their way to Louisville, but this will all be determined over time, and based on Species Survival Plan (SSP) recommenda-

Today's zoos cooperate to manage animals in ways that are most beneficial to the species. For example, the movement and breeding of Western lowland gorillas in North America is managed by the Gorilla Species Survival Plan (SSP) of the American Zoo and Aquarium Association (AZA). This is done to maintain as much genetic diversity in the gorilla population as possible. One of the ways that the SSP accomplishes this task is by carefully and scientifically selecting each animal's mate.

Lincoln Park Zoo: a leader in gorilla conservation

Lincoln Park Zoo began in 1868 with a pair of swans, making it the oldest zoo in the country. Today more than 1,100 mammals, reptiles and birds reside on 35 acres of Chicago's lakefront. One of the most visited zoos in the country, Lincoln Park has become worldrenowned for its successful gorilla breeding program.

On August 15, 1930, a 2 1/2 year-old gorilla arrived at Park Zoo from Lincoln Cameroon. His name was Bushman and he became a Chicago legend. Since that time, an amazing 44 gorillas have been born at the zoo garnering Lincoln Park Zoo the nickname Gorilla Town, USA.

Louisville Zoo:

Although only 32 years old, the Louisville Zoo offers an extensive animal and botanical collection. More than 1,300 animals are displayed in naturalistic habitats on the 134-acre facility, conveniently located in the middle of Louisville. It is a top attraction in Louisville (second only to the city's Waterfront Park) and 11th in Kentucky. While its primary focus is as a recreation, education and conservation resource for the region, the Zoo appeals to all ages and draws almost 700,000 visitors annually.

"PEARL HARBOR"

This summer's most over-hyped "event movie," "Pearl Harbor," is proof positive that a film can be both a blockbuster and a dud much like "Titanic" was.

The historic atrocity isn't so much the bombing of Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941, but this film's depiction of the events and total disregard for the spirit of time in which the attack occurred. None of the characters looks, acts or speaks the way Americans did during that era.

That's because "Pearl Harbor" isn't a movie about history. It's a summertime popcorn flick with pretty, one-dimensional characters who have "love issues" (for the chicks), and lots of explosions (for the dudes).

It's just set during the 1940s in much the same way "Happy Days" was about the 1950s. Everyone wore '50s clothes, but

their haircuts, values, dialogue and sensibilities were firmly rooted in the present day. "Pearl Harbor" is just like "Happy Days" - only louder, longer and more boring.

This more than three-hour loogie stars Ben Affleck (Rafe McCawley) and Josh Hartnett (Danny Walker) as two childhood buddies from Tennessee (though Josh is the only one who attempts an accent) who volunteer (they're from Tennessee, get it?) for the Army Air Corps.

While at training camp, Affleck falls in love with a nurse (Kate Beckinsdale). Their passionless love affair takes up the first hour and a half of the film.

Since America isn't involved in the war in Europe, Affleck volunteers to fly for the British RAF. During a mission, he is shot down and presumed dead. So, Ben's nurse girlfriend sleeps with his best

But we all know that Ben Affleck isn't dead because his name's above the title. Lo and behold, he returns. Everyone involved in the love triangle is totally bummed. Everyone in

the audience is looking at their watches wondering where the Japanese are.

Eventually the Japanese show up. Lots of explosions. Somehow, the 40-minute battle sequence seems longer than the previous 90 minutes.

America is shocked. America is stunned. America wants payback. So, Jimmy Doolittle (played by Alec Baldwin) leads his famous raid on Tokyo. Ben and Josh volunteer for the raid. One of them dies, which ties up the messy love triangle thing. America wins the war. The

The only redeeming thing about "Pearl Harbor" is that while watching this debacle, I kept thinking of some of my favorite World War II pictures: "Patton," "Sands of Iwo Jima," "30 Seconds Over Tokyo," "From Here To Eternity." For the price of admission to "Pearl Harbor," I - and you - could rent those great films. I suggest you do


